Poll e-campaign renews focus on local networks

On Tuesday morning, Home Minister Amit Shah is scheduled to address a "massive rally" aimed at the BJP's supporters in West Bengal. The posters for the meeting are already circulating on social media and the State BJP has encouraged individual leaders, MLAs and MPs to post posters of the meeting with their faces. It is unlikely that any of these posters will be in evidence on the walls of houses in either Kolkata or other urban clusters of West Bengal. This absence is significant because the political culture of the State deems that a public meeting addressed by a political stalwart is preceded by posters, bunting and wall writings. There is a thriving industry in West Bengal that is centred on agitprop and there is fierce competition between political parties over high attendance. The biggest meetings are traditionally held at the Brigade Parade Ground in the Kolkata Maidan, just adjoining the iconic Victoria Memorial. Slightly smaller meetings — although huge by national standards — are held either at the Shahid Minar or the crossing of Chittaranjan Avenue and Bentinck Street. There is a set drill for public meetings and, by and large, political parties of all shades adhere to the rules. On Tuesday morning, however, there will be no crowds either at the Kolkata Maidan or the Chowringhee crossing. BJP flags will not be in evidence and there will be no saffron-draped march where the local leaders will wait the arrival of Amit Shah. That's because the whole event will be virtual. The Home Minister will be speaking from his residence in Lutyens' Delhi and the party faithful will watch the proceeding from either a computer, a tablet or a smart phone. At best, some enterprising local leader will install a giant screen in the mohalla and a crowd will watch the speech from there. But even here, there will at least be a pretence of social distancing for the cameras, although, as a rule, the citizenry of West Bengal tend to remarkably casual about adhering to the norms of either a lockdown or social distancing.

Finally, if the fear of Covid-19 remains as intense as at present, there will be a significant reduction in the costs incurred by political parties — an unintended but desirable consequence

of this new form of virtual campaigning that has been forced on the country by the Covid-19 crisis. Will grand events such as this one have the same impact and, indeed, appeal as a traditional public meeting? What will be the online viewership? Will it have to be supplemented by live telecasts on local channels? Will people view it in real time, keeping in mind that internet connectivity is still erratic, or will they view a recorded version at leisure? These are unanswered questions that need further probing.

At this point I can only narrate my own experiences of political engagement using video calls and other social media platforms. Since the lockdown began on March 25 and I found myself stranded in Delhi, unable to get back to the scene of action in West Bengal, I have spoken and participated in at least 20 programmes, big and small. Since Zoom — the platform that despite its China connections offers the best service — can accommodate only a maximum of 100 participants — if you want more, the charges are quite prohibitive — there is the tendency to link it with some other social media platform that has facilities for live broadcast. The only disadvantage is that while Zoom allows interaction with the audience, the other live broadcasts involve a silent audience. This can be disconcerting to speakers who depend, as I do, on audience reactions to mould a speech.

At the same time, Zoom has been invaluable in communicating with smaller and more targeted audiences. It has become the best substitute for face-to-face meetings with, say, 50 to 60 people. The additional advantage is that the audience is spared the trouble of commuting — and all the hassles that involves. My feeling is that these conference calls and small webinars have managed quite successfully to overcome the problems caused by the restrictions on travel. However, while these can maintain the activist network and bolster morale, they are of little use in communicating directly with ordinary people, particularly those uninvolved in day-to-day politics.

The issue is relevant in the context of the Assembly election in Bihar that is due by September-October this year. The elections in Assam and West Bengal are due by May 2021. If the Election Commission deems that the elections will go ahead as scheduled — despite the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic — there will have to be many adjustments. At one level there will have to be administrative modifications, keeping in mind social distancing. I believe that if the levels of participation are to be ensured, the EC should consider extending voting hours, even contemplating two-day voting. This would have presented huge logistical problems in the case of a general election but a State Assembly election is more manageable.

As for the political issues, I feel that the importance of TV is certain to be enhanced considerably. Secondly, because contacts with individual voters are certain to be more restricted, there will be a renewed emphasis on the existing local networks of parties and candidates. The incumbent may even enjoy a modest advantage, unless there is fierce anti-incumbency. Finally, if the fear of Covid-19 remains as intense as at present, there will be a significant reduction in the costs incurred by political parties — an unintended but desirable consequence.

LAC parleys raise hopes

No breakthrough, but it creates ground for more talks

In an effort to defuse the nearly month-long stand-offs at various locations at the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in Eastern Ladakh, top military commanders of India and China held extensive talks on Saturday. There was no immediate breakthrough, and both the sides agreed to remain engaged to resolve the ongoing confrontations.

The high-level talks between Leh-based 14 Corps chief Lt General Harinder Singh and his Chinese counterpart Major General Liu Lin, commander of Tibet Military District in Chushul-Moldo in China, came a day after the video conference between the senior diplomats of the two countries — Naveen Srivastava, Joint Secretary (East Asia) at the External Affairs Ministry, and Wu Jiahua, director general in China's foreign ministry.

They agreed not to let their "differences" turn into "disputes" and address contentious issues through peaceful dia-

logue while respecting each other's sensitivities and concerns.

India and China have also agreed that both the sides should implement the consensus reached between the leaderships of the two countries that the "two neighbours do not constitute a threat to each other and that each other is an opportunity for development and do not let differences turn into disputes." This is in a reference to decisions taken at the two informal summits between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping.

As expected, the talks between the senior military commanders were not to yield instant solution.

However, the three-hour long parleys prepared the ground for some more rounds of talks at the local military level in the coming days, sources said.

At present, there are at least four flashpoints at the LAC in Eastern Ladakh and both the sides ramping up



their troop strength. More than 12 rounds of talks at various levels of military were held in the last fortnight but failed to achieve any breakthrough.

Earlier in the day, the Indian Army officials said Indian and Chinese officials continue to remain engaged through the established military and diplomatic channels to address the current situation in the India-China border areas.

India, China will have more cases than US if they test more: Trump

Washington: US President Donald Trump has said that countries like India and China would have much more coronavirus cases than America, the worst-hit country in the world, if they conduct more tests.

Trump, in his remarks at Puritan Medical Products in Maine, said that the US has carried out 20 million tests.

Compared to the US, Germany is at four million and much talked about South Korea is about three million tests, he said. According to Johns Hopkins Coronavirus Resource Center, the US has reported nearly 1.9 million cases and over 1,09,000 deaths, making America the worst affected country, while the total number of coronavirus cases in India and China stand at 2,36,184 and 84,177 respectively.

Washing hands with water a luxury here!

Kusuma's struggle starts at 4 Kam. She wakes up early to ensure her family can get water from the tanker which comes regularly in the Sarhat village of Manikpur in Chitrakoot. "I get up so early and place the bucket and other utensils in line but there is no guarantee that I will get water," she said.

"Ours is a forgotten village where we live with scarcity of water for decades. We do not have enough water to drink. Washing hands regularly with water is a luxury which we cannot afford," she told this reporter on the telephone.

As the Unlock 1.0 began early this week with Government advocating people to maintain safe distance and asking them to wash hands regularly to beat Covid-19, the villagers in Bundelkhand have resigned to their fates. Their struggle for water begins in the morning and ends in the evening with fetching water to



wash, cook and drink on a daily basis and cannot think of washing water to wash hands every two hours, as advocated by experts and doctors.

The rugged Bundelkhand is known for water crisis and the summer months are the worst, with groundwater levels acutely low. Sarhat is one of the villages where water scarcity is routine, even during winters. The tankers are only source of water to these parched vil-

India risks Covid explosion as it opens up: WHO

The coronavirus disease has not "exploded" in India, but the risk of that happening remains as the country moves towards removing its nationwide lockdown that was imposed in March to contain the Covid-19, a top WHO expert said.

India, which went past Italy on Friday to become the sixth worst-hit nation by the Covid-19 pandemic, is already witnessing huge spurt in cases each passing day.

WHO Health Emergencies Programme Executive Director Michael Ryan said the doubling time of the coronavirus cases in India is about three weeks at this stage. "Measures taken in India such as the nationwide lockdown has had an impact in slowing transmission but the risk of an increase in cases looms as the country opens up," he said while stressing that as the disease generates and creates a foothold in communities, it can accelerate at any time as has been seen in a number of settings.

In South Asia, not just in India but in Bangladesh, Pakistan and other countries in South Asia, with large dense



populations, the disease has not exploded. But there is always the risk of that happening, Ryan said in Geneva.

Ryan noted that measures taken in India such as the nationwide lockdown has had an impact in slowing transmission but the risk of an increase in cases looms as the country opens up.

"The measures taken in India certainly had an impact in dampening transmission and as India, as in other large countries, open up and as people begin to move again, there's always a risk of the disease bouncing back up," he said.

He added there are specific issues in India regarding a large amount of migration, the dense populations in the urban environment and the fact that many workers have no choice but to go to work every day.

Pregnant woman dies in 13-hour abortive hunt to get hospital bed

An eight-month pregnant woman died in an ambulance here after a frantic 13-hour hospital hunt failed to find her a bed as over half-a-dozen facilities, including a Government one, denied her treatment, her family claimed on Saturday.

Neelam, 30, and her husband Vijender Singh, 30, knocked the doors of eight hospitals, including Government ones, before she died in the ambulance outside a facility in Greater Noida on Friday, the family told PTI.

Taking note of the death and the claim, the Gautam Buddha Nagar district administration ordered an inquiry into the matter.

A resident of Khoda colony on the Noida-Ghaziabad border, Neelam was eight months pregnant and undergoing treatment at Shivalik Hospital here, a private facility, for pregnancy-related complications, her husband said.

Lacks thrill factor

Though it has been just over a month since the film was released, it appears to have caught the imagination of the OTT platform viewers of late. But there are a few things that inherently don't sit well with *Mrs Serial Killer*. First and most important, a defense lawyer telling his client that the only way to prove the innocence of the jailed beloved is to become a copycat killer.

Imagine the consequences and ramifications of such advice. Even if one manages to overlook this bizarre piece of ill-advice, there is the whole backdrop that the film has been shot at.

It is dark, dingy and seedy looking. Why Shirish Kunder? What was it that you were looking for? Is it to tell the viewers that it is a dark movie? The title is a give-away. It is unfortunate that there are few scenes in the entire film that are not shot in the dark. It is more annoying rather than the director trying to be scary and freaking you out that there is a serial killer out there gunning for unwed pregnant girls. Showing a mangled bloody body suspended from chains and six bottles with foetus is nowhere near shocking or worth pucking.

There is a bit on a disconnect as well. While the subject is interesting enough, the subject is far removed from what happens in India. We may have had our share of serial killers — the 2006 Noida serial murders. But these are few and far between. We also

don't want to know that there is a male gynae doctor out to get you.

Then there is Jacqueline Fernandez. This is the second time that we are watching her in a Netflix Original, the first being *Drive*. Here, all she does is either cry or try to pop her eyes like she is shocked but all one will end up doing is roll one's eyes. And what is with the accent?

As for Manoj Bajpai, one hopes that the actor is trying to experiment with different scripts and hence taking up such projects. Otherwise how is it possible for an actor who has been part of films like *Drohkaal*, *Special 26* and *Aligarh* end up doing *Mrs Serial Killer*? It boggles the mind.

Over all, this movie should only be watched if one wants to see the kind of experimenting that is taking place on OTT platforms. — Shalini Sakseena

ASHISH ESCAPED ACCIDENT

Recollecting the experience Ashish narrates: "I was on top of a structure that was around 20-30 feet high and I was supposed swing across on a rope to another building that was around 50 feet away. It was very windy and we couldn't predict its speed. Once I started gliding, I gained greater than the required momentum and slid through much faster than I was supposed to. I almost banged straight into a brick of wall but somehow fortunately due to my quick reflexes managed to avoid the collision with the help of my feet. After the incident, I was hanging mid-air for around 20 minutes till the team managed to get me down safely."

'I will play Lord Krishna every time I am asked'

VISHAL KARWAL, who plays Lord Krishna in *Dwarkadheesh-Bhagwan Shri Krishna* that airs on Dangal TV talks to SHALINI SAKSENA about how he got into acting, challenges that come with playing a mythological character, among other things

■ What got you interested in acting?
I have done engineering in Computer Science from Chandigarh. When I was in third year, I auditioned for *MTV Roadies 4*. Back then I was interested in bike riding. I gave the audition and got selected. I did that show and finished my course. I then went to Texas for a flying course. When I finished my flying, I got another call from *MTV for Splitsville 1*. I flew down straight from Dallas to Mumbai. I was told it would be a month's shooting and a month's promotion and then I could go back. But I won and they offered me another show to host. This was in 2008. Back then there weren't many jobs in aviation. But I kept getting TV offers. I got *Bhagyavidhaata* and the rest of the shows followed. I had not planned to be an actor, they just happened.

■ So, you had a different trajectory?
Yes, I come from a business family. We have jewellery shows. From the very beginning, I was against doing things that were routine and go to one place. When I studied engineering, I knew that it was not my cup of tea. A friend of mine had applied for a flying course and that interested me and asked him how to go about applying for the same. The idea of being up in the clouds and going places really piqued my interest.

■ Was it a struggle to make space in the industry?
If I had not given the first audition, I would have never gone to Mumbai to become an actor. I had no acting background. I never even got a portfolio done for the first four-five years of my career. The industry has very kind to me. When I went to Mumbai, I already had a show in my hand. I have done around 12 shows in a career spanning 12 years and a few films as well.

■ How did you come on board to play Lord Krishna?
This is the fourth time that I am playing Lord Krishna in *Dwarkadheesh—Bhagwan Shri Krishna 2*. I was doing *Rishton Se Badi Pratha* back in 2010-11. Sagar Pictures were conducting auditions through an actor friend. I didn't really prepare for it but got selected. Before doing this show, I had done two fictional shows and reality show but I started enjoying acting when I played Krishna for the first time. The whole idea of standing in front of the camera and to play a God really got me interested.

I have noticed that not many actors want to do mythological shows. Also, not all of them suit the role. Doing such shows is a different ball game. One needs to do his homework to play these roles



■ This is not the first time you have played this character. Why say yes, each time?
I have noticed that not many actors want to do mythological shows and I have also seen that not all actors are suited to do them. It is a different ball game. While I had not prepped for the first mythological show, I enjoyed the whole process. As an actor I am truly blessed that I have got this opportunity. I will continue to play this role as long as I keep getting them since people remember you.

■ How tough is it to live up to people's expectation when you are part of a myth show?
Many actors have played Krishna but have not been exacted. Personally, I have to be able to look the part. I was offered to play Shiv but I refused. Because I don't think that I can do justice to the look since Shiv has a rough and rugged personality. I know what my traits are. For me to be able to convince the audience that I am God, I have to be convinced otherwise that conviction will not come across.

■ What are the challenges that come in such shows?
I don't think there are very many since people know the man behind the show due to social media. But when you play such roles, you do your own research. Before I took up the role back in 2011, I never used to practice yoga or meditate. But I do that regularly. I have lots of books as well. It has changed in a way but it has not been intentionally.

■ Is there a need to change content that we see on TV?
Definitely. If we don't do it now then, when? If not, TV is going to suffer since there are so many OTT platforms that offer great content. People even in small towns and cities have access to good Internet connectivity. If makers want people to sit in front of their sets at 8 pm and come back day after day, they need to find content that is brilliant. We must do away with the concept of daily soaps and come up with finite shows. When you do daily soaps, one tends to compromise because there is a deadline and we must do away with this.

■ Should viewers change their choice?
Not really. It is wrong to assume that because the audience watches such shows, makers are producing them. There was a time when the entire family would sit and watch shows, back in the 90s. If you give good content, people will watch it.

■ What next?
I am back home and looking at the change to open a boarding school in Palampur. But I would love to do web series provided the content and script that I am offered is good.

Lively and charismatic

MUSBA HASHMI speaks with SNEHA WAGH about her debut, how she chose to play a mother on screen at an early age and, above all, her passion for acting

At the age of 13, when most girls are busy watching fairy tales and imagining a life in la la land, Sneha Wagh, who plays Mata Anjana in &TV's *Kahat Hanuman Jai Shri Ram*, was giving wings to her career.

Wagh started from Marathi theatre and then went on doing Marathi shows. However, acting was never on her cards whatsoever.

"I never dreamt of being an actor. I was a classical dancer and my goal was to have my dance academy one day. But like any other family, my father wanted me to be an engineer," she tells you.

But destiny had something else planned for her. Wagh developed interest in theatre and joined a group. She got a chance to do Marathi shows like *Adhuri Ek Kahani* and *Kaata Rute Konala*.

"My father was not very happy with my decision of being an actor initially. But then, my mother knew what I wanted. She told my father and with time he too embraced the fact that acting was my calling," Wagh tells you.

That was not all. She was then offered the lead in NDTV *Imagine's Jyoti*. "That came as a surprise. The producer saw me on TV in one of the Marathi shows and she wanted me to play the title lead in *Jyoti*. She searched for me and then contacted me. But the funny thing is I failed the audition 16 times. Because the character was so serious and I was just 19 back then. I said I just couldn't do that. I was like a newcomer in the industry. But then I gave it another try and it went well. That's how I was finalised for the role," Wagh tells you.

Playing a mature character like Jyoti changed Wagh inside out. "The character was indeed challenging. I had to learn a lot of things to get into the skin of the character. But it changed my life 360 degrees. It changed me from within and I started looking at things differently. The character was so emotional that there were times when I



story was amazing and the character was neither completely positive nor purely negative. That was the beauty. But back then, I didn't know that the show will become so popular and will run for so long," Wagh tells you.

From playing a young girl Jyoti to Ratan, a mother of two in her second Hindi TV show, Wagh says, she didn't thought of the consequences that time. "Like I said, I returned from London and was offered the role, so that time I didn't think too much about whether people in the industry will typecast me. For me work was work and I looked at it that way. However, later on I realised that I should have given it a second thought. I even went into depression. But then, I picked myself up and thought how does it matter if I played a mother. What should matter is my craft and my talent.

Then there are so many people out there who don't have work and that I should feel blessed that I have been working all this while. And now I can see my career trajectory has been so good. I have never repeated anything and that's the best part of my career," she says.

She adds that she has never been choosy when it comes to projects. "If I like the script, I just take up the project. I took all the good projects that came my way. Acting is what I love the most and as long as I am acting I am at my happy place," Wagh, who in future wants to be a part of a real-life inspired series, tells you.

Wagh is extremely happy to be a part of *Kahat Hanuman Jai Shri Ram*. The reason for increasing popularity of mythological shows, she says, is positivity. "It is human nature that whenever we are in danger or the time is not right *hum ya toh mummy ko yaad kartey hain ya bhagwaan ko*. Also these shows bring in so much of positivity, they give out a message that good will always win against evil. These shows kind of validate our trust and just create a positive atmosphere that everything will be fine," she says.


89 new Covid-19 patients found in U'khand

TOTAL SURGES PAST 1300; 79 PATIENTS DISCHARGED AFTER RECOVERY

The spike in the number of novel Coronavirus (Covid-19) infected patients in Uttarakhand is showing no sign of slowing down. On Saturday the State health department reported 89 new cases of the disease which increased the number of patients in the state to 1303. On a positive note, 79 patients were discharged from different hospitals of the state on the day after their complete recovery from the disease. So far eleven patients of the disease have died in the state.

On Saturday, 21 new patients were reported from Haridwar district while 16 cases surfaced in mountainous Pithoragarh district. In Dehradun 10 new patients were found while nine patients were reported from Tehri district. In Nainital seven new patients were reported while six patients each were reported

from Chamoli and Champawat districts. Four cases each were found in Almora and Bageshwar districts while three patients were found in Udham Singh Nagar district. On the day, one patient of Covid-19 was also found from Uttarkashi district.

On the day, 29 patients were discharged from hospitals in Tehri district while 25 were discharged from Almora district. Eight patients each were discharged from Dehradun and Haridwar districts while six were discharged from Pauri district. In Nainital three patients recovered from the disease.

In Dehradun, four members of nursing staff of Mahant Indresh hospital deputed in the hospital

emergency were found infected with the disease. The hospital has now closed the emergency for disinfecting it.

The additional secretary, state health department, Yugal Kishore Pant said that reports of 1117 samples were found negative for the disease on Saturday. He added that reports of 6253 samples are still awaited by the department. On Saturday, a total of 587 samples were collected for COVID-19 testing. The authorities have so far taken swab samples of 36638 suspected patients for COVID-19 test. Out of the total samples taken, 4.23 percent samples have been found positive for the disease. The doubling rate of disease in the state is 14.15 days while the recovery percent in the state is

U'khand to send samples to NCDC Delhi for test

In view of increasing backlog of samples at different testing facilities of the state, the Uttarakhand government has decided to send samples to the laboratory of National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC) New Delhi. This information was provided by the secretary medical health and family welfare Amit Singh Negi during a meeting with senior officials of health

department, all district magistrates and chief medical officers (CMO). In the meeting the Joint Secretary Government of India, Nidhimani Tripathi was also present.

She has been appointed by the GoI as nodal officer for Covid-19 in the state. In the meeting Negi directed district authorities of Haridwar and Udham Singh Nagar to send 300 samples each to NCDC New Delhi.

Haridwar now has 71 active patients of the disease while Pithoragarh and Udham Singh Nagar districts have 43 and 42 active cases respectively. Champawat now has 37 active patients while Pauri has 26 active cases. With recovery of 25 patients on the day, the number of active cases in Almora district reduced to 25 on Saturday.

Rudraprayag now has 19 active cases while Bageshwar and Chamoli districts have 16 and six active cases of the disease respectively.

CM: Enhance disaster training, complete monsoon preparation

Pvt varsity asks faculty members to resign

Despite the Government asking institutions to not remove their workers during the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, a renowned private university located in Dehradun has asked many of its faculty members to resign. The management of this university is learnt to have threatened to terminate these staff members if they fail to tender their resignations with immediate effect. The university management however claims that the number of teachers in

the university had become more than what is required.

The university has asked about 30 senior and junior faculty members of mechanical, electrical, electronics, mathematics and other departments to put in their papers. The aggrieved faculty members say that they are being fired at this critical time precipitated by Covid-19. They point out that the central government has clearly said that the employees should not be removed from their jobs.

"People were informed through an e-mail on June 3 to

connect on June 4 at specific time slots of 15 minutes each via a Zoom link. The agenda was not disclosed. On joining the meeting, the head of department concerned and HR

representative curtly told us that we should resign within 24 hours failing which the university would issue termination orders," said one such faculty member. The university has also blocked the official mail IDs and directed these employees to surrender the university's assets.

When contacted, a senior official of the university said that the teacher student ratio prescribed by the University Grants Commission (UGC) has got skewed in favour of teachers. "The list of surplus teachers was ready for quite

some time. Last year we witnessed a drop in student admissions and this year due to the pandemic scenario the situation is expected to be worse. After a process of screening based on performance this list of teachers was prepared. We had two options, either go for a salary cut of all the staff or go for a tough decision of removing non performers. The university has decided to give them salary till September 30 so that they can get enough time to scout for a new job," he said.

Man arrested for alleged brutal killing of dog

At a time when the killing of a pregnant elephant in Kerala has triggered nationwide outrage, Dehradun police on Saturday arrested a man for the alleged brutal killing of a stray dog in Singra Colony, Vikasnagar while keeping investigations on against the main accused Vinay Kumar.

On June 5, a disturbing video of the same day went viral on social media that showed a white coloured dog crying in pain while being kicked and being flushed with water to rinse away blood.

The video was made by Saumya Bajaj, who filed a written complaint to the police alleging that on Friday, Vinay Kumar killed a five-month old stray dog in a brutal manner after the dog walked inside his house. Taking cognisance of

her complaint, police registered an FIR and began investigation. On the basis of video evidence, the police arrested accused Madan Pal, also a resident of Singra Colony, the man seen throwing water on the crying dog with blood on the floor.

In her complaint, Bajaj stated that Vinay Kumar beat the adolescent dog to death following which, Pal threw water on the bleeding and dying dog to rinse away blood. She has also alleged that when she tried to intervene to save the dog from being killed brutally, Kumar abused her

and intimidated her with threats of physical assault.

"I feed strays in Singra Colony where I stay. On Friday, I fed a five month old pup who then wandered inside the house of Vinay Kumar. A few moments later, I heard piercing screams of the dog and found that he was being beaten to death inside Kumar's house. I urged them to stop and leave the pup. I tried to rush inside their house to save the dying dog but I was pushed out, abused and threatened. Not allowed to go inside, I made a video of the atrocity from the road," narrated Bajaj to this correspondent. The police have registered a case under sections 323/504/429 of the IPC and under Section 11 of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960. The matter is being investigated by sub-inspector Nidhi Dabral.


However, Buniyaad has

been extremely popular these days, bringing joy to viewers in these difficult and puzzling times. So many memories of so many people have been brought back by this exceptionally well-made saga of four generations of a family which goes through the partition. Each character is beautifully conceived and built up and the nuances of relationships among the family are delicately portrayed in this serial written by Manohar Shyam Joshi and directed by Ramesh Sippy in the mid-1980s.

Satbir, the youngest son (adopted) of Master Haveli Ram (who was played by Alok Nath) was portrayed by renowned film and TV actor Kanwaljit Singh who has had a long association with Saharanpur, Dehradun and Mussoorie. Kanwaljit Singh, it seems, was destined to play Satbir as it is by this role that he is always recalled most. "In fact, people kept calling me Satbir and still do," he said. Those who have watched Buniyaad regularly and carefully will agree that his role was one of the strongest in the serial and most impressive indeed. "I wanted to prove



myself through this intense role that was required for Satbir's character and thus refused the role of Roshan Lal although I could have done that well too," said the actor who proved himself as the superstar of the TV industry through serials like "Farman", "Saans" and "Siski". "Besides Buniyaad, I loved Farmaan."

He said that he was happy that people were watching Buniyaad again with great

interest and youngsters were getting an idea of what people went through during the Partition. "When I was acting in Buniyaad, all we knew was that Ramesh Sippy was a star director and Manohar Shyam Joshi was a star writer who had written Hum Log. It was later that we realised the classic status of the series." He said he remembered how well writer Krishna Sobti helped in the execution of the dialogues and

Student allegedly abused, parents' body wants action on school

The National Association for Parents and Students Rights (NAPSAR) has requested the State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (SCPCR) to take cognisance of the reported physical harassment and abuse of a nine year old student in a hostel of the private school located on Sahastardhara Road. In a letter to the SCPCR, the national president of the NAPSAR, Arif Khan said that in the shocking incident, a nine year old student, a resident of Noida was abused by the hostel

warden. The police have arrested the accused on the complaint and a case has been registered against him. Khan said that the school administration cannot claim to remain aloof to the heinous crime which occurred in its hostel. He said that the school administration should also be held accountable for the incident. Khan said that the parents association wants that an impartial inquiry should be held in the incident and action should be taken against all those responsible.

Court dismisses interim bail plea of AAP MLA Jarwal

New Delhi: A Delhi Court on Friday dismissed the interim bail plea of AAP legislator Prakash Jarwal, arrested in connection with a case of alleged suicide of a doctor in south Delhi in April, sought on account of the demise of his father-in-law who was suspected to be Covid-19 positive. Additional Sessions Judge Sanjeev Aggarwal said that the chances of the accused being released on interim bail, influencing the witnesses cannot be ruled out. The court said the body of Jarwal's father-in-law has already been handed over to the kin of the deceased for cremation today. It noted however, that the accused suspected his wife and infant son to be suffering from

Covid-19 and were under self-quarantine. In any case, in these peculiar circumstances, when the family of the accused is under the shadow of Covid-19 and is under quarantine and his father-in-law had also suspected to have died from Covid-19 and the fact that the investigations are still in progress, in these circumstances if the accused is released on interim bail, considering the dominant position of the accused, who is stated to be resident of the same locality as also the local MLA, therefore chances of the accused influencing the witnesses cannot be ruled out. Therefore, no ground for interim bail is made out at this stage. The application stands

dismissed, the judge said. Rajendra Singh, 52, allegedly committed suicide in Durga Vihar in south Delhi on April 18. In his suicide note, the doctor held Jarwal responsible for his death. The father-in-law of the accused had some breathing problem since last two days consequently he was admitted in hospital... He expired in LNJP hospital where he was under treatment. He was suspected with Covid-19 virus and his samples has been taken by LNJP hospital doctors, the bail application said. The plea, seeking interim bail for 45 days, further said that Jarwal's wife and son, 11-month old, were also residing with her father for last several days.

There is apprehension that the wife and the child of the accused are also suffering from Covid-19, the application said, adding that both of them are currently in quarantine. As per Hindu rites the presence of accused is must at time of cremation of his father-in-law, the plea said. The presence of the accused is must at his home to look after his 11 months old baby, his wife and his parents who are senior citizens... it added, seeking bail on humanitarian ground. The investigating officer opposed the contents of the bail application, stating that the accused was residing in a joint family having two brothers, who can look after his parents, as also his in-laws who were

also residing in the same locality. His brother-in-law can perform all the rights and rituals related to the death of his father-in-law, the police said, seeking dismissal of the application. The public prosecutor said that the allegations against the accused were serious in nature. The investigation is at a crucial stage and if granted the relief, the accused may likely to hamper the probe, the prosecution said. The court had on May 28 denied him bail, saying probe was at a crucial stage and that the accused was an influential person and could hamper the ongoing probe. According to police, like Jarwal, deceased Singh was

also involved in the business of water supply with the Delhi Jal Board since 2007. It alleged that the MLA and his associates were extorting money from other water-tanker owners, including the doctor. Jarwal, who represents the Deoli assembly constituency, was arrested on May 9, after a case of extortion and abetment to suicide was filed against him and others based on a police complaint by the doctor's son — Hemant. The FIR said Singh had been threatened and intimidated by Jarwal and others. "During investigation it was found that there was a big nexus between water-tanker owners and the accused person," the police had said in the remand application. **PTI**

1,320 new cases in Delhi, total 27K

Death toll climbs to 761

New Delhi: Delhi recorded 1,320 fresh coronavirus cases on Saturday, taking the COVID-19 tally in the city to over 27,500 while the death toll due to the disease mounted to 761, authorities said. The highest single-day spike in fresh cases -- 1,513 -- was recorded on June 3. In a bulletin issued on Saturday, the Delhi health department said the death toll from coronavirus infection has risen to 761 and the total number of cases mounted to 27,654. A total of 53 fatalities were reported on June 5, which took place between May 25 and June 5, the bulletin said, adding

that 20 of these deaths took place on June 3 and 19 on June 4. It, however, said the cumulative death figures refer to fatalities where the primary cause of death was found to be COVID-19, as per the report of the Death Audit Committee on the basis of case sheets received from various hospitals. On Friday, the total number of cases stood at 26,334 including 708 deaths. With fresh 1,320 cases, the total number of coronavirus cases in Delhi has climbed to 27,654.

18% restaurants may not restart post lockdown

New Delhi: Post Covid lockdown, it is estimated that 18 per cent single unit restaurants are likely to shut down between May and July and another 12-15 per cent of restaurants will be part of a second round of closure between September and December. A research report called 'Future of Food: Covid-19 Survival Plan' by Indian Federation of Culinary Associations and Tagtaste says that based on the analysis and

extrapolation of last available profit and loss statements and balance sheet, and subsequent interactions, an estimated 18% single-unit restaurants won't be able to restart their units. Chain-brands too run the risk of shutting down 12-15% of their restaurants by December 2020, it said. It estimates 18% of the outlets are likely to shut down between May and July. There will be a second round of closures in September-December, about 12-15% of the restaurants will be shutting down but the remainder will hold out and invent new ways of conducting their businesses. As per the report, in financial year 2019-20, the year that ended in March 2020, only 19% outlets

delivered an EBITDA of 10% or more, "half of our universe was negative". G'gram pvt hospitals to face action if patients refused treatment

Gurugram: The Gurugram district administration has warned private hospitals of strict action if they refused to admit or treat coronavirus-infected patients. "We will register FIRs against private hospitals if they refuse to admit or treat corona patients, especially pregnant women, in the district. We have issued notice in this regard," said

VS Kundu, Additional Chief Secretary, and Covid nodal officer. The district administration also announced helpline number 108 for ambulance service on Saturday. On Saturday, Gurugram reported 129 corona positive cases. Gurugram now has 1,692 corona cases, including 1,345 patients admitted in different hospitals.

The health officials claim that majority of the corona cases are from containment zones and possibly got infected from earlier infected patients. "We are in the process of contact tracing to reach out to every person who came in contact with corona-infected patients. Gurugram has 66 containment zones and all of

them are monitored through SDM-ranked officers," he said. "Earlier, the ambulance services are regulated through the Civil Hospital. Now, we have dedicated helpline number where anybody can call for ambulance. A separate call centre has set up in the Mini Secretariat here, which will be operational round

the clock with a dedicated team of 12 operators," said Ashok Sangwan, Divisional Commissioner. "Gurugram has 17 ambulances, of which four are used for ferrying corona patients. Besides, we have 4 donated ambulances which will be operational soon," said Gurugram District Magistrate Amit Khatri. **IANS**

Covid-19 cases cross 1000 mark in J'khand

PNS ■ RANCHI The count of Covid-19 cases in Jharkhand crossed 1000 mark on Saturday as nearly 100 fresh cases surfaced here — the highest single-day surge reported since the entry of the virus in State, health officials said. At least 34 fresh cases of Covid-19 infection were reported from Simdega, the highest among the 12 districts where cases surfaced on Saturday, officials from the National Health Mission (NHM) said. As many as 21 cases were reported from Ramgarh, 10 from Gumla, six from East Singhbhum and five from West

Singhbhum on Saturday. Besides, four cases surfaces in Ranchi and three each in Hazaribag and Latehar, health officials said. Cases were also reported from Saraikela, Palamu and Khunti. The number of Covid-19 cases in State have reached from 500 to 1000 in roughly a month, health officials said, citing the return of migrants as

the reason for the unprecedented increase in cases. At least 742 of the 1028 cases reported in Jharkhand so far are that of migrant workers, NHM officials said. As per the daily Covid-19 bulletin was not issued by the NHM on Saturday, at least 90 suspects had already tested positive for the virus by the time this report was filed. More than half of the 1028-odd people infected by COVID-19 virus so far in Jharkhand are in the age bracket of 11 to 30 years — a trend that highlights how young people were as prone to the virus as their older counterparts, health officials said. Out of the 1028 cases, 629 are in the age bracket of 11 to

30 years and 313 in the age bracket of 31 to 50 years, the NHM bulletin said. According to NHM, more than 70 per cent of the COVID-19 cases reported in Jharkhand are migrant workers. At least 5 lakh migrants have returned to Jharkhand since the lockdown was imposed across the country in March, health officials said. The Government has so far collected samples of 94,043 COVID-19 suspects from across the State, and more than 1000 of them have tested positive. At least 84,444 of the 94,000-odd samples collected have been tested so far, the NHM report said.

Deceased Delhi constable's test report +ve for Covid

STAFF REPORTER ■ NEW DELHI A 30-year-old Delhi Police constable's report came positive for the Covid-19 who died earlier this week at National Capital's Safdarjung Hospital. The constable, Rahul, was posted in northeast district and resided in Mandoli with his family. He was a native Aligarh in Uttar Pradesh. According to Ved Prakash Surya, the Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP), Northeast, Rahul was on medical leave since November 2019 and was undergoing treatment for lung infection for the last six months. Almost 85 per cent of

his lung was not functioning. According to a senior police officer, he was being treated at a hospital in south Delhi and was shifted to Safdarjung Hospital on Tuesday after his condition deteriorated. He died on Wednesday during treatment. Earlier three Delhi Police personnel died due to Covid-

19. A 31-year-old constable, Amit Kumar, posted at Bharat Nagar police station had died on May 6 due to Covid-19. Two Assistant Sub-Inspectors also died due to Covid-19 last week. While a 52-year-old ASI died around 11.30 am Sunday during treatment at the Army

Base Hospital here, another officer of the rank passed away at the same facility Saturday evening. According to police, around 500 personnel have tested positive for the deadly virus so far, of whom 200 have recovered. Vikram, who died Sunday morning, was posted in the Sultanpuri police station of Outer district and was on highway patrol duty in the area since May 1. Shesh Mani Pandey, 54, died on Saturday evening. He was ex-Army personnel and worked with the Finger Print Bureau (FPB) of the Crime Branch in Central Delhi's Kamla Market area.

Highest single-day surge of 355 fresh COVID-19 cases in Haryana

PNS ■ CHANDIGARH Yet again, Haryana on Saturday continued to battle a surge in infections with 355 new cases of novel corona virus, the highest in a day so far, raising the total of infected cases to 3,952. Of the 355 new cases reported, 129 are from Gurugram alone while Sonapat accounted for 89 cases, followed by 39 new cases in Faridabad. In the last 24 hours, 71 patients have recovered from

various hospitals of the State, a health bulletin said. The State has a recovery rate of 32.39 per cent, fatality rate at 0.61 per cent while tests per million being conducted are 5,589. The doubling rate in the State is six days. With 1,280 people cured and discharged from the hospitals, there are 2,648 active COVID-19 cases in Haryana now. Gurugram reported 129 new cases of the deadly disease, taking the total in the district to 1692. Faridabad reported 39

new cases, taking the total in the district to 620. Sonapat reported 89 new cases, taking tally to 350. Ambala reported four new Covid cases, taking tally to 80. Palwal reported 19 more cases, taking total to 119. Five more cases were reported in Panipat, taking total to 72. Jind reported three more cases, taking the tally to 38. 10 more cases reported in Karnal, taking total to 91. Yamunanagar reported 10 more cases, taking the total to 19. One new case reported in Sirsa, taking count to 51.

Covid-19 patients to pay ₹35K/day in pvt hosp in Ranchi

PNS ■ RANCHI Covid-19 infected patients will have to spend up to Rs.35,000 a day for treatment in private hospitals across Jharkhand, and shell out more money if they have a comorbid condition or require administration of high-end drugs, the umbrella body for private hospitals in the State has decided. The decision comes in the backdrop of reports highlighting exorbitant fee charged by some private hospitals here from patients infected by the deadly virus, president of the Association of Healthcare Providers India

(AHPI), Jogesh Gambhir said. "We have finalised four categories for Covid-19 patients undergoing treatment in private hospitals. The charges will vary from Rs.15,000 per day to Rs.35,000 per day depending on the category," said Gambhir. The fee structure is indicative, and may vary from city to city, said Gambhir, adding that the charges may be lower in smaller towns of Jharkhand. "The daily fee, however, will not exceed Rs 35,000 unless the patient is also treated for a comorbid condition or administered high-end drugs like Immunoglobulin and Tocilizumab," he said. As per the chart fixed by

the AHPI, a Covid-19 patient admitted in an isolation ward will have to pay Rs.15,000 a day. A patient, who is provided oxygen support, will be charged Rs.20,000. A patient admitted in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) will have to pay Rs.25,000 for each day of treatment, and a patient put on ventilator will be charged Rs.35,000 daily. There are around 500 private hospitals in State. The development comes a day after the Supreme Court asked the Centre whether a direction could be passed to cap the cost of treating Covid-19 patients in private hospitals. The apex court also asked if a certain percentage of those

who contracted the disease could be treated for free. On Thursday, a 45-year-old Covid-19-infected man died during treatment for a head injury in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) of RIMS. In less than 24 hours since his death, another 70-year-old Covid-19-infected man from Simdega died at RIMS during treatment for a kidney ailment on Friday. Both the patients were admitted in RIMS after being discharged from Bhagwan Mahavir Medica Superspecialty Hospital, health officials said. The health department served a show-cause notice to the private hospital in connection with the two cases.

Punjab CM constitutes panel to crackdown on illicit liquor trade

PNS ■ CHANDIGARH Punjab Chief Minister Capt Amarinder Singh on Saturday tightened the noose on illicit liquor traders in the state with the constitution of an excise reforms group to break the "nexus" between producers, wholesalers and retailers. The announcement comes a day after the chief minister had announced the setting up of a Special Investigating Team (SIT) to probe illicit liquor trade in the state. The five-member panel has been asked to submit its recommendations on "destroying any such nexus within 60 days", thus paving the way for elimination of illicit liquor trade and maximisation of the state's excise revenue, said an official spokesperson. The group shall comprise Housing and Urban Development Minister Sukhbinder Singh Sarkaria and Public Works Minister Vijay Inder Singla, retired IAS Officer D S Kalha, Advisor Financial Resources V K Garg and

Secretary School Education Krishan Kumar. Working in tandem with the SIT, which has been tasked with investigation into all aspects of illicit liquor trade in the state, including complicity of excise department officials, the group will identify the gaps leading to revenue losses for the state due to such complicity. The chief minister has mandated the group to come up with suggestions on long-term legal and administrative reforms, after due diligence and consultations with the stakeholders. In this process, the group may consider the suggestions/reports received earlier from the finance minister on his visit to West Bengal and also from the previous local government minister. The spokesperson further said that the department of excise and taxation would provide requisite information and other assistance to the group to facilitate its functioning. The chief minister has recently pointed out that despite various policy changes

In its affidavit, the Centre has said that States and the Railways have been providing food and water free of cost to the labourers travelling back to their native places. "Till 1st June, Railways has served 1.63 crore meals and over 2.10 crore packaged drinking water bottles, apart from services provided by respective State Governments," the affidavit read.

Rahul accuses Modi Govt of ruining country's economy

Continuing with his tirade against the Modi dispensation, Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Saturday accused the Government of actively destroying the country's economy by refusing to provide cash support to people and small and medium enterprises as he termed the Modi regime "Demon 2.0".

Sharing a news report on Twitter on the impact the coronavirus pandemic would have on the economy and the state of affairs of the MSME sector in the country, he called for an immediate provision of ₹10,000 to the poor and an economic stimulus package for the MSME industry to come out of the current situation. "Government is actively



destroying our economy by refusing to give cash support to people and MSMEs. This is Demon 2.0," he tweeted. The Congress has also been demanding an economic stimulus package for the MSME sector, which provides employment to a large number of people, together with cash in the hands of people, to help generate demand.

Rahul had earlier said that it was criminal on the part of the Government not to provide cash to people and the industry to emerge out of this crisis. He had termed the lockdown imposed by the Government to contain the spread of virus as one that "failed" in achieving its aim and purpose.

ITBP throws open its hospitals' gates for its veterans suffering from corona

The Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP), that secures the frontier with China, has thrown open the gates of its countrywide health centres and hospitals for its veterans suffering from Covid-19, paramilitary chief SS Deswal said on Saturday.

Deswal has issued an official message to all his troops and formations saying the decision has been taken after the force came across media reports of people facing problems in getting admission or treatment at designated hospitals for the management of pandemic.

"We have come across news items that citizens are facing problems in hospital admissions and treatment or they are charged exorbitantly," the DG said in his message.

"Our Himveers (mountain warriors) have sweated throughout their life. We do not want that they suffer and hence all our veterans are being offered health services in case anyone of you are affected by COVID-19," he said.

He further said that all hospitals of the force throughout the country will admit veterans with coronavirus infection and treat them.

The ITBP has about 20,000 retired and dependent personnel.

The ITBP runs a super specialty Referral hospital for the Central Armed Police Forces (CAPFs) or paramilitary forces in Greater Noida, has two base hospitals at Tigris in Delhi and Kimin in Arunachal Pradesh and composite hospitals at



Dehradun and Chandigarh apart from health centres at its every base in the country.

The DG, further in his message, said the COVID-19 situation is "under control" in the force as protocols were strictly followed by field units.

"Everyone of you have contributed in this tense period. We are grateful and proud of our doctors and paramedical staff who have sincerely and with utmost dedication treated our troops and policemen from all forces working in the national Capital region," the DG said.

According to latest data, the ITBP has 211 Covid-19 positive cases out of which 177 personnel have recovered and only 34 are undergoing treatment. One personnel has succumbed to the pandemic.

ITBP also reported three fresh cases of coronavirus infection on Saturday.

The ITBP was the first organisation in the country to have created a 1,000-bed quarantine centre for Covid-hit people.

The centre in Chhawla area of south-west Delhi has treated about 1,200 people including 42 foreigners who were brought to India on special evacuation flights from Wuhan in China and Italy after the Covid-19 outbreak earlier this year.

The facility is still operational and is taking care of those ITBP troops who are joining back work after easing of restrictions imposed during the countrywide lockdown.

It also created the first standard operating procedures (SOP) for management of the pandemic among the various Central paramilitary forces and Central police organisations.

The about 90,000 personnel-strong force is primarily tasked with guarding the 3,488 km-long Line of Actual Control with China and a good number of its troops along with Army personnel are at present engaged in the stand-off with the People's Liberation Army of the neighbouring country in the Ladakh area.

Air India books over 22K seats in just 15 hrs

A day after Air India opened booking for select destinations in the USA, Canada, the UK and Europe under the phase three of Vande Bharat mission, Air India (AI) on Saturday said that it has sold over 22,000 seats in 15 hours of opening bookings under Vande Bharat Mission-III. AI also informed that more seats to new destinations will be added in due course under the mission.

"Sale of tickets commenced at 5 p.m. Friday for select destinations in the USA, Canada, United Kingdom & Europe under Phase-3 of #VBM. Our website saw exceptionally high traffic without 60 million hits at peak & over 22,000 seats have been sold overall till 8 a.m. now in a transparent manner. Heavy rush however slowed the website at times. More seats to more destinations will be added in due course," the AI tweeted.

The maximum demand is for flights to the US, with connection to San Francisco and Chicago being the most sought after there. As per schedule, AI will be operating 75 flights from India to select destinations in USA and Canada from June 9 to June 30.

People faced a difficult time due to huge demand as tickets are being sold on only AI channels. Passengers wonder why did AI not sell its inventory through online travel agents.

Several Twitter users then pointed out that the Air India website was down and the ticket purchase was not going through.

AI will operate 300 flights to North America, Canada and Europe from June 9 to June 30, 2020 under the third phase of Vande Bharat Mission.

AI has in Phase I operated 64 flights and evacuated 12,708 Indians.

In phase 2, till date 290 flights and 52,113 Indians have been brought home.

ED employees, including a spl director rank officer, test coronavirus positive

Five Enforcement Directorate (ED) employees, including a special director rank officer, have tested positive for Covid-19, following which the headquarters of the Central anti-money laundering agency has been sealed for 48 hours till Monday.

Out of the five infected personnel, two persons are contract employees. The employees were found infected after the ED carried out section-wise testing at its headquarters in the wake of some Covid-19 cases being reported from other floors of the Lok Nayak Bhawan in the upscale Khan Market area here, where the agency office is located, the officials said on Saturday.

All the ED employees who were found infected with the

pandemic after "proactive testing" are asymptomatic, officials said.

The employees who have tested positive include a special director rank officer and an investigating officer. All of them have been admitted to isolation facilities at a designated hospital for treatment.

After detailed contact tracing, people who came in contact with the infected personnel have been quarantined.

As per procedure, the headquarters of the agency have been sealed for 48 hours and are expected to resume operations on Monday, the officials said.

The affected employees have not been coming to office since they tested positive, they said.

In order to check the spread of the viral infection, a

protocol has been put in place for sanitising the ED headquarters twice a week and all documents. "Daak" (post) is sanitised before it is handed over to officers and other staff of the agency, they added.

An ED employee had tested positive for Covid-19 in May also.

The ED is the federal agency mandated to probe money laundering, black money and hawala crimes under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) and the Foreign Exchange Management Act (FEMA).

Earlier, headquarters of the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) and Border Security Force (BSF) located at the CGO Complex here were sealed after detection of Covid positive cases in the respective Forces' ranks.

Min dispels notion about barrier-free trade in farm sector

After the Punjab Chief Minister Amarinder Singh Government targeting the Centre over an ordinance which allows barrier-free trade in the farm sector, Union Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar on Saturday asserted that the ordinance would not violate the spirit of federal structure in any way. The Union Minister also slammed people who create "illusions" over the minimum support price (MSP) for food-grain and said the assured price to farmers would continue.

The Union Minister's statement came a day after Punjab Chief Minister Amarinder Singh dubbed the ordinance as "violation" of the federal structure. The Chief Minister had also warned that it could pave the way for disbanding the MSP regime as well as the foodgrain procurement regime, triggering unrest among the state's farmers.

The Centre on Friday notified two key ordinances to kick in agriculture reforms and help farmers trade freely and fetch better prices.

The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion & Facilitation) Ordinance 2020 allows barrier-free trade in agriculture produce outside the notified APMC (Agriculture Produce Marketing Committees) mandis.

It proposes to bar state governments from imposing taxes on sale and purchase of farm produce undertaken outside the mandis and give farmers the freedom to sell their produce at remunerative prices.

Whereas the Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Ordinance 2020 empowers farmers to engage with processors, aggregators, wholesalers, large retailers and exporters through advanced agreements on pre-agreed prices.

NIA arrests one in Naval spy case

The NIA on Saturday arrested an accused terror funding conspirator in the infamous Visakhapatnam espionage case in which 11 Indian Navy personnel allegedly leaked sensitive information to Pakistan's spy agency, Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI).

Abdul Rehman Abdul Jabbar Sheikh, 53, a resident of Mumbai, was involved in the terror funding along with his arrested wife Shaista Qaiser and others, an official spokesman said.

During the search of his house, a number of digital devices and incriminating documents were seized by the National Investigation Agency (NIA) which took over the case in December last year, he said.

The Indian intelligence agencies had busted the espionage racket linked to Pakistan in December last year.

The NIA arrested Mohammed Haroon Haji Abdul Rehman Lakdawala, a resident of Mumbai, last month. A probe found that he was one of the "key conspirators" in the case.

With the arrest of Sheikh, as many as 15 accused have so far been arrested, including the 11 Navy personnel, Pakistan-born Indian national Qaiser and her associates.

ISI recruits agents in India for collecting sensitive and classified information regarding locations and movements of Indian naval ships and submarines, and other defence establishments along with their deployment pattern.

"Investigation revealed that a few Navy personnel came in contact with Pakistani nationals through various social media platforms such as Facebook and WhatsApp, and were involved in sharing classified information in lieu of monetary gains.

The money was deposited into the bank accounts of the Navy personnel through Indian associates having business interests in Pakistan," the NIA had said in a statement last month.



WHO favours wider use of face masks

Days after maintaining that there was not enough evidence to suggest that healthy individuals should wear masks and encouraged the use of medical face masks only by those who were sick or caring for the sick, the World Health Organisation on Friday did a U-turn by recommending wider use of face masks.

The guidelines issued by the WHO on Friday said that people aged 60 years and above, and those with underlying conditions are recommended to wear a face mask in situations where physical distancing is not possible.

The new guidelines also advise use of medical masks for all people who are working in clinical areas of health facilities in areas with the widespread transmission, and not

round on the cardiology or palliative care units where there are no confirmed Covid-19 patients, they should still wear a medical mask," WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said at a virtual press conference.

For people who are in areas of widespread transmission, "In light of evolving evi-

dence, WHO advises that Governments should encourage the general public to wear masks where there is widespread transmission and physical distancing is difficult," Tedros said while introducing the new guidance.

Based on new research and evidence, the WHO also advises that fabric masks should consist of at least three layers of different materials.

At the same time, WHO also warned that masks are not a replacement for social distancing, hand and respiratory hygiene - and all measures should be strictly followed to keep the risk of Covid-19 transmission at bay.

The cornerstone of the response in every country must be to find, isolate, test and care for every case, and to trace and quarantine every contact," Tedros stressed.

Bee biz may be on track with easing curbs

Stung by the Coronavirus pandemic-triggered restrictions, quarantine requirements and border closures, beekeepers are now, as the lockdown eases gradually, exploring ways on how to move their bee boxes from one place to another across the country.

While the tough regulations have already disrupted their earnings particularly of those engaged in exports, it also suggests that their bees could not be fed as usual on seasonal flowers, neither will they pollinate this summer, warn experts.

Gopinathan Maheswaran, scientist with Birds section of Zoological Survey of India (ZSI) said that the Covid-19 lockdown presented a peculiar problem for the beekeepers and the bees. "As countries went into extended lockdowns, movement of non-

essential vehicles also came to a standstill. In India, the restrictions made it difficult for the farmers to move the huge number of beehive boxes from one State to another or even within the States. As a result, the bees are starving to death."

He explained that during the summer months between February and July, farmers, especially in Northern India, go from one state to the other with their bee boxes to feed the bees (Apis indica) on seasonal flowers of mango and litchi trees.

"Bees feed on the flower honey for nutrition and farmers sell the honey the insects store in their hives. The bees also help pollinate the mango and litchi trees, thereby increasing the production of these two cash fruit crops, and also a variety of other plants," he said in a report published in Nature India recently.

In India, there are more than 9,698 government-registered entities - individuals, societies, firms, companies and a few self-help groups who are engaged in beekeeping. A whopping 15, 59, 771 registered bee colonies are spread across various states in the country. Rakesh Kumar, chief consultant with Lucknow-based Golden Hive Products talked about challenges faced by those selling their products in local market as abroad. "With all their movements' restricted inter-state and intra-state, many aparies were trapped in areas which had nothing to offer to the bees. Many aparies were left with none to care for them for an extended period of time. Though bee keeping was under essential services, it was not easy for the farmers to take up the risk in view of mandatory quarantine period and scare spread all across the country.

As a result, the strength of the bees depleted. Lots of beekeepers were unable to migrate their aparies to different regions as per their planned movement calendar and lost on honey production. The inability to do anything in the face of looming crisis was indeed stressful."

Satinder Singh, a small time beekeeper from Punjab too said that they could not travel across State lines to move the hives around and feed them. "As the temperature increases, we have to shift the bee boxes to the shade" otherwise they will die from the heat, he said. Rakesh Kumar pointed out that even though lockdown has eased, seven days compulsory quarantine period cross-border will add up to the input cost, even as natives of the respective states are also not keen welcoming the outsiders, unlike earlier, fearing Covid-19 spread.

Employment for migrants should be top priority for ruling NDA: Chirag

Lok Janshakti Party president L Chirag Paswan on Saturday said that employment for migrants, who have returned to Bihar from across the country, should be the top priority for the ruling NDA as it prepares for the State Assembly polls.

With some of his comments seen to be critical of Chief Minister Nitish Kumar-led Government, Paswan said he never doubted Kumar's intentions but there have been "shortcomings" which he as an honest ally has highlighted.

"Nitish ji emerged as an

alternative to jungle raaj and was known as 'vikas purush'. But, yes, there have been shortcomings. I am not levelling allegations but offering suggestions for improvement as an honest ally," he told PTI.

Paswan said the Bihar government's handling of the migrant crisis, triggered by the nationwide lockdown to curb COVID-19, "could have been better" and counted law and order as a concern, saying serious crimes like murder and robbery have been rising.

The Lok Sabha MP from Jamui in Bihar called for a common minimum programme to

guide the NDA government in case it retains power.

The assembly elections in Bihar are due in October-November.

Employment, especially for its migrant population, health and education should be the top priorities for the NDA, Paswan said.

Asserting that the opposition alliance, which includes the RJD and Congress, is not in a position to pose any serious challenge to the BJP-led National Democratic Alliance, he said the saffron combine may win more than 225 of the state's 243 assembly seats.

Electioneering amidst coronavirus crisis is nothing but 'political vulturism': Tejashwi

A day ahead of Amit Shah's virtual rally to sound BJP's poll bugle in Bihar, RJD leader Tejashwi Yadav on Saturday said electioneering amidst the coronavirus crisis in the country is nothing but "political vulturism", and alleged that the saffron party was only interested in electoral victory even at the cost of human lives.

The Leader of Opposition in the Bihar Assembly also accused the Nitish Kumar-led NDA government of mulling out "step-motherly" treatment to migrant labourers and asserted that this would be a

major issue in the Assembly polls slated for later this year.

In an interview to PTI, Yadav said he is hopeful that all like-minded parties who are driven by the same ideology of pro-constitutional supremacy and pro-poor would come under one umbrella and fight the "divisive and a failed government of 15 years" in the State.

He also dismissed reports of cracks in the opposition

alliance, saying that having "contrarian views" is healthy for any democracy.

His remarks come a day before the Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) is set to observe "Garib Adhikar Diwas" that was announced to counter

Shah's rally on June 7 in which the Home Minister will address the people of the State through video conferencing and Facebook live, given the COVID-19 guidelines and restrictions.

The BJP will sound the poll bugle in Bihar with the virtual rally by the Union Minister and party's senior leader Shah.

Protesters support Black Lives Matter on 3 continents

Berlin: Thousands of people rallied in Australia and Europe to honour George Floyd and to voice support on Saturday for what is becoming an international Black Lives Matter movement, as a worldwide wave of solidarity with protests over the death of a black man in Minneapolis highlights racial discrimination outside the United States.

Demonstrators in Paris tried to gather in front of the U.S. Embassy in Paris, defying restrictions imposed by authorities because of the coronavirus pandemic. They were met by riot police who turned people on their way to the embassy, which French security forces sealed off behind an imposing ring of metal barriers and road blocks.

"You can fine me 10,000 or 20,000 times, the revolt will happen anyway," Egoantchi Behanzin, a founder of the Black African Defense League, told officers who stopped him to check his ID documents before he got close to the diplomatic building. "It is because of you that we are here."

Pamela Carper, who joined an afternoon protest at London's Parliament Square that headed towards the U.K. Home Office, which oversees the country's police, said she was demonstrating to show "solidarity for the people of America who have suffered

for too long."

The British government urged people not to gather in large numbers and police have warned that mass demonstrations could be unlawful. In England, for example, gatherings of more than six people are not permitted.

Carper said the coronavirus had "no relevance" to her attendance and noted that she had a mask on.

"I am showing the government that I am heeding to

their rules and everybody is staying away," Carper said. "But I need to be here because the government is the problem. The government needs to change." In Sydney, protesters won a last-minute appeal against a Friday ruling declaring their rally unauthorised. The New South Wales Court of Appeal gave the green light just 12 minutes before the rally was scheduled to start, meaning those taking part could not be arrested.

Up to 1,000 protesters had already gathered in the Town Hall area of downtown Sydney ahead of the decision. Floyd, a black man, died in handcuffs on May 25 while a Minneapolis police officer pressed a knee on his neck even after he pleaded for air and stopped moving.

His death has struck a chord with minorities protesting discrimination elsewhere, including deaths of indigenous Australians in custody. AP

Minneapolis, California move to end police neck restraints

The Minneapolis City Council on Friday voted to end use of chokeholds and neck restraints like that used by a white police officer who pressed his knee into the neck of unarmed black man George Floyd on May 25, sparking coast-to-coast protests.

In California, Governor Gavin Newsom said he would end state police training in carotid restraints similar to the technique used on Floyd by former Minneapolis officer Derek Chauvin while three officers stood by and watched as Floyd died after pleading for his life.

The Minneapolis police fired all four officers, and they have been charged with murder. The incident has communities across the United States reconsidering use of such restraints.

The Minneapolis decision came in response to a Minnesota state human rights complaint against the city. In a proposed court order that must be approved by a judge, the Minneapolis City Council said it would ban all chokeholds and

neck holds, and require any member of the police department to immediately report any unauthorized use of force by an officer.

"Black, Indigenous, and communities of color have suffered generational pain and trauma as a result of systemic and institutional racism and long-standing problems in policing," said the proposed order which the council approved unanimously.

San Diego County in California this week also banned the carotid restraint, in which an officer blocks the flow of blood to a detainee's brain, leading to unconsciousness.

Newsom said he supports legislation to ban use of the technique in local police departments throughout California.

"At the end of the day the carotid hold is literally designed to stop people's blood from flowing into their brain," Newsom said. "That has no place any longer."

Many police departments have ended the use of so-called chokeholds, which put pressure on a detainee's windpipe, but have still allowed carotid restraints.

2 Buffalo police officers charged with assault

Buffalo (US): Two Buffalo police officers were charged with assault Saturday, prosecutors said, after a video showed them shoving a 75-year-old protester in recent demonstrations over the death of George Floyd in Minnesota.

Both pleaded not guilty to second-degree assault. They were released without bail.

The officers had been suspended without pay Friday after a TV crew captured the confrontation the night before near the end of protests.

The footage shows a man identified as Martin Gugino

approaching a line of helmeted officers holding batons as they clear demonstrators from Niagara Square around the time of an 8 p.m. Curfew.

Two officers push Gugino backward, and he hits his head on the pavement. Blood spills as officers walk past. One officer leans down to check on the injured man before another officer urges the colleague to keep walking.

Dozens of police officers stepped down from the department's crowd control unit Friday, in response to their fellow officers' suspensions. AP

4 soldiers killed in helicopter crash in Indonesia

Semarang: An Indonesian army helicopter crashed on the main island of Java on Saturday, killing four of the nine people on board, officials said.

The Russian-made MI17 helicopter was carrying nine soldiers on a training mission when it went down and burst into flames in Central Java province's Kendal district about an hour after taking off from the provincial capital, Semarang, said army spokesman Brig. Gen. Nefra Firdaus.

In addition to the four who were killed, five others were hospitalized with serious injuries after managing to escape the wreckage, Firdaus said in a statement.

The cause of the crash was not immediately known.

"The helicopter was flying very low and getting lower



until it crashed with a very loud sound," Eka, a witness, was quoted as saying by Kompas TV. "Two passengers escaped before it crashed, and after that there were three or four explosions." Indonesia, a sprawling archipelago nation of about 270 million people, has been plagued by transportation accidents in recent years, including plane crashes and ferry sinkings.

The military, which suffers from low funding, has also regularly suffered airplane and helicopter crashes. AP

Taiwanese oust pro-China mayor who sought presidency

Taipei (Taiwan): Voters in the Taiwanese port city of Kaohsiung on Saturday ousted their mayor, whose failed bid for the presidency on behalf of the China-friendly Nationalist Party earlier this year brought widespread disapproval among residents.

The number of votes to recall Han Kuo-yu far exceeded the 574,996 needed to remove him. Han accepted the result in a statement to supporters and media after the threshold was passed.

But he blamed the media in part for the result, saying he had been subjected to "constant smears, rumours and attacks." He has one week to leave office, unless he decides to appeal.

The success of the recall vote — Taiwan's first — was hailed by commentators as the latest sign of politicians being held accountable in the island's robust democracy.

It is also a further blow to the Nationalists, who moved

their government to the island after Mao Zedong's Communists swept to power in mainland China in 1949.

The party's continued association with China's demand for eventual unification between the sides has continuously hurt it at the polls, but a failure to generate popular candidates has also resulted in recent major defeats.

The measure to remove Han needed the support of 25 per cent of the city's more than 2 million eligible voters. Just over 22,000 voted to oppose his recall. Han won a surprise victory in 2018 in what had long been a stronghold of the ruling Democratic Progressive Party, which rejects China's demand that it recognize Taiwan as a part of China.

His decision to take a leave of absence to seek the presidency just months after taking office drew heavy criticism and a petition campaign was launched to seek his recall. Han was blasted for his

contacts with China's ruling Communist Party and lost in January's presidential election to DPP incumbent Tsai Ing-wen by a whopping 57% to 38%, with a third-party candidate taking the remaining percentage. Strong Taiwanese disapproval of the heavy crackdown on pro-democracy protesters in the semi-autonomous Chinese territory of Hong Kong and questions about how Han had acquired expensive properties on his modest civil servant's salary also helped Tsai to the landslide win.

China has shunned Tsai since shortly after her 2016 inauguration, shutting the already diplomatically isolated island out of international forums and stepping up its threat to conquer the island by military force. She has, however, received strong support from the Trump administration amid sharply deteriorating relations between Beijing and Washington. AP

Separate attacks kill 14 Afghan forces in Kabul, northeast

Two separate militant attacks killed 14 Afghan security personnel on Saturday in the northeastern Badakhshan province and the capital of Kabul, officials said.

A roadside bomb killed 11 security force members in Badakhshan when it tore through a security vehicle responding to attacks on checkpoints in Khash district.

Sanaullah Rohani, spokesman for Badakhshan's provincial police chief, said a local commander was among the dead, and that four militants were killed in the fighting.

An hour-long gunbattle also erupted in Kabul's Gul Dara district when insurgents attacked a police checkpoint, killing three police officers, said Interior Ministry spokesman Tariq Arian.

Both Afghan officials said

the Taliban had carried out the attacks, although no one immediately claimed responsibility. The Taliban on Saturday claimed an attack a day earlier that killed 10 policemen in the southern Zabul province. Afghan government officials said the Taliban ambushed an Afghan police convoy on Friday after setting off a roadside bomb.

US forces had carried out two sets of airstrikes Friday against the Taliban in western and southern Afghanistan. These were the first U.S. Strikes following a brief cease-fire declared by the insurgents for a major Muslim holiday last month.

Since the signing of a US-Taliban peace agreement at the end of February, U.S. Forces have only once before announced a strike against the Taliban, in defense of Afghan forces. AP

Clashes, tear gas in Beirut as protests turn to riots

Beirut: Lebanese riot police fired tear gas at protesters in central Beirut on Saturday, after a planned anti-government demonstration quickly degenerated into rioting and stone-throwing confrontations between opposing camps.

A few thousand demonstrators had gathered in Martyrs Square hoping to reboot nationwide protests that began late last year amid an unprecedented economic and financial crisis. But tensions and divisions among protesters over the goals of the demonstration quickly became apparent as groups of protesters faced off, with the army standing between them. Scattered groups of protesters arrived in the capital's downtown area, only some of them wearing masks and face shields to protect against the spread of the coronavirus, in response to calls for a centralised protest to press for demands. AP

COVID-19 OUTBREAK

Around the Globe

Jakarta: Indonesia reported nearly 1,000 new cases of the coronavirus on Saturday, a new single-day high for the country that brought its total caseload past 30,000, as the government unveiled an enhanced stimulus package worth \$47.6 billion to anchor the virus-battered economy.

Moscow: Russia reported its second-highest one-day death toll from COVID-19 even as the number of new coronavirus infections remained steady.

Washington: Researchers have found that the drug hydroxychloroquine — with or without the antibiotic azithromycin — did not reduce the risk of ventilation or death, and was associated with longer length of hospital stay in COVID-19 patients. The analysis, published in the journal Med, is the first in the US to report data on hydroxychloroquine (HCQ) outcomes for COVID-19 from a nationwide integrated health system.

Kathmandu: Nepal's COVID-19 cases crossed 3,000 on Saturday after a record 323 new infections were detected across the country, while the death toll due to the coronavirus has gone up to 13, according to the health ministry.

New York: The New York State, which has been the epicentre of the COVID-19 pandemic in the US, has recorded the lowest number of 42 deaths and 2,728 hospitalisations since the pandemic began, Governor Andrew Cuomo has said.

China accords highest level of protection to pangolins

Beijing: China has upgraded the protection of the pangolin, believed to be the intermediate host of the coronavirus, to that of the first-class protected animals on par with the endangered species like giant pandas.

Pangolin meat is viewed as a delicacy in China and its scales are commonly used in traditional Chinese medicines to promote lactation and cure impotence resulting in the massive poaching of the mammal.

The pangolin is also believed to be the world's most trafficked mammal. About one million pangolins are estimated

to have been poached in the last decade, and 20 tonnes of pangolins and their parts are trafficked internationally every year, according to the wildlife trade monitoring network TRAFFIC.

After initially suspecting the snake and the bat for the COVID-19, Chinese scientists believe that the pangolin may be an intermediate host of the novel coronavirus to humans.

The contagion, which has turned into a pandemic resulting in the worst global health crisis, was believed to have been spread from Huanan

seafood wholesale market in Wuhan, the virus' first epicentre which was subsequently closed.

This weekend, China announced to upgrade all species of the pangolin from second-class to first-class protected animals considering their rapidly decreasing numbers due to overhunting and habitat destruction, state-run Global Times reported on Saturday.

Other first-class protected animals include giant pandas, Tibetan antelopes and red-crowned cranes. PTI

Most of 51 new S Korea cases linked to door sales

Seoul: South Korea reported 51 new cases of the coronavirus on Saturday, mostly in the densely populated capital region, as authorities scramble to stem transmissions among low-income workers who can't afford to stay home.

As of Saturday afternoon, at least 42 of the new cases were linked to door-to-door sellers hired by Richway, a Seoul-based health product provider.

Vice Health Minister Kim Gang-lip said the spread of the virus among Richway sellers was particularly alarming as most of them are in their 60s and 70s. He called for officials to strengthen their efforts to find and examine workplaces vulnerable to infections.



At least 130 infections have also been linked to a massive warehouse operated by Coupang, a local e-commerce giant, which has been accused of failing to properly implement preventive measures and having employees work even when sick.

South Korea has now confirmed 11,719 cases, including 273 deaths.

The country was reporting around 500 new cases per day in early March due to a massive outbreak surrounding the southern city of Daegu, before officials managed to stabilize

the situation with aggressive tracking and testing.

But the recent resurgence of COVID-19 in the greater capital area, where about half of South Korea's 51 million people live, is now threatening to erase some of the country's hard-won gains. It has also led to second-guessing whether officials were too quick to ease social distancing and reopen schools.

Health authorities and hospital officials on Friday participated in a table-top exercise for sharing hospital capacities between Seoul and nearby cities and ensure swift transports of patients so that a spike of cases in one area doesn't overwhelm its hospital system. AP

Sri Lanka to reopen for foreign tourists from Aug

Colombo: Sri Lanka is set to welcome back foreign tourists from August under strict measures to boost the tourism sector that has been crippled by the coronavirus pandemic, authorities said on Saturday. Sri Lanka announced lockdown in mid-March to contain the spread of the coronavirus.

The severest impact was recorded in the tourism sector, with a drop of tourist arrivals by over 70 per cent year-on-year in March.

According to new guidelines, all travellers will be issued a visa valid for 30 days and extendable up to six

months. "Further relaxation of long stay guests is currently under consideration, enabling tourist to be granted five-year multiple-entry visas with a maximum six-month stay," Sri Lanka Tourism Development Authority said.

On COVID-19 measures, the authority said there won't be mandatory quarantine upon arrival unless symptoms are detected.

All travellers would be subjected to PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction) tests at the airport. The PCR tests reports are to be released in 4-6 hours. PTI

Wear masks in public: WHO's new advice

Geneva, Switzerland: The World Health Organization Friday changed its advice on face masks amid the coronavirus pandemic, saying they should be worn in places where the virus is widespread and physical distancing is difficult.

The use of masks has been a hot topic ever since the pandemic first emerged in China in December. "In light of evolving evidence, WHO advises that governments should encourage the general public to wear masks where there is widespread transmission and physical distancing is difficult," said WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus. In areas with community-

level virus transmission, "we advise that people aged 60 years or over, or those with underlying conditions, should wear a medical mask in situations where physical distancing is not possible," he added.

But the UN health agency stressed that facemasks alone "will not protect you from COVID-19" — and people suffering with the virus should not be out in public if they can avoid it.

The WHO maintained its recommendation that people who are sick with COVID-19 symptoms should stay at home and if it is absolutely necessary for them or their contacts to leave home, they should wear

a medical mask.

As before, those caring for an infected person at home should wear a medical mask when in the same room; and health workers should wear medical masks plus protective equipment when dealing with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 patients.

But in an update affecting healthcare workers, the WHO now recommends that in areas with widespread virus transmission, all people working in clinical sections of a health facility should wear medical masks — not just those dealing with patients with COVID-19.

The WHO also issued new guidance on the composition of

non-medical fabric masks for the general public, advising that they should consist of at least three layers of different material. The inner layer should be made of a water-absorbent material such as cotton, the middle layer — which acts as a filter — from a material like non-woven polypropylene, while the outer layer should be a water-resistant material such as polyester.

The WHO's emergencies director Michael Ryan stressed that putting on a fabric mask is primarily about preventing the wearer from possibly infecting others, rather than self-protection. "It's an altruistic act," he said. And Tedros stressed that

masks were only one part of an effective strategy to suppress the virus — and should not lure people into a false sense of security. He said they were not a replacement for physical distancing and hand hygiene.

"Find, isolate, test and care for every case, and to trace and quarantine every contact. That is what we know works. That is every country's best defence against COVID-19."

The novel coronavirus has infected at least 6.7 million people and killed more than 390,000 since the outbreak first emerged in China last December, according to a tally from official sources compiled by AFP. AFP

₹285 cr fraud in 4 loan a/cs in Karnataka Bank

Private sector lender Karnataka Bank has reported to the RBI that it has been defrauded of over ₹285 crore consequent to loans gone bad to four entities including DHFL.

A total of ₹285.52 crore has been reported as fraud where in the bank was one of the consortium lenders during 2009 to 2014 to Dewan Housing Corporation Ltd (DHFL), Religare Finvest, Fedders Electric and Engineering Ltd and Leel Electricals Ltd, Karnataka Bank said in a regulatory filing on Friday.

The maximum is owed by DHFL at ₹180.13 crore, followed by Religare Finvest ₹43.44 crore, Fedders Electric ₹41.30 crore and Leel Electricals ₹20.65 crore.

"DHFL (defaulted entity)

dealing with us since 2014 had availed various credit facilities under consortium arrangement wherein, we were one of the member banks. In view of Early Warning Signals (EWS) in the conduct of the account and other developments, the account was red flagged on November 11, 2019.

"The borrowing account was classified as Non-Performing Asset on October 30, 2019 and now, for misappropriation & criminal breach of trust & diversion of funds in the credit facilities extended earlier to the company, a fraud amounting ₹180.13 crore has been reported to RBI," Karnataka Bank said.

Likewise, Religare Finvest Ltd (RFL) was dealing with the bank since 2014, availing various credit facilities.

Following classification of this account as non-performing in October 2019 by a con-

sortium member, Karnataka Bank reported to RBI a fraud amounting to ₹43.44 crore in the credit facilities extended earlier, on account of diversion of funds.

Leel Electricals was classified as NPA account in March 2019 and it reported to RBI a fraud amounting to ₹20.65 crore in the credit facilities to the company on account of diversion of funds.

"In all the referred three non-performing accounts, necessary provisions have been made in full to be spread across four quarters," it said.

Fedders Electric and Engineering Limited was reported as NPA in July 2018 by a member bank in consortium, subsequent to which Karnataka Bank reported fraud of Rs 41.30 crore on account of fund diversion.

The account has already been fully provided for, it added.

India imposes anti-dumping duty on Malaysian calculators for 5 yrs

India has imposed anti-dumping duty on imports of electronic calculators from Malaysia for five years with a view to guard domestic players from cheap imports from that country.

After conducting a probe, the commerce ministry's investigation arm Directorate General of Trade Remedies (DGTR) had recommended anti-dumping duty on electronic calculators from Malaysia.

"The anti-dumping duty imposed (USD 0.92 per piece)...shall be effective for a period of five years (unless revoked, amended or superseded earlier)," the department of revenue has said in a notification.

In its findings of the probe, the DGTR had concluded that the product has been exported to India from Malaysia below its associated normal

DGTR had concluded that the product has been exported to India from Malaysia below its associated normal value

value, which is amounting to dumping and the domestic industry has suffered material injury due to the dumping. While DGTR recommends the duty, the finance ministry will take the final call to impose the same.

Ajanta LLP had filed the application for imposition of anti-dumping duty on imports from Malaysia.

Malaysia is a key trading partner of India in the Southeast Asian region. The bilateral trade between the countries increased to USD 17.25 billion in 2018-19 from USD 14.71 billion in 2017-18. In international trade parlance, dumping happens when a

country or a firm exports an item at a price lower than the price of that product in its domestic market.

Dumping impacts the price of that product in the importing country, hitting margins and profits of manufacturing firms.

According to global trade norms, a country is allowed to impose tariffs on such dumped products to provide a level-playing field to domestic manufacturers. The duty is imposed only after a thorough investigation by a quasi-judicial body, such as DGTR, in India.

The imposition of anti-dumping duty is permissible under the World Trade Organization (WTO) regime. India and Malaysia are members of this Geneva-based multi-lateral body. The duty is aimed at ensuring fair trading practices and creating a level-playing field for domestic producers vis-a-vis foreign producers and exporters.

COVID-19 Near-term outlook for FMCG sector 'extremely uncertain, says HUL'

The near-term outlook for "extremely uncertain" as the COVID-19 outbreak had a "terrible impact" and the situation remains volatile with the trajectory of the coronavirus undetermined, according to HUL.

While describing the current situation as "much more uncertain than normal", the FMCG major added that it is confident about its ability to manage the immediate crisis. "The situation remains volatile with the trajectory of the virus undetermined, evolving hot spot geographies, the success of containment measures uncertain, the severity and duration of resulting economic crisis and the extent of structural damage unknown," HUL Chairman and Managing Director Sanjiv Mehta said in his address to shareholders in the company's annual report for 2019-20.

"There are many unknowns today and hence, the near-term outlook is extremely uncertain," he added.

Though the coronavirus and containment efforts have resulted in supply and demand disruptions, leading to a sharper growth deceleration, Hindustan Unilever Ltd (HUL) is confident about medium to long-term growth prospects of the sector.

"Despite the near-term ambiguity, we remain confident of the medium to long-term growth prospects of the FMCG sector," HUL said, adding its strong portfolio of trusted brands and capable teams is built to survive times like these.

According to the company, despite being one of the fastest growing markets globally for FMCG products, the per capita FMCG consumption in India is still amongst the lowest in the world, giving the industry a long runway for growth. "The complexity and volatility continue to rise. In the last quarter of financial year 2019-20, we have seen an unprecedented global breakout of the COVID-19 pandemic leading to a humanitarian crisis, lockdown across many countries and a significant economic fallout," it said, adding, "In India, the economic impact of COVID-19 is trickling in on the backdrop of an already challenging macro-economic environment."

Mehta said various containment measures and the nationwide lockdown from March 25 caused disruptions across the company's value chain. "We continue to work closely with the government at different levels, prioritise key SKUs, make planning cycles more agile and create flexible alternatives.

This is helping us reboot our supply lines to a large extent," he added. Mehta said 2019-20 witnessed a challenging business environment with lower GDP growth and slow-down in consumption, which resulted in a weakening consumer sentiment and lower demand for the categories in which HUL operates.

For FY20, HUL's net profit was up 11.48 per cent at ₹6,756 crore, compared to ₹6,060 crore in the previous year. Sales stood at ₹39,136 crore, marginally up 1.44 per cent.

NITI Aayog CEO Kant Arogya Setu remains among top 10 downloaded apps globally in May

Arogya Setu, a Govt app developed for tracking COVID-19 patients, retained its position as one of the top 10 downloaded mobile apps in the world in May, NITI Aayog CEO Amitabh Kant said on Saturday. The Centre has made the app mandatory for government employees to bolster efforts to fight the COVID-

19 pandemic. "Arogya Setu one of the top 10 downloaded mobile apps globally since launch, second month in running. India has led the way in effectively leveraging technology to combat the COVID-19 pandemic," Kant said in a tweet. Prime Minister Narendra Modi in his address to the nation on April 14 appealed to people to download the app.

Amul Twitter handle briefly blocked

Twitter cites security processes; account restored

The Twitter account of Amul was briefly blocked, sparking public outrage, but the social networking and microblogging firm on Saturday said the account was restricted after being caught in the platform's security processes. Gujarat Cooperative Milk Marketing Federation (GCMMF) - which makes

Amul brand of food products - found its Twitter account blocked on June 4 evening. The account was restored on June 5.

Some sought to link the blockage to Amul advertising for use of its Make in India products and boycott Chinese products.

Amul had posted 'Exit the Dragon' tweet on June 3 afternoon and its account went down on June 4 evening.

On accessing the account, a message saying "This account is temporarily restricted. You're seeing this warning because there has been some unusual activity from this account. Do

you still want to view it?" was displayed.

Twitter did not link the account restriction to the advertisement.

"Safety and security of the accounts is a key priority for us and to ensure an account has not been compromised sometimes we require the account owner to complete a simple reCAPTCHA process.

These challenges are simple for authentic account owners to solve, but difficult (or costly) for spammy or malicious account owners to complete," a Twitter spokesperson said in an emailed statement. Once the account clears this

security step, the account regains full access, the statement added.

"To protect the accounts, we routinely require them to clear this security key for login verification," the spokesperson said. Amul Managing Director RS Sodhi said the company's Twitter account was blocked on the night of June 4, and restored on June 5 morning when the issue was taken up with Twitter.

"Our Twitter account was blocked on the night of June 4 and restored on June 5 morning when we again took up the process of reactivation with Twitter," he said.

Exports to Bangladesh set to resume through Bengal's Petrapole land port

PTI ■ KOLKATA

Exports to Bangladesh are set to resume through West Bengal's Petrapole land port after traders agreed to create a pool of local drivers, who will deliver consignments to the neighbouring country and stay in isolation after returning, an official said on Saturday. Days after a similar mechanism was introduced at Mahadipur land port in Malda district, this arrangement at Petrapole integrated check post in Bongaon area will start from Sunday, he said.

A pool of 100 local truck drivers will only be allowed to go up to 500 metres within Bangladesh port area, and will return after unloading goods, the official said, adding that they need not move anywhere else in the neighbouring country. "The drivers, who will stay in the integrated check post (ICP) area after their return and will not go outside the land port," he said. The trade will be allowed for 12 hours daily,

starting from 6 am. All Bangladesh-bound vehicles stranded in and around the Petrapole check post, around 80-km from Kolkata, will be cleared by June 14, he said. The local administration also asked traders to be ready with another pool of 50 drivers outside the ICP area for any exigency. "A large number of trucks are stranded near the border due to the lockdown. Exports through Petrapole check post will resume on Sunday. We have agreed to follow the instructions given by the administration," an official of exporters' body FIEO told PTI.

Federation of Indian Exports Organisations regional chairman (east) Sushil Patwari said exporters are not sure whether this arrangement will continue, following clearance of the stranded trucks by June 14.

Everyday, around 550 to 600 trucks laden with various goods go to Benapole, located on the other side of the border, through Petrapole land port that accounts for the majority

of trade between India and Bangladesh.

The trade through this land port, the largest facility on the Indo-Bangla border, was stopped on May 2 after two days of operation, following protests by local people who were afraid that truck drivers and labourers might spread coronavirus infection when they return from Benapole. Meanwhile, Mahadipur Exporters' Association secretary Prasenjit Ghosh claimed that around 70-80 trucks are currently operating as a pool of 50 drivers are working to deliver consignments to Bangladesh.

Usually, over 300 vehicles used to operate through the Mahadipur land port before COVID-19 outbreak. Apart from Petrapole and Mahadipur, the trade between the two countries takes place through several land ports such as Changrabandha in Cooch Behar, Fulbari in Jalpaiguri, Hilli in South Dinajpur, Ghojadangra in North 24-Parganas district, among others.

Paytm reaches out to State Govts on contactless food ordering at restaurants

Digital payments major Paytm on Saturday said it has approached 10 State Governments to promote contactless food ordering and payments, and to make these a part of the standard operating procedures for re-opening dine-in restaurants and take-away joints. In April, Paytm had said it has developed a 'contactless in-store ordering' solution - 'Scan to Order' - to help restaurants and eateries minimise physical contacts for menu, billing and cash transactions after these businesses open after the lockdown.

"With the Government further easing lockdown norms and opening malls, restaurants in non-contaminated zones, the company is having advanced discussions with multiple state governments urging them to make contactless QR-based food ordering part of the standard operating

procedure for opening food establishments," Paytm said in a statement.

It added that it has reached out to 10 State Govts and plans to approach all states over the next few days. The company had earlier stated that it aimed to onboard over one lakh restaurants for the solution in phase one. Paytm said it has already partnered thousands of restaurants for the solution, but did not provide exact details.

"We strongly believe that our contactless food ordering solution would not only help establishments get back to business but also save lives as the core idea of this innovative product is based on maintaining social distancing and dining out the smarter safer way," Paytm Vice President Nikhil Saigal said. Paytm has developed a QR code that is displayed at partner restaurants that users can scan from the Paytm app to browse the menu and place orders.

Canara Bank cuts in repo-linked lending rate by 40 bps to 6.9%

State-owned Canara Bank on Saturday announced reduction in its repo-linked lending rate (RLLR) by 40 basis points (bps) to 6.90 per cent. Meanwhile, the Bengaluru-based bank also slashed its marginal cost of fund-based lending rate (MCLR) by 20 basis points across various tenors.

The revised lending rates will be effective from June 7, Canara Bank said in a statement. All new retail loans (housing, education, vehicle), credit to MSMEs are linked to RLLR. Many banks have passed on the benefit of reduction in 40 bps in repo rate announced by the Reserve Bank of India in May through cuts in their RLLR. Recently, some lenders, including Punjab National Bank, Bank of India and UCO Bank, slashed their lending rates linked to repo rate by 40 bps.

RCF sale of industrial products cross ₹100cr-mark in Apr-May

Despite COVID-19 crisis, state-owned Rashtriya Chemicals Fertilisers (RCF) has crossed ₹100 crore mark in its industrial products in the first two months of the current fiscal, the Fertiliser Ministry said on Saturday.

"The company's operations have been running successfully. In the ongoing current COVID-19 pandemic, the company is fully geared-up to face the upcoming challenges and ready to capitalise on the opportunities coming its way," the ministry said. The RCF's major industrial products are Ammonia, Ammonium Nitrate, Ammonium Bi-carbonate, Methyl Amines, Nitric Acid, Dilute Nitric Acid, Argon, Formic Acid, Di-Methyl Formamide, Di-Methyl Acetamide and Sodium Nitrate. For instance Ammonia is used as a refrigerant for nitriding of steel, rocket fuel and pharmaceuticals, while that of Ammonium Nitrate in explosives for coal mining and

Ammonium Bi-Carbonate for bakery products and tanneries. Methyl Amines is used in pesticides, dyestuff, and pharmaceuticals, while Dilute Nitric Acid in jewellery and propellant and Formic Acid is used in the rubber and leather industry. Di-Methyl Formamide - as solvent for fibres, spandex, polyamides. In the statement, the Ministry said that RCF standalone net profit rose by 49 per cent to ₹208.15 crore in 2019-20 fiscal from ₹139.17 crore in the previous year.

The revenue from operations rose 9 per cent to ₹9,698 crore in the 2019-20, the highest since inception.

"Despite various challenges being faced by the company, the financial performance for the current year has been better as compared to previous year," it said.

Title in sight for Bayern

Flick's side comes from goal down to beat Havertz-less Leverkusen 4-2; Leipzig slip up again

Robert Lewandowski scored his 30th league goal of the season on Saturday as Bayern Munich came from behind to claim a 4-2 victory at Bayer Leverkusen and move a step closer to the Bundesliga title.

After Lucas Alario secured an early lead for the home side, Bayern struck twice in quick succession just before half-time to turn the game in their favour after Kingsley Coman's equaliser.

Lewandowski netted in the second half as Bayern established a 10-point lead over title rivals Borussia Dortmund, who later host Hertha Berlin.

The game also saw Bayern lend their support to protests over the death of black American man George Floyd, with all their players wearing armbands bearing the slogan *Black Lives Matter*.

With their talisman and Bayern transfer target Kai Havertz ruled out with a muscle injury, Leverkusen turned to Alario to lead

the line against the champions. The Argentine delivered after just nine minutes, beating the off-side trap after a throw-in to slot the ball past Manuel Neuer.

A mistake from Moussa Diaby allowed Coman to curl in the equaliser, before a fizzing shot from Leon Goretzka and an elegant lob from Serge Gnabry saw Bayern take a two-goal lead before half-time.

Lewandowski finished the job

with a well-placed header after the break, reaching the 30-goal mark for only the second time in his Bundesliga career, but there was still time for 17-year-old Florian Wirtz to curl in a consolation goal for Leverkusen before the final whistle.

Elsewhere, a late equaliser from Christian Strohdiek gave bottom-of-the-table Paderborn a faint glimmer of hope in the race for survival, as they snatched a 1-1 draw away to RB Leipzig.

Captain Ashalata Devi, who was among the three nominees for the *AFC Women's Player of the Year 2019*, said that getting to play in the Asian Cup will be a 'dream come true' moment.

"I would like to thank the AIFF and Women's Committee as they made a lot of efforts to bring the tournament to India. It's a huge step for us and the entire continent's eyes will be on us," the centre-back said.

She also highlighted the importance of the tournament to her and the players.

"Ever since I have been playing football, I have never shown any of my matches to my mother. I was waiting for the right moment and now in 2022, I want my mother to come and watch me play against Asia's best teams."

Goalkeeper Aditi Chauhan feels it would be a "huge responsibility" to live up to the expectations of fans in the tournament.

"It is an amazing opportunity for us to prove and show our supporters why they should believe us when we say women's team has the potential to play at the top level.

"There is now a huge responsibility for us to put forward the image that we want our supporters to have of women's football," Chauhan said.

PL stadiums to be split into 'zones'

Premier League stadiums will be divided into three zones when the season resumes behind closed doors on June 17, West Ham vice-chairman Karren Brady said on Saturday.

Clubs met on Thursday to discuss logistics and safety protocols, with Brady saying stadiums would be divided into red, amber and green zones.

"Red zone will be the most severely restricted area, including the pitch, the tunnel, technical areas, changing rooms will be limited to 105 people maximum, to include players, coaching staff, match officials and all the essential staff only," Brady wrote in her *Sun* newspaper column.

"And only those who have tested negative for Covid-19 in the past five days can enter this area..."



"The amber zone will be restricted to the minimum number of staff required to meet contractual requirements for broadcasting, media and club staff... And anyone entering this area will be subject to a temperature check and a health questionnaire.

"And the green zone is the stadium exterior, eg car parking."

Players have been told they must not shake hands, spit or share drinks, while social distancing will be observed even in the dressing room and show-

ers, with a 15-minute limit for pre-match talks by managers.

"A new strict accreditation process will be developed, including an isolation room should someone unfortunately develop symptoms of Covid-19 whilst within the stadium," Brady added.

Television viewers will have access to 360 degree replays and pre-match tunnel shots, while players' shirts will feature the logo of Britain's state-run National Health Service.

"So we are in good shape," Brady said. "We are ready. We are raring to go."

Solskjaer backs extra subs change

Ole Gunnar Solskjaer believes the introduction of extra substitutions will be "welcome" when Manchester United resume their Premier League campaign later this month with action away to Tottenham Hotspur on June 19.

United face fellow European qualification hopefuls Sheffield United on June 24, with the FA Cup quarter-final at Norwich and league match at Brighton following soon afterwards.

With games coming thick and fast, Premier League clubs have agreed managers will be able to make up to five substitutions per match from an expanded nine-strong bench as a way of helping sides cope with a three-month backlog of fixtures.

"I think that's helpful because footballers, after being out for so long, going into competitive games will be a challenge for them and we have to look after their injury-wise and fitness-wise," United manager Solskjaer told the club's website.

"We can't just flog one player and say to them, 'you play every game and every minute' because it might be



a period when we have to rotate quite often."

United are currently three points adrift of a place in next season's Champions League, and Solskjaer said: "It does feel like a new season but then again, the first two games against Tottenham and Sheffield United are vital for the league standings, the table.

"And it's a short season, it's only nine (league) games so can we get as many points and good performances as possible. "If we do get a good spell now, we could end up with some trophies and something to cheer about."

The enforced suspension has allowed the likes of Paul Pogba and Marcus Rashford to regain fitness following ankle and back injuries respectively.

But former United striker Solskjaer was cautious about their prospects of playing against Spurs.

"Well, we hope everybody's going to be ready for the first game.

"We've had time out so I don't think we can expect that those lads who've missed lots of the football can last the full game."

Hard to believe Ronaldo is 35 in training: De Ligt

Juventus centre back Matthijs De Ligt said that it is difficult to believe that Cristiano Ronaldo is 35-years-old when one sees him training. Calling the Portuguese superstar as the best striker of his generation, 20-year-old De Ligt said that Ronaldo is a huge example for younger players.

"I always try to improve the way I play by watching him because even in training he has a crazy intensity and you wonder if he really is 35-years-old," the Dutchman told *Tuttosport*.

De Ligt was all praise for his Juventus squad, which he joined this year from Ajax.

"We really have a good team, a lot of good guys. The most fun are the South Americans. Beside Ronaldo, I was impressed by Paulo Dybala and Rodrigo Bentancur: both players with an amazing technique. Rodrigo in particular is underestimated, he will have a great future ahead of him."

FIFA open to salary cap & transfer fee limit proposals

FIFA president Gianni Infantino called on Saturday for discussions over proposals to introduce salary and transfer fee caps to football in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic.

Last month, the German FA and Bayern Munich chairman Karl-Heinz Rummenigge urged industry talks about a salary cap and reforming the transfer system to keep football "credible".

"On the financial and governance aspects, I also heard some interesting proposals on a wide range of topics," Infantino wrote in an open letter to FIFA's members.

"From salary caps to transfer fee caps or other taxation mechanisms, to the possible obligation for governing bodies, competition organisers and clubs to build reserves or to contribute to a reserve fund which can be of assistance in hours of need such as now.

"I personally advocate for clearer and stricter financial regulations, imposing full



transparency and good governance principles, and not only limiting this to the transfer system, but to the entire football ecosystem.

"FIFA is doing already a lot of work on this area, even if we face some strong vested interests who fight against our plea for a better global governance in our sport."

A recent study by accounting firm KPMG said the transfer value of players in 10 of Europe's top leagues could plummet by up to 10 billion euros due to the economic crash caused by coronavirus.



Djoker worried by US Open health restrictions

World number one Novak Djokovic described the strict hygiene restrictions under which the US Open is likely to be played as "extreme" and a cap on support teams as "really impossible" on Friday.

As doubts grow over whether or not the Grand Slam event can go ahead as scheduled in New York, the epicentre of the coronavirus outbreak in the United States, Djokovic admitted the demands of organisers could create severe strain.

"Just yesterday I had a telephone conversation with the leaders of world tennis, there were talks about the continuation of the season, mostly about the US Open due in late August, but it is not known whether it will be held," the 33-year-old Serb told *Prva TV* television and quoted by *Blic online* daily.

"The rules that they told us that we would have to respect to be there, to play at all, they are extreme."

Djokovic, champion at the US Open in 2011, 2015 and 2018, described planned limits on player entourages as "really impossible".

"We would not have access to Manhattan, we would have to sleep in hotels at the airport, to be tested twice or three times per week.

"Also, we could bring one person to the club which is really impossible.

"I mean, you need your coach, then a fitness trainer, then a physiotherapist.

"All their suggestions are really rigorous but I can understand that due to financial reasons, due to already existing contracts, organisers (want the event to be) held. We will see what will happen."

Balotelli set to be released by Brescia

Mario Balotelli's ill-fated stint at hometown club Brescia appears to be coming to an end, with local media reporting on Saturday his contract will be terminated after repeated absences from training.

A letter notifying Balotelli of his release was sent to the Italian international by the club's lawyers on Friday, according to *Sky Sport*, *Gazzetta dello Sport* and the *AGI* news agency.

Balotelli has reportedly missed a number of sessions since Serie A teams returned to training at the start of May. Players initially worked out individually before clearance was given for them to resume team training.

The 29-year-old said this week he had been sick and would send the club medical certificates as proof. Brescia coach Diego Lopez



said on Friday he was "disappointed" with the forward's attitude.

"Mario is training separately because his team-mates have done work that he hasn't," Lopez told *Corriere della Sera*.

"The (individual) training sessions were optional, okay. But the group took one road and he took another. On Zoom, during the quarantine, we didn't see him. Even if he says he feels good, he's not at the level of his team-mates."

Serie A confirm 5 substitutions

ROME Serie A has announced that each team will have five substitutions per game for the rest of the season which begins on June 20 after the Covid-19 shutdown.

According to the statement of Italy football federation, each team can make the substitutions using a maximum of three game interruptions, in addition to the interval

It's 2021 or never for Tokyo

AFP ■ TOKYO

High-ranking Olympic official Pierre-Olivier Beckers on Saturday made plain that the delayed Tokyo Olympics "will be held in 2021 or not at all".

The Belgian was reiterating the stance put forward by Japan and International Olympic Committee chief Thomas Bach that next year was the last chance to hold the Games postponed due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"Today everyone is sure that they will start on July 23, 2021," he told Belgian newspaper *L'Avenir*.

"We are convinced that the Games will take place in 2021 or they won't take place.

"It's unthinkable to keep



such a project on the go for any longer considering the enormous costs and all the thousands of people involved."

Beckers suggested it was "essential" that the traditional sporting calendar emerges from its Covid-19 lockdown before allowing major sporting events like the Olympics to be staged.

"All the sporting federations have to adapt to the Games' postponement.

"We can't envisage a similar upheaval a second time," stressed the president of Belgium's Olympic Committee.

According to Beckers a final decision on Tokyo "will be taken in the spring if questions (over the global health crisis) persist."

He said he was optimistic over the staging of the Games, rejecting any notion that it would be held behind closed doors.




Awareness for mindpower

As queer citizens all over India join others across the world in celebrating a very atypical Pride Month, PARMESH SHAHANI reflects on how the world has changed so much between when the first edition of *Gay Bombay* came out in 2008 and now, when this revised edition is out. An edited excerpt..

WHAT DOES BEING GAY MEAN IN GAY BOMBAY?

AUTHOR'S NOTE

“When the book first came out, it was anthropology but now I think it can be read as a slice of queer history. As you can see in this excerpt below, even 12 years ago, members of the group were contesting ideas around queerness and Indianness, and I read these discussions alongside the other rich activism that was happening in the country then, and also as precursors to the intersectional queer projects that have followed over the years. In the preface to this book's new edition I ask the question — what kind of world are we going to create together now that Section 377 is gone but we have a regressive trans act? How do we find the connectedness between trans rights, Dalit rights, Adivasi rights, and the rights of other minorities and move ahead together? Can we recognise that the #blacklivesmatter struggle that is going on all around the world, is also connected to our queer struggle? I am glad to see how many young queer projects in the country are about intersectionality. This Pride month, I sincerely hope that the queer movement in our country galvanises around the important issue of the regressive Trans Act, the same way as it did around 377. There are so many other laws that need to change in future. A lot of work ahead, and this pride month, I invite all our country's straight citizens to join us queers in creating a more inclusive India together.”

course of my research. Take the case of Harbhajan to whom being gay was 'just sex, over and out' and who was also married to a woman who was aware of his sexual orientation. I observed him at several GB events and he was an intrinsic part of the organizing committees for these. It was clear that he experienced his sexuality as something much more than 'just sex'. He felt a part of the community and there was camaraderie between him and others. Or Bhuvan, who clearly told me that he was not willing to shout out in public about his sexuality. Two years later, he was one of the lead panelists at a CNN talk show, openly discussing his life as a gay man on television!

For the gay identified respondents, being gay signified different things to each of them. For some gay just represented their sexual desires, for others it was a political statement or a social identity. Many respondents felt that it was a state of being or a way of life, while some spoke of it as an emotional commitment to other men. For all of them, the common element about being gay was the imagination of themselves as gay, in whatever way they wished to articulate this imagination. It was fascinating

to meet someone like Nachiket, for example. He was married with kids, had never had sex with another man, but still described himself as gay, because he *imagined* himself so.

Many respondents felt that they were bound by the *contract of silence* and that being discreet about their sexuality was the pragmatic thing to do. Within this silent space, they found society to be pretty flexible and accommodating with regard to their sexuality. Some, citing responsibilities towards their parents, families and society, had either chosen to get married, or were contemplating doing so in the near future. As Vanita (2001) writes, this is typical in India — The parental family remains a major locus of social and emotional interaction for adults. There are few public places where people can comfortably interact, so friends are entertained at home and absorbed into the family or turned into fictive kin. The family is also the only form of social security and old age insurance available to most people. This means that heterosexual marriage and parenthood hold many attractions even for

homosexually inclined people. Many deal with the dilemma by marrying and then leading a double life.

For these married men, or soon to be married men, marriage did not indicate a change in their sexual identity. They were clear that their marriage was an obligation, but that their sexual gratification would continue to rest with men, even after marriage. There was very little sensitivity expressed towards the feelings or desires of women in these worldviews.

Other respondents were avoiding marriage and devising means to negotiate what was best for them. For some of these individuals, this meant coming out, for others it meant discreetly fighting for what they felt was important and making creative compromises to attain their goals. But for all respondents, there was a constant reflexivity- an acute consciousness of their thoughts and actions vis-a-vis their sexuality.

Overall, I think that to be gay in Gay Bombay signifies being *glocal*; gayness here stands for *Indianized* gayness. So, one might dance in a Western style disco anywhere else in the world, but one can only munch on a post-dance *jalebi* in India. My respondents wanted to selectively draw on a buffet of Indian and western influences in conjuring their own *thali* of gayness! Most of them, even those who had access to the El Dorado of *abroad*, still wanted to configure their gay experiences within an Indian matrix. As Cholan said, hanging out in the Castro was not important, but coming back home and being with his father was. Even for the younger Gul, travelling to America opened his eyes to *Queer as Folk* and gay strip bars, but he used the experience to be more confident in India.

Gay Bombay is certainly inspired by Western notions of what it means to be gay-its dance parties, PFLAG style meets, website and so on, have all drawn from Western experiences; but they have been customized, glocal-ized and made uniquely Indian, uniquely Gay Bombay. Thus, as I noted in Chapter 3, even though I talk about flows throughout this book, I do not want to diminish the agency of my respondents or their locatedness in Bombay itself. For Gay Bombay, as I have realized, place does matter and this is true both offline and online, where even though it is a *virtual* world, it is still a manifestation of Bombay and Indianness at large.

Large numbers of Asian men and women continue to live within the 'traditional' spaces for gender or sex difference and to understand themselves and their lives in 'pre-gay' terms that often relate more to the pre-industrial rural pasts of their societies than to the post modernizing urban present. However, there are also large numbers of men and women who are reacting against what they see as the historic constraint on homoeroticism in their respective societies and who are actively engaging in relocating homoeroticism from the shadows and the periphery, to the centre stage of their lives. (Jackson, 2000)

I encountered two opposing conceptions of homosexuality among my interviewees. One version equated homosexuality with being *gay*; this camp wished to assimilate and appropriate the term within the Indian context, recognizing fully well the unique set of circumstances within which this would take place. For them, social interaction was the key to building a sense of gay community in Bombay, but they recognized that cutting across class and gender norms may be a problem within these kinds of interactions. The other version of homosexuality I encountered questioned terms like *gay* and deemed them Western imports and negative influences and preferred to use *gay* as just one term, alongside indigenous terminology such as *kothi* or functional terms like 'MSM'. They were interested in social interaction across class norms, an assimilation of the various LGBT identities that exist in India and were also concerned with issues such as HIV/AIDS. Proponents of both these views used the gay Bombay newsgroup as well as real world events like parties and meetings as a battleground for their respective ideologies. The archive facility of the Gay Bombay newsgroup provides a fascinating and rich look at their debates as they have played out through the volatile posts over the years.

However, this is not to suggest that these were the only two positions that my respondents adopted-as we have seen in Chapter 7, there existed a variety of other stances that were sandwiched between and around these two prominent takes on the nature of Indian homosexuality. Many of these included reconciliatory stances advocating a middle ground, which echoed Shivananda Khan's (2000) line of reasoning that 'to say gay is appropriate and right. But at the same time to denigrate or deny other frameworks of identities and choices is not...'

Let us stop seeing a debate that pits those who work for *gay* rights and those who work in preventing HIV/AIDS, among men who have sex with men, against each other. Let us work together, whatever our own frameworks and priorities and recognize that in a region of over one billion people there is space for everyone to work out their destinies. (Khan, 2000)

Indeed I find it difficult to look at things in black or white after my experiences in the field. What people said often contradicted with what they did and people's views changed over the

Rethinking public health



As the entire humanity reels under the pandemic impact an important question crops up. Do we give public health the same kind of priority that Defence gets? In all probability, no. The global obsession with war preparedness is rather an ancient phenomenon that indicates our insecurity and inclination to be ready to repel any attack from an enemy known or unknown. Even a cursory review of human history since the ancient times would reveal that wars have killed millions causing wide spread devastation. The economic, social and psychological costs of war have been huge in enormity and wide in scale. But, so also have proved the epidemics, in their impact on human history. If we take into account the disruption and death caused by epidemics it could be more than what wars have done. Why, then, have the epidemics been not accorded the same priority that wars get? Why our preparedness against epidemics does not reflect the same degree of concern? These questions may not be easy to answer as many would compare the budgets that are earmarked for defence and health. It is true that on this count many nations do show a tilt in favour of health. Nonetheless, there are some nations who are found wanting on this count as they put more money for defence than public health. But that, notwithstanding, budgetary allocation as a percentage of health is not the issue. That epidemics strike and disrupt irrespective of budgets is just one side of the story. The other and more important one is that preparedness is much more than mere allocation of funds. How much effort and planning goes in defence and how much in health is what makes the difference. So, despite allocating much more budget for health than defence, the US was in no less precarious position than Saudi Arabia and several others that had marked more funds for defence. This is the issue that needs to be resolved. But before that one important assertion. In many cases war and epidemic connection can also be seen if we take a closer look at many past major epidemics. Of course, there may be a few other variables, too, that would need to be examined, but some moderate degree of correlation can be found. The other significant pointer is the fact that epidemics have played more havoc at commercial hubs. All these factors need to be examined by the big data analysts who are busy finding out how many are going to die, when and where. To begin with the first lesson that governments all over the globe have to learn is that like equipping military to defend the borders, they need to equip the doctors and nurses to defend public health. Had there been a well oiled health machinery and a battle ready health army, many decisions that proved costly and painful could have been avoided. There is one more requirement. We must revive the idea of barefoot doctors, the concept that proved useful in the past but went out of practice. The paramedical personnel is a medically trained force, like the para military forces, that must be reared and trained for such exigencies. Nevertheless, this is not the last time that a pandemic has struck nations. Let good sense prevail so that we not only learn but practice the age old lesson that prevention is better than cure. And much less costly. Health is wealth, literally.

Ketu (south node of the moon) is also marked impotent. Ketu has been ascribed the status of a monk planet, and it offers salvation away from indulgence.

Accordingly, the zodiac signs are also determined on the basis of gender. Aries, Leo, Scorpio, and Aquarius are considered male and Taurus, Cancer, Virgo, and Libra are female signs. Gemini, Capricorn, Sagittarius, and Pisces are considered im-



tent. In a chart, the seventh, eighth, and twelfth houses of the horoscope are associated with sexual organs.

American angle in China-Taiwan face-off

The new crisis that has cropped up between China and its rebel nation Taiwan highlights the “love-hate” relationship between the two. The root of the current stand-off lies in the belligerent posture maintained by the Xi Jinping regime. And the face-off has escalated with the re-election of the pro-independence Democratic People's Party (DPP) candidate Tsai Ing-wen as the President and William Lai as her Vice-President of Taiwan.

Clearly the election outcome in Taiwan is a sharp rebuke to both Beijing and the pro-China parties in the island such as the Kuomintang (KMT). Besides China's constant threat to reunify Taiwan with the mainland and the two groups of political actors — one for pro-independence and the other for merger in China — there is an external element, the strong voices from the international community mainly led by the US.

This results into the cross-strait relations between Taipei and Beijing getting more complicated, with the latest saga of events like the island nation's inclusion in the World Health Assembly meeting on the sidelines of the current Covid-19 crisis.

China claims Taiwan as an inseparable part of it. However, the majority of the Taiwanese reject China's claim as bluffs and declare itself as absolutely independent from Beijing. Whenever the matter of complete independence erupts, Beijing either threatens Taipei or airs strong warnings about possible fallout of such steps by the latter. Such extreme pronouncements from the mainland are quite common. In 2017, Yin Zhuo, a Chinese Rear Admiral in the Navy, said, “If the Democratic Progressive Party (Taiwan's ruling party) declares independence, then we must go to war without any hesitation. If they declare independence, we will use military force to bring about unification, we must be very clear about that.”

Needless to say that with the coming of the DPP to power, the centrist forces in the island and the Communist Party in China have become equally concerned about the real intentions of the Tsai regime. Thus any move that leads to complete separation of Taiwan from the sovereign territory of China would tantamount to causing war.

The major cause of irritant for China in Taiwan is the constant American interference and engagement with the island. But then there is an official act known as the “1979 Taiwan Relations Act” that provides the legal basis for the unofficial relations between the US and Taiwan. This particular Act enshrines the American commitment to assist Taiwan in maintaining its

Taiwan issue will remain intact as a permanent thaw between Washington and Beijing is far-fetched. With Xi's war theatrics and grand propaganda of fulfilling his “China Dream”, the cross-strait relations would continue to be in focus.

Again, if Trump returns to power, it may bolster the China skeptics to continue the trade war with China. It would be a big mistake to think that Trump's anti-China rhetoric is just an election gimmick. It is a permanent policy plank of the core team of Trump presidency to exert pressure on Beijing whether it comes to trade, technology, South China Sea, Taiwan, Xinjiang, Hong Kong, Tibet and even to China's border conflicts with India.

Hence, the future of China-Taiwan relations is heading for a chaos. Certainly, there is no chance of an imminent war. But it serves as one of the most dangerous flashpoints in the world, particularly when two nuclear giants are engaged. China's status of being a trade behemoth mainly emboldens it to spur its campaign against major powers of the world, especially against the US. But then derailing a powerful coalition of Western forces would be extremely difficult for China at any time in future.

Instead of competing and contesting the US, China must see to it that its own territories are secured and its citizens enjoy basic human rights. Suppressing the populace back home in the mainland and particularly in Hong Kong would cost Beijing in future. Only mere force applying through the PLA would not help sustaining the Xi model of permanent presidency across all the overseas territories of China.

What seems permanent is that the ill-will between Taipei and Beijing is going to continue. Admittedly, the tension between the two has risen to an all-time high under Xi. Though Tsai is leaving after this term, the DPP and its liberation philosophy can't be obliterated from the Taiwanese soil. With a sixth generation of leadership not coming to take over (because of Xi's permanent presidency), it definitely adds worry to internal party consensus over Xi's presidency after his two terms. These are serious threats to Xi and his core team. Therefore maintaining an iron fist at home and sloganeering unification over Taiwan and Hong Kong would be successful only in rhetoric.

Taiwan would remain what it is today, physically alienated, economically tied with the mainland and politically distant foes forever. So the war of words and weapons between the ROC and the PRC will nowhere head for perpetual peace.

defensive capability. Though the US officially does not support Taiwan's independence, but the American Institute in Taiwan (AIT) is solely responsible for implementing the US policy towards Taiwan.

Clearly, this is the bone of contention between the US and China. Washington has been developing close contacts with the island and its administration, but that is simply not acceptable to Beijing.

Historically, the 1979 US-PRC Joint Communiqué switched diplomatic recognition from Taipei to Beijing. In this communiqué, America recognised the Government of the PRC as the sole Government of China. This again reiterates the fact that there is but one China and Taiwan is a part of China. But what has taken an ugly turn today is that only under this communiqué, the US is allowed to maintain cultural, commercial and other unofficial relations with Taiwan.

After this, what we need to know is the historic 1992 consensus that is critical in shaping and reshaping the relations between Taiwan and China. When Lee Teng-huei became the chairman of the KMT in 1988 and also became the first elected President of Taiwan in 1996 after the demise of Chiang Ching-kuo, the son of the founder of Taiwan i.e. Chiang Kai-shek. In 1988, he initiated talks with the mainland, and associations representing Beijing and Taipei met in Singapore in 1992. At the end of this historic meet, the

representatives issued a document which read like this: Both sides agree that there is only one Chinese nation comprising all of mainland China, Taiwan, Penghu and the offshore islands; under this Chinese nation, there are two states and both sides agree to disagree on the definition of control of these two states. What follows from this is that basically both sides agreed that the other side existed, but they would disagree about everything else. What many of us miss in this agreement is that both sides agreed that Taiwan belonged to China, while continuing to disagree on which “China, whether it is Republic of China or the Peoples Republic of China. As years passed, this came to be known as the ‘1992 Consensus’, which has been rightly rejected by the current ruling party in Taiwan.

The US, being the predominant power of the world, has a strong military presence in the Asia-Pacific, backed by its allies. Therefore any war-like situation over Taiwan would surely drag not only the US into this maelstrom, but also all its allies. And this could probably be the beginning of the Third World War. America's growing influence in Taiwan starting from defence cooperation to people to people contact has irked China for long. When Tsai won her second term this year, US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo congratulated her saying, “Her re-election by a huge margin shows that she has earned the respect, admiration and trust of the people on Taiwan. Her courage and

vision in leading Taiwan's vibrant democracy is an inspiration to the region and the world.”

With this remark coming from Washington last month, China has flashed its anger yet again for the US coming ever closer to Taiwan. In fact, the praise prompted China's Ministry of Defense to issue a statement expressing strong dissatisfaction and firm opposition to Pompeo's remarks. At the same time, its Foreign Ministry said it was “extremely indignant” at the message and accused Washington of breaching its diplomatic commitments. And what happened in the beginning of March was another pointer to America's deeper ties with Taiwan, especially under the Donald Trump administration. On March 4, the US House of Representatives unanimously passed the Taiwan Alliances International Protection and Enhancement Initiative (TAIPEI) Act. What is adding more weight towards the maintenance of Taiwan's unique identity and independence in future is the very special character of the Act. This Act aims at inducing governments that are allies of Taiwan to maintain diplomatic ties with the country and to identify those at risk of sovereign relations with it.

It also calls for the US to supplement its diplomatic presence in countries that support Taiwan and reduce its diplomatic footprint if they side with Beijing. Further, the Act would give the Secretary of State the power to expand, reduce, or terminate US aid to countries

depending on whether they improve, worsen or sever diplomatic relations with Taiwan. It finally calls for increased American support for Taiwan's participation in global affairs. Closely looked at, this directly wants to bolster Taiwan's claim for de facto independence.

What comes from the other side of the spectrum is that Beijing adheres to its one China policy as it is. That is why China registered its utter dissatisfaction with the US by saying the latest words coming from Pompeo is hurting the “sentiments of the 1.4 billion Chinese people.”

Taiwan's re-elected President Tsai hoped for peaceful co-existence with China, but clearly disavows “one China framework” of Beijing. She again highlighted that “Here, I want to reiterate the words ‘peace, parity, democracy, and dialogue’. We will not accept the Beijing authorities' use of ‘one country, two systems’ to downgrade Taiwan and undermine the cross-strait status quo. We stand fast by this principle.”

These words directly indicate what Taiwan under Tsai is looking for. On her inaugural speech, she vowed to fight for Taiwan's participation in international organisations, strengthen mutually beneficial cooperation with its allies and bolster ties with the US, Japan, Europe and other like-minded countries. This definitely is slated for a tough fight with the Xi regime in the days to come.

At the centre of the China-Taiwan bitterness lies the sheer

apprehension of the Taiwanese to be under the Communist dictatorship of the mainland. In the name of people's democracy, what has been practised in China since the days of Mao Zedong till Xi is nothing but a pseudo-socialist system. The political system that prevails today in China is pure market capitalism in the disguised form of socialism with Chinese characteristics. Majority of the Taiwanese do not want to have a governance system like that of the mainlanders. The primary detest and hatred for Chinese political system emerges from the complete absence of basic freedoms, absolute disregard for human rights, and the public display of state-sponsored violence by Beijing. Secondly, since historically and geographically, both Taiwan and China live apart, the people of Taiwan have developed a taste for independence from the beginning. However such claims though buttressed by the Taiwanese side, the mainland outrightly rejects them. For Beijing, Taiwan is a breakaway province and its reunification is a must either by peace or by force.

China's potential danger comes from its own people. The world's most populated nation is simply scared of its own populace. The discontents emerging from its population are not allowed to be surfaced anywhere else. It has been suppressed for decades with an iron fist by its successive communist regimes. When it comes to Taiwan, it is certain that the sensitivity of the

Covid-induced vaccination pause puts children at risk

Recording over 6.8 million cases in more than 200 countries, the coronavirus pandemic has undoubtedly become the most widespread infectious disease outbreak, leaving SARS, Ebola and H1N1 influenza far behind. Across the globe, countries have deployed aggressive containment measures, including stringent lockdowns, domestic and international border-sealing and trade restrictions. Tourism, hospitality, public transport, manufacturing and other such “non-essential” services have been affected in most countries, which are likely to have a resounding impact on domestic economies.

In two dozen countries, national routine immunisation programmes have been paused. In India, too, routine immunisation has been suspended to help ease the burden on the already overstretched

health system and to help limit transmission. Of course, this temporary halting is critical to recalibrate efforts to arrest the spread of Covid-19, but it is also deeply concerning. My fear is, this temporary suspension could place children at risk and disrupt the significant momentum we have achieved through our immunisation efforts in the country. Let me elaborate.

Since its inception, the Universal Immunisation Programme (UIP) — one of the largest public health programmes in the world — has protected millions of children from vaccine-preventable diseases like diphtheria, pertussis, measles, pneumonia, diarrhoea, etc. From offering protection against 6 vaccine-preventable diseases in the mid-eighties, today, the UIP has expanded to provide protection against 12 such diseases! New vaccines like measles rubella,

pneumococcal conjugate, inactivated polio and rotavirus have been introduced to improve the health of our children. In fact, our UIP targets to serve more than 26 million newborns and about 27 million pregnant women every year. Concerted efforts have helped us beat polio, maintain our polio-free status for over half a decade and eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus — which were all responsible for significant child morbidities.

Mission Indradhanush is testament to the Government's commitment to reach and protect the most vulnerable through targeted immunisation. In just 3 years, the mission fully immunised over 8 million children. Today, the Government has strengthened its mission to leave no-one behind, through intensified mission Indradhanush. We have also made strides in

strengthening our systems to better monitor and manage vaccine stocks, logistics, temperature tracking, all of which are essential to ensure that vaccines are accessible to everyone.

Of course, these are just a few of the encouraging results of a more robust UIP and the benefits of new vaccines. But it would be safe to say that, through dedicated efforts of the government and partners, we have managed to considerably improve child health in the country.

So how has the current suspension affected us? Unfortunately, vaccine-preventable diseases have not taken a break. For instance, globally, there has been rising concern about how the current situation could lead to a spike in vaccine-preventable diseases such as measles. In fact, WHO and others predict that more

than 117 million children across the world could miss out on essential vaccines needed to protect against measles. Women are also missing out on a vaccine that protects against rubella — an infectious disease that if contracted by pregnant women could cause spontaneous abortions, fetal deaths and serious congenital defects. These are grave concerns, especially since India, in the recent past, has already witnessed several outbreaks of measles and rubella. Similarly, while we are a polio-free country today and there's much to celebrate, the recent outbreaks of vaccine-derived polio in parts of the world is a sobering reality. We need to ensure that children receive the inactivated polio vaccine on time to avoid the possibility of such an outbreak in India.

The temporary suspension has also significantly affected

vaccine management systems and logistics, including activities that were underway to produce new and existing vaccines. While I am certain that all activities to sustain and expand the immunisation programme will eventually resume, the disruption caused by Covid-19 may lead to delays in restoring full capacity.

This pause has also dealt a severe blow to our plans of scaling up pneumococcal conjugate and rotavirus vaccines across the country. A quarter of our children still die of pneumonia and diarrhoea, yet we may have to wait longer than earlier expected to ensure everyone has access to these life-saving vaccines. The on-going economic downturn affects us all, including vaccine manufacturers, impacting overall production and distribution.


Let's explore the possibi-

ty of declaring vaccinators as first line responders. With protective gear and mobile technology, they could effectively sustain immunisation activities while practicing the mandated physical distancing.

Intersectoral collaborations will be critical to immunisation infrastructure — scientists, researchers, policymakers, economists, and civil society organisations and private organizations have to come together to design a roadmap to cover lost ground.

Even as all hands are on deck to develop a Covid-19 vaccine, we need to collectively carve out a meticulous risk management, financing and executive plan to ensure that once an emergency vaccine is available, everyone has access to it.



construct, chemistry, and operating principles of mind. Remember, mind is the prime mover of a being. All actions out in the open, be it chasing a desired destination or respond and react to an external stimuli, originates in mind, which following processing translates into action. Even the imprints of all your inherent tendencies are there in the mind itself, in the form of thought-seeds.
