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Booster shot for 40+, advises Govt body

INSACOG also suggests genomic surveillance, travel monitoring

Amid scare over the spread of Covid-19 Omicron variant, top genome scientists from INSACOG, a Government's network of national testing labs to monitor genomic variations of coronavirus, on Friday recommended a booster dose of Covid-19 vaccines for those above 40 years, with preference to vulnerable population. They also said genomic surveillance will be critical for early detection of the presence of this variant to enable necessary public health measures.

The Government has said that such a decision (on booster dose) will be considered only after detailed discussion with the scientific community.

India has so far reported two cases of Omicron variant. One of the two patients who was found infected in India is a 46-year-old fully vaccinated doctor from Bengaluru, who had no travel history but developed fever and body ache on November 21. The other confirmed Omicron patient is a 66-year-old South African who came to India with a negative Covid report.

The recommendation for booster dose by the scientists

made in the weekly bulletin of the INSACOG has come amid demands for a booster dose of Covid vaccines by MPs during a discussion in the Lok Sabha on the pandemic situation in the country.

"Vaccination of all remaining unvaccinated at-risk people and consideration of a booster dose for those 40 years of age and over, first targeting the

most high-risk/high-exposure, may be considered since low levels of neutralising antibodies from the current vaccines are unlikely to be sufficient to neutralise Omicron, although risk of severe disease is likely to be reduced," INSACOG said.

The scientists have also recommended monitoring travel to and from the known affected areas, and contact

tracing of Covid-19 cases with an epidemiological link to the affected areas has been implemented, along with increased testing.

The Genetics Consortium has said that the preliminary evidence suggests that Omicron may increase reinfection risk, which is expected from the structural changes due to the mutations, and the number of cases of this variant appears to be increasing in almost all provinces in South Africa.

"In some PCR tests, such as Thermo TaqPath, one of the three target genes is not detected. Such a phenomenon was previously seen for Alpha, which is currently not in active circulation and thus SGTF can be used as a marker for this variant, pending sequencing confirmation", said INSACOG adding that the mutation spectrum of Omicron is predictive of high transmissibility".

No reports of Omicron Covid variant deaths yet: WHO

Geneva: The World Health Organization said on Friday it had not seen any reports of deaths relating to the new Omicron variant of Covid-19. The WHO said it was collecting evidence about the variant of concern (VOC), as countries around the world scramble to stop it from spreading. But

despite a growing number of countries registering infections with the new variant, no deaths have yet been reported to the UN health agency. "I have not seen reports of Omicron-related deaths yet," WHO spokesman Christian Lindmeier told reporters in Geneva.

9 of family Covid +ve days after S Africa tour

Nine members of a family here tested positive for Covid-19, days after four of them returned from South Africa, putting the Health Department on alert amid concerns over the "Omicron" variant of the infection.

Those who returned from South Africa have been admitted to the hospital of the Rajasthan University of Health Sciences (RUHS) and swab samples of all nine people have been sent for genome sequencing to Jaipur's Sawai Man Singh Hospital, a health official said.

Chief Medical and Health Officer Dr Narottam Sharma said 14 samples were taken for testing from the family, nine of which tested positive for the infection.

In contact tracing, it was found that four of them had returned from South Africa, he said. The official said as per guidelines, those who returned from South Africa have been isolated at the RUHS hospital while the other five have been home quarantined. Currently, Rajasthan has 213 active cases. The maximum 114 active cases are from Jaipur alone.

UP blames Pak for air pollution

The Supreme Court on Friday took strong exception to the Uttar Pradesh Government's claim that winds blowing from Pakistan were one of the reasons for Delhi's air pollution.

Senior counsel Ranjit Kumar appearing for UP told the Bench that polluted air in north Indian plains is currently coming from Pakistan since UP is in the downward direction of the wind. "Closure of industries may affect sugar cane industries. UP is on downwind, air is mostly coming from Pakistan," he said. A peeved CJ Ramana asked, "So you want to ban industries in Pakistan?"

The Chief Justice also expressed displeasure on certain media reports blaming the top court for the closure of schools.

A special bench headed by the CJ also took note of measures taken by the Commission for Air Quality Management in the National Capital Region and adjoining areas and asked the Centre, Delhi and States in the NCR to follow

the directions.

In an affidavit, the commission told the bench, also comprising justices DY Chandrachud and Surya Kant, that a five-member enforcement task force has been set up to contain air pollution in Delhi and NCR. Forty such squads would monitor the implementation of measures suggested by it to deal with pollution, the panel said.

"The party was so much mired in infighting that hardly any energy is left to build a viable Opposition that will fight the BJP. It is incapable and incompetent party," the article said iterating what the Bengal Chief Minister said in Mumbai a few days ago that "the UPA does not exist".

Battling rather strongly for Mamata, it said with the fall of the Congress and demise of the UPA there was a strong need

for a uniting force that can build up a viable anti-BJP force and around which the other Opposition parties would unite. "The country currently needs an alternative front, that can replace the UPA of which the Chief Minister herself was a part till 2012 when she came out of the Alliance," the mouthpiece said.

It claimed all the "Opposition parties wanted Mamata Banerjee to take charge. They are looking up to her to fill the vacuum. She is presently the most popular opposition face in the country."

Earlier TMC MP Derek O'Brien too lashed out at the Congress. "We think where there is no concept of UPA, there has to be a fresh start," O'Brien said echoing Mamata.

Incidentally a bunch of Congress leaders from Meghalaya, Goa, Tripura and Haryana recently joined the TMC.

Protesting farmers stop Kangana's car, let her go after she says sorry

Bollywood actor Kangana Ranaut was in for a shock on Friday when farmers stopped her car in Rupnagar district, when she was on her way to Chandigarh airport.

The protesting farmers, including women, claimed that they had allowed Kangana to go only after she tendered apology for her "regular comments against the farmers", who have been protesting against the Centre's three farm laws, and also against the Central Government's decision to repeal the same.

Kangana, who was coming from her native place in Kullu (Himachal Pradesh), was stopped by the agitators, who were standing on the main road at Bunga Sahib near Kiratpur Sahib. The actor enjoys Y-category security. She expressed an apology



for her derogatory remarks against an elderly woman farmer last year. Notably, Kangana had tweeted a photo of an aged woman farmer, terming her a "woman available at ₹100" for protests.

Ropar Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Vivekshel Soni said the protesters allowed the vehicle to move after the police inter-

vened to resolve the matter. Kangana, who is active on social media, also shared her story on Instagram while sitting inside the car, alleging that a "mob of anti-social elements", who are claiming themselves to be farmers, have gheraoed and hurled abuses on her while she was returning after her flight was cancelled.

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Govt will install 1.40 L CCTVs: CM

The Delhi Government is all set to install an additional 1.40 lakh CCTV cameras in the national Capital. Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on Friday said this will take the total number of CCTVs in Delhi to 4.15 lakh. The additional CCTV installations are being set up as a part of second phase of the Government's project.

Citing a survey, Kejriwal said that Delhi is well ahead of London, New York, Singapore, and Paris in terms of CCTV cameras per square mile. "London is the second in the world after Delhi in terms of CCTV, Delhi has 1,826 cameras per mile while 1,138 are installed in London, added Kejriwal.

Briefing online about the second phase of the project, Kejriwal said, ever since these have been installed in such great numbers, women's safety has



improved and they feel more secure. "The CCTV footages also helped police in investigations," he added.

Ensuring no loopholes in technology, he said that city Government is installing the best in class, modern

CCTVs as being sourced from Bharat Electronics Limited - a Central Government company. "They are doing great work, and we would like to thank them. The cameras are extremely modern and state of the art devices. Often after installation, many CCTVs get damaged and no one gets to know - and in a time of need, when a crime occurs, we find out that the camera wasn't even working. But in the case of these modern CCTV cameras we are installing, an alarm will be used to alert the command centre in case a camera has been damaged. Additionally concerned operators will also receive messages on their phones alerting the same. So, in case of power cut or vandalism, if a CCTV camera stops working, these alerts will help repair it at the earliest," he said.

AAP diverting people's attention: Delhi Cong

Congress Delhi unit president Anil Kumar said that the AAP Government has fallen short in installing CCTV cameras in the city. "Delhi Government has installed 2.75 lakh CCTV cameras in Delhi in the past seven years but before the 2015 Assembly elections, he promised that 15 lakh CCTV cameras will be set up in the national Capital. Kejriwal raked up the camera claim today to divert people's attention from Supreme Court's strictures on the AAP Government for the severe pollution levels, which has forced the closure of schools yet again," he said.

NDMC braces up for new variant

NDMC vice-chairman, Satish Upadhyay visited the Charak Palika Hospital, Moti Bagh and New Delhi to discuss and assess the preparation with all concerned and took note of the status of facilities available in the medical services department of NDMC.

The discussion covered the preparedness in view of Covid-19 new variant Omicron like oxygen cylinder, oxygen bank and 1000 LPM PSA oxygen plant concentrators, PPE kits. Upadhyay also visited the labs and oxygen plant in the hospital and issued the directions to be ready for any eventuality. NDMC medical services department informed about the one Covid isolation centre, one quarantine centre and testing centers facility available.

Rai asks Centre for joint pollution meet

Delhi Environment Minister Gopal Rai on Friday wrote to Union Minister Bhubender Yadav, urging him to call a joint meeting of environment Ministers of States in the NCR in view of the serious situation of pollution in the region.

Rai in his letter to the Minister asserted that despite a slew of measures taken by the Delhi Government to curb pollution, no positive improvement is being seen. Rai said, Delhi's internal pollution is largely under control due to numerous emergency measures taken by the Kejriwal Government, like ban on construction, 'Red Light On, Gaadi Off' Campaign, ban on trucks entering Delhi, PUC certificate checking, Anti-Open Burning Campaign, and more. However, there is an urgent need for the Centre's and other State Government's involvement in order to control the remaining 69% of pollution, which is external, contributing to Delhi's poor air quality.

CM flags off first free tirth train to Ayodhya

The injured person has been identified as Hardik Tiwari a resident of Uttar Pradesh. The victims were returning to Gurugram city from Sadhrana village of Gurugram district after attending a marriage.

Man, friends held for attacking youth in Mandawali over old enmity

Delhi Police has arrested a 23-year-old man, along with his associates, for allegedly attacking a person over an old enmity in east Delhi's Mandawali area.

The accused has been identified as Akib Ahmad alias Happy, a resident of Mandawali. Police said that the accused has been found previously also involved in three cases of murder, dacoity and attempt to murder.

According to Priyanka Kashyap, the Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP), East district, on November 9, police got information regarding a quarrel at Mandawali area.

"The injured Bobby Chaudhary (21), also a Mandawali resident, was taken to LBS hospital. Bobby alleged that Happy, along with his associates, attacked him with a knife and a cricket bat," said the DCP.

"Police had already arrested Happy's associate Lokesh and apprehended two juveniles, but he was absconding. On Wednesday, police got a tip-off that Ahmad would come near Baba Balak Nath Mandir, Chander Vihar, thereafter, a trap was laid and he was apprehended," said the DCP.

City Govt to overhaul Wazirabad Barrage

The Delhi Government said on Friday that it will upgrade the existing Wazirabad barrage with the latest technology. In a meeting with Jal Board officials, Water Minister Satyendar Jain discussed required modifications for the barrage which was built in 1959 across the Yamuna river.

Presently, Yamuna has a total of six barrages. These new barrages will be constructed with the latest technology with flood alarm systems for quick response during the rainy season.

This will be a revolutionary step to stop flooding in nearby areas which will lead to safeguarding the property and lives of people.

This new barrage will also help to hold more water during the non-rainy season leading to more water percolation, which will further help to increase the groundwater levels of the city.

Jain said, "The upgradation process of these barrages is the need of the hour. Every year, lakhs of cuses of water flows in the River. It is important to have the latest technology to regulate the barrage system." He further added that "New barrage will help in improving ground water recharge and stabilize river water elevation to feed water treatment plants of Delhi Jal Board."

During monsoon season upto 4-5 lakh Million gallons of water flows all at once through these barrages.

Namaz offered at Gurugram ground despite 'disruptions'

The conflict over Friday open Namaz once again reared its ugly head in Gurugram after more than 200-300 people belonging to the Islamic faith performed the Friday Namaz at the Sector-37 ground here despite disruption attempts by some Hindu groups.

Members of Hindu groups

staged a protest against the Friday prayers. The Gurugram Police on Friday detained around 10 people of Hindu organisations including Dinesh Thakur, the chief of a right-wing group for trying to disrupt Friday Namaz at Sector-37, an industrial area.

The Bharat Mata Vahini group was demanding that offering prayers in public parks and spaces be stopped.

In view of the tense situation, several police personnel were also deployed at the spot to avoid untoward incidents. They cordoned off the ground to stop Hindu right-wing members to create any ruckus during Friday Namaz.

Many people of the right-wing group had gathered at the ground and raised slogans such as "Jai Shri Ram", "Bharat Mata Ki Jai" and "Vande Mataram."

 Stating that how the attempt of "mob lynching" is being made openly in our country, Kangna claimed that the situation would have been different in case there was no security with her.

"Despite the presence of police, I am not allowed to move," she said in the video.

"They are threatening to kill me and are abusing me. If the police were not here, there would have been lynching. Several people are doing politics in my name and today's episode is the result of that," she said. Several video clips are also being circulated in the social media in which Kangana can be seen briefly interacting with the protesting women. In one of the video, the actor can be heard telling the women protesters that she was like their daughter.

In another video, several protesters are carrying flags approaching her vehicle. Later, she was seen talking with the women protesters, holding their hands, while they were asking Kangna to apologise for her remarks. Kangana was seen clarifying that her remark was not against the woman farmer, but against the protesters at Shaheen Bagh. But the women protesters refused to believe her. One of the women even warned her that she must think before saying anything about the farmers' protest.

 "People should not only rely on border measures. What is most important is to prepare for these variants with potential high transmissibility. So far, the information available suggests we don't have to change our approach," he said during the virtual media briefing.

The study, published pre-print on medrxiv, which means not peer-reviewed yet, showed that recent reinfections have occurred in individuals whose primary infections occurred across all three waves, with the most affected by the Delta variant.

This finding has important implications for public health planning, particularly in countries like South Africa with high rates of immunity from prior infection, the researchers said.

"We find evidence of increased reinfection risk associated with emergence of the Omicron variant, suggesting evasion of immunity from prior infection," Juliet RC Pulliam, from DSI-NRF Centre of Excellence in Epidemiological Modelling and Analysis (SACEMA) at Stellenbosch University,

South Africa, wrote on Twitter.

The team examined whether SARS-CoV-2 reinfection risk has changed through time in South Africa, in the context of the emergence of the Beta, Delta, and Omicron variants, and conducted a retrospective analysis of routine epidemiological surveillance data from 2,796,982 individuals with laboratory-confirmed SARS-CoV-2 who had a positive test result at least 90 days prior to 27 November 2021. The results showed that 35,670 individuals had suspected reinfections.

They developed two methods to monitor signatures of changes in reinfection risk -- a null model with no change in reinfection risk and compared observed patterns to projections under the null model.

"Using this approach, we start to see reinfection numbers exceeding the projection intervals from mid-November in Gauteng and nationally," Pulliam said.

In the other approach, the team looked at trends in the relative hazards of primary infection and reinfection. "Since early October, we see a decreased risk of primary infection, though this could be partially explained by vaccine rollout.

 However, it has also been said that while there is initial suggestion that this variant may have a growth advantage over Delta, growth advantage is not the same as higher transmissibility, especially when there is prior immunity in the community. In the meantime, noting that some clusters of infections have also been reported from some places in the country, the Ministry has asked the States that active surveillance and testing is the only key in detection of such clusters or hotspots. It also asked States to send the samples of those tested positive to the laboratories tagged to the State and UTs in the INSACOG network. "Samples of all those who test positive must be sent for Whole Genome Sequencing expeditiously, and only to the laboratories tagged to the State/UT in the INSACOG network," Ministry said in a letter to the States and UTs. It also underlined to put in place a system to ensure that sample quality is good and transportation to INSACOG labs is quick to avoid any delay in testing. It said further that ideally no samples should be sent to any lab which is not part of the INSACOG network. "Enhanced Testing is the only strategy for detection of the virus, hence as per the earlier guidelines of ICMR and Ministry of Health, focused and strategic testing must be taken up in and around the cluster of infection," said the letter.

Taking a note of the measures, the bench ordered, "We have perused affidavit by Centre and the Delhi Government. We have taken into consideration the directions proposed. We direct the Centre and the Government of National Capital Territory to implement the orders of December 2 and we keep the matter pending and will hear it on next Friday."

At the outset, the bench referred to certain news reports and said a message "intentionally or unintentionally" been sent that the court is the "villain" and it is ordering the closure of schools.

al or unintentional and some sections of media portrays us that we are the villains who want to close down the schools. You (Delhi government) on your own opened the schools. But, see the newspapers..." the Chief Justice said.

Senior advocate A M Singhvi, appearing for the Delhi Government, referred to a news report and said one English newspaper reported that the apex court threatened to take over the administration.

GANGRAPE OF A 15-YEAR-OLD GIRL Chargesheet filed against 33 accused

Nine weeks after a shocking gang-rape of a 15-year-old girl allegedly by 33 persons, including four juveniles, rocked Maharashtra, the police on Friday filed a comprehensive charge-sheet against the accused in the Sessions Court at Kalyan in the adjoining Thane district.

The charge-sheet filed in the sensational blackmail and gang-rape case against 33 persons in the Kalyan Sessions Court runs into 885 pages, comprising statements by 122 witnesses.

Of the 33 accused, 29 are in judicial custody, while four others—all juveniles—are currently out on bail.

The heinous crime came to light when the 15-year-old victim girl from the satellite town of Dombivli in Thane district—who had allegedly been blackmailed and gang-raped for more than eight months—lodged a complaint with the Manpada police station on September 22, 2021.

The investigations have revealed that in January this year, the victim's boyfriend



had reportedly indulged in forcible sex with her and had video-graphed the incident.

Later on, the accused boyfriend showed and shared the video with his friends who allegedly used the clip to blackmail, threaten and sexually assaulted the girl for over the next eight months.

The perpetrators, some of them said to be politically well-connected, compelled the girl to accompany them to various locations at Dombivli, other nearby towns like Rabale, Badlapur, Thane, Navi Mumbai, Murbad and also at a remote farmhouse, where they repeatedly raped her. The charge-sheet stated that on a few occasions, the accused also drugged the victim girl before perpetrating sexual crime on her.

The accused had allegedly blackmailed and threatened the victim girl that if she told her

family members or approached the police about forced sexual acts, they would put out the video clips of her in revealing positions in social media. However, the victim girl mustered courage and approached the Manpada police station at Dombivli on September 22.

The victim girl, who underwent medical tests and treatment at a local hospital, recovered later from the trauma she had undergone.

During the investigations, the victim girl named all the 33 accused. The accused have been booked under sections 376 (rape), 376 (2) (n) (repeated rape is punishable with rigorous imprisonment for a term which shall not be less than 10 years but may extend to imprisonment for life), 376 (d) (gang-rape), 376 (3) (rape on a woman below sixteen years of age) of IPC and provisions of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act.

The 29 adult accused will be tried in a regular sessions court or a Special Fast Track Court, while the four juveniles will be tried before a Juvenile Justice Board.

Rahul calls Govt inhuman, insensitive on 'no record of farmers' death during stir'

Former Congress president Rahul Gandhi on Friday expressed surprise that the Modi Government had "no record" of the farmers' deaths during the farm laws agitation and accused it of being "inhuman", "insensitive" and "arrogant".

The Congress leader also questioned the Government for treating the deceased farmers and earlier people who died of Covid as nonexistent. "This is not the way a Prime Minister should behave. This is an unpleasant, immoral, and cowardly way to behave," Rahul said.

Addressing a Press conference at AICC headquarters, Rahul mentioned that while he will place the list of the deceased farmers before the Parliament on Monday, he mentioned that the Punjab government is not responsible for the deaths of the farmers during the farm laws agitation but still paid Rs 5 lakh compensation to the families of 403 deceased farmers in the state.

He said the Congress also has a list of 100 farmers from outside Punjab who died during the farm laws agitation and another list of about 200



deceased farmers has been compiled based on public records.

Rahul's attack was against the backdrop of the Government's statement in Parliament a day earlier. "No record is available on the matter (death of farmers) so the question does not arise," the government maintained.

On a question about the remaining demands of the farmers following the repeal of the farm laws, he said, "I don't think the government will accept farmers' demands" and asserted that "its intention is not right".

"Frankly it is not our mistake that caused the death of 700 farmers. It is the PM's mistake. The Prime Minister apologised. He said he made a mistake and because of that mistake, 700 farmers died. Why doesn't the PM have the decency and the dignity to help their families?" Rahul asked.

RJD demands release of politicians who have spent 14 years in jail

Patna: The opposition RJD in Bihar on Friday demanded that politicians who have spent more than 14 years in jail serving sentences be released forthwith in keeping with a Supreme Court judgement which has empowered respective state governments to take a call on such matters.

The issue was raised in the state assembly by MLA Chetan Anand, whose father Anand Mohan Singh had been awarded death penalty which was later commuted to imprisonment for life in a high profile murder case.

"I had raised the matter both as a member of the House and as a member of an aggrieved family," Anand told reporters later outside the assembly.

Singh, a don-turned-politician who famously loved to get photographed holding a gun and surrounded by henchmen armed to the teeth, had been convicted for inciting a mob that lynched IAS officer G Krishnaiya in the 1990s.

Krishnaiya, who was the District Magistrate of Gopalganj, was beaten to death after being dragged out of his car while it was passing through Muzaffarpur district where a procession was being taken out in support of dreaded gangster Chhotan Shukla

upon his murder. Interestingly, Singh had always been daggers drawn with Lalu Prasad, who was then the chief minister of Bihar and is now the president of the RJD.

Brij Bihari Prasad, then a powerful RJD minister of the state, was allegedly involved in the murder of Shukla, who had got associated with the Bihar People's Party floated by Singh. Brij Bihari Prasad was also shot dead in a Patna hospital where he was undergoing treatment in 1998.

Singh's son said, "The reply to my submission by the minister in charge clearly shows that it has no intention to release such prisoners. I spoke not only for my father but for many others, including Rajendra Yadav".

Rajendra Yadav is an ex-MLA of the RJD from Atri in Gaya who has been convicted for the murder of a JD(U) worker when the former was taking out a victory procession after winning the seat in 2005.

Leader of the opposition Tejashwi Yadav, who stood beside Chetan Anand, also spoke after the latter was through. "This government wants to keep all those who are not beholden to it under some type of pressure. Reluctance to release Anand Mohan and Rajendra Yadav is politically motivated," said Yadav. He asserted that the

nephew of a minister was named in a murder that took place about a month ago though the accused was yet to be arrested.

"So much for the Nitish Kumar government's claims of framing no innocent and sparing no guilty," said the RJD leader who shortly afterwards held a press conference at the party office where he brandished a bundle of papers claiming it to be a copy of the FIR lodged in connection with the Purnea murder case.

"The FIR clearly speaks of sufficient evidence at hand against Athiya, a nephew of Leshi Singh, who is a cabinet member and a confidante of the chief minister. Why is not the minister being even interrogated?" asked Yadav.

The RJD leader also showed a video purportedly showing Athiya pulling the trigger on the deceased Rintu Singh and returning to check whether the latter had died. Yadav, who claimed that Rintu Singh was killed because he was considered close to the RJD, also alleged that his "question pertaining to the murder did not get listed because the government entertains no question on the floor of the House which relates to the department of home and general administration, both retained by the chief minister".

Bundelkhand will throw out BJP out of power: Akhilesh

Samajwadi Party president Akhilesh Yadav exhorted the electorate of Bundelkhand region to throw out the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party from power like Rani Lakshmi Bai expelled the British colonial forces from Jhansi.

"The BJP swept the 2017 UP assembly election and won all 19 assembly seats in Bundelkhand and later in 2019 Lok Sabha polls, it won all parliamentary seats from there. But what did the people of Bundelkhand get in return? They were taken for a ride and no development work took place in the region," Akhilesh alleged while addressing a public meeting at Jhansi on Friday.

Attacking Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath and his government, the Samajwadi Party chief said that just as the BJP changed the names of places and other institutions, the people of the state would very soon change the government.

"The Yogi government has only changed the names of places. Very soon people in Uttar Pradesh are going to change this government. Youth, farmers and businessmen in Uttar Pradesh have decided to get rid of the Yogi government.

Farmers in Uttar Pradesh are going to benefit if Samajwadi Party comes to power," he said. Akhilesh further said that Uttar Pradesh was one state where the maximum number of cases of crime against women in the country was registered and the state also topped in custodial deaths across the country.

"If any government has received the highest number of notices for fake encounters, then it is the present BJP government in Uttar Pradesh," he added. Countering the charges of dynastic politics against his party by the BJP, Akhilesh raised the demand for caste-based census.

"Caste-based census is the only solution to caste-related disputes. The BJP is a master in creating discord in society and among castes to exploit it for their narrow political ends. Let there be a caste-based census after which the numerical strength of each caste will be on record. Subsequently, those enjoying strength on paper will be exposed," the SP chief said.

On alliance of Samajwadi Party with smaller caste-based political parties, Akhilesh said, "Now Pal and Gopal (Yadavs) have joined hands and no force on earth can fight this formidable combination."

Mayawati asks people to beware of poll promises of BJP, SP, Cong

Bahujan Samaj Party president Mayawati alerted the people of Uttar Pradesh, asking them to be cautious on the election promises being announced by different political parties ahead of the 2022 assembly polls.

Reacting to promises made by Congress general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, Samajwadi Party chief Akhilesh Yadav and even a host of Bharatiya Janata Party leaders, including Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Union Home Minister Amit Shah and Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, Mayawati tweeted on Friday, "In UP, a flurry of election promises are being made every day, especially by Bharatiya Janata Party, Samajwadi Party, Congress etc., to woo and mislead the people of the state. But these promises are mostly forgotten after coming to power. This has been their history till now. People should be cautious of them."

The BSP chief further tweeted, "The promises that the BJP and SP are making to the public, why did they not do the work while they were in the government in the state? Why did the Congress party not do what they promised to give 40 per cent tickets and scooty to women in states where they have governments? This is also something to think about."

Fear engulfs Keralites as water level in Mullaperiyar Dam rises

About 4 million people staying in the districts of Idukki, Kottayam, Ernakulam and Alappuzha in Kerala live in perpetual fear as the possibilities of the 126 year old Mullaperiyar Dam bursting any time became stronger with the north east monsoon of 2021 bringing in bountiful rain.

Wednesday night saw Tamil Nadu Government which owns and operates the dam situated in Kerala opening seven shutters without any warning and this led to unexpected raise in water level in Periyar River that flows through Idukki, Kottayam, Ernakulam districts.

"The Central Government should immediately intervene and save the people of Kerala from a deluge. It is time Mullaperiyar Dam is either demolished or decommissioned," seven-time MLA of Kerala Legislative Assembly P C George told The Pioneer. George, a veteran farmers' leader in the State said that the Dam is a ticking time bomb and people like him who reside downstream live in perpetual fear.

"I as the chairman of the petition committee of Kerala Legislature had recommended thrice the decommission of this dam and cancellation of the 1886 Mullaperiyar Agreement signed between the then British Government and the Travancore Maharaja. The agreement has become null and void as all agreements signed between the British colonial masters and the princely States in India got cancelled by the night of August 14, 1947 with the implementation of the India Independence Act 1947," said George.

The controversial dam, built with lime and surki (before cement and concrete mixture came into vogue) is 53.66 meter (176 ft) high, 1200 ft in length and has a depth of 142 ft. "Though Tamil Nadu claims that its Kallanai Dam in Thanjavur was built during the 2nd century AD, the truth is that it is a dwarf of a dam compared to Mullaperiyar. Its



height is just 5.4 meters and there are no structural defects detected in it unlike Mullaperiyar Dam which has many flaws in its construction," said George.

M M Mani CPI(M) MLA who is the former power minister and P J Joseph, MLA and former minister for revenue too expressed their fear and concerns about the safety of the dam and called for immediate action from the Government of Tamil Nadu. "Water level in the dam should be brought down so that people could sleep peacefully," said Mani.

Tamil Nadu opened the shutters of the dam on Wednesday late night without any warning that led to the flooding of Periyar River flowing through Kerala. Since the people staying on the river banks were did not sleep because of heavy rains, they could alert their brethren and save them from getting washed away, said Joseph.

George said Kerala has identified land for building a new dam in place of Mullaperiyar. "We will continue giving Tamil Nadu whatever water it is taking from Mullaperiyar. Our only mission is to save the people of Kerala from getting washed away while ensuring water for Tamil Nadu," said George.

Kodiyeri Balakrishnan returns as Kerala CPI(M) chief

The ruling CPI(M) in Kerala which has been facing a series of allegations in connection with murder of political rivals, corruption in high places and religious appeasement, got a major relief on Friday as the party's State Secretariat decided to give back the charge of secretary to polit bureau member Kodiyeri Balakrishnan who was on leave on health grounds since November 2020. The decision to hand over the post of secretary to Balakrishnan comes at a time when there is a strong demand by the party cadre to elevate him as all India General Secretary.

Though Kodiyeri Balakrishnan, who has been secretary of the Kerala unit of the party since 2014, was on leave reportedly due to health reasons, it was the arrest and imprisonment of his younger son Bineesh Kodiyeri that made him temporarily vacate the party post. Bineesh was arrested by the Enforcement Directorate in connection with drug trafficking and related financial issues.

The younger son of Balakrishnan was in Bangalore's Parappana Agrahara Prison for one year and was released on bail only in October 2021. Balakrishnan's elder son Binoy is also facing charges of sexual abuse and financial impropriety.

HC tells NIA to get Varavara Rao medically examined, extends date of surrender till Dec 18

Mumbai: The Bombay High Court on Friday directed the National Investigation Agency (NIA) to get poet-activist Varavara Rao medically examined at Nanavati hospital in the city to check if he suffered from any ailments that warranted extension of his medical bail.

The HC also extended till December 18 the time for Rao to surrender before the Talaja prison authorities.

As per HC's previous order, Rao was to have been medically examined on November 18, but the NIA told the court on Friday it was yet to get his medical check up done.

The NIA counsel Sandesh Patil said the delay was caused because several doctors were required to check Rao since the 83-year-old was "taking advantage of the court's order" and trying to get a comprehensive health check up done.

"At the time of seeking medical bail earlier this year, he (Rao) had complained of cataract, hernia, and appendix. Now appendix and hernia are over and only cataract remains. But he is taking advantage of the court's order and trying to get all tests done," Patil said.

A bench of Justices Nitin Jandam and SV Kotwal, however, questioned the NIA's submission and said the agency must take a practical approach and consider Rao's advanced age.

60L parents wait for UP Govt grants for school uniforms

Even as winter has set in, parents of over 60 lakh school children are still waiting for ₹1,100 meant for the purchase of uniforms, sweaters and shoes for their wards who are being forced to go to schools without proper winter uniforms.

On October 30, Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath had declared that ₹1,800 crore would be transferred through DBT in the bank accounts of parents of more than 1.60 crore students for the purchase of winter uniforms. He had claimed that the scheme would benefit students of primary, upper primary schools and non-government aided primary/pre-secondary schools.

"A parent would get Rs 1,100 per child and the payments would be made within a month's time," Yogi had declared while releasing funds online.

A month later, officials of the Education department claimed that over 60 lakh parents were yet to receive the money and the entire process was delayed because of the delay in the confirmation of bank details of parents with the details available with the



school. "Who will do it?" asked a leader of the Shiksha Parishad. "The teachers and officers of the Education department are deployed in the revision of electoral rolls. There is no one in schools to carry out the clerical work of confirming the bank details of the parents," he said.

Officials said that the first lot of money was transferred to the accounts of over one crore parents but over 60 lakh parents were still waiting for the funds to purchase uniforms, sweaters, shoes and school bags.

An employees' union leader said that the argument given by the official was that the direct transfer of money would ensure a transparent system as well as develop a market at the local level which in turn would generate self-employment opportunities in rural areas.

"Winter has already set in. The delay in transfer of money will lead to delay in purchase of sweaters and till then the poor students will bear the brunt of the winter," he said.

Principal Secretary Deepak Kumar said that this money should have been transferred within a month's time.

What's next?

The world's scientific community needs to pool all its resources to avoid another Delta-like chaos

The Omicron variant has brought back the pandemic scare, but the world appears not to have learnt its lessons from the previous waves and lockdowns. The world has seen the Delta variant wreak havoc and Omicron is only beginning to bloom. Next to nothing is known about its capacity to infect and ease of transmission. Yet, a global approach to fighting it is conspicuously absent. South Africa did not waste time informing the world about the detection of patients infected with the Omicron variant. In no time, and without waiting to verify if the new variant really originated from there, the country, and several other African nations, were subjected to travel restrictions by the US, European Union, the UK and a large part of Asia. The variant has now been detected in 30 countries in all and the list is growing. Nobody has any idea if the cases are spreading from somewhere or originating from everywhere. The samples have been sent for genome sequencing and the results will take time coming. The Americans do not know how the variant was detected in California or why the UK reported 32 cases. Of the two cases in India, one is about a patient without any travel history. How is that possible? Unless the world's scientific community pools its resources for a coordinated testing and tracing programme, there is going to be chaos just like during the time of Delta. More than impulsive travel restrictions, the focus is expected to be on intensive testing and tracing.

The second issue where a global understanding is urgently needed is vaccination and vaccine supply. The rich nations and the better among the developing countries are facing the problem of people refusing to vaccinate either because of complacency or issues of privacy. Such people constitute a definite risk to the rest of the population insofar as the transmission is concerned. It is time there is a global debate on making vaccination legally mandatory. If complacency impedes the vaccination process in advanced nations, the lack of vaccines is slowing down the process in the poorest nations of the world, particularly in Africa. Incidentally, India has already cleared all vaccine orders placed by COVAX for supply to African countries, but that alone is not enough. South Africa, along with India, is at the forefront of the global campaign for a proposed temporary waiver of intellectual property rights on COVID-19-related pharmaceuticals. The US has supported the proposal, but the pharmaceuticals and the EU and the UK are not ready. Instead, they want to supply their vaccines – a costly proposition for the poor countries. They also have export restrictions that impede access to vaccine inputs, contribute to uncertainty on delivery timeframes by suppliers, impact clinical trials and impede the movement of samples from global clinical trials to centralized testing sites. Yet, the pharmaceuticals are unmoved. This has led to discrimination between vaccinated and unvaccinated people that the world has to set right fast.

Celebrity influence to sell products fair?





Celebrity endorsements have become an effective marketing tool which can exert greater influence on consumers' attitudes and buying intention

The term 'Hero' denotes a person who is admired for his courage, outstanding achievements or noble qualities. It is generally associated with a war hero. The hero is a character who, in the face of danger, combats adversity through feats of ingenuity, courage or strength. The hero is a role model, looked by others as an example to be imitated. According to Cambridge dictionary, 'hero worship' is a feeling of extreme admiration for someone, imagining that they have qualities or abilities that are better than anyone else's. The concept of hero narratives fulfil important cognitive and emotional needs, including the need for wisdom, meaning, hope, inspiration and growth. The framework called the Heroic Leadership Dynamic (HLD) is to explain how need based heroism shifts overtime from our initial attraction to heroes to later retention or repudiation of heroes. Central to HLD is the idea that hero narratives fulfil both epistemic and energising functions. To energise us, heroes promote moral elevation, heal psychic wounds, inspire psychological growth and exude charisma.

However, gone are the days when 'hero worship' provided the elevation of the human spirit. Today, the concept of role model has shifted from personalities of heroic deeds to film actors, singers, musicians, models, cricketers and other sportspersons, wrestlers and the likes who are simply the professionals in their respective fields but have somehow gained fame and public support. They have no visible role to elevate the human spirits but still, through the vehicle of media resources, have successfully reached to target the impressionable minds, mostly the teenagers to blindly follow them as their role models worthy of veneration. The glamour which they exhibit accelerates their fame and 'star' becomes their pseudonym.

Celebrity endorsement of advertisements make a great impact. However, quite often the endorsements given by celebrities for a particular product are unscrupulous and unreliable as these promoters hardly use the products being endorsed. A few



years ago, the issue of misleading endorsement had cropped up in India, when Maggi noodles were temporarily banned after the food regulator revealed that it contained an excessive amount of lead.

Marketers use celebrity endorsements to make advertisements believable and to enhance consumer recognition of the brand name. Celebrity endorsements as of now have become the most effective marketing tool in advertisements, which can exert a greater influence on consumers' attitudes and buying intention. The millennial generation, especially the college students, are the viable purchasers and brand loyalists. There is a great effect of celebrity-brand congruence and publicity on consumers' choice and buying behaviour. Fans of celebrities quite often seek to imitate or follow the style of their choice celebrities to improve their self-image and self-esteem. As such, they become crazy to purchase the product endorsed by them.

Celebrities cause great influence on the endorsed product. However, for creating such a big influence upon the sale of the endorsed product, they charge heavy amounts from the manufacturers/businesses. Some celebrities charge up to ₹5.5 crore a day to endorse brands. Several celebrities have also endorsed the co-ownership endorse-

ment model by taking an equity stake in the product brand company. Another form of arrangement is a royalty agreement where the celebrity leases a brand to another company, which is in manufacturing and distribution.

The law of demand states that other factors being constant (ceteris paribus), price and quantity demanded of any good and service are inversely related to each other. When the price of a product increases, the demand for the same product decreases, then increases as the prices fall. However, this rule is changed when not bothering the demand or price of a product endorsed by the favourite celebrity, the consumer out of celebrity influence finds himself forced to buy the product.

Leaving aside the questions of false and misleading advertisements and celebrities' endorsing a product or service without using, experiencing and having knowledge of the product endorsed, the question arises from the principle of reasonableness as well as accounting procedures that the heavy amount paid to celebrities by manufacturer for endorsement in any form is made through business expenses, which ultimately falls on the neck of the consumers.

The phenomenon of marketers' sensitising, informing customers about their prod-

uct/service may be fair enough through reasonable modes but why the intervention of celebrities for recommending a product? How can it be in the consumer's interest, when the choice of the consumer is not the demand of the product but the psychological influence of the endorser? More so, what is the rationale, rule or criteria of celebrities charging heavy amount as fees for endorsement in a most arbitrary, discriminatory, fanciful and unjustified manner? Who decides the quantum of fees and on what measure or basis? The endorsers have been let loose to charge any amount of fees from manufacturers arbitrarily with no legal control.

The question arises whether the heavy cost of endorsement falling upon the neck of the consumer is a consumer rights issue? If yes, then the central authority is empowered to protect, promote and enforce the rights of consumers as a class and prevent violation of consumer rights and unfair trade practices under the CP Act, 2019. The Authority is also empowered to undertake and promote research in the field of consumer rights. It is, therefore, essential to establish that endorsement practice is unfair and prejudiced to consumers interests or rights.

NOBODY IS SAFE UNTIL EVERYBODY IS SAFE

A year after the first vaccines became available, only six per cent of Africans are fully vaccinated

The new Omicron variant of the COVID-19 virus was discovered by scientists in South Africa and Botswana, the only countries in southern Africa that have the skills and resources to detect a new variant. On November 23, scientists in Botswana uploaded 99 Sars-CoV-2 genome sequences to the Wellcome Sanger Institute in the United Kingdom, which has operated as a clearing house for more than a million such sequences from dozens of countries since March 2020. They noted that three of the genomes seemed different from the usual Delta variant. On the same day a separate team in South Africa uploaded the genomes of seven COVID samples with the same suspicious mutations in the spike protein that the virus uses to infect human cells. Within hours, scientists everywhere could study those genomes on the web, and in 72 hours the WHO declared that we have a fifth 'variant of concern' on our hands. Whereupon the rich countries of the global north instantly slammed their gates shut against travelers from South Africa and nine other



countries in the same region. It's not even clear that this is where the variant first emerged, but never mind all that. Prof Tulio de Oliveira, the Durban-based scientist leading the effort to understand the new variant, pointed out that South Africa has been "very transparent with scientific information...The world should provide support to South Africa and Africa and not discriminate or isolate it." Fat chance. By Sunday South Africa's President Cyril Ramaphosa was warning that the travel ban "is not informed by science, nor will it be effective in preventing the spread of this variant."

The only thing the prohibition on travel will do is to further damage the economies of the affected countries and undermine their ability to respond to and recover from the pandemic. Where to start? Perhaps with the fact that there is no country called 'Africa'. For example, there is actually no shortage of vaccines in South Africa, a semi-developed country where the main problem is vaccine reluctance. Internet access is high and mistrust of authority is even higher, so only 27 per cent of South Africans are fully vaccinated. The risk of new variants emerging still exists even in rich countries where the Covid virus continues to circulate widely. In most African countries, and in the poorest Asian countries as well, the risk is very high and will remain so, because they just can't get enough vaccines. A year after the first vaccines became available, only 6 per cent of Africans are fully vaccinated. Twelve billion vaccine doses will have been produced in the world by the end of this month (December), which is more than enough for every human being over 18 years old. But the rationing is mainly done by price, so school-children are being vaccinated and adults are getting a third jab in the wealthy countries, while several billion adults have not yet had their first jab in the global south. And in the meantime, they are also punishing the economies of the poor by imposing knee-jerk travel bans on an entire region of Africa on suspicion of harbouring the Omicron virus — even though we all know that it has already been confirmed in Europe and Asia, and is doubtless present in the Americas too. The right move, even at this late date, is to focus all the world's energies on getting vaccines into the poorest countries: 'nobody is safe until everybody is safe'. Omicron looks like it may be a big problem, and there could be even bigger ones behind it.

Can doctoral degrees make better teachers?

It is often said that the quality of higher education in a country rests on the hands of the number of PhDs holder produced by her. With this objective, policymakers of higher education give more impetus to increase the number of doctoral degree holders every year. Even during the accreditation process of UGC-NAAC more thrust is given to the number of PhD holders in an institution. The UGC is also supporting teachers through faculty improvement programs to pursue PhD. Even those who do not have any interest in research also do PhD for the sake of promotions. Does a greater number of PhD holders improve the academic or research culture of a country? Do such people do any good for the academic system?

A debate was triggered earlier this month when Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan said that making a PhD degree mandatory for the post of assistant professor at universities is "not favourable" in the current education system.

If we analyze the quality of an average PhD holder from a state university or private university, we get a dismal picture of our higher education (with few exceptions). There are many who even do not know how to state a research problem or how to cite references properly. Quality in higher education cannot be attributed to the degree one holds. If the number of PhDs and high impact factor publications is the scale for measuring quality, our country would have produced hundreds of Nobel Laureates and we would have solved many of the problems afflicting our society.

In history we find many eminent scientists without a PhD degree or even a good academic degree. Michael Faraday did an apprenticeship, and had no degree; Charles Darwin, had an 'ordinary' degree in theology; and James Joule, had no degree at all. John Walker, who won the Copley Medal and the Nobel Prize, got a third-class honours degree; and Admiral Henry Jackson, who invented radio communication between ships, did not have a degree either.

In one of the studies published in The Biologist, it is reported that 10 per cent of the distinguished scientists who were listed in the prestigious Fellows of the Royal Society (FRS) never had degrees. Our own great scientist and teacher Sir C V Raman did not have a research degree. Clearly, degrees or grades are not a reliable indicator of the research or academic ability and potential of a candidate. Using degree scores alone would have prevented many world-famous scientists from building successful careers if they had lived today.

Considering the facts from history, the statement of the Union Education Minister is a welcome step for people who value knowledge and wisdom above certificates or degrees.

In higher education what is needed is the transformation of the students to equip them to solve the problems faced by soci-

ety and also to mold them into citizens having good values. Unfortunately, today's education fails to impart these. Academic transformation can be achieved only by updating the latest developments in the subject. Regrettably, most of our teachers are not interested in updating the subject. The students are fed with information of the 70s or 80s or 90s that these teachers learned during their college days and they ask students to write the same for university examinations. Teachers of this group do not even students to refer to standard books.

Many teachers who have taken doctoral degrees have the feeling that they have climbed Mount Everest and they do not need to learn further. They even have a feeling that they should be focused only on MSc and PhD classes as they are superior. Many do not engage themselves with BSc and MSc classes citing workload mentioned in UGC rules, which gives weightage to teachers who are engaged in research. In many affiliated colleges having research centers, BSc and MSc students get less focus from this group of teachers. In university centers the situation is so pathetic that many are not interested even in taking classes, their only focus is research. In many university centers, theory and practical sessions for post-graduate students are carried out by research scholars.

Of course, in science education, research and teaching are two sides of the same coin and we cannot

neglect either one. The attention of teachers is needed for molding undergraduate students as they are fresh and need the assistance of teachers. The students who come for MSc and PhD are people who usually have already a clear set of objectives.

Value-based education can be provided only if a teacher has some connection with society. Most of the present-day college teachers feel they are an elite class. A teacher having more degrees and honors becomes totally excluded from society. During earlier days students had good role models among their teachers. But in today's world even a teacher's life is corrupted with the dismal state of society. Most of the present-day teachers do not like to correct students; they only fulfill their duty as a lecturer providing one hour lecture or giving a test and teacher-student relationship ends just there.

To be a good teacher one needs to be a good student. Only a good student can excel as a teacher. To be a good student means always opening your eyes and ears to the learning process. A good teacher need not be one who holds a PhD degree. The reason in most cases is that once a person is awarded a PhD degree, he feels that his learning process is complete and becomes egotistic. They feel that they are superior superhuman beings and nobody should question them. This creates a negative impact on the academic culture of our students. In science education, this atti-

tude will destroy the questioning nature of students.

To be a good teacher is more difficult than securing a PhD degree. A good teacher should be able to understand the academic level of each student and accordingly deliver the content. It is really more challenging than doing a wet lab experiment. In higher education what we lack today is the presence of a good teacher. Only a good teacher can instill scientific creativity in students.

There are many passionate researchers among our school teachers who do not have a post-graduate degree, but still are better researchers compared to PhD holders. We have to tap the resources of such great teachers. But the so-called scientific community will not accept them as they do not have a PhD. The Government should provide opportunities for such teachers to showcase their talents. We need to promote them with an award equivalent to Shanti Swarup Bhatnagar Prize given to researchers. Solutions to problems affecting the community can be solved only if we tap the intellectual ability of so-called non-scientific people who lack a PhD. It is the undue importance we give to the PhD degree that harms the productivity in science. Science should be respected looking at the work one does, not by one's degree. In higher education what we need is good teachers who enlighten our youngsters and create a strong intellectual pool for the country.

Delhi's response to air pollution needs a rethinking

The Delhi-NCR's plan to mitigate air pollution requires better-timed measures with actions being more 'pre-emptive' rather than 'reactive'

The COVID-19 pandemic was an unexpected disruption but air pollution remains the national capital's chronic crisis which recurs on a yearly basis. Year after year, it is a familiar story — farm fires meet firecrackers in November, Delhi-NCR and the Indo-Gangetic plain choke and the annual blame game starts. After a two-month-uproar, come February, every-one moves on.

In 2017, the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) was introduced specifically to combat winter air pollution in Delhi. However, the primary issue is that the GRAP measures are reactive and linked to higher levels of measured PM 2.5 and PM 10 concentrations. As a result, the appropriate response measures targeting

sources are usually activated too late. For instance, actions such as private vehicle restrictions, construction bans and school closures kick in only when the fine particulate matter (PM2.5) levels of 300 ug/m3 — 20-times the World Health Organisation's safe limit — persist for at least 48 hours.

Hot mix plants, stone crushers and brick kiln operations are required to be shut only when air quality crosses the severe mark (250 ug/m3). In 2021, Delhi is better equipped with an early warning system that gives a three-day pollution forecast and a dedicated Decision Support System (DSS) developed by the Indian Institute of Tropical Meteorology that pin-points sources of pollution. However,



these systems are not in sync with the GRAP.

Delhi-NCR's action plan to tackle air pollution requires a fundamental rethink. More measures need to be 'pre-emptive' rather than 'reactive' as we propose in this four-point plan.

First, the threshold for declaring a public health emergency and restricting highly polluting activities like industrial operations, vehicular movement, and construction has to be brought down from 48 hours of PM2.5 concentrations at 'severe' level (>300

ug/m3). The threshold should be improved to 'very poor' (PM2.5 > 121 ug/m3) in the next three years and eventually to the National Ambient Air Quality Standards limit of 60 ug/m3 if Delhi-NCR is to ensure clean air round the year. Public messaging should be stepped up at the threshold and citizens should be encouraged to limit their outdoor movements. The messaging should also include air quality forecasts so that citizens can plan activities accordingly. Similar to COVID-19, lockdowns should be acceptable even in the case of chronic crises like air pollution, the long-term impacts of which are much worse.

Secondly, the response measures in the GRAP should be triggered by the early warn-

ing system and in sync with the forecasted source contributions. This means that if 'severe' air quality is forecast for the next two days and the primary contributor is to be local vehicular emissions, then vehicular restrictions should be imposed in the city. For a system that is driven by forecasts, continuous validation of the forecasts becomes equally important. Also, efforts should be made to ensure that the forecasting system captures and reflects on-ground conditions and episodic contributors. Thirdly, the NCR and states of Punjab, Haryana, and Uttar Pradesh should have a common winter response plan, which should be notified under the Commission of Air Quality Management in NCR and adjoining areas Act, 2021.

For instance, a survey from last winter found that power plants and industries accounted for 15 per cent of Delhi's winter particulate concentrations. However, there are no coal-fired power plants within Delhi's jurisdiction. Equally, states in the region resort to using some of their most inefficient plants to fulfill their power needs, on account of perverse incentives that keep efficient plants moth-balled. Therefore, one component of the regional plan must be to ensure that all large-scale industries around NCR comply with minimum efficiency and emission standards.

Fourthly, create a fund that pools resources from the environment damages compensation paid by industries and the green cess paid by

commercial vehicles entering Delhi. Such a fund can compensate the weakest of those affected by air pollution, especially during economic shut-downs. It can provide a safety net to informal sector workers like construction labourers and micro and small enterprises. Further, the fund can also be used to accelerate clean energy transition for Delhi NCR's urban poor, thereby reducing household emissions.

Air pollution is certainly not insurmountable. Look at the examples of London, Los Angeles, and even Beijing for inspiration. These cities have successfully improved the quality of air and thereby, quality of life. With a recalibrated approach to solving for clean air, Delhi too can add itself to the list.

WHO says measures used against delta should work for omicron

Manila: Measures used to counter the delta variant should remain the foundation for fighting the coronavirus pandemic, even in the face of the new omicron version of the virus, World Health Organisation officials said Friday, while acknowledging that the travel restrictions imposed by some countries may buy time.

While about three dozen countries worldwide have reported omicron infections, including India on Thursday, the numbers so far are small outside of South Africa, which is facing a rapid rise in Covid-19 cases and where the new variant may be becoming dominant. Still, much remains unclear about omicron, including whether it is more contagious, as some health authorities suspect, whether it makes people more seriously ill, or whether it can evade vaccine protection.

"Border control can delay the virus coming in and buy time. But every country and every community must prepare for new surges in cases," Dr. Takeshi Kasai, the WHO regional director for the Western

Pacific, told reporters Friday during a virtual news conference from the Philippines. "The positive news in all of this is that none of the information we have currently about omicron suggests we need to change the directions of our response."

That means continuing to push for higher vaccination rates, abiding by social-distancing guidelines, and wearing masks, among other measures, said WHO Regional Emergency Director Dr. Babatunde Olowokure.

He added that health systems must "ensure we are treating the right patients in the right place at the right time, and so therefore ensuring that ICU beds are available, particularly for those who need them."

Kasai warned: "We cannot be complacent."

WHO has previously urged against border closures, noting they often have limited effect and can cause major disruptions. Officials in southern Africa, where the omicron variant was first identified, have decried restrictions on travelers from the region.

WHO says no reports of omicron Covid deaths yet

Geneva: The World Health Organization said Friday it had not seen any reports of deaths relating to the new Omicron variant of Covid-19.

The WHO said it was collecting evidence about the variant of concern (VOC), as countries around the world scramble to stop it from spreading.

But despite a growing number of countries registering infections with the new variant, no deaths have yet been reported to the UN health agency.

"I have not seen reports of Omicron-related deaths yet," WHO spokesman Christian Lindmeier told reporters in Geneva.

"We're collecting all the evidence and we will find much more evidence as we go along."

"The more countries...keep testing people, and looking specifically into the Omicron variant, we will also find more cases, more information, and,

hopefully not, but also possibly deaths."

While Omicron has rattled the world, Lindmeier also urged people to be mindful of the Delta variant, which accounts for 99.8 percent of sequences uploaded to the GISAID global science initiative with specimens collected in the last 60 days.

"Omicron may be on the rise, and we may come to a point where it takes over to be the dominant variant, but at this point, the very dominant variant remains Delta," he stressed.

Lindmeier added: "The restrictions that were put into place in many countries just two weeks ago -- economical closures again, lockdowns in some areas, closures of Christmas markets in parts of Europe -- this was done before Omicron because of a rise of Delta cases. Let's not lose sight of this." AP

WHO rushes experts' team to S Africa to help combat Omicron

The WHO has rushed a team of experts to South Africa's Gauteng province, the epicentre of the new Omicron variant of Covid-19, to ramp up surveillance and contact tracing efforts as the country grapples with rising cases of infections.

Omicron, which was first identified in South Africa exactly a week ago, now has been detected in at least 24 countries around the world, including India.

"We are deploying a surge team in Gauteng province to support surveillance and contact tracing," World Health Organisation's Regional Emergency Director for Africa Dr Salam Gueye said in a media briefing on Thursday.

A team is already working in South Africa on genomic sequencing, he said.

Malaysia detects first omicron case in S African student

Kuala Lumpur: Malaysia said Friday it has detected its first case of the new omicron strain of the coronavirus in a foreign student who returned to the country last month after visiting her family in South Africa.

Health Minister Khairy Jamaluddin said the 19-year-old female transited in Singapore and arrived in Malaysia on Nov 19, where she underwent a COVID-19 test upon arrival. She was then bussed to her university lodging in northern Perak state with four others and placed under quarantine, he said.

Results the next day confirmed the student was positive for COVID-19, he said. The bus driver and four others in the vehicle tested negative and were all quarantined, he added. AP

New York confirms at least 5 omicron cases

New York: Health officials have confirmed at least five cases of the omicron coronavirus variant in New York, Gov. Kathy Hochul said Thursday evening.

A 67-year-old woman from Suffolk County, two Queens residents, a Brooklyn resident and a fifth person believed to be a visitor to the state tested positive. Their vaccination statuses weren't immediately clear, but the woman from Suffolk County had received at least one dose, Hochul said.

The cases come after a Minnesota resident tested positive for the variant following attendance at an anime convention in New York City.

New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio said the geographic spread of the positive tests suggested the variant was undergoing "community spread" in the city, and wasn't linked to any one event. AP

Taliban bans forced marriages of women in Afghanistan

Kabul: The Taliban decreed Friday that they are banning the forced marriage of women in the war-torn country, in what appears to be a move to address criteria that developed nations consider a precondition to recognise their Government and restore aid.

The move announced by Supreme Leader Hibatullah Akhundzada came as poverty is surging in Afghanistan, following the religious militia's takeover in August that pushed out US and international forces and led foreign governments to halt funds that had been a mainstay of

the economy. "Both (women and men) should be equal," said the decree, adding that "no one can force women to marry by coercion or pressure." Women's rights improved markedly over the past two decades of international presence in Afghanistan, but are seen as under threat with the return of the Taliban, whose earlier rule in the 1990s saw them virtually cloistered.

Forced marriages have become more commonplace in the poor, conservative country, as the internally displaced marry off their young daugh-

ters in exchange for a bride-price that can be used to pay debts and feed their families.

The announced decree did not mention a minimum age for marriage, which previously was set at 16 years old.

Women in Afghanistan for decades were treated like property — as an exchange token for blood money or ending disputes or tribal feuds. The Taliban now state they are against the practice. They also said a widow will now be allowed to re-marry 17 weeks after her husband's death, choosing her new husband freely. AP

Mob in Pakistan's Punjab province lynches Sri Lankan citizen over 'blasphemy'

Lahore: A mob in Pakistan on Friday lynched a Sri Lankan national before burning his body over alleged blasphemy in the country's Punjab province.

Priyantha Kumara, who was in his 40s, was working as the general manager of a factory in Sialkot district, some 100 kms from here, a Punjab police official told PTI.

"Mr Kumara allegedly tore a poster of the hardline Tehreek-e-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP) in which Quranic verses were inscribed and threw it in the dustbin. The poster of the Islamist party was pasted on the wall adjoining the office of

Kumara. A couple of factory workers saw him removing the poster and spread the word in the factory," the official said.

Hundreds of men, enraged over the "blasphemy" incident, started gathering outside the factory from adjoining areas. Most of them were activists and supporters of the TLP.

"The mob dragged the suspect (the Sri Lankan national) from the factory and severely tortured him. After he succumbed to his wounds, the mob burnt his body before police reached there," the official said. PTI

Trump faces flurry of investigations beyond Jan 6 probe

New York: As Donald Trump's lawyers try to block the White House from releasing records to the congressional committee investigating the Jan 6 Capitol insurrection, the former president faces a flurry of other investigations that could come to a head in the coming weeks and the new year. That includes two major state criminal investigations — one in New York and one in Georgia — and lawsuits concerning sexual assault allegations, a fight over an inheritance and questions of whether he should be held personally liable for inciting the insurrection. Trump has long dismissed the investigations as nothing more than a politically motivated "witch hunt" that began with the probe into Russian meddling in the 2016 election. But while Trump has spent most of his life dodging legal consequences, he is no longer shielded by the protections against indictment enjoyed by sitting presidents. AP

Ukraine says Russia amassed over 94,000 troops at border

Kyiv (Ukraine): Ukraine's Defense Minister estimated Friday that Russia has amassed more than 94,000 troops near their borders and said there is a probability of a "large-scale escalation" in late January.

Ukrainian and Western officials recently voiced alarm about a Russian troop buildup near Ukraine, saying they feared it could herald an invasion. Moscow has denied planning to invade and accused Ukraine and its Western backers of fabricating claims to cover up their own allegedly aggressive designs.

Ukrainian Defense Minister Oleksii Reznikov told lawmakers Friday that the number of Russian troops near Ukraine and in Russia-annexed Crimea is estimated to be 94,300. "Our intelligence service analyzes all scenarios, including the worst ones. It notes that a probability of a large-scale escalation on the part of Russia exists. The most probable time when (Russia) will be ready for the escalation is end of January," Reznikov said. The minister noted an escalation "is a probable scenario, but not certain, and our task is to avert it." AP

Sensex crashes 765 pts as Omicron enters India

Mumbai: Domestic markets lurched lower on Friday after India reported its first case of the Omicron variant of the coronavirus, prompting investors to dial back risk exposure.

The Centre on Thursday said two cases of Omicron have been detected in Karnataka. Both the patients are men, aged 66 and 46 years, with mild symptoms. Severe symptoms have not been noted, an official said.

The Government has asked people not to panic and follow Covid-appropriate behaviour. It also said while there is no evidence to suggest that existing vaccines do not work against Omicron, some of the mutations reported may decrease the efficacy of the jabs.

Snapping its two-session rally, the 30-share BSE Sensex nosedived 764.83 points or 1.31 per cent to end at 57,696.46.

Similarly, the broader NSE Nifty tanked 204.95 points or 1.18 per cent to 17,196.70. **PTI**

Gold prices decline by ₹196; silver tanks ₹146

New Delhi: Gold in the national capital on Friday dipped ₹196 to ₹46,581 per 10 gram in line with fall in international precious metal prices, according to HDFC Securities.

In the previous trade, the precious metal settled at ₹46,777 per 10 gram. Silver also declined ₹146 to ₹59,878 per kilogram from ₹60,024 per kilogram in the previous trade.

In the international market, gold was trading lower at USD 1,767 per ounce and silver was flat at USD 22.30 per ounce.

"Gold prices traded weak with spot gold prices at COMEX were trading down at USD 1,767 per ounce on Friday," according to HDFC Securities,

Rupee drops 10 paise to 75.12 against USD on new Covid variant worries

Mumbai: The Indian rupee extended its loss by another 10 paise to settle at 75.12 against the US dollar on Friday in line with massive sell-offs in domestic equities amid growing worries over the new COVID variant.

At the interbank foreign exchange market, the local currency opened at 74.98 and witnessed an intra-day high of 74.95 and a low of 75.18 against the US dollar in a highly volatile trading session. The local unit finally settled at 75.12 a dollar, down 10 paise over its previous close. For the week, the currency weakened by 23 paise against the US dollar. The dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was trading 0.06 per cent up at 96.21.

"Transformational initiatives under Digital India have opened doors for innovative Fintech solutions to be applied in governance", he said to the forum participated by 70 countries.

The Prime Minister emphasized that now it is time

Centre: ₹374.78 cr payment pending for reprocessing under PM-KISAN since 2019

New Delhi: About ₹374.78 crore amount is pending for reprocessing after failed transactions occurred under the central scheme the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi Yojana (PM-KISAN) since its launch in 2019. Under the PM-KISAN scheme, eligible marginal farmers have electronically given ₹6,000 annually in three equal instalments -- saw a 14.22 lakh pending failed transaction during 2019-20 fiscal, when the scheme was launched in February 2019.

"Consequently, the number of pending failed transactions was reduced to 8.19 lakh during the 2020-21 fiscal. But in the ongoing 2021-22 fiscal, the number of pending failed transactions stood at 9.11 lakh till November 30", the Ministry of Agriculture data showed. The amount that was pending for reprocessing due to failed transactions was ₹182.78 crore during 2019-20 fiscal, ₹163.99 crore in 2020-21 fiscal, and ₹28.47 crore till November of 2021-22 fiscal. The total amount that is pending for reprocessing from 2019-20 till November 20 of this year under the PM-KISAN scheme stands at 374.78 crore, the data showed.

In a written reply to the Upper House, the agriculture minister said failed transactions remained less than one per cent so far since the launch of the PM-KISAN scheme. "Under the PM-KISAN scheme, the total number of transactions that have taken place is 80,27,44,674, of which the number of failed transactions is less than one per cent," he noted. Tomar said the cumulative number of failed transactions of PM-KISAN were at 69,02,227 from February 1, 2019, till November 30 of this year. Out of which, 32,02,408 transactions were successfully reprocessed, Tomar said. **PNS**

Govt seeks Parl nod for ₹62,000 crore infusion in AIAHL as part of ₹3.73 L cr extra spending

New Delhi: The Government on Friday sought Parliament's nod to infuse over ₹62,000 crore into the company that holds residential assets and liabilities of Air India after its privatisation, as part of over ₹3.73 lakh crore additional spending planned in the current financial year. The extra spending would include ₹58,430 crore by way of additional fertiliser subsidy; ₹53,123 crore towards payment of pending export incentives and ₹ 22,039 crore to rural development ministry for transfer to National Rural Employment Guarantee Fund.

Minister of State for Finance Pankaj Chaudhary tabled the second batch of supplementary demands for grants in the Lok Sabha envisaging a net cash outflow of over ₹ 2.99 lakh crore and ₹74,517 crore extra expenditure would be matched by savings by different ministries.

Later, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman tabled the supplementary demands for grants for 2021-22 in the Rajya Sabha.

As per the document, ₹62,057 crore would be given to the Civil Aviation Ministry for equity infusion in Air India Assets Holding Company (AIAHL) for repayment of past Government guaranteed borrowing and past dues/liabilities of Air India. **PNS**

Difficult for India to achieve climate goals without compromising economic targets: Oxford Economics

New Delhi: India's new climate goals will be difficult to achieve without significantly compromising the country's stated economic targets and its ambition to become a USD 5 trillion economy by 2024-25, according to global forecasting firm Oxford Economics.

It further said India's pledge to achieve 'net zero' emissions by 2070 is admirable, but the path announced by Prime Minister Narendra Modi at COP26 toward achieving that goal is ambitious.

"We think the new climate goals will be difficult to achieve without significantly compromising India's stated economic targets and its

ambition to become a USD 5 trillion economy by 2024/25. Indeed, it may not even be possible," Oxford Economics said.

In 2019, Modi envisioned to make India a USD 5 trillion economy and global powerhouse by 2024-25. Last month, the Prime Minister announced a bold pledge that India will achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2070 and asserted that it is the only country that is delivering in "letter and spirit" the commitments on tackling climate change under the Paris Agreement.

According to Oxford Economics, financing the transition will also be a big challenge. **PTI**

ROAD LESS-TRAVELLED

Combining the urge to travel with frequenting places that are less-visited to ensure safety, CHRISTY VARGHESE offers some options from each of the four metros



With the lockdown being lifted in phases, most of us city dwellers can't wait to travel to someplace relatively cooler, where the night sky is filled with stars that are clearly visible to the naked eye. And we are sure your bags are packed, ready to go. But what destination do you have in mind? Surely someplace relatively unknown, to minimise the scope of contact with other people?

With states like Himachal Pradesh witnessing an overwhelming influx of vacation-starved folks after the announcement that a negative RT-PCR test report is no longer required to enter the borders, we are certain that you are having a hard time figuring out the destination for your weekend getaway.

Rest assured, we are here to help you! Here's a straightforward guide to lesser-known scenic places close to the metros that will help you beat the heat and, odds are, won't feature on the itinerary for most people... unless they have read this article, of course.

DELHI

As someone who resides in Delhi, I have been to the conventional spots across Himachal Pradesh one too many times, which is why I feel now would be a good time to explore Uttarakhand. Do take note that at the time of writing, the state demands a negative RT-PCR test from everyone entering its borders.

Chakrata: Chakrata is about 325 km away from Delhi, and if you're up for it, the place is a great destination for a motorcycle trip. Built as a summer retreat for high-ranking officials of the East India Company, presently, Chakrata serves as the base for the Special Frontier Force (SFF), an Indian special operations unit, that serves under the direct supervision of the Research and Analysis Wing (RAW). So, I am afraid you won't witness any rave parties here. Pre-COVID, there was a range of adventure sports one could indulge in, however, even if you can't go river rafting in Kanasar

or waterfall rappelling at Kimono Falls, there is still a lot to do. Located about 13 km from Main Chakrata Market, the Deoban Forest, loved by bird watchers, makes for a good hike. Hire a 4x4 vehicle and a guide as normal four-wheelers are known to get stuck along the secluded stretch leading to Deoban. The motorable road is only built till the Forest Rest House and after a brisk 15-minute walk, one can reach Vyas Shikhar. As per local belief, this is where sage Vyas wrote the Hindu epic, Mahabharata. If you are lucky, the weather will permit you to catch a glimpse of numerous peaks of the Himalayan range including Nanda Devi.

You could undertake the somewhat easy, five-km-long trek from the taxi stand near the cantonment area at Chakrata to Tiger Falls. Your exertion, through luxurious deodar vegetation, will be rewarded with the breathtaking view of the waterfall cascading down the hill to form a small pond at the bottom. Enjoy the serenity of the falls and the surroundings by having a small picnic beside the pond. If you are in luck, subject to further developments of the pandemic, you would be able to rappel down the face of the waterfall.

Feeling particularly adventurous? You could recce the Budher caves, which remain largely unexplored due to the rough terrain, known for their stalactite and stalagmite formations. A stalactite is an icicle-shaped formation that hangs from the ceiling of a cave and is produced by the precipitation of minerals from water dripping through the cave ceiling. Most stalactites have pointed tips while, on the other hand, most stalagmites have rounded or flattened tips. A stalagmite is a type of rock formation that rises from the floor of a cave due to the accumulation of material deposited on the floor from ceiling drippings. An easy way to remember the terminology is by simply picturing that stalactites are held 'tight' by the roof of the cave while stalagmites 'might' just grow big enough to touch the roof of the cave.

These caves are about 30 km from



Chakrata and are believed to have been built by the Pandavas. But be warned, those who have undertaken it say that the expedition is quite rigorous.

We saved the best for the last though. We highly recommend a visit to Chilmiri neck, which is just 20-30 minutes away from Chakrata main town. A sunset point set atop a plateau, Chilmiri is the highest peak in the town, offering National Geographic-worthy views of the mountains surrounding Chakrata.

KOLKATA

If you reside in Kolkata, we are sure you have visited Darjeeling, Kalimpong, Kurseong and Siliguri. Since I haven't visited it, I had to rely on a friend, who happens to be a mod-

ern day-nomad, for some valuable input. Bearing in mind that we were looking for someplace offbeat, she highly recommended that we visit Simultala (about 360 km from Kolkata) and Ayodhya Hills (280 km from Kolkata). We sought more information on the latter as it is closer.

Ayodhya Hills: Ayodhya (or Ajothya) Hills, in Purulia District of West Bengal, is a part of the lowest step of the Chota Nagpur Plateau and are popular among young mountaineers who wish to take the basic course in rock climbing. The name might be somewhat misleading as it is a small plateau, surrounded by hills. If you are feeling particularly lucky, and railway services recommence, you can catch the train to Barabhum from Howrah. Barabhum is a short distance from



Bagmundi which is one of the main entrances to Ayodhya Hill. If this is the route you take, seek directions from locals to Bamni Falls on the way. Don't forget to catch a full view of the creek and the beauty of the scene from the watchtower for an enchanting experience.

The region has great religious significance since, according to mythology, Rama and Sita lived here during their exile. Sita was thirsty and Ram pierced an arrow through the Earth's crust and a pristine fountain gushed out. The place where Sita quenched her thirst is known as Sita Kund. Now, this is a small, shallow water body in Bagandi village where cold water bubbles from the white sand base.

Ajodhya Hills is known for its temperate environment and pleasant weather which lasts through the year. While it was one of the most remote areas of the state, it is now slowly gaining popularity.

CHENNAI

We can't imagine your eyes ever tiring of the panoramic views at Yercaud, Ooty, Kodaikanal and Munnar. However, if you were on the lookout for a place much closer to Chennai, we have something worth your while.

Kolli Hills: Kolli Hills or Kolli Malai, which means 'Mountains of Death', is a small mountain range located just 358 km from Chennai and is apt for a perfect bike trip. The Kollimalai Ghat Road, leading to the Kolli Hills, is an extremely adventurous undertaking with more than 70 hairpin bends spread across a length of nearly 47 km.

Apart from the scenic journey to Kolli Hills, there are numerous places you could visit, in and around the area, to satiate the tourist within you.

The Arapaleeswar Temple is a crucial part of Kolli Hills sightseeing with a rich culture and historical significance that dates as far back as the 1st century CE when it was built by the then-ruler Valvil Ori. Dedicated to Lord Shiva, the temple stands as a witness to the great Dravidian style of architecture till today.

And don't forget to visit the Botanical Garden which comprises a beautiful rose garden, a majestic sightseeing point, eco-friendly cottages, and a fun-filled children's park.

If hiking is your passion, do visit Puliacholai, a haven for the quiet and adventurous alike. Puliacholai is a dense forest range on the foothills of Kollimalai. There is a lot of scope in converting this place into a trekking base, as the forest has nearly 24 discernible, well-set trails.

MUMBAI

Being the third-largest state in India, Maharashtra has no dearth of scenic locations

with pleasant weather throughout the year. We had heard of several (somewhat) commercialised places that would serve as the ideal weekend getaway from the prickly summer heat such as Mahabaleshwar, Panchgani, Matheran, Lonavala and Khandala. Since some of the aforementioned places fall within 100 km of Mumbai, seeking clarity, we reach out to a fellow traveller who currently resides in Mumbai. As someone who was raised in Pune, another major Maratha city that has its little belts of greenery, forests and temperate weather, he is a trusted source of intel. When he shares that all of the aforementioned places deserve a visit, we feel dejected; turns out he is just as spoilt for choice as we are. He is someone who prefers camping out by himself or with friends, somewhere in the Sahyadri mountain ranges (Western Ghats). He shares that camping out always seems like the best way when travelling, provided you have the necessary equipment, know how to cook and clean up after yourself.

Thinking hard, as a cursory remark, he mentions that if one fancies the notion of heading out on a long drive, one could visit Amboli, Maharashtra's last hill station on the way to the plains of Goa. He says that since it is relatively unexplored, there's no need to be worried about running into many tourists here. While we recommend you take all necessary precautions every time you step outside the safety of your home, we look up his claims and it turns out he is right. At a little less than 500 km from Mumbai via NH 48, Amboli Ghat (as it is also known) looks pristine and has one of the lowest positivity rates in Maharashtra with between 1,100 and 1,500 residents, as per the latest data.

Bhandardara: Knowing that we might like embarking on a momentous trek leading to some breathtaking views, he recommends we visit Bhandardara. A short while later, he shares an elaborate itinerary. Turns out a large reason why he singled out Bhandardara is because of Kalsubai Peak, the highest peak of the Sahyadri Ranges, and Maharashtra, with its summit situated at an elevation of 1,646 metres.

The trek is a very tricky one and, usually, the experienced trekkers find their way to the top with some difficulty, he said about the climb. He also added that there are now man-made stairs to access the peak if you don't wish to trek.

While there are several quaint hotels in or around the city centre at Bhandardara, we were told that camping at the Mt Kalsubai base or close to the Wilson Dam would be a good idea. For a weekend getaway, there is plenty to look forward to here.

So, what are you waiting for? Travel, but travel safe and smart.

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THE WISE CHOICE

Mayank makes statement with 100 as India score 221/4

MAYANK AGARWAL scored his maiden century against New Zealand in the seventh innings of fourth Test match by making an unbeaten 120 runs off 246 balls with 14 fours and four sixes on the opening day of the second Test match at Wankhede Stadium, Mumbai on Friday (December 3). The 30-year-old from Bangalore, scored all four centuries, including two double hundreds, in nine innings of seven Test matches at home.

CHETESHWAR PUJARA became the seventh Indian top order batter (1-4) to receive 10 or more ducks in Tests. The right hand batter's 10th duck came in the 150th innings of 89th Test match while batting in top order. It was also his first duck in 22 innings of 12 Test matches against New Zealand.

VRAT KOHLI received his maiden duck in 20 innings of 11 Test matches against New Zealand. Overall, it was his 14th duck in 163rd innings of 97th Test match.

Under pressure to prove his worth, Mayank Agarwal made the best statement possible with a superb hundred as India recovered from a sudden top-order collapse to reach 221 for 4 in two extended opening day sessions against New Zealand in the second Test here on Friday.

Agarwal (120 batting, 246 balls), who is all but certain to sit out once Rohit Sharma and KL Rahul come back during the next series (if South Africa then away, if West Indies then home), added to a happy headache for coach Rahul Dravid, on a day when vice-captain Ajinkya Rahane had to be "dropped" because of a hamstring niggle.

Worse, Cheteshwar Pujara and Virat Kohli failed to trouble the scorers and it was a hundred that came under pressure with India being 80 for 3 and 160 for 4 at different stages of the game.

Had the Indian team management been forced to play Rahane, who is likely to fall on Agarwal and it's never a great feeling to go out there in such a situation.

He was jittery to begin with as a streaky boundary through slips came early on but once he marched down the track to loft

Ajaz Patel (29-10-73-4) for a straight six, his nerves had all but vanished. The boundaries --- 14 in all and four sixes, all off Patel showed his class as he got his fourth hundred in Tests.

In fact, Patel, who was by far the best New Zealand bowler in view, having reduced India from 80 for no loss to 80 for three, did look pedestrian in front of Agarwal at times.

When an airborne Agarwal punched the air after a square driven boundary off part-time seamer Daryl Mitchell, one could sense that pressure weighing a thousand tonnes must have come off his chest.

Agarwal was the first choice opener during the England series but before the first game, he got hit on the head and KL Rahul coming in his place, grabbed the opportunity with both hands.

With Rohit also having his best overseas series as Test opener, Agarwal was confined to the reserves.

He could again be back in the reserves but he made a statement of intent with his strokeplay as he dominated the 80-run fourth wicket stand with Shreyas Iyer (18).

Along with another reserve player in Wriddhiman Saha (25 batting, 53 balls), Agarwal added

another 61 runs before the close of play.

New Zealand had erred in not playing Neil Wagner on a track where there was a lot of bounce on offer.

If Agarwal showed discretion, the same couldn't be said about Shubman Gill (44, 71 balls), who was dazzling till he was around in their 80-run opening stand before Patel snuffed him out.

Gill looked fluent before paying for his impetuosity which led to a mini collapse.

Mumbai-born left-arm spinner Patel also picked up Cheteshwar Pujara and Virat Kohli in quick succession with both failing to trouble the scorers. Patel became the second Mumbai-born cricketer after legendary England captain Douglas Jardine to play against India in his city of birth.

He altered the length cleverly and the extra bounce, which is always a speciality of Wankhede, helped him immensely.

He had Gill on the mat when he flighted one to entice him to come out and the ball turned and jumped with keeper Tom Blundell making a hash of a stumping.

However, the very

next ball saw him shorten the length as Gill tried jabbing at it and it turned enough to take the outside edge into Ross Taylor's palms.

Pujara's confidence has hit nadir after too many failures and he survived a DRS appeal from New Zealand before he jumped down the track to york himself. Patel, very wisely, fired one with an angle straight into his toes and what happened with Pujara often happens with out-of-form batters.

For skipper Kohli, it was a delivery that straightened after pitching as the Indian skipper tried to play a forward defensive stroke. Straight umpire Anil Chaudhary gave him out and Kohli immediately asked for a review.

The replay was inconclusive on whether it hit the bat first or pad and as per rule, TV umpire Virender Sharma went with his on-field colleague, leaving Kohli absolutely livid.

He had a word with leg umpire Nitin Menon and was seen expressing his displeasure.

The TV cameras then caught him standing in the dressing room balcony, visibly upset with the decision, which was a touch and go one.

Rahul bhai told me to make it 'big': Mayank

Mayank Agarwal knows that he might be confined to the sidelines once KL Rahul and Rohit Sharma are back in the mix but what has helped him stay focussed is words of wisdom from coach Rahul Dravid, who told him to control what's in his domain.

Agarwal, who has been in and out of the squad in recent times, scored a fine 120 under pressure on the opening day of the second Test before which he watched legendary Sunil Gavaskar's batting videos and slightly changed his stance.

"When I was picked, Rahul bhai spoke to me. He asked me to control what is in my hands and said, 'go out there and give it your best,'" Agarwal said at the end of the day's play.

"He had told me 'When you get set, make it big'. I am happy to have capitalised on the start that I had. But that message was very clear from Rahul bhai, that I should make it count," he added.

The Bangalore based opener lamented that it was his misfortune that he got hit on the head during a net session in England and then

there was nothing in his hands.

"It was unfortunate for me to not have played in England. I got hit and there's nothing much I could do about that. I accepted it and continued to work hard and work on my process and my game."

Gavaskar on the day during his commentary session spoke about how he had advised Agarwal to reduce his pronounced back-lift into a shorter one and the opener said that as of now, he is trying to ape the iconic former India captain's side-on stance.

"He told me that I should consider keeping the bat a bit low initially in my innings. I have a tendency to hold it high. I couldn't make that adjustment in this short period of time. When he was saying that, I noticed his shoulder position and basically picked up that I need to be more side on."

On the day, he hit four sixes off left-arm spinner Ajaz Patel, who was New Zealand's best bowler by a distance with four wickets to his name. He said it was a "conscious decision".


"He was bowling exceedingly well. But each time anything was in our half (our arc), the plan was to be a bit more attacking.

Anything that came a little towards us in length, we were going to go for it.

"He had that phase when he tied us down, so it was a conscious decision to make it count when we could or each time he bowled it in our spot," he explained.

For Agarwal, this innings was more about "grit and determination" and he was prepared to look ugly as long as he got results. "That is something I have thought about, but this innings was more about grit and determination, just to stick with the plan, be disciplined. I know I didn't look good sometimes but I got the job done," he said.

India hasn't still reached a commanding score and Agarwal reckoned that the first session on Saturday will be crucial. "How we start is crucial, the focus is that. The first session we want to play it out, the wicket is going to get harder and harder to bat on."



Afghanistan will face pressure from ICC over women's cricket: Ramiz

Pakistan Cricket Board chairman Ramiz Raja has said that the ICC will put pressure on Afghanistan to clarify its position on the ban of women's cricket after the Taliban took control of the government in Kabul. Raja is part of an International Cricket Council working group reviewing the state of the game in Afghanistan.

"Pressure will be put on Afghanistan. I'm sure they will have to decide in the next six months how they deal with the ICC," Raja told Stumped on the BBC World Service.

It is an ICC requirement for full members to also have a national women's team, besides the men's side. But the return to Taliban rule has led to the prospect of women being forbidden to play cricket in Afghanistan. "Like everybody else, we are giving them time. They are in a difficult situation," said Raja. Afghanistan is one of 12 full members of the ICC. Afghanistan's men took part in the T20 World Cup that was played in the UAE and Oman in October and November.

Sri Lanka completes test series sweep vs West Indies

Spinners Ramesh Mendis and Lasith Embuldeniya took five wickets each to propel Sri Lanka to a crushing 164-run win over West Indies in the second test Friday and a 2-0 series sweep.

Chasing 297 to win, the West Indies reached 65-2 in the second innings at lunch on the fifth day but the tourists were bowled out for 132 in the third session. They lost their last eight wickets for 40 runs.

Embuldeniya had best figures of 5-35 while Mendis recorded 5-66, and collected 11 wickets in the match.

Sri Lanka was still batting when play started on the final day and they declared their second innings on 345-9 in the morning session.

Sri Lanka had scored 204 in its first innings and the West Indies made 253, taking a 49-run lead.

Dhananjaya de Silva was unbeaten on 155 and his overnight partner Embuldeniya was out for 39 bowled by Jason Holder.

De Silva faced 262 balls and hit two sixes and 11



boundaries in scoring his eighth test century.

Left-arm spinner Veerasammy Permaul had the best bowling figures of 3-106 while offspinner Roston Chase took two wickets.

West Indies lost its first second-innings wicket with the total on 15 when captain Kraigg Brathwaite (6) was trapped lbw by Mendis.

Then Nkrumah Bonner joined Jermaine Blackwood

and the pair added 50 runs for the second wicket before Blackwood (36) was caught by de Silva off Embuldeniya in the last ball before lunch break.

When Mendis had Shai Hope (16) caught by Lakmal, West Indies' score stood at 92-3, but it triggered the late collapse.

Bonner top scored for the West Indies with 44.

Sri Lanka won the first test at the same venue by 187 runs.



Axelsen, Tzu Ying named BWF Male and Female Player of the Year

Olympic champion Viktor Axelsen and Tokyo Games silver medalist Tai Tzu Ying were named the BWF Male and Female Player of the Year respectively in recognition of their stellar runs this season.

It was the first season-ending award in this category for both Axelsen and Tai Tzu Ying -- the All England champions of 2020.

All eight winners were honoured in a virtual broadcast on Friday.

Axelsen was rewarded for his extraordinary run starting from the Barcelona Spain Masters in February 2020.

The Dane made 10 finals in 11 individual tournaments, winning seven of those, including gold at the Tokyo Games. "This means a lot to

me," said Axelsen in a release. "Thank you to my team, my coaches, my friends, my family, my competitors.

This year has been really eventful. A few downs, but a lot of ups, with the Olympics being the biggest win, a dream coming true. This award gives me a lot of motivation to work harder."

Tai Tzu Ying won the All England 2020 and then struck a rich vein of form at the three-tournament Asian Leg in January 2021, making all three finals, and clinching the BWF World Tour Finals 2020.

The Chinese Taipei player then made the final of the Tokyo Olympics, going down in a thrilling match to China's Chen Yu Fei.

"It's a pity I can't be in Indonesia for the HSBC BWF World Tour Finals," said the world No.1.

Medvedev puts Russia back in Davis Cup semifinals

Daniil Medvedev maintained his perfect record at the Davis Cup Finals to put Russia into the last four.

Medvedev defeated Mikael Ymer 6-4, 6-4 Thursday to give Russia an insurmountable 2-0 lead over Sweden in the quarterfinals of the revamped team event.

Andrey Rublev earlier ousted Elias Ymer, Mikael's older brother, in a 6-2, 5-7, 7-6 (3) win at the Madrid Arena. With Russia having secured the win after the two singles matches, the doubles match was-



n't played.

Russia will face Germany in the semifinals on Saturday. Serbia and top-ranked Novak Djokovic will face Croatia in the other semifinal on Friday.

It was the third consecutive straight-set victory for the second-ranked Medvedev after group-stage wins over Spain's Pablo Carreno Busta and Ecuador's Emilio Gomez.

Medvedev broke serve twice in the first set and three times in the second against No. 94 Mikael Ymer, Sweden's top-ranked player.

Argentina end France's dream run to book final berth in Junior Hockey WC

The South Americans secured two penalty corners inside the first 10 minutes but, on both occasions, France goalkeeper Guillaume de Vaulcelles denied the opposition.

Qualified for semis, Sindhu loses final group match

Already Assured of a semi-final berth at the BWF World Tour Finals, India's P V Sindhu on Friday suffered a three-game defeat to top seed Pornpawee Chochuwong of Thailand in her third and final group A women's singles match here on Friday.

Sindhu, a two-time Olympic medallist, couldn't apply enough pressure on the world no. 10 Chochuwong to go down fighting 12-21 21-19 14-21 in a match that lasted an hour and 11 minutes.

This was Sindhu's third loss to the 2016 world junior champion Chochuwong in seven meetings.

Sindhu thus finished in the second position in group A, behind Chochuwong and her opponent of the semifinal stage will be decided in a draw later in the day.

Earlier, Kidambi Srikanth

bowed out of the season-ending tournament after losing to second seeded Malaysian Lee Zii Jia 19-21 14-21 in 37 minutes in his third and final group B match.

It was Srikanth's second loss to the world no. 8 Malaysian, who had defeated the Indian at Hylo Open in straight games.

Ashwini Ponnappa and N Sikki Reddy too ended their campaign though they eked out a hard-fought 21-19 9-21 21-14 win over England's Chloe Birch and Lauren Smith in the inconsequential third and final group match.

Sindhu, the reigning world champion, was quite erratic and couldn't control the rallies against Chochuwong, who rode on her quality of strokes to stay a step ahead.

In the first game, Sindhu erred in her lengths early on as Chochuwong led 5-3. The Indian managed to collect a few points but she never looked in control.

Chochuwong took the initiative and kept things under her control, leading 11-6 at the interval.

The Thai player got rewarded for her angled and crisp returns, while Sindhu lacked consistency as Chochuwong took 17-9 lead.
