

to Tihar jail fuels speculation about **Dec 16 execution**

The shifting of Pawan Kumar Gupta — one of the convicts in the December 2012 Nirbhaya gang-rape and murder case in a moving bus in Delhi — from Mandoli Jail in North east Delhi to Tihar jail has fueled speculation that the four convicts will be hanged on December 16, the seventh anniversity of the ghast-

seventh anniversity of the gnast-ly incident.

Sources said preparations are going on to hang the con-victs once President Ram Nath Kovind turns down the mercy plea. Earlier Union Home Minister Amit Shah, who is also the Minister for Department of Justice, is

Department of Justice, is reported to have rejected the mercy petition of one of the accused Vinay Sharma.

However, officials were tight lipped whether the convicts would be hanged on the death anniversary of Nirbhaya to send a strong message. to send a strong message.

Gupta, who was lodged in the Mandoli Jail, was shifted to Tihar recently, Director General (Prison) Sandeep Goel said. Gupta is lodged in Jail No. 2 of Tihar, where two other convicts in the case — Mukesh Singh and Akshay — are also lodged, while Vinay Sharma is in Jail No. 4 of Tihar, another jail official said. The rest went on trial in a fast-track court. The juvenile was convicted of rape and murder and given the maxi-mum sentence of three years imprisonment in a reform facil

A Delhi court on Tuesday reserved verdict for next week in the case of alleged kidnapping and rape of a woman by expelled BJP MLA Kuldeep Singh Sengar in Unnao in 2017.

During in-camera pro-ceedings, District Judge Dharmesh Sharma reserved Dharmesin Sharma reserved the judgment for December 16 after hearing final arguments by the CBI and the accused in the case. The judge heard the case on a day-to-day basis from August 5 after it was transferred to Delhi from a court in Lucknow on Supreme Court's directions.

The woman was alleged ly kidnapped and raped by Sengar in 2017 when she was a minor. The court has also framed charges against co-accused Shashi Singh in the case. Sengar was expelled from the BJP in August 2019.

The court had on August 9 framed charges against the MLA and Singh under Sections 120 b (criminal conspiracy), 363 (kidnapping), 366 (kidnapping or inducing a woman to compel for marriage), 376 (rape) and other sections of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO)

On July 28 this year, the car in which the victim was travelling was hit by a truck and she was severely injured. The woman's two aimts were killed in the accident and her family had alleged foul play.

Her father was allegedly framed in an illegal arms case and arrested on April 3, 2018. He died in judicial custody a few days later, on April 9, Ap April 9.



"It is, however, regrettable that the body has chosen to be guided only by its prejudices and biases on a matter on which it clearly has little knowl-edge and no locus standi," he asserted. Around a decade back, the USCIRF had also favoured denying of tourist visa to Narendra Modi, the then Chief Minister of Gujarat. In its statement, the USCIRF said, "CAB is a dan-

OSCIRF said, CAB is a dangerous turn in the wrong direction; it runs counter to India's rich history of secular pluralism and the Indian Constitution, which guarantees equality before the law regardless of faith," adding that it was deeply troubled over the pas-sage of the Bill in the Lok Sabha.

Kumar asserted that every nation, including the US, has the right to enumerate and validate its citizenry, and to exer-cise the prerogative through various policies.

 $B^{\text{HU professor Feroze Khan,}}_{\text{whose appointment as a teacher in the faculty of}}$ Sanskrit Vidya Dharam Vigyan (SVDV) led to protests by some university students, resigned from his post and joined the Sanskrit department of Faculty of Arts in BHU, sources said on Tuesday. SVDV Faculty Dean Bindeswari Prasad Mishra con-

firmed the news. This comes amid protest by

students against his appoint-ment at SVDV last month. The students had boycotted his classes and staged a dharna outside the vice-chancellor's office, claiming that only a Hindu can train them in religious rituals. They had said that Feroz is free to teach Sanskrit elsewhere. The BHU administration had come out in Khan's support, saying his appoint-ment was made in accordance with the BHU Act and the guidelines issued by the University Grants Commission.The university had in a public statement even said that Khan was the "best"

among all candidates.
A frustrated Khan had

even appeared for an interview on Friday in the university's

Ayurveda department.
The interview was held in secrecy in a guest house in view of the fear of protests by stu-dents. Ten candidates, includ-ing Khan, were to appear for the interview but only eight turned up.

Ayurveda department dean

Prof Yamini Bhushan told reporters that Khan had ranked at the top of the merit list.

Khan had earlier applied for the job in the Ayurveda and Arts faculties, along with the Sanskrit faculty. He was appointed to the Sanskrit fac-ulty which triggered protests by students who were unwilling to accept a Muslim as their teacher. The students of the Sanskrit Vidya Dharma Vigyan (SVDV) Department had been on protest since November 7 and on November 24, the retired professors of the BHU had also expressed their support for the students.

On Monday, the protesting students had told the university proctor that if Khan is not suspended with immediate effect, they will not only boycott the upcoming semester exams but also start a fast unto death.



Bittu Sarpanch refutes allegations dubbing him as 'gangster'

Abunch of photographs projected by both the Congress and the Akalis as speaking more than a thousand words over the politicians-gangsters nexus in Punjab has not only generated political controversy, but is also threatening to turn into a legal

A day after the Chief Minister Capt Amarinder Singh and SAD president Sukhbir Badal entered into a war of words accusing each other of having links with the alleged gangster Harjinder Singh alias Bittu Sarpanch, the said "gang-ster" on Tuesday came out in open to claim that allegations against him are "false", while

Capt Amarinder released the Badals' photographs with Bittu Sarpanch at public events maintaining that on the basis of the same he had ordered the State police chief to look into politician-gangster nexus in the State. Hours later, Sukhbir shared Capt Amarinder's photograph while inducting the same man into his party ahead 2017 elec-

Responding quickly, the Chief Minister said that Bittu Sarpanch was never a Congressman and had always been an Akali leader with close ties with Badal junior.

Peeved, Bittu Sarpanch on Tuesday came down heavily on the Chief Minister for making already acquitted him.

"Captain has made false allegations against me. The court has acquitted me in all the cases. Is Capt Amarinder above the Courts?" said Bittu Sarpanch, declaring that he would file a defamation case against the Chief Minister.

He alleged that the police was raiding his house without any reason, and even the arms license of his wife has also been cancelled without any reason. Punjab DGP Dinkar Gupta,

a day before, had stated that Bittu has been named in several criminal cases relating to drugs, mur-der, dacoity, arms act etc, and as per information available with the Organised Crime Control been registered against Harjinder Singh alias Bittu in cases dated as old as 2006 in Himachal Pradesh, Haryana, and

Besides a drug case, Bittu has been facing charges like cheating, criminal intimidation, theft, voluntary causing grievous hurt, rioting, among others.

Gupta, who has been entrusted by the Chief Minister

with the task of conducting the inquiry into the nexus, had maintained that inputs available with OCCU also revealed that Bittu is reported to have been providing shelter to members of the notorious Gurpreet Sekhon

gang in the past.

Releasing Bittu's pictures,
Capt Amarinder had made it

to SAD's "cheap pressure tactics" and would get to the bottom of politician-gangster nexus. Capt Amarinder said that he had ordered the probe by the state police chief after receiving pho-tographs clearly showing links of hardened criminals or gang-sters with top Akali leadership including the Badals.

He had said that before ordering the inquiry, he had apprised the Governor VP Singh Badnore about these photographs, which, if proved to be authentic, would expose the role, nature and extent of Akali involvement in patronizing crim-

inals and gangsters in the state.

"The evidence is serious and required a full-fledged police investigation, and I have asked

same at the earliest...The evidence in the form of pho-tographs, along with various documents, show a clear nexus between the Badals and other Akalis leaders, who are obviously trying to divert attention from their involvement by targeting Jails Minister Sukhjinder Singh Randhawa," he had stated adding that the SAD, in fact, had no proof of any involvement of Randhawa or any other Congress minister or leaders

According to inputs available with the police, Bittu is also allegedly close to Jeet Mohinder Singh, the former SAD MLA from Talwandi Sabo.

Later, Sukhbir released Capt Amarinder's photo with Bittu and asked the Congress leader to also include his name in the list too "Please also forward this photo graph to Governor VP Singh Badnore so that he also under-stands how Congress used gangsters in the run up to the assem-bly elections for political benefits and is now repaying them at the cost of the people of the state," he had added.

Sukhbir added that as the Chief Minister would find it dif-

The senior journalist, who lives on the campus, said she was taking pictures of flowers at the garden when the accused iched her and pointed towards the cactus enclosure, telling her that she could click picture with her mobile phone. At the time of the incident, there were no other morning

walkers inside the garden.
Feeling uncomfortable

to click his photo on her cell phone and give it to the police.

The accused then took a

couple of steps towards her and caught hold of her from behind, gagging her mouth with his hand. After grappling with the accused for nearly 15 minutes, she managed to free herself from his clutches and ran out of the garden, the journalist stated in her com-

She then narrated the incident to her husband, after which the couple approached police to file a complaint.

Abrogation of Article 370 unconstitutional, people of J&K bypassed: Petitioners to SC

New Delhi: The Centre's decision to abrogate provisions of Article 370 was "unconstitu-Article 3/0 was "unconstitu-tional" since people of Jammu & Kashmir were "bypassed" and any proposal for altering the constitutional status of the erstwhile State should emanate from the citizens there, one of the petitioners said in the

Supreme Court on Tuesday. A five-judge Constitution Bench headed by Justice NV Ramana, which commenced hearing on batch of pleas chal-lenging the constitutional validity of the Centre's decision, was told by the petitioner that it was violative of the Constitution as orders were passed in "disregard of consent" of people of J&K. Provisions of Article 370,

which gave special status to the erstwhile State of J&K, was abrogated by Centre on August 5.

A number of petitions have been filed in the matter, including that of private individuals, lawyers, activists and political parties and they have also chal-lenged the Jammu & Kashmir Reorganisation Act 2019, which splits J&K into two Union Territories — J&K and Ladakh. Senior advocate Raju

Ramachandran, appearing for bureaucrat-turned-politician Shah Faesal, Shehla Rashid and other petitioners, said Jammu & Kashmir was under President's Rule from December 19, 2018, till October 31 this year and "will of the people" was not there in the concurrence given

by state for abrogation of pro visions of Article 370.

He told the Bench, also comprising justices SK Kaul, R Subhash Reddy, BR Gavai and Surva Kant, that powers of the President and Parliament during period of proclamation under Article 356 is in its very nature "temporary" and it cannot be used to bring "irreversible" constitutional changes.

"The record indicates that

neither the President nor the Governor held any consulta-tions on the issue either with the public at large or with members of the legislative council," Ramachandran said in his outline of submissions which was handed over to the Bench.

As per the Bill, the Government proposes to amend Section 25 (1AA) of the Arms Act, 1959, to give punishment from the usual life term of 14 years to "imprisonment for the remainder of that person's life" for manufacturing, selling, repairing and possess-ing "prohibited" arms. The minimum punishment under this section will be 14 years.

Under the present law, the offence invites imprisonment of not less than seven years but may extend to life imprisonment — mostly up to 14 years. According to an estimate, India has a total of around 35 lakh gun licences. Thirteen lakh people have licences to carry weapons in Uttar Pradesh, fol lowed by militancy-hit Jammu & Kashmir, where 3.7 lakh people possess arms licences, most of which were taken in the name of personal security.

Tonion prices on Tuesday stayed above the ₹100 per kg mark, as Government efforts to cool the rates seem to be taking more time than expected. The rates were as high as ₹165 a kg in Panaji, while the average of 114 major cities in the country came to over ₹100.

As per the Ministry of Food and Consumer Affairs, onion prices started to climb from September and have averaged over ₹100 per kg since November 25. Onion, which is an essential ingredient in many food preparations, is a politically sensitive item and its high prices have been a cause defeat for many

Governments in the past.

According to the data. onion prices are ruling at ₹96 per kg in the national capital, ₹102 per kg in Mumbai, ₹100

Max lawmakers facing criminal cases against women from BJP: ADR

The number of Lok Sabha MPs with cases related to crimes against women has increased from two in 2009 to 19 in 2019.

According to the Association for Democratic Reforms (ADR), the BIP has the highest number of 21 law-makers facing cases related to crime against women, followed by the Congress (16) and YSRCP (7).

As per the report, the number of Lok Sabha election candidates with cases of crimes against women went up from to 126, an increase of 231 per cent, during the period. "There are three MPs and six MLAs who have declared cases related to rape... In the last five years, recognised parties have given tickets to 41 candidates who declared cases related to rape," an ADR report said.

In the past five years, the BJP gave tickets to 66 candidates facing cases of crime against women to contest Lok Sabha, Rajya Sabha and State Assemblies elections. The

Congress fielded 46 such candidates and Bahujan Samaj

Party 40.
The ADR said it analysed 4,822 out of 4,896 election affidavits of current MPs (759)

and MLAs (4063).
The number of Lok Sabha election candidates with cases of crimes against women went up from 38 to 126, an increase of 231 percent, during the period, the report said.

West Bengal reported the highest number of MPs/MLAs (16) who declared cases of crimes against women, followed by Odisha and Maharashtra with 12 MPs/MLAs each. "In the last five years, a total of 572 such candidates contested in Lok Sabha, Rajya Sabha

PAPER WITH PASSION **Anxiety in the N-E**

The sub-nationalism of ethnic groups and the fear of influx may just deflate Hindu-dominant nationalism



e problem with identity politics is that it thrives on resentment and insecurities of social groups, fragmenting them further instead of galvanising them into a cohesive social structure. The manipulative politics of extremism feeds off mutual anxieties. creating an entirely different context of relevance that does not depend on governance. So the Citizenship Amendment Bill (CAB), 2019, which was passed by the Lok Sabha on the strength of the numbers of the ruling dispensation, is a deeply unsettling piece of

legislation as it pits all kinds of otherness versus each other. This is the reason why there's a huge unrest in the North-east with indigenous groups fearing the influx of Hindu refugees from neighbouring Islamic countries that the Bill enables would swamp their culture and economy as it has historically. There have been torchlight vigils, students have taken to the streets in massive numbers and the 12-hour bandh has stalled all North-eastern States. This despite assurances that the Bill would not be applicable to Arunachal Pradesh, Nagaland and Mizoram where the Inner Line Permit (ILP) system exists and those tribal regions of Assam, Meghalaya and Tripura which are governed under the Sixth Schedule of the Constitution. The Bill proposes to grant Indian citizenship to fleeing Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Christians and Parsis, who are residents of Pakistan, Afghanistan and Bangladesh and are persecuted there. It does not reference other neighbouring countries like Sri Lanka, Myanmar or China from where refugees could come in but predicates it solely on the championship of the post-Partition Hindus, namely those left in Pakistan and Bangladesh. So it excludes persecuted Muslim sects from the same countries, the Shias and Ahmadiyas. In other words, non-Muslim immigrants would not face deportation and Muslims would, making religion a key criterion for asylum. It also proposes to reduce the mandated 11 years of residence in India for eligibility to six years, thereby hastening the cooption of Hindu refugees into the mainstream. The BJP wants to neutralise the Muslim infiltration in border States, encouraged by votebank politics of past years, with a Hindu influx and effect a demographic change. But this nationalist spiel, in turn, threatens locals, particularly in Assam.

Ethnic Assamese groups have consistently raised concerns about the Bill being contradictory to the spirit of the Assam Accord and the just-released National Register of Citizens (NRC) list. They argue that the Bill granting citizenship to Hindu refugees from across the border till the cutoff year of 2014 would swamp Ahom identity and the right of indigenous people over their land, opportunities and resources. Truth be told, the BJP has been pushing the citizenship Bill so that lakhs of Hindu families left out of the NRC would automatically be rehabilitated here. For the Assamese, any facilitation of Bengali Hindu immigrants is a remnant of the colonial legacy that saw Bengali civil servants and businesses take over the socio-economic matrix. For a long time, till 1876, Bengali was the operable language in the State. By virtue of territorial contiguity, the Bengali-domination meant a continuous infusion of Bengalis, exacerbated by the Partition and then the 1971 Bangladesh war. So even if their tribal pockets are protected, the Assamese fear that if Bengali-speaking illegal immigrants, especially those in the Barak Valley, are granted citizenship, they would outnumber the locals, as it has happened in Tripura where Hindu Bengalis have edged out indigenous people from even claiming the political space. The royal scion of Tripura, Pradyot Manikya Debbarma, has been spearheading the cause of the tribals. In fact, the BJP may be playing down the dissent in Assam but language and cultural pride of the Assamese have led to emotion-driven mass movements. Let not anyone forget the Bongal Kheda or the organised ethnic cleansing of Bengali Hindus that originated in the late 1940s and continued into the 1960s. The turbulence saw significant property damage, ethnic policing, street violence, conversion of Bengalimedium schools into Assamese and attacks on Bengali students in educational institutions. Similarly, the Mizos, who have struggled to establish their supremacy in power structures, are fearing a massive influx by Buddhist Chakmas. In turn, the Chakmas fear they could be denied citizenship under NRC and with Mizoram exempted from the CAB, protectionist permits would mean that they would be displaced despite being settlers for decades and have to move to other States. With discriminatory attacks, there will be large-scale internal displacement of people for which nobody has any answers. The sub-nationalism of ethnic groups may just take the wind off the sails of Hindu-dominant nationalism.

Shut out Russia

Is the World Anti-Doping Agency's decision to ban its athletes from international competition justified?



ladimir Putin is not a happy man. In fact, the Russian President is extremely angry. This because the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) has decided to ban all athletes competing under the Russian flag for four years. This is an unprecedented punishment as the ban will cover all major comtions, including the Olympics and the football World Cup. In the case of the latter, even if Russia qualifies for the 2022 World Cup, the athletes will not be allowed to represent their nation. And while Russian athletes, who can

prove that they did not submit to what WADA called a systematic State-sponsored doping regime, can represent themselves at global competitions, they cannot do so under the Russian tricolour. President Putin described this as proof of a global anti-Russian campaign. But was WADA justified? Yes, thanks to Grigory Rodchenkov, the former head of the Moscow anti-doping laboratory, who called out how Russian spies were tampering with results and even managing to break open and reseal apparently "untamperable" urine sample bottles. So the case was strong. This systematic tampering has been going on for years and was apparently part of an attempt by the Russian authorities to paint the nation as a sporting superpower, much like it was done in the days of the Soviet Union. Some Western analysts say that the ban doesn't go far enough with some athletes, who apparently gained from the doping regime but were never caught and were still able to compete, albeit under the Olympic flag. If the Russian team qualifies for the World Cup in Qatar, a workaround will be found. Incidentally, this ban does not apply to tournaments not classified as "major" like the Euro 2020 football championship, where the Russian city of St Petersburg will host some matches and the team has qualified.

All said and done, the sports world has to continue to crack down on drug cheats. The drugs that some athletes use are getting more and more advanced and is easy to hide. Moreover, in a technological arms race between drugs and detection, the latter is losing. Was Russia just a bit stupid that it got caught? Would such a punishment ever be imposed on a Western nation? These are questions that need some answering. But for now, this is not final as Russia has said that it will appeal against this decision at the Court of Arbitration for Sport.

Unfulfilled goals

The best tribute to Gujral, who appreciated the need for India to blend development efforts with environmental protection, will be to revisit the findings of the GREEN India 2047 project

t was last week that some events and television programmes were organised to mark the 100th birth anniversary of IK Gujral, who served as the 12th Prime Minister of India from April 1997 to March 1998. Those who have voiced their tributes and eulogies for this humane and gentlemanly leader have highlighted not only Gujral's vision in the field of international affairs but also his qualities as a steadfast friend to those who got to know him. Gujral was not only an intellectual who knew a great deal about subjects that political leaders generally do not read about, but he was also a person who expressed his opinions without fear or favour. It is not well-known that Gujral saheb was a person who held environmen-tal issues close to his heart and fully appre-ciated the need for this country to blend development efforts with environmental

It was in 1995 that The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI) launched a major project called GREEN India 2047 in preparation for the celebration of 50 years of India's independence in 1997. This project, which was the effort of almost three dozen researchers working for almost two years, estimated and documented the damage that Indian society had imposed on the country's natural resources and its on the country's natural resources and its environmental quality. It further projected what could happen with business as usual 50 years into the future, that is when India reaches 100 years of independence in 2047. A brief presentation on this project was made before Gujral early in August 1997 at Vigyan Bhavan, during which he also assembled a number of members of his Council of Ministers. At the end of the presentation, which provided startling facts and figures, Gujral saheb stated that this presentation "should jolt us

At that stage, the media, too, reported on the stark facts and the disturbing trends which had been in evidence during the first 50 years of India's independence One particular editorial in a leading news paper carried the title as "Filthy at Fifty." Much of the media coverage, which undoubtedly supported efforts to inform the Indian public, was clearly the result of the attention provided by the then Prime Minister to the analysis and realities presented to him.

Today it would be useful to revisit some of the findings of the GREEN India 2047 project, perhaps as a salute to Gujral's appreciation of the fact that India cannot develop without due attention to its natural resources and ecosystems, which not only support human life but a range of biodiversity that this country is blessed with. The truth is that in a range of vital resources, there has been rapid degradation as a result of socalled development. Some important facts need reflection even as 1997 is now 22 years



In this respect, the provision of infrastructure and wherewithal for universal literacy and education have been lacking. So, too, the provision of adequate healthcare facilities in several parts of the country, which would have promoted different fertility decisions. 

tion, after the presentation that was made before him, he stat-ed, "Thus, we have come to a stage when there are two lifestyles. The elite in the country can drink water out of a bottle: the common man can drink municipal water; and the worst, the slum dwellers can drink untreated river water. This is the picture that is emerging. Therefore, when we look at the coming 50 years — we are now at the golden jubilee of our independence — we must ask: Is this the lifestyle we are thinking of? Is this the life that we are offering to our people? Is this the future of our

children? And when I say children, I do not mean children only of the elite. The child living in the slum, the child who walking and sleeping on the street, what future are we offering him?"

Sadly, many of the projec tions that were made in this project and presented to the then Prime Minister have only become more threatening Whether it is the air quality, chemical and toxic pollution of our groundwater, dumping of waste in our rivers, thinning of forests and the huge mountains of solid waste being generated not only by our cities but by our rural areas as well, the out look for 2047 looks grim and

While we have widespread opportunities, the inertia in our system is pushing us in the direction of business as usual. There is, therefore, a dire need for Indian society to shift gears and move towards a path of sustainable development. That would not only be a fitting tribute to Gujral but a reassurance for our children living a secure existence devoid of the grow-ing risks from human-induced climate change and the catastrophic destruction of our natural resources.

EVs are the next big thing

Improved battery technology and concerns over climate change are set to make electric vehicles the dominant force in the automobile space

he increased use of Electric Vehicles (EVs) is the first major game-changing revolution sweeping the automobile industry evel since the internal combustion engine changed the sector's dynamics. Powered by improved battery technology and made extremely relevant by growing concerns over climate change, EVs are slowly but steadily moving towards becoming the dominant force in the automobile space. In 2018, the global sale of plug-in vehicles reached 2.1 million units, which constituted a 64 per cent increase over the previous year. Of this, 69 per cent were all-electric models while 31 per cent were plug-in hybrids, indicating that the consumer is increasingly preferring pure EVs. Electric bicycles (e-cycles) are another category that is fast catching the public's imagination globally. According to a recent report by a leading market research organisation, the global e-cycle market is expected to touch \$21 billion by 2024, growing at a Compound Annual Growth Rate (CAGR) of

12.5 per cent between 2019 and 2024.
Interestingly, a bulk of this growth in the EV category is coming from China, which accounted for more than 50 per cent of global sales. It is the Scandinavian countries, however that lead the way when it comes to adoption of EVs. In Norway, a whopping 40 per cent of new car sales in 2018 comprised EVs while in Iceland it stood at 17.5 per cent and in Sweden 7.2 per cent. In India, the Government has already provided a major boost to the EV sector by announcing major investment goals for realising the objective of creating reguisite charging infrastructure for them. The last Budget also announced significant income tax breaks for people buying EVs. As the transport sector globally tilts towards them, a great amount of churning is expected to take place in the automobile industry, which is currently dominated by internal combustion engine-powered vehicles.

An increasing shift to alternative energy is transforming different aspects of the automotive industry. With EVs clearly emerging as the future of the industry, automobile sector players are already expected to invest billions of dollars in this emerging technology. With EVs becoming a reality sooner than it was expected, investing in this technology will be key for all major players to stay relevant. Currently, the EV divisions of most automobile manufacturers form a miniscule part of their overall businesses. Most manufacturers have just one or two variants of EVs in place. However, as this is likely to change in the near future, the next 10 years will be very critical for conventional automobile manufacturers. It is not that the automobile technology has not witnessed any transformation in a century. However the transformation was ushered by continuing development of existing technology. A shift to EVs, however, marks a complete change in automobile technology as well as major disruption in the automobile ecosystem. For example, automotive parts manufacturers are likely to be hit since EVs use fewer parts than other vehicles.

The coming years will witness a huge boost in Research & Development (R&D) in the EV sector as an increasing number of conventional car manufacturers work overtime to improve their EV technology. The battery supply issues, need for fast-charging batteries as well as long distance charging concerns need to be addressed now. Most R&D efforts in the automobile sector are, therefore, expected to focus on improving battery performance and reducing battery costs to make EVs more affordable. The e-cycle space is also likely to witness a greater churning and growth. The bulkier lead-acid batteries have already made way for much lighter nickel-cadmium and lithium-ion batteries that have made newer models much more viable and acceptable to the end consumer. Newer emerging trends in the e-cycle space include luxury folding e-bikes and high-tech bikes with smartphone integration.
With much-improved battery lives, e-cycles offer a highly sus-

tainable and effective solution to the air pollution-cum-traffic congestion woes of countries like India. E-cycles launched in the country are already offering a viable, versatile and eco-friendly alternative to motorised bikes. These e-cycles come with substantial bat-tery life and can easily be pedalled back manually in case of loss of battery. Interestingly, most path-breaking innovation in battery technology is coming from startups and not from established automobile players which also indicates that the latter might have to fight harder for survival.

Another interesting shift might be observed in the global cen-tres of automobile manufacturing. With countries like China and India giving a major policy push to EVs, a lot of automobile manufacturing is likely to shift to these countries over the next 20 years. The

next Detroit might as well emerge in one of these countries.
The emergence of EVs in a big way also gives a shot in the arm to the alternative fuel sector in general. An increasing yearning for a carbon-neutral world has prompted greater work in the direction of making a basket of clean fuels workable. An ethanol-powered bike has already been launched in India. The decline of fossil fuels in general and a shift towards a greener economy will, therefore, provide

a boost to biofuels as well as solar energy.

The world is witnessing an integration of economies like never before. At the same, time, political and economic volatility has increased manifold and no country is immune. to the resultant turmoil. Another consequence of this global economic integration is the rise of multi-nationals with transnational operations and subsidiaries in numerous countries and access to financial markets worldwide.

More than one-third of all financial transac

tions occur across borders and that number is expected to grow as the search for diversification and better investment opportunities expands. Different accounting standards mean different models. For example, a company may recognise profits under one set of national accounting norms profits under one set of national accounting norms and losses under another, which could ultimate by have an impact on its reported financial performance and position. Without common accounting standards, cross-border activities were complicated in the past that resulted in adding cost, complexity and risk for both companies and investors using those financial statements to make economic decisions. In such an integrated but impulsive world economy, it is important to but impulsive world economy, it is important to have a common business language that can help understand and compare businesses. Financia reporting is an important way through which com-panies communicate with external stakeholders and standardisation of such reporting processes worldwide to bring about uniformity is more valu-able today than ever before.

With a view to improve corporate governance and increase free flow of capital across the globe, in 2001, the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) developed the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS), a set of high-quali-ty common accounting rules established to bring about consistency, transparency, reliability and comparability in the financial statements world-wide. They define the types of transactions with financial impact, their maintenance and reporting. This goal of a single set of high-quality global accounting standards is being supported by several nations, including G20 countries, several professional accounting organisations and investors

IFRS norms support the three pillars of transparency, accountability and efficiency. Transparency in financial statements is brought about by improving the comparability and the quality of financial information internationally, thereby improving the decision-making capability of investors and other external stakeholders. As a investors and other external stakeholders. As a source of globally-comparable information, IFRS norms are also of vital importance to regulators around the world. By reducing the information asymmetry between the providers and users of capital, they boost accountability. Improving capital allocation by helping investors to identify opportunities and risks across the world, these standards contribute towards better economic efficiency. The usage of IFRS has become quite widespread with approximately 120 nations partially requiring these approximately 120 nations partially requiring these standards for their domestic listed companies. However, as many as 90 countries have fully conformed with IFRS as promulgated by the IASB and include a statement, acknowledging such conformity in their audit reports. Even those countries that don't apply the standards directly, like China, closely follow the rules that the IASB has established the countries of the countries of the country of the c lished over the decades. According to a 2018 IFRS Foundation report, 27,000 domestically-listed companies on 88 major stock exchanges in the world use the standards. India's convergence with

In Germany, the impact of IFRS adoption was studied during 1998 to 2002 by Hung and Subramanyam where they concluded that the value of total assets and equity and variability of net earnings are significantly higher under IFRS compared to the German Accounting Standards. However, changes in financial ratios were not supported by their study.

Agea and Aktas conducted a pre and post-adoption study on impacts on financial ratios of 147 listed firms on the Istanbul stock exchange during 2004-2005 and found out that ratios that were majorly affected were the current and net asset turnover ratios. In contrast to other individual surveys by country, analysts Callao and Jarne, conducted two studies comparing results in Spain and the United Kingdom (UK).

The results revealed that the quantitative impact on financial ratios is sig-nificant in both countries and that it is higher in the UK. Blanchette, Racicot and Girard, in their research, examined various financial ratios of liquidity, leverage coverage and profitability and their impact on the adoption of IFRS in com-panies operating in Canada and did not find any difference. Although survey results showed differences in means, medians and volatility in most financial ratios of companies but statistical significance could not be established in many cases. When they specifically evaluated their results by groups of companies who adopted IFRS at different dates, no significant variations were found in their

Arouri researched the IFRS impacts on return on equity (ROE) and value rel-

ment in transparency and value rele vance. In India, Achalapathi and Bhanu Sireesha studied several firms and showed that IFRS adoption has led to an increase in most of the liquidity, prof-itability and valuation ratios, which were statistically significant and were able were statistically significant and were about to conclude that an opportunity for capital maintenance and protection against failure risk may have been provided to companies due to the transition to IFRS. Although standardisation and harmonisation of financial reporting is important in this globalised world, com-plete integration may not be possible as there is an increasing focus among dif-ferent stakeholders on the future. Therefore, in an environment that is highly volatile and ever-changing, it is rather difficult for companies to make accurate predictions. Thus, more flexibility is needed in this area and the possibilities of standardisation become limited. ited. William Shakespeare's famous drama Julius Caesar, Cassius, a Inobleman, speaking with his friend, Brutus confides in the latter that in the best interests of the public, Julius Caesar must be stopped from becoming the monarch of Rome. Cassius tells him, "The fault, dear Brutus, is not in our stars, but in ourselves, that we are underlings." How apt is this quotation today! The solution to the increasing number of rapes and atrocities on women lies with us not elsewhere. This was my intro while writing about the Nirbhaya rape case. Unfortunately, since then, despite public outrage, rape and molestation cases have been on the rise and they have become more violent. The recen Telangana rape-murder case and the burning of the Unnao rape victim and her subsequent death in a hospital, show that nothing has changed. Delhi is now considered the rape capital of the world. Foreign countries like the US and the UK have sent advisories to tourists travelling to India. In these countries too, there are crimes and rapes but by and large, the public is aware that the "big brother" is watching and the perpetrators will be caught sooner or later.

Sadly, this is not the case in India as criminals seem to have no fear of the authorities.

The public outrage following these unfortunate incidents is huge, as it should be. Asha Devi, mother of Nirbhaya, went on record and vent-ed her frustration over the fact that her

daughter's rapists had still not been given capital punishment after all these years. In the meantime, there have been many high-profile rape cases allegedly involving some politicians

and gurus.

However, the way some parliamentarians clapped their hands in support of the police encounter of the four alleged rapists in Telangana and the subble converted for the attack. the public support for the extrajudi-cial killings reveals the frustration of the people with the county's criminal justice system which takes years to mete out punishment.

But many apprehend that police encounters often end up thwarting jus-tice and are often misused as a quick-fix by the security establishment

under public pressure.

After the Nirbhaya incident, The Criminal Law (Amendment) Act, 2013 was amended and is held as one of the most concrete steps taken by the Government to curb violence against

women. After the Telangana and Unnao incidents there has been clamour for even more stringent punishments. The question is, do we need more laws?

In reality, what is needed is stringent implementation of the existing laws by the police, Government, law enforcement agencies and awareness campaigns by women's organisations. The cases drag on for years. In the meanwhile, the perpetrators get emboldened and attack infants, children, girls, women and even grandmothers, to satiate their lust. Many women still do not go to the police to report these incidents for lack of faith

in the criminal justice system.

The spate of atrocities against girls/women is indeed a wake up call for the judiciary. The State Governments and the High Courts (HCs) must support the Centre's proposal to set up 1,000 special courts to fast-track nearly 1.67 lakh rape cases,

of which the maximum crimes were those involving hapless children. It is also important to note that the conviction rate is a dismal 32 per cent and the other perpetrators are roaming

Poor investigation and shoddy case build-up by agencies result in cul-prits getting away scot-free. In short, there are failings in the entire criminal justice system. The police are not prompt in dealing with rape cases, the prosecution fails to get the perpetrators convicted and the courts do not

have enough judges to take up cases.
The Centre and States need to address the issue of women's safety on a war footing as the public has lost confidence in the system. It is a sad commentary that despite the Supreme Court's observations that judicial reforms were needed urgently, the

Government is dragging its feet on it. Archaic laws need to be amended. It is appalling that when a toddler

is raped and is unable to give evidence, the culprits go scot-free because the mother's evidence is considered secondary. How can a two-year-old child give evidence of rape? The onus of proof should not lie with the victim It is this kind of incongruity within the legal system which needs to be addressed.

Last, but not the least, there is need to change the mindset of the public. Society should strongly support the victims of rape and not blame or shame them. The moral fabric of the country is tearing up slowly and this needs to stop. Boys should be taught to respect women in a country where the Shakti (divine feminine creative power) cult is still relevant.

We should introspect in the after-math of Hyderabad and Unnao incidents and put the fear of God in the minds of perpetrators and provide justice to the victims.

Sonowal welcomes passage of Bill

tion there. He also thanked Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah "for fulfilling a long-standing commitment of India and for taking everyone along and ensuring protection for all

indigenous people". Sarma who is also the

ister of the State, tweeted that the Bill will go down in "history as a glorious historical correction of a blunder committed by the Nehru-Liyaquat Pact! Posterity will owe it to PM Sri @narendramodi for

this giant step".
The then Indian Prime
Minister Jawaharlal Nehru and his Pakistani counterpart Liaquat Ali Khan signed an agreement, known as the Nehru-Liaquat Pact, in 1950 to protect the minority communities in their respective coun-

Sarma thanked the Union Home Minister for tearing "into the opposition as he made an inspired speech while replying on the CAB in the Lok Sabha". The Chief Minister had also tweeted on Monday that the CAB is not only for Assam but for the entire country and a section is "maligning the image of the state by spreading

Kerala CM slams CAB Politics behind

Thiruvananthapuram: The Citizenship Amendment Bill (CAB) passed by Parliament in unusual haste' was an 'attack on the secular and democratic character of the country, Kerala Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijavan said on Tuesday.

The Constitution of India guarantees the right to citizenguarantees the right to chizen-ship for all Indians, irrespective of their religion, caste, lan-guage, culture, gender or pro-fession and this very right is being made void by the CAB, Vijayan said in a statement The move to decide citi-

zenship on the basis of religion amounts to rejection of the Constitution, he said. This was an excercise to divide people on communal lines, he said.

"The bill was passed by the Lok Sabha with unusual haste and tenacity," he said.

"Muslims, who have immi-grated from Bangladesh, Afghanistan and Pakistan are being excluded. The discrimi-nation on the basis of religion

and preferential granting of rights is a denial of natural jus-

tice," Vijayan said.
The bill mentions that people belonging to six religious groups from three neighbouring countries can be granted

citizenship.

These two clauses must be withdrawn, the Chief Minister

It is not unknown to the Sangh Parivar that India houses refugees from Sri Lanka in addition to the three aforementioned countries, he said.

"The CAB serves the communal policies of the sangh parivar and their devious plans to establish a non-secular state. The articles of the Constitution that relate to citizenship and fundamental rights are being violate here. India belongs to Indians of all kinds. Efforts to undermine this fact will only take our country backward," he

. "It will destroy our hardfought freedom and we must not let that happen", he said. PTI

Citizenship (Amendment) Bill. He claimed that the bill is an attempt to divert people's attention from issues like unemployment and slow eco-

The bill seeks to amend the Citizenship Act, 1955, in order to grant Indian nationality to Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians who come to India after facing religious persecution in Bangladesh, Pakistan and Afghanistan even if they don't possess proper documents.

It was passed in the Lok Sabha a little past midnight on Monday after a heated debate that lasted over seven hours. It will now be tabled in the Rajya

"There is politics some-where behind introducing the bill. It is not written in the Constitution that there should be discrimination on the basis of religion. The Congress has opposed the bill in principle and the party's stand is clear that religion should not be the ground for (granting) citizen-ship," Pilot, who is also the Rajasthan Congress chief, told

reporters here.
"Amendments to the Citizenship Act have been made in the past as well but it is the first time that it is being opposed in parts of the country," he said.

The government's decision to introduce the bill was met with protests in northeastern States with most student unions and regional political parties opposing it. PTI

It will dilute Art 371F in long run: Bhaichung

Rootballer-turned-politician Bhaichung Bhutia on Tuesday expressed disappointment that Sikkim was not excluded from the ambit of the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, unlike several other northeastern States.

Bhutia, also working president of Hamro Sikkim Party, expressed his fears that the leg-islation will dilute special pro-visions of the Himalayan state

"We are deeply disappointed with the CAB. The Bill ĥas not excluded Sikkim compared to other North-East states like Nagaland, Meghalaya and a few others. "We wanted Sikkim also be

mentioned in writing on the Bill like other North-East states," Bhutia, said in a Facebook post.

He said though Home Minister Amit Shah had men-tioned in the House that the legislation will not have any effect on states enjoying special status under Article 371, the legal provision is different from Article 371F. "This Bill is surely a way of

diluting Article 371F in long run," the former Indian football

team captain said.

tough task ahead.

The ruling BJP on Monday had swept the by-elections, winning 12 of the total of 15 seats. Yediyurappa on Tuesday said he would soon hold discussions with the central leadership on cabinet expansion.

"In another three to four days I will go to Delhi to meet Amit Shah (BJP National President) and Prime Minister (Narendra Modi), when they decide we will do it (Cabinet expansion), Yediyurappa said here.

"As I had given an assurance that those who had resigned and came out of (Congress and JD(s)) and won the bypolls. making them Ministers is our responsibility, I have accepted it and will execute it hundred per cent," he told

Eleven of the 13 disqualified legislators, who ccessfully contested the bypolls on BJP tickets,

expected to become Ministers

However, Cabinet expansion will not be an easy task as Yediyurappa will have to strike a balance by accommodating the victorious disqualified legislators as he had promised and also make place for old guards, upset at being "neglected" in the first round of the induction exercise.

He also has to give adequate representation to various castes and regions in his cabinet that already has eight Lingayats, including the CM, three CM that have the company to the company Vokkaligas, three from Scheduled Caste, two OBCs, one Scheduled Tribe and a Brahmin.

Region-wise,Bengaluru Urban, with four Ministers and Belagavi and Shivamogga,with two each, have a larger share in the Ministry. Including the Chief Minister, there are currently 18 ministers in the cabinet, whose sanctioned

strength is 34.

With indications about cabinet expansions on the cards, several ministerial aspirants, both old and newly-elected, have met Chief Minister to push their case, party sources said.

Wednesday's launch will mark a significant milestone for the space agency as it would be the 50th flight of the PSLV and also the 75th vehicle mission from Sriharikota. The 628 kg satellite, meant for applications in various fields like agricul ture, forestry and disaster management support, will carry nine customer satellites, including one each from Israel, Italy, Japan

and six from the United States. ISRO said the countdown for RISAT-2BR1 began at 4.40 PM on Tuesday. The space agency said the satellites are being launched under a commercial arrangement with NewSpace India Ltd. The mission life of RISAT2-BR1 is five years, ISRO said. RISAT-2BR1 follows the successful launch of RISAT-2B in May 22.

Prof A Ramachandran, vice chancellor, Kerala University of Fisheries and Ocean Studies (KUFOS) and an internationally respected industrial marine specialist says that the coastlines of Somalia and Yemen remain underutilised.

"Because of the lack of interest among Somalian fishermen to take the initiative to venture out to the exclusive economic zone of this country,

what is happening is that the region is experiencing large scale poaching in the form of unauthorised fishing. Fisheries resources in Somalia remain untrapped due to a host of rem untapped due to a host of reasons," Prof Ramachandran told

He also pointed out that coastlines of Somalia and Yemen and virgin areas. "Fish is not very much relished in these countries," said Prof Ramachandran.

Since these countries were not very much into fishing, the untapped marine wealth in the form of fish products could be harnessed by entrepreneurs from India. 'Our fishermen, especially those from Tamil Nadu and Kerala, are skilled in fishing in these regions. The area offers immense potential for our fishermen," he

said. What makes the Somalian and Yemen coast unique is the presence of large stock of tuna, lobster, sardine, mackerel, cuttle fish and several other species

which enjoy big demand in global market, said the vice - major role in facilitating such chancellor. Since both Somalia and

Somalia, Yemen beckon Indian fishermen

Yemen are not fully equipped for deep sea fishing and do not have modern infrastructure for storing and processing the catch, there is a big potential for Indian entrepreneurs as well as fishermen, pointed out Prof Ramachandran and Dr Nomvuyo Nokwe, secretary general, Indian Ocean Rim Association (IORA), an intergovernmental organisation engaged in strengthening regional cooperation and sus-tainable development within the Indian Ocean region through its 22 member States and nine dialogue part-

Unnao rape victim's dying declaration strong evidence to nail killers: UP DGP

Lucknow: The dying declaration of the 23-year-old Unnao rape victim, who was set ablaze last week by five men, including the two accused of raping her earli-er, is a "strong evidence" and will be used to nail her killers, Uttar

Pradesh police chief O P Singh said on Tuesday.

The police will go in for the prosecution of the five accused in a fast-track court, the director general of police said a day after the Utter Pradesh Government took a Cabinet decision to set up 218 new fast-track courts — 144 to try rape cases and 74 for sexual offences

cases and 74 for sexual offences against children.
"Dying declaration is a very strong evidence, and certainly, it will be used. Before dying, the girl deposed before a sub-divisional magistrate that these five persons attacked her," DGP

Delhi and admitted to the hospital, she also had a chat with doctors. We will try to get the statement of the doctor also in this regard. These will be strong evidence to chargesheet these five criminals," he added.

Singh also said the police will soon file the chargesheet in the murder case. "We will be the murder case. "We will be chargesheeting them within a few days. We want to fast-track the entire case," said the police chief. "We are also exploring the possibility of going for the DNA test of the accused," said Singh.

Pro-Maratha outfit seeks speedy justice in Kopardi rape case

Pune: The Maratha Kranti Morcha has demanded speedy justice in the 2016 case of rape and killing of a 15-year-girl in Maharashtra's Kopardi village.

The pro-Maratha outfit sent a letter to Chief Minister Uddhav Thackarey on Monday, seeking his intervention into the

matter and their other pending demands.

"A sessions court awarded death sentence to three accused in the Kopardi rape case. The case is now pending before the Bombay High Court. The Government should intervene and ensure speedy justice to the victim," Maratha Kranti Morcha member Rajendra Kondhare told reporters here on Monday.

The victim, a Class IX student belonging to the Maratha community, was found brutally killed after being raped on July 13, 2016 at Kopardi village in Ahmednagar district. According to police, the accused also inflicted iniuries all over her body and broke PTI her limbs before throttling her.

Over 1,500 rape cases in Kerala till Sept this year

1,500 rape cases have been registered in Kerala so far this year, according to police sta-

The numbers have been revealed at a time when there is a Nationwide uproar over increasing crimes against women after the recent killing of two young women in Hyderabad and Unnao in Uttar Pradesh respectively.

In Hyderabad, a young veterinarian was gang-raped, killed and set on fire by four men, while in Unnao a rape victim died after being set

According to the police's crime records bureau, a total of 10,516 cases of atrocities against women have been reported up to September this year, of which 1,537 were rapes.

Though there is a slight dip in the number of rape cases this year compared to the 2,015 last year (provisional figures), it could go up when the cases in the rest of the months are taken into consideration.

Besides the rape cases, total of 3,351 molestation, 167 kidnapping and abduction, 309 eve-teasing cases, four dowry

deaths and 2,019 cases of cruelty by husbands and relatives have also been reported in the first nine months this year, it

A total of 2,003 and 1,656 rape cases had been reported in Kerala in 2017 and 2016

RCEP did not address **India's concerns: Goyal**

The RCEP did not "adequately" address India's concerns including over issues of non-tariff barriers to trade and opaqueness in subsidy regime in some countries, which forced it to back out from the trade deal, the government informed Rajya Sabha on Tuesday.

Besides, the government is also going to review the free trade agreement between India and AŠEAN countries by the previous governments saying that it has created trade imbalances, Union Minister of Commerce and Industry Piyush Goyal said in a statement.

According to the minister, imports from these countries have increased much more than exports from India.

However, Goyal, who was replying to members in the Upper House, also assured them that India's Look East

policy would continue.
"The government's priority is also to correct the asymmetry in the existing agreements and maximise its export potential to benefit domestic industry and

India and doubling farmers' ome," said Goyal.

The minister also said

that India would continue to engage with other countries as "equal partner and on the principle of reciprocity"

"We are working with our existing FTA partners like South Korea and Japan to address our concerns," said Goyal in his statement on trade agreements

with RCEP countries.
He further added: "We have also secured an agreement to initiate a review of ASEAN-India Trade and Goods agreement to make the AIFTA more user friendly, simple and trade facilitative

Over RCEP, the minister said that India continued to focus on its core demands level playing field, fair trade practises, transparency and market access - during the

trade negotiations.
"Since, RCEP in its current form did not adequately address our concerns, joining it would be unfair to our interests," he said.

During RCEP negotiations,

the government had high-lighted India's position as a rel-atively low per capita GDP as compared to other RCEP countries and its concerns about the livelihood of farmers and employment generation provided by the industrial sector, particularly by the MSMEs.

The Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) is a mega free-trade agreement (FTA) which was negotiated by 16 countries, including India and China. On November 4 in Bangkok, Prime Minister Narendra Modi took the call of not joining the RCEP agreement as India's concerns were not addressed in the pact.

Taking a dig on the previous governments, the minister said that the previous FTAs done by them had done damage to trade, hence there was no question of any such further

trade agreements.
Asked about the consequences of not joining RCEP, the minister said, "The economy of the country would improve and there would be no unwanted imports."

₹ rises 12 paise to 1-month high of 70.92 against \$

The rupee rose by 12 paise to close at a more than one-month high of 70.92 against the US dollar on Tuesday amid softening crude oil prices and weakening of the greenback vis-a-vis major global curren-

Forex traders said the Indian rupee gained ground on the back of stable crude oil prices and a weaker dollar index. However, muted domes-tic equity markets weighed on the local unit.

At the interbank foreign exchange market, the rupee opened at 70.98 against the US

During the day, the domestic unit fluctuated between a high of 70.85 and a low of 71.04 and finally ended the day at 70.92 against the US dollar, the highest closing level since November 5 when the unit set-

On Monday, the rupee had settled at 71.04 against the

American currency.

"Rupee continued to extend gains despite fall in domestic equities but primarily on back of weakness in the dollar against its major cross-es," said Gaurang Somaiyaa, Forex & Bullion Analyst, Motilal Oswal Financial Services Private Ltd.

Somaiyaa, further said that focus will now be on inflation and industrial production number and weaker-thanexpected data could curb the

gains for the currency.

"We expect the USDINR
(Spot) pair to find support
close to 70.80 levels and on the higher side resistance is at 71.40 level," he said.

Forex traders said easing crude oil prices and weak-nesss of the US dollar vis-a-vis other currencies overseas supported the rupee.

The consumer price index The consumer price index (CPI) — a key gauge of retail inflation — came in at 4.5 percent for November, the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) said, up from 3.8 percent in October and the highest rate since January 2012.

Analysts surveyed by Bloomberg News had forecast an increase of 4.3 percent onyear.
The widespread outbreak

of swine fever since August 2018 has disrupted the pork supply in China, sending the prices of the staple meat up 110.2 percent last month November.

With China's pig herd down by about 40 percent, authorities last week launched a plan to restore pork produc-tion to pre-swine fever levels by

Govt told to prevent misuse of input tax credit under GST as collection slows

A Parliamentary panel on finance on Tuesday observed the Goods and Services Tax (GST) collection has slowed down in recent months and asked the government to prevent misuse of input tax credit.

Two years after its launch, the government has begun the review of GST, including a possible resetting of rates along with the slabs, the Standing Committee on Finance headed by Jayant Sinha said in its report tabled in Parliament.

"In this connection, the committee are constrained to observe that GST collections have somewhat slowed down in recent months as compared to the target. The committee would therefore expect the government to resolve all the troubling issues related to GST at the earliest to achieve the desired revenue buoyancy," the

panel said. GST revenue collection crossed the ₹1 lakh crore mark after a gap of three months in November, with the revenue growing by 6 per cent to ₹1.03 lakh crore in the month. The collection stood at ₹95,380

collection stood at ₹95,380 crore in October.
"The committee would also urge the Department of Revenue to remain vigilant so as to prevent misuse of provisions as input tax credit and compliance," the committee said. enhance monitoring of overall

It further asked the revenue department to have systemat-ic reports and conduct feedback surveys from taxpayers to evaluate whether GST is oper-

ating smoothly.

On large amount of tax refunds and the accruing interests on it, the committee said the processes should be revisited to dispense with the "need for raising realistic demands as also payments of dispropor-tionately large advance tax by assesses'

In 2017-18, the direct tax refunds stood at ₹1.52 lakh crore and ₹17,603 crore as interest, which rose to ₹1.61 lakh crore and ₹20,566 crore respectively in 2018-19.

Digital payments have seen significant growth in India after the government's demonetisation drive in 2016. Players like PhonePe and Paytm have witnessed strong growth in user base as well as transaction value and volumes.

PhonePe has seen its losses mount to ₹1,904.72 crore in 2018-19 from a loss of ₹791.03 crore for the year ended March

However, its revenue from operations rose manifold to ₹184.22 crore in 2018-19 as against ₹42.79 crore a year

Previously, PhonePe had stated that it had seen 380 million transactions on its platform in August 2019, as compared to 290 million in the month of June.

There have also been reports that Flipkart is looking at hiving off PhonePe into a separate entity, a move that would help the payments company raise funds independently.

COAL LINKAGE RATIONALISATION LEADS TO ₹3,770CR **SAVINGS PER YEAR** BY 58 TPPS: CIL

Coal India Ltd (CIL) on Tuesday said about 58 thermal power plants (TPPs) in the country are saving around Rs 3,770 crore per annum in coal transportation cost after the miner had implemented the

fuel linkage rationalisation.
A total of 63 million tonne of coal movement is currently involved under the rationali-sation policy, CIL sources said.

"An estimated Rs 3,770 crore is being saved annually by 58 thermal power plants in the country in coal transportation costs after the implementa-tion of linkage rationalisation policy by Coal India Limited since 2015," the miner said. The linkage rationalisation

refers to transfer of coal supply source of a power plant from a far end mine to the nearer one.

This arrangement benefits the power plants in reduction of coal transportation cost and ensures quicker supplies of the fuel and greater availability of railway rakes, the sources said.

SBI reports loan divergence of ₹11,932 cr for FY19



The country's largest lender State Bank of India (SBI) on Tuesday reported about Rs 12,000 crore divergence in their bad loans for the last fiscal.

As per the assessment done the SBI was 11,932 crore more at ₹1,84,682 as against ₹1,72,750 reported by the bank for 2018-19, SBI said in a regulatory. ulatory filing. Similarly, the net NPA was

77,827 crore as compared to disclosed figure of ₹65,895 crore, reflecting divergence of ₹11,932 crore, it said. As a result the bank has to make additional provisioning of ₹12,036 crore in the balancesheet and the notional

loss would have been at ₹6,968 SBI had posted a profit of ₹862 crore for 2018-19 in May this year.

It further said after subsequent slippage or upgradation during the current financial year, the remaining impact on the gross NPAs during the third quarter of current fiscal is ₹3,143 core. The impact on provision-ing during the third quarter

stood at ₹4,654 crore added.

In recent months, there have been several instances of under-reporting of bad loans by lenders, prompting regula-tory action by the Reserve Bank of India.

Last month, SBI in a circular noted that disclosures in respect of divergence and pro-visioning are in the nature of material events and hence necessitate immediate disclosure. Further, this information is also price sensitive, requiring prompt disclosure by a listed

Accordingly, the regulator has decided that "listed banks shall make disclosures of divergences and provisioning beyond specified threshold, as mentioned in aforesaid RBI notifications, as soon as reasonably possible and not later than 24 hours upon receipt of the Reserve Bank's Final Risk Assessment Report (RAR), rather than waiting to publish them as part of annual financial statements".

The SBI has reported the loan divergence to the exchanges, as per the direction of market regulator Securities and Exchange Board of India

Next rate cut depends on how less tearyeyed onion leaves RBI

China plans to launch its own digital currency: Report

hina plans to launch its own digital currency to stay ahead of the global competition with its central bank approving proposals to conduct trials in some cities, official media here

reported on Tuesday. China's central bank - the People's Bank of China (PBC) - has stepped up efforts to roll out its Digital Currency Electronic Payment (DCEP) as it seeks to stay ahead of the competition among central banks around the world and help preserve financial sovereignty, state-run Global Times

reported.

The bank is set to conduct trials of the digital currency in cities such as tech hub Shenzhen in the country's southern Guangdong Province

The initial test, set at the end of this month in Shenzhen will involve some of the largest banks in the country and telecom carriers, the Times reported, quoting the Caijing The test will be expanded

to more areas next year, it said. Similar tests are also expected to be conducted in Suzhou, China's estern Jiangsu Province, the report noted. Domestic internet giants Alibaba and Tencent will also participate in the trials, it added. The PBC is accelerating

the launch as competition heat ing up among central banks around the world to leap ahead with digital currency, expected to affect a wide range of sectors ranging from financial to retail and trade, the report said. On Wednesday, Francois Villeroy de Galhau, governor of

France's central bank, announced that the bank will conduct a test of a digital currency and launch a call for projects before the end of the first quarter of 2020.

Employability of graduates jumps to 47% in 2019 from 33% in 2014: Survey

In some good news to the millions graduates and also to the education system in the country as a whole, where for many years as much as 70 percent of the professional degree holders were found to be unemployable, a survey has found that nearly half of the fresh pass-outs are employ-

The survey, however, does not speak about the jobs scenario given the shape of the economy due to the high capacity underutilization prevalent in across most industry segments for many years now.

According to the India Skills Report by Wheebox, People Strong and CII, there is an overall positive trend in talent supply as over 46 percent of the students surveyed are found to be employable or ready to take-up jobs in 2019 against only 33 percent in 2014.

"There is an improvement in the availability of employable talent at around 47% in 2019up from 33.9% in 2014," Wheebox Nirmal Singh said.

The most employable can-didates are MBA passouts with 54 percent of the being found employable against 40 percent in two years ago, it said, adding BPharma, polytechnic, BCom and BA graduates have also seen an improvement in their employability which has increased by over 15 percent.

However, there has been a decline in the employability those coming out with BTech, other engineering streams, MCA, technical and computerrelated courses, says the survey.

The survey is based on a study by the talent management specialisit Wheebox which has conducted the national employability test survey from July-November 2019 with more than 3 lakh participants from 3,500 educational institutions across the country.

Two articles of impeachment focusing on abuse of power and obstructing Congress were expected to be unveiled, Xinhua news agency quoted The Washington Post as saying in a report on Monday night citing sources who cautioned the plan was yet to be final-

Under the current plan, the House Judiciary Committee, which is responsible for writing articles of impeachment, would vote on the articles on Thursday, the newspaper said in its report.

A full House vote will take place next week, it

The news broke out only hours after the House Judiciary panel concluded its second and final hear-ing in the Trump impeachment proceeding on

The marathon hearing that lasted nearly 10 hours allowed the attorneys to present their findings from the first phase of the investigation, who provided conflicting accounts of Trump's dealings with Ukraine, as Democrats and Republicans reiterated their positions.

In his closing statement on Monday evening, House idiciary Committee Chairman Jerry Nadler accused

Trump of having "put himself before his country".

"I am struck by the fact that my Republican colleagues have offered no serious scrutiny of the evidence at hand. They have talked about everything else, but they have offered not one substantive word in the President's defence," the said.

Doug Collins, the top Republican on the panel, said it will "be the first impeachment that is partisan, and facts are not agreed to"

House Democrats have been looking into whether Trump abused his office by pressuring Ukraine into launching investigations that could benefit him politically. Lawmakers have also been examining whether the Republican conditioned a White House meeting or military aid to Ukraine on those probes.

Hong Kong court lifts ban on face masks

Hong Kong: A Hong Kong court on Tuesday lifted a ban on face masks by refusing the governments request to suspend an earlier ruling that found it unconstitutional.

Acting chief judge of the High Court Jeremy Poon Shiu and Court of Appeal Vice President Johnson Lam revealed they were satisfied the gov-ernment appeal was "reasonably arguable" but found that the authorities had failed to show there was a need to further suspend the lower court's declaration of unconstitutionality and

decision "is not and should not be regarded as an encouragement or con-donation for any person to cover their face" in situations previously caught by the ban, the South China Morning Post reported.

The Court of First Instance on November 18 ruled in favour of 25 pandemocrats who applied for a judicial review challenging the constitutionality of the ban on masks that was introduced by the government to quell the anti-government movement roiling the city since June.

A notice of appeal was lodged on the following working day, with the government arguing that the court should have allowed the executive gency laws, in its bid to reinstate the ban.

Become a problem solver

An integrated approach has to be taken and courses like design thinking and creative problem solving, have to be offered in MBA programmes as a core subject which will help students think holistically, says DR RAMAKRISHNAN RAMAN



f one ponders about the job that a middle level and a senior manager does in any organisation, then it would be evident that they solve problems and try ensuring that those prob-lems do not occur again. One of the critical skills that a manager must have is the ability to solve problems. The issues can be related to process or people or procedures — but solving them needs creative thinking and excellent people management skills.

In an MBA programme which is offered by many Indian B-schools, faculties are usually arranged in functional silos, where specialised knowledge-such as finance, accounting, operations and HR is taught in spe cialised courses by subject-specific technical experts. But when it comes to the real-world scenario, complex problem solving is integrative, and it cuts across these silos. This means that all departments are responsible for helping students become better prob-lem solvers, but none of them owns

the challenge and takes the lead in addressing it. Consequently, a typical b-school doesn't teach complex problem solving as part of the core curricu-lum or provide the opportunity to practice and get feedback on it. Hence an integrative approach has to be taken and subjects like Design Thinking and Creative Problem solving, have to be offered as a core sub-ject which helps students to integrate and think holistically.

B-schools must ensure that prob-lem solving becomes an integral part of the MBA programme and must equip the students with skills related to problem-solving. There are several theoretical approaches which give insight about several methods to solve problems in a structured man-ner. While imparting this 'knowledge' the students must also be trained in tools and technologies that can help them approach, understand and solve problems in a better fashion. Today every organisation has a large amou

of unstructured data available at disposal. Using this data can help in understanding the root cause of many issues that the organisation are grappling. Analysis of this data and correlating it with the problems can bring a different perspective to the organisations. If this skill is imparted to a management graduate, then, their employability quotient would increase by many folds.

Many managers go with their gut feeling when they face a problem which needs an immediate solution. Whenever one depends only on the gut, then the answer might go wrong in the long run. Hence ability to quickly look at the available data and analyse it to get some insights can help in solving the problem in a bet-ter fashion. This is a key aspect which must be ingrained in the students while they pursue their MBA

degree.

In the present VUCA (volatility,

ity) world problem-solving is in demand. It's considered the top skill for success at management consulting firms and it's increasingly desired for everyone, not just MBA graduates. A case-based curriculum that is followed by some premium B Schools in the country orients the students towards problems solving in real-time. With the internet and access to it via mobile a lot of data that is available at disposal for the graduates while they join the workforce. Hence there is no point in making the graduates cram up mundane stuff; instead, they must be made to learn on how to apply the concepts to solve real-time practical problems. By ensuring that problem-solving becomes the default in all subjects offered at the MBA level, the next generation managers will be well equipped to innovate and bring innovative solutions to perennial

There is need to develop innovative ways of learning for differently-abled children, says MAHJABEEN YUSUFI

earning is the process of gain-Ling knowledge or skill. But how do we accomplish this with children who are unable to learn in traditional ways.

Well, the answer to that is

innovation! Innovative methods: titrated to the needs of each child will help optimise the learning process. Now let us look at some of the challenges encountered.

Do you remember sitting for a three-hour long movie and waiting for the interval to stretch your legs? Well, whittle that down to a 40-minute session; and you have a child who is edgy, restless and fidgety. What that child needs; is an interval. Tasks like 'erase the board', 'take a peek out the window, 'have a sip of water and join us' can be given to the child. These two-minute intermittent breaks will calm the surge of restiveness and help with sitting tolerance.

For many children rote learn. ing has been an integral and safe tool, hence any digression into abstract territory may ruffle them. Have you tried making sense of a Jackson Pollock? I can't! Making sense of abstract nuances can be a difficult task for those children who think only in black and



sentence' will leave them parroting back the excerpt from the lesson. Tell them 'Don't think about the table as you read it in the text, look at your table; is it big, blue, messy, wooden? Now make a

Encourage role play where they learn to challenge and improvise. Turn that abstract thinking into something concrete. 'Circle your friend like the Earth does the sun, 'Put your hand on the speakstite. Simple tasks like 'make a son, rutyour land of sound.' Engage all their senses and create

a 5D learning experience.

Another area is attention. I ometimes think of that picture in picture television. Where do I focus my attention? That can be a daily reality for many children. What we need to do is tone down the learning space. No cluttered desks, no engaging in intrusive and tangent talk. Train the child to build tolerance by waiting for a stipulated time at the end of each class for expression

and dialogue.
You may also encounter

impulsive and sometimes destructive behaviour. Can you imagine having to dodge a projectile in class while teaching because the child was not happy with a B. A behaviour modification chart will go a long way to repair unfitting behaviour. Being firm with bad behaviour is just as important as rewarding good behaviour. A rewards chart with takeaways like 'you can wear coloured clothes once you collect your stars, 'library privileges card' will help motivate appropriate behav-

Adopt a creative approach. Reverse roles in class, as a teacher you hand in your work and ask them to correct it. Let them hold the reins for a while scanning through your flawed work. This is not only an excellent tool for revision but it humanises the authority figure and shows the children that adults too make mis-

At the end of the day you need to respect every child. Steer clear of discrediting syntax. They might not understand semantics but they are fluent in body language. A simple pat on the back will show them that you care.



Prepare a daily time table and smartly allocate days for each topic. Always remember not to spend much time on one topic and rather study at least two-three topics, side by side. Doing so will help you stay engaged and maintain the momentum instead of getting bored and gradually losing out interest. Apart from doing regular revisions, fix a day, for instance, Sunday for revising the work done in the past week.

■ Practice solving more and more questions rather than mugging up the theory part, again and again. As part of regular revision practice, prepare a list of 50-60 standard questions that should cover all the relevant topics and practice them

Divide the syllabus into Class XI and Class XII topics. It is always advisable to start your preparations with a lower level (Class XI) then gradually proceed to a higher level (Class XII) to make your base stronger, which will further help you in better understanding of the higher-level subjects. Remember, JEE will comprise a right mix of both levels. Prepare accordingly!

■ Carefully analyse the question papers of last 10-15 years of both JEE and AIEEE. Doing so will give you a clear idea of which topics should be given the maximum weightage. Never forget to cover those topics that are being asked almost every year. almost every year. This shows the level of impor-

tance they carry. For instance, a candidate should never miss out topics such as thermodynamics. organic chemistry, calculus, com plex numbers, coordinate geom etry, among others. Most essentially, revise them at least twothree times on a regular basis. Last, never break your sleeping pattern as it may affect your health and make you feel lethargic all day. Passenger vehicle sales slip into negative territory in Nov

 $D_{\text{sales slipped into negative territory once again in November after registering a}^{\text{omestic passenger vehicle}}$ slight recovery in the preced-ing month, as muted demand conditions forced companies to reduce their dispatches to deal ers. According to data released by the Society of Indian Automobile Manufacturers (SIAM), passenger vehicle (PV) sales declined 0.84 per cent to 2,63,773 units in November from 2,66,000 units in the

year-ago period.

The PV sales figure would have been much lower during the period under consideration, if it had not been aided by the utility vehicle segment, which saw despatches grow by 32.7 per cent to 92,739 units in November as compared with 69,884 units a year-ago. Domestic car sales were down 10.83 per cent to 1,60,306 units as against 1,79,783 units in the year-ago period while van sales vere down 34.32 per cent to 10,728 units as compared to 16.333 in November 2018

"Challenges continue in the passenger vehicle segment. we have to remember that the current numbers are on a comparatively low base of last November," SIAM Director

General Rajesh Menon told reporters here. New launches in the utility vehicle segment has helped prop up sales in October and November, he added. Total two-wheeler sales in November fell 14.27 per cent to 14.10,939 units compared to 16,45,783 units in the year-ago month. Motorcycle sales last month were down 14.87 per cent to 8,93,538 units as against 10,49,651 units a year earlier. Similarly, scooter sales last month declined 11.83 per cent to 4,59,851 units as compared with 5,21,542 units in November 2018. Commercial vehicle sales were down 14.98 per cent to 61,907 units in November, SIAM said.

"It is worrisome that commercial vehicles and two wheelers sales continue to be in the negative zone. Commercial vehicle segment continue to suffer because of low demand muted due to low demand in the rural areas," Menon said. In the PV segment, Marut

Suzuki India reported a 3.31 per cent decline in its November sales at 1,39,133 units. Hyundai Motor India witnessed a 2.04 per cent increase at 44,600 units, while Mahindra & Mahindra reported a fall of 9.62 per cent to 14,633 units during the month In the two-wheeler cate-gory, Hero MotoCorp posted a

15.81 per cent drop in sales at 5,05,994 units, while rival Honda Motorcycle and Scooter India saw sales decline by 5.32 per cent to 3,73,283 units. Similarly, Chennai-based TVS Motor Company saw its sales slump by 26.52 per cent to 1,91,222 units in November.

In November, vehicle wholesales across categories registered a decline of 12.05 per cent to 17,92,415 units from 20,38,007 units in November 2018. On the other hand November retail sales data showed a somewhat better picture in terms of sales, pointing to inventory correction taking place in the industry. Overall retail sales increased by 4.76 per cent to 22,13,519 units as compared with 21,12,876 units in the year-ago period.

TRAI issues public notice on revised MNP process

PTI I NEW DELHI

elecom regulator TRAI on Telecom regulator 1KA1 on Tuesday issued a public notice on the revised mobile number portability process, which is slated to make the porting process fast and simple from December 16. The new process, which comes with conprocess, which comes with con-ditions for generation of Unique Porting Code (UPC), entails three working days' timeline for port out requests within a service area, and five working days for requests for port out from one circle to another.

There is no change in the porting timelines for the cor-porate mobile connections, the relecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) said. "TRAI has revised the Mobile Number revised the Mobile Number Portability (MNP) process...In the revised MNP process, the Unique Porting Code (UPC) will be generated only when the subscriber is eligible to port-out his mobile number," TRAI said. From December 16, 2019, the revised MNP process will be in place and mobile subscribers place and mobile subscribers can generate the Unique Porting Code and avail the mobile number porting process, it added. Laying down the rules for the new process, TRAI said a positive validation of various conditions will determine generation of the Unique Porting Code.

Sensex tumbles nearly 250 pts

 $B^{\text{enchmark indices spiralled}}_{\text{lower on Tuesday, dragged}}$ by widespread selling in bank, energy and IT stocks, as investors booked profit at higher levels amid lacklustre macro and global cues. The 30-share BSE Sensex, after a positive opening, lost momentum throughout the session. It finally closed 247.55 points or 0.61 per cent lower at 40,239.88. On similar lines, the 50-

Participants were eager to take money off the table amid lack of positive news on the growth front, while global cues were weak due to the US-China tensions, traders said. Yes Bank was the biggest loser in the Sensex pack with 10.05 per cent Pack with 10.05 per cent decline, followed by PowerGrid, IndusInd Bank, NTPC, ITC, TCS, Axis Bank, Hero MotoCorp, M&M and HCL Tech, which lost up to 2.66 per cent. On the other hand, Bajaj Finance, HUL, HDFC Bank, ICICI Bank, and Bajaj Auto gained up to 1.06 per cent. "Selling in domestic market accentuated today as investors turned more cautious over double whammy of inflationary pressure and weak growth. "Another factor which is impacting market is the likelihood of maintenance of status quo on rates by both US Fed and ECB. Given domestic premium valuation of key indices, market is highly sus-ceptible for near term volatil-ity," said Vinod Nair, Head of Research at Geojit Financial Services. All the BSE sectoral indices finished in the red
