have two children. However, even after 29 years of her mar-riage, she is yet to get Indian citizenship. She is the only member of the family having a

Pakistani passport. Sarada claims that despite repeated appeals, she has failed to get Indian citizenship. She now hopes to gain citizenship of this country after legislation

21 injured; cops, protesters fight pitched battle

 $T_{\text{Amendment Act (CAA)}}^{\text{he protest over Citizen}}$ on Tuesday moved out of the universities in the national Capital to North East Delhi's Seelampur area on Tuesday with hundreds of protesters torching several bikes, pelted stones at the Delhi Police and

damaged public buses.

The Delhi Police used force and fired tear gas shells to disperse the protesters. Plumes of smoke billowed from at least two localities in the area as the standoff continued for around one-and-a-half hours on Tuesday afternoon. Police said the situation was brought under control and adequate police force has been deployed to main-

tain law and order in the area.
Twenty-one people, includ

ing 12 policemen and six civilians, were injured in violence, police said. Police said the protesters were marching from Seelampur towards adjoining Jafrabad. Clashes erupted between police and protesters at Seelampur Chowk when the security personnel tried to stop them from moving ahead. The fresh clashes erupted two days after violence broke out during

a protest in the New Friends' Colony area in South Delhi near Jamia Millia Islamia

The policy focuses on creing, etc., for better value capting an ecosystem interlinking ture, create value-chains paroverall farmers' income.



Muslims urge Naveen not to implement CAA

Holding placards with Save Democracy' and 'Boycott CAA' messages, the minority community members took out a rally from Satyanagar covering several parts of the city up to Sishu Bhawan Chhak.

Later, the members went to meet Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik at his residence to submit a memorandum demand-ing withdrawal of the CAA and measures to protect the community's interests in the State.

Terming the CAA as unconstitutional, the protesters alleged that it violates Articles

BMC. BDA ask **building owners**

The Bhubaneswar Development Authority (BDA) and the Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) have set a deadline of six months for building owners to instal Rain Water Harvesting (RWH) system, failing which they may face strict action as per law. The RWH system is mandatory for buildings constructed in a minimum area of 300 square metre under the jurisdiction of BMC and BDA.

The BDA and the BMC have decided to refuse issuing occupancy certificate in case an apartment developer or individual house owner does not follow the norms. "In pursuance to the mandatory provisions of Rain Water

Harvesting prescribed in BDA (Planning &Building Standards) Regulations and Section 302 of Odisha Municipal Corporation Act, 2003, all building owners, developers, residents' welfare associations, Government organisations, schools, colleges, universities, large campuses, etc., within the area of BMC are hereby directed that rainwater harvesting structures shall be installed within six months' time from the date of this order," said an order jointly issued by BDA and BMC.

"Strict enforcement measures shall be taken up after the stipulated time is over under the provisions of Odisha Development Authorities Act, 1982 and Odisha Municipal Corporation Act, 2003. In case Corporation Act, 2003, In case of noncompliance of order, appropriate action shall be taken under the provisions of aforesaid Acts and rules/regulations framed thereunder,

which includes but not limited to revocation or permission/ revocation/suspension of occupancy certificate. All Government and private owners are requested to treat this as an opportunity to contribute in making of a climate-resilient Bhubaneswar," the order added.

The civic bodies further

said, "To reduce the impact of urban flooding during heavy rainfall, it is one of the recognised mitigation measures to construct rainwater harvesting structures by which the rain water can be collected from the rooftops, paved and unpaved areas, parks, playground, parking areas, etc., and stored for either for reuse purpose or recharge of the stored rainwater into the ground?

"A team from BDA and BMC will make surprise visits to various buildings to check violation of the rule. The authority will check whether these buildings have constructed the facility; and if not, strict action will be taken against the building owners," a BDA officer said. Mandatory provisions have been prescribed in the BDA (Planning & Building Standards) Regulations since 2008 for effective management of rainwater, which includes harvesting, storing, reuse and groundwater-recharging of rainwater within the premises; and the rainwater harvesting structures shall be mandatorily provided in the plots which are more than 300 square metre in area including open spaces; and the provisions of the regulations shall also be applicable to any building constructed without an

approved plan and buildings constructed with deviation of an approved plan.

Rainwater harvesting structures are those that help store rainwater for reuse in the same building or for other purposes. In 2015, the State government had decided to implement a new scheme for rooftop rainwater harvesting and groundwater recharge in urban areas with an investment of Rs 100 crore. On a pilot basis, it was implemented in Bhubaneswar through installation of Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting Systems (RRHSs) in buildings to augment ground-water recharge, enhance the water table and improve water quality in the urban areas.

It has come to light that the RWH system remained poor in Bhubaneswar with only a handful of building owners complying with it despite repeated directives issued in this regard.

Contract killer engaged to execute job, says SP

Even as police are yet to make much headway in the Khordha firing incident, which claimed life of a medicine shop owner and left a pae-diatrician doctor seriously iniured, district SP Ajay Pratap Swain on Tuesday said involve ment of a contract killer is suspected in the incident.

"We suspect that a contract killer was hired to eliminate paediatrician Manas Das, who was critically injured in the firing. Probe is underway to attack," the SP said.

As many as four police teams have been formed to apprehend the accused, the SP said, adding that the murderer would be arrested soon. The condition of the paediatrician, who is undergoing treatment at a private hospital in Bhubaneswar, is now stable,

A police team is in Ganjam trying out ascertaining if any contract killer from that district was engaged to bump off the doctor. The attack on the docowner is believed to be carried

out by a professional.

The family of the doctor has ruled out personal enmity as the reason behind the attack. as the reason behind the attack.

Lecturers' recruitment upper age limit now 48

 $T^{o\,\text{give opportunity to more}}_{\text{candidates}} \text{ belonging to}$ Ex-Servicemen/ Commissioned and SSC Officers of Defense service and persons with disabilities (PwDs), the State Cabinet on Tuesday decided to amend the OSJS and OJS Rules, 2007.

After amendment, the upper age limit for Ex-Servicemen/ Commissioned and SSC Officers of Defense would be relaxed by five years and the upper age for Persons with Disabilities would be relaxed by 10 years over and above the normal relaxation admissible to Scheduled Caste,

Scheduled Tribe and SEBC for recruitment to the post of Civil Judge. Recruitment and appointment of Government college teachers enjoying UGC scale of pay is being made through Odisha Public Service Commission.

The age limit for applying for the post of lecturers in Government colleges is from 21 years to 33 years allowing admissible relaxations in dif-ferent reserved categories.

Following a requisition made to the OPSC for selection of candidate for filling up of 606 vacant degree lecturer posts on October 1, 2019, representation/recommendation were received to enhance the

upper age limit in view of PhD/NET qualification being made mandatory for recruitment to such posts.

While the Health and

Family Welfare Department has fixed maximum age of 45 years for selection of lecturers in medical, homeopathic and ayurvedic colleges, the upper age limit for selection of lec-turers recruited by State Selection Board is 42 years. But no upper age limit has been fixed by the UGC.

Considering all theses, the Government has decided to give one time relaxation in enhancing the upper age limit from 33 years to 48 years for recruitment of lecturers.

Cardiac care unit functions in Capital Hospital

Treatment done free of cost

Health and Family Welfare Minister Nabakishore Das on Tuesday said an advanced heart care centre has started functioning at the Capital Hospital premises here with eminent cardiologist Prabhat Kumar Dash as its Director.

He told reporters that the State Government would bear all the expenses of the heart patients who would undergo surgery at this unit.

Das said, "Taking the new infrastructure and the staff strength into consideration, the centre can conduct 15 to 20

surgeries every day." Dr Prabhat Dash, who is presently working as the Head of the Department of Cardiology at the Satya Sai Institute of Higher Medical Sciences in Bengaluru, has nearly 30 years of experience in cardiac treatment. He was nominated for the Outstanding Health Professional Worldwide Award in 2007 and won the Rashtriva Rattan Award in 2008 for his contribution to the field of medicine in India.

Notably, Minister Das had announced about such a centre in November this year. An updated cathlab and modern infrastructure are available at

the Capital Hospital. "There will be no space crunch; and very soon the operation theatres for heart

surgery will come up. Besides modern equipments, special ICUs, additional beds will be procured where provisions of complex angiography, device closure, electrophysiological studies will be available," he had said, adding, "Measures are being taken to rope in more

doctors and associates. The Minister had visited the hospital earlier to take stock of the situation there. He is sure that there would be no delay in making the hospital's Cardiology Department a Centre of Excellence.

At present, nearly 3,500 patients are registering in the hospital's outpatient depart-ment out of which over 100 are coming for treatment of cardiac ailments.



59 apprehended crossing **Indo-Nepal border this yr**

With security tightened along the Indo-Pak front following abrogation of Article 370 provisions, an increasing number of people with "ulteri-or motives" from countries like Pakistan, Bangladesh and China are trying to sneak into India through the open Nepal

The Sashastra Seema Bal (SSB), which guards the Indo-Nepal frontier, caught 59 such persons this year, which is over a 100 per cent jump compared to 2018 when 28 people vere apprehended by the border guarding force. SSB is also the Lead Intelligence Agency for the 1,751-km Nepal border.

SSB Director General (DG) Kumar Rajesh Chandra said there have been 59 such cases this year as compared to 28 in 2018 where the Central paramilitary force caught "third party nationals" on the Nepal frontier.

These apprehended third party nationals were from countries like Pakistan, Bangladesh, China and the United States. , the DG told mediapersons during the annu-



al press conference of the Force. Asked further about the identities of these people and their motives, the DG said they were "a mix of both inadvertent crossers and suspects".

"Whether they were ter-rorists or fake Indian currency note (FICN) operatives or smugglers. We have got our limitations to know that as we catch them and hand over to local police or other probe and intelligence agencies," he said, adding their numbers have definitely increased.

The feedback (from sister

security agencies like Intelligence Bureau and Research and Analysis Wing) that they got on these cases is that "most of the cases are in progress. But mainly people who have come were with some ulterior motives".

In the case of the two US nationals it looked to be a case of ignorance of law and they could be inadvertent crossers and similar could be the case of a Chinese group who were on a tourist sojourn along the Nepal border area. The DG said as its "sister force BSF has enhanced vigil on

the India-Pakistan border, these elements could have used the open Nepal border as an alternative route".

The Border Security Force (BSF) had conducted two special operations, code named 'Sudarshan', to fortify its defences and plug gaps along

Bobde recuses from hearing convict's plea seeking review of death penalty

Upadhyay, in his PIL, had sought framing of guidelines to grant minority status to a religious community based on their population in a particular State and claimed that Hindus which are in minority in eight States, are deprived of

From India, annular phase will be visible in the morning after sunrise from some places within a narrow corridor of southern part of the country (parts of Karnataka, Kerala & Tamil Nadu) and it will be seen as partial solar eclipse from the



rest part of the country.
The narrow corridor of

annular phase of the eclipse will pass through the southern part of the country through certain places like Cannanore, Coimbatore, Kozhikode, Madurai, Mangalore, Ooty, Tiruchirappalli etc.



Kovind said universities should become the laboratories for exposing students to the problems that need to be addressed in the cause of nationbuilding. He said students should be encour-

aged to take up academic and extra-curricular work with a distinct community orientation. The president said simple steps like strictly adhering to academic calendar for admissions, conduct of classes, examinations, declaration of results and awarding of degrees at convocations and so on, can be the start-

ing point on the journey towards excel-

"Similarly, there are some steps that vou can take to address the shortage of faculty in your universities. For instance, you can develop a robust visiting fac-ulty program or use online teaching he said.

In another function on the occasion of presentation of the '5th Visitor's Awards' at Rashtrapati Bhavan, he said developing meaningful linkages between the academic community and local industry should be a top priority for the universities. "Students must be encouraged to emerge as job-creators rather than job-seekers," Kovind said.

al efforts with Myanmar in the repatriation of displaced Rohingyas back to Myanmar, a statement from the Vice President's Secretariat said.

Naidu's remarks on the Citizenship (Amendment) Act come days after Bangladesh Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen and Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan cancelled their visits to India amid protests against the legislation in the northeast.

Japanese Prime Minister Prime Minister Shinzo Abe also cancelled his trip to India scheduled to begin on last Sunday. Shinzo Abe was to meet Prime Minister Narendra Modi in Guwahati for a summit on December 15.

Naidu emphasised that India wants peace and stabili-ty in the neighbourhood and

friendly relations with all its neighbours. Without naming Pakistan, he said Kashmir was a settled issue and deplored the attempts by a neighbouring country to aid, abet, fund and train terror outfits to promote cross border terrorism.

The Vice President sought Bangladesh's support in restructuring and reforming multilateral organisations such as the United Nations, so that policies that affect the entire world were not decided by a

few.

Foreign varsities express solidarity with AMU, JMI

New Delhi: Protests against the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) transcended Indian campuses to reach top educational insti-tutions abroad like Oxford, Harvard, Michigan, Columbia, Yale, Chicago, Boston, Stanford, Cincinnati and Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), where students and scholars staged demonstrations against the police crackdown on students of Jamia Millia Islamia (JMI) and Aligarh Muslim University (AMU). Similar protests have been planned in Berlin and Zurich.

Back home, the of Human

Resource Development Ministry said, the situation in 42 central universities in the country, except JMI and AMU, is peaceful and examinations are being held as scheduled.
According to HRD Ministry

officials, the ministry received a report from JMI about the incident that took place on December 15 where they mentioned about the resolution taken by the Executive Committee of the university seeking a high-level inquiry. However, no formal request in this regard

came so far. Over 400 students from different US universities have issued a joint statement expressing solidarity with Jamia and AMU students in their standoff against the CAA

While terming the Act as "unconstitutional" and "discriminatory" and while also condemning the use of police violence against students on December 15, 2019, the Universities have decided to hold a student-led protest at Harvard University on December 17, 2019. The students and scholars at Oxford University staged a protest march to India House in London against the CAA and the police action on students.

In the statement, scholars from universities, including Harvard, Yale, Columbia, Stanford and Tufts said they condemn the "brutal police violence unleashed against students at Jamia and AMU as a gross violation of human rights under the Constitution of India and international human rights law".

The protests at various universities abroad are mostly being led by Indians studying there. The

statement signed by students and alumni of around 20 US universities perceive the incident as a gross violation of human rights, both under Indian Constitution as well as the International Human Rights Law. The Universities have condemned such state-sponsored actions and have demanded complete withdrawal of police forces from the university premises. They also seek an immediate, independent, and robust investigation into the abuse of power by the Delhi Police, Uttar Pradesh Police, and the Central Reserve Police Force.

"We condemn the violence unleashed on students in Jamia and AMU among other Indian institutions. The use of force exercising their fundamental right to protests and elsewhere is direct attack on foundations of a democratic society," according to a joint statement issued by students, scholars and alumni of University of Oxford. "We also lend our voic es in support of the fight against this immoral and unconstitutional law and call for its immediate

India rejects Pak's National Assembly's resolution

India on Tuesday rejected a esolution adopted by Pakistan National Assembly on the Citizenship Amendment Act on Monday and said it is a poorly disguised effort to divert attention from Islamabad's "appalling treatment" and "per-secution" of its religious minorities.

Strongly asserting this position, the Ministry of External Affairs in a statement said the resolution was a thinly-veiled attempt by Pakistan to further its false narrative on the issue of Jammu & Kashmir and

ing support for cross-border terrorist activities in India. We are confident that such attempts will fail," it said.

Pakistan's Parliament on Monday unanimously passed a resolution terming India's citizenship amendment law against the bilateral agreements and asked New Delhi to revoke the "discriminatory" clauses

The resolution — moved in Pakistan National Assembly by Education Minister Shafqat Mahmood — said the Citizenship Act was "against international norms of equality and non-discrimination and International Human

Ministry statement said the Pakistani Resolution is a poorly disguised effort to divert attention from Pakistan's appalling treatment and per-secution of its own religious minorities. The demographics of these minorities, whether Hindu, Christian, Sikh or other faiths, in Pakistan speak for themselves, it said.

The Resolution intention ally mischaracterizes the objectives of the Citizenship Amendment Act 2019. This Act gives citizenship to foreigners from selected countries who are persecuted religious minorities. It does not take away the citizenship of any Indian irrespective of her or his

The statement further said it is laughable that the National Assembly of Pakistan that has itself passed discriminatory legislation against religious minorities, should point fingers at others. We call upon Pakistan to engage in serious self-introspection rather than to falsely accuse others of what they themselves are guilty of.

Pakistan would do well to remember that India is the world's largest democracy, that all its Governments have been freely and fairly elected through universal adult franchise, and that all Indians irrespective of faith enjoy equal rights under the Constitution. We urge Pakistan to similarly aspire to

Four FTII students go on indefinite strike over fee hike

Taking a leaf from the agitation undertaken by students of the Jawaharlal Nehru University, four leaders from the Pune-based Film and Television Institute of India Students' Association (FTI-ISA) have gone on an indefinite fast in protest against the 10 per cent yearly fee hike and the exorbitant Joint Entrance Test (JET) application fees.

The hunger strike resorted to by FTII student leaders Aadhith V Sathwin (President, FTIISA), Rajarshi Mujumdar (Gen Secretary), PR Manikandan (Cultural Secretary) and Vivek Allaka on the Institute premises, entered the second day on Tuesday.

Talking to media persons in Pune in the evening, FTIISA president Aadhith V Sathwin said: "We will continue our fast till our two demands are met' The FTIIS' two demands are: revocation of the continuous 10 per cent hike in overall fee every academic year and reduce it and deferment of

hike in academic fees year on year since the batch of 2013. From the annual fee of ₹ 55,380 from the 2013 batch the fees for the upcoming 2020 batch has reached to ₹ 1,18,323," Sathwin said.

"In addition, there has been an exorbitant rise in the JET (Joint Entrance Test for both FTII and SRFTI) application fee. From ₹ 1500 in 2015. the entrance exam fee has gone up to a maximum of ₹ 10,000 for JET 2020. As such the institute is making itself com-pletely inaccessible to a large section of our population, fasting FTIISA president said. Meanwhile, FTII's director

Bhupendra Kainthola has requested the four students who have gone on a hunger strike to break their fast, pending a decision at an emergency meeting of Governing Council of FTII convened on December

"Mr. Kainthola has told us that the Governing Council of FTII is convening an emergency session on the 27th ecember, 10 days from now. He has requested the four stu-

PAPER WITH PASSION **Defanging RTI**

The SC may argue that pleas are frivolous but the fact is a filter kills the very purpose of ensuring transparency



ver since it became a reality, the Right to Information Act (RTI Act), which guarantees transparency in governance and ensures its accountability to citizens, has been defanged by successive regimes. It all began with the Manmohan Singh government when establishment hawks claimed that the law was being misused by "frivolous and vexatious" requests for information. Another canard was also spread about RTI being used as blackmail, a ruse to stifle it as more and more cases of corruption tumbled out of the cupboard fol-

lowing even simple requests for information. This thread was picked up by Home Minister Amit Shah who asserted that citizens do not have the need to file RTI applications because the Modi government is anyway transparent. Obviously, the RTI petitions had led to embarrassing revelations on demonetisation, Aadhaar and even bank NPAs. The judiciary, too, has not been proactive on this as questions have begun to be raised about the lack of transparency in its functioning. Agreed every law has advantages and pitfalls and the RTI could probably do with some caveats but when the Supreme Court, too, plays up the establishment's anxieties, then the implication becomes serious for the common man. On Monday, the court ruled that the misuse and "criminal intimidation" of RTI should be stopped and that only petitioners, who are connected or involved with the issues raised, would be entertained. Describing the huge flow of applications under RTI as a "serious problem", the Bench said though it was not opposed to the transparency law, there was a need to evolve some mechanism to ensure that only the affected or concerned person has the recourse to power. The problem with such filtering mechanism is that you first isolate the information seeker, making it that much easier for the powers that be to hound or silence him/her than when it is a class action plea. Far too many reports have emerged of RTI activists being killed. According to the Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative, 84 RTI activists have been killed in India since October 2005. Second, information on a policy matter of far-reaching consequence can never be a matter of personal but general interest. For example, no political party or politician will seek or be a party to a scrutiny of the electoral bond scheme, the working of which impacts voter preferences. Also, if a bidder in a government contract loses out over suspected foul play, will the individual/organisation pursue a petition, the effort for which may disqualify them from future contracts as a trouble-maker? The top court, however, directed the Centre and various State Governments to fill up vacancies of information commissioners, which have further held up crucial files. Independent studies have shown that at one time there were four vacancies in the 11-member Central Information Commission (CIC) while pendency had been rising every month to touch 33,000. The studies also found out that an appeal in the Andhra Pradesh State Information Commission could take 18 years for scrutiny. That time taken in Bengal and Odisha would be five and four years.

The RTI is slowly becoming another casualty of democracy, the government having whittled down its efficacy and the institutions formed by it with an amended version. The new RTI anyway strips the Information Commissioners from the immunity that is given to Supreme Court judges and Chief Election Commissioners, subjecting their service records, tenure and salaries to the discretion of the government or the Executive. Effectively, it means defanging them as the Government can remove them when it considers them unsuitable to its design. A fixed tenure and autonomy regardless of the government of the day would enable them to pursue fair probes. Otherwise, they would be afraid to be independent. Even our first Chief Information Commissioner, Wajahat Habibullah, and several other bureaucrats had written to the Prime Minister Narendra Modi to not bring the amendments and dilute what actually empowers the common man. Modi, who made running a corruption-free government his professed mantra since 2015, lost credibility by pushing something antithetical to that spirit. But now that he has the heft of the Lok Sabha verdict, he is beyond any criticism of the citizenry that voted him. Information Commissions are crucial links in allowing access to the workings of the Government. The system was anyway dependent on retired bureaucrats and now has loyalists. As it appears, RTI is now a robotic ritual than democratic intervention.

Trust in Max

Ten months after the Boeing 737 Max was grounded, it seems it's not getting back into the air soon



he American plane-maker Boeing's tremendous confidence in the ability of its latest jet, the 737 Max, even after two dramatic fatal accidents in Ethiopia and Indonesia killed close to 400 people, was worth watching. The Max was grounded worldwide in March but Boeing kept churning them out at a rate touching 42 a month. This has led to over 400 aircraft sitting around Boeing's factories at Seattle, unable to fly anywhere. Boeing's confidence in its jet and almost bombastic optimism that it would be soon cleared

to fly is not matched by the US aviation regulator, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), which has been embarrassed by a rash of stories of how it had been infiltrated by Boeing employees, who led their inspectors up the garden path and essentially gave certification to a plane that had some fundamental issues. The issues are so fundamental that it now appears the Boeing 737 Max may not actually be recertified to fly, that, too, only in the US initially before February 2020, and possibly even March. It is no surprise, therefore, that Boeing has finally decided to wind down production of the aircraft.

In many other industries, a product failure like this would have been fatal to the company. Thankfully Boeing operates in a comfortable duopoly with European manufacturer Airbus, which despite opportunities, has not stuck the dagger into it. The relationship between Airbus and Boeing then is akin to that between Coca-Cola and Pepsi, not really a rivalry, no matter what the advertising says. Ergo, Boeing will survive the worst of this crisis in all likelihood, even though it might take a year or so to get back to its feet. Thankfully, for the global aviation industry, a few fortuitous airline collapses, including the demise of Jet Airways in India, have meant that at least for the time being there are enough aircraft available to pick up the slack of demand. That said, airlines will be wanting aircraft soon enough and Boeing will have to get its act together to resolve the problems on the Max. Crucially, the manufacturer will also need to fix the trust deficit that it suffers regarding the Max with ordinary airline passengers. The crisis also highlights severe flaws in the aircraft certification process. All in all, aviation is safer today than it has ever been. That does not mean that we take things for granted. Boeing did in case of the 737 Max and will pay a massive price but hopefully, 2020 will be a better year than 2019 was for global aviation.

Global warning

Irrespective of the disappointing outcome of the Madrid summit, as a responsible nation, India cannot be making a half-hearted approach to address the issue of climate change



ven as the thunderous reverberations of the 16-year-old environmental activist, Greta Thunberg, at he UN, just three months ago, are yet to die down, to our utter sur-prise, the Madrid climate talks under the aegis of COP25 ended in a failure. This is not the first time that such discordance among member nations has been witnessed. The present talks failed despite the fact that while inaugurating this conference, UN Secretary General António Guterres had issued a ver stern warning. "I call on anyone who is stiĺl lobbying their Governments for a slow transition or even no transition, to end those activ ities now. The world is watching," he emphasised. Today, the world community appears to be focussed more on the protection of their own domestic agenda rather than paying

heed to the impending disaster.

The first decade after the Rio de Janeiro
Earth Summit of 1992 saw a rare building up of consensus on almost all issues Perhaps it was the decade after the Cold War and the first Gulf War when the world community saw immense merit in consensus-building. The same was also manifest during the signing of the WTO Agreement at Marrakesh, Morocco, in 1994. But in the very next decade, one saw the appearance of discordant notes, particularly as former US President George W Bush virtually refused to follow the Kyoto Protocol even as America was the largest polluter in the world. This trend was further aggravated when President Donald Trump followed the same route as charted earlier by Bush. Unfortunately, despite the bleak scenario,

the voice of a number of smaller and less polluting nations, prominently Tuvalu, Maldives Bangladesh, Nepal and Bhutan among others, who are already facing the brunt of the climate change, seems to have been lost. On the other hand, high polluting nations such as China, India and the European Union could not account for their efforts at reducing global warming. They were unable to quantify in specific terms the targets achieved as was laid down under the Paris Agreement. But the prime reason for the failure of the Madrid Summit, which was participated by 197 countries across the world, was a lack of consensus on development of a market mechanism to limit carbon emissions.

The concept of trading in carbon mar-kets as a response to climate change was an important outcome of the Kvoto Protocol. The primary purpose of the Protocol was to make the developed countries pay for their emis-sions while at the same time, monetarily reward those nations with good record in this regard. The underlying philosophy was that since the developing countries could start with cleaner technologies, they would be rewarded by those who were stuck with old and polluting technologies. In a way, this translated into wealthier countries purchasing the extent of reduction in carbon levels achieved by the developing countries.



oped and wealthier nations would not only be able to sell their technology to the develop-ing countries but could also gather carbon credits to meet the requirements of Kyoto Protocol without any reduction in their emission levels. The failure of the Madrid summit, to achieve any results in this direction, may have also disappointed those who encouraged carbon trading mechanism like the oil major Royal Dutch Shell Plc and the anish utility Iberdrola SA.
Such a market mechanism

was also considered important by heavy industrialised countries, who are economically dependent on oil and gas production. In the normal course, large-scale de-caroonisation would take much longer than as prescribed under the Paris targets. Besides, it would also ensure that the rich and already developed countries could continue to pollute on the strength of carbon credit purchased by them, while the options of developing and relatively poor countries would be curtailed. It can, thus, be inferred that the summit spent more time in ensuring that the interests of the developed countries are well protected through the carbon trading mechanism.

In fact, the scheme of carbon credits is some kind of a smoke screen which enables the develAT THE SUMMIT, NOT MUCH TIME WAS SPENT ON

exploit those still developing. Those already developed, thus, escape the limits while the less industrialised and less polluting are loaded with the burden of further reductions. This may ultimately impact and retard their

progress in the long-run.
In this context, let us take the example of the GFL gas project in Gujarat. GFL is one of the largest producers of carbon off-set credits in the world, selling them to many of the biggest pol-luters in the EU. Europe's polluters have had a cheap way to offset their climate responsibilities without actually greening even a small patch of the land. EU Climate Action Commissioner Connie Hedegaard admitted that such projects have a "total lack of environmental integrity." At the summit, not much time was spent on determining

the targets to be achieved by each country so as to keep the emissions of greenhouse gases with-in the overall objective of the global warming being limited to the extent of 1.5 degrees between 2018 and 2100. For this to become a reality by 2050, we should be a net-zero emitter. So far only about 20 countries, including the UK, France, New Zealand, Norway, Finland, Switzerland, Denmark and Sweden, figure in the list of those who are expected to meet

US still have a long way to go.
In India, with a perceived

difficulty in cutting emissions in order to meet the targets, an ambitious plan for harnessing solar energy has been formulated. We are lucky that sunlight is available in abundance but the challenge lies in the procurement of solar Photo Voltaic (PV) cells, which is one of the major constraining factors in our efforts to realise the full potential. According to a report submitted by the parliamentary standing committee, in order to achieve the target of 100 GW of solar electricity capacity by 2022, India should have had an installed capacity of 32,000 MW by 2017-18. But as of January 31, 2018, the country only had a capacity of 18,455 MW in just four years — this is over 20,000 MW a year and

appears difficult to achieve.
Irrespective of the disappointing outcome of the Madrid summit, as a responsible nation with high prestige in the interna-tional arena, India does not have the luxury of a half-hearted approach towards this vital area. The phenomenon of global warming has to be seen as a glob-al warning. (The author is a former

Get off the couch

The time for the citizens to speak against the high-handedness of the Government is now. We must do so before there is no one left to speak for us

n the past year, the country has seen numerous developments in key sectors such as aviation, railways, oil and gas, roads and bridges, ports and shipping, telecom, power and urban infrastructure, just to name a few. Despite all the rhetoric, actual "development" as promised by the Modi Government when it was elected to power, is yet to materialise. Nonetheless, this isn't a statement where I mean to say that the current Government is "unsecular." I believe this was automatically implied when the Citizen Amendment Act (CAA), 2019, was passed in Parliament. For, it entails that every "illegal migrant", Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians from Afghanistan, Bangladesh and Pakistan and who entered India on or before December 31, 2014, other than the Muslims, are eligible for Indian citizenship.

Daimler AG and Audi announced almost 20,000 job cuts in the past three weeks.

But it dragged its name through the mud when the Delhi Police forced its way into the Jamia Millia Islamia, one of the most reputed educational institutions in the country, and brutally assaulted the students over there. Neither do I need to emphasise the fact that the Government has been lying to its citizens every since it came to power. From trumpeting a dream project of a high-speed rail, what has been delivered is that crucial sectors like education, defence and healthcare are facing its gravest crisis ever.

Today, we are living in a country where States like Jammu & Kashmir and Assam are boiling. People's voices are being suppressed. Being apolitical is a risk one should not be taking. Because being "apolitical" or in turn "silent" is a weapon that only backfires. For silence only means being "complicit" to the happenings. When a Government maintains silence, it is considered to be an accomplice of the wrong because the reality says otherwise. When it is silent, it is used as an excuse to continue with the actions that are detestable. Had the Government actually been concerned about the problems surrounding the citizens, it would have acted maturely. I am not here to take criticism on my take of "consequences of being silent." I am here to tell you that this is the real world.

This does not mean that one will not be labelled as an "antinationalist" when he/she speaks against the establishment. One also needs to understand that raising voices against the Government does not in any sense mean that one is speaking against the nation. Instead, when one tends to take a view, he/she is trying to protect the interests of the fellow citizens when actu-

ally it is the duty of the Government to do so.

If this situation persists, eventually a time will come when we will be able to call ourselves the "largest democracy" with as much credibility as modern-day China. Leaders there state that they run a "socialist democracy" alongside an authoritarian rule that strips people off their democratic rights, which is the very basis of a democratic State. As a Muslim who has had mostly Hindu friends, I have been

confiding in them, laughing with them and sharing this idea of One India, which I believed, stood as a strong evidence that we can embrace diversity and be united even as we boast of more than a billion people with different religions, dissimilar languages, individual beliefs and varied cultures. To my dismay, the Government has been trying to bring out a strange undercurrent of differences among the citizens, which in my opinion, did not exist before. One only wishes all of this ends here. It is not just the Muslims who are being isolated but even the Assamese, the Kashmiri Hindus and the students as well.

If we don't speak even now, when the Government came after the students in Jamia, it may act against all of us. At least one can draw the line and make it realise that such barbaric ways will not be tolerated. The time to act is now

Are SDGs on track?

Since meeting goals by 2030 requires substantial changes in all aspects, the limited effectiveness of governments may not be sufficient unless businesses and civil society play their part

the world cannot survive unless drastic steps are taken. The member states of the United Nations (UN) in 2015 adopted the 2030 agenda for Sustainable Development with 17 Goals at its heart. This is a universal call to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure that all people live a productive, vibrant life and enjoy peace and prosperity by 2030. Since 2020 is round the corner and we are just a decade away from 2030, we must analyse the sufficiency of the actions taken by governments, businesses, developmental organisations, scientific community and civil society to make achievement of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) a reality. Since these require substantial changes in all aspects, the limited effectiveness of governments may not be sufficient, unless businesses and civil soci

ety play their part. The UN's SDG Report, 2019, is helpful in mea-suring headways made in several critical areas and indicates some positive developments like substantial decline in extreme poverty, 49 per cent fall in the under-five mortality rate since 2000 and access to electricity to a large chunk of the world's population. Marine life has also been safeguarded and protected areas have multiplied since 2010. Issues regarding illegal fishing are also being smoothened. The Paris Agreement on climate change has been signed by 186 parties. Rapid urbanisation has also been addressed worldwide with 150 countries framing policies at the national-level aiming to solve the ing policies at the national-level aiming to solve the problems arising from it. Over 300 policies and instruments have been developed by several countries, including the EU, to encourage sustainability in production and consumption. These improvements could not have been possible without the widespread support of all stakeholders and this all-pervasive participation creates considerable optimism and promise for a secure future. mism and promise for a secure future

However, unified and concentrated action is still required in many areas. Environment protection and action to reduce climate change are the top priority as it is predicted that global warming will rise to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels in years to come if greenhouse emissions are not checked. This, coupled with increasing sea levels because of it, will have cumulative effects that will be irreversible and disastrous. Add to this an increasing ocean acidification, coastal erosion, extreme weather conditions, the frequency and severity of natural disasters, continuing land degradation, risk of loss of one million plant and animal species and we have a perfect recipe

for the ecosystem's collapse.

Human suffering is closely linked to this environmental degradation as it has the capability to make many parts of the planet derelict. Given the make many parts of the planet dereifet. Given the loss of vital plant and animal species and global warming — with the last four years being the warmest on record — food production will be at risk, leading to large-scale food shortage and increasing global hunger. This can potentially displace up to 140 million people by 2050, unless strong and decisive action on climate change is taken by the antire world.

The goal to end extreme poverty by 2030 also looks unattainable as violent disturbances, conflicts and displacements are adding to the exposure to natural disasters, leading to deep-rooted deprivation. At least half of the world's population lacks essential health services, more than half of the world's children do not meet educational standards and women in all parts of the world continue to face dis-

advantages and discrimination.

Since achieving SDGs is not easy or ossible alone, all stakeholders should partner for the cause. As resources are limited, be it financial, natural or human, society must make optimum use of the same. By way of partnership, we have the ability to bring together diverse and scarce resources to deliver a higher impact, greater sustainability and increased value greater sustainability and increased value to all. According to the UN, "Partnerships for sustainable development are multi-stakeholder initiatives voluntarily under-taken by Governments, inter-governmental organisations, major groups and other stakeholders, whose efforts are contributing to the implementation of inter-governmentally agreed development goals and commitments."

Through this the UN has recognised the importance of partnerships by busi-nesses and all leading institutions as imperative in international relations and global development. This fundamental shift in its thinking and approach is expressed in its clear acceptance of the interrelations and interdependence of thriving business, prosperous society and a healthy environment as a whole. All societal sectors without exception have been named as key development actors and an unprecedented level of coopera-tion and collaboration is the need of the hour for achievement of SDGs.

Since the launch of SDGs, several wide-ranging development partnerships have seen the light of the day, both at globand local levels; from international net-works to bilateral arrangements; from multi-sector, multi-issue platforms, to sin-gle-sector, single-issue interest groups. To bring some standardisation into the multitude of collaborative arrangements with quite different qualities, three basic types of partnerships can be identified, which can be distinguished in terms of the main objectives of the partnership and the nature of the relationship between the partners.

The first category,
"Leverage/Exchange" involves partnerships that are complementary to each
other and are a one-way transfer or reciprocal exchange of resources like knowl-edge, services, skills and funding, that the organisations need to employ towards their own strategic goals. It is applicable when each partner has something that is more valuable to the other than to themselves, resulting in net gain on exchange. For example, the relationship between an aid agency and a university research institute can constitute a partnership of mutu-al benefit where the agency accesses research outputs and expertise from the institute while providing research funding or sources of data and case studies to the institute. An example of this type of partnership is Coca-Cola and the Global Fund Project Last Mile, which leverages Coca-Cola's logistic, supply chain, distribution and marketing expertise to build African Governments' capabilities to ensure communities have better access to life-sustaining and life-enhancing medi-cines. Coca-Cola gains by demonstrating its commitment to a better planet as well as providing employee engagement opportunities. The

"Combine/Integrate", identifies a cross-sector partnership, which is essentially a partnership between two or more organisations where complementary resources are pooled to identify solutions to a common problem and in the process accomplish a shared strategic goal. Innovative approaches, which are developed by all the partners involved through brainstorming and consistent dialogue and mutual accountability, are the hallmarks of this type of partnership. The core belief here is that one can achieve more by working together and combining the resources than individually. An example in this category can be seen in Bangladesh between

a social enterprise and a major supplier of renewable energy, SOLshare, and Grameen Shakti, which is being supported and enabled by UN DESA. Grameen Shakti brings access to its massive existing customer base and network of solar homes, as well as its knowledge of the communities, and SOLshare brings cut-ting-edge, innovative technology with the potential to transform the supply of affordable energy to low-income households in Bangladesh.

The final partnership type "Transform", is more ambitious and focusses on the final goal of tackling a development challenge in an innovative and multi-faceted way where the problem definition may be unclear, and partners bring differing world views and perspective to the problem of the pro bring differing world views and perspec-Nutrition is a global, country-led and multi-sectoral movement to combat undernutrition and catalyse support for countries with a focus on a set of evidencebased direct nutrition interventions. Here a partnership is developed to facilitate a system change with the involvement of various actors like countries, various Government ministries (e.g. ministries of education, health and agriculture) as well as other change agents like businesses, civil society and the UN.

We are at a time where interventions to save the planet have to be colossal and no country or individual can contribute in isolation. The challenges are global and require global solutions. The SDGs have brought countries and communities together to work for a better life and a sustainable planet. It is the duty of all stake-holders to develop and to further strengthen international cooperation on climate change, migration, technology, trade and partnerships. Let us take the advantage of many synergies that we have and work together to achieve the 2030 Agenda.

ostradamus, the world's most famous seer, had predicted that the year 2020 would mark the beginning of a new era, accompanied by bloodshed and suffering, but that it would also bring new hopes. So, as we stand at the cusp of the new year, one won-ders what 2020 will bring for India?

Politically, the country will be stable, given the massive mandate won by Prime Minister Narendra Modi just six months ago. The BJP is sure to begin the year with a sense of triumph as the Modi Government has achieved most of the party's core agenda during its second term, including the abrogation of Article 370, a favourable judgment in the

the Citizenship Amendment Act, 2019 (CAA) and the National Register of Citizens (NRC) and so on. However, there is a need to arrest the widespread unrest created due to the CAA and the NRC as it is not doing the Government any

good.
Going forward, in 2020, the Government is likely to form a trust and begin the Ram temple's construction in a grand manner in Ayodhya. The Uniform Civil Code (UCC) is the only remaining part of the core BJP-RSS agenda and a Bill to regulate the population is also on

the anvil.
Though the BJP will not achieve majority in the Rajya Sabha, Modi and his deputy Amit Shah have shown how Bills could be pushed through with the support of some neutral parties like the Biju Janata

However, the economy is going to be the biggest challenge for the Modi Government. A plunge in domestic consumption, manufac-

Ayodhya issue, dealing with the issue of illegal immigrants through weakening of industrial production, slump in exports and imports and a mess in the banking and financial sectors need urgent attention. The Organisation for Economic

Cooperation and Development (OECD) recently marginally cut its growth forecast for 2019 to 5.8 per cent but said it will pick up to 6.2 per cent in 2020 and further to 6.4 per cent in 2021. The global broking firm Goldman Sachs has forecast a mild recovery of the Indian econo-March 2020.

Politically there could be some realignments. The Opposition may continue to be scattered and weak. The Congress' prospects are looking up a bit. However, it is yet to emerge as an alternative. Both the Congress and the BJP might have new presidents. While Rahul Gandhi is expected to return as the party chief, the BJP might choose the present working president JP Nadda to lead it from now on.

The BJP ended the year by emerging as the single-largest party in Haryana and Maharashtra. While

the party formed the Government in Haryana, the Shiv Sena-Congress-Nationalist Congress Party combine formed Government in Maharashtra,

upstaging the BJP there.
With the parting of ways with the Shiv Sena, the BJP might have to look for new friends in the coming year. As it is, the NDA has shrunk with the Telugu Desam Party leaving in March 2019 and the Sena in December 2019. The JD(U) and the Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) are the only two big allies left with

the saffron party.

Bihar and Delhi will go for Assembly polls in 2020. Both are important for the BJP as it is part of the ruling coalition in Bihar and has been trying to get Delhi back as it was strong in the Capital in the past. The "Modi magic" did not work in both the States in 2015 as the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) won with a massive majority in Delhi and the mahagathbandhan, comprising the Congress, JD(U), the RJD and smaller parties, won in Bihar. The mahagathbandhan has broken up since then and Nitish Kumar is back as an NDA Chief Minister. Bihar has 243 seats and Nitish will lead the BJP-JD(U) combine in the Bihar

As for Delhi, the ruling AAP is going strong despite all odds. The fight there will be three-cornered with the AAP, the Congress and the BJP fighting for the 70 seats. The Congress and the BJP have no local leaders to match the cityte of leaders to match the stature of Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal. However, the BJP's star campaigner Modi is planning to kick off the poll campaign on December 22 with a huge rally at the Ramlila Maidan.

Modi has struck up a friendship with US President Donald Trump. It is to be seen who wins the crucial 2020 US presidential elections. In any case, India has the support of both Democrats and Republicans in the US and the victory of Boris Johnson in the United Kingdom (UK) might cement the Indo-UK relationship further, too, making things right for the country as far as the West is concerned. However,

India has to sort out its differences in the neighbourhood, particularly

with Bangladesh and Sri Lanka. The Tokyo Olympics in 2020 is an important event as in the 100th year of India's participation, the Indian Olympic Association, with the JSW Group, will showcase the nation's heritage and economic might through an India House. It seems strange that a country of more than 1.3 billion people can only col-lect an average of less than one medal per games. Maybe the new year will see the nation shore up its winnings as more and more people take to sports and training takes centre stage.

India will be hosting the next 'No Money for Terror' Ministerial Conference in 2020. Restricting funding is the key to stopping terror in its tracks, as money is the backbone for training, attacks and other terror infrastructure.

Though the year 2020 is not packed with events, nevertheless, it only the beginning and events might overtake any prediction. (The writer is a senior journalist)

State-owned NBCC on Tuesday won approval of financial creditors to takeover debt-laden Jaypee Infratech Ltd, rekindling hopes of home-buyers finally getting their promised flats over the next four years.

A week-long voting on the takeover proposals submitted by NBCC and Mumbai-based real estate firm Suraksha Realty ended close to midnight, with results going in favour of the state-owned firm with a over-whelming majority of 97.36 per

cent favouring it.
This is the third round of bidding process to find a buyer for Jaypee Infratech, which went into Corporate Insolvency Resolution Process (CIRP) in August 2017.

The successful resolution will provide a big relief to over 20,000 homebuyers across various housing projects launched by Jaypee Infratech in Noida and Greater Noida (Uttar Pradesh). As many as 13 banks and over 21,000 homebuyers have voting rights in the Committee of Creditors (CoC) Buyers have 57.66 per cent voting rights, fixed deposit holders 0.13 per cent and lenders 42.21 per cent. For a bid to be approved, 66 per cent votes are required.

In a filing to the BSE,

Jaypee Infratech's Interim Resolution Professional (IRP) Anui Jain informed that NBCC got 57.66 per cent vote of homebuyers and 0.13 per cent of fixed deposit holders. The public sector firm got 39.57 per cent votes of lenders out of total 42.21 per cent votes.

IFCI, which has voting rights of 1.21 per cent,

abstained from voting process, while ICICI Bank (1.31 per cent) and SREI Equipment Finance Ltd (0.12 per ce voted against NBCC's bid.

Suraksha managed to get 2.12 per cent votes as only fixed deposit holders and two lenders

— Axis Bank and The Jammu and Kashmir Bank Ltd favoured it. Out of 21,781 homebuyers that are part of the CoC, as many as 12,147 flat owners voted on NBCC's resolution plan, of which 97.02 per cent were in favour. After the CoC approval, NBCC's bid has to be approved by the National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT).

On December 7, the CoC decided to put on vote simultaneously the bids of NBCC (India) Ltd and Suraksha Realty to acquire the bankrupt realty firm. The voting process started on December 10 and ended

on December 16. In its bid, NBCC has proposed to complete over 20,000 pending flats in the next threeand-a-half years. Homebuyers' claim amounting to Rs 13,364 crore and lenders' claim worth Rs 9,783 crore have been admitted. In its latest bids, NBCC offered 1,526 acres of land to lenders under a landdebt swap deal. On Yamuna Expressway, NBCC has prosed to transfer the road asset to lenders but before that it would take a loan of around Rs 2,500 crore against toll revenue

to fund construction spend.

Jaypee Infratech, a sub sidiary of crisis-hit Jaiprakash Associates, went into insolvency process in August 2017 after the National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT) admitted an application by an IDBI Bank-led consortium.

Telecom operators will continue to pay 6 paise per minute for every outgoing call made to their competitors' network till December 31, 2020 following sector regulator Trai's decision announced on

These charges were proposed to become zero from January 1, 2021. Telecom industry body COAI sees it as a relief for the debt ridden sector and expects that continuing with six paise mobile call termination charge will not have any impact on consumers as operators have already bsorbed this charge in their recently increased mobile call

charge would continue to remain as Re 0.06 (paise six only) per minute up to December 31, 2020," The Telecom Regulatory Authority

of India (Trai) said.
The rate were reduced to 6 paise with effect from October 1, 2017 from 14 paise charged earlier and it was to become nil from January 1, 2020. "From January 1, 2021 onwards the termination charge for wireless (mobile) to wireless (mobile) domestic calls shall be zero," the regulator added.

According to estimates, industry players lost Rs 11,000 crore when interconnect usage charge for mobile calls was reduced to 6 paise from 14 paise. Further, removal of the mobile call termination charges

Govt promises broadband access in all villages by 2022; launches **National Broadband Mission**

he Government on Tuesday promised broadband access in all villages by 2022, as it launched the ambitious National Broadband Mission entailing stakeholder invest-ment of Rs 7 lakh crore in the

coming years.
The mission will facilitate universal and equitable access to broadband services across the country, especially in rural and remote areas. It also involves laying of incremental 30 lakh route km of Optical Fiber Cable and increase in tower density from 0.42 to 1 tower per thousand of population by 2024.

The mission — unveiled by Communications Minister Ravi Shankar Prasad — will also aim at significantly for mobile and internet.

"By 2022, we will take broadband to all the villages of India...The number of towers in the country which is about 5.65 lakh will be increased to 10 lakh," Prasad said.

The mission also envisages increasing fiberisation of tow ers to 70 per cent from 30 per

cent at present, he added.

The mission will enable strengthening of technological infrastructure for education, health, entrepreneurship and development, he said. "We will also take the speeds up to 50 Mbps is a phased manner," Prasad promised.

He urged the States to extend full support to the mission, to take benefits of tech-nology (fuelled by high speed connectivity) to people.

Government sets ₹1.1 lakh crore monthly GST collection target

Taxmen asked to buckle up

Amid concerns that the government may fall short of tax collection target in a slowing economy the Centre has set an ambitious Rs 1.1 lakh crore monthly GST target for the remaining four months of the current fiscal and asked taxmen

to step up efforts to achieve the goal. Revenue Secretary Ajay Bhushan Pandey held a video conference meeting with top tax officials of departments looking after both income tax and indirect taxes such as GST and asked them sumed 17 centre and state levies and to step up efforts to achieve tax tar-

gets, finance ministry sources said. While taxmen have been asked to plug evasions, Pandey impressed upon them to achieve targets without harassing honest taxpayers. Taxmen were told in no uncertain terms that both the GST as well as the Rs 13.35 lakh crore target for direct taxes for 2019-20 will have to be achieved.

In the meeting, the GST target was set at Rs 1.10 lakh crore every month between December 2019 and March 2020. Of these four months, Rs 1.25 lakh collections has to be achieved in at least one month, the sources said. Gross GST collections, which include the share of both Centre and the states, crossed Rs 1 lakh crore mark in four out of the eights months of the cur-

Rs 1.1 lakh crore. At the current trend, the GST tax collection target is likely to be missed by at least Rs 1 lakh crore.

Countries like Japan and Norway and many other EU states are eagerly waiting to dispatch their ships to India. It is going to give an edge to India over other countries.

Safe working conditions of the vard

Safe working conditions of the yard workers is one of the most important aspects of this bill. What is the safe- ty rules incorporated in this bill for that very purpose?

In Gujarat, media have raised concerns over ships Recycling Bill and inflow of more old vessels that may cause oil spillage leading to heavy marine pollution, which will not only have adverse marine and environmental impacts but also force closure of the yard itself. What are your views on this?

the vessels movement from one region

to another in the International waters is as per the Basel Convention. The older vessels coming to India for recycling have to be in coming to India for recycling have to be in seaworthy conditions (as per flag state regulations). Before entering into our territorial waters, they are thoroughly inspected not only for sea worthiness but also for any leakages and or carriage of hazardous materials other than mentioned in the inventory. Such ships are supposed to carry minimum oil and fuels for the voyage to reach up to the designated shipyards. With yard facilities being certified/authorised punitive actions are laid down in the provisions of the bill for the recycler. These things will act as deterrence for any marine pollution. However in case, of any such eventuality recycler is responsible to clear and take the corrective measures. State Maritime Boards and regulatory authorities will also keep a close

rective measures. State Maritime Boards and regulatory authorities will also keep a close watch to avoid such situations.

What are the timelines for the Ship Recycling Bill 2019 going to come into force? The enforcement of this bill in India will happen after the notification is issued by Govt. of India. If Govt. of India desires to enforce the bill in one go istelf, it will be implemented accordingly. Otherwise, the enforcement will be done in a gradual and step by step manner.

Strong economic figures have helped US President Donald Trump to his highest approval ratings ever, despite impeachment, a new poll found on Monday. Although the Quinnipiac University survey said Trump has a high of 43 per cent for his job approval, that is still far below nearly all pre-vious presidents in modern times at the same point in their

According to the poll, carried out December 11-15, 52 per cent of Americans still disapprove of Trump's job performance.

Trump has been mired in those unusually low ratings for nearly his entire presidency. But the latest figures show a progression, indicating supgrowing for Trump, despite the impeachment process threatening his presi-dency. The House of Representatives could vote to impeach for abuse of office and obstruction of Congress as

December had 41 per cent approval and 55 per cent dis-

approval, while an October poll, done before impeachment hearings began, put those figures at 38 and 58 per cent.

Nearly three quarters, 73 per cent, saw the economy as good or excellent, the poll found. "That view of a strong economy seems to be helping

I'd be disappointed if wen see. It be disappointed in something would be in the works. And if it is, we'll take care of it," Trump said at the WH when asked about the situation. "We're watching it very closely."

Washington and Pyongyang have been largely stalled since the collapse of a February summit in Hanoi between Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un. MAX production next month decision immediately raised

Boeing says to halt 737

Boeing said on Monday it would temporarily suspend production of its globally grounded 737 MAX jets next month as safety regulators delay the aircraft's return to the skies after two crashes.

The decision confirmed investor fears that the company's recovery from the crisis is dragging on longer and creating more uncertainty for Boeing than executives anticipated.

Boeing's travails since March have weighed on the US economy, holding down US manufacturing output, trade and sales of durable goods while damaging the company's performance on Wall Street's benchmark Dow Jones Industrial Average. In a statement, the compa-

ny said it would continue to pay its workers despite the temporary production stoppage, but the

questions for the future of parts suppliers which contribute to the jets' manufacture.

"We have previously stated that we would continually evaluate our production plans should the MAX grounding continue longer than we expected," the company said in a statement.
"As a result of this ongoing

evaluation, we have decided to prioritise the delivery of stored aircraft and temporarily sus-pend production on the 737 program beginning next month."

The company said it would

focus on delivering 400 jets it has kept in storage. Though the jets have been grounded worldwide since March following deadly crashes in Indonesia and Ethiopia, which left 346 people dead, Boeing had continued to produce 40 of the planes per month at a Renton, Washington



Law schools should incorporate experiential learning in order to prepare well-equipped lawyers who can give well-rounded and reasonable solutions to real world problems, says DR AVINASH DADHICH

periential learning or learning through experience requires a series of experiences in the realworld setup. The experiences involved in this type of hands on learning stays with the students for a longer time, unlike rote learning or curriculum

In today's day and age law schools need to shed the conventional method of imparting legal education to match up to our changing and dynamic society. Law is a multi-disciplinary subject and it is the duty of a lawyer to be well acquainted with the multifarious problems of our society and have real world solutions to these complicacies. Therefore a law graduate who has only been exposed to the vast syllabus that we have our law schools and have gained their knowledge through the humongous law books will not be well equipped to give a well-rounded and reasonable solution to any real world problem. Many lawyers and some law professors have long believed that legal education placed too much emphasis on theoretical learning and not enough on practical learning. The charge was made that we were graduating students who could think like a lawyer, but were

unprepared to act like a lawyer.

Being aware of the legal theories is no doubt the primary task of a lawyer but an appreciation of the other variety of factors in the society is the need of the hour. Lawyers are generally termed as the problem solvers of the society and recent law graduates can only carry out this task if they are sufficiently exposed to different kinds experiences outside the four walls of their classroom.

Now mentioned below are six reasons why experiential learning is so vital in a law school:

In the growing Indian economy, there's a need of lawyers who can offer industry focused or business friendly solutions. A lawyer working in a ly solutions. A lawyer working in a corporate house should not only be familiar with the corporate laws of the country but should understand how the business works in real life. The ability to understand the different aspirations of different businesses and the way business is being conducted is necessary for a corporate legal counsel. In their law schools a student of law can only learn about this through internships. Through internships in a corporate house, the complexities of running a business and its day to day activities can be appreciated. Generally in Indian law schools only a month is dedicated towards internships. But the authors believe that in order to truly appreciate the way a business activity is conducted, at least three months is

required in a year.

Legal aid societies in law schools focus on a range of public interest legal issues, from the struggles adolescents face as they age out of foster care to the promotion of human rights, the pursuit of economic justice and envi-ronmental protection. with legal education is that students have little or no experience of practice before they graduate. Actually, representing a real client while in law school is an invaluable learning experience. The work includes impact litigation, direct-services representa-tion, collaborative investigations, pol-icy initiatives, and grassroots advo-cacy. Students learn the practical art of lawyering by assuming increasing levels of responsibility for cases and matters involving real individuals, communities, and organisations that otherwise might be unable to secure

■The students are provided an option to choose an activity that they are passionate about, thus increasing their engagement and commitment. As the student, who for example is enthusiastic about protecting our environment, is directly involved in the problem-solving activity, the level of commitment is high. The need for lawyers to genuinely empathise with the modern-day problems becoming essential if we are looking for a viable solution to mitigate the problems. This also develops leadership skills in an individual.

■Law schools should encourage the students towards entrepreneurship ventures in legal and non-legal sectors. Entrepreneurship is not confined to any particular stream of knowledge, but an attitude should be developed by students during their law school days. Law schools must create training and live projects for students in this direction

■As experiential learning is based on trial by error, from law schools itself a student should be encouraged to come up with innovative solutions. In this stage of their lives they can make mistakes without impunity. But the ability to think out of the box and give creative and reasonable solutions, a law student can hone this skill in law school itself through real life simula-tions or mock trials/moot courts.

■ A lot of technologies are being introduced in the legal sector, such as softwares backed by artificial intelli-gence and blockchain which still remains a mystery to law students. The future of legal sector will be highly dominated by technologies and during the law school days a student must be exposed to existing and emerging technologies to make them a better lawyer in our society.

In our law schools we definitely have a fair share of experiential learning activities like moot courts or internships, but proper multi-disci-plinary, social, technological, industry and entrepreneurship focused empha-sis on such activities is lacking. Passing an examination and mugging up the-ories before the said exam is a prevalent vice that needs to be addressed if we want to churn out law graduates who are trained to serve the dynam-

ic needs of the society.

The need for emergency medicine in India is immense, particularly in the wake of changing burden of various diseases, says DR TAMORISH KOLE

What is Emergency Medicine (EM)? Many people we come across look at us quizzically when they are told what we do. This is the medical specialty dedicated to the diagnosis and treatment of unfore-seen illness or injury. The practice of emergency medicine includes the initial evaluation, diagnosis, treatment, coordination of care among multiple providers, and disposition of any patient requiring expedi-tious medical, surgical or psychiatric care.

In a country with a population of 133.92 crores, the need mergency medic India is immense, particularly in consideration of the changing burden of disease. We do not have the necessary manpower to provide quality emergency medical care to patients, the keyword being quality. Right to emergency medical care and to life are fundamental rights. But we believe Right to Quality emergency medical care should be the fundamental right. Emergency medicine training is still in its nascent stages in our country but efforts



of the Society for Emergency Medicine, India and joint collaborations with the leaders in EM from the United States of America, United Kingdom and Australia, has focused on structured training in this field of Emergency Medicine. This has produced many quality emergency medicine caregivers. But due to lack of recognition, most have migrated abroad to UK

It is of utmost importance

to understand that Emergency medicine does not begin at the doorsteps of an emergency department. It begins at your homes, on the roads, at the airports and when you're out for a hike. Basic life support and basic emergency care if taught during medical school will help in a big way to tackle the initial minutes of an emergency. There are many organisations that go from schools to corporate

offices to government bodies,

teaching basic life support and first aids. Initial response from the society can help trained emergency medicine physicians in providing better outcomes for patients who have received initial help at the point of emer-

gency.

Emergency departments of Government hospitals across India are still manned by doctors who are fresh out of medical school and has been tasked to manage sick and acutely ill

patients. Having a subject on basic emergency medical care at the MBBS level will go a long way in providing initial quality emergency care to millions of patients who throng the emergency departments. Emergency Medicine was recognised as a post graduate specialty by Medical Council of India (MCI) in 2009 and by National Board of Examinations (NBE) in 2013. Though both courses are running across the country the number needed to serve the entire nation is much more than the existing emergency physicians. tination for overseas nationals. The good old days for international students, however, came to a standstill in 2012 when the then-home secretary Theresa May scrapped the post-study work permit. This move also turned out to be a major setback for the domestic universities in the UK. However, in the wake of a recent announcement by the UK Government, the situation seems extremely likely to become

favourable once again.

Re-launching the two-year post-study work visa: In its latest statement, the Boris Johnson Government has effectively reinstated the two-year post-study work visa policy abolished by his predecessor Theresa May The development is expected to pull in more international students by enabling them to seek professional

After the completion of their studies, students would be allowed to switch onto the skilled work visa in case they find jobs, something that had been revoked by the previous regime. At present, internation-

al students pursuing Bachelor's and Master's degrees only get the permission to stay and work for four months while those studying at 27 universities on a pilot scheme

Benefits to Indian students:

The announcement by the UK Government will significantly benefit Indian students planning to pursue academic opportunities in the 2020-21 academic year. In particular, it will give a major fillip to Indian students for whom poststudy work visa is a deciding factor when it comes to studying abroad.

To avail the benefits of this visa route, students must know that it will be a separate visa and calls for a new application form to be filled inclusive of immigration health surcharge and payment of visa fee. Graduates whose leave expires before the visa's implementation (2020-21) will be disqualified and

won't be eligible for the benefits. **Benefits:** It will have a positive impact on employers in the UK who were having a difficult time in the absence of the post-study work visa. 44 per cent of employers faced issues with recruiting new talent whereas 34 per cent experienced employee retention challenges last year, as per CIPD data.



inedine Zidane and Ernesto Valverde might have been fearing for their jobs if they had lost a Clasico back in October but its postponement means that today they can face each other feeling more secure

Stalling in the autumn, Real Madrid and Barcelona have rolled through the gears in the lead-up to Christmas, meaning the winner of today's crunch meeting at Camp Nou will move seven points clear of third

place.

More importantly, in what increasingly looks like a two-pronged title chase, the winner will pull three ahead of the loser, with one round Liga matches left before the two-week winter break.

Yet even for the loser, providing defeat is not a humiliation, the con-

actear is not a numination, the consequences will not be so grave.

The gap in the table will be small and considering where both these teams were only a few weeks ago, when every week brought a new name linked with coaching jobs and every goal conceded planted another seed of doubt.


