Big FDI reforms to shore up economy

Cabinet eases investment norms for single-brand retail, coal mining, manufacturing, digital media

The Centre on Wednesday announced major steps to attract foreign investment and give a boost to medical education in the country. The Government relaxed Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) rules in many sectors, including single brand retail, coal and lignite mining, contract man-ufacturing and digital media. It also decided to open 75 medical colleges which will add at least 15,700 MBBS seats in

Briefing reporters on the decisions taken by the Union Cabinet headed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal said 100 per cent FDI under automatic route in coal mining and associated infrastructure has been approved.

To boost domestic manufacturing, 100 per cent FDI in contract manufacturing under

automatic route has been allowed, he said, adding that 26 per cent FDI has been allowed in digital media.

On FDI in single-brand retail, the Cabinet has expanded the definition of mandatory 30 per cent domestic sourcing norm. It also allowed single-brand retailers to start online sales, waiving the previous condition of setting up a mandatory brick-and-mortar store, said Goyal.

The changes in FDI policy will result in making India a more attractive FDI destination, leading to benefits of increased investments, employment, and growth," Goyal told a media briefing after the meeting of the Union Cabinet.

He said 100 per cent FDI under automatic route in coal

The FDI policy provides that 30 per cent of value of goods has to be procured from India if SBRT entity has FDI more than 51 per cent. Further, as regards local sourcing requirement, the same can be met as an average during the first five years, and thereafter annually towards its India oper-

Further, the current cap of considering exports for five years only is proposed to be removed, to give an impetus to exports, it added, detailing the changes in the single brand FDI norms.

FDI is a major driver of economic growth and a source of non-debt finance for the economic development of the country.

The Government has put in place an investor-friendly policy on FDI, under which investment up to 100 per cent is permitted on the automatic route in most sectors/activities.

> The Supreme Court on Wednesday referred a batch of petitions challenging the changes in Jammu & Kashmir's constitutional status by abrogating provisions of Article 370 to a five-judge Constitution Bench. The SC, which said the petitions will be listed for hearing in the first week of October, also issued notices to the Centre and the Jammu & Kashmir administration on the batch of pleas challenging the presidential order abrogating Article 370 of the Constitution.

A Bench headed by Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi did not agree with the Centre that there was no need for issuing notices in the matter as Attorney General KK Venugopal and Solicitor



General Tushar Mehta were marking their presence in the court. "We will refer the matter to a five-judge Constitution Bench," said the Bench while not accepting the argument that the notices would have a "cross-border repercussion".

The Bench also comprised Justices SA Bobde and SA Nazeer. The Attorney General said whatever was being said by the court was sent before the United Nations (UN). As the counsel appearing for both sides were involved in arguments and counter-arguments, the SC said, "We know what to do, we have passed the order,

GOVT TO START DRIVE AGAINST MOSQUITO RELATED DISEASES FROM SEPTEMBER 1

Disclosing previous three years health records focusing dengue and chikungunya, Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal said cases of vector-borne diseases have dropped by 80 per cent from 2015-18 contrary to all over India where the number of cases escalated to 1,88,401 in 2017 from 60,000 in

The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) regime claimed that the number of deaths also decreased in past three years. Citing Health Department data, Kejriwal said, "In 2015, total number of deaths due to vector borne were 60 whereas the deaths number decrease to only four in 2018.

Conspicuously, India is among the 100 countries highly affected by vector borne disease. "If we look at the national level, there was an increase of 300 per cent in the Dengue and Chikungunya cases between 2009 and 2017. The number of cases of Dengue and Chikungunya increased to 1,88,401 in 2017 and the large number of deaths happened in 2017," Kejriwal said.

Announcing the campaign '10 Hafte, 10 Baje, 10 Minute Har Ravivar, Dengue Par War', Kejriwal urged people to

Lauding Mohalla clinics and 500 fever clinics, Kejriwal said in Delhi in 2015, the total number of dengue cases stood at 15,867, while the number decreased to 2,798 in 2018. It also resulted deaths being recorded at four as compared to 60 in the corresponding period ". "It is possible due to Mohalla clinics, as people don't have to rush to big hospitals as medical services are available in Fever clinics," Kejriwal said.

Kejriwal announced that will begin this campaign from his own house on Sunday and will check that there is no stagnant clean water in any of the sources where mosquitoes can breed. "We appeal to the people of Delhi to give 10 minutes on every Sunday at 10:00 AM to check all sources of stagnant water in their homes, as the Dengue mosquitoes breed only in clean water" Kejriwal said.

Citing dengue and chikun-gunya data of the Delhi Government which claimed the number of vector-borne diseases have decreased by 80 per cent in three years span from 2015 to 2018, Delhi BJP president Manoj Tiwari said Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal admitted that three Municipal Corporations are working in a better way and now he should release the funds to corporations.

Delhi department of Government has decided to extend the benefit of the scheme to the students belonging to Other Backward Classes (OBC) and Economically Weaker Section (EWS) category as well. The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) Government is also planning to increase the coaching time in order to provide a quality education. The Minister of SC/ST and

Social Welfare Department, also the brain behind the scheme Rajendra Pal Gautam said, "We have successfully implemented the scheme for SC/ST students under which about 30 students have secured admissions in top university such as IIT, NEET, Netaji Subhash University of Technology, Delhi University, Benaras Hindu University and others. Thus, the Government has planned to extend the scheme to the needy students from OBC and general category students coming under EWS category, who will avail the free coaching classes."

"Chief Minister (CM) Arvind Kejriwal believes that the students with talent and skills should not lag behind because of poverty. Everyone has the Right to Education and

in many cases talented students miss the chance due to poverty thus, the government has decided to extend the facility to the other category students. The department has prepared cabinet note for the extension of the scheme to the OBC and EWS category students and are expecting to get approval soon. "The cabinet note is prepared and we will announce this happy news to the public

Gautame said. The OBC and EWS students whose annual family income is not above Rs 8 lakh will avail the facility under this scheme. Currently under the scheme about 5000 students of SC/ST are provided free coaching classes in top coaching centres but with the extension of this scheme the seats will be increased to 15000 to provide free education to the poor needy students of OBC and EWS, the minister added. Jaishankar, who arrived here on Tuesday on a two-day visit finalise the preparations for Prime Minister Narendra Modi's forthcoming visit to Russia, said that 'I first came here almost to the date exactly 40 years ago and in 40 years lot of things have changed, the world has changed, Russia and India have changed.'

Jaishankar was posted in the Indian mission in Russia from 1979 to 1981.

'I would say relatively speaking, a constant in these 40 years have actually been our

relationship (India-Russia). If you look 40 years ago at the big relationships that characterised international relations... India-Russia has remained a much more stable factor in the international relations than almost

any other significant relationship of our era,' he added.

Delivering a speech at the discussion platform of the Valdai Discussion Club on 'The prospects of India's policy in the Indo-Pacific region

shifted towards the Pacific, so the policies that started from 'Look East' to 'Act East' have matured into 'Indo-Pacific'.

He said that the changing world had thrown up new concepts and approaches and the Indo-Pacific was one of them.

'We are actually moving significantly out of the world of alliances to a world of convergence...But countries who find common cause on particular issues have an interest in working together and the Indo-Pacific is a concept that has grown out of this era of convergence,' he said during the discussion.

'In our neighbourhood we have a policy 'neighbourhood first' which is a non-reciprocal policy of prioritising co-operation in our immediate neighthe ASEAN which was called 'Look East', started in 1992, over a period of time it became 'Act East' because it developed aspects of physical connectivity and security. Today, India's economic interest have shifted towards the Pacific, so the policies matured into 'Indo-Pacific',' he added.

India, the US and several other world powers have been talking about the need to ensure a free, open and thriving Indo-Pacific in the backdrop of China's rising military manoeuvring in the region.

China has been trying to expand its military presence in the Indo-Pacific, which is a biogeographic region, comprising the Indian Ocean and the western and central Pacific Ocean, including the South

Elderly Sikh stabbed to death in US

Washington: A 64-year-old Sikh man from India was stabbed to death by an unidentified person in the ÚS' California while he was on his evening walk, according to a media report.
Parmjit Singh was attacked

in Gretchen Talley Park in Tracy around 9 pm on Sunday. He died from his injuries, ABC News reported. Detectives say a passerby spotted the man bleeding on the ground and immediately called 911. Police have launched a homicide investigation.

Police don't have any clear suspects. On Monday, they asked for the community's help identifying a man captured on video hopping a fence and running away from the park around the time when the incident took place, according to the report.

'We just need to figure out who that is, why they were in the area, what they may have seen and potentially any of their involvement in the incident,' said Tracy Police Spokesperson Lt Trevin Freitas.

amenting the "very pitiful" Lamenting une very reconstruction rate in criminal cases in the country, Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Wednesday said the era of ageold police techniques like administering third degree to suspects and phone tapping are over as they do not yield the desired results in curbing crime.

Addressing the top brass of Central Police Organisations during the 49th Raising Day event of the Bureau of Police Research and Development (BPRD) here, Shah exhorted the use of forensic evidence by police investigators to clinch convictions against criminals.

Hinting at an overhaul of policing techniques, the minister said that he has asked the BPRD to prepare a plan to have 'modus operandi bureaus' at the national and state-level and that the government is mulling making forensic evidence compulsory in all criminal cases where the quantum of punishment is seven years or more.

He said he has asked the BPRD, a police think tank under the Home Ministry, to initiate a countrywide "consultative process" for effecting changes in CrPC (Criminal Procedure Code) and IPC

(Indian Penal Code).

National forensic science varsity ₹6,268 subsidy on sugar export

The Union Cabinet on Wednesday approved a ₹6,268-crore subsidy for export of 60 lakh tonnes of sugar during the 2019-20 marketing year starting October, in order to liquidate surplus domestic stock and help mills in clearing huge sugarcane arrears to farmers.

The decision, meant for the sugarcane season for the current year involving an export subsidy of ₹ 10,448 per metric tonne to sugar mills, comes in the backdrop of upcoming Maharashtra, polls in . Jharkhand and Haryana.

Maharashtra and Haryana are among the top sugarcane producing states. India has 162 lakh tonnes of sugar stock. Of this, 40 lakh tonnes is buffer stock and 60 lakh tonnes are meant for export.

After the Cabinet meeting, Information and Broadcasting Minister Prakash Javadekar said that the government has taken an important decision in the interest of sugarcane farmers. "This will benefit millions of farmers in Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra and Karnataka as well as other states," he said. The government is providing subsidy for export of 50 lakh tonnes of sugar for the current 2018-19 marketing year. "The subsidy will be trans-

ferred directly to the farmer's account on behalf of the mills against cane price dues and subsequent balance, if any, would be credited to mill's account. The direct transfer will poten-

tially curb pilferage and directly reach the farmers. The sugar season 2019-20 is expected to start with an opening and closing stock of 142 MT and 162 MT respectively," officials said.

The announcement is expected to give a boost to BJP's support base among farmers in Maharashtra, Jharkhand, Haryana and Delhi. In a major outreach initiative to address the concerns of the farming community, which cost the BJP three state elections last December, the NDA government extended the scope of the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi, or PM-Kisan scheme, to include all the 145 million farmers across the country, besides announcing a ₹ 3,000 monthly pension scheme for 125 million small and marginal farmers.

NEW TWIST IN CHINMAYANAND CASE

Victim found staying with extortionist in Delhi hotel

New Delhi: Startling revelations in the Swami Chinmayanand sexual abuse case has given a new twist to the story, which has taken Uttar Pradesh by storm.

The Shahjahanpur girl who released a video on August 23, accusing former BJP Union Minister Chinamayanand of sexual harassment, has been traced in New Delhi, along with the boy who reportedly demanded a ransom of ₹5 crore from Chinamayanand.

A senior Uttar Pradesh Police officer confirmed with IANS that CCTV footage retrieved from a hotel in Dwarka establishes the presence of the victim with the boy who reportedly made an extortion call to Chinmayanand.

"We have recovered an Aadhaar card, submitted as address proof, from the Delhi hotel. The couple shifted to another hotel on August 25," said an official associated with the investigation, adding, "The also belongs to Shahjahanpur. Efforts are on to identify his place and family."

The police have also traced the location and the elopement route of the young couple from



Shahjahanpur to Delhi through the records of their mobile

Sources said that after August 24, the couple switched off their phones and probably started using new numbers. The police also said that the girl spoke to her family till August 24. The victim, who alleged that Chinmayanand was sexually harassing her, was in touch with the local boy for the past several days. The records of her mobile phone established that the two were staying in the same premises in Delhi.

Earlier, Chinmayanand had said that he was being framed in a case of abduction and sexual harassment as part of a conspiracy.

against him for the alleged abduction of a law student in SS College in Shahjahanpur, the BJP leader told a news channel: "This is a conspiracy against me and the girl in question is a part of it. There are four other boys who had earlier tried to blackmail me and extort money."

The former minister further said that attempts were being made to malign the image of the Yogi Adityanath Government.

"Earlier Kuldeep Singh Sengar was implicated in a similar case and now I am being targeted," he said.

Lucknow: The Uttar Pradesh Women Commission on Wednesday sought a report from the Shahjahanpur district administration on the disappearance of a Post-graduate student who, in a video clip, had accused former Union minister Swami Chinmayanand of harassing her.

UPWC chief Vimla Batham also expressed her commitment to safe return of the girl, who had been pursuing her studies in a college run by BJP leader Chinmayanand's Mumukshu

"We have taken note of the incident and sought a report in this regard from district magistrate and superintendent of police of Shahjahapur. We are awaiting report and will ensure that she returns safely," Batham told

The missing woman's father subsequently in a complaint to the police has accused Chinmayanand of sexually harassing his daughter and being behind her disappearance — a charge vehemently refuted by the BJP leader's

On the father's complaint, the police has lodged an FIR against the former Union minister under sections 364 (kidnapping or abducting for murder) and 506 (criminal intimidation) of the Indian Penal Code.

Chinmayanand case repetition of Unnao episode: Priyanka

Lucknow: Congress leader Priyanka Gandhi Vadra on Wednesday said the alleged harassment of a woman student by ex-Union Minister and BJP leader Swami Chinmayanand in Shahjahanpur appears to be a repetition of the Unnao case.

In a tweet, she alleged that in Uttar Pradesh, if a woman registers a complaint against a BJP leader her security is not guaranteed.

Gandhi was referring to the rape charge made by a 19-year-old woman from Unnao against MLA Kuldeep Singh Sengar, who was expelled from the BJP recently. In Shahjahanpur, Chinmayanand was pooked on Tuesday under IPC sections related to abduction in order to murder, and criminal intimidation.

Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath's media advisor Mrityunjay Kumar was quick in his retort advising the Congress general secretary not to create confusion and the police have taken all the steps in this regard.

The Shahjahanpur police on Tuesday lodged an FIR against Chinmayanand after the student harassing her. Her father had filed a complaint

with the police accusing Chinmayanand of sexually harassing her, a charge refuted by the BJP leader's lawyer who claimed it was a "conspiracy" to blackmail him.

The woman's father alleged that she has gone missing at the behest of the 72-year-old BJP leader, who heads Mumukshu ashram. She is a post-graduate student in one of the colleges run by the ashram.

"In Uttar Pradesh, this matter appears to be repetition of the Unnao case. If a woman complains against a BJP leader, then she is not guaranteed justice, even her own safety is not guaranteed," Priyanka Gandhi said in a tweet in Hindi with hashtag 'EnoughIsEnough'.

The 19-year-old rape survivor from Unnao and her lawyer suffered critical injuries in a car-truck collision in Rae Bareli district in Uttar Pradesh on July 28. Her two aunts died in the incident. The girl's fam-

Guwahati: The All Assam Students' Union (AASU) on Wednesday said it has full faith in the updation process of the NRC and claimed that the apprehension expressed by various political parties is a ploy to confuse people as they want to

protect their votebanks. The AASU is a signatory to the Assam Accord, a 1985 document that provided for "detection, deletion and deportation" of illegal foreigners from Assam.

Under the monitoring of the Supreme Court, the National Register of Citizens (NRC) is being updated in the BJP-ruled state to prepare a list of genuine Indians. The final version of it is slated to be published on August 31.

"We have full faith in the process. Different political parties are trying to confuse the people by expressing apprehensions at a stage when the NRC is to be published in a few days," AASŪ Chief Advisor

Samujjal Bhattacharya told PTI. Union Home Minister Amit Shah, who is also the BJP president, and Chief Minister

Sarbananda Sonowal had earlier "hailed the publication of the draft NRC but suddenly they started criticising the process," he said. Former Congress chief

minister Tarun Gogoi who had claimed it was his government that initiated the NRC process, recently alleged that the register is going to be just a "scrap of paper", Bhattacharya claimed.

"Political parties seek to protect their vote banks involving both Hindus and Muslims and these criticisms are just a ploy to

confuse people," he alleged.

The BJP government is there at the Centre since 2014 and in the state from 2016, and both have the power to resolve the foreigners' issue, the AASU leader said. "Before both the assembly poll and recent Lok Sabha elections, the BJP

promised that they will ensure publication of a foreigner-free NRC but now they have adopted a different stand," the AASU leader said. The BJP and the Akhil Bharatiya Vidyarthi Parishad are claiming that a large number of foreigners have been included in the NRC drafts.

The state and central governments had moved the Supreme Court seeking permission for 20 per cent sample re-verification to find out wrongful inclusions and exclusions of persons in the NRC. The apex court rejected the

plea on July 23.

The AASU leader urged political parties and the governments not to confuse people but cooperate in the process of the NRC publication. During the last 34 years since the signing of the Assam Accord, there has been no detection or deportation or sealing of the Indo-Bangladesh border, Bhattacharya claimed. PTI

Assam Govt did nothing to ensure error-free NRC: Anti-infiltration body

Guwahati: An organisation against infiltration on Wednesday accused the Assam Government of "doing nothing at the right time" to ensure an error-free NRC, while alleging that the ruling BJP was only interested in including Hindu

Bangladeshis in the document. It is now "evident" that the National Register of Citizens (NRC), the final version of which will be published on August 31, will include a large number of foreigners illegally living in Assam, claimed the Prabajan Virodhi Manch (Forum Against Infiltration).

Cooperation pacts in traditional and emerging sectors expected during Modi visit to Vladivostok

learly, the informal talks and Upersonal chemistry between Russian President Vladimir Putin and Prime Minister Narendra Modi have reset the Indo-Russian axis of cooperation, one that many had thought was being pulled at the edges in a US-dominated scenario. Going by the chief guest status accorded to Modi for the Eastern Economic Forum meeting at Vladivostok, introducing India as a decisive economic

player in the Russian-Pacific region and holding the 20th bilateral summit there as an example of expanded cooperation, the relationship is not only on an even keel but emerging as a major force in the Far East. As the Russian ambassador to India, Nikolay Kudashev, said at a press conference, "Our leaders, who represent global powers, playing an active role in shaping a more just, equal and representative multi-polar world order, will for sure synchronise watches on international and regional developments, while we enjoy similarity of approaches in global affairs."

Given the immediacy of Jammu & Kashmir as a context that tested ties, he further reiterated Russia's position that it respected "India's constitutional space, that Kashmir was an internal issue of India to be decided within the parameters of the Simla Agreement and the two countries would have to solve their issues through dialogue." Backing him up, the Deputy Chief Mission, Roman Babushkin, clarified that during the closed consultations in UN Security Council earlier this month Russia had insisted that members should adhere to the UN charter, which says there should be no interference in domestic matters. "There was no mention of any specific UN resolutions. We are committed to non-interference in domestic affairs of a third country," he said. The envoys also highlighted Russia's continued support to India's candidacy as a permanent member in the Security Council and the "inadmissibility of double standards on terrorism. The Russian-Indian ties successfully adjust themselves to the modem realities, including turtoday's world. Our bilateral relations are immune to any negative influence from outside." If there was any doubt on Russia's role vis-a-vis India-Pakistan, this clearly dispelled it.

While the envoys said that they were satisfied with current levels of defence cooperation, the Vladivostok summit is expected to promote stable mutual growth of trade turnovers, aiming to touch \$ 30 billion by 2025. While ONGC Videsh has been an early player in the region with the Sakhalin oil fields, the new areas for Indian investment and agreements would be mining mineral resources, harnessing energy, participation in pharmaceuticals and R&D, partnerships in education, agriculture, aquaculture, promotion of tourism and people-to-people contacts. A visit to Vladivostok is now being facilitated by evisas. Low-cost financing and preferential tax regimes will be offered to encourage investment. Most importantly, the Vladivostok-Chennai sea route, which was once used by Russian cargo ships, will now be developed as a key transport and logistics corridor.

On its part, the Russians will enhance industrial cooperation, create new technological and investment alliances, and contribute to infrastructure development through the "Make in India" project. For example, Russian Railway will collaborate on the Nagpur-Secunderabad high-speed corridor.

Russia is stepping up efforts to prepare bilateral intergovernmental agreements on promotion and mutual protec-

tion of investments, expediting the Free Trade Area between the Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU) and India and expanding the use of local currencies in mutual payments. "We must eliminate dependence on the US dollar," said Babushkin.

And since nuclear energy constitutes a fundamental building block for strategic partnership, Russia remains the only foreign country in India involved in practical construction of nuclear reactors. The ambassador said that the implementation of the project to build six power units of the Kudankulam

nuclear power plant is well under way. During the visit, both countries intend to sign a general contract for the construction of at least six extra power units of the NPP of the Russian design." Meanwhile, Russia hopes to fatten up the bouquet of existing cooperation in hydrocarbons and liquefied natural gas, where delivery has been timely. Post the Modi visit, one can expect cooperation in geological exploration and joint development of oil and gas fields in both Russia and India, including offshore fields. On the agenda are scal-

cent persons by Pakistanbacked terrorists is unbearable. The Gujjar community will not be cowed down by such acts as we are nationalists by core and ready to sacrifice our lives for our nation," Kohli said.

Describing the killing of two Guijars as the "murder of humanity and an anti-Islamic act", Khatana expressed hope that the killers will be identified and appropriate action will be taken against them.

"The BJP stands with the bereaved families at this hour of grief," he said, assuring all help to the families of the deceased persons.

Later, addressing a press conference, BJP state spokesperson Tahir Choudhary said the killing of the two Gujjars is a conspiracy to demoralise the community.

Pakistan at a loss

Imran Khan may be throwing more ill-thought hurdles our way but is now being hounded at home for mishandling J&K



It is a tough time to be the Pakistan Prime Minister, even if one propped up, coached, tutored and played by the fountainhead of the nation's real power, the Army. Little wonder then that Imran Khan is at his most vulnerable as his armed invincibility has now been hopelessly blown to smithereens and isn't scaring anybody in the region. Completely spooked by US President Donald Trump's stand on Kashmir that it was a bilateral issue between two neighbours and isolated by even the Islamic world that considers the abrogation of Article

370 as India's internal and administrative matter, Khan is desperately short of ideas and is making one embarrassing counter-move after another. First, he is threatening to close down his country's airspace to Indian flights, riled by the fact that Prime Minister Narendra Modi used Pakistani airspace to fly to France, a nation that has steadfastly helped India's line on sponsorship of terror factories. Second, he is urging certain pro-Khalistani Sikhs, who have been used for anti-India propaganda for years, to support him on Kashmir. In a viral video, a Pakistan-based Sikh leader claimed that no less than the highest temporal authority of the Sikhs, namely the Akal Takht, had asked the community to do so. It is another matter that the Takht has passed no such unrealistic resolution. Third, he is threatening to close land routes between India and Afghanistan and block trade, something that is more disadvantageous to his economy than ours. We have already downgraded trade relations and withdrawn Most Favoured Nation (MFN) status to Pakistan since the Pulwama attacks. Khan has proclaimed himself to be a global brand ambassador of Kashmiris and is reminding the world of repercussions in the event of an escalation of Indo-Pakistan hostilities, considering both are nuclear powers. Does he realise that such a strike is the last option any nation would contemplate and obliterate his people as well?

Truth is Khan, and by extension the Pakistani Army, are just moving around traditional counterweights in the strategic chessboard, hopelessly failing to blur the hard-edged reality. And that is since Pulwama, India has stopped being preventive about but rather reactive to Pakistani threats. The Modi brand of Indo-Pak diplomacy has shown that it is not scared to take on Pakistan's "what could be" scenarios and could frustrate its "thousand bleeding cuts" strategy of exporting terror and separatism, staying well under the nuclear flashpoint. This newfound boldness means Pakistan misadventures on Indian territory are not to be tolerated but acted upon and nipped in the bud. Khan's emotional appeal to the Islamic world that Kashmir was a matter of protecting Muslim identity has also backfired miserably with the snub from OIC and the UAE. Bahrain named Modi for its highest civilian honour, coopting the centrality of India in economic and strategic cooperation in the Gulf. Even the Taliban, known for its hardline interpretation of Islam, has not warmed up to the Kashmir question, although it has been safe-housed and nurtured by the Pakistan Army. Then its all-weather friend China has been selective in its reaction to India's mainstreaming of Kashmir, objecting only to the bifurcation of Ladakh and its impact on Aksai Chin that it had taken over after the 1962 war. Besides, given its own problematic record of human rights in minority provinces and with Uyghurs, it doesn't want to attach itself to causes linked to religiosity or upset its bilateral paradigm with India at the moment, which is far bigger. The Asia-Pacific grouping of the Financial Action Task Force (FATF), the watchdog of nations promoting terror and empowered to restrain international funding, has already put Pakistan on an enhanced blacklist, so most nations would not want to touch it now because of that taint. Now, our western neighbour has to focus on avoiding the blacklist in October, when the final review comes up. If any good has happened to Pakistan, it is that the foreign policy of years is now being questioned by its opposition parties. Bilawal Bhutto has now advised Khan that he better focus on saving Muzaffarabad and Pakistan-Occupied Kashmir, lest that strategic pie also slips out of his hands. Of course, democracy is a long shot in Pakistan but Khan and the Pakistan Army have now got to reconcile that their age-old templates aren't working or won't be anymore in a world where politics will be dictated by the economy.

Brexit brink

The UK is driving towards the new deadline



The United Kingdom (UK) is now in the midst of a full-blown Constitutional crisis with the new Boris Johnson-led Government deciding to prorogue Parliament. This might have been scandalous in other times, especially as the Government has a majority of just one, and could have led to "horse-trading" as several Constitutional experts in the UK have warned. But with Britain also rushing headlong towards the October 31 deadline to leave the European Union (EU), there's no room for such machination. One can

only imagine the volume of screaming and shouting had the Government in India tried to prevent Parliament from discussing something of paramount national interest. Comments by several British parliamentarians from the Opposition as well as the ruling Conservative Party, including the Speaker of the House of Commons, have been of surprise and outrage. For students of British history, it appears that another schism has emerged between Parliament and the Executive, which goes back before the English Civil War.

And while there is no risk of a violent second civil war, the country is hugely divided, politically, socially and economically. Yet, it is also clear that the vote on leaving the EU must be honoured — for better or worse. The problem is that several parliamentarians are rightly scared about the "for worse" option, particularly about a "no deal" transaction with the EU. This would, some fear, lead to a land border between British Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland as well as Customs and immigration chaos. There is no resolution as yet about the status of European citizens living and working in the UK as well as what will happen to British citizens in Europe. And with just about 60 days to work out a solution, Johnson must have felt that he could have done without the distractions of a deeply divided Parliament. What he might have created though is a monster and united the several warring factions inside the Houses of Westminster into a cohesive unit. Negotiating deals is not as easy as composing tweets or even campaigning, both things that Johnson is very good at. Dealing with hard-nosed bureaucrats of the EU and trying to extract concessions is even tougher. It appears Johnson has borrowed some tactics from Pakistan, which regularly negotiates with a gun to its head, as a commentator once aptly said. The UK, which sowed the seeds of conflict in the Levant, South Asia and Africa, finds itself in a bind and the rest of the world, particularly those that have once been part of the empire, cannot help but feel what the Germans call schadenfreude.

he abrogation of Article 370 has led to a lot of typing on the keyboards of Indian as well as foreign journalists. Most scribes were illinformed about the legality of the issue but generally, the Indian Press dealt with the subject more decently, taking into consideration the situation on the ground, including Ladakh where the "liberation" of the mountainous division was celebrated as in Jammu, too. The Indian Press also mentioned about the tragic fate of the Kashmiri Pandits and how the Article fuelled terrorist acts, which have plagued the Valley for decades. 
But this has not been the case of the foreign Press, which has once again shown not only its partisanship — the often-violent "anti-Modi" bias (they hate the 'Modi' phe-nomenon which eludes their understanding) — but also its abysmal ignorance of the historical background of the Kashmir issue.

Take the example of the French Press. Following the August 5 decision, it is difficult to say that it was the worst, because the British and the American were really bad, too (particularly the BBC). In their offices beyond the seas, editorialists remain stuck in old clichés — they love to portray Modi's India as having only one objective: To massacre as many Muslims as possible. Due to sheer "White" arrogance, most of these "grand reporters" do not need to study the issue before writing on it, as "they know" about it.

After the Indian Prime Minister's visit to the UAE, one French publication even wrote: "Modi has managed to escape the Muslim ire ...for now." The Chinese factor and their indecent claims over Ladakh have also been brushed aside; the Buddhists of Ladakh and the Pandits are not worth a word. It is ironic that at the same time, the Indo-French bilateral relations have been blossoming (but journalists will probably say, "Modi has bought Macron on his side by promising to buy a few Rafales more").

Who is responsible for this constant misinformation or disinformation? As I said, it is not possible to change the ideological slant of the Press (foreign or French), so one should let it be. 

The art of turning waste into wealth

Upcycling not only keeps garbage out of landfills, it also reduces carbon emissions

ealing with ever-growing garbage mountains is a challenge that India and countries across the world continue to face However, the need to reduce rubbish has led to some innovative solutions such as upcycling waste. Upcycling, also known as creative reuse, is the process of transforming waste materials, by-products and unwanted products into new materials or products of better quality and environmental value, while retaining the characteristics of the original material. This helps promote a circular economy by giving discarded materials a second life, reducing the need for virgin resources. More often than not, it doesn't require major financial investments and can be achieved through out-ofthe-box thinking, smart designing and reorganising production. Besides keeping refuse out of landfills and offsetting demand for virgin materials, upcycling reduces carbon emissions and helps save

Upcycled materials could include used clothes, packaging material, e-waste or simple household goods like furniture and furnishings. These materials could also be pre-consumer waste that is generated before the products reach the consumers. Examples include clothing manufacturing, paper and printing industry and the autocomponent industry that also generates metal scraps. India has begun embracing upcycling and many firms are coming forward with innovative ideas and business models. For instance, a company in Bengaluru that turns old clothes, plastics, tyre tubes, broken glass, wood pieces and multi-layered plastic packaging into stylish products has successfully upcycled 30 tonnes of trash.

A Mumbai-based firm upcycles post-consumer and post-industrial fabrics like denim. It makes bags and jewellery, having already upcycled around 3,000 pair of jeans and 500 metres of post-industrial waste denim. Another Bengaluru-based outfit makes jewellery from discarded PET bottles. However, this is just the beginning and a lot more can be done to reduce waste and generate employment at the same time through product lifetime extension.

For instance, a Mumbai-based social enterprise recycles textile waste into sustainable materials and products that are handcrafted by women living in slums. The collection of waste provides opportunities to integrate the informal sector into the formal sector with the former becoming a supplier of the material.

However, upcycling is still at a nascent stage, with difficulties in achieving economies of scale. While an average customer may expect an upcycled product to be cheaper than a product made of virgin material, various issues make it challenging to achieve that, which has a direct impact on the prices of these products. The heterogeneous nature of raw material leads to labour-intensive processes. Recycling doesn't always generate products like those made from virgin materials. Then there are supply chain complexities, and while increased attention to hygiene generates acceptability by consumers, it increases overhead costs.

Starting an upcycling venture also needs technical and managerial guidance along with expert advice for designing and manufacturing. Making such a venture viable would require regular sourcing of waste, including local material streams that can be arranged through tie-ups with second-hand markets and collection centres. Price benchmarking of waste material is also important to enable competitive costing. Further, awareness, supportive eco-systems and industrial symbiosis are extremely crucial to encourage upcycling. To create a market, retail partnership with stores, online availability of products and subsidised participation at exhibitions can be explored. Most importantly though, understanding consumer perion and attitudes towards uncycled products will need to be factored in to garner their buy-in/acceptability. For this, positive attitudes and social expectations around upcycling need to be created through social media campaigns, workshops and events.

The upcycling industry in India needs a major leg-up and policy direction has a very significant role to play in this. Change in Government procurement policies to favour upcycled goods over mass-produced goods made from virgin materials can create a demand. The Government could also commission upcycling proiects to help create a positive image. Tax incentives that typically offer benefits for purchasing equipment and machinery could further be designed for the industry. Lastly, in the longer term, manufacturers should consider changes to consumer products and packaging that makes them easier to upcycle at the end-of-life stage.

Upcycling can be an important tool for sustainability in this age of resource scarcity, hence community efforts in channelling waste and creating a market for such products are the need of the hour.

Despite decriminalisation of Section 377, inclusion in the mainstream remains a pipe dream as LGBTQs continue to struggle for an identity and acceptance

n September 6, 2018, in a landmark judgment, the Supreme Court (SC) decriminalised Section 377 of the Indian Penal Code (IPC) and allowed consensual gay sex between adults in private. The apex court's ruling that criminalising gay sex was "unconstitutional, irrational, indefensible and manifestly arbitrary," was met with widespread celebrations by the LGBTQ community across India. However, despite this path-breaking verdict, which delivered a powerful riposte to institutionalised disgust and contempt aimed at the LGBTQ community, nearly one year down the line nothing much seems to have changed on the ground. Inclusion in the mainstream remains a pipe dream as the LGBTQ community continues to struggle for an identity and acceptance. Members of the community face legal exclusion, ostracisation, violence and denial of access to financial and health service, among others.

Access to employment and a discriminationfree workplace continues to be a challenge for the community, particularly for transgender people, as limited access to formal education and discriminatory recruitment practices of organisations lead

Despite the SC verdict, LGBTQs continue to be closeted about their sexuality over fears of potential discrimination at the workplace. More often than not, when they do come out or are outed, they often face ridicule and discrimination. In fact, the Indian LGBT Workplace Survey, 2016, shows that about 40 per cent people have faced harassment at the place of employment on account of their gender identity/sexual orientation.

More significantly, in spite of constitutional recognition of rights in various judgments, existing laws continue to exclude LGBTQ people. This becomes apparent in their day-to-day experiences with the law and the legal system.

Besides discrimination in the formal sector, LGBTQs, specifically transgenders, continue to be disproportionately targetted by enforcement agencies in the unorganised/informal sector. This is particularly prevalent in the case of sex workers and beggars, wherein transgender persons are often targeted by laws such as the Immoral Traffic (Prevention) Act, 1956 (ITPA) and anti-begging laws, respectively. The lack of regulation of the informal sector makes LGBTQ community members working in the sector particularly vulnerable to diswith laws dealing with violence as there are two cardinal problems with them. First, substantive laws may not account for the LGBTQ community, thus creating barriers in accessing such provisions. Second, prevalent discriminatory patterns lead to the well-documented persecution that they face at the hands of law enforcement agencies.


The discrimination against LGBTQ persons in substantive criminal law occurs at two levels. First, the operation of such laws in the male-female binary does not take into account the transgender identity, thereby creating a barrier for transgender persons from accessing such provisions. Second, the operation of criminal laws on heteronormative assumptions does not recognise same-sex relationships or non-heterosexual sexual orientations, thereby limiting the operation of such provisions to sexual acts in the male-female binary.

Criminal law provisions such as rape, Section 375 of the IPC, exclude LGBTQ people at both lev-

els. By operating in the male-female binary, it fails to account for the transgender identity and by only accounting for heterosexual conduct it fails to include alternative sexual experiences.

Therefore, in light of the realities of sexual violence, a potential way forward could be the neutrality of the victim for the offence of rape and for related provisions of sexual violence. Further, in line with the recommendations of the Justice Verma Committee, introduction of a victim-neutral provision that deals with nonpenetrative acts of sexual violence could also be considered.

Such an approach would recognise LGBTQ peoples right to sexual autonomy and choice and also obviate concerns of the use of a dated provision like Section 377, in interacts of soxyal violence. 377 in instances of sexual violence. Neutrality of the perpetrator is, however, a more complex issue and would require further research to be undertaken before being considered.

However, neutrality cannot be the law and much more needs to be done in order to make access to justice a reality. This requires measures such as greater legal education, sensitisation of law enforcement authorities etc.

In India, even instances of workplace sexual harassment are dealt by the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (POSH Act). Provisions in the Act, however, only recognise the complainant to be an "aggrieved woman" under Section 2(a), thereby excluding transgender persons and precluding the possibility of LGBTQ people being subjects of workplace sexual harassment.

Further, law and Government policies also render transgender identity invisible by operating in the categories of male and female or by providing only male and female prefixes such as Smt/Shri etc.

Considering the nature of identity, there is a need to strongly consider whether requiring one's gender status is necessary for a scheme or policy. Where gender is irrelevant, schemes or polices can be actively un-gendered. The same logic could also be extended to forms in the private sector where details regarding gender identity may be irrelevant to the purpose for which the form is being filled. Active un-gendering of forms is also in line with international best practices.

In instances, where gender specification is relevant for a scheme or collection of such data is necessary for policy purposes, the requirement to provide gender status must also account for transgender persons.

Further, the law also tends to freeze identities at birth which goes against the fluid nature of identity. The Registration of Births and Deaths Act, 1969 operationalised through State rules and forms, only recognises two sexes i.e. male and this attribute is also mandatory, which thus results in the assignment of sex and eventually gender within the malefemale binary. This binary understanding of male and female sex also indicates how persons with intersex variation i.e. those who do not fit into either of the two sexes are rendered invisible by the law, which ends up force-fitting them into the two categories.

Further, such laws also cause the medical community to perform non-consensual medical procedures on minors with intersex variations so that their bodies fit into the binary of male or female.

Conversations with doctors revealed that there is no uniform protocol for assigning sex at birth and shockingly, in some cases the choice of sex in infants is based on the surgical intervention that

would be easiest to fit the infant into either male or female depending on the shape of the genitalia. The need for an objective medical protocol in this regard is thus ressing.
In fact, most recently, the Madras

High Court in a path-breaking judgement held that non-consensual surgery on infants with intersex variations was a violation of the SC's judgment and directed the Government of Tamil Nadu to issue an order prohibiting such surgeries on infants. Similar measures are the need of the hour in other States as well. Ironically, the hour in other States as well. Ironically, in spite of the recognition of the transgender identity and an individual's fundamental right to choose one's gender identity in the SC's judgment in National Legal Services Authority Vs Union of India, way back in 2014, laws have not responded adequately and still remain unclear on what the consequences of a unclear on what the consequences of a change in gender identity would be and how rights and liabilities translate post such a change.

Transgender (Protection of Rights) Bill 2018 remains completely silent on this. Illustratively, does a marriage dissolve upon a change in gender identity because same-gender marriages are not recognised in India? Countries like Malta, Argentina and Norway have clarified the impact of such a change on the rights of persons who change their gender identity in their gender identity laws. It's time India does the same and also makes laws more inclusive for the LGBTQ commu-

The fact remains that India is home to more than 55 million LGBTQ adults and the country as a whole cannot afford to ignore them anymore, both as individuals, a market and as a talent pool.

Fire in world's lungs a cause for worry

The combined impact of human intervention, frequent forest blazes and climate change is beginning to tell on the health of the Amazon rainforests, the much-needed carbon sink of the world

onsidered a formidable natural fortress, the Amazon rainforests have a legendary reputation due to their density, which reaches almost mythical levels. But the spectre of climate change seems to be catching up with these awe-inspiring ecological assets as well. This year has been particularly punishing, as Brazil's National Institute for Space Research (NISR) detected 72,000 fires between January and August 2019 and around 9,500 conflagrations since last

Thursday alone. According to the space agency and satellite data, wildfires in the Amazon rainforest rose by 84 per cent this year. The world's largest, these rainforests play the role of a carbon sink and slow

down the rate of global warming. Apart from this, they are home to millions of animal species and indigenous populations. Anthropogenic intervention had been nibbling away at these forests for long but till now this ecological marvel had been successful in keeping its adverse impact at bay. Sadly, now the combined impact of human intervention coupled with climate change is beginning to tell on the health of these rainforests.

The intensity and the consequent damage caused by these blazes can be gauged by the fact that the smoke emanating from these infernos caused an hour-long blackout in Sao Paulo, a city 2,700 km away. While the dry season provides favourable conditions for wildfires in Brazil, fires meant to clear the land for cattle ranching also cause them. Amazonas, a state in northwestern Brazil, declared an emergency in the wake of the conflagrations, while satellite images showed Roraima

engulfed in choking black smoke. According to data published by NISR, the country saw 88 per cent increase in deforestation in June 2019, a figure that was instantly dismissed by



Brazilian President Iair Bolsonaro. who attributed it to farmers setting fires to clear land.

However, conservationists blame Bolsonaro for encouraging loggers and farmers to clear the land, resulting in rampant forest fires and deforestation. In fact, scientists believe the loss of forests in Amazon is taking place at a faster rate since the new President took office in January 2019.

Given the important role these natural carbon sinks play in fighting global warming, the Amazon conflagrations

have attracted world attention. On August 23, 2019, the United Nations chief, Antonio Guterres, also expressed deep concern over the fires and called for the protection of these rainforests.

Yet another cause for the spike in wildfires is the rapid rise in ambient temperatures. In India, too, rising temperatures play havoc with our green cover. As many states witnessed nigher than normal maximum temperature this week, instances of large blazes increased more than six times across

According to the India Metrological Department (IMD) data, the average maximum temperatures have been on the rise at most places in Uttarakhand, Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram, Tripura, Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh, Delhi, east Úttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, Jammu & Kashmir, Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Marathwada and coastal Andhra Pradesh. The Forest Survey of India's (FSI's) data shows that on an average, there are more than 100 large, active forest fires in the country. The highest number of blazes is being reported from Uttarakhand, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh. Another reason that literally adds

fuel to forest fires is the scanty rainfall. These conditions are further exacerbated in areas such as the Amazon where the loss of green cover is immediately apparent. In fact, studies show that nearly 2.2 million square miles of the Amazon rainforest are nearing a tipping point, and large, fragmented portions of the rainforest could degrade into an entirely different, drier ecosystem. This would lead to the acceleration of climate change, the loss of countless species and disaster for the indigenous populations that call the tropical rainforest home.

Be it forests in India or in the Amazon, they all have a crucial role to play in containing climate change and absorbing atmospheric carbon. Sadly, these precious carbon sinks are falling prey to human greed.

In the case of the Amazon, the biggest threat that is emerging is the presence of economic interest groups, which are eating away at the Amazon rainforests such as cattle grazers and soyabean growers. These human groups are slowly wreaking havoc and this is precisely what the countries across the world must fight to stop. The impact of climate change is becoming apparent in all walks of life and now the global forest covers, too, are not exempt. There need to be concerted global efforts to ensure that natural assets are insulated against degrading developments. The state of the Amazon rainforests due to the fires is nothing short of unfortunate and needs imme-

RBI gives reasons for ₹1.76 lakh dividend

massive bond buying, new A/c norms helped transfer higher surplus'

The Reserve Bank could transfer an additional ₹1.23 trillion from its surpluses to the Government, thanks to the gains from bond buying and a change in the accounting practices of its forex operations, sources said Wednesday.

These two heads alone have contributed as much as ₹57,000 crore to the income of the central bank, people in the know explained.

There has been widespread criticism after the RBI agreed to part ₹1.76 trillion with the government following the Bimal Jalan committee report on the appropriate economic capital framework for the central bank. The ₹1.76 trillion includes a surplus of ₹1.23 trillion and ₹52,000 crore in one-

The higher quantum of bond buying to inject liquidity into the system has resulted in additional income of

time surplus.

tices resulted in gains of ₹21,000 crore, the source said.

Without quantifying the gains, the source also said that there is no need to provide money against potential risks as the capital required is falling within the levels prescribed by

the Jalan committee. "These three heads (OMO income, change in forex accounting and zero provisions) are all independent events that have taken place at the some point during the fiscal year," the source explained.

On the one-time transfer ₹52,000 crore, the source said passing the money to the government is considered a much neater" way of transferring the excess reserves identified by the Jalan com-

The source said the Jalan committee was extra conservative while prescribing the preferred levels of buffers required to be maintained, and takes into account a scenario where the 10 largest banks go down simultaneously in an ownership-agnostic way.

The levels prescribed are such that the RBI will be able to carry on its role as the lender of last resort even if these 10 banks were to go down, the

source pointed out. The Jalan panel has asked the central bank to maintain its ₹36,000 crore, while the risk buffers in the range of 5.5-

ance sheet and that the transfer of ₹52,000 crore will not force the RBI to sell any assets to meet this requirement, the source said.

Replying to the initial excitement after papers, including those published by some "respected people" which pegged the excess reserves at ₹3 trillion, the source explained that the same stems from the size of the currency and gold revaluation account (CGRA).

The CGRA stood at ₹7.3 trillion for the year June 2019 (RBI follows a July-June accounting calendar which will be changed to April-March from this year as per the Jalan panel), which resulted in such expectations. However, the panel has made it clear that investments in both forex and gold are prone to volatilities, and only transaction on sale should lead to booking of profit or losses which led to the expectations being belied.

The panel has also felt that paying interim dividend as has been done in the last two years, is "not the right thing to do", the source said.

 $T^{\text{he National Company Law}}_{\text{Tribunal Wednesday}}$ cleared the sale of IL&FS's seven wind energy assets to Japan's Orix Corporation for ₹4,800 crore, which will partially help reduce its debt burden of over ₹99,000 crore.

The tribunal comprising of VP Singh and Rajesh Sharma allowed the Governmentappointed board's plea to approve sale of 51 percent stake in seven wind energy arms to Orix.

Orix Corporation is already an equity partner in the group and owns 49 percent stake in each of these seven operating wind power plants.

The seven wind power

SPVs are Lalpur Wind Energy, Etesian Urja, Khandke Wind Energy, Retadi Wind Power, Wind Urja Indiae, Tadas Wind Energy and Kaze Energy.

The company should deposit the fund from the asset

sale in an interest bearing account until further, the tribunal said

Retired Supreme Court judge DK Jain had recommended that the proceeds from the sale of these seven assets should be kept in an escrow account.

Last month, IL&FS had said it would completely exit the wind energy business, held under IL&FS Wind Energy to Orix, with NCLT for final

The proposal was filed before the tribunal after completing a binding share purchase agreement with Orix and obtaining an in-principle approval from all lenders.

Jain had approved sale on conditions that the proposal would be placed before NCLT for approval and the bid amount realised from the sale be kept in an escrow account and the money would be disbursed only on the orders and directions NCLT/NCLAT.

This intent to buy 51 percent stake was in exercise of Orix's right under the terms of an existing MoU wherein Orix can match the price offered by the highest bidder for purchasing these assets.

Orix decided to match the offer of the highest bidder, of about ₹4,800 crore for 100 percent of enterprise value, contemplating no haircut to the debt of the SPVs aggregating to around ₹3,700 crore.

eKYC, Digital KYC for opening bank accounts to make process secure: UIDAI

The recent amendments to anti-money laundering rules allowing voluntary use of Aadhaar for opening of bank accounts and the modalities of digital KYC for cases where verification is done using other documents like voter ID and driving licence will make the process secure and convenient for users, UIDAI CEO said on Wednesday.

The Government, last week, had notified amendments to the Prevention of Money-Laundering (Maintenance of Records) rules to allow voluntary use of the biometric identifier for opening of bank accounts, and had cedure for 'digital KYC' to be performed in case of verification done via documents like voter ID and driving licence.

The notification now paves the way for use of various verification mechanisms — Aadhaar eKYC where Aadhaar documents are given voluntarily,

offline verification and Digital KYC (Know Your Customer) for opening bank accounts.

The same procedure will also be applicable for investment in mutual funds and opening of demat accounts.

"Digital KYC has been successful in telecom sector for issuing mobile connections. For bank accounts too, now if someone has paper Aadhaar, voter ID or driving licence, then the person can go for Digital KYC, like in the telecom sector," Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) CEO Ajay Bhushan Pandey

Digital KYC will involve capturing the live photo of the customer and officially valid sion of Aadhaar where offline verification cannot be carried out, along with latitude and longitude of the location where such live photo is being taken by an authorised officer of the bank. A step-by-step procedure has been laid down for performing Digital KYC.

Foreign firms unprepared for China's rating system: chamber



Profit-booking following the recent rally and a depreciating rupee also weighed on bourses, traders said.

Additionally, India Ratings lowered the country's growth forecast to a six-year low of 6.7 per cent for the current fiscal from its earlier estimate of 7.3% on account of slowdown in consumption and modera tion in industrial growth, among other factors.

After a choppy session, the 30-share Sensex settled 189.43 points, or 0.50%, lower at 37,451.84. Similarly, the broader NSE Nifty fell 59.25 points, or 0.53%, to 11,046.10. Global equities were held

back by fears of an impending recession following the latest inversion of yield curves of US Treasury bonds — seen as a predictor of economic contraction.

Yes Bank was the biggest loser in the Sensex pack, plunging 7.47%, after Moody's Investors Service downgraded the lender's long-term foreigncurrency issuer rating, terming the bank's outlook as negative.

Vedanta, Tata Steel, Tata Motors, ONGC, M&M,

Maruti, NTPC and HUL too fell up to 4.06%.

On the other hand, HCL Tech, Infosys, Tech Mahindra, HDFC, TCS and Asian Paints rose up to 2.61%.

As part of a capital alliance agreement, Toyota will acquire 2.4 crore shares of common stock in Suzuki (4.94 per cent stake) for 96 billion yen (over ₹6,510 crore), while Suzuki plans to acquire shares in Toyota equivalent to 48 billion yen (around ₹3,255 crore).

On October 12, 2016, the two companies had first announced their business partnership. In March this year, they agreed to engage in joint product development and collaboration in production, in addition to promoting mutual supply of products by bringing together Toyota's strength in electrification technologies and Suzuki's strength in technologies for compact vehicle. Elaborating on the reasons for their capital alliance, Toyota and Suzuki în a joint statement said the automobile sector was currently experiencing a turning point unprecedented in both scope and scale, not only because of enhanced environmental regulations but also from new entries from distinct industries and diversified mobility businesses.

23 killed in Mexico bar fire, officials investigating 'attack'

At least 23 people were killed and 13 badly wounded in a fire at a bar in eastern Mexico that is being investigated as an attack, authorities said Wednesdav.

The fire in the city of Coatzacoalcos, which broke out Tuesday night, "may have been the result of a vile attack," said a statement from prosecutors in the state of Veracruz, a flashpoint in the bloody turf wars between Mexico's rival drug cartels.

Media reports said the fire broke out when attackers burst into the bar and threw Molotov cocktails.

"The devious crime of a few moments ago in Coatzacoalcos will not go unpunished," Veracruz Governor Cuitlahuac Garcia said in a tweet.

Frantic family members

rushed to the bar, the Caballo Blanco (White Horse), looking for their loved ones, said an AFP reporter at the

"I just want to know if he's OK," said a mother looking for her son, who worked as a cleaner at the bar, after searching for him in vain at local hospitals. The interior of the bar was wrecked and charred, with chairs overturned and debris littering the floor. A heavy contingent of police and emergency vehicles gathered outside the building.

Veracruz is one of the most violent regions in the country. Its strategic location on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico makes it a popular route for drug cartels and for human traffickers bringing undocumented migrants to the United

Morales thanks G7 for 'tiny' Amazon aid

La Paz: Bolivia's leftist President Evo Morales gave a half-heart-ed welcome on Tuesday to a G7 pledge of \$20 million to fight the Amazon wildfires, describing it as "tiny." An underwhelmed Morales said the aid from the most industrialized countries was part of the world's "obligation" to preserve the Amazon rainforest.

"I welcome that small, small, tiny contribution of \$ 20 million from the G7 — that is not help, it is part of a shared coresponsibility, as all peoples have the obligation to preserve the ecosystem," Morales told Bolivia's Radio Panamericana.

The richest nations "should contribute a lot, and not only when there are fires," the president said, adding that he hoped the aid would arrive as quickly as possible.

Bolivia is one of nine South American countries to share the Amazon rainforest. While fires in Brazil have

captured the world's attention, Bolivia has been fighting its own blazes that Morales said on Tuesday had destroyed 1.2 million hectares, or more than 4,000 square miles of forest and grassland, since May. AFP

Respiratory ailments rise in Brazil as Amazon fires rage

Lingering smoke in the Amazon is reportedly causing increased respiratory problems - particularly among children and the elderly — as fires in the region rage.

"The kids are affected the most. They're coughing a lot," said Elane Diaz, a nurse in the Rondonia state capital of Porto Velho, as she waited for a doctor's appointment Tuesday at the city's 9 of July hospital with her 5-year-old son Eduardo.

"They have problems breathing. concerned because it affects their health. The number of people

treated for respiratory issues increased sharply in recent days at the local Cosme e Damia Children's hospital.

"This period has been very tough. The dry weather and the

smoke causes many problems for children, such as pneumonia, coughing and secretion," Daniel Pires, a pediatrician and the hospital's adjunct director told the Folha de S Paulo news-

He said the number of cases has more than doubled since the early part of the

Fears over health impacts have been growing with the surge in fires, with more than 77,000 blazes documented by the country's National Space Research Institute since the start of the year. About half of the fires occurred in the Amazon region, with most in the past month.

But the issue has been overshadowed by growing acrimobetween Brazil and European countries seeking to help fight Amazon fires in a region seen as vital to the health of the planet.

Trump lashes 'corrupt' Puerto Rico ahead of storm

President Donald Trump branded Puerto Rico "one of the most corrupt places on earth" Wednesday as the US island braced for its first major storm since being ravaged by Hurricane Maria two years ago.

Trump has feuded continuously with the US territory in the wake of Maria, where he was widely accused of failing to bring sufficient help. He says he did respond correctly and was never thanked properly.
As Tropical Storm Dorian

bore down on the island, threatening a direct hit on population centers in the east, Trump decided to restoke the intensely personal row.

"Puerto Rico is one of the most corrupt places on earth. Their political system is broken and their politicians are either Incompetent or Corrupt," he

Ex-Pentagon chief Mattis warns US cannot survive without allies

Washington: Former US Defence Secretary Warned Wednesday that the United States cannot survive without its allies, days after the G7 summit showed President Donald Trump out of step with America's key partners.

"An oft-spoken admonition in the Marines is this: When you're going to a gunfight, bring all your friends with guns, Mattis wrote in the Wall Street Journal, in his first public comments since quitting in a policy dispute with Trump last December. "A leader must display strategic acumen that incorporates respect for those nations that have stood with us when trouble loomed," Mattis wrote.

"Nations with allies thrive, and those without them wither. Alone, America cannot protect our people and our economy.' Mattis's opinion column was

published just hours before his successor, Mark Esper, gives his first on-camera press briefing since being confirmed as Pentagon chief last month.

Esper has the responsibiliof implementing Trump's demands for a withdrawal of most US troops in Afghanistan, Iraq and Syria, the policies Mattis fell out with the president over. Mattis, a retired Marine Corps general, said he had to step down after his "concrete solutions and strategic advice, especially keeping faith with our allies, no longer resonated, with the US leadership.

Mattis also blasted the nyper-partisan political atmosphere in Washington as contributing to the erosion of US leadership in the world, saying he had little taste for "the political fratricide practiced in



Dhoni unlikely to be selected for SA T20s

 $M^{\hbox{\scriptsize ahendra Singh Dhoni}}_{\hbox{\scriptsize may have put his}}$ international retirement on hold but he is unlikely to be selected for India's threematch T20 home series against South Africa starting September 15 in Dharamsala.

The team for the series is expected to be picked on September 4. The remaining two games will be played at Mohali (September 18) and

Bengaluru (September 22). In all likelihood, the squad that blanked West Indies 3-0 is likely to be retained (subject to fitness) and the selection committee wants to continue building towards World T20 in

Australia in October 2020. "There are only 22 T20 Internationals before India play their first World T20 game and selectors are clear in their vision that it's time to move forward," a senior BCCI official privy to developments in selection committee said on Wednesday.

'They are planning on getting a pool of three keepers ready for limited overs, especially T20s," he added.

It is still not clear whether the BCCI brass or the selection committee will speak to Dhoni to enquire about his plans like they did before the West Indies tour when the former captain informed that he would be taking a break to serve his regiment in Territorial

"Retirement is an individual decision and selectors or for that matter, no one has any right to decide on that front. But they have every right to decide the roadmap for the 2020 World T20 and that's to give Rishabh Pant maximum chances," the official explained.

It is learnt that the second and third option for the selection committee is Sanju Samson, whose batting is considered to be on par with Pant and India A regular Ishan Kishan. While Pant remains the


first choice across formats, the selectors are also factoring in the fitness and workload management.

A few members of the selection committee will be in Thiruvananthapuram for the A series and Samson's performance will be keeny watched as he has made the squad for the last two List A games. As far as batting is con-

cerned, the selection committee believes that Samson is ready for top level cricket but his wicket-keeping is still work in progress.



Rafael Nadal launched his tilt at a fourth US Open title on Tuesday with a swift defeat of John Millman as other leading seeds in his half of the draw tumbled out in the first

Four players in the world's top 10 Dominic Thiem, Stefanos Tsitsipas, Karen Khachanov and Roberto Bautista Agut — lost Tuesday to ease Nadal's potential path to the final.

The Spanish second seed — US Open champion in 2010, 2013 and 2017 needed barely two hours to see Millman off 6-3, 6-2, 6-2 at Arthur Ashe Stadium with the world number 60 from Australia unable to reproduce the magic that saw him stun Roger Federer here a year ago.

Meanwhile on Wednesday, Past US Open runners-up Kei Nishikori and Karolina Pliskova advanced to the third round of the Grand Slam event on a rainy day when most matches were delayed by showers.

Japanese seventh seed Nishikori, the 2014 US Open runner-up and a semi-finalist in 2016 and 2018, defeated 108th-ranked American Bradley Klahn 6-2, 4-6, 6-3, 7-5 after two hours and 44 minutes.

"Looking forward to the next one," Nishikori said. "Hopefully I can continue to play good tennis?

Next in Nishikori's path will be either Australian Alex de Minaur or Chilean 31st seed Cristian Garin.

Alexander Zverev, seeded sixth, outlasted Moldova's Radu Albot 6-1, 6-3, 3-6, 4-6, 6-2, while Marin Cilic, AP the 2014 champion, advanced in

"Definitely I feel lighter now," Halep said. "I feel much better that I could win a match finally in this tournament."

Halep lost to Russian fivetime Grand Slam champion Maria Sharapova in the 2017 first round and fell to Estonia's

Kaia Kanepi last year. "Well, the pressure was tricky today. Winning one match in three years, it's pretty tough," Halep said with a smile. "But it's good that I could go over that. "I was stressed before the

match, also on this court that I lost last year. Was not easy. But I'm really happy that I could manage in the end to play better than before." Halep said she was thankful

for a tough fight in her opener, thinking it better prepares her for the tests to come. "I'm not feeling great at the

beginning of the tournament, but always when I played tough

I went through the semi-finals or quarter-finals," Halep said.

'So I'm confident. I feel like my game, it's there. I'm moving well. I just need a little bit of mental confidence. Now I'm trying to get it."

Halep hopes to match the level she reached in last month's Wimbledon final, where she outplayed 23-time major champion Serena Williams to collect her second Grand Slam title after the 2018 French Open.

"The good thing is that I believe I can touch that level," Halep said. "If I keep working every day really hard, I'm able to do it again. So that's why I'm motivated. I'm still hungry of results, of titles. I'm sure that with matches and with tourna-

ments I can get back there." She could become the world number one by winning the US Open title and could chase for the year-end number one ranking she held last year. "If I'm healthy, I will go for it 100 percent," Halep said. "I want to finish number one. I still have chances, so I'm going to work for them. I'm confident I have actually a big chance. "We actually have a big vacuum in terms of producing coaches of quality and it's not a training program. It's an ecosystem issue. So, we need to work harder to bridge that gap," he said.

Gopichand said although there are some foreign coaches like South Korean Kim Ji-Hyun on

with the talent that is coming up. He said more coaches are required to strategise for matches against seasoned international players like Lin Dan.
