Trump concedes defeat after Capitol siege

Supporters storm Capitol building in insurrection bid, clash with cops, 4 killed; after US Congress certifies Joe Biden-Kamala Harris' victory, Trump says there will be an orderly transition on Jan 20

PTI WASHINGTON

In an unprecedented assault on democracy in the US, thousands of supporters of outgoing President Donald Trump stormed the Capitol building here and clashed with police, resulting in four deaths and interrupting a constitutional process by Congress to affirm the victory of President-elect Lice Biden and Vice elect Joe Biden and Vice President-elect Kamala Harris in the election.

The Electoral College votes of Biden and Harris were finally approved early on Thursday after both the Senate and the House of Representatives rejected all objections raised by the Republicans to the votes in the States of Pennsylvania and Arizona.

In the presidential election held on November 3, Biden and Harris received 306 electoral votes, while President Trump and Vice President Mike Pence got 232. The counting of Vermont's three electoral votes put Biden and Harris over the 270-threshold needed to win the presidency.

In a statement released just after the certification was finalised, Trump at long last acknowledged his election loss. He said that even though he disagrees with the outcome,

Metropolitan Police Department Chief Robert Contee called the rioting by pro-Trump demonstrators "shameful" during a news conference.

One woman was shot and One woman was snot and killed by Capitol Police during the rioting. Police said three other people — a woman and two men — died after apparently suffering "separate medical amergancies" near the ical emergencies" near the Capitol grounds.

The joint session of Congress, which is normally a ceremonial step, was halted for several hours when sup-

porters of Trump breached the Capitol. Proceedings resumed and continued through the night after the building was cleeared. Vice President Pence brought the Senate session back into order and proceeded with the verification process.

"The announcement of the state of the vote by the President of the Senate shall be deemed a sufficient declaration of the persons elected President and Vice President of the United States, each for the term beginning on the 20th day of January 2021...," Pence said following the count of all of the state's Electoral College votes.

Covid-hit GDP to contract by record 7.7%, reports NSO

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

India's GDP is estimated to Coontract by a record 7.7 per cent during 2020-21 as the Covid-19 pandemic severely hit the key manufacturing and services segments, as per Government projections released on Thursday.

Amid overall decline in economic activities, some respite was provided by the agriculture sector and utility services like power and gas supply, which have been projected to post positive growth during the current fiscal end-

ing March 2021. "Real GDP or GDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) in the year 2020-21 is likely to attain a level of ₹134.40 lakh crore, as against the Provisional Estimate of GDP for the year 2019-20 of ₹145.66 lakh crore...

The growth in real GDP during 2020-21 is estimated at -7.7 per cent as compared to the growth rate of 4.2 per cent in 2019-20," said the first advanced estimates of national income released by the National Statistical Office

expressway was dotted with tractors and farmers the whole day. Several protesters lined on the route to provide fellow farmers with all kinds of supplies, including peanuts, tea, and newspapers.

Joginder Singh Ugrahan,

president of Bharati Kisan Union (Ekta Ugrahan), whose union is one of the largest farmer organisations in Puniab. claimed farmers participated in the march with over 3,500 tractors and trolleys. He said they will not accept anything less than the repeal of the

three farm laws. Yogendra Yadav on Thursday claimed people are still joining the protest in a large number and it will be intensified in coming days.

"Today's tractor rally was just a trailer for the

Government. Around 5,000 tractors were there today in the tractor march. If the Government does not repeal these laws till January 26, we will enter Delhi on our trac-

tors," said Yadav.
"Women are also joining the protest and they have also come forward to hold one day hunger strike against the Centre's new farms laws. On Thursday, 11 women whose husband died during the protest sat on one day hunger strike," said Yadav.

"We are the sons of soil. If the laws are passed, we will starve to death. This rally is our way of telling the Government that we will not give up unless it gives in to our demands," said Jaspal Singh Deol from Punjab's Chamkaur Sahib.

The eighth round of talks between protesting unions and the Central Government is scheduled to be held on Friday.

Following the tractor rally call, the Delhi, Gurugam and Uttar Pradesh (UP) police tightened its security along the borders. The police also divert-ed routes and closed the KMP expressway for commuters for a few hours which led to traffic jams at several places.

Braving severe cold and sporadic rain, the farmers have been camping at Delhi borders.

Apex court fears about protesters' exposure to Covid

Thursday expressed con-cern over large gatherings of farmers protesting against the new farm laws at Delhi borders and drew a parallel with Tablighi Jamaat congregation at Nizamuddin Markaz.

The top court was hearing a plea seeking various reliefs including CBI probe into the matter related to assembly of people at Anand Vihar Bus Terminal and the Tablighi Jamaat congregation at Nizamuddin Markaz in the national Capital after the nationwide lockdown was announced last year to contain

the pandemic. "The same problem is going to arise in farmers' agitation. I do not know if farmers are protected from Covid. So, the same problem is going to arise. It is not that everything is over," said Chief Justice SA Bobde, heading a Bench, also comprising Justices AS Bopanna and

The court asked Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the Centre. protesting farmers are protected from Covid-19. Mehta replied, "certainly not".

day before the second Aday before the second nationwide vaccine dry run scheduled on Friday, the Centre asked the States and UTs to remain prepared to receive the first supply of Covid-19 vaccines shortly. 41 destinations across India have been finalised for the delivery of Covid-19 vaccines.

A battery of 1,70,000 vaccinators and 3,00,000 vaccination team members have been trained to administer the doses, once the date for mega vaccination drive is announced, which is likely to be any time

The Centre has also drawn

vaccines and their movement across different parts of the country. "For vaccine transportation across the country, a common draft has been made and shared with stakeholders. The transportation of vaccines is likely to begin by today or tomorrow," said sources in the Union Health Ministry. Pune had been chosen as

the central hub for Covid-19 vaccine distribution where passenger aircraft will be permitted to transport doses in the hold of the carrier. The Centre has formed mini-hubs across the country for the trans-portation of the vaccine and a total of 41 destinations (airports) have been finalised for their delivery, the sources said.

JEE Advance 75% eligibility criteria scrapped, to be held on July 3

Union Education Minister Ramesh Pokhriyal Nishank on Thursday announced the Joint Entrance Examination (JEE) Advanced 2021 examination date and the eligibility criteria for admission into Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) on Thursday. The exam will be held on July 3 while the 75 per cent eligi-bility criteria will not be applicable this year.

"JEE-Advanced will be conducted by IIT Kharagpur on July 3. The relaxation in admission requirement of 75 per cent marks in Class 12 which was announced last year in view of Covid-19 pandemic will be offered this year as well," Nishank said.

Masood Azhar to go to jail for terror financing Lahore: In a significant devel-

opment, an anti-terrorism court in Pakistan on Thursday issued an arrest warrant for banned Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) chief Masood Azhar on the charges of terror financing.

The Anti-Terrorism Court (ATC) Gujranwala issued the warrant during a hearing in a terror financing case instituted by the Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) of Punjab police against some members of the JeM.


"ATC Gujranwala judge Natasha Naseem Supra issued an arrest warrant for Masood Azhar and directed the CTD to arrest him and present him in the court. The CTD told the judge the JeM chief was involved in terror financing and selling jihadi literature," an official told PTI.

According to police, the 50-year-old woman, who was an Anganwadi worker, was gangraped and murdered in Ughaiti area of Budaun district when she had gone to a temple on Sunday evening.

The post-mortem report confirmed rape and injuries in her private parts besides fracture in her legs. An FIR was registered against three accused, including a priest, at Ughaiti police station under sections 376 (d) and 302 of IPC. Two of the accused were arrested on Wednesday while the priest is still absconding. A cash reward of Rs 25,000 has already been announced on his arrest. The police station incharge was also suspended for the negligence as the family of the deceased had alleged police apathy.

Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath has directed authorities to take stern action against the accused and directed the ADG, Bareilly Zone, to submit a report. He has also directed the UP Special Task Force to assist in

Mahoba case takes a curious turn

Lawyer alleges illegal detention of IPS officer Patidar

The Mahoba incident, in which ▲ an IPS officer Mani Lal Patidar is alleged to be absconding in connection with abetment to suicide case, has taken a curious turn. A cash reward of Rs 50,000 has been also announced for his arrest.

A lawyer has moved Supreme Court and knocked the doors of various government officials, claiming that the IPS officer is not absconding but was abducted as part of a deep-rooted conspiracy hatched by two senior officials of Police and Home departments. He alleged that Patidar was abducted and detained to ensure illegal mining without any obstruction.

He despatched a fax to Union Home Minister Amit Shah, UP Governor Anandiben Patel, chair-

man of National Human Rights Commission and others, including IAS and IPS associations, seeking their immediate intervention. He demanded that a case be registered in this connection and the probe be transferred to the CBI. He also demanded that the accused officers be placed under suspension pending enquiry. He also claimed to have handed over a complaint to the Commissioner of Police in Lucknow, demanding that a case be registered. However, no action has been taken in the matter.

Supreme Court lawyer Mukut Nath Verma, who is the legal representative of the accused IPS officer, claimed that to get the statement of Patidar recorded before the SIT, he sought relevant documents like FIR, post-mortem report and details of allegations regarding corruption against his client, but nothing has been provided to him, even as two senior officers in the government hatched a bigger conspiracy.

Verma mentioned in his letter that on November 27 last, when his

client was coming to meet him to discuss the case and to pay his fee, he was abducted at the behest of two government officials and instead of showing him as arrested, as Patidar was already shown 'wanted' in the Mahoba case, the two officers illegally detained him and took him to some secret hideout.

He alleged that despite his client being in illegal custody since November 27, a cash reward of Rs 25,000, which was later increased to Rs 50,000, was announced on his arrest. "Besides, they have also lodged a case under Section 174-A of IPC against my client with ulterior motives. Such elements worked in a well-planned manner to damage the morale of an honest IPS officer as part of a criminal conspiracy," Verma alleged. He said he gave an application to Hazratganj police and to the Commissioner of Police (Lucknow) against the two government officials and others, but no action has been taken

Off-season onion crop to be showcased

ISH has successfully demonstrated offseason Conion production amongst farmers, so that onion bulbs are produced from November onwards when the onion is in constant demand but sold at a higher price in the market due to limited

supply.

CISH director Shailendra Rajan said that to showcase the technology, they are organising an Onion Field Day in the field of Rajesh Pushkar of Kakrabad in Kakori block of Lucknow on Friday and farmers from selected villages will be provided varieties for onion set production for kharif onion.

Onion bulb prices start increasing after the onset of rainy season and continue till the production of the new crop because of sprouting and rotting of

bulbs due to high humidity and temperature during

Rajan said that farmers in Maharashtra are already practising kharif onion production technology but despite suitable climatic conditions and available varieties, farmers in subtropical conditions are not producing the crop because of unawareness about the technology.

"CISH has taken initiative to popularise the technologies by producing onion bulbs at farmers' fields under Lucknow conditions. In the process, farmers were identified from different villages of Kakori and Mall block and they were provided onion set during monsoon season for the planting of sets. Planting of saplings after August 15 resulted in better survival and production of the onion bulbs," he

pointed out. Covid makes matters worse for TB patients

A man sold the dry straw of the thatched roof of his house in a Banda village so that his father, who was suffering from TB, could get treatment, but to no avail as the patient died of the dreaded disease recently. The deceased belonged to Attara block in Banda district of Bundelkhand.

A patient with Covid-19 symptoms was brought to Ram Manohar Lohia Institute of Medical Sciences in Lucknow last week. He was also suffering from TB and his lungs were in a poor shape. He died within 24 hours of admission to the hospital.

These are not solitary cases as TB and HIV patients have been the prime victims during the unlock period.

Manohar and Rajkumar, two TB patients who died on Sunday, belonged Kuchbandiyas caste (untoucha and lived in Kherwa village in Banda. The villagers detest interacting with the Kuchbandiyas even under normal circumstance; the fear of coronavirus has added to their ostracisation.

Ramesh, son of Raj Kumar, said that they do not have anything to eat. "My father had been eating only once a day despite being a TB patient. I sold the straw of our thatched roof so that I could get medicines for my father, but that did not help," he recalled.

TB patients need nutritious food but during the Covid lockdown and subsequent unlock period, the supply chain snapped. "Go to any village of Bundelkhand and you will find TB patients. They are dying because they are not getting food and are also missing out on the medicines that they are supposed to take regularly," Raja Bhaiya of Vidya Dham Samiti said. "Doctors are talking about corona but what about TB patients? Almost everyday, 4-5 people are dying of TB in villages," he

Incidentally, the government does people have died of TB from March 25 till date. "We are compiling the data," a senior official, requesting anonymity,

The government pays Rs 500 as sus-

tenance allowance to TB patients and officials have no information regarding

Dr Suryakant, head of the department of Respiratory Medicine at King George's Medical University, said any person with compromised lungs is vulnerable to coronavirus infection. People having TB need to take more

precautions during this period, he said. "TB is the leading killer and around 4.35 lakh people die of this disease every year. On an average, over 1,000 people die of TB, everyday," he pointed out. Over 28 million cases of tubercu-

losis were there in India before Covid-19 happened. Once people are diagnosed with TB, they are notified as being part of India's National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme. Protocol mandates that community health workers follow up on the notified natients, making sure that they con sume their medicines and show up for scheduled appointments at the tuberculosis unit for health check-ups and to

collect medicines. But the lockdown has resulted in a Suryakant pointed out.

Govt identifying, rescuing children forced into labour, begging

PNS LUCKNOW

With a view to ensuring a better future for children living below poverty line, the Yogi Adityanath government has started identifying kids engaged in child labour and begging and their rehabilitation has been made a part of the Mission Shakti campaign. Besides, NGOs have been asked to adopt crossings where the number of child beggars is more. "The theme of January 2021 has been designed with special focus on children under the Mission Shakti campaign, and it is based on kids engaged in labour, begging and elimination of child trafficking. To improve the childhood of these poor kids and ensure protection and

respect to them, the department of along with hygiene kits besides food Women and Child Development has started working extensively in all the UP districts, including Lucknow," a senior official said. These underprivileged children are being admitted to primary schools and they are also being empowered financially. Officials are also preparing a list of ration card holders at district level.

"Teams of Labour department, Police, Women & Child Development and Health departments are identifying such children at the ground level", said Sarvesh Kumar Pandey, who is the chief probation officer of Lucknow division. After identification, these children are being admitted to primary schools and provided primary kits

items, he added. "In view of January's theme of Mission Shakti, an action plan has been prepared and for providing benefits of the government schemes to these children, government-run and non-government institutions are being encouraged to adopt city crossings and blocks," Pandey said. Fifty NGOs, including Childline and Bal Kalyan Samiti, have adopted 31 crossings in Lucknow. With the commencement of the adoption process, the children identified by the institutions are directly benefiting from the schemes, Pandey said. is being carried out at a large scale in Woman sets father ablaze over objection to her affair

Lucknow (PNS): A woman allegedly set her father ablaze after he objected to her relationship with a local resident. The 55-year-old man was set afire in Wazirganj area of Budaun on Wednesday. He was admitted to a hospital where his condition was said to be critical.

There were reports that the woman was helped by other members of her family. The case came to light when an unidentified man contacted the police and informed them that a man had set himself on fire. The victim was identified as Mohammed Aamir, a resident of Hatra village in Wazirganj. He works as a marginal farmer and has two daughters and a son.

A team of police went to the spot and saw the man lying on the floor having suffered 50 per cent burn burns. The police rushed the man to the district hospital where he was battling for his life. His statement was recorded after preliminary treatment was administered

"My daughter is having an affair with a local man and when I objected to it, she, with the help of my son and

wife and nephew, set me afire after pouring petrol on me. They all wanted to kill me," Aamir alleged.

Additional SP (Rural) Siddharth Verma said they have not received any complaint in the matter and no case has been registered so far. "However, we are looking out for the accused," he said.

Doctors monitoring Aamir's condition said he is stable but needs constant medical attention.

Meanwhile, in Firozabad, mutilated headless body of an unidentified man was found lying in Ramnagar village of Shikohabad police station area on Thursday. The incident came to light when villagers going to their fields found the headless body. The deceased was said to be in his late 20's.

On being informed, police said that apparently, the man was killed elsewhere and the body dumped there. SP Rajesh Kumar, who also visited the spot, claimed that they were trying to locate the head so that the victim could be identified. A case was registered and the body was sent for autopsy while further probe was underway.

Final vaccination trial to be held at 170 units

The final dry run of Covid-19 vaccination on January 11 will be carried out at a total of 170 units or booths in Lucknow where the actual vaccination drive will take place. A senior health official said that an extensive micro-plan has been made for the massive exercise.

"The exercise will witness the participation of thousands of health workers, district administration officials and police personnel. The microplan has been finalised and we will act according to the plan,"

KGMU Vice-Chancellor Dr Bipin Puri said although the number of Covid cases has been on the decline, that of severe patients is still high and the battle against Covid-19

is far from over. "KGMU gets scores of patients from other hospitals in the city and other districts. Some patients are so serious that they die within two to three hours of reaching the hospital," he pointed out.

He said he has issued clearcut instructions that no patient should be denied admission to the hospital irrespective of their condition.

He said they are fully pre-



pared for the vaccination drive. Once the vaccination drive begins, it will allay anxiety and apprehensions in the healthcare workers and general public. In all three parameters (efficacy, immunity-boosting and safety), vaccines will help a great deal," he added.

Meanwhile, incharge of ICU (1), SGPGI, Dr Zia Hashim said that in their new research for which they are currently doing the validation, they have developed a scoring system for Covid

patients who are hospitalised. "We categorise a patient by giving a score based on his or her condition and then follow the clinical procedures. It helps because we can begin the treatment knowing the condition of the patients. These are statistical models which help in the classification of patients," he pointed out.

Dr Hashim said they had developed this scoring system they have developed it for Covid-19 as well. He added

cases are coming down, there is no dearth of severe patients. "Our ICUs are still full and we are getting patients from other districts too. These patients are not in a good condition because of complications. Most of these patients are on ventilators and their number is more than it used to be

that this kind of system is also

followed in hospitals of other

countries. He said though the

earlier," he said. Dr Hashim said that the ICUs have patients aged above 60 years. "Older patients with multiple diseases are more and even with the commencement of the vaccination drive, the ICUs are likely to remain full,"

As far as treatment is concerned, he said they are no longer giving the patients higher pulse steroids because they there are patients with multiple infections. "If these patients are given higher levels of steroids, then the bacterial infection will spread more," he

Dr Hashim pointed out that former Governor Keshari Nath Tripathi, who has been shifted from ICU to a private room, is on oxygen support.

147 more test positive for coronavirus



PNS LUCKNOW

As many as 147 persons tested positive for coron-avirus in Lucknow on Thursday while 167 patients recovered, taking the number of recoveries to 75,944. Lucknow's death toll stands at 1,124 deaths while there are 2,396 active cases in the district.

The fresh cases included 15 from Rae Bareli road, 13 from Gomtinagar, 12 from Indiranagar, and 10 from Chowk. There were four deaths in Lucknow and one of the deceased belonged to Lucknow while three others from Ayodhya, Prayagraj and Siddharthnagar.

Across the state, 815 persons tested positive, including 39 in Kanpur, 28 in Ghaziabad, 16 in Gautam Buddh Nagar, 63 in Varanasi, and 49 in Meerut, taking the UP case tally to 5,90,844. There were 11 deaths

Day after gang war, police find two bikes with blood stains

Aday after the sensational murder of Mau's former block pramukh Ajeet Singh in Vibhuti Khand, police recovered two unclaimed bikes parked at Kamta bus stand in Chinhat on Thursday morning.

DCP (East) Sanjeev Suman confirmed the recovery of the bikes and said blood stains were found on the vehicles. "It appears that the bikes were used by the assailants who suffered injuries in the exchange

of fire," he said.

He added that the police were waiting for the autopsy report and teams were close to arresting the shooters. "A case of murder has been registered in this connection," he said.

While the police were tightlipped about the autopsy report, sources said that Ajeet was shot about a dozen times. 'There were 12 wounds on Ajeet's body and all were caused by bullets," one source said.

The sources said the police alerted their informers to get details of people receiving treatment at private hospitals. "All the shooters were firing at the deceased and his aide. One of them was firing shots from two handguns. Ajeet's aide Mohar Singh returned fire and a bullet hit one of the attackers who fled the scene. The injured attacker will be getting himself treated at some private hospital," one source said, adding that the police had their eyes fixed around private hospitals in the city.

The sources said the police were sending the bikes recovered from Kamta bus stand for



forensic examination. "Singh's SUV had a secretariat pass pasted on the windscreen. The police are investigating how he got the pass," they said. The case was registered against Ajeet's arch-rival Dhruv Singh aka Kuntu Singh and Akhand Singh for criminal conspiracy, while a case of murder against shooter Kanhaiya Vishwakarma aka Girdhari aka Doctor of Varanasi and three unidentified miscreants for murder. The case was registered on the complaint of Ajeet's aide

Mohar Singh of Mohammedabad in Mau district. Mohar had suffered injuries in his leg. In his complaint, Mohar stated that he, along with Ajeet, was staying at a flat in Rapti Apartment in

Gomti Nagar Extension.

He said he and Ajeet purchased some items at Kathauta crossing in Vibhuti Khand police station area and were going to sit in the SUV which was parked on the other side of the road when they were attacked around 8 pm.

"I identified Kanhaiya who, along with three other aides, was firing at us. By the time we could react, Singh had succumbed to bullet injuries," Mohar said. He added that Kuntu Singh was threatening them not to appear as witness in the MLA Sarvesh Singh murder case, in which Ajeet was an eyewitness. The case is sub judice in Azamgarh and Ajeet had to give his statement next week.

It surfaced that Ajeet and one source said.

Kuntu were friends-turnedfoes after Kuntu decided to get MLA Sarvesh Singh eliminated and Ajeet withdrew himself. Ajeet later appeared as a witness in the MLA murder case and it irked Kuntu. Mohar alleged that Kanhaiya executed the plan on being asked by

Kuntu and Akhand. The rivalry between Ajeet, who was close to mafiaturned-politician Mukhtar Ansari and Kuntu, is an open secret in Mau and almost every resident is aware of it. Ajeet, who was a former block pramukh, had political ambitions. "Panchayat elections are round the corner and the rivalry is on the rise. It is possible that some political rival of Ajeet wanted to get him eliminated,"

Farmer killed in road mishap

Lucknow (PNS): A farmer was killed in a road mishap while another died after he was hit by a train in separate incidents in Gosainganj on Thursday. In another incident in Mohanlalganj, a man died after he fell down from a heap of grain sacks. A 45-year-old man, Bharat Yadav of Loni Katra in Barabanki, was hit by a speeding loader at Birwa crossing around 11:30 am. Bharat suffered grievous injuries and was rushed to a hospital where he was declared brought dead. The errant driver fled the scene abandoning the vehicle on the spot. The loader was impounded by the police.

Meanwhile, a 20-year-old boy, identified as Neeraj of Nagram, died after being hit by a train near Gangaganj Railway crossing (near Chandrauli railway station) on Thursday. It surfaced that Neeraj had gone to see a relative and was returning home when he met the mishap.

In another incident, Shivraj Lodhi (65) of Udvat Kheda locality suffered head injuries after he fell down from a heap of grain sacks and died later.

Bird flu alert in state a double whammy for poultry farmers

T he bird flu alert sounded in the state is a double whammy for poultry farmers. President of Poultry Farmers' Association Nawab Ali Akbar said when the farmers were just recovering from the coronavirus setback, the bird flu scare has added to their woes.

He said there has been a very slight impact on the sales of eggs and chicken, but prices have not got down in the retail market although the poultry farmers have faced a slight decrease in prices.

"Sales have not been impacted that much because there has been no case in UP. However, more than the retail market, it's the poultry farmers who are impacted by these developments," Akbar said.

However he said thes farmers could have faced more problems but since the gap between the supply and demand was huge, the decrease in the wholesale market and the impact was less.



"Poultry farmers had made a 40 per cent recovery after the coronavirus setback, and hence the demand and supply ratio is still not the same as it existed. If the supply had been high, the farmers would have suffered more," he added.

He said that in view of coronavirus pandemic, there was an unnecessary panic crefarmers' business hard in Uttar Pradesh.

"It was an unnecessary created because chicken or any other meat is cooked at very high temperature in our country and it kills all the viruses. The only thing that is required to be done is to eat chicken and eggs cooked well," he said. Meanwhile, Lucknow zoo

authorities are also alert. The zoo director said that as far as the diet of the inmates is concerned, they are only given boiled eggs. "We do not give chicken to the animals. It is sick that chicken soup is served," he said.

Directions have been issued that if any bird is found dead, it should be reported to authorities concerned.

He said the complex was established in the 18th century by Nawab Nasiruddin Haider, the then Nawab of Awadh, as a mango orchard.

"At that time, it was known as Banarasi Bagh. Even today, in the colloquial language, locals call it Banarasi Bagh. As the evening of Awadh used to be famous, a baradari was built which is still situated in the middle of the zoo with all its grandeur. It has also been seen in many films," he said.

Singh said that after the Nawabs, it remained a favourite place of the British. "From 1921 to 1926, as

many as 26 buildings were Singh recalled.

constructed. At that time, the cost of those constructions was Rs 2,08,800. The main gate was constructed in 1936 and it was named 'Sir Ludovic Porter Gate'. A committee was formed for its management and the then commissioner of Lucknow was its chairman. Sheikh Maqbool Hussain was made the first secretary of this committee," Singh said.

He said that in 1950, in place of the above-named committee, an advisory committee was formed under the Public Health department and the director of Medicine and Health was made its administrator. The CII, along with the department of Agriculture, on Thursday hosted an interactive session on Agri-infra-structure fund. Addressing the session, Agriculture Minister Surya Pratap Shahi said that 30-35% of farm produce is wasted owing to lack of facilities to store, process, pack and

transport it timely.

Therefore, he said there is a need to build post-harvest assets and infrastructure to minimise this wastage. The minister said that at the state level, the progress would be personally monitored by the chief secretary in close coordination with the banks. He further elaborated that FPOs, start-ups and agri-service providers can benefit from the scheme and set up facilities for grading, cleaning, processing etc which would enable growers to penetrate consumer markets efficiently. "Less wastage will also boost exports," he said.

He pointed out that despite being a low-cost rice manufacturer, India is not able to export as much as other leading rice exporting countries. He invited the industry to invest and reap the benefits of this scheme and stated that the state is looking at more than Rs 10,000 crore worth of investments against this fund in the next five years

Speaking at the session, Additional Chief Secretary, Agriculture, Devesh Chaturvedi pointed out that post-harvest infrastructure is crucial, especially for horticulture produce, wherein there exists a gap of 80-90% as per

"Hence, there is a need to develop more ripening chambers, cold-storages, sortinggrading units as well as godowns," he said.

He said that of the Rs one

fund, the state has been allocated Rs 12,831 crore. He also urged the Central government to increase the unit cost of the scheme to make it more attractive for investors. He added that the work on an FPO dashboard is underway and should be launched in two to three weeks.

He said people who were above the age of 50 will be vaccinated in the third phase especially who were suffering from cancer, diabetes, high blood pressure, kidney and liver diseases etc. He said for this category there shall be a website and portal for registration. He said people who were unable to get themselves registered can submit their details at the Health department from where the official and worker will be nominated. He said people will get an sms on their mobile phones informing them about the name of the vaccination centre, date and time the vaccination will be done. He said it was important to understand that after the first dose of vaccine the second dose was mandatory and the details of the second vaccination will also be sent on the mobile phone. 

Thousands likely to lose houses on proposed route

he Kerala Government's decision on Wednesday to meet half the project cost of Rs 2,815 crore in the construction of Angamali- Erumeli Sabari Rail Route has stirred up a hornet's nest in the region through which the track is to be laid. Thousands of residents staying along the route of the proposed track would lose their dwelling places and fertile farms once the Indian Railways resume the land acquiring process. What is disturbing the Railway authorities in Kerala is that the majority of the people who would be displaced because of the project belong to the minority communities.

The Pinarayi Vijayan-led Kerala Government on Wednesday had declared that it would meet half the cost of Rs 2,815 crore required for the 111 km long railway line from Angamali to Erumeli to faciliate pilgrimage to the holy shrine

The legendary Dr E Sreedharan, India's Metro Man, sounded caution about the Sabari Rail project. The Kerala Government has suddenly raked up this project only to get political gains for the

next election. This railway line will be of threats and coercion to acquire land for no use to Kerala or to the Sabarimala pilgrims. On the other hand, it will dislocate many people and cause severe environmental damage to the green, beautiful hill ranges." Dr Sreedharan told The Pioneer on Thursday.

He said that automatic signalling can be introduced on the Trivandrum-Mangalore section and the line capacity increased to run many commuted trains at half the cost meant for the project. "This will reduce the road congestion and road accidents," said Dr reedharan.

He said the lop-sided policies of the Kerala Government has resulted in the stagnation of growth in the State. "A more urgent railway link is the extension of Trissur-Guruvayoor line to Thirunavaya, (a project sanctioned about 14 years back) which will reduce the running time of trains between Ernakulam and Kozhikode by at least one hour and the severe congestion at Shornur junction too will be avoided," he said.

There is widespread complaint against the Centre and Indian Railways for using high handed measures like

the seven kilometre stretch which has been built as part of the project. "This is a move to displace the population belonging to the minority communities from places like Perumbayoor, Kothamangalam up to Erumeli. The question where we would go from the places where we have been living for decades remains unanswered. The Kerala Government had expressed its helpless ness in acquiring land for the construc-tion of National Highway in North Kerala and the Centre was forced to shelve its plan to build a six-lane track, said P M Basheer, former councillor of Perumbavoor Municipal Council.

Though the decision to part finance the project has been taken by the Pinarayi Vijayan Government, legal experts are of the view that land acquisition process would not be easy. "The Modi Government itself has amended the land acquisition laws and the Railways would find the process tough. Andhra Pradesh intermediate board to implement 1:40 teacher-student ratio

Education (BIE), the regulator of the crucial two-year intermediate course in Andhra Pradesh, will implement a teacher-student ratio of 1:40 from the next academic year, 2021-22, an official said on Thursday.

However, for the current 2020-21 academic year, obeying the Andhra High Court ruling, BIE will allow a maximum number of 88 students per classroom.

'Yes, definitely we will reduce it to 40. Whatever studies the High Court has directed us to do, we will conduct them," BIE secretary V. Ramakrishna told IANS.

The BIE envisioned restricting the number of students in a classroom to 40, adhering to international standards of the teacher-student ratio, considering the endless number of students corporate colleges were cramming into classrooms.

However, the court allowed 88 students per classroom for this academic year.

Ramakrishna himself is clueless about who recommended this 88 ratio earlier, which was existing as a government order even before the court recommended it.

The state government has chosen not to challenge the High Court ruling in the Supreme Court as students and parents are eager to start the academc year after the time they lost due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"We cannot make the students keep on waiting. Already the academic year is almost over, they are putting a lot of pressure on us to open colleges. Even the managements want colleges to be opened, they have admitted students and collected fees," observed Ramakrishna. In normal times, intermediate examinations get over by February end. To make up for the lost time, the BIE will extend the current academic year till April and has also slashed some syllabus for the first and second vear intermediate courses, in synch with the CBSE.

Syllabus reduction was coordinated with the CBSE so as not to put the state students at a disadvantage when they appear for national competitive examinations such as IIT, AIIMS and others. Ramakrishna, a 2009 batch Indian Revenue Service (IRS) officer

Amaravati: The Board of Intermediate has also clipped the wings of several corporate colleges over conducting their own admission tests.

"The admissions should be made based on the SSC (Xth standard) pass or equivalency obtained in the qualifying examination. They should not conduct any test for admission. All the principals are instructed to take measures to provide full security to girl students and also follow the instructions issued for prevention of suicide deaths strictly," observed the BIE secretary.

Likewise, intermediate colleges have also been restricted from admitting students in the second year who have completed their first year in Telangana intermediate colleges.

'The curriculum of the syllabus is different in both the states. If any student is interested to study in Andhra, they should take admission into first vear only," he said.

Similarly, college principals have been instructed to take the BIE's permission before admitting students who studied in the Xth standard from other boards. "We are doing this to root out students coming for intermediate admissions who completed their school education from some fake boards," said Ramakrishna.

However, there would be no issue for students coming from recognized boards such as ICSE or CBSE.

For transparency, during the period of admissions lasting from January 7 to 17, the board has ordered all the college managements to prominently display the number of class sections the BIE has permitted in each and every individual college. Every college must also display the number of seats filled up in each section and the number of seats still available for admission on a daily basis. If any college wishes to increase its number of classroom sections, it has to take permission from the BIE, a move aimed at cracking down on profiteering colleges which have crammed students into classrooms without even proper infrastructure.

Asbestos sheds as classrooms, premises sans fire safety certificates, mind numbing advertising blitz, admission hunting, compelling teaching staff to market colleges, overcrowded classrooms and other transgressions will hopefully be a thing of the past.

PNB Bank fraud master-mind Nirav Modi's sister Purvi Modi, alias Purvi Mehta, and her husband Maiank Mehta have turned approver in the case and also agreed to assist the authorities in realising and repatriating various assets in India and abroad worth ₹579 crore to the Government of India. These assets are in Purvi Modi's name or in the names of companies

"They filed an application before the Special (PMLA) Court, Mumbai for allowing them to seek pardon under Section 306 and 307 of Criminal Procedure Code and undertook to make true and full disclosure of the circumstances and events without concealing any evidence and provide complete documents. Purvi Modi has also agreed to assist in realising and repatriating various assets in India and abroad totaling to ₹579 crore to the Government of India," the ED said in a statement.

These assets include one residential flat in (Breach Candy) Bhulabhai Desai Road, Mumbai worth ₹19.5 crores, two flats in Central Park South, New York, NY in the name of a Trust worth US\$ 4,995,000 (Equivalent to ₹36.52 crore),



one unit at Central Park South New York, NY in the name of a Trust worth US\$ 25,000,000 (Equivalent to ₹182.82 crores) and a Bank Account in Switzerland in the name of Purvi Deepak Modi with a balance of CHF 20,201,500.00 (Equivalent to ₹168.08 crores) and another bank account in Switzerland whose beneficial owner is Purvi Modi and it has a balance of CHF 13,009,200.00 (equivalent to ₹108.23 crore). Other assets are a flat at Marylebone Road, London, NW15PL, UK. Worth GBP 6,250,000 (equivalent to 62.1 crores), a bank account in Syndicate Bank, Nariman Point, Mumbai in the name of Purvi Modi with a balance of

₹1.96 crores. Prosecution Complaints (chargesheets) were filed by ED before the Special PMLA Court against Purvi Modi, Maiank Mehta and others in the Nirav Modi Bank Fraud

case, the ED said. 'Investigation under PMLA revealed that Purvi Modi has more than a dozen bank accounts and has ownership of various companies/Trusts abroad. Both of the accused stated that the funds channelised through their accounts were belonging to Nirav Modi and on Nirav Modi's insistence, it

The Special Court has

allowed for grant of pardon under Sections 306 and 307 of Cr.P.C., on condition of making full and true disclosure and further allowed that the accused shall be marked as approver in this case. The court further directed that 'the applicant-accused shall appear before the Court by returning to India, for which purpose the complainant-prosecution shall facilitate the approach of accused at earliest, and shall take suitable steps accordingly. NIA conducts searches in J&K, Punjab in narco-terror case

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Thursday conducted searches at six locations, five in Jammu district and one in Tarn-Taran district of Punjab, in connection with investigation of a narco-terror module related to seizure of about 61 kg heroin along with arms and ammunitions on September 20 last year at the international border at Arnia,

The searches were conducted at the residences of six accused persons- Jasraj Singh, Sham Lal, Bishan Dass, Ajeet Kumar, Gurbaksh Singh and Gurpartap Singh.

These accused persons were arrested for hatching a criminal conspiracy for carrying out anti-national and unlawful activities, and to help the terrorist organisations by collecting funds and channelizing the proceeds of drugs for furthering the activities of such terrorist organisations like Babbar Khalsa International (BKI)," the NIA said in a statement.

Gurpratap Singh of Tarn-Taran district of Punjab is the kingpin of this module. In the second week of September, 2020, Gurpratap Singh had received 10 kg heroin from Pakistan-based handlers through his associates. The consignment in the case was also intended to be received

Court sentences ISIS terrorist to 7-year rigorous imprisonment

The NIA Special Court here 1 on Thursday sentenced an accused and ÍSIS terrorist Shajahan VK of Kannur, Kerala to seven years rigorous imprisonment (RI) and fine of ₹73,000 for the offences under section Indian Penal Code (IPC) Sections relating to criminal conspiracy, cheating, forgery, criminal breach of trust and provisions of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act.

The ISIS-Kannur Case was initially registered by the Special Cell of the Delhi Police as FIR No. 44/2017 dated September 5, 2017 under various IPC Sections and provisions of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act and the Passport Act.

July 1, 2017 at IGI Airport here on deportation by the Turkish authorities. Another accused Mohd. Mustafa was arrested from Chennai, on July 12, 2017. Subsequently, the NIA took over investigation of the case on September 5, 2017.

"Shajahan Velluva Kandy is a member of proscribed international terrorist organisation ISIS. He had associated himself with ISIS with the intention to further its activities. In October, 2016, he along with his family had gone to Turkey via Malaysia with an intention to go to Syria to fight on behalf of ISIS," the NIA said in a statement.

However, while crossing the Turkey-Syria border, he along with his family were authorities and deported back to India on February 1, 2017. In his desperation to serve the cause of ISIS, he procured an Indian passport again on the basis of forged documents and in April 2017, he travelled to Turkey via Thailand and was apprehended again while attempting to cross to Syria. Thereafter, he was again deported to India on July 1, 2017 and was arrested, the agency said.

After investigation, the NIA had filed a charge sheet on December 23, 2017 against two accused persons--Shajahan Velluva Kandy and Mohd. Mustafa.

Continued spike in infection in 4 States might negate overall gains in Covid fight

JEE Advanced on July 3, 75% eligibility criterion scrapped

Union Education Minister Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank' on Thursday announced the Joint Entrance Examination (JEE) Advanced 2021 examination date and the eligibility criteria for admission into Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs). The exam will be held on July 3 while the 75 percent eligibility criteria will not be applicable this year.

"JEE-Advanced will be conducted by IIT Kharagpur on July 3. The relaxation in admission requirement of 75 per cent marks in class 12 which was announced last year in view of COVID-19 pandemic will be offered this year as well," Nishank said. The exam will be conducted by IIT Kharagpur.

For admissions to IITs, apart from qualifying the Joint

Entrance Examination (JEE)-Advanced, the candidates are required to secure either minimum 75 per cent marks in class 12 board exams or rank among the top 20 percentile in their qualifying examinations.

The JEE Advanced 2021 would be attempted by those who had qualified the JEE Mains last year but could not appear for the next exams due to the coronavirus pandemic. As a one-time exception, the National Testing Agency (NTA) has allowed the latter BTech candidates to directly appear for JEE Advanced 2021.

Ahead of Pokhriyal's announcement, candidates have been requesting to scrap 75 percent criteria for JEE Mains, grant multiple attempts for JEE Advanced 2021.

The JEE Main 2021 will be conducted four times this year,

India's improved air quality may prevent 7% of pregnancy losses in South Asian regions

m targets}$ India's air quality may prevent 7 per cent of pregnancy losses in the region, according to a study published

gested that pregnant women in India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, who are exposed to poor air quality, may be at higher risk of stillbirths and miscarriages. It said that an estimated 349,681 pregnancy losses per year in south Asia were associated with exposure to PM2.5 concentrations that exceeded India's air quality standard (more than 40 ig/m or micrograms per cubic meter air), accounting for 7 per cent of annual pregnancy loss in the

In the study, the researchers included 34,197 women who had lost a pregnancy, including 27,480 mis-carriages and 6,717 stillbirths, which were compared to livebirth controls.

Of the pregnancy loss cases, 77 per cent were from India, 12 per cent from Pakistan, and 11 per cent from Bangladesh. Pregnancy loss associated

with air pollution was more common in the northern plains region in India and Pakistan.

Previous studies have sug-gested a link between air pollution and pregnancy loss in other regions, but this is the first study, published in Lancet Planetary Health, to quantify the burden in south Asia.

South Asia has the highest burden of pregnancy loss globally and is one of the most PM2.5 polluted regions in the world.

"Our findings suggest that poor air quality could be responsible for a considerable burden of pregnancy loss in the region, providing further justification for urgent action to tackle dangerous levels of pollution," said lead study author Dr Tao Xue from Peking University in China.

To carry out their analysis, the authors combined data from household surveys on health from 1998-2016 (from women who reported at least one pregnancy loss and one or more livebirths) and estimated exposure to PM2.5 during pregnancy through combining satellite with atmospheric modelling outputs.
The researchers, however

noted several limitations of their study. In the surveys, they were not able to distinguish between natural pregnancy loss and abortions and there was under-reporting of pregnancy losses because of stigma or ignoring very early pregnancy losses.

Over 50 docs, PETA sound Covid alert on Jallikattu

Chennai: Over 50 doctors and people for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) India appealed to the Tamil Nadu G overnment to immediately withdraw the permission for the annual bull taming event -- 'Jallikattu'.

Jallikattu is typically celebrated in the southern state of Tamil Nadu as part of the Pongal celebrations, on the Mattu Pongal day, which occurs annually during this month. Over 50 doctors have signed a letter to the Tamil Nadu Chief Minister,

Edappadi Palaniswami and Health Minister C. Vijayabaskar urging them to immediately withdraw the permission, which the doctors warn poses a grave risk to the general public because of the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic. The appeal is in response to the

Tamil Nadu government's recent order allowing the conduct of Jallikattu events with hundreds of people present, People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) India has also asked the state government to stop Jallikattu events. The letter signed by 50 doctors,

states, "To prevent the rapid spread of Covid-19 and to protect public health, as well as to ease the pressure on the healthcare professionals, non-essential activities such as Jallikattu events, which lead to unnecessary gatherings of people, must not be allowed."

The letter also states, "Since the Tamil Nadu government legalised Jallikattu in 2017, at least 22 bulls and 57 humans have reportedly died, while 3,632 humans were injured in events organised throughout the state" They also warn that even more

human deaths will likely occur because of Covid-19 if Jallikattu events are allowed to be organised in the state. PETA India Research Associate Dr.

Ankita Pandey further cautions that more

people are expected to die this year, not

only because of Jallikattu itself but also because of Covid-19. "If Jallikattu events are not stopped, if huge crowds gather to torment bulls, society will be torment-ed, too," she urges the TN government

The healthcare professionals also forewarn that the measures of Covid-19 - negative certificates for participants and thermal screening of spectators as preconditions for allowing Jallikattu are not enough to stop the spread of the virus. And their letter further says, during

the incubation period, a contagious person may be tested too early and produce a false-negative result and not everyone with Covid-19 develops or sustains

This event is associated with strength and courage and honours the bull owners. However, it is undoubtedly cruel to animals. In 2014, Jallikattu was banned by the Supreme Court. But the ban on Jallikattu, considered

an important authentic tradition and inalienable part of rural society's culture, had spurred widespread protests in Tamil Nadu. After several years of continuous protests, in 2017 the Tamil Nadu government passed the Jallikattu Bill bringing into effect the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (Tamil Nadu Amendment) Act, 2017, thereby allowing the conduct of Jallikattu.

As early as 2010 itself, an investigation led by the Animal Welfare Board of India concluded that "Jallikattu is inherently cruel to animals". Animal welfare organisations such as the Federation of Indian Animal Protection Organisations (FIAPO) and PETA India have protested against the practice since then.

However, pro-Jallikattu activists countering the animal activists argue that Jallikattu had been known to be practiced during the Tamil classical period (400-100 BC) and inalienable part of the rural Tamil society's culture.

American shame

The violence at the US Capitol by Trump's supporters is a stunning rebuke of American exceptionalism



lectoral and political violence before and after elections is not a surprise in India and many other parts of the world. But the incidents that took place at the US Capitol in Washington DC where the US Houses of Congress sit and meet, and were sitting to certify the results of the presidential election that took place in the US in November — are shameful since America has for the past two centuries been seen as a promoter and, more recently, a protector of democracy across the world. Egged on by the sitting US President, Donald Trump, the loser of the election, his supporters gave

a shameful display of themselves and the US to the rest of the world. Not just Trump, many of those who owe their political careers to him encouraged the supporters and, while they expressed their shock and dismay at the end result, this was nothing short of an attempted coup. Part of the fault lies in the convoluted American election system where different States are given the Electoral College votes based on the weightages decided decades ago. Trump, who won the election in 2016 on this very basis despite losing the popular vote, claims that in several States his votes were "lost" or "extra votes" were found by his Democratic opponents, and the US State of Georgia has been in his crosshairs because he lost the election there by a narrow margin. Trump, who has made a career out of being a "winner", is bitter with his loss in Georgia and some other States, particularly in Arizona and Pennsylvania, and his claims of fraud have stoked his core supporters, who are almost always racist white vigilante organisations who believe in the conspiracy theories that formed the core of the militias that marched into Washington.

The US needs to move to a simpler and easier presidential election system where the person, a man or woman, who wins the plurality of the votes wins. Trump lost to Biden by over seven million votes, that is 4.4 per cent of the ballots cast. While not a landslide, it is a comprehensive victory margin in any book. Trump does not like losing, but he also lost the plurality of votes in 2016. The rest of the democratic world, which largely follows the first-past-the-post system that has its own flaws, cannot understand how a voter in the sparsely populated agrarian state of Wyoming has his or her vote count as almost double that of a voter in the most populated State of California. The US electoral system is broken and it needs to be fixed urgently, particularly as the country faces off against a rival across the Pacific Ocean once again. A rival that exports autocracy; a rival that exports tyranny. If the world is to trust the US to stand up to China, if India is to trust the US to stand up to China, we need the US to fix its electoral flaws. Fixing the deep divisions in American society, however, is something that might take much longer. The US is clearly a deeply divided nation, much like many other democracies, including ours. Fixing these problems will require exceptional leadership and a multi-partisan approach. As Joseph Robinette Biden Junior becomes the 46th President of the US on January 20, he has an incredibly difficult task in the shape of uniting his country, in front of him.

Inaction is worse than delayed action and busts holes in CM Yogi Adityanath's claims of deterrent activity



oon after the brutal Hathras gang rape, which was nothing but a manifestation of caste vengeance, Uttar Pradesh (UP) Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath had sought to overturn his State's dismal reputation on crimes against women as a political power tool. He had publicly warned that "those harming mothers and daughters would get such punishment that it would set an example for the future". Sadly, the only example that UP continues to set is in its series of rapemurders, political protectionism of the perpetrators, tardy and lax police investigation and a societal acceptance of excesses as unfortunate and unavoidable. It continues to legitimise the offenders by administrative inaction. What else explains the bestiality in Badaun with-

in months of Hathras? What explains the lack of outrage over the death of an aanganwadi worker who went to a temple and where a mahant and his henchmen subjected her to indignity and torture like the 2012 Nirbhaya case, brutalising her with iron rods? What sense does it make to protect the honour of women by waging a war against interfaith marriages when the authorities can't guarantee their basic safety from men they would rather not touch, given their political stock and sensitivities? Predictably, there has been the tokenism of justice being dispensed by the suspension of an SHO and arrest of two of the three accused. But that doesn't quite make up for the police lapse in registering a missing person's complaint despite the woman's family running from pillar to post to be heard. That predictability of punishing the police post facto is worse than a cover-up. And a similar laxity in the Badaun case shows why no lessons have been learnt from the rape and murder of a Dalit girl in Hathras. When nobody questions the police or even holds it to account for forcibly cremating the girl's body, denying her parents and family that right and dignity, and ostensibly wishing away the taint on her upper caste rapists, then what does one expect? When the police, as an unabashed tool of State power, seemingly condones the crime by not following the rule of law and processes as it is mandated to do, when it abandons the victimised; there is legal sanction of a lopsided thinking that emboldens and encourages offenders.

So a Chief Minister, who has been thriving on casteist and communal politics just like his predecessors, only ends up mimicking an administrative drill routinised by successive regimes: A drill that privileges their casteist constituencies at the expense of others and mocks all claims of ushering in a rule of law. Hence the repetitive excesses on Dalits, women and minorities continue to spiral in UP, making it the worst State in the country for anybody vulnerable. As it is, the Centre had confirmed in the Lok Sabha in 2019 that UP accounted for 43 per cent of the total cases registered for harassment against minorities and Dalits. It also tops the rape chart and, according to the National Crime Records Bureau, reported the most cases of violence against women in 2019. The best that the UP Police has done, and continues to do, is to impose Section 144 to can every trouble, debate and dissent, like it did by stopping the Opposition leaders from reaching Hathras to meet the girl's family and booking journalists who were on a fact-finding mission, accusing them of intending to foment unrest. UP's non-action has many precedents, the most recent being the Unnao rape case in which a girl was gangraped in June 2017 but her rapist, BJP legislator Kuldeep Singh Sengar, was convicted only in December 2019. Or, take the recent encounter killing of underworld don Vikas Dubey that snuffed out all information we could have had on the politico-criminal nexus in the State. Sadly, the UP Police, which at one time had been a professional force, now seems co-opted by the executive. Despite all the recommendations on police reforms and the Supreme Court's directive to set up a police complaint authority at the State and district levels, compliance is a far cry.

Ties for free data flow must

A world crawling out of global devastation needs multicountry data alliances to find solutions to current and future pandemics and cybersecurity

The new decade brings with it unresolved issues of the past and risks and opportunities in the days to come. Did you know that China is the world's largest storehouse of cross-border data while also being the single-largest exporter of what is being termed as the most precious resource or commodity on the planet? If data is the gold reserve of the new decade, it is time to understand the complexities around data silos and a regulated Earth. The pandemic-ravaged year and a "sheltered at home" humanity saw some key rulings and policy documents on data regulations, pinned across strategic geographies, which possibly hold the key to a new world order. In October 2020, China came up with a Personal Information Protection Law (PIPL) draft to provide a structured privacy and data governance regime. This draft, besides stating the obvious about protecting the privacy of Chinese citizens while providing for technological innovation and growth, has significant insights on China's outlook towards the global digital economy. It raises key points related to national security vis-a-vis the world economy, banning of overseas data controllers and processors, and using Chinese companies or investments as economic attaches to international sovereigns, thereby threatening them with reciprocal actions in case of adverse decisions or threats. The PIPL has borrowed heavily from the European Union (EU) General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and has provisions which give Beijing digital policing reach beyond its physical boundaries. It also allows China to strictly control data flows from its territory, with possible sanctions and bans against blacklisted entities. The PIPL does not have the provision for an independent data protection authority, with the Cyberspace Administration of China being the enforcer and policymaker on data regulations. Meanwhile, along similar timelines a European top court ruling has junked the provisions of the Privacy Shield, a legal framework which guided data flows between the US and EU countries. The landmark ruling will have substantial ramifications for thousands of companies currently sharing millions of dollars worth of data with the US. Meanwhile, the EU has also released a first set of measures under the Data Governance Act to "foster the availability of data for use by increasing trust in data intermediaries and by strengthening data-sharing mechanisms." This Act has ambiguous guidelines and references on international data transfers, access requests from third countries and provisions to control non-personal data. All of these have edges to cut through the existing fabric of global trade and cooperation.

India introduced a Bill in Parliament for protecting the data privacy of its citizens in 2019, called the Personal Data Protection Bill. Its provisions are still being deliberated by lawmakers. Meanwhile, in the last week of 2020, it also came up with a second draft on the regulation of non-personal data which, according to the committee which prepared the draft, will lead to "India becoming the first country to put in place a simple, comprehensive framework for non-personal data." The underlying principle is to generate economic value through processing and use of data. When we look at the big picture we find some key phrases such as "data sovereignty", "economic value of data", "data protectionism" and "data diplomacy" emerging as commonalities among all regional regulations. It would be naïve to assume that each region in its respective bubble, can derive and create significant value out of the evergreen commodity called data, unless it is helped by real world multinational company investments. The beauty of a digital market economy is that it is both a receiver and a generator of the commodity. Any data regulation applicable for a country/geography will find resonance only if it is interoperable with comparative policies in other economically strategic regions. Let us add another dimension of the emerging technology-led promise of greater well-being in the form of 5G, Artificial Intelligence (AI), the Internet of Things (IoT) and cloud computing, and cyberspace becomes a complex multilayered chessboard. Every player has equal opportunity and risk, with every

To stay in the game, one needs to build alliances or corridors of faith with other players. For instance, the incoming Biden Administration in the US can take the lead in building mutually beneficial tunnels of free data flows between like-minded countries. It may be significant to mention here that China will increasingly use this tactic in its Belt and Road Initiative partner countries, cushioned by large State funded investments and sponsored companies. What is interesting is that each player is learning from the other, while sharpening the next move. Make no mistake that growing concerns/regulations on data flows have a significant impact on the power cords of a "Digi global world order" running on innovations in fintech and technology-aided healthcare, while looking at collective issues of tackling pandemics, climate change and sustainable living. A world crawling out of global devastation needs multicountry data alliances to find solutions to current and future pandemics. It needs to collectively find regulatory principles for Al and emerging technology, including ensuring a safe cyberspace. Any damage to the fragile ecosystem will lead to additional layers of regulatory complexities, which will not benefit anyone

A doubtful future

Will the overambitious Xi be able to steer China through its present crisis or would he cause the CCP's demise? It will all depend on how he reacts to global isolation and discord within the party

n an unprecedented move, China recently removed the military from the Government's control and expanded the powers of its Central Military Commission (CMC), headed by Xi Jinping. The CMC will now be able to mobilise military and civilian resources in defence of national interest, both at home and abroad. The new Defence Law has removed policy and decision-making from the State Council (the Cabinet), thus consolidating power in the hands of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) and Xi. It is aimed at strengthening the military leadership under Xi, providing it with the legal grounds to respond to the challenges of accelerating confrontations in which China is embroiled with its neighbours and the US. It empowers Xi to deal firmly with situations that could harm the communist regime at home and abroad. The CMC will now be responsible for the formulation of the National Defence Policy removing it from the purview of the State Council

Has Xi realised that his move to take on India, that was aimed at sending a strategic message, has backfired? Coupled with this, many other decisions taken by Xi in 2020 are haunting him. There is increased dissension and threat to the regime, spurring a debate on the fallout of these follies on the future of Xi and the CCP. It being a single-party State, the CCP is synonymous with China.

Empirically speaking, no totalitarian party so far has ruled for more than 74 years. The CCP has already entered the 72nd year. It relies on three "Ps" to maintain its iron grip on China. Personnel control, Propaganda and the People's Liberation Army (PLA). In his effort to consolidate the rule of the CCP and its ideology, Xi has assumed firm control of the three "Ps", sidelining the "collective leadership" propounded by his predecessors and thus becoming a virtual dictator.

In the process, is the CCP yielding control to Xi and being undermined? In the absence of collective leadership Xi is surrounded by a coterie which, instead of giving rational advice, generally accedes to the Paramount Leader's thinking? In his urge to become the most powerful Chinese leader and be equated with Chairman Mao Zedong, he has taken a few decisions which are proving counteructive leading to dissension the party. The latter is fuelled more by external forces determined to overthrow the communist regime by taking advantage of growing economic disparity and growth of two distinct classes in China. Plus, the expansionist ideology of the CCP followed aggressively by Xi is a major bone of contention at the glob-

When the communists under Mao seized control of mainland China in 1949, it aggressively distanced itself from its feudal past. However, under Xi there has been a concerted attempt to merge the past with the present. In order to combat the dissent against the CCP, he has projected the party as the inheritor of the great Chinese empire of the past. Despite being born with a "Red spoon", Xi was not parachuted to the top and had to work his way up. His family background and the subsequent struggle to rise to power has made him ambitious, adamant and a committed communist.

Xi took over the reins of the party in 2012 when it was in a disarray. In the process of consolidating his position and hold over the party, he brought an end to the "collective leadership" system and became all powerful by grabbing all the three powerful posts in China, including a resolution passed for abolishing the President's term limit, enabling him to rule indefinitely. This act has not gone down



well with young and aspiring leaders within the CCP who see a dark future for themselves and no chance of rising to the top. Like all authoritarian leaders Xi, too, has a fair number of dissidents and

domestic opponents.

During his consolidation of power, among other things, he has relied a lot on emphasis on ideology and nationalism. To fulfil his ambition he announced a roadmap, that is often referred to as the 'China Dream.' The underlying idea behind the China Dream is to restore the former Middle Kingdom's glory and regain Chinese supremacy through expansionism. It is also aimed at minimising internal dissension through national unity. Xi's ambition is to make China not only stronger but assertive and the world's number one power by 2050.

China, under Xi, has witnessed subership role in world affairs. At the same time his repressive policies in Tibet, Xinjiang and Hong Kong as well as excessive curbs on academic freedom, issues like ecological degradation and the widening wealth disparities at home, a protracted trade war with the US and aggressive behaviour with its neighbours have posed serious challenges for the party and Xi, both domestically and globally.

The policy of forced population transfers is also proving counterproductive due to fewer livelihood opportunities in the new habitats, causing widespread dissatisfaction. The income disparity between the rural and urban population also poses a serious threat. His attempts to introduce a legal framework in China has drawn flak from the hardliners within the party who consider the CCP to be above any law.

After the outbreak of COVID-19, for which many nations blame China, Xi has been mired in controversies due to various decisions taken by him that have led to the weakening of China globally and the CCP domestically. To combat the global anger against China, Xi embarked on an aggressive policy to silence his critics and dissenters at home. In the process, he committed the Himalayan blunder of employing the PLA to "teach" India, its potential competitor, "a lesson."

By doing so, he wanted to convey a strategic message but the resolute response of India thwarted all his hopes and put him on the back foot, severely denting his image at home and abroad. His simultaneous aggressive moves in the South China Sea (SCS), the East China Sea (ECS), Hong Kong and Taiwan, too, drew stiff resistance. There was a global outcry to halt the expansionist designs of the CCP turning it into a battle of ideologies: Communism versus democracy: authoritarian versus the Free World. The "Wolf Warrior diplomacy" and the "Three Warfares" strategy of Xi not only proved counterproductiv Chinese isolation and increased abhorrence for the CCP.

His adventurism in the seas and on the borders with India resulted in a unified alliance by the West and by nations in the neighbourhood against China. The QUAD is fast turning into a military alliance from just a formal grouping. Japan is strengthening its armed forces. Australia has become more belligerent vis-a-vis China. India has signed pacts to augment defence and economic engagement with Vietnam and Japan; both victims of Chinese aggression. Taiwan is determined to face the mainland hegemony and not to succumb to its threats. Taiwan's determination is buoyed by increased support from the US. The UK, US and France have begun aggressive patrolling of the SCS. All eyes are now on US Presidentelect Joe Biden and his China policy, which is expected to be tougher and more damaging than his predecessor Donald Trump's. But for a handful of friends in Turkey and Pakistan, China under Xi faces total global isolation.

Even at home, things do not appear

to be better due to growing unemploy ment, loss of business, relocation of global companies, the fallout of control over Hong Kong, disruption and realignment of global supply chains, food shortage, rowing income disparities, cruelties of the PLA and suppression of dissent with an iron hand. These are all adding to the woes

The implementation of the recentlyintroduced Civil Code, an effort to introduce the Rule of Law, would be another litmus test of Xi's hold over the CCP. There is bound to be conflict of interest in its successful implementation and maintenance of the supremacy of the CCP. Growing demands for reforms and resistance by the ethnic communities of the autonomous regions to forced "Sinofication" is a tinderbox that may lead to the demise of the CPC and China's balkanisation as and

China is at a unique point in history. The CCP has presided over the country for more than seven decades and is close to the shelf life of contemporary totalitarian parties.

Will the all-powerful and overambitious Xi be able to steer China through its present crisis or would he cause the demise of the CCP? It will, to a large extent depend on how he reacts to China's global isolation and growing dissension within the

Former professor Cai Xia, who has been recently expelled from the elite Central Party School, has criticised Xi and said that under his regime the CCP is not a force for the progress of China. She said there was widespread opposition within the party but few dared to speak out as they were afraid of political retaliation in the form of internal party discipline and corruption charges. The China watchers are keeping their fingers crossed.

Democracy returns to J&K through the grassroots

¬he Indian Parliament took a historic decision through the 73rd and 74th Constitutional Amendment Acts. These Acts gave the Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) and Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) a constitutional status in India. According to the Annual Report (2019-20) of the Ministry of Panchayati Rai, there are more than 2.76 lakh panchayats in the country spearheading the cause of democracy. The number of women representatives elected to these institutions is a whopping 13.79 lakh. It is the largest number of elected women

representatives in the world. Both the amendment Acts provide

reservation for women to make them an important stakeholder in the process of decision-making at the ground level. The PRIs and ULBs are doing significant work across the country. The ongoing pandemic has shown that these are effective institutions, especially for the delivery of public services till the last mile.

Similar bodies, called the District Development Councils (DDCs), have been functioning in Jammu and Kashmir (J&K). The recent DDC elections signalled the resumption of democratic processes in the newlyformed Union Territory (UT).

The DDCs are contributing to the strengthening of grassroots democracy in the region. These institutions are working towards the cherished ideals of the Constitution. J&K has been under the scanner of various countries and international organisations since the abrogation of Article 370 and 35-A of the Constitution. But the DDC elections were a testimony to the commitment of the nation to the peace, prosperity and progress of J&K. It also reflects the eagerness of the Central

Government to involve and engage the people of J&K in the decision-making process. The Union Government is ready to pass the baton to the people of the UT so that they can provide a direction to the development process.

The Central Government's decision to appoint former Union Minister Manoj Sinha as its representative in the UT is owing to his ability to reach out to people and address their genuine grievances. His long political career and administrative acumen came in handy to restart political activities in

Even the political parties which were the stakeholders in the election process vouch for the credibility of the DDC polls. These political parties belong to a spectrum of ideologies, from the BJP to the People's Alliance for Gupkar Declaration. Despite security concerns, all the political parties were provided a fair chance to campaign, interact and engage with their voter base. Although, the Gupkar Alliance won big and bagged 110 out of the total 280 seats, the BJP remained the single-largest party with 75 seats.

This was contrary to all expectations. The elections saw a 51 per cent voter turnout which was overwhelming considering the harsh weather conditions in the UT at this time of the year, juxtaposed with the pandemic scare as well. It showed that the citizens were also willing and enthusiastic about participating in the electoral process. Such a high voter turnout also helped to break the stereotypes associated with the various political actors involved.

While the world worried about the human rights and basic civil liberties of the people of J&K, India took the constitutional way of returning democracy to the people who have suffered long enough for a multitude of reasons. Many scholars and independent observers have vouched for the credibility of these polls and compared them to the 1977 elections when the ruling Janata Party lost all but two seats of Eidgah and Handwara to Sheikh Mohammad Abdullah's National Conference.

Irrespective of the electoral scores and the bickering that is taking place now with charges of horse-trading fly-

ing thick and fast among various parties, the successful conduct of the elections and the results are a victory of the rule of law and deep democratic roots of the country. The polls buried questions regarding the restoration of democratic institutions and process-

The security forces along with the administrative mechanism need to be lauded for conducting the democratic exercise in the most transparent manner in such a tense atmosphere. The rise in the number of Independent candidates showcases the open-mindedness of the voters and the start of a new trend in the politics of the UT. A whopping 50 seats were garnered by Independent candidates in the elections. Conducting free and fair polls in J&K under the shadow of terror is a humongous task. Even a tiny mistake could have cast a black shadow over the whole exercise.

A part of the credit for this crucial exercise should be given to the present Lieutenant-Governor of J&K. This political initiative is an integral part of the three-point agenda set by him when he assumed the position. would be a chance for all stakehold-The agenda focuses on prosperity in the region, industrialisation, employment creation and eradication of anti-India activities.

These elections indicate a fresh hope in politics which will go a long way in building a sense of trust and faith between the people and the authorities.  $T^{\text{he finance ministry on}}_{\text{Thursday said the GDP}}$ estimates suggest a continued resurgence in economic activity in second half of the current fiscal and point at post-lock-down sustained V-shaped recovery.

The ministry was commenting on the first advanced estimates (AE) of the national income released by the National Statistical Office on Thursday, which projected 7.7 per cent contraction in GDP for the current fiscal year.

"The AE of 2020-21 reflect continued resurgence in economic activity in Q3 and Q4 which would enable the Indian economy to end the year with a contraction of 7.7 per cent,"

it said in a statement. The continuous quarter-

the strength of economic fundamentals of the country to sustain a post-lockdown Vshaped recovery, it added.

It further said the

movement of various high frequency indicators in recent months, points towards broad based nature of resurgence of economic activity. "The relatively more man-

ageable pandemic situation in the country as compared to advanced nations has further added momentum to the economic recovery," the ministry added.

On the demand side, it said real GDP in 2020-21 has been supported by an estimated increase in Government Consumption Expenditure by 5.8 per cent.

On the supply side, agriculture is estimated to register 4 per cent as per the provisional estimate of 2019-20.

In the manufacturing sector, electricity sector is estimated to register a growth of per cent, the data showed.

The pandemic and associated public health measures have adversely affected the contact-sensitive services sector where trade, hotels, transport and communication are estimated to contract by 21.4 per cent in 2020-21.

In a nationally televised address, Biden said that the

scenes of chaos at the Capitol do not reflect the true America.

"This is not who we are. What we are seeing is a small number of extremists dedicated to lawlessness. This is not dissent. It is disorder. It is chaos. It borders on sedition. And it must

end. Now," he said. The police, outnumbered by the protesters, had a tough time in managing the crowd on Wednesday, as hundreds of protesters breached security and entered the Capitol building, where members of the Congress were going through the process of counting and

Vice-President Mike Pence and lawmakers were evacuated to safe locations. Both the House and Senate and the entire Capitol were placed under a lockdown.

Calling on the mob to pull back and allow the work of democracy to go forward, Biden said that the words of a President matter, no matter how good or bad that president is.

"At their best, the words of a president can inspire. At their worst, they can incite," he said, calling on President Trump to go on national television, now, to fulfill his oath and defend the Constitution and demand an end to this siege.
"To storm the Capitol, to

smash windows, to occupy offices, and to threaten the safety of duly elected officials is not protest. It is insurrection. The world is watching - and like so many other Americans, I am shocked and saddened that our nation, so long a beacon of light, hope, and democracy has come to such a dark

America has endured much. And we will endure here and prevail now. The work of the moment and the work of the next four years must be the restoration of democracy and the recovery of respect for the rule of law, and the renewal of a politics that's about solving problems — not stoking the flames of hate and chaos," he

The key suspect in Pearl's slaying, Ahmed Omar Saeed Sheikh, remains in custody while his lawyer has petitioned he top court to f keeping with another court's ruling last month that ordered his release. Pearl's family and the Pakistani Government have appealed the acquittal to the Supreme Court, which resumed its hearing this week. A decision is expected before the end of the month.

Sheikh's lawyer, Mehmood A Sheikh, has been trying to get his client, who has been on death row for 18 years, freed since his acquittal. The lawyer and Sheikh are not related.

Earlier on Wednesday, thousands of angry supporters of Trump swarmed over the US Capitol, forcing lawmakers to evacuate their chambers and delaying by several hours a normally routine procedure clearing the way for Biden and Harris to be sworn in as president and vice president.

House of Representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi announced after hours of chaos around the white-columned edifice that police had secured the building.

Today, a shameful assault was made on our democracy," Pelosi said. "It was anointed at the highest level of government. It cannot, however, deter us from our responsibility to validate the election of Joe

Amidst the violence Biden said he was shocked and sad to see the US has "come to such a dark moment".

"At this hour, our democracy is under unprecedented assault. Unlike anything we've seen in modern times. An assault on the citadel of liberty, the Capitol itself. An assault on the people's representatives and the Capitol Hill police, sworn to protect them. And the public servants who work at the heart of our Republic...," he said

in an address to the nation. "Let me be very clear. The scenes of chaos at the Capitol do not reflect a true America. Do not represent who we are. What we're seeing are a small number of extremists dedicated to lawlessness. This is not dissent. It's disorder. It's chaos. It borders on sedition. And it must end now,"

Biden said. "I call on President Trump to go on national television now to fulfill his oath and defend the Constitution by demand-

ing an end to this siege," he said. Harris also demanded an end to the

assault on the US Capitol by the supporters of Trump. "I join President-elect Joe Biden in calling for the assault on the Capitol and our nation's public servants to end, and as he

said, "allow the work of democracy to go forward," Harris said in a tweet. Trump has refused to concede the election. He alleges that there was a massive voters' fraud and electoral malpractice.





There will be a growing trend to reduce food wastage as much as possible and develop recipes which can make peels delicious. The trend does not just revolve around Blissful food from waste but also cocktails and beverages using food waste, peels and ingredients like apple pulp, orange peels etc. Blissful recipes will be a big trend in 2021.

WINE TRENDS

Sonal Holland, India's only master of wine believes in the last quarter of 2020, we have finally seen some buoyancy and a pick-up in sales in the F&B industry. With sales only opening up again in end-August, the industry has been playing catch-up ever since, to try and make back the significant losses faced over the course of the year. Another big trend that will continue into the New Year is the purchase of alcohol online. Ever since the Government has allowed online sales of alcohol, consumers have gravitated towards this highly convenient - and pandemic-proof - way of purchasing their favourite beverages. Given that the excise department has seen such a significant dip in revenue this year, I see no reason why the Government won't continue to encourage online liquor sales into the New Year, and even longer.

Wine, an affordable luxury: In a year where the affluent haven't had a chance to spend on themselves as much, through

international holidays or luxury purchases, a quick and convenient way to consume luxury is by spending on premium wines. Now more than ever, wine has become a luxury that the affluent can splurge on — I see premium wine purchases continuing through the New Year, with the wealthy even looking to trade up, and splurge more than usual on their wines and other luxury beverages.

Wine in cans: With the recent introduction of wine in cans by brands like Sula and Fratelli, the Indian consumer, who is younger and not as experienced in the world of wines, will have more opportunities to try and enjoy wines in 2021. Wine in cans is a more accessible and price-sensitive way for consumers to sample the beverage, and with their introduction, the hope is that a younger, newer audience will convert to drinking wine.

Blush & rose wines: In 2021, I predict that rose still wine from regions all across the world — like French Provence, Italy, Spain and so on, will continue to rise in popularity. Rose wines are incredibly versatile, offering the lightness and freshness of a white wine, but the body and fruit of a red wine. They also pair very well with vegetarian food. One variant in the rose category that will continue to enjoy popularity in the New Year is the blushcoloured styles of Moscato wines. It's a medium-sweet wine and low in alcohol, thus allowing for easy drinking. It's got great aromatics and is especially a hit among lady drinkers. As women continue to embrace wines in 2021, options like Moscato, which are perfumed, sherbetlike and not very expensive, will remain

aries early. Marnus played well, hopefully we go along well tomorrow," he said at the end of day's play in which 55 overs were bowled owing to a four-hour rain disruption.

Having entered the match after registering scores of 1, 0 and 8 in his last three innings, Smith's first confident shot came against India's pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah, who was nicely driven through the

In between three reprieves, Pucovski layed some impressive shots and also looked solid in defence after Mohammed Siraj had sent back the returning David Warner early.

Introduced into the attack after 13 overs in India's first bowling change, senior offspinner Ashwin tempted Pucovski into a drive and the batsman only managed an edge after losing his balance, but Pant failed

to hang on to the offering despite getting his gloves to it in the 22nd over.

Pant spilled one more chance and on that occasion the unlucky bowler was Siraj, whose fast and short delivery touched the batsman's gloves on his way to the keeper, who could not complete the task. Pant managed to take it on the second attempt, but the ball had hit the ground by then.

With luck on his side, Pucovski got to his fifty when he pulled another debutant, Navdeep Saini, through the wide mid-on region for a boundary.
Earlier, play resumed as the sun shone

brightly after a four-hour rain interruption.

Groundsmen at the Sydney Cricket Ground worked relentlessly, including using a blower to go with the super-sopper, to get the surface ready for resumption at 3pm local time.

As many as 35 overs were lost due to rain. Scheduled close of play was extended to 6.30pm with extra 30 minutes permitted to ensure minimum overs.

This was after young pacer Siraj dismissed Warner to leave Australia at 21 for one before the inclement weather stopped play barely seven overs into the first day's

The home team had batted for only 7.1 overs when play was interrupted.

Siraj sent back Warner (5) when he had the seasoned opener caught behind by Cheteshwar Pujara at first slip in the fourth over, giving India their first breakthrough before the heavens opened up.

Making a return after a long injury lay-

off, Warner showed intensity in the first few overs but got carried away as he chased a wide Siraj delivery.

Dad's memory brought tears to my eyes: Siraj

Sydney: India pacer Mohammed Siraj has revealed that his late father's memory brought tears to his eyes while the national anthem was being played ahead of the third Test against Australia which began on Thursday at the SCG.

Video and images of Siraj fighting back tears went viral on social media before the start of the play.

Siraj had lost his father on November 20, about a week after the Indian team landed in Australia and were in quarantine ahead of the limited-overs series.

The pace bowler, who was part of the squad for the Tests that were to begin only on December 17, was given the option of returning home to attend the burial of his father but decided to stay back as the entire process of going back and returning would

have involved quarantine periods.
"During the national anthem, I just remembered my father. That is why I felt a bit emotional. Dad always wanted to see me play Test cricket. If he would have been alive, he would have seen me," said Siraj after the end of the first day's play.

Former India batsmen Wasim Jaffer and Mohammad Kaif both appreciated

"Even if there's little or no crowd to cheer you on, no better motivation than playing for India. As a legend once said 'You don't play for the crowd, you play for the country," tweeted Jaffer.

BCCI formally writes to CA on relaxation of Brisbane hard quarantine

The BCCI on Thursday wrote to Cricket Australia seeking relaxation in hard quarantine protocol of Brisbane for the fourth Test to go ahead, reminding the host board that the visitors are done with the strict isolation that was agreed upon at the beginning of the tour.

It is learnt that a top BCCI executive has written to CA head Earl Eddings citing to him the Memorandum Understanding signed by

the two boards on the modalities of the tour which never had any specification on two hard quarantines in separate cities. The Brisbane Test is due to start on January 15 and the quarantine rules will restrict the players to just their hotel rooms after day's

"The discussions are still on but today BCCI has formally sent a letter seeking relaxation of hard quarantine for its players if they are to have the match in Brisbane," a senior BCCI official told *PTI*.

"The MoU that was signed never mentioned about two hard quaranhard quarantine in Sydney (practice and back to hotel room)," he added.

So what are the precise demands placed by the BCCI after addressing the grievances of its players and where exactly does Queensland health authorities stand at the moment?

"The BCCI's demand is simple. The players want to mingle with each other inside the hotel bio-bubble like they did in the IPL. They want to have their meals together inside the hotel and also have the team meetings together. That's not a big demand,"


