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## CASE AGAINST KANGANA RANAUT FOR 'COMMUNAL' TWEETS

A Mumbai court has ordered an FIR (first information report) against Bollywood actor Kangana Ranaut for allegedly creating religious disharmony. Ms Ranaut, 33, has been accused of "continuously defaming Bollywood film industry" by a casting director who petitioned the court and said the 'Queen' actor is "creating a communal divide between people of two communities and in the mind of common man" through her tweets. The order was passed on Friday by Bandra Metropolitan Magistrate Jaydeo Y Ghule as the court responded to a complaint by petitioner Sahil Ashrafali Sayyed; the complaint also mentions Ms Ranaut's sister - Rangoli Chandel. "She is well aware that she is a well-known actress and has a big fan base so her tweets will be seen and will reach out to many people," the petitioner underlined.



## INDIA RANKS 94 AMONG 107 NATIONS IN GLOBAL HUNGER INDEX

India ranked 94 among 107 nations in the Global Hunger Index 2020 and is in the 'serious' hunger category with experts blaming poor implementation processes, lack of effective monitoring, siloed approach in tackling malnutrition and poor performance by large states behind the low ranking. Last year, India's rank was 102 out of 117 countries. The neighbouring Bangladesh, Myanmar and Pakistan too are in the 'serious' category but ranked higher than India in this year's hunger index. While Bangladesh ranked 75, Myanmar and Pakistan are in the 78th and 88th position. Nepal in 73rd and Sri Lanka in 64th position are in 'moderate' hunger category, the report showed.



## FRANCE TEACHER WHO SHOWED PROPHET CARICATURES BEHEADED

A history teacher who had shown caricatures of the Prophet Mohammed in class was on Friday decapitated and his assailant shot dead by French police as they tried to arrest him, police and prosecutors said. French anti-terror prosecutors said they were investigating the assault which happened on the outskirts of Paris at around 5 pm (1500 GMT) near a school in Conflans Saint-Honorine, a western suburb of the French capital. According to a police source, the victim was a history teacher who recently discussed caricatures of the Prophet Mohammed in class. Prosecutors said they were treating the incident as "a murder linked to a terrorist organisation" and related to a "criminal association with terrorists".



## GOVT EXTENDS HOME SECRETARY AJAY KUMAR BHALLA'S TENURE

The tenure of Home Secretary Ajay Kumar Bhalla has been extended till August 22, 2021, according to a Personnel Ministry order issued on Saturday. He would have superannuated next month. Bhalla, a 1984 batch IAS officer of Assam-Meghalaya cadre, was in August 2019 appointed as the Home Secretary. The Appointments Committee of the Cabinet has approved the extension in service of Bhalla as Home Secretary beyond the date of his superannuation i.e. November 30, 2020 up to August 22, 2021, it said.

## Telangana won't withdraw case in SC on water sharing

Apex Council decisions may not see the light of day

Giving a new twist to the ongoing dispute between Telangana and Andhra Pradesh, TS Chief Minister K Chandrababoo Naidu has decided not to withdraw the case which TS had filed in the Supreme Court with regard to sharing of Krishna and Godavari waters, according to sources.

Not only this, KCR has now decided to ignore several other crucial decisions taken at the recent Apex Council meeting, sources said.

This runs counter to the undertaking that TS gave at the Apex Council meeting convened by the Centre on October 7 with the Chief Ministers of Telangana and AP. At the meeting, AP Chief Minister YS Jaganmohan Reddy had his way (curiously,



following a meeting the same day with Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah) while KCR's demands were watered down. Fighting a losing battle, KCR had then agreed to withdraw the case in a day or two to enable the Centre to go ahead with its

plan to refer the underlying issues to a tribunal.

This was confirmed by none other than Union Jal Shakti Minister Gajendra Singh Shekhawat, who chaired the Apex Council meeting, while addressing a press conference the same day.

## Remdesivir not reducing Covid deaths: WHO

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

A study coordinated by the World Health Organisation has indicated that remdesivir, along with three other potential drug treatments for the coronavirus, has "little or no effect" on death rates among hospitalised patients.

The interim results from the WHO's Solidarity Therapeutics Trial, said to be the world's largest randomised control trial of coronavirus treatments, were published Thursday.

The results indicated that the remdesivir, hydroxychloroquine, lopinavir/ritonavir and interferon drug treatment regimens "appeared to have little or no effect on 28-day mortal-



ity or the in-hospital course of Covid-19 among hospitalised patients."

Remdesivir is one of the drugs given to US President Donald Trump after he tested positive for the coronavirus two weeks ago.

The randomised study by the WHO was conducted in 405 hospitals across 30 countries on 11,266 patients, with 2750 given remdesivir.

Many people were forced to leave their homes in search of shelter, especially in Bodauppal and Kamalanagar, as the water gushed inside people's homes.

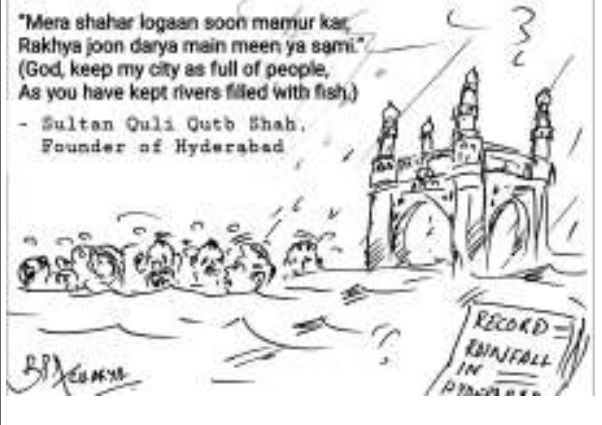

# City suffers due to skewed priorities

When Andhra Pradesh was bifurcated, a major area of conflict centred around the ownership of Hyderabad. Telangana pressed its case successfully with the Centre claiming that a new State without resource-rich Hyderabad was a futile exercise and Andhra ended up as just a guest which could share the capital for ten years. Six years later, Andhra is nowhere near having its capital. The Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC), once counted among the richest urban local bodies, has been pauperised through misplaced generosity in funding tasks outside its mandate. Unlike Delhi, which has Aam Admi Party, and Mumbai, the Shiv Sena; Hyderabad is nobody's baby.

Telangana Rashtra Samithi was averse to contesting GHMC elections in 2009 and lost most of the Assembly seats in 2014, a phenomenon it blamed on "Andhra settlers". However, today, it controls the municipal body and has snatched all powers of decision-making from the GHMC, making a mockery of the 74th Constitutional amendment. The GHMC can hardly be held accountable when unprecedented rains and floods caused death and destruction. The entire responsibility lies on the government, which failed to upgrade the basic infrastructure. The net result was images of people, particularly in the Old City, safeguarding their lives and valuables by clutching rafts made out of barrels, rubber tubes and plastic water tanks to reach higher ground. Contrast this with KCR's

umpteenth promises to transform Hyderabad into a mirror image of Dallas and the Old City to look like Istanbul and you can believe the Opposition's charge that he has led people up the garden path. Let alone fulfilling promises, Hyderabad is sliding downwards. A modest rain of 5-6 cms brings the city down on its knees by causing instant flooding, paralysing traffic and creating more potholes on the already damaged roads. Yet,



the knowledge of officials. There is a marked disinclination to check this dangerous trend, though Hyderabad is home to nearly 30 per cent of Telangana's population. Nalas carrying stormwater run up to a length of over 400 kms in Hyderabad. These are getting narrower due to

encroachments by builders and hutments instead of being widened to absorb huge inflows of water. The number of such illegal structures is estimated at 28,000 but no will has been shown to clear them. Musi becomes a river of sorrow whenever there is flooding as thousands of houses built on the river bed get submerged. The Musi River Front Development Corporation is a non-starter save for appointment of a chairman and allocation of Rs.720 crore. Where Gujarat has built the Sabarmati project in Ahmedabad, a visual treat with flowing waters and leisure boats, and the UP Government the Gomti project in Lucknow, Telangana is faltering. During the past year, KCR has spent considerable time in trying to revamp the cropping pattern, streamlining the Rythu Bandhu subsidy and

undertaking a complete overhaul of Revenue administration for reining in corruption and ushering in transparency in land transactions. His efforts are laudable. But, the focus on city-related matters has dwindled. Municipal Administration Minister K. T. Rama Rao too is overburdened as he holds key portfolios of Industries and Information Technology as well. KCR has rarely if ever toured the city or shown enthusiasm like he did for supervising progress of Kaleswaram lift irrigation project or renovation of Yadadri temple. Not even in the wake of the floods. This has created an impression that government's priorities are skewed. There is money for building a new Secretariat and the Yadadri temple, both at huge cost, but none for the city infrastruc-

ture. Hyderabad's image has transformed from a city of biryani and pearls to that of a software hub but not its facilities to cater to a population of 1.20 crores. Consequently, the new city comprising Hi-TEC City, Gachibowli and Financial District, home to software giants like Microsoft and Google, has become susceptible to traffic jams and floods. The floods may be the right time for the government to convert an adversity into an opportunity. It must prioritise long-term projects like rehauling the drainage system, protecting water bodies, clearing them of encroachments and seeking the Centre's help for speedy completion. The TRS government enjoys an unprecedented majority in the Assembly. It need not be in a perpetual state of electioneering and seeing people as voters when infrastructure is crying for development. Fantasising about foreign cities or obsessions with pet ideas and projects too must end.

## Bitter times for sweet lemons farmers

Sweet lemon farmers have sustained Rs 150 crore losses during the season, which is drawing to a close by October-end, for want of MSP for the produce. The sweet lemon farmers sustained losses as the markets in the north - Delhi, Haryana, Punjab and Uttar Pradesh - are not functioning to their full capacity for the past several months on account of the pandemic. Officials estimated that the sweet lemon yield in the district during the last summer would be at least 52,000 tonnes as the area under the crop in the state was put at 50,000 acres. The erstwhile Nalgonda district accounts for maximum area under the crop. In fact, 90 per cent of the harvested sweet



lemon is exported to the northern India under normal conditions. But, the total exports to the North was not even 10,000 tonnes this year. The traders used to procure sweet lemon from here at the

rate of Rs 40,000 per tonne. The total volume of the trade during the season would have been at least of the order of Rs 200 crore under normal circumstances. The farmers are lamenting that no trader is

coming forward to buy sweet lemons at Rs 20,000 a tonne. There were occasions when the farmers had to make a distress sale of sweet lemons at the beginning of the season by selling a tonne between Rs 4,000 and Rs 8,000. The first ever sweet lemon market set up for the first time in Nalgonda district could not ensure the farmers to get remunerative price

for their produce. Therefore, the farmers inclined to sell sweet lemons to the traders coming from Northern India and those from Hyderabad instead of selling their fruits at the exclusive market for sweet lemons. It may be recalled that the troubles of sweet lime (mosambi) farmers, which began some three years ago, have now doubled up owing to the lockdown. As against its usual price of Rs 30 per kg to Rs 35 per kg, sweet lime is now priced at around Rs 15 per kg. The farmers claim that the sweet-lime orchards were being neglected over the years by the Horticulture and Marketing Departments. Its cultivation, which was spread over 3 lakh acres three years ago, has now reduced to just around 90,000 acres.

## Remdesivir not reducing Covid...

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"No study drug definitely reduced mortality (in unventilated patients or any other subgroup of entry characteristics), initiation of ventilation or hospitalisation duration," the authors of the study wrote. Randomised controlled trials are considered the "gold standard" of clinical studies because they more effectively eliminate bias. However, the WHO study has not yet been peer reviewed, which means it has not been independently evaluated by other experts. The WHO's findings come a week after drugmaker Gilead Sciences published the final data on its own large-scale trial of remdesivir. Gilead originally developed remdesivir to treat the Ebola virus. The study, of 1,060 patients hospitalised with Covid-19, found that remdesivir contributed to significantly-reduced mortality among those in the early stages of receiving oxygen support. However, it did not find a statistically significant reduction in death rates across the entirety of patients treated in the trial.

## Telangana won't withdraw case in SC on water sharing

Shekhawat then said, "With regards to sharing of water of Godavari and Krishna between the two states, the Chief Minister of Telangana has agreed to withdraw the case the State has filed in the Supreme Court to enable the Centre to move forward on referring the water sharing issues to the tribunal under the Inter-State River Water Dispute Act 1956 after taking due legal opinion." Noticeably, there has been no move on this front by the Telangana government even 10 days after the Apex Council meeting on withdrawal of the case. "When Irrigation Department officials approached the Chief Minister on the decisions taken at the Apex Council meeting and sounded him about withdrawing the case from the Supreme Court, the CM directed the officials not to withdraw the

case until he takes a 'final decision' on the issue," sources added. KCR strongly believes that there is no need for setting up a new tribunal for Godavari in the present circumstances as Telangana already has water allocation of 967 TMC. Further, if the TS government agrees to the setting up of a new tribunal at this juncture, it would be forced to share water with other states due to which TS will be a loss. Even in the case of setting up a new tribunal for Krishna, KCR had asked officials to go ahead only after the government receives the minutes of the Apex Council meeting. It was also decided at the meeting that TS and AP governments would submit DPRs (detailed project reports) of all the projects taken up on Krishna and Godavari since the bifurcation of AP -- i.e. in June 2014. KCR now reportedly asked officials to submit DPRs of

projects only if the Centre says they are old and not new projects, considering that Telangana had only redesigned the old projects to meet its changing water needs for irrigation and drinking water purposes. At the meeting, it was decided to also notify the jurisdiction of both Krishna River Management Board and Godavari River Management Board, though KCR had strongly opposed it. "The Centre will go ahead with notifying the jurisdiction of both KRMB and GRMB. The Telangana Chief Minister dissented on this but as per the APRA-2014, no consensus is needed and hence the Centre will notify it," Shekhawat had said. KCR has now reportedly taken a decision to agree to such notification of the jurisdiction only after water sharing is finalised between all the riparian States by the Brijesh Kumar Tribunal.

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However, if an adult stays with more members, then they cannot go over to someone else's household to spend a night. ## New rules for Bathukamma, courtesy Corona

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Director of Public Health Dr G Srinivas Rao said: "We are advising people to restrict celebrations to their home. When they are doing physical activity, while walking or jogging, we ask them to ensure six feet distance, but for Bathukamma, it is done in open places and is a little bit crowded. Bathukamma cannot be played by maintaining physical distance. So, we are advising them to wear a mask and play as it is not that much strenuous work". Dr Srinivas Rao said, "Bathukamma started on Friday and feedback from districts is that 'it is not happening like before', evidently people are serious about avoiding infection. We are ensuring they wear masks, wash hands

frequently, and play in smaller groups. Mass gatherings are strictly not allowed. We witnessed what happened in Kerala due to Onam and don't want people to repeat it here". City-based doctor Dr G Abhilash said, "Normally it is not advised to wear masks when doing high-intensity exercises like running and jogging. This is because while exercising we breathe more air and so lungs have to work harder. Mask restricts the flow of air into our lungs, which will make you feel breathless and tired. In case of Bathukamma celebrations, women can wear a mask, but keep it low-key exercise. If women are already suffering from some underlying health conditions like asthma or heart disease, it is not recommended to wear mask and stay indoors."



# Fractures during Covid pandemic: Elderly patients face greater risks

While the Covid pandemic has led to a significant reduction in the load of fracture patients among the younger population, the incidence of fragility fractures among the aged emerged as an area of concern, say the doctors.

There are reported instances of mortality among elderly patients who failed to receive timely medical intervention for fractures suffered during the lockdown and subsequently.

According to them, there is an urgent need to enhance awareness about the need to handle fractures to elderly people at the earliest. Many people are scared to step out these days, more so to visit a hospital. But, unless aged people



who suffer a fracture due to fragility or a fall receive timely care, the impact could be devastating, physically and mentally.

Hip fractures in the elderly

co-morbidities such as diabetes, hypertension, COPD, and obesity are severely affected by associated infections, due to reduced functional reserves and weakened immune systems.

Such patients should be operated as soon as they are medically optimised.

"There is a significantly higher risk of mortality in elderly patients with fractures and hence they should only be operated in a facility with robust intensive care.

Delay in ensuring right treatment could result in a permanent disability or even worse among the aged.

Not just physical, such incidents could leave a strong negative impact mentally, hence, it is strongly recommended that old-aged people are taken to

hospital without much ado and given proper treatment," said Dr Sree Sowjanya Patibandla, HOD & Consultant Emergency Medicine Physician, Continental Hospitals.

According to Dr. Satheesh Kumar Kailasam, Group Director - Emergency Response, Medicovert Hospitals, traumatic injuries are a leading cause of disability, and the ones caused to the brain leave patients exceptionally debilitated.

"When it comes to aged people, the impact is devastating in most cases.

Hence, ensuring treatment within the 'golden hour' of the incident is a must. Delayed response at times is as good as no response and it could be too late even for the medical fraternity to rectify the damage."

# GHMC continues drive to raze weak structures in city

Hyderabad suffered the brunt of the damage as the city received record-breaking rainfall that brought it to its knees. The city witnessed monsoon fury that inundated roads, flooded houses, toppled and swept away vehicles.

Several houses were inundated over the past three days. Due to the structures being underwater for very long time, there are chances of weakening of structure. To avoid any further building collapses and wall collapses, the Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC) officials are directed to visit the inundated colonies and identify weak buildings which are in dilapidated condition due to weakening of structure. The officials were told to ensure that no one occupies the building.

During the last 5 days, as many as 49 dilapidated structures have been demolished



and a total of 65 inmates living in 15 dilapidated structures were rehabilitated. So far during this monsoon, out of 531 dilapidated structures, 176 structures are demolished and 109 structures have been repaired.

In addition to above, 35 persons who were residing along Musi River near Mangalhat were rehabilitated.

Stating that the special drive for action on dilapidated structures is being continued,

GHMC Commissioner Lokesh Kumar said.

"In case of most dangerous structures, advance precautionary measures are taken such as vacation of inmates, seizure of building, barricading around the structure and display of notice cautioning public not to move around the structure."

Lokesh urged citizens to cooperate with GHMC and also come forward to inform of any structure in danger.

### UoH faculty invited to speak at two-day ICWA-SAU webinar

Prof. Aparna Rayaprol and Prof. Pushpesh Kumar of the Department of Sociology at the University of Hyderabad (UoH) were invited to speak in one of the sessions in a two-day webinar WOMEN AND POWER jointly organised by the Indian Council of World Affairs (ICWA) and South Asian University (SAU) on Women and Power on October 15 and 16, 2020.



Prof. Aparna began the session by tracing the history of how women migrants have been represented, she said, "Either they are mentioned as migrants' wives or are ignored." Further, she explained her research findings on immigrant women. She said that many first-generation migrant Indian women in America are doctors, engineers, etc. Mentioning about the migrant women from Hyderabad, she said these migrant women are no more dependent migrants but noteworthy contributors to development.

### Dr Reddy's to conduct clinical trials for Russia's Corona vax



Hyderabad-based Dr. Reddy's Laboratories Ltd and Russian Direct Investment Fund (RDIF), Russia's sovereign wealth fund, on Saturday announced that they have received approval from the DCGI to conduct an adaptive phase 2/3 human clinical trial for Sputnik V vaccine in India. Earlier Dr Reddy's and RDIF planned to conduct only a phase III trial of the vaccine, but the SEC of the CDSCO asked Dr Reddy's to conduct a seamless Phase II and III clinical trial in India, instead of just a phase III study. This is because the safety and immunogenicity data in overseas phase I or II studies was small and there was no data available on Indian subjects. So, as per the new agreement, India will now carry out an adaptive phase II and III human clinical trial involving 1,500 participants, RDIF, which is marketing the vaccine abroad.

### Web option for seats through EAMCET counselling begins

The web options process for choosing engineering seats through the Telangana State Engineering, Agriculture and Medical Common Entrance Test (TS EAMCET) 2020 counselling is all set to commence from Sunday. This year, candidates can choose seats in new courses, including Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning, Data Science, Internet of Things, Networks, Cyber Security, and Software Engineering. While the web options process is commencing from Sunday, a nod on number of seats in the new courses is awaited till the last inputs received on Saturday. Last year, 64,709 seats were available under convener quota in 183 engineering colleges across the State. "We have not received government orders on number of seats available in the new courses. The web options will commence from Sunday," an official said. So far, 55,812 candidates registered and booked slot for certificate verification and the last date for registration, payment of fee and slot booking is October 19.



### UoH students protest against cut-off norms for admissions

Seeking removal of the common cut-off mark for MPhil and PhD admissions, the University of Hyderabad (UoH) Students' Union on Saturday staged a protest on the campus. They also demanded that candidates be called for interviews in the ratio of 1:6. According to the union, candidates were shortlisted by the varsity for MPhil and PhD interviews by defining a minimum 50 per cent for general/EWS categories and 45 per cent for the SC/ST/OBC/PWD categories, citing the UGC guidelines. Students said the cut-off mark would exclude several students particularly from marginalised communities from admissions. Even before interviews were conducted, 71 seats were left vacant. Of the total vacant seats, 64 were under the reserved category, they added. "The releasing of shortlisted candidates for interview by the university is condemnable and discriminatory as it left 71 seats vacant even before interviews. After interviews, there will be more vacant seats."



# Arvind Kumar takes a stock of Himayath Sagar, Osman Sagar

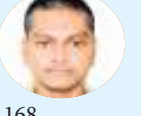
### 190 TSWREIS students qualify

# Rains take a toll on standing crops

Standing crops in 4,071 villages in 348 mandals of 27 districts of the state have been damaged affecting at least 4 lakh farmers. The loss of crop is estimated to be around Rs 2,000 crore. Standing crops in an extent of 7.35 lakh acres have been damaged with crop prospects in them is put at less than half the normal harvest.

According to a preliminary report sent to the government by the Agriculture Department, Yadadri-Bhongir district accounts for crop loss in 47,808 acres, while Siddipet district accounts for loss of crop in 65,925 acres and Mahabubabad district reports crop loss in 4,210 acres.

To be able to get investment subsidy from the Centre for the crop loss, the Agriculture



Department has to send a detailed report listing the loss of crop from land holding wise. The department has been making arrangements to obtain details from the farmers once the disaster management department gives its green signal to do so. Medak district accounts for maximum num-

ber of 54,747 farmers sustaining loss, while Khammam district accounts for losses to 53,985 farmers.

The Agriculture Department reports indicate loss to crops damaged in 7.35 lakh acres in the rains that lashed the state during the past one week. The rains affected crops in 4 lakh

acres in July, August and September. The official accounts of crop loss then are not included to the state government in its latest report.

Will the government procure the discoloured paddy due to the incessant down pour? A clear picture is yet to emerge. The quantity of such paddy would be around 2 lakh tonnes. Only after drying the harvested paddy, the extent of discoloured paddy would be able to be estimated. The Civil

Supplies Department will not lift paddy if the moisture content exceeds 17 per cent.

The officials of the department say they are helpless in this regard unless the state government relaxes guidelines. To what extent the state government will be able to come to the rescue of the farmers could not be predicted now. Only the time will tell the support the farmers will be able to get from the government or otherwise.

## Cong, BJP did nothing for people, says Harish Rao

he also holds the Irrigation portfolio. He said that the damage was so enormous that it would hit the water supply to the farmers in that Ayacut.

## Rain-hit ryots assured of all support

Transport Minister P Ajay Kumar has told the farmers who lost crops due to rains not to lose heart and assured all possible help from the State government.

The minister along with Sathupalli MLA Sandra Venkata Veeriah inspected roads, tanks and standing crops damaged due to rains in Sathupalli, Vemsoor mandals in Khammam district on Saturday.

Ajay Kumar noted that every farmer who suffered loss due to cyclonic rains would be helped by the government. He said the irrigation and roads and buildings officials were already told to take up works to repair damaged canals, tanks and roads in the district.

He said Sathupalli mandal has received a record rainfall of 18.6 cm rainfall and Vemsoor recorded 17.8cm rainfall on Oct 13 which was the highest

rain recorded in the district in this season. As a result widespread was caused in the Sathupalli Assembly segment. Ajay Kumar informed that the agriculture and revenue officials were already told to start crop loss assessment. As soon as the loss reports were submitted to the government steps towards paying compensation to the affected farmers would be taken.

He further said arrangements for paddy and cotton procurement were underway. About 438 centres would be set up for paddy procurement while 13 centres were being established by the Cotton Corporation of India for cotton procurement. The number of sectors increased to eight. Ajay Kumar inspected Bethupalli tank left canal and feeder channels in Sathupalli, low level causeway at Adasarlappa village, tanks and irrigation canals in Vemsoor damaged due to recent rains.

## TS reports 1,451 new Covid cases

Telangana registered 1,451 new Coronavirus cases, taking the state's tally to 2.2 lakh, even as 1,983 more patients recovered from the infection, officials said on Saturday. Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC) area accounted for the highest 235 new cases in the past 24 hours, followed by Rangareddy district at 104, Medchal Malkajigiri at 101, Bhadradi



Kothagudem at 92, Nalgonda at 84 and Khammam at 71.

Other districts where new cases were reported include

Karimnagar (65), Siddipet (64), Warangal Urban (55), Suryapet (37), Nizamabad (32), Rajanna Sircilla (30), Jagtial (29), Peddapalli (28), Medak (25), Nirmal and Wanaparty (24 each), Vikarabad and Nagarkurnool (22 each). However, nine more patients died, raising the statewide COVID death toll to 1,265. In all, 55 per cent patients died due to comorbidities and 45 per cent due to Covid alone.

## Srisailem project gates lifted as inflows rise

Officials of Srisailem project lifted 10 gates of the project to a height of 33 feet to discharge 6.50 lakh cusecs through the project's spillway in to Nagarjuna Sagar Project.

The project is receiving heavy inflows on account of heavy rains in the upper reaches of the project in Karnataka and on account of discharging flood water into Jurala and Tungabhadra projects. The project officials have been discharging the flood water after producing hydel power through the right and left canal bank power houses. As a precautionary measure, three feet of water was discharged from the project. The FRL of the project is put at 885 feet. As against the FRL, the water level in the project reads as



882.3 feet. Meanwhile, the NSP has received an inflow of 5.28 lakh cusecs of water as on Saturday morning. The officials have lift the 18 crest gates of the project up to a height of 10 feet to discharge 4.91 lakh cusecs from the project. The discharge of flood water is put at 29,063 cusecs through the main hydel power station of the project and 3575 cusecs

through the power house of the project. Against the 590 FRL of the project, water level measured in it is put at 588.8 cusecs. Meanwhile, farmers protested at Nagireddipet mandal demanding that water from Nizamsagar project be released to save the submerged paddy crop in Nizamsagar backwaters at Nagireddipet and Yellareddy mandals.

## Theatre operators adopt wait and watch approach

In spite of the Centre giving its nod to open cinema theatres across the country, the theatres in the state did not open as the state government has to issue orders locally giving permission to resume activity. The Ministry of Information and Broadcasting had released an extensive list of SOPs including model seating arrangement and staggered show timings for the same. However, the exhibitors are also not keen to open the theatres pending resolution of their demands by the state government.

They have been demanding deferment of payment of electricity charges for the lockdown period, increase in the maintenance costs of theatres, permission to collect parking fees in single theatres among other things. The exhibitors association has decided to go ahead with the resuming of exhibition of cinemas only after a clear



picture emerges on these issues.

However, are Hyderabadis running to the theatres just yet? In the run up to the Dasara weekend, the big movie producers are choosing to play the wait-and-watch game, even as the multiplex and single theatre owners try to cut their losses. The jury is still out on whether to book the movie ticket. Many hard-core movie goers cannot wait to watch their stars on the big screen again. However, other movie enthusiasts want to wait out the pandemic

before they feel confident to venture into a movie hall again.

Karnataka, Gujarat, Bengal, UP, Bihar, Delhi and some other states have resumed exhibition of cinemas from October 14. The Telangana Cinema Exhibitors' association secretary Govindraj has exuded confidence that the state government will respond on the association's demands as early as possible.

It may be recalled that cinema halls in several parts of the country reopened earlier this

week after seven months in the shadow of the pandemic. Theatres and multiplexes, closed since March because of the coronavirus crisis, recently allowed to resume operations as per guidelines issued under Unlock 5. Fifty per cent occupancy, staggered show timings, social distancing, thermal screening, adequate protection gear for the staff, and com-

pulsorily providing phone numbers for "contact tracing" are some of the changes moviegoers will see.

At the food and beverages section, all food will be sterilised under UV rays in a machine for eight minutes before being handed over to the customer. Popcorn containers will completely be covered with paper lids. Despite the extra arrangements, the cinema hall officials claimed that prices of tickets and food will remain the same as pre-COVID rates. A recap of Covid-safety norms and punishment, in case they are not observed, would become a part of the customary pre-and-post-show advertisements. Floor and seat markers for social distancing, thermal scanning and "respiratory etiquettes" are among the changes patrons will have to bear in mind after they are allowed entry on being cleared as "asymptomatic".

**AIMPLB will work towards building public opinion**

**Lucknow:** The All India Muslim Personal Law Board (AIMPLB) will work towards building public opinion against a uniform civil code, saying in a country like India with different cultures and civilisations such a move "will not be justified". A decision to this effect was taken in the executive meeting of the board held virtually a few days ago. AIMPLB member Zafaryab Jilani told PTI on Saturday that "important decisions pertaining to common civil code and the Babri mosque demolition case" were taken in the meeting on October 11 and October 13. "The board members are of the view that in the agenda of the ruling BJP, now only common civil code is left, and they will proceed in this direction," he said. Jilani said that the board will establish contact with different sections of the society, which could be affected in case the common civil code is implemented, and try to build a consensus and public opinion against it.

**Govt effectively responding to flood situation, says CM Mysuru:**

**The Karnataka government was effectively responding to the havoc caused by heavy rains and floods successively battering the state, with relief and rescue work on in affected areas and was confident of revival of the economy, Chief Minister B S Yediyurappa said here on Saturday.** "Several districts of north Karnataka have been affected by floods and I assure the people there that the government is there with them. Prime Minister Narendra Modi spoke to me last night and took stock of the situation. He has assured all necessary assistance from the centre," he said. Speaking at the inaugural of the Dasara festivities, Yediyurappa said he has reviewed the situation with Deputy Commissioners of flood hit districts and Minister R Ashoka was touring the regions.

# ‘Peace, tranquillity along LAC deeply disturbed’

External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Saturday said peace and tranquillity along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) is "deeply disturbed" and this is obviously impacting the overall relationship between India and China. Jaishankar made these comments against the backdrop of the over five-month-long border standoff between India and China in eastern Ladakh where each side has deployed over 50,000 troops. The Sino-India boundary question a very "complicated" and difficult issue, he said at a webinar on his book The India Way', giving a historical perspective to development of the relationship between the two neighbouring countries in the last three decades.



The external affairs minister said the relationship between India and China, which was "very difficult", was normalised since late 1980s through a plethora of initiatives like trade, travel, tourism, and societal activities on the premise of peace and tranquillity along the border.

"It is not our position that we should solve the boundary question. We understand that it is a very complicated and difficult issue. There have been many negotiations at different levels... That is a very high bar for a relationship," Jaishankar said.

"I am talking about a much more basic bar which is that there must be peace and tranquillity along the LAC in the border areas and that has been the case since the late 1980s," he added. "Now, if peace and tranquillity is deeply disturbed, then obviously there will be an impact on the relationship and that is what we are seeing," he said referring to the border situation in eastern Ladakh. Jaishankar said both China and India are rising and assuming "bigger" role in the world, but the "big question" is how the two countries find an "equilibrium". "That is the basic case I addressed in my book," the minister said, adding he completed the manuscript of the book in April, before the border row erupted in eastern Ladakh.

## Rape case filed against actor's son

Mumbai Police have registered a case against veteran actor Mithun Chakraborty's son Mahaakshay and the former's wife Yogita Bali on a complaint of rape and cheating filed by a woman, an official said on Saturday. The case was registered at Oshiwara police station on Thursday night based on the complaint lodged by the 38-year-old woman, he said. "The complainant said she was in a relationship with Mahaakshay Chakraborty from 2015 to 2018 and during that period he had promised to marry her," the official said. "The woman said that during their relationship, she had gone to see Mahaakshay's flat at Adarsh Nagar in Andheri West, which he had purchased in 2015. She said when she went there, the accused offered her a spiked soft drink and forced her to have physical relations with him," he added. "The woman alleged that



when she became pregnant, Mahaakshay asked her to abort the baby and gave her pills," he said. "The woman said she used to ask Mahaakshay about their marriage. But in January 2018, he told her that he cannot marry her, which led to an altercation between them. She said when she called him, his mother Yogita Bali threatened her," the official said. The complainant later went to Delhi with her brother to stay with their family friend.

There, she lodged a complaint against Mahaakshay and his mother Yogita Bali at Begumpur police station in June 2018, he added. The police had registered an offence under section 376 (rape), 313 (causing miscarriage without woman's consent) and others, and the probe was transferred to the crime branch there. A Delhi court later granted anticipatory bail to Mahaakshay and his mother in the case.



## Notification to shut govt-run madrasahs: Assam minister

All government-run madrasahs and Sanskrit tols will be closed in Assam and a notification to this effect will be issued in November, Education Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said on Saturday. The Madrasa Education Board will be dissolved and all state-run madrasahs will be converted into high schools and new admissions will be held for all as regular students, the minister said addressing a press conference here. "The final year students will be allowed to pass out but henceforth all taking admission in these schools will have to study as regular students," he said. The Sanskrit tols (institutes) will be handed over to the Kumar Bhaskarvarma Sanskrit University and these will be converted into centres of learning and research where Indian culture, civilisation and nationalism will be studied, the minister said. "This step has been taken by the government to ensure that students get regular education under the SEBA," he said. The examinations of the madrasahs and the tols are different with students not appearing for the matriculation examination conducted by the SEBA, he said.

## New farm laws an attack on soul of every farmer: Rahul

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Saturday stepped up his attack on the central government over the recently enacted farm laws, and said these are a blatant attack on the soul of every farmer and that such legislations "weaken" the country's foundation. "These three laws are an attack on the soul of every farmer of this country, they are an attack on their sweat and blood. And farmers and labourers of this country understand this," he said. Referring to his "tractor rallies" against the laws during his recent visit to Punjab and Haryana, Gandhi said, "I came to Punjab and Haryana a few days ago and every farmer and labourer know that these three laws are an attack on them."

He said he was happy that the Punjab government has decided to convene a special session of the Assembly on these laws on October 19 where MLAs will "decide about these farm laws". Gandhi was delivering a virtual address at the launch of the second phase of 'Smart Village Campaign' in Punjab. Rs 2,663 crore has been allocated to execute approximately 50,000 different development works under the campaign. Punjab Chief Minister Amarinder Singh, some of his cabinet colleagues were among those present at the virtual launch. Hitting out at the BJP-led central government over the farm laws, Gandhi said, "If we weaken country's foundation, India will be weakened."

"When Congress party fights, we do that to protect and strengthen the foundation. This is the difference between us and the central government.

They talk of the building, but they thrust schemes from the top without talking to the panchayat and the people and their laws weaken India's foundation," he said. "If these laws were in favour of farmers and labourers, then why did the government not allow a debate before these were passed in Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha? Why were they afraid of a debate? Entire country would have seen the debate and decided if these laws are for farmers' benefit," he said. "But in Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha, voice of India's farmers was suppressed. I am happy that in Punjab assembly, farmers, labourers' voice will be heard in the special session," said Gandhi. The three farm bills -- the Farmer's Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Bill, 2020, the Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement of Price Assurance and Farm Services Bill, 2020 and the Essential Commodities (Amendment) Bill, 2020 -- were passed by Parliament recently. Subsequently, President Ram Nath Kovind gave his assent to the bills. The Congress, many other opposition parties and several farmers organisations have been protesting against these

legislations, claiming that these will harm the interests of farmers and benefit corporates, a claim denied by the government. The Centre has asserted that these new laws will be beneficial for farmers and will increase their income. Gandhi said the Centre had launched an assault on Punjab and its farmers with these ill-conceived laws. "Every building has a foundation. If that weakens the building falls. If Vidhan Sabha is the building, Panchayats and Sarpanches are the foundation. If we have to develop Punjab or India, we have to protect the building and the foundation," he said, adding that the smart village campaign was aimed at that. Representatives of all the Punjab village panchayats participated in the virtual launch programme. "When Congress runs a programme, be it MNREGA, Right to Food Act or rural infrastructure programme, we run it through medium of panchayats... because we know if we involve panchayats, programmes can run effectively. If we trust our programmes from the top without involving panchayats and area MLAs, it is bound to fail because it won't involve people," he said.

## Grand Alliance promises jobs to youths

The RJD-led Grand Alliance (GA) on Saturday released its joint manifesto for the upcoming Bihar assembly elections, promising to offer jobs to 10 lakh youngsters and repealing the new farm laws recently enacted by the central government if they are voted to power. Releasing the manifesto titled "Badlav Ka Sankalp" (commitment to change) in the presence of All India Congress Committee (AICC) general secretary Randeep Singh Surjewala and other Mahagathbandhan leaders,

Tejashwi Yadav said their government, if elected, would first approve the process for appointments on about 10 lakh jobs in the government. "Contractual teachers would be entitled for same pay for same work, for which they have been agitating for long," said Yadav, who is the opposition chief ministerial candidate. Assuring the people that the coalition will stand by its commitments, Yadav said that they were not leaders who conveniently forget their promises and that the state has still not been accorded a special status -- a demand echoed

for years by political parties in Bihar. "(Donald) Trump will not come to accord special status to Bihar, which was once promised by the Prime Minister," said Yadav, in an apparent reference to Prime Minister Narendra Modis ties with the US President. Kumar has raised the issue of granting special status to the land-locked Bihar several times, both during the Congress-led UPA and the BJP-helmed NDA- which could bring investment into the state by providing concessions in taxes to prospective indus-

tries. Surjewala said that the first assembly sitting of the GA government would see annulment of the three controversial farm acts that, he alleged, defeat the objectives of green revolution in the state. Nitish Kumar government was the first in the country to do away with the APMC (Agriculture Produce Market Committee) Act in 2006. "If we form the government, under the leadership of Tejashwi Yadav, we will pass a Bill in the first Vidhan Sabha session to scrap the three anti-farm laws.

authority. The Thiruvananthapuram MP and author of several books was speaking at the Symbiosis International University Literary Festival via video-conferencing. "When I was in school, I learnt that the pen is mightier than the sword. Today, I have seen our country, its politics and its discourse. I am no longer convinced it is," he said. "I am sorry to say, but

words and ideas may outlast power and authority. Power and authority in the short term can crush the words," the Congress leader said. "We have seen that a large number of people are under detention for words they have expressed. Currently, people like Varavara Rao, Vernon Gonsalves, Sudha Bharadwaj and Anand Telumbde are under detention for their words.

Those accused in the killing of a 46-year-old man at a meeting attended by senior administration and police officials here will be charged under the National Security Act and the Gangster Act, police said on Saturday, as the hunt continued for the local BJP leader who allegedly shot the man dead. Eight people have been named accused in the incident on Thursday. While police is on the lookout for six people, including local BJP leader Dharendra Pratap Singh, two have been arrested.

Police have also detained five others. Besides the eight accused, the FIR in the case mentions 20-25 unnamed accused. DIG (Azamgarh Range) Subhash Chandra Dubey has announced a cash reward of Rs 50,000 on information leading to the arrest of each of the accused. Dubey said, "A cash reward of Rs 50,000 has been announced on each of the absconding accused. Action will also be initiated under the National Security Act (NSA) and the Gangster Act against the accused." Under the NSA, one can be detained without a charge for up to 12 months if the authorities are satisfied that the person is a threat to national security or law and order.

## Family refuses to conduct last rites of Shaurya Chakra awardee

The family members of Shaurya Chakra awardee Balwinder Singh Sandhu, who was shot dead by two unknown assailants in Punjab's Tarn Taran district, have refused to cremate the body unless the accused are arrested. The 62-year-old Sandhu who fought terrorism in Punjab was shot dead in the district on Friday, months after the government withdrew his security cover. The motorcycle-borne men pumped four bullets into him when he was at his office adjoining his home at

Bhikhiwind. Sandhu's wife Jagdish Kaur Sandhu, told reporters, "The family would not cremate him unless the killers are arrested." She also demanded security cover for her family. "All the family members -- I, my late husband, his brother Ranjit Singh Sandhu and his wife Balraj Kaur Sandhu -- are Shaurya Chakra awardees and this award was given by the Centre for our fight against militancy." "Both the state and Central governments are accountable for the intelligence failure that resulted in the killing of my husband at the hands of terrorists," Sandhu's wife said.

## MP urges Centre to raise Mizo regiment to guard borders

Mizoram's lone Rajya Sabha member K Vanlalvena has urged the Centre to raise a Mizo regiment in the Army or a paramilitary force Mizoram Rifles to guard the state's international borders with Bangladesh and Myanmar. The lawmaker, who is currently camping in Delhi, has recently met Union Defence Minister Rajnath Singh and urged him to initiate steps in this regard, a statement said on Friday. Vanlalvena said Mizos had resisted British rule and two

army regiment or a paramilitary force to guard Mizoram's borders with Bangladesh and Myanmar would not only solve local unemployment issues but

also boost national security. "Mizo youths, with their inborn fighting spirit and strong desire to join security forces, can make the best army regiment or paramilitary force in the country," Vanlalvena said. During last year's agitation against the controversial Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA), Union Home Minister Amit Shah had promised NGOs leaders from Mizoram that the Centre will raise a CRPF battalion comprising Mizo youths, according to a Central Young Mizo Association (CYMA) leader.

# COVID-19 has resulted in largest global economic contraction in 80 years: IMF

The World Bank and the International Monetary Fund said the global economic contraction caused by the ongoing coronavirus pandemic is the largest in the last eight decades, raising the world poverty rate, exacerbating inequalities and damaging long-term economic growth prospects.

The WB and IMF concluded their annual meeting here on Friday, which heavily revolved around the impact of COVID-19.

"The pandemic has resulted in the largest global economic contraction of the last eight decades: it is impacting developing, emerging and developed economies; increasing the global poverty rate; exacerbating inequalities; and damaging long-term economic growth prospects," according to a joint-ministerial communique issued by the two UN-backed institutions.



The associated lockdowns, restrictions and continued uncertainty have caused investments, trade, and remittance flows to plummet, eroded jobs and human capital, kept children out of school, and pressured food and medical supply chains, it said.

The monetary institutions warned that the humanitarian crisis can further exacerbate fragility, conflict, and violence

as well as intensify risks, including in small island states.

The economic crisis is threatening the lives and livelihoods of vulnerable populations, including women-led households, youth and the elderly, refugees and displaced people.

It is also widening gender gaps and jeopardising hard-won development gains and prospects for girls and children

overall, it said.

Commending the World Bank for the speed and scale of its COVID-19 response across countries, the joint communique said that the bank is supporting countries' efforts to strengthen health systems and should continue to do so.

Early this week, the bank had announced a USD12 billion financial incentive to fund a COVID19 vaccine.

Noting that in the restructuring and recovery stages of the COVID-19 response, the bank and the IMF will need to help countries rebuild better, focusing on promoting the building

blocks for an inclusive and sustainable recovery, ensuring affordable energy access and energy security, and addressing the challenges to economic and environmental vulnerabilities, including climate change, the communique said that they look forward to the upcoming Climate Change Action Plan.

To accelerate a resilient recovery centered on jobs and economic transformation, the communique asked the World Bank to provide the knowledge, policy advice, and financial support to help countries strengthen social safety nets

and facilitate the movement of capital and labour toward sectors that will be productive and sustainable in the post-pandemic context, while also providing the innovation needed to open up trade finance for SMEs and confront the challenges of informality.

The joint communique urged the World Bank to support the mobilisation and crowding in of private capital and finance, to create markets and promote investments and quality infrastructure for a broad-based recovery and long-term development.

Supporting the extension of the Debt Service Suspension Initiative (DSSI) by six months and to examine, by the time of the 2021 Spring Meetings of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund, the joint communique said that all official bilateral creditors should implement this initiative fully and in a transparent manner.



## FT MF's schemes generate Rs 8k-cr

Franklin Templeton Mutual Fund has said its six shut schemes have received Rs 8,302 crore from maturities, pre-payments and coupon payments since closing down in April.

Franklin Templeton MF shut six debt mutual fund schemes on April 23, citing redemption pressures and lack of liquidity in the bond market.

"The six schemes have received total cash flows of Rs 8,302 crore as of October 15, 2020 from maturities, pre-payments and coupon payments since April 24, 2020," Franklin Templeton MF said in a statement.

Part of this amount has been utilised to repay borrowings and post repayment, Rs 5,116 crore is available for distribution to unitholders in four cash positive schemes -- Franklin India Ultra Short Bond Fund, Franklin India Dynamic Accrual Fund, Franklin India Low Duration Fund, Franklin India Credit Risk Fund have 40 per cent, 19 per cent, 19 per cent and 4 per cent of their respective assets under management (AUM) available in cash to distribute to unitholders, it said.

This is subject to a successful unitholder vote, the fund house added.

The fund house reiterated that the cash flows received so far are without the ability to efficiently monetise assets, which will only be possible after successfully completing the e-voting process.

It further said the court has completed hearing the arguments on matters related to the six schemes under winding-up and the fund house is now awaiting the judgement from the court.

"Our focus remains on the important task of generating maximum value and returning your monies at the earliest possible time in accordance with the applicable regulations, subject to the decision of the Karnataka High Court," the fund house said.

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## Govt issues notices to Flipkart, Amazon

In a crackdown on e-commerce companies, the government on Friday issued notices to e-commerce majors Flipkart and Amazon for not mandatorily displaying information, including country of origin, about products sold on their platforms.

The notices have been issued by the Department of Consumer Affairs, Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution.

While notices have been issued to Amazon and Flipkart, the department has asked the states to ensure compliance of rules by all e-commerce companies. The two companies did not comment on the issue of notices. The department has asked all e-commerce entities for ensuring compliance of



Legal Metrology (Packaged Commodities) Rules.

Both the companies have been asked to reply within 15 days. "It has been brought into notice that some of the e-commerce entities are not displaying the mandatory declaration on digital platforms required under the Legal Metrology (Packaged Commodities) Rules, 2011,"

the notice said.

In almost similar worded notices, the department said that Flipkart India Pvt Ltd and Amazon Development Centre India Pvt Ltd are e-commerce entities and therefore, they have to ensure that all mandatory declarations be displayed on the digital and electronic network used for e-commerce transactions.

The two companies, as per the notices, have "not provided the mandatory declaration and contravened" the Legal Metrology Act.

Referring to advertisements made by the entities on their respective websites, the notices said that "on examination" of the advertisements "it was found that the mandatory declarations are not mentioned" as per the rules.

The Legal Metrology (Packaged Commodities) Rules provides that an e-commerce entity has to ensure that the mandatory declarations (including the country of origin), except the month and year in which the commodity is manufactured or packed, "shall be displayed on the digital and electronic network used for e-commerce transactions".

## Zydus Cadila gets USFDA nod for drugs

Drug firm Zydus Cadila on Saturday said it has received approval from the US health regulator to market Ursodiol capsules, used to treat primary biliary cirrhosis, in America.

The company has received final approval from the US Food and Drug Administration (USFDA) for the medication in 300 mg strength, Zydus Cadila said in a statement. Ursodiol is in a class of medications called gallstone dissolution agents. It is used to treat people with primary biliary cirrhosis, an autoimmune liver disease.

## Public warned against mischievous activities of MSME Export Council

The MSME ministry on Saturday warned the public not to fall prey to "unauthorised" and "ill-intentioned" activities of MSME Export Promotion Council and clarified that it is not associated with the organisation in any way.

The Ministry of MSME issued a clarification in this

regard alerting the public after taking strong note "of mischievous activities of this organisation projecting itself as part of the MSME ministry". The ministry said it is noticed that certain messages are being circulated in media and social media regarding issuance of appointment letter to the post of 'director' by the MSME Export Promotion Council.

"It is hereby clarified that Ministry of MSME is not associated with the MSME Export Promotion Council in any way. Also, the Ministry of MSME has not authorised any posting or appointment to any post related with this council. The public is informed and advised not to fall prey to such messages or such elements," an official statement said.

## Need to take long-term perspective on debt sustainability: WB President

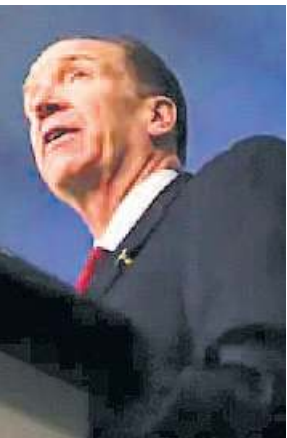
There is need to take a longer-term perspective on debt sustainability, World Bank President David Malpass said on Friday as he sought to consider debt stock reduction to address looming debt crisis.

"I think we need to take a longer-term perspective on debt sustainability," Malpass said in the intervention of Development Committee meeting of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund.

At his request early this year, the G-20 has endorsed a temporary suspension of debt service, which has resulted in 43 of the world's poorest countries benefitting from an estimated USD5 billion in debt service suspension from official bilateral creditors.

In addition, the World Bank had announced a 150 billion in surge financing. Much of it is for the poorest countries and will take the form of grants or low-rate, long-maturity loans.

"The Debt Service Suspension Initiative (DSSI) has



helped us make significant progress on debt transparency, which is critical for increasing high-quality investment," he said.

Looking beyond the DSSI, one must consider debt stock reduction," he said.

"Otherwise there's no light at the end of the debt tunnel for the people in the debtor countries," he added. "The crisis-related lending operations supported by our institutions have put heavy emphasis on short-term financial flows. Those address liquidity needs

but not the solvency crisis facing the world's poor," Malpass said.

For example, reprofiling debt payments addresses liquidity but not solvency. There is a need to strengthen the IMF/WB Debt Sustainability Analyses to use a longer window, he said.

This concern about the debt overhang also applies to the G-20 discussion of a common framework on debt treatment, he said. "It's important that the framework not just kick the can. Given the urgency of the debt crisis, it's urgent to make rapid progress toward debt stock reduction, because debt burdens are crushing recovery and reversing decades of progress on poverty reduction," Malpass said.

Malpass also welcomed the public call of several European shareholders, including Ministers of Denmark, the Netherlands, France, Germany, Spain and Sweden for "the WB and the IMF to deliver a coherent approach to debt restructuring that helps address the looming debt crisis.

#### Gems, jewellery exports may dip 20-25 pc; growth expected by FY22

The gems and jewellery export is expected to decline by 20-25 per cent this fiscal year compared to 2019-20 due to the disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, GJEPC said on Saturday. During 2019-20, the exports stood at Rs 2,52,249.46



crore, according to data provided by the Gem and Jewellery Export Promotion Council of India (GJEPC). "We expect the exports to witness a decline of 20 25 per cent in 2020-21, compared with last year. With demand improving gradually, we should be at our 2019-20 levels next year. Growth will come back only maybe by 2021-22," GJEPC chairman Colin Shah said at the virtual press conference about the closing of 5-day Virtual India International Jewellery Show (IJS).

#### Government approves 14th tranche of electoral bonds

Ahead of the Bihar election, the government on Friday approved the 14th tranche of electoral bonds which will be open for sale between October 19 to October 28.

The Election Commission of India (ECI) accorded 'no objection' from the Model Code of Conduct (MCC) angle on October 15 with certain conditions, a finance ministry statement said. As per the ECI, "no political functionary shall make any reference in this regard during any public speech or communication to the press or public in the constituencies going for poll; and the relevant provisions of Model Code of Conduct issued by the Election Commission shall be strictly followed." The three-phased Bihar election will be held on October 28, November 3 and November 7. Counting of votes will take place on November 10.



#### Bank of Baroda inks pact with Mahindra & Mahindra for finance

To push agriculture finance, state-owned Bank of Baroda (BoB) on Friday said it has entered into a pact with Mahindra and Mahindra for tractor finance business. The lender, through its over 5,000 rural and semi-urban branch network, will provide tractor loan facility to customers of Mahindra and Mahindra. This memorandum of understanding (MoU) will give a boost to agri business and will help farmers in availing hassle-free credit facilities for buying tractors. BoB Executive Director Vikramaditya Singh Khichi said. The tractor financing scheme was first piloted in the UP zone for a year and it has been successful, he said adding that this is being expanded into 11 zones of the bank. The bank has tied up with Gromax under the Mahindra stable as the preferred brand, he added. Besides, he said, the bank is focussing on dairy sector self-help groups and farmer producer organisations for expanding the agriculture finance portfolio.

#### Digital media, news aggregators need to comply with 26pc FDI cap

News aggregators, news agencies which supply information to digital media firms and companies uploading news and current affairs on websites will have to comply with the 26 per cent foreign investment cap, the government said on Friday.



These companies "would be required to align their FDI to the 26 per cent level with the approval of the central government, within one year from the date of issue of this clarification", the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT) said. In August last year, the Union Cabinet approved 26 per cent FDI (foreign direct investment) under government route for uploading/streaming of news and current affairs through digital media, on the lines of print media. A section of industry players and experts had stated that the move to cap FDI in digital media sector to 26 per cent throws up questions that need clarifications.

## DST restructures FIST programme to cater to tech needs

The FIST programme will now be reinvented as FIST 2.0 to orient it towards the goal of 'Aatmanirbhar Bharat' to create research and development infrastructure not only for experimental work but also to cater to theoretical work, ideas and entrepreneurship, said Sanjay Dhande, the chairper-



son of the FIST Advisory Board.

This will create a new paradigm for FIST 2.0, he added.

"The Department of Science and Technology (DST) is restructuring its FIST programme under which it supports scaling up of the network

of infrastructural facilities for teaching and research in universities and higher educational institutions to cater to high-end S&T infrastructural requirements of start-ups and industries," the department said in a statement.

It will also link up pro-

grammes like FIST, Sophisticated Analytical Instrument Facilities (SAIF), and Sophisticated Analytical & Technical Help Institutes (SATHI), all of which are designed to set up science and technology infrastructure centres at department, university, regional and national level, it said.

While on an average of about 8,500 researchers use these facilities in centres spread all over India, industries and start-ups involved in research

and development, technology and product development have to carry out most high-end experiments and testing of technologies from laboratories outside India.

This is because they prefer not to buy equipment and infrastructure which are of limited usage to them and they cannot access most of the high-end science and technology infrastructure set up in the universities and institutions, the statement said.



## The birdman of Assam

He is an ornithologist, mammalogist, an artist, avid photographer and an author. He is also the honorary Chief Executive of the Rhino Foundation for Nature in North-east India and was Deputy Commissioner of Baksa and Lakhimpur districts in Assam. He retired as Divisional Commissioner of Barak valley, Development Commissioner for Hill Areas and Commissioner and Secretary to the Government of Assam last year.

If this was not enough to add to his list of accomplishments, Choudhury is a member of as many as nine IUCN/SSC/BLI specialist groups. Due to his work, at least 12 wildlife sanctuaries and two elephant reserves have been established. He was also instrumental in upgrading Dibru-Saikhowa into a national park, inclusion of Laokhowa and Burhachapori Sanctuaries in Kaziranga Tiger Reserve.

Known as the Birdman of Assam, he was the first to produce books on the birds of different Northeastern State. His studies have contributed enormously to the conservation and awareness in the region.

“I was born and brought up in Nagaland. Back then it was a part of Assam. But later, I ended up finishing my schooling and college from Guwahati. I was always interested in Nature and the diverse wildlife this region has to offer. I used to draw birds from the region which later turned into a scientific study. But I also wanted to be a Civil Servant and hence took the UPSC exam and got selected. As a Government official one can do so much good and that is what I did,” Choudhury says.

He tells you how as an officer in the region he was able to do so much for the conservation of wildlife and get the files moving at a fast pace. Though he agrees that it is not always easy to get things done but since he was an officer, doors that were difficult to open, were wide open for him.

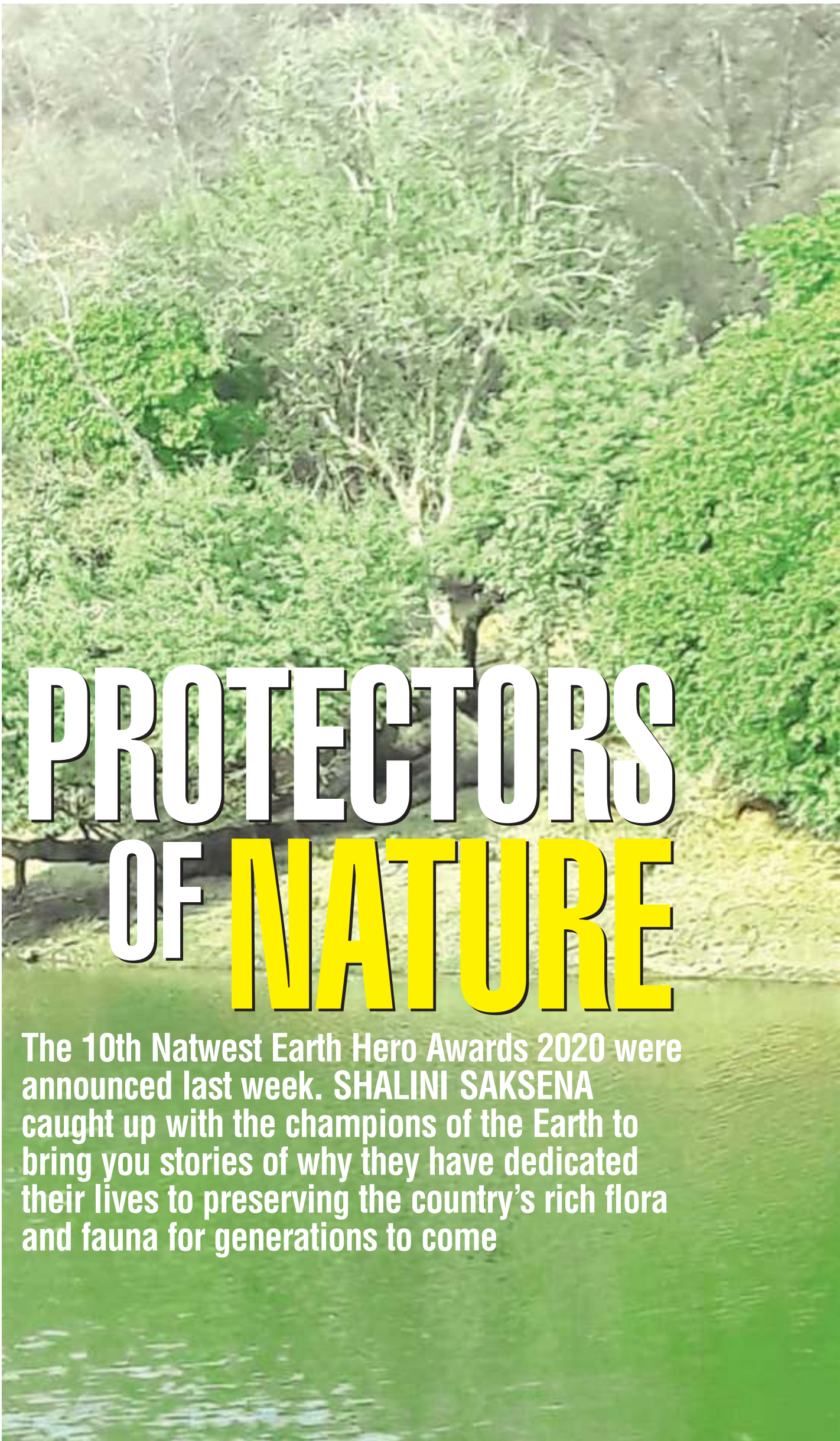
“Of course, I could sanction my own recommendations. Once I was in the Forest Department, we didn’t have to coordinate with other departments but where required, it was easy if you take personal interest. Instead of sending the file, I would take it myself to my colleagues. Once I got talking about Nature, people got interested too. This made it possible for me to a lot when it came to conservation,” Choudhury says.

He tells you that even though it was easy to get paperwork done, it was tough to involve the local communities. But in districts where he had independent charge, he would organise awareness programmes particularly at the *panchayat* level. “I would tell them the importance of conservation,” Choudhury tells you.

Another challenge that the region faces is the loss of wildlife due to floods especially of the Kaziranga. But he explains why flooding in this area is extremely important for the eco-system.

“Without floods, the eco-system would collapse. Some seven-eight decades back, during floods the animals would move to higher ground — Karbi Anglong without any human interference. Slowly, people took over and highways were made and the region became busy restricting the movement of the wildlife. Unfortunately, there is no long-term solution though some higher grounds are being constructed where animals can rest during flooding,” Choudhury explains.

A major part of his work was declaring the white-winged wood duck as the State bird. This bird, one is told is endangered. This was part of Choudhury’s work with the birds in the North-east. In India, there are 1,300 species. Out of which around 1,000 are

found in this region with Assam topping the charts with 850 species — the highest in any State in the country.

Now that he has retired, he tells you he has more time to write. But during the lockdown, field work was hampered. However, things are back to normal and Choudhury is back to traveling and working towards general conservation.

A specific project that he just finished working on is Amur Falcon, a migratory bird that moves from Assam to South Africa with their breeding place in eastern Siberia. There are two roosting sites in Assam that we observe since lakhs of birds roost here. We had been working on this project for the last three years and last year saw the highest number — three lakh — with the world population standing at 10-12 lakh this was a great achievement,” Choudhury says.

## Eco-tourism key to conservation

She is Deputy Conservator of Forest (Ecotourism), Forest & Environment Department, Odisha. She joined the service in 2007. She has extensively worked in Satkosia Tiger Reserve (STR), Mahanadi Wildlife Division to reduce the depletion of the tiger habitat. She mobilised the local community to create Odisha’s first eco-village — Muduligadia inside STR. The ecotourism project — Satkosia Sands Resort and Nature Camp run by 34 community members has a capacity to accommodate 19 guests and has generated a revenue of ₹3 crore in the last four years.

She tells you that eco-tourism and conservation of wildlife are two sides of the same coin. “One very important threat to wildlife and conservation is human-related pressures. Conservation can bring good results only if there is support from the locals. Eco-tourism is one such area that can help us strengthen economic development in remote areas. It can also bring social wellbeing,” Das explains.

She tells you that it was not easy to involve the locals with the conservation. There was a lot resentment from the locals. Das and her team started working in two areas — punishing the guilty for illegal activities and addressing the long-standing grievances like all-weather road, we provided them electricity and introduced different livelihood alternatives. Gradually, this reduced the reduced their dependency on the forest.

The success story of Satkosia Sands Resort and Nature Camp tells you that when one involves locals, the results can be amazing. So much so that seven-eight villages are no longer dependent on the forest. “Earlier, they were totally dependent on the forest for their firewood needs. We provided LPG. The income from the resort bettered their lives. It has also controlled migration. Locals helped the department set-up antipoaching camps. The protection at the tiger reserve got better. We enrolled women in protection activities. We managed to get good informer network. People have understood that if they work towards conservation their livelihood and lifestyle will improve,” Das says.

Due to the information provided, the department was able to nab an international smuggler of pangolin Shamsuddin Khan in 2018. This would not have been possible without local support. The good part about the revenue generated from the resort is that it goes back to the people who run it. About 80 per cent is distributed as salaries depending on the work they do and how to manage the resort and its upkeep. Part of the money — 10 per cent goes to their community development as eco-villages. There is no plastic, there is no litter outside and no open defecation. The houses are colourful and depict their traditions and cultures. So much so that people visit these villages just to see the houses. The rest 10 per cent goes the Government as revenue. There are 47 such eco-tourism that are under one portal. People can go the website and book wherever they want to stay,” Das says.

She tells you that the duty of a Government servant it is their duty to do their work diligently and honestly wherever they are posted. “Forest and Environment is one department where one gets to do varied work — there is general conservation work, there is eco-tourism and there is working towards saving species from extinction. One can even take up hobbies like photography and writing that I have been doing for the last seven-eight years,” Das says.

Her publications *Avifauna of Satkosia*, *Satkosia Seen and Unseen* and *Birds of Satkosia Landscape* have garnered a lot of attention. Another feather in Das’ cap is her work towards the *gharial* in STR. “Back in 2015, there was only one left in the region. Illegal fishing in the area led to the extinction of this animal here. It lives in deep waters. Satkosia gorge is the only place in Odisha where we find gharial. Below Satkosia, there are no *gharials*. All the earlier release programmes didn’t help because the entire gorge was under the cover of illegal fishermen.

“We apprehended 38 of them and rehabilitated them. We gave some of them jobs in the department and others were given alternatives. Gharials are extremely sensitive to the fishing nets. After the arrests were made, we artificially released a gharial and the numbers went up to eight in 2019. Of course, the success of this rehabilitation is not just mine. I need to thank all my team members for their contribution in ensuring that the gharial thrives here once again,” Das says.

She opines that aim of conservation is to remove illegal activities. Hence, the area became safe for other wildlife as well. This increased tourism. Today, people are not just traveling to see the tiger or eat good food or go shopping. People today are looking for experiential travel. They want to explore new places. Photography is a passion for the young. Then there is biking, hiking and bird watching. One of our projects offer canopy walk. These activities go well with eco-tourism and hence we have seen such large number of travellers. Seeing wildlife is not the aim,” Das says.

“Even though we gave them an alternative means to earn a living. To convince them to take them up was tough. People were used to illegal farming and grazing their cattle here endangering not just GIB but the entire habitat of the region. They didn’t see how what they were doing was wrong; they had been doing this for years. I told them if we increased the grasslands, it would good for them as well — they can take their cattle to graze there legally — leaving a large portion for GIB and other wildlife to thrive here. But to give alternative employment to so many people is difficult. But the villagers tell me that if they are given a job, they would stop traditional practices,” Jamara explains.

He started working on making the area a tourist attraction — Sam being a prime example. “With eco-tourism, it opened doors to alternate job opportunities. The grassland enclosers can be saved as well as GIB’s habitat. But more needs to be done. The money that is earned from eco-tourism should go to the local communities and ensure that the money is spent for their betterment,” Jamara tells you.

He tells you that back in the 80s, the number of this beautiful bird stood at 1,500, unfortunately, the number has dwindled to less than 100 according to 2011 census. However, Jamara’s work has paid off. The Wildlife of India picked up 10 GIB eggs to be artificially hatched in Desert National Park in Rajasthan. All the eggs were picked up from where Jamara has been working tirelessly. “It is good to see my work been has paid off but there is much to do. I want to thank NatWest as well for the award,” Jamara says.

## ‘SAVING GREAT INDIAN BUSTARD IS MY CALLING NOW’

He was 18 when he enlisted in the Army. At age 35 he retired after serving the country for 17 years as *havaladar*. When he came back to his hometown in Jaiselmer, Rajasthan he was at a loose end and didn’t know what he should do next till he came to know that Great Indian Bustard (GIB) had practically disappeared from this region. That is when he knew what his calling would be henceforth.

“When I came back to Jaiselmer in 2010, I came to know how this large bird found in our State had almost disappeared thanks to extensive poaching. I was always interested in photography. My home is inside the park. Whenever I was home on a holiday, I would roam the area and take photos. But once I was back for good, I reported

poaching from Sudhasar area to the Forest Department in 2012 because I released one thing — if we save GIB, we would save Nature. Since then I have made it my mission to save this species from extinction.

But the task was not an easy one. People living in the area depended on the money that came to them when people would come to hunt GIB and illegal farming and grazing. To change their thinking and get them to take an alternative method to eke out a living was not easy.

“It is very easy to say that people who depend on the forest need to look for an alternative way to earn a living. One has to understand that to change one’s dependency on Nature and to change one’s thinking is not easy. People have families to feed. You just can’t tell them to not enter a certain area because it is now under State protection. Also, a large portions of forest area in Rajasthan is not owned by the Forest

Department. Then there is the desert. People have been living off it for generations. To ask them to stay off the land where the GIB lives was next to impossible. But I never gave up. I would go from village to village that surround the grassland enclosers where the GIB lives. I told them the importance of grasslands. The habitat of GIB is the tall grass found here. This grass is special. A bit of rain is enough for it to sprout,” Jamara says who is also the founder secretary of Godawan Conservation Society.

He has also served as the honorary Wildlife Warden, Jaisalmer and eco-development, Sudasari, Forest Department. Since he reported the first poaching, he has played a huge role in the renovation of old grassland enclosers and creating new ones with the cooperation from surrounding villagers. Jamara has also been instrumental in providing employment to local people though eco-development committee —

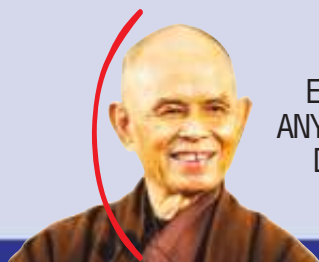
guarding the area and labouring for renovation. In the last eight years, he has engaged in advocacy for the GIB and grassland conservation with State and Centre.

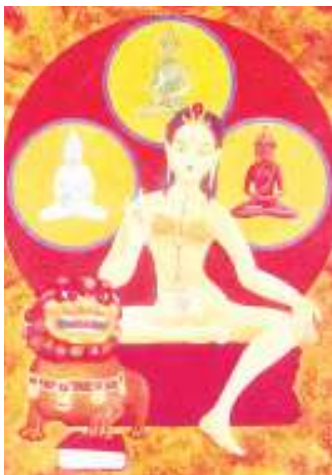

Will this year see the beginning of the return of the Durga Puja in its original form? SAIMI SATTAR discusses the idea with Kolkata denizens to find out more

## THE HOMECOMING

This year, 41-year-old Arpita Sarkar is relieved that rather than being stuck for hours in traffic in the month preceding Duga Puja, she has been able to commute smoothly to and from office. “Things had come to such a head that we had decided that even though we hate spending these days away from Kolkata, we would do so,” she says. But a tiny miniscule virus had other plans. So now, for the six days of the Puja, rather than engage in *pandal*-hopping, Arpita along with her family will cook something special at home, probably go to a relative's house where children too would be able to catch up with their cousins. “That is what *Pujo* signified for us when we were growing up. Heading to *Mama baari* or *Bade Papa's* place with our parents is what we did as children. Even though, it is a community celebration, the crowds that have become synonymous with Durga Puja are not the essence of the festival,” says 41-year-old Arpita who works as an HR in a multi-national company in Kolkata and counts dance and drama as her areas of interest. She often performs at the cultural programmes organised during Puja and this year she is recording the performance which is being put up jointly with other artistes on YouTube channels.

Over the years, for Bengalis and non-Bengalis, Durga Puja came to be centered around how many *pandals* they had hopped, which one displayed the best theme and which Puja Committee was likely to win an award that year. The lament, especially among the older generation, was that the emphasis was now on an extraneous journey while the festival was more of an inward cruise of devotion which had gone completely missing. But nature often has a way of setting humans on the path of course correction, sometimes in the form of a virus, only if they are willing to listen to its call.

Like every year, Ayandrali Dutta, travel and food writer who has made Delhi her home for the past 12 years, will be making her way back to Kolkata to be a part of the 168-year old ancestral Burrabazar Mallick Bari Durga Puja that is celebrated at her house. “Over the past five-six years, Durga Puja has become a social media activity where you have to do a check in at all the *pandals*,” says Dutta who sees her annual homecoming as something akin to the Goddess Durga's return to her maternal house.

At Ayandrali's, till last year, there would have been around 300-400 people visiting and eating at her house. These would be family friends, relatives, people who had heard about the *puja* through word-of-mouth. “This won't happen this year,” says Ayandrali firmly. While the *aarti* would take place, the ceremonial conch would be blown but the place where the five-foot idol is placed would not be flocked with people who had queued up for a *dekkho* at the *prati-ma*. This year there would not be more than five-six at one time. But Ayandrali believes that this was very much-required. “We needed to slow down and cut down on lot

of frills which we thought were an important part of life. After all, that is what we have been doing during the past seven months and it has done us a lot of good. It has made us realise that minimalism could be a part of life. Instead of 400 people eating earlier, now there would be 50 and that it is perfectly fine. If we are feeding for the sake of charity, we can do it in some other place and in some other way,” she says adding that Pujas had become a larger than life affair.

While Ayandrali is much younger, Arup Sarkar, a retired government servant can recall a time when Pujas were simpler affairs. “The budgets have become huge due to sponsorship by political parties and corporates. There is an excess of everything — lighting, theme, decoration. A lot of money is thrown around on the display but the devotion that is needed is nowhere to be found. Earlier, the way the face was crafted, the body made and the decorations done were exceptional. The idols were simpler but they inspired devoutness. The *bhakti* that came from the heart is no longer there,” he says. He hopes for a return to the simplicity of earlier times but is not relying on the fulfilment of his wishes — even during the pandemic.

Arpita, a trained Bharatnatyam and Odissi dancer, too is not fond of the theme *pandals*. “The competitions are a way of showing off how much money can be splurged. The focus is on making expensive *pandals* and political parties have jumped into the fray as well. When we were younger, we went to see the *pandals* every year. The idols and *pandals* were the same each year but they inspired devotion. Since they are so intricate and expensive now, there are many restrictions about where we can sit and what we can touch so much so that people are not able to enjoy themselves,” she says.

Arup points out that earlier there was a lot personal involvement. “The entertainment was different. Everyone from the extended family pitched in ensuring that the festivities went off smoothly. On the cultural side, someone sang, another one recited. It was unparalleled *anand*,” he says. Ayandrali too agrees that the complexion of Puja underwent a change as different members of the household became busier and a lot of work was outsourced to people. “Earlier every member had a responsibility to go and get the flowers, buy the vegetables, decorate the house and more so there was personal touch. Many of us no longer stay in Kolkata and when we return for Puja we prefer to outsource the work and spend time with family,” she says.

Of course, like contemporary times, earlier too *pujas* entailed dressing up to the nines; *dhaaki* players who by their rhythmic percussions signalled the arrival of *Maa* Durga to her maternal home; the *dhunochi naach* made popular in the non-Bengali speaking areas by countless Bollywood films as well as *pandal*-hopping but it is the

new norms of social distancing that have forced many to sit back and rethink about the hijacking of this festival by Mammon.

The change had started around 25 years back when the concept of “theme *puja*” made an entry. From 1993-94 each of the *paara* (area) began to conceptualise the *pandal* around a contemporary issue. It could be questioning violence against women while celebrating a goddess or depicting the condition of refugees or creating awareness about social issue of contemporary relevance. As the *pandals* grew in scale, awards started being handed out for different categories like best idol, lighting, decoration, social work and more. To remain a contender in the competitions needed a scaling up of budgets and corporate sponsorship or by political parties entered the picture. And after that there was no looking back as each year the magnificence and size of the *pandals* grew and visitors from and around Kolkata lined up.

However, 48-year-old Sutirtha Basu, a regional manager in a pharmaceutical company has a different take. Sutirtha, who used to visit nothing less than 50-60 *pandals* every Puja, feels that these gave artists and craftspeople a platform to display their talent. “Artists who conceptualise the *pandals* are from arts college and are really talented. Depending on the theme, they get village artisans adept in crafts like mud, metal or others to make the *pandals* and give them an opportunity to showcase their ability. An entire economy depends on Durga Puja. These people have tremendous flair but it was never exhibited,” he says and adds, “The awards are a recognition of the hard work and talent.” Not just the *pandals* and idols but also the social work done by Puja Committee is rewarded.

Despite the changes, a *bonedi puja* or the one celebrated at a *Zamindar baari* (home) like the one at Ayandrali's ancestral home, still maintains tradition. “Even if they do not assemble at any other time, they make sure to come during *puja*. They dress up in traditional attire, wear the heirloom jewellery and have cultural programmes,” says Arup.

In fact, historically it was only the *zamindar* and other rich families who celebrated Durga Puja at their homes. “There was no *paara puja* which started 100-110 years back during the British Raj. The *zamindars* objected to the *paara pujas* as earlier they had exercised a monopoly over organising Durga puja. Being allowed to visit one was considered to be a favour bestowed upon one. While all the *paara* people were not freedom fighters but they wanted that they should be able to express their hatred against the British. So the *asur* (demon) in the *prati-ma* (idol) was depicted like the British and the Goddess was shown to be killing him,” says Basu.

Fast forward to today. And whether we would be able to annihilate materialism and imbibe the true spirit of the festival, this year and in the ones that follow, is a story that is unfolding and yet to be written.

## MEANWHILE IN THE CAPITAL...

For sometime now the Durga Puja Committees in Delhi were in a quandary about the way they could go ahead and celebrate the festival without endangering people while ensuring that the festivities remained intact. The Purbanchal Bangiyo Samiti, a forum of 38 committees which celebrate Durga Puja in East Delhi formed about two years ago decided to take the lead and, post several parleys with Manish Sisodia, Deputy Chief Minister of Delhi finally, managed to come out with a set of guidelines that attempts to do both.

While the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare (MoHFW), Govt. of India had already issued a Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) in the first week of the month, the Delhi Disaster Management Authority (DDMA) suggested some additional measures. All the event organisers have to obtain requisite permission from the District Magistrate concerned for organising the festival events well in advance. The order says that the capacity of each event site would be decided on the basis of area and social distancing norms, laid down by MHA by which in a closed space, a maximum of 50 per cent of the hall capacity would be allowed, with a ceiling of 200 persons, and in an open spaces the size of the ground would be kept in view and strict observance of social distancing norms would be followed. Naturally, the seating capacity for each such site would be determined according to the norms of social distancing and observing Covid-appropriate behaviour.

This would include ensuring separate entry and exit at each event which will be strictly regulated and only those wearing a face mask would be allowed inside.

Every organising committee is supposed to video-record the entire event and a soft copy of the unedited video recording in pen-drive and a certificate, certifying that no violation of the SOPs/Guidelines issued by Govt. of India and Govt. of NCT of Delhi has taken place, shall be submitted to Nodal officers within three hours of closing of the programme of each day. In case of any violation of SOPs/guidelines the permission for conducting such an event shall be revoked immediately for all subsequent days. At all events only sitting on chairs with social distancing norms shall be allowed. Suitable arrangements have to be made for an adequate number of temporary toilets and other public facilities like electricity, water, sanitisers and thermal screeners at each site venue.

Mirinal Biswas is the general secretary, Milani Cultural & Welfare Association, Mayur Vihar, as well as the Purbanchal Bangiyo Samiti, a forum of 38 committees which celebrate Durga Puja in East Delhi formed about two years ago. Says he, “Only 11 of the 38 committees will organise the Durga Puja with a small idol. The rest would have a *kalash/ghot puja*. The idol would be eco-friendly with water-based colour and of the height of three-five feet. Some of the *puja* committees would be organising online pushpanjali. No cultural events, *bhandara* and stalls would be allowed.”

At the Milani Clubhouse, they are registering members and handing out digital tokens for visiting the place where the idol is kept. The restricted entry would be rotated after every half an hour so that everyone gets a chance to offer prayers while maintaining social distancing. Children below 12 and elderly people above 65 will not be allowed inside.

For the immersion, a metal tank is being arranged by Purbanchal Bangiyo Samiti at Mayur Vihar Kali Bari Ph-1 and at Purbasha Kali Bari (IP extn) premises with each Puja committee being given a different time slot. Puja material like flowers, leaves and decorative items will not be allowed at the time of immersion.

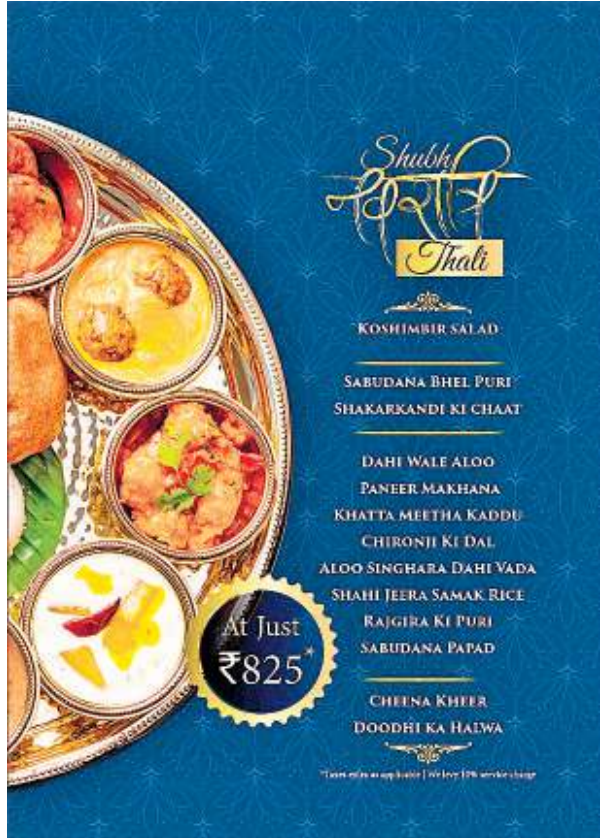

money was inculcated to me by my father. Thus empathy and helping others has become my motto. I instituted an award in my grandfather's name to be presented every year at the annual conference of Indian Water Works Association (IWWA) for outstanding work in field of water supply and sanitation.

## Met match at Mussoorie

My wife Ranjeev is a batchmate from Jalandhar, Punjab. We developed friendship during our civil services training at Mussoorie and later decided to get married. We got married in Tirupati in 1985. She served as Special Chief Secretary, Education, and has now retired from service.

## Start of career

While Odisha was of course my first choice, I was allotted Andhra Pradesh cadre, based on the zonal system. Depending on the rank and community I belong to, I couldn't make it to Odisha and coming to Andhra Pradesh wasn't a complete shock but a possible choice. My first posting was as the sub-collector, Bhadrachalam and hers was sub-collector, Kothagudem.

Right at the start of our careers, Godavari recorded its worst flood in 1986. Fortunately, we managed to save a lot of lives.

## Was asked to contest for Lok Sabha

I served for six years in Warangal and people wanted me to contest for the Lok Sabha. But I was not interested and I knew it would be challenging. I was the District Development Officer, Zilla Praja Parishad for three years and later worked as Collector and District Magistrate, Warangal from 1990-1993.

Working in Warangal was the high point of my career and I could identify with people, the land and heritage. That's how I brought out a publication on 'Kakatiya Heritage'.

People there used to treat me like a 'son of the soil' and the link remains unbroken. The people from Warangal do reach out to me even now.

## Turning the HMDA around

My most challenging role was my brief stint in HMDA in 2009. The situation was so bad that the HMDA did not even have enough money to even pay my salary. I was fortunate to be able to turn it around in 10 months and could complete large parts of ORR and finalised the Master Plan for the GHMC area after nearly 45 years. We even allocated the first parcel of government land to the HMRL in Nagole so they could start their activities.

## Dairy development

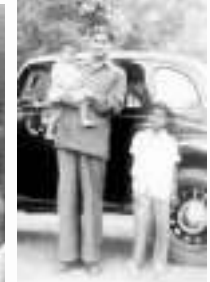
During one of my stints, I was posted as MD, Vijaya Dairy and I had to compete with the then Chief

## Manufacturing 'defect'

I have a manufacturing defect - I get 100 per cent involved in anything I take up, I can't allow myself to put in a superficial effort. Making things happen in the government is not easy. In fact, it's very difficult and requires a lot of effort and vigorous persuasion.

During my stint at the APIIC, I turned it around. When I left the Corporation, its turnover was Rs 5,000 crore, up from the merely Rs 65 crore when I took over.

Yet I was made a scapegoat in the political crossfire in 2012, for no fault of mine. My conscience is clear that I was treating these investments on their merit. It was a traumatic time and my family suffered. I turned to spiritual introspection and began reading Gita, Mahabharata and Ramayana. It was ashram. Eventually, I believe 'Dharma Rakshati Rakshatah' (Dharma protects those who follow it).

## Do not want to retire

Everyone who joins the Civil Services aspires to become the Chief Secretary. There was some professional regret but it was made up with work done at MCRHRD-IT.

At the MCRHRD-IT, we have trained over 80,000 field staff of the State under DoPT training e-Learning programme during the last three years and over 10,000 trainees on virtual mode too during the last six months of the lockdown.

I will turn 60 on October 30. I am not tired and wouldn't want to retire. I like to do something in the Industries sector. In the context of pandemic, the MSME sector needs to be revamped and that is one area I am looking at and another is Manufacturing sector.

## Publish a book on cartoons

I may come out with a book based on my cartoons. I have been drawing cartoons since I was a child inspired by RK Lakshman. I have about 200-300 cartoons. I like the classical style of RK Lakshman black and white, as colours tend to distract from the punchline. As a civil servant, there are some restrictions, but when I retire, I would be able to take a political stand on issues.

## Son resents recommendations

My son Nikhil was born in Warangal. He is a filmmaker and working as creative strategy consultant in London. He is very particular that I shouldn't talk about him and resents recommendations.

His standards of ethics are perhaps more stricter than mine. I wouldn't say I am easygoing as a father, but instead, I am firm. I get involved in so many things. Letting things go is something I can't do, I wish I could be easygoing. Trying to micromanage everyone's lives causes stress and tension.
