Ensure free travel for migrants: SC

Stranded workers must be provided with food and water, States/UTs told

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

Ten days after it junked a PIL on the plight of migrant workers, the Supreme Court on Thursday directed that no train or bus fare be charged from the migrant workers stranded across the country and they be provided food and water.

Between then and now, dozens of migrant workers were mowed down by trains and buses or were found dead inside trains while returning to their home States.

The SC, which passed interim directions, said all migrant workers who are stranded shall be provided food by concerned States and Union Territories (UTs) at places which shall be publicised and notified to them for the period they are waiting for their turn to board a train or a bus. A Bench headed by Justice

Ashok Bhushan said the originating State shall provide meals and water at the station

and during the journey while the Railways would provide the same to the migrant workers. It

said food and water be also provided to them for travel in buses.

The Bench, also comprising Justices SK Kaul and MR Shah, directed that States to oversee the registration of migrant workers and ensure that they are made to board the train or bus at the earliest.

The top court said complete information in this regard should be publicised to all concerned.

The court observed that it is presently concerned with the miseries and difficulty faced by the migrants workers who are trying to get to their native places. It said though there is no doubt that State Governments and UTs are taking steps, several lapses have been issued in the process of registration, transportation and providing food water to the migrants.

Earlier, the apex court asked some questions from the Centre on the plight of

migrant workers ranging from as to how long they will have to wait before going to their native places to who will pay for their travel and provide them food and shelter.

The court asked Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the Centre, about the confusion over the payment of travel fare of stranded migrant workers and said that they should not be made to pay for their journey back home.

"What is the normal time? If a migrant is identified, there must be some certainty that he will be shifted out within one week or ten days at most? What is that time? There had been instances where one State sends migrants but at the border another State says we are not accepting the migrants. We need a policy on this," the Bench told Mehta.

We're engaged, India rejects US offer on China

A day after US President Donald Trump offered to mediate between India and China in what he termed a "raging border dispute," New Delhi on Thursday virtually rejected the US proposal saying it was "engaged" with Beijing at diplomatic level to resolve the issue "peacefully."

Making the Indian stand clear, External Affairs Ministry Spokesperson Anurag Srivastava said, "Our engagement on the diplomatic front continues both in Delhi as well as in Beijing."

India and China, he said, have engagements both at the military level as well as diplomatic levels. The two nations have signed several protocols on maintaining peace and tranquility at the border. There are many agreements on this issue.

"Our troops have taken a very responsible approach towards border management. They scrupulously follow the guidance provided by our leadership. At the same time, we will defend our sovereignty and territorial integrity," he

added. The US President in a tweet message from Washington had said, "We have informed both India and China that the United States is ready, willing and able to mediate or arbitrate their now raging border dispute."

Besides indicating that the LAC dispute was a bilateral issue and there was no need for third party interference, India on Thursday also said the two countries (India and China) have established a mechanism to resolve the situation peacefully through dialogue.

Sources also said talks at the local military level between commanders of the two armies are also on. In fact, more than seven rounds of talks were held in the last fortnight but could not achieve a breakthrough.

The armies of India and China are involved in face-offs at four places for the last 25 days or so in Eastern Ladakh. The Chinese army has also intruded into the Hot Spring area near Galwan valley and reinforced its troop strength to over 5,000 in total at all the stand-off locations.

Delhi, Bengal, Kerala see biggest single-day spike

For second consecutive day, India reports highest number of cases

Delhi, West Bengal and Kerala reported their biggest single day spike on Thursday and with Maharashtra recording yet another day of huge surge in number of cases and death it was the second consecutive day when the country recorded biggest spike of 7,220 cases.

Delhi reported 1,024 new cases and 13 deaths on Thursday and this is for the first time that the national Capital has reported more than 1,000 cases. Other than Maharashtra, only Gujarat, and now Delhi have reported 1,000 plus cases in a day. Delhi has now 16,281 confirmed cases with a death count of 316.

After the development in Delhi, the Haryana Government decided to seal its borders with the national Capital.

"We will keep our border with Delhi completely sealed due to increasing Covid-19 cases," Haryana Minister Anil Vaid said.

After reporting between 2,000 and 2,200 cases for the three days, Maharashtra logged in 2,598 new Covid-19 cases on

Thursday, taking the total number of coronavirus cases almost to 60,000 in the State at 59,546. The toll in the State also rose to 1,982 after 85 casualties were reported in the last 24 hours.

Reports said 36 new cases of coronavirus were reported in Mumbai's Dharavi in the last 24 hours. The total number of cases rose to 1,675 on Thursday in the densely-populated area.

West Bengal, which is battling with coronavirus and destruction caused by Amphan cyclone, reported 344 new coronavirus cases which is the

highest single-day spike in cases so far. The total number of cases in the State rose to 4,536, which includes 2,573 active cases and 1,668 discharges.

The nationwide curbs were first imposed on March 25 to contain the spread of the novel coronavirus, and has been extended thrice.

Locusts may reach Odisha

Swarms of locusts are expected to reach as far as Bihar and Odisha in July, according to the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO).

Spring-bred immature adult groups of locust and swarms that arrived in Rajasthan from the west continued to move east and to the central states of Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra.

Much of these movements were associated with strong westerly winds from Cyclone



Amphan in the Bay of Bengal. The FAO warned, "Several successive waves of invasions can be expected until July in Rajasthan with eastward surges across northern India as far as Bihar and Odisha followed by westward movements and a return to Rajasthan on the changing winds associated with the monsoon."

67 more test +ve, State's total 1,660

Highest 26 infected in Ganjam
75 recover, total recoveries 887

On Thursday, 67 coronavirus cases were reported, increasing the total number of cases to 1,660 in the State.

Ganjam district reported the highest number of 26 cases. It was followed by Jajpur and Khordha districts with 11 cases each, Nayagarh district seven, Subarnapur district four, Balangir district two, Jagatsinghpur district two,

Sambalpur district two and Keonjhar one each.

Out of the new cases, 65 cases belonged to quarantine centres and two were local.

However, for the consecutive third day, the recoveries outnumbered the new coronavirus cases. A total of 75 patients recovered from the disease, taking the total number of recoveries to 887 on Thursday.

Out of the 75 recoveries, 25 were from Jajpur district, 19 from Ganjam, nine from Cuttack, eight from Puri, three each from Nayagarh and Kendrapada, two each from Kandhamal and Balangir and one each from Keonjhar, Boudh, Sambalpur and Khordha.

The current active cases stand at 766.

Odisha lead performer in Covid mgmt

Recovery rate higher, fatality rate less than nat'l average

Odisha has been a lead performer in the Covid-19 management in the country. This was revealed at a high-level meeting on public health response to the Covid-19 held under the chairmanship of Cabinet Secretary Rajiv Gouda in which Chief Secretary Asit Tripathy, Health and Family Welfare ACS Pradeep Kumar Mohapatra and other senior officers of Odisha participated through video conferencing on Thursday.

It was revealed that the rate of Covid test per million people in the State is 3,429 against all India average of 2,490. One positive cases found in Odisha out of around 84 sample tests

against the national average of one out of 21 tests. The fatality ratio in Odisha, as of now, is 0.42% against the national average of 2.86%.

As on Thursday, a total number of 1,39,311 Covid tests have been completed in the State. The State's recovery rate is around 49 percent against all India average of 42 per cent.

In the recent week, it was recorded that the number of daily recoveries was more than the positive cases found on same day. The wave of community participation through PRI and SHGs has been another achievement of Odisha. TMCs and quarantine centers are being managed at panchayat level through active participation of the Sarpanches, elected representatives, SHGs and other people.

Health and Family Welfare Special Secretary Shalini Pandit, Covid-19 CSO to Chief Secretary Vishal Dev and OSML MD Yamini Sarangi were present, among others.

Cong demands monthly financial aid for poor

'Deposit ₹7,500 in accounts for six months'

The State Congress has demanded that the Centre provide monthly financial assistance to poor people suffering from the ongoing lockdown.

"We demand Union Government to deposit Rs 7,500 in accounts of poor people at least for a period of six months to help them during the lockdown," said PCC president Niranjan Patnaik during the party's 'Speak up India' campaign here on Thursday.

Launching a scathing attack on both BJD and BJP, Patnaik said both the political parties have betrayed people of Odisha, for which they went through tough situations arising out of corona.

"After being inspired by election speeches of BJP and BJD leaders, some might have cast their votes for them to power. In the course of time, it was found that common people have been betrayed," Patnaik said.

He alleged that the



Governments at the Centre and in the State have been formed only for their publicity instead of addressing the genuine issues of the people.

"They are the Governments of publicity, commitments and betrayal. The people of Odisha as well as the country have been betrayed by both BJP/Fan BJD, for which we all are suffering from the man-made disease," Patnaik said.

He said, "PM Narendra Modi had promised to win the Covid battle in 21 days while referring to the Mahabharata war that had lasted for 18 days. However, the infections continue to spread across the countryside like locusts."

Patnaik also demanded that the State Government ensure safe return of migrant labourers. He too demanded financial aid for farmers, who have borne huge losses due to lockdown restrictions.

OERC letter in the court on the grounds that statutory rules haven't yet been finalised regarding the status of the present Ceseemployees and it has also not been decided as to which company would pay the arrears dues of the retired employees.

A Division Bench of Chief Justice Mohammad Rafiq and Justice Dr BR Sarangi heard the matter. The OERC has also filed an affidavit in this regard and it was instructed that copies of the affidavit would be served on all parties.

Bus services resume, but partially normal

Even though private bus services finally resumed in the State on Thursday, only a few buses began plying. The numbers of passengers were also very low at various places. A bus carrying 15 passengers which left from Baramunda to Boudh was the first one to ply in the State. Another two buses from Baramunda to Brahmapur and Balugaon also left for their destinations.

To prevent the coronavirus spread, the buses were first one to ply in the State. The connectivity helps in ensuring that people wear masks and sanitise their hands.

More livelihood activities in villages planned

20L man-days to be created by May 31

The State Government has planned to undertake

livelihood and wage employment activities in rural areas post lockdown period.

On Wednesday, Chief Secretary Asit Tripathy directed district Collectors to take up more employment-intensive projects in the MGNREGS and Odisha Livelihoods Mission (OLM) programmes.

Development Commissioner SC Mohapatra advised that DMF districts may give additional daily wages in MGNREGS projects for attracting more labourers.

Panchayati Raj Secretary Deo Rajinjan Kumar Singh suggested issuing of new job cards to the willing migrant workers. The Collectors were directed to start at least two works in each village by June 1.

It was targeted that 20 lakh man-days per day would be created by May 31. As of today, around 12 lakh man-days are being provided. The Chief Secretary directed for 100% timely payment of the wages.

'WhatsApp your grievances'

BHUBANESWAR: In a novel initiative, the Ganjam district administration on Thursday issued a WhatsApp number for people of the district to lodge their grievances.

Official sources said the district administration asked people to send their applications through the WhatsApp number 09437565801 instead of visiting the district Collectorate. The problem of unemployment is a major concern in Odisha. In spite of its advantage like natural resources and a stable Government of two decades, the State continues to remain a backward rural agrarian economy and has been facing the challenge of joblessness and huge distress migration problem for its one third of workable population. In order to counter the issues of economy, the move of the Government has been towards more privatisation and social charity which has not yet contributed much to resolve issues.

The nature of unemployment varies from region to region and also different among economic classes and social groups within the State because of huge local, social, caste and gender based disparities subject to their eco-

nomie, social and educational status. The State Finance Minister in 2019 had informed to the Assembly that 1,31,000 Government posts were lying vacant in the State. The total job seekers registered in State employment exchange above matric was more than 10 lakh in 2013. It has been increasing each year. There has been huge distress migration of unskilled youth and very few skilled professionals having advantage migration.

In the agriculture sector of Odisha, there has been huge under employment and more than 60 per cent of the work forces of the State depend on agriculture for seasonal employment whereas agriculture continues to be seasonal in nature and has been prone to a host of natural calamities. This sector is already overpopulated with presence of 42 lakh cultivators and 68

lakh agriculture workers. Mechanisation in agriculture has been slowly eroding many of the traditional work by labour force. The agriculture workers are mostly seasonally employed and often migrate in lean period.

The State Government has made residential hostel facility for about 7,000 children of migrant workers in the State as part of distress migration mitigation programme. There were about 47 lakh operational holdings out of which 92 per cent are small and marginal holdings which is in between 0.57 ha to 1.63 ha. This may not be viable for a family to survive with

such small holdings. The distress condition in agriculture remains a permanent feature with farmers suicide and distress sale of agriculture produces in the absence of input subsidy and lack of basic infrastructure such as irrigation, cold storage, transportation and marketing facilities. There has been very little growth in the areas of forestry, animal husbandry and fishery in spite of natural advantage of forest coverage, coast line, rivers, ponds, lagoon and fresh water and huge availability of waste land in many parts of the State. The dependency on subsidised paddy production has dominated the agriculture scenario rather than the cultivation of fruits, vegetables, fish, milk, meat, egg and other cash crops though the State has the advantage of ten varieties of agro climatic zones and less development of agro-based

industries. There is ample scope in the areas of mineral and manufacturing sector. It is a fact that the major public sector industries in the State such as NTPC, Nalco, MCL, SAIL, RSP, OMC and many more have created much scope of employment and making major input in the growth of the State's economy through socially inclusive employment. The industrial and mining areas have emerged as mini economic hubs. But the emerging issues out of industrialisation and mining have not been so far addressed properly by the Government, private industries and other stakeholders.

Odisha remains a consumer State of industrial products. Even many agricultural produces are also imported from other States. The welfare economic model through limited micro schemes such as Mission Sakhi and KALIA for

rural poor are not economically viable even to survive and to meet the growing financial needs of the rural population. The cost of production of these small units is very high and also they confront marketing issues. A family in rural areas cannot depend on such miniature schemes to feed themselves unless there is a minimum regular income.

The State should distribute productive assets, land, knowledge, and invest more on human resources development to make more people skilled and employable. The Government along with private organisations must set up manufacturing units such as garments, leather, cotton, household articles in every blocks and plan mass production of consumer goods.

The number of unskilled unemployed youth is very high in the State because lack of

quality education in primary level and absence of modern skill development training centres. So there should be universal free quality English medium common school system and universal primary healthcare centres in every panchayat. The State should invest more on universal healthcare and education, banking and insurance, communication and connectivity, basic amenities, infrastructure such as road, railway, coastal highway, and other means of transport, electricity, telephone. The connectivity helps in networking globally and reach the larger employment market. While planning for manufacturing industry and service sector, the non-economic issues must be looked into in the State.

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Priest beheads man at temple in Cuttack dist

Rural SP refutes incident as 'human sacrifice'

A priest allegedly killed a man by beheading him at a temple near Bandhabuda under the Narasingpur police station in Cuttack district on Wednesday night.

Later, accused Sansari Ojha (72), priest of Brahmani De Temple, surrendered to police following the incident.

Reports said an argument erupted between him and deceased Saroj Pradhan (52) at the temple. The matter took a violent turn as Ojha hacked Pradhan with a sharp weapon killing him on the spot.

Police have recovered the body and sent it for post-mortem. Further investigation into the incident was underway. However, Cuttack Rural SP RB Panigrahi has refuted the incident as 'human sacrifice' as reported in a section of media.

Panigrahi clarified that the midnight murder of an aged

person by an elderly man was out of a sudden provocation after the duo had entered into a scuffle under the influence of ganja.

"No, it was not a human sacrifice to check the spreading of Covid-19 as reported by a section of media", the SP said after visiting the spot at Bandha Huda village under Narasingpur police station, about more than 100 kms from the city.

Saroj had previous rivalries and were habitual ganja smokers. They often pick up quarrels over stupid matters.

While Sansari was staying in the basement of a local temple after abandoning his family and house; Saroj, an unmarried youth, often comes to the temple late in the evening to sleep in the basement. Last evening Sansari and Saroj



entered into a quarrel after Saroj forcibly ate the dinner of the former. Enraged over it, Sansari reportedly picked up a chopper and severed the head of Saroj with a single strike on Wednesday.

At the twilight of age, when parents want their children to take care of them, an octogenarian person, here, was forced to shoulder the burden of his family members as his two children were insane.

Nrusingha Charan Behera of Ekalapur village under Kansa Badadantugoupi of Mahakalapada block has not enough strength to stand straight on his own feet and has to depend on a lathi to walk, but circumstances compelled him to collect bread and butter for the maintenance of his mentally disabled children.

Nursingha's only source of income comes from his old age pension of Rs700 and subsidised food grains that he gets from his insane son's



card, to run the family.

According to Nrusingha, his wife died several years back. His only son later developed insanity whereas his daughter, who was married, returned back to his family following rift with her. She developed mental sickness soon.

But she is yet to be enrolled either in NFSA or SFSA ration card. Nrusingha's mentally sick

children are yet to avail the deformity certificate to get the benefits. Even his daughter does not have Aadhaar card too. All are staying in a ramshackle thatched hut. When contacted, District Social Security Officer Pravas Chandra Das stated that the matter had come to his notice and steps had been taken to provide all the Government helps to the ill fated family.

Apathy to farmers: AIKSSS sends memo to PM

Raises slew of demands

The All India Kisan Sangh (AIKSSS), Sarajaya Samiti (AIKSSS), Odisha unit, sent a memorandum to the Prime Minister of India on continued neglect to farmers' problems and expressing dissatisfaction over the relief packages by the Government.

The Samiti demanded 'Sampoorna Karjामुक्ति' (full loan waiver) and 'Poora Daam' (full price) for the produce of the farmers.

While the Government has written off Rs 68,607 crore of the big corporate loans, but the farmers and workers are being

The memorandum demanded waiver of all loans of all farmers, slash in input prices, fair MSP, waiver of all electricity bills, provision of 15 kg per unit per month of food grain along with at least 1 kg of pulses and sugar, wage work for full 6 months, Rs 10,000 per month for at least for six months for loss of livelihood to each family.

Government health facilities in every village, free transport to allow all migrants to return home, testing for all migrants; opening of all local small businesses and production and local transport.

The memorandum also cautioned that the economic relief announced would completely ruin the limited securities of farmers.

Surat returnee dies in home quarantine

BARIPADA: A Surat returnee of Tarsole village in the Betnoti area of Mayurbhanj district died while being under home quarantine on Thursday.

The deceased was identified as Paresh Chandra Mohanta of Tarsole village in Betnoti area of the district. According to information, Mohanta was put under seven days institutional quarantine at the Betnoti-based Odisha Adarsha Vidyalaya quarantine centre after his arrival the State from Surat. Later, he was allowed by the authorities to remain on home quarantine.

However, he breathed his last at his residence in the morning, after three days of home quarantine. But the cause of his death was yet to be ascertained.

However, Mohanta's wife lodged a complaint with the Betnoti police urging them to probe into the matter and take steps towards ascertaining the reason behind her husband's death. PNS

2 B'swar Covid Hosp nurses test corona +ve

Fear psychosis gripped all staffs of the Covid-19 Hospital here after two nurses tested positive for coronavirus. On the night of 12th of 149 total positive cases of the district have recovered.

In the meanwhile, the death of a 72-year-old man suffering from multiple diseases created confusion as his corona positive report was received following his demise and the administration neither confirmed his death due to the virus nor declared his residence area, Hinjali, under Sadar block as a containment zone.

Reports say as many as 21 medical staffs, including six doctors, who were treating the co-morbid patient are now in home quarantine.

The local Sarpanch has directed the family members of the deceased to stay in home quarantine.

District Project Manager Anil Mohanty said, "The two infected nurses were residing in the quarantine centre created in the hospital campus."

Currently 17 patients are undergoing treatment in the Covid hospital while 129 of 149 total positive cases of the district have recovered.

NREGS, agri can be potential job providers for migrants

It appears that the fight against corona devil would be a long-time affair. The lockdown has put the migrant labourers helpless and peni-

less as they have lost livelihoods in their place of work.

About 12 crore people used to work in different cities and sectors like textile, eatery, transport, driving, electrical and motor mechanics and building works, who have lost their livelihood. Most of these workers are migrating to their home States like Bihar, Odisha, Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, Assam, Andhra Pradesh etc by truck, cycle and on foot.

The lockdown has also hit the landless labourers hard in rural areas who were earning livelihood by working in agro fields or cultivating small lands on lease basis as harvesting and marketing of hor-

ticulture crops in initial one month of lockdown period has come to a standstill. It would be very difficult for these crops of people to financially recover their losses that they sustained due to the scenario, which has broken the economy.

The current situation leaves no option but to revive agro activities with increasing dimension. Sometimes there used to be problems of scanty of workers while now there would be problem of plenty. Exodus of migrants to their native places would be a heavy burden on the rural economy. The home returnees may not like to go back to their former work places and would like to stay back at their native places

for which it is imperative to provide them job by engaging in various rural development and agriculture activities. The National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGS) would have to be expanded and the work limit up to 100 days has to be extended to round the year to restore livelihood to them.

The workers can be engaged as wage earners in both farm and non-farm sectors. If more people are engaged in agriculture production and horticulture like vegetable and fruits round the year to meet domestic needs and commercial marketing, it would make agriculture more profitable, sustainable

and job creating. Some of the works that need to be included under the MGNREGS are (a) digging and cleaning village ponds (b) construction of water channels, rain water conservation ponds as per feasibility (c) creating village forests of 500 fruit bearing trees in each village as per availability of space on village roadsides (d) strengthening river banks at vulnerable flood points (e) check dams on small river courses (f) plantation on river banks and around water bodies and road sides. Concerted effort to increase greenery is the need of the hour to reduce anger of the nature.

Besides revival of traditional cottage industries

through SHGs by engagement workers in weaving, tailoring, handicrafts, carpet making, milk production, fishery, etc. The National Rural Rehabilitation programmes would lead to increase in agro products and eventually transform the villages / GPs as self sufficient economic units. The role of gram panchayats and blocks is important in the new scenario as these units would have to function as village Governments for successful implementation of various projects. The Odisha Government has recently taken a series of measures to empower gram panchayats, SHG groups and local NGOs can play useful role for successful implementation of such

development programmes in their localities.

Article 39(a) of the Constitution mandates the State to ensure adequate means of livelihood and Article 43 calls for ensuring "decent standard of life" to the citizens. To rehabilitate all these migrant labourers the States would face enormous financial problems. As village administration is covered by the State list, the Centre's help is very much needed to overcome such distress.

In the pre-GST era the States had freedom to raise funds. With coming into force of GST in July 2017, the States have lost their power to independently levy any tax to raise their resources. The idea of

GST is good but it has snatched away the power of taxation of the States which was guaranteed by the Constitution as sovereign and independent entity in the federal structure. The States also need to explore other sources to raise their revenue to overcome the extreme financial crunch they are subjected due to need of engaging such a vast exodus of migrants. But this situation is exceptional and the Governments must rise above political consideration to make joint efforts for smooth sail from the crisis.

Cabinet Secy reviews 13 worst-hit cities


Holds meeting with Chief Secretaries of States, 13 Municipal Commissioners and District Magistrates

Three days ahead of Lockdown-4 to end, Cabinet Secretary Rajiv Vajpayee on Thursday held a meeting with Chief Secretaries of States, and 13 Municipal Commissioners and District Magistrates of most Covid-19-affected cities.

These 13 cities, including Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai and Kolkata, are having 70 per cent of the positive cases in India. The meeting is seen important as Prime Minister Narendra Modi will address the nation on May 31, Sunday through his radio talk Mann Ki Baat.

As Prime Minister's address is not fixed on other days, it is widely expected that he will announce the way forward after May 31, the day the Lockdown-4 regulations end.

The meeting bears significance as these 13 cities are considered to be the worst Coronavirus-affected locations and constitute about 70 per cent of the positive cases in the country.

The 13 focus cities are Mumbai, Chennai, Delhi/New Delhi, Ahmedabad, Thane, Pune, Hyderabad, Kolkata/Howrah, Indore (Madhya Pradesh), Jaipur, Jodhpur, Chengalpattu and Thiruvallur (Tamil Nadu).

Health Secretaries of the States also attended the high-level meeting chaired by Gauba. The Cabinet Secretary stressed for the containment zones and demarcating these areas geographically for implementation of strict protocols to prevent the pandemic. He also urged the States to doubling of the tests on people.

Centre has stressed that containment zones are to be geographically defined based on factors like mapping of cases and contacts and their geographical dispersion. This would enable in demarcating a well defined perimeter and enforcing the strict protocol of lockdown.

India: HCQ to be used with full responsibility

Even as Italy, Belgium and France have stopped use of Hydroxychloroquine (HCQ) amid WHO's concerns over its safety aspects, India on Thursday reiterated that it will continue to use it as it has been recommended as prophylaxis against the disease.

Several trials have been done on the use of HCQ, it is also being done in India. Our experience so far is that as per the current guidelines for its use by frontline workers, its benefits outweigh any risks.

ICMR Director General Dr Balram Bhargava too had said India would continue to use HCQ as prophylaxis despite its suspension from the solidarity trial of Covid-19. Scientists are studying these drugs and therapies, both in and out of the solidarity trial.

On May 26, WHO General Director Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus had announced "a temporary pause" in clinical trial of HCQ on Covid-19 patients, while the safety data of the anti-malaria drug was being reviewed.



Favipiravir, plant-based medicine ACQH, Itrilizumab (Also used for arthritis) BCG vaccine Micro-Bacterium W, Centresent Plasma, Arbidol, and HCQ besides Ramdesivir. Eight vaccine candidates are being tried."

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This had prompted the three of the countries' hardest hit by coronavirus infections to put a break on the large trial of the drug.

Soon test that detects viral particle's presence is on anvil: Vijayraghavan

Principal Scientific Adviser Dr K Vijayraghavan on Thursday said the RT-PCR test — the gold standard in India — looks for viral genetic material but soon a test that detects the viral particle's presence is on the anvil.

"As for testing and diagnosis, a new kind of test is likely to come up for testing of virus particle presence. Several nucleic acid tests have been developed, variations of RT-PCR tests have been developed. Then there are antibody tests.

"If sensitivity and specificity of antibody tests are high, they can be used for testing at individual level. Otherwise, they can be used for community surveillance purpose," said Dr K Vijayraghavan, Principal Scientific Adviser.

Dr VK Paul, member of the NITI Aayog and chairman of the Empowered Group 1 said that at least 20 Indian companies are now producing diagnostic kits. "India will be able to produce 5 lakh indigenous kits daily by July," he said, adding the manufacturers will be able to export after the domestic demands are full met.

Till last month, India had been heavily dependent on other countries as it had been importing the testing kits.

However, now the local manufacturers too have jumped in the fray in a big way. To bring the scientists and laboratories in touch with private firms to produce millions of testing kits, including around 10 million rapid antibody tests that offer quick results is being done under the project called Consortium for affordable and rapid diagnostics (CARD), spearheaded by the NITI Aayog and the Central Government's Department of Biotechnology.

The first goal of project CARD will be to churn out at least 10 million or 1 crore

to produce 5 lakh indigenous kits daily by July, he said. The first goal of project CARD will be to churn out at least 10 million or 1 crore rapid antibody tests for Covid-19 by July 2020. The final aim is to make India a diagnostic export powerhouse by the end of 2020.

It also seeks to bolster India's capabilities in manufacturing reagents, probes, primers, and other components needed for diagnostics. The final frontier for the fight against Covid-19 is science and technology. The base of our institutions of science and technology, bio-tech and pharma industry is strong. The entire infrastructure is engaged in the war against Covid-19," said Dr Paul.

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Nearly 30 groups in India trying to develop vaccines

Nearly 30 groups in India, ranging from big industry players to individual academics, are trying to develop vaccines to fight coronavirus, Principal Scientific Adviser K Vijayraghavan said on Thursday.

Of these 30, 20 are working at a good pace, he said.

added that "till today, we have not observed any change in the virus that alters its fundamental properties."

He said designing new drugs is a "very big challenge" and just like a vaccine it takes a very long time.

"Most attempts fail and thus you have to try a lot," said Vijayraghavan.

He said start-ups and academics have also got into developing vaccines and specified that four categories of vaccines can be there.

For instance, mRNA vaccines, in which component of genetic material of the virus is injected. Our body translates it into viral protein and develops immune system when the virus attacks. Another is standard vaccine in which weak version of the virus is used while yet another uses protein coding region of the virus is attached to the backbone of another virus to develop vaccine, he said.

The scientist further elaborated that virus protein is developed in the lab and is used with another stimulant while several companies are trying to develop it on the backbone of flu vaccine, it is in late pre-clinical trial stage and may be by October, pre-clinical trial would conclude.

"Indian companies are collaborating with foreign companies. Academics are also trying to develop the vaccines. The logistics of making the vaccine available to everyone will be a big challenge," said Vijayraghavan.

About the drugs, he said, drugs attack the virus chemically after it has entered the cell, as the virus uses our machinery to replicate. A drug has to be designed to attack only the virus.

"It has to attack the virus an early stage. There are two broad categories of drugs which can be developed. It can be re-purposed drugs or new drugs. Re-designing of new drugs is a major challenge.

"In India, in addition to our science agencies, the CSIR and AICTE have embarked on drug discovery hackathon where students are trained with info on how to do computational drug discovery, they will get access to expensive equipment.

"As for testing and diagnosis, a new kind of test is likely to come up for testing of virus particle presence. Several nucleic acid tests have been developed, variations of RT-PCR tests have been developed. Then there are antibody tests.

"If sensitivity and specificity of antibody tests are high, they can be used for testing at individual level. Otherwise, they can be used for community surveillance purpose," explained the scientist.

5 measures can prevent spread of Covid-19

These are maintaining hygiene, surface cleaning, physical distancing, tracking and testing in absence of drugs and vaccine, said Dr K Vijayraghavan, Principal Scientific Adviser

With no letup in the coronavirus cases whose numbers have crossed over 1.60 lakhs and with over 4,000 mortalities, Dr K Vijayraghavan, Principal Scientific Adviser on Thursday suggested that five measures should be taken to prevent spread of Covid-19, till the time its vaccine is developed.

These are maintaining hygiene, surface cleaning, physical distancing, tracking and testing in the absence of drugs and vaccine, he said at a Press briefing here.

"The disease spreads as our immune response takes a little longer and the virus by itself is not able to spread in individual level. Otherwise, they can be used for community surveillance purpose," explained the scientist.

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Parallel processing has to be done: Vijayraghavan

New Delhi: Dr K Vijayraghavan said if we want to develop vaccine in one year, then parallel processing has to be done.

"Hundred vaccines are being tested, instead of one. Simultaneously, we have to go fast on the regulatory process without compromising quality. We have to have manufacturing capability without compromising our standard immunising programme."

He added we have to have a distribution system ready. "This will require investment of 2 to 3 billion dollars, which is currently being done by the world. Our vaccine manufacturing is top class, of the three standard immunising vaccines, two are produced in India," PNS

NIA forensic team reaches Puwama

A forensic team of National Investigation Agency (NIA) has reached Puwama where a car fitted with an IED with an estimated 40-45 kg of RDX was blasted in situ by the bomb disposal squad early on Thursday.

A Pulwama like terror plot is being touted to have been averted by destroying the explosives-laden vehicle and the forensic team lifted various samples from the incident site for scientific testing and analysis into the type of explosives and detonators fitted into the IED, sources said.

While the case has not been handed over to the NIA officially, the investigation is likely to be taken over by the federal anti-terror probe agency soon, they said.

According to preliminary information gathered by the agencies, the car was driven by a Hizbul Mujahideen terrorist who escaped after initial fire-fight with the security forces.

Cong seeking benefits from challenges country is facing, indulging in political slander: BJP

New Delhi: The BJP on Thursday accused the Congress of seeking benefit from the challenges the country is facing currently, and said the opposition party is indulging in "political slander" which is "unfortunate but expected."

New Delhi: BJP national spokesperson Sambit Patra has been admitted to a private hospital in Gurugram after he showed symptoms of Covid-19, sources said. He is admitted to the Medanta hospital in Gurugram, hospital sources said.

The BJP leader has shown symptoms of Covid-19, a source said. Patra is one of the most visible BJP faces on news channels. He is also very active on social media and posted several tweets on Thursday as well.

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Bengal for lockdown till June 14

Adhir slams State Govt for mishandling migrant workers issue

The Bengal Government wants the lockdown to be extended by two weeks beyond May 31, sources at the State secretary Nabana said, resting the office of the Chief Secretary. According to sources the State Government has already communicated its views to the Centre notwithstanding the fact that most establishments such as malls, cinema halls, restaurants and educational institutions have been fully or partially functioning in the State. The State Government had already allowed resumption of bus and auto-rickshaw services to limited passengers from Wednesday.

Meanwhile even as train loads of migrant workers rolled in at various stations in Bengal Congress leader in Lok Sabha

Adhir Chowdhury on Thursday slammed the Mamata Banerjee Government for lackluster handling of the migrant workers issue, failing to realise the plight of those stuck in other states for months. "Why the State is cold-shouldering the issue of migrant workers who are languishing in other States without food and shelter... Why the State Government has not created facilities for the migrant workers who are coming in hordes from other States... How the state can be so insensitive towards its own citizens? Chowdhury, a five-time MP from Behrampur asked wondering why the Chief Minister was so worried about 'shramik trains' coming to Bengal when already the workers are returning to their State in hordes by buses and trucks.

"The workers are coming back in hordes in buses and trucks, paying for the fare by selling whatever they had and

here the State Government is simply looking the other way. Why this Government is so insensitive towards the plight of migrants and hapless people suffering for the past several months?" he asked wondering "where is a difference between people coming in trains and those coming buses."

Chowdhury's comments came on a day when about 25 trains entered Bengal bringing back several thousand workers to Burdwan, Malda, Dankuni, Purulia, Birbhum and Bankura. Elsewhere another instance of alleged "insensitivity" raised many eyebrows when Bengal BJP president Dilip Ghosh termed the incident of a toddler playing besides its dead mother's body at Muzaffarpur railway station a "minor event".

The Bengal opposition party leader Dilip Ghosh said his "insensitive comments" saying he was only reflecting the views of his party which was only an "attendant of the rich."

Condemning Ghosh for his alleged cavalier ways senior Trinamooli Congress MP Saugato Roy said "less said about this man is the better. He is foul in his mouth and insensitive too. He is better suited as a wood-cutter."

CPI(M) politburo member and former MP Md Salim said "one can only express sympathy for the ruthless person who calls the heart-rending scene of a toddler trying to awaken its dead mother in a Railway Station --- particularly at a time when the migrant workers are dying a hundred death every day --- a 'minor incident'."

He said, "The rest of the BJP leadership think that Modi is the only God and Ambanis and Adanis are the only human beings... and the remaining people are animals. What can you expect from them... The Modi Government with the help of the leaders like Dilip Ghosh has failed to save humankind but successes in killing humanity."

Green loss to turn City of Joy into 'city of heat'

The City of Joy may get transformed into a "hot city" in the coming decades not because of any 'page three' factor but because of the large-scale destruction of Kolkata's green cover, experts say.

With about 5,500 trees felled by the super cyclone that hit the city after 283 years Kolkata may witness a climate change of sorts getting robbed of about more than 5 lakh kilos of oxygen in parts at Jadavpur University say.

While Kolkata lost about 5,500 trees the iconic Botanical Gardens in Howrah saw about 1,000 trees getting damaged. The Pagla Gach (Mad tree) and the Kalpatrika—the only surviving species of their kind in the world — at Botanical Gardens too have suffered some damage, sources said.

"It is irreparable loss considering the well-known fat Sunderbans — 100 miles down south near the sea — has lost about 1.5 lakh trees meaning thereby that Kolkata will get that much less protection in the next cyclones," said Partho

Bhowmick an expert. The double whammy is the "loss of trees coupled with carbon emission creating a condition for the cyclones to visit the city more regularly and the loss of green cover in Sunderbans (on the verge of the sea) denying the region the natural speed breaker for the cyclones," said DP Mitra an environmental expert.

"Even if you plant trees at a brisk pace which is unlikely to happen understanding the bureaucratic velocity of work the trees that will be planted now will take at least 10 years — if we plant some fast growing trees — to grow to a level that can at least half-mange the situation," said a Satupa Saha a green activist.

Normally it takes 15 to 20 years for a tree to reach a stage where it is able to absorb a good amount of carbon dioxide besides providing oxygen. A full-grown tree absorbs about 20-25 kg of CO2 which is a huge amount.

Considering the fact that an individual requires about 750 kg of oxygen one should be surrounded by about 10 trees.

Tipplers in Kerala get their favourite brand after 2 months

Liquor outlets in Kerala (except those in hotspots) were reopened on Thursday morning and started selling spirits to tipplers who have been without their daily quota of drinks for the last two months.

According to TP Ramakrishnan, the State's Excise Minister, liquor is being sold through 265 outlets of Kerala State Beverages Corporation (Bevco), 36 outlets under the Consumed, 576 bar hotels, and 291 beer parlours.

Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan told reporters that 2,25,000 persons made use of the BevQ App which went operational on Thursday morning. The app allows long through on-line mode. There were some hiccups during initial hours but the Excise Department told me that it has been rectified. A complaint regarding a fake App has been registered and the police and liquor headquarters is probing the allegation. If found genuine, we

will initiate legal proceedings against those responsible for such fake campaign," said the chief minister.

Customers were asked to book their choice of drinks through BevQ, an App developed by a Kochi-based start up company to streamline and regulate the sale of liquor. The booking was opened from 6 am on Thursday and saw hectic activities, according to Faircode Technologies Pvt Ltd which developed the App.

The two-minute long trial-run of the BevQ app held on Wednesday saw 20,000 customers placing orders for the drink of their choice. The BevQ became operational at 6 am and would continue till 10 pm on Thursday night. The liquor would be sold between 9 am and 5 pm.

Flights running in & out of Mumbai half the capacity

Even four days after the resumption of domestic air-operations and that too truncated manner, the flights are being operated in and out of the GVK MIAL-managed Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport (CSMIA) in Mumbai at half the capacity, if the flights-passengers ratio is going by. As many as 52 scheduled flights — involving 26 departures and 26 arrivals — flew in and out of the Mumbai airport — catered to a total of 5,583 passengers comprising 4,255 departed passengers and 1,328 passengers who arrived in Mumbai.

"CSMIA today saw a total of 52 scheduled flights which include 26 departures and 26 arrivals. CSMIA connected to 16 sectors which were operated by 05 airlines. Today, CSMIA catered to a total of 5,583 passengers which include 4,255 passengers departures and 1,328 arrivals," a CSMIA spokesperson said.

"The highest passenger load capacity was seen on the Bhubaneswar route departing out of CSMIA. The first flight reported to Ranchi at 600hrs while the first flight arrived at 8:10hrs from Lucknow which was operated by Air Asia India and Indigo, respectively," the CSMIA spokesperson added.

An analysis of the flights-passenger load ratio on Thursday revealed that on an average 107 passengers flew in and out of Mumbai — in 52 flights (26 flights each to and from Mumbai). In 26 flights that departed from Mumbai, there were an average of 163 passengers, while mere 51 passengers arrived in Mumbai on Thursday from other destinations in the country.

On the first day of resumption of flight operations at CSMIA on Monday, as many as 47 flights belonging to seven airlines had flown in and out of the Mumbai airport catering to 4852 passengers. While 3852 had departed from Mumbai (an approximate 150 passengers), 1100 (an approximate 47 passengers) had arrived in Mumbai.

On the second of resumption of flight operations on Tuesday, 44 flights operated with 4,224 passengers from the CSMIA on Tuesday. While 3114 passengers (124 passengers per flight) departed from Mumbai, 1110 passengers (58 passengers per flight) arrived in Mumbai.


The Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir has now joined the club of States with over 2,000 plus cases of coronavirus.

On Thursday, a total number of 115 cases were reported, while more patient died due to covid-19 in Kashmir valley, taking the death toll to 27.

According to media bulletin, out of 115 fresh cases, 101 were reported from Kashmir division while 14 cases were reported from Jammu division. The final tally of coronavirus cases stood at 2,036.

Out of these, 1,150 are active cases. A total number of 301 cases are active in Jammu and 849 in Kashmir division. A total number of 859 patients have recovered so far.

According to the media bulletin, the highest number of 45 cases were reported from North Kashmir district of Kupwara followed by 16 cases from Budgam, 11 each from Srinagar and Baramulla in Kashmir valley. Majority of the cases were reported from Poonch and Udhampur districts of Jammu division.

On the other hand, Jammu division reported a total number of 14 cases on Thursday. Five travelers and three locals tested positive in Jammu while three travelers in Kathua tested positive. One case each was reported from Reasi, Poonch and Udhampur districts of Jammu division.

Maha Guv announces austerity steps to cut costs at Raj Bhavan

In an effort to make available more resources available for the welfare of the people, Maharashtra Governor Bhagat Singh Koshiyari on Thursday announced a series of austerity measures, including a freeze on new capital works and cancellation of Independence Day reception in Pune, to reduce the expenses of Raj Bhavan.

The Governor issued instructions to the staff at the Raj Bhavan to undertake various measures in the current financial year to reduce the expenditure in Raj Bhavan premises. "There will not be any new major construction or repairing works in Raj Bhavan. Only ongoing works in progress will be continued and completed," a Raj Bhavan spokesperson said.

According to the spokesperson, the Independence Day Reception to be held on August 15, 2020 at Raj Bhavan in Pune will be cancelled.

Similarly, Raj Bhavan has deferred the proposal to purchase of new car for its use. There will be no new regular recruitment in Raj Bhavan

until further orders," the spokesperson said.

In another austerity measure, the Raj Bhavan has decided to discontinue until further order the practice of offering gifts and mementos to VIPs. The practice of welcoming VIP visitors with bouquets will be discontinued. Guest house rooms in Raj Bhavan should not be decorated with vases and flower-pots," he said.

The Governor would henceforth hold meetings and interactions with Vice-Chancellors and various officers via video conference to avoid any expenses on travel.

"It is estimated that these measures will save nearly 10 to 15 percent of the budget of the Raj Bhavan in the current financial year," the spokesperson said.

"The Governor has already contributed his one month salary and further pledged 30% of his salary for one year to the PM CARES Fund for COVID -19," the spokesperson said.

"In the Governor's estimation, these austerity measures will be a small but significant contribution to save resources that can be used to reduce the sufferings of the people in the backdrop of the situation arisen because of the Corona Virus Disease," Raj Bhavan said in a statement issued here.

With 827 new cases, TN breaches 19,000 mark

There was no respite for Tamil Nadu or Chennai on Thursday as the number of persons tested positive for coronavirus in the State reached 19,372.

The medical bulletin issued by the Government of Tamil Nadu said there were 8,679 active covid-19 afflicted persons in the State as on Thursday. "Till date, 10, 548 persons have been cured of the pandemic and discharged from hospitals. A total of 4,34,625 persons have been tested till Thursday," said the bulletin.

Chennai with 12, 762 positive cases topped the table while Chengalpattu (933), Thiruvallur (863), Cuddalore (443) closely followed the capital city. Dr C V Krishnaswamy, south India's lead physician closely tracking the pandemic said that there was no reason to be panic about the numbers. "Its when the death rate exceeds the prescribed norms we have to be worried. As on date, the death rate in India and Tamil Nadu is well below the mandatory figure. Though we are testing many persons positive for the pandemic, we should note that the recovery rate is one of the bests in the world," said Dr Krishnaswamy.

Tamil Nadu Government despite the covid-19 pandemic succeeded in signing Memorandum of Understanding with some of the global brands like Danone, Virvud Solair, Salcomp PLC to set up manufacturing plants/expansion of ongoing operations in the State.

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Andhra tally at 2,841 as 54 more test +ve

Amaravati:

Despite intensive containment measures, fresh Covid-19 cases continue to surface in Andhra Pradesh with unfailing regularity. On Thursday the state reported 54 positive cases, which includes four persons that had travel histories to the Koyambedu market in Chennai.

With the addition of 54 new cases over the past 24 hours, the state's tally jumped to 2,841, the state nodal officer reported at 10 a.m., on Thursday. While there has been a decrease in the proportion of cases with a Koyambedu connection, the number of cases related to returns from other states are continuing to some extent.

On Thursday, only 4 of the 54 positive cases were found to have a Koyambedu connection. While Nellore district reported two cases, 1 case was reported from Chittoor and Guntur districts respectively.

The Koyambedu market which has since been closed, was identified as one of the biggest spreaders of Covid-19 cases in neighbouring Tamil Nadu, where positive cases tally has long crossed the 18,000 mark.

Labour woes

While States are redistributing returnee workers, in the long run we need a national database and a pan-India social security net



The reverse exodus of migrants, which according to the Government's admission in the Supreme Court has seen 91 lakh daily wagers and service personnel move out of cities to their home States, may change the labour market forever. Shunted out overnight by contractors and factories following the lockdown and with no savings, quarters or interim relief coming from either their employers or the Government, they trudged back home, risking their lives in the process, exposing themselves to the disease and starvation. And though they may return to the subsistence economy that they once escaped, they are not coming back soon. Rejected by the big cities that they helped build and mistreated like intruders by the Governments they voted for, they would much rather find work in their home States under MGNREGA and infrastructure projects. The vacuum in big cities is already being felt as daily needs servicemen like drivers, cleaners, electricians, handymen, carpenters, plumbers, house helps, gardeners and bricklayers have all fled. And now with several States compiling a data base of returnees with their skill sets, these people are most likely to be rehabilitated in services vacated by migrants from elsewhere. In other words, local sourcing, something that political parties have promised in their manifestoes for a while, may soon become the new rule of engagement in the labour market. Except that the traditional labour-exporting States may be flooded with returnees seeking newer pastures and fall short of accommodating them. Sensing the new labour map, the first off the mark has been Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath. With the State having already received 23 lakh migrants by the end of last week, he has fast-tracked moves to absorb returnee workers according to their skill sets and allocate them work zones. Fifteen lakh are already on the database and industrial units have sought contracts for five lakh among them. He has further drawn up a migrant commission to list all workers in the State, provide jobs and issue them a card that would ensure their social security during a crisis. An insurance scheme to secure their lives, too, is on the cards. And though he is reconsidering it, his controversial suggestion that other States hiring labourers from UP would have to go via his Government points to a new trading tool that may just take off unofficially as everybody tries to leverage strengths in a pandemic-hit economy. Such a move is downright unconstitutional as every citizen has a right to migrate to any part of the country in the quest for better prospects. But new regional labour cartels could emerge, peddling a skilled pool of workers and quoting higher prices now in labour-starved zones. Rajasthan has started collecting data of both skilled and unskilled workers from all 33 districts and will release them to factory owners in 18 industrial clusters soon. It has already collected details of 1.2 million unemployed people and will soon launch a portal that will help devise programmes for the labourers, generate quick employment and also meet the demand-supply gap. It will also help design training programmes for workers as per their qualifications and requirements of industries. Meanwhile, Madhya Pradesh has restarted the Sambal Yojana, which will now cover returnee migrants and provide social security to their family members, including school fees of children and insurance. A workers' database is almost ready. Bihar and Jharkhand are also working on an internal reorganisation map. Punjab and Haryana, States without too much of local labour, were among the first to set up migrant portals to rehire and redirect displaced labour to their various work sites.

While the "vocal for local" mantra has taken a new meaning in the labour market, this could well be short-term. For wages and capacities are lower in States. For example, even if Uttar Pradesh manages to provide jobs to its returning migrants, its per capita income is a little over ₹70,000. Comparatively, it is over ₹2 lakh in Maharashtra and ₹4 lakh in Delhi. So the osmosis will happen once the threat of the pandemic weakens. Besides what do you do with States like Uttarakhand, which do not have enough opportunities to absorb highly-skilled labour? So far over 1.54 lakh migrants have returned to the State and under the Mukhyamantri Swaraj Yojana, they will get heavily subsidised loans to set up small businesses or shops. Many returnees are from the IT, hospitality and BPO sectors with a particular skill set and experience of working in big cities and are not keen on the entrepreneurial mode. They wouldn't want to erode their revenue-earning ability for the safety of a home that they won't have to pay for. Labour is needed across industries and communities and perhaps a national database and a pan-India social security net should be set up to streamline our demographic edge than pass this on to States as their responsibility. Besides, this protection based on geography will never substitute competence.

The timing of the flare-up is, perhaps, the most predictable one. A pandemic-stricken world has been brought down to its knees and India has surpassed China's Coronavirus tally. It has now climbed into the top 10 countries worst hit by the pandemic. To recall, in 2014, when Chinese troops intruded deep into the Indian territory even as Premier Xi Jinping was on a State visit to India, it baffled many. Why would Beijing do that? Strategic stalemate

The Chinese behaviour along the LAC points to a familiar pattern vis-a-vis India. However, it's time for New Delhi to turn a new page in dealing with Beijing

After some intense physical showdown between the Indian and Chinese soldiers at the Line of Control (LoC), an attempt is being made by Beijing to dial down the conflict. A Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson said recently that the situation at the border with India is "overall stable and controllable" and that both countries have "proper mechanisms and communication channels" to resolve the issues through "dialogue" and "consultation". China's apparent attempt to de-escalate tensions at the border is as quintessential a leaf from its strategic playbook as its attempt to escalate it in the first place. A few familiar patterns are apparent earlier such endeavours cannot be missed.

The timing of the flare-up is, perhaps, the most predictable one. A pandemic-stricken world has been brought down to its knees and India has surpassed China's Coronavirus tally. It has now climbed into the top 10 countries worst hit by the pandemic. To recall, in 2014, when Chinese troops intruded deep into the Indian territory even as Premier Xi Jinping was on a State visit to India, it baffled many. Why would Beijing do that? If anything, it only harmed the purpose of the ongoing bilateral talks. By now, China's strategic charade of mixing wrong signals with publicly-perceived good intentions is all too known. served until at least 50 years. Furthermore, there's an obvious cold war 2.0 on the US. Wolf warrior diplomacy has been launched world over as a pre-emptive effort to counter criticism and questions of accountability. It is also resisting a global call for an unbiased probe into the origin of the Coronavirus. Above all, Xi has called upon the People's Liberation Army (PLA) to "prepare for war". All such instances have come to test China's strategic transition into a "great power". As countries look inward to deal with their economic, political and strategic problems arising due to the spread of the virus, China considers this as its moment to test the limits of "power transition hypotheses". But in many ways, how China acts during the pandemic will define its future course as a "great power".

In the ongoing standoff with India, too, traits clearly point to the aforementioned test-of-its-power transition. China has opened multiple fronts of conflict along the LAC, at least one of them is a hitherto uncontested region, the Naku La Pass in north Sikkim. There are a few other peculiarities that set the ongoing border flare-up apart from earlier skirmishes. The number of PLA troops camped near the LAC is estimated to be somewhere in between 5,000 and 10,000. Although India has matched Chinese encampments and numbers, this is perhaps a new high of troop build-up by the latter in the absence of any unilateral aggression by the former. The military build-up and China's refusal to recede is geared towards "political signalling" than to "protect" an apparent incursion into India. This subtle packaging comes at a time when India is scrambling to improve border infrastructure and connectivity in border areas. In the current context, the strategic importance of the Darbuk-Shyok-DBO road, that brings India within an eight kilometre range of the strategically important Karakoram Pass, cannot be overstated.

Steps from either side point to a long-drawn confrontation. While the two sides match in troop numbers that mirror each other, certain factors suggest that neither side will be too quick to withdraw from strategic positions. Chinese troops remain entrenched in bunkers along with a fleet of heavy vehicles and monitoring equipment. Helicopter movement close to the LAC has also been monitored by the Indian side. India, too, scrambled two fighter jets along the LAC in Ladakh. Besides, Army Chief MM Naravane paid a visit to Leh, the headquarters of 14 Corps in Ladakh, for a security review of the sensitive sector amid tensions. Perhaps this suggests that the best way to resolve the present standoff is through established mechanism at the military and governmental level, however ineffective these mechanisms may be.

Chinese behaviour along the LAC points to a familiar pattern vis-a-vis India. Just like its

traditional medical practice acupuncture, it is pressing certain points. Its assertions may often be intended to solve a deeper or a different issue. In the present case, unprovoked assertions along the LAC can be linked to a few decisions taken by India in recent times, which may have perturbed China. Among them is the Indian Government's decision to implement three important recommendations relating to border infrastructure that was made by the Shekatkar Committee in 2016. Specifically, the work on the Sela tunnel (connecting Tezpur in Assam to Itanagar) is in full swing. Once completed, it will provide all-weather connectivity to an important frontier with China in the Kameng sector. Such projects are also on to connect Zaskar Valley and Ladakh. The Nimrud Padam Darcha road being constructed across the Sinkunla Pass could have been points of concern for China, too.

Other factors that could have perturbed Beijing include New Delhi's decision to change FDI norms for countries sharing land border with India. This could potentially impact how China invests in India. The virtual presence of two BJP MPs at the swearing-in ceremony of the Taiwanese leader has also irked Beijing. Lastly, India's support to the global call for a WHO-led probe into the origin of the Coronavirus is a cause, too.

From India's point of view, the transgressions, including ones at previously uncontested patrol areas, like the Naku La

Pass, point towards a wider conflicting arc. To that end, Chinese strategy along the LAC has preferred horizontal to vertical escalation, where scaling up of conflict at the local level has been the preferred strategy.

India's options in the current standoff are limited. First, and perhaps the most likely way to resolve the tension, is by repeating the Doklam strategy; it should resolutely wait until both sides decide to de-escalate. However, under no circumstances should India negotiate on settled areas like the Naku La Pass. This will not only increase the possibility for China to horizontally escalate against India but would also dilute India's sacrosanct nature of "sovereignty" apropos a modern state. This is precisely what makes the current standoff different and more fraught than previous ones. Since both sides have laid claim to a new area as their "sovereign part", possibilities of de-escalation are high. India can press other weak points of China to compel desired State behaviour if LAC is too sensitive a matter. Adopting the Indo-Pacific strategy to chart a future strategy in Asia as an emerging global power is a low-hanging fruit. Among other steps, raising a global pitch on China's other interests or decisions that run counter to Indian interests can be considered. It is, perhaps, time to turn a new page in dealing with China.

The cost of care

SC asks Govt to identify private hospitals which benefitted from past largesse and, therefore, should treat COVID patients free



As Coronavirus cases continue to rise across the country and the Government healthcare infrastructure begins to burst at the seams, the Supreme Court has asked the Centre to identify private hospitals which can treat COVID-19 patients for free or at a minimum cost as many of them have been given land either free or at nominal rates. However, the hospitals are off the hook for now as being a policy issue, the Government would need to take a call on it first. At the moment, patients are being treated for free/minimum cost at Government hospitals across the country. However, those who opt for private healthcare facilities end up paying hefty sums as the cost of treatment in general wards is around ₹0.8 lakh in Tier-II cities, ₹1.5 lakh in Tier-II State capitals and ₹2.5 lakh in metro cities. Co-morbidities push up care costs further.

What complicates the matter is the fact that the Government cannot put a cap on treatment costs like it did for the Corona tests as that will depend on many factors like the place where the patient is being treated; his/her age; whether the person has any co-morbidities; what stage the virus is in, whether it is in the initial stage or has the infection aggravated. Will the s/he go to the ICU or be on oxygen support or will s/he also need a ventilator? Predictably private hospitals are not very keen to shoulder the COVID burden with the Government because they say their bottomlines have already been hit by a decline in patient footfall, limited OPD operations and suspension of the lucrative medical tourism business. Plus the overheads have shot up as they are spending more on disinfection, sterilisation, infection control, isolation wards, staff rotations and quarantines, responsible waste disposal and comprehensive disinfection. Free treatment won't work even if the hospitals had benefitted from largesse at inception. So while the apex court and the Centre mull how to rope private hospitals in, patients continue to suffer because even having an insurance does not mean that there will be no major out-of-pocket expense. Insurance firms are not paying patients for the PPE, face shields and so on to constitute at least 50 per cent of the total treatment cost for a Corona patient. But what is irking is that while crying about the cost of the PPEs pushing up their expenses, hospitals are glibly glossing over the fact that they are charging all patients for these kits even though one doctor tends to multiple patients wearing one kit. Asking hospitals to lower treatment costs is reasonable but seeking to make it all free will be counter-productive. The larger question right now is how to increase capacities as both public and private facilities are saturated.

Saving lives and livelihoods
 The question of livelihood is getting desperate. The cure today is proving more expensive than the pandemic

A housing society with nearly 3,000 families in Greater Noida was sealed this week due to a family being found Covid-positive. These families, most of them first-time flat owners, self-employed or working for private enterprises in the National Capital Region (NCR), are a relatively new bunch of inhabitants to this area. The sealing exercise ensured most of them are imprisoned within the society complex while their employers threatened them with salary cuts if not layoffs. For the first time perhaps since the lockdown began in March-end, angry employees from the housing society took to an organised demonstration to save their livelihoods.

A few dozen special trains meant to transport migrant labourers to their States allegedly got diverted on extended routes and ended up terminating at wrong destinations across the country. Many flights, too, got cancelled within the first two days of resuming operations in the country.

A high-intensity super cyclone whipped its way into mainland West Bengal leaving a trail of unprecedented destruction. It took nearly four days to restore electricity in the capital city of Kolkata even as rural and semi-urban areas are yet to be reached and assessed, for providing basic amenities like clean drinking water.

The above examples are just a fragment of the apologetic tale of mismanagement and lack of coordination between different arms of the same Government in a particular geography. If we start adding layers of Central, State, district, city and neighbourhood governance to this, an almost incomprehensible cobweb of India's ongoing pandemic-redressal system emerges.

It takes courage and a Himalayan leap of faith to impose a lockdown this stringent for more than two months on almost one-fifth of humanity, for a Prime Minister. We understand Narendra Modi took a call to save lives while bartering away over 400 million livelihoods, of people who had just about begun to start having a semi-globular existence with most basic amenities like electricity, clean drinking water, gas connections and a monthly income of nearly \$150. In just two months, the harsh realities of still being a poor nation have started hitting hordes if not headlines.

Consider snapshots like the "Biggest recession for India", "Millions of faceless, traceless stranded nowhere", "Lockdown exit strategy missing". The real issue is beginning to stare most of us in the face and we are slowly realising that there is no lockdown exit strategy at all.

This reminds me of another great warrior. In the Mahabharata, Abhimanyu, the son of the brave Arjun, was a child prodigy who mastered the key skill sets of warfare in his mother's womb. However, Abhimanyu didn't know how to get out of the *Chakravyuha* (a multi-layer defensive formation used in warfare), even if he did know what it took to get into one and win a day in a battle. We all know what it takes to prepare and get into a war. But how many know how to safely get out of one with least collateral damage to human life or limb, especially if the war is not at the borders?

That's a crucial point, to drive at this stage and here are some near-sar assumptions: COVID-19 spreads fastest with human-to-human contact. Misinformation or mistrust is a greater virus than COVID and is here to stay longer. A vaccine, if at all, is at least a year away from the developed world and much longer for a poor yet aspirational nation like ours.

The developing world can only wish for more heat and homemade remedies. The surprise element is that some of that ancient common sense does work in dealing with a deadly virus.

There is no statistical data to prove any of the above claims, but most of them have great significance. Indians can at this stage wish for a common-sense guided approach to the pandemic. India has had a good recovery rate till now and low fatality as compared to the rest of the world, based on public information. And there is no reason to doubt this information since in a nation with nearly 1.5 billion phones the truth can't be suppressed for too long. Somebody or the other will definitely capture an anomaly and let the information flow. Let us also accept and be cautious that India has managed to hold up so far and lives as envisaged by our Prime Minister are more saved than lost.

However, the question of livelihood is getting desperate, the cure today is proving more expensive than the cause. Every life saved today may be lost to malnutrition, hunger, preventable disease or disaster in the near future. Keepers of the law on the ground aren't safe from the pandemic or viral flow of misinformation and one-size-fits-all can't be the approach.

Going extremely micro-local and an empowered approach to tackle the pandemic can be a solution for the long-term fight against the virus. However, remember that with great power comes great responsibility. Therefore, frontline lawmakers, right from the senior-most to those guarding the neighbourhoods to prevent the outflow of the virus, have to ensure livelihoods and social distancing at the same time.

Disastrous decade for data

The challenges for data posed by the pandemic, CAA-NPR-NRC and the reluctance of the Government to release official figures need to be tackled urgently

Owing to the lockdown necessitated by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Centre has deferred the National Population Register (NPR) updation exercise and the first phase of Census 2021, both of which were scheduled to start in April. Census enumerators in India had their last been conducted in an unbroken chain since 1981. The only exceptions were in Assam in 1981 due to Statewide protests against illegal immigration from Bangladesh and in Jammu and Kashmir in 1991 due to law and order problems.

India's census, comprising house listing operations, where all the houses, irrespective of use, are identified and population enumeration, is one of the largest administrative exercises undertaken anywhere in the world. In the present context, given how the virus is spreading its tentacles, it is impractical to send census enumerators to households to collect and validate any information.

The census-NPR debate: Before the pandemic struck, the emphasis on conducting a joint census and NPR updation exercise, riding on the house listing operations, had faced considerable debate and criticism owing to the recently enacted Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) intertwined with the Government's open commitment to the National Register of Citizens (NRC).

Linking of the census and NPR raises technical and operational questions. In 2011, the NPR tagged to the house-listing schedule had serious coverage issues, with about 60 million people missing. The fact that the NPR data is certainly not required for targeting purposes, the question that arises then relates to its utility since it is collected at enormous physical and financial costs when Aadhaar-based biometric identification numbers with higher coverage are already available. Moreover, since the Government has not revealed the existing NPR to public scrutiny, all insistence on its accuracy is merely a conjecture, validating apprehensions over the NPR being the base for the NRC. The census-NPR exercise has become intertwined with other controversies over official Government data. This has portrayed the present decade as disastrous for public data in India and warrants an urgent response to uphold the integrity and credibility of our statistical institutions.

The political economy of official data and harnessing ICT: Experiences from recent years suggest that the Government itself shied away from adopting various official statistics on employment, consumption, sanitation, and so on, owing to the inability of the Government, NITI Aayog and other departments to produce credible reports on account of method and comparability, adhering to the consistent macro picture. Apart from concealment and postponement of Government reports, it is when these are released, they are done so with multiple disclaimers.

As a result, the entire process makes the reports virtually unusable. This is further amplified by blatant withholding of administrative data often managed by big private consultancies over several years, not much has been done to fix this lacuna.

To reform the Indian statistical system, the present Government prepared the Draft National Statistical Commission (NSC) Bill, 2019. This Bill is aimed at empowering the NSC to effectively formulate policies, priorities and standards on statistical matters. Further, a Five-year Vision 2019-2024 for the National Statistical System has been published by the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI). The NITI Aayog on its

part has proposed a National Data and Analytics Platform (NDAP). These efforts demonstrate a growing acknowledgement of the need for the use of digital technology, which would democratise access to holistic and coherent public Government data on a real-time basis.

This, going forward, it appears that the era of Industry 4.0, Artificial Intelligence (AI), blockchain and big economy would require extensive utilisation of ICT. This would enable quick and smooth harnessing of new sources of data, including payroll data, GIS data and big data generated using mobile communications, social media interactions and digitally-enabled transactions.

A departure from the past census exercise for census 2021 is that these operations will be carried out with handheld devices for prompt scrutiny and transfer of data to secure centralised servers. While this is certainly a progressive move, India must further take a cue from the experience of many countries in their responses to COVID-19 to tackle data-related exigencies concerning citizens responses.

In the US, the ongoing census 2020 (https://2020census.gov/) operations have been a model of success, ensuring accountability and credibility. Importantly, this has made the exercise open, inclusive and participatory. The exercise has displayed apprehensions and policy vacuum.

There is no time to lose. The existing initiatives by the Government on harnessing ICT, such as Pro-Active Governance and Timely Implementation (PRAGATI), Digital India and IAM, must be leveraged to carry out and continue the historic census exercise of 2021, as well as

to restore the credibility of our statistical institutions.

COVID-19, data and the State: There is no denying that the pandemic can only be fought with real-time information and aggregated data collected using cutting-edge technology and with the use of the internet, phones, ICT, location data and so on. This will help in the mandatory surveillance of each citizen in the extended lockdown period to enforce the necessary social distancing, isolation, tracing, delivery of essential services and welfare, the functioning of the economy and society and, more importantly in ensuring health and medical facilities.

This calls for a full-fledged citizen digital literacy programme under Digital India, utilising the lockdown time to hand-hold each citizen. In other words, the time for ensuring universal digital literacy, learning and application is now or never. During the pandemic, the amount of constructive and willing enrolment and support from each citizen, community, private sector and civil society, which will provide for such universal enumeration and registry by the Government, will be enormous and worth attempting. For now, the fallout of non-withdrawal of the States' power over data and surveillance remains a valid yet distant worry.

The way forward: The fight against the pandemic has taught us the real importance of data and statistical systems with a robust ecosystem for innovation and accountability. Empowerment of the severely underfunded and understaffed Indian statistical system requires urgent and large investments in technical and human resources.

Also, a real-time and dynamic database of unemployed, migrant and informal sector workers would immensely help in aiding the most vulnerable and marginalised sections that are excluded from any support from the Government in the absence of their up-to-date registry. This

would, in future, help to avoid situations like the current plight of internal migrants trekking along the highways to reach their home villages and small towns, in the face of the transportation and economic lockdown.

The census provides migration data at the district and town level, so holding it every five years instead of the present decadal system should be considered. Organising an intersectoral survey, as done in many countries, can also mitigate this deficiency in the Indian data system to a large extent.

Improving the credibility of official statistics would take a broad consensus and effective leadership. Dismantling the overlapping functions of statistical bodies like the NSC and MoSPI and creating coherence and cohesiveness in their duties and responsibilities is required.

To enable evidence-based policymaking, planning and implementation, adapting ICT to par with global standards is required by the system of official statistics in India. A universal digital India push now can lay the foundation of real-time data and modern architecture. This will go a long way in realising the vision of 'New India and a \$5 trillion economy. Further, postponement of NPR and only doing the first phase of the 2021 census work will be a logical step to ensure that the timeline for the population count in March 2021 is not altered. The challenges for data, posed by the pandemic, CAA-NPR-NRC and the reluctance of the Government to release official data, needs to be tackled urgently. Besides this, the NSC should be made an independent and dynamic body led by professionals to ensure availability of credible, accessible and legible statistics to empower policymakers with quality data to make India the world guru.

A pandemic of domestic abuse

Lockdowns have trapped women and girls with abusive partners. They are isolated and cut off from support networks and resources

Every morning I wake up to a few messages on Saify's social media pages. Usually, these are requests for help and read like, "I know a girl who is facing domestic violence (DV), please can you help?" One person asks, "Hey, do you help in the lockdown too? I have been going through domestic violence for four years and it's been horrible." My team and I get busy supporting victims of domestic violence, getting them the help they need.

More than 90 countries are under lockdown with four billion people confined to their homes. However, little do most people realise that for millions of women, "home" is not a safe place during a lockdown. As the world scrambled to flatten the Coronavirus curve, the DV curve surged across the globe. In France, DV cases increased by 30 per cent while in Argentina, emergency calls regarding DV increased by 25 per cent. Cyprus and Singapore helplines registered an increase in calls of 30-33 per cent. The UK, US, Spain, India and other countries, have all witnessed a rise in violence at home.

Lockdowns have trapped women and girls with abusive partners. They are isolated and cut off from support networks and resources. Victims are no longer able to pick up the phone and call for help because they are being watched by the abusive constantly. They are unable to step out of that door and seek support.

The truth is that DV has persisted in our homes for generations. A fact most of us choose to ignore. DV, like all forms of abuse, is about power. And during this pandemic, men are using violence to control women's minds, bodies, economic capacities and mobility. It is a deliberate action carried out against the victim with a sense of entitlement over their bodies. And nothing can or should justify violence against women/girls.

So, what have countries done so far to address DV during this pandemic? France is offering hotel rooms for victims of abuse. The Government will pay for 20,000 hotel nights for victims and put in place approximately 20 counselling centres at stores across the country in order for women to be able to seek help when they run errands.

In Germany, the Green Party's parliamentary leader, Katrin Göring-Eckardt, said she feared for the lives of thousands of women trapped with violent partners and called on the Government to free up money for safe houses.

In Greece, officials said they were stepping up a campaign to help women cope with problems clearly emerging from the issue of confinement.

A prosecutor in Trento, Italy, has ruled that in cases of DV the abuser must leave the family home and not the victim.

In India the National Commission for Women has launched a WhatsApp number (+91 7217735372) to facilitate quick and increased reporting, taking cognisance of the increase in violence.

So, the big question is, what can a citizen do as a bystander?

Now more than ever, bystander intervention is vital. Each one of us, even under a lockdown, can actively intervene online or in the offline space if we see someone experiencing harassment or violence. Here are five ways that can help citizens speak out, identify, engage or respond to a situation of domestic abuse.

Delegate: Which means get help from someone else. For example, in India, you can dial 100 for the police or 181 to connect to the women's helpline number after checking with the person facing harassment or abuse.

Delay: Wait for the incident to be over and then check in with the person harassed or abused. You can call the person, message them or use another creative way to check on them like through a chat feature on an online game and so on.

Distraict: Is to use an indirect approach to de-escalate the situation and divert the attention of the abuser away from the violence to give the victim a break. A common way to do this, if the incident is happening in your neighbourhood, is to ring the bell and ask to borrow something, like a cup of milk. The famous #RingTheBell campaign by Breakthrough is a classic example of how to distract an abuser.

Document: You can document the violence using your phone or a camera. Remember, while document-

ing the incident, try to film undetected and give the videos and photos to the person facing the violence. Consent is important. Let them decide what to do with it.

Direct: Speak up when you see a incident of DV. You can do so by naming the abuser and the victim. You can say, "Domestic violence is a crime." Name what you see. "It looks like she is physically hurt and very scared." Ask the abuser a question, "Why are you beating her?"

A word of caution: When intervening, please ensure your own safety first. If you don't feel safe, intervention, get help. Be vigilant. DV, most of the time, is occurring behind closed doors and is less talked about. In fact in India, less than 14 per cent of women who have experienced physical or sexual violence seek help.

While a majority of us are following the shelter-in-place order, many first responders like postal workers, garbage collectors, food delivery staff

are out and about through neighborhoods doing their jobs. They may have an opportunity to detect violence and report to the authorities. If you know of someone facing violence, ask them how they would prefer to connect? Stay in touch with them through creative ways. Once you have safely established a way to connect, help them find a DV shelter or a helpline number. Think through a safety plan with the victim. One safety plan does not fit all. Abuse, harassment and violence is different in each incident. Each situation is unique and will require a different intervention.

These are difficult and unusual times for all. While we are physically cut away from each other, don't let that prevent you from raising your voice and using your resources for another pandemic called gender-based violence. When will we try to flatten this persistent curve?

China approves controversial HK security bill

Beijing: China's parliament on Thursday approved a new controversial security law for Hong Kong which would make it a crime to undermine Beijing's authority in the former British territory.

China's annual political season, delayed by the COVID-19 pandemic, ended on Thursday with its legislature, much on the expected lines endorsing the new security law for Hong Kong.

The new law, Chinese security agencies can for the first time open their establishments and operate in Hong Kong.

The National People's Congress (NPC), which ended its week-long meeting approved a host of bills on the last day including the new security law for Hong Kong, state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

The bill now passes to the Standing Committee of the Communist Party and could become law by August.

The full details of the bill are not yet known.

The authors in Hong Kong insist the law is essential to tackle growing violence and 'terrorism', and that the territory's residents have nothing to fear from it.

Critics fear it could lead to Hong Kongers being prosecuted for criticising their or the

leadership in Beijing, joining protests or exercising their constitutional rights under local laws.

China's move has already sparked a new wave of anti-mainland protest in Hong Kong, a former British colony, which was handed over to Beijing on July 1, 1997.

Clashes broke out again on Wednesday, as Hong Kong's

parliament debated a different proposed law, which would make a crime to disrespect the Chinese national anthem.

The NPC regarded as the rubber stamp parliament for its routine approval proposals of the ruling Communist Party of China (CPC) unanimously approved the law which Hong Kong political parties said

would be a death knell to its 'one country two systems' and the autonomy it enjoyed from China.

The law has been denounced by the US, the UK and the EU as a blow to freedom and liberty of Hong Kong and affect the city's status as an international business hub. PTI

Hong Kong offenders will not be sent to China for trial: Report

Beijing: Chinese officials have clarified that those facing charges for offences committed in Hong Kong will not be sent to China to face trial under the new security law to firm up Beijing's hold over the former British colony.

China's new national security law will be incorporated into Hong Kong's legal system with built-in protections for offenders, who will not be sent across the border to mainland China to face trial, Hong Kong-based South China Morning Post quoted sources as saying.

The new law permits for the first time Chinese security agencies to open their establishments in Hong Kong.

The association also expressed concern over sug-

gestions that mainland security agencies would be set up to safeguard national security within the city, saying it was "entirely unclear" how that the arrangement would comply with Article 22 of the Basic Law, which stipulates that Beijing departments not to interfere in local affairs.

The new legislation establishing and improving the legal system and enforcement mechanisms for the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) to safeguard national security is set to be passed by China's National People's Congress (NPC) on Friday.

The bill is regarded as a political bombshell for the former British colony as China has

US, China lock horns over new security laws

United Nations: The US and China clashed over Hong Kong at the UN Security Council, with Washington calling a meeting over the controversial national security law introduced by Beijing to tighten its control on the former British colony.

The US Mission to the UN on Wednesday said Washington was "deeply concerned by actions taken by the People's Republic of China (PRC) National People's Congress that fundamentally undermine Hong Kong's high degree of autonomy and freedoms as guaranteed under the Sino-British Joint Declaration of 1984, which was registered with the UN as a legally binding treaty and the Basic Law of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region."

"This is a matter of urgent global concern that implicates international peace and security, and warrants the immediate attention of the UN Security Council," the US Mission said. The US mission added that the United States had

called for a virtual meeting of the Security Council on Wednesday to discuss these actions and China's proposed national security law that would threaten Hong Kong's democratic institutions and civil liberties. "Such actions confirm the PRC's contempt and complete disregard for its international obligations," it said.

The Chinese envoy added that "facts prove again and again that the US is a troublemaker of the world." "It is the US who has violated its commitments under the international law. China urges the US to immediately stop its power politics and bullying practices," the Chinese envoy said. PTI

Bipartisan Opp leaves surveillance bill in doubt

Washington: Legislation extending surveillance authorities that the FBI sees as vital in fighting terrorism was thrown into doubt as President Donald Trump threatened a veto and Republican leaders and top liberal Democrats said they would oppose it.

House Democratic leaders abruptly adjourned without considering the bill, hours after saying there would be a vote Wednesday evening.

In between, Trump said explicitly for the first time that he would veto the measure. A similar version of the legislation had drawn bipartisan support just weeks ago.

"If the FISA Bill is passed tonight on the House floor, I will quickly VETO it," Trump tweeted, using the acronym for the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act.

"Our Country has just suffered through the greatest political crime in its history. The massive abuse of FISA was a big part of it!"

Trump had suggested Tuesday evening that he would veto the measure, prompting Republicans who once backed the deal to follow Trump's lead and say Wednesday that they would now vote against it.

The leaders of the Congressional Progressive Caucus, which has about 70 Democratic House members, also said they would oppose the legislation, saying it lacked curbs on online surveillance without warrants. Combined with the week-long campaign, the Democrats' defiance of House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., suggested there might be enough dissent to

sink the bill.

It was unclear if Democratic leaders would try again Thursday to hold a vote, or if they would skip a vote and try to negotiate with the Senate on a final compromise.

"We cannot in good conscience vote for legislation that violates Americans' fundamental right to privacy," said the progressive caucus's leaders, Reps. Pramila Jayapal, D-Wash., and Mark Pocan, D-Wis.

The legislation first passed the House in March with broad bipartisan support after Attorney General William Barr negotiated a deal with Republican and Democratic House leaders.

But that consensus crumbled Wednesday after the Justice Department came out against the bill, which was

amended by the Senate. The Justice Department's statement, by Assistant Attorney General Stephen Boyd, urged Trump to reject the bill.

Soon after, House Republican Leader Kevin McCarthy, R-Calif., said it was time to take a "pause" on the legislation. The new impasse raised the potential for the surveillance powers to remain expired indefinitely. The provisions, which lapsed in March, allow the FBI to get a court order for business records in national security investigations and to conduct surveillance on a subject without establishing that they're acting on behalf of an international terrorism organization.

They also make it easier for investigators to continue eavesdropping on a subject who has switched cell phone providers

to thwart detection.

Despite the sudden GOP switch, Democratic leaders said they would move forward with a vote anyway, arguing that very little had changed since 126 Republicans, including McCarthy, voted for it in March.

"Your flailing around to find a rationalization for your change of vote is sad," House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer, D-Md., told Republicans in a heated, angry exchange on Thursday.

"The only thing that has changed," Hoyer said, "is that Donald Trump has said vote no."

With Republicans opposed, Pelosi needed to keep her caucus together to pass the bill. The progressives — a group of lawmakers who have long opposed surveillance laws — made that a lot harder. AP

UK PM's aide made 'minor breach' with lockdown drive: Cops

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson's top aide, Dominic Cummings, might be guilty of a "minor breach" of the legal regulation when he took a journey during the coronavirus stay-at-home lockdown last month, UK police concluded on Thursday.

Durham Constabulary found the aide had committed no legal offence when he drove over 400-km from his London home to his father's farm in Durham, north-east England, at the end of March.

However, a second shorter trip to Barnard Castle on April 12, which 48-year-old

Cummings said was to test his eyesight for an eventual long drive home, could have fallen into the category of a breach but no retrospective action would be taken against him.

"Durham Constabulary have examined the circumstances of the breach and concluded that there might have been a minor breach of the Regulations that would have warranted police intervention," Durham Constabulary view his as minor because there was no apparent breach of social distancing, a Durham police statement said.

Covid a 'very bad gift' from China: Trump

US President Donald Trump said Thursday that coronavirus was a "very bad gift" from China to the rest of the world, as America surpassed the grim milestone of over one lakh COVID-19-linked deaths.

"All over the World the COVID-19 cases are a very bad gift from China, marches on. Not good!" Trump said in a tweet. "We have just reached a very sad milestone with the coronavirus pandemic deaths reaching 100,000," he said.

Manhunts after hundreds flee quarantine in Zimbabwe, Malawi

Blantyre (Malawi): Manhunts have begun after hundreds of people, some with the coronavirus, fled quarantine centers in Zimbabwe and Malawi while authorities worry they will spread COVID-19 in countries whose health systems can be rapidly overwhelmed.

In Malawi, more than 400 people recently repatriated from South Africa and elsewhere fled a center at a stadium in Blantyre, jumping over a fence or strolling out the gate while police and health workers watched. Police and health workers told reporters they were unable to stop them as they lacked adequate protective gear.

At least 46 escapees had tested positive for the virus.

Some of those who fled told reporters they had bribed police. And in Zimbabwe, police spokesman Paul Nyathi said

officers were "hunting down" more than 100 people who escaped from centers where a 21-day quarantine is mandatory for those returning from abroad.

"They escape and sneak into the villages. We are warning people to stop sheltering them. These escapees are becoming a serious danger to communities," Nyathi said.

Nearly all of Zimbabwe's 75 health Minister Obadiah Moyo told a special parliamentary committee this week.

Both Zimbabwe and Malawi have fewer than 200

confirmed cases but regional power South Africa, where many in both countries go to seek work, has more than 25,000. South Africa has the most cases in Africa, where the continent-wide total is nearly 125,000.

Zimbabwe's information minister, Monica Mutsvangwa, on Wednesday told reporters that the government is increasing security at the schools, colleges and hotels used as quarantine centers.

Government spokesman Nick Mangwanya suggested that security officers guarding centers with high walls and razor wire might be receiving bribes to allow people to leave early.

Zimbabwe's government is also worried about people crossing porous borders and failing to report at quarantine centers. AP

Violent protests rock Minneapolis for 2nd straight night

Minneapolis: Violent protests over the death of a black man in police custody rocked a Minneapolis neighborhood for a second straight night as angry crowds looted stores, set fires and left a path of damage that stretched for miles.

The protests that began late Wednesday and stretched into Thursday morning were the latest in a series of protests since the death of George Floyd, who was seen on video gasping for breath during an arrest in which an officer knelt on his neck for almost eight minutes. In the footage, George pleads that he cannot breathe before slowly stops talking and moving.

Minneapolis Mayor Jacob Frey appealed to the governor to activate the National Guard and asked for calm. "Please, Minneapolis, we cannot let tragedy breed more tragedy," he said on Twitter.

Protests also spread to other US cities. In California,



hundreds of people protesting Floyd's death blocked a Los Angeles freeway and shattered windows of California Highway Patrol cruisers.

Pockets of looting continued Thursday at Minneapolis stores where windows and doors were smashed. Television station KSTP reported some fires at businesses burned with no firefighters on the scene. A liquor store employee displayed a gun as he stood among the debris of broken bottles and beer cans inside the business.

Amid the violence, a man

was found fatally shot Wednesday night near a pawn shop, possibly by the owner, authorities said.

Protesters gathered Wednesday afternoon near the southern part of the city, where the 46-year-old Floyd died on Memorial Day as police arrested him outside a convenience store on a report of a counterfeiter on the ground.

Around the Globe

Dhaka: Bangladesh on Thursday issued an order allowing the reopening of the offices and transport services from May 31 despite fears of the intensified coronavirus onslaughts as the country recorded 2029 new COVID-19 cases - the highest number of infections in a single day.

Kathmandu: Nepal on Thursday registered its highest single-day surge in the coronavirus cases with 156 new infections, taking the COVID-19 tally in the Himalayan nation to 1,042, the health ministry said.

Seoul: South Korea on Thursday reported its biggest jump in new COVID-19 cases in more than 50 days, a huge setback that could erase some of its hard-won gains.

Ankara: Intercity train service resumed on a limited basis Thursday in Turkey as the government eases restrictions imposed to curb the coronavirus.

Islamabad: Pakistan on Thursday crossed the 61,000-mark with 2,076 new coronavirus cases reported in the last 24 hours, the health ministry said. As many as 36 more patients died of the deadly viral infection, bringing the total death toll in the country to 1,260.

Moscow: Russia is continuing to see high numbers of new coronavirus cases even though its far-flung regions have increasingly moved to reopen the economy. The government's anti-coronavirus task force reported 63,71 new infections Thursday, the same as in the previous day and lower than the peak levels of more than 11,000 cases earlier this month.

Beijing: China has reported two new confirmed coronavirus cases, both from abroad and 23 asymptomatic ones, majority of them from COVID-19 epicenter Wuhan, health officials said on Thursday. According to the China's National Health Commission (NHC), two imported cases - one in Shanghai and the other in Fujian were reported on Wednesday while no cases of domestic transmission were reported. PTI

DANIEL PEARL MURDER CASE Pakistan SC to hear appeal against acquittal of accused on June 1

Islamabad: Pakistan's Supreme Court on Thursday fixed the hearing of the Daniel Pearl murder case for June 1, a month after the American journalist's family filed an appeal against the acquittal of the prime accused and British-born top al-Qaeda leader Ahmed Omar Saeed Sheikh and three others in the case.

The Pearl, the 38-year-old South Asia bureau chief for The Wall Street Journal, was abducted and beheaded while he was in Pakistan investigating a story in 2002 on the alleged links between the country's powerful spy agency ISI and al-Qaeda.

An anti-terrorism court awarded death sentence to Sheikh and life imprisonment to three others. PTI

US Congress approves China sanctions over ethnic crackdown

Washington: Congress has voted to toughen the US sanctions over China's crackdown on ethnic minorities, adding another factor to the increasingly stormy relationship between the two countries.

The House passed a bipartisan bill on Wednesday that would impose sanctions on Chinese officials involved in the mass surveillance and detention of Uighurs and other ethnic groups in the western Xinjiang region, a campaign that has drawn muted international response because of China's influence around the world.

The measure already passed the Senate and needs a signature from President Donald Trump, who said this week he'll "very strongly" consider it amid US anger over China's handling of the Covid outbreak and tension over a Chinese plan to restrict civil liberties in Hong Kong. Both issues emerged, along

with other sore points in the China-US relationship, as members of Congress spoke in support of the bill. No one spoke against it, and it passed by a 413-1 vote. "Beijing's barbarous actions targeting the Uighur people are an outrage to the collective conscience of the world," House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said in a floor speech in support of the bill. It was the first bill in history to pass with proxy votes after House Democrats, over Republican objections, adopted a measure allowing such votes in response to the coronavirus outbreak.

Congress last year voted to condemn the crackdown in Xinjiang, where Chinese authorities have detained more than a million people - from mostly Muslim ethnic groups that include Uighurs, Kazakhs and Kyrgyz - in a vast network of detention centers. AP

Pak crash: Foreign experts recover missing cockpit voice recorder

Karachi: A team of foreign experts on Thursday recovered the missing cockpit voice recorder from the debris of the crashed Pakistan International Airlines plane, nearly a week after one of the worst aviation disasters in the country's history.

The domestic flight from Lahore to Karachi crashed in a residential area near the Jinnah International Airport here last Friday, killing 97 people on board. Two passengers miraculously survived the crash.

The Airbus A320 aircraft of the national carrier had 91 passengers and a crew of eight when it crashed into the Jinnah Garden area near Model Colony in Malir on Friday, minutes before its landing. Eleven people on the ground were also injured. PTI

Virus may push 86 mn more children into household poverty by 2020-end: Report

United Nations: The number of children living in poor households across low and middle-income countries could increase by 86 million to reach 672 million by the end of 2020 due to the economic fallout of the coronavirus pandemic, according to a new study.

The deadly virus has so far infected 5,695,290 people and claimed 355,692 lives globally, according to a tally by the Johns Hopkins University.

The economic fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic could push up to 86 million more children into household poverty by the end of 2020, an increase of 15 per cent, said the study conducted jointly by the UNICEF and humanitarian organisation Save the Children.

The analysis highlighted that without urgent action to protect families from the financial hardships caused by the pandemic, the total number of children living below the national poverty line in low and middle-income countries could reach 672 million by year-end.

Nearly two-thirds of these children live in sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia and countries across Europe and Central Asia could see the most significant increase, up to 44 per cent across the region.

Latin America and the Caribbean could see a 22 per cent increase. "The coronavirus pandemic has triggered an unprecedented socio-economic crisis that is draining resources for families all over the world," UNICEF Executive Director Henrietta Fore said in a statement.

"The scale and depth of financial hardship among families threatens to roll back years of progress in reducing child poverty and to leave children deprived of essential services. Without concerted action, families barely getting by could be pushed into poverty, and the poorest families could face levels of deprivation that have not been seen for decades," Fore said. The organisations warned that the impact of the global economic crisis caused by the pandemic and related containment policies is two-fold - immediate loss of income meant families are less able to afford the basics, including food and water, less likely to access health care or education, and more at risk of child marriage, violence, exploitation and abuse. PTI

Sensex extends gains, reclaims 32,000-mark

Benchmark indices defied gravity for the second straight session on Thursday as expiry of May series derivatives contracts triggered across-the-board buying amid firm global cues.

The 30-share BSE Sensex rallied 595.37 points or 1.88 per cent to finish at 32,200.59. Similarly, the broader NSE Nifty ended 175.15 points or 1.88 per cent at 9,490.10.

L&T was the top gainer in the Sensex pack, spurring 6.17 per cent, followed by Hero MotoCorp, Infosys Bank, HDFC Bank, Maruti, HDFC, Tata Steel and Bharti Airtel.

ITC, SBI and Bharti Airtel were the only laggards, slipping up to 0.83 per cent. Benchmarks witnessed a broad-based rally on account of short-covering by market participants as May series derivatives and options (F&O) contracts expired at the end of the session, analysts said.

Further, domestic investors took positive cues from most global markets amid optimism over the reopening of major economies across the world. "A huge EU stimulus plan provided a boost to European



shares while Asian shares were affected by the US-China diplomatic issues. Indian markets are banking on continued resumption of economic activities, in spite of still high number of new infections.

"Further stimulus measures are also expected to boost demand in the economy and help the most impacted sectors to recover.

Mark is rising on the back of expectations while there has been little change in ground realities," said Vinod

Nair, Head of Research at Geojit Financial Services. All sectoral indices ended on a positive note, with BSE capital goods index surging 5.1 per cent, followed by auto, industrials, finance, realty, bank and metal.

Broader BSE mid-cap and small-cap indices rallied up to 1.42 per cent. Global equities remained buoyant on economic recovery hopes, with US Dow Jones closing above the 25,000-level for the first time since March.

71% Indians think Govt's stimulus package will lead to economic recovery: Study

Around 71 per cent of Indians believe the Government's ₹20 lakh crore stimulus package will lead to economic recovery, a study said.

The Centre earlier this month announced a mega relief package to mitigate the economic impact of the COVID-19 crisis. A vast majority (71 per cent) of Indians either agree or strongly agree that the relief package will lead to economic recovery, the study by global market research and data company YouGov said.

The survey was done online by YouGov Omnibus among 1,005 respondents in India between May 19-22, 2020. It found that 71 per cent of Indians either agree or strongly agree that the extension of credit linked subsidy scheme for middle-income groups, 'starting of online courses' for top 100 universities' (31 per

Further, only 15 per cent seem unhappy with the package. Dissatisfaction is the highest among people from the south (21 per cent) as compared to the other regional residents, the survey said. Similarly, tier-I residents (21 per cent) seem unhappy with the offered benefits compared to tier-II (14 per cent) and tier-III (10 per cent) residents.

Even though a majority support the economic package, fewer than half see it benefitting them personally. From the various schemes, four in 10 urban Indians (43 per cent) feel they are most likely to benefit from the 'increased public expenditure on healthcare' and 'reduction of TDS/TCS rates for non-salaried section' (40 per cent). One in three (33 per cent) urban Indians are also expecting to benefit from the 'extension of credit linked subsidy scheme for middle-income groups', 'starting of online courses' for top 100 universities' (31 per

cent) and 'interest subsidy for small business under Mudra-Sisu loans' (30%), it added. Asked about the provisions that could benefit the underprivileged (migrants and poor, among others), majority of respondents (61 per cent) believed 'distribution of free food grains' is most likely to work to their advantage.

More than half (53 per cent) were in support of 'one nation one ration card' provision under which the government has allowed inter-state portability of ration cards. Some think this package will help new businesses (21 per cent), while others see it giving a boost to the smaller businesses (20 per cent) or the rural economy (17 per cent), the study added.

Nissan plans to shut Indonesia, Barcelona plants

Japanese automobile major Nissan Motor Company on Thursday said closure of Indonesian and Barcelona plants; reducing the number of models; rationalising production capacities; cutting down fixed costs by 300 billion Yen are some of the measures planned to achieve sustainable growth, financial stability and profitability by the end of fiscal 2023. Company also said it will be exiting South Korea, the Datsun business in Russia and streamlining operations in some markets in ASEAN. In a statement the company said the scaleable plan will shift the company's strategy from its past focus on inflated expansion.

US layoffs climb to 41 million despite business reopenings

An estimated 2.1 million Americans applied for unemployment benefits last week despite the gradual reopening of businesses around the country, bringing the running total since the coronavirus shutdowns took hold in mid-March to about 41 million, the government said Thursday. The figures underscore the continuing damage to businesses and livelihoods from the outbreak that has now killed at least 100,000 people in the U.S., more than the number of Americans lost in the Vietnam and Korean wars combined, and more than 33 times the death toll on 9/11. The U.S. unemployment rate was 14.7% in April, the highest since the Great Depression.

A NEW LEARNING

AYUSHI SHARMA talks to the experts to find out the way forward for schools and education as social distancing changes the method of instruction

Students without seat partners, attending school in shifts while wearing masks, and carrying sanitizers along with books, combining online education with physical and a focus on keeping safe... Is this what schools in the recent future, whenever they reopen, look like? Since the world is all set to change with new normal in every industry be it fashion, travel or education, the question is — what is the way forward? Educationists share that COVID-19 is likely to change the face of education in the forthcoming years and it will pave the way for new learning trends.

Some of the suggestions that have come forth from educationists include frequent health checks, temperature screenings, staggered arrivals and limiting visitors on campus.

But there is also the emotional aspect to be looked after. The bond that children make in school, while being away from their parents, family or any kind of intervention, make them understand different aspects of life while making them emotionally strong. So social need is one domain which every school caters as it plays a very important role in shaping a child's character, believes Shivani Gupta, a primary teacher of Gems Modern Academy, Gurgaon. She says, "Multi-sensory experiences for a child are a very strong force. She learns best not in a class, but over time with real life experiences. I feel the focus still remains the same, just the strategies have changed because of what is happening in the world. Now these values are being taught using technology."

ed to make them aware of the current situation. Their inputs are asked on topics like: What do they think can be done to stay safe? How important is it to maintain social distancing? Is there any need to be changed — our thinking or our actions? "Such topics ignite their critical thinking and give them a chance to introspect their views. Once they believe in what they do, it becomes their habit," Shivani tells us.

Group learning, which was widely adopted before this pandemic, should now be replaced with a more engaging approach, shares Beas Dev Ralhan, co-founder and CEO of Next Education India Pvt Ltd. "Schools should introduce individual activities and project-based learning so that students can explore their interests and learn at their own pace. Further, to make bonding among students and teachers, online discussions, debates and extempores should be conducted so that they can interact, present their views and stay connected. This, in turn, will ensure that learning and holistic development doesn't stop no matter what," says he.



What is a crisis worth if you don't learn something from it? Well, Anju Wal, principal of Shiv Nadar School, Faridabad, shares that schools are re-imagining the teaching-learning process. At this moment, it is more important to do empathetic teaching than transactional lessons online. She says, "An expression of love and care is

paramount to the digital learning format in these unprecedented times. No one in the education sector was certain how to go about the new norm of teaching digitally, but have evolved considerably and bettered the online experience for our children with regular improvements made through feedback, dialogue, and analysis."

One thing is certain that education institutions have made the most of the situation. With e-learning, schools have learned not to put disproportionate focus on facts, figures and bookish learning. What Meenal Arora, founder-director of Shemford Group of Futuristic Schools, feels is that this chaotic time is teaching us that a curriculum must be grounded in students' realities and cultivate empathy, creative and flexible thinking in students. "Teachers are trying to help children think about their relationship with the world around them through various activities. Parents have an important role to play and their active participation is indispensable," says she.

Educational needs of children are changing at a very high pace. Subjecting them to mathematical tables, mugging up poems and memorising the names of colours is not going to help anymore. They need to be exposed to 'experiences' no matter how trivial. But with the current scenario and online education becoming the trend, this isn't an option. So how can one focus on learning through real experiences in an untouchable world? Shivani Parikh, a teacher, shares her thoughts on this negative situation as well. She feels that we can still do a lot more than what we could do before the 'stay-at-home' orders. "Earlier, we were getting away from all the pleasures of life, from family and happiness because of our fast-paced lives. Right now, we are actually saving that time and energy, which can be used in various other pursuits. This untouchable time has actually brought us closer to our families and has given time to focus on the real experiences. As a teacher, I ask my students to connect with their grandparents as they can offer endless stories and a huge amount of patience to answer all those 'why?' questions and help their mothers as psychology suggests that children learn and imitate behaviours by watching and listening, which means they can learn character traits such as resilience, determination and perseverance from mother," shares she.

Anju tells us that even in these lockdown days, when they are digitally connecting with the children, they are looking at the home as the laboratory of learning and the parents as their co-partners in the journey of teaching and learning. Even agrees with Shivani and says, "There has been no option but to deepen connects with our parents and orient them seamlessly and consistently to own our pedagogy. We partner with them and use homegrown resources to bring real-time experiences in this learning from home situation."

The global health crisis has also redirected the pedagogical approach towards digital learning tools and e-learning plat-

forms that offer learning experiences close to real experiences. "Subject learning must be reshaped and amalgamated with short videos, DIY activities, audio-visual content and more. Students must be encouraged to explore and browse subject-related queries online, actively participate in discussions with subject experts and attend webinars," says Ralhan.

Pankaj Kumar Singh, Managing Director of the Cambridge Montessori preschool and day care pvt ltd, has a few more ways through which children can be exposed to real experiences. He says, "Design activities that integrate online interactions with physical movement like going on a scavenger hunt, group stories, singing or music. Provide children with a choice of activities so that they can be empowered in making decisions over the week, while ensuring a balance of activities across curriculum learning areas. For instance, using a rubric tool to self-monitor progress, apply techniques of the flipped classroom. It's where children engage in learning experiences by collecting information, items, experimenting and then share through online format."

Once the schools reopen, a few precautions need to be taken and we can still be on the path of learning. So how can the children be taught about social distancing in schools and no-touch culture? Rohan Parikh, director of The Green Acres Academy, explains that children are naturally curious and are always looking to explore and interact with their environment. "The more practical solutions will be to create a shift system so we have less children in the building at one time. Keep separate groups to contain any spread. There will be a huge burden on schools to manage and keep to these measures. Teachers will have to look for ways to create experiences within classrooms that are meaningful and impart knowledge. Such creativity and working with limited resources have been the way of teachers for many years. I trust we will find the solution," says he.

Undoubtedly the process has its own challenges but "a lot of training sessions and workshops for everyone — teachers, students and even parents, can help a bit," shares Meenal. "Using fun interactive activities, children can be taught to maintain social distance. With constant counselling, we will be able to achieve a no-touch culture at school. It can be done by instilling discipline and making children understand how they have to conduct themselves in the 'new normal' world. This may impact learning through real life experiences a bit but we must remember — difficult times don't last forever. This, too, shall pass soon."

The future of education is all set to change. And it's true that nothing can replace the physical touch and its impact on one's memory. But as they say, the only constant in life is change. The ones who do not want to change will succumb and those who change with their sanity, stay calm and are willing to adapt this change will survive this pandemic.

Phygital is the way forward'

BALBIR SINGH DHILLON, Audi India's head, hopes that the sales will bounce back in the country powered by the YOLO mentality of customers

As the country limps back to a sense of normalcy, I spoke with Balbir Singh, Dhillion, Audi India's head, about how he believes the luxury car market in India will proceed. To start with, over two-thirds of Audi's workshops are open as are half of the showrooms that are following all social distancing norms. But Dhillion says that there are challenges, not just social distancing, inside showrooms and other norms such as the rule in Chennai that car showrooms cannot use air-conditioners. "There are some unique challenges in some states," he says.

But what about car sales? Not a single unit was sold in April. In fact, sales fell 15 per cent. "The first quarter of the calendar year 2020 saw volumes continue to decline," he admits. But he maintains a positive spin on things going forward. "I believe the thought process will change, people will start thinking on the lines of 'YOLO (You Only Live Once) and will want to splurge on a luxury vehicle for driving getaways." He added that the Q5 SUV's were assembled in India, Dhillion admitted that localisa-



tion levels are low. "With more proactive policies we could have reached 1,00,000 units easily but the system has to work together for that. Such numbers would not only have meant more manufacturing and localisation in India, but also newer technologies and products for us."

The lockdown might be winding down but the economy and sales are in tatters. Audi is not going to hold back from its previously planned launch schedule for 2020. "Sure, there will be short-term adjustments such as a launch getting delayed by a month or two, but there are no changes in plans." And in other markets, as restrictions lift, sales have seen a bounce. In China, for example, the country where all the troubles began, sales have stabilised to nearly the levels they were before everything went haywire. Dhillion and his colleagues at Audi India are hoping the same will happen here as well.

It would have been nice if the government made some demand-side interventions such as a reduction of GST rates, which are still far too high in India. Rates between 43-48 per cent coupled with registration charges ranging from 10-20 per cent have meant that the luxury segment is just one percent of the overall car market. Even a slight reduction in these rates could have proven to be a booster to growth, but we must accept this and move on. We have to continue to do what we do best, that is selling emotions, dreams and positivity." Dhillion told this columnist, which is why he continues to believe in incalculating brand loyalty for Audi early on.

However, the higher charges on luxury cars has proven to be a hindrance for the government's ambitious 'Make in India' project. While 90 per cent of the Audis sold in India, such as the best-selling A3 and A4 sedans and the Q5 SUV's are assembled in India, Dhillion admitted that localisa-

Theatre helped me grow: Shreyas Talpade

Shreyas Talpade's first role was that of Sita for a school play. The next year he played Draupadi in the school version of the *Mahabharata*. This was, perhaps, the first sign of how the actor he would be in later years. From school dramas, street plays to monologues and mimes — Shreyas wanted to learn and be a part of everything.

"From 1990 till 2005, I did nearly 2,500 shows in various languages and of different productions. My love for the stage was such that I didn't want to miss a single chance to be under the art lights. Whatever I am today is because of theatre. It grows you and betters your craft like no other medium. Whatever little appreciation I get in my films today is all because of it," reminisces Talpade.

The play is set in the 70s when the caste system was not just prevalent but rigidly enforced in India. However, it shows how the context of the story is relevant even today. Shreyas plays the role of Mahipat Babruvahan, who becomes the first from his caste and village to complete his master's degree. Mahipat has a dream of becoming a professor and of the play show-cases all he does to achieve his dream including how he manages his love interest.

"The script is layered, entertaining and has a strong social message. I have always believed you can say a lot with humour," says Shreyas.

LITTLE VICTORY GARDENS

While most super foods are perceived to be exotic, expensive and difficult to find, this is not really true, says nutritionist ISHI KHOSLA

Evolving consumer demands based on health needs and changing lifestyles have resulted in changes in the food industry in recent years. To meet growing and changing consumer demands driven by health and well-being, the food industry is forced to come up with new, innovative concepts and food products that are driven by the use of new raw materials. These are emerging out of super foods, which gained the attention of the consumers over the last few years.

The increasing popularity of super foods can be understood from the fact that these raw materials match with diet trends like "organic", "all-raw", "free-from", "vegan", "gluten free" and an increasing desire to stay healthy. These new raw materials might play a role in meeting the new health needs in the backdrop of COVID-19 pandemic and with existing epidemics of obesity, diabetes, heart disease, auto-immune disorders and cancers. These merit particular attention when immune systems are challenged and there is rising awareness about their importance. The properties that qualify a food as super are that it should possess special health benefits which go beyond its nutritional benefits. While most super foods are perceived to be exotic, expensive and difficult to find, this is not really true. Actually they are all around us in legumes (soya, black beans), spices and herbs (turmeric, basil), vegetables (ginger, garlic, broccoli, kale, mushrooms, avocado), fruits (berries, amla, olives), grains (quinoa, millets). Some of the unsung Indian super foods are fox nuts (*makhana*), *kokum*, *morenga*, Sea Buckthorn, flax, sorusop, basil seeds, and in-fact our entire spice box.

It is only when a food gets recommendations by health professionals based on research or other factors that it acquires a premium status and is then positioned as a super food. As a matter of fact, the concept which was meant only to describe foods with higher polyphenols and anti-oxidants has been revoked and has become questionable.

In 2012 USDA has withdrawn this term and does not support claims of super foods. The goal is to eat a variety, include all the food groups, in the right amount as a part of a healthy diet. Rising consumer awareness about the health benefits being offered is leading the industry to boost its demand.



Growing health consciousness among the consumers and rising number of new products are some of the major factors contributing to growth in this industry. For example leading multinational food companies are serving turmeric ginger laced beverages. Such trends are only expected to grow. Currently global super foods market is dominated by North America, with a growth rate of 9 per cent followed by Europe and Asia-Pacific region.

Consumption in Asia-Pacific is driven by the growing affluence of the middle-class population and rising health consciousness among consumers coupled with increasing acceptance of nutritious products. However, the high prices of such products restrain the growth of their demand. High rate of urbanisation has radically changed the lifestyles and resultant changing diets of people are expected to have a positive impact on this growing market.

To cope with increased demands and the growing popularity of these foods, there is a need to increase agricultural pro-



duction and productivity with more environmentally friendly agricultural practices. Until then, it is likely that the demand may exceed the supply and the prices will go up making them assume a

further premium status on super market shelves. With the adoption of new ground breaking innovations, it is possible to add value in the areas of health, nutrition, consumption, and overall well-being. Organic, bio-dynamic cultivation, hydroponics and many more advancements are some of the future agricultural practices which will not only be good for our health but the entire ecosystem.

The combination of suitable raw materials and inspiring food technologies may guide and shape the food sector of the future. Meanwhile the best practices that emerge to enjoy these high value foods is to go back in post world war times and grow your own vegetables, herbs and spices. Victory gardens (vegetable, fruit, and herb gardens planted at private residences and public parks) supplied 40 per cent of fruits and vegetables at one point in the US after the war in 1919. Fruits of the little victory gardens with super foods all across the country and may pave the way to victory on the virus by building our very own immunity.

Beat the heat

Here are some drinks with a refreshing twist to keep you hydrated during summer. By TEAM VIVA

Now that summers are here, ways to stay hydrated will take centre stage. Water, for obvious reasons is the first choice. Apart from that, one can try other drinks, salads, more carbs, coconut water and more to remain hydrated.

Here are some drinks with a refreshing twist.

The Oberoi has come up with *Green Rush* by combining spinach leaves, green apple, celery sticks, cucumber and lemon juice. You need to blend all the ingredients until smooth, add crushed ice, garnish with a celery stick and serve chilled.

It has several nutritional benefits. Cucumber is a great source of antioxidants and provides hydration to the body. Celery contains a plant compound called apigenin, which is anti-inflammatory, anti-allergic, antiviral and an antioxidant. Spinach is a great source of iron and vitamin A and green apple provides both vitamins A and C to the body.

Another drink that it has to offer is *Banana Spice Smoothie*. Mix banana, moringa leaves, coconut milk, ginger, cardamom and cinnamon. Blend the spinach and coconut milk until smooth, add the bananas, ginger, cinnamon, and cardamom and blend again. Ginger helps in reducing inflammation, aids digestion and helps the body detoxify naturally. Moringa helps in balancing digestive system and in improving eye sight. Banana is high in anti-oxidants and helps in moderating blood sugar levels. It is a rich source of fibre and helps in weight loss.

Chef Anshu Raj, Caterpoint suggests *Watermelon Basil Coconut Limeade* to up your health game. Combine ripe watermelon, fresh basil leaf or soaked basil seeds with fresh lime, roasted cumin and coconut water. Don't forget the ice cubes.

First take the watermelon, wash it thoroughly, peel and chop into about half inch cubes. Now take fresh coconut water and pour in mixer. Then add lime juice, basil leaves or soaked basil seeds and stir well along with six to eight ice cubes. Now add watermelon cubes. For an Indian flavour, you can add roasted cumin seeds which go very well with the mix. If you have a sweet tooth, you can add honey to your limeade.

He shares another summer favourite to beat the heat: *Watermelon Mojito Cooler*. Add Sprite or sparkling water, mojito



syrup, lime juice and ice cubes in ripe watermelon.

Take watermelon, wash it thoroughly, peel the skin and cut into half inches cubes. Then take a mixer, add Sprite or soda, lime juice and mojito syrup. If you don't have mojito syrup you can make it at home with sugar, lime juice and crushed mint leaves. Add that to your cooler. Now add ice cubes in a mixer and stir before adding watermelon. Pour the mixture in a tall glass and garnish with fresh mints.

Apart from keeping you hydrated, it helps you to fight heart problems, is good for hair, skin and your digestive system.

Vinayak Gupta, chef and partner at Beep, Agira shares an immune booster elixir which keeps one hydrated too. It can be made by combining wheat grass, apple, carrot, celery stick, lemon, chopped ginger, garlic clove (optional) and turmeric. Put all ingredients in a jar, juice them and drink immediately. If you prefer the drink to be chilled, place all ingredients in the fridge for at least half an hour before processing. All these refreshing drinks will certainly leave you wanting for more.

R E C I P E S

BOHRI MALAI KHAJA

WHAT YOU NEED

For covering:

- Refined flour: 2 cups
- Ghee: 2 tbsp

For layering:

- Refined flour: 1 tsp
- Ghee: 1 tsp

For stuffing:

- *Khoya*: 1 cup
- California walnut powder: 1/2 cup
- Sugar (powdered): 1 cup
- Green cardamom powder: 1 tsp
- Saffron water: 1 tsp
- Oil for frying



METHOD

- Roast the *khoya* and California walnut powder on low flame for 10 minutes.

- Cool and mix sugar, cardamom powder. Keep aside.
- Knead refined flour and ghee with little water to form a stiff

dough. Make into orange-sized balls.

- Roll each ball to a thin disc nine-inches in diameter. Smear ghee and sprinkle refined flour all over.

- Roll into a thin cylinder, twist it and spiral it up. Chill for 10 minutes.

- Roll the chilled spiral ball into a four-inch disc and add in a scoop of the cooled filling.
- Bring the ends together and roll into a ball again.

Give it a smear of saffron water and cool for 15 minutes.

- Deep fry over low flame.
- Garnish with powdered sugar.

ALMOND & ROSE KULFI

WHAT YOU NEED

- Milk, full cream: 4 cup
- Sugar: 1/2 cup
- Saffron: 1/4 tsp
- Almond meal: 1/2 cup
- Dried rose petals: 1/4 cup

METHOD

- In a pan, add milk and heat it on low flame. Keep stirring. Do not let the milk burn.
- Let milk start to



thicken.

- Once it becomes half the volume, add the almond meal and sugar and mix well.
- Strain the mixture.
- Add the dried rose petals and saffron strands. Mix well.
- Allow the *kulfi* mixture to cool, pour it into *kulfi* moulds or small bowls and freeze them.
- Demould the *kulfi* and serve it garnished with roasted almond flakes.

SMOKED ALMOND RAITA

WHAT YOU NEED

- Almond flakes: 1/4 cup
- Yoghurt: 1 cup
- Dry roasted *jeera* powder: 1/4 tsp
- Black pepper powder: 1/4 tsp
- Salt to taste
- Black salt: 1/4 tsp
- Chopped garlic: 2 tsp
- Chopped coriander leaves: 1 tsp
- Sunflower oil: 2 tsp
- Hot coal: 2-3 pieces
- Ghee: 1 tsp

METHOD

- In a heavy bottom pan, heat the oil. Roast the chopped garlic until golden.
- In a bowl, add the yoghurt and whisk it well.
- Add the *jeera* powder,



black pepper powder, salt, black salt, roasted garlic as per taste. Mix gently.

- Take the almond flakes in a bowl.
- Make a small bowl-like structure out of the aluminum foil, and place it in the center of the bowl with almond

flakes.

- Place two to three small pieces of hot coal in the aluminum foil.
- Pour some ghee on top of it.
- Cover the almond bowl immediately with aluminum foil and keep it covered for 10-15 minutes. The almonds should be smoked.
- Remove the foil and the coal from the almonds and add these smoked almonds to the raita and mix gently.
- Serve the raita topped with chopped fresh coriander leaves and smoked almond flakes.

PATELI KE KEBAB

WHAT YOU NEED

- Boneless mutton (cut in half inch bits): 800 gm
- Ginger garlic paste: 50 gm
- Raw papaya paste: 150 gm
- White onion paste: 100 gm
- Brown onion paste: 100 gm
- *Desi ghee*: 150 gm
- Yellow chilli powder: 25 gm
- Coriander powder: 25 gm
- *Garam masala*: 25 gm.
- Black pepper powder: 10 gm
- Roasted *chana* powder: 50 gm
- Curd: 100 gm
- Saffron: 1 gm
- Poppy seeds paste: 30 gm
- Cashew paste: 10 gm
- *Chiroli* paste: 10 gm
- Desiccated coconut powder: 10 gm
- *Kewra*: 2 ml
- Clove: 4 pcs



- Green cardamom: 6 pcs
- Salt to taste

METHOD

- Take a bowl, put washed

salt and brown onion.

- Blend well and keep in a cool place for two hours.
- Take a *pateli*, heat it and add ghee, clove and cardamom. After roasting put the entire marinated mutton, add some amount of water, roasted *chana* powder and stir vigorously. Put on medium flame, cover it for almost 15 minutes.
- Remove lid when the mutton is almost done. Now add cashew, almond, *chironji* paste, desiccated coconut powder, and poppy paste. Again blend it with a ladle and cook until it turns oily.
- Now add saffron and *kewra* water, stir two to three times, close the lid and remove from the flame immediately.
- Garnish with coriander leaves. Have it with *romali roti* or *paratha*.

ICC defers decision on WT20 postponement till June 10

NEW DELHI: The International Cricket Council (ICC) Board on Thursday deferred a decision on the fate of this year's T20 World Cup in Australia till June 10 as it continued exploring contingency plans amid a raging pandemic.

The ICC also launched an inquiry into concerns over the "confidentiality" of its functioning, which the Board felt has been breached in the past few days.

"The Board also requested the ICC management continue with their discussions with stakeholders in exploring various contingency options in light of the rapidly changing public health situation caused by the Covid-19 virus," the ICC said in a statement after the Board's teleconference.

It is learnt that most of the discussion on the day was pertaining to classified information, including internal e-mails, being leaked, an issue that outgoing chairman Shashank Manohar as well as board members addressed.

"A number of Board members had raised their concerns over this issue recently and felt it required immediate attention to ensure the sanctity and confidentiality of Board matters in line with the highest standards of governance," the ICC release stated.

In fact, the ICC's Ethics Officer will be probing the media leaks.

"There was unanimous

agreement to immediately initiate an independent investigation led by the ICC's Ethics Officer and supported by global experts. The Board will be updated on this by the ICC CEO at its next meeting on 10 June 2020," it further stated.

It is understood that ICC board discussed all options with regards to the World Cup but there was no unanimity on whether to go ahead with the World T20 as per schedule or postpone it to 2021 or possibly 2022, which for many is a practical solution.

With Cricket Australia announcing their itinerary on the day, which included T20 matches in October, there are questions as to why the World T20 cannot go ahead in such a scenario.

"If you look at the Australian itinerary, India's T20 games are scheduled in mid-October before the start of World T20. If you can play T20 games in mid-October, why is it not possible to play World T20, a source told PTI.

But having a World T20 is not only a health concern but also about commercial viability. If BCCI is unable to organise the IPL in this window, it stands to lose ₹4000 crore, which certainly would be a big blow.

Also Star, which is broadcast partner of both the ICC and BCCI, will also need to be taken into confidence with regards to rejigging of the calendar. PNS

Ending weeks of speculation, Cricket Australia on Thursday confirmed that India will make the trip Down Under starting October this year for a financially critical assignment comprising four Tests, ODIs as well as T20 Internationals.

Cricket Australia announced the much-anticipated resumption of the game after the Covid-19 pandemic with a six-month home summer schedule which will begin with a tour by Zimbabwe for a three-match ODI series from August 9.

India will tour the country for a T20 series, which will begin on October 11 at Brisbane followed by matches on October 14 (Canberra) and October 17 (Adelaide), the CA posted on its official website.

This is to be followed by the T20 World Cup, the likelihood of which going ahead is slim owing to the pandemic. The CA did not even mention the event in its official schedule update.

After the T20s, Virat Kohli's men will return for a four-Test series, beginning on December 3 at Brisbane. India are then scheduled to play a Day/Night Test, as committed by BCCI President Sourav Ganguly, from December 11 to 15 in Adelaide. The third and fourth Tests will be held in Melbourne (December 26-30) and Sydney (January 3 to 7).

The ODI series is scheduled to begin with a match on January 12 in Perth and it will be followed by contests on January 15 (Melbourne) and



January 17 (Sydney).

"We are working closely with the BCCI to deliver the eagerly anticipated men's and women's tours, and we are looking forward to staging the important series against both the men's and women's New Zealand sides," Kevin Roberts, Cricket Australia CEO, said in a statement.

The India women's team will also travel to Australia for an ODI series with matches scheduled in Canberra (January 22), St Kilda (January 25) and Hobart (January 17).

Roberts hinted that if circumstances dictate, there could be changes

in the schedule which also features series against New Zealand (both men and women), West Indies and a one-off Test against Afghanistan (November 21-25).

"...But we'll be doing everything we can to get as much international cricket in as possible this summer. We will communicate any changes to the schedule if or when they are required," he added.

Cricket Australia also said that it will continue to act in accordance with public health advice and Government protocols to ensure the safety of the public, players and sup-

WACA chief lashes out at CA for India series snub

Western Australia Cricket Association (WACA) chief Christina Matthews has lashed out at Cricket Australia for choosing Brisbane over Perth as one of the venues for the high-profile Test series against India in the summer.

Matthews said the newly built Optus Stadium is better than the Gabba in every way. Instead, Perth will be hosting the low profile one-off Test against Afghanistan in November.

"All the metrics associated with cricket over the last two years see us surpass Brisbane in every area, whether it's crowds, broadcast ratings, even better rainfall at that time of year, more corporate seats — just so many indicators — and a brand new stadium," Matthews was quoted as saying by Fox Sports on Thursday.

"When Australian crickets primary objective is fans first, it is astounding that the 10,000 members who pay money to support cricket year after year in this state are not afforded the number one Test team to tour this year.

"The last time (India tour of 2014), we were told it was because our venue wasn't good enough and if we supported a new stadium, this would never happen again. And here we are again," Matthews said referring to the old WACA stadium.

India played in Perth when they toured last year (December 2018) with Australia winning the second Test by 146 runs to level the series.

The reinstatement of the Gabba comes after support from none other than Australia captain Tim Paine. Australia have not lost there in more than 30 years.

ers and coaches now feel that the use of external substances should be

allowed to shine the ball in order to maintain a balance between the bat and ball.

"As far as use of external substance is concerned, as long as it is same and uniform for all the teams, why not try it," Arun said.

"Use of saliva will be a very difficult habit to get over but we will make a conscious effort during our training and practice sessions to get rid of this habit," he added.

Virat right guy to take Indian cricket forward: Botham

Legendary England all-rounder Ian Botham has said he would have loved to play against Indian captain Virat Kohli, saying he is the right guy to lead the Indian cricket team.

Speaking in an online chat session with Playwrite Foundation, Botham was quoted as saying by The Times of India: "Virat takes the game to the opposition, he takes a stand for his players. I would have loved to play against him. He is the right guy to take Indian cricket forward."

Asked about all-rounders in modern day cricket, he said: "All-rounders can't be manufactured, they don't grow on trees. The workload is double and it obviously takes a toll on your body. Just imagine Kapil... the amount of bowling he did on those Indian pitches, which had very little to offer, that too in the scorching heat of Chennai and Delhi. I can't see anyone in the present generation being able to do that," Botham said.

Morgan casts doubts on T20 World Cup

England's white-ball captain Eoin Morgan has cast doubts on the T20 World Cup going ahead as per schedule, saying that hosts Australia would be wary of risking a second wave of coronavirus outbreak in the country.

Australia, who are scheduled to host the T20 World Cup from October 18 to November 15, has been largely successful in containing the contagion by sealing their borders and imposing travel restrictions. "I'd be surprised if it goes ahead," Morgan was quoted as saying by the Press Association.

"My reasons for that would be if you look at how Australia has handled the pandemic, they've shut down the borders pretty early, had a limited num-

ber of cases and deaths in comparison to the rest of the world," he added.
Morgan said going ahead, Australia, which has reported just over 7,100 positive cases with more than 6,500 recoveries and 103 deaths, would be weighing their options.
"Their biggest worry moving forward — a small negative to a huge positive — would be they almost don't know what the immunity would be like if the virus does have an outbreak," he added.
Morgan said that having teams flying in from across the world will come with the possibility of a second Covid-19 outbreak in the country.
"Having 16 teams across several venues has the potential to expose something," Morgan said.

PL to restart on June 17

The Premier League season is set to restart on June 17, three months after it was suspended due to the coronavirus pandemic, British media reported on Thursday.

No matches have been played since Leicester's 4-0 win over Aston Villa on March 9, with Liverpool also wins away from securing the title.

Top-flight clubs voted unanimously on Wednesday to return to contact training and were meeting again on Thursday to discuss issues such as the restart date and the rebate to broadcasters.

The BBC reported that the first two matches would be Aston Villa vs Sheffield United and Manchester City vs Arsenal. Those matches are the two games in hand.

A full fixture list would then be played on the weekend of June 19-21. AFP

Leipzig drop more points

LEIPZIG: Julian Nagelsmann slammed 10-man RB Leipzig for defending like 'a school team' in Wednesday's 2-2 draw at home to Hertha Berlin behind closed doors which cost them the chance to go second in the Bundesliga.

Hertha forward Krzysztof Piatek equalised with a late penalty to seal the draw as Leipzig's goalkeeper Rune Jarstein who had made a blunder for Leipzig's second goal. However, Nagelsmann was furious that Leipzig conceded a weak goal from a corner with just nine minutes gone when Hertha's midfielder Marco Gruec, on loan from Liverpool, fired home unmarked.

"We started well, but fell behind because we defend a set piece like a school team," fumed Nagelsmann.

"We simply did nothing, everyone is standing in position, yet he (Gruec) could finish with his foot, in the box."

"This is the second time in a row in a home game that we conceded from a set piece," said Nagelsmann whose team drew 1-1 against Freiburg in their last home game. AFP

Aigaonkar, who also holds the sports portfolio, was quoted as saying in a statement shared by IOA President Narinder Batra.
... Committee to hold November's statement added, and decide on fixing dates for National Games. (Goa) Government to take advice from Union Sports Ministry, need four months advance notice to organise games". Aigaonkar's statement added, "The previous edition of the Games was held back in 2015 in Kerala.
The upcoming Games, facing uncertainty for long, was originally scheduled for November 2018 but was postponed to April 2019. However, due to the general election, the Government of Goa ordered another cancellation.
