Booster dose for MSMEs, farmers

Cabinet OK's ₹20K cr for MSMEs, hikes MSP for kharif crops

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

The Government on Wednesday announced a major scheme for the revival of micro, small & medium enterprise and enhanced the minimum support price for kharif crops to ease off the problems of farmers due to Covid-19 and protracted lockdown.

The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs (CCEA) announced ₹20,000 crore financial package for two lakh "stressed" MSMEs and ₹50,000 crore "Fund of Fund" equity infusion plan to the medium and small units to enable list in stock markets.

Later Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched a dedicated one-stop portal "Champions" for the MSMEs to avail the benefits announced in the Atmanirbhar package.

Detailing the Cabinet announcements, Union Minister Nitin Gadkari and Prakash Javadekar said these two packages will help the millions of MSME units to tide over their bank NPA problems and get more loans as well as new fund infusion. "With today's approval, implementation modalities and road map

for entire components of the Atmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyan package are in place. This will help in attracting investments and creating more jobs in the MSME sector," said Gadkari, adding that new single window portal "Champions" will take care of the grievances of MSME units and also monitor their applications to banks under the

Atmanirbhar packages. Gadkari said the change in definition of MSME will help the small and medium enterprises to get more help from financial institutions. He said that the Government has also formed ₹4,000 crore distressed asset fund for the revival of small and medium units in the country. "The definition of

micro manufacturing and services unit was increased to ₹1 crore of investment and ₹5 crore of turnover. The limit of small unit was increased to ₹10 crore of investment and ₹50 crore of turnover. Similarly, the limit of a medium unit was increased to ₹20 crore of investment and ₹100 crore turnover. The revision was done after

14 years since the MSME Development Act came into being in 2006. After the package announcement on May 13, the Government received several representations that the announced revision was still not in tune with market and pricing conditions and it should be revised upwards. **Continued on Page 2**

Community transmission well established: Experts

They paint gloomy picture in report to PM, assert Covid can't be eliminated at present stage

Contrary to the Government's stand, a group of health experts, including eminent doctors from the AIIMS and ICMR on Covid-19, has said that community transmission stage of the coronavirus infection has been well-established across large sections or sub-populations in the country. "It is unrealistic to expect that Covid-19 pandemic can be eliminated at this stage given that community transmission is already well-established across large sections or sub-populations in the country," they said while painting a gloomy picture of the state of the deadly disease in a report which has now been submitted to the Prime Minister.

The report comes amidst spurt of cases in major States

like Maharashtra, Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Haryana and Bihar. The report compiled by experts from the Indian Public Health Association (IPHA), Indian Association of Preventive and Social Medicine (IAPSM), and Indian Association of Epidemiologists (IAE) is damning in nature and also slams the Government for failing to take timely adequate steps to contain the disease for which "India is paying a heavy price, both in terms of

humanitarian crisis and disease spread." "The expected benefit of this stringent nationwide lockdown was to spread over the disease over an extended period of time to flatten the curve and effectively plan and manage so that the healthcare delivery system is not overwhelmed. This seems to have been achieved albeit after lockdown 4.0 with extraordinary inconvenience and disruption of the economy and life of the general public," said the report. **Continued on Page 2**

Haryana, Odisha too join the race

Maharashtra, TN, Delhi, Gujarat, UP remain biggest contributors



Haryana and Odisha on Monday recorded biggest single day spike in the number of Covid-19 cases after Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Delhi, Gujarat and Uttar Pradesh remained the major contributors in sustaining the high figure on a daily basis for weeks.

Haryana reported 265 new cases, which is its highest daily count, taking the total number of positive cases in the State to 2,356. Haryana has seen steady rise in the number of cases during the last one week. State's ruling politicians have blamed Delhi for the spike and sealed the State's border with the national Capital.

Odisha reported 156 new cases on Monday which took its overall tally of cases to 2,104. The State has seen a gradual increase in the number of cases since the migrants workers began to return in tens of thousands.

Jammu & Kashmir reported 155 new cases — 56 from Kashmir division and 99 from Jammu division. Total positive cases in the Union Territory

stand at 2,601 including 1,624 active cases. West Bengal added 271 new cases, which took its tally of positive cases to 5,772 while the death toll is at 253. Karnataka reported 2,187 cases which took its tally to 3,408. Maharashtra's count rose to 70,013 cases with 2,362 deaths. The State reported 2,361 new cases on Monday. The recovery rate from the coronavirus pandemic in Maharashtra improved to 43.35 per cent in

the month of May. As many as 40 deaths and 1,413 new Covid-19 positive cases were reported in Mumbai on Monday, taking the total number of cases in the city to 40,877. Municipal Corporation Greater Mumbai said. Meanwhile, the State's doubling rate has also improved. It is 17.5 days now, as compared to 11 days earlier. After reporting 1,295 cases on Sunday, Delhi on Monday

added 990 new Covid-19 cases. Delhi's total case count has now risen to 20,834 with a total death toll of 523. The day Tamil Nadu chose to relax the lockdown and allow factories, IT companies and business establishments to resume operations, it saw 1,162 persons testing positive for corona virus, the highest number of cases to be registered on a single day. **Continued on Page 2**

Airlines should keep middle seat vacant if feasible, says DGCA

Otherwise passenger on middle seat will be provided with PPE

The Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) on Monday issued a circular instructing the airlines to keep the middle seat vacant if the passenger load and seat capacity permits. The order, which will be effective from June 3, however, States that members of the same family can be allowed to sit together.

If the middle seat, or the seat between two passengers, is occupied due to passenger load, then additional protective equipment like the Ministry of Textiles-approved wrap-around gown will be given to the individual occupying the intervening seat, in addition to three-layered face mask and face shield. The Government had earlier said it would not be viable to keep middle seats vacant as fares would shoot up. From now on, no meals or



drinking water shall be provided on board except in extreme circumstance, the DGCA order read. The DGCA order said airlines must provide a safety kit to each passenger. It shall include a three-layered surgical mask, a face shield and adequate amount of sanitiser in either a sachet or a bottle.

The embarkation or disembarkation shall be sequential and passengers shall be advised by airlines to follow the instructions. The passenger should not rush towards the exit as soon as the flight lands. Airlines must ensure the orderly entry and exit of the travellers, it said. **Continued on Page 2**

Delhi borders sealed for week to stem corona spike: Kejriwal

Amid rising coronavirus cases in the national Capital, Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on Monday ordered to seal Delhi's borders connecting Haryana and Uttar Pradesh. Also, Kejriwal has sought suggestion from Delhiites via WhatsApp and emails on the issue. Sources said after reviewing the feedback, the Delhi Government will decide whether borders to neighbouring States should be opened or not.

"Delhi's borders will be sealed for a week due to rising coronavirus cases. Essential services will remain functional and Government officers can travel on their identity cards. Delhi residents can send their suggestions via WhatsApp 8800007722, email delhim.suggestions@gmail.com and call on 1031 by Friday 5 pm.

"Delhi to open salons and barber shops, movement on road restricted from 9 pm to 5 am except for essential services," a Delhi Government's order read.

Should hospitals be reserved for Delhiites, CM asks residents

Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on Monday sought suggestions from public on whether hospitals across the national Capital should be reserved only for residents amid the Covid-19 epidemic.

Kejriwal said, "Positive cases are rising in Delhi, which is a matter of worry but there is no need to panic. I say this because the AAP Government has invested a lot in developing the healthcare infrastructure of Delhi in the last five years."

The Chief Minister's office (CMO) in a tweet stated that the suggestions can be sent by June 5, 5 pm. Close family and brother Sajid attended his last rites on late Monday afternoon. He was 42. He had a kidney transplant, and was on the ventilator for the last four days.

1,000 foreign goods delisting 'erroneous', CAPF to list afresh

After the Central Police Canteens that cater to the Central paramilitary forces withdrew 1,000 foreign items from their stores, Welfare and Rehabilitation Board (WARB) Chairman and CRPF DG AP Maheshwari on Monday said the items were erroneously delisted and action is being taken against errant officials. The move by the WARB follows instructions from the Home Ministry to rescind the order for removal of "imported" products sold at canteens. On May 29, an order delisting the "imported" products was issued. However, a number of products manufactured by Indian companies also figured on the list. Now a new reworked list will be brought out, officials said. Maheshwari said, "This is clarified that the list issued by Kendriya Police Kalyan Bhandar (KPKB) on 29th May 2020 regarding delisting of



certain products has been erroneously issued at the level of CEO. The list has been withdrawn and action is being initiated for the lapse." DIG-rank officer RM Meena is the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) KPKB that runs paramilitary canteens across India. The KPKB had formulated three categories of products to discriminate between locally manufactured and imported. In the first category, products made in India from scratch were included. **Continued on Page 2**

Moody's demotes India's sovereign rating 1st time in over 2 decades

Moody's Investors Service on Monday downgraded India's sovereign credit rating for the first time in more than two decades, saying policymakers will be challenged to mitigate risks of low growth, deteriorating fiscal position and financial sector stress. Downgrading India's rating by a notch to "Baa3" from "Baa2" assigned in November 2018, Moody's estimated India GDP shrinking by 4 per cent — first full fiscal contraction in more than four decades, as the country faces a prolonged period of slower growth. Accordingly, India's foreign-currency and local-currency long-term issuer ratings have been downgraded to Baa3 from Baa2. India's local-currency senior unsecured rating too has been lowered to Baa3 from Baa2, and its short-term local currency rating to P-3 from P-2. Polls to 18 RS seats deferred due to corona now on June 19

The polls to 18 Rajya Sabha seats in seven States, deferred due to the coronavirus pandemic, will be held on June 19. The elections assume significance not just because it will be the first such electoral process ever since the outbreak of the Covid-19 contagion but also since it is politically crucial for the BJP and the Congress locked in a fierce contest in Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan where the likes of Jyotiraditya Scindia, Digvijay Singh and KC Venugopal are in the fray. Out of the 18 seats going to polls, four seats each are from Andhra Pradesh and Gujarat, two from Jharkhand, three each from Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan and one each from Manipur and Meghalaya. Votes will be polled from 9 am to 4 pm on June 19 and counting will be done from 5 pm onwards on the same day. The results will be declared on June 22. **Continued on Page 2**

Monsoon keeps date with Kerala

The Southwest monsoon arrived in Kerala on Monday as predicted by the India Meteorological Department (IMD) bringing heavy rain to several parts in the State and marking the commencement of the four-month long rainfall season in the country. This year, monsoon rainfall would likely get 102 per cent more rain between June and September than what the IMD forecast in April. Further away, from the west coast a cyclone Nisarga is brewing in the Arabian Sea and likely to hit north Maharashtra as well as the Gujarat coast by the June 3. The cyclone will bring heavy rainfall on coastal areas of Mumbai and Gujarat and may inundate low-lying areas. Announcing the arrival of Southwest monsoon in Kerala, Madhavan Rajeevan, Secretary, Ministry of Earth Sciences, on Monday said India would get 102 per cent more than between June and September. "Most parts of India, except for the north-east are expected to get more rain than normal. North-west India is expected to get 107 per cent of

its normal, Central India-103 per cent and 102 per cent over south peninsula. North-eastern India, including Bihar, West Bengal, is expected to get only 96 per cent of its long term average. Rain in July were likely to be 3 per cent above what's usual for the month but August would see a 3 per cent decline," Rajeevan said while releasing second Long Range forecast for southwest monsoon 2020. In last 24 hours, most parts

of Kerala have reported heavy to very heavy rainfall. "While unclear so far, the presence of the cyclone could delay the progress of the monsoon and put it into a 'hiatus,' he said. The IMD also stated that some possibility of development of weak La Niña conditions in the later part of the monsoon season that is good for the monsoon. **Continued on Page 2**

7.26 mn records of BHIM user data leaked: Report

New Delhi: Security researchers have discovered that about 7.26 million records linked to users of mobile payments app BHIM were left exposed to the public by a website.

The exposed data included sensitive information such as names, dates of birth, age, gender, home address, caste status and Aadhaar card details, among others, said the report from VPN review website vpnMentor.

"The scale of the exposed data is extraordinary, affecting millions of people all over India and exposing them to potentially devastating fraud, theft, and attack from hackers and cybercriminals," the security researchers from vpnMentor wrote in a blog post on Sunday.

Offered by the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI), the app BHIM, or Bharat Interface for Money, was launched in 2016.

In a statement on Monday, the NPCI said that "there has

been no data compromise at BHIM App."

"We have come across some news reports which suggest data breach at BHIM App. We would like to clarify that there has been no data compromise at BHIM App and request everyone to not fall prey to such speculations. NPCI follows high level of security and an integrated approach to protect its infrastructure and continue to provide a robust payments ecosystem," said the NPCI.

In its report, vpnMentor also said that the website that leaked the data was developed by a company called CSC e-Governance Services LTD. in partnership with the Indian government.

The issue was resolved late last month after the researchers contacted India's Computer Emergency Response Team (CERT-In) twice in a month's time.

"In this case, the data was stored on an unsecured Amazon Web Services (AWS)

S3 bucket," the researchers said, adding that S3 buckets are a popular form of Cloud storage across the world but require developers to set up the security protocols on their accounts.

"We reached out to the website's developers to notify them of the misconfiguration in their S3 bucket and to offer our assistance. After not receiving a reply, we contacted India's Computer Emergency Response Team (CERT-In), which deals with cybersecurity in the country," they added.

It appears CSC established the website connected to the misconfigured S3 bucket to promote BHIM usage across India and sign up new merchant businesses, such as mechanics, farmers, service providers, and store owners on the app, according to the research led by vpnMentor's Noam Rotem and Ran Locar.

The volume of exposed data which was first discovered by the security researchers on April 23 amounted to 409GB.

Moody's, Fitch and S&P trying to destabilise India's economy as part of 'Chinese conspiracy': BJP MP

New Delhi: BJP MP Nishikant Dubey has urged Prime Minister Narendra Modi to take immediate action against global rating agencies Moody's, Fitch and S&P, alleging that they are "trying to destabilise" India's economy as part of a "Chinese conspiracy".

Though these rating agencies are based in the US, "China has invested in these firms for its strategic interest", he said in a letter to the prime minister on May 31.

"...These rating agencies act and behave like God and treat our country as a third-grade country. Therefore, India's sovereign rating remains low," he said.

Incidentally, Moody's on Monday downgraded India's sovereign rating to 'Baa3' from 'Baa2', saying there will be challenges in implementation of policies to mitigate risks of a sustained period of low growth and deteriorating fiscal position.

"Baa3" is the lowest investment grade - just a notch above junk status.

"These three rating agencies for long have not taken into consideration the correct financial strength of our country like less debt to GDP ratio, and other factors," Dubey said in the letter.

Despite making millions of dollars via their Indian subsidiaries, the Lok Sabha member said, these rating agencies have failed to bring in any advantage or value addition to India and Indian companies.

"...The need of the hour is to put these foreign rating agencies on a tight leash so as to protect India, Indian business and its citizens," he said and requested the prime minister "to take immediate action and protect our country from this Chinese conspiracy".

The BJP MP said the compulsion of ratings from these agencies for Indian entities to avail bank loans should be withdrawn. "Rating should be compulsory only for public/market fund raising that too with Indian owned and Indian controlled rating agencies taking its responsibility," he said.

U'khand CM, three other Ministers in self-quarantine after colleague tests +ve

Dehradun: Uttarakhand Chief Minister Trivendra Singh Rawat and three cabinet colleagues were in self-quarantine Monday following a meeting last week with Tourism Minister Satpal Maharaj, who has tested positive for coronavirus.

Satpal Maharaj, his wife and 21 other people - family members, staff and his followers staying in the same household - have tested positive, an official said.

Swab samples of all ministers and officials who attended the cabinet meeting in which Satpal Maharaj participated were taken for testing on Monday, an official said.

The state health department said there was no need for

those who attended Friday's meeting to isolate themselves, going by the Centre's guidelines.

"The ministers and officials fall into the category of low risk contacts as they were not in close contact with Satpal Maharaj. They can function in a normal way and there is no need to quarantine them," state Health Secretary Amit Negi said.

But the CM and the three other ministers - Harak Singh Rawat, Madan Kaushik and Subodh Uniyal - decided to remain in self-quarantine as a precautionary measure, an official at the Chief Minister's Office said.

"They will remain in self-quarantine at least for the next few days during which

they will be tested for COVID-19," he said.

"Whether or not they resume normal day-to-day functions in a few days will depend on what their test reports say," he said.

Dehradun District Magistrate Ashish Shrivastava said swab samples of all ministers and officials who took part in the meeting have been taken.

"We have received a list of all ministers, officials and employees who were directly or indirectly part of the meeting. Their samples have also been taken for testing," he said.

"People who came in contact with them are also being traced," Shrivastava added. **PTI**

Liquor shops in Delhi can now open daily, no odd-even rule

New Delhi: The Delhi excise department Monday lifted the odd-even restriction on opening of liquor shops, allowing them to operate daily, after the city government announced more relaxations in the coronavirus lockdown.

The government also extended timing for the opening of liquor shops by one-and-a-half hours.

"Liquor shops will now remain open from 9 am to 8 pm in Delhi," a government official said. Until now, they would be allowed to open till 6.30 pm.

According to the order, liquor shops will open on a daily basis now. Earlier, they were being allowed to open on odd-even basis.

However, those in containment zones will remain closed.



Of 863 liquor shops in Delhi, 475 are run by four state-run corporations - Delhi State Industrial and Infrastructure Development Corporation, Delhi Tourism and Transportation Development Corporation, Delhi State Civil Supplies Corporation and Delhi Consumer's Cooperative Wholesale Store - while 389 are owned by private players.

Of these 389, about 150 are located in shopping malls, hence not allowed to open. **PTI**

DJB to augment water capacity to meet shortage

In order to provide uninterrupted water services to the residents during peak summer, Delhi Jal Board is working tirelessly in this pandemic situation to augment the water capacity.

Vice Chairman of DJB, Raghav Chadha, has identified unutilised capacity that can be availed of and will, in turn, increase the total production of Chandrawal 'Waste Treatment Plant' (WTP) from 8 to 10 MGD.

Chadha directed the administrative and engineering staffs to consider the unutilised capacity at the earliest only for summer months in order to cater the growing demand during the peak summers.

Govt kept its promise of fixing MSP at 1.5 times of cost of production: Nadda

New Delhi: BJP president JP Nadda on Monday said the Government has kept its promise of fixing the minimum support price (MSP) at a level of at least 1.5 times of the cost of production.

Welcoming the Union Cabinet's decision to fix the minimum support price for kharif crops, including paddy, cotton and maize, Nadda said the Government has also extended the crop loan repayment to August 31 along with rebate and interest subvention, which will hugely benefit farmers.

"The Government has kept its promise of fixing the MSP at a level of at least 1.5 times of the cost of production. Crop loan repayment has also been extended to August 31 with rebate and interest subvention hugely benefitting farmers," Nadda said in a series of tweets.

He also congratulated the Modi Government for taking

urgent actions to quickly operationalise monetary measures announced for strengthening Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) and helping 50 lakh street vendors as part of "Atmanirbhar package".

The Union Cabinet, chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday, approved provisioning of ₹20,000 crore as subordinate debt to provide equity support to stressed MSMEs and proposed equity infusion of ₹50,000 crore for units through a fund as part of a roadmap to implement the package announced for the sector.

The Government on Monday raised the MSP of paddy marginally by ₹53 per quintal to ₹1,868 per quintal for the 2020-21 crop year, while the rates for oilseeds, pulses and cereals were hiked substantially. **PTI**

CBI reports first virus cases as 2 junior officials test positive

Two officials posted at the CBI headquarters here have tested positive for Covid-19, in first cases of the infection in the investigative agencies, sources said Monday.

The junior-level officials have been sent on leave and asked to remain in quarantine till they are in perfect health to join duty, they said.

The senior officers refused to disclose the identity of their two affected colleagues.

The agency is likely to carry out a contact-tracing exercise and advise those who came in their contacts to start work from home and follow quarantine protocol, they said.

The CBI had initiated strict social-distancing and sanitisation norms from the third week of March with every visitor being checked for temperature and asked to wear face masks mandatorily.

Pak High Commission officials wanted to extract details of Army movements via trains: Police

New Delhi: The motive of the two officials of Pakistan High Commission, who were declared 'persona non grata' by India on charges of espionage, was to extract details of movement of Army units through trains by befriending railway staffers, police said on Monday.

The two officials, Abid Hussain and Muhammad Tahir, were caught by the Special Cell of the Delhi Police from central Delhi's Karol Bagh while they were obtaining sensitive documents relating to India's security installations from an Indian national in exchange of money, official sources had said on Sunday.

According to the police, during investigation, it has emerged that Hussain operated under several fake identities to lure people working in organisations and departments of his interest.

He posed as Gautam, brother

of a media person, to establish contact with an individual working in the Indian Railways.

He tried to gain his confidence by pretending that he needed information about rail movements for his brother who was supposedly doing a story on the Indian Railways and for which he was willing to pay, said Anil Mittal, Additional PRO (Delhi Police).

However, police said the real motive was to lure and trap the railway staff and then acquire information about movement of Army units and hardware via trains.

In a statement released on Sunday, the Ministry of External Affairs had said, "The government has declared both these officials persona non grata for indulging in activities incompatible with their status as members of a diplomatic mission and asked them to leave the country within 24 hours." **PTI**

On Sunday 1,149 persons had tested positive for the pandemic.

According to the release issued by the Government of Tamil Nadu on Monday, 23,495 persons have been tested positive till date in the State. Taking into account the number of persons cured and discharged from hospitals, there were 10,138 active cases in the State as on Monday. The day also saw 11 persons succumbing to the pandemic taking the tally to 184.

In the last 24 hours, 25 deaths and 423 new #Covid-19 positive cases have been reported in Gujarat. The total number of positive cases rises to 17,217 including 10,780 cured/discharged and 1,063 deaths.

As per the order, Airlines shall set the air-conditioning system in such a way that the air gets replaced at the shortest possible intervals.

The aircraft will have to be sanitised after the end of each travel when there is no passenger on board. However, on transit flights, when passengers are on board, the vacated seats (including its contacts), will be sanitised. At the end of the day, each aircraft will be deep cleaned as per procedure. Special attention has to be given to seat belts and all other contact points.

The airplane lavatories will be cleaned or sanitised frequently during the flight. The airlines will also carry out health check-up of all the crew regularly. All the flying/cabin crew will be given full protective suits. At the end of the day, each aircraft must be deep cleaned, DGCA advised.

The DGCA circular noted that the recommendations were submitted to the Ministry of Civil Aviation by the expert committee, constituted by the Ministry in pursuance of the observation of the Supreme Court and in interest of the safety of passengers. The domestic commercial flights started after two months on May 25. International flights will not resume till end of June.

The experts noted that India's nationwide lockdown from March 25 till May 31 has been one of the most "stringent" and yet Covid cases have increased exponentially through this phase, from 606 cases on March 25 to 1,38,845 on May 24.

"This draconian lockdown is presumably in response to a modelling exercise from an influential institution which presented a 'worst-case simulation'." "The model had come up with an estimated 2.2 million deaths globally. Subsequent events have proved that the predictions of this model were way off the mark," said the 16-member joint Covid Task Force that included Dr Shashi Kant, former president IAPSM and Head of the Centre for Community Medicine at AIIMS, New Delhi and others.

Also, on the Task Force are Dr Sanjay K Rai, national president, IPHA and Professor, CCM, AIIMS, Dr D C S Reddy, former Professor and Head, Community Medicine, IMS, BHU, Varanasi and Dr Rajesh Kumar, former Professor & Head, DCM&SPH, PGIMER, Chandigarh Dr Reddy and Dr Kant are also members of an ICMR research group on epidemiology and surveillance for Covid-19.

The experts also took exception that the Government did not consult the epidemiologists while making decisions on tackling the pandemic and rather relied overwhelmingly on general administrative bureaucrats. "Had the Government consulted epidemiologists who had better grasp of disease transmission dynamics compared to modellers, it would have perhaps been better served," the report said.

From the limited information available in the public domain, the experts said, it seems that the government was primarily advised by clinicians and academic epidemiologists with "limited field training and skills".

"The engagement with expert technocrats in the areas of epidemiology, public health, preventive medicine and social scientists was limited," they said. "The incoherent and often rapidly shifting strategies and policies, especially at the national level, are more a reflection of 'afterthought' and catching up phenomenon on part of the policy makers rather than a well thought cogent strategy with an epidemiologic basis," they said.

The second category included products manufactured or assembled in India but the raw material was imported. Likewise, the third category referred to 'Purely Imported Products', officials said.

Each and every product sold by the paramilitary canteens was put under one of these three categories. In the category 3, the KPKB listed 1,026 products that included an Italian chocolate brand and a South Korean manufacturer of air conditioners and televisions.

Seven companies engaged in importing finished products and selling them here included brands like

American shoemaker Skechers, Italian proprietary food products manufacturer Ferraro India and energy drink maker Redbull India.

The delisted products list also included brands like Dabur fruit juice and VIP suitcases among others.

The KPKB order had anticipated the possibility of disputes over the move and underscored that it had categorised the products "on the sole information provided by the firms only".

"In case of any litigation, the information provided by the firm will be used as evidence and the onus to prove the information is correct will be on the respective firm," according to the order.

The push by the canteens for selling only local products follows Prime Minister Narendra Modi's stress on "vocal for local" and subsequent directive by Home Minister Amit Shah that the canteens will only sell "Made in India" products.

According to IMD, as of June 1, the cyclone is located about 360 km southwest of Panjim (Goa), 670 km south-southwest of Mumbai (Maharashtra) and 900 km south-southwest of Surat (Gujarat). It will cross north Maharashtra and south Gujarat coasts between Harihareshwar (Raigad, Maharashtra) and Daman during the evening of June 3.

Unlike cyclone Amphan which was categorised as an extremely severe cyclonic storm that devastated parts of West Bengal the cyclone Nisarga is expected to be less intense when it hits the coast. Konkan and Goa are likely to receive extremely heavy rainfall in isolated places from June 3.

Parts of Maharashtra will also experience heavy rainfall on June 3-4. High waves in the range of 2.3 - 6.5 meters are forecast till 11:30 pm of June 2 along the coast of Maharashtra-- from Malvan to Vasai. Madhavan said the IMD latest cyclone update expects it to balloon into a "severe cyclone" by the middle of the week.

Keeping in mind these representations, the Government decided to further increase the limit for medium manufacturing and service units. Now, it will be ₹50 crore of investment and ₹250 crore of turnover. It has also been decided that the turnover with respect to exports will not be counted in the limits of turnover for any category of MSME units whether micro, small or medium. This is yet another step towards ease of doing business. This will help in attracting investments and creating more jobs in the MSME sector," said the Government in a statement detailing the financial packages.

Gadkari said that ₹50,000 crore equity infusion for MSMEs will strengthen their growth potential and will enable them to get listed on stock exchanges. "This is for the first time MSMEs are get-

ting such support. We are changing the definition of MSMEs after 14 years," he said. Meanwhile, to ensure remunerative prices to the growers for their produce and encourage farmers amid coronavirus pandemic, the CCEA chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday approved increase in the Minimum Support Prices (MSPs) for all mandated kharif crops by 50-83 per cent for marketing season 2020-21. This will help farmers take a call on which kharif (summer) crop to grow as sowing picks up with the arrival of southwest monsoon.

Accordingly, the MSP for paddy has been fixed at ₹1,868 from ₹1,815. The price of the better variety of rice (Grade A) has been proposed at ₹1,888, up from last year's price of ₹1,835. Rice is a major kharif crop, accounting for 40 per cent of the planting in the season. Among cereals, the highest increase is proposed in Bajra where price is likely to be

₹2,150 per quintal from ₹2,000, ₹150 more than last year. Among pulses, highest increment has been recommended for urad, with a proposed rate of ₹6,000 from last year's ₹5,700 a quintal.

The Cabinet has given its approval to extend repayment date up to August 31, for Standard Short-Term loans up to ₹3 lakh advanced for agriculture and allied activities by banks, which have become due or shall become due between 1st March, 2020 and August 31, 2020 with continued benefit of two per cent Interest Subvention (IS) to Banks and three per cent Prompt Repayment Incentive (PRI) to farmers. The Government's decision of providing such loans to farmers through banks @ 7 per cent per annum, with 2 per cent per annum interest subvention to banks and 3 per cent additional benefit on timely repayment by farmers thus provides loans up to ₹3 lakh at 4 per cent per annum interest.

In Gujarat, five Congress MLAs have resigned to make the contest a close one. Gujarat has four Rajya Sabha seats going to polls. While two each for the BJP and the Congress were expected, the resignations have put the Congress in a fix. Here too, the BJP put up an additional candidate to queer the pitch for Congress.

In Rajasthan, the Congress seems more comfortable to win two Rajya Sabha seats and has Congress general secretary and Rahul Gandhi confidant KC Venugopal in the fray from one of the seats. The BJP is poised to win one but

then it put up an additional player to send confusing signals to the opposite camp.

The EC said the Chief Secretaries of the States have been asked to depute a senior officer to ensure that the extant instructions regarding coronavirus containment measures are complied with while making arrangements for conducting the elections.

The Election Commission said it has reviewed the ongoing situation due to the coronavirus pandemic and the guidelines issued by the Union Home Minister and has decided to conduct the polls that were earlier scheduled to be held on March 26.

The EC has appointed Chief Electoral Officer concerned as Observer for the election in the respective state.

G'gram sees 129 cases in a day, total reaches 903

The Gurugram district reported 129 more coronavirus positive cases on Monday. The situation is alarming here with 100 cases reported ten days ago and now the tally has zoomed up to 903 on Monday. The Gurugram district reported 586 Covid-19 cases in the past six days. The total coronavirus cases are at 903 in Gurugram, including 284 who were cured and discharged from hospitals. While 615 are undergoing treatment. Health officials said there

is no reason to panic because of the sudden surge since most cases that have emerged are related to Delhi with those testing positive either being people who visited the capital recently or their contacts. Health official said that several of them are wholesale vegetable dealers in Khandas Anaj Mandi, vegetable vendors, health workers, police personnel, media personnel, pharmacists, depot holders, sanitation workers and some other infected patients who have a travel history to Delhi, who, along with their contacts, are testing positive. The affected areas were

sealed by Municipal Corporation of Gurugram (MCG) and health officials have initiated the sanitation works. "All the patients are isolated at different government, ESI and private hospitals. Their family members are also put under home quarantine. The health officials are making efforts to identify other persons who were infected after coming in contact with them," he said. Increased screening and testing, the official said, is another reason why the number of cases has seen a steep rise this month.

Gridlock at Capital borders on first day of Unlock-1

A massive traffic was reported at Delhi-Gurugram and Delhi-Noida borders on Monday after commuters came out in huge numbers on the first day of the Unlock-1.

The queue on Delhi-Noida Direct (DND) was almost two-kilometer long.

Many among the commuters came out from their cars after they stuck for long as the police deployed at the border was checking passes and the identity cards of the people travelling from Delhi to Noida.

The Delhi Police asked the people who did not have passes to return back. Many among them traveling without passes started returning in the same lane that also created traffic snarl.

The vehicular traffic on the roads have increased by over 40 per cent on Monday morning as several office-goers came out to attend their offices, according to the Delhi Traffic police. The traffic in the national

capital also witnessed a surge as a number of vehicles were seen on the streets in areas like Jhandewalan, ITO etc. Similar, scenes were witnessed at the Delhi-Gurugram and Delhi-Ghaziabad borders.

Noida, Ghaziabad and Gurugram have already sealed their borders with the national capital as the number of the Covid-19 cases saw a spike, with majority of the cases linked to those travelling to Delhi.

Applicable from Monday, June 1, the fresh order issued by the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) spoke of the expanded fresh guidelines a day ahead of the end of lockdown 4.0.

"In exercise of powers under section 6(2)(i) of the Disaster Management Act, 2005, the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) has directed the undersigned to issue an order to extend the lockdown in containment zones up to June 30, and reopen prohibited activities in a phased manner in areas outside the contain-

ment zones," the order read. "Therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred under section 10(2)(l) of the Disaster Management Act 2005, it is directed that the guidelines will remain in force up to June 30. With effect from June 1 to June 30, the lockdown 5.0 will be limited only to containment zones and only a limited number of activities will remain prohibited throughout the country," it added.

As per the order, international air travel, operation of Metro Rail, cinema halls, gymnasiums, swimming pools, entertainment parks, theatres, bars, auditoriums, assembly halls, and political, sports, entertainment, academic, cultural and religious functions, and other large congregations will remain prohibited.

LG, CM condole death of two ASIs from corona

4 held for duping 4K with fake Ayushman website

New Delhi: The Delhi Police has arrested four people for allegedly duping over 4,000 people by promising them jobs under the Centre's flagship Ayushman Bharat scheme.

The accused have been identified as Umesh (37), Rajat Singh (33), Gaurav (26) and Seema Rani Sharma (33).

Police said that the accused had created a fake website that

resembled a Government site and placed advertisement for thousands of jobs. They charged aspirants ₹300 to ₹500 as registration fees, the police said.

According to Anyesh Roy, the Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP), Cyber Cell, the National Health Authority, the agency that administers the health assurance scheme

Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana, registered a complaint with police alleging that it received grievances from public regarding an "unscrupulous agency" which was portraying a false association with the scheme. The details of the website — <https://ayushman-yojana.org> — were obtained and the payment gateway and the bank account linked with it analysed during investigation.

NMC junior engineer dies of virus

"Unfortunately, one of the junior engineers of the civic body died due to Covid-19

The junior engineer got fever on May 18 and he was on leave since then. He was admitted to the Lady Hardinge Medical College and Hospital on May 20, he said.

At least 79 staff of north Corporation tested positive till now including a principal of a

school run by the civic body who tested positive of Coronavirus on Sunday.

"Out of these, 40 who tested positive are health care workers and 39 are field staff," he said.

The official said that a total of 95 staff including health care personnel have been placed under home quarantine till now.

Airport authority issues guidelines for cab operators

White tigress at Delhi zoo undergoes dental procedure

Like human beings, animals too suffer from dental problems. Sita, a 5-year-old white Tigress in Delhi zoo, received emergency dental treatment amidst the lockdown emergency.

While dental pain impacts eating, sleeping and other activities in human beings, animals like tigers also face the same. It impacts their behaviour and other routine activities.

Delhi Zoo officials observed that Sita — the tigress — was under stress and had stopped eating as the painful abscess in her lower canine was affecting her behaviour.

After observing her least interest in activities, Zoo officials conducted a preliminary examination which revealed swelling in the lower gum close to the lower left canine and realised that this was causing the tigress immense pain and discomfort thus requiring immediate medical intervention to help alleviate pain.

Zoo officials consulted with experts from the Indian Veterinary Research Institute (IVRI) in Bareilly and the Wildlife SOS veterinary team to carry out digital radiography and biopsy for proper diagnosis however the problem was that during the lockdown how would a digital radiography machine be brought for this purpose. Without delaying in providing treatment, the Central

Zoo Authority contacted Wildlife SOS. Understanding the urgent nature of the situation, a Wildlife SOS veterinary team transported a Digital X-ray machine and a Dental X Ray machine all the way from Agra to New Delhi.

As the lockdown prevented normal vehicular movement, the NZP Director sent a vehicle with an officer from the zoo to Agra to bring the Wildlife SOS veterinary team and the equipment. The X Ray equipment enabled the veterinary team to examine and detect a root abscess in the lower left canine of the tigers jaw.

The entire medical procedure was carried out by the NZP Veterinary team and the Wildlife SOS Veterinary team working together. The abscess was drained and treated with antiseptic solution and anti-inflammatory medication. The tigress has been placed under observation and is recovering well.

Dr. Suneesh Buxy, IFS-DIG and Director NZP Delhi Zoo, said, "The NZP vet team and Wildlife SOS have done a good job with providing treatment. This has brought significant improvement in the overall health of the tigress."

Meanwhile Zoo officials are monitoring her recovery and treatment of infected area is carried out daily. "She is active and eating without any discomfort," a Zoo official said.

BJP Bihar campaign to start with 'virtual rally'

 Amid the coronavirus pandemic, the BJP is set to unlock its poll campaign in Bihar next week with a "virtual rally" by Union Home Minister and former BJP president Amit Shah who will address the people of the State through video conference and Facebook Live.
 Shah's virtual rally will be followed up by BJP President J P Nadda's "digital rally" in the State that is slated to go to polls in October-November this year to elect 243 members of the Bihar Legislative Assembly. The term of the current Assembly, elected in 2015, will expire on November 29, 2020.
 The BJP has been sharing power with the JD(U), headed by Chief Minister Nitish Kumar since 2005, barring a four-year gap from 2013-17.
 Bihar would be the focus of most of the 2,000 virtual video conferences, rallies or meetings announced across the States by the BJP in the next one month. The Central and State leaders, to begin with, will address and mobilise booth-level workers in the State through video-conferencing.
 According to Bihar BJP President Sanjay Jaiswal, the

party has set a target of roping in "at least one lakh people across the 243 Assembly segments in Bihar" for the video conference, besides those who may prefer to listen to the speech on the social networking site.
 "The virtual rally can be very well called the commencement of our digital campaign for Assembly elections in Bihar. The June 9 rally by the Home Minister will be followed by similar public addresses from party president J P Nadda on a later date. Itinerary for the same will be made known in due course. Nadda is expected to address the people in two phases covering north and south Bihar," he said at Patna.
 The Rashtriya Janata Dal is also planning to counter Shah's "virtual rally" by its own "Garib Adhikar Divas" rally on June 9.
 BJP's national president this week said that Coronavirus has restricted the scope of real poll campaigning but the party would launch electioneering sticking to new norms of 'social distancing' and taking to face masks.
 Bihar's Deputy Chief Minister Sushil Kumar Modi, had, interestingly, spoken of the possibility of 'virtual cam-

paign' and even 'online voting' replacing old-style rallies and the long queues outside polling booths in the times of pandemic.
 The election commission will have the last say on the date of polling and the mode of campaign if the pandemic curve is not beaten effectively before the year-end, sources said.
 While large gatherings are prohibited under what is being termed as "Unlock 1.0", it remains to be seen whether conventional poll campaign involving rallies and roadshows will be allowed by the time the election schedule is announced.
 Rival parties in Bihar apprehend that a campaign restricted to the "digital" mode would be of disproportionate advantage to the BJP, which has a well-oiled IT cell, and by virtue of being in power at the Centre for more than six years, can marshal resources with far greater ease than its rivals.
 Last month, Nadda had addressed a meeting of Bihar core committee leaders through video-conferencing and exchanged views relating to electioneering, including the subject of stranded migrants from the State.

India's corona fatality rate still lower at 2.83%

Covid-19 case-wise, India may have moved up viciously from the 10th position to 7th position within a week since May 25 but the fatality rate at 2.83 per cent of the total death of nearly 5,400 is much lower than the global 6 per cent.
 The recovery rate in India also improved to 48.13 per cent on Monday. On May 25, India with 1,38,645 infected cases was at tenth position piping Iran which currently has 1,54,445 cases. On May 31, India with 1,90,535 cases replaced France to move to 7th position.
 A senior official from the Union Health Ministry said that infection and fatality might seemingly be moving at the faster pace in India, but when compared to the other worst-hit countries, it is comparatively low (See Box).
 The case fatality rate is 2.83 per cent. On May 18, it was 3.15 per cent while on May 3, it was 3.25 per cent and on April 15 it was 3.30 per cent.
 "A steady decline can be seen in the case fatality rate in the country. The relatively low death rate is attributed to the continued focus on surveillance, timely case identification and clinical management of the cases," he said.
 In comparison, said the official, the USA has 5.92 per cent, UK (14.07 per cent), Italy

(14.33 per cent), Spain (12.12 per cent) and other around eight other developed nations where case fatality is comparatively higher than India.
 "Through a graded, preventive and pro-active approach, we are taking several steps along with the States/UTs for prevention, containment and management of Covid-19.
 These are being regularly reviewed and monitored at the highest level," he added. The official also said that two specific

trends are being noticed: while the recovery rate is increasing on one hand, case fatality is going down on the other.
 A total of 91,818 patients have been cured of the disease, with recovery rate at 48.19 per cent amongst Covid-19 patients.
 The testing capacity has increased in the country through 472 Government and 204 private laboratories (total 676 laboratories). Cumulatively, 38,37,207 samples have been tested so far for the infection.

IMA urges Govt to extend MSME benefits to clinics, nursing homes

The Indian Medical Association (IMA) has urged the Government to extend the micro, small and medium enterprises (MSME) benefits, recently announced by the Finance Ministry, to clinics, nursing homes and small hospitals run by single doctors, couple doctors and group of doctors who are grappling with financial crisis owing to the Covid-19 pandemic.
 "There are thousands of single doctors, couple doctors and group of doctors who have established clinics, nursing homes and small hospitals providing healthcare in almost all the districts and towns of the country. They provide affordable healthcare and are accessible 24x7.
 "Most of them fail to come under the definition of MSME. It is also true they have been badly affected in the current lockdown situation. Many of them have been closed. Some of them may not revive at all.



All of them are important in the current stage of exit to provide non-Covid services and perhaps even Covid-19 related services," IMA national president Dr Rajan Sharma said.
 This stimulus package, which requires clarity will allow these institutions to survive and continue serving the people, Dr Sharma added. The IMA represents private medical professionals in the country.
 The Government has announced a major economic package for the MSMEs which have been given a special consideration to help them bail out from financial crisis in the wake of Coronavirus pandemic.

Naidu, Birla mull virtual Parliament in long run

Rajya Sabha Chairman M Venkaiah Naidu and Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla on Monday discussed about the conduct of Monsoon Session of Parliament under social distancing norms in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic. Naidu and Birla also explored "virtual Parliament" as an option in the long run and to adopt technology to enable Parliament Sessions to tide over situations when regular meetings are not possible.
 Both the Presiding officers also referred the issue of virtual meetings of parliamentary committees to the Rules Committees of both the Houses in view of the confidentiality aspect of the deliberations.
 Parliament officials said several options are being considered including holding the meeting of Lok Sabha in the

Central Hall, with the Rajya Sabha, which has less members than the lower house, shifting to the chamber of Lok Sabha. Also the sittings of both the Houses can be held on alternate days.
 Taking note of reports suggesting that the fight against the coronavirus is likely to be a long haul, Naidu convened the meeting at his official residence which was also attended by the Secretary Generals of both the houses.
 The presiding officers directed the Secretary Generals to examine the feasibility of using the central hall of Parliament appropriately to ensure social distancing norms during the upcoming monsoon session.
 They noted that since there is no requirement of maintaining confidentiality of the proceedings of both the Houses, which are open to general public besides being

telecast live, virtual Parliament is an option to be explored in the long run.
 The two officials were also directed to examine in detail various technical and other arrangements to be ensured to enable smooth functioning of both the Houses.
 Parliament usually meets in July-August for the monsoon session. It was adjourned sine die on March 24, ahead of schedule, amid growing concerns over the Covid-19 outbreak.
 "Both the Secretary Generals briefed the Chairman and Speaker on issues connected with the proposed virtual meetings of various committees of Parliament," said the official.
 Measures include providing a safe technological platform, complying with the rules of confidentiality of deliberations in such meetings and the difficulties in ensuring the

same in case of virtual meeting, they said.
 Infrastructure upgrade to be undertaken to enable virtual meetings and the time likely to be taken in this regard were also discussed.
 Taking cognisance of the long existing rules regarding confidentiality in respect of meetings of the committees and the implications of holding virtual meetings, Naidu and Birla opined that it would be necessary to refer the issue of virtual meetings to the Rules Committees of both the Houses, the sources said.
 Regarding the view expressed in some quarters that presiding officers can suspend the Rules, officials have pointed out that such suspension requires a motion to be carried in the House and presiding officers cannot supersede rules by issuing directions.
 Both Naidu and Birla noted that the chairmen of various

committees of Parliament including the department-related Standing Committees are empowered to convene regular meetings of respective committees on their own.
 However, in view of the feedback being received from some members of Parliament about their inability to travel on account of quarantine norms in various states, they felt that it may be better for the chairmen of various committees to convene meetings after ascertaining the likely attendance of Members.
 Officials informed that the average attendance in the meetings of the eight department-related Standing Committees of Rajya Sabha over the last three years has been about 45 per cent.
 This in effect means that on an average, 14 of the 31 members of each committee attended the meetings, they said.

Take political parties, country into confidence over China border issue, Cong tells Centre

The Congress on Monday asked the Government to take all political parties and the country into confidence over restoration of the status quo ante on the border with China.
 Congress' chief spokesperson Randeep Surjewala said there can be no compromise on India's security and territorial integrity and posed a set of questions to the Government on the situation at the border in Ladakh.
 He questioned the "silence" of the Government on the "brazen Chinese transgression" into Indian territory.
 The Congress leader also expressed concern over issues raised by Nepal and hoped the Government would find a lasting solution to it.
 "Why has the Modi Government not taken the nation into confidence vis-a-vis

the actual position on the ground?", the Congress asked.
 "While the Government has briefly commented upon resolving the crisis diplomatically, the Modi Government must take all political parties and the country into confidence on restoring the status quo and protecting India's territorial integrity," Surjewala demanded at AICC Press conference.
 The Congress said that umpteen news reports reflect that Chinese forces have made serious transgressions into Indian Territory at three points in Ladakh and Sikkim.
 "Reports of Chinese Army moving thousands of troops in Galwan Valley and Pangong Tso Lake Area (Ladakh) are shocking and audacious attempt on our "territorial integrity", said the party leader.
 The grand old party said if these reports are true, the

Modi Government must answer -Have the Chinese troops occupied Indian Territory in the Galwan River Valley and Pangong Tso Lake in Ladakh?
 It asked from the government to clarify that the Chinese transgressions into Galwan River Valley threaten the operation of "Darbuk-Shyok-DBO Road" vital to servicing Indian troops in Sub-Sector North and Karakoram pass.
 Have they crossed into Indian Territory even beyond China's own "Claim Line", pitched hundreds of tents, constructed concrete structures and built a few kilometres of road along the LAC in Galwan River Valley as also on the north bank of Pangong Tso Lake? And is it correct that Chinese troops have occupied the "Finger Heights near Pangong Tso Lake?" asked the Congress.

Odisha, Sikkim, Mizoram join 'One Nation-One Ration Card'

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

Three more States — Odisha, Sikkim and Mizoram — have joined the 'One Nation-One Ration Card' scheme, taking the number of states and union territories (UTs) which have joined the scheme to 20. Uttarakhand, Nagaland and Manipur will also be added to the national cluster by August.
 Union Food and Consumer Affairs Minister Ram Vilas Paswan said on Monday said necessary infrastructure work - upgradation of electronic Point of Sale (ePoS) software, integration with central Integrated Management of PDS (IM-PDS) and Annavitran portals, availability of ration cards/beneficiaries data in cen-

tral repository and requisite testing of national portability transactions — required for ration card portability has been completed in these three states-Odisha, Sikkim and Mizoram. So far, ration card portability has been enabled in 17 states and UTs—Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Dadra & Nagar Haveli and Daman & Diu, Goa, Gujarat, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Kerala, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Punjab, Telangana, Tripura and Uttar Pradesh.
 Under the 'One Nation-One Ration Card' initiative, eligible beneficiaries would be able to avail their entitled foodgrains under the National Food Security Act (NFSA) from any Fair Price Shop in the country

using the same ration card.
 "Further, constant efforts are being made by this Department to expand the reach of national portability to the beneficiaries of other states/UTs also in association with respective state/UT governments," Paswan said.
 The Food Ministry is doing all necessary arrangements to include remaining 13 states and UTs to the national cluster.
 A central technical team has imparted the requisite orientation training to the technical teams and concerned officers of these states through video conferencing and necessary guidelines/instructions for the implementation of national/inter-state portability were also provided to them, Paswan said.

PM Svanidhi for street vendors

The Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (MoHUA) on Monday launched PM Svanidhi, or Pradhan Mantri Street Vendor's AtmaNirbhar Nidhi scheme, which is a special micro-credit facility plan to provide affordable loan of up to ₹10,000 to more than 50 lakh street vendors, who had their businesses operational on or before 24 March. The scheme is valid until March 2022.
 Under the scheme, vendors can avail working capital loan of up to ₹10,000, which is repayable in monthly instalments within one year. On timely/early repayment of the loan, an interest subsidy of 7% per annum will be credited to the bank accounts of beneficiaries through Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) on six-

months basis. There will be no penalty on early repayment of loan.
 The scheme is applicable to vendors, hawkers, thelewalas, rehriwalas, theliphadwalas in different areas/contextual who supply goods and services. Street vendors belonging to the surrounding peri-urban/rural areas are also included.
 The scheme targets to benefit over 50 lakh Street Vendors, who had been vending on or before 24 March, 2020, in urban areas including those from surrounding peri-urban/ rural areas.
 The duration of the scheme is till March 2022. The street vendors belonging to the surrounding peri-urban/ rural areas are being included as beneficiaries under the urban livelihoods programme for the first time.

OZ PM to hand over stolen artefacts to Modi during virtual meet

A virtual meeting between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his Australian counterpart Scott Morrison scheduled on June 4 is also likely to witness the latter handing over online the exquisitely carved stolen artefacts, including two Nayak period dwarapalas or temple gate guardians and a 6th or 7th Century serpent king (Nagaraja) of Rajasthan/Madhya Pradesh, stolen from India.
 The Australian Government had earlier planned to return the three antiquities of cultural significance during the official visit of Morrison to India in January early this year. But the plan went for a toss, first owing to forest fires in Australia followed

by the Covid-19 pandemic which has brought the world on its knees.
 Sources in the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) said that the three culturally significant artefacts, a pair of "Dwarapala" (door guardians), dating back to 15th century, are from Tamil Nadu. The 'Nagaraja' (serpent king), belonging to 6th or 8th century from either Rajasthan or Madhya Pradesh, was at display at National Gallery of Australia. It had reportedly purchased them from idol smuggler Subhash Kapoor.
 However, extensive research undertaken by the Gallery prompted it to voluntarily return these artefacts to India. "We are expecting the Australian leader to virtually handover the idols to our Prime Minister Modi when



they have a virtual meeting on June 4. After that, we will send the two Dwarapalas to Idol wing of Tamil Nadu which has registered a theft case in the matter while the Serpent King will be handed over to a museum in Red Fort," the sources

said.
 In September last year, a 600-year-old Nataraja idol worth Rs 30 crore which was stolen 37 years ago from a temple at Kallidaikurichi in Tirunelveli district, Chennai, Tamil Nadu was returned to

India by Australia. The two and a half feet 16th-century idol which was kept in the gallery in Adelaide, Australia for 17 years was traced a year ago.
 Three years ago, Australia had returned three artefacts, including an idol of goddess Pratyangira, stolen from a Shiva temple in Cuddalore district in Tamil Nadu. In 2014, then Australian Prime Minister Tony Abbott had returned two statues of Nataraja and Ardhanariswarar stolen from temples in the state.
 Both India and Australia are a party to the UNESCO 1970 Convention on the Means of Prohibiting and Preventing the Illicit Import, Export and Transport of Ownership of Cultural Property.

1,162 test positive in TN, 11 die

Total reaches 23,495

The day Tamil Nadu chose to relax the lockdown and allow factories, IT companies and business establishments to resume operations saw 1,162 persons testing positive for coronavirus, the highest number of cases to be registered on a single day. On Sunday 1,149 persons had tested positive for the pandemic.

According to the release issued by the Government of Tamil Nadu on Monday, 23,495 persons have been tested positive till date in the State. Taking into account the number of persons cured and discharged from hospitals, there were 10,138 active cases in the

State as on Monday. The day also saw 11 persons succumbing to the pandemic taking the tally to 184.

Chennai, Chengalpattu, Kancheepuram and Thiruvallur districts topped the table with the highest number of covid patients. Dr Ram Subramanian, member of the medical team advising the Tamil Nadu Government said the increase in the number of patients need not cause any kind of apprehension in the minds of the people. "The responsibility of the citizens is to make sure that they wear masks and observe social distancing.

Also, see to it that children below the age of 10 and senior citizens (those above the age of 60) remain at home because

they are the most vulnerable group," said Dr Ram Subramanian, a specialist in infectious diseases.

Chief Minister Edappadi Palaniswamy on Monday laid the foundation for a ₹ 235 crore Software Park to be built by Tamil Nadu Industrial Development Corporation at Pattabiram, a Chennai suburb. The park named as Tidel

Park would offer 25,000 direct employment in the field of futuristic technology, said a release by the Tamil Nadu Government.

Despite the ever increasing number of patients, the State is limping back to normalcy as the lockdown which was in force for the last 65 days has entered its last phase. Barring the four districts of Chennai, Thiruvallur, Kancheepuram and Chengalpattu, lockdown is being relaxed all over the remaining 33 districts, though remnants of the restrictions are still visible.

State-owned transport buses started plying in 33 districts with stringent regulations like social distancing and face masks. Employees of Tamil Nadu State Transport

Corporation, the public sector that operates inter-district bus services looked jovial and pleased as they welcomed the passengers onboard by offering them hand sanitizers.

"It has been lifeless 65 days away from the growling of the engines and the cacophony of the passengers. We have never experienced such a phase in out three decades of service," said Manoharan, a driver in Sivaganga bus station while getting ready for the routine trip to Karaikudi.

M K Stalin, leader of the Opposition, who is also the president of the DMK said in a statement that the hike in the number of coronavirus cases in the State is due to the failure of the government to properly conduct the tests.

Reshuffle in Bengal BJP ahead of 2021 polls

Ahead of the June 8 video conference with Home Minister Amit Shah, the Bengal BJP has effected massive organizational reshuffling that saw shunting of a known "plain-speaker" senior leader Chandra Bose a scion of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose.

The name of Bose who was a vice president of the Bengal party unit would not appear in the new list of office bearers even as State BJP president announced the new list of functionaries even as critics said the new list makes it apparent that the party is looking for street fighters rather than ideologues to counter the Trinamool Congress in the next year's Assembly elections.

According to the new list Barrackpore MP and a former strongman of the TMC Arjun Singh has been promoted to the

post of vice president. Along with him Bankura MP Dr Subhas Sarkar, Hooghly leader Rajkamal Pathak, Ritesh Tewari, Pratap Banerjee, Raju Banerjee, and Mehfuza Khatun too have been made the party's State vice presidents.

Former women's wing leader Locket Chatterjee, the current Hooghly MP has been made the General Secretary of the party along with JP Singh Mahato and others. Locket Chatterjee is replaced by fashion designer Agnimitra Paul as the State party Mahila Morcha president. Sabyasachi Dutta another TMC turncoat and close associate of senior leader Mukul Roy has been made the party's state secretary. Vocal leader Sayantan Banerjee too have made a general secretary while party MP Soumitra Khan has been made the Yuva Morcha president.

The reshuffling takes place

at a crucial time ahead of the next year's Assembly elections which the BJP is seeing as a chance to bring about a second change in Bengal.

The reshuffling --- which further tightens the stranglehold of Ghosh in the State party --- also takes place ahead of the five-day video conference with Shah who would speak to all the party workers and office bearers from June 8 onward, sources said.

Meanwhile Ghosh on Monday made it clear that his party was switching on to the agitation mode keeping the next year's elections in mind even as he brought new allegations against the TMC Government accusing it of large-scale housing corruption. Crores have been siphoned off in housing scam which is a big scam and the party will take up this cause soon along with other issues," he said.

Chennaiites face difficulty to reach other TN dists

For the first time in recent history, Chennai has become out of bounds for people from other districts in Tamil Nadu. Similarly, every Chennaiite desiring to go out of city limits to other districts in the State should undergo tests for coronavirus, according to the guidelines formulated by Department of Health.

Though autorickshaws are plying in the city, only two passengers could travel at a time making the common man's vehicle literally out of his rich. The auto drivers are fleeing the passengers due to a host of reasons which include restrictions in travel. Chennai and the three neighbouring districts

are devoid of public transport. This has made life difficult for employees in government and corporate offices who do not have their own vehicles for commuting.

Travellers who are planning to come to Tamil Nadu have been asked to collect e-passes from the portal tnpass.tnega.org. Both air and train passengers coming to Tamil Nadu have to get e-pass from the Government portal, said the department of health.

Eateries and restaurants are the establishments which have been hit hard by the coronavirus and the resultant lockdown. Most of these restaurants had employed migrant labourers as tea makers, cooks and suppliers. Since

they have gone back to their villages in Assam, Bengal, Bihar and Uttar Pradesh, the proprietors are struggling to get workers.

"The local people would not agree to work on the salary which we pay to the migrant labourers and hence it is not viable to open the shops," said the owner of a popular eatery. Most of the tea and coffee shops in Chennai were owned and operated by Keralites.

With the advent of coronavirus, they returned to their native places in Kerala, which has dampened the spirit of the population in the Metro, because the Malayali coffee and tea were an essential ingredient in the lives of Chennaiites.

Goa likely to allow more activities, hints Sawant

"All activities which have been allowed by the Central Government will be allowed in Goa too, but as Goa, we may take some other steps too. We will finalise the decision by today evening about some other relaxations which can be made," Sawant told reporters outside his official residence.

Yogi to give ration kits, ₹1,000 to each destitute

Lucknow: Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath has directed officials to provide ration kits and ₹1,000 to all destitutes who do not have ration cards. In his meeting with Team 11 officials on Monday, the Chief Minister said that efforts should also be made to provide ration cards to these people. In the rural areas, the ration kits and ₹1,000 will be given from the funds allotted to village heads while in the urban areas, the same will be provided by municipal corporations, the Government spokesman said.

"If any such persons are not registered under the Ayushman Bharat Yojana or the Mukhya Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana, he should be provided necessary treatment all the same," he said.

Patients recovery rate goes up in Maha in one month

Some good news emerged from the worst-Coronavirus affected Maharashtra on Monday in the form of increase in the rate of recovery of patients by 26.47 per cent during the last one month — from 16.88 per cent on April 30 to 43.35 per cent on May 31, even as coronavirus claimed 76 lives and left 2,361 others infected in various parts of the State during the last 24 hours. The number of deaths dropped in Maharashtra from 89 on Sunday to 76 on Monday. There had been a total of 591 deaths in Maharashtra during the previous six days. On May 26 (Tuesday) the state had witnessed 97 deaths, while there were 105 deaths on Wednesday, 85 deaths on Thursday, 116 deaths on Friday and 99 deaths on Saturday. Sunday's Covid-19 toll was 89.

The number of new infected cases dropped from 2487 on Sunday to 2361 on Monday. At a time when Covid-19 appears to be peaking in Maharashtra, the increase in recovery rate has brought some solace to doctors waging a relentless battle against the pandemic.

As per the statistics put out by the state health department on Monday, the recovery rate stood at 12.91 per cent on March 31, twenty two days after the

first person tested positive for coronavirus in the state on March 9. In the following month from April 1 to April 30, the recovery rate rose marginally from 12.91 per cent to 16.88 per cent. However, during the period from May 1 to May 31, the recovery rate increased by 26.47 per cent from 16.88 per cent to 43.35 per cent, which doctors fighting the Covid-19 battle is pretty impressive.

In terms of numbers, as many as 39 out of total 302 patients recovered from March 9 (when the first coronavirus case was recorded in the state) to March 31. In the following month from April 1 to April 30, 1773 patients out of total 10498 patients were discharged from various hospitals after full recovery.

76 new cases, 34 discharged in Andhra

Amaravati: Andhra Pradesh's 76 new coronavirus cases took the state's total tally on Monday to 3,118 even as 34 patients were cured and discharged to take such cases to 2,169. The number of active cases in the state now stands at 885. With two deaths in Kurnool district,

the state's death toll climbed to 66 on Monday morning. The Koyambedu market connection again surfaced on Monday, with the state nodal officer reporting that eight of the positive cases detected in the past 24 hours had visited the Chennai market.

People crowd streets on Day 1 of unlock 1.0 in WB

The City of Joy tended to miss a heart beat on Monday the first day of "unlock 1.0" even as things degenerated into a mega mix-up when citizens threw all cautions to the wind thronging public places and boarding packed up public buses—that ran far and few between—in mad desperation to reach their work places.

While people spilled over to the streets thronging market places in thousands at the end of 67 days confinement, the enforcers of law were hardly to be seen around, sources complained.

"We have been forced to come out of our houses taking great risk on our lives as we have been asked by our respected offices to join work. But here we have no adequate public transport because the large majority of public buses are not running because they have an

issue with the Government with increased fare," said Nalini Goswami and IT professional.

As the people tried to avail of the skeletal public transport whatever government buses were running got jam-packed with passengers, the more conscious people complained adding the policemen were nowhere to be seen to enforce the social distancing norms.

Monday saw a number of religious places opening up in Bengal with the exception of Kalighat, Dakshineswar temples and Belur Math. While busy religious places like the three "Shakti Peeths" of Birbhum district, Thanthania Kali Temple and Lake Kali Temple in Kolkata opened up with limited visitors.

The Jute, mining and Tea industry to functioned normally after the Government allowed these sectors to function with 100 percent atten-

dance. The Bengal Government had extended lockdown on June 1, permitting total attendance in MSMEs, mining, jute and tea industries.

Expressing great concern over the way things were shaping up post lockdown Dr. Sumit Jana said "it seems that the people are preferring jahan (livelihood) to jaan (life). People don't seem to understand that they are at great risk and the way the number of cases are going up we soon climb up the list of worst affected countries."

Dr AK Nandi a virologist said, "the people will have to understand that they have been given a respite from lockdown because to remain afloat economically and not to go and party. If they do not understand it now then they will be in for a big trouble as the cases are going to rise in June and July in heaps and bounds."

Guj offices, shops re-open, buses are back on roads

Gandhinagar: With the announcement of relaxations in lockdown norms, the wheels of administration in Gujarat started rolling again, here on Monday, after more than two months of shutdown.

The Chief Minister and other Ministers kept 2-minute silence to pay respects to all those who lost their lives due to Covid-19.

At the Secretariat, employees and visitors were allowed only from Gates No 1 and 4 after thermal screening.

The state transport buses, the Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation-run (AMC) AMTS and BRTS also started operating, barring in the containment areas.

The dedicated state transport buses, ferrying government employees from Ahmedabad to Gandhinagar, also plied at 50 per cent strength during the day. IANS

Advisory issued for prayers in UP mosques

Lucknow: The Islamic Centre of India has issued a fresh advisory regarding opening of mosques from June 8.

Maulana Khalid Rashid Firangi Mahali, chairman of the Centre, said that people should wait for 15 days before going to mosques.

He asked people not to crowd in mosques and added that people above 65 years and children below 10 years should not visit mosques in the pandemic.

The Maulana said that the Friday prayers would be held in four different groups so that social distancing is maintained. He said that all carpets and rugs would be removed from mosques and a distance of six feet would be maintained between each person.

The mosque would be cleaned with disinfectants before and after each prayer.

The cleric said that soap would be provided for "wuzu" (washing of hands and people should bring skull caps from their homes, instead of using the ones provided in a mosque.

All those visiting the mosques should wear masks, the advisory said. IANS

Another push

Cabinet decisions on MSMEs and the agricultural economy are well-intended but depend a lot on implementation and sub-text



The Coronavirus and its shape-shifting effect on the economy have been debilitating but the Government has been reacting to them in fits and starts. And while the stimulus packages announced in a series so far haven't been as stimulating, the Cabinet decisions with regard to Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) and the agricultural economy are well-intended but depend a lot on implementation and details. The definition of MSMEs has been changed, their turnover limit revised upward to ₹250 crore from ₹100 crore. The Government has infused ₹20,000 crore into

the sector as subordinate debt for stressed units. And although the Finance Minister in her first tranche of the stimulus had included ₹3 lakh crore collateral-free automatic loans for them, many MSME owners claimed that about 97 per cent of them were not in the corporate sector and were either partnerships or proprietorships. So only a minuscule number of firms, that were either private limited or LLP, benefited. Besides, this badly-hit sector, which contributes up to 30 per cent of the GDP, has not quite recovered from demonetisation and many units are almost on the verge of closure. And for all the detailing, the fact of the matter is that credit channels like banks and NBFCs will have to ease loans to this sector no matter what the Government says. Even now, MSME credit is a very small percentage of total outstanding bank credit and that pie was declining even before the pandemic, decelerating industrial growth. The proposed fund of funds would help list MSMEs on stock exchange, hoping it would encourage private sector investments in them. But without good ratings and financials, that would not deliver immediately. Farmers, too, got some incentive in the form of a hike in Minimum Support Price (MSP) for 14 crops, which will be 50-83 per cent more than the cost of production. But the Government's loan facility to them (₹3 lakh with a two per cent interest subvention) and the credit scheme for street vendors still do not address the dire need for fund infusion. Of course, more decisions guaranteeing farmers' incomes, encouraging crop rationalisation and making agri-business investment worthy are expected like getting rid of the Agricultural Produce Marketing Committee (APMC) Act and facilitating easy inter-state trade for farmers. They are currently bound to sell agriculture produce only through APMC mandis, which restrict the free flow of farm products and lead to cartelisation. Though APMCs were meant to protect farmers from commission agents and middlemen, over time they embodied the very ills that they were meant to cure. But to their credit, they did ensure a steady procurement of foodgrains to avoid our food crises. So though farmers may have free market benefits, dismantling a regimented procurement structure would have to be followed up by creating an efficient marketing and distribution system that does not compromise our food security. Free market policies may not look at such altruistic priorities as creating a buffer. Yet we must remember that at least our surplus food reserves helped us somewhat during an emergency brought about by the pandemic. The dairy industry would be a good comparison. With private dairies refusing to buy extra milk produced, only cooperative dairies picked it up and converted it into other milk products, thereby easing the pressure on dairy owners. The Kerala Cooperative Milk Marketing Federation is even providing free milk to migrants to take care of the glut in supplies. Also, over 90 per cent of our farmers do not have access to regulated markets, so dismantling them wouldn't really have a cascading impact. A better bet would be to widen a network of well-distributed mandis and invest in longer shelf life of produce by way of attendant infrastructure like cold chains, storage, grading, transportation and so on.

Also, many of these measures were intended and discussed before to revive a slowing economy and are not particularly a palliative to the pandemic. We still have a slowing GDP to take care of and that will need big bang reforms and a fund infusion in the short run. Second, this year's GDP projection has fallen to 4.2 per cent and a consistent downward revision of growth means that figures aren't sacred. And for all the push to the agricultural sector, nothing is being done to generate demand in urban hubs or tackle joblessness without which no reform would make sense. Our manufacturing and construction growth is almost flatlining and certain sectors are just not being considered for incentivisation. Till this piecemeal approach continues, no matter how reinvigorating each is, there is no rescuing the economy.

Back to space

The privately-funded SpaceX mission not only marks America's return to manned space flight but is much more



A comment on Twitter read, "2020 in the US resembled 1968." A statement by aviation journalist Jon Ostrower has a historical context to it. For those of us in India, it is worth recalling that in the late 1960s, as the US reached for the moon, race riots and civil rights movement led by Martin Luther King reached a crescendo. Similarly, protests following the "effective" murder of an unarmed Black man George Floyd, just as America launched its first manned mission to space after almost a decade, is a telling commentary on the US: The world's only superpower can

climb the greatest heights and plumb the lowest lows all at once. However, one must not lose sight of the tremendous achievement of the SpaceX Crew Dragon mission to the International Space Station (ISS) undertaken by astronauts Robert Behnken and Douglas Hurley. For one, while funded in part by the US' space agency, NASA, the rocket that carried the astronauts to space, the Falcon 9, the Dragon capsule and even the spacesuits the astronauts wore, were all developed by the Elon Musk-promoted SpaceX. Musk, who also founded electric carmaker Tesla, is a divisive figure for many but only the most petulant will deny that he is a technology visionary. Developing a commercially-viable space launch system from scratch and now using it to launch astronauts from American soil, he has done something that was previously unthinkable. A private, commercial organisation without Government support, funded by Musk's billions among other investors in a sector previously dominated by Government money across the world, he has proven, like he himself with electric cars, that change is possible.

This acquires even more significance as India, too, is opening up its space sector for commercial opportunities. Of course, we might not be able to find a man like Musk but even small private sector development, starting with a satellite that can use existing technology from the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO), can drive India's space industry. Musk's development with SpaceX alongside the work by fellow American billionaire Jeff Bezos with his "Blue Origin" has created large volumes of research as well as high-tech jobs across the US. India can emulate this and create jobs for legions of its best and brightest engineers, many of who emigrated to the US to work with the likes of Musk and Bezos as well as the larger aerospace and space industries. Arguing that opportunities exist and allowing industry access is not, however, the be-all and end-all of policy. The Indian Government, ISRO and private Indian industry will have to walk the talk if we want to emulate Musk.

Age of reason

Amid border tensions, India must beat China at its own game by playing to its strengths, lowering rhetoric, strengthening its military-economic muscle and posturing peace

The crest and trough of the Sino-Indian relationship has been witnessing its lowest ebb ever since the Doklam standoff of 2017. Now, an expected reportage of counter-narratives is ensuing on both sides. Hard facts have become a casualty. The primary driver for the present jingoistic fervour is the cold reality of extreme "political vulnerability" following mismanagement of the COVID pandemic and its accompanying impact both in Beijing and New Delhi. Thus, the common urge for some societal distraction. The ability to spin the situation (however severe) towards their own advantage has been the hallmark of both regimes.

While this is certainly not the sort of distraction that would appeal to New Delhi's sensibilities, it is clearly up the Chinese path of circumstantial preference. The Xi regime is legitimised and galvanised by the hegemonic "Chinese Dream" and the sudden undoing of the same due to the socio-economic cost of COVID-19. Alongside came the trade war with the US, impulsive tendencies flaring up in Hong Kong, Tibet and with the Uighurs. The re-election of Taiwanese President Tsai Ing-Wen, who has brazenly slammed the door on the Chinese offer of "one country, two systems," dealt a further blow. Chinese President Xi Jinping is desperately looking for distraction and is showcasing some "wins." He is punting on the tried and tested formula of patriotism to "manufacture" distraction.

In such times, the media becomes the foremost weapon for subterfuge and inflaming passions that tend to divert passions from real issues. It is in this backdrop that a rather bizarre, loaded and factually questionable goad was made by Xi when he said, "It is necessary to explore ways of training and preparing for war because epidemic control efforts have been normalised." The supposed "enemy" was not named. It could be anyone — Taiwan, the US or India — given the prevailing dissonance. The Indian media does no service in biting the bait with its own proclivity for war-mongering and provoking the citizenry to adopt their own diversionary views. Uber-nationalism is also fodder for TRPs. Besides, it is also ostensibly projects a "positive" outlook of Indian capabilities.

Amid the media din, the official dispensation has maintained an unusual silence, unlike the fuming free-for-all against Pakistan. Somewhere, the chinks in our foreign policy (especially with our neighbours) are getting embarrassingly exposed with traditional allies like Nepal, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka, too, rolling their eyes gently at China. Indian diplomacy seems to have got carried away with its own supposed stridency and circumstantial "pivot" with an ultimately fickle



US ignoring the virtues of quiet diplomacy and humility.

The fact is that China has an expansionist agenda while India does not. This is reflected in Chinese realpolitik and its chess-board moves. Denial and deception are a standard feature of Chinese diplomacy and no amount of serving tea on a swing can undo that basic instinct. When Xi was being personally charmed in Ahmedabad, the People's Liberation Army (PLA) was engaged in a border fracas at that very moment. The same China, which selectively posits a "Dragon-Elephant tango," will have no qualms to veto India in favour of an international terrorist like Masood Azhar.

To get carried away by "hometown diplomacy" is reminiscent of *Hindi Chini Bhai Bhai* (India and China are brothers) naivety. Border issues between India and China date back to decades but a consensus on delinking the same was established by way of improving bilateral relations. Today, a breakdown of that diplomatic understanding is apparent. Rhetoric on both sides needs to be lowered and not escalated. Beyond a point, the Chinese themselves cannot afford to open yet another "front" in these trying times.

So when the dust settles, both sides will claim to have "bloodied each other's nose," their cadres will be electrified and then, the leadership on both

sides will move on to the next set of distraction after having "won" this round. But the essential point of "tripping diplomacy" is well-nigh forgotten.

Reality is that 2020 is not 1962 even though the Indian armed forces are numerically and materially lesser than the PLA. However, the Chinese would know better than most that numeric superiority is not enough. Limited combat operations against India in 1967 at Nathu La and Cho La or the more expansive war against the Vietnamese forces in 1979 would validate this but the Chinese did get a bloody nose, both times.

Worse for the Chinese, today's PLA is also the largest military to have never partaken in any tangible combat experience whereas Indian soldiers are combat-experienced and tested. The Chinese are masters of knowing when to bargain as also just how much. They will limit their activism to the levels already established and keep the kettle boiling with existing and new-found proxies in the sub-continent. They just found a convenient opening for limited distraction as the Indian diplomacy and the Government inadvertently afforded the chance.

The foremost lesson for India is to not be taken in by its own charm offensives and instead strengthen its "core" in defence and economy. As it is, the diplomatic dice is loaded and

we make it worse with thundering blusters that unsettle smaller neighbours and send them scurrying into the willing arms of China. Uber-nationalism that is seen and heard in political rallies need to be inked where it matters, that is in defence budgets. All talk of mass exodus of US firms from China to India is more social media fantasy, like the cadre call for boycotting Chinese products. A bulk of this lopsided trade with China is done by the Indian Government itself.

Instead, the citizenry has to put pressure on the Government to revert to old-fashioned and professional diplomacy that is not necessarily conducted under the glare of the media lens or with one eye permanently fixated on electoral prospects. China fears India as a "moral idea" which intrinsically resonates across global capitals. We cannot look and sound like China. Xi's "thought on diplomacy" is unapologetic about its hegemonic intent. India needs to "manage" the same by lowering rhetoric, strengthening military-economic muscle and yet posturing peace and reason. Basically, beat China at its own game by playing to its strengths. The elephant needs to remain calm, wise and powerful. It must never forget the ignoble fire-spewing instincts of the dragon.

Things Government must set right

On March 24, when a three-week nation-wide lockdown was announced, the Government's concern was to save human lives. The Corona pandemic had just begun spreading its tentacles then. Beware the dragon's moves

China's recent actions at the LAC have only gone to prove the long-term and diverse strategies that the nation follows

China is doing what it does best — confuse and confound. Its recent actions have only gone to prove the long-term and diverse strategies that the nation follows. It began with the sequential escalation along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) at Naku La in Sikkim and then at Pangong Tso in Ladakh. This has been followed by a face-off at the Galwan Valley in the Daulat Beg Oldi (DBO) sector of the LAC in Ladakh. The activities, with soldiers engaged on three border points, have the potential to escalate due to the intrinsic linkages between and the changed circumstances of the present clashes from the earlier incidents. There were also some indirect actions on both sides that have been in focus like the objection by Nepal to the development and inauguration of the road from Darchula to Lipulekh pass in Uttarakhand. This is despite an agreement between India and China to have trade across the pass in the tri-junction of Nepal-India-China. Beijing accepted the pass as one of the commercial and cultural transit points with India under its 1954 Peace and Tranquility Agreement. This was reiterated when Prime Minister Narendra Modi visited China in 2015. The route has deep-rooted spiritual and civilisational significance for India. In contrast, the recent broadcasting of weather reports of Gilgit-Baltistan on Indian news channels and the pre-conditions set for Foreign Direct Investment in segments of the Indian economy have definitely upped the ante for the Chinese.

The three sectors where India and China have recurrence of disputes are in Arunachal Pradesh, Sikkim and Ladakh. The Arunachal sector is largely dormant despite China's claim to the entire State. The Sikkim sector is strategic as any Chinese road and infrastructure development in its proximity can threaten the narrow Siliguri Corridor which is the gateway from India to the seven States of North-East India. The Doklam stand-off for 73 days from June to August 2017 amply demonstrated the strategic relevance of this sector.

It is in the Ladakh sector that the geo-strategic implications of the face-off and incursions assume significance. The Chinese have made an immense investment of \$62 billion in the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) project. Recent assertions by India on its right to Gilgit-Baltistan through which the CPEC passes on its way to the Karakoram Pass in the Shaksgam valley (illegally conceded by Pakistan to China) have obviously rocked the boat. China does not make short-term tactical moves without a long-term plan which may unfold in the winter when terrain and weather put India at a disadvantage. Unlike Doklam, where the Chinese movement was restricted to the single track which they were trying to develop along a narrow valley, in Ladakh the LAC is open and rugged. There are various "disputed areas" and "areas of differing perceptions" from the DBO in the north to Fukche in the south (the point of entry of the Indus river from Tibet to India). The scene of the recent scuffle has been on the banks of the Pangong Tso Lake. Its centrality to the entire LAC in Ladakh and proximity to the Spangur Gap and Chushul make the south bank of the lake a secure flank for large-scale moves by the Chinese. Hence, it holds operational importance to both armies.

The western Ladakh region of DBO provides a buffer against Chinese direct access to Shaksgam valley and the Siachen heights. India therefore, strongly holds on to DBO. Here the Galwan valley has witnessed similar stand-offs in the past with Chinese encampments detected far inside the alignment of the LAC into the valley. Strong deployments along the Line of Control (LoC) at Kargil and Drass opposite Pakistan have also to be maintained by India at all times. Reinforcements and additional forces will have to be moved into Ladakh mostly from the plains and will require acclimatisation to operate in high-altitude areas of 11,000 to 16,000 feet. Logistics and sustenance of forces are a key factor, especially in Ladakh.

The People's Liberation Army (PLA) forces involved in the skirmishes are not their regular army but the Border Defence Regiments (BDR) backed by PLA garrisons and camps with acclimatised troops along the Chinese East-West Highway. In contrast, Indian regular troops get sucked in as reinforcements and readjustments of command and control are necessitated as the Indo-Tibetan Border Police force (ITBP) readjusts from its border posts held in peacetime.

Hence, two imperatives for the Department of Military Affairs and Ministry of Defence to resolve in the present will be in the fields of command and control of border management forces and logistic preparedness. The office of the Chief of Defence Staff (CDS) is best suited to resolve intra-service coordination of both areas as also inter-ministerial resolution of the command and control lacunae of forces on the LAC. India's approach must include a myriad of agencies and all elements of national power. The annual defence allocations have been shrinking regularly (experts say the percentage available for modernisation has shrunk from 40 per cent to almost 32 per cent) and cannot sustain the human and equipment inventory needed to effectively deter China. In such a situation and in the post-Corona reduced resource basket, the prioritisation of requirements rather than a dilution of weapon qualitative requirements, is recommended. There must be a push towards operationalising the Rohtang tunnel to full capacity especially in view of logistic sustenance and troop reinforcements for the road closed period starting in November.

Hope sprouts in the farm

The Government deserves some credit for at least putting on the table long-pending reforms in agri-marketing, which if carried through, will be truly revolutionary

Heralding a new chapter in agricultural market reforms in India, on May 15 Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman made three major announcements under the "Atma Nirbhar Bharat Abhiyan." The first announcement was about the Centre's decision to enact a legislation to enable direct purchase of specified commodities — under entry 42 of the Union List and entry 33 of the Concurrent List — from farmers outside the designated Agricultural Produce Market Committees (APMCs). Next was the move to enact a Central law on contract farming to provide a legal framework for farmers to engage with processors, aggregators, large retailers and exporters in a fair and transparent manner. Third was the decision to amend the Essential Commodities Act (ECA), 1954 and take off pulses, cereals, edible oil, oil seeds, onions and potatoes from the purview of this archaic law.

To understand the full ramifications of the proposed enactments, at the outset, let us take a look at the existing regulations. At present, trade in agri-commodities is governed by a highly-restrictive legislation viz. the APMC Act. This empowers State Governments to specify market areas — where farmers bring their produce for sale. These are operated and regulated by market committees. There are a total of about 5,000 such markets or *mandis* across the country.

The stated objective of the APMC acts is to promote organised marketing of farm commodities to ensure fair play, achieve an efficient system of buying and selling of commodities, protect farmers from intermediaries and traders and to ensure better prices and timely payment for the produce. Far from achieving these objectives, farmers are being exploited by a network of licenced traders and middlemen, who have a complete stranglehold over these platforms.

While on one hand, farmers don't get to sell their entire produce at the Minimum Support Price (MSP), on the other, no alternative platforms are available where they could sell. Even Government agencies don't come forward to buy when the market price dips below the MSP. Actually, the problem is much deeper. This has to do with a cozy nexus between politicians and grain traders that has existed and flourished for decades. A grain trader has a fundamental interest in ensuring that he minimises his payout to the farmer for the grains he buys. He can succeed in this gameplan if the farmer is left high and dry by State agencies. So, he collaborates with the politicians in the ruling establishment to ensure that State agencies remain weak and demotivated.

This nexus has also come in the way of amending the APMC Act to make way for alternative channels of selling, such as direct purchase by bulk buyers, processors, exporters and so on (the revenue State Governments get from levy of market fee on transactions at the *mandis* has proved to be another major deterrent. In 2017, the Modi Government had passed a Model Agricultural Produce and Livestock Marketing [Promotion and Facilitation] Law containing provisions to give more options to farmers for selling their crop and greater flexibility to traders such as 'single pan-State licence' for buying from anywhere in the State).

True to its nomenclature, the model law is a mere showpiece as until hitherto (prior to the COVID-19 crisis, to be specific), a majority of the States showed no interest in amending their

In a daring move, the then BJP Government, led by Devendra Fadnavis, had approved in August 2018, an amendment to the Maharashtra Agricultural Produce Marketing (Development and Regulation) Act, 1963, in sync with the Centre's model law. That was done through the ordinance route. But Fadnavis was forced to withdraw the Bill on November 28, 2018 from the legislative council, a day after it was passed.

The continued writ of the APMC acts has meant that there is no free movement of farm products even within the State, forget free inter-State trade. With several pieces of State legislation creating impregnable zones, even the much-trumpeted electronic national agriculture market (e-NAM) has failed to take off. The processors, exporters and other large buyers have no incentive to invest in agri-infrastructure. The archaic ECA (1954) with its draconian provisions, especially with regard to stock limits, acts as a further disincentive.

All this boils down to farmers not getting a remunerative price for their produce on the one hand and consumers having to pay a high price on the other — even as a number of intermediaries in the supply chain appropriate a major slice of what the latter pays. Needless to say, that the resulting low income not only keeps farmers poor but also boomerangs on overall economic growth through reduction in rural purchasing power. The extant state of affairs is not good for boosting exports on a sustainable basis either.

The COVID-19 crisis may have come as a blessing in disguise. It gripped India at a time when the Rabi crop, mostly the winter staple wheat, was ready for harvest. April-May is the period when farmers congregate at the *mandis*. Being the only platform where farmers could sell their produce, this would have led to overcrowding at the markets

which comes in conflict with "social distancing" — a pre-requisite for preventing the spread of the deadly virus.

Due to the dire need for adhering to "social distancing", Modi asked the States to suspend certain provisions of their respective APMC laws for three months to make way for purchase of farmers' produce directly from their doorsteps by large farmers' producers organisations (FPOs), large buyers such as processors, millers, exporters, cooperatives, individual traders and so on.

Some States like Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat and Karnataka responded by making amendments in their APMC laws (using the ordinance route as none of the State Assemblies are in session, courtesy the prevailing emergency). As per the amendment, the entire State is declared as a "single market" wherein a trader can get a single licence for purchase of agricultural produce from any *mandi* within it. Further, it allows trade in all farm commodities, including livestock, outside the regulated APMC markets.

This has not only kept COVID-19 at bay (as the traders went to the farmers' doorstep instead of the latter having to go all the way to the *mandi*) but also fetched a remunerative price for their produce by offering more choice, resulting in higher income. No wonder, amid the gloom and doom in most other sectors of the economy, agriculture is expected to show a positive growth rate of over three per cent during the current year (of course, this will be helped by normal monsoon predicted by the meteorological department).

In retrospect, there is some reason to rejoice over the changes in APMC laws by the aforementioned States, which has enabled private trade to complement efforts of State agencies in ensuring record procurement from the farmers. While Modi had asked for suspension of the relevant provisions for

three months, these States have gone a step further by bringing an element of permanence. That serves as the icing on the cake. But some doubts remain.

For one, most States continue to turn a deaf ear to the Centre's wish. Even in the four States, where the changes have been brought about, these will have to be passed by the State Assemblies in the end. Given the deep-rooted vested interest, a Maharashtra-type fiasco can't be ruled out. In this backdrop, the Centre's decision to enact a Central law, wielding the rarely-used power under the Constitution to regulate inter-State trade and intra-State trade, makes major sense. The law will enable an entity to buy farm produce from farmers directly anywhere in the country, even outside the regulated market yards.

At the same time, the amendment in the ECA to remove fetters such as stock limits (these limits will be imposed only in exceptional circumstances) will enable large buyers viz. processors, millers, exporters and so on, to scale up purchases, thus providing sustained support to farmers. The proposed Contract Law — enforceable in all States — will clearly lay down rules of the game for a processor/large retailer that it must follow to ensure that farmers are not taken for a ride.

These farm reforms are intended to create a parallel arrangement for selling farm produce and can co-exist with the APMCs. These aim at breaking the monopoly of a few licenced traders at *mandis*, create competition and thus help both farmers and consumers. Whether or not these actually see the light of the day remains to be seen. For now, the Government deserves some accolades for at least putting on the table long-pending reforms in agri-marketing, which if carried through, will be truly revolutionary.

Don't take their right to life away

Having given legal protection to intersex kids against unnecessary surgeries, India must proactively put an end to intersex and female infanticide

The recent killing of a one-day-old girl child in Tamil Nadu's Tiruvannamalai district has brought to the fore the unending practice of female infanticide. The murder was discovered on the complaint of an alert medical officer who suspected foul play.

Being the second reported instance of female infanticide from the region, this case has demonstrated that this evil practice is alive even during the current pandemic. Nearly 30

years ago, economist Amartya Sen argued that 100 million women were "missing." However, much before this usage was coined, the phenomenon behind the phrase was a reality in India, reflected in the practice of sex determination, selective abortions and female infanticide. There were no official numbers on female foeticide until the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) started collecting data on this crime in 2014. However, the consequences of killing the girl child before or after birth are clearly reflected in the skewed sex-ratios in the country.

In 2016, the Government released data based on the civil registration system. It showed that the sex ratio at birth (SRB) had fallen from 946 girls for every 1,000 boys in 1949 to 877 in 2014. A deeper crisis is revealed when the data on girls in the age group of zero-six years is examined. In 2011, the number of girls below six per

1,000 boys stood at 914 — which is the lowest since Independence. Now that the registration of births is compulsory, the SRB data is considered to be quite accurate. The problem is graver in five States (Andhra Pradesh, Rajasthan, Bihar, Uttarakhand, and Tamil Nadu) which have an SRB equal to or below 840.

Prevention of female foeticide and infanticide has been the focus of a wide range of the Government's efforts since the 1990s, with some successes and many challenges. The child sex ratio has continued to be on the decline even after the enactment of a Central law in 1994 banning the use of prenatal diagnostic tests for sex determination. Aside from this legal measure, the Union and State Governments have undertaken several policy initiatives such as the National Action Plan of 1991 to Balika Samridhhi Yojana in 1997 to the latest Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao

campaign of 2015, to incentivise retention of the girl child. Several State Governments have also implemented innovative initiatives like the "Cradle Baby" scheme of the Tamil Nadu Government. Launched in 1992, the aim of the scheme was to encourage parents to give female children up for adoption by providing for cradles at Government hospitals and Primary Health Centres (PHCs). The two-fold objective was to prevent female infanticide and also stop illegal sale of babies.

This measure of the Tamil Nadu Government also encouraged reporting of this crime unlike other States where the cases are massively under-reported. In addition to improving law enforcement and preventing access to ultrasonography, measures like "Cradle Baby" scheme are critical.

The preference for the male child leading to a skewed sex ratio has been well-documented. However, another major consequence of such preference poses a serious risk to bodily integrity of intersex infants and children. Intersex children in India are at constant risk of forced surgical and medical intervention in the form of sex normalising surgeries to align their body as per the normative definition of traditional gender identity i.e. male and female. In most cases, intersex children are assigned as male at birth.

This heinous practice is widespread in several Indian States, including Kerala, which claims to be a model State in terms of human development indicators. Even worse, the medical community also justifies such procedures, displaying a shocking ignorance of intersex human rights. For instance, doctors working in a hospital in Kerala have admitted performing such surgeries on intersex children and have also highlighted the preference of parents for the male child. In 2019, the Madras High Court outlawed this

practice and directed the Tamil Nadu Government to pass an order implementing the ban. However, infanticide of intersex babies and children continues to be an ignored issue in India. It is estimated that every year, more than 10,000 intersex children are born in India.

Still, our official statistics, including the census, do not provide any authentic population data of intersex children in the country. Over the years, various United Nations (UN) committees have highlighted this issue. In 2019, expressing concern over the "mercy killing" of intersex children with disabilities, the UN Committee on Rights of Persons with Disabilities recommended the Government to "protect intersex children from attacks against their lives and any related harmful practices."

The "missing intersex children" phenomenon is not limited to India. There is an urgent need for more

research and documentation on this subject globally. Further, it is also critically important to initiate a dialogue on the need for an international instrument to prevent intersex infanticide and a complete ban on sex normalising surgeries.

Having already established a legal protection regime for intersex children against unnecessary surgeries, India has a unique opportunity to lead the intersex human rights movement if it can proactively put an end to intersex infanticide. To achieve these goals, the Centre and States must undertake urgent steps to ensure prevention and prosecution in cases of female and intersex infanticide.

FLOYD ANGER PERVADES US

Thousands arrested, nearly 40 cities under curfew

The US remained a tinderbox of anger and emotion as violent protests erupted for a sixth day across the country over the custodial killing of African-American George Floyd, resulting in the death of at least five people, the arrest of thousands and placing of curfew in nearly 40 cities, while forcing President Donald Trump to take shelter in a White House bunker.

Considered to be the worst ever civil unrest in the US in decades, the violent protests have engulfed at least 140 cities across America in the days following the death of Floyd, a 46-year-old man who was pinned to the ground in Minneapolis on Monday by a white police officer who knelt on his neck as he gasped for breath.

Some of the protests have turned violent, prompting the activation of the National Guard in at least 20 states.

"At least five people were killed in violence that flared as demonstrations in parts of the country devolved into mayhem," The Washington Post reported. Police have arrested at least 2,564 people in two dozen US cities over the weekend. Nearly a fifth of those arrests were in Los Angeles, it said.

The unrest initially began in Minneapolis in Minnesota but has now spread across the country, with reports of violence coming in from across major cities including Los Angeles, Chicago, New York, Houston, Philadelphia and Washington DC.

"The United States remained a tinderbox of emotion, anger and continued violence on Sunday, the sixth day of nationwide unrest since the death of yet another black man at the hands of the police," *The New York Times* reported.

Birmingham, protesters started to tear down a Confederate monument that the city had previously covered with a tarp amid a lawsuit between the state attorney general and the city.

In Boston, a police SUV was set ablaze near the State House,



sending up a column of black smoke after a large group of protesters had mostly dispersed.

In Philadelphia, police officers in riot gear and an armoured vehicle used pepper spray to try to repel rioters and looters.

In New York, demonstrators marched across the Brooklyn and Williamsburg Bridges, snarling traffic. The Manhattan Bridge was briefly shut down to car traffic. Chaos erupted in Union Square, with flames leaping up two stories from trash cans and piles of street debris, the *Times* said.

"It is the first time so many local leaders have simultaneously issued such orders in the face of civic unrest since 1968, after the assassination of the Rev Dr Martin Luther King Jr," the report said.

Police fired tear gas near the White House on Sunday night to dissuade protesters who had smashed the windows of prominent buildings, overturned cars and set fires, with smoke seen rising from near the Washington Monument, it said.

For the past few days, thousands of protesters have gathered outside the White House raising slogans against President Trump. According to *CNN*, President Trump was briefly taken to the underground bunker for some time during the protest outside the White House, while First Lady Melania Trump and their son Barron were also taken to the bunker.

President Trump made no public appearances on Sunday, but in a series of tweets he blamed the media for fomenting hatred and anarchy in the country.

"The Lamestream Media is doing everything within their power to foment hatred and anarchy. As long as everybody understands what they are doing, that they are FAKE NEWS and truly bad people with a sick agenda, we can easily work through them to GREATNESS!" he said.

Earlier in the day, he announced that his administration will be designating ANTIFA as a Terrorist Organization. ANTIFA is regarded as a militant, left-wing, anti-fascist political activist movement in the US. It comprises autonomous activist groups that aim to achieve their political objectives through the use of direct action rather than through policy reform.

US Attorney General William Barr said that the violence instigated and carried out by the organisation and other similar groups in connection with the rioting is domestic terrorism and will be treated accordingly. The Trump administration alleges that it appears the violence is planned, organised, and driven by anarchistic and far left extremists, using ANTIFA-like tactics, many of whom travel from out of state to promote the violence.

Former Vice President Joe Biden, who is the presumptive

presidential nominee of the Democratic party, visited a protest site in Delaware on Sunday. "We are a nation in pain, but we must not allow this pain to destroy us. We are a nation enraged, but we cannot allow our rage to consume us. We are a nation exhausted, but we will not allow our exhaustion to defeat us," Biden wrote on social media postings on Sunday.

"The only way to bear this pain is to turn all that anguish to purpose. And as President, I will help lead this conversation — and more importantly, I will listen, just as I did today visiting the site of last night's protests in Wilmington," he said.

The Committee to Protect Journalists, in a late night statement said several dozen covering the protests have been harassment, as well as arrested by law enforcement agencies.

TRUMP SLAMS GUVS AS 'WEAK,' URGES CRACKDOWN ON PROTESTS

President Donald Trump derided the nation's governors as "weak" and demanded tougher crackdowns on protesters in the aftermath of another night of violent protests in dozens of American cities.

Trump spoke to governors on a video teleconference with law enforcement and national security officials, telling the local leaders they "have to get much tougher" amid nationwide protests and criticising their responses.

Joe Biden vowed to address "institutional racism" in his first 100 days in office as he met with community leaders at a predominantly African American church in Delaware on Monday morning, leaving home for a second consecutive day to address exploding racial tensions that have begun to reshape the upcoming presidential election.

GEORGE FLOYD'S FUNERAL TO BE HELD IN HOUSTON
George Floyd, the 46-year-old black man whose cold-blooded murder at the hands of a white police officer has sparked protests across the US, will be laid to rest in his hometown of Houston, following a public visitation in Minneapolis. Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner announced the funeral plans on Saturday, though there are currently no public details about when it will take place. The mayor broke the news as part of a larger plea for peace amid a weekend where Houston police arrested hundreds of protesters.

JOURNALISTS COVERING US PROTESTS FACE ASSAULT, ARREST
From the East Coast to the West, journalists covering the widespread protests in the US after the killing of African-American George Floyd are facing assaults, being shot at, tear-gassed and arrested, as a leading media rights group urged authorities to ensure that reporters do their job safely without fear of injury or retaliation. From Minneapolis to Washington DC, from Louisville to Las Vegas, reporters are facing assault and arrest while reporting on widespread protests and unrest, the *CNN* reported.

WORLD'S REACTION TO US WEAVES SOLIDARITY, CALLS TO CHANGE

Several thousand people marched in New Zealand's largest city on Monday to protest the killing of George Floyd in the US as well as to stand up against police violence and racism in their own country.

Many people around the world have watched with growing unease at the civil unrest in the US after the latest in a series of police killings of black men and women. Floyd died on May 25 in Minneapolis after a white police officer pressed his knee on Floyd's neck until he stopped breathing. The officer was fired and charged with murder. In Iran, which has in the recent past violently put down nationwide demonstrations by killing hundreds, arresting thousands and disrupting internet access to the outside world, state television has repeatedly aired images of the US unrest.

In Brazil, hundreds of people protested crimes committed by the police against black people in Rio de Janeiro's working-class neighborhoods, known as favelas. Police used tear gas to disperse them, with some demonstrators saying "I can't breathe," repeating Floyd's own words. In Canada, an anti-racism protest degenerated into clashes between Montreal police and some demonstrators. Police declared the gathering illegal after they say projectiles were thrown at officers who responded with pepper spray and tear gas. Some windows were smashed and some fires were set.

In authoritarian nations, the unrest became a chance to undermine US criticism of their own situations. Iranian state television repeatedly aired images of the US unrest. Russia said the United States had systemic human rights problems.

North Korea's official Rodong Sinmun newspaper on Monday reported about the demonstrations, saying that protesters "harshly condemned" a white policeman's "lawless and brutal murder" of a black citizen. It printed three large photos of protest scenes from recent days in the city where Floyd was killed.



China threatens to 'counter-attack' US over HK curbs

Beijing warned Washington of retaliation after President Donald Trump announced restrictions on Chinese students in the US in protest over a new national security law in Hong Kong.

Trump said Friday that the United States would ban some Chinese graduate students and start reversing Hong Kong's special status in customs and other areas, as Beijing moves ahead with a plan to impose a controversial security law.

The US President said the Chinese Government had been "diminishing the city's long-standing and very proud status". But China reacted angrily to the moves on Monday, saying it was "detrimental to both sides".

GLOBE TROTTING

SCALE DOWN DRILLS: RUSSIA TO NATO

Moscow: The Russian military on Monday accused the US and its NATO allies of conducting "provocative" military drills near the nation's borders, a statement that reflected simmering Russia-NATO tensions. Col-Gen Sergei Rudskoi of the Russian General Staff said Russia has sent a formal letter to NATO proposing to scale down each other's military activities for the period of the coronavirus outbreak, but the alliance has stonewalled the offer.

PUTIN SETS JULY 1 FOR VOTE TO EXTEND HIS RULE

Moscow: Russian President Vladimir Putin says a nationwide vote on constitutional amendments that could allow him to further extend his rule will be held on July 1. Putin said the pace of Russia's coronavirus outbreak has slowed down, allowing election officials to safely hold the vote.

DANIEL PEARL CASE

Pak's SC rejects Sindh Govt's plea to suspend HC verdict

Pakistan's Supreme Court on Monday rejected a petition filed by the Sindh government to suspend a high court verdict that overturned the conviction of al-Qaeda leader Ahmed Omar Saeed Sheikh in the kidnapping and murder of Daniel Pearl in 2002, in a setback to the US efforts to get justice for the American journalist.

Pearl, the 38-year-old South Asia bureau chief for *The Wall Street Journal*, was abducted and beheaded while he was in Pakistan investigating a story in 2002 on the alleged links between the country's powerful spy agency ISI and al-Qaeda.

On April 2, a two-judge Sindh High Court bench overturned the death sentence of British-born 46-year-old al-Qaeda leader, who was convicted in the abduction and murder of Pearl in 2002.

He has been in jail for the past 18 years.

The court also acquitted his three aides — Fahad Naseem, Salman Saqib and Sheikh Adil — serving life sentences in the case.

The Bench announced the verdict on the appeals filed by

the four convicts 18 years ago.

The Sindh Government challenged the High Court judgment and on May 2 the slain journalist's parents also approached the Supreme Court against the acquittal of the convicts.

On Monday, a three-member bench headed by Chief Justice Gulzar Ahmed heard the appeals in Islamabad.

The apex court after initial hearing refused to suspend the Sindh High Court judgment and asked the provincial government to provide complete record of the case. It also said the petition contained irrelevant sections.

"We should be provided a complete record of the case," said bench member Justice Manzoor Malik.

"I want to look at all the records so that I can understand all the points."

The court adjourned the hearing for an indefinite period, after the Sindh government sought time to submit the record of the trial court.

The apex court ordered the counsel representing the Sindh government, Farooq H Naek, to submit the detailed record before the court.

COVID-19 OUTBREAK

Around the Globe

● **Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan** said it was a "mistake" to enforce a strict coronavirus lockdown as it aggravated the economic situation, even as the number of Covid-19 infections crossed the 72,000-mark in the country on Monday. According to the Ministry of National Health Services, 2,964 new infections surfaced over the last 24 hours, taking the nationwide tally of coronavirus to 72,460. "Lockdown is not a solution as it can only slow down. So it was a mistake to shut down business in the country," Khan said.

● The Singapore Government said it will build new accommodations to improve the living condition of foreign workers and reduce the population density in their quarters, which have seen a very high transmission rate of the novel coronavirus. There will be additional space to house about 60,000 workers by the end of the year, the Ministry of National Development and Ministry of Manpower said.

● The US has delivered two million doses of the antimalarial medicine hydroxychloroquine (HCQ) to Brazil to fight Covid-19, the White House said, though drug has not been proven effective against the coronavirus. "HCQ will be used as a prophylactic to help defend Brazil's nurses, doctors, and healthcare professionals against the virus. It will also be used as a therapeutic to treat Brazilians who become infected," a statement said.

● Britain's Queen Elizabeth was photographed riding a 14-year-old Fell pony in Windsor Home Park on Sunday as the country eases stringent measures to stop the spread of the novel coronavirus. The Queen has been living at Windsor Castle, west of London, during the lockdown with her 98-year-old husband Prince Philip.

Report: Russia to start using 1st approved drug from next week

Moscow: Russia will start giving its first drug approved to treat Covid-19 to patients next week, its state financial backer told Reuters, a move it hopes will ease strains on the health system and speed a return to normal economic life.

Russian hospitals can begin giving the antiviral drug, which is registered under the name Avifavir, to patients from June 11, the head of Russia's RDIF sovereign wealth fund told Reuters in an interview.

He said the company behind the drug would manufacture enough to treat around 60,000 people a month.

There is currently no vaccine for Covid-19, the disease caused by the new coronavirus, and human trials of several existing antiviral drugs have yet to show efficacy.

A new antiviral drug from Gilead called remdesivir has shown some promise in small efficacy trials against Covid-19 and is being given to patients by some countries under compassionate or emergency use rules. Avifavir, known generically as favipiravir, was first developed in the late 1990s by a Japanese company later bought by Fujifilm as it moved into healthcare.

Report: People living on higher altitudes less vulnerable

Washington: Researchers have found that populations living in higher altitudes, especially 3,000 metres above the sea level, significantly report lower levels of coronavirus infections than their lowland counterparts.

The *Washington Post* cited one peer-reviewed study, published in the journal *Respiratory Physiology & Neurobiology*, in which researchers from Australia, Bolivia, Canada and Switzerland looking at epidemiological data from Bolivia, Ecuador and Tibet found that Tibet's infection rate was "drastically" lower than that of low-

land China, three times lower in the Bolivian Andes than in the rest of the country and four times lower in the Ecuadorian Andes.

Cusco in Peru, a picturesque Andean valley, the high-altitude city of 420,000 residents, had only recorded the death of three tourists from Mexico, China and Britain, between March 23 and April 3, at the start of Peru's strict national lockdown. Since then, there has not been another covid-19 fatality in the entire Cusco region, even as the disease has claimed more than 4,000 lives nationally.

SA eases; liquor is sold, school openings delayed

Many South Africans spent their Monday morning lining up outside liquor stores, as alcohol sales were allowed again after a two-month ban because of the coronavirus outbreak.

But while South Africa — with the continent's most developed economy and the highest number of confirmed cases of Covid-19 — relaxed its strict lockdown, the reopening of most school classes was delayed and there was debate about how churches could safely resume services.

The Government postponed the planned opening of two grades for another week so that some under-prepared schools could get ready to resume classes for grades 7 and 12, the final years of elementary school and high school.

Places of worship were allowed to open from Monday with limits on the number of people in congregations, yet many religious groups said they would refuse the opportunity. They said they were concerned about the danger of allowing people to gather in an enclosed building — something health experts warn against — and

some also said that limiting the number of people who could come into their church is against their values.

South Africa has reported over 32,000 Covid-19 cases and more than 600 people have died. The government warns that the number of infections will continue to increase and the peak is not expected until August or September.

Still, the relaxation of the alcohol ban came as a relief to many, who chose restocking their liquor cabinets instead of going straight to work on the day much of the country's economy also reopened.

UN forced to cut aid to Yemen, even as virus increases need

Cairo: Aid organisations are making an urgent plea for funding to shore up their operations in war-torn Yemen, saying they have already been forced to stop some of their work even as the coronavirus rips through the country. Some 75% of UN programs in Yemen have had to shut their doors or reduce operations. The global body's World Food Program had to cut rations in half and U.N.-funded health services were reduced in 189 out of 369 hospitals nationwide.

Lockdowns ease across Europe, Asia with new tourism rules

The first day of June saw coronavirus restrictions ease from Asia to Europe on Monday, even as US protests against police brutality sparked fears of new outbreaks. The Colosseum opened its ancient doors in Rome, ferries restarted in Bangladesh, golfers played in Greece, students returned in Britain and Dutch bars and restaurants were free to welcome hungry, thirsty patrons.

Countries around the Mediterranean Sea tentatively kicked off a summer season where tourists could bask in their famously sunny beaches while still being protected by social distancing measures from a virus that is marching relentlessly around the world.

"We are reopening a symbol. A symbol of Rome, a symbol for Italy," said Alfonsina Russo, director of the Colosseum's archaeological park. "(We are) restarting in a positive way, with a different pace, with a more sustainable tourism."

Greece lifted lockdown measures Monday for hotels, campsites, open-air cinemas, golf courses and public swimming pools, while beaches and museums reopened in Turkey and bars, restaurants, cinemas and museums came back to life in the Netherlands.

"Today, we opened two rooms and tomorrow three. It's like building an anthill," Athens hotel owner Panos Betis said as employees wearing face masks tidied a rooftop restaurant and cleaned a window facing the ancient Acropolis. "We can't compare the season to last year. We were at 95% capacity. Our aim now is to hang in there till 2021."

A long line of masked visitors snaked outside the Vatican Museums, which include the Sistine Chapel, as they reopened for the first time in



three months. Italy is eager to reboot its tourism industry, which accounts for 13% of its economy.

The Vatican Museums' famous keyholder — the "clavigero" who holds the keys to all the galleries on a big ring on his wrist — opened the gate in a sign both symbolic and literal that the Museums were back in business.

Still, strict crowd control measures were in place at both landmarks: visitors needed reservations to visit, their temperatures were taken before entering and masks were mandatory.

"Having the opportunity to see the museums by making a booking and not having to wait in line for three hours is an opportunity," said visitor Stefano Dicozzi.

The Dutch relaxation of coronavirus rules took place on a major holiday with the sun blazing, raising immediate fears of overcrowding in popular beach resorts. The new rules let bars and restaurants serve up to 30 people inside if they keep social distancing, but there's no standing at bars and reservations are necessary.

Britain, which with over 38,500 dead has the world's sec-

ond-worst death toll behind the United States, eased restrictions despite warnings from health officials that the risk of spreading Covid-19 was still too great. Some elementary classes reopened in England and people could now have limited contact with family and friends, but only outdoors and with social distancing.

In Asia, Bangladesh restarted bus, train, ferry and flight services Monday, hoping that a gradual reopening revives an economy in which millions have become jobless. Traffic jams and crowds of commuters clogged Manila as the Philippines tried to kickstart its economy.

Around 6.19 million infections have been reported worldwide, with over 372,000 people dying, according to a tally by Johns Hopkins University. The true death toll is believed to be significantly higher, since many died without ever being tested.

The US has seen nearly 1.8 million infections and over 1,06,000 deaths in the pandemic, which has disproportionately affected racial minorities in a nation that does not have universal health care.

Moody's downgrades India's rating to 'Baa3'

Moody's Investors Service on Monday downgraded India's sovereign credit rating for the first time in more than two decades, saying policymakers will be challenged to mitigate risks of low growth, deteriorating fiscal position and financial sector stress.

Downgrading India's rating by a notch to 'Baa3' from 'Baa2' assigned in November 2018, Moody's estimated India GDP shrinking by 4 per cent — first full fiscal contraction in more than four decades, as the country faces a prolonged period of slower growth.

Accordingly, India's foreign-currency and local-currency long-term issuer ratings have been downgraded to Baa3

from Baa2. India's local-currency senior unsecured rating too has been lowered to Baa3 from Baa2, and its short-term local currency rating to P-3 from P-2. The outlook remains negative.

"The decision to downgrade India's ratings reflects Moody's view that the country's policymaking institutions will be challenged in enacting and implementing policies, which effectively mitigate the risks of a sustained period of relatively low growth, significant further deterioration in the general Government fiscal position and stress in the financial sector," Moody's said.

'Baa3' rating is the lowest investment grade -- just a notch above 'junk' status.

Moody's had last downgraded India's rating in 1998.

The negative outlook reflects dominant, mutually-reinforcing, downside risks from deeper stresses in the economy and financial system that could lead to a more severe and prolonged erosion in fiscal strength than Moody's currently projects, it added.

Moody's said slow reform momentum and constrained policy effectiveness have contributed to a prolonged period of slow growth, compared to India's potential, that started before the Covid-19, and it expects this to continue well beyond the pandemic.

Moody's said India faces a prolonged period of slower growth relative to the country's potential, rising debt, further

weakening of debt affordability and persistent stress in parts of the financial system, all of which policymaking institutions will be challenged to mitigate and contain.

The agency said its upgrade of India's ratings to Baa2 in November 2017 was based on the expectation that effective implementation of key reforms would strengthen sovereign's credit profile through a gradual but persistent improvement in economic, institutional and fiscal strength.

"Since then, implementation of these reforms has been relatively weak and has not resulted in material credit improvements, indicating limited policy effectiveness," Moody's said.

Sensex, Nifty spurt over 2 pc as India begins to unlock economy

Market benchmark index Sensex on Monday rallied 879 points on heavy buying in financial, FMCG and energy stocks as the Government starting the process to unlock the economy boosted investor sentiment. Positive cues from the global markets also helped the key equity indices extend gains for the fourth session in a row.

After skyrocketing 1,250 points during the day, the 30-share BSE Sensex settled 879.42 points or 2.57 per cent higher at 33,303.52.

The NSE Nifty surged 245.85 points or 2.57 per cent to finish at 9,826.15. Bajaj Finance was the top gainer in the Sensex pack, rising around 11 per cent, followed by Titan, Tata Steel, SBI, M&M, HDFC, IndusInd Bank and Reliance Industries. On the other hand, Sun Pharma, Nestle India and UltraTech Cement were among the laggards.

All sectoral indices ended on a positive note with BSE consumer durables rallying 6.56 per cent, followed by metal, finance, bank, energy, auto and realty indices. "Domestic shares zoomed at opening and stayed strong throughout the day as investors ignored fourth-quarter GDP data and reacted positively to the government's decision to come up with a phased re-opening of all activities outside containment zones beginning June 1," Paras Bothra, President of Equity Research, Ashika Stock Broking, said. Positive sentiments also supported after US President Donald Trump stopped short of specifying



tough sanctions over China's new national security law for Hong Kong and Chinese PMI data showed fresh signs of economic recovery, he added.

"The market further rallied in the afternoon session with much broad-based buying seen in both large and mid cap stocks tracked by respective indices," Narendra Solanki, Head - Equity Research (Fundamental), Anand Rathi, said. Broader midcap and smallcap indices surged up to 3.03 per cent.

The Home Ministry on Saturday said 'Unlock-1' will be initiated in India from June 8 under which the nationwide lockdown effectuated on March 25 will be relaxed to a great extent, including opening of shopping malls, restaurants and religious places. "Buoyant Asian and European markets helped sentiments. Volumes were also healthy suggesting high delivery activity. Financials, Materials and Auto stocks did

well while Pharma stocks came under selling pressure," Deepak Jasani, Head Retail Research, HDFC Securities, said.

Asian shares advanced to three-month highs on Mon as progress on re-opening economies helped offset jitters over riots in the US cities and unease over Washington's power struggle with Beijing. Bourses in Shanghai, Hong Kong, Tokyo and Seoul settled up to 3 per cent higher, and those in Europe opened with significant gains. International oil benchmark Brent crude futures were trading 0.21 per cent higher at \$37.91 per barrel.

On the currency front, the rupee appreciated 8 paise to provisionally close at 75.54 against the US dollar. India is likely to receive 102% rainfall of a long-term average this year, the IMD said on Monday in its 2nd long range forecast, raising expectations for higher farm output in India, which is reeling from the new coronavirus pandemic.

Non-subsidised LPG rate hiked, aviation fuel ups by ₹11,000/kl

Oil marketing companies have hiked the prices of non-subsidised cooking gas and aviation turbine fuel with effect from Monday.

The price of the 14.2 kilogram cylinder of non-subsidised LPG gas in Delhi has been raised by ₹11.50 from May to ₹593 per cylinder.

In Kolkata, Mumbai and Chennai, the price of LPG has been raised at ₹616, ₹590.50 and ₹606.50, against ₹584.50, ₹579 and ₹569.50 per cylinder respectively. The highest increase was witnessed in Chennai with a hike of ₹37 from the price in May.

The Government currently subsidises 12 cylinders of 14.2 kilograms each per household in a year. Additional purchases have to be made at the market price.

In a statement on Sunday, Indian Oil Corp said that the retail selling price of LPG in Delhi market for the month of May 2020 was reduced from ₹744 to ₹581.50 per cylinder for all consumers in line with drop in International prices.

"For the month of June, there has been an increase in International prices of LPG.

Enhancement of turnover limit of MSME sector to help exporters

The Government's decision to increase the turnover limit for medium units from ₹100 crore to ₹250 crore will help infuse technology and promote automation in certain sectors and boost outbound shipments, according to exporters.

Federation of Indian Export Organisations President Sharad Kumar Saraf said that exclusion of exports turnover from total turnover will help in internationalisation of MSMEs and will bring their focus on exports. "This will also benefit a lot of gems and jewellery companies, who would have breached the MSME criteria due to sheer cost of their inputs," he said in a statement.

The cabinet on Monday approved further increasing the limit for medium manufacturing and service units to ₹50 crore of investment and ₹250 crore of turnover. The turnover with respect to exports will not be counted in the limits of turnover for any category of MSME units whether micro, small or medium.

"The move is most pragmatic and will also infuse technology as in certain sectors margins are so low.

Raj DIPR sets new dimensions fighting corona pandemic

Punjab National Bank (PNB), the country's second-largest state-owned lender, on Monday said it has reduced its repo-linked lending rate (RLLR) by 40 basis points (bps) to 6.65 per cent from 7.05 per cent. The bank's marginal cost of funds-based lending rate (MCLR) has also been revised downwards by 15 bps across all tenors.

Jaipur: In the ongoing fight against Covid, all departments of Government of Rajasthan played their important role.

PNB cuts repo-linked lending rate by 40 bps to 6.65%

A STREETSIDE NAMED DESIRE

With lockdown restrictions being lifted in some parts of the country, people have flocked the streets irresponsibly during a time which demands social distancing. How can local market vendors and shops ensure safety and hygiene, asks TEAM VIVA

With a few lockdown restrictions having been lifted, a large majority is seen frolicking in the streets in a manner that makes it seem that it is back to what life was prior to the outbreak of the pandemic. While advisories such as the practice of disinfecting hands regularly and covering face with masks are possible but maintaining social distancing with customers crowding around a *rehri* or screening them with an infrared thermometer might seem easy for shopping malls or other corporate offices, but are somewhat exclusionary towards street vendors and hawkers due to the nature of their livelihood and their socio-economic standing.

Markets are an important part of any local landscape and ensuring their safety is a must. So how are local vendors being prepared to keep hygiene in place? Experts tell us that the fear is here to stay and the precautions are important to follow now more than ever.

Sangeeta Singh, head of street food programme, National Association of Street Vendors of India (NASVI), said, "Everyone, including the street food vendors, will have to get used to the new normal to start earning their livelihood. There are approximately more than three lakh vendors in Delhi alone, according to NASVI, which is a large number that has been unemployed due to everything being shut down. While the government is preparing these vendors for the new normal, most of them are quite unsure if they can immediately go back to selling food items, and are also worried about not earning enough because a lot of their food stands were next to public places like the metro station, bus stand, etc."

HK Sharma, owner of Babu Ram Paranthi Wala, a shop in Chandni Chowk, agrees that finding the first customer is quite difficult because of the non-operation of metro lines. He shares that they will ensure compliance with measures to protect themselves and the workers of the shop. Talking about the procedure being followed, he adds, "We are taking the basic safety measures such as wearing protective gears, using disinfectants to keep everything clean, opting for online payment and of course maintaining social distance. People are themselves so aware that it's unlikely they'll break the rules. Even if somebody does, we are ready with our strict protocols."

Ask him how important it is to follow them, he says, "This is something very serious. Everybody has to stick to the guidelines otherwise they will be risking their own lives as well as of others. Remember what Modiji said? *Jaan hai toh jahan hai*. So it's only if you have a life, you can have the world."



In order to have a proper protocol which was specially designed for street vendors, NASVI decided to coach them in various measures that they must take. The training focusses on three major aspects — maintaining high levels of personal hygiene, practicing social distancing at all times and frequent cleaning and sanitisation — among other things.

The NASVI also announced that it will train 500 street food vendors in collaboration with FSSAI to assist them in earning their livelihood by strictly following certain safety measures. As a part of the first phase, vendors were given training recently. They were informed and educated about the different kinds of precautionary measures which include food, safety, health and hygiene. They were also taught about the use of disposal plates, glasses and the safe use of alcohol-based hand sanitisers. Apart from this, the importance of social distancing and hand-washing was also taught to them.

The training is based on guidelines for food businesses during the pandemic. There are other examples too through which more such guidelines could be applied.



Maybe the solution would also come from market associations. Screening people at the same place where door-frame metal detectors are installed, restricting the entry to ensure that there are not more than a certain

number of people and keeping sanitisers at the entrance of a market are some ways that the associations can take up the responsibility of ensuring the safety of the vendors and the customers.

An example the Indian markets could learn from is that of the Maine Federation of Farmers' Markets, which, as soon as the US state discovered its first cases of the virus, issued guidelines in public welfare. It wants market customers and the public to know they are taking immediate and proactive steps to ensure markets are safe places to shop during the pandemic. The organisers were encouraged to streamline their markets to discourage the public from gathering in large numbers or lingering onsite. Inside the markets, the information booth will be well-stocked with hand sanitisers and there will be hand-washing stations available throughout the venue. All food sold at the market will be pre-packaged and sold by the vendors to reduce human contact with the items as much as possible. The federation also ensured that the food purchased at local farmers' market is safer than that sold in supermarkets.

Well, now the public is shattering the fear surrounding COVID-19 and stepping out onto the streets to do away with the monotony of sitting at home, we need fewer hands touching the products and ensuring these measures are observed.

'Today the world is battling its greatest battle against Coronavirus. In these difficult times, the people who are battling this crisis head on, are frontline workers, the medical personnel, brave soldiers, police force, who are risking their lives to keep us safe. As a Mumbaikar, I say a big Thank You to the Mumbai Police Foundation.'

"Meri toh duniya bikul alag thi Andaaz woh kho gaya Dekhna doobna ho gaya Doobna tairna ho gaya Kya asar mere saath hai Mukhtasar mulaakat hai..."

It was singer Wajid Ali's voice which made this song from *Teri Meri Kahaani* (2012) quite a favourite among youngsters. The singer later revealed that he had initially composed the song for his own album but then decided to use it for the film because it matched the situation. Alas, the song's meaning now matches Wajid's current situation. His demise at 42 due to Coronavirus has come as a shock to many connoisseurs of Bollywood music as well as the Indian music fraternity.

He had tested positive for Coronavirus a few days ago and was also suffering from a kidney ailment, had undergone a kidney transplant recently. He had been admitted to Surana Hospital at Chembur where his condition had deteriorated and was on a ventilator for the last few days. He breathed his last in the early hours of the day.

Priyanka Chopra, who starred in the song, tweeted, "Terrible news. The one thing I will always remember is Wajid *bhai's* laugh. Always smiling. Gone too soon. My condolences to his family and everyone grieving. Rest in peace, my friend. You are in my thoughts and prayers."



Wajid has judged various reality shows like *Sa Re Ga Ma Pa*, alongside other prominent names from the industry. Shekhar Ravjiani, who judged the 2018 show alongside Wajid and Richa Sharma, expressed his grief by mailing us some of their photographs from the show sets and said, "I'll miss my friend."

It was Salman Khan's *Pyaar Kiya Toh Darna Kya* (1998), for which the Sajid-Wajid composer duo first scored music for with *Teri Jawaani*. The actor tweeted, "Wajid will always respect and remember you as a person. Love you and may your beautiful soul rest in peace."

The duo went on to compose several hit numbers for Salman starrers including *Laal Dupatta* and title track of *Mujhse Shaadi Karogi* (2004), *Tere Mast Mast Do Nain* and *Hud Hud Dabangg in Dabangg* (2010), *Mashallah in Ek Tha Tiger* (2012) and more.

Music composer and singer Shankar Mahadevan wrote, "I am just not able to come to terms with this. It's shocking! Good bye dear brother. Love you! Till we meet on the other side. Prayers for your peaceful journey Wajid *bhai*."

Singer Sona Mohapatra, who has also judged alongside Wajid in a reality singing show, recalled her experience during the time. She told us,

"I know that Wajid was going through kidney ailments for a long time now. Even two years ago, on the sets of *Sa Re Ga Ma Pa*, he had a small accident, where he had hurt himself but things became complicated because of his other medications and low immunity."

She added, "He was a generous, affectionate and lovely person who had come up the tough way. A tabla player, a composer, who had the intention to do good always. He would bring home-cooked food for all of us on the sets and used to be full of enthusiasm. I really got along with him very well and deeply regret losing touch during the lockdown."

Sona had also tweeted, "Heartbreaking news. Wajid is no more. Spent time on the *SRGMP* show with him as a co-judge and he was so kind and generous. I know he was ailing for a while, regret not picking up the phone on him in this lockdown. Stunned and sad."

Singer Mamta Sharma, who lent her voice to *Anarkali Disco Chali*, *Fevicol Se*, among other popular Sajid-Wajid numbers, expressed her grief by recalling her work with him as she considered him to be her "guru" and "mentor." She earlier said, "I am not in a clear state of mind right now because he was really close to us. Wajid *bhai* was just like family. I am too shocked to say anything. Last week, I spoke to him over a video call. He was absolutely fine and I thought he would be discharged in a few days. Meanwhile, this happened. I am still not out of this trauma. I cannot think of anything right now. Whatever I am today, it is because of him. Over the call, I was in tears looking at him but the smile on his face was intact and he was consoling me and saying 'Don't worry, I am ok, I am good, I will be alright'. He was such a strong person and a pillar of positivity."

- Include pumpkin, papaya, cucumber, potato, cauliflower, and peas in your diet.



No Tobacco Day was on May 31. Doctors tell you how to be tobacco free to boost immunity during Coronavirus pandemic

Tobacco consumption happens in two forms- either chewing tobacco in the form of smokeless tobacco (*pan masala, gutka & khaini*) or smoking (cigarettes & *beedi*). Tobacco consumed in any form is extremely addictive because of nicotine and three hundred cancer causing carcinogens. Chewing tobacco accounts for major consumption of tobacco in India, making head and neck cancers the most commonly reported forms. Smokeless tobacco is usually a mixture of aromatic betel leaves and nuts that the user keeps in the mouth and chews on it for hours. When these leaves are chewed upon constantly for long durations, nicotine is released in the mouth along with other flavours, that causes the mouth to produce excessive saliva. Users generally end up spitting this out. While smoking tobacco, nicotine is released in the lungs and affects the other organs, tobacco when chewed stays in the mouth. Development of tartar can lead to gum disease and can negatively impact saliva flow in the mouth. It makes it easier for bacteria to stick to teeth and gums. Repeated consumption causes various damage to the oral health:

- **Impacts on oral health**
- **Bad breath:** This is the most initial and primary impact of repeated consumption of smokeless tobacco, happens due to the residue of smokeless tobacco is left in the mouth and stained teeth.
- **Gum infections:** Smokeless tobacco can irritate your gums,

The most common cause of lung cancer is smoking. Risk of lung cancer is up to 30 times higher in long term smokers compared with lifetime non smoker. Moreover, tobacco smokers may be more susceptible to contracting COVID-19, as the act of smoking involves contact of fingers with the lips, which increases the possibility of transmission of viruses from hand to mouth. Smoking shisha or hookah, often involves the sharing of mouth pieces and hoses, which could facilitate the transmission of the COVID-19 virus in communal and social settings

Say no to tobacco

Even from studies before COVID-19 crisis, extensive proof underlining the deleterious impact of tobacco use on lung health and its causative connotation with respiratory diseases is all over healthcare research papers. The effects are damaging to the immune system of the smokers too and they are twofold more susceptible to influenza than non-smokers. Furthermore other severe symptoms along with a higher mortality rate were reported in smokers in the preceding MERS-CoV outbreak.

Now we know well that tobacco use is damaging to our respiratory system, with or without COVID-19. Moreover, COVID-19 has made the previously deleterious effects of tobacco, lethal. If you want to quit smoking, no time can be better than this. Research also supports that the effects of smoking starts to

Chemicals present in tobacco smoking causes irritation of wind-pipe, voice box and other parts of respiratory tract.

Excessive mucous is secreted as a response to the irritation. It also deposits in the alveoli of lungs reducing lung function and causing distressed breathing.

Gradually the entire air way reduces in size.

You are already aware of the chemicals found in tobacco harmful and cancer causing for both users and passive smokers.





At this time, wearing any makeup seems to be a thing of the past. It feels so liberating not to use any makeup or skin products. It is giving our skin some time to breathe.

But at this time we almost neglect to care for our skin. Because this is the time it needs unique care and attention. We generally forget that our skin is exposed to the summer heat and dust even if you are sitting in your home. And, because we all are under the air conditioner all the time, it may just make things even worse. Some people are observing a skin breakout and many other skin problems during the COVID-19 lockdown. We should know the reasons and how can take care to avoid such skin conditions:

- During this time of summer, heat and warm weather tends to aggravate dry skin, and especially in low humidity conditions. Going outdoors under the harsh sunlight has become minimal these days, still drying of skin is unavoidable.
- Hydrate yourself through the day, as water help to get rid of toxins in the body. Most people don't drink water on a regular basis, and this also causes acne.
- Stop washing your face with any soap. Always use a good face wash to clean your skin. It removes dirt from the surface of the skin and keeps the face fresh, and will not dry out the skin as soaps do.
- Don't eat any kind of junk food. Always take a healthy diet, exercise, hydrate yourself at regular intervals, sleep well and have foods which are rich in Vitamin D. So that it can keep your skin acne free.
- Even if we are confined to our house, we still need to follow a dedicated skincare regime for the nourishment of our skin. Nourish the skin with a face pack once a week and follow a nightly cleansing ritual every day. These are important for a glowing and healthy skin.

The COVID-19 pandemic has exposed the weakness of food and health systems, disproportionately impacting already vulnerable populations. As inequalities and malnutrition continue to sweep the world and India, the 2020 Global Nutrition Report stresses that the need to address malnutrition in all its forms by tackling injustices in food and health systems is now more urgent than ever.

The report finds that India remains severely affected by malnutrition, with one of the highest rates of within-country inequalities in malnutrition globally. However, some progress has been made to tackle stunting and underweight, and the country has put in place innovative programmes aimed at reaching the most vulnerable.

India has had some success in reducing rates of underweight in child and adolescents. Between 2000 and 2016, rates have decreased from 66.0% to 58.1% for boys and 54.2% to 50.1% in girls. However, this is still high compared to the average of 35.6% for boys and 31.8% for girls in the Asia region.

In addition, 37.9% of children under 5 years of age are stunted and 20.8% are wasted, compared to the Asia average of 22.7% and 9.4% respectively.

We need an alternative to saliva: Bumrah

Rohit & Virat defining pair of modern era

Premier India pacer Jasprit Bumrah won't miss the hugs and high-fives as part of a wicket celebration but he will certainly miss applying saliva on the ball and feels an alternative should be provided to maintain the red cherry.

The ICC Cricket Committee, led by former India captain Anil Kumble, recommended a ban on using saliva on the ball as an interim measure to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic. However, the Committee did not allow the use of artificial substances as a substitute move.

The new rule makes life tougher for the bowlers and Bumrah, like many former and current fast bowlers, feels there ought to be an alternative.

"I was not much of a hugger anyway and not a high-five person as well, so that doesn't trouble me a lot. The only thing that interests me is the saliva bit," said.

"I don't know what guidelines we'll have to follow when we come back, but I feel there should be an alternative," he added.

Bumrah said not being able to use saliva makes the game more batsman-friendly.

"If the ball is not well maintained, it's difficult for the bowlers. The grounds are getting shorter and shorter, the wickets are becoming flatter and flatter.

"So we need something, some alternative for the bowlers to maintain the ball so that it can do something - maybe reverse in the end or conventional swing."

When former West Indian



pacer Bishop pointed out that the conditions have been favourable to the fast bowlers over the last couple of years, Bumrah nodded in agreement. "In Test match cricket, yes. That is why it's my favourite format, because we have something over there. But in one-day cricket and T20 cricket... one-day cricket there are two

new balls, so it hardly reverses at the end.

"We played in New Zealand, the ground (boundary) was 50 metres. So even if you are not looking to hit a six, it will go for six. In Test matches I have no problem, I'm very happy with the way things are going."

He finds it amusing that

the batsmen keep complaining about the swinging ball.

"Whenever you play, I've heard the batsmen - not in our team, everywhere - complaining the ball is swinging. But the ball is supposed to swing! The ball is supposed to do something! We are not here just to give throwdowns, isn't it? (laughter)

"This is what I tell batsmen all the time. In one-day cricket, when did the ball reverse last, I don't know. Nowadays the new ball doesn't swing a lot as well. So whenever I see batsmen say the ball is swinging or seaming and that is why I got out - the ball is supposed to do that.

"Because it doesn't happen so much in the other formats, it's a new thing for the batsmen when the ball is swinging or seaming," said the 26-year-old.

The Ahmedabad-born pacer finds himself in an unusual position as he has not bowled for over two months due to the lockdown imposed in the wake of the coronavirus outbreak.

When India will play next is not clear yet and Bumrah said he is not sure about how his body will hold up when he returns to action.

"I really don't know how your body reacts when you don't bowl for two months, three months. I'm trying to keep up with training so that as soon as the grounds open up, the body is in decent shape.

"I've been training almost six days a week but I've not bowled for a long period of time so I don't know how the body will react when I bowl the first ball.

"I'm looking at it as a way to renew your own body. We'll never get such a break again, so even if you have a small niggle here and there, you can be a refreshed person when you come back. You can prolong your career," he said.

Bumrah has risen rapidly in international cricket despite experts having reservations about his longevity due to his unorthodox action.

Every cricketing era has a "defining pair" which builds the narrative and the duo of Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma is a special one for India in modern times, says Sri Lankan legend Kumar Sangakkara.

Kohli and Rohit have aggregated nearly 36,000 runs (35,930 runs) across three formats and Sangakkara feels the duo has the same aura which Sourav Ganguly and Rahul Dravid had in the late '90s and early 2000s.

"There is something very special about Virat and Rohit. That fact that rules have changed and run-scoring might have become slightly easier in one-day cricket, but it's incredibly hard, the volume of cricket that India athletes play," Sangakkara said on Star Sports' 'Cricket Connected'.

Sangakkara feels that Kohli and Rohit deserve the respect also for the fact that players from bygone era didn't have to constantly play three formats.

"So, I think you have to have a lot of respect for Rohit and Virat but understand that it's all because of the players that

have gone before and have done all the hard work then as well.

"So, it's a knock-on effect, so in every era, there's always a defining pair and in the modern era, it's Rohit and Virat for India for sure." Sangakkara recollected the era of Dravid and Ganguly and drew a parallel with Kohli and Rohit where batsmen have been destructive despite being orthodox in their technique.

"If you look at Rahul and Dada, both of them are orthodox batsmen. They play beautiful cricket shots and are very technically correct. Dravid may be a little bit more so, but the ability to be as destructive with such rate and precision stroke-making is something that has to be really admired."

"If you take the modern-day game, India has two of the best players in Virat and Rohit, who play orthodox cricket but who are just absolutely destructive in any format of the game. You don't have to muscle the ball or put too much effort or look ugly doing it, they just play good cricket shots and results come," he concluded.

Advantage for Aus in D/N Test: Smith

Star batsman Steve Smith says the experience of having played more pink ball games than India would give Australia 'slight advantage' when the two sides clash under flood lights in December but the Virat Kohli-led side has the batsmen to stand up to the challenge.

Cricket Australia last week confirmed that India will tour Down Under for a full tour comprising four Tests, three ODIs and three T20Is. The second Test will be a day-night affair, starting from December 11 in Adelaide.

"We played a few more pink ball games, perhaps, than India which might be a slight advantage," the Aussie star batsman said in a Facebook session, hosted by Sony Sports India.

"India played pretty well in the day-night game they played at Kolkata. It's a different game but they certainly got the batters that can stand up to the conditions when it gets tough with the Pink Ball. And their bowlers, they stand the seam up with quality."

"They are world class play-



ers who are able to adapt to anything, so I see it being a pretty amazing contest," he said.

India will first clash with Australia in a T20I series beginning October 11 and then return to defend the Border-Gavaskar Trophy with the opening match at Gabba, where the hosts have tremendous record.

"Our record at Gabba (Brisbane) against anyone, is good to be fair, that is a fortress

ECB to resume cricket behind closed doors

The ECB has welcomed the UK government's decision to allow the resumption of professional sports behind closed doors which allows the board to go ahead with its plan of hosting international cricket starting next month.

In the latest health and safety guidelines designed to prevent the spread of coron-

avirus, Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport Oliver Dowden on Saturday gave the green light for live competitive sport to return behind closed doors in safe and carefully controlled environments from June 1.

"We are extremely heartened by Saturday's announcement from the Secretary of State, which will support the return of professional, domes-

tic cricket behind closed doors, and provides a meaningful next step for recreational players to begin playing at their clubs again," England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) said in a statement.

The board added that it will study the guidelines laid down by the government to safely resume the game.

"Over the coming week, we will seek to understand the spe-

cific guidance from Government's medical teams so that we can provide support for cricket clubs who will be eager to see their communities safely playing in small groups."

"We extend our thanks to all those in Government who have worked hard to support the return of sport and we look forward to seeing players from across the game start returning to the field," it added.

Everyone entitled to their own opinion: Rabada on his aggression

Manchester United extended Odion Ighalo's loan spell until January 2021 on Monday to ensure the Nigerian striker will be able to finish the 2019/20 season with the Premier League club.

Ighalo's initial loan deal from Shanghai Shenhua expired at the end of May, but the 30-year-old has been rewarded for an impressive return of four goals in eight appearances for United before football was shut down by the coronavirus pandemic in March.

"Manchester United have reached agreement with Shanghai Greenland Shenhua to extend the loan deal for Odion Ighalo," United said in a statement.

"He will now remain with the Reds until 31 January 2021, enabling him to build on an impressive start to life with the club he supported as a boy."

Ighalo could prove an important addition to Ole Gunnar Solskjaer's squad ahead of a packed schedule once games get back under way later this month.

"They (Shanghai) have been great towards us, allowing him to play for his dream club," said Solskjaer last week.

"It's been a dream for him and hopefully he can finish what he started and win a trophy with us."

BFI to nominate Phangal for Khel Ratna

World Silver-medallist Amit Panghal and the seasoned Vikas Krishan were on Monday nominated for the Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna award by the Boxing Federation of India, which picked only Olympic-bound names as its nominees for the annual honours.

The BFI has nominated world Bronze-winning trio of Lovlina Borgohain (69kg), Simranjit Kaur (64kg) and Manish Kaushik (63kg) for the Arjuna awards. Of these, Borgohain has won the world Bronze twice, the most recent being last year.

For the Dronacharya awards, the BFI has finalised the names of national women's coach Mohammed Ali Qamar and assistant coach Chhote Lal Yadav.

"The nominations of the athletes and coaches have been on the basis of their performance during the last four years," the BFI said.

The 24-year-old Panghal (52kg), also an Asian Games champion, has not won any national sports award. He was being nominated for the Arjuna award for the past three years but was not considered by the selection committee because of a 2012 "inadvertent" dope offence.



"He is allowed to compete for the country and his medals are celebrated. He deserves to be honoured as well," BFI Executive Director R K Sacheti told PTI.

"Youth level ki galtiyan to sab jageh maaf hoti hain. I didn't do it intention-

ally. I only took a medicine prescribed to me without knowing the consequences. I am hopeful I will be considered," Panghal had told PTI in a recent interaction.

Commonwealth and Asian Games Gold-medallist Krishan (69kg) won the Arjuna award in 2012. The 28-year-old had turned professional in 2018 after his CWG top finish followed by a third Asian Games medal — a Bronze.

He returned to the amateur circuit last year with the South Asian Games, winning a gold there before qualifying for the Olympics at the Asian qualifiers in Jordan in March this year.

Of the three Arjuna contenders, Kaushik has had a great run for the past couple of years, winning a Bronze in his maiden world championship (2019) to qualify for the Olympics after a Silver at the 2018 Commonwealth Games.

Both Kaur and Borgohain booked their Tokyo tickets at the Asian qualifiers. Qamar, an Arjuna awardee, was India's first Commonwealth Games gold-medallist in boxing and has been in charge of the women's camp for over a year now. This was after serving as an assistant coach for one year.

Real to play at training center on La Liga restart

The Spanish league is resuming in less than two weeks with Real Madrid playing its games at the club's training center.

Madrid will host Eibar on June 14 at the 6,000-capacity Alfredo Di Stefano Stadium, a venue used mostly by the club's "B" team at the Ciudad Real Madrid center on the city's outskirts.

Madrid is not stopping renovation work at the Santiago Bernabéu Stadium as all remaining league games are likely to be played without fans because of the coronavirus pandemic.

The league on Sunday confirmed the dates and times of the first two rounds of matches to be played after the competition was stopped mid-March because of the pandemic. The first game will be the Seville derby between Sevilla and Real Betis on June 11 at 10 p.m. Local time (2000 GMT).

Defending champion Barcelona, which has a two-point lead over Real Madrid after 27 rounds, will resume at Mallorca on June 13, while Atlético Madrid visits Athletic Bilbao the following day.

The league has announced that every game will include an "applause

to infinity" tribute to the "heroes who are fighting to overcome" the pandemic. Pre-recorded applause uploaded in videos by fans will be played in the 20th minute of matches.

"We have created this initiative to help fans be a part of La Liga's return and also as an opportunity for them to show their support for the heroes of the COVID-19 pandemic," said league president Javier Tebas, who gave his weekly interview to league broadcaster Movistar on Sunday.

"We want them to feel close to their team, even if they cannot be in the stadiums cheering them on, and for players to feel the support of their fans."

Most games will be played late in the day to take into account high temperatures in Spain, but some will be brought forward based on favorable weather forecasts. There will be a couple of matches at 1 p.m. Local time in the first weekend.

The second division will resume June 11 with the second half of the game between Rayo Vallecano and Albacete, which was suspended at halftime in December after Ukrainian Roman Zozulia of Albacete was subjected to Nazi taunts by opposing fans.
