27 soldiers killed due to poor bullets in 5 yrs, says Army

Twenty-seven soldiers were killed and 146 wounded due to poor bullets and shells between 2014 and 2019.

Gearing up for a long haul at the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in Ladakh, the Army has expressed concern over the alleged poor quality of ammunition leading to casualties among soldiers.

The Army has noted that more than ₹960 crores was wasted on faulty ammunition and this money could have catered for buying more than 100 howitzers. These guns are very effective in mountain warfare and much needed on

facing borders China. Pointing these critical defi-ciencies, the Army also said at least 27 soldiers were killed and 146 wounded due to poor bul-lets and shells in the period 2014-2019 and urged the Government to take immediate steps. They included fixing accountability and production

"Lack of accountability and poor quality of production has resulted in frequent accidents over the years with injuries and death of soldiers," they said. On an average one accident has taken place per week, internal data of the Army from 2014 to 2019 shows. There were 403 incidents between 2014 to 2019 due to which the Army suf-fered 27 deaths and 146 injuries.

A significant quantity of products was disposed off without completing shelf life due to poor quality.

N early 8-9 crore Indian, or one in 15 individuals aged over 10 years, may have been exposed to coronavirus by the end of August, according to the findings of the second serosurvey conducted by the Indian Council of Medical Research.

In percentage terms, the total people exposed to coronavirus will be estimated at around 7 per cent, which is 10 times higher than the numbers thrown by the findings of the first serosurvey released on September 11. It shows that between the two surveys, the infection has spread wildly. "One in 15 individuals

aged over 10 years were estimated to be exposed to Covid-19 by August 2020," ICMR chief Balram Bhargava said. "Earlier we had thought that it does not affect those below 18, but have now found there's no difference. The prevalence is not different by age group or

between August 17 and September 22. As per its find-ings, the prevalence of Covid-19 among individuals over 10 years was 6.6 per cent, and in adults (over 18 years of age) was 7.1 per cent.

Since India's population is around 140 crore, the total number of people exposed to coronavirus could be around 8-9 crore when we take out the

## in India and pause all its ongo-ing campaign and research PM inaugurates ₹521 crore Namami Gange projects in U'khand

Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated mega development projects worth ₹521 crore in Uttarakhand under the Namami Gange Mission through video conference on Tuesday. He inaugurated a total of eight sewage treatment plants (STPs) including four in Haridwar, two in Rishikesh and one each in Muni-ki-Reti and Badrinath. He also inaugurated the Ganga Avalokan Museum, the first of its kind on the River Ganga at Haridwar and the new logo for the Jal Jeevan Mission. With the inauguration of the STPs, about 15.2 crore litres of contaminated water will not end up in

the Ganga daily.
Modi highlighted the importance of keeping the Ganga clean as it plays a significant role in sustaining the lives of about 50 per cent of the country's population from its origin in Uttarakhand till West Bengal. He termed the Namami Gange Mission as the largest integrated river conservation mission which not only aims at the cleanliness of the Ganga but also focuses on

comprehensive upkeep of the river. The PM said this new thinking and approach had made the Ganga return back to life. Had the old methods been adopted, the situation would have been equally bad today. Old methods lacked public participation and foresight, he added. Modi highlighted the fact that under Namami Gange, projects worth more than Rs 30,000 crore are either in progress or have been completed. He pointed out that due to these projects the sewage treatment capacity of Uttarakhand has increased four times in the last six years.

The PM listed the efforts taken to close more than 130 drains in Uttarakhand from drains in Uttaraknand from flowing into the Ganga. He referred specially to the Chandreshwarnagar drain which was an eyesore for visitors and rafters at Muni Ki Reti in Rishikesh. He applauded the closing of the drain and the construction of a four storied STP at Muni Ki Reti. Modi further said that as it was experi-Prayagraj Kumbh, the visitors to Haridwar Kumbh would also experience the clean and



pure status of the Ganga in Uttarakhand. He said fragmentation of work- on an important subject like waterinto various ministries and departments, led to lack of clear guidelines and coordination. As a result, problems related to irrigation and drinking water continued to persist. He lamented that even after so many years of independence, piped drinking water has not reached more than 15 crore

households in the country. Today, about one lakh house-

holds are being provided piped water supply connections every day under the Jal Jeevan Mission. He said drinking water

connections have been provided to two crore families of the country in just one year. The PM said a special 100-day campaign is being launched on October 2 this year under Jal Jeevan Mission to ensure drinking water connection to every school and Anganwadi in the country. Modi also com-mended the Uttarakhand government for providing drink ing water connections to more than 50,000 families even during the Covid pandemic in the past 4-5 months.

Thanking the PM and the Centre, Chief Minister Centre, Chief Minister Trivendra Singh Rawat that of the 19 projects approved for 16 priority towns, 15 had been completed while the remaining will be completed before the 2021 Kumbh Mela. Of the 135 drains marked in these towns, 128 had been closed while the remaining will be closed before the Kumbh. The benefit of works done in the catchment areas of the Ganga will be evident in the future. Further, organic agriculture is also being encouraged on 5 to 7 kms area on both banks of the Ganga under Namami Gange.

The treated water coming out of the STPs built under this programme is also being provided to farmers for irrigation, he added. ## Sushant didn't die of poisoning, says AIIMS report

**But flags lapses in Cooper Hospital** autopsy report for leaving out details

PNS NEW DELHI

The five-member board of doctors of the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) led by Dr Sudhir Gupta entrusted to re-evaluate film star Sushant Singh Rajput's post-mortem and viscera reports has submitted its finding to the CBI and ruled out death by poisoning but raised certain doubts on the autopsy report conducted by the

Cooper Hospital, Mumbai.
The report is big blow to those who were claiming that Sushant was first poisoned and then hanged. The CBI investigation has so far not found any evidence to substantiate the murder theory. The AIIMS report has ruled out poison allegation, leaving it for the CBI to arrive at its own conclusion on the basis evidences, if

The AIIMS team submitted the report at CBI HQ. The CBI is probing the death case of Sushant and the agency is seeking to ascertain whether it

was a murder or suicide. "The AIIMS has submitted the report. The CBI is studying the report. The report is definitely a help in investigation but not mandatory in all sense. Certain doubts raised by the medical board towards Cooper Hospital and the previous investigation agency which we will try to answer and find out the facts. The job of the agency is to find facts which can stand court of law with evidence. But AIIMS medical report can't be ruled out completely," a top source said.

## Capt holds meeting with farmers' union, declares to fight battle on all fronts


Extending Punjab Government's full support to the agitating farmers in these 'dark and difficult times', the Chief Minister Capt Amarinder Singh on Tuesday assured of all possible legal and other steps to fight the "draconian" new farm laws, including a special session of the Vidhan Sabha to discuss and decide the way forward.

Capt Amarinder, chairing

a meeting with the represen-tatives of 31 farmer unions to take their views on the matter, said that he would be discussing the issue with his legal team to finalize the next steps, including challenging the farm laws in the Supreme Court. Besides farmer represen-

tatives, All India Congress Committee (AICC) general secretary in-charge of Punjab Harish Rawat attended the meeting, along with Cabinet Ministers Sukhjinder Singh Randhawa, Gurpreet Singh Kangar and Bharat Bhushan Ashu, MLA Rana Gurjit Singh, Punjab Congress president Sunil Jakhar and the state Advocate-General Atul Nanda.

"We will take all possible steps to counter the Union Government's assault on the State's federal and



Constitutional rights, and fight for the interests of the farmers, Capt Amarinder assured the farmer representatives.

If the legal experts advise amendment to the state laws to fight the central laws, a special session of the Vidhan Sabha will be immediately called to do so, he said.

Making it clear that the Government had no qualms about convening an Assembly session if that was the best course in the circumstances. the Chief Minister, however, trashed SAD president Sukhbir Badal's demand for a special Vidhan Sabha session as "cheap

gimmickry" after their active support to the central laws for

He questioned, where were the Akalis in the previous session and why Sukhbir did not support the other parties at the all-party meeting.
Asserting that the Centre

had no right to enact these laws as it amounted to violation of the Constitution and attack on the federal structure, the Chief Minister said that Punjab Government shared the farmers' concerns and will do whatever it takes to scuttle the Union Government's attempt to ruin the farming commu-

islations.
"The battle will be fought on all fronts," said the Chief Minister adding that besides the Congress signature campaign, announced a day before, all Panchayats in the state would be requested to pass resolutions against the Agriculture Acts, and the same would be sent to the Union

Government. Declaring that Punjab Government and the State Congress were with the farmers in this difficult time, Capt Amarinder said that he would take the suggestions of the Kisan Unions to legal experts

action.
"If the new laws are implemented, it will spell the end of agriculture," said the Chief Minister, warning that "in the times ahead, the Government of India will follow up these legislation with elimination of MSP (minimum support price) and FCI (Food Corporation of India), bringing an end to the time-tested farming procurement and marketing system as we know it."

Promising to fight the

Farm Laws shoulder-to-shoulder with the farmers, Jakhar said that he was ready to quit PPCC presidentship to join their protests without making it a political act.
"However, I am confident

that the Chief Minister would find way to counter the Central assault on the farming com-munity and protect your interests just as he had done on the water issue.
They (Centre) have killed

the farmers with a pen, we will have to find a way to kill them with a pen," he said, quipping "Kalam naal marya hai, assi kalam naal bachavange" (We will save the farmers with the

## 25 more Covid-19 deaths, Haryana toll reaches 1,356; 1,562 fresh cases reported

The tally of Covid-19 patients in Haryana mounted to 126, 974 on Tuesday with the State Health department reporting 1562 fresh cases of the disease. Deaths of 25 patients were also reported due to Covid-19 on Tuesday after which the death toll from the disease mounted to 1356.

On a positive note, the authorities discharged 2403 patients of the disease from different hospitals of the State after their recovery on the day. A total of 110,814 patients have so far recovered from the disease and the recovery percentage in the state is 87.27. The infection rate (IR) in the state has increased to 6.73 percent with a doubling rate of 29 days.

Of the 25 fatalities on

Tuesday, three each were reported from Rohtak; Hisar, Yamunanagar while two each from Sirsa, Kurukshetra, Bhiwani,Panipat and one each from Faridabad, Gurugram, Rewari, Ambala, Palwal, Panchkula, Nuh and Fatehabad ranchkula, Nun and Fatenabad districts. Among the districts which reported a big spike in cases are Gurugram (224), Faridabad (168), Kurukshetra (143), Sonepat (112) and Rohtak (114). Currently, there are 14,804 active Covid-19 cases in Haryana, while 1, 10, 814 people have been discharged after recovery.



## Punjab has 1,100 fresh cases, 75 Covid-19 deaths

Punjab on Tuesday added 1,100 fresh cases to the infection tally pushing the state's Covid-19 count to plushing the states Covid-19 count of 1,12,460. Besides, as many as 75 more Covid-positive patients succumbed to the contagion in the past 24 hours, pushing the state's death toll to 3,359. The state's mortality rate stood at 2.99 percent. Maximum 12 casualties were reported in Ludhiana, followed by seven each in Amritsar and Gurdaspur; five each in Pathankot, SBS Nagar (Nawanshahr), and SAS Nagar (Mohali); four each in Jalandhar, Hoshiarpur, and Ferozepur; three each in Kapurthala, Barnala, and Muktsar: two each in Tarn Taran. Bathinda, Faridkot, Patiala, and Ropar; and one death each in Fatehgarh Sahib, Moga, and Sangrur districts.

Among the fresh cases, highest

180 were reported from Ludhiana district, followed by 145 from Jalandhar, 109 from Mohali, 95 from Gurdaspur, 55 each from Bathinda and Kapurthala, 50 from Hoshiarpur, September 21, 1,711 on September 24,

47 from Tarn Taran, 43 from Muktsar, 28 from Ropar, 25 from Fazilka, 20 each from Faridkot and Sangrur, 18 from Fatehgarh Sahib, 16 from Moga, 13 from Mansa, 12 from Barnala, 11 from SBS Nagar, nine from Pathankot and eight new cases from Ferozepur district. Registering a higher number of



# **Covid-19 tally mounts** Recovery rate shows to 47,995 in U'khand

11 deaths and 1,413 recoveries on Tuesday

 $F^{\mathrm{or}}_{\mathrm{day}}$  on Tuesday, the state health department reported less than 500 fresh cases of Covid-19. On the day 493 patients were reported which increased the tally of the disease to 47,995 in the state. Deaths of 11 patients were reported on Tuesday which increased the death toll to 591.

Continuing the good trend of increased recoveries, 1,413 patients of the disease were declared cured on Tuesday. A total of 38,059 patients have so far recovered from the disease and the recovery percentage has increased to 79.30 percent. The Infection Rate (IR) of the disease is 7.09 percent and the doubling rate of the disease is

Four patients of Covid-19 were reported dead at Sushila Tiwari government hospital Haldwani. In All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) Rishikesh three patients of the Rishikesh three patients of the disease were reported dead. Similarly two patients succumbed to the disease at Government Doon Medical College (GDMC) hospital Dehradun. One patient each was reported dead at Government Base hospital and SN hospital Almora on the day. The authorities reported

The authorities reported 174 fresh cases of the disease in Dehradun district on Tuesday. In Tehri 65 patients were reported while 60 patients in Udham Singh Nagar, 53 in Haridwar, 47 in Nainital, 40 in Uttarkashi, 15 each in Champawat and Pithoragarh, 13 in Chamoli, six in Bageshwar, four in Almora was reported.

Out of the 1413 patients recovered on Tuesday, 411 are from Dehradun, 301 from Nainital, 169 from Haridwar, 142 from Udham Singh Nagar, 120 Chamoli, 94 from Pauri and 74 are from Almora dis-

# Ensuring health & happiness of the elderly for a better society



 $T^{\text{he United Nations declared October 1 as the}} \\ International Day for Elderly. On this day UN$ and its allied groups raise awareness on issues affecting the elderly and our responsibilities towards our elders. It is also a day to appreciate the contribu-tions of the elderly to society. The elderly popula-tion is defined as people aged 65 years and above. This year we are still under the siege of the Covid-19 pandemic and it is the elderly who have been afflicted the most by Covid.

Currently the total population of the world is 7.8 billion. It is estimated that there were 703 million persons aged above 65 in 2019. This number is projected to double to more than 1.5 billion people by 2050. One can imagine how seriously this rise in geriatric population will bring changes to the ailing Indian health system

It is common knowledge that as our age advances, the immunity of our body decreases to fight against even less virulent virus or bacteria which can give rise to illness. Additionally, eldery people usually have other associated comorbidities like diabetes, hypertension, heart, lungs and

kidney problems.

Being an orthopaedic surgeon, in addition to these above mentioned comorbidities, I mainly see ple- osteoporosis and osteoporosis related fractures. Osteoporosis is a disease which can cause generalised body pain and bending of these fragile bones which is more marked in the lower limbs and the spine. These deformities usually increase as the age advances. The quality of the bone becomes more porous hence the bones become more bent and more fragile which fracture with trivial trauma.

Osteoporotic fractures usually occur in the spine, hip and wrist bone. The common mode of injury is a minor slip in the bathroom in cases of hip fracture and after travelling on bumpy roads, which is quite a common scenario in our country to sustain osteoporotic spine fractures. Wrist fractures usually occur when one falls on an outstretched hand.

Wrist fractures can usually be managed by simple plaster while most osteoporotic spine fractures can easily be managed with brace. But, in the current scenario, there is not much scope for conservative treatment in managing hip fractures. These hip fractures are difficult to manage due to the age of the patients and their comorbidities. These fractures are almost always managed surgically but the results after surgery are also not very predictable. In my own experience -also supported by scientific studies, a third of the patients with hip fracture who are treated surgically die within a year of the injury irrespective of any surgical treatment and the hospital facilities not only in our country but in developed countries

too. Not only do the elderly suffer from physical deformities and problems but also occasionally have mental problems like anxiety, depression, psychosis and Alzheimer's disease or some other sort of neu-rological problem like Parkinsonism etc.

The UN is promoting the decade of healthy ageing and bringing together UN experts, civil soci-

ety, government and health professionals to prepare a global strategy and action plan on ageing. This strategy will be integrated into the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) especially goal 3 which is to ensure healthy life and promote well being of all at all ages. One of the aims in the present proposal is reducing the health disparities between elderly people in developed and developing countries so as to leave no one behind. Currently, the Covid pandemic has increased the burden on the health system ating elderly people in a short pe od of time, hence the policy, planning and the attitude of the public, social workers and policy maker's needs to change.

Ageing and osteoporosis are creating a burden on the already constrained health services in both public and private sectors in India hence, an attempt should be made to prevent osteoporosis and osteoporotic fractures. Primordial pre-vention by eating a healthy, nutritious and balanced diet containing calcium, vitamin D and the other micro nutrients, daily exeror recreational work improves bone strength. This will definitely reduce the incidence of osteoporosis and related fractures. The other preventive measures to reduce incidence of fractures is using a walking aid like cane or walker, keeping the floor dry, turning on the light bulb in the bathroom particularly during the night.


Human resource is the biggest resource but its worth depends upon the health of the individual. Elderly people can play a critical and an important role through volutions and the dependence of the control of the cont unteer work and even helping their family with responsibilities and sharing their vast experience. Though elderly people cannot do rigorous physical work they can do many other supervisory works. They can transfer their experience and knowl-edge to the younger generation which will greatly benefit the family, society and nation. The elderly people particularly the well trained and experienced profession-als should be motivated to make contributions to local communities. This will help both the community and the elderly while boosting their self esteem and making them

while boosting their self esteem and making them feel more dignified as they age.

Ageing is a natural and physiological phenomenon which starts from conception of an individual. This process cannot be stopped but can be modified. According to the 2011 Indian census there are nearly 104 million elderly persons in India and we all should be concerned about their mental, physical and nutritional requirements at large.

People are now living longer but not living health-ier. Everybody's goal should be to improve quali-ty of life so that all can live comfortably and independently for the rest of their life. For that there is an urgent need to build a stable infrastructure and health care support system for the elderly.

## SC acquits man in 20-year-old rape case

 $T^{\text{he Supreme Court has}}_{\text{acquitted a man in a 20-year-old rape case observing}}$ that he and the alleged victim were in love, their relationship was consensual and the case was "an afterthought" - filed when the man was about to

marry another woman.

The bench of Justices RF Nariman, Navin Sinha and Indira Banerjee set aside the conviction by a trial court and the Jharkhand High Court quoting medical experts, who established that the woman was 25 years old when she filed the case in 1999, and not 20 as she claimed, making her a major at the time of the alleged assault in 1995.

The court added that let-ters exchanged between the two and their photographs together showed they were in love and that a case of rape and cheating on pretext of marriage was filed a week ahead of the man's wedding to another woman.

It added that no woman, after being sexually assaulted at knife-point, would write love letters to the accused and share a live-in relationship with him

for four years.

The woman had claimed she stayed quite after the assault because the accused has

promised to marry her.

"The marriage between them could not materialise due to societal reasons as the man belongs to a Scheduled Tribe, while the woman is a Christian... The woman had deposed that their marriage could not be solemnized because they belonged to different religions. She was therefore conscious of this obstacle all along..." the court said.

The court added it was not possible to hold, on the basis of evidence, that the man never intended to marry her and quoted the woman's letters in which she had acknowledged that the man's family always treated her well, and that their families even got them

## EC fixes schedule for bypoll to one LS, 56 Assembly seats

The Election Commission (EC) on Tuesday (EC) on Tuesday announced dates for bypolls to one Lok Sabha seat and 56 Assembly constituencies spread across 12 States. Bypolls to 54 Assembly constituencies will take place on November 3 while bypolls to the Lok Sabha seat and two Assembly constituencies will be conducted on November 7. The votes will be counted on November 10 alongside the counting of votes for the general assembly elections in Bihar.

Before announcing the schedule, the poll panel had issued a separate statement on Tuesday to announce that it has decided not to hold assembly bypolls in seven seats across Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Assam and West Bengal "at this stage" after specific request from the

atter specific request from the states in conduct of polls. By-polls will be held for Chhattisgarh, Gujarat, Haryana, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Nagaland, Odisha, Telangana, and Uttar Pradesh. Madhya Pradesh has the highest number of seats--27--among the 54 Assembly constituencies for which polling will be held on November 3. Next is Gujarat (eight), Uttar Pradesh (seven); Jharkhand, Karnataka, Nagaland, Odisha (two each) and one each from Telangana, Chhattisgarh and Haryana. The term of the legislative assemblies of the four states would end on different dates between May and June next year.

The bypolls in Madhya Pradesh were necessitated after 25 Congress MLAs followed their leader Ivotiraditya Scindia in joining the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in March. This led to the collapse of the state's Congress government and paved way for the BJP to return to power. The bypolls were necessitated on three of the seats - Joura, Agar and Biora -due to death of the MLAs - two from the Congress and one from BJP, and on the remain-



ing seats due to resignation of the then Congress MLAs.

The Valmiki Nagar Lok

Sabha seat fell vacant in February after the death of incumbent Lok Sabha MP Baidyanath Prasad Mahato of the JD(U). The bypolls were necessitated following resignations tendered by Congress MLAs, five in March and three in June. The reason is that the number of vacant seats in some states has changed due to var-ious reasons, including court

According to EC, the date of issue of notification for byor issue of notification for by-polls to 54 Assembly seats in various states, except Manipur, is October 10, while the last date of filing nominations is October 16, and date for withdrawal is October 19. In the two Assembly seats of Manipur, and one Lok Sabha seat in Bihar, the date for filing nominations October 20, and for withdrawal of nominations is October 23.

SC directs States to provide dry

rations to sex workers without

he Supreme Court on Tuesday directed all States to provide dry rations to sex workers, who are identified by National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO) and legal services authorities, without insisting on any proof of iden-

The apex court asked all the states to file compliance report within four weeks giving details of number of sex workers who got dry ration within this peri-

A bench comprising Justices L Nageswara Rao and Ajay Rastogi said that it would later deal with the aspect of whether financial assistance could be provided to them during the period of COVID-19

The top court, which posted the matter for hearing after four weeks, said that states would provide dry rations to sex them with the assistance of NACO, district as well as state legal service authority. The bench was hearing a

plea which has raised the issue problems faced by sex workers on account of the COVID-19 pandemic. It asked the states to file a

detailed report on how they would provide ration cards and other facilities to sex workers.

"We are aware of the facts that states are coming forward to provide assistance but the problem is that these sex workers don't have any proof of identity. Therefore, all should be given rations. States should tell us how this should be implemented," the bench said.

The counsel appearing for the Centre said it has no objection if states would provide dry ration to sex workers

Advocate Pijush Kumar Roy, assisting the apex court as an amicus curiae in the matter, said bank accounts of sex workers should also be opened withnotalism or issues in respect of the aforesaid property out insisting upon proof of identity in order to provide them financial assistance.

The apex court had last

Taken aback by the surge in the number of Covid-19 patients, the Indian Medical Association, the highest policy making body of modern medicine practitioners have asked the Government of Kerala to declare a state of "Health Emergency".

Dr Abraham Varghese,

president, IMA (Kerala) said in a statement to the Government that the situation in Kerala is precarious and requires stringent action and an awareness campaign. The number of cases diagnosed with Covid-19 on a daily basis is disturbing. But what is of more concern is the number of patients contracting the pandemic through social

contacts," said Dr Varghese.
The soft-spoken doctor has been cautioning the authorities about community transmission which was set long back in the State.. He said the Government should go for strict social controls and regulations to check the number of people crowding at public places and shopping centres. "Offices and business establishments could work with skeleton staff and there should be restrictions on the number

of people who could gather in public or private places," said

Dr Varghese.

Though the official figures state that almost 58,000 people are under treatment in the State for Covid-19, Government doctors themselves say that the figure has crossed 2 lakh mark. "The IMA's studies prove that the situation in Kerala is getting worse by the day as shown by the spurt in numbers.

Kerala branch demanded a state of Health Emergency in the State, the number of new Covid-19 patients shot up to 7,354 which include 7,036 patients who contracted the pandemic through social contacts. Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan, who briefed the

media after an all party meeting said that there were 61,791 persons under treatment in the State for Covid-19 on Tuesday.

Neighboring Tamil Nadu is gradually bringing down the number of cases on a daily basis without any fanfare. On Tuesday, Tamil Nadu diagnosed 5,546 new persons afflicted with Covid-19. A medical bulletin released by the Tamil Nadu Government said the num-ber of patients in the State as on Tuesday were 46,281 which was well below that in Kerala. Tamil Nadu saw 70 persons succumbing to the dreaded disease during the last 24 hours.

Kerala, which had claimed that it tamed Covid-19 as early as May 8 is facing a precarious position. Malappurm district alone diagnosed 1,040 new patients while the capital city of Thiruvananthapuram diagnosed 935 patients. The Chief Minister blamed the Opposition. particularly the BJP for the State's failure in countering the pandemic. Tamil Nadu tested almost 85,000 persons across the State while Kerala had to content with 53,000 persons.

## **Another silent Nirbhaya**

Dalit girl from Hathras dies after being brutally gang-raped. Where are the deterrent laws and action? Will we have to wait years again?



he "Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao" campaign is being slandered with each passing day as it becomes a "Beti Hatao, Beti Darao" mission in reality, with heinous crimes against the girl child and women going up every day across the country. So it is that just two days after Daughter's Day, a 19-year-old Dalit girl was brutally gang-raped in Uttar Pradesh's Hathras district. In a chilling throwback to the Nirbhaya case and the incident in Hyderabad not so long ago, the girl was left with her tongue cut out, ostensibly to prevent her from testifying. Her legs were bruised so severely and her spine was so lethally battered that she was completely paral-

ysed while her arms could just about register a movement. Still she fought for her dear life over 15 days in hospital but gave up despite being brought to Delhi. Yet there was no outcry for the last fortnight till she became just another cold statistic. Nobody mourned a young life snuffed out in its prime due to caste-based hatred, sexual depravity and a deteriorating law and order situation, particularly in the Hindi heartland. Exacerbating the situation, as usual, were the poorly conducted investigations and a slow justice system. The conviction rate for rape is only 27.2 per cent despite the fact that it accounts for 11.5 per cent of the total crime statistics. On an average, 91 rapes were reported every single day across India in 2018, according to National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) data. The Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC) says that trial in rape cases should be completed in 60 days but that never happens because of the tardiness of police investigations. Then there are judicial flaws that need to be plugged when it comes to rape, the primary being bail to the accused, which should be denied till the probe is completed. Some independent studies indicate that the average time of finishing trial even in fast track courts is eight months. And even if one were to get death penalty, acquittals, appeals and mercy petitions mean that only about five per cent death penalties are actually upheld by the Supreme Court. A traumatised rape survivor hardly has the courage to go through such travesty and gives up midway. The 2012 Nirbhaya rape, which shook the conscience of not just the nation but the world, too, compelled our parliamentarians to strengthen the punitive justice delivery system based on the recommendations of a committee that included eminent jurists. It led to some crucial amendments to the law, which included changing the very definition of "rape", the establishment of fast-track courts to ensure victims get justice without undue delay, harsher punishments for the accused with the provision of death sentence being added to it and the abolition of the two-finger test among others. Two other such incidents, in Kathua and Unnao, where two children were raped, had widened the scope of punishment for raping a child under 12 to death penalty. Undoubtedly, there has been an increase in reportage of crimes against women after Nirbhaya though much of them are still under-reported. Besides, as the Hyderabad incident has shown, question marks remain on the use of the death penalty as criminals are now murdering their victims to destroy evidence. For the criminal, there is no deterrent. But yes, he can be stalled if deterrence is built into the system by fast-tracking procedures and ensuring swift justice. Conviction rates need to go up proportionately. At present, fast-track courts are no different from the usual courts in terms of case pile-ups and vacancies. A quick, fair and unbiased judicial set-up with requisite number of judges is a sine qua non. A continuously responsive system is a bigger deterrent than one or two landmark rulings.

The unchecked crimes against women and the girl child are also skewering gender equity in the rural hinterland. According to a study supported by the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR), that was conducted in Uttar Pradesh and Haryana, the increasing crimes against women have deepened preferences for a son. So much so that we have lost around 4,60,000 girls to sex selection at birth each year between 2013 and 2017, according to the UNFPA. When errants go scot-free and the woman's family is left to wallow in pain and shame, a malaise becomes a societal archetype. And the girl child will continue to be vulnerable, either used as a tool in a caste war as the rapists in Hathras belonged to the upper caste, a sacrifice in a revenge drama or a family feud or a life cheap enough to be pawned by male-dominated codes. Predictably, there is a political slugfest over this latest incident, with the Congress, Bahujan Samaj Party (BSP) and the Samajwadi Party (SP) slamming the BJP Government in UP for the sorry plight of law and order in the State. Their protests will once again be tainted by the ruling party as "crocodile tears" and a "political conspiracy" to "defame the Government." The Opposition will predictably make the rape a subset of excesses on Dalits. But neither the Opposition nor the ruling party was there for the girl when she was writhing in hospital for a fortnight. And much to the shame of India's most populous State, nobody wants to roll back UP's unique distinction of reporting the highest crime spiral against women. As for justice, will we have to wait another seven years?

But as a robust democracy, we have it within ourselves to accept vilification and acknowledge cogent counterpoints. We shouldn't need lobbyists to get the other side of the story; our media should be free

ne trouble with human rights watchdogs is that they

to do that. Besides, by and large, the organisation has an international acceptability even if we take some of its reports with a pinch of salt. But by targetting Amnesty, which says it is now forced to shut shop in India because the Government has completely frozen its bank accounts here, we appear to be in the bracket of oppressor and authoritative regimes like China. And considering its activists have been particularly penalised for tracking dissent pan-India over the last two years, it gives them a moral upper hand and claim a witchhunt. The reasons that the organisation lists behind the Government crackdown on it are the same as those cited by tormented civil society activists — namely "unequivocal calls for transparency in the Government, more recently for accountability of the Delhi police and the Government of India regarding the grave human rights violations in Delhi riots and Jammu & Kashmir." Frankly, even without the Amnesty's reports, there is far too much on-ground evidence of the charges it has made. And the way the disclosure statements and names in the chargesheet of the Delhi Police on the city riots have been circled out, targetting the liberal intelligentsia, protesters and activists while leaving out the inflammatory fringe Rightists, there is a move to freeze the right of democratic dissent. So the timing of its India exit suits Amnesty more than us at this point of time.

It would have made more sense had the Government zeroed in on Amnesty in 2016, when it was booked in a sedition case for allowing "anti-India" slogans on Kashmir at an event in Bengaluru. But to pursue it for violating foreign funding rules in 2019 obviously raises questions on intent. Amnesty though claims that its India operations have been funded domestically. The immediate context seems to be the report it released last month on the complicity of Delhi police in the riots. Yes we must defend our pluralism and challenge the official narrative. But by hounding out Amnesty, we have a public relations battle ahead. Nothing will happen to it. Nothing would have if it had been allowed to continue.

# New agricultural paradigm

The end of socialist-era impediments should ideally stimulate increased private sector investment across the value chain and help create jobs


he over-hyped green revolution of the late 1960s introduced varieties of dwarf rice and wheat in northern India with a cocktail of chemical fertilisers and pesticides that sucked up groundwater and gradually made it unfit for drinking. The chemicals leached into the soil and water. State-sponsored propaganda about "miraculous yields" extended the phenomenon across the country ruining soil fertility and the nutritious value of food crops: the impact on public health was noticed by the medical community but all voices were silenced. Today, Gurdaspur-to-Delhi trains are called "Cancer Express", yet there has been no medical study of the harm caused by chemical agriculture to the health of humans, animals, soil and water resources

Now, four momentous laws could pave the way for a revolution in which farmers drive the change, with technology playing a supportive role. If the Government repudiates the genetically-modified food crops lobby, India could return to farming methods that do not require costly inputs and force farmers into a vicious cycle of debt (and even suicide).

On September 16, 2020, one day before the three agriculture-related Bills were moved in Parliament, the Banking Regulation (Amendment) Act, 2020 was passed, bringing all cooperative banks under the purview of the Reserve Bank of India (RBI). It means stricter supervision of 1,482 urban and 58 multi-state cooperative banks, with deposits of ₹4.84 lakh crore

The legislation undermines the strongmen who control the Agricultural Produce Marketing Committees (APMCs), mandis loans and so on in many States. It is noteworthy that large farmers are resisting the new laws; earlier they opposed the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act, 2005 (MGNRE-GA) as they had to match wages or lose farm labour. The ongoing COVID pandemic has also improved the bargaining power of farm labourers and added to the

bitterness of large farmers.
Often, agents arranged debtfunding for farmers from private moneylenders, who charged usurious interest and enjoyed political heft; such debt has been linked to



Simultaneously, the Union crore fund for animal husstimulus package and a scheme for interest subvention of two per cent to "shishu" loan catego ry borrowers for one year under the Pradhan Mantri Mudra Yojana. These developments form the sub-text of the farm

The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act 2020 allows sale and marketing of produce outside notified APMC mandis. State Governments cannot collect market fee, cess or levy for trade outside the APMC markets; inter-state trade barriers are nixed and provisions have been made for electronic trading of agricultural produce. No licence is needed; anyone with a PAN card can buy directly from farmers. The new sys tem provides a dispute resolu-tion mechanism in case farmers are not paid immediately or within three days.

The APMCs failed as they

allowed vested interests to seize the system. States levied cess to earn extra revenue that was not part of the budget and was used for "discretionary" development spending, mostly under the Chief Minister's orders. As the cess increased, political appointees took charge of the APMCs. Even the Food Corporation of India (FCI) paid cess. Small farmers were bur-

to take their produce to the mandis and deal with middlemen. For instance, waiting outside sugar mills, with heat evap-orating the sugar content in the cane, desperate farmers have succumbed to agents (of nearby mandis) who arrive miraculously and dictate the price.

Under the new Act, politicians and urban elite farmers will find it difficult to get large "agricultural" incomes mandicertified and pay zero per cent income tax, as payments have to be made against PAN cards.

The Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020 regulates contractual farming rules and State APMC Acts. Farmers can make contracts with a corporate entity or wholesaler at a mutually agreed price. The system already exists in 20 States; PepsiCo buys potatoes from 24,000 farmers across nine States. Further, 18 States already permit private *mandis* while Kerala and Bihar don't have APMC mandis at all. More pertinently, the Act prohibits acquiring ownership rights of farmers' land.

The Centre has funded ₹6,685 crore for the formation of 10,000 Farmer Producer Organisations (FPOs) and the ₹1 lakh crore Agriculture Infrastructure Fund (AIF). The FPO will give farmers higher bargaining power while AIF and market reforms serve as additional enablers. They can invest in farm equipment, infrastructure and build forward market linkages by making agreements with agribusinesses, thus improving access to technology and investment. Maharashtra's Sahyadri Farmers Producer Co. Ltd, with 8,000 marginal farmers, exports 16,000 tonnes of grapes every season.

The end of socialist-era impediments should stimulate increased private sector invest-ment across the value chain, creating jobs in logistics service providers, warehouse operators and processing unit staff. The rise of food-processing industries could create non-farm jobs in rural areas.

India processes less than 10 per cent of output (cereals, fruits, vegetables, fish, etc) and loses around ₹90,000 crore annually to wastage. Hopefully, market linkages will motivate farmers to diversify and grow crops such as edible oils and help reduce India's edible oil import bill that currently stands

at over \$10 billion. Finally, The Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020 removes excessive control on production, storage, movement and distribution of food commodities: removes cereals, pulses, oilseeds, edible oils, onion and potatoes from the list of essential commodities, and paves the way for cold chain infrastructure to come up. Previously, control regarding the storage of essential com-modities (onions, potatoes, edible oils, jute, rice paddy, sugar) gave draconian powers to authorities to raid "hoarders", confiscate stocks, cancel licensing and even imprison offenders. This naturally discouraged investment in storage as entrepreneurs feared being prosecut-ed as "hoarders." Lack of storage also contributed to volatilin prices as their stability depends on adequate ware-

housing infrastructure.

Henceforth, the ECA 2020 will be invoked only under extraordinary circumstances such as war, famine, natural calamity of grave nature and extraordinary price rise (100 per cent increase in retail price of horticultural produce over the preceding 12 months, or 50 per cent increase in retail price of non-perishables over the preceding five years).

Dismissing the propaganda that the new laws would end the minimum support price (MSP). the Centre has quietly ordered procurement, effectively nipping the canard that small and marginal farmers would be short-changed. Implementation will be the key.



## BJP all set to make it alone

It is well within its rights to expand its base and in times to come, go solo as the top brass believes in making the party electorally strong



he saffron party must slowly learn to live without its major allies now that its oldest partner, the Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD), quit the BJP-led NDA alliance on Saturday. The BJP and the SAD had been partners even during the Jan Sangh days. However, with a brute majority in the Lok Sabha, the BJP's attitude now is "go if you want to leave." That is why there are no efforts to mollify miffed allies as it was done during the Atal Bihari Vajpayee era. There was a time in the eighties when it was difficult for the BJP to get allies but today Prime Minister Narendra Modi is in a strong position and hence the alliance partners are not needed

by the party anymore.

The BJP had five major allies till two years ago. They were the Telugu Desam Party (TDP), the Shiv Sena, the SAD, the Janata Dal-United (JD-U) and the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP). With the Bihar elections round the corner, the party is left with only the JD(U) as its major alliance partner now. The others are smaller parties. Out of all these NDA allies, the TDP was the first to leave in March 2018 over the issue of grant of special status to Andhra Pradesh. Soon after the TDP's departure, another one of the oldest allies, the Shiv Sena parted company in October 2019 on the issue of chief ministership in Maharashtra after the Assembly polls. The Sena formed the Government in the State under the Sena chief Uddhav Thackeray with the Congress and the Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) as partners. Now, the SAD too has left on the issue of the controversial farm Bills that were pushed through amid din and allegations of riding roughshod on the objections of the Opposition parties and allies alike.

The only partner the BJP itself dumped was the PDP in Jammu and Kashmir (J&K). In any case, the BJP-PDP alliance was an uneasy marriage of convenience and the late PDP chief Mufti Mohammad Sayeed termed it as "an alliance of the North Pole and the South Pole."

The NDA partners had been unhappy with the BJP for long, claiming that they were not consulted or even informed about major issues. "Where is the NDA," asks SAD chief Sukhbir Badal. The relationship under Modi has changed compared to Vajpayee's time when one of the partners was the convenor of the NDA while Vajpayee or later Advani were the chairmen of the alliance. There were NDA meetings on important issues. Though Modi has included the representatives of the allies, despite the BJP having a majority in both 2014 and 2019, there is no formal NDA structure now. However, the BJP needed them in the Rajya Sabha for pushing the Bills where it was in a minority.

The BJP, under the leadership of Modi has learnt the art of dividing the Opposition and pushing through even some controversial Bills like the recent farm ones and the earlier Citizenship Amendment Bill. Also, the Punjab elections are in 2022 and the next Lok Sabha polls are even further off, in 2024. Who knows what will happen by then? However, according to insiders, the BJP wants to improve its performance by going solo in the coming polls. The main grouse of the allies is that the BJP, which was the junior partner in Maharashtra and Punjab, has expanded its base in the last six years. Not only has it overtaken the allies, it has become the richest party, too. Notwithstanding the concerns of its partners, the BJP is aggressively pursuing its objective of coming to power in States where it is not in Government. The only aim of the party is to consolidate Hindu voters even further by eating into the votes of its alliance partners. It has a major presence in most big States and is now eyeing the South and the North-East for expansion. The saffron party has replaced the Left in Tripura and edged the Congress out in West Bengal and Odisha as the main challenger to the ruling party.

In the 552-member Lok Sabha, the NDA has 335 seats, of which the BJP alone has 303 representatives. It does not need partners in 334 seats and is dependent on allies in 212 seats. When the BJP came to power in 2014, it had only 23 Rajya Sabha seats but today, it has 87. So far, the party has managed to push even controversial Bills like the bifurcation of J&K and the Citizenship Amendment Bill by dividing the Opposition. The three farm reform Bills, too, were passed similarly.

The Modi regime wants to have ties in which the BJP stands to gain. This has mostly worked in the last six years. The BJP has overtaken the Sena in Maharashtra and in other States too it has improved its electoral chances. It is indeed well within its rights to expand its base and in times to come, go solo as the top brass believes in making the party electorally strong.

Is it not said that in politics there are no permanent friends or permanent enemies? The BJP, too, is banking on the old allies coming back to its fold and new allies joining it. If one looks at the coalition politics, which is practised by both the main parties
— the Congress and the BJP — the Congress-led UPA too is

# Education as revolution

The poor have found innovative ways of helping themselves and visionary leaders from among these communities are nurturing a growing industry of good quality private schools

the state of India's school education continues to be abysmal despite so many high-sounding policy prescriptions being tossed around. There are, however, islands of excellence and even in this bleak landscape there are shoots of green While Government schools are the mainstay of school education for the poor, some exceptional pri-vate schools are affordable even to the extremely marvate schools are affordable even to the extremely mar-ginalised. The accepted wisdom is that private schools serve the privileged; everyone else, especially the underprivileged, requires public schools. This logic is grounded on the assumption that the poor need Government assistance if they are to get a good edu-cation. Which helps explain why many school choice enthusiasts believe that the only way the poor can get the education they deserve is through Government schools.

But if we reflect on some of the underprivileged communities, we find these assumptions lacking. The poor have found remarkably innovative ways of help-ing themselves educationally and visionary leaders from among these communities are nurturing a large and growing industry of good quality private schools. Tikiapara, a sprawling slum in Howrah, is a witness and a willing participant in a quiet revo-lution led by Mamoon Akhtar that has the potential to turn around the lives of its residents, especially of its children. Mamoon was forced to drop out of middle school because his parents couldn't afford to educate him further. Three decades later, he is the driving force two schools in Tikiapara with 3,000 students, most of them children of unlettered parents Mamoon's extraordinary journey from a victim to champion of the underprivileged started the day he decided that just because his family couldn't pay for his schooling, he wouldn't forego education. Mamoon's passion helped him overcome his depri-

His father was keen that his son get a good education. So he put him in one of the areas leading schools, St Thomas. After his father died, the teenager had to give up his studies and took up a librarian's job at a private school in Tikiapara, supplementing his income by giving private tuitions. Life would
have gone on as usual but Mamoon couldn't get over
the tragedy he suffered on being forced to lose out
on education. The young idealist believed in giving
direction to the fire within, not in extinguishing in
In 1991 he started an informal "school" teach-

In 1991, he started an informal "school", teaching five to six children in his own house in the Tikiapara slum. Thus began his lifetime romance with education. As the residents of the area became aware of this "school", more and more children started coming and soon there was no place to seat them. The enterprising Mamoon constructed a room on his own 600 square foot plot of land. In that one room, the Samaritan Help Mission School was born with 25 young and eager children flocking to it daily. The good Samaritan stretched his every rupee and canvassed from door to door to raise ₹28,000 per annum (in addition to his own contribution of ₹10,000). The organisation has continued to steadily grow through the years. The catchment area of the school can break the determination of even the greatest optimist but Mamoon is alive and equal to the challenge. The parents come from very poor backgrounds, some are rickshaw-pullers, drug peddlers and daily labourers. But with Mamoons effort, their dreams of educating their children in an English-medium school has come a reality.


Social responsibility: As an educationist, Mamoon is also sharply aware of his role of a social reformer. Most children come from families afflicted with social maladies, with a large number of them that schools should have the right to exclude pupils

exclusion takes its toll on parents, too. Mamoon knows the pain of depriva-tion only too well. At a time when there is a widespread practice of pupils being shunted off a school's rolls in order to manipulate its exam results or rankings in league tables — he is doing his every bit to ensure that children remain at school during the day. There are hundreds of pupils who joined his school after being booted out of another one. Taking in as many vulnerable pupils as possible is the core of this teacher's mission. His school is single-handedly ensuring pupils remain on the rolls. There are a number of youngsters who wouldn't be getting an education were it not for the Samaritan Help Mission School. In a world where schools are clearly pushing vulnerable pupils out through the back door with little thought to their next steps and best interests, he is embrac-

ing them with a cheerful heart.

With a little help from friends:
When he canvassed for help from the community around him, Mamoon reaped a bonus — a strong connect with the community. In 2007, the Samaritan Help Mission School became accredited and recognised by the West Bengal Government. Today, it is a co-educational English-medium school, affiliated to the State Board of Secondary Education, with an enrolment of 1,300. The big thing is that with the school being an English medium one, it makes a major difference to the future prospects of the kids once they go out into the world. However, the odds are stacked against the children of this local ity given the inter-generational nature of poverty and the poor developmental out-comes that families face. This impacts the children in many ways. They battle poor

an underdeveloped personality. Disheartened and discouraged by financial stress and their own inadequacy, parents are ill-equipped to adequately support their children. Sadly, parents in Tikiapara have little motivation to invest in their children's education. Fortunately, Mamoon's conviction and commitment are unflagging and his enthusiasm is contagious sending hope in the community.

Some of the students are orphans;

some of the students are orphans; some have run away from home; all are underprivileged. The Samaritan Help Mission School charges them a measly ₹5 a year, and that too because the teacher believes that people will not value anything that is free. Funds to run the school come from Mamoon's savings and private donors whose motivation is inspired by the good Samaritan's devotion. This led to an addi-tion to the original school on Mamoon's plot, the IR Belilious Institution on Belilious Road, covering two acres of land bequeathed by a Jewish couple, Rebecca and Isaac Raphael Belilious. The school today has a football field, basketball court. a water body, a two-storeyed school building and a bigger one coming up close by. As a child Mamoon swam there, to later see the water body turn into a municipal garbage dump and the Government school that used to run there become virtually defunct, the whole space go derelict and transform into a den of drug pushers. The land on which the second Samaritan Help Mission School stands had thus been a garbage dump for years until Howrah City Police and the Howrah Municipal Corporation got together to create a conducive atmosphere for Mamoon to expand his initiative. The police helped them (Mamoon and his staff) build a wall, remove encroachments and start a school

Creating safe spaces for children at risk: Many children studying in the two schools attest to the fact that they have a fun-filled, interactive and encouraging atmosphere and that the teachers are plex, maladjustment, lack of initiative and engaged in creative activities like sports, ment professional)

quiz competitions, picnics and recreational programmes in the local parks. Regular cleaning campaigns in Tikiapara are organised in which students, teachers and other volunteers take an active part. Mamoon has also introduced a paramedic course for senior students. His policy of inclusive education has ensured that the constitutional right to primary education is a reality in this slum. There are schools which identify parents who are not well-educated and living in the slum. They are approached informally and told that it "will be difficult for your child to stay" in the hope that the parents agree to move out or home-school their child. But Mamoon's schools are a safe learning haven where no one is shunned — either because of creed, low academic scores or poverty.

Innovative approaches: Mamoon says that the process of teaching and learning is an intimate act that neither computations.

ers nor markets can hope to replicate. It is a small wonder then that the technology-centric corporate business model has not worked in reforming the school system as there is simply no substitute for the personal element. There is no substitute for a good teacher and nothing more valuable than quality classroom instruction. But we also need more involved parents to make leaning more effective.

The core objective of a school is to provide high-quality instruction: Fostering both excellent teaching and a learning environment in which students can thrive. These schools don't develop randomly on their own; an essential ingredient behind each of these success stories is transforma-

tional leadership.
A lot of good programmes got their start when one individual looked at a familiar landscape in a fresh way. What they did was to simply change the fundamental approach to solving problems, and the outcomes have been truly revolutionary. Thus, people only need to summon their will power the way game-changers like Mamoon are doing to bring about change.

# How many child deaths will it take to stop hunger?

The wasted, stunted, anaemic and mentally underdeveloped youth of our country, who barely survived, cannot build a strong nation

n the fourth month of the lock-down, the UNICEF (United ▲Nations Children's Fund) had warned India that if the nation does not seriously address the issue of hunger and malnutrition aggravated due to the shutdown and make proper arrangements for providing adequate nutritional food to underprivileged children, 3,00,000 more kids under the age of five would die within the next six months and make the toll a total of around 12 -13 lakh this year.

Even before the Coronavirus pan-

demic struck, the situation was quite alarming. In 2018, a whopping 8.8 lakh children under the age of six died in India, says the UNICEF. Nearly half of all our children are underweight, about 45 per cent are stunted (too short for their age), 20 per cent are wasted (too thin for their height), 75 per cent are anaemic and 57 per cent are defi-cient in Vitamin A. Half of the world's malnourished children live in India. The rate of malnutrition among

India's children is almost five times more than China and double than that in Sub-Saharan Africa, says a World Bank report. A study commissioned by the UNICEF in 2019 had found that over 80 per cent of adolescents in India suffered from hidden malnutrition. This includes deficiency of one or more micronutrients such as iron, folate, zinc, vitamin A, vitamin B12, and vitamin

According to the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) Mission document of the Ministry of Women and Child Development, out of the total

child births of 2.5 crore annually in India, child survival is only 1.75 crore. Infant mortality is 0.8 crore annually or 80.00.000 children die every year in our country before six months of age. This means that on an average as many as 21,917 children die every day in India. Maternal and child malnutrition is one of the reasons for 68 per cent under-five deaths in India.

What has been the COVID-19 lockdown impact? With job and income loss on a large scale, closing of schools and consequently the Mid-Day Meal Scheme (MDMS) and Anganwadis that gave hot, cooked meals, a poor Public Distribution System (PDS) and poor implementa-tion of the announced schemes of free rations during the last five months, there is a situation of absolute pover ty and hunger in our country that will have a serious impact on the already pathetic nutritional status of our peo-ple, especially the children and women.

The UNICEF has estimated that 120 million children living in South

Asian countries, including India, could slip into poverty within the next six months due to the COVID-19 crisis, taking the total number of such kids in the region to 360 million. The UNICEF also warns: "In the worst-case scenario, where health interventions are reduced by around 45 per cent, there could be as much as a 44.7 per cent increase in under-five child deaths and 38.6 per cent increase in maternal deaths per month."

In the last two decades, there have been many dialogues, debates, and legal steps like the Supreme Court Judgment on Right to food Act and so on to address the issue of malnutrition. But the schemes or missions rolled out by respective governments proved to be inadequate. The ICDS, the flagship scheme to address this crisis, has been deprived of funds despite the apex court's judgment for universalisation of the scheme. The fund allocation pattern has been changed to 60:40 in the last few years, putting a major finan-cial burden on the States. With the

ongoing issues of lack of funds in States, things are going to worsen. In addition, there were drastic budget cuts. As an impact, according to the Global Hunger Index 2019, wasting among children in India rose from 16.5 per cent in 2008-2012 to 20.8 per cent in 2014-2018.

The much-acclaimed "Poshan Mission" is just policing of the Anganwadi workers, who are already overburdened with non-ICDS work. Similar is the case of the other schemes like the MDMS and the National Health Mission. At present, despite the warning bells, the announced packages do not address the problem of malnutrition. Moreover, there is an absence of a national composite guideline to address malnutrition at the communi-

To stop further loss of precious lives, there is an urgent need for the Government to show political will to recognise the right to food/nutrition of every citizen of India, make quality infrastructure and basic nutrition ser-

cient with increased financial alloca-tion, so that the most marginalised and vulnerable are benefitted as well

The pandemic has shown that the lakhs of community-based women caregivers like the Anganwadi workers and helpers, Accredited Social Health Activists and MDMS workers, are the crucial link between the community and policymakers. Their work must be regularised with minimum wages and social security, as recommended by the 45th Indian Labour Conference. Otherwise whom do we expect to be "skilling" for the 'Make in India' projects? The wasted, stunted, anaemic and mentally underdeveloped youth of our country, who barely survived, cannot build a strong nation. How many more deaths do we need before we realise so many of our children are

## Pompeo voices support for talks between Greece, Turkey

of State Mike Pompeo expressed support Tuesday for talks between Greece and Turkey, NATO allies whose relations have deteriorated sharply to the point where both had warships facing off in the

Mediterranean.

Speaking from the Souda Bay military base on the island of Crete, on the second day of a five-day regional tour, Pompeo said relations between the United States and Greece are "at an all time high and get-

ting stronger."
"Today I'm in Crete to showcase one of America's strongest military relationships throughout all of Europe," Pompeo said. "We, the Americans, look

to Greece as a true pillar for stability and prosperity in the eastern Mediterranean, and we're incredibly proud to support its leadership." Greece has been looking to the U.S. And the European Union for support in its dispute with accuses of encroaching on its sovereign rights in the eastern Mediterranean.

Last month Turkey sent a research vessel, accompanied by warships, to prospect for energy resources in an area Greece claims is on its own continental shelf and where it claims exclusive economic rights. Athens sent warships of its own to the area, and put its armed forces on alert. The dispute has led to fears of open conflict. EU leaders are to discuss potentially imposing sanctions on Turkey for its actions later this week.

But tension has eased somewhat recently, with Athens and Ankara announcing they will restart an ongoing

process of exploratory talks. Technical discussions on a military level have also been taking place at NATO for the avoidance of a military accident, such as the collision in August of warships from the two sides, which reportedly

on either side.

"We strongly support dia-logue between NATO allies Greece and Turkey and encourage them to resume discussion of these issues as soon as possible," Pompeo said in brief statements after meeting with Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis.

"I spoke with (NATO) Secretary-General (Jens) Stoltenberg just two days ago on the progress being made at NATO. And we hope that these talks can continue in a serious way." Amid the tension with Turkey, Greece has announced major arms purchases, including fighter jets from France, as well as warships, helicopters and weapons

systems.
"In the Mediterranean, there should be no waves caused by threats and rivalry. It is a sea of strategic importance, also for the United States," Mitsotakis said. AP

## UAE defends decision to normalise Israel ties

United Nations: The United Arab Emirates has defended its decision to normalise ties with Israel and criticised interference in Arab affairs, an apparent reference to its foes Iran

Emirati Foreign Minister Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahvan, the brother of Abu Dhabi's powerful crown prince, made the remarks during a speech Tuesday before the U.N. General Assembly.

He proclaimed that the UAE's decision announced in August to formalize ties with Israel froze a controversial Israeli plan to annex occupied territory in the West Bank claimed by Palestinians.

Israel's prime minister, however, has insisted that plans have only been tem-porarily suspended.

"We hope this peace accord will provide the oppor-tunity for the Palestinians and the Ísraelis to re-engage in

negotiations to achieve peace." Palestinians have blasted

the deals signed by the UAE and Bahrain with Israel, which were brokered by the United States, as acts of betrayal. President Mahmoud Abbas used his U.N. Speech on Friday to stress that his gov-ernment has not given a mandate to anyone to speak or negotiate on behalf of the Palestinian people.

Abbas said that the only path for lasting peace is an end to the Israeli occupation and creation of a Palestinian state. The Emirati foreign min-

ister also warned against what he said were "the expansionist ambitions of some countries in the region." Though he stopped short of naming any countries, the UAE has long accused Iran, Turkey and Qatar of meddling beyond their borders in the affairs of

## Afghan peace negotiator urges new era in ties with Pakistan Islamabad: The chief of need fresh approaches and

Afghanistan's peace negotiating team said Tuesday on a visit to Pakistan that the time has come for the two neighbouring countries to shun the suspicion, "stale rhetoric" and tired conspiracy theories that have dogged past relations.

Abdullah Abdullah is in Pakistan on a bridge-building mission meant to mend deep-rooted mistrust between the two countries. It was his first

visit in 12 years. Abdullah told the Institute of Strategic Studies in the federal capital of Islamabad that the two neighbors are on the threshold of a new relationship characterised by "mutual respect, sincere cooperation

and shared prosperity."
"I am a firm believer that after many troubling years, we now need to go beyond the usual stale rhetoric and shadowy conspiracy theories that have held us back," Abdullah said. "We cannot afford to pursue business as usual. We

our people demand it. It is more urgent than ever to look to our region as one region. "

His statements come ahead of meetings later Tuesday with Pakistan's powerful army chief and prime minister. His visit also comes at a crucial time in Afghanistan's troubled history as a government-appointed negotiation team is in the Gulf state of Qatar brokering an end to war with its Taliban foes.

Even before coming to power in 2018, Pakistan's Prime Minister Imran Khan has advocated for a political end to Afghanistan's war and has been a strong critic of Washington's so-called war on terror saying it has left tens of thousands of Pakistanis and

But many in Afghanistan have been critical of the sup-port the Taliban received in Pakistan following the collapse of their rule in 2001 with the U.S.-led invasion of Afghanistan. AP

## Tensions mount as Armenia, Azerbaijan continue fighting

## 'GRE tests students on relevant metrics'

In order to secure a seat in a B-school globally, one must clear show academic capabilities. The GRE test is one of the best option available for aspirants, says ALBERTO ACEREDA

very year, thousands of B-school aspirants apply for schools around the world as a first step to securing a place in prestigious institutes. Cracking one of these schools is not an easy task though. B-schools reflect this recognition and hence typically lean towards candidates who demonstrate allround academic capabilities, a well-rounded personality, leadership qualities and intellectual vigour- attributes that are seen to be important for success in the real world of business and

A key element of the admission process to these schools is a standardised assessment test. Given the abilities that are on test, the GRE is the one which best tests the students on the relevant metrics. The GRE measures the students verbal reasoning, problem solving, critical reading and analytical writing ability- in short, it's a test for some major competencies that are required for success in B-Schools as enumerated above and is structured as such.

The first section is the analytical writing section which is essentially a task in writing two essays each spanning 30 minutes. The first essay is typically written by the student on a topic as chosen by her stating her position on an issue. The second essay is then written to dissect the logic provided in the first essay and to figure out where the logic falters

and can therefore be improved.

The scoring is done on a scale of 0-6. Each essay is rated by a human reader and an e-reader and in case of difference in ratings, it's sent to another human reader and the average of the two human scores is taken. Analytical abilities and analytical writing in particular are important skills which are not only relevant to B-Schools but are extremely critical for success in the world

This is followed by the verbal reasoning section. This section places a great deal of emphasis on vocabulary, logic and reading comprehension. This is important as proper vocabulary helps the student better communicate with peers and others in an academic envi-ronment. To crack this section, one would require a fair degree of expertise

in reading and reasoning skills. A fair amount of habitual reading should get a student past this section comfortably. This section is scored on a scale of 130-170 with one-point increments.

The last section is the quantitative abilities section which involves problem solving and quantitative comparisons and essentially measures an individual's ability to interpret and analyze data and quantitative information using mathematical concepts. Quantitative reasoning is also on test here. Students are also allowed to use the calculator for this section. As in the previous section, here too the scoring is done on a scale of 130-170 with 1-point increments.

The three-hour 45 minutes assessment is a section adaptive test which means one can skip a question which is tough and move on to another one which could be answered first and come come back to skipped question.

An important feature of the GRE is Score Select option. On test day, this enables a student to send scores from the most recent test or any other test taken within the last five years as per the student's preference. This has enabled stu-dents to send off their best scores, thus enhancing chances of success.

omeschooling is where children learn outside of a traditional school setting, the most common setting being their home. of choice back in the hands of parents. In our own work in the preschool segment, we've seen parents from Jaisalmer to Majuli Pathanamthitta to Srinagar actively using technology to provide meaningful learning experiences for their little ones at home.

**Transparency:** The credibility and authenticity of Homeschooling resources or a teacher can be vetted and reviewed before signing up. Parents we interact with tell us that they avoid downloading a learning app that has less than a 4.2 rating on Play Store. They choose to download our app only after

reading our reviews and subscribe to it after going through the trial period where they get to experience what is being offered transparently. Service providers have to constantly be on top of their game, or risk losing customers to other qualitatively

appealing options.

Affordability: With financial pressures associated with the COVID pandemic, many parents have had to realign life choices However, the possibility of not providing the best education for their child is a compromise they would not like to make

Technology can make access to quality learning resources and teachers affordable flexible and customised to suit one's need. Collaborative participation: Instead of

packaging learning like instructions on a 'Ready To Cook' meal packet, technology should provide the right ingredients and the freshest ideas for parents and children to tinker, create, connect, collaborate, share feedback and add their own touch.

Localised product experiences: It is crucial that technology allows localised solutions to address learning needs at home
— from using local languages in the product and content experience, to making the infrastructure light and easy to access low bandwidth areas and devices with

limited storage. Technology should not be intimidating, but rather inclusive, and built on a strong premise of empathy so that a fundamental right like access to good quality education is not limited to only those who are experienced users of technology.

The pandemic has certainly gatecrashed

into our lives but I also see this as a tremendous opportunity for different stakeholders in the education system be it parents, teachers or technology platforms to introspect and come together to usher in new ways to ensure continuity in education goals while always putting the needs of children first.


