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Nitish will remain our CM: BJP

Party asserts decision carved in stone, irrespective of number of seats each wins

Nitish Kumar will remain the Chief Minister of Bihar if the NDA return to power in the State irrespective of the number of seats the BJP and the Janata Dal(U) clinch in the polls. The BJP made this declaration on Tuesday as the two parties announced their seat sharing pact.

The JD(U) will contest 122 seats and the BJP 121. The differences of one seat means BJP's symbolic acceptance of Nitish Kumar as the "elder brother" in Bihar politics.

The BJP also rebuffed LJP chief Chirag Paswan who has decided to go solo in the polls and put up candidates against the JD(U) nominees. Without directly naming Chirag or his party, the BJP said no one outside the NDA alliance in Bihar was allowed to use Prime Minister's name in poll campaigning.

Incidentally, Chirag has been repeatedly saying his candidates will strengthen the hand of the Prime Minister after the polls.

Bihar Deputy Chief Minister and senior BJP leader Sushil Kumar Modi said that the NDA in this election will mean only four parties — the BJP, the JD(U), Jitan Ram Manjhi's HAM and the Vikassheel Insaan Party. "Only four NDA parties can use PM's photo during campaign. If needed, we will write to the Election Commission that PM Modi's photo must not be mis-

used," he added.

Sources said before the two sides held a joint Press conference to announce their seat sharing deal, the JD(U) leadership told the BJP that it must distance itself from Chirag Paswan. Following this, BJP State president Sanjay Jaisawal issued a brief statement which said, "Only those who accept Nitish Kumar's leadership in

Bihar will remain in the NDA. The leader of the NDA in Bihar is Nitish Kumar. The BJP accepts his leadership in Bihar and everyone in the NDA should accept his leadership."

Jaisawal later said "the LJP was an ally at the Centre and we pray for early recovery of its founder and Union Minister Ram Vilas Paswan. But there should be no confusion with

regard to the fact that in Bihar the NDA's leader is Nitish Kumar. Our alliance with his party is *atoot* (unbreakable)."

Declaring the seat-sharing arrangement, Nitish Kumar said, "The JD(U) has got 122 seats out of which we have set aside seven for the Hindustani Awam Morcha (headed by former CM Jitan Ram Manjhi). The BJP has got the remaining

121 wherein new entrant Vikassheel Insaan Party of Mukesh Sahnai will be accommodated."

Responding to a query about post-poll scenario Deputy Chief Minister Sushil Kumar Modi asserted, "We have said unequivocally that Nitish Kumar will be our Chief Minister. It does not matter which party gets how many seats in the elections."

Nitish did not mention Chirag by name but remarked sarcastically, "I believe in doing my job. If some people derive pleasure out of saying something inconsequential, they are most welcome to do so. It does not bother me."

However, he sought to repudiate Chirag's allegation that the JD(U) has not treated its alliance partners in the State well and asked "did Ram Vilas Paswan get elected to the Rajya Sabha without the JD(U)s support?"

In the outgoing Assembly, the RJD is the single largest party with 73 MLAs, followed by the JD(U) with 69, BJP (54), Congress (23), CPI-ML (3), LJP (2), HAM and AIMIM of Hyderabad MP Asaduddin Owaisi one each, and Independent (5).

Several senior leaders of both the BJP and JD(U), including BJP Bihar in-charge Bhupendra Yadav, BJP's Bihar poll in-charge Devendra Fadnavis and JD(U) State chief Vashisht Narayan Singh too were present at the joint press meet.

India calls for rule-based world order, free India-Pacific region

Amid its strained relations with China, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Tuesday said New Delhi is committed to peaceful resolution of disputes and rule-based world order even as he called for a free and open India-Pacific region.

Making these opening remarks at the meeting of Foreign Ministers of Quad countries including India, Japan, Australia and the US in Tokyo, he also said the four democratic countries favour a free and open India-Pacific region. The Quad meeting comes at a time when China is aggressively asserting itself in this region leading to tension. Jaishankar, however, refrained from naming China.

At Quad Summit, Jaishankar says New Delhi committed to peaceful resolution of disputes

This is the second Minister-level meeting of the Quad countries in the last two years. The ongoing two-day conclave is the first against the backdrop of ongoing tension between India and China at the LAC in Ladakh and coronavirus pandemic. Jaishankar had held a two-hour long bilateral meeting with his Chinese counterpart Wang Yi on September 10 in Moscow to end the logjam at the border.

The Quad meeting discussed the issue of ensuring a free and open Indo-Pacific in the face of China's increasingly aggressive behaviour across the region. The other three Ministers include Marise Payne (Australia), Toshimitsu Motegi

(Japan) and Mike Pompeo (US).

Jaishankar said the events of this year have demonstrated how "imperative it is for like-minded countries to coordinate responses to the various challenges that the pandemic has brought to the fore."

On the situation in the strategically important India-Pacific region, he said "as vibrant and pluralistic democracies with shared values, our nations have collectively affirmed the importance of maintaining a free, open and inclusive Indo-Pacific."

"It is a matter of satisfaction that the Indo-Pacific concept has gained increasingly wider acceptance," he said.

SOP for reopening cinema halls from Oct 15 issued

The Information and Broadcasting Ministry on Tuesday issued strict Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) to re-open cinema theaters from October 15.

The SOP includes filling up only for 50 per cent capacity, keeping one seat vacant between the viewers, and maintaining temperature conditions.

The SOP bars serving cooked food of any kind and says only packaged food and beverages will be allowed for sale at refreshment points. The viewers will not be allowed to carry any food inside the cinema hall.

Releasing the SOP, Minister Prakash Javadekar said local authorities must ensure the guidelines are adhered to along with strict physical distancing norms.

In multi-halls, to prevent the crowding, the SOP has suggested staggered timing also. Mask wearing will be compulsory for viewers and staffers and theater managers must ensure medical facilities if anybody is feeling uneasy.

"The highlights of the guiding principles include the general principles which have been given by the Ministry of

Health & Family Welfare, including thermal screening of all visitors/staff, adequate physical distancing, use of face covers/masks, frequent hand washing, provision of hand sanitisers, etc and respiratory etiquettes specifically with regard to the exhibition of films," the I&B Ministry said.

The Ministry said it has formulated the general SOPs taking into consideration international practices notified in the sector, including physical distancing, entry and exit with designated queue markers, sanitisation, safety of staff, contact minimisation.

The SOP said there should be one seat vacant between the viewers and the vacant seat should be marked. The SOP also asked the local PWD authorities to ensure the temperature and air-conditioning norms.

"Temperature setting of all air conditioning devices should be in the range of 24-30°C. Relative humidity should be in the range of 40-70 per cent. Recirculation of air is to be avoided to the extent possible. Intake of fresh air should be as much as possible. Cross ventilation should be adequate," said the guidelines.

Govt defers privatisation move; power staff end stir

The power employees have withdrawn their indefinite strike as the Uttar Pradesh government has decided to defer the privatisation of Purvanchal Vidyut Vitran Nigam Limited (PVVNL) for three months, till January 15, 2021.

Energy Minister Shrikant Sharma agreed to roll back the privatisation plan after talks with the leaders of power employees. However, the agreement could not be signed as UPPCL Chairman Arvind

Kumar Singh refused to sign it on Monday, leading to breakdown of talks.

The government announced the decision here on Tuesday after Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath summoned the top officials of the UPPCL in the morning and took stock of the situation as the power employees had boycotted the work on Monday leading to disruption in thermal power generation and long hours of supply breakdowns in several districts as the employees refused to attend the faults in power distribution network.

The energy minister said that the strike by the power employees was not in public interest and causing disruption in power supply was illegal and unacceptable.

He urged the power employees to have patience and join their duties from Wednesday as the government was working for an amicable solution to the issues raised by the employees.

The work boycott by the power employees on Monday had seriously impacted power supply in 30 districts of eastern UP. The PVVNL, a wholly

owned subsidiary of the UPPCL, controls and manages the power distribution in eastern UP districts.

The call for indefinite strike was given by Power Employees Joint Action Committee and UP Power Officers Association representing the Scheduled Caste and OBC employees of the UPPCL.

The disruption in power supply had created a water crisis in as many as 30 districts, including Lucknow. Power supply to the official residences of the chief minister and several

ministers was also disrupted on Monday. At many places in Lucknow, the power supply breakdown was not attended to by the employees for over 20 hours.

The Union government's decision to fast-track the privatisation of power distribution companies had forced the power employees to go on indefinite strike.

The Centre had on September 23, released the standard bidding document (SBD) for the first time and uploaded it on its website. The

The Supreme Court on Tuesday directed the Uttar Pradesh Government to inform it by October 8 about the steps taken to protect witnesses in the Hathras horror case in which a Dalit girl was brutally raped following which she succumbed to injuries.

Describing the crime as "horrible", the court also asked the State Government about legal aid to the victim's family.

Hearing a PIL, a bench comprising Chief Justice SA Bobde and Justices AS Bopanna and V Ramasubramanian asked all

The State Government said it favoured a court-monitored CBI probe because fake narratives were being spread.

"Narratives after narratives being spread in Hathras case, this needs to be stopped," said Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the UP Government.

The CBI probe in Hathras

case will ensure no vested interests will be able to create fake, false narrative with oblique motives, Mehta told the court.

Mehta said the State Government is not opposing the plea for a fair probe by the CBI or a Special Investigation Team and said "a young innocent girl has lost her life, but nobody should sensationalise it. Investigation should be fair, appear fair."

Senior Advocate Indira Jaising, appearing for a few intervenors, asked the top court to provide protection to the victim's family. Jaising said the

5-fold spike in stubble burning set to choke north India

As if the Covid-19 pandemic wasn't enough, residents in north India, including Delhi-NCR, could well be heading for winters far more polluted than in the last three years. Satellites have detected an almost five-fold increase in the number of crop residue burning instances in Punjab, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh in the first week of October in 2020 than during the corresponding period since 2017 to 2019.

According to the Agriculture Ministry, satellites detected 208 incidents of farm fires on just a single day, October 5. Of them, 163 were detected in Punjab, 30 in Haryana and 15 in UP.

Between October 1 and 5, 894 paddy crop residue burning events have already been detected

as compared to 184 in 2019, 263 in 2018 and 652 in 2017. Punjab is leading in farm fires with 700 events, followed by 146 in Haryana and 48 in UP. The number of burning events was highest on October 5 in Punjab in the last 4 years.

According to the Ministry, in Punjab, burning/fire events were concentrated in Amritsar, Tarn Taran, Patiala, Gurdaspur, Ferozepur, Ludhiana, Sangrur and Fatehgarh Sahib districts. Last year, only 79 events of farm fires were detected between October 1 and 5 in Punjab. The number of farm fires was 117 in 2018. On October 5, total 163 farm fires were reported while 16 in 2019, 56 in 2018, 106 in 2017 and 95 in 2016. This is despite the fact that the Punjab Government had spent more funds than Haryana and UP in the past two

years on trying to get farmers implement farm waste management practices. But farmers say they do not have any option but to burn.

In Haryana and Uttar Pradesh, the burning events were scattered. As many as 86 farm fires events were detected in Haryana this year during the same period while 87 farm fires events were reported in 2019; 208 in 2018 and 100 in 2017. Most farm fires events were detected from Ambala, Kurukshetra, Kaithal, Jind and Fatehabad districts.

In UP, most farm fires events were detected from Sitapur, Meerut, Aligarh, Bareilly, Ghazipur, Sambhal, Shamli and Saharanpur districts.

"A sharp increase in stubble burning was observed around Punjab, Haryana, and neighbouring border regions. Boundary

layer wind direction is favorable for transport (of pollutants). It will start impacting Delhi in the coming days," the System of Air Quality and Weather Forecasting and Research (SAFAR) said.

Officials said that wind directions have changed to north-westerly and this will cause pollution to Delhi-NCR. Stubble burning causes a smog-like situation in Delhi-NCR every year post autumn, creating a health hazard for its residents.

Interestingly, the Supreme Court on Tuesday agreed to examine a suggestion that full Minimum Support Price (MSP) should be released to farmers only after a verification that they didn't burn stubble. The court posted the matter for further hearing to October 16 after SG Tushar Mehta said the Centre would file a reply on the issue."

Hathras-bound Kerala scribe, 3 others held for PFI links

The Uttar Pradesh Police has arrested a journalist and three other people in Mathura while they were on their way to Hathras, home to a Dalit woman who died after being allegedly gangraped.

The police had on Monday said it has arrested four people having links with the Popular Front of India and its affiliate in Mathura. The PFI had been accused of funding protests against the CAA earlier this year and the UP Police had sought a ban on the outfit.

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‘Visionless opposition has nothing to offer’

Hitting out at the “visionless opposition”, Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath on Tuesday said that they had nothing to offer to the people hence they indulged in propaganda.

“The opposition can go to any extent to vitiate the atmosphere in the country and the recent incidents are testimony to this fact,” Yogi said while virtually addressing the Bharatiya Janata Party office-bearers of booth division and sector of Ghatampur Assembly constituency where bypoll will be held on November 3.

Exhorting the BJP workers to publicise the achievements of the Centre and the state government as well as expose the opposition, he claimed that both the governments had done some historical works and they needed to be communicated to the masses.

The chief minister asked the party workers to go for intensive

mass contact after setting up booth committees. He insisted that the plank of development was always going to work in these changing times of coronavirus pandemic.

Yogi said that the people should be told that in the BJP rule, employment in the state was on the basis of transparent merit of the individual and not on region or caste basis.

“More than 3.5 lakh youth have secured jobs on this basis during the last three years,” he said, adding that the same number of aspirants would get employment in the near future.

He further added that the government had proved that the criminals and mafias would not be allowed to raise their heads and they were running for shelter.

“Gone are the days of the previous jungle raj when industrialists wrangle up their businesses in the state. Instead, new investments are coming to the state. Improved law and order and



availability of infrastructure in terms of electricity and roads have added to the disadvantage of industrialists to come to Uttar Pradesh,” he said.

The chief minister said that ever since Narendra Modi became the prime minister, some unprecedented development works had taken place in the country.

“In the times of global pandemic, his supervision and consistent support has proved to be

extremely helpful,” he said.

Yogi said the UP government ensured the return of over 40 lakh migrant workers from across the country during lockdown and made sure that their needs were taken care of by distributing food packets and providing required medical help to them.

“The UP government also made arrangements to bring back 1,000 students from different parts of the country and made them self-reliant by providing them employment through Ono District One Product initiative,” he added.

Yogi also emphasised on the remarkable work done in Kanpur Nagar for making Ganga pollution-free, as the holy river was at the centre of people’s belief.

BJP state president Swatantra Dev Singh, in an apparent attack on the opposition, said that they had not been able to digest the all-round development of the country because their agenda had never been development-oriented.

Left leaders meet family members of Hathras victim

Lucknow (PNS): A joint delegation of Communist Party of India and CPI(M) on Tuesday met the family members of the 19-year-old Dalit girl who died in a Delhi hospital on September 29 after she was allegedly gang-raped in Hathras, and demanded an independent judicial inquiry into the matter.

The Left delegation, after their visit, said that the Dalit family members were scared of their safety and were apprehensive of getting justice. They demanded that the UP government work as per the Constitution and provide security and justice to the victim’s family.

“Every citizen of the country has the constitutional right to get justice,” they said, adding that the victim’s family had demanded a judicial probe rather than the CBI investigation.

The Left parties demanded that as per the request of the family, the government should order for a probe by the sitting judge of the Supreme Court.

CM Yogi directs officials to further improve Covid recovery rate

Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath has stressed upon paying more attention to the districts where 50 to 100 coronavirus positive cases are being reported daily and has directed officials to carry out relief and treatment work actively to control the COVID-19 infection.

The chief minister was presiding over a high-level Unlock review meeting at his official residence here on Tuesday. The chief minister also directed officials to pay special attention to Lucknow and Kanpur Nagar districts and improve the COVID-19 recovery rate.

He asked the chief secretary to intensively monitor the Covid situation in Lucknow and Kanpur Nagar districts and submit a report to his office. Directing officials to further strengthen the Integrated Command and Control Centre (ICCC), the chief minister said that it should be operated efficiently.

“The COVID-19 awareness programmes should be carried out

actively and intensively. Carry on the cleanliness and sanitation work continuously. Anti-larva chemicals should be sprayed regularly,” he said. The chief minister said that zero budget farming, which is now called the Indian Natural Farming, should be promoted.

“To ensure that the farmers do not face any problems at the paddy purchase centres, the payment of paddy procurement should be transferred to the bank accounts of the farmers within 72 hours,” Yogi said.

The chief minister said that awareness should be spread against the demerits of burning husk and the pollution caused by it. He also said that the Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Rojgar Abhiyan should be packed up and carried out intensively. Directing officials to further increase the revenue of the state, the chief minister directed them to make more and more registrations under the goods and services tax (GST).

Altogether 3,663 fresh cases of COVID-19 were reported on

Tuesday in Uttar Pradesh while 4,432 infected people recovered. Now the tally of confirmed positive cases in the state has reached 4,20,937 of which 3,70,753 have recovered and 44,031 are admitted in the hospitals or are in home isolation.

The recovery percentage in the state has also increased to 88.07 per cent. Additional Chief Secretary (Health) Amit Mohan Prasad said now all the government hospitals were functioning normally and were holding OPD regularly.

He said on Monday, 1,56,336 samples were tested and now the total Covid tests in the state had reached 1,10,44,860.

Prasad said there were 20,647 asymptomatic patients in home isolation while 3,513 COVID-19 patients were admitted in private hospitals and the rest were recovering in government-run Covid hospitals. Over 4.3 lakh surveillance teams have covered 1,32,391 areas of the state and admitted 2.62 crore houses to check the health of over 12.99 crore people.

Key pact signing for ₹29,560 crore Jewar airport today

Noida (PTI): The signing of a key agreement, which got delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, for the Rs 29,560 crore Jewar airport will take place on Wednesday, officials said.

The ‘concession agreement’ for the green-field project will be signed between developer Zurich Airport International AG and the Yamuna International Airport Private Limited and the Noida International Airport Limited (NIAL), the officials said on Tuesday.

Restriction on flight services due to COVID-19 outbreak and subsequent lockdown has twice led to the extension of the date for signing of the concessionaire agreement between selected developer and the state government agencies for the project, according to officials.

NIAL’s officer on special duty Shailendra Bhatia confirmed to PTI that the agreement for the international airport is scheduled to be signed at 1 pm on Wednesday.

On November 29 last year, Swiss firm Zurich Airport emerged as the highest bidder to develop the Jewar airport on the outskirts of Delhi in Gautam Buddh Nagar district of UP, outbidding competitors like Adani Enterprises, DIAL and Anchorage Infrastructure Investments Holding, officials said.

The entire project will be spread over 5,000 hectares and is estimated to cost Rs 29,560 crore, the officials said.

Once completed, the airport, which will be the third in the national capital region after Delhi’s Indira Gandhi International Airport and Ghaziabad’s Hindon Airport, is touted to have six to eight runways, the maximum in India, they said.

The first phase of the airport would be spread over 1,334 hectares and is expected to be completed by 2023 at a cost of Rs 4,588 crore, the officials said.

Maya: Extend justice victim’s family, instead of targeting opposition

Bahujan Samaj Party chief Mayawati on Tuesday yet again attacked the Yogi Adityanath government in Uttar Pradesh over the “mishandling” of Hathras case, saying to prevent such occurrences, strict actions are a must.

She also advised that the government must concentrate on extending justice to the victim’s family instead of leveling charges on opposition parties.

Mayawati, in two Hindi tweets, said, “The entire country is annoyed with the inhuman attitude of police towards the victim’s family. The state government should rectify its mistake and provide justice to the aggrieved family or would be tough to prevent such occurrences in future.”

She further said, “The government’s allegation about conspiracy of caste and communal clashes against the backdrop of the Hathras incidents is correct or just a poll gimmick would unfold in the coming days. But focus now should be on the victim family getting justice at the moment.”

On Monday too, the BSP president had tweeted that they were the first to meet the victim’s family when the gangrape took place. She says that the lathi-charge, manhandling done by the Police is condemnable. The Yogi government should mend its autocratic ways. The roots of

democracy are being threatened, she further added. The BSP leaders had met the victim’s family on September 28 to know the actual details of the case. Hathras has turned into a political battlefield and politicians are on queue up to meet the victim’s family.

CONG CONTINUES FIGHT AGAINST NEW FARM LAWS

Mounting a fresh attack on Prime Minister Narendra Modi-led Central government, Uttar Pradesh Congress president Ajay Kumar Lallu on Tuesday said that three laws recently passed by Parliament had been imposed on the country’s farmers to hand over the agriculture sector to capitalists but his party would not let it happen under any circumstances.

The Congress had launched a nation-wide movement against the farm laws under the leadership of Rahul Gandhi, Lallu said on Tuesday, adding that there was massive response to the Kisan Nyay Yatra in Uttar Pradesh and in other parts of the country.

The UPCC chief said the party organised a tractor rally from Budhana Mor in Muzaffarnagar to expose the three “black” farm laws of the Central government on Tuesday morning.

He said that these legislations aimed at promoting corporate farming and benefiting capitalists.

Series of crimes rock UP

With the Uttar Pradesh Police busy in unearthing the alleged international conspiracy behind the recent Hathras trouble, more cases of rape, killing and other crimes poured in from different parts of the state during the last 24 hours.

In Aligarh, a six-year-old girl who was allegedly raped by her cousin in Jatoi area of the district, succumbed to her injuries in Safdarjung Hospital in New Delhi on Sunday, the day she was shifted there. However, her father did not bury the body to expose the police’s negligence. The Aligarh police acted when the victim’s father put the body and staged a demonstration on Tuesday, prompting the SSP of Aligarh to get the 11-year-old accused arrested and also place the station house officer of Iglas police station under suspension and order a departmental inquiry against him.

Surprisingly, the case was registered on September 21, four days after the rape, that too when the SSP intervened, but the cops initiated no action against the accused and also made no efforts to trace out the 15-year-old sister of the victim who was missing along with her aunt (also an accused in the case) since the registration of the case.

The aunt was absconding to avert her arrest but the cops had no answer why the sister also disappeared.

Both the victim and the missing girl were living with their aunt as their mother had expired in January this year.

ADM (Hathras) JP Singh told a news agency that since the day of rape incident, the maternal aunt and victim’s sister were missing.

“Police are searching for the missing girl so that nothing bad happens to her,” he said.

He also claimed that the administration had promised a compensation of Rs 5 lakh to the family.

In another sensational killing, a couple was hacked to death in Kushinagar. The killing took place some time late Monday night when the couple were sleeping in their house at Parsauni Bujurg hamlet of Tarya Sujan.

The bodies were found in pools of blood on Tuesday morning.

The police suspect the hands of Ramshankar, a listed criminal of the area, in he murder as the couple were witnesses against him in four criminal cases. In another incident, a girl received more than 80 per cent burns after efforts were made to burn her alive in Sitapur late Monday night.

SP of Sitapur, RP Singh, said that a

girl hailing from Bhojipura area of Bareilly left her house to live with her lover, identified as Pratap of Shahjahanpur.

Her family members had married her with another youth but as she was in love with Pratap, she left her husband.

Singh claimed that the girl was pressurising Pratap to marry her so on Monday, her lover brought her to Sitapur assuring her of marriage but later with the help of his friend, Kaushal, poured kerosene over the girl and set her ablaze. However, some villagers of Piswa rushed to the girl’s help and the accused escaped.

The victim was shifted to district hospital from where she was referred to Trauma Centre in Lucknow.

In Saharanpur also, Ramkumar Verma was burnt alive by unidentified miscreants. The body of Verma was found lying near Khudana Nahar in Nanauta area of the district on Tuesday morning. Police claimed to have formed a team to work out the case.

In Kaushambi, a 19-year-old woman was allegedly abducted from her village and raped by two youths, police said on Tuesday.

The woman was abducted on September 13 by the duo who are cousins. They took her to their relatives’ place in the Paschim Sarira police station area and raped her, the victim’s father alleged. She somehow managed to escape and returned home about a week back and told her family about the incident.

Her father said the local police refused to register an FIR. The family then approached Kaushambi’s superintendent of police and after he intervened, an FIR was registered on Monday. In one more incident, a Dalit girl was allegedly raped by a man in Pratapgarh following which the accused was arrested, police said on Tuesday.

The incident took place on Sunday when the 17-year-old girl was sleeping in her house and the accused, identified as Chandrakesh Verma, entered her room through the terrace and raped her, police said. According to police, the girl was alone in the house at the time of the incident.

In another rape incident, a deaf and dumb girl was raped in Gorakhpur.

According to reports, the girl was alone in her house in Kewladabar hamlet on Monday evening when her neighbour, identified as Pintu, entered the house and taking advantage of the situation, raped her and escaped. The cops registered a case but the accused was not arrested.

Focused containment in Alambagh, Gomtinagar

With Alambagh and Gomtinagar witnessing more cases, focused containment activities were carried out in these areas and Aliganj on Tuesday. A senior official at the CMO office said more than 50 cases had emerged from these areas on Monday, hence they were being monitored effectively.

Additional Chief Secretary, Finance, Sanjeev Kumar Mittal was admitted to SGPGI after he tested positive for coronavirus on Tuesday. Mittal was sitting beside Finance Minister Suresh Khanna on Monday while sharing details of revenue collection by the state government till September. Official sources said the charge of the finance department could be assigned to some other officer till Mittal returns to work.

Health officials also visited these areas to carry out an inspection of how the teams were moving, what was the quality of work, what were the preparations and what was the room for improvement in the containment activity.

He said there were 4-5 areas in the city with zero cases. "We will shift the staff from these areas to Gomtinagar and Alambagh for surveillance work. In Aliganj, we brought rapid response teams from silent areas and increased their number from 13 to 20," he said.

WHO recognises white paper on ivermectin

A white paper on ivermectin, which was prepared by Dr Surya Kant from KGMU's Respiratory Medicine department and other national experts, has been recognised by WHO which displayed it on its website. Dr Surya Kant said ivermectin can also be used for viral illnesses apart from its anti-parasitic use.

"Several laboratories have confirmed its efficacy against Covid-19. It results in a decrease of Covid-associated morbidity and mortality. Ivermectin prevents entry of coronavirus into cells and nucleus. It also prevents multiplication of the virus. It acts

428 test positive, 539 recover

As many as 428 persons tested positive for coronavirus in Lucknow on Tuesday while 539 patients recovered, taking the total number of recoveries to 49,410. There have been 754 deaths in Lucknow till now while there are 5,553 active cases in the district.

A senior official at the CMO office said the patients included 38 from Gomtinagar 34 from Indiranagar, 28 from Rae Bareilly road, 24 from

Ashiyana, 22 from Aliganj, 19 from Cantt, 18 each from Chinhat & Talkatora, 17 from Jankipuram, 16 from Alambagh, 15 from Chowk, 14 from Madaiaon, 13 from Mahanagar, 12 from Hazratganj and 11 from Sarojinagar.

There were four deaths in the district and the victims included two from Lucknow and one each from Lakhimpur Kheri and Ayodhya. There were three deaths at KGMU, including that of a 41-year-old

man from Bihar, a 55-year-old man from Rajajipuram and an 8-day-old infant from Ayodhya.

In the state, 3,663 persons tested positive, including 168 in Kanpur, 191 in Prayagraj, 158 in Gorakhpur and 185 in Ghaziabad, taking the tally to 42,097. There were 61 deaths in the state, taking the toll to 6153. Besides, 4,432 patients recovered, taking the total number of recoveries to 3,70,753 while there are 44,031 active cases in the state.

Singh on Tuesday for setting up a Cath lab and the minister promised all help.

Meanwhile, spokesperson of Ram Manohar Lohia Institute of Medical Sciences Dr Shrikesh Singh said the number of Covid patients had declined but there were severe patients.

"Nearly, 15-20 per cent of the critical patients are from neighbouring districts such as Sitapur, Hardoi and Barabanki. They probably come here because of mental satisfaction of getting treatment from a premier institute," he said. He added that the hospital had given services to people even in the lockdown period.

Family held hostage, robbers decamp with cash, valuables

A group of robbers held a family hostage at the knife-point and decamped with Rs 1.25 lakh in cash, a motorcycle, mobile phone and ornaments in Vikalp Khand under Chinhat police station area on the intervening night of Monday and Tuesday.

Police registered a case under Section 459 of IPC (whilst committing lurking house-trespass or house-breaking, causes grievous hurt to any person or attempts to cause death or grievous hurt to any person) in this connection.

It was the second case registered under section 459 of IPC after one which was registered in Banthra on September 28 when house-breakers had killed a woman, identified as Deepika Trivedi of Gatipur village in the area.

As per reports, the miscreants scaled the boundary wall to enter the house of Uday Pratap Singh of Vikalp Khand-3 in the area. Singh is the retired senior food inspector.

Around 3 am, the miscre-

ants started collecting goods from Singh's house and due to commotion, Singh woke up and challenged the miscreants. He also raised an alarm to alert other family members and to seek help from neighbours. However, it failed to deter the miscreants and one of them attacked him with a knife.

Singh tried to take evasive action and he suffered injuries on his hand. The thieves then locked others in a bathroom and decamped with cash, motorcycle, mobile phone and other valuables. Singh's brother Santosh Singh lodged a case, stating details of the incident. As the news broke in the morning, the social media was flooded with the news of dacoity in the area.

However, the Lucknow police claimed that it was a case of theft and not dacoity or robbery. Police spokesman AK Dwivedi said it was a case of theft and a case was registered on the complaint of victim's brother. He said a sub-inspector had been assigned the probe. Sources said it was the second case in which the house

owner/inmate was attacked by thieves or robbers at the house. Earlier, the police had registered a case under section 459 of IPC saying thieves had choked the woman to death during theft at her house in Banthra.

YOUTH FOUND HANGING

A youth, identified as Ghanshyam (20) of sector-3 colony in Jankipuram, was found hanging at his house on Tuesday. Though police said the youth ended his life, no suicide note was recovered from the scene.

Ghanshyam was found hanging from the ceiling with a saree tied around his neck. After he did not wake up in the morning, his mother Dharmmati went to wake him up but found the doors bolted from inside. As Ghanshyam did not respond, Dharmmati sought help from neighbours who broke open the doors, only to find him hanging. The police said Ghanshyam's father Guru Dayal works with Nirman Nigam. The body was sent for autopsy and further investigation was started.

Four arrested on murder charges

Lucknow (PNS): The Cantonment police arrested four miscreants involved in the murder of a vegetable vendor. Those arrested were identified as Mohammed Alam and his sons — Mohammed Azam, Mohammed Alam and Mohammed Altaf (all of Arjunanj) — in Cantonment police station area. The deceased was identified as Mithun Kumar Lodhi. The police said Mithun had a brawl with Mohammed Nafis on putting up a vegetable stall. As the brawl escalated, Nafis and his sons attacked Mithun, who was all alone. He suffered grievous injuries and was rushed to a hospital where he succumbed to injuries.

SUSPENDED

DG (Prison) Anand Kumar ordered suspension of Lucknow jail pharmacist Shailendra Kumar Singh and warden Sushil Kumar Mishra on Tuesday for their alleged involvement in corrupt practices. According to PRO, DG (Prison), the action was taken after a sting operation carried out by a news channel, according to which the above-named officials allowed jail inmates treatment outside the jail premises in unauthorisedly.

BSIP to estimate number of corona cases through sewage samples

PNS ■ LUCKNOW

Birbal Sahni Institute of Palaeosciences (BSIP) is studying the sewage samples of two STPs in the city to estimate the actual number of coronavirus cases in the city. Covid lab incharge and senior scientist Niraj Rai said it would give a fairly accurate number of cases in the city. He said it would give more accurate results as compared to testing.

"If you do 2,000 tests, you will get 700-800 positive results but it will give us the real numbers which can go up to few

lakhs and not thousands," he said.

He said they had collected the samples from the Bhawara STP in Gomtinagar and Chowk STP which cover a major population of the city.

He said they had collected the samples during the peak, which was in the second and third week of September. "We have collected the data and we are analysing the samples," he said.

Rai said the virus goes into the sewage through the faecal matter. "One can check the strains in the samples

through which a very accurate estimate can be made. We have collected the water samples from the STPs and quantified the strains which can give the number of cases," he said.

He added that one group of scientists from south had done a similar work and already submitted the paper. "In our study, we are covering 80 per cent of the population and we will be the second group of scientists to be conducting the study," he said. He added that the methodology includes extracting the viral RNA and then sequencing it.

SOPs for pvt schools submitted with DM

Lucknow (PNS):President of Unaided Private Schools' Association Anil Agarwal met District Magistrate Abhishek Prakash and submitted the SOPs and consent forms for parents in connection with the opening of schools from October 15. He said they have suggested the opening of class X & class XII only from October 15 and class IX & class XI from Diwali onwards. Suggestions have been made for complete sanitisation with sodium hypochlorite by designated individuals wearing proper kits at the start and end.

"All classrooms and halls also have to be sanitised with proper protocols. No entry will be allowed without thermal scanning and sanitisers at the gates. No entry of students will be allowed without masks. Latex gloves are also recommended. Students will go directly to classes assigned and remain there for the entire duration. There will be no lunch break," he said.

He said toilets would be used sparingly and only one student at a time would be allowed to leave the class. "We recommend students carrying their own water bottles," he added. He said school would not be responsible for personal transport. "Vans and buses will be operational only where possible and schools will not be held liable. All protocols of transport will be followed where used. Only bicycles will be allowed in the campus where it is possible and scooters, motorcycles will not be allowed," he added.

5-day workshop at BBAU

Lucknow (PNS): The AICTE Atal-sponsored five-day workshop at Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar University (BBAU) is being organised by the department of Information Technology. At the inauguration ceremony on Tuesday, Vice-Chancellor Acharya Sanjay Singh said that in this period of epidemic, online training is the need of the hour for teachers and for students and that such programmes help in connecting people. Dean and director of workshop RA Khan said that to sustain world-class education, teachers and students must join such training programmes. Dharendra Pandey informed the participants about BBAU's programme. There was a panel discussion in which Prabudh Chaturvedi from Delhi, Ramanuja Pandey from Bengaluru and Ravi Prakash Pandey from Ayodhya took part.

Software engineer in police net for sexually exploiting Nepali woman

A software engineer was arrested along with a woman accomplice for raping and blackmailing a Nepali woman. The woman was forced to leave the city after which she shifted to Nagpur, where she lodged a case in this connection. The Chinhat police arrested the accused and his aide as the crime had taken place there in 2018.

The accused, identified as Praveen Kumar Yadav of Sultanpur, worked as a software engineer in Saudi Arab. His aide was identified as Sufi Vishwakarma of Semra locality in Chinhat. Both were arrested on Monday night.

As per reports, the Nepali woman was staying at Krishna Apartment along with Sufi and

was working with a company. Sufi got acquainted with the Nepali woman and later duped

her of Rs 1.5 lakh.

Sufi had earlier introduced the Nepali woman to Praveen Kumar Yadav and both interacted through video calling frequently. She shared the issue with Praveen, who assured her help. He later visited Lucknow and started sexually exploiting her. In her complaint at a police station in Nagpur, the woman alleged that Praveen spiked her drinks at her flat and then raped her. Praveen filmed the incident and started blackmailing her. He made the video viral and forced her to leave the city. The woman shifted to Nagpur and shared her ordeal with a friend there. Later, she lodged a complaint against the accused. The FIR was transferred to Chinhat. A police team worked on the case and arrested the accused.

SSR case: Rhea custody extended till October 20

TN RAGHUNATHA ■ MUMBAI

A Special court here on Tuesday extended the judicial custody of actress Rhea Chakraborty in the Sushant Singh Rajput-related drug case till October 20, even as Rhea's family's lawyer Satish Maneshinde charged that the actor's family and their lawyers were "interfering and tampering" with the investigations.

The special court also extended the remand of Rhea's brother, Showik Chakraborty, and others till October 20.

In a related development, the Bombay High Court -which had on September 29 reserved its verdict on the bail pleas of Rhea, Showik and others in the same case - is expected to deliver its order on Wednesday.

Meanwhile, Rhea's family lawyer Satish Maneshinde charged that Sushant's family and their lawyers were "interfering and tampering" with the

investigations, by raising doubts about the probe carried out by the CBI and the forensic report submitted to it by the All India Institute of Medical Science (AIIMS) which has ruled out murder in the Sushant death and said it was a clear case of "suicide".

Maneshinde's statement came on the day when the Special court extended Chakraborty's judicial custody by another fortnight i.e., till October 20.

"The CBI is independently and impartially investigating both the cases and the agency is supposed to be insulated and free from any interference," Maneshinde said.

"It is disturbing to learn that the family of SSR and its lawyers are interfering and tampering with the investigations by bringing pressure on the AIIMS team of doctors by speaking to them during investigations and releasing purported audio

recorded conversations and information to the media in order to bring pressure and tamper with potential witnesses," Maneshinde said.

"The SSR family lawyer (Vikas Singh) is supposed to have said that he is going to meet the CBI Director to get the family's pre-determined path of investigations in SSR death. It is very disturbing to read such information in the media as attempts are being made to get a pre-determined result in the case," Maneshinde said. "Any further attempts to interfere and tamper with the investigations would be brought to the notice of the appropriate courts," Maneshinde added.

It may be recalled that Rhea was arrested on September 8, after 19-long hours of grilling carried out during a span of three days. Her brother Showik had been arrested five days earlier.

Combative Rahul says won't back down on farm laws

Dares PM to come to Punjab to convince farmers

Patiala/Kurukshetra: Capping three days of protests against the new farm laws, Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Tuesday said his party will not allow the Centre to imperil India's food security as he attacked Prime Minister Narendra Modi on a host of issues, including the Hathras case.

Claiming that several institutions, including the media, that protect the voice of the people have been "captured" by the BJP-led Centre, he said, "Give me free press and institutions which are free, this government will not last for long." A combative Gandhi also targeted the prime minister on the Ladakh standoff, demonetisation and GST, besides the farm laws, and asked why he was "scared" of answering queries from mediapersons.

The prime minister does not understand these farm laws, the Congress leader alleged on the final day of his tractor rally in Punjab and dared Prime Minister Modi to come to the state and stand with farmers if these new legislations were in the interest of the farming community. **PTI**

Maha Cong Min trying to divert Central project, says Sena MP

Shiv Sena MP Vinayak Raut on Tuesday claimed Congress Minister in Maharashtra Amit Deshmukh is trying to divert a Central project meant for Konkarni to his home district Latur, an assertion disputed by the latter.

Raut, whose party is a Congress ally, said the Ayush Ministry has finalised setting up the National Institute of Medicinal Plants at Sindhurg in Konkarni, but Deshmukh "on his own" wrote to the Centre seeking to locate the project at Latur in the Marathwada region.

The Sena leader is the Lok

Sabha MP from Ratnagiri-Sindhurg, which is part of the coastal Konkarni region.

Reacting to Raut's claim, Amit Deshmukh, the state's Medical Education Minister, said there was no discussion at the level of his department at any point of time about locating the institute in Sindhurg.

He, however, stressed that there are no differences between the Shiv Sena and the Congress on the issue.

The Congress leader, son of former chief minister Vilasrao Deshmukh, is an MLA from Latur and is also the guardian minister of the central Maharashtra district.

Coal scam: Court convicts ex-Min Dilip Ray, others

New Delhi: A special court convicted former Union Minister Dilip Ray on Tuesday here in a coal scam case pertaining to irregularities in the allocation of a Jharkhand coal block in 1999. Special Judge Bharat Parashar convicted Ray, former minister of state (coal) in the Atal Bihari Vajpayee government, for criminal conspiracy and other offences.

The court also convicted two senior officials of the Ministry of Coal at that time, Pradip Kumar Banerjee and Nitya Nand Gautam, Castron Technologies Ltd (CTL), its director Mahendra Kumar Agarwalla and Castron Mining Ltd (CML).

The court will hear arguments on the quantum of sentence on October 14. The case pertains to allocation of Brahmadiha coal block in Giridih in Jharkhand to CTL in 1999. **PNS**

India's wildlife, biodiversity equally imperative as its developmental needs: Modi

New Delhi: India's developmental needs are paramount but wildlife and biodiversity are equally imperative, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Tuesday.

In his message to the nation to mark the celebration of the ongoing Wildlife Week, the prime minister said India's commitment to wildlife protection and conservation is strong. "Wildlife conservation is ingrained in our ethos and has always been an integral part of our tradition and culture. Our holy Constitution also enshrines this philosophy by including conservation of forest and wildlife as one of the fundamental duties of every Indian."

"India harbours 17 per cent of world population with in 2.4 per cent land area of the world. Developmental needs of the country are paramount. However, we believe wildlife and biodiversity conservation are equally imperative," Modi said in a written message.

He said that with a robust and wide network of protected areas, the country's commitment to worlds wildlife protection is as strong as ever.

"Eco-sensitive zones provide a peripheral support and act as a buffer around national parks and sanctuaries. Taking

great strides in this direction, several such zones have been notified to enhance the space availability for thriving wildlife," Modi said. He said India remains a natural home to a variety of migratory species and for this reason, Gandhinagar declaration, which was adopted during the 13th Conference of Parties to Convention on Migratory Species in February this year, prioritised the integration of the concept of ecological connectivity into the 'Post 2020 Global Biodiversity Framework'.

"We are emphasising on the conservation of migratory birds and marine species," he said.

Prime Minister Modi also took pride in India being home to wild Asiatic lions and tigers, saying the result of the concerted efforts of the nation in conserving wildlife are showing.

"Our country hosts the last wild population of Asiatic lions. It also possesses the distinction of having the highest number of tigers in the world. The result of the concerted efforts of the nation towards conserving our wildlife are showing. The resolve of doubling tiger numbers has been fulfilled. We have achieved this target well in advance. **PTI**

JMM accuses Tejashwi of political betrayal

An exasperated JMM launched an attack on the RJD leadership saying that the new leadership of the RJD has forgotten political decency and sacrifices made by the JMM.

"In Bihar we wanted to contest along with the UPA alliance to defeat the communal party like the BJP and the JD (U), which is a party of negative mindset. We wanted to be the part of change that people of Bihar want. We have the organizational base in Bihar, a fact that RJD is aware of. We also remained a political force in Bihar. In the 2015 Assembly election in Bihar the JMM had extended support to the RJD led alliance because we wanted defeat of the BJP.

Hathras impact: Congress postpones announcement of candidates list for Bihar polls

The impact of the Hathras rape case is being felt even in Bihar Assembly elections with Congress postponing announcement of its list of candidates for the upcoming polls in the state with few party leaders asserting tickets should not be given to tainted leaders.

AICC sources said the Congress Election Committee was to finalize and release its list of candidates by Monday evening but it was unable to do it and the matter has been placed before the party high command to take a view.

"The party wants to keep away from the controversy of proposing the names of tainted candidates, particularly those related to cases on women issues. Our top leadership have been fighting on this front and most recently over the Hathras," said the party sources. With Congress leaders Rahul Gandhi and Priyanka Gandhi Vadra leading the campaign against Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, senior party leaders are of the view that giving tickets to the rape and crime against women related cases will boomerang and erode the moral of the grand old party which taken on the Hathras incident by attacking the government tooth and nail.

Further explaining the reasons for the delay is the name of shortlisted candidates like Brajesh Pandey (for Gopindganj constituency) tainted with rape and other crimes against women, attracting protests from several leaders most notable being senior Congress leader and former Union minister Girija Vyas.

family has expressed that they are not satisfied with the CBI taking up the case and said an SIT, monitored by the apex court, should probe the case.

At this point, the bench asked Jaishwant her locus standi was in the case.

"You don't have any locus in this matter. But we are hearing you because the case is such and of huge importance. We are hearing you because this is a shocking incident, but we are still pondering over your locus in this case," said the bench.

Advocate Kirti Singh, appearing for a few women lawyers, said the probe should be under the supervision of the court.

The apex court said this is a horrible incident but it does not want repetitive arguments in court.

"It is horrible incident but the question is how many similar arguments should we hear? Please understand that there is no need to duplicate concerns in the court of law," the bench said.

"Court of law need not hear the same argument by every party. This is not a comment on the incident but please understand our point of view," it added.

The Uttar Pradesh Government earlier in the day sought a CBI probe into the alleged gang-rape and murder of the Dalit woman saying it will ensure that no vested interest is able to create a fake and false narrative with "oblique motives".

In an affidavit filed in response to a PIL, which has been listed for hearing before a bench headed by Chief

Justice S A Bobde, the UP Government said it is important that the investigation is carried out by an independent Central agency.

Said the State has already requested the Centre that the CBI takes over the investigation as it would obviate hindrance being created by certain vested interests in the fair and impartial investigation. Quoting FSL reports, it has however denied the charge that rape was committed.

"We remain committed to upholding the rules-based international order, underpinned by the rule of law, transparency, freedom of navigation in the international seas, respect for territorial integrity and sovereignty and peaceful resolution of disputes," he added.

Spelling out India's stand, he said it was for advancing the security and

economic interests of all countries having legitimate and vital interests in the region.

Incidentally, Australia is keen to join the yearly Malabar series of maritime exercise between India, US and Japan in November-end. However, a decision is yet to be taken. Moreover, China is resisting such a proposal of all the four countries of Quad holding a military exercise.

Among other key points, Jaishankar also underlined the need for "seeking collective solutions to global challenges, including global recovery from the pandemic and reform of multilateral institutions".

Highlighting the growing importance of this coalition, he also said the fact that the four Foreign Ministers were meeting in person, despite the global pandemic, is "testimony to the importance that these consultations have gained, particularly in recent times". He added, "Our world is significantly different today than what it was when we last met in New York in September 2019."

As regards other issues, the four Foreign Ministers were likely to discuss plans for manufacturing and distribution of a Covid-19 vaccine, connectivity, development of 5G technology, maritime cooperation, counter-terrorism, cyber security, and development of critical infrastructure and supply chains. The Quad Foreign Ministers also called on Japan's new Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga.

GOVT DEFERS PRIVATISATION MOVE; POWER STAFF END STIR

SBD is the guiding document for states looking to offer discoms to private companies.

This is for the first time that the Central government has drafted guiding SBD for privatisation of discoms. It is in line with the Centre's efforts to improve the operations and finances of the discoms in various states.

In 2019, the Union power ministry had suggested several private franchise models to the states for the power distribution sector. In May, under the Atmanirbhar Package, the Central government had announced that the power distribution in all Union Territories would be privatised.

Currently, power distribution has been privatised in a few cities — Delhi, Mumbai, Agra and Ahmedabad. The process of privatisation of PVVNL was initiated in June soon after the package was announced in May. The accumulated losses of the PVVNL are Rs 1,500 crore as of March 2020 and the aggregate and technical and commercial loss of 37.9 per cent.

As of March 2020, the total net loss of all five discoms in the state stood at Rs 819 crore, according to the Ujjwal Discom Assurance Yojana (UDAY) portal. The state's average aggregate technical and commercial loss is 30 per cent — higher than the national average of 19.19 per cent.

The PVVNL controls and manages electricity supply in eastern UP districts — Ghazipur, Chandauli, Jaunpur, Varanasi, Sant Ravidas Nagar, Mirzapur, Sonbhadra, Mau, Azamgarh, Gorakhpur, Ballia, Deoria, Kushinagar, Maharajganj, Sant Kabir Nagar, Basti, Siddharthnagar, Prayagraj, Pratapgarh, Fatehpur and Kaushambi.

In 2018, UP had announced it would offer five cities, including state capital Lucknow and Varanasi, to a private distribution franchisee. The move however failed to take off following the stiff resistance by the power employees and the 2019 Lok Sabha elections.

Admn tightens grips as power crisis worsens in many areas

As the power employees including the engineers continued their indefinite strike for the second day on Tuesday in protest against privatisation of Purvanchal Vidut Vitran Nigam Limited (PVVNL), which supplies electricity to the 21 districts of six divisions of Purvanchal (eastern UP), many areas not only in the city but also in many other parts of the region have started facing serious power crisis. Due to pre-vailing power crisis, many areas saw protests from the local residents and in connection with the same many persons including two corporators Bablu Shah (Om Kaleshwar Ward) and Mithilesh Sahani (Prahlaad Ghat) were arrested under the Adamपुरa police station while they were raising voices against the power crisis. Later they were released. As many areas including Sarnath and Sigra faced long power disruption which also created a water crisis, the local residents also raised voices at nearby power sub-stations.

Meanwhile, the district administration has tightened its grips to meet the crisis created by the strike of power employees. Divisional Commissioner (DC) Deepak Agrawal, Inspector General (IG-Range) Vijay Singh Meena, District

Magistrate (DM) Kaushal Raj Sharma and Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Amit Pathak visited some of the power divisions and sub-stations and studied the stock of situation. They also held a meeting with the Managing Director (MD) Dr Saroj Kumar to assess the situation. The DM said that the number of alternative teams has been increased and Nagar Nigam has been instructed to make arrangements of generators in view to ensure supply of water smoothly in all the areas. He said that the attempts are being made to restart water pumps where the supply was disrupted by using generators. According to him, due to some routine faults, power supply from Ledupur sub-station was

disrupted and attempts are being made to repair the same.

Sharma further said that in all the hospitals, the power supply is normal and water supply is being assured there. Besides, Nagar Nigam has also made arrangements of water-tanks for the areas facing water crisis. He said that an FIR would be lodged against those involved in creating crisis under the Essential Service Maintenance Act (ESMA), Disaster Management Act and National Security Act (NSA). According to him, for ensuring round-the-clock power supply, shift-wise deployment of employees is being ensured.

Meanwhile, under the banner of Power Employees' Joint Action Committee, the employees held a meeting at

PVVNL headquarters at Bhikharpur which was attended by hundreds of employees and engineers. While addressing the power staff, the speakers apprised the power staff of the continuous deadlock as a long marathon between agitating employees with the Power Minister failed to reach a consensus a day ago. Similar meetings were also held at many other districts of Varanasi, Allahabad, Gorakhpur, Azamgarh, Vindhyachal (Mirzapur) and Basti zones of PVVNL.

The agitating employees said that their work boycott did not include power production units, 765/400 KV power sub-stations and control systems and supply to hospitals and water pumps continued as usual. They said that the privatisation would not affect the power employees but its impacts would be on the common customers. They expressed their concern over the rigid attitude of the state government as it failed to take any initiatives despite 34 days of agitation to draw its attention.

Among those present were RK Wahi, Kedar Tiwari, Chandra Shekhar Chaurasia, Dr RB Singh, Sanjay Bharti, Ved Prakash Rai, Deepak Agarwal, Shashi Kiran Maurya and Raman Srivastava.

118 COVID-19 patients found

As many as 118 new COVID-19 patients have been detected on Tuesday, increasing the total number of cases to 14,315. Besides, the district also saw one more death, increasing the toll to 232. During the day, the follow-up negative reports included 196 patients. Out of them, 195 patients were recovered from home isolation, increasing the number to 9,867 and just one patient has been discharged from the hospital. With this, the number of cured patients from the hospitals has increased to 2,736. The total number of cured patients is now 12,603, leaving 1,480 active patients. The recovery rate has improved to 88.04 per

cent and the mortality rate has remained at 1.62 per cent.

Meanwhile, Urban Primary Health Centre (UPHC), Manduadih was visited by Dr Prem Prakash Upadhyay and Satya Prakash, District Programme Manager, Chandauli under the rejuvenation programme (Kayakalp Karyakaram) conducted under the National Health Mission (NHM). This was the third and final phase evaluation of the health centre under the rejuvenation programme in which only Manduadiha UPHC has been selected from all the 31 UPHCs of Varanasi division. There are 24 UPHCs in Varanasi, three in Jaunpur and two each in Chandauli and Ghazipur. During the visit, the team inspected delivery and

vaccination rooms apart from seeing the progress of the family planning programme. The team members also saw labs, bio-medical waste disposal, medicine store, sanitation and other medical facilities in which all the facilities were found to be well organised. Dr Mamta Pandey, Medical Officer Incharge and all the staff were found in dress. It was also suggested by the team that the painting on the wall of the yoga room should be finished as soon as possible. ACMO Dr AK Maurya, present during the visit, encouraged the medical staff of the health centre for their better work.

Chief Medical Officer (CMO) Dr VB Singh has also has informed that in the first

report of the day by 11 am, 107 positive patients were detected out of 1,514 received reports. Till then, the total test reports received were 2,27,238 and the results of 3,887 are awaited. Out of them, 2,12,934 were negative while 14,304 positive. The total number of samples collected was 2,45,543.

Earlier, two males aged 35 and 46 from Assi (Bhelupur) and Maal Road (Cantonment) succumbed to COVID-19 at Sir Sundarlal Hospital (SSH), Banaras Hindu University (BHU) and Heritage Hospital respectively.

With the addition of six new red zones, the total number of hotspots has increased to 2,107 including 314 red zones. There are 1,793 green zones with 16 new ones.

Identify patients with ILI, SARI symptoms: CMO

Chief Medical Officer (CMO) Dr VB Singh has instructed all the doctors to inform the Covid Command Control Room (1077) about the people with influenza like illness (ILI) and severe acute respiratory infections (SARI) symptoms apart from co-morbid patients and ensure their antigen tests and RTPCR immediately so that in case anyone of them is found corona positive, his/her treatment can be started soon in view to avoid the health condition turning critical. He also asked the doctors to take the corona tests seriously; otherwise, it

would be their responsibility in case of negligence in treatment.

According to him, various activities are being organised in the district under the ongoing month-long special communicable disease control campaign on the instructions of District Magistrate (DM) Kaushal Raj Sharma. On Monday, Asha workers visited 33,642 and 27,971 houses in the rural and urban areas respectively and mobilised the people about the favourable conditions of mosquito breeding. As many as 64 meetings were organised in which 482 women took part and chlorination demos (process to sterilise water) was carried out at 949 locations, in

which 5,759 persons participated. During the visit, 277 patients with fever, cough and other symptoms were found and during the past 48 hours, the number of Covid testing on 218 ILI cases identified by door-to-door teams was done.

Besides, the number of houses visited by rural Asha workers in rural and urban areas was 1.79 lakh and information given on the favourable conditions of mosquito breeding in 1.57 lakh houses. The number of Rural Health Sanitation and Nutrition Day (VHSND) programmes were 293 and 1,193 meetings were organised in which 7,795 took part. In all, chlorination demos

(process to sterilise water) was carried out at 4,863 locations, in which 27,508 persons participated. As many as 2,003 patients with fever, cough and other symptoms were found so far. District Malaria Officer Sharad Chand Pandey said that in addition to this, the Panchayati Raj department has sprayed anti-larvae in 242 villages of Harahua, Badagaon, Pindra, Kashi Vidyapeeth, Arajline, Sewapuri, Chiragaon and Cholapur villages. Anti larva and sodium hypo-chloride sprayed by the teams of the Health department in which 2,638 sources were deregulated. In the urban areas, anti-larva was sprayed by 15 teams.

Durga Puja Committees in dilemma about erecting pandals

Due to the state of indecisiveness and uncertainty of the district administration, the Durga Puja Committees of Varanasi are in dilemma about erecting Durga Puja pandals. So, they decided only to worship during the auspicious occasion of Shardiya Navratri by installing the idols of Goddess Durga.

With the grand and splendid puja pandals in almost all the areas and Durga Puja's boom all around, the holy city turns into Mini Kolkata particularly for the three days during the auspicious occasion of Shardiya Navratri. Not only from various parts of district but also from adjoining districts come to the city to have a glance of grandeur of puja pandals. The Durga Puja Committees start preparation for the erection of durga pan-

dals even four months in advance. But this time, these committees are in a great dilemma as the district administration has so far not issued any guidelines regarding this while only 15 days are left to begin the auspicious occasion. The Shardiya Navratri will begin from October 22 to come. In fact, the state government has issued guidelines regarding this allowing the committees to erect puja pandals and worship the Goddess Durga with some conditions in view of the COVID-19.

While having a talk with 'The Pioneer' in Lucknow, the Additional Chief Secretary Avnish Awasthi had clearly said, 'Puja is allowed in the park during the auspicious occasion but the procession during immersion is not allowed'. Contrary to this, the Additional District Magistrate (ADM-City) Gulab Chand, while talk-

ing to 'The Pioneer', here on Monday said, 'The district administration has so far not received any guidelines from the government in this direction but it is clear that no durga puja pandal will be allowed to be erected on road or other public places because of corona-virus'. 'The worship could be performed at home by installing the idols of Goddess Durga', he added.

This contradiction has created confusion among Durga Puja committees and some of them are still waiting for any guideline regarding this by the district administration. He came to know through media about the decision taken by the district administration not to allow anyone to erect puja pandals on road but was not informed by any authority in the administration regarding this, the president of Varanasi Durgotsav Sammilini, the old-

est Durga Puja pandal of city, Devashish Das said adding, 'Now, the committee has decided to perform only worship of Goddess by following the guidelines of COVID-19 and no puja pandal will be erected'.

In view of the COVID-19 pandemic, we have already decided not to erect grand Durga Puja pandal in Hathua Market, which draws the crowd in thousands with its uniqueness and grandeur but now, decided just to perform puja there if allowed otherwise the same would be performed at home to continue the tradition, the president of Premier Boys Club, Ajay Rai said adding, the district administration seems to be in the state of indecisive and uncertainty regarding this even till date. The similar views were also expressed by the president of New Delight Club Durga Puja Samiti, Orderly Bazar Manoj Kumar.

189 more test positive in Prayagraj

The number of patients with corona infections has decreased somewhat in terms of data after two months. Reports of 189 patients, including two professors of Allahabad University and MNNIT, came positive after the Covid test on Monday. At the same time 13,090 patients living in home isolation have been cured. In 24 hours, three corona-infected

people died during treatment. CMO Dr GS Bajpai gave this information. He said that 239 people were free of corona infection on Monday. Home isolation of 220 of these was completed. 19 patients were discharged from various Covid hospitals and Covid care centres.

According to the CMO, 242 patients are admitted in various Covid hospitals, care centres. Among them, 37

patients are admitted in Kalindipuram Covid Care Centre, 24 in Railway Hospital, 43 in Tej Bahadur Sapru Hospital, 21 in United Medicity and 30 in Sainath Vatsalya AMA Hospital. The maximum 87 infected are hospitalised in SRN Hospital.

According to Nodal Officer for Corona Dr Rishi Sahai, the newly infected included one of the Allahabad University professors and one professor of

MNNIT. An MBBS student of the medical college along with a Deputy Manager of State Bank of India are among the infected for coronavirus. At the same time, five advocates have also been confirmed after the Covid test came positive. He said that so far 20,265 people have been infected in the district. In the past 24 hours, three infected people died. The cause of his death is said to be afflicted by another serious illness.

Durga Puja: HC directive to approach DM for permission

The Allahabad High Court has directed petitioners, seeking permission to organise Durga Puja in Prayagraj during COVID-19 pandemic, to approach the District Magistrate for the same.

The bench comprising Chief Justice Govind Mathur and Justice Siddhartha Varma disposed of the petition filed by Pronob Kumar Roy and another while observing that the District Magistrate will decide the matter in accordance with law while taking into consideration guidelines issued by the government of Uttar Pradesh.

Petitioners had sought permission to organise Durga Puja under the guidelines laid by the Central/ State/ District Administration on the eve of

COVID-19.

Petitioners asked to direct the district and police administration to call a meeting of the office-bearers of the Bengali Welfare Association and the Durga Puja Committee, at least 21 days prior to taking any decision in this regard, for appraisal of their difficulties.

The writ was however disposed of with a direction to approach the District Magistrate.

HC ALLOWS PETITION SEEKING PERMISSION OF MAJLIS : The Allahabad High Court allowed a petition seeking permission of Majlis (religious gathering) at Imambada Masjid Meer Imam Ali Mehdi Begum of Varanasi while directing the local police not to create any hindrance in the holding of the Majlis.

The bench comprising Justice SK Gupta and justice Pankaj Bhatia disposed of the petition filed by Waqf Imambada Masjid Meer Imam Ali Mehdi Begum alleging that on a regular basis a Majlis (religious congregation) is performed for 10 days and this year the Majlis was to be performed from September 30 to October 9.

Petitioner had alleged that the Shia Waqf Board vide a letter dated August 21, 2020 had requested the district administration that suitable police arrangements be made so as to enable the Majlis to be held without any hindrance. The permission for Majlis was also granted, however, local police are not allowing religious gathering.

Senior Advocate SFA Naqvi appearing for petition-

er argued, 'Unlock-4 Guidelines itself provide for congregation up to 100 persons in respect of the religious gathering and restraining the petitioner, without any valid reasons, from holding the congregation is violative of Article 19 (1) and Article 25 of the Constitution of India which guarantees freedom to assemble peacefully as well as freedom to practice religion.'

The court while allowing the petition directed local police not to create any hindrance in holding of the Majlis by the petitioner subject to the petitioner ensuring the compliance of the 'Unlock-4 Guidelines' and also ensuring the maintenance of social distancing norms and the other restrictions like wearing of masks and Sanitisation, etc during the religious gathering.

NCR completes many vital works in Sept

North Central Railway has completed many important works in September-2020 with thrust on safety and efficient train operations.

Enhancing safety and efficiency in train operations is a conscious and continuous exercise on NCR. With highest network of 130 kmph trunk routes and high volume of passing through traffic, both safety and detention free train operations are of paramount importance over three divisions of NCR.

To increase safety of road users three maned level crossings have been closed in September 2020 and so far, 18 level crossings have been closed in current financial year. One RUB at level crossing no. 123 has been commissioned in Prayagraj- Pt. Deen Dayal Upadhyaya section and total 4 RUBs have been commissioned in current financial year. Level crossing gate no.

445 in Sank-Morena section of Jhansi division has been interlocked with signal; so far 5 gates have been interlocked in FY 2020-21 to ensure that signal to train get lowered only after closure of gate. In September 2020, a major work of launching bow string girder of 42 metre span weighing more than 300 tonnes has been completed successfully at ROB no 426 in Birlanagar Rayaru section of Jhansi division.

Track safety is always accorded highest priority on NCR and 53 track kms track renewal done in September-20 with total 193 track kms TRR (primary) completed in 2020-21 till September. To enhance safety and speed of trains over point and crossing zone, 6 nos. thick web switches have been provided in September 2020 and so far, 15 thick web switches have been commissioned in FY 2020-21. Despite COVID-19 situation, execution of all other safety related track maintenance works has

been above Railway Board's target for September-20. First running loop at stations between Lalitpur and Khajuraho has been increased from 15 kmph to 30 kmph for faster receipt and dispatch of trains. For enhanced safety of passengers new FOB at Kanwar station was commissioned in September and so far 4 new FOBs are constructed in current financial year.

With commissioning Block Proving Axle Counters (BPAC) in 3 block sections during September 2020 complete section between Prayagraj to Fatehpur is now equipped with BPAC for automatic confirmation of complete and safe arrival of train at a particular station. In a major work towards freight train handling capacity augmentation, panel interlocking (PI) work at Harduaganj was commissioned on 14.09.20 with provision of Ultratech Cement siding along with additional line no 9 and 10 in Harduaganj yard. With completion of this important

work now 163 route combinations are available in this major yard as compared to earlier 117 routes for efficient handling of freight traffic for NTPC, Ultratech and other industries.

In the field of rolling stock safety related maintenance works like intermediate overhauling (IOH) of 50 coaches, shop schedule(SS-I) of 29 LHB coaches, periodic overhauling (POH) of 31 coaches, routine overhauling (ROH) of 286 wagons and periodic overhauling(POH) of 667 wagons was done during September 2020.

Skill and knowledge updation of running and other category staff is very important for safe train operations. During COVID-19 times, online training facilities have been made available in all the three divisions and so far, more than 1,350 running staff from electrical and diesel operation wings have been imparted refresher training through online means.

SHUATS research scholar successful in growing 'goldenrod'

A research scholar of SHUATS, Naini has been successful in growing 'goldenrod', a flower which is mostly used for decorative purposes, in the climatic conditions of Prayagraj.

Sai Bharath has been successful in growing this high-yield and commercially viable flower round the year, including in extreme weather in winter when the mercury plunges to near three degrees Celsius. This promises a bright future for the farmers of the region engaged in floriculture.

The origin of goldenrod's common name refers to both the flower's colour and the plant's spindly presentation. The genus name comes from two Latin words: solidus (meaning 'whole') and ago (meaning 'make'). It's botanical name is Solidago canadensis L.

Bharath has developed this plant under the guidance of SS Saravanan, associate professor of Horticulture department at SHUATS, and with the help of Vijay Bahadur, head of the department.

A Pune-based farm provided me with the mother plant with a word of caution that this will not survive in the climate in Prayagraj. The crop can be cultivated throughout the year. Bright sunny warm weather is best suited for its healthy growth and can be grown in

sandy loam to red loam soils with proper drainage, the factors which were challenging for me to find out in Prayagraj, said Bharath.

This drought-tolerant flower can be grown under varied climatic conditions and is less prone to attack of pests and diseases. Although it lacks fragrance, it is very popular because of its attractive colour and thus used for making bouquets as a filler material with combination of limonium and Hollyhock flower, he explained.

Using goldenrod fillers in combination with limonium is becoming increasingly popular in India because professional florists use fillers not only to flatter the flowers, but also to keep the costs down. The horticulturists can not only grow this flower but can get the harvest all year along, he added.

He added that apart from its decorative value, this plant has various medicinal properties like anti-inflammatory, antioxidant, analgesic and spasmolytic, antibacterial, antifungal, anticancer and immunomodulatory activity.

'Santosh from Manjari farm in Pune told me that this plant is not tolerant to cold temperature and would not survive in winter as witnessed in Prayagraj, when the temperature is as low as five degree Celsius. But, I planted the plants in December and the plants stood up with a hope of

growing. We have grown the flowers and their quality is extremely good and the farmers will get good income,' said Bharath.

Being a high-value and low-volume crop, this is one of the most demanded cut flowers in India, and on special days the price goes up to Rs 20-25 per spike, which is enough to give an idea of the profit and sizable market that awaits the farmers. It is more profitable for small and marginal farmers because they can get more income at lower costs in the available land, said his guide Saravanan.

VANDE BHARAT EXPRESS MAKES MANY RECORDS: Vande Bharat Express, the first semi high speed train built in the country, has made many records since September 12. The Vande Bharat Express from New Delhi to Varanasi did not get delayed for a single day during the last 16 runs. During this, every day except September 30, this train reached Prayagraj Junction before time. The special thing is that out of the 16 trips, 10 trips were done when Vande Bharat came from New Delhi to Prayagraj Junction in less than six hours.

The Vande Bharat Express ceased operations in March 2020 due to COVID-19. Due to the long waiting list of special trains going to Delhi, the operation of Vande Bharat Express

started as a special train on September 12 last month. Vande Bharat, which runs five days a week, has made a total of 16 trips from September 12 to October 3. The special thing is that during this period the train did not get delayed for a single day. Ten of the 16 trips were made when Vande Bharat completed the journey from Delhi to Prayagraj in less than six hours. The arrival and departure time of this train at the junction is 12.08-12.10 hrs, while Vande Bharat reaches Varanasi at 2 o'clock in the day.

13 out of the last 16 trips of the Vande Bharat Express with an average speed of 104 in the country were such that when it reached Varanasi ahead of time. For several days, this train reached Varanasi at 2 o'clock in the day, whereas it was not so before the lock down. Even when going from Varanasi to Delhi, a good improvement was observed in the timing of the train. From September 12 to October 2, the Up rake of Vande Bharat did not reach New Delhi late on a single day. The train reached New Delhi ahead of time five days.

The General Manager NCR Rajeev Chaudhry is continuously monitoring the compliance of each train from one station to another. Due to this, the time compliance of other express trains with Vande Bharat has become better, said the CPRO of NCR Ajit Singh.

11 RRTs to monitor Covid patients in home isolation

Kanpur Nagar District Magistrate Alok Tiwari said that 11 more rapid response teams (RRTs) had been deployed to monitor the COVID-19 patients in home isolation apart from the 40 plus RRTs already on the job for contact tracing and taking samples.

Addressing a meeting of all the nodal officers on Tuesday, the district magistrate said the special teams would visit those patients who had completed four and seven days of home isolation and check their temperatures, take swab samples for testing and give feedback to the Covid control room. He asked the officials manning the

control room to dispose of the complaints they receive the same day itself.

Tiwari said the RRTs would carry out antigen test of all people suffering from cough, cold and fever and go for RT-PCR test of people testing negative in the antigen test..

The district magistrate stressed on tracing the contacts of the person testing positive for coronavirus infection and at least 10 persons who had come in contact with the latter.

Tiwari said the present focus of the district administration was on bringing down the COVID-19 death rate and containing the spread of the coronavirus infection. He said this posed a big challenge to the administrative and medical

officials of Kanpur Nagar.

Later, the district magistrate carried out a surprise inspection of the SPM Hospital once again and took first hand information. He said all the patients admitted to the hospital must get quality care.

He then saw the ICU where eight patients were admitted and found that the treatment was satisfactory.

Tiwari directed the hospital authorities to ensure that they had sufficient backup of medical oxygen to smoothly cater to the needs of the patients for at least 48 hours. He said if the hospital faced any problem in this regard, it should be brought to the notice of the district administration without delay.

The district magistrate warned the medical oxygen suppliers against charging more than the government approved rates. He said medical oxygen supply and pricing was being strictly monitored.

He said that in the current situation when the power supply in the city was erratic, there should be a proper and robust arrangement of 48 hours' power backup for the entire hospital. He said all the private hospitals had agreed to comply with the protocol issued by the Sanjay Gandhi Post-Graduate Institute of Medical Sciences in Lucknow. He said the hospitals should also make proper arrangement for the virtual ICU monitoring as well.

176 more test +ve

Kanpur Nagar reported 176 more coronavirus positive cases on Tuesday evening.

Chief Medical Officer Dr Anil K Mishra said that 176 more people had tested positive for coronavirus infection between Monday evening and Tuesday evening taking the tally of confirmed cases to 26,142 cases.

He said one COVID-19 death in the city pushed the toll to 691 on Tuesday evening.

The CMO said with 170 COVID-19 patients recovering in hospitals and home isolation in the last 24 hours, 22,618 coronavirus infected people had been cured in the city and at present 3003 active cases were undergoing treatment.

Dr Mishra said 5,012 samples were sent for testing in the city.

NCL achieves over 20 pc growth in coal production

The Northern Coalfields Limited (NCL) produced 53.54 million tonnes of coal in the first half of the financial year 2020-21 which is about five per cent more than the production done during the corresponding period in the previous financial year. Even in adverse conditions generated due to Covid-19 the NCL has met the production target from April to September. NCL had produced 51 million tonnes of coal in the same period during the last financial year. Performing brilliantly in the month of September, NCL as compared to the previous year has achieved more than 20 per cent growth in coal production. NCL has produced around



9.2 million tonnes (MT) of coal in September this year. In overburden removal the company has also achieved an increase of around 25 per cent in the first half and removed 185 million cubic metres

of it which will be helpful in coal production as and when required. NCL has also despatched 9.2 million tonnes of coal in September registering an increase of more than 16 per cent. In the first half from April to September, NCL has despatched about 50 million tonnes of coal of which more than 40 million tonnes has been delivered to power houses. In the financial year 2020-21 NCL has been given the target of 113.25 million tonnes of coal production and despatch.

2 held with six monoblock pumps

Madihan police arrested two persons along with six stolen monoblock pumps on Monday. As per the reports received here, Pramod Kumar Singh, a resident of Pateri village, had lodged a first information report (FIR) at Madihan police station that his submersible pump which was installed for irrigation purposes had been stolen from Belan Bakhar canal. In his complaint he had also mentioned about the theft of five other pumps from the area recently. Acting instantly on the complaint the police started gathering information about the culprits through its network. On Monday Dhaurahan police outpost incharge Udai Narain Maurya was on patrolling duty when he tipped off by an informer about the presence of a suspect near the culvert of canal located in Imiliya Chaurasi village. Thereafter police raided the place and interrogated the suspect who was later identified as Pradeep Bind, son of Mansharam, a resident of Imiliya Chaurasi village. With the help of the suspect the police apprehended another accused, Vishal Kol, a resident of the same village, and recovered six monoblock pumps. After completing the necessary legal formalities the police seized the pumps and sent the accused to jail. Meanwhile an earlier

report said Jamalpur police arrested one person, seized two vehicles and rescued four cows. As per the reports, SO Jamalpur Vijay Kumar Saroj spotted two vehicles near Pidkhiid village whose drivers tried to flee on seeing the men in khaki there. Patients with pulmonary problems to be kept in separate hospital area

Ganesh Shankar Vidyarthi Memorial Medical College (GSVM) Principal Prof RB Kamal has directed the LLR Hospital officials to ensure that all the people reporting to the hospital with pulmonary problems like asthma, pneumonia and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) are kept in a separate area.

He said for the COVID-19 patients, special and separate arrangements had been made at the neuro-science centre,

ICU of the maternity wing and isolation ward.

Prof Kamal said at present the patients of COVID-19 and other respiratory problems were being accommodated jointly.

The principal said to ensure that the non-COVID-19 patients did not face any problem in treatment, the hospital had bifurcated the wards. He said Covid test was mandatory for all patients coming to the hospital and once they were found negative only then they would be shifted to the new

allotted wards.

He said this was being done in view of the special directive from the Uttar Pradesh government after the decline in coronavirus positive cases and the spread of the virus as well.

Prof Kamal said currently there were less COVID-19 patients and thus the government had directed that the indoor treatment of other patients should be started in a phased manner.

He said all non-COVID-19 patients would undergo check-

up and treatment separately. Meanwhile, Additional Chief Secretary (Medical Education) Rajneesh Dube issued directives to carry out a fresh probe into the death of two patients at LLR Hospital earlier.

The death audit committee had raised doubts over the two cases and thus their retest was ordered.

Dube said the re-examination would be carried out by a special team from King George's Medical University, Lucknow.

Bring down Covid fatality rate to below 1%, States told

About 48 per cent of the total Covid-19 deaths in the country is concentrated in eight States of 25 districts, of which 15 districts are in Maharashtra alone, the Government said on Tuesday. The target is to bring the fatality rate below 1 per cent, it maintained.

Giving figures on Covid deaths in the country at a press briefing here, Union Health Secretary Rajesh Bhushan said, "Out of 25 districts in eight States, 15 districts are in one state alone, that is Maharashtra. Two districts each are in Karnataka, West Bengal and Gujarat and one each in Tamil Nadu, Punjab, UP and Andhra Pradesh."

The Ministry is in talks with these states to control the deaths due to the pathogen, Bhushan told the reporters. He was of the view that the deaths in these identified districts were not due to poor

health infrastructure but because of delay in treatment.

The States have been asked to enhance tests and thus detection so that those needing the treatment are given adequate medical facilities. "Delay in treatment can progress the disease and hence deaths," Bhushan said even as he added that the States were having enough supply of oxygen and other infrastructure to manage the disease. More than 8 crore COVID tests have been conducted so far, of which 80 lakh tests were done in the last week.

While talking about the spread of Covid-19 in the country, he said that ten States account for 77 per cent of total active cases of which three States viz. Maharashtra, Karnataka and Kerala account for 50 per cent of country's total active cases.

Analysing the trend of COVID cases reported in different states, he remarked that it is too early to take a call on Maharashtra and that there is

Govt issues advisories on preventive measures ahead of festival season

Ahead of the festivals like Navratri, Durga Puja, Diwali, Chhath Puja, the Union Health Ministry on Tuesday issued advisories on preventive measures such as staggered timings, thermal screening, physical distancing, sanitisation and monitoring through CCTVs at the events to contain the spread of Covid-19 which are on increase across the country.

While festive events in the containment zones will not be allowed, the Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) enlists necessary preventive steps that need to be followed for religious worship, fairs, rallies, exhibitions, cultural functions during the festivities that are expected to witness gatherings of a large number of people.

The document says that organisers/staff/visitors from the containment zones shall not be permitted in areas

where festive events are organised. People residing in the containment zones may be encouraged to observe all festivals inside their homes and not move out.

Persons above 65 years, those with co-morbidities, pregnant women and children below 10 years have been advised to stay at home and avoid large gathering for festivals to be held in October, November and December.

As per the SoPs prepared by the Union Health Ministry, the committees will have to ensure the adequate area for events with a detailed site map and proper markings to maintain social distancing. Touching of idols and holy books has been prohibited to prevent the spread of infection.

People wishing to attend the events, including the staff should be allowed entry only if they are using a face mask. The SOPs clearly state that the visitors will have to maintain

physical distancing of a minimum of six feet.

In case of rallies and immersion processions the number of people should not exceed the prescribed limit and proper physical distancing and wearing of masks must be ensured. In any case, the number of such rallies and the distance covered by them may be kept within manageable limits, as per the advisory.

"Adequate manpower shall be deployed/arranged by the organisers to ensure observance to physical distancing norms and other preventive measures at all times, appropriate arrangements for personal protection gears like face covers/masks, and other logistic like hand sanitizers, soap, sodium hypochlorite solution for sanitising frequently touched surfaces etc. shall be made available by event organizers/business owners for their staff as per requirements," it said.

He also said that a digital platform is being built to track COVID-19 vaccine administration and movement, from procurement to storage to distribution to indi-

Health, Ayush Ministries launch National Clinical Management Protocol for Covid

To bring in uniformity and consistency in the Ayush-based Covid-19 treatment across the country, the Union Health and Ayush Ministries on Tuesday jointly launched a protocol for the clinical management of Covid-19 based on Indian traditional medicine system for prevention of coronavirus infection and treatment of mild and asymptomatic cases.

According to the 'National Clinical Management Protocol, based on Ayurveda and Yoga for Management of COVID-19', which was released by Union Health Minister Dr Harsh Vardhan on Tuesday in the virtual presence of Shripad Naik, Minister of State for AYUSH, one should follow dietary measures, yoga and consume Ayurvedic herbs and formulations such as Ashwagandha and AYUSH-64 among few other herbal formulations.

"This protocol dealing

with preventive and prophylactic measures is a significant step not only in management of COVID-19 but also in making traditional knowledge relevant to solving problems of the modern time," Vardhan said.

"Unfortunately, Ayurveda did not receive much attention after independence until Prime Minister Narendra Modi took up this cause with the importance it deserves," he said while stressing that Ayurveda "had a significant impact in the foundations of modern medicine".

The protocol document points out that the current understanding indicates a good immune system is vital for prevention of coronavirus infection and to safeguard from disease progression.

It suggests use of medicines such as Ashwagandha, Guduchi Ghana Vati or Chyawanaprasha as prophylactic care for high risk population and primary contacts of patients while recommend-

ing consumption of Guduchi Ghana Vati, Guduchi and Pippali or AYUSH 64 for asymptomatic COVID-19 positive patients for prevention of disease progression to symptomatic and severe forms and to improve recovery rate.

Guduchi and Pippali, and AYUSH 64 tablets can be given to mild coronavirus infected patients, it said.

Union Secretary Rajesh Kotecha said, "We call this first version of the protocol, which will be modified as more evidence is generated through further studies in future."

The document also listed A s h w a g a n d h a , Chyawanaprasha or Rasayana Churna for post-COVID-19 management to prevent lung complications like fibrosis, fatigue and mental health.

Further, to improve respiratory and cardiac efficiency, to reduce stress and anxiety and enhance immunity, the ministry has listed Yoga Protocol for Primary Prevention of COVID-19.

Railway bribery case: ED files chargesheet against 10 persons, 1 firm under PMLA

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) has filed a prosecution complaint (chargesheet in police parlance) under Prevention of Money Laundering Act against 10 individuals and one entity in the infamous railway bribery case.

The PMLA case was an outcome of a CBI case in which then railways minister Pawan Kumar Bansal's nephew Vijay Singla was caught red handed while accepting a bribe of ₹89,68,000 for favourable appointment and posting of Mahesh Kumar, a 1975 batch officer of Indian Railway Service of Signal Engineers (IRSSE) as Member (Electrical), Railway Board.

Those named in the prosecution complaint are Mahesh Kumar (former officer of Indian Railway Service of Signal Engineers), N Manjunath, Sandeep Goyal, Vijay Singla, Ajay Garh, Rahul Yadav, Sameer Sandhir, Sushil Daga, CV Venugopal and MV Murali Krishna besides private firm Venkateshwara Rail Nirman Pvt. Ltd. The prosecution complaint was filed before the Special Court (PMLA) at Chandigarh in the Railway Bribery case.

"The Prosecution Complaint has been filed with a prayer to punish the accused in accordance with the law and to confiscate the asset attached under PMLA," the ED said in

a statement.

The ED had initiated investigation under the provisions of PMLA on the basis of CBI's FIR and chargesheet filed before Special judge (SPE/ CBI cases) Patiala House Court, New Delhi against Mahesh Kumar (Member (Staff), Railway Board), Vijay Singla, Sandeep Goyal and seven other accused persons under Section 120-B (criminal conspiracy) of the Indian Penal Code and relevant provisions of the Prevention of Corruption Act.

"During the course of investigations under PMLA, it was revealed that N Manjunath, on behalf of Mahesh Kumar, had persuaded various Railway vendors/S&T manufacturers/contractors for making arrangement of bribe amount for promotion of Mahesh Kumar as Member (Electrical) by alluring them that all the contributors will be taken care of/benefited from the desired posting of Mahesh Kumar," the ED said.

Investigation further revealed that the first instalment of bribe amount of ₹89,68,000 was contributed by N Manjunath, MV Murali Krishna, Sushil Daga and Venkateshwara Rail Nirman Pvt. Ltd. Of this, Rs 50 Lakh were contributed by Manjunath himself, ₹25 Lakh by MV Murali Krishan, ₹5 lakh by Sushil Daga and Rs 10 Lakh from the account of Venkateshwara Rail Nirman Pvt. Ltd. by Rahul Yadav and Sushil Daga.

BJP gets 80.12% of overall political donation, tops list

Eleven political parties together collected ₹2,777.97 crore comprising donations above ₹20,000 between 2014-15 and 2018-19 with the ruling BJP accounting for 80.12% of the total donations by collecting ₹2225.66 crore, followed by its rival Congress at 13.64% with ₹379.02 crore.

According to the Association for Democratic Rights (ADR), only three of the 11 mainstream parties analysed had submitted their reports of donations to the Election Commission (EC) within the stipulated time frame.

The income for all political

parties for the 11-year period was estimated at ₹11,367.34 crore, including national and regional outfits at ₹9,278.30 crore and ₹2,089.04 crore, respectively. The ADR report showed that ₹1,405.19 crore was declared by six national parties through known sources of donation worth above ₹20,000.

There were donations worth ₹325.23 crore that were deposited without any Permanent Account Number (PAN), which is issued by the Income Tax (I-T) Department.



The BJP accounted for the lion's share of unaccounted source of donations at ₹237.22 crore, or 72.94%, followed by the Congress (₹81.87 crore) and the Communist Party of India (CPI) (₹5.04-crore). Besides, ₹15.75 crore was donated to the parties via incorrect PAN numbers.

95 Covid warriors' kin got insurance claim: Govt

The Union Health Ministry on Tuesday said that insurance claim of ₹50 lakh each was paid to the kin of 95 frontline healthcare workers who succumbed to the coronavirus disease, while 176 claims were still under process.

"In 95 cases of death of healthcare workers across the country, insurance money of Rs 50 lakh each has been paid. There are 176 claims which are being processed by the nodal insurance company. Out of these, 79 claims are yet to be received from various states," said Union Health Secretary Rajesh Bhushan at a press briefing here.

In the wake of Covid-19 pandemic, the Centre has made a provision for insurance cover under the Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Package for healthcare providers and community health workers, who may have to be in direct contact and take care of Covid-19 patients and thus at risk.

Dr Reddy's Lab asked to submit revised protocol for both phase 2 and phase 3 human trials of Sputnik V

The Central Drugs Standard Control Organisation (CDSCO) has asked Dr Reddy's Laboratories to submit a revised protocol for conducting both phase 2 and phase 3 human clinical trials for the Russian vaccine against Covid-19, Sputnik V, in India, the Government said on Tuesday.

The Hyderabad-based pharmaceutical company had applied to the Drugs Controller General of India (DCGI) late last week, seeking permission to conduct phase-3 human clinical trials of the Russian vaccine.

The Subject Expert Committee (SEC) on Covid at

the CDSCO, which held its meeting on Monday, deliberated on the application and asked the firm to submit a revised protocol stating it will have to conduct combined phase 2 and 3 clinical trials.

The firm has been asked to provide some other information as well.

In reply to a media query here at a press briefing, Union Health Secretary Rajesh Bhushan said that the Russian vaccine has an agreement with an Indian commercial entity (Dr Reddy's Lab) which has approached the Indian regulator (DCGI) for clinical trials and that the regulator has given some suggestions which need to be incorporated by the entity.

NCERT inks deal with ISLRTC to standardise Indian Sign Language

In a move aimed to benefit the deaf and those with hearing disabilities, the National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) inked a pact with the Indian Sign Language Research And Training Centre (ISLRTC) on Tuesday to come up with resources to standardise the Indian Sign Language to prepare inclusive academic material for persons with disabilities.

The agreement was signed on the occasion of the 60th foundation day of NCERT. Union Education Minister

Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank' said: "This new initiative by the NCERT and ISLRTC for the specially abled children, especially for those who cannot hear or speak, will help to guide them along with the rest of the students in terms of education."

Officials said that the priority will be to convert textbooks into the Indian Sign Language for Classes 1 to 5 and later for Classes 6 to 12. ISLRTC will provide the educators, interpreters and resources for this task.

As per the census 2011, there are 50, 71,007 deaf people and 19, 98,535 with speech disability in India.

Will join Indian Army, says daughter of martyr Singh

Even before the mortal remains of Subedar Sukhdev Singh, martyred in a ceasefire violation by Pakistan on the line of control in Nowshera sector of Rajouri late Monday night, arrived in his native village Peoni falling under Majalita tehsil of Udhampur district on Tuesday, his daughter Tanvi Rajput took a pledge to serve the Indian Army by becoming an ace shooter, as desired by her father.

"My father was a brave soldier and an 'ace shooter'. When he was off duty and staying at home he used to train me and motivate me to become a shooter. After completing my studies I would like to serve the Indian army and become an ace shooter like my father" Tanvi Rajput told reporters while paying glowing tributes to him at her village home in Peoni on Tuesday.

Holding the hands of her younger brother in her lap, Tanvi kept repeating the last words uttered by her father. "Beta when you will complete



your class 10th I will start your training, I want to become shooter like my father"

Subedar Sukhdev Singh, labeled as 'sher' (Lion) in his native village, had also participated in the Kargil war.

Remembering Singh's valour one of his ageing uncles said, "Sukhdev was very courageous. He never showed his back to his enemies. He led from the front, was not afraid of meeting death on the front line."

"I have lost my son but I am proud he sacrificed his life defending the borders of the

mother nation".

As his mortal remains, wrapped in a tricolor wheeled inside his native village in a military truck, patriotic slogans were raised by hundreds of youngsters holding tricolor in their hands. After close family members performed rituals at home several hundred people escorted brave 'son of the soil' on his last journey to the cremation ground where his last rites were performed with full military honors.

Saluting the courage and valour of the valiant soldiers, the

Lt Governor Manoj Sinha said that our Brave Army personnel are serving the nation with utmost dedication and determination.

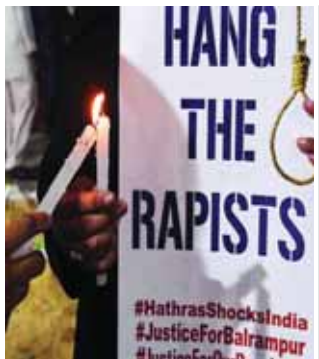
"The nation will remain indebted to brave hearts like Subedar Sukhdev Singh who made supreme sacrifice to safeguard the country's territorial integrity to ensure a safe and secure environment for our citizens," said the Lt Governor.

Since October 1, four soldiers of the Indian army and two CRPF personnel have attained martyrdom in different incidents in Jammu and Kashmir.

Two soldiers identified as Havaldar Kuldeep Singh and Rifleman Shubham Sharma attained martyrdom along the line of control in Nowgam in Kupwara on October 1 while Lance Naik Karnail Singh sacrificed his life in Poonch on September 30. Two CRPF personnel identified as Constable Shailendra Pratap Singh and Dharendra Tripathi were martyred in a terror attack along the NH 44 in South Kashmir district of Pulwama near Pampore on October 5.

Outrageous plea

The UP Govt's affidavit in SC on the Hathras rape case, justifying its acts, shows why justice is a far cry for Dalits



The Supreme Court may express outrage at the gang-rape of a Dalit woman in Hathras as "shocking and extraordinary" and may have held the Uttar Pradesh Government to account over the legal protection of witnesses and the distraught family but does that change anything on the ground? On the contrary, the abhorrent arguments forwarded by the State Government in defence of what it did (though it was more like what it did not do) after the rape are the reasons why the justice system keeps failing us. By insuring the upper caste perpetrators, the UP police also ensured why two more gang-rapes of Dalit

women that made the news, one in UP itself, in Balamrampur, and the other in Aijmer, Rajasthan, were not followed up. Hathras may have become politically volatile but does that mean the other two women have been less violated? No. It's just that the offence is so repetitive that it is not considered big enough. And given the fact that the UP Government presented its deficiencies as strengths, justified its obstructionist moves as necessary for maintaining law and order and pleaded that it was the victim instead of the tormentor, because there was a larger conspiracy to malign its image, even the unthinkable can be sold as credible. So justice seems like a far cry. What is disturbing is that the State Government keeps looking for all kinds of "otherisation" to justify its actions, labelling every problem as a conspiracy and a threat to national security and the greater good of the community. So it told the Supreme Court that its police had "immediately registered the crime" and that it had cremated the girl's body in the presence of her parents to avoid a caste and communal flare-up that it had anticipated would be inevitable. Besides, some sections were force-feeding narratives to the victim's family and sensing a larger conspiracy to defame the Yogi Adityanath Government, the blockade at Hathras was necessary to counter false propaganda. It forgot to mention that it stood guarantor and made exceptions for an upper caste congregation that was called to save the rapists. And if the official version that the girl was killed by strangulation and brutal assault is to be believed, then there was no rape at all in Hathras. Yet these claims not only seem abominable and distasteful, they are blatantly false. On-ground reports by media and independent investigations have revealed that the police filed the said FIR days after the incident. The forensic test that ought to have been conducted within three days was delayed to such an extent, by 11 days to be precise, that there was no evidence of sperm left in the victim's body. Of course, the police knows that there are other ways of establishing rape, like matching DNA samples from the victim and the accused. But that was not to be as her body was burnt. As for parental consent, the family has been consistent in its statements that members were isolated in their house, stopped from accessing any kind of outside help. Not only that, once the State Government felt that things were slipping out of its control, it imposed Section 144, barricading the entire village and alienating the victim's family, restricting media presence and heckling Opposition leaders who were trying to meet the family. The UP police filed 21 FIRs across the State, alleging sedition and conspiracy by "unknown" people. One of the FIRs also alleges that the family of the young woman was offered ₹50 lakh to lie about the State Government. This is one of the six that were filed based on a complaint, predictably, by a sub-inspector. Did the State Government realise that there are other ways of hatching conspiracies than milking the rape of a daughter? Worse, the State Government's affidavit also accused the media of criminal intent to incite riots. In contrast, nowhere did it show a semblance of empathy for the girl who lost her life, accusing the family of changing versions of their statements as proof of a frame-up.

This is exactly a throwback to the gang-rape of Bhanwari Devi in 1992. Her rapists were acquitted in 1995 on the grounds that upper caste men would not even touch a lower caste woman as it would defile their "purity." Nothing has changed since then. If we go by the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) figures for 2019, then about 10 Dalit women are raped every day in the country with UP recording among the highest numbers. And given the tone and tenor of the State Government's affidavit in the highest court of the land, and, therefore, seen as a measure of the official response mechanism, that number is likely to be higher. Most Dalit women do not report the crimes for fear of backlash by the dominant castes, coercion by the tools of the State that they happen to control and out of a fatalistic acceptance of their birth as a burden to be borne and lived with. Even among the rare cases that are prosecuted, the outcome is rarely empowering or so dragged out that the traumatised victim just gives up. Little wonder then that over the past five years, crimes against Dalits have almost doubled. Hardly are the procedural clauses mentioned in the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes (Prevention of Atrocities) Act, 1989, followed strictly. This law mandates that violations be investigated by an officer who is or above the rank of DSP and that a chargesheet be filed within 60 days. The conviction rate for rape is anyway low in the country, at about 28 per cent. So imagine the chances of a Dalit victim. At this rate, even our moral conscience will look like a threat some day.

Milking his illness

Donald Trump is using his COVID-19 diagnosis in a politically unique way



US President Donald Trump has joined the list of world leaders who have been diagnosed with COVID-19, but like the United Kingdom's Boris Johnson and Brazil's Jair Bolsonaro, he is also a leader who was once sceptical of the virus. Bolsonaro was quarantined for a couple of weeks and Johnson was hospitalised and even administered oxygen. So far, Trump appears, at least from what we hear, to have escaped the worst. Yet, unlike the other two, Trump is in the midst of election season. Indeed, voting day for the US Presidential election is under one month away. But instead of convalescing, he has used the last few days to actively campaign, and while we are unaware of the advice doctors have given him, one is pretty sure that keeping his mask on in public is one of them. And his bravado may do more harm than good.

But Trump has always been a bit fast and loose with facts and best practices surrounding the pandemic. He is right in calling out China's double standards and hypocrisy around the virus but by not taking the impact of the pandemic seriously enough, many lives have been lost in the US. However, in his defence, Trump's position right now is a delicate one. He is not a young man and the US Presidential election is a tiring one, particularly given the bizarre way the US conducts it. This involves large amounts of travel across a geographically large country and his precarious health will affect his campaigning. We are still not aware if Trump's diagnosis will impact the US Presidential election but it also highlights how uniquely susceptible politicians and the political process are to the pandemic. While education and some other sectors have switched to working from home, politics by its very nature involves social gatherings. In India, we do not know how adverse or otherwise the Bihar polls will be in the spreading of the virus but we could hope that it is now weaker than it was and best practices have been put in place. Trump should also be very careful, not just for his own health but those of his most ardent supporters as well.

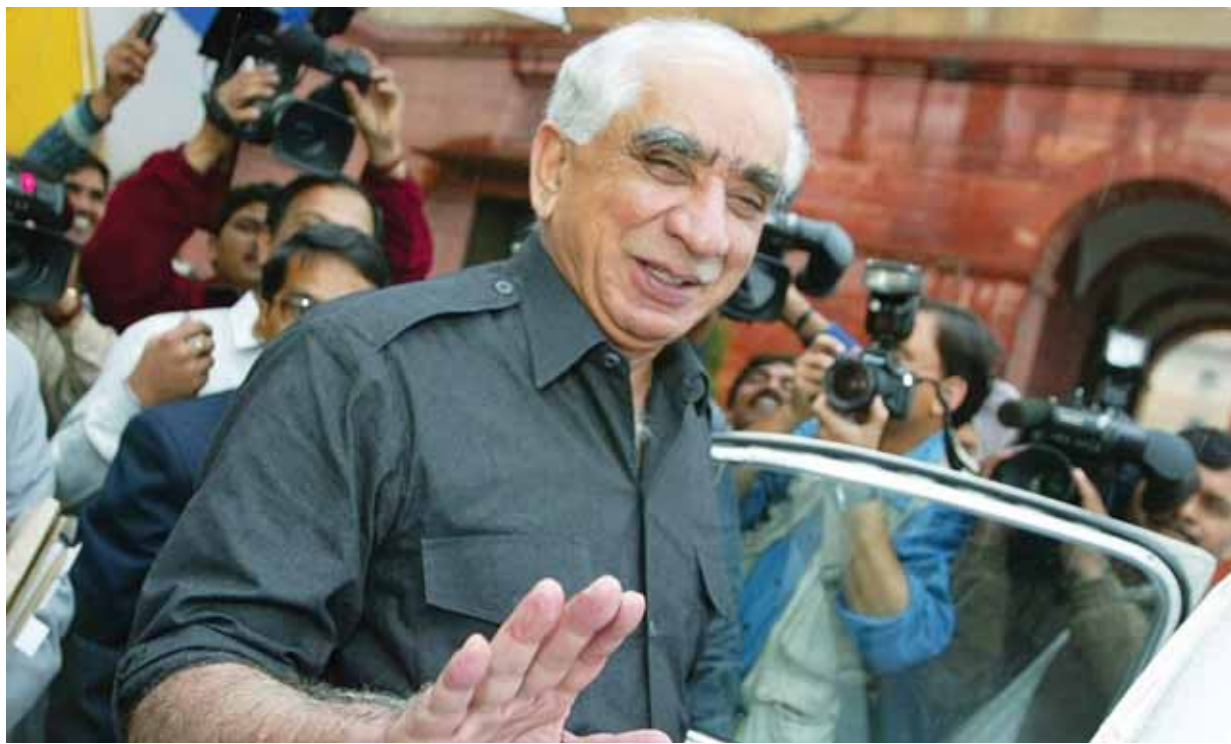

The only photograph I have of Jaswant Singh and me together was the one he gave me a year before he was admitted to the hospital in August 2014, never to regain consciousness. It was taken on December 10, 1957, when we were on stage enacting a play, *Choice of Arms*, at the Indian Military Academy, Dehradun, during the silver jubilee of the academy and our passing out parade celebrations. Portraying the hallmark cavalry officer, Jaswant reflected its mirror image: suave, stylish and snobbish. I played the rough and ready infanteer, his poorer cousin, crew cut *et al*. As Jaswant Major *Saab* bade farewell to arms in 1966, complaining about excessive employment of "Yes Sir," his sputnik political rise saw him become Defence, Finance and Foreign Minister. In those heady days, he would tell Jeeves, Pep Singh: "General *Sahab ko manpasand* whisky pilao". During these convivial encounters, he would recount in fits of laughter, incidents in the academy — of lost patrols, enemy ambush and one dereliction that nearly delayed graduation. His passion for Western classical music, literature and history never deserted him. Bach, Beethoven and Mozart played softly even at 35,000 feet on Air India or in his offices in South Block and 16 Teen Murti Lane.

A conspiracy hatched by Army Chief, General SF Rodrigues, marked my parting from the Army. I sought Jaswant's help which came unflinchingly. As a member of the Lok Sabha and a rising star in BJP, one evening over sundowners, he invited two of the country's best legal minds — Ram Jethmalani and Arun Jaitley — both from his party but with their mutual dislike never camouflaged. Only Jaswant could have brought them together and along with Jaitley's junior, Arvind Nigam, they managed, 20 years later, to defeat the Government for the first time in India's independent history over its imposition of Army Act Section 18 and the Pleasure Doctrine. All three legal eagles became good friends.

Jaswant also introduced me to his tailor in Khan Market, Mukhtar Ahmad, who patterned his black *mazri* bush shirts in the Army's Walking Out style. The trademark epaulette bush shirt — Jaswant's copyright — is now worn by all and sundry.



Jaswant's mastery of the English language and his gorgeous handwriting were legendary. He wrote a dozen seminal books, three focussed on defence and national security: *A Call to Honour*, *Defending India* and his last before he was hospitalised, *India at Risk*. In 2013, he invited me to Mumbai on a whistle-stop tour to promote his book and quiz him on the risks facing India. I recall vividly an earlier evening at his home that was rudely interrupted by Defence Minister Sharad Pawar's call announcing that he was on his way. I was urged to knock back my drink and leave. Then Army Chief Rodrigues, in an interview to this newspaper, had indiscreetly called neighbouring countries as bandicoots and counselled for good governance. This created a furore in Parliament which forced Pawar into administering a warning to Rodrigues. It was the draft of this admonition that Pawar wanted Jaswant to edit and embellish that led to my retreat. With his Sheaffer pen, Jaswant corrected the parliamentary reprimand which Pawar read out the next day in Parliament, pacifying the Opposition ranks of which he was one.

Perhaps Jaswant's most anxious moments were during the Kandahar hijack of IC 814. He told me that relatives of passengers made good copy for television and that IB was reporting that the incident could trigger communal disturbances. During the Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) meeting, he volunteered, since no one else did, to accompany the three Jaish terrorists to Kandahar for release of

Indian hostages. The stigma of this enduring ignominy he parried bravely.

During the Kargil skirmish, on the day Tololing heights were captured (June 11, 1999), I accompanied Jaswant to Beijing as part of the press delegation in my post-Army *avatar*. India had carried out nuclear tests the previous year and attributed them to the threat from China. His mission to China was to restore bilateral relations gone in deep freeze since the tests. The frosty meeting with Foreign Minister Tang Jiaxuan began with Tang insisting that China was never a threat to India, adding that we "have a saying in Chinese that those who tie the knot must untie it first" to which Jaswant recalled a Rajasthani aphorism from his village Jasol: "you need two hands to untie a knot." The strategic difference was not allowed to become a dispute.

Jaswant was full of witty repartees. After the nuclear tests, which stunned and annoyed the Americans, he met Secretary of State Madeleine Albright who remarked with dripping sarcasm that "India had dug itself into a hole." "Madam Secretary of State, India is a civilisational state, it does not dig holes," he replied with exceptional grace. The two developed healthy respect and affection for each other. Through the 'Next Steps in Strategic Partnership' Jaswant discussed with Deputy Secretary of State, Strobe Talbott, and over 16 meetings in different parts of the globe, they sketched the path towards the landmark India-US nuclear deal.

In the last of his nine stints as a parliamentarian, Jaswant rep-

resented the Gorkhas from Darjeeling. Since I was from the fifth Gorkha regiment, had widely trekked in Nepal, was fluent in Gorkhali and familiar with the problems of India-domiciled Gorkhas and their demand for Gorkhaland, I became his occasional advisor in his constituency. I once accompanied him to Darjeeling, meeting Gorkha Janmukti Morcha leaders Bimal Gurung, Roshan Giri and Ramesh Ale, who was from my regiment. Jaswant would park himself in a quaint 19th century English hotel — below Kalimati temple — which was then under American ownership but would annually fly in English actors to stage plays like that year Oscar Wilde's *Importance of Being Earnest*.

As convenor of India-Pakistan Track Two dialogue, which ran for nearly 15 years till the ruling dispensation forced it to stop, I tried to invite Jaswant to participate when he was not in Government. I suggested "you could meet your Kargil counterpart Sartaj Aziz, with whom you refused to shake hands" but he steadfastly refused.

Jaswant was a prolific rider and played horse polo and cycle polo for the academy. He continued riding for several years and owned ponies till a back problem forced him to stop. While I have lost a true friend from whom I learnt a lot, India and the BJP have lost a great scholar, statesman and soldier.

A collective failure

The solution to the increasing number of rapes and atrocities on women in the country lies in us, not elsewhere

Once again the whole country is aghast at the alleged gang-rape and brutalisation of a 19-year-old Dalit girl from Uttar Pradesh (UP) who succumbed to her injuries in a Delhi hospital recently after fighting for her life for 15 days. Even though bowing to pressure, the four accused men belonging to the upper caste were arrested and are now in police custody, it was the callous attitude of the local police and the UP administration, which led to her sad end. Had the girl been from an upper caste family, the whole episode would have ended different. But as things stand, after the alleged rape in Hathras, the Government of UP hastily cremated the victim in the middle of the night, ostensibly to “avoid large scale violence” and briefly barred the media and Opposition politicians from visiting the victim’s village and family, prompting suspicions of a cover-up. Sadly, even over seven decades after India’s Independence, Dalits still remain on the fringes of society and face discrimination despite many laws protecting them.

Though top Congress leaders Rahul Gandhi and Priyanka Gandhi Vadra marched to the residence of the murdered girl in Hathras, the police did not allow them to enter the area. There was a showdown after which they met the girl’s family. Bhim Army chief Chandrashekhar Azad has also accused the State Government of inaction. However, the two former chief ministers of UP Akhilesh Yadav (Samajwadi Party) and the BSP chief Mayawati (who is herself a Dalit) have confined themselves to tweets condemning the Government. Bowing to the public and political pressure, UP Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath announced a CBI probe into the crime.

The Hathras case is not just one more rape case. It shows that whatever laws are passed by Parliament, women, particularly poor Dalit women, have to struggle for justice, right from registering a First Information Report (FIR). According to the 2019 annual report of the National Crime Records Bureau, 32,033 rape cases were registered across the country, or an average of 88 cases daily or one rape every 16 minutes. The December 2012 Nirbhaya gang-rape case shook the conscience of the nation and there were large scale protests. Even then it took eight years for the justice system to execute the accused. The Government allocated a huge amount for the aid of rape survivors after the Nirbhaya case but it has not been distributed satisfactorily. Though new laws were passed since 2012 increasing penalties for sexual assault, rape, and sexual abuse, they have not deterred rapists. As the Hathras case shows, the perpetrators are still not scared of the rule of law. And only a vigilant media brings out such shocking incidents and helps the victims get justice, when all attempts are made to bury their voices.

What is the remedy and do we need more stringent laws? What is needed are not more laws but the strict implementation of the existing ones by the police, the Government and law enforcement agencies. The mindset of the police and the judicial system should change and they should be more sensitive and sympathetic to rape survivors. Complaints should be filed without delay and harassment of the victim. The backlog of cases is stupendous and justice takes too long to be delivered. Justice delayed is justice denied. It is important that the judicial system respond to public needs.

Second, it is a sad commentary that despite the Supreme Court’s observations that judicial reforms were needed urgently, the Government is dragging its feet on them. Archaic laws need to be amended. It is bizarre that when a child of two or three is raped and is unable to give evidence, the culprits go scot-free because the mother’s evidence is considered secondary. How can a two-year-old child give evidence of rape? The onus of proof should not lie with the victim. Third, building up of weak cases by the investigating agencies, including the CBI has enabled influential criminals to go free or get away with minimum punishment. The fourth is the need for educational reforms. There is no doubt that the system needs some shaking up. Children should be taught moral values and respect for women right from their childhood. In a country where the Shakti cult is still relevant, girls should be taught self-defence in schools.

The fifth is the social outlook. Society has to change its present attitude. Many women still do not go to the police to report these incidents for lack of faith in the system. Till rapists are not brought to book swiftly in the country, they will continue to rape with impunity.

A watchful society, supportive of the victims is very necessary to check these heinous crimes. It is apt to remember the quotation in William Shakespeare’s *Julius Caesar*. Cassius confides in his friend Brutus that in the best interests of the public Julius Caesar must be stopped from becoming the emperor of the Roman Empire. Cassius tells him, “The fault, dear Brutus, is not in our stars, but ourselves, that we are underlings.” The solution to the increasing number of rapes and atrocities on women lies in us, not elsewhere.

History repeating itself

Popular opinion for the Krishna Janmabhoomi dispute in Mathura is being slowly galvanised although the court dismissed the civil suit

As popular opinion for the Krishna Janmabhoomi dispute in Mathura is being slowly galvanised after the court dismissed a civil suit on September 30, it looks like history is repeating itself. It wasn’t a usual day at the office for Civil Judge, senior division, Chhaya Sharma of the Mathura Civil Court, although, what happened wasn’t unexpected. The court had just received a civil suit by a Hindu deity — Lord Krishna Virajman. Since the Lord is a “minor”, he was represented in the suit through his “next friend.” The suit had been filed against encroaching and illegally building a *Shahi Idgah* mosque on the minor’s property. The allegation was against the Uttar Pradesh Waqf Board and the mosque trust for illegally allowing the entry of “some Muslims” for the said purpose.

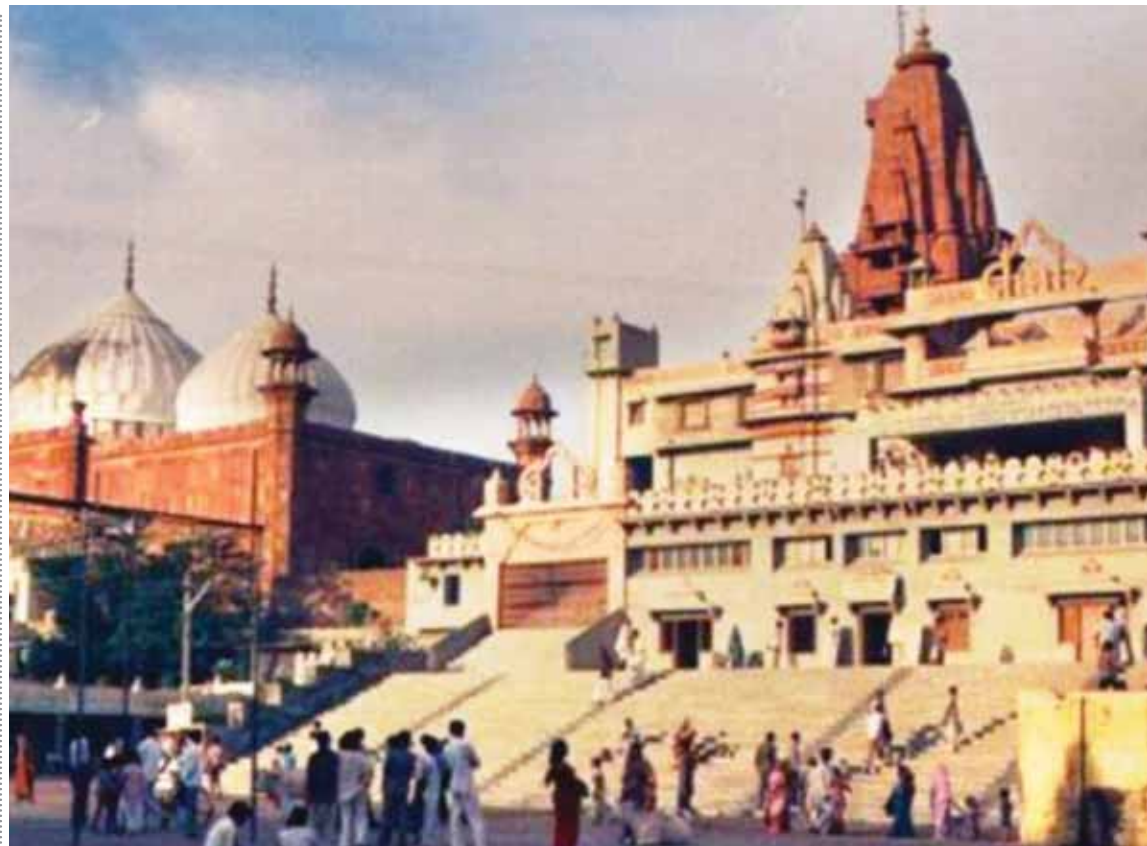
It had been claimed in the suit that “every inch of land in Katra Keshav Dev (the disputed site) is sacred for the devotees of Lord Krishna” as he was born on that site. It had been demanded on behalf of the deity that, “*Darshan, pooja*, rituals according to Vedic Sanatana Dharma, faith, belief, usages, traditions and customs”, which are protected under Article 25 of the Constitution, be allowed to be performed at the actual birthplace which lies beneath the *Shahi Idgah* mosque. The suit was dismissed by the court on September 30 at the admission stage itself. The court cited that the Places of Worship Act, 1991, which provides for the maintenance of the religious character of any place of worship as it existed on August 15, 1947, barred it from accepting the suit at this stage.

Don’t be surprised if you are getting a feeling of *déjà vu*, because the country has been through this before. The filing of a civil suit before the Mathura court was only symbolic. What it effectively did, irrespective of the dismissal order, is that, it has set the tone for an all new battle that Right-wing Hindus are ready to fight in their attempt to regain their cultural heritage and lost religious integrity.

The Krishna *Janmabhoomi* in Mathura has for decades been one among the three sites (others being the Ayodhya Ram *Janmabhoomi* and the Kashi Vishwanath Temple in Varanasi) that Hindu Right-wing political organisations have been fighting for. The battle is to reclaim the religious and cultural heritage of India which was lost when Aurangzeb had issued orders for the demolition of a large number of temples (close to 40,000) in 1669-1670 and had built mosques over them. This, of course, is a matter of fact and history. But, how will this lost heritage be regained today? The answer is: “By the demolition of these mosques built by barbaric Muslim rulers over temples.”

One can’t help but be reminded of the Ayodhya Ram *Janmabhoomi*-Babri *masjid* dispute. It was one of the longest and the most fiercely fought legal as well as political battles in our country which changed the way politics was done and elections were fought. Although appeasement politics was used as a tool during elections even before the 1990s, such glorification of a particular belief system juxtaposed to the vilification of another was unprecedented. Populism and divisive politics were played like never before. Politics of identity based on new definitions of Hinduism had emerged — one that was based

on the faith of exclusion and anti-communitarian. The battle even defined what is meant by community, society, and citizens and who deserved to stay in it. It set new standards for everything. No one knew what was the “common good” anymore. This led to social atomisation, cultural fragmentation and moral and religious decadence. For 25 long years, Lord Ram was politicised. He was made an emotional issue to garner votes. Rabble-rousers and demagogues were allowed to rise to positions of political power using his name. A new politico-cultural space was created in this country which said, “Let me glorify my own religion.”

This led to bloodshed that cost thousands of lives. The most viral slogan on the streets, for the longest time ever was, “*Tareekh nahi batayenge par mandir wahi banayenge* (we will not give you a date, but we will make the temple there only).” Suddenly, everybody was a staunch supporter of this new version of Hindutva. Everybody wanted a temple to be built in Ayodhya on the disputed Babri mosque site — legally or illegally, peacefully or violently. All this was happening simultaneously with an equally fierce legal battle being fought before the courts.

When the apex court gave a final decision in the case, allowing for a temple to be built on the disputed site, it was clear that this was an apt example of decisions based on faith. The majority of the parties to the suit were happy. However, senior advocate Rajeev Dhawan had warned the court during the hearings by stating that the court must consider how future generations would view this verdict.

The demand for declaring the disputed site in Mathura as Krishna *Janmabhoomi* is gaining momentum. A

‘Krishna Janmabhoomi Nirman Nyas’ has already been set up by a group of religious men. Mass support for the suit is on the rise on social media where political groups are even demanding for the scrapping of the 1991 Act.

“Hindu unity” like never before is being called for. Statements by top political leaders and members of Right-wing organisations have already started pouring in. And last but not the least, prime-time drama on TV news channels have got new fuel for their daily duels. Popular opinion is being slowly galvanised, and this all looks like history repeating itself. This was the inevitable consequence of the Ayodhya issue and the verdict.

One has to understand that political parties, whose rise to power has transpired due to a combination of certain formulae and tools of political oppression, will always be reluctant to let those formulae go away so soon. It was the Ayodhya dispute, the reassertion of the “persecution complex” on the part of Muslims, and the subsequent wave of “Hindu nationalism” that transformed the BJP from a cadre-based party to one with mass support. The BJP has leap-frogged into power and consecrated its image of a “Hindu nationalist.” A denouement of the same is, therefore, impossible especially when it is faced with a crippling economy and the worst rates of unemployment this country has seen in decades.

Religion, historically, has proven to be the best political weapon, to internalise oppression among the masses. A sedative that helps cool down dissenting voices, where people can agree to not disagree.

Mathura will be the new metaphor for Hindutva politics. The Krishna *Janmabhoomi* movement will serve as a consistent emotional issue required to

connect to the masses. This time, Lord Krishna will be used. Fringe groups will again devise a putsch to assert majoritarianism. New definitions of State and citizens will be written down in the name of “religious freedom.” Safe spaces for minorities will again be crushed. The judiciary will again be faced with an all-new battle where it will again choose necessity over rationality. But, what after Mathura? How many more Ayodhyas and Mathuras will we be spectators to? Isn’t our heritage more about inclusivity, acceptance, tolerance, trust and harmony? Why can’t a mosque in Mathura’s Katra Keshav Dev stand together with Lord Krishna’s temple? Why can’t the compromise arrived at between the two communities, based on mutual respect for each other’s faith, way back in 1968, be allowed to survive? Isn’t that the idea of India we are duty-bound to protect?

I am reminded of two *kalyug* predictions that Ved Vyasa made. First, he said that cities will be dominated by thieves, the *Vedas* will be contaminated by speculative interpretations, political leaders will virtually consume the citizens and the so-called priests and intellectuals will be devotees of their greed. (*Srimad Bhagavatam* Verse 12.3.32) Second, he said, “Uncultured men will show their austerity to the Lord by wearing a mendicant’s dress and those who know nothing about religion will mount a high seat and presume to speak on religious principles (*Srimad Bhagavatam* Verse 12.3.38).” The dismissal of the suit by the Mathura court doesn’t matter because the politics around Krishna *Janmabhoomi* has just started. India is fully set to vindicate Ved Vyasa. *Jai shri Krishna!*

Women at the receiving end during the pandemic

The world is far away from building more equal and resilient societies and creating equitable policies and interventions

The Indian economy’s downhill journey was all over the media, but the news about 88.17 per cent women workers surviving with a reduced number of meals in the 26 districts of Madhya Pradesh (MP) and the 52.46 per cent dip in women’s participation, the lowest in eight years in the National Rural Employment Guarantee Act, received very little media attention.

When the pandemic struck the world, Maria Holtsberg, United Nation (UN) Women, Humanitarian and Disaster Risk Advisor, Asia and Pacific, rued that a “crisis always exacerbates gender inequality.” In 2016, a high-level UN panel called for incorporating gender dimensions in any public health emergency response. Unfortunately, Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act’s appraisal of 73 policy

statements, guidance documents and response strategies, laid bare a shocking revelation that nearly half or 46 per cent ignored the gendered effects of the pandemic and hunger crises and only seven per cent proposed any concrete action.

“The pandemic-containment public policies and health strategies so far haven’t looked through the gender lens... and now the pre-existing gender inequalities, in every sphere, from health to the economy...are likely to be further amplified,” lamented Poonam Muttreja, Executive Director, Population Foundation of India (PFI).

In the light of the past adverse health consequences of epidemics, the World Health Organisation’s (WHO’s) early advisory urged prioritising sexual and reproductive health services as “essential services.” Nevertheless, a survey in 103 countries found large-scale disruptions in 67 per cent. A Guttman Institute’s projection, on the basis of data from 1.6 billion women of reproductive age from 132 low and middle income countries, envisaged that a “10 per cent decline in use of reversible contraceptive methods, would hit 49 million more

women, cause 15 million additional unintended pregnancies and 3.3 million unsafe abortions over the course of a year.” Going by official figures, the health deficit (April-June) in India amounts to a drop in immunisation by 27 per cent, institutional deliveries by 28 per cent and major surgeries by 60 per cent in comparison to last year.

Despite abortions being enlisted as “emergency services,” very few in reality could reach the clinics due to inadequate transport and lack of information. Ipas Development Foundation (IDF), India, collating data from eight States, evaluated that “from March 25 to June 24, about 1.85 million Indian women could not terminate unwanted pregnancies. About 80 per cent for absence of medical abortion drugs at pharmacy stores, another 20 per cent, due to reduced access to health facilities.”

However, women play a lead role in care-giving within families or as healthcare workers. “Women’s social conditioning makes them take charge of a sick family member. And as professional care-givers, nursing continues to be seen as a women’s domain. But the risks of being with patients for

longer hours than the doctors are often undermined. We tend to fall into gendered hierarchies in recognising the services of a nurse contracting the disease and succumbing, as against the doctors falling prey to the disease,” says Padmini Ghosh, country co-ordinator, Women’s Regional Network.

The recent agitation of the ASHA workers against underpayment and increased workload, without the minimum protective gear, further exposed the inadequacies of the public health system. PFI’s Muttreja was categorical that “we must invest in our 3.3 million strong female frontline workforce for combating COVID-19 by valuing and resourcing their needs.”

A PFI study in Uttar Pradesh (UP), Bihar and Rajasthan, disclosed that an increasing care-giving role within the household has led to high degrees of psychological distress among girls/women. Ghosh says that women’s mental health problems are often ignored as “figments of imagination” and receive no medical interventions. In this regard, the launch of a toll-free helpline “Kiran” to address the rising number of pandemic-induced mental health problems is a welcome step.

Furthermore, the economic slump has also created ripple effects on food security in India, which experts apprehend, would reinforce inequalities in food distribution within the household, making structural inequities more visible in food systems.

Dr Shweta Khandelwal, Head, Nutrition Research, Public Health Foundation of India, asserted that “women tend to remain vulnerable to multiple forms of malnutrition due to various socio-economic, demographic and cultural factors. Undernutrition enhances their susceptibility to infection, including respiratory infections and immuno-deficiency, making them more vulnerable to COVID-19.”

Plus, with less than a quarter being present in the labour force in the pre-pandemic era, Indian women are now likely to be further pushed out of gainful employment. The Centre for Monitoring Indian Economy’s Consumer Pyramids Household Survey data confirmed that, at least, four out of ten women in India lost their jobs. In rural India, the huge influx of migrants workers to home-towns and villages generated a downswing of about 2.24 per cent in the rate

of women’s work participation. William Joe, Professor, Population Research Centre, Indian Institute of Economic Growth, alerted that, “Women being hardly present in the core sector labour force are less likely to benefit from macro-support programmes. There is a need for direct wage support programmes like MNREGA, rural and urban. These should be redesigned to fit into gender needs and work preferences as unskilled labour work may not find many takers in urban areas.”

Many experts also fear that “about 23.5 percentage points less women than men employed in the pre-Corona phase are likely to be re-employed later.” Besides, the lockdowns have turned homes into a place for physical, sexual and psychological abuse for many women. During the first four phases of the lockdown, Indian women filed more domestic violence complaints than in the last ten years during the same period.

Now, while assessing women’s COVID-19 disease burden and health outcomes from the biological perspective, many researchers affirmed that “women tend to mount a stronger

immune response,” while some contended that “sex patterns are not universal among all viruses.” How sex and gender are influencing clinical care cannot be fully explained for lack of comprehensive sex-disaggregated data, as the WHO in its 2007 guidelines emphasised. Nevertheless, in the past too, WHO guidelines have been overlooked which seriously affected women’s health needs.

“The pandemic’s imagery in public consciousness and reportage has been dominated by a male doctor, a policeman, a male migrant labourer. While a nurse, the policewoman who has to go back home to an infant, a jobless migrant domestic help or a trafficked sex-worker with no income, rarely feature in public imagination,” laments Ghosh. Sadly, this rings true.

The UN Secretary-General’s call for focusing on women’s interests in the pandemic remains largely unheeded. The world is far away from building more equal and resilient societies and creating equitable policies and interventions.

WITH NO MASK ON

Trump, still infectious, back at White House

Washington: President Donald Trump staged a dramatic return to the White House after leaving the military hospital where he was receiving an unprecedented level of care for COVID-19. He immediately ignited a new controversy by declaring that despite his illness the nation should not fear the virus that has killed more than 210,000 Americans — and then he entered the White House without a protective mask.

Trump's message alarmed infectious disease experts and suggested the president's own illness had not caused him to rethink his often-cavalier attitude toward the disease, which has also infected the first lady and several White House aides, including new cases revealed Monday.

Landing Monday night at the White House on Marine One, Trump gingerly climbed

the South Portico steps, removed his mask and declared, "I feel good." He gave a double thumbs-up to the departing helicopter from the portico terrace, where aides had arranged American flags for the sunset occasion. He entered the White House, where aides were visible milling about the Blue Room, without wearing a face covering.

The president left Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, where his doctor, Navy Cmdr. Sean Conley, said earlier Monday that the president remains contagious and would not be fully "out of the woods" for another week but that Trump had met or exceeded standards for discharge from the hospital. Trump is expected to continue his recovery at the White House, where the reach of the outbreak that has infected the highest levels of the U.S. government is still being

uncovered.

Still, just a month before the election and anxious to project strength, Trump tweeted before leaving the hospital, "Will be back on the Campaign Trail soon!!!" And in case anyone missed his don't-worry message earlier, he rushed out a new video from the White House.

"Don't be afraid of it," Trump said of the virus. "You're going to beat it. We have the best medical equipment, we have the best medicines." His remarks were strong, but he was taking deeper breaths than usual as he delivered them.

On Tuesday, Trump went a step further, repeating his previous comparisons between COVID-19 and the seasonal flu.

"Many people every year, sometimes over 100,000, and despite the Vaccine, die from the Flu," he tweeted. "Are we going to close down our Country? No, we have learned to live with it, just like we are learning to live with Covid, in most populations far less lethal!!!" **AP**

Vaunted White House virus testing couldn't protect Trump

Washington: His press secretary once described President Donald Trump as the "most tested man in America" when it came to COVID-19.

And variations on that message were the White House ready response any time critics questioned the president's lax approach to following guidelines for avoiding the novel coronavirus.

But that vaunted testing operation proved woefully insufficient in protecting the president and those who work for him at the White House, as evidenced by a string of positive tests over the past week for Trump, his wife and others in their orbit.

Trump demonstrated in dramatic fashion that relying on testing alone isn't enough to create a safe bubble. Mask wearing and social distancing are other key ingredients for preventing the spread of COVID-19, and both have often been in short supply at the White House.

From the earliest days of the virus, Trump has provided conflicting advice on wearing a mask, noting that federal health experts were recommending them, but adding that "I don't think I'm going to be doing it." At another point, he said that "maybe they're great, and maybe they're just good. Maybe they're not so good." **AP**

Michelle slams Trump; calls him 'racist'

Washington (PTI): Former first lady Michelle Obama on Tuesday launched a scathing attack at President Donald Trump, accusing him of being a "racist" and not being "up to the job" and urged fellow Americans to make informed and engaged choice in the presidential election to regain stability in the country.

Pitching for Democratic presidential nominee Joe Biden, she made an impassioned plea through a 24-minute video, saying that the country is in chaos and the voters should know what is at stake.

Titled 'Closing Argument', the video was released on social media platforms and also by the Biden campaign.

Believe it or not, the election is right around the corner. Votes are already being cast. And if you're still deciding who to vote for, or whether to vote at all, I wanted to take a moment to remind you what's at stake and to urge you to make a plan to vote today. Because let's be honest right now, our country is in chaos because of a president who isn't up to the job, she said in the video.

While the presidential elections are scheduled for November 3, early-voting and mail-in-voting has already started in states across the country.

Alleging that the president, already hit by the coronavirus, continues to gaslight

the American people by acting like this pandemic is not a real threat, Michelle said, so what the president is doing is once again, patently false. It's morally wrong, and yes, it is racist. But that doesn't mean it won't work because this is a difficult time, a confusing time. And when people hear these lies and crazy conspiracies repeated over and over and over again, they don't know what to think with everything going on in their lives.

She said that to regain any kind of stability, "we've got to ensure that every eligible voter is informed and engaged in the selection. Because the stakes are on display every day, not just in the headlines,

but in our families."

"If you are a parent like me, you're feeling the consequences of this president's failure to take this pandemic seriously from his constant downplaying of the importance of mask and social distancing to his relentless pressure on schools to open with offering a clean plan or meaningful support to keep students and teachers safe, she said.

Trump returned to the White House on Monday night after spending four days at a military hospital where he was treated for coronavirus.

Urging people to vote for Biden, the former first lady said that Americans have the chance to elect a president

who can meet this moment, a leader who has the character and the experience to put an end to this chaos, start solving these problems and help lighten the load for families all across the country.

The one thing this president is really, really good at is using fear and confusion and spreading lies to win, she alleged.

Former president Barack Obama and Michelle have not campaigned much in person this election season. But they have been issuing videos in support of Biden and his running mate Senator Kamala Harris. Obama has also attended a number of fundraisers for Biden and Harris.

I was too fat like UK economy, says Boris

London (PTI): British Prime Minister Boris Johnson on Tuesday likened his own health with that of the country's economy, which was superficially healthy but had some chronic underlying conditions which were exposed by COVID-19.

Johnson, who was hospitalised after testing positive for coronavirus earlier in the year, has often spoken about his struggle to lose weight in order to ward off an added risk from the deadly virus.

Addressing delegates of the ruling Conservative Party for its annual conference, being held virtually in keeping with the coronavirus guidelines for large meetings, the Tory party chief set out his vision for a post-COVID British economy in a rousing speech, even as he hit back at critics who have questioned if his bout of COVID had somehow robbed him of his 'mojo'.

I have to admit the reason I had such a nasty experience with the disease is that although I was superficially in the peak of health when I caught it, I had a very common underlying condition. My friends I was too fat, he said, claiming that he has since lost nearly 12 kg.

When you look at the general economic condition of this country when we went into lockdown there was a similarity because we were on the face of it in pretty good shape And yet if you looked more carefully you could see and indeed many of us said so at the time that the UK economy had some chronic underlying problems: long-term failure to tackle the deficit in skills, inadequate transport infrastructure, not enough homes people could afford to buy that isn't good enough, said Johnson.

The 56-year-old UK PM went on to lay out his party's plans that would mean not to restore normality but to "reform and renew" the country.

Evoking the UK's recovery from the Second World War, he said he wanted to build a "new Jerusalem", with opportunity for all, improved housing and healthcare.

Among the policies he detailed for the future include making the UK a "world leader" in green energy by announcing 160 million pounds of investment in ports and factories to increase electricity generation from offshore wind; boost house building through changes to England's planning system; and greater provision of one-

to-one teaching for pupils who had fallen behind during the pandemic.

Amid repeated references to UK Chancellor Rishi Sunak, his neighbour at No 11 Downing Street, and the various economic measures put in place by the Conservative Party government to fight against the economic impact of the pandemic, the UK PM admitted that increased bailouts and subsidies to prop up the economy go against his party's traditional free market instincts but there was "simply no reasonable alternative".

Overall, he sought to strike a note of optimism with the annual party policy speech as he promised that the government was working night and day to repel this virus.

I know the people of this country are going to defeat this virus I believe it is a measure of the greatness of this country that we are simply not going to let it hold us back or slow us down, and we are certainly not going to let it get us down, he said.

The UK has so far reported 518,222 cases of coronavirus with 42,549 deaths so far due to the contagious disease, according to Johns Hopkins University.

Pak to challenge India's move for exclusive GI tag to Basmati rice in EU

Islamabad (PTI): Pakistan has decided to file its opposition in the European Union in response to India's application for an exclusive Geographical Indications (GI) tag to Basmati rice in the 27-member bloc, a media report said on Tuesday.

This was decided during a meeting chaired by Adviser to the Prime Minister on Commerce Razak Dawood on Monday.

The meeting was attended by Secretary Commerce, Chairman, Intellectual Property Organisation (IPO-Pakistan), representatives of Rice Exporters Association of Pakistan (REAP), and the legal fraternity, the Dawn newspaper reported.

During the meeting, REAP representatives were of the view that Pakistan was a major grower and producer of Basmati rice and India's application for exclusivity is unjustified, it said.

India has said that it is an Indian-origin product in its application, published in the EU's official journal on September 11.

Dawood said that Pakistan will vehemently oppose India's application in the European Union and restrain New Delhi from obtaining an exclusive GI tag of Basmati rice.

He supported the concerns of REAP and relevant stakeholders and ensured that their claim for Basmati rice as GI will be protected, the report said.

Pakistan enacted the Geographical Indications (Registration and Protection) Act in March this year, which gives it the right to oppose Indian application for registration of Basmati rice's exclusive rights.

3 scientists share Nobel physics prize for cosmology finds

Stockholm: Three scientists won this year's Nobel Prize in physics Tuesday for advancing our understanding of black holes.

The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences said that Briton Roger Penrose will receive half of this year's prize "for the discovery that black hole formation is a robust prediction of the general theory of relativity".

Goran K Hansson, the academy's secretary-general, said German Reinhard Genzel and American Andrea Ghez will receive the second half of the prize "for the discovery of a supermassive compact object at the center of our galaxy."

The prizes celebrate "one of the most exotic objects in the

universe," black holes, which have become a staple of science fiction and science fact and where time even seems to stand still, Nobel committee scientists said.

Penrose proved with mathematics that the formation of black holes was possible, based heavily on Albert Einstein's general theory of relativity.

Genzel and Ghez looked at the dust-covered centre of our Milky Way galaxy where something strange was going on, several stars moving around something they couldn't see.

It was a black hole. Not just an ordinary black hole, but a supermassive black hole, 4 million times the mass of our sun.

Now scientists know that all galaxies have supermassive

black holes.

It is common for several scientists who worked in related fields to share the prize. Last year's prize went to Canadian-born cosmologist James Peebles for theoretical work about the early moments after the Big Bang, and Swiss astronomers Michel Mayor and Didier Queloz for discovering a planet outside our solar system.

The prestigious award comes with a gold medal and prize money of 10 million Swedish kronor (more than \$1.1 million), courtesy of a bequest left 124 years ago by the prize's creator, Swedish inventor Alfred Nobel. The amount was increased recently to adjust for inflation. **AP**

Maldives ex-VP jailed again for money laundering

The former vice president of the Maldives has been sentenced to 20 years in prison after he pleaded guilty to money laundering and embezzlement under orders from the former president.

The Criminal Court on Monday night also fined Ahmed Adeb \$129,800. The prison sentence, which will be shortened by one year because he served time after a previous conviction on the same

charges, also covered charges of corruption and possession of an unlicensed firearm.

Adeb was a protege to former President Yameen Abdul Gayoom during the early years of his presidency between 2013 and 2018. He had been sentenced to 33 years in prison in 2016 for several counts including masterminding a blast in a presidential speedboat in which Yameen's wife was wounded. He was freed from all charges after Yameen lost reelection in 2018.

FLOODS IN FRANCE, ITALY SWEEP BODIES OUT OF CEMETERIES

Breil-Sur-Roya (France): The grim job of searching for flood victims in Alpine villages and on the nearby French and Italian coasts has grown even more gruesome: Along with storm casualties, authorities say corpses from cemeteries have also been found around the Mediterranean shore, apparently swept down the mountain by violent rains.

A total of 12 deaths have been reported since the storm pounded France's Alpes-

Maritimes region and Italy's northwestern regions of Liguria and Piedmont starting Friday — four on the French side, eight on the Italian side.

More than 600 rescuers and others were searching Tuesday for some 20 people still missing, according to a spokeswoman for the Alpes-Maritimes regional administration.

Corpses unearthed from cemeteries have washed up on the Italian side, she told The

Associated Press. She could not say how many or where they came from, and it was unclear whether the bodies were among the eight reported dead in Italy from the storm. Italian local authorities could not immediately be reached for comment.

The cemetery corpses were in such an advanced state of decomposition that they were clearly distinguishable from recent storm victims, the French spokeswoman said. **AP**

Scandal grows over corporal punishment in Thai schools

Bangkok (AP): A scandal over corporal punishment of schoolchildren in Thailand expanded Tuesday as six teachers and caregivers at a school accused of such abuse turned themselves in to face criminal charges.

There are now 13 employees of the Sarasas Witaed Ratchaphruek School who are facing charges after the parents of 30 students complained that their children, mostly around kindergarten age, had been physically abused, said police Lt. Gen. Ampol Buarubporn, the regional police commissioner overseeing the case.

Ronnarong Kawpech, a lawyer representing 30 families, said his clients filed charges of physical abuse, illegal detention and child abuse against the staff members of the school in Nonthaburi province, just outside Bangkok. They also filed separate complaints against both the school and the involved staff members seeking 5 million baht (160,200) in compensation for each abused child.

Corporal punishment is not unusual in Thai schools. The Education Ministry recently issued orders barring teach-

ers from using physical punishment against their students, but many reports, often including videos posted on social media, suggest the practice is still widespread.

The issue has been highlighted during a wave of political and social protests in Thailand. Secondary school students demanding educational reforms, who have organized themselves under the tongue-in-cheek name of Bad Students, have staged several protests against schools and the Education Ministry. One of their demands is for the ministry to punish schools and teachers for using physical punishment of students.

The scandal over the Sarasas Witaed Ratchaphruek School broke out when a parent went to consult with a school staff member about a son who had developed some strange behavior and refused to go to school. The staff member displayed video from a closed-circuit TV camera installed in the classroom that showed a female caregiver physically abusing the child while other staff turned a blind eye.

When other parents sub-

sequently viewed videos, they observed similar abuses, especially in kindergarten classes.

According to lawyer Ronnarong, one caregiver was seen employing physical violence more than 20 times in videos covering just eight days.

Many of the video clips have been posted on social media, drawing attention from mainstream media. One of the most shocking ones shows a student being thrown to the floor and then having a female caregiver cover his head with a black garbage bag as he tries to run away.

Another clip shows a caregiver repeatedly push a pupil against a wall while he is trying to leave the classroom.

Piboon Yongkamol, the founder and president of the privately run chain of 49 Sarasas schools, told Thai media he had apologized to the parents, but showed little remorse for the situation. He charged that parents were making a fuss just to get money out of him, and if he were forced to close his schools, he would lose nothing financially because of the profit he could make by selling the land they are on.

Poland's ruling party leader joins revamped government

Warsaw (AP): Poland's president has formally sworn in a reshuffled government in which the leader of the main ruling party, Jaroslaw Kaczynski, becomes deputy prime minister, after years of forging the nation's politics from outside the Cabinet.

Kaczynski, 71, will now be in charge of the justice, defense and interior sectors, supervising the work of these key ministers.

Until now, he was formally only a regular lawmaker for his Law and Justice party although he was considered to wield considerable influence.

Observers say his main task will be to ease tensions between moderate Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki, and hard-line Justice Minister Zbigniew Ziobro, which recently brought the right-wing coalition, in power since 2015, to the brink of collapse.

Ziobro, whose reform of the justice system has drawn European Union condemnation, is the head of a small coalition partner, United Poland. The open-air swearing-in ceremony Tuesday was led by President Andrzej Duda in the gardens of the Presidential Palace. It had been planned for

Monday at the palace but was postponed after the new education minister, Przemyslaw Czarnek, tested positive for COVID-19.

Czarnek was not present Tuesday and will be sworn in later.

The reshuffle trimmed the number of ministries to 14, from 20, in what leaders described as an effort to make it more efficient and to speed up the decision-making process.

The coalition, which also includes another small party, Agreement, has three years left of its term.

What's in a year

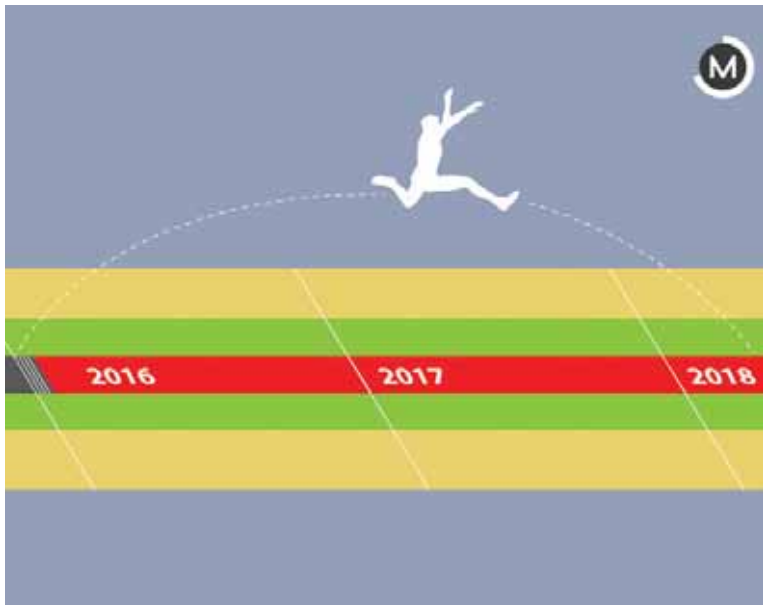
The impression of dropping a year has always been accredited with wasting the year. But now the scenario has completely reversed, says ANKIT KAPOOR

‘COVID-19 has changed how education is imparted’

International students need to study online and complete course from campus when safe to return, says **EMMA LANCASTER**



The onset of the Coronavirus pandemic is transforming the traditional way of imparting education. However, now new tools are being added to the labs and lecture theatres.

Earlier, virtual learning was only considered a supplement to classroom learning. While many will still prefer physically attending classes, the pandemic is bringing a shift in how online learning is perceived. We are confident blended learning will become a larger part of the education system, with a combination of face-to-face teaching and online teaching.

An understanding across academia that talented international students need to start their study programmes virtually and then eventually complete the course from the campus when safe to return to. This means students won’t have to skip a semester or waste a full year.

While Indian students have been historically cautious about distance learning (especially for higher studies), the realities of

COVID and the fact that high quality programmes have been developed with leading universities are changing attitudes. In addition to programmes with top 100 universities in the US and U.K., Australian programmes like the Charles Sturt University Study Centre in Australia have introduced additional measures to allow students to try face-to-face virtual and blended learning risk-free.

In the UK, the University of Huddersfield moved its courses online earlier this year in the wake of the global pandemic and locked international borders. With the campus reopening for Autumn 2020, students who had begun studying online can now progress to their degree.

The key test though is the experience of students and their teachers. Academics say they have confidence that students are satisfied with their learning. Students and their teachers have risen to the challenge. They are both to be commended for the work they have undertaken and the online skills they have acquired which will remain part of their experience.

3,100-PLUS TEACHERS CERTIFIED AS MIE BY TAG

UV-RAY DEVICE TO DISINFECT AIR FROM AC

Researchers from Lovely Professional University have developed a device that can be installed in air conditioners to disinfect the air they dispense from viruses and harmful gases. The devices comprises of a set of UV tubes which emit rays at a particular wavelength to destroy the viruses present in the air flow of the AC. The device also removes hazardous gases like Sox and Nox from the air.

The device circulates pure air inside the room as soon as the AC is turned on. The sensing unit ignites the tube, whilst the indicator installed inside the unit, displays when the tubes need to be replaced. The research team has developed prototypes and necessary testing has been completed. It took the team about one month to prepare the module. The cost of each module is between ₹1,500-₹2,000.
