Successfully enters orbit of Moon

BENGALURU: In a major milestone for India's Moon mission, the Chandrayaan-2 spacecraft successfully entered the lunar orbit on Tuesday. Lunar Orbit Insertion (LOI)

maneuver was completed suc-cessfully at 0902 hours as planned, using the onboard propulsion system, the Bengaluru headquartered space agency said in a statement. "The duration of maneuver was 1,738 seconds. With this, Chandrayaan-2 was successfully inserted into a Lunar orbit," ISRO said.

Following this, a series of orbit maneuvers will be performed on Chandrayaan-2 spacecraft to enable it to enter its final orbit passing over the lunar poles at a distance of about 100 km from the Moons surface, it said.

Is AP govt contemplating an alternative to 'Amaravati'?

Minister for Municipal Administration Satyanarayana's observations on Amaravati have raised many an eyebrow as he has stated that construction cost of the capital city is too high and internal discussions are going on in the government over the capital. "Flyovers and huge structures have to be built in Amaravati, while the construction cost in other areas of the State is low", Satyanarayana said. It may be noted that the

budget allocation for the Capital City of Amaravati is just Rs 500 crore. Stating that Amaravati is a flood-prone area, the minister said the State government would assess the damage caused by floods and decide on the extent of compensation. He hit out at the 'yellow' media for putting out distorted news and pointing fingers at the YSRCP government's prompt steps, which minimised the damage to property and prevented human loss. Chief Minister YS Jaganmohan Reddy had constantly enquired about the flood situation in the State from the US and issued appropriate directions.

Exactly a year ago, the then Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu had directed the CRDA officials to expedite capital construction to win the confidence of the people.



INTENT IS CLEAR WITH RS 500-CR ALLOCATION

With an allocation of Rs 500 crore for Amaravati construction in the State Budget, the YSRCP government had dropped enough hints on its priorities. With this, the government has reiterated its stand on the 'reverse tendering', which is to be taken up in a phased manner in all capital works. It may be recalled that Capital Amaravati was the top priority during the TDP government's regime.

Former Professor of Economics Dr LSN Prasad said he was amazed at a single line mention of the allocation of funds for construction of Capital City Amaravati. "The allocation to social welfare and education was more than expected," he said and added that allotting only Rs 500 crore for the capital construction was something that needs to be discussed at length. Allocation of Rs 92,050 crore for development activities was laudable, he said and added that making budgetary allocation towards financial aid for barbers, tailors and auto drivers is a new concept. Prasad further stated that the revenue deficit is only Rs 1,700 crore and the total deficit is Rs 32,500 crore.

It may be recalled that former bureaucrat EAS Sarma had said one year ago "The State budget figures show that as a result of the diversion of revenue for non-productive purposes and shrinkage in the space for capital investments, the State is unable to devote enough resources for lifeline sectors such as agriculture and crucial sectors like social welfare. While the State's finances are deteriorating, there seems to be no conscious effort on the part of the government to observe economy and austerity. Meetings are held not in modest state guest houses, but in five star hotels. Special aircraft are routinely used for travel, unmindful of the fact that even the US ministers are reluctant to charter special aircraft, fearing public uproar."

Where has all the money gone?

A severe 'cash crunch' is being felt across all sectors in the country. Even state governments in the Telugu States are feeling the squeeze, with pending bills of Telangana state government touching Rs 30,000 crore while that of Andhra Pradesh are pegged at Rs 22,000 crore. Both the state governments have stopped all payments, except salaries/pensions for their staff. The tight financial condition has raised a troubling question: "Where has all the money gone?" Private hospitals in Telangana have stopped Arogyasri services after the government failed to clear arrears amounting to over Rs 1,000 crore. The government could not solve the problem even four days after the hospitals stopped services, due to paucity of funds.

The private sector is also feeling the pinch of 'cash crunch'. Private companies are defaulting on payments, citing 'no cash'. The real estate sector is reeling under cash crunch with poor sales of apartments/independent houses as unsold units have touched a high of nearly 8 lakh units by June-end in nine major cities in the country, including Hyderabad.

The state governments are blaming the Centre for the cash-scarcity situation, while the Centre is pointing fingers at the Reserve Bank of India for maintaining high levels of cash reserves with it which is lying idle, contending that no coun-

The state governments on the

other hand are blaming the Centre's FRBM Act of 2003 for the cash crunch, arguing that they could not mobilise funds despite having repayment capacity due to stringent norms prescribed under the Act. Even the Centre has to adhere to FRBM Act, forcing it to not raise funds above the prescribed limit. The severe cash crunch is fuelling calls for scrapping the FRBM Act or easing borrowing norms under the Act. India adopted the Fiscal Responsibility and Budget Management (FRBM) Act in 2003 that capped borrowings by the Centre and states by linking it to tough fiscal deficit criteria. Some economists have argued that FRBM Act has robbed the government of the right to print money at will, unlike before 2003. They point out that the Bank of Japan has been printing \$70 billion of cash every month.

Naidu sees conspiracy in inundation of his house

Telugu Desam Party (TDP) chief N Chandrababu Naidu has alleged that the State government has hatched conspiracy to inundate his residence on Krishna riverbank in floodwaters. He said many poor families have lost their homes. Naidu, who visited the

flood-affected areas in Krishna district on Tuesday, lashed out at ministers and the DGP for treating the drones issue as a small one. He opined that with the help of drones, any-body can bomb the premises. Operating drones in a high-security zone where Z Plus security is arranged without any permission is ridiculous and all the mnisters and police officials are treating it as a routine affair, he added.

Naidu opined that the Government had failed in avoiding damage due to floods. The officials had deliberately delayed the release of water from Prakasam Barrage, only to inundate riverbank areas on Undavalli Karakatta (bund) and villages in the capital region. "They wanted to see my home in floodwater. If the Lingamaneni Guest House is submerged, it is the worry of the owner. Why are the

ministers bothered?" he said. Naidu alleged that local MLAs Alla Ramakrishna Reddy and Sridevi were concentrating only on my home, leaving all other victims affected by floods. The TDP chief said if Anna Canteens were present at the time of floods, they would have been a great help to the victims.

HC reserves judgment on Navayuga plea

VIJAYAWADA: Andhra Pradesh High Court has reserved its judgment on a petition filed by Navayuga Company seeking cancellation of a fresh tender notification issued by the State construction in Polavaram project. All the arguments were presented by the counsel of Navayuga Company on Tuesday. Navayuga Company was the earlier contractor of the Polavaram Project including and hydel project. On August 14, the government issued an order cancelling its earlier order stating that the work was not done in-time and issued a fresh notification on August 17.

The counsel of Navayuga argued that there was no delay in work from the contractor's side. APGencom, which has signed the agreement with Navayuga for construction of Hydel project, had failed to identify the place for construction of the power project. He further argued that APGenco is the appropriate authority to take a decision on cancellation of work order and not the Government of Andhra Pradesh. The cancelled order issued by the government is not valid, he said.

Minister for Transport and Information and Public Relations Perni Venkataramaiah (Nani) on Tuesday said that an interim report will be prepared at the experts' panel meeting on RTC merger with the State Government and it (the report) will be submitted to Chief Minister YS Jaganmohan Reddy soon after his return from the

Speaking to media persons at the Meet-the-Press event organised by the Andhra Pradesh Union for Working Journalists (APUWJ), he said the Finance Minister will also attend the meeting. "The Cabinet decision to merge RTC is implemented earnestly. The roadmap has been prepared and the merger is within the vicinity."

While some economists say the current liquidity crisis could have been handled better if the government had the power to print currency at will, some others argue that an unfettered right to print money will trigger an inflationary spiral, rekindling memories of the 1960s and 1970s when the RBI was printing money to finance the government's huge budget deficit. "Indiscriminate printing of money is inflationary and will hurt the poor the most. Inflation will make life tougher, the poor poorer, and the rich richer. The political fallout of such a policy is usually negative," they opine.

A garland of scorpions for the Lord

India is a land of customs and beliefs with some of them unique and dating back to centuries. The act of offering flowers, fruits and milk to the deity is a common practice in temples across the country. However, the temple of Kondalarayudu in Kurnool district hosts a surprising ritual - that of offering scorpions as prasadam for the Lord.

Spurious liquor is also made by boiling water mixed with

polish remover, creams used to rub cars to give the desired kick to tipplers. Even branded liquor is being adulterated with water or cheap variants of liquor since the bottles are made of plastic and not glass. Sometimes mineral water is being used to adulterate liquor.

There are expert technicians who can open the bottle's

cap without damaging the seal. One fourth of the liquor is removed from them and the bottles are then filled with cheap liquor and water. Later, the seal is carefully replaced without giving rise to any doubts. The technicians visit the wine shops now and then. They charge the wine shops depending on the number of bottles tampered with.

In an effort to allay fears, the Union Home Ministry on Tuesday said non-inclusion of a person's name in the final list of NRC does not by itself amount to him or her being declared a foreigner and assured that adequate arrange-ments have been made for appeal against it.

The ministry also said it will amend the rules to increase the time limit of filing of appeals in foreigners tribunals (FTs) from 60 to 120 days for those who would be excluded from the final National Register of Citizens, a list of Assam's residents to be published on August 31.

The decisions were taken at a high-level meeting chaired by Union Home Minister Amit Shah and attended by Assam Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal and others here on Monday.

In a statement, the ministry said under the provisions of Foreigners Act 1946 and Foreigners (Tribunals) Order 1964, only foreigners tribunals are empowered to declare a person foreigner.

Thus, non-inclusion of a person's name in NRC does not by itself amount to him/her being declared as a foreigner,"

time, the MHA will amend the rules to increase the present time limit of filing of appeals in FTs from 60 days to 120 days regarding exclusion from final NRC," the statement said.

At the meeting, it was also decided that adequate arrangements will be made by the state government to provide full opportunity to people excluded from the NRC list to appeal.

"Every individual, whose name does not figure in the

final NRC, can represent his/her case in front of the appellate authority i.e. foreigner tribunals," it said.

Citizenship The (Registration of Citizens and Issue of National Identity Cards) Rules, 2003 are also being amended accordingly.

To maintain law and order, the ministry said, central security forces are being provided to the state.

The Union Home Ministry and the Assam government have held extensive deliberations in recent weeks, the statement said.

When the draft NRC was published on July 30, 2018, there was a huge controversy over the exclusion of 40.7 lakh people from it. The draft NRC included the names of 2.9 crore people out of the total 3.29 crore applications.

In the list published in June 2019, over a lakh more people were excluded.

French eye

India to launch 8-10 satellites with France as part of a 'constellation' for maritime surveillance



hatever be the domestic apprehensions about the many controversial moves of Modi 2.0, particularly over the revocation of Article 370 and reorganisation of Jammu and Kashmir, diplomatically it has managed to keep the opinion of the big power players on its side. Considering 14 of the 15 members at the UN Security Council were largely dismissive of Kashmir as a matter to be settled bilaterally and with China having no locus standi in the matter as it has been reorganising its own territories and legitimis-

ing PoK, India is moving to now matters maritime. And in a direct challenge to China's "string of pearls" approach in the Indian Ocean Rim (IOR), one that has its military and commercial facilities dotting our littoral states, from the Chinese mainland to the Horn of Africa, India is looking to France to narrow down its hawk's eyes. India's new space endeavour with France, where the two countries will launch 8-10 satellites as part of a "constellation" for maritime surveillance, will help safeguard strategic interests at sea. This new venture, to be finalised during Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to Paris, will provide an inside-out information about developments over, on and under the sea surface and coastal areas. This has become almost a necessity considering China is known to have built artificial islands over the last decade or so. Besides, its interest in the Scarborough Shoal near the Philippines and its military fortification of islands in the South China Sea have complicated the security environment. Considering that France has been supportive of India's position and has even spearheaded resolutions to protect it from Pakistan-sponsored terrorism in the UN, there could be no better ally in this project of a larger national security.

The Chinese belligerence on our waters is worrisome simply because sea lines run through several major maritime choke points such as the Strait of Mandeb, the Strait of Malacca, the Strait of Hormuz and the Lombok Strait as well as other strategic maritime centres in Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, the Maldives and Somalia. Right now, China has effectively encircled India and reinforced its superiority by setting up outposts and ports in countries which are beholden to it courtesy the economic projects under the Belt and Road Initiative. Apart from military muscularity, such control also bodes ill for the ease of trade in these waters. India itself conducts nearly 40 per cent of its trade with littoral nations along IOR and has been consistently working with some of them to preserve the integrity, inviolability and freedom of oceanic channels. While we have been conducting joint naval exercises, fact is our Navy is not as cutting edge as China's, hence the need for pre-emptive surveillance. The new age of conflicts means that we are as prone to the dangers of maritime terrorism, smuggling, transnational crime, drug trafficking, illegal immigration besides climate change issues. This satellite cluster will, therefore, monitor sea traffic management. While the IOR is of concern to India, France, too, has its territories spread across the Indian, Pacific and Atlantic Oceans and is seeking cooperation on its vigil campaign. India was a natural choice as a partner because France has had space cooperation with us for about six decades and is now involved even in ISRO's human mission programme, Gaganyaan. This alliance is expected to continue in our future interplanetary endeavours. Of late, India has found a strategic and technological sounding board in France as its relations with others have their own set boxes — Russia remains our oldest defence partner and despite leaning towards China for practical reasons, still honours the legacy of a shared past. China, despite everything that is disputed, remains our key trading partner and the US is a new-found ally. Over the decades, India and France have emerged as true democratic partners, who honour the spirit of international law, and have been developing cooperation in counter-terrorism, intelligence-sharing and cooperation on investigations and judicial processes. Despite global outcry over the nuclear tests in 1998, France was the first to resume nuclear talks with India and among the first to push nuclear trade in later years. One area that remains unexplored is that of bilateral trade between the two. On the basis of this trust, India may even become a middle power with its own bargaining chips.

Squatters have no rights

The poor often get unfairly tarnished for squatting on public property whereas the worst culprits are entitled politicians



t the memorial of the late great Sushma Swaraj, many mourners noted how the former Foreign Minister had vacated her official accommodation soon after leaving the Government. Her actions are in direct contrast to the shameful and thuggish behaviour of Jat leader Ajit Singh, who tried to hold on to his official guarters even after being trashed at the hustings. He further tried to hire goons to threaten the Government back in 2014. Thankfully, Singh realised that he could not muster any public sympathy for his squat-

ting, which he tried to rationalise calling it a "matter of Jat pride" and left his house in a huff. But others like Adhir Ranjan Choudhury of the Congress, who refused to give up his ministerial quarters after his party's defeat in 2014, had to be physically evicted. Now in 2019, the Modi Government is taking it upon itself to ensure that Members of Parliament (MPs) do not overstay their welcome in Government housing. It has given errant MPs and former Ministers, several of them members of the BJP, a week to vacate their houses.

Frankly, this move was long overdue and there should be no quarter given. Several MPs have used all sorts of excuses to overstay their welcome. Some have moved the courts to get stay orders but after the Supreme Court ordered a cleanup in 2013, that avenue was closed. However, some high-security individuals, who are in the 'Z+' security category, such as LK Advani and Priyanka Gandhi, might be allowed to remain in exclusive housing because they are easier to protect. Government housing is a privilege that parliamentarians enjoy only for their term and this rule has to be enforced. If previous occupants do not leave, how will new MPs and Ministers function? Just because a person wants to retain a fancy New Delhi address, he/she should pay the same market rentals in private colonies that ordinary citizens do. Nobody should have an extremely inflated sense of self like Ajit Singh, a man now reduced to being a political nobody. ignored by the community for whom he said he wanted to keep his house. At the same time, the shortage of housing in central Delhi is also evidence of the need to build new and better housing facilities for Government servants, defence personnel and parliamentarians in the centre of the city. Several older Government colonies and many bungalows built in 'Lutyens Delhi' are showing signs of age. They are in desperate need of repair if not outright reconstruction. Old rules do not apply to housing anymore and old structures must be removed.

The time has come to provide new orientation to India-China relations. The two nations must come together and work towards the establishment of global peace and security





ne outcome of External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar's visit to China has been positive, not only in terms of India explaining its stand but also clearing the air for future exchanges. The External Affairs Minister is not only a distinguished diplomat but having been India's Ambassador to China, he knows the system and personalities whom he has to deal with. One major point made by him to China's Foreign Minister Wang Yi was to emphasise that the future of the India-China relationship will depend on "mutual sensitivity" to each other's "core concerns." In return, Minister Wang Yi emphasised "the five principles of peaceful co-existence", which have "fundamental interest and long-term interest of our two peoples and also contribute to world peace and human progress." As an immediate measure, India and China signed four agreements covering cultural exchanges, healthcare, sports and cooperation in museum management. In particular, both Jaishankar and Yi emphasised the importance of cooperation in the field of traditional medicine, wherein both China and India, the two most ancient civilisations in the modern world, have cumulative knowledge.

The time has come now to provide a new orientation in China-India relations. In the economic field, bilateral trade between the two countries touched almost \$90 billion in 2017-18 but trade deficit increased to \$62.9 billion in China's favour. China must follow Lao Tzu: "If you do not change direction, you may end up where you are heading." It clearly has interests which are long term, given its ancient history and traditions and it is unlikely that it would think in terms of mere short-term benefits that could lead to friction and disputes. Our External Affairs Minister clearly mentioned that any bilateral differences should not become disputes.

China has major ambitions to emerge as the largest and most influential global power in the world. Its growth rate has been phenomenal and poverty, which was widely prevalent, has more or less been completely eliminated. This writer first visited China in 1981 and today, the country represents progress which most other nations have achieved in almost a century. Yet, China cannot ignore the fact that it shares a large border with India and the latter is a rising power in a complex world. There is every need for the two nations to come together and work security.

One major area where the two countries must cooperate is in respect of promoting a pattern of sustainable development which deviates substantially from the Western model. Unfortunately, both nations have been following this model. China in particular has adopted it much too rapidly with major economic success but with some adverse consequences both at the global and national levels. Gandhiji was not in any way exaggerat-



ing when he predicted that for the civilised West "a time is coming when those who are in the mad rush today of multiplying their wants, will retrace their steps and say; what have we done.... Modern civilisation is such that one has only to be patient and it will be self-destroyed." What we find across the entire world, which is mindlessly aping the Western model, is humaninduced climate change resulting from the burning of fossil fuels, a loss of biodiversity and destruction of the earth's ecosystems.

China and India are large countries, which are also suffering from the consequences of these disastrous trends. As the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) has projected and as is becoming increasingly evident today, the frequency and intensity of extreme events is rapidly on the increase. These take place in the precipitation events and several sea level related disasters. There are areas which are suffering from prolonged drought, which at the same time, witness floods during certain seasons.

China already has a major problem of water scarcity, particularly in its western region. India, too, is suffering from the consequences of global climate change,

which clearly makes this a "core concern" for both societies. It is also important for the population of China and India to set a new path of development which is relevant not only for the two countries but also for the rest of the world. Together, China and India are close to three billion people in a world which holds today an estimated 7.7 billion. Clearly, therefore, whatever path is set by the two countries will have a major influence on the world as a whole.

An area in which cooperation is needed would be to develop and use renewable sources of energy. The IPCC has clearly assessed the reasons for the world to keep within the 1.5°C limit by the end of the century. It has also defined the implications of land use, including massive consumption of meat, which is totally unsustainable. Today, China has increased its cona huge level. However, fortunately, it is one of the leaders in the use of renewable energy wherein both countries would derive mutual benefits from working

In Prime Minister Modi's Independence Day speech, he emphasised the need for water conservation, including precision agriculture, rainwater harvesting and waste water treatment. He also highlighted the indiscriminate use of plastic. Additionally, he addressed the need for cutting down on the use of chemical fertilisers in agriculture by up to 25 per cent. He stated: "This would be a great service to the nation. This would be a great step in saving our Mother Earth."

China and India can work towards the use of bio-fertilisers, which would enable us to do away with chemical fertilisers. "Saving our Mother Earth" is clearly a core concern for both societies. This writer has interacted with those responsible for conceptualising a facility called "Science City", which is to be established outside Beijing over an area of 100 square kilometres.

The ambition behind this initiative is to see that China addresses global problems of a long-term nature. Perhaps India could also ioin hands with China, with delineation of principles governing intellectual property and clear areas of common endeavour to cooperate in "Science City" so that we work towards developing global solutions for a sustainable

Reunification of India a necessity

The idea of Indian reunification is one whose time has come though there's no doubt that it will take a long time to achieve. However, it must be under a strong, liberal leadership



or a long time, I have been propagating the idea that India Pakistan and Bangladesh should reunite under a secular government for their mutual good (see the Mission Statement and articles on indianreunificationassociation.co.in). I have long said that India, Pakistan and Bangladesh are really one country, with a common culture, and were one for cen-

Many people have criticised this idea, more so in light of the recent developments in the subcontinent. Many Pakistanis, including Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan, say that recent developments in the region prove that the founder of Pakistan, MA Jinnah, was right in insisting that Muslims get their own homeland otherwise atrocities (e.g. lynching, attacks and incarceration of Muslims for long periods on trumped-up charges) would be committed on them in a united India. So these developments prove that Partition was good for Muslims, and the idea of Indian reunification is only a pipe dream, they point out.

My reply is as follows: Our aim must be to create a highly industrialised country, because only then can we generate the wealth needed for the welfare of our people and give them decent lives. Only a high level of industrialisation can create millions of jobs to wipe out unemployment.

The Partition of India in 1947, and creation of an Islamic state, which was a historical British swindle on the basis of the bogus two-nation theory, was aimed at preventing this growth. If India emerges as another China, then, with its cheap labour, our industries will undercut their rivals from developed countries. Who will buy their costly goods then and won't their industries shut down? One China has become a headache for the West. Will they permit another?

So the secret understanding among developed countries is that India must not be allowed to emerge as a modern industrial giant like China. To prevent that, Indians must remain divided on the basis of religion, caste, region etc.

All this talk of improving relations between India and Pakistan (such as that touted by the campaign *Aman ki Asha*) is unrealistic and nonsense. The very purpose of creating Pakistan as an Islamic state was that there shouldn't be peace but hostility between the two neighbors and Hindus and Muslims. If there are good relations then the very purpose of creating Pakistan will be defeated.

Our common enemy is massive poverty, record unemployment, appalling child malnourishment, farmers in distress, spiralling prices, ignorance, lack of healthcare, unabated corruption, atrocities on minorities, etc. We waste our scant and precious resources fighting each other instead of joining hands and fighting against these problems that are our real enemies.

To say that Partition was necessary to safeguard Muslims is puerile. First, there are as many Muslims in India as in Pakistan (about 200 million in each). Second, Muslims in Pakistan may be safe from Hindu bigots, but are they safe from Muslim bigots? Are Ahmadis, Shias safe? Are Barelvis safe from Deobandis? They often bomb mosques, dargahs, etc. And are the Muslims there free from the evils of unemployment, price rise, malnourishment, ignorance, lack of healthcare, corruption, etc? It was a stupid idea that creation of Pakistan will keep Muslims safe. In fact Partition has increased the problems of Muslims, Hindus, Sikhs, Christians there.

So, unless we reunite, we will keep wasting our scant resources fighting each other, and will never become a highly industrialised country, and thus remain poor with many social evils. As mentioned earlier, we are really one nation with a common culture, and were befooled by the British into thinking we are each other's enemies. But how are we to reunite?

This can only be done peacefully and voluntarily, and will take a long time, maybe 10-20 years. The communal venom which was injected into our body politic by vested interests for over a century, will take a long time to be expelled. During this period, we must patiently explain to the masses the truth that we are really one nation, were one for centuries, and spread the idea of Indian reunification among them.

As Victor Hugo said, "There is one thing more powerful than all the armies in the world, and that is an idea whose time has come." The idea of Indian reunification is one whose time has come though it will no doubt take a long time to

We will be called daydreamers by many. But when Giuseppe Mazzini spoke of Italian unification, he too was called a daydreamer, though the dream became a reality thanks to the efforts of Count Cavour and Giuseppe Garibaldi. West and East Germany reunited in 1990 after partition in 1945. North and South Vietnam reunited in 1975 after a partition of over

21 years. At present, all that needs to be done is to spread the idea of reunification, as is being done by the Indian Reunification Association. Later, when the idea has gripped the imagination and minds of the masses, then people will use their creativity and find ways to make a peaceful reunification a real-

However, it's vital that such a reunification is under a liberal leadership, which while ensuring religious freedom does not tolerate religious bigotry from any quarter and crushes it with an iron hand. Such progressive leaders will rapidly ensure industrialization of the nation, provide for the welfare of the people and catapult India into the front ranks of the world community. How and when such a historic transformation will take place, who these leaders would be, is impossible to predict. But it is a necessity.

The overleverage fix

More research must be done as to why firms become hooked to high debt. As they say about addiction, admitting you have a problem is the first step towards solving it

he recent suicide by Café Coffee Day owner jolted every coffee lover in the country and brought to the fore the grim reality that high debt can be dangerous for a company. A business is said to be overleveraged when it carries too much debt and is unable to make interest payments on loans and meet other expenses.

Overleveraged companies are often unable to pay operating expenses because of the burden brought on by debt in the form of interest payments and principal repayments. Overleveraging can sometimes lead to a downward financial spiral where the company cannot generate enough revenue to make the debt payments and pay its usual operating expenses. This leads to the company having to borrow more to stay in operation, and the problem gets worse. This spiral usually ends when the company closes its doors or files for bankruntry protection. for bankruptcy protection.

A less leveraged company can be better positioned to sustain drops in revenue because they do not have the same expensive debt-related burden on their cash flow. Businesses that borrow money to add to a product line, expand internationally, or upgrade their facilities are often better able to offset the risk they take on when borrowing.

Leverage can be measured by financial leverage ratios, sometimes called equity or debt ratios, which measure the value of equity in a company by analyzing its overall debt picture. These ratios either compare debt or equity to assets as well as shares outstanding to measure the true value of the equity in a business

This shows how much of the company assets belong to the shareholders rather than creditors. When shareholders own a majority of the assets, the company is said to be less leveraged. When creditors own a majority of the assets, the company is considered highly leveraged. All of these measurements are important for investors to understand how risky the capital structure of a company is and if it is worth investing in.

The most common financial leverage ratios are debt ratios, debt-equity ratios and equity ratios. Debt ratio is a solvency ratio that measures a firm's s as a percentage of its total In a sense, the debt ratio shows a company's ability to pay off its liabilities with its assets. In other words, this shows how many assets the company must sell in order to pay off all its liabilities.

The debt to equity ratio is a financial, liquidity ratio that compares a company's total debt to total equity. The debt to equity ratio shows the percentage of company financing that comes from creditors and investors. A higher debt to equity ratio indicates that more creditor financing, i.e., bank loans, is being used than investor financing, i.e., shareholders.

The equity ratio is an investment leverage or solvency ratio that measures the amount of assets that are financed by the owner's investments by comparing the total equity in the company to the total assets.

In fact, some years ago, a team of financial scholars at Stanford Graduate School of Business and at Germany's Max Planck Institute studied banks and found that they have become "addict-

ed" to increasing their debt levels steadily. According to them, "leverage begets leverage" However, it was further analysed that other corporations have become addicted to debt, even when it reduces the total value of the enterprise. Once a company begins to take on debt, they say, the leverage becomes almost "irreversible." Shareholders will generally oppose measures that reduce debt and support moves to increase it whenever the opportunity arises.

According to Paul Pfleiderer, a professor of

finance at Stanford, taking leverage is like eating potato chips. One cannot stick to the commitment of eating just a few chips. So, if one cannot stop after eating just one chip, one might be better off not eating them at all.

The authors argue that since reducing debt entails a transfer of risk - and wealth - from shareholders to creditors, there is a clear disincentive for shareholders to cut back on borrowa company buys back its bond ple, bondholders will demand a premium above the current market price for those bonds. That's because bondholders will insist that the buyback price reflect the fact that the remaining debt will be at less risk of default.

In other words, bondholders get all the benefits of debt reduction and shareholders have to foot the cost upfront. Government tax policy makes companies even more biased toward higher debt, because it allows companies to deduct interest payments from their taxable income.

In theory, creditors can protect themselves by insisting on contracts or "covenants" that restrict a company's ability to increase its leverage in the future. Among other things, covenants can restrict a company from selling additional bonds or making big payouts to shareholders, which reduce the company's equity.

In practice, the authors argue, covenants are difficult to enforce. Most covenants give companies at least some discretion to take on more debt, because companies need flexibility in dealing with new opportunities and problems. On top of that, the creditors are often dispersed and unable to take a unified position.

The most obvious risk of high debt is the increased danger of falling into financial distress or even bankruptcy. But on the other hand, rising leverage can also make companies reluctant to invest in promising new projects.

That's because part of the increase in value

generated by an investment would flow not to the shareholders but to the creditors, because their bonds and loans would become more secure. Corporate boards take a hard new look at how much they compensate management through stock options and other grants of equity in the company. The more money managers earn from grants of stock and options, rather than from their salaries, the more they will align their self-interest with shareholders rather than creditors

As had as it may seem all businesses must take out loans. Debt financing can be attractive to business owners because banks won't dictate how they should spend the money and they don't have to split up company ownership. Highly leveraged companies are very sensitive to economic declines and at higher risk for bankruptcy.

There are several problems of a highly leveraged company. First, the lenders require borrowers to pay back their loan in a timely manner. This becomes a problem for fledgling companies that borrow money for projects with longterm returns. If payments come due before the company starts seeing returns, loan repayments can be a crippling expense.

Paying back the loan on a regular basis means less money to finance operations and invest in growth opportunities.

Second, substantial loan payments can easily cripple a highly leveraged company. A company doesn't have an obligation to repay capital from equity sources.

However, banks and lenders have top seniority when it comes to repayment in the event of bankruptcy. This means that lenders will get paid out before anyone else, including the company owner. If the company has a secured loan, the bank can repossess company assets. Depending on the business structure and the terms of the loan, the owner of the company may also be personally liable for the loan repayment.

Third, just like with individual lending, banks scrutinize corporate credit reports before doling out more loans. Banks are unlikely to provide further funding to highly leveraged organizations. Not only are these companies at high risk for

bankruptcy, the new lender might not get paid back if the company goes under. Older loans typically carry higher seniority compared to newer loans, so lenders are hesitant to put themselves at the bottom of the list ing their investment. In bank does issue a loan, the interest rate will be high enough to account for that increased risk.

Fourth, one of the options a company has to reduce its financial leverage is to increase the amount of equity capital.

However, investors rarely give money to highly leveraged businesses. Investors avoid highly leveraged companies for all the same reasons lenders do, plus they're the last in line

If an investor is willing to invest in a highly leveraged company they'll expect to receive an especially large percentage of ownership in exchange for their money.

It's important that further research should be done to shed light on why companies can become hooked to high debt. As they say about other forms of addiction, admitting you have a problem is the first step towards solving it.

yebrows were raised when Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed concern about the population explosion in the country in his recent Independence Day speech. There was a feeling of surprise that the Prime Minister chose to bring up an issue that has been a 'No- No' for many politicians from the days of Emergency when the Indira Gandhi government used coercive population control measures. Her Family Planning programme received widespread condemnation and effectively never realized its purpose. Later the ministry's name was changed to Family Welfare.

India's population is 1.34 billion, which is nearly a four-fold increase since Independence. Modi has reasons for concern as according to the World Population Prospects 2019 of the United Nations, India is expected to add

and 2050. Inevitably, with these figures, "India is projected to surpass China as the world's most populous country around 2027", the report said. The biggest challenge for India is its unpreparedness to accommodate such a huge population. Looking at these figures, "The time has now come that we should take such challenges ahead,"

Interestingly, while Modi talked about India's demographic dividend in his first term, in his second term he has realised that though a large population by itself may not be a bad thing, it has to contribute to the growth of the country. This needs to be supported by capital, technology and infrastructure, as well as skills. That is why the Prime Minister is now talking of education as a means of both moderating the rising population and making it productive.

The country is already facing an acute drinking water crisis, garbage disposal and sewage treatment problems, inadequate rainfall, climate change, increased levels of pollution, high infant and child mortality rate and poor standard of living in the economically weaker sections

chief Mohan Bhagwat, during his annual Dussehra address some time ago, noted, "We need to rise above vote bank politics to formulate a holistic approach, equally applicable to all citizens, towards the population policy."

In Parliament too, BJP members have raised this issue. Recently Rakesh Sinha, a BJP Member of Parliament, introduced a Private Member's Bill to regulate population. Earlier, another BJP member Sanjeev Balyan, who is now a minister, had also introduced another Bill with the backing of 124 members.

The late BJP stalwart Atal Bihari Vajpayee too had made such an attempt in 2000 by bringing a forward-looking National Population Policy. However, it made the two-child norm a voluntary commitment for individuals. The Modi Government has also followed the same approach that the family planning programme in India is target-free and voluntary in nature.

Modi's speech has triggered speculation that a mild interventionist population policy is not far off. It is a very sensitive issue both at the state level as well as the religious level.

The North-South divide and the

issues that raise their heads whenever the spotlight is on population control. While the southern states feel that their great success in bringing down the population is costing them in terms of resources devolved from the Centre, the Minority Affairs Minister Mukhtar Abbas Naqvi has claimed this week that it is a social reform.

The Prime Minister is not one to waste words and he has used the Independence Day speech to prepare the country for population regulation, going forward. There is an urgent need to aggressively push concepts like the twochild policy, child spacing, increased use of contraceptives and voluntary sterilisation. The two-child norm should be made a uniform criterion for government jobs, getting aid and subsidies and other benefits. Perhaps incentives and disincentives might work better in containing the size of the family. The health ministry is already implementing many of these schemes, but much more will be needed to create awareness and to make an impact in the long run.

As India aspires to become a major economic power, it's time to define whether a growing population is an opportunity or a danger.

Resolve stressed assets on time: RBI to bankers

"Timely resolution is very important. I'd request you to ensure that the resolutions are done in time, not just for the regulatory requirement but also because it will result in better valuation going forward," he said. Mahanagar Gas Ltd (MGL), where the majority stake is owned by state-owned GAIL India Ltd, sells compressed natural gas (CNG) to automobiles and piped-cooking gas to house-



holds in and around Mumbai. When MGL was listed in July 2016, Shell and GAIL held 32.5 per cent stake each in the company. Last year, Shell sold 24 per cent of its shareholding in two tranches -- 8.5 per cent in April and 14 per cent in August -- in the open market through bulk deals. The government of Maharashtra has 10 per cent shareholding in MGL, while the remaining is with the public. Shell sold its stake in the open market after GAIL waived off its first right of refusal. According

to the shareholding agreement, partners had the first right to buy in case either one of them wanted to exit.

"We already have a controlling stake. What purpose would it have served to buy the additional stake at market price," a senior GAIL official said. He said the sale price was "too high".

"It doesn't make any sense for us to buy the stake at the market pricé," he added.

When Shell first started dilut-ing its take in MGL in April last year, the company had stated that this was "part of Shell's ongoing portfolio optimisation to transform Shell into a simpler company, delivering stronger

The one-week long work-shop would be organised by Film Heritage Foundation in association with *Viacom 18*, and International Federation of Film Archives from December 8 to 15 at Annapurna Studios. The workshop helps enthusiasts to learn about various topics like film preservation, restoration, paper and photo-graph conservation, digital preservation and restoration, archive strategy, film repair, film scanning, colour correction and more.

The actor further says, "I saved my iconic movies such as *Annamayya* in a hard disk, but the files got corrupted years later. I'm ashamed of myself for not having preserved or restored a single movie of mine to date. I have done more than 90 films and I'm not sure how many of those I have to save due to their present situation."

Film experts from all over the world guide participants on techniques to save cellu-loid cinema and on how to deal with issues relating to digital cinema. Nagarjuna adds, "My father used to tell me about films from the Silent Era. Now, none of those films has been saved. Hard disks can become unreliable any time and so, we need to find a solution to preserve and restore our classics. These workshops started four years ago in India and saved more than 300 films. I hope it will inspire film enthusiasts to join in this workshop and to save the

cinema. Amala mentions that they have arranged 20 classrooms for this workshop. "We are very happy to help make this a big event. It is our duty, as film personalities, to show our youngsters the greatness of classic movies and help them learn how to save those films. I'm requesting the entire Telugu film fraternity to come forward and join this work-shop."

Jayesh Ranjan says, "I'm also running a film club — Moving Images — and we screen old classics for cine-

ma lovers. The club started three months ago and has a great response from the audience. More than 300 people attends our screening. It is always important to know the iconic movies of our past. We are ready to screen the movies restored through this workshop."

Sudhanshu Viacom18 CEO and MD, says, "Cinema is an integral part of our country's cultural DNA and we owe it to our future generations to pass it on. This is the reason why we have collaborated with this workshop. To take it further, we are also conducting a round table conference with the Telugu film fraternity to discuss the workshop."
Shivendra Singh, the founder of Film Heritage

Foundation, says that film is an art form and reflects the times we live in. "To save Indian cinema, we started conducting workshops since 2015 and have been training individuals on restoring old cinema. More than 200 film enthusiasts will participate in the workshop. People from Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, Nepal, Bhutan, and Afghanistan are participating in it as well."

ith the kind of films that unspool every week, one can conclude that there is a dearth of not only ideas but also direction! Varied kinds of films are being made, as each filmmaker is trying to come out with something different. This includes all — big as well as medium-range producers. The idea seems to be taking a shot in the dark. It is all about tak in the dark. It is all about tak-

ing chances. Some producers are falling back on period costume dramas, which work out very costly and are not every director's cup of tea. This genre was avoided for a long time mainly because of these two reasons: capability and cost. Yet, we have had period films like Mastani and Baiirao Padmaavat, Manikarnika and Kesari. There have been a few flops in this genre like *Mohenjo Daro*, *Rangoon* and *Thugs Of Hindostan*. The backers of such films would do it only based on saleable stars, coupled with a capable director. Still, it often proves risky.

Each week, a new kind of film is dropped in the market. For instance, last week we had *Khandaani Shafakhana*, a film discussing sexual problems for those who can make sense of the title! For one, sex and problems related to it are not generally discussed in India. Delhi and surrounding areas do have such clinics but that does not make

the subject acceptable all over.

One may have thought if Vicky Donor could work, why not take it a step further? Odd subjects like *Vicky Donor* or *Piku*, very personal to people, do work. However, they need to be woven into a plausible story and dealt with a fair amount of humour. Recent such films are Piku, Padman, and Toilet: Ek Prem Katha. This is called reaching out to personal matters of people. Humour is a must since it delivers the message without making the proceedings seem mundane.

It seems filmmaking is all about inspirational and awareness films. A small film about a person few had heard about, Paan Singh Tomar, followed by Bhaag Milkha Bhaag, opened up a new genre — the biopic. Neerja, MS Dhoni: The Untold Story and Dangal followed in quick succession. The film industry calls this a "daur" (trend). It does not last long, though.

Most writers who script stories like *Piku* or *Vicky Donor*, or directors who make films like Dangal, Bhaag Milkha Bhaag and Neerja, have always had this problem, regarding what next. They usually have nothing that matches the earlier success. No maker seemed to have a worthy successor. Therefore, they go back to the usual claptrap and

come a cropper.
There were also some biopics like Manjhi: The Mountain Man or Sachin: A Billion Dreams, where the makers just chose to go with the trend but turned the

film into a documentary. A film like Sachin: A Billion Dreams costs crores as royalty to the character on whose life it is based, as well as to acquire real-life footage. The film on Sachin was a victim of failing to dramatise. The idea is to pick a life story and add a fair amount

'Frightening' Archer won't let up: Stokes



ngland's Ben Stokes has told Australia to expect more bouncers from Jofra Archer in the remainder of the Ashes.

"It's part of the game and a big part of Jofra's game, being aggressive, not letting batsmen settle," said Stokes.

Archer produced a hostile and compelling display on debut as the rain-affected second Test ended in a draw at Lord's on

Not only did he take five wickets, he repeatedly unsettled Australia with a short-pitched balls. The 92mph bouncer that hit Steve Smith on the neck forced the star batsman to miss the last day with concussion.

"When someone takes a nasty blow no bowler is going to say 'I'm not going to bowl that again because I don't want to hit them again," Stokes, a lively seam bowler,

"The concern is always there when someone takes it, but next ball, when you get back to the mark, it's 'I'm going to keep doing it." Smith, who could be ruled out of the third Test at Headingley starting on Thursday as well, had earlier been hit a painful blow by Archer on his left forearm.

Marnus Labuschagne, Smith's replacement at Lord's as cricket's first concussion substitute, was then hit flush on the grille of his helmet second ball by another Archer thunderbolt.

All the deliveries are considered a legitimate part of a fast bowler's armoury and Stokes said Archer had no reason to change his approach in Leeds.

Stokes believes Archer's extra pace can help England overturn a 1-0 deficit in the five-match Ashes series following their 251-run loss in the first Test at Edgbaston.

Eng need to preserve Archer: Akhtar

Former Pakistan speedster Shoaib Akhtar believes England have got a great weapon in Jofra Archer but they need to preserve him and man-age his workload in a way that the 24-year-old doesn't get injured very often.

"Archer is an exciting talent. He is strong but I believe he is the perfect candidate for being injury prone. With his action and speed, I believe he can have back injuries, so he needs to be preserved," Akhtar said in a video posted on his Youtube channel.

"My suggestion will be to play him in fewer matches, he should not bowl 27 overs in an innings. What he cannot do in 14 overs, he won't be able to do it 27 overs," he further said.

against the West Indies starting on Thursday.

Umesh, who took three wickets for 19 runs in the West Indies A first innings in the warm-up game which concluded on Monday here, said he worked on getting his rhythm back at the Vidarbha Cricket Academy with coach Subroto Banerjee in the last few months.

"As a fast bowler you have to practice and you need to set your rhythm, to know at what line and length you have to bowl. I have also tried the same, to get my rhythm right. I was preparing myself to do what I will be doing in a match situation," Umesh

said after the drawn warm-up game. "I went to Vidarbha Cricket Academy and worked with coach Subroto Banerjee there and asked him for his opinion. There were these issues of length of deliveries. It happens to a lot of fast bowlers, when you are playing a lot continuously, you're unable to settle into a specific line and length. I worked on that," he added.

He said he was able to bowl into the right areas during the warm-up game against the West Indies

"I am playing a practice match after a long time. I had earlier come here to play for India A and I played one game. The wicket is not too different and

"(In the warm-up game) I was focussing on the areas I have to put the ball. My mindset was to put the balls in those areas and bowl dot balls. I was being able to do that," he added.

The 31-year-old played his last Test in Australia in December 2018. He then played for Vidarbha in the domestic competitions and followed it up with a stint with Royal Challengers Bangalore in the IPL.

"After the Australia tour, I played in Ranji tro-y and we (Vidarbha) won and then IPL came. In the two and half months after that, I gave myself some time to work on my errors and get my rhythm

back. Accordingly, I prepared my mindset. "I worked on bowling drills and trained a lot on whatever bowling problems which I thought I had. You need off-time because it is only during your off-time that you can re-shape your mindset on what needs to be done," he added, when asked about the

drills at the Vidarbha academy. Asked about the competition in the current Indian team in the fast-bowling department, he said, "When you know you're going to play back-to-back Test matches, you need that kind of bench-

'All the fast bowlers know there is a good competition and that everyone is going to get an opportunity. Whoever does well, will get to play more. If we think in that manner, it's good for us because we will try to improve ourselves.

"It is a healthy competition and it is good for the team. It make us more exciting and challenging and will improve our performance."

McGrath loves what he sees in Jofra

The legendary Glenn McGrath T is a big supporter of Jofra Archer and feels the England pace sensation is going to play Test cricket for a long time.

"I've been a big supporter of Archer for a long time and I love what I see there," McGrath was quoted as saying by BBC where he will be part of the Test Match Special commentary team and contribute a regular column to the *BBC Sport* website.

"It's quite rare to be able to bowl with pace and accuracy for such a long time. To have pace is so unique and with Archer, it is all natural. His action doesn't look too stressful, he has a nice, smooth run-up and goes through the crease really well

It's a fairly stress-free action and he's young and fit. He keeps it simple: "He just comes in, bowls good areas and with good
