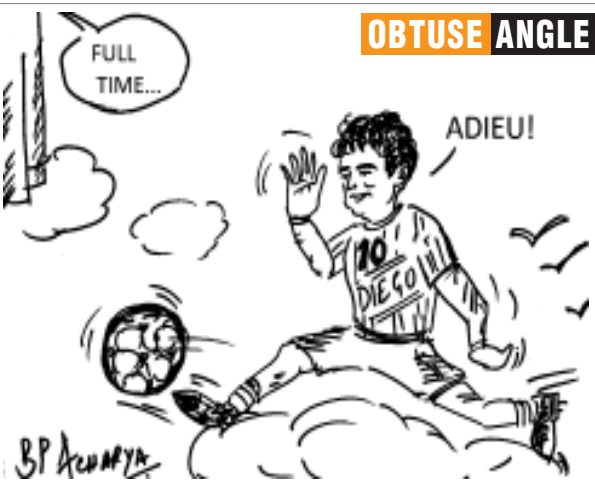

Telangana Rashtra Samiti supremo and Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao has said that BJP's 'Delhi leaders' are flooding Hyderabad for GHMC polls with an aim to obstruct him from entering national politics.

Addressing TRS' public meeting at LB Stadium here on Saturday, KCR said: "Recently, I talked about giving a new direc-

tion to India. I talked about the need to bring qualitative change in Indian politics for the all-round development of the country. I talked about how the so-called national parties had failed miserably to put India on a growth trajectory over the past seven decades. My attempts sent shock waves to them. For this reason, they are sending a flood of Delhi leaders to Hyderabad for GHMC polls. I wonder is this a local election or a national election? They

are sending Delhi leaders to see that KCR is obstructed at Hyderabad itself by defeating TRS in GHMC polls."

Urging GHMC voters to give a fitting reply to BJP for resorting to these acts, KCR said, "By giving landslide victory to TRS in GHMC polls, send a clear message to them that the mission to bring qualitative change in Indian politics has begun from Hyderabad itself."

Although TRS working president and IT Minister KT Rama Rao has been repeatedly issuing statements during campaigning that AIMIM is TRS' main rival for GHMC polls, and not BJP, the pink party's supremo and Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao targeted only BJP during his address at the public meeting at LB Stadium on Saturday.

The AIMIM leader, addressing a public meeting here on Wednesday in the run up to the December 1 Greater Hyderabad Municipal Elections, claimed that the banks of the lake was spread over 4,700 acres when it was built by saint Hussain Shah Wali, but was now not even 700 acres. He said it had become a road, with shops and samadhis of the two leaders there, as also the Lumbini Park.

Bhagyalakshmi temple takes a center-stage in GHMC elections

It appears that 'temple' is inseparable from politics in all places where the Bharatiya Janata Party wants to have its way, be it the Ayodhya, Mathura and Kashi shrines or the reopening of places of worship in Maharashtra. The latest instance of this shrine-based politics is the Bhagyalakshmi temple at Charminar, which, though disputed, has taken

the center-stage in GHMC elections. It has become a preferred spot for BJP leaders.

On Sunday, Home Minister Amit Shah will start his election campaign in Hyderabad from the Bhagyalakshmi temple. He will head from the Begumpet airport to Charminar at 10:45 am and will begin his campaign after offering prayers.

On 20 November, it was TS BJP chief Bandi Sanjay who went to the temple ostensibly

to prove that he was not behind the suspension of disbursement of Rs 10,000 relief amount to the

residual flood-hit families in Hyderabad. He had challenged Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao to come to the temple and take similar oath.

TRS leaders say that Sanjay picked the temple only to create disturbances in the sensitive Old City area. TRS working president on 21 November said, "They went to Bhagyalakshmi temple in the Old City that too on Friday."

BJP’s high-octane push in GHMC has a larger purpose



Municipal Corporation election has never attracted so much national attention as the one to be held in Greater Hyderabad on December 1 when an estimated 74 lakh voters are listed to elect 150 corporators. The BJP has pulled out all the stops by despatching its brass from Home Minister Amit Shah to MP Tejaswi Surya for the campaign.

This extraordinary importance the saffron party is attaching to a civic poll and the high-octane campaign of its leaders were initially intriguing beyond the transparent

objective of boosting the cadre's morale and the party's approach of not taking any election lightly. The other simplistic view is the aim of emerging as an alternative to the TRS. Equally facile is the conclusion that the GHMC elections are a semi-final for the Assembly polls in Tamil Nadu, Puducherry, West Bengal and Assam in 2021 and in UP in 2022, besides pushing its Hindutva agenda. Yet, it is difficult to envisage how the BJP's success in GHMC will influence voters in the East and the North where the socio-political factors are different.

The BJP's game plan also seems directed at the South, which accounts for 130 Lok Sabha seats and turning its toe-hold into a footprint that extends beyond Karnataka,

This extraordinary importance the saffron party is attaching to a civic poll and the high-octane campaign of its leaders were initially intriguing beyond the transparent objective of boosting the cadre's morale and the party's approach of not taking any election lightly. The other simplistic view is the aim of emerging as an alternative to the TRS

where it holds power. Amit Shah's visits to Chennai and Hyderabad within a span of eight days should explain this. This was a smart move considering the likelihood of V. K. Sasikala's release from jail, superstar Rajinikanth formally launching his party formally and developments like M. K. Alagiri's inclination to join the BJP. He has ended possi-

ble uncertainty in spite of AIADMK's disastrous show in the 2019 Lok Sabha elections against the virtual clean sweep by the DMK and its UPA allies which won 38 out of 39 seats.

Among AP, Tamil Nadu, Telangana and Kerala, the BJP had just two Assembly seats till recently. In Tamil Nadu, it is on the backfoot over Hindi and in



Andhra over its refusal to confer Special Category Status and muddled thinking over Amaravati. It has clearly come to a conclusion that it must play the Hindutva card for a successful foray into the South, a fact BJP leaders openly admit.

In Telangana though, the party took a big leap by winning four Lok Sabha seats as well as the Dubbaka Assembly seat in a byelection earlier this month. Although the victory in Dubbaka was marked by a wafer thin margin, it indicated that non-Modi factors like anti-incumbency can also do the magic.

The twist that BJP president Bandi Sanjay Kumar gave to the GHMC campaign by threatening a surgical strike against Pakistanis, Rohingyas and Afghans overstaying in the Old City must be understood against this background. It has turned the spotlight on his party with the likes of Tejaswi Surya fanning the flames through incendiary speeches. His audacious claim that the BJP's battle was primarily against Asaduddin Owaisi's

MIM was a clever attempt to put the TRS and MIM in a fix. In spite of some mutually recriminatory statements, their fight is commonly viewed as a friendly match as the MIM is contesting only 51 seats. It walked straight into the BJP's trap by daring the TRS government to demolish memorials of Telugu icons N. T. Rama Rao and P. V. Narasimha Rao built on the foreshores of Hussainsagar Lake.

The BJP and MIM are treading a dangerous path as both sides have their sights fixed on West Bengal too. Buoyant after winning five Assembly seats in Bihar, the MIM sees West Bengal with 27 per cent of Muslims as another hunting ground. This may lend a new dimension to Bengal's electoral landscape as the Trinamool Congress

and BJP are already locked in a battle with strong communal overtones.

Elections in Bihar where the Congress could win only 19 out of 70 seats proved again that the political space for the grand old party is receding in large swathes of the country. This is true also in Telangana where its fortunes are dwindling and its leaders have been defecting to the TRS and lately BJP.

KCR's iteration of his plans to float a third front targeted primarily at the BJP would be another reason for the BJP's attempt to give back as good as they get. They are taking the battle to his home turf as a forewarning to KCR to watch his back before taking a leap from 'gully politics' to Delhi politics, to use Rao's own expression.

All set for inauguration of Khammam IT Hub

The Telangana government is all set to take a big leap forward in expanding IT hubs to tier-II cities in the state. Arrangements are being made for launching the IT hub in Khammam by IT Minister K T Rama Rao on December 2. It may be recalled that the Telangana government has already launched IT hubs in Warangal and Karimnagar districts.



The G+5 IT hub being built in an area of 42,000 square feet at a cost of Rs 25 crore in the heart of Khammam city will be a source of pride for denizens. A huge job fair has been being organized at the local SBIT College on Saturday to recruit employees required to perform duties at various levels in the IT hub. Response for the job fair was overwhelming as hundreds of young people flocked to the walk-in interviews.

The government is trying hard to extend the fruits of technology to local eligible

youth by conducting a job fair. As many as 25 IT companies will start their operations from the IT hub. Some of the companies are well-known worldwide, while some are startups.

KTR agreed to set up an IT hub in Khammam as per the suggestion of Minister Ajay Kumar. The foundation stone for the IT hub was laid in 2017. Minister Puvvada Ajay Kumar, the in-charge for campaigning in Kukatpally division in the

GHMC polls, is also overseeing the arrangements for KTR's tour in consultation with Khammam district collector and other higher officials.

Initially, it was proposed to build the IT hub in just 25,000 sq ft, but it was later increased to 42,000 sq ft as the response from entrepreneurs was good. The ground floor will be used as the task office. Many companies are willing to start their operations in Khammam and tap the local talent pool.

During his visit to the US, Ajay Kumar met CEOs and IT dignitaries of Telugu origin and explained to them about the opportunities available in Khammam. Initially, as many as 16 companies evinced interest in setting up their offices in the hub.

Khammam is the second fastest growing city in Telangana after Hyderabad. The state government has already set up the required infrastructure to speed up the development process in the city. The state government has already chalked out a master plan for the development of Khammam city and is now in its final stage. The Dhansalapuram Railway Overbridge, a dream of denizens for decades, has also been completed and would be inaugurated on December 2 by KTR. R&B Minister Vemula Prashanth Reddy will accompany him. The new Police Commissionerate office set up at Prakash Nagar will be inaugurated by Home Minister Mahmood Ali.

Are there no other temples in Hyderabad? They want to create unnecessary disturbances between different sections and that is the reason they went to the old city".

However, BJP leaders maintain that there is nothing wrong in visiting Bhagyalakshmi temple and Sanjay even asked, "Is it in Pakistan, Afghanistan or Bangladesh?" In 2012, the Archaeological Survey of India, responding to an RTI query, described the temple structure as "an unauthorised construction". Even historians claim that it was built only in the 1960s.

According to some historians, one of the guard stones, shaped like a milestone, near Charminar was allegedly painted with saffron colour in 1965 and then an old woman was reportedly the person in-charge of this shrine. After an RTC bus purportedly hit the stone damaging it, a permanent structure was raised at the site and the stone replaced with an idol of Goddess Lakshmi. A case was later filed in the then AP High Court, opposing the encroachment of Charminar by the temple authorities.

Even BJP is family party except for Modi, says KTR

TRS working president KT Rama Rao took a strong exception to BJP leaders' comments that Chief Minister K Chandrababbar Rao and his family are looting the state. He said that even BJP is a family party except for Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

Addressing different communities at Vibrant Hyderabad Programme on Saturday, KTR said, "BJP leaders won't discuss development, but will call us family parties. Are there no families in BJP? Karnataka Chief Minister Yediyurappa's son is MP, his son is state BJP vice president. In Madhya Pradesh there is Vijaya Rajee Scindia, Yashodhara and now Jyotiraditya. Rajasthan has Vasundhara Rajee and Dushyant. In Delhi, there is Maneka and Varun Gandhi. If we go further Rajnath Singh is there and his son is in UP BJP. Is BJP an exception?"

"This holier than thou attitude is not right, stating that there is no family in our party, is wrong. It is different that Modi doesn't have family. I don't have anything with that.



But other leaders in your party have family members. To posture like this is not right. You don't have anything to speak straight to the point, and these family politics etc are deviation," KTR added.

It may be mentioned here that on Friday, BJP president Jagat Prakash Nadda referring to KCR's plans to bring the anti-BJP parties together said, "Why don't you say that you will make a family with all the family-held parties. Birds of a feather flock together. They are all same, maybe little difference of shades."

Meanwhile, he informed that community that because of Coronavirus pandemic taking hit on economy, the state cannot give industrial incentives as promised in Budget. KTR, taking a dig at Atma Nirbar Bharat programme

said, "From 15 days, I am trying to find using magnifying lens who got benefitted from Rs 20 lakh crore atma nirbar, couldn't find one".

The state cabinet earlier this week gave nod to the Uttar Pradesh Prohibition of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Ordinance, 2020 to curb forcible or dishonest religious conversions including those for the sake of marriage, which could land violators in jail for up to 10 years. Uttar Pradesh Governor Anandiben Patel gave assent to the ordinance on Saturday. Now, it will be presented in the state legislature for passage. Commenting on it, Akhilesh Yadav told reporters, The Samajwadi Party is not in

favour of any such law. We will oppose it (when it comes to the assembly). He also sought to know its relevance when the state has schemes to encourage inter-caste and inter-faith marriages. The government does not want to debate on more important issues due to which it brought the ordinance, he said, alleging that it is creating hatred and chasm in society. The SP president also extended support to the farmers' protest against the Centre's farm laws.

The betterment of farmers cannot be ensured through laws. It will happen only when the government comes for-

ward and provides them with the right price of their produce, he said.

Akhilesh alleged, No other government has committed as many atrocities on farmers as this government is doing. This treatment is being meted out by those who had promised to double their income.

He also asked when the Centre is going to bring a law to double farmers' income and provide employment to the youth.

Questioning investment claims of the UP government, Akhilesh said it should also tell how it has fared in corruption and fake encounters.

but some inimical forces were trying to disturb the peace by fomenting communal trouble and whipping up passions. "We need a peaceful Hyderabad for growth, development, and for our children's future."

On the flood situation, the Chief Minister said that every megacity in the country had faced severe crisis including Mumbai, Bengaluru, Chennai, and Kolkata, and that Hyderabad was no exception. "Our leaders have waded through knee-length water to help people in a flood situation. No government anywhere in the country had disbursed Rs 10,000 to each household

affected by floods. But we did it. We distributed Rs 650 crore for over 6 lakh people. But opposition parties obstructed this by complaining to the Election Commission. TRS government will be there even after GHMC polls. We will give Rs 10K flood relief to leftover people from December 7. We expect leftover people at around 2 to 3 lakh and we are ready to spend Rs 300 crore for this to mitigate the sufferings of people, though the state government's financial condition is bad due to corona situation," KCR observed.

KCR promised to sanction Rs 10,000 crore in Budget every year to GHMC to help provide a permanent solution to floods, clear nala encroach-

ments and enable construction of new nalas for effective flood water management.

On the deployment of national BJP leaders for GHMC poll campaign, he said, "To beat this whip-thin man, their national leaders are camping in Hyderabad. Remember, I am the son of Telangana soil. People from Delhi have descended to campaign in 'gully' politics. This clearly shows how strong the TRS is, every leader in Delhi is shaking in their pants. The Uttar Pradesh CM has come to visit Hyderabad. His state stands 25 in growth terms, while Hyderabad figures in the top 5. Now, this weak CM from a weak state will teach us how to rule and govern. We have to live together in communal harmo-

ny, together as a bouquet of flowers. Save Hyderabad to save your businesses. If the communal harmony is disturbed, the real estate prices will crash, the business climate will be affected. Hyderabad is a reality. I request the intellectual class to save the history and peace of Hyderabad. Are we going to lose our peace because of some communal forces? Do you want to surrender your peace? Do you want to compromise on law and order," he asked.

KCR also said his government had largely solved the water problem in the state. "Six years back before we came to power, women would stand in long queues for a bucket of water."

Bharatiya Janata Party Telangana state president Bandi Sanjay on Saturday predicted that the TRS government, led by K Chandrababtu Naidu, would collapse post the Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation elections. He predicted that TRS MLAs would revolt against the CM. There will be mid-term elections and BJP would win, he claimed. He also stated that KCR would surely go to jail.

Sanjay, who is also a Lok Sabha member from Karimnagar, made these comments at an election rally at Ramnagar. "The corrupt government will collapse after the GHMC elections. Everyone knows that KCR is involved in a fake passport scam. The Centre will settle all accounts," he said.

He cautioned the police officials against backing an "unstable" government and said they were reading out the script of the Chief Minister over possible communal violence in the city. People want clean and non-corrupt corporators

As a popular Telugu saying goes 'Illu Katti Choodu Pelli Chesu Choodu', loosely translated as 'construct house or perform marriage and you will know challenges', constructing a new house has become a cumbersome task for people in urban areas, especially within the GHMC limits. Some corporators are allegedly harassing people constructing new houses and demanding money.

Earlier, relatives used to offer wood, sand and monetary help to the persons constructing houses. Similarly, they used to offer rice, vegetables and extend

support whenever a person performs marriage of his daughter. In contrast, some of the corporators, along with their henchmen, visit the construction site and demand money from people. If they refuse to give in to their demands, they threaten them of denying necessary permissions from municipal authorities. Instead of helping people who elected them, some of the corporators are allegedly harassing them for the sake of money.

Venkat Reddy, a resident of Saidabad Colony, said that the contestants convince them in every possible way to win their trust. "They request, lure and cajole people to get elected, but



after winning election, they start collecting money from people constructing new houses. They resort to land grabbing, settling land disputes and indulge in real estate business. They forget the fact that they are

public representatives and start harassing people for money," he said.

"They collect money from common man to real estate builders who construct new houses. If they are not given money, the corporators create hurdles for people with the help of municipal authorities," he added. A builder on the condition of anonymity said that the corporators demand a percentage from them. He said that the builders allocate money for corporators while planning the project itself. We add this amount when they sell the flats after completing the project, he added. Constructing houses in GHMC limits has become a dif-

icult task for common people because of the hurdles created by the corporators. They don't understand this practice as they construct houses once in their lifetime. It is difficult for them to raise money demanded by the corporators. The corporators appoint their henchmen to look after these activities. These men, along with GHMC authorities, go to the construction site and collect the money. They will stop the construction citing rules and regulations if they are not given money. To avoid hurdles people give money to them, said Saleem from Tolichowki.

A corporator, who didn't get a ticket in these elections, on the

condition of anonymity, said that the corporators would collect money from the people to meet expenses during elections. Ram (name changed) from Serilingampally constituency said that he gave Rs 5 lakh to his corporator. He lamented that he voted for the same corporator who demanded money from him in the last elections.

Srikanth Rao (name changed) from Serilingampally constituency said that the corporators demand not less than Rs 50,000 from individuals for constructing houses and not less than Rs5 lakh from builders. Raghu from Qutubullapur want the corporators to avoid these corrupt practices.

‘DELHI CHALO’

Stalemate continues as protesting farmers refuse to budge

Thousands of farmers have reached the national capital on their tractor-trolleys and other vehicles, responding to the “Delhi Chalo” call against the agri-marketing laws enacted at the Centre in September.

On Saturday morning, it wasn't clear if they will agree to move to the Burari ground on the outskirts of the city, where police said they can continue with their protest. Many protesters were demanding a better venue in the centre of Delhi. Originally, the protest was meant to be on November 26 and 27.

A look at the protest so far:

Day 1:
On Thursday, thousands of farmers crossed from Punjab to Haryana. At border points, the Haryana Police tried to stop them, using water cannons and teargas. But later they were allowed through. There were skirmishes with police at other points as well on the highway to Delhi as it passed through BJP-run Haryana. A large group of protesters camped for the night near Panipat.



Day 2:
Protesters assembled at Delhi's border at Tigr and Singhu. Police used teargas and water cannons to stop them from breaking through barricades, which included sand-laden trucks. In the evening, they offered to let them into the city and continue their protest at Burari ground. But many appeared reluctant.

Day 3:

The standoff continued on Saturday morning at Delhi's border. More farmers were making their way from Punjab and Haryana.

What farmers fear:
Farmer unions in Punjab and Haryana say the recent laws enacted at the Centre will dismantle the minimum support price (MSP) system. Over time big corporate houses will dictate terms and farmers will end up getting less for their

crops, they argue. Farmers fear that with the virtual disbanding of the mandi system, they will not get an assured price for their crops and the “arthiyas” -- commission agents who also pitch in with loans for them -- will be out of business. **Their demands:**
The key demand is the withdrawal of the three laws which deregulate the sale of their crops. The farmer unions could

also settle for a legal assurance that the MSP system will continue, ideally through an amendment to the laws.

They are also pressing for the withdrawal of the proposed Electricity (Amendment) Bill 2020, fearing it will lead to an end to subsidised electricity. Farmers say rules against stubble burning should also not apply to them.

Key players:
The “Delhi Chalo” call was given by the All India Kisan Sangharsh Coordination Committee. Several other organisations including Rashtriya Kisan Mahasangh and factions of the Bharatiya Kisan Union (BKU) came out in support.

The march is being held under the banner of Samyukta Kisan Morcha. The Rashtriya Kisan Mahasanghathan, Jai Kisan Andolan, All India Kisan Mazdoor Sabha, Krantikari Kisan Union, Bharatiya Kisan Union (Dakaunda), BKU (Rajewal), BKU (Ekta-Urgahan), BKU (Chaduni) are among the participants.

Most protesters are from Punjab, but there is a substantial number from Haryana as well.

Fadnavis targets MVA govt on issues of ryots, Maratha quota

BJP leader Devendra Fadnavis on Saturday accused the Uddhav Thackeray-led Maharashtra government of ignoring the plight farmers in the state and failing on the Maratha reservation issue.

The former chief minister said the government has failed to provide financial aid to farmers. The MVA government completes a year in office on Saturday. “The Thackeray government has failed in providing financial assistance to farmers. The government has completely ignored their plight. Cotton, soybean crops got destroyed due to pest attack, but no help was provided to farmers,” Fadnavis said in a press conference.

“This government has miserably failed in Maratha reservation as well,” he alleged.

“Some of the state ministers are deliberately making contradictory statements on the Maratha reservation issue. They are doing so to cover up the government's failure. This government is deliberately dragging its feet in the Supreme Court,” he said.

The BJP leader also said that he had not seen any chief minister in Maharashtra, other than

Fadnavis further said, “The Supreme Court and the Bombay High Court's recent decisions are enough to underscore the constitutional breakdown in the

state.” He was apparently referring to the Supreme Court's decision to extend journalist Arnab Goswami's interim bail and the Bombay High Court's observation that the Mumbai civic body's action of demolishing part of actor Kangana Ranaut's bungalow in Mumbai was illegal and smacked of mala fide intentions.

The latest organisation to come under this category is the Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) as its chief Rajesh Ranjan is set to retire this month-end and the Union home ministry has given the “additional charge” of the post to SSB director general Kumar Rajesh Chandra “till the joining of regular DG. CISF or until further orders, whichever is earlier” as per an order issued on November 26.

Similarly, the charge of the federal counter-terrorist force NSG, the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) and the central police think tank -- Bureau of Police Research and Development (BPRD) -- is being rendered in additional



capacities by various Indian Police Service (IPS) officers.

Indo-Tibetan Border Police chief S S Deswal is handling the “additional charge” of the National Security Guard since incumbent A K Singh retired on September 30.

Border Security Force (BSF) chief Rakesh Asthana is holding the additional charge of NCB since July last year after incumbent DG

Abhay was appointed as the Director of Hyderabad-based Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel National Police Academy.

Abhay, who goes by his first name, is now serving as the DG of Odisha Police. Special secretary (internal security) V S K Kaumudi is holding the additional charge of BPRD since August after he was appointed to the present post in the Union home ministry.

US imposes sanctions on Russian and Chinese firms

The US has imposed sanctions on four companies from China and Russia for supporting Iran's missile programme that remains a “significant proliferation concern,” Secretary of State Mike Pompeo has said.



The announcement was made on Friday as the US continues to take tough measures against Iran for continuing their activities related to nuclear arms.

“The US has sanctioned four entities in China and Russia for their support of Iran's missile programme, which remains a significant proliferation concern. We will continue to use all our sanctions tools to prevent Iran from advancing its missile capabilities,” Pompeo said.

The companies are Chengdu Best New Materials Co Ltd and Zibo Elim Trade Co, Ltd. in China and Nilco Group, which is also known as Nil Fam Khazar Company and SanTERS Holding and Joint Stock Company Elecon in Russia for transferring sensitive technology and items to Iran's

missile programme.

President Donald Trump withdrew the US from the landmark Iran nuclear deal in 2018.

After withdrawing from the Iranian nuclear deal, Trump has asked all countries to reduce their purchase of oil from Iran to zero or face secondary sanctions.

Iran insists its nuclear programme is for peaceful purposes.

Pompeo said all countries need to be vigilant to efforts by Iran to advance its missile programme.

“These measures are part of our response to Iran's malign

The announcement was made as the US continues to take tough measures against Iran for continuing their activities related to nuclear arms

activities. These determinations underscore the continuing need for all countries to remain vigilant to efforts by Iran to advance its missile programme,” Pompeo said.

“We will continue to work to impede Iran's missile development efforts and use our sanctions authorities to spotlight the foreign suppliers, such as these entities in the People's Republic of China and Russia that provide missile-related materials and technology to Iran. The sanctions imposed include restrictions on US government procurement, US government assistance, and exports and will be in effect for two years,” he said.

Nearly 8000 IT professionals get jobs through 'Karma Bhumi'

Sri Lanka is hosting the fourth national security advisor trilateral meeting on maritime security cooperation with India and the Maldives.

The meeting is taking place after six years - the last meeting was held in New Delhi in 2014.

“NSA #AjitDoval and @MariyaDidi, Defence Minister of #Maldives held a cordial & detailed discussion on deepening bilateral partnership between India & Maldives in defence and security,” High Commission of India in Maldives said in a tweet.

Doval arrived in Colombo on Friday for the trilateral maritime dialogue.

The high-level engagement that covers a wide range of subjects is designed to initiate collective action on maritime security including maritime domain awareness, legal regimes, train in search and rescue, maritime pollution response, information sharing, curbing piracy drugs arms and contraband trafficking in the Indian Ocean region.

ED attaches assets of ex IAS officer

The agency is probing Agrawal, his family members and others in connection with a money laundering case linked to charges of alleged corruption and disproportionate assets.

Nomads under lens as child missing cases rise

The Kerala police is keeping a special watch on nomads and migrant workers in the wake of an increase in child missing cases in the state, a top official said.

The state police chief, DGP Loknath Behera informed the state Human Rights panel that the Janamaithri wing of the police department had been entrusted with the task of tracing children who had gone missing under various circumstances in the southern state.

Information on nomadic



groups and migrant workers were being collected, he said.

The ‘Janamaithri Suraksha Project’ is a prestigious com-

munity policing initiative of the Kerala government.

The rights panel chairman, Antony Dominic, had recently directed the DGP to submit a report on the steps taken to control the disappearance of children.

In the report, the top cop said immediate and effective action is taken if a complaint is received about a missing child and to trace them.

The police report also said an investigation was progressing to find out the circumstance in which seven-year-old Devananda, a school going girl who had gone missing while playing in

the backyard of her home and later found dead in Kollam district recently.

The rights panel sought the police report based on a complaint filed by human rights activist, P K Raju.

According to Kerala police's latest crime statistics, a total of 91 cases of kidnapping and abduction of children were reported in the southern state in the initial three months, till March, this year.

Of the total 1217 crime reported against children during the period, 331 were rape and seven were murders, it said.

12 arrested for duping aspiring Delhi Police constables

The Uttar Pradesh Special Task Force has arrested 12 persons for taking money from aspiring Delhi Police constables, promising their selection in the entrance examination to be held shortly by the central area's Staff Selection Commission. Twelve persons including the racket kingpin Mahendra Singh have been arrested by the STF from Gorakhpur on Friday, an official statement said here on Saturday. The STF sleuths also seized 11 mobile phones, 14 Aadhar cards, six fake id-cards of exam recovered from them. During interrogation, Mahendra Singh told STF that he used to run the racket of promising candidates' selection by having “question solvers” sit in the test in their place, it said. The gang used to charge hefty amount from candidates for their services. A detailed probe is on in the matter.



‘Navy to execute \$ 51bn orders for ships, submarines’

Union Minister of State for Defence Shripad Naik on Friday said expected orders for surface ships and submarines to be executed from 2020 to 2030 by the Indian Navy are to the tune of USD 51 billion.

Naik was addressing a virtual meet on opportunities at Goa Shipyard Limited (GSL) and Mazagao Dock Shipbuilders Limited (MDSL), organised by the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII).

The union minister said that more than 60 per cent of the Indian Navy's budget is dedicated to capital expenditure and nearly 70 per cent of this capital budget has been spent on indigenous sourcing, amounting to nearly Rs 66,000 crore in the last five years.

He said that with more than 60 major surface and sub-sur-



face platforms being built for mainly the Indian Navy and the Indian Coast Guard at Goa Shipyard Limited, Mazagon Docks Shipbuilders Limited, Garden Reach Shipbuilder and Engineers (GRSE), Hindustan Shipyards

Limited (HSL) and Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL), the potential for MSMEs is vast.

Naik said "expected orders for surface ships and submarines to be executed from 2020 to 2030 are to the tune of USD 51 billion".

Speaking during the event, CII Goa State Council Chairman Blaise Costabir said that with India's maritime interests growing at a fast pace in line with Prime Minister Narendra Modi's vision of a USD 5 trillion economy by 2025, the country's shipbuilding will see increased focus and demand.

The country's vast coastline and the evolving geopolitical situation in India's neighbourhood has also put a greater thrust on maritime safety and security, he added.

Chairman and Managing Director of GSL said the defence shipbuilding sector will continue to see robust growth.

There was 9.3 per cent growth in the defence budget in 2019-20, he said and added that the country expects to see the same trend for the next 10 years.

FDI up 15 pc to \$ 30 billion during April-Sep: Govt data

Foreign direct investment (FDI) into India grew by 15 per cent to USD 30 billion during the first half of the current fiscal, according to official data.

Inflow of FDI during April-September 2019-20 stood at USD 26 billion, as per the data of the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT).

In July, the country had attracted USD 17.5 billion worth of foreign investments.

Sectors which attracted maximum foreign inflows during April-September 2020-21 included computer software and hardware (USD 17.55 billion), services (USD 2.25 billion), trading (USD 949 billion), chemicals (USD 437 million) and automobile (USD 417 million).

Petrol price crosses Rs 82 mark, diesel above Rs 72 /ltr

Petrol price on Saturday crossed Rs 82-mark in Delhi and diesel surpassed Rs 72 a litre after eighth increase in rates in past nine days.

Petrol price on Saturday was hiked by 24 paise per litre and diesel by 27 paise as hopes of a vaccine development led to a rally in international oil prices.

Petrol price in Delhi rose to Rs 82.13 per litre from Rs 81.89, according to a price notification from oil marketing companies.

Diesel rates went up from Rs 71.86 to Rs 72.13 per litre.

This is the eighth increase in rates since November 20 when oil companies resumed daily price revision after nearly two-week hiatus.

In nine days, petrol price has gone up by Rs 1.07 per litre and diesel rate has risen by Rs 1.67.

Prior to the November 20 hike, petrol prices had been



static since September 22 and diesel rates hadn't changed since October 2.

Public sector oil marketing companies - Indian Oil Corporation, Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd and Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Ltd - revise rates of petrol and diesel daily based on benchmark international oil price and foreign exchange rate.

They have, however, resorted to calibrating the rates since the pandemic broke out with a view to avoiding volatility in retail prices. The 58-day hiatus in petrol price revision and 48-day status quo on diesel rates were preceded by no change in rates between June 30 and August 15 and a 85-day status quo between March 17 and June 6.

Ather discontinues 450 scooter, replaces it with 450X, 450 Plus

Electric two-wheeler startup Ather Energy on Saturday said it has decided to replace its first product, Ather 450, with Ather 450X and Ather 450 Plus, which have been built on the same platform, with improved hardware and software capabilities.

The company had launched the Ather 450 in 2018. The company will stop the sale of Ather 450 on November 28 in both Bengaluru and Chennai, Ather Energy said in a statement. This marks the end of phase one of Ather Energy as a company as it moves on to a new stage of rapid growth aided by a new round of Series D funding, it added. "Our maiden model, Ather 450 was the outcome of four years of continuous work on R&D, design, prototype building and testing, and improving the product to make it production worthy. The learnings from Ather 450 in terms of design, specifications and production along with feedback from the owners has helped shape the Ather 450X and Ather 450 Plus," Ather Energy Co-founder and CEO Tarun Mehta said. The company is now looking forward to delivering new products across all cities, he added.

Yoga guru Swami Ram Dev, his younger brother Ram Bharat and close aide Acharya Balkrishna will be on the board of soya food brand Nutrela-maker Ruchi Soya that was recently acquired by Patanjali Ayurved. Ruchi Soya Industries Ltd in a notice to shareholders sought approval for appointment of Ram Bharat, 41, as the Managing Director of the company. Subsequent to a consortium of Patanjali Ayurved Limited, Divya Yog Mandir Trust (through its business undertaking, Divya Pharmacy), Patanjali Parivahan Private Limited and Patanjali Gramudhyog acquiring Ruchi Soya in insolvency proceedings last year, the new management got right to appoint the board, the notice said. "The board of directors of the company at its meeting held on August 19, 2020 appointed Shri Ram Bharat as managing director of the company with effect from August 19, 2020 to December 17, 2022 and his designation was changed from whole-time director to managing director," it said. Now the shareholder approval is being sought for the appointment. Bharat will be paid a salary of Re 1 per annum, the notice said.

"He has emphasized on strengthening the cost competitiveness, internal decision making and the project implementation capabilities of the PSEs for their improved performance," a statement issued by SAIL quoted Chaudhary as saying. He also said there are ample opportunities for CPSEs to create a synergy among themselves to improve their performance and contribute towards Atmanirbhar Bharat, the statement added.



Sri Lanka willing to meet its debt obligations: Govt

Sri Lanka remains willing and able to meet all its debt obligations as it has done in the past, the government said on Saturday, a day after Fitch downgraded the country's sovereign credit rating to "CCC".

Fitch Ratings said on Friday it was downgrading Sri Lanka from "B-" to "CCC", barely above default, after the government's 2021 budget showed too steep revenue projections, following earlier tax cuts and a higher deficit for 2021 than 2020.

The ratings agency said the budget was lacking a credible fiscal consolidation strategy and provides only limited details on the potential revenue impact of some of the measures announced, raising

uncertainty about the government's planned reduction in government debt and budget deficit.

"The Government has repeatedly expressed its ability and willingness to meet all its debt obligations falling due in the period ahead," the finance ministry said in a statement.

The government wishes to reaffirm to foreign investors that have put faith in Sri Lanka continuously over the past several years that the country remains willing and able to meet its debt obligations, as it has done impeccably in the past, the statement said. It said the assessment had ignored several key proposals presented in the 2021 Budget regarding deficit financing in the period ahead.

‘65 per cent of domestic air travel back to pre virus level’

Nearly 65 per cent of the domestic air travel has returned to the pre-COVID-19 level and now there is a need to evolve a strategy to bring back the tourism industry on its feet, Civil Aviation Secretary Pradeep Singh Kharola said on Saturday.

He was addressing a webinar on 'Aviation and Tourism-the Road Ahead' hosted by the Federation of Association of Indian Tourism & Hospitality.

Kharola also said in the times of COVID-19 air travel has become a preferred mode of travel for being a safe means of transportation.

"On the first day of resumption of domestic air services (May 25) there were 79,000 people who would travel and we were worried. But gradually it started improving," he said.

Farmkart to raise Rs 90 cr from VCs for pan-India expansion

Madhya Pradesh-based agritech startup Farmkart, which offers a wide range of agricultural products and services to farmers through its e-commerce platform, is planning to raise Rs 90 crore in Series A funding from venture capitalists for expansion across the country.

Patidar said the company has tie-ups with top brands, both domestic as well as international, for its e-commerce platform. "We have tied-up with almost all major international and domestic brands for seeds, fertilisers, fungicides and pesticides. We have tie-ups for farm equipment and are looking to add more in this category," he added.

EPFO extends date to submit life certificate

Retirement fund body EPFO has extended the deadline for submission of life certificates by pensioners till February 28, a move which would benefit over 35 lakh persons who could not submit the document by November due to coronavirus pandemic.

The pensioners who could not submit their life certificates till November 30 deadline, would get pension every month till February.

"In view of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the vulnerability of elderly population to coronavirus, the Employees' Provident Fund Organisation (EPFO) has extended the time limit up to 28th February 2021 for submission of Life Certificate (Jeevan Pramaan Patra-JPP) in respect of the Pensioners drawing pension under EPS 1995 (Employees' Pension Scheme-1995) and whose

Life certificate is due in any month till February 28, 2021," a labour ministry statement said.

Presently, a pensioner can submit JPP anytime during the year up to 30th November, which is valid for a period of one year from the date of issue.

All such pensioners can submit life certificates till February 28, 2021.

During this extended period, pension will not be stopped in respect of 35 lakh pensioners who could not submit JPP during November 2020, the ministry added.

Multiple modes for submission of JPPs including 3.65 lakh Common Service Centres (CSCs), branches of pension disbursing banks, 1.36 lakh post offices, postal network of 1.90 lakh postmen and Grameen Dak Sevaks under the Department of Post can be availed by pensioners.

ADB approves \$300 mn loan to cash-strapped Pakistan

The Asian Development Bank has approved a USD 300 million policy-based loan to Pakistan to help promote macroeconomic stability in the cash-strapped country.

The announcement by the Philippines-headquartered lender came a week after Pakistan secured USD 800 million worth of debt freeze deals from 14 members of the G20. As of August this year, the country owes USD 25.4 billion to the group of 20 rich nations.

The USD 300 million loan would improve trade competitiveness and export diversification, said Hiranya Mukhopadhyay, Principal Public Management Specialist at the Asian Development Bank (ADB).

"While COVID-19 hit



Pakistan at a critical point in its macroeconomic recovery, the government's ongoing efforts to ensure stability have started showing encouraging results this fiscal year," Mukhopadhyay said in a statement.

The ADB's programme will support Pakistan's efforts to improve its export competitiveness which was more important than ever given the impacts of the pandemic, he said, adding that it is expected

to enable Pakistan in recovering current account deficit in a sustained manner as well as facilitate export diversification.

It will introduce important tariff- and tax-related policy reforms to help improve Pakistan's international competitiveness and further strengthen key institutions, including accreditation bodies, the Export-Import Bank of

Pakistan, and the Pakistan Single Window.

The bank said that several steps were also taken to introduce e-commerce, strengthen key institutions involved in facilitating trade, and enhance the export certification process.

The new financing falls under Subprogram 2 of the Trade and Competitiveness Programme.

Under the first phase, the ADB helped the government usher in key reforms, including reducing or abolishing tariffs and ad hoc duties on a large number of raw materials and intermediate goods.

DELHI SURGE: ALL TO BLAME

On Thursday, the Delhi Government informed the High Court that it is considering lockdown, night curfew in order to curb the virus. The fact that Delhi is one of the worst-hit States obviously leave the Government with no second choice.

But, what has led Delhi to this troublesome zone? Is it irresponsible public behaviour, festooning of throats with masks to escape penalty? Or is it the decision to relax the lockdown in the face of crashing economy, joblessness and societal depression?

Whatever the reason, fatalities have rocketed. Alarming, experts fear this is just the tip of the iceberg.

With 5,000 fresh cases daily and deaths peaking to over a 100, in the Capital a whopping 6 lakh have been impacted by coronavirus infection.

"The increasing death toll is a matter of worry for everyone. No one specific reason can be attributed for this surge. The causes are diverse and need to be dealt with accordingly. The toll is proportionate to the infected cases. Due to the rising number of cases, the hospitals are overburdened, hence providing timely treatment to all the patients is a big challenge. This can be one of the reasons for the deaths," Dr Shiba Kalyan Biswal, Consultant, Pulmonary and Sleep Medicine, Narayana Hospital, Gurugram, tells you.

Another reason can be that although COVID is a respiratory disease, it affects the immune system and the blood vessels as well. Such conditions aggravate co-morbidities that a person may have. Hence, if a person is suffering from some underlying disease, he is more prone to suffer from a serious condition after he contracts COVID infection. Such patients are also unfortunately adding to the toll," he said.

The ongoing festive and wedding season has added to the danger.

"Many people attended gatherings and social meetings. This also added to the problem. Also the fall in temperature can propagate any flu or infection. Dense population is also another factor in big cities and often people fail to follow social distancing norms. The lockdown was lifted because of economic constraints but as a result, the careless attitude of people in public places is reflected. It is time people avoid stepping out if unnecessary," he said.

Hans Raj Hans, Member of Parliament, North-West Delhi, said that Government laxity along with several other factors has led to high number of cases in the Capital.

"Poor mask discipline, the decision to open all the markets, more than 50 people at weddings and other related functions, social gatherings during festivities, the deteriorating air quality index and rising respiratory disorders are reasons for the rise of COVID-19 in the National Capital. Besides, the casual approach of Delhiites is also one of the reasons for this rise. The Central Government is working with the State Government to control the situation in Delhi, but the residents should cooperate by taking all possible care. Without this cooperation, the situation will not abate anytime soon," Hans said.

It's been only nine days since the Delhi Government implemented a fine of ₹2,000 for not wearing a mask in public and within four days of the rule, the Delhi Police collected nearly ₹1.5 crore as challans. According to the data shared by the Delhi Police, a total 7,655 challans have been issued from November 20 to November 24. The figure, which then started to see a dip, is sufficient to explain how masks is not at all an option worth considering for Delhiites, who seemingly don't fear the deadly virus.

Varun Gupta, a social activist and environmentalist, agrees with Hans and says that Delhiites are extensively responsible for the current situation.

"To a great extent, Delhiites are responsible for the increase of COVID in the Capital. People should consider their mask as the only vaccine at present. During the festival time, what I analysed was that people almost forgot that the world is fighting a pandemic. The markets and some of the public places were crowded just like it used to be in the pre-COVID time. Adding to that, maximum people were not wearing masks or the same was and is below their nostrils. Such cases were seen in the metro too. Not only this, even vegetable sellers, shopkeepers, food stall owners, rickshaw man were seen without masks. Government, doctors, academics, social organisations, police, media and others keep telling peoples to take precautions, but people are living in oblivion. I would just say to everyone that there is still time to protect yourself," Gupta said.

Dr Shuchin Bajaj, Founder Director, Ujala Cygnus Group of Hospitals, tells you that the intensity of the second and third wave of a disease is always much widespread and it is the time when people need to take more precautions.

STEPS TAKEN BY DELHI GOVERNMENT

- Challan of ₹2,000 for not wearing a mask in public
- Not more than 50 people allowed in marriages
- Aggressive testing. Daily RT-PCR tests limit has been increased to 37,200
- Atleast 205 ICU beds added in hospitals run by the Central and Delhi Governments
- 120 ventilators arrived from Bharat Electronics Limited, Bangalore, given to hospitals

"Historically, the intensity of second and third waves are always much widespread in case of any pandemic. People are now tired of the guidelines and are coming out in large numbers this leads to a much extensive viral load and more chances of getting exposed to the virus. If you remember, in the beginning of the pandemic the deaths of doctors were much higher because they had the higher viral load and they didn't know much about the virus. They didn't know the exact way of donning and doffing the PPE kits. But doctors have learnt rapidly and are following all the precautions. But the general public doesn't know the etiquette of wearing a mask. They keep taking it off just to speak and never shy away from touching the outer surface of the mask. So doing all these things proves to be very dangerous especially in crowded settings like markets and offices," he said.

He tells you that Delhi is now open to people accessing healthcare from the nearby cities which was not the case earlier. "People were not allowed to cross State boundaries during the first wave. Usually people come to Delhi when their case is critical and that's why the mortality in Delhi is higher," Bajaj added.

Bajaj feels that the guidelines of marriages should have been made permanent instead. "I feel that the limited crowd in weddings help us as a community also. It prevents poor people from getting exploited and also curtails the unnecessary expenditure. Undoubtedly, during COVID it prevents marriages from acting as super spreaders of infection," he said.

He points out that aggressive testing is necessary in any pandemic. "We can't keep chasing the virus all the time. We have to test and identify the people upfront those who are symptomatic. That's the reason South Korea got a handle on the pandemic very quickly because of the massive aggressive testing policy that they implemented," Bajaj said.

Even when Maharashtra and other States of India saw a surge in cases, Delhi managed to keep the case count as low as 2,000. Dr Sandeep Nayar, Senior Director, Centre of Chest and Respiratory Disease, BLK Super Speciality Hospital, tells you why things have gotten worse now.

"There are many factors, one of which is overcrowding. Now that all the markets are opened, people are out there and not following any social distancing norms or proper hygiene. If you see the scenario outside, people are climbing on each other. Not even 10 per cent of the people are wearing their mask properly. It is something that has troubled us. It goes without saying that this has contributed in the rising cases," Nayar explains.

The second reason is that because of the pollution the symptoms are getting worse. Earlier patients with mild symptoms were opting for home quarantine, but now COVID along with pollution is resulting in worsening of the symptoms and patients are rushing towards the hospital.

He believes that the high cases are not only a result of aggressive testing in the State. "States like UP have also increased the testing rate. Our positivity rate has gone up to 13 per cent. Aggressive testing is happening but then about 25 days back, the occupancy had come down to 70-80 per cent. Now things have gone from bad to worse and we had to add more beds. It is not only because people have tested positive, but because they are in a bad shape and have to be rushed to the hospital," Nayar tells you.

He adds the increasing mortality rate in Delhi can be attributed to the severity of the COVID-19 symptoms. "We are witnessing about 100 deaths

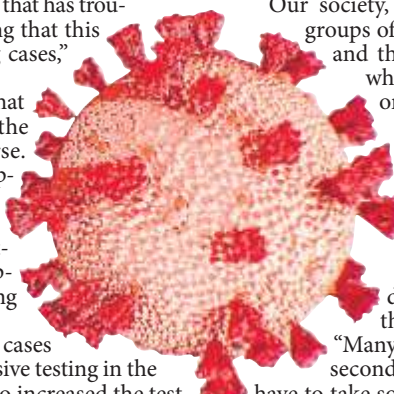
everyday. This is not acceptable by any means. The severity of symptoms have increased and people are not getting beds easily. The patient is moving from one hospital to another in search of a bed, this too and fro will surely make their symptoms worse. We are worried about this situation," he said.

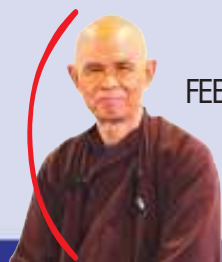
The new rules implemented by the Delhi Government should help in curbing the cases. "These regulations should help. Initially, there were a limit of only 50 people in marriages. But then they removed it and now they have come back to it again. They have realised their mistake," he said.

Our society, Nayar says, is divided in two groups of people. One, who wears masks and the others who don't. "The ones who wear masks think that the later ones are fools and vice versa. They think that just because of one disease they will not wear a mask. It is only when they suffer from it they realise its severity. It is just that they learn the hard way," he said.

When can Delhi expect a decrease in the cases, Nayar says, that we can only hope for it. "Many European countries went for a second lockdown. Who knows we too have to take some stern steps. I am not saying we should go for a lockdown, it is purely the Government's call. But some strict steps should be taken to tackle this situation. Though, the Government has recently revised some rules, they have to be very strict and make sure that they are also implementing it. Just announcing won't make a difference," he said.

Lastly, he has a request to make to the general public. "Masks are a must. Take care of yourselves. Keep your body hydrated. Eat fresh fruits and vegetables. Avoid junk food," he said.

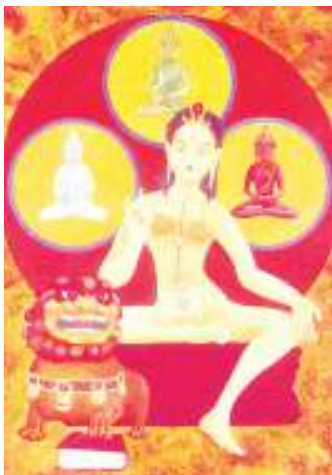

Mind balance is the key

Someone concerned about not being able to contain his wavering mind and habit tendencies, despite serious efforts towards that end, connected with me for necessary guidance. "Sir, for almost a decade now, I have been religiously pursuing Yoga-*asana* and meditation as guided by two acclaimed teachers in the field. So far, I have been able to just identify my fault lines. I have been trying to address them, with no sign of tangible success in immediate future. My monkey like mind keeps randomly flirting with varying thoughts and ideas, and so I fail to do justice to my priority preferences. I don't know how to go about further. Kindly guide."

"Well, the purpose of spirituality is to understand the living realities of life, which when absorbed in the deep realms of mind help in making reasoned choices in life and conduct with ease and comfort. What is the fun in pursuing spiritual process, if it has not helped reform your thought process?" I asked. "Remember, all actions on your part, be it pursuing spiritual process or targeting material desires are conducted by mind. Better, give me an account of how you are pursuing the process so that the

missing link in the process could be figured out," I said. Looking at the account he shared, it appears that he keeps chanting *mantra* with focus on his energy centres. So, he has been mechanically working on energy plane. He, however, has cared the least to work upon his thought process. He has been reading many books written by realised people for necessary guidance, which makes him academically aware. As the world got busy battling the effects and impact of the virus, hackers saw this as an opportunity to exploit new vulnerabilities that emerged from a large numbers working from home, writes **AJAY SINGH**, as he explains various cyber risks faced by individuals and groups and suggests ways to tackle them

The Covid-19 pandemic has led to lockdowns across the world and made working from home an inevitable necessity. While this allows businesses to remain operational, it has exposed organisations to several new risks, particularly for those who fail to take the proper precautions. Even as the world got busy battling the effects and impact of the virus, hackers saw this as an opportunity to exploit new vulnerabilities that emerged from a large work force working from home.

Various reports around the world indicate a sharp increase in cybercrime even as Covid-19 has caused major disruptions and forced changes in the way we work. During this crisis, there has been a sudden surge in cybercrime in many countries with cybercriminals preying on new factors and vulnerabilities related to information systems that have come into play.

Scams, phishing websites, maps loaded with malware, and spam messages linked to the Coronavirus have been reported the world over. Dominic Raab, the British Foreign Secretary observed in early May that 'There will always be some who seek to exploit a crisis for their own criminal and hostile ends. We know that cyber criminals, and other malicious groups are targeting individuals, businesses, and other organisations by deploying Covid-19 related scams and phishing emails.' Since then cyber threats and attacks have only increased.

The lockdowns have not only made us work from home, but also shop-from-home, study-from-home, bank-from-home, attend meetings from home and so on. Studies have also shown a dramatic increase in the amount of time people are spending on-line. Fortunately, technologies like video conferencing, BYOD (Bring Your Own Device), VPN (Virtual Private Network), and collaborative platforms exist today that enable working from home. However, the exposure to cyber risk has grown exponentially and rather suddenly and existing security standards have been compromised. Cybercriminals have been quick to discover that employees working from home have weaker cybersecurity than when they operate from their offices. They have exploited new weaknesses in the various technologies used and have incessantly launched attacks.

Given that we are spending (and will continue to spend) a major part of our lives on-line, a comprehensive assessment of the cyber risks that we are exposed to as individuals, families, and businesses, is key to survive and thrive.

A large number of organisations have already announced that some office-based employees will be working from home in some form for the foreseeable future and perhaps even permanently. This shift to a work from home environment which initially was

considered as a temporary solution may become a regular practice. This necessitates a complete rethink on cyber risks and involves moving away from traditional cybersecurity approaches. Any policies and protocols related to cybersecurity which were introduced when companies switched to work-from-home may have served them in the short-term, but when it comes to long-term measures, a thorough re-evaluation needs to be conducted. With the easing of lockdown restrictions, when employees will no longer be confined to working from home, the larger questions of dealing with cyber risks of working-from-anywhere will become more relevant. The top of the cybersecurity agenda for individuals, businesses, and governments in the aftermath of coronavirus should therefore be to mitigate cyber risks and build a safer and more resilient cyber environment.

INDIVIDUALS AND CYBER RISKS

We have all been a target of cyber-attacks in some form or the other, for instance phishing attacks, phone calls or SMSs from cybercriminals, among others. They are after your personal data, passwords, social ids, bank information and social contacts... basically anything that can either fetch them a price for your data or can help them launch bigger attacks. Escaping a cyber-attack means that you have been vigilant, prepared or simply lucky enough to avoid one.

There are fortunately many things we can do as individuals to make our online existence safer while working from home or for that matter working from anywhere. Before looking at what we can do, consider the findings of the latest Norton Cyber Security Insights Report which suggests that:

- 30% of people cannot detect a phishing attack and another 13 percent cannot tell the difference between a real message and a phishing email. This implies that four in 10 are vulnerable.
- Eighty-six percent of people said they may have been a target of a phishing incident.
- 70% of consumers wish that their home Wi-Fi network could be made more secure. However, a mere 27% consider it likely that their home Wi-Fi network could be susceptible to attack.
- This goes to show that cyber threats are greatly enhanced by the fact people are largely unaware of the cyber risks that they have to contend with and the counter measures they must adopt to mitigate the risks. Some of the basic things that contribute to maintain better cyber hygiene while working from home are:
 - Instead of using personal devices, company-provided computers and laptops should be used
 - A VPN software can be utilised to connect the organisation network
 - Using different devices for work and leisure

- Stopping remote access unless it is a necessity
- Default passwords should be changed
- Devices and online accounts should have strong passwords. For both personal and business accounts multi-factor authentication wherever available, should be utilised
- Meeting links should strictly not be shared publicly or through social media platforms
- Trusted apps or those recommended by one's employer should be used for work involving collaboration
- Regularly updating operating systems, antiviruses and other applications on computers and other devices
- Home Wi-Fi and admin passwords should be changed regularly, while avoiding open/free Wi-Fi networks
- Cyber-hygiene guidelines as laid out by one's employer should be strictly followed

ORGANISATIONS AND CYBER RISKS

Today, almost all businesses regardless of the industry they are in and their size are vulnerable to cyber-attacks which can happen at any time, without warning. This is true across sectors and geographies. The pandemic has only accelerated the need to implement comprehensive cybersecurity programs after a thorough assessment of existing, new, and emerging cyber risks. The concept of a cyber 'perimeter' which was once confined to the walls of an organisation or a data centre has completely eroded. Security professionals have been forced to abandon the traditional castle-and-moat strategy used so effectively in the past due to the arrival of cloud computing and the use of portable devices by organisations coupled with the integration of personal devices into organisational systems. The cyber perimeter has interminably moved from the walls of the enterprise to what is today a flexible and extended virtual perimeter. This calls for a reassessment of cyber risks and requirements across the following four dimensions:

- **Technology dimension:** securing IT systems, applications, networks, data, and devices
- **People:** employees and others who are users and have access an organisation's system
- Policies, Procedures and Processes that are used to run business operations
- Laws, regulations, and compliance

In the near future as the pandemic continues, there are a few types of cyber-threats companies must specifically be prepared for and safeguard against:

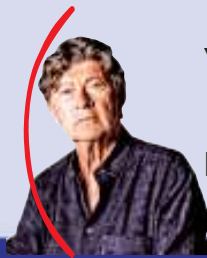
Ransomware: Ransomware is a type of malware that is used to deny access to a computer system or data by encrypting the information and keeping it hostage until the ransom is paid. There has been an alarming rise

in Ransomware attacks in recent months. The deployment methods include socially engineered emails packed with malware, or a weblink that triggers a drive-by download. Some of the ways to protect your systems from Ransomware attacks include changing default passwords at all access points, training employees in identifying suspicious email links, keeping air-gapped up-to-date data back-ups, prohibiting the use of USB drives, and updating all operating systems and software in time.

Phishing: This is a type of social engineering attack where hackers attempt to steal login credentials such as passwords or deceive people in multiple ways into installing malware. Employee training to recognise phishing emails and the use of multi-factor authentication can help to prevent or mitigate damage from a cyber-attack which may result from a phishing exploit.

Business email compromise: During this pandemic, a large number of cases of business email compromise instances have been reported. Here, cybercriminals spoof emails (usually making them look like they are from legitimate sources) to redirect a payment intended for one of the company's suppliers to their own bank accounts. In a work from home scenario, where employees are not in front of each other to seek clarifications, these kinds of cyber-attacks are on the rise. Preventing such attacks calls for a high degree of vigilance and situational awareness among employees (especially those processing payments). Employees must be advised to be careful and alert to such attempts and double check before they initiate action. Organisations must also implement additional controls to prevent any mistakes in this regard.

Bring Your Own Device (BYOD): The use of personal devices like phones, laptops and tablets for office work has become common nowadays. As employees switched to working from home, there are many who also started to use their home devices for day to day work. While companies may have policies for onboarding these devices into the corporate network, there is often laxity and carelessness in observing the protocols. More so, during the pandemic. The absence of specific organisational cybersecurity protocols makes them a cyber risk. If any of these devices are compromised, they can provide hackers with an opening into a corporate's network and data which can be accessed and exploited. If employees continue to work from home and rely on personal devices for the foreseeable future, then a more robust protocol must be established which mandates the installation and updating of security software on personal devices that are used for office work.

Goa and Portuguese colonisation of India are almost synonymous. Few know that Goa has a past that dates back to the saga of Parshuram in Hindu mythology and India's pre-Islamic era, writes **SOMEN SENGUPTA**. UNESCO World Heritage Week was recently celebrated in India from November 19 to November 25

Nestled between the Western Ghats and Sahayadri Hills, and watered by two beautiful rivers named Mandovi and Zuari, this land was long isolated from the Indians. It was isolated not because of any physical feature or inaccessibility, but for its distinctive history and heritage that was seemingly "foreign" for British-ruled Indians. Goa, the coastal territory of Konkani heartland, was always a hidden pearl and a prized colonial nest for Portugal, a country that traded and ruled at many parts of the globe for several centuries.

Goa and Portuguese colonisation of India are almost synonymous. Few know Goa has a past that dates back to the saga of Parshuram in Hindu mythology and India's pre-Islamic era.

Hindu mythology says that this land was created from sea by Parashuram the 6th incarnation of Vishnu. Parashuram, according to mythology, excavated this surface from sea with his arrow and gifted it to the Brahmins. In the ancient times, it was known as Govapuri and later Gomantak.

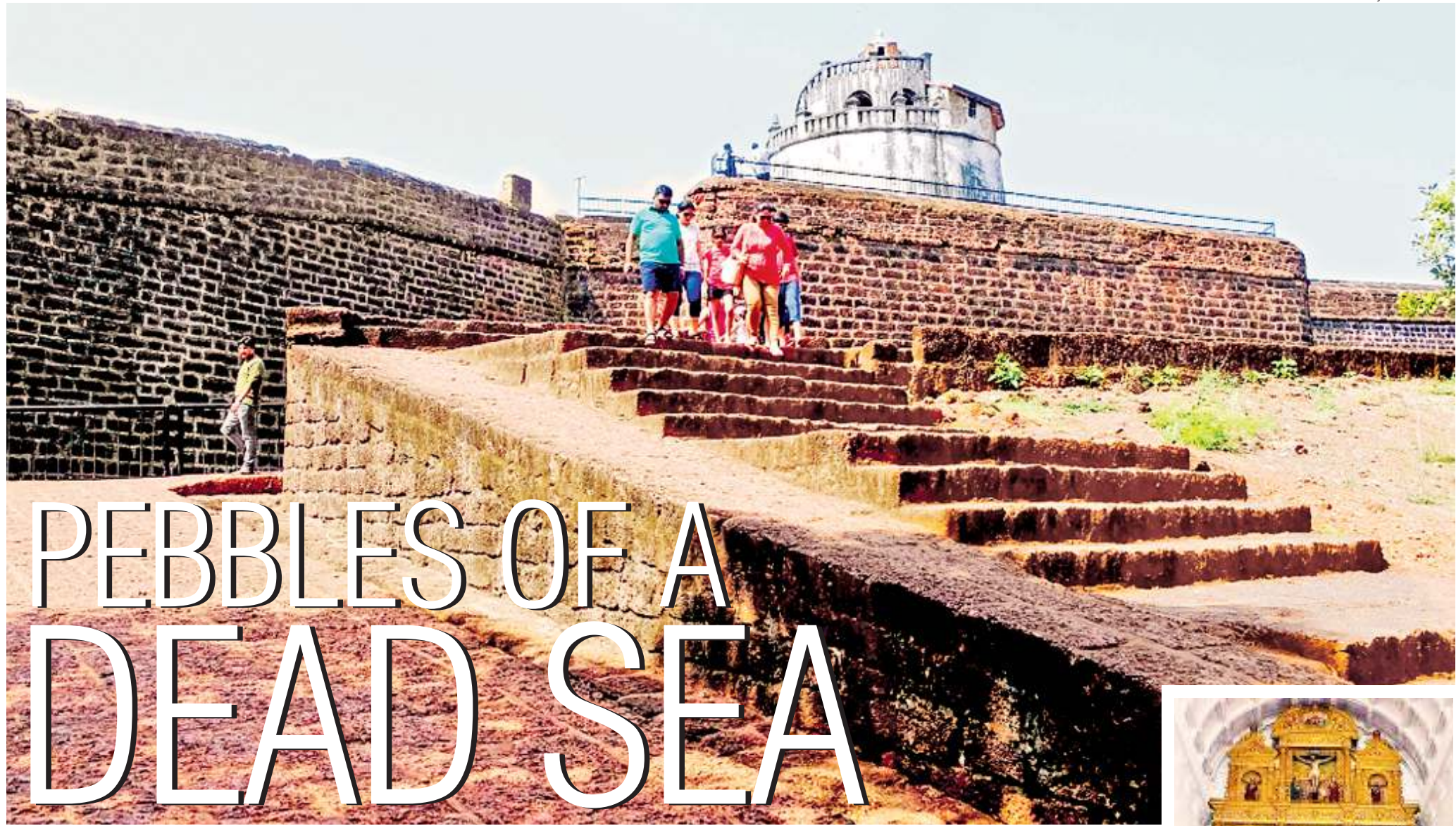
In 3rd century BC, it was a part of Maurya Empire and after that till the end of 750 AD almost all Hindu dynasties of Western India like Satavahanas, Chalukya and Rashtrakuta ruled this land. It fell into the hands of Muslims in 1312 and again in 1370, Hindu king of Vijaynagar conquered it. Hindu rule ended in 1470 when Adil Shah of Bijapur gained Goa.

This was the time when the fragrance of Goa's exotic spices began to attract the Portuguese, who had already arrived in Kerala in 1498, like a magnet. In 1510, 12 years after Vasco Da Gama arrived in Kerala as a trader, another Portuguese named Alfonso De Albuquerque showed his military might and became the ruler of Goa.

Soon after, they took over Diu in 1534 and Daman in 1559. A large part of Bengal was already under the Portuguese and with the new territory, they cemented a foundation of India's Portuguese colonisation. This prevailed till 1961, following which India reclaimed it after a soft military operation.

The conquest of Goa was perhaps the beginning of Portuguese dream to imprint their colonial stamp upon India. As a tyrannical race they soon got into conflict with local Indians, resulting in demolition of temples and forceful religious conversions. This was also the time when they tried to stop the practice of *sati* cult but failed. Soon the need was felt to protect Goa from other European powers, like British and Dutch East India Company, and even from the Maratha warrior, Shivaji, who attacked the Portuguese of Goa.

The need for military competence pushed the Portuguese to go for massive fortification. They got direct sup-

port from Lisbon to expand their activities in India, such as expansion of Christianity, through the missionaries landing from Europe. Soon there was a visible change in the entire demography of Goa and tangible changes in architecture, language, food, dress, music and sports Goa came about. Goa gradually became a unique place within India.

This little Portugal of India gradually boomed in its own style and pace. Majestic churches, forts, printing press and above all a legend named "St Francis Xavier" turned Goa into an unparalleled place to which no other Portuguese colonies of India (be it those in Bengal or Gujarat) came a close match.

Towering among the past relic of that fascinating time is Fort Aguada that was built from 1609 to 1612 and still stands a living testimony at north Goa. This is one of the few forts of India, that was never conquered by enemies.

Built in sturdy brown laterite stone for the sake of combating the British, Dutch and Marathas, this is perhaps the best sample of Portuguese military architecture in India. *Aguada* means water, and this fort once had several sweet water streams flowing inside it, offering a great provision of drinking water both for its inhabitants and sailing ships that used to anchor near it. The fort strategically faces Candolim beach near river Mandovi. The upper part of the fort was used as water station and fort where as the lower part was used to berth Portuguese war ships. The huge water reservoir is assumed to store not less than 23,76,000 gallons of water.

The 1.3 metre thick fortification wall skirts the seashore and ascends the edge of bare rocky island. The massive grand stand of Fort Aguada once had 79 canons in place. A 13 mt high light house built in 1864 is the most iconic landmark of the fort. It o f t e n

appears in many movies. St Lawrence church built in 1630 is situated inside the fort.

Though a large part of the fort is now dilapidated and submerged in water, its remains give enough idea of typical Portuguese style of fortification. Its well planned moats, gunpower room, bastions, light house and escape passage all are still visible and very clearly mirror mystic timeline of the history.

Goa witnessed a silent revolution when India's first printing press was set up there, though accidentally. It is interesting to note that the first book printed in India was not in Bombay or Bengal Presidency, where historically almost all modern wonders landed from Europe.

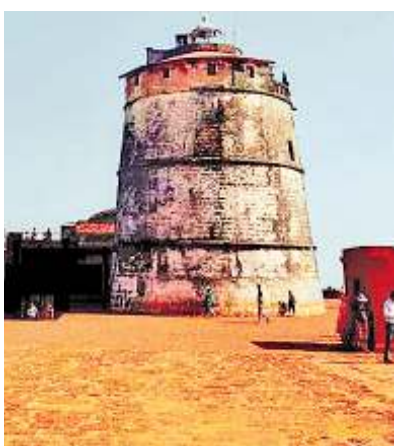
It was in September 1556 when a printing press machine, which was originally meant to be delivered at Abyssinia or Ethiopia, arrived in Goa and placed in St Paul's college. From that machine, for the first time, a Spanish technologist named Juan De Bustamante printed a book of Theology named *Conclusions Philosophic*.

This machine was actually shipped from Portugal to Abyssinia of Africa. When the ship anchored at Goa on its way to Abyssinia, the relations between the two countries had declined as the king of Abyssinia detested the fact that Christian missionary had come to his country. So the machine was abandoned at Goa and it was sheer luck that India, as the first country of Asia, got to see the magic of printing machine. Unfortunately, after 1660, the machine went traceless. Today, a printing museum in Goa tells the story without showing any tangible relics.

Portuguese touch is palpable in every corner of old Goa, especially in its massive churches and cathedrals. Two most significant of those are Se Cathedral de Santa Catarina and Basilica de Bom Jesus. Both are UNESCO world heritage monuments and both are filled with stories of exciting history of Portuguese conquest of Goa and its religious history.

Se Cathedral is perhaps the most celebrated religious building of Goa. This is the largest church of India and even bigger than any in Portugal.

A classical example of Gothic Portuguese Manueline style of architec-



ture, this massive church of 250 ft in length and 187 ft wide was built between 1562 to 1619 during the golden era of Portuguese.

Dedicated to the feast of St Catherine of Alexandria, it was built to commemorate the victory of Portuguese over Muslims in 1510. The church exterior bears a Tuscan touch while the interiors are much of Corinthian. Its extraordinary Iberian façade, colourful mosaic floors, typical European ceiling and exotic wood carvings, all put together, create an outstanding piece of European architecture which is matchless on many counts. The laterite plinth and lime plaster of the church have survived the test of time.

Earlier, the church had two towers. One of which was grounded in 1776. The church has a bell called the Golden bell and a chapel known as Cross of Miracles. It is believed that in 1619, the vision of Christ had fallen there. This legend attracts a huge crowd all across the globe. It is the Cathedral of Arch Bishop of Goa. A convent adjacent to it houses a small yet good archaeological museum.

If Se Cathedral is famous for Cross of Miracle then Basilica de Bom Jesus (a smaller monument) is a bigger crowd puller as it holds the legend of St Francis Xavier, the man who is considered the "greatest figure in Asia after St Thomas the Apostle".

Goa's emergence as one of the holiest place in the Christian world is largely because of its association with a holy relic



of a man who died in 1552 in China.

Born in Spain and sent to India in 1542 by both the King of Portugal and Pope the third, Francis Xavier, spent 10 years in Goa serving leprosy cursed people and spreading the message of Christ. From 1510 to 1540, when Portuguese brutality over Indian masses was at its apex, he landed there as an apostle of peace and first gained confidence of local people by serving them. It was he who attracted a huge mass to Christianity that finally changed Goa to a very different demographic marquee in India.

After his death in China, his body which was still intact after many months of his demise, was brought back to Goa on March 14, 1554 and kept in a casket gifted by Queen of Portugal Maria Sophia in 1560 at Basilica de Bom Jesus. The relic is placed on the right wall of the church and can be seen from a distance.

This attracts thousands of pilgrims across the world. Every 10 years the casket is taken down and people are allowed to get a closer look of the relic.

Over a period of time, however, several distortions have taken place. One finger of its feet was vandalised by a lady in 1554 and the right hand of the body was sent to Vatican in 1914, as demanded by Pope himself. This was a year after Xavier was crowned as Saint.

Basilica De Bom Jesus is a gem of architecture and perhaps, the most famous Portuguese footprint in Goa. Its bare exterior, made of brown laterite, offers an irresistible charm to mingle with history. Built between 1594 and 1605 in late Rene structure, it blends Doric, Ionic, Roman and Corinthian style of architecture. The façade contains Jesuit motif emblem "HIS" an abbreviation of Latin "*Iesus Hominum Salvator*" meaning "Jesus, Saviour of Men". The monument enshrines statue of St Ignatius Loyola and infant Jesus.

Cathedral, fort, lighthouse and old colonial buildings are now open to public and Government alike. The general panorama of old Goa runs like a motion picture visualising a saga much different from India's general history. Even though Portuguese are long gone the profound footprints are alive in every edifice of Parashuram's land.

Working From Home? Beware of that cyber attack

Focussing on the softer aspects of cybersecurity: Thus far, discussions around cyber security have largely focused on IT infrastructure, and the risks that software and hardware can pose to businesses. However, the pervasiveness of cyber threats like Ransomware, stealing of passwords, social engineering attacks like phishing

and Business Email, Compromise among others are forcing businesses to consider the softer and less tangible aspects of cyber security such as awareness, training and a security first culture. A heightened level of situational awareness in the context of responsible online behaviour, maintaining basic cybersecurity standards and

training is also necessary to ensure both new and existing employees are well versed in cyber risks.

GOVERNMENT AND CYBER RISKS

Governments around the world have taken note of the alarming rise in cybercrime in recent months which coincide with the spread of the pandemic.

Indian citizens, commercial and legal entities faced nearly seven lakh cyber-attacks till August in the current year according to Government data. Recognising the rapidly increasing cyber risks, the Government of India issued guidelines for Chief Information Security Officers (CISOs) relating to their key roles and responsibilities for securing

applications/infrastructure and compliance. All Ministries/ Departments of the Central Government, State Governments (and their organisations) and all critical sectors are implementing a 'Cyber Crisis Management Plan for countering cyber-attacks and cyber terrorism'. Mumbai suffered a major power outage on October 12 which lasted several hours.

Today, authorities are investigating whether this was a cyber-attack.

Cyber risk is real, and it is potent. For all digital citizens and entities, it is a reality that will outlast the pandemic. The specific cybersecurity security challenges across industry sectors, governmental systems, public utilities are wide ranging. As cybersecurity experts say, you are never done as far as cybersecurity is concerned.

Cyber risks and threats keep evolving and so should cybersecurity measures and systems. This is one game you have to keep winning to survive and thrive in the digital world.

LOVE FOR CINEMA...

I was always fascinated by cinema. Even as a child, I would watch three to four films a day. Also I would always prefer to act in school. Whenever you act, you are being someone else and that's the only chance for

you to get away from being who you are. It was always very exciting to me. From Sai Baba to superheroes, I donned every role and I always outperformed. Acting, elocution and debating speaking were the only two things that I was at my best and I won appreciation

AUDITIONING FOR THREE YEARS...

Later, I worked with a lot of new filmmakers and with them, one gets to learn something new every day. I had good hits and stunning lows. Now, my career has picked up again from scratch with *Ninu Veedani Nene*. This phase of my career is the most exciting one. It saw an all-time low and then zoomed up beautifully. For the first time in my life, I put my education to use. You will now see a completely different Sundeep Kishan.

LIVING LIFE ON MY OWN TERMS...

For a major part of my life, I always wanted to be an actor, but for a brief period, I wanted to be an IPS officer. Perhaps the thought of becoming an IPS officer took root in my head because of all the films I have watched. I completed one semester in Engineering but began questioning myself if that was what I wanted to be really doing with my life; it did not make sense to me. Later, I did my BBA and MBA. In a way, I have lived my life on my own terms. For most, it might not sound to be rebellious, but coming from a typical Telugu family, particularly with the kind of upbringing I got, it was very rebellious of quitting engineering, choosing BBA, while simultaneously working as an assistant director and giving auditions.

A MEMORABLE EXPERIENCE...

One of the most memorable experiences of my life was after *Prasthanam*. At that time, I had a lot of meetings in Mumbai. For me, being in Mumbai itself was big deal. I was still living off my parents when I got a Bollywood film offer. But going to Mumbai even for the meetings was way too expensive for me. I would take an evening bus and reach Mumbai by the morning. I would then go to a dormitory that charged about Rs 250 to Rs 300 per day, get ready in the common washroom, later take a coffee and request the café guy to keep my luggage safe, then attend the meeting and return in the evening, take my luggage and return either to the dormitory or take the bus back home. All this was because staying in a hotel was too expensive for me. The process itself was very interesting and beautiful. I'm glad I could experience all of this.

A SATISFYING FILM...

A1 Express is the most satisfying film I have done so far. The film is being shot with a bunch of youngsters. I'm the oldest one on set. It's an extremely ambitious film in terms of budget and the film is about sport — Hockey. Considering where my career dipped to a point and I and my team could rise again and pull this film off is highly satisfying. I've shed 14 kilos for the film and I'm enjoying the process. I don't want to talk about the struggles; I always want to talk about the good things. Most recent emotional moment was during *Ninu Veedani Nene*. With no fault of ours, we had to face a lot of hurdles. At some level my managers, Seetharam and Siva, could manage everything. The entire credit goes to them.

THE THREE WOMEN WHO INFLUENCED ME...

The major part of childhood influence was my maternal grandmother Anantha Lakshmi garu, my mother, Kanakadurga, and her elder sister, Padmalatha. My biggest support system to even get my first photoshoot was the money given to me by my grandmother. When I had to get a better photoshoot done, my *pedhamma* gave me money without telling my mom. These three women very strongly influenced me in my life and my sister, Mounica Naidu, does so today.

What do you do in your leisure time: I'm either working too much or just lying down. If I want to get away from all this, I'll visit a new city.
