Resolution eludes India-China talks

But both sides agree to meet soon to find mutually acceptable agreement to disengage, de-escalate

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

India and China held the ninth round of military-level talks on Sunday to defuse tension at the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in Ladakh and reaffirmed their commitment to resolve the issue through dialogue. There was no breakthrough but both the sides agreed to meet soon to find mutually acceptable agreement to disengage and de-escalate.

The talks came amid reports that the Chinese Army has built a village inside Arunachal Pradesh and consolidated its positions in eastern Ladakh by bringing in more troops at the friction points along the LAC.

The parleys lasting more than seven hours beginning at 10 am between the Corps Commanders of the two armies were held at the Chushul-Modo border meeting point on

the LAC in Ladakh. The Indian side was led by 14 Corps chief Lt General PK Menon and the delegation also included a Joint Secretary from the Ministry of External Affairs.

Incidentally, at least six rounds of the diplomatic level talks under the aegis of the Working Mechanism for Consultation and Coordination (WMCC) were also held since the face-offs began between the two armies in May last year. However, these interventions also failed to end the impasse. The last WMCC talks were held on December 18.

The latest round of Corps Commander talks came more than two months after the eighth round was held on November 6 between the two Commanders. While no positive result came out from the latest episode, both the sides focused on thrashing out a mutually acceptable timeline



for disengagement from friction points and ultimate de-escalation, sources said here on Sunday.

In a joint statement issued after the last round of talks, the two countries agreed to implement the "important consensus reached by the leaders of the two countries, ensure their frontline troops exercise restraint and avoid misunderstanding and miscalculation." The two Commanders on Sunday took stock of this agree-

ment and decided to sustain it till an amicable solution was found, officials said.

Though reiterating its stand on finding a way out through dialogue, India is not taking any chances. Against this backdrop, it had so far turned down the Chinese insistence on withdrawing its troops from strategic heights on the south and north banks of the Pangong Tso (lake). Instead, India in all the rounds held so far stuck to its

stand that China had to first withdraw its troops from all the friction points, including "Finger 4 to 8" at the same time. The Chinese have intruded more than four km in this region near the Pangong Lake. India was of the firm view that China had to reduce its troop strength in depth areas besides tanks and artillery guns.

At present, more than one lakh troops from both the sides were facing each other at the 1,700 km long LAC in Ladakh. Moreover, the entire LAC from west in Ladakh to Arunachal Pradesh in the east was on heightened alert. The Indian Army and IAF have deployed its frontline troops and fighter jets at all the important forward bases all along the 4,000 km long LAC.

Given China's blatant attempt to unilaterally change the status quo at the LAC, Army Chief General MM

Naravane said here on January 12 the Indian troops will hold their ground as long as it takes to achieve the "national goals and objectives." He, however, underlined the need for finding an amicable resolution of the standoff through talks.

IAF chief RKS Bhaduria on Saturday had said if China opted for an aggressive stance in eastern Ladakh, "we can also be aggressive."

These observations from the two Services chiefs came as the armed forces were prepared for a long haul as the talks had not yielded any results.

The Indian troops were braving the harsh winter in Ladakh with the temperature dipping to minus 30 degrees now. In order to sustain them and keep them operationally ready, the Army has an adequate number of winter clothing and prefabricated heated huts.

Certified health report must to attend Kumbh

People above 65, kids below 10 yrs, pregnant women not allowed to visit Haridwar

Senior citizens above 65 years of age, pregnant women, and children below the age of 10 will not be permitted to visit Haridwar during Kumbh Mela at Haridwar in Uttarakhand. Patients with health conditions and comorbidities such as diabetes, hypertension, cardiac disease, chronic lung disease, cerebrovascular disease, chronic kidney disease, immunosuppression, and cancer will be "discouraged" to visit.

These are part of the guidelines (SOP) issued by the Centre on Sunday for Kumbh Mela amid Covid-19, asking all devotees desirous of attending the "mela" to register with the Uttarakhand Government. They will also have to obtain a compulsory medical certificate from Community Health Centre/District hospital/Medical college in their State.

According to the Centre's guidelines, RT-PCR test should be taken not more than 72



hours prior to their visit to Haridwar during the Kumbh Mela. The reports will also be required to be uploaded on the Uttarakhand Government's official web portal.

Considered to be the biggest Hindu religious festival, the "Maha Kumbh" is celebrated every 12 years and draws a huge crowd. This year, the Kumbh would continue for two months — from February 27 to April 27 due to Covid-19 crisis.

The Central Government has also acknowledged that since the Maha Kumbh receives devotees from various States of the country as well as from abroad, it is necessary to take precautions.

Moreover, the State Governments have been directed to deploy only those health-care personnel on duty who have been provided the Covid-19 vaccine shot.

Delhi Police OK's routes of rally to be held after R-Day celebrations

After several rounds of talks between the Delhi Police and farmers' unions, the police on Sunday finalised the proposed tractor rally routes inside the national Capital on January 26. Police said the tractor rally will begin amid tight security after Republic Day celebrations conclude.

Police also said there are intelligence inputs suggesting that there are elements, which pose threats to the proposed rally and they may disrupt it.

"After analysis of Twitter handles revealed that there are 308 such accounts created in

Pakistan which are attempting to create confusion and thus disturbances during farmers rally," said police.

According to sources, the Delhi Police Cyber teams are keeping eyes on social media to

track the miscreants.

Police said the rally will be conducted in three parts — first from Singhu border which have 62 km route, then from Tikri border with around 60 km route and Ghazipur Border with 46 km route. "There are approximately 12,000 to 13,000 tractors at various border —around 7,000 to 8,000 at Tikri, around 5,000 at Singhu and around 1,000 at Ghazipur border which is expected to go up in coming days," said police.

Nepal PM Oli ousted from NCP by faction led by Prachanda

The ruling Nepal Communist Party's splinter faction led by Pushpa Kamal Dahal "Prachanda" on Sunday expelled Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli from the party's general membership.

The decision to remove Oli from the party's general membership was taken at the Standing Committee meeting of the faction led by former prime ministers Prachanda and Madhav Kumar Nepal after Oli failed to produce explanation to his recent moves as sought by party leadership, sources said.

Earlier in December, the splinter group had removed Oli, one of the two chairmen of the ruling party, as the party chair. Madhav Nepal was named as the party's second chairman. Prachanda is the first chairman of the party.

The Prachanda-led faction on January 15 sought clarification from Oli alleging that he was carrying out activities that



go against the party's policies. The faction decided to strip Oli off even from the ordinary membership of the party after he chose not to furnish any clarification, party sources said.

Oli had been accused of violating party statute by the splinter group.

The latest political development came two days after the NCP's splinter faction led a massive anti-Government rally, saying the "unconstitutional" dissolution of the Parliament by Prime Minister Oli has posed serious threats to the country's hard-earned federal democratic republic system.

New induction won't belittle importance of old-timers: Bengal BJP

But need to induct leaders from other parties to expand base, says Ghosh

Amid a spate of defections from the ruling TMC to the saffron camp in Bengal ahead of the Assembly polls, State BJP president Dilip Ghosh on Sunday allayed apprehensions of the turncoats getting more importance than the old timers, saying switching political allegiance doesn't always guarantee leadership positions.

Ghosh, however, insisted that the party, in order to expand its base for coming to power in Bengal, needs to induct people from other political outfits.

In an interview to PTI, he also clarified that everybody has to abide by the rules and regulations of the party, be it the old-timers or the newcomers.

"The BJP is a growing



force in West Bengal. Our organisation is getting strengthened with each passing day; people from other parties including the TMC are joining us. If we don't take people from other outfits, how will we grow?"

"No matter who joins the camp, I would like to add that everyone has to abide by the rules and regulations of the party. No one is above the party," he said, when asked about reports of infighting in certain pockets of the state over induction of leaders from the Trinamool Congress.

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Around 20% population of UP screened for TB

With the aim to find the missing TB cases in the state during the coronavirus pandemic, over 20 per cent population of Uttar Pradesh has been screened for TB as focus of the government is back on tuberculosis following decline in COVID-19 cases in the recent past.

The screening is part of the 'TB Harega, Desh Jeetega' campaign.

During the coronavirus pandemic, the TB Programme staff was roped in to manage the spread of COVID-19. This impacted the implementation of the TB programme.

"This (screening) campaign will help find the missing cases of TB and ensure they receive quality treatment from the government," said Dr Rajendra Prasad, Vice Chairman of the national taskforce of National TB Elimination Programme.

The campaign was divided into three phases. The first entailed joint screening camps at certain places which may house vulnerable populations, including prisons, old-age homes, orphanages, shelter homes for women and children, madrasas and ashram schools. The second phase included house-to-house visits in urban and rural slums by the programme staff to identify cases among high-risk groups, including diabetes patients. The symptomatic patients were screened for both TB and COVID-19 through these exercises.


As a majority of TB patients visit the private health sector for medical care, the third phase, from January 13, focused on engaging private providers, including doctors, chemists and laboratories, by the TB programme staff to encourage them to notify TB cases to the government and ensure they adhere to the standard government treatment protocol.

In the last five years, greater engagement with the private sector has led to an exponential increase in notifications from the private health sector - from 18,865 cases notified in 2015 to 1,61,083 in 2019.

"Recognising that the private sector caters to a majority of TB patients in the state, the TB programme has intensified engagement with private doctors and chemists, and created mechanisms by which the public and private sectors are working toward a common goal of TB elimination.

The results of this engagement are for everyone to see today," said Dr Shibu Vijayan, Global TB Director, PATH, a non-governmental organisation working closely with the state government to engage private health care providers.

Experts also informed 'The Pioneer' about the expansion of the private sector engagement programme called Patient Provider Support Agency (PPSA) models in 20 districts across the state to facilitate free care to patients seeking care in the private sector.

Licence mandatory for storing excessive liquor at home

Uttar Pradesh has made it mandatory to obtain a licence to keep more than the prescribed limit of liquor at home.

In UP, a person is permitted to store 1.5 litres each of country-made and Indian Made Foreign Liquor (IMFL) liquor and four bottles of beer.

After the amendment in the policy, if anyone wants to store liquor more than the prescribed limit, a licence will have to be obtained from the state Excise department.

Additional Chief Secretary Sanjay R Bhoosreddy said that under the new excise policy, individuals would have to obtain licence to purchase, transport or for private possession or personal bar, liquor in excess of the prescribed retail limit.

He said the licence would be issued on payment of Rs 12,000 as licence fee and a security of Rs 51,000 per year, subject to the prescribed conditions.

The state government has set a revenue target of Rs 34,500 crore for the next fiscal 2021-22 for the Excise department against the expected revenue collection of Rs 28,340 crore in 2020-21. The additional chief secretary said the state government had hiked the revenue target by Rs 6,000 crore to Rs 34,500 crore for the next fiscal 2021-22 against Rs 28,340 crore of current fiscal 2020-21.

He said to achieve the hike in the target the annual licence fee for country liquor, Indian Made Foreign Liquor retail shops and model shops had been increased by 7.5 per cent for the next fiscal 2021-22.

There is no hike in licence fee for the retail beer shops.

Farm wastes to increase income of farmers

It is good news for the farmers of the state as the Yogi Adityanath government will now be paying money to them for agricultural wastes.

The chief minister has directed the Agriculture department to increase the income of farmers and also to reduce their cost. On his initiative, a bio-coal production unit has been set up in Risia Bazaar town of Bahraich district, according to official sources.

The trial of the fuel briquette pellet manufactured from agro-waste has also been completed in the plant and agricultural wastes like paddy straw, corn stalks and sugarcane leaves are being bought at the rate of Rs 1,500 to Rs 2,000 per quintal from the farmers of the region, an official said on Sunday.

About 10,000 quintals of agricultural waste has been bought from the farmers so far.

The unit has received an order for supply of 1,000 tons of pellets per day by the Unchahar unit of the National Thermal Power Corporation (NTPC).

The fuel briquette pellet unit has also provided direct and indirect employment to over a hundred persons. At the same time, the farmers are getting an extra income for their agricultural residue.

Agriculture Produce Commissioner Alok Sinha said here on Sunday that it was just a small effort to increase the income of farmers.

"This, however, will be a major relief for the problem of stubble burning and management of agricultural residues. We are motivating others to set up such units in the state for manufacturing pellets from agricultural residues," Sinha said.

An official said that two proposals from Shahjahanpur and one each from Pilibhit, Ayodhya, Basti and Gorakhpur had been received to set up similar plants and training was being imparted on manufacturing pellets from agricultural residues as this causes no harm if these are mixed with coal.

2 Chinese nationals held in pre-activated SIM sale case

Two Chinese nationals were arrested on Sunday in connection with the pre-activated SIM card sale case in which the sleuths of the Anti-Terrorist Squad had nabbed 14 persons recently.

The accused were identified as Xu Xunfu aka July and his woman partner in crime, Li Teng Li aka Alice. The police are interrogating them.

On January 17, the ATS had arrested 14 persons, nine of them from different districts of Uttar Pradesh and five from Noida for selling pre-activated SIM cards for opening bank accounts.

The arrest of the 14 accused came during investigation of a case in which unidentified persons had used pre-activated SIMs to open bank accounts online in different banks using fake names and submitting fake identity proofs at the time submitting their online applications.

It also surfaced that the accused made bank transactions of money from unknown sources or through criminal activities.

It surfaced during investigation that all the 14 accused and their leader Prem Singh had sold pre-activated SIM cards to different foreign nationals in New Delhi.

The ATS sleuths developed the information and the name of the above Chinese nationals surfaced in the crime. ADG (Law and Order) Prashant Kumar and IG (ATS) GK Goswami had got a red corner and a blue corner notice issued against the accused Chinese nationals.

The sleuths posing as customers engaged the accused Chinese nationals in talks and nabbed both of them in Noida.

Both confessed their crime and disclosed that they used to purchase pre-activated SIM

cards from some persons, including Prem Singh, who were arrested in the past. They said they used to provide the pre-activated SIM cards to the manager of a hotel located in Gurgaon of Haryana and is owned by a Chinese couple. The accused used to remain in touch with their handlers through a WeChat app.

The accused told the police that they shared to the Chinese nationals 150 OTPs generated for WhatsApp registration on 150 Indian mobile numbers. They said they did not know who and where these WhatsApp numbers were being used at present. The accused confessed that they had provided 100 pre-activated SIMs to the manager of the hotel. It further surfaced that the business visa of Alice had expired in September 2020 and of July in August 2020.

The police said the accused were being interrogated further and added that the police would seek their police custody remand after presenting them in a court.

Tiwari slams petrol, diesel price hike

The Congress has criticised the frequent hike in the prices of petroleum products like diesel and petrol.

Congress Working Committee member and senior party leader Pramod Tiwari said Sunday was a Black Day for the people of the country as the prices of petrol and diesel had been increased for the fourth time in a week by the Bharatiya Janata Party regime.

He said the retail price of petrol was Rs 92.28 per litre in Mumbai on Sunday and of diesel Rs 82.40 per litre while the price of crude oil in inter-



national market was only 52.21 USD per barrel.

Tiwari claimed that on the basis of the crude oil price, petrol could be priced at Rs 36 per litre but the oil companies were charging Rs 60 more from the consumers.

He said the hike in petrol price was only benefitting the big industrial houses like Adani and others.

However, it may be mentioned that the business interests of the Adani group do not include petroleum products.

Tiwari accused the BJP government of betraying the people, saying that during the election, Prime Minister Narendra Modi had promised to cap the price of petrol at Rs 25 per litre.

He said the exorbitant hike in the price of diesel had added to the woes of the people who were already reeling under the devastating impact of the coronavirus pandemic.

The Congress leader said the hike in diesel price had a multiplier effect as it led to a hike in transport cost which fueled the fire of inflation.

Tiwari also lashed out at BJP MP Shakshi Maharaj for claiming that Congress was behind the "murder" of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose. He said the BJP MP's statement was an insult to the martyrdom of Netaji.

The Congress leader said the BJP MP seemed to have lost his mental balance as he was not aware of the historical facts that during the British period, Netaji suffered injuries on foreign soil during an air crash.

He said an inquiry commission was set up to investigate the incident and matter was also heard by the Supreme Court but none in the history leveled such a dirty allegation as made by the BJP leader.

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Bid to ensure better turnout in next phases of vaccination

All the 51,000 health workers in Lucknow will be covered under the Covid immunisation by February 5, according to district immunisation officer MK Singh. The number of session sites and vaccination centres in the will be increased for the coming sessions — January 28 & 29 and February 4 & 5.

To ensure better participation, messages will be sent from the portal to health workers two days in advance instead of one day. They will get messages from the Integrated Control and Command Centre regarding the vaccination schedule. They will also receive calls from the centre, and nodal officers of the respective hospitals will also ask their workers and staff to get themselves vaccinated.

Singh said that the department would take to social media in order to bust myths and misconceptions regarding side effects of vaccines.

Meanwhile, nodal officer for Covid at KGMU Dr D Himanshu said that looking

into the conditions, they they have sent a proposal to the state government for increase in the number of beds at the Infectious Diseases Hospital from 40 to 250.

He said although the number of Covid cases has decreased and the infectivity rate has also come down, the percentage of serious cases has been the same. "The deaths may have decreased because the total number of cases has come down, but the percentage of serious cases is the same," Dr Himanshu said.

"With the number of cases decreasing, we have closed an isolation ward consisting of 20 beds. We have 28-30 serious patients at the Covid hospital currently," he said. About the research work for coronavirus at KGMU, he said they are in the final stages of trials for a majority of researches.

About the eradication of coronavirus, he said the number of cases are likely to go further down. "Vaccination is underway and when herd immunity increases, we can avoid another wave," he said.

On Sunday, only 30 fresh

Covid cases emerged in Lucknow while 136 patients recovered. City's death toll stands at 1,165 while there are 1,552 active cases. The new cases included four from Indiranagar, and three each from Chowk & Rae Bareilly road.

In the state, 297 persons tested Covid positive, including 13 in Ghaziabad, nine in Gautam Buddha Nagar, 15 in Varanasi and 14 in Meerut, taking the UP tally to 5,98,713. There were eight deaths in the state, including two in Sonbhadra, and one each in Kanpur, Gorakhpur, Meerut, Lakhimpur Kheri, Etawah & Mirzapur, taking the state toll to 8,617. A senior health official pointed out that that more males than females have been vaccinated in the two phases of vaccinations so far. "Some women may be genuinely sick while others who stayed away included pregnant women and lactating mothers. Some may also have been negligent," he added.

Former CEO of Biotech Park and senior scientist at National Academy of Sciences

PK Seth said that his main concern is long-term effects of coronavirus. He said he will soon organise webinars to spread awareness. "The after effects include neurological disorders, lung functioning disorders and renal disorders. Besides, the mental disorders include state of confusion & forgetfulness and even strokes even six months after recovering from Covid," he pointed out. Seth said there is no data in India regarding this. "When no one wants to look into it, how can one find it? I have organised webinars in the past and will do so in future about Covid after effects," he said.

Seth said that as a former director of IITR, he has been continuously studying the toxicity effects on the brain. "I have studied neurotoxicology regarding how metals affect the brain and how the brain diseases are caused," he said. He added that scientific awareness is very useful and important. "People are not taking vaccines without having any knowledge about it, hence they need to be made aware of scientific aspects," he added.

Youth dragged on car's bonnet, run over later

A car-borne group hit the scooter of a youth and then dragged him on the bonnet about a kilometre. Later, they crushed him under the wheels of the car, leaving him injured in Mohanlalganj late Saturday night. The injured youth, identified as Loknath aka Anshu, was rushed to KGMU Trauma Centre where he died around midnight.

As per reports, Loknath worked with a private company and was returning home on Saturday night. His scooter was hit by a car near his house on Bheelampur road. Loknath

demand compensation from the group of youths after which a heated argument ensued. Loknath climbed the bonnet of the car but the man in the driving seat stepped on the gas and the vehicle moved at a high speed about a kilometre.

It was alleged that the accused reached Imaliya Kheda locality in the area with Loknath clinging on to the bonnet and then they applied brakes. Loknath fell down on the ground and the accused ran him over under the wheels of the car. His family members reached the spot and rushed him to the KGMU Trauma Centre where he died during

treatment. Inspector Deenanath Mishra said the police did not get any complaint, and no case was registered in this connection. Police said Loknath was in a drunken state and picked up a fight with the car-borne youths. However, people flayed the police, claiming that the cops were trying to save their skin. "The incident took place at a time when the police are supposed to be on patrol. The verbal duel continued for over an hour and several commuters also flocked to the scene in a bid to solve the issue. But the police were nowhere to be seen," they said.

Speeding SUV hits car of ADG (Traffic)

A high-speeding SUV hit the car of ADG (Traffic) Ashok Kumar in Vrindavan Colony (sector-11) under PGI police station area on Sunday. However, the ADG was not in the car at that time. Vikram Singh, driver of the ADG's car, suffered injuries in the mishap. The impact was so intense that a rear tyre of the car was damaged in the mishap. The SUV driver sped off soon after.

Meanwhile, two groups of men had a clash as both accused each other of dumping garbage in a vacant plot in Thakurganj on Saturday night. Several persons from both the groups suffered injuries. The police registered a cross-FIR in this connection. Atul Srivastava of Raja Vihar in Balaganj said his neighbours Manohar, Bhodu Yadav and others attacked him and his sister Ranjana and her husband

and others when they asked them not to dump garbage in the vacant plot adjacent to his house. He said several members in his family suffered injuries in the attack.

Contrary to his claim, Manohar said that they had cleaned the garbage which was being dumped in the vacant plot. He said Atul and his family members used to dump garbage and did not mend ways even after being asked to. He alleged that Atul and members in his family attacked him and his family members and injured them.

FIRE

Property worth lakhs of rupees was damaged in a fire which broke out inside a house in Jankipuram police station area on Sunday. Luckily though, no loss of lives or injuries were reported in the incident. Reports said the fire broke out in the house of Ramesh Dixit of Jankipuram (sector-F) around 10 am on Sunday. The fire broke out through an earthen lamp and engulfed the house. The family members tried to put off the fire by throwing water and using other methods, but in vain. A fire tender reached the scene and the flames were extinguished.

Fraudsters land in police net

Lucknow (PNS): Police arrested three persons on Sunday on the charges of running fake societies and NGOs in Chinhat. The accused duped several people of cash after promising them benefits of what they introduced as government schemes.

Those arrested were identified as Ved Prakash Bharti & Virendra Kumar Gangwar of Rajajipuram and Raj Pratap Singh of Chinhat. The police recovered fake documents related to fake schemes, those of UP Bhawan and Sannirman Board besides five mobile phones and stamps.

The police said that the miscreants used to open societies/NGOs in the different localities and trap gullible people by offering attractive benefits. Since the names of their societies sounded genuine, people would easily fall in their trap. They would realise huge amount of money from people for availing of the benefits of schemes.

After collecting money from different persons, they used to do a moonlight flit. It surfaced that the accused had duped people in Aligarh, Farrukhabad, Bahraich and Shahjahanpur too. The police said that the accused belong to an inter-state gang and suspected that there could be more persons involved in the racket.

CISH promoting organic farming

Lucknow (PNS): Central Institute for Subtropical Horticulture (CISH) is promoting organic farming practices in 200 hectares of land with the help of 10 groups comprising 211 farmers in UP under Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY).

Govt eyes seaweed cultivation to boost fishermen's income

Though bestowed with more than 8,000 km coastline enriched with seaweeds (macro algae) which has huge potential as a sustainable food source and provide livelihood to coastal communities hit by climate change vagaries, India's share in global production is negligible at .01 per cent when compared to China and Indonesia which have grabbed 80 per cent of the market pie.

Now, keen to be not left behind, the Modi Government is leaving no stone turned and taking a series of measures like providing subsidy, capacity building and awareness through webinars and interaction among others with the interested cooperatives and entrepreneurs to take up seaweed cultivation in a big way, business of which is projected to hit USD 26 billion by 2026.

India's present seaweed value is estimated to be around just USD 500 million ie 50 crore and the officials feel that there is a huge opportunity to exploit the potential of the seaweed business.

To spur the sector, the government has already allocated ₹ 637 crore for the cultivation of these nutrition-rich marine

plants, as part of the ₹20,050-crore central scheme Pradhan Mantri Matsya Sampada Yojana (PMMSY)—to be spent over the next five years, mainly as subsidy support.

In fact, seaweed cultivation has been the pet project of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who since his days as Chief Minister of Gujarat, had been stressing on its promotion for the fishermen and coastal communities looking to double their income by 2022 and boost the rural economy.

In this direction, to create awareness and deliberate on the strength, opportunities and challenges, an international webinar is being jointly organized by the Department of Fisheries, Union Ministry of Animal Husbandry & LINAC-National Cooperatives Development Corporation (NCDC), and NEDAC, Bangkok next week ie January 28, 2021.

At the webinar, the stakeholders including scientists, government officials and entrepreneurs from India and countries like Canada, Thailand, Philippines and Vitenam will share their views, brought on one platform and steps will be taken work towards forging alliances for promotion of entre-

preneurship in the sector through cooperatives. At the same time, the webinar will identify bottlenecks at various levels and will aim at evolving options.

"Much of India's coast is ideal for seaweed cultivation with suitable tropical weather, shallow waters and a rich supply of nutrients. In total, as many as 841 species of seaweed thrive along the region, though only a few are cultivated. The seaweed is not only destined to be a food source, but also a source of biofuels, bio-fertilisers and other products like in pharma and cosmetic," said Sundeeep Kumar Nayak, MD of the NCDC. He said the webinar is the part of series of steps planned to promote seaweed cultivation among the cooperatives in the country.

While Dr. Rajeev Ranjan, Secretary of the Department of Fisheries from the Animal Husbandry Ministry will be the chief guest at the webinar, Manoj Joshi, Additional Secretary from Union Ministry of Food Processing will dwell on his Ministry's support for seaweed based food and Dr. Thierry Chopin, Prof of Marine Biology, University of New Brunswick, Canada will talk about 'Seaweeds, a key compo-

nent of Integrated Multi-Trophic Aquaculture (IMTA) providing important ecosystem services, which should be valued."

The other topics that would be taken up during the webinar will be 'Seaweed based Sagarika for farmers' by Dr. US Awasthi, MD IFFCO, India, Dr. Blossom Kochhar, Chair, Blossom Kochhar Group, India will touch upon 'Seaweeds in the cosmetics industry in India'.

Others who will participate include Kavita Nehemiah, Snap Natural & Alginate, India, Dr. Nguyen Van Nguyen, Dy Dir, Res Inst for Marine Fish, Vietnam, Dr. Anicia Q Hurtado, University of the Philippines Visayas, Philippines, Prof Krishna R Salin, Director, NEDAC Bangkok and Dr. Atul Patne, Commissioner Fisheries, Gov of Maharashtra, India among others.

The key beneficiaries of this webinar will be seaweed farmers, budding entrepreneurs, youth, women and vulnerable communities. The webinar also aims at augmenting awareness about seaweed farming as a business and to come up with an actionable, time bound plan which will contribute towards attaining 'Atmanirbhar Bharat,' said

Nayak. It has been estimated that India can produce one million tonnes of dry seaweed providing employment to nearly 2 lakh fishers with an annual income of ₹1 lakh per individual.

Nayak further said that seaweed farming is one of the few sectors in developing countries that allow a certain level of flexibility besides tackling climate change threats. As a result, women can work in this business and gain an independent income without neglecting their traditional household work. For instance, Tanzania has seen women emerge as leaders in the seaweed world, and they have even moved onto producing seaweed flour in addition to farming, he added.

As per the PMMSY guidelines, seaweed farming will be promoted in a mission mode and supported through financial, marketing and logistical support to ensure income and welfare gains to small fisher population especially women and fisherwomen headed households.

Seaweed seed banks, nurseries, tissue culture units, processing and marketing units, etc. would be supported.

Over 16L healthcare workers receive Covid-19 vaccine jobs

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

Over 16 lakh healthcare workers across the country have received Covid-19 vaccine jobs till the evening of the ninth day of the nationwide immunisation drive, as per provisional reports, the Union health ministry said on Sunday.

The ministry said that 31,466 beneficiaries were vaccinated on Sunday till 7:30 pm in five states -- Haryana (907), Karnataka (2,472), Punjab (1,007), Rajasthan (24,586) and Tamil Nadu (2,494) -- through 693 sessions. "The cumulative number of healthcare workers vaccinated against COVID-19 has crossed 16 lakh (16,13,667) till 7.30 pm today through 28,613 sessions, as per the provisional report," the ministry said, adding that the final report will be completed by late in the night.

"Only 10 adverse events following immunisation have been reported till 7.30 pm on



the ninth day of the vaccination drive," it stated.

The inoculation drive was launched on January 16 with over three crore healthcare and frontline workers prioritised to get the jobs initially.

The total number of beneficiaries, who were vaccinated till 7.30 pm on Sunday since the launch of the drive, include 1,47,030 in Andhra Pradesh, 76,125 in Bihar, 53,529 in Kerala, 1,91,443 in Karnataka, 61,720 in Tamil Nadu, 25,811 in Delhi, 78,466 in Gujarat and 84,505 in West Bengal, according to provisional reports.

I'm innocent, husband fixed me, says mother charged with sexually assault on minor son

Thiruvananthapuram: The 35-year-old woman, who has been accused of 'sexually abusing' her minor son, on Sunday said she was innocent and framed by her estranged husband and his second wife. Appearing before the media with her face covered, the woman said, "the truth should come out. My son was threatened by his father to give the statements against me. The case is fabricated."

The woman, who was arrested under the POCSO (Protection of Children from Sexual Offences) Act was granted bail by the Kerala High court.

The court had observed that the gravity of offences alleged against the woman was serious in nature and quite unheard of, and had directed the state police chief to constitute a special team, preferably headed by a woman IPS officer, to proceed with the investigation.

The woman from nearby Kadakkavoor was arrested on December 28 on charges of sexually abusing her son since the age of 10 till he shifted to Sharjah with his father in December 2019.

The case was registered based on a report filed by the Child Welfare Committee officials who had conducted counselling of the child. The woman alleged that the POCSO case was filed by her husband in retaliation for the case she had moved before a family court seeking custody of her four children and alimony.

"I am innocent. The truth should come out. My son will never make such a complaint", she said. She said she was not aware about the details of the case and came to know about it only at the police station. "I cried and told the police that this was not true", she said.

Jawan succumbs to injuries caused by Pak firing in J&K

Jammu (PNS): An Army jawan, undergoing treatment at Udhampur based command hospital, succumbed to his fatal injuries early Sunday morning. The Army jawan, identified as Naik Nishant Sharma, had received serious injuries during 'unprovoked' ceasefire violation by the Pakistan Army along the line of control in Sunderbani sector of Rajouri.

According to Defence PRO in Jammu, Naik Nishant Sharma of 10 JAK Rifles was undergoing treatment at command hospital where he succumbed to his injuries on Sunday. Meanwhile, tension prevailed along

the line of control following repeated incidents of ceasefire violations in the region. The Pakistan Army is desperately attempting to push small groups of heavily armed terrorists inside the Indian territory to execute a terror plot. On the other hand, Indian soldiers are maintaining a tight vigil to prevent any infiltration bid from across the LoC. High alert has been sounded in the run up to the Republic day celebrations along the International border with Pakistan across the Jammu frontier after another cross border tunnel was detected by the BSF in Pansar area of Kathua district.

ASHA worker's death after Covid job triggers protest

Amaravati: A woman public health worker, who had taken Covid vaccine on January 19, died at a government-run hospital in Guntur in the early hours of Sunday while undergoing treatment for alleged reactions.

While family members of Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHA) worker Vijaya Lakshmi (44) alleged that she died due to the adverse effect following vaccination, the officials said the cause of the death was under investigation.

Health officials said the cause of the health worker's death would be known only after receipt of her autopsy report.

The officials said the death does not appear to be related to vaccination. They pointed out that over 10,000 people were given the vaccine in Guntur district so far and not a single Adverse Event

Following Immunisation (AEFI) was reported.

ASHA worker's death sparked protest by the family members and ASHA workers at Government General Hospital, Guntur. They demanded Rs 50 lakh compensation. Guntur district collector Samuel Anand announced that a government job will be provided to the son of the deceased. "If the family is eligible to get a house under the government scheme, the same will be allotted to them," he told reporters at the hospital.

The collector, who faced angry protests by the deceased's relatives and others, said he would send a proposal to the government for compensation to Vijaya Lakshmi's family.

However, not satisfied by the collector's response, the ASHA worker's family members support-

ed by the leaders of opposition Telugu Desam Party (TDP) began a sit-in at the hospital.

Raising slogans of 'we want justice' the protestors squatted at the main entrance of the hospital. Police forcibly lifted the protestors and arrested them, leading to tension. The TDP leaders alleged that the police resorted to excessive use of force to suppress the protest.

According to Vijaya Lakshmi's family members, she took the vaccine on January 19. She developed high fever on January 21. They alleged that a private hospital in Guntur refused to admit her, forcing them to take her to the government hospital.

They said the doctors told them that she suffered brain stroke but they alleged that the death was the result of adverse effect of Covid vaccine. IANS

TN brings down Covid-19 cases

Tamil Nadu has managed to bring the Covid-19 pandemic under control, if the government details are any indication. A State which was about to top the table with the maximum number of positive cases, has brought down the number of new persons diagnosed with the pandemic to 586 as on Saturday evening. The 24 hours ending Saturday night saw the fatalities coming down to just two.

"This is a marked change from the weeks when Tamil Nadu used to test 6000 to 7000 new Covid-19 cases daily and

the death tally per day hovered around 200 to 300 for many weeks. Till Saturday the State lost 12, 309 persons to the pandemic. But as on Saturday, there are only 5073 patients across Tamil Nadu. This is the State which used to have lakhs of Covid-19 patients," said a physician working with Tamil Nadu Government Health Services who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Chief Minister Edappadi Palaniswamy and Health Minister Vijayabaskar attributed the success to the dedication shown by the doctors, nurses, paramedical staff and workers in the departments of health, revenue, police and the general

public. "But for their sacrifices and cooperation, we would not have reached this level," said Vijayabaskar.

But DMK president M K Stalin alleged that the Palaniswamy Government was a total failure in handling the Covid-19 at Ground Zero. "The fight against Covid-19 succeeded in the State because of the DMK's Ontrinaivom Vaa programme which reached crores of people. The DMK launched a campaign to feed one crore people and offer medical facilities. Covid-19 exposed Palaniswamy is a hopeless Chief Minister who has no concern for the people," said Stalin while speaking to a pro-Left newspaper.

10 more test positive in Varanasi

As many as 10 new COVID-19 patients have been detected in the district on Sunday, increasing the total number to 21,850. No casualty has been reported during the day and the death toll remained at 375. During the day, the follow-up negative reports included 16 and all of them have been recovered from home isolation, increasing the number to 18,406. As no patient has been discharged from any of the hospitals, the number remained at 2,965. The total number of patients who have been recovered so far is 21,371, leaving 104 active cases. The recovery rate is 97.80 per cent, while the

mortality rate is 1.71 per cent.

In the first report of the day, nine positive patients were found out of 2,004 reports received. Till then, the total test reports received were 5,80,333 and the results of 3,418 are awaited. Out of them, 5,58,484 were negative, while 21,849 were positive. The total number of samples collected was 6,07,366. Meanwhile, mass / group corona antigen tests continued and all the 218 tests were found negative at SSPG Hospital Kabirchaura apart from 36 at CHC Shivpur, 64 at Vivekanand Hospital Bhelepur, 220 at LBS Hospital Ramnagar and 200 at SSH BHU. Along with this, samples of 97 from SSPG, 200 from LBS Hospital,

58 from Vivekanand Hospital and 75 from SSH BHU have been sent for RTPCR investigation.

Besides, for safety, respect and self-confidence of women under the 'Mission Shakti' campaign being run in the district, the girls/ women of various schools / colleges and public places in different police station areas were made aware by giving information about the helpline numbers (112, 1098, 1090, 181, 1076, 108, 102) issued by the government through posters / banners / pamphlets / audios / video clips. A total of 5,114 women / girls were mobilised at 197 places and 1,061 leaflets were distributed. A total of 1,899

women / girls were sensitised by the Anti-Romeo Squads at 120 places.

As many as 137 eve teasers were warned while action was taken under Section 151 CrPC against two and Section 294 IPC against one.

Apart from this, the police arrested 19 persons under Section 151 of CrPC while challaned under Section 188 and others sections against four persons. During checking at various points, 1,366 vehicles were challaned and eight seized.

Apart from this, ₹ 1,42,900 were realised from 121 vehicles, while ₹ 13,200 from 339 persons for moving on the roads without wearing masks.

Mystery shrouds death of woman

Mystery still shrouds the death of a newlywed bridegroom which took place on Thursday night in Kharkouni village in Naini, Prayagraj. The post-mortem report also confused the cause of death. Police have preserved viscera. At present, the police have sent the accused husband to jail. Police also failed to get him confessed in view of the grieving atmosphere of the house.

The husband of the married woman has been sent to jail. At the same time, police are searching for other accused. In this connection, the dowry murder case was filed against five people including elder brother of the accused husband and his wife on the written complaint being made by Guddu Sonkar, brother of the married woman.

It may be pointed out here that Rakhi Sonkar daughter of Kallu Sonkar, resident of Bhunda village under the Karchana police station, was married to Vinod Sonkar son of Banjara Sonkar, resident of Kharkouni village, on November 30. During the

marriage, Kallu Sonkar married off his daughter Rakhi by giving a dowry as per his ability. It is alleged that she has been mentally harassed over dowry at her in-laws' house. Rakhi died in suspicious circumstances on Thursday night.

Her body was found lying on the bed on Friday morning. When the family members of the girl reached the daughter-in-law's house, they found her body lying on the bed. The in-laws ran away from home. Rakhi's brother Guddu Sonkar had given a written complaint against her husband Vinod Sonkar, his elder brother and his wife for a dowry murder. The police arrested husband Vinod Sonkar on Saturday and sent him to jail.

SHO Naini Jitendra Singh said that the cause of death could not be clear in the post-mortem report. He further added that Rakhi must have been murdered, which the in-laws are hiding. The husband has been sent to jail after filing a case on the basis of a written complaint of the deceased's brother. Other accused are being searched, added the SHO.

BEAUTIFICATION UNDER SMART CITY PROJECT: The entire stretch connecting Manmohan Park crossing in Katra to Laxmi crossing via Science faculty boundary and SSL hostel, will be beautified under the smart city project.

To accelerate the beautification work under the Smart City project, there will be an agreement between Prayagraj Development Authority (PDA) and Allahabad University. AU V-C Prof Sangita Srivastava has constituted the committee to look into the issue under the chairmanship of Prof Ashish Saxena of the Department of Sociology, AU.

A few days back, when the work for developing this stretch was taken up by the district administration, it had to face the wrath of inmates of different hostels, the boundary wall of which would have to be shifted back to expand the width of the road. Even the local shopkeepers on the University Road staged their protest and many of them had to do away with the front part of their premises.

As one goes towards the union hall building from

Manmohan crossing, the right side of the road goes along with the boundary wall of the science faculty of AU and later that of AN Jha hostel. Further ahead, the boundary wall of SSL hostel, Sir PCB hostel, Nirala gallery, GN Jha hostel etc would be affected by the redevelopment of this stretch of road under the Smart City project which would go till Laxmi crossing.

To expedite the work of developing this part of the road, AU V-C has now constituted the committee which would hold a meeting with the PDA officials and chalk out the strategy as to how the development work can progress causing minimum change in the structures of AU or its property.

The committee would be headed by Prof Ashish Saxena, while the other members include Jaya Kapoor of the Department of English, Shefali Nandan of the Department of Commerce and Business Administration, Sonal Shankar of the Department of Law, PS Pundir of the Department of Statistics and Haribansh Singh of the Department of Law.

Girls take out awareness rally

VARANASI (PNS): Raising their protest against the gender discrimination, foeticide, child marriage and rising violence against women and girls, the girls took out an awareness rally in Nagepur on the occasion of National Girl Child Day on Sunday and demanded, the government should ensure the education and safety of the girls. There is also no primary health centre and sports ground in the village and they have to go outside for the medical requirement and to play, the girls said

and demanded the government to open health centre and construct sports ground for the betterment of villagers. Nandlal Master expressed concern over the sharp decline in the girl ratio comparatively to boy and emphasised that the government should pay serious consideration regarding this. Varsha Patel, Madhubala, Khushboo, Soni and others joined the rally. Earlier, the Kishori (adolescent girls) Day was celebrated on the eve of National Girl Child Day at Chittipur Anganwadi Centre under Kashi Vidyapeeth development block on Saturday. On this day, adolescent girls were apprised of the importance of the day. The girls were given the message of 'Beti Bachao,

Beto Padhao' and they were asked to send this message door-to-door in their areas. They were also apprised of importance of programmes of hygiene, nutritious diet, health information, hand wash and iron tablets. Chipaipur Primary School Principal Deepa said that this day has been celebrated every year since 2008 to spread awareness about the declining sex ratio of girls and to remove inequalities in society with them. Anganwadi worker Shail Singh said that the right nutrition is very important for adolescent girls according to the increasing demand for their bodies. In this stage more nutrients are needed. It is necessary to take a calcium and iron rich diet.

20 new Covid cases in Prayagraj

The reduced speed of corona infection spread is relieving to not only the common men but also the Health department. At the same time, the number of healthy people has decreased once again. On Saturday night, a screening of 6,445 people was conducted in the district and of them, the report of 20 people, including an ADJ and three advocates of the Allahabad High Court came positive in 24 hours.

As the same time, 21 people beat Corona. No death was reported. According to CMO Dr Prabhakar Rai, the scope of testing has been extended to identify the infected. Covid

testing work has been started in the Magh Mela area. A total of 20 new cases of infection reported in 24 hours. Home isolation of nine people was completed among 21 people who beat corona while 12 patients also beat the coronavirus while being treated from different Covid hospitals.

A total of 314 patients are admitted in Covid hospitals of the district, out of which the maximum 44 patients are undergoing treatment at L3 Covid Hospital SRN. There are now only 314 active cases in the district.

The Covid testing report of three police personnel including the head wireless

operator in the Magh Mela Police Line has come positive. According to the Nodal Officer for Corona Dr Rishi Sahai, among the infected are a CRPF constable, Railway reservation supervisor and others.

NER CANCELS SPECIAL TRAINS: After incurring huge losses on Makar Sankranti, North Eastern Railway (NER) has cancelled special trains for Magh Mela pilgrims on the occasion of the second major snan on Paush Purnima falling on January 28.

The decision has been taken as authorities expect a low turnout on Paush Purnima too from the stations

falling under NER due to Covid pandemic. NER had run a special train on Makar Sankranti on January 14, but it incurred losses. Two trains were operated from Manduwadih to Prayagraj City, but only 18 passengers booked the first train and just 11 boarded the second train. This was against the estimation of the railways, which expected at least 800 to 900 passengers.

Public Relations Officer (PRO), NER, Ashok Kumar said, 05153 Manduwadih-Prayagraj Rambagh special train and 05152 Prayagraj Rambagh-Manduwadih special train will be cancelled on January 27.

Wife, her paramour held for medical store owner's murder

The police have worked out the murder of a medical store owner with the arrest of two persons.

The medical store owner's wife with the help of her paramour and a relative had killed her husband on October 5.

Police arrested the wife of the deceased and her relative on Sunday while her paramour had earlier been sent to jail.

Medical store owner Ravi Mohan of Vasant Vihar in

Ghatampur mysteriously went missing on October 5. The same day, his wife, Renu, lodged a report about his disappearance with the Ghatampur police.

The next day, the body of Ravi Mohan was recovered near a canal in Badehadu village under Baberu police station of Banda district.

Mohan's uncle had also lodged a report of abduction and had suspected the hand of Mohan's nephew Mahendra Kumar alias Monu of Fatehpur who was living with him.

After investigations, police had arrested Mahendra Kumar alias Monu and sent him to jail.

But as the cousin of the deceased was not satisfied with the investigation, he had urged DIG Pritinder Singh for reinvestigation. The case was then transferred to the Crime Branch and investigated by Inquiry Officer Ram Babu, who exposed the involvement of the deceased's wife and her paramour in the murder.

Addressing media persons, Superintendent of Police (Crime) Surendra Pratap Singh

said during investigation, it came to light that Ravi Mohan was killed by his wife with the help of Monu and a relative, Chandrak Prakash alias Bhole of Sangrampur village in Karbi (Chitrakoot).

Confessing her crime, Renu disclosed that she had illicit relations with Monu and it was opposed by her husband. She said in a bid to avoid regular clashes with Ravi Mohan over her illicit relations, she decided to eliminate him with the help of her paramour and a relative.

KNN to take up genuine problems of street vendors

KANPUR (PNS): Additional Municipal Commissioner Bhanu Pratap Singh, while addressing the Vendors' Day function organised by Kanpur Street Vendors Association at Rajiv Vatika, said street vendors constituted an integral and legitimate part of the urban retail trade and distribution system for daily necessities of the general public. He said the Kanpur Nagar Nigam had decided to take up the genuine problems of street vendors and ensure they got the benefits of the Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Act. He said street vendors represented around 4 per cent of the urban workforce across India and played a variety of roles in city life. He said despite street vending being one of the oldest forms of retail trade in the country, the urban laws still neglected the activity and its practitioners. Singh said the administration would take up the genuine problems of the street vendors and ensure they were provided with proper hawking zones.

Addressing the gathering, the association's president, Ramesh Kumar, said city administrators continued to regard hawking as illegal. He said there were sections of the public who felt that the hawkers encroached upon spaces meant for civic use and others simply considered them as eyesores. He said nearly 2,00,000 women and 21,500 children were engaged in street vending in India and around 1.18 million households were dependent on this informal sector as their primary source of income.

'Roads to be safer if everyone followed traffic rules religiously'

Head of the political science department of Christ Church College, Dr Ashutosh Saxena, while addressing a workshop on road safety awareness as part of the drive launched by Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, said it was the bounden duty of every person to not only keep oneself safe on roads but also ensure the safety of others as well.

He said road safety rested on people who were aware of traffic rules and regulations and religiously followed it as well. He said road rage was a major cause of concern in cities like Kanpur where on account of poor awareness people landed in trouble by not only losing precious lives but also their precious time. He said this engendered the need for making people sensitive to the road safety rules.

He said in case the road safety rules were made mandatory and followed in letter and spirit, roads would be much more safer.

He said the decision of the UP government to focus on college and school students was certainly the right decision as if one were able to generate awareness in youth they would certainly be able to convince their parents and elders to follow the road safety rules in the right earnest.

Saxena said in UP alone, 40,783 accidents were officially reported in 2018 and the figure went up to 42,368 in 2019. He said the state also recorded maximum fatalities on national highways with 7,187 deaths, while 6,385 deaths were reported on state highways and 761 on expressways. He said Uttar Pradesh, with 22,256 casualties, topped

the chart of road accident deaths in the country in 2018 and on an average, 60 road crash deaths were recorded in the state every day and the state was at the top of the same list in 2017 too.

Prof Nalin Kumar, officiating principal, said India had 1 per cent of the world's vehicles but accounted for 6 per cent of the world's road traffic accidents, according to data from a 2018 World Health Organization report.

He said the two major reasons for high road accident deaths had been attributed to speeding and drunk driving, followed by a lack of lane discipline (driving on the wrong side), jumping the red light and the use of a mobile phone while driving.

He said over-speeding was the most common cause of deaths on roads in India, with 64 per cent of road deaths because of speeding. He

said 60 per cent of the accidents in India occurred on highways, mostly because of speeding.

He said the current speed limit in the country was 80 km per hour on a 4-lane highway. He said the WHO had recommended that if the speed was reduced to about 55-57 km per hour, it could save around 37 per cent lives in the country.

Later, Dr Vibha Dixit showed a documentary film on traffic rules.

The vote of thanks was proposed by Dr Anindita Bhattacharya who also conducted the programme.

Prominent among those present on the occasion were Dr DC Srivastava, Dr RK Dwivedi, Dr Sudhir Gupta and Dr RK Juneja.

Around 200 students along with NCC and NSS Cadets also attended the workshop.

Rangdum monastery gets national importance tag

The 18th-Century Rangdum monastery, a Buddhist shrine that lies in the Kargil district of the newly formed Union Territory of Ladakh housing several artifacts like conches and scriptures from Tibet, has got the tag of 'national importance'.

This is the first monument to be accorded the ASI tag after Ladakh was given the UT status in October 2019 when Jammu and Kashmir was officially divided into two UTs — J&K and Ladakh.

The Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) recently issued a notification in this regard bringing it under its fold which would enable it to get central funds for its upkeep.

Situated more than 130 km away from Kargil, the monastery is a tourist's delight perched atop a mountain and looking like a citadel that overlooks and guards the serene Rangdum valley.

A section of historians says that the gumpa was established in the 8th century while many believe it to be of the 18th Century. This shrine has a central prayer hall, which is equivalent to a museum due to the rich assortment of Tibetan antiques and other precious artefacts. It is also the residence of about 40 Buddhist monks. Belonging to the Gelugpa sect, the imposing monastery is a



tourist's delight for being abandoned by colourful hills on the one side and glacier-coated Rocky Mountains on the other. It is next to the Julidok village, and about 25 km from the 14,436 ft (4,400 m) Pensi la (pass) which leads into Zaskar in the head of the Suru Valley in Ladakh in J&K.

ASI officials say that this is the only living monastery in Suru Valley except a few, indicating that the Buddhist flourished in this part of Ladakh. Currently, the monastery is being looked after by Rangdum Gumpa Culture and Welfare Society, Rangdum, Zaskar.

"The monastery has two courtyards giving the visitors a clear view of the artifacts and other collections of Tibetan paintings. The available wall space of the portico is embellished with paintings of cardinal kings, wheel of life,

Buddhist mystic monogram Namchu Wangdan.

"Also, there are images of thousand armed Dugar and mummified statues of vulnerable blo-bZang dG-legs Yshes Grags Pa is of exceptional sacred value for pilgrimage visiting this monastery. Also a giant thangka of lord Buddha kept in Tsazin Khang is unfurled once every year during the fifth day of the sixth month of the calendar," as per the details available on the websites.

A few other ASI historical monuments of national importance in Ladakh region are Sculpture at Drass, Rock Cut Sculpture at Mulbekh, lamayuru Monastery, likir Monastery, Alchi Monastery, Phyang Monastery, Hemis Monastery, leh Palace, Old Castle Tsemo Hill, Stupa at T-Suru and Shey Palace.

Voter identity cards to go digital with e-EPIC launch today

Voter identity cards are all set to go digital as the Election Commission (EC) will launch the e-EPIC (Electronic Electoral Photo Identity Card) on January 25, which is the National Voters Day. The digital version of voter identity card can be downloaded on a mobile phone or a personal computer and can be digitally stored.

The digital version e-EPIC is a non-editable secure portable document format (PDF) version of the EPIC and will have a secured QR code with image and demographics like serial number, part number, etc. This is in addition to physical IDs being issued for fresh registration. The digitalisation of voter-ID card will have a special significance in the upcoming polls in five states — Assam, Kerala, Puducherry, Tamil Nadu and West Bengal.

In a statement, the EC said that a function will be organized at Ashok hotel where Union Law Minister Ravi Shankar Prasad will launch the e-EPIC programme, and distribute e-EPICs to five new voters. President Ram Nath Kovind will be the Chief Guest at the national function.

Under the e-EPIC programme, new voters will get the facility after downloading the

stored on the DigiLocker app or self-printed from a computer. According to the EC, the

digital version of voter identity card will be launched in two phases. In the first phase (January 25-31), new voters who have applied for the voter-ID card and registered their mobile numbers in Form-6 will be able to download the e-EPIC by simply authenticating their mobile number. In the second phase that will begin from February 1, general voters can apply for e-EPIC. "All those who have given their mobile numbers (linked one) they can

also download their e-EPIC. According to the plan, on the digital format of the EPIC there will be two different QR codes consisting of information about the voter. One QR code will have the voter's name and other specific details while the second code will have the voter's other information. On the basis of the data stashed in the QR codes in the downloaded version of the EPIC, voting rights can be availed.

Shah seeks another term for BJP to make Assam free from flood

Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Sunday urged the people of Assam to give five more years to the BJP to make the State free from flood too, just as it had done from bullets and agitations.

While addressing 'Vijay Sankalp Samaroh' rally in poll-bound Assam's Nalbari, Shah also attacked the Congress and its ally All India United Democratic Front-AIUDF led by Badruddin Ajmal.

"A flood of development came here. Hospitals, new roads, colleges are being constructed. Industries are being set-up here. In the coming days, only BJP can solve the biggest problem of Assam — floods. We have made Assam free from bullets and agitations. Give five years more to BJP and we will make Assam free from flood too," he said.

Attacking the Congress, Shah said Congress cannot stop infiltrators in Assam as they are its vote bank. Shah said the Congress rule in the state gave only bloodshed, in which thousands of youths lost their lives.

"Can Congress and Badruddin Ajmal stop infiltrators in Assam? They will allow infiltrators since it is their vote bank. Only the Narendra Modi-led BJP government can free Assam from infiltrators," he said.



The Congress has formed Grand Alliance with AIUDF, CPI, CPI(M), CPI(ML) and Anchalik Gana Morcha (AGM) to fight the upcoming Assembly election, likely to be held in March-April.

"Many times, the Congress has accused the BJP of being communal, while the Congress is with the Muslim League in Kerala and is in alliance with Badruddin Ajmal in Assam. In which direction will the Congress take Assam? I want to ask the people who were in power for years, what you did for Assam's culture? What did you do for the development of Assam?" he added.

Attacking the Congress, Shah said, "Congress continued the British policy of divide and rule. They created a divide between Adivasis and non-Adivasis, Assamese people and hill peoples, Bodos and non-Bodos."

"In 20 years there was only bloodshed and 10,000

Assamese youths were killed by bullets fired by the Congress," he said.

Listing out some of the developments in Assam by the BJP government, Shah said that in the 13th Finance Commission, the state was given only ₹79,000 crore.

"In the 14th Finance Commission, the BJP government gave ₹1.55 lakh crore to the State. We opened bank accounts of about 7.20 lakh people in the tea garden area. BJP has done the work of giving ₹5,000 to about 60.20 lakh people in 26 districts of Assam," he added.

Shah is in Assam as part of a two-day visit to the region. Earlier in the day, he addressed a public rally to mark the first anniversary of signing the Bodoland Territorial Region (BTR) Accord at Kokrajhar in Assam.

The term of the 126-member Assam Assembly is ending on 31 May 2021.


Left parties seek repeal of farm laws

The five Left parties on Sunday issued a joint statement reiterating the demand for repealing the controversial three farm laws in the forthcoming budget session of Parliament and urging the Government to hold discussions with all stakeholders for agrarian reforms.

In a statement, the leaders of CPI(M), CPI, CPI(ML), Forward Bloc and RSP said that suspending the laws are not enough and must be repealed in the Parliament even as they hailed the determination of the farmers' unions.

"We demand that the central government must stop being obstinate and immediately convey to the farmers unions that these agrarian laws will be repealed in the forthcoming budget session of parliament that is meeting this week. Already the Government has conveyed its willingness to suspend these laws for eighteen months. Acts that are legisla-



ed by parliament, signed by the President of India and notified by the Gazette are law of the land.

"They cannot be suspended. Unless they are repealed, they are enforceable. Hence, the Government must be reasonable, repeal these laws, hold discussions regarding agrarian reforms with the farmers and other stakeholders including State Governments and then bring proposals before parliament, if any, for their consideration and due deliberations," said the statement issued by Sitaram Yechury, D.Raja, Dipankar Bhattacharya, Debabrata Biswas, and Manoj Bhattacharya.

CBI arrests Regional Labour Commissioner for ₹30,000 bribery

The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) on Sunday arrested a Regional Labour Commissioner (Central) Madurai and a private person in an alleged bribery case of ₹30,000.

A case was registered against the Regional Labour Commissioner (Central), Madurai,

P Sivarajan and private person N Murali, resident of Triplicane, Chennai.

The duo was arrested on the allegations that the said public servant was demanding undue advantage from the private person, representing a private company for issuing labour licence. The CBI laid a trap and both the accused were intercepted while exchanging the undue advantage/bribe amount of Rs 30,000. Searches were conducted at five places in Chennai and Madurai (Tamil Nadu), the CBI said in a statement here.

Not sexual assault under POCSO if there is no 'skin to skin' contact: Bombay HC

Groping a minor's breast without "skin to skin contact" cannot be termed as sexual assault as defined under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, the Bombay High Court has said.

Justice Pushpa Ganediwala of the Nagpur bench of the Bombay High Court, in a judgement passed on January 19, the detailed

copy of which was made available now, held that there must be "skin to skin contact with sexual intent" for an act to be considered sexual assault.

She said in her verdict that mere groping will not fall under the definition of sexual assault. Justice Ganediwala modified the order of a sessions court, which had sentenced a 39-year-old man to three years of imprisonment for sexually assaulting a 12-

year-old girl. As per the prosecution and the minor victim's testimony in court, in December 2016, the accused, one Satish, had taken the girl to his house in Nagpur on the pretext of giving her something to eat. Once there, he gripped her breast and attempted to remove her clothes, Justice Ganediwala recorded in her verdict. However, since he groped her without removing her clothes, the offence cannot

be termed as sexual assault and, instead, constitutes the offence of outraging a woman's modesty under IPC section 354, the high court held.

While section 354 entails a minimum sentence of imprisonment for one year, sexual assault under the POCSO Act entails a minimum imprisonment of three years.

The sessions court had sentenced him to three years of imprisonment for the offences

under the POCSO Act and under IPC section 354. The sentences were to run concurrently. The high court, however, acquitted him under the POCSO Act while upholding his conviction under IPC section 354. "Considering the stringent nature of punishment provided for the offence (under POCSO), in the opinion of this court, stricter proof and serious allegations are required," HC said.

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PAPER WITH PASSION

Missing cohesion

The latest attempts by the Congress to paper over differences raise more questions than these answer

One cannot help wondering what ails India's 'grand old party'? Why is it that over four months after the Congress set into motion the process of holding elections for the appointment of a new president, the Congress Working Committee (CWC) on Friday unanimously put off the exercise until June? Does the Congress not realise that it is rapidly losing political relevance in the country by losing State after State? So now, with the Assembly elections to five States slated for May or earlier, is it not the time for the party to elect a leader who will be able to effectively lead the party into the polls and work out a strategy to reverse its dwindling fortunes? It is very obvious that Rahul is not interested in being at the helm of affairs despite his mother Sonia Gandhi's fervent desire to see her son lead it. Though Rahul is rapidly shaping into a politician who frequently raises uncomfortable and relevant questions for the Government and even takes on the Prime Minister, he is a "reluctant politician" who would rather be away from it all instead of right in the middle of a fight at the hustings. So isn't it time that the Congress began looking at someone outside the "dynasty" to lead it into the poll battles? However, given that the schedule announced by the party's working committee will ensure that the new president escapes responsibility for the outcomes of the five Assembly elections, one cannot be blamed for



thinking that the mantle might again fall on the Gandhi scion.

Is it that the party does not have faith in the bevy of veteran leaders who are more than capable of steering it on the path of victory and, by extension, political relevance? Or is it that the loyalists would rather run the party into the ground than change guard? Is there so much rivalry in the 'grand old party' that the members can't rise above it and do what is best for the future of the Congress and, by extension, the country? Everyone knows that for democracy to be relevant, alive and kicking in a country, a strong Opposition is a must to keep the Government on its toes. But all attempts at forging Opposition unity have come to nought till now as senior leaders — like Chandrababu Naidu, Mamata Banerjee, Sharad Pawar and so on — refuse to kowtow to a young and inexperienced leader who has never even been a Chief Minister? Plus, each of them is more than capable and harbours prime ministerial ambitions. So why would the stalwarts step down for a dynast? The result is a country with a weak and scattered Opposition and no leader tall enough to give an alternative Government at the Centre and occupy the Prime Minister's chair. It is a shame that at a time when the Congress should be finalising its strategy for the looming Assembly elections, there is infighting over the internal elections and the CWC polls which were last held when Sonia took over as Congress president in 1998. The Congress obviously needs to put its house in order, both for its sake and for that of the country.

The mercury may keep dipping but the political temperature is likely to soar ahead of the 72nd Republic Day

With the Weatherman's forecast that the mercury may dip to 4°C Celsius on the Republic Day this year, probably the politically soaring temperature in the Capital due to the planned tractor rally by the farmers' unions is the only thing that might get our blood thawed and running. The Indian Meteorological Department data shows the intense fluctuation in the minimum temperatures this month due to factors like a lesser number of western disturbances influencing the plains, rapid change in wind direction and its speed. Delhi's chilly weather may have troubled the residents a lot but what sends a chill down the Government's spine is the scheduled tractor rally by the peasants, wherever it finally takes place, and if at all. The Republic Day parade is the showcase of India's might and grandeur, its military prowess, rich cultural heritage, its research and development, its values, ethics and whatnot. However, a simultaneous protest rally by the cultivators, when marching contingents of our Armed Forces and paramilitary will showcase the nation's strength on the Rajpath, would definitely not be a feather in India's hat globally. In fact, it'll be considered a blot on Indian democracy.



Delhi has become a political hotbed since the past two months, when the farmers angry with the three Central farm laws have been camping at its borders. However, it's not only the farmer's rally that is expected to mar R-Day celebrations. In the absence of any chief guest at the parade this year, in over 50 years now, the R-Day celebrations would be a bit insipid. After British Prime Minister Boris Johnson expressed his inability to attend the celebration due to the emergence of the mutant COVID-19 strain at home, India would not be showcasing its military might and prowess to the world leaders, to their person. Also, the celebrations will be low-key due to the COVID-19 pandemic as the number of invitees has been drastically cut short to make sure that all the protocols are followed. The weather forecaster has predicted foggy weather in Delhi for the next three days, including that on the Republic Day. The mercury may dip further but the political temperature is soaring each passing day; is expected to leave a mark on the 72nd R-Day and then reaching a climax during the Budget Session.

Professions versus self-employment

Since only about half the employable people globally have jobs, it's time to start training youngsters for self-employment

For a living, there is nothing more pleasurable than owning and running one's own enterprise. True, lately, even in India, some companies offer a hefty pay and perks which exceed the profits of a small-to-medium industry or business. Nevertheless, the satisfaction of owning an enterprise is greater and well offsets the income of a top job. Mind you, a chief executive of a large corporation has several advantages other than merely pay and perks. To be able to operate on a large scale as well the potential of further expansion on commensurate scale is itself a substantial compensation.

The larger the enterprise, the greater the market and, perhaps, influence, and the more the number of people reporting to the CEO. Some chief executives experience, and rightly so, a sense of power which a medium self-owned enterprise can't provide. Until 1980, I headed a company, with no questions ever asked, which employed 25,000 people. That pleasure is yet to be replicated in my own business-cum-industry which has been successful for its size. For a musician, the pleasure of playing on a grand piano far outweighs the satisfaction that a harmonium provides, although the former belongs to someone else while the latter is one's own. The pain and humiliation of the piano being taken away would be greater than the pleasure it ever gave you.

Nevertheless, if I were born again, I would get into my own business earlier than I did in this innings. But I must not forget to mention that a certain discipline and method of work that a large organisation provides, a small one seldom gives. It is not widely known that management science or business management as a subject was started by what an officer observed of the German Army's functioning during World War I: How best to develop an effective organisation economically and then run it optimally. An example that readily comes to mind is the famous "tooth to tail ratio". Given, say, a division of soldiers, maximise the number of fighting/firing men and keep the deployment for servicing/sup-



porting the frontline men with rifles and machine guns at the bare minimum. It was subsequently discovered that the British Army had a 1:10 ratio, while the German ratio was 1:4. On this criterion, the Germans were two-and-a-half times more efficient than the British at the fundamental function of fighting and killing the enemy.

Do not get the impression that I favour the Army set-up as an ideal example for organising a large company. One, I have quoted an example of over a century ago. Two, in today's context, the Army's fighting soldiers and officers are divided into many layers. A better focused training would require fewer layers of supervision or leadership. In contrast, small businesses require versatile men and women, persons who know how to perform multiple functions for the simple reason that the smaller the company, the fewer number of persons it can afford to employ.

Looking at the world scenario, only about half the employable people have jobs. The other half is self-employed, which includes the wealthiest entrepreneur to the humblest hawk. The message is that of the two youngsters coming into the employment market, one must look for self-employment. If one's education

has been law, medicine, accountancy or suchlike, s/he knows what to do. Else, one may try one's hand at business. This is where youngsters who do not belong to families with a business tradition can feel lost. Business management studies enumerate theories on commerce-related subjects. But they seldom lay out advice on how to set up a business if one has no experience. Few successful entrepreneurs write their life stories for the beginners to learn from. Nor have the publishers of educational books apparently persuaded enough entrepreneurs to fill this knowledge gap.

A word of caution: Neither an inheritor of business nor an academician is quite the appropriate author of a truly useful book. Only someone who happens to have started his/her enterprise from scratch and succeeded, is such an author.

My plea is urgent because in the employment market right now, women in significant numbers are seeking jobs, which was earlier a men's monopoly. We had not heard of women fighter pilots in the Air Force; now they are a reality. On the other hand, the COVID-19 affliction has caused a loss in jobs. Will all the shops survive or will home deliveries replace some of them? What are like-

ly to be the effects of work-from-home on employment?

With no family tradition of business, I worked as an executive in big companies for 23 years. By pursuing acquaintances in multi-national corporations, I got started with contract manufacturing. That line helped me set up small factories manufacturing and selling similar goods. This is one example of how a novice can enter his/her own enterprise. But one factor is certain: The person concerned has to lose his/her fear of insecurity. The security of a steady job can sometimes be as bad as a disease.

India is proud of its business management schools which have turned out first-rate executives. But it will be interesting to see a survey of their alumni: What percentage has developed their own enterprises? I feel there is a need for similar schools for small enterprises. A laundry, a restaurant, even a grocer or *panwallah* is a business worth learning and pursuing. Everyone need not learn how to run a large company. In fact, there is greater scope for smaller enterprises but I doubt if there are schools teaching about them.

THE NEXT STAGE IN WORLD HISTORY

The US and China will be embroiled in conflict and India will join the ranks of developed countries

In my opinion the next stage in world history will be marked by two main events: The conflict between the US and China and India joining the ranks of developed countries. Regarding the first, there are two superpowers in the world today, the US and China. The difference between the two is that China is aggressive and expanding, while the US is on the defensive. Hence, the Chinese can be compared to Nazi imperialists in the 1930s and early 1940s, while the US can be compared to the British and French, who were on the defensive. At that time the real danger to the world was Nazi Germany, not the British or French. Today the Chinese, with their huge \$3.2 trillion foreign exchange reserve hungrily looking for new markets, raw materials and avenues for investment worldwide, are the real danger to world peace, like Hitler's imperialism. The main check to the Chinese is the US. Therefore, they are bound to clash. However, for now, the conflict will not take the form of an open war between the two in view of the fact that both have nuclear weapons. But limited conflicts may take place, in various forms like tariff wars and in different places like the South China Sea incidents. As regards the second, in today's age there are really two worlds, one of the developed countries (like North America, Europe, Japan, Australia and China) and the world of the underdeveloped nations (like India and the other countries of Asia, Africa and Latin America). India is on the verge of smashing its way into the ranks of the developed countries.

Before the Industrial Revolution, which began in England in the beginning of the 18th century and then spread everywhere, there were feudal agricultural societies everywhere. The feudal mode of production was so backward that very little wealth could be generated by it. Consequently only a handful of people (kings and aristocrats) could be rich while the rest (over 95 per cent) had to remain poor.



This situation changed drastically after the Industrial Revolution. Now modern industry is so powerful and so big that enough wealth can be generated by it to give a decent life to everyone. Yet, over 75 per cent of the people of the world are poor, particularly in underdeveloped countries. The objective of the underdeveloped countries must be to become developed nations and, therefore, the 21st century and the next stage of history will be characterised as a period of struggle by the people of underdeveloped countries to make this historical transformation. Otherwise they can never escape poverty, unemployment, hunger, lack of healthcare and other evils. There are powerful forces which, for their own vested interests, oppose this historical transformation, so it will not be easy but it must be done by patriots.

India will lead the underdeveloped countries in this process, because it is the most developed of all of them and is on the verge of smashing its way into the ranks of developed nations. India has a huge pool of technical talent with thousands of bright engineers, technicians and scientists (Indians are largely manning Silicon Valley in California and are professors in the science, engineering and mathematics departments in many American universities) and immense natural resources.

However, Indians lacked a genuinely patriotic and modern political leadership and were till now divided on the basis of feudal concepts like caste and religion. This was blocking their advance. The ongoing farmers' agitation has changed this to a large extent. Indians are shunning divisive politics and politicians and are united like never before. This stir has come as the spark that will transform India into a developed country.

Make AI evolution inclusive in India

The disproportionately dominant role played by men in the development of this technology, which leads to gender stereotypes and biases, is concerning

The last few years have witnessed the evolution of Artificial Intelligence (AI) into a powerful tool that enables machines to think and act like humans. Considering the ability of this technology to transform economies, the AI revolution holds unparalleled significance for a developing country like India, which has the second-largest population in the world. While recognising the tremendous potential that this technology holds, it is also important to understand and question the processes involved in the making and functioning of AI. The disproportionately dominant role played by men in the development of this technology which leads to gender stereotypes and biases, is concerning.

The growth of AI technologies: India being the fastest-growing economy in the world has a significant stake in the development of AI. Recognising this potential, the Government had in 2018 instructed the NITI Aayog to establish a national AI programme. Thereafter, the establishment of a national AI stack, the proposal for a National Mission on AI and the launch of a global AI summit in 2020 by the Prime Minister, are all evidence of the Government's commitment to creating a robust AI infrastructure in the country.

With machine learning (ML) finding its application across sectors including healthcare, digital finance and education, the opportunities for job seekers are also abundant in this field. The robust Information Technology (IT) ecosystem coupled with talented human resource has the ability to convert India into an AI hub very soon. However, like any other man-made technology, AI artifacts too reflect the challenge of being cluttered with existing sociological biases. Such concerns need a strategic and tactful response to obviate the said technology from reinforcing the existing stereotypes and discriminatory social norms.

Feminist challenges to the proliferation of AI in Indian Society: It has been 25 years since the adoption of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, that envisioned a peaceful and equitable world for all women. A significant gender bias still exists in our society. For instance, as late as in February 2020 the Supreme Court had to remind the Government that its arguments for denying women a position of command in the Army were based on stereotypes. Moreover, as per a recent report of UNDP titled 'Tackling Social Norms', gender bias is not a male problem as the findings of the report reveal that almost 90 per cent of the people (both men and women) hold some kind of biases against women and people from other marginalised communities. The challenges of social bias and other forms of discrimination against women and members of the trans community pervade all spheres of life. While the existing digital divide and under-representation of women in STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) continue to pose significant concerns, AI and automation are throwing newer challenges for attaining substantive equality in the age of the fourth industrial revolution.

With 78 per cent of AI professionals being men, it is certain that male experiences inform and dominate all AI algorithms with negligible representation from the other communities. This power imbalance has severe adverse implications for the other sexes like affecting their access to jobs and loans by automatically vetting out their applications.

Even companies leading the drive of automation are unintentionally contributing to the existing social biases getting embedded in the AI systems. As highlighted in a 2019 report by UNESCO, it is not a coincidence that virtual personal assistants like Alexa and Siri have female names and they come with a default female voice. These features reinforce the existing social realities where a

majority of personal assistants in the public and private sector are women.

The way forward: Some of the solutions that concern an overall better uptake of AI among women and minorities for India lie in designing these systems inclusively. This may seem fairly obvious on the face of it, but effectively it means using more inclusive training data wherever possible. For instance, women who have never formally learnt to read or write can use their smartphones to communicate. Such digital literacy — and India's increasing digital penetration — can open up a world of opportunities. Voice assistants inbuilt into mobile devices allow women to access a range of tools — however, manufacturers need to ensure that the training data used by the voice assistant is inclusive. Indian accents can vary incredibly based on region, according to the Eighth Schedule of the Indian Constitution, India has 22 regional languages. These can vary further — based on geography and community. If the voice assistant is unable to help a woman due to dialect — then there exists a missed opportunity to include those who are not literate, but willing and able to use their smartphones for a range of purposes.

The solution is straightforward but the challenge lies in its implementation — there has to be emphasis on ensuring that voice assistants can recognise a range of Indian dialects. This is not particular to women — and is a much broader issue of regional inclusivity — but it can benefit women more due to the gender divide in accessing formal education. Manufacturers can pre-empt the digital divide from worsening, in this manner — and such a solution benefits society at large. Conversational

AI can increase the number of customers on an e-commerce platform, help with information and knowledge access and enhance internet experience overall. There are many women who are older and often have not used devices as early on in life as their male counterparts. This leads to a stereotype that mothers are often not as adept at using their mobile phones, and some part of it can be rooted in reality — however, that can be changed with leveraging the power of conversational AI.

Another important element to consider with AI and disruptive technology is the nature of job loss — which will be borne unequally by women across the world. Gender justice in the workforce is a concern of immense importance which must be addressed when it comes to the future of work. Women have the highest participation rates in the informal sector. This is reflected across major sectors such as manufacturing, agriculture and services, where employment of the female labour force is mainly informal. Their jobs are more routine and less abstract than their male counterparts. Research in developing countries shows patterns of job-loss due to digital automation affect women-dominated jobs more than male-dominated ones. This indicates that there is an urgency to skill women so that they can take on jobs which require handling of the AI-based tools.

A majority of the female labour force should be skilled to handle such jobs across sectors. Empowering women technologically will enable them to benefit from emerging technology such as 5G, blockchain, robotics, digital communications and so forth — instead of being the reason for an economic landslide.

COVID-19 has affected women unequally — with women being on the receiving end of job loss, domestic violence and increased household responsibilities. When the post-COVID recovery for the economy begins, India must remember to focus on these gendered issues in order to leverage the potential of its working women — across formal and informal sectors.

In the truest sense of intersectional inclusivity, it is important to remember that inclusivity does not include only women in the strict social sense of the term — but also sexual minorities. The LGBTQIA+ community in India isn't well-represented on forms which collect data for larger AI/ML analyses. Many Government forms only offer the 'M/F' categories to indicate gender and occasionally, 'other'. This leaves out an entire category of people who might identify elsewhere on the gender spectrum — or non-binary people, who do not identify as M/F.

It is vital to work towards weeding out the bias which exists while hiring from the general pool of applicants — by anonymising the profiles of candidates in terms of removing gender identifiers, limiting the skill sets to only those that are required for the job (and not inadvertently including skills which might be typically masculine) and locating non-traditional applicants.

These are some of the social disparities which must be kept in mind while designing and deploying AI systems in India. AI/ML solutions are vast and far-reaching — with the potential to revolutionise sectors such as business and governance, but their impact can be divisive, sexist and exclusionary if not implemented correctly.

Navalny is a thorn in Putin's side but he's no Lenin

What he is doing to great effect is mobilising the tech-savvy youth whose attitude to the regime now verges on contempt

When the Russian Opposition leader Alexei Navalny returned to Moscow after convalescing in Germany following a failed poisoning attempt by the FSB domestic spy agency, the regime-friendly media loyally failed to mention his arrival. With one striking exception: *Vremya*, the flagship news show of Russian State television. Presumably somebody there was hoping to win favour with the Kremlin, because they briefly mentioned Navalny three-quarters of the way through the two-hour programme. In fact, they compared Navalny's trip home to Vladimir Lenin's famous return to Russia in 1917 and suggested that he

was as great a danger to Russia as Lenin had been. The Germans plucked Lenin from exile in Switzerland in the middle of World War-I. He was sent across Germany in a "sealed train" (so he wouldn't spread the infection of communism there) to St Petersburg, then in the throes of Russia's first democratic revolution — and he did just what the Germans had hoped he would.

Lenin overthrew the fumbling democratic provisional Government in a military coup, took Russia out of the war and launched a 73-year totalitarian communist regime that cost at least 20 million Russian lives in purges, famines and lesser acts of repression. Is Navalny really

that great a danger?

The ambitious presenter at *Vremya* probably won't get the job he wanted, because President Vladimir Putin really won't have liked seeing his noisiest critic compared to Lenin, a genuine world historical figure. Putin himself never mentions Navalny's name at all.

Russians cannot even put a name to the system they live under, as the poor presenter's confusion illustrates. It's certainly not a democracy, although there are regular elections. It's definitely not communist, although most of the regime's senior figures were communists before they discovered a better route to power and wealth. It's not a monarchy, although Putin



has been in power for 20 years and is surrounded by a court of extremely rich allies and cronies. And "kleptocracy" is just a pejorative term used mostly by foreigners, although Navalny does habitually refer to Putin and his cronies as "crooks and thieves." It's a purely personal

regime and it is very unlikely to survive his dethronement or demise. Putin has just changed the Constitution with a referendum that lets him stay in power until 2036. But that seems unlikely, partly because he is already 68 and partly because the younger generation of Russians is getting restless and bored. Navalny is a brave man who has gone home voluntarily to face a spell in Putin's jails. (He missed two parole appointments for a suspended sentence on trumped-up embezzlement charges because he was in Germany recovering from the FSB assassination attempt.) But his role in Russian politics so far had been more gadfly than revolutionary. However, his sup-

porters do their homework and make witty videos detailing the scandalous financial abuses of the regime. The latest is a virtual tour of Putin's new \$1 billion seaside palace on the Black Sea, but he is probably not the man who will take Putin down. What he is doing to great effect is mobilising the tech-savvy youth whose attitude to the regime now verges on contempt.

Russians have put up with it for a long time because they were exhausted and shamed by the wild political banditry of the 1990s, but Putin's credit for having put an end to that has been exhausted. He may still be in power for years, but this is a regime on the skids.

Markets may witness profit-taking after 50K peak

All eyes on Budget

The Indian stock market which added another feather to its cap by scaling the 50,000-mount for the first time ever may witness some profit-taking ahead but for now, all eyes are on the upcoming Union Budget that will influence the onward journey of the bluechip index, according to analysts.

From witnessing gigantic losses to record-shattering gains, investors witnessed a wide array of emotions in 2020. Markets showed volatile trends last year, with the benchmark crashing to its one-year low of 25,638.9 on March 24, only to roar back to reach record highs in the later part of the year.

The record-breaking run has been continuing, with the benchmark reaching the momentous 50,000-mark on January 21. The 30-share BSE index jumped to its record high of 50,184.01 during the trade on Thursday.

"Expect markets to go into consolidation phase in the sec-

ond half of this calendar year and again resume the upward trajectory from CY20 onwards," Rusmik Oza, Executive Vice President, Head of Fundamental Research at Kotak Securities, said.

The entire plot changed for the markets in just ten months from massive losses to record-breaking peaks and this came at a time when the world is facing a health crisis.

Market analysts have attributed the sharp rebound in the market following the March crash to a host of factors such as abundant liquidity injected into the global financial system by leading central banks of the world, unprecedented retail investor participation and in recent months, on hopes of successful vaccines.

Driven by the improved investor sentiment, the market capitalisation of BSE-listed companies is also making new records and is currently at over ₹194 lakh crore. The BSE-listed companies market cap had crossed the landmark ₹100 lakh crore on November 28,

2014. In 2020, investors grew richer by ₹32.49 lakh crore helped by massive returns in the equity market which had a roller coaster ride during the year hit by the coronavirus pandemic.

From March 23, 2020 when the benchmark indices posted their worst ever one-day crash till now, the investor wealth has risen by a whopping ₹92,48,551.09 crore.

During the entire 2020, the 30-share BSE Sensex made monthly gains in seven while



closing with losses in five of them. The Sensex, the country's first equity index, was launched in 1986. On July 25, 1990, it had closed above 1,000 mark. In another milestone, the benchmark closed above 10,000 mark on February 7, 2006.

"Indian markets have been witnessing strong momentum over the past few months on hopes of a faster economic recovery after the pandemic lockdown. Also positive global cues, sustained FII inflows and strong corporate earnings

kept the sentiments high. Buzz around the upcoming Budget has also added strength to the markets. The Budget could potentially lay the foundation for a long term economic growth path.

"Overall, we expect the market to continue its upward journey on the back of healthy corporate earnings, strong liquidity, positive developments on the vaccine front, broad-based economic recovery and low interest rates," Hemang Jani, Head Equity Strategist at

Motilal Oswal Financial Services, said.

Jani also noted that unlocking of the economy since June 2020 led to a significant recovery in various macro, micro data points, resulting in equity markets surpassing its previous lifetime highs once again.

"The three big factors that have driven markets are smart recovery in the economy, FPI flows and earnings revision," Oza said.

Apart from being driven by FII investments, the rally was also led by direct investments by domestic investors. The sharp fall in Indian markets in March opened up opportunities for stock picking which saw a clear shift in the way retail investors participated in stock markets, Jani added.

"The speed with which central banks across the globe infused liquidity was the single most reason for the equity markets to recover," S Ranganathan, Head of Research at LKP Securities, said. On the road ahead, VK Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist at Geojit Financial Services, said markets are likely to turn highly volatile reacting to events and news.

Govt likely to announce formulation of policy for toys sector in Budget

The Government may in the Budget next week announce formulation of a dedicated policy for the toys sector to boost domestic manufacturing, sources said.

They said the policy will help in creating a strong ecosystem for the industry in the country and also attract startups.

The commerce and industry ministry is already taking steps to promote domestic manufacturing of toys. It has come out with a quality control order for the sector and had also increased import duty last year on toys.

Quality control order is one of the ways to stop flow of cheap sub-standard toys into the domestic market.

A source said that the country has low share in the international toys industry and India's exports account for less than 0.5 per cent of global demand, so there are immense opportunities in this segment.

The other areas which could be considered for the sector include promotion of research and development and design centres for toys.

"Boosting manufacturing would also help increase exports of toys from India. Countries like China and

Vietnam are major players in the sector," they added.

India's toy exports are limited to about USD 100 million. The toys industry in India is primarily in the unorganised sector, comprising about 4,000 small and medium enterprises.

About 85 per cent of toys are imported in the country, with maximum coming from China. It is followed by Sri Lanka, Malaysia, Germany, Hong Kong and the US.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi had said that India has talent and ability to become a toy hub for the entire world and called upon startups to work towards realising this potential while being "vocal about local toys".

Covid underlined need for higher Budget allocation for healthcare sector

The Covid-19 pandemic has emphasised the key role of healthcare in the lives of people, underlining the importance of higher budget allocation for improving the healthcare infrastructure in the country, sectoral players said.

The pharma sector which has played a leading role as the "pharmacy of the world" said it expects support and incentives especially for research & development and innovation in the coming Budget.

The pandemic has completely changed the dynamics of the Indian healthcare ecosystem, NATHEALTH President and Apollo Hospitals Executive Vice-Chairperson Preetha Reddy told PTI.

"It has reiterated the need for increased investment in healthcare infrastructure, national level programmes for skill development and training of healthcare staff, increase in number of medical colleges, effective PPP models and further boost for local manufacturing," she added.

These should be the key priorities for the Government this time, Reddy said.

"Private healthcare providers are hopeful that there will be additional incentives to aid the sector in business

recovery and also enable expansion across tier 2-3 cities - through provision of land at subsidised rates to set up hospitals, tax relief for new infrastructure creation, import duty relief for life saving equipment and ease of GST regulations for healthcare services," she added.

Reddy said that public spending in healthcare should increase to deal with future pandemics and for sustained preventive care.

Digital Health services found their rightful space during the pandemic and there is a need to expand and support the essential backup services to enable digital healthcare to function efficiently in all primary and secondary healthcare centres, she added.

In a similar vein, Fortis Healthcare MD and CEO Ashutosh Raghuvanshi said the Covid pandemic has underlined the importance of higher budget allocation for healthcare.

"The current situation demands increased budgetary impetus for improving healthcare infrastructure at primary, secondary and tertiary levels, and also to enable the healthcare sector's speedy recovery," he added.

It is important to note that the healthcare sector is not only a potential foreign exchange

earner but also a significant employment generator, Raghuvanshi said.

"Our overall strategy must integrate preventive and curative services and make healthcare more affordable and accessible for the people of India," he added.

Highlighting the need for increasing the budget allocation for healthcare, Aster DM Healthcare Founder Chairman and MD Azad Moopen said the Covid-19 pandemic hit home the fact that a strong healthcare infrastructure is absolutely essential to ensure a sustainable economy.

"It is important to at least double the healthcare budget from last year's meager allocation. This would help improve access to affordable care for the masses," he added.

Emphasising expectations from the budget for the pharma sector, Indian Pharmaceutical Alliance (IPA) Secretary General Sudarshan Jain said: "The overall policy ecosystem should help increase thrust on healthcare and build healthcare infrastructure to cater to the societal needs as healthcare is fundamental."

The pharma industry is looking for support and incentives in research & development, and innovation, he added.

Real estate sector seeks sops in upcoming Budget

The real estate sector wants Stimulus in the form of sops in the upcoming Union Budget to boost housing demand, a top Credai Bengal official said.

The demands include personal tax relief, tax rebate on housing, extension of interest subvention, GST waiver, infrastructure status for the realty and easing liquidity for the sector, the official said. The Budget for financial year 2021-22 will be presented on February 1.

In recent months, the government had offered ₹25,000 crore stress asset fund for the uncompleted housing projects, increasing the differential from 10 per cent to 20 per cent under Section 43(CA) of the IT Act till June 30, 2021 were announced apart from ongoing interest subvention scheme.

"The year 2020 has been an unprecedented period in human history that disrupted the normal course of life. Since the outbreak of the pandemic in India earlier this year, the real estate sector reeling under a liquidity crunch, witnessed a flurry of challenges, Credai, West Bengal, president Sushil Mohta told PTI.

"There is a need to bolster the real estate sector that contributes 8 per cent of the country's economy as it is gearing for a big leap in the next 10 years," he said.

Global real estate consultant Knight Frank India chairman and managing director Shishir Bajjal in a pre-budget wish demanded A separate annual deduction of ₹1,50,000 that will provide the much-needed flip to opt for house purchase. On the aspect of housing demand, Section 80 C

tax deduction on home loan principal repayment does not provide for a focused benefit on housing, he said.

"Hike the ₹2 lakh tax rebate on housing loan interest rates to at least ₹5 lakh to generate healthier housing demand, most notably in affordable and mid-segment housing. The last increase in the deduction limit under Section 80C (to ₹1.5 lakh a year) was in 2014 and an upward revision is long overdue," Mohta who is also the Merlin group chairman said.

He also demanded GST waiver for under-construction homes and extension of the interest subvention by another three years. Bajjal said the government should use this budget session to refer to recommendations on restoration of GST input tax credit to the upcoming GST council meet.

Hold back imposition of BCD on solar equipment in Budget, demand developers

Solar power developers in the country have demanded that the government should hold back the imposition of basic customs duty (BCD) on solar equipment for the time being in the forthcoming Budget. They fear that this could derail the Government's ambitious target of having 175GW renewables by 2022, requiring an investment flow of ₹1.75 lakh crore.

India has an ambitious target of having 175GW of renewable energy capacity by 2022, including 100GW of solar and 60GW of wind energy

According to industry estimates, as much as ₹1.75 lakh crore investment is required to bid out 35GW of renewable energy capacity in the country. About 50 GW of clean energy is under implementation, while India has already installed over 90GW renewables, including 37GW of solar and 38GW of wind energy. India has an ambitious target of having 175GW of renewable energy capacity by 2022, including 100GW of solar and 60GW of wind energy.

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman would propose the General Budget on February 1.

Earlier in June last year, Power Minister RK Singh had clearly indicated about the Government's intent to impose basic customs duty on solar equipment and also reiterated that again.

India sees 19 IPOs worth \$1.84 bn in 2020 Q4: Report

Reflecting strong momentum, India witnessed 19 initial public offers worth \$1.84 billion in the fourth quarter of 2020 and market sentiment remains positive in what could be a stellar 2021, according to a report.

Leading consultancy EY's India IPO Trends Report: Q4 2020 showed that there were a total of 10 Initial Public Offers (IPOs) in the main market and 9 in the SME (Small and Medium Enterprises) segment during this period.

In the latest December quarter, there were 19 IPOs valued at \$1.836 billion and the largest was that of Gland Pharma with an issue size of \$869 million. There were just 11 IPOs in the year-ago period.

India ranks ninth globally in terms of the number of IPOs in 2020 with 43 IPOs raising \$4.09 billion, as per the report.

"There is a strong momentum in the IPO markets, and we are seeing an increased interest from companies across sectors looking to raise capital in the near term. Additionally, companies are keenly awaiting guidelines for direct listing in overseas markets. The market sentiment remains positive for what could be a stellar 2021," Sandip Khetan, Partner and National Leader, Financial

Accounting Advisory Services (FAAS) at EY India, said.

During the 2020 December quarter, main markets had 10 IPOs compared to 5 in the same period a year ago.

Real estate, hospitality and construction and diversified industrial products were the most active sectors (in terms of the number of IPOs) with three IPOs launched in each sector (including main and SME markets), the report said.

The report said that in 2020, global IPO volumes continued to accelerate, increasing by 19 per cent to 1,363 while proceeds increased 29 per cent year-on-year to a total of \$268 billion.

Last year, IPO activity proved resilient to the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic supported by low interest rates and expansionary monetary policies, it said.

"Despite a challenging year, 2020 activity in the Asia-Pacific region surpassed 2019, increasing 20 per cent (822) by volume and 45 per cent (\$136.2 billion) by proceeds in 2020.

"In fact, the region saw the highest proceeds since 2010. Industrials led the sectors with 181 IPOs raising \$20.8 billion in proceeds, followed by technology with 180 IPOs and \$38.7 billion in proceeds, and materials, which saw 95 IPOs raising \$7.4 billion," the report said.

Finance Ministry allocates ₹660 cr additional funds to Madhya Pradesh for capex

The Finance Ministry on Sunday said it has allocated an additional ₹660 crore to Madhya Pradesh for capital expenditure to undertake citizen-centric reforms.

"A list of capital projects with an estimated cost of ₹660 crore was approved by the Department of Expenditure. Fifty per cent of the approved amount (i.e. ₹330 crore) has also been released to the state (Madhya Pradesh) as first instalment for the approved projects," it said in a statement.

The Ministry has allocated this additional funds to the state for capital expenditure for undertaking the "One Nation, One Ration Card" reforms, Ease of Doing Business

reforms, and urban local bodies reforms.

The State has also completed part of the fourth reform - the power sector reforms.

The "Special Assistance to States for capital expenditure" scheme was announced by the Centre in October last year as part of Aatmanirbhar Bharat package. The scheme is aimed at boosting capital expenditure of the state governments that are facing difficult financial environment due to a shortfall in tax revenue arising from the Covid 19 pandemic.

"So far, capital expenditure proposals of ₹10,657 crore of 27 states have been approved by the Ministry of Finance. An amount of ₹5,328 crore has already been released to the states as the first instalment under the scheme.

Country's economy is gradually recovering, says Montek

The country's economy, which contracted in the first two quarters of the current fiscal, has started recovering at a gradual pace, former deputy chairman of erstwhile Planning Commission Montek Singh Ahluwalia said on Sunday.

The economy contracted by a massive 23.9 per cent in the first quarter and 7.5 per cent in the second quarter on account of the Covid-19 pandemic.

"We had jumped off a cliff in the first quarter of this financial year because of the lockdown, which was necessitated by the pandemic. The economy is now climbing back. I think it's a gradual recovery but it is a clear recovery," Ahluwalia said at a virtual event.

According to the first advance estimates of national

income released by the National Statistical Office (NSO), the country's GDP is estimated to contract by a record 7.7 per cent during the current financial year (2020-21).

An article published in the Reserve Bank of India's January Bulletin has stated that the country's GDP is within the striking distance of attaining positive growth.

Ahluwalia said the manufacturing sector is recovering and has got back to where it was in 2019-20. However, the contact industries which include hotels, restaurants, travel, tourism and retail shopping in malls are badly hit and will take some time to return to normalcy, he said.

He said the infrastructure in the country still lags behind and there is an urgent need to increase investment in the sector over the next few quarters.

FPIs net investors at ₹18,456 crore in January so far

Foreign portfolio investors (FPI) remained net buyers to the tune of ₹18,456 crore so far in January as global liquidity led to continued investment in emerging markets.

According to depositories data, overseas investors pumped in ₹24,469 crore into equities but pulled out ₹6,013 crore from the bonds market between January 1-22.

The total net investment during the period under review stood at ₹18,456 crore.

"The inflow into the Indian markets continue as global liquidity leads to more investments in emerging markets like India," said Harsh Jain, co-founder and COO at Groww.

Besides, he said there are indications which suggest that the economic recovery post lockdowns have been better than expected.

CAIT seeks action against Amazon, Zomato for 'daylight robbery'

The Confederation of All India Traders (CAIT) in a communication sent to Union Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal demanded immediate action against e-commerce entities including Amazon, Flipkart, Zomato, Swiggy and others.

"It is a case of daylight robbery of e-commerce entities in India and therefore demand immediate action against the erring e-commerce portals and online mechanism providers," CAIT said.

CAIT has accused Amazon, Flipkart, Zomato, Swiggy and various other e-commerce entities for violation of mandatory display of Country of Origin and Manufacturer, seller details on products sold through their respective E-Commerce Portals as required under the

Consumers Protection (E Commerce) Rules, 2020, Legal Metrology (Packaged Commodities) Act, 2011 and guidelines of Food Safety & Standards Authority of India.

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"It is a case of daylight robbery of e-commerce entities in India and, therefore demands immediate action against the erring e-commerce portals and online mechanism providers," CAIT said.

CAIT National President B.C. Bhartia and Secretary General Praveen Khandelwal in a communication to Goyal said that e-commerce entities conducting business in India including Amazon, Flipkart and others are highly violating the mandatory conditions spelled out in above Acts.

"It is a pity that particularly in e-commerce every guidelines, Rules & Regulations, Laws and policies are being flouted openly and no department has so far taken any cognizance of compliance issues resulting in a highly vitiated and mess like e-commerce trade of India," CAIT said.

Bhartia and Khandelwal said that Rule 10 of Legal Metrology (Packaged Commodities) Rules, 2011 provide that e-commerce entities should have to display name and address of the manufacturer, name of the country of origin, common/generic name of the product, net quantity, best before/use by date (if applicable), maximum retail price, dimensions of the commodity, etc.

This rule was introduced in June 2017 and provided a transition period of six months thereby its implementation

from January 1, 2018 but even after a lapse of three years, the above rules are not being complied by e-commerce companies prominently by Amazon, Flipkart, etc.

Failure to make declarations as above will amount to selling non-standard packages and will invite penalty under the above said Act, including fine or imprisonment or both, CAIT said.

Both trade leaders further said that similar obligations were imposed on e-commerce food business operators vide guidelines issued by the Food Safety & Standards Authority (FSSAI) on February 2, 2017.

"But such FBOs like Zomato, Swiggy, etc. are not complying with the above rules," CAIT said.

Bhartia and Khandelwal said that under Rule 4(2) of the Consumer Protection (E Commerce) Rules, 2020, it is

provided that every e-commerce entity shall provide the following information in a clear and accessible manner on its platform, displayed prominently to its users, namely, legal name of the e-commerce entity, principal geographic address of its headquarters and all branches, name and details of its website, and contact details like email address, fax, landline and mobile numbers of customer care as well as of grievance officer. Similar provisions are also spelled out in Press Note 2 of the FDI Policy, 2016.

CAIT said no e-commerce entity has appointed a Nodal Officer as also complying with above provisions. Important rights of the consumers are being violated as they are not aware of the seller or description of the product at the time of purchase of products from e-commerce portals.

Joe Biden conveyed his intention to strengthen the "special relationship" with the UK in his first call as the US President with British Prime Minister Boris Johnson, during which the two leaders re-committed to the NATO alliance and agreed to cooperate on combating climate change and containing the Covid-19 pandemic.

The conversation with Johnson over phone on Saturday was Biden's third involving a foreign leader since his inauguration on Wednesday, after he spoke with Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and Mexico's President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador on Friday. "Great to speak to President Joe Biden this

evening. I look forward to deepening the longstanding alliance between our two countries as we drive a green and sustainable recovery from Covid-19," Johnson said in a tweet.

It seem that a new trade agreement was not on the list of priorities for both sides. While the Downing Street readout of the phone call referred to Johnson reiterating his intention to resolve existing trade issues as soon as possible, the White House communicate of the call only referred to "strengthening the special relationship".

"The president conveyed his intention to strengthen the special relationship between our countries and revitalise transatlantic ties, underscoring the critical role of NATO to our collective defense and shared



values," the White House said. "Building on the UK and US' long history of cooperation in security and defence, the leaders re-committed to the NATO alliance and our shared values in promoting human rights and protecting democracy. They also discussed the benefits of a potential free

trade deal between our two countries, and the Prime Minister reiterated his intention to resolve existing trade issues as soon as possible," a Downing Street spokesperson said.

The UK is keen to conclude a post-Brexit free trade agreement with the US, but the new American administration



has been less vocal over this amid the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic crisis.

The global health crisis and vaccination programme in both countries and around the world as well as climate change were areas of more mutual agreement, with security and defence through

strengthening the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) also high on the agenda - in contrast with former President Donald Trump's hard ball with the alliance.

During the call, President Biden noted the importance of cooperation, including through multilateral organisations, on shared challenges such as combatting climate change, containing Covid-19, and ensuring global health security, the White House said.

The leaders also discussed the need for coordination on shared foreign policy priorities, including China, Iran, and Russia, it said.

"The Prime Minister warmly welcomed the President's decision to re-join the Paris Agreement on climate change, as well as the World Health Organisation and the

COVAX programme to ensure equitable access for vaccines," the Downing Street spokesperson said.

On climate change, Johnson is said to have also praised President Biden's early action on tackling climate change and commitment to reach Net Zero by 2050.

"The leaders looked forward to meeting in person as soon as the circumstances allow, and to working together through the G7, G20 and COP26 this year," the spokesperson added.

The UK will be hosting the G7 summit in Cornwall in June, which is expected to be Biden's first visit to the country. Prime Minister Narendra Modi is also due to join the summit for its guest country sessions.

The new White House

incumbent is famously anti-Brexit but all early indications are that his views on the UK's exit from the European Union (EU) are unlikely to overshadow US-UK relations in future.

In his call with Mexico's President, Biden and Obrador agreed to work closely to stem the flow of irregular migration to Mexico and the US, as well as to promote development in the Northern Triangle of Central America.

"The president outlined his plan to reduce migration by addressing its root causes, increasing resettlement capacity and lawful alternative immigration pathways, improving processing at the border to adjudicate requests for asylum, and reversing the previous administration's draconian immigration policies," the White House said.

Vaccinated people may still transmit Covid, warns England's chief medic

One of England's leading medical officers on Sunday urged the public to continue to follow the strict lockdown rules because any vaccine-related immunity from Covid-19 takes at least three weeks to kick in.

Professor Jonathan Van-Tam, England's Deputy Chief Medical Officer, also warned that there is no clear evidence yet to show that vaccinated people cannot transmit the deadly virus on to others.

"Regardless of whether someone has had their vaccination or not, it is vital that everyone follows the national restrictions and public health advice, as protection takes up to three weeks to kick in and we don't yet know the impact of vaccines on transmission," said Van-Tam.

His warning comes as the UK registered another high daily death toll from the virus of 1,348 this weekend, taking the country's total to 97,329.

However, he pointed to an additional 32 vaccination sites coming on stream to add to the thousands of venues where the

National Health Service (NHS) has been delivering 140 jabs a minute, taking the vaccinated total to over 5.8 million.

"The vaccine is rightly something to celebrate - let's stay patient, stay at home and support the NHS as it continues to roll out the vaccine," he said.

A Living Museum where the BBC filmed a hit drama series 'Peaky Blinders' based on the notorious Birmingham gang in the 1920s is among the new vaccine sites.

A former IKEA store at the Westfield shopping centre in Stratford, London, the Francis Crick Institute, which is also in the UK capital, the Nightingale Hospital in Sunderland and the Blackpool Winter Gardens will also be new vaccination centres.

The latest openings mean there will be a network of almost 50 across the country, adding to options alongside hospitals, pharmacies and general practice (GP) surgeries.

"Through the vaccines delivery plan, we have made outstanding progress in vaccinating our NHS and care staff

and the most vulnerable people in society," said UK Health Secretary Matt Hancock.

"We must not drop our guard. While the vaccine can prevent severe disease, we do not know if it stops you from passing on the virus to others, and it takes time to develop immunity after a jab, so for now everyone must continue to stay at home to help bring down infections and protect the NHS," he said.

The NHS said the new vaccine centres will each be capable of delivering thousands of jabs each week, scaling up and down according to vaccine supplies and demand.

People eligible in the priority criteria of over-80s, followed by over-70s, care home workers and staff as well as frontline workers, are being invited when it is their turn and people are being urged not to just turn up.

"These new centres provide another option for people invited for their jabs, alongside the fantastic work of local GPs," said Professor Stephen Powis, NHS national medical director.

US condemns Russia's use of harsh tactics against protesters, journalists

The United States has strongly condemned Russia's use of harsh tactics against protesters and journalists demanding the release of jailed opposition leader Alexei Navalny.

The US State Department called on Russian authorities to release all those detained for exercising their universal rights and for the immediate and unconditional release of Navalny.

"We urge Russia to fully cooperate with the international community's investigation into the poisoning of Aleksey Navalny and credibly explain the use of a chemical weapon on its soil," State Department Spokesperson Ned Price said in a statement amidst widespread protests across Russia.

"Prior to today's events, the Russian government sought to suppress the rights to peaceful assembly and freedom of expression by harassing protest

organisers, threatening social media platforms, and preemptively arresting potential participants," he said.

This follows years of tightening restrictions and repressive actions against civil society, independent media, and the political opposition, he added.

Continued efforts to suppress Russians' rights to peaceful assembly and freedom of expression, the arrest of Navalny, and the crackdown on protesters that followed are troubling indications of further restrictions on civil society and fundamental freedoms, Price said.

"Russians' rights to peaceful assembly and to participate in free and fair elections are enshrined not only in the country's constitution, but also in Russia's OSCE commitments, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and in its international obligations under the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights," he said.

Chinese military pressure on Taiwan threatens regional peace, stability: US

Expressing concern over Chinese military pressure on Taiwan, the United States has said that such intimidating tactics threaten regional peace and stability.

"The United States notes with concern the pattern of ongoing PRC (Peoples Republic of China) attempts to intimidate its neighbours, including Taiwan," State Department Spokesperson Ned Price said on Saturday.

In a statement, he urged Beijing to cease its military, diplomatic, and economic pressure on Taiwan and instead engage in meaningful dialogue with Taiwan's democratically elected representatives.

"We will stand with friends and allies to advance our shared prosperity, security, and values in the Indo-Pacific region -- and that includes deepening our ties with democratic Taiwan," Price said.

The US will continue to support a peaceful resolution of cross-strait issues, consistent

with the wishes and best interests of the people on Taiwan, he said, adding that the US maintains its longstanding commitments as outlined in the Three Communiqués, the Taiwan Relations Act, and the Six Assurances.

"We will continue to assist Taiwan in maintaining a sufficient self-defence capability. Our commitment to Taiwan is rock-solid and contributes to the maintenance of peace and stability across the Taiwan Strait and within the region," Price said.

19 BURNED BODIES FOUND NEAR MEXICO-US BORDER Ciudad Victoria (Mexico): Mexican authorities say they have found 19 shot and burned bodies near a town across the Rio Grande from Texas in an area that has seen violent territorial disputes between organised crime groups in recent years. The Tamaulipas state prosecutor's office said late Saturday that the bodies were discovered along a dirt road outside Camargo after residents reported a burning vehicle. Authorities found two vehicles on fire, one containing four bodies and the other 15.

ESTONIA TO GET 1ST FEMALE PRIME MINISTER Tallinn: Estonia's two biggest political parties say they have clinched a deal to form a new Government to be led by a female Prime Minister for the first time in the Baltic country's history, replacing the previous Cabinet that collapsed into a corruption scandal earlier this month. The party councils of the opposition, center-right Reform Party and the ruling, Left-leaning Center Party were expected to vote in favor of joining a Cabinet headed by Reform's PM-designate and chairwoman Kaja Kallas.

308 PAK TWITTER HANDLES TRYING TO DISRUPT TRACTOR RALLY: POLICE

As the farmers wanted to do a tractor rally on January 26, police have come to a conclusion

that the rally will be conducted after the timing of the Republic Day Celebration ends. Police has given them around 170 kilometres of distance in three routes," said the Special CP.

"The rally will start from Singhu border and pass through Sanjay Gandhi Transport Nagar, Kanjhawala, Bawana, Auchandi Border, Kundli-Manesar-Palwal expressway and will return to Singhu border. It will cover around 62 kilometres stretch. Police teams have done the assessment of these routes," said the Special CP.

"From Tikri border, the farmers have been given the route which will pass through Nangloi, Najafgarh, Jharoda, Kundli-Manesar-Palwal expressway and then will head back to Tikri border. They will cover a distance of around 63 kilometres," said the Special CP.

"The farmers tractor rally from Ghazipur border will pass through Apsara Border, Hapur Road Kundli-Manesar-Palwal expressway and conclude at Ghazipur. Those farmers groups will cover 46 kilometres of distance," said the Special CP.

"The barricades and other security arrangements will be removed and the farmer will enter the national capital. Later, they will return to their destinations after covering a respectable distance," said the Special CP.

"For the Delhi Police, it will be a challenging task. We have spoken to Haryana and Uttar Pradesh Police officers about how it will be conducted in a convenient way. The rally will be started after the time period of the Republic Day Celebration ended," he said.

"Police have also told farmers that the expected number of tractors should be distributed in a way that the rally will be concluded in a peaceful and disciplined way and adequate security will be provided to the rally by the police," said police official.

Police said farmers' union Sanyukt Kisan Morcha had assured them that they will go back to their respective places from where the rally started.

While police tried to convince farmer leaders to hold their tractor parade outside the national capital, they were adamant on holding the proposed rally on Delhi's busy Outer Ring Road.

Earlier, there have been three rounds of meetings between the unions and police officers from Delhi, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh, but it was during the fourth round of talks over the tractor parade on Friday where both sides reached an agreement.

NEW INDUCTION WON'T BELITTLE IMPORTANCE OF OLD-TIMERS: BENGAL BJP

According to the saffron camp sources and media reports, several party cadres and the RSS the BJPs ideological parent are not very happy with the induction of certain leaders in the party.

"There could be complaints against some leaders, but you have to understand one thing that whoever is joining us will not become a leader immediately. In a democracy, numbers

play an important role. We have to get the numbers (to come to power)," he said.

Ghosh further said and "regarding the question of getting a leadership position, it will be decided later by the party who will be the leader or the face."

Ghosh assured the old-timers that they have nothing to worry about, as each of them will be accommodated according to their ability.

"Everybody be will be accommodated according to their ability and will get respect. All of us have to work together to oust the TMC," he said.

Many senior TMC leaders, including political heavyweight Suvendu Adhikari, 14 other MLAs and a sitting MP, have switched over to the saffron camp in the last two years.

Three Left MLAs and four Congress legislators have also joined the saffron camp.

Talking about Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee's allegation that the BJP has turned into a "washing machine" that cleanses corrupt turncoats after inducting them, Ghosh said taking someone into the party fold does not mean justifying his/her wrong deeds.

"We are not certifying or justifying anyone or anything. If someone is proven guilty, he or she will have to face the consequences. Its the TMC that believes in the culture of corruption.

"In our society, a section of people are into politics, and wherever this section goes, that party grows from strength to strength. If there are some politicians who are willing to join us, we will welcome them. Law, on the other hand, will take its own course," he stated.

Ghosh, however, maintained that the party has put in place a mechanism to look into the profile of cadres and workers before inducting them.

"We are not here to judge anyone. But, that doesn't mean we will induct each and every one. There is a screening process and everybody has to go through it. We can never deliver good governance if we don't come to power. For that, we need to expand our base," he said.

Referring to the "outsider versus insider" debate in West Bengal, the state BJP chief said the TMC has raked up the issue as it has nothing else to talk about.

"The TMC, after a decade in power in the state, has nothing to talk about, it seems. Ours is a national party, and our leaders will come here to assist us. But, those who are fighting elections or are working at the grassroots level are residents of this state. So the allegations are baseless," he underlined.

Exuding confidence that the BJP will come to power with more than two-thirds majority, Ghosh said the party would draft a road map for the development of the state.

Speaking on the issue of projecting a chief ministerial candidate before the assembly polls, Ghosh said it is for the leadership to decide.

"In states where we were in opposition, we chose our CM candidate after winning the elections. Our party believes in collective leadership. Naming a chief ministerial candidate is not important," he pointed out.

11 trapped miners rescued from gold mine in China

Eleven miners, trapped underground for two weeks following a blast in a gold mine in east China's Shandong Province, have been rescued, the state media reported on Sunday. Authorities have been racing to dig out 22 miners trapped underground in the partially built gold mine in the city of Qixia in Shandong Province, since the explosion blocked their exit on January 10. The rescuers set free two workers on Sunday, bringing the number of rescued miners to 11, the state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

The first miner was rescued from the mine in the morning. The worker, said to be in "extremely weak condition", was rushed to the hospital for treatment, the report

said. Currently, 633 people and 407 equipment are at the site for rescue operations.

Before Sunday, rescuers had established contact with only 10 of the miners, who were in good physical and psychological condition. Another is believed to have been dead, the report said, adding the deceased worker had been in a coma.

Efforts have been underway to reach the workers since the blast occurred about 240 meters from the mine's entrance, but Chinese officials said on Thursday it could take 15 days to drill through 70 tons of debris trapping many of the miners. Food, medical supplies, blankets, and batches of nutrient solution have been passed down a shaft to the 10 workers who have been located, Xinhua reported.

Dutch police clash with protesters in Amsterdam, Eindhoven

Dutch police clashed with protesters demonstrating against the country's lockdown in the capital, Amsterdam and the southern city of Eindhoven on Sunday, a day after rioting youths protesting the country's curfew torched a coronavirus testing facility in a Dutch fishing village.

In Amsterdam, police used a water cannon to disperse protesters taking part in a banned demonstration on a major square ringed by museums. Video images showed the water cannon spraying people grouped against a wall of the Van Gogh Museum. Police in Eindhoven used a water cannon and tear gas against a crowd of hundreds of demonstrators that also included supporters of the anti-immigrant group PEGIDA.

Eindhoven police said they made at least 30 arrests by late afternoon and warned people to stay away from the city center amid the clashes.

There were no immediate reports of injuries. It was the second Sunday in a row that police clashed with protesters in Amsterdam angry at the country's lockdown amid.

The unrest followed a night of rioting in the fishing village of Urk on the first night of a curfew imposed by the Dutch government to rein in the spread of the more transmissible variant of the coronavirus.

REGAIN THE LOST GLORY

Traditional handloom tapped into the potential of modern e-commerce sites during the pandemic. By SANJAY DESAI

India's handlooms and handicrafts, unique to various communities within the country, represent its rich cultural heritage. Handloom products, from Pashmina Shawls of Jammu and Kashmir, Ikkat of Odisha, Kanchipuram Saris of Tamilnadu, Lucknow's Chikan and Zardozi to Assam's Eri and Muga Silks, have been preserving the colourful and vibrant culture for over 2000 years.

M N Upadhyay in his book *Handicrafts of India* wrote the most fitting description of Indian handmade craft and textile: "To write about Indian handicrafts is almost like writing about the country itself. So vast, complex, colourful yet simple and charm, difficult to attain under comparable conditions."

The social and economic importance Indian handloom industry is enormous as well. It creates 95 per cent of the world's handmade textiles, making a hefty contribution to the economy. It also remains the second-largest employment provider for the rural population after agriculture. According to the Handloom Export Promotion Council, a statutory body constituted under the Ministry of Textiles, about 4.3 million people directly derive their livelihood from the handloom industry.

Despite its cultural, social, and economic significance, handlooms have been on a decline. In the last few decades, economic liberalisation, globalisation, rapidly increasing industrialisation have affected the handloom and handicrafts industry. There's a substantial difference between the time consumed in the production of cloth by the handloom industry and the powerloom industry. It takes months to design and weave a beautiful Chanderi silk sari while machine-made saris are woven within days. Thus, cheaper powerloom products dominate the market.

The traditional industry also suffers due to supply chain inefficiencies, lack of branding and marketing. The middlemen and retailer of handloom products receive three to 10 times the price paid to weavers and artisans. The craftsmen, renowned for their hand-spinning, weaving and printing elegance, struggle to make ends meet. The skills are passed on from one generation to another but lack of income and dignity of labour has been deter-



ring the younger generation from working in this industry. The unorganised and informal nature of the craft heritage has left it on the verge of dying.

The pandemic effect

During the COVID-19 pandemic, people, wary of contracting the virus, rarely stepped out of their homes and started shopping online. This dealt a heavy blow to local weavers, who earn their living by selling to tourists in fairs and exhibitions. Export earnings also fell drastically during the prolonged lockdown. India has been the second-largest exporter of handloom products in the world. It exported US\$ 353.9 million worth of handloom products, but between April to August 2020 slid to US\$ 66.26 million.

Online platforms to the rescue

Today, building an online presence is essential for both traditional and modern players. And, during the pandemic, it became more apparent than ever before. E-commerce has been helping artisans regain their footing for the

past few years. The Department of Handlooms and Textiles, Government of India, engaged nine e-commerce players and 70 retailers to increase the reach of handloom products. These online platforms together generated handloom sales of ₹ 1.06 crore in 2015-16 and ₹ 7.07 crore in 2016-17, increasing to ₹ 9.54 crore in 2017-18.

E-commerce giant Amazon expanded its footprint in India's handloom industry, adding pure handloom and handicraft items of Weavesmart, an online handloom store supported by the Government of India on its app and website. It made more than 20,000 handloom products available to millions of customers. "We have been engaging with cooperatives (like Khadi Nation). Consumers from cities as far as Port Blair (Andaman and Nicobar Islands), Kullu (Himachal Pradesh), Guwahati (Assam) and Chhatrapur (Madhya Pradesh) are shopping for products such as Ikkat saris. There is still plenty of potentials that can be unlocked from artisans and craftsmen

across the country," said an Amazon spokesperson. Flipkart's art house or social marketplace GoCoop has been beneficial for local craftsmen and weavers.

Online selling platforms proved to be a lifeboat for traditional artisans during the lockdown months. Besides providing local weavers with a platform to showcase their handiwork, these platforms have extended their support to those suffering from lack of resources. They are collaborating with artisans, promoting their products and helping them improve their brand visibility and reach. With e-commerce, they have made their way in every nook and corner of the country, meeting buyers who appreciate and value their artwork.

The road ahead

The future of the Indian handloom and handicrafts industry looks promising. The global demand for handmade products is growing rapidly, owing to an increase in tourism and the propensity of gifting unique products and interest in using eco-friendly, sustainable clothing and accessories.

The current generation of artisans has grasped this opportunity to gain more traction in both domestic and international markets. Their focus is on curation and product development, meeting quality standards, branding and marketing to grow through online channels. They are also bringing a modern twist to traditional handloom garments and handicrafts, making them more appealing to Gen Y and Z.

With e-commerce uniting the fragmented population of artisans and weavers, eliminating middlemen and making a wide variety of well-made handloom products at fair prices directly from weavers, the Indian handloom and handicrafts industry is expected to see an upward growth trajectory. It's expected to reach USD 60 billion by 2024.



Sanchi is a 'blink and you'll miss it' sort of town, much like thousands of other small towns on India's highways. Located on the Bhopal to Vidisha state highway, you'd never quite believe one of India's most famous historical sites is located on a hill on the edge of the town if it weren't for the tens of boards that the state tourism board has stuck at various places, all but the last vital turn. On the way to the site from Bhopal, you do cross a little curiosity, a marking for the "Tropic of Cancer", an imaginary line which if you remember your middle-school geography is the northernmost declination of the sun relative to the earth, a point reached at the summer solstice. Odd that there are remarkably few markings of this line in India and it was a pleasant surprise to find it out here.

If you take a look inside your wallet and find a ₹ 200 note, you'll see the image of the Great Stupa of Sanchi on the obverse, and its importance in Indian history is mainly because of the fact that it is one of the largest archaeological remains from Mauryan times. The Great Stupa, or 'Stupa Number 1' as it is called dates back to the reign of Ashoka and construction was begun by him. This stupa is a part of a major complex of Buddhist sites across the region. Ashoka considered the region dear to him as his first wife Devi hailed from the nearby town of Vidisha. She was the mother of Ashoka's son, Mahinda and daughter, Sanghamitra, who spread the tenets of Buddhism to Sri Lanka from where other monks spread it far and wide.

As you turn off the highway to drive to the Stupa, you first pass the Archaeological Museum. Though small, it is a place that you must stop and visit. The 'Lion Capital' from the Ashokan pillar found at the Stupa has pride of place at this museum. This capital which is extremely similar to the one found at Sarnath that most Indians today know as our national symbol is remarkably well-preserved as are many other relics mainly from the site and other nearby Buddhist and Hindu sites. It recalls the stellar work of Sir John Marshall in restoring the site and saving it from his fellow colonialists.

The story of saving the Stupa is one that does deserve to be told and the Sanchi Museum has a treasure trove of photographs dating back to 1881 when the British finally put an end to the ravaging of the site by military treasure

hunters and amateur archaeologists. Sir Marshall, more famous for his work in excavating the sites at Harappa and Mohenjodaro, played a vital role in saving Indian historical sites as the Director-General of the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI). His stellar role in shepherding the ASI for a quarter-century till 1928 is a major reason that so many sites across India survive to this day. Marshall's role at Sanchi is so venerated by the ASI that they've kept his worktable and some notes at the museum and, rather curiously, his silver cutlery as well. The stupas and the old Buddhist monasteries and schools at Sanchi had been ravaged by time and treasure hunters, the worst of which were the final colonialists who broke into

the great stupa in the hope of finding a buried treasure. India owes a great debt to Sir John Marshall.

A winding drive up the hillside takes you to the site where on the way is a



small levelled out field where the local children have an ongoing tennis-ball cricket match while the town elders sit on the roadside wall drinking tea and bemoaning the pandemic and the loss of income the town has suffered. Sanchi is the most important site in the central Indian 'Buddhist Circuit' and is particularly popular with Sri Lankans, so much so that many signs inside the complex are written in Sinhala. Once you get to the rather empty parking lot, the Giant Stupa looms large in front of you. And you also get a sense of the vastness of the complex, Sanchi was a major site of Buddhist learning for centuries and several additions to the complex were made even after Mauryan times. Indeed, there is a belief by some scholars that the post-Mauryan Shunga dynasty destroyed the original stupa and rebuilt it later.

At its peak, there were probably thousands of monks, scholars and students at the site, the ruins of the monastery and smaller stupas under which prominent monks had been buried.

You enter the site walking to the northern gateway and its

impressive 'Torana', these gateways have rich sculptures where stories of the Buddha and great kings, including Ashoka have in relief. The remains of the polished sandstone Ashokan pillar are located near the southern gateway from where a staircase leads up to the deambulatory walkway. Scholars believe that the Great Stupa as we see it today was built by the Shunga dynasty that followed the Mauryan empire, the covering of stone, the balustrades and even the intricate sculptures on the gateways are from that period. What you see on the 200-rupee note is the Western gateway.

Much like the 100-rupee note that features Rani Ki Vav, the famous stepwell near Patan in Gujarat, the image on the note does not do justice to the site. The sculptures on the gateways are tremendous and the different gateways all have different stories. Some depict tales from the life of Gautam Buddha and others tell the story of Ashoka the Great. You also see the vastness of the site that you never really learn about in your history textbooks in school. This again comes back to the fact that India has the richest amount of history of any nation. A site like Sanchi could be as prominent as the Taj Mahal in other nations, in India, while undoubtedly a popular site, primarily due to its importance as a site of Buddhist pilgrimage, but it should also be remembered, much like Sarnath outside Benaras as one of the few remaining sites with a direct connection to ancient India's greatest emperor.

A LONG WALK



The slow pace of construction work has deprived remote villages in Uttarakhand of basic infrastructure, especially transport facilities. By MAHANAND SINGH BISHT

Uttarakhand, which has been separated from Uttar Pradesh with the expectations of better roads, health, education, employment and livelihood, is still craving for the basic needs. Even after 20 years of establishing the state, the residents of this mountainous state are struggling for the basic necessities of life. During the outbreak of COVID, thousands of migrated youths came back to their villages for employment. They had expectations that the government would help them make a living. Due to lack of proper counseling and complicated proce-

dures for obtaining government schemes, youngsters couldn't benefit and are now back to cities in search of employment. Other than employment, the hilly areas of the state have various issues, the major one being lack of basic infrastructure. Various villages such as Dumak Kalgoth, Kimana, Palla, Jakhola, Lanji Pokhni, Dwijing, etc., do not even have a proper transport facility. Due to this, the development works in this area are also being affected. Although the construction work of the roads had started over the years but due to the slow pace, the work still remains incomplete.

However, the state government is claiming to provide roads to the villages. After frequent agitation by villagers, under the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana, approval of the Dhingharan-Syun-Vemru-Dumak Kalgoth roads was announced by the government. Along with this, road construction in several other areas was also promised. But due to the arbitrariness of the construction agencies, in the last 17 years, the work has either stopped or is on due. The residents here have to walk for miles to manage their livelihood. The villages in this

region are home to around 500 families. The biggest problem they face is during the rains and snowfalls, when the road is not even walkable. The bridges and pedestrian roads connecting these villages were completely damaged during the 2013 disaster, and have not been made yet. Jeet Singh Sanwal and Pooran Singh of Dumak village say, "Despite being a border village, the basic problems remain as they were. Villagers have to walk for 18 km to reach the road." He further adds, "the problem becomes even

more severe when someone in the village is ill. In such a situation, people take the sick person with the help of a doli. Sometimes s/he dies on the way. During rain and snowfall, it is not even possible to take the patient to the hospital."

Rajma, ramdana, potato, mainly cash crops are grown in this region. But without proper transportation the products do not reach the market. The cost of transporting products to mandis (farmer's market) like Dehradun increases manifold. Tanuj Kamboj, Assistant Engineer, Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana, Chamouli, says, "At present, the construction work is in progress. A new tender process has been issued after the contractor left the construction work in the middle some time ago. The work is in progress and the construction of the road is likely to be completed soon."


In this regard, the local MLA Mahendra Bhat says, "Along with the development of roads, necessary instructions have been given to the departmental officers for the development of

other facilities too. Funds for the road have also been approved by the government. If we don't see progress by the construction agency, strict action will be taken against them."

Prem Singh Sanwal, a social worker and a pioneer of the road movement of Dumak village, says, "Even today, the people of these villages are resorting to horses and mules to market their cash crops. Due to this, farmers have to bear the loss as large amount of money is spent in freight." A farmer from the village says, "To take five quintal rajma to reach Gopeshwar or Joshi Math city, the rent of horse and mule is so high that I am left with zero profits."

The government of a welfare state should take the problems of its citizens seriously and at least provide them with basic facilities. Quick action should be taken to complete development works on time. Only then it will be possible to integrate the development of villages and villagers.

VEGAN KIDS MAY HAVE LOW VITAMIN D

If your child is fully vegan, then there are chances that they may have a lower level of vitamin D, a new study suggests.

The findings indicate that children on a fully vegan diet were found to have significantly lower vitamin D levels compared to children without a special diet despite having regular vitamin D supplementation.

Along with that, the study also suggested that their vitamin A status was lowered too.

"Our results indicate that the health effects of strict diets on children cannot be extrapolated from studies on adults. In addition to vitamin D intake, attention must be paid to adequate intake of vitamin A and protein from various sources," said researcher Topi Hovinen from the University of Helsinki.

Young diets gain popularity especially among young adults and through choices of the families vegan diet is becoming more common in young children, too.



HYPERACTIVATION SIGN OF ALZHEIMER'S

Abnormal hyperactivation in the brain could be an early biomarker of Alzheimer's disease, a new study suggests.

The study indicates that hyperactivation in certain brain areas in people not yet diagnosed with Alzheimer's but who were worried about their memory loss and who exhibited risk factors for the disease.

"Alzheimer's disease is progressive and may emerge in the brain 20 to 30 years before diagnosis," said researcher Sylvie Belleville from the Université de Montreal in Canada.

"It is therefore, very important to pinpoint biomarkers — that is, physical and detectable signs of the disease — and to understand better the initial effects on the brain. Hyperactivation could therefore represent one of the first signs of Alzheimer's disease," Belleville added.

For their study, the team used data from the Consortium for the Early Identification of Alzheimer's Disease to study brain activation in groups of individuals at a high risk of developing Alzheimer's disease who had performed a memory task while being scanned with MRI.



PLANTS MAY UP POSITIVE MENTAL WELL-BEING

If you love having plants at home, then there is a good news for you as a new study suggests that plants at home can keep you mentally healthy.

The findings, published in the journal Urban Forestry and Urban Greening, indicated that having plants at home had a positive influence on the psychological well-being of the dwelling's inhabitants during COVID-19 lockdown.

For the study, the researchers, including Katia Perini from the University of Genoa in Italy, evaluated the role played by the plants at home during the first COVID-19 lockdown and the study involved 4,200 respondents.

The situation between the months of March and June deprived the public of the chance to enjoy open spaces and nature, and forced them to spend extended periods of time indoors.

The team found 74 per cent of the respondents agreed that having plants at home had a positive influence on emotional well-being during lockdown, the researchers said.



INACTIVE CANCER PATIENTS AT HIGH COVID RISK

Patients with inactive cancer and not currently undergoing treatments also face a significantly higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19, a new study suggests.

The findings underscore the importance of COVID-19 mitigation, like social distancing and mask wearing, and vaccinations for all patients, not just those recently diagnosed or with active disease.

"Patients who have cancer need to be careful not to become exposed during this time," said researcher Kara N. Maxwell, Assistant Professor at University of Pennsylvania in the US.

"That message has been out there, but these latest findings show us it's not only for patients hospitalised or on treatment for their cancer. All oncology patients need to take significant precautions during the pandemic to protect themselves," Maxwell added.



OBESITY IMPACTS COVID VACCINES' EFFICACY

COVID-19 vaccines may not be fully effective in people who are suffering from obesity, as experts on Tuesday suggested that the process of healing may be slower in obese people as compared to the healthy ones.

According to a report on Nature, obesity correlates with a dulled immune response to COVID-19. And vaccines for a handful of other conditions often don't work as well in obese people, suggesting that a shot for COVID-19 might not provide as much protection as researchers would like.

"The severity of the virus is potentially high in obese or diabetic people. The fact is that the immunity and the process of healing may be slower in an obese person than a healthy person," Navneet Sood, Pulmonary Consultant, Dharamshila Narayana Superspecialty Hospital, said.



Natarajan didn't expect to debut in Aus

India's latest pace bowling find, T Natarajan, on Sunday said he was not sure of debuting in even one format, let alone all three and make history during the team's tour of Australia.

When he was picked for the fourth and final Test against Australia in Brisbane, Natarajan became the first Indian to debut in all three formats during the same tour.

"I was keen to do my job. But I didn't expect to get an opportunity in the ODIs, was not expecting to make my debut in Australia," Natarajan told reporters in Chinnappampatti in Salem district.

Natarajan took three wickets in the series-deciding Test, playing a part in India's incredible win.

Natarajan said he enjoyed playing under the captaincy of both Virat Kohli and Ajinkya Rahane, adding they both supported and encouraged him a lot.

He made his ODI debut in the third and final match of the three-match series and picked up two wickets with Marnus Labuschagne being his maiden international scalp.

Natarajan said he got emotional when Kohli handed the trophy to him after the team won the T20 series.

Sundar wishes to open in Tests

"I think it will be a blessing for me if I ever get an opportunity to open the batting for India in Tests. I think I will accept the challenge just like our coach Ravi sir did during his playing days," Washington told PTI during an interaction from his Chennai residence.

He scored 62 in the first innings at Gabba to keep India in the match

and then a quick 22, including a hooked six off Pat Cummins, to play a part in the finishing act, apart from a match-haul of four wickets.

"Ravi sir tells us very inspiring stories from his playing days. Like how he made his debut as a specialist spinner, got four wickets and batted at number 10 against New Zealand on debut.

"And how from there, he became a Test opener and played all those great fast bowlers. I would love to open batting in Tests like him," said Washington, who enjoys a decent first-class batting average of 32 plus, which can only improve from hereon as he gets to play more games for India.

For a youngster coming into the Test side, he feels that there is no need to draw any inspiration from outside as there are so many role models in that India dressing room.

"As a youngster, when I look up for inspiration and motivation, I find so many role models in that dressing room. There is Virat Kohli, Rohit Sharma, Ajinkya Rahane, R Ashwin who have been such great performers.

Used to be petrified of bouncers: Gill

The promising Shubman Gill on Sunday revealed he used to be "petrified of bouncers" before eventually overcoming all his fears to get his Test career off to a rollicking start against some of the world's fastest bowlers.

Gill, 21, announced his arrival on the big stage with a classic knock of 91, which set the tone for India's incredible victory on the final day of the series-deciding fourth Test against Australia recently.

In the six innings that he batted against the likes of Pat Cummins, Josh Hazlewood and Mitchell Starc, Gill never looked in any sort of discomfort. But it wasn't so easy many years ago.

"When you get hit by a ball, your fear disappears. You are only scared until you get a blow but once you get hit, you feel like it was pretty normal! And then you lose the fear entirely," Gill was quoted as saying by his IPL franchise Kolkata Knight Riders on website www.Kkr.in.

"When I was young, I used to be petrified of bouncers. I used to be prepared for the chest-height balls way in advance. I used to practise drives a lot so I got mature in playing the pull shot with a straight bat.

"I also developed one more shot where I move aside a little to play the cut. I used to feel scared of short deliveries so I always wanted to get away from the line of the ball and play the cut shot.

"These two-three shots were my favourite as a kid and now they have become a part of me." Going back to his early days in Mohali, Gill spoke about how he was scared of facing a particular fast bowler at the academy and how he overcame his fears.

"I was nine years old when I was asked to play in a higher age group match. There was a bowler in the academy, just like you find in every other academy, who was really fast. I was batting against him and was scared that I would get a bouncer to start with.

"So I had pre-decided that I would just duck it. He bowled a bouncer but pitched way ahead. I still squatted and saw the ball hitting the edge of my bat and racing to the boundary. I realised he was not that fast after all. Soon I hit 2-3 more boundaries. "I was quite young so everyone was surprised. This helped me raise my confidence level. This incident just eliminated all kinds of fear from my heart for leather balls and bouncers."

Melbourne century was crucial for series victory: Rahane

Taking over the team's reins after the Adelaide humiliation, Ajinkya Rahane had led from the front in the Boxing Day Test, producing a master-class hundred against Australia, and the Indian vice-captain says the century will remain special as it paved the way for the series victory.

After his 112 in the Boxing Day Test, Rahane had said his century at Lord's was his best.

However, the 32-year-old said he didn't quite realise the value of his Melbourne effort that eventually became a building block for India's



2-1 series win against Australia.

"For me whenever I get runs and when we win. I think for me that is something really special. Winning the Test match and winning the series is

the priority for me rather than my own achievements," Rahane told Sports Today.

"But yes Melbourne Test hundred was really special. I said in Melbourne that my Lord's hundred was special but many people told me that I think Melbourne hundred was better than my Lord's hundred," Rahane added.

"I did not know how to react to that. But now I realised, given the circumstances after the Adelaide Test match, Melbourne Test was really crucial for the series and yes I thought Melbourne innings was really special," Rahane further said.

Root's rich form cancels SL advantage

England captain Joe Root smashed 186 runs to lead the touring side ever closer to Sri Lanka's first-innings total as they finished day three on 339 for nine, just 42 runs behind on Sunday.

Root's epic innings came to an end in the last over of the day when he was run out 14 short of another double hundred. Sri Lanka's bowlers had no answer for the Yorkshireman and it appeared inevitable that he was only going to be dismissed through a run out.

Root faced 309 deliveries and hit 18 fours in his monster innings.

Root attempted to flick Dilruwan Perera to mid-wicket but the thick edge was grabbed by Oshada Fernando at short leg on the bounce.



Root had taken a few steps out of the crease and sensing an opportunity Fernando threw the stumps down as a tired Root's diving effort couldn't save him.

Left-arm spinner Lasith Embuldeniya finished with a seven-wicket haul but the day belonged to the England captain, who put up a splendid show of character and

determination in batting for more than eight hours. He had posted a double hundred in the first test that England won by seven wickets.

Not since West Indian Brian Lara's exploits in Galle in 2001 when he scored 688 runs in six innings, had a batsman played spin bowlers so expertly. Root now has 415 runs in three innings.

The sweep shot was Root's bread and butter and he executed it to perfection, finding gaps frequently despite Sri Lanka having three fielders in the leg-side boundary.

The 30-year-old reached his 19th test hundred in the morning and during his knock went past the run tallies of three former England greats - David Gower 8,231, Kevin Pietersen 8,181 and Geoffrey Boycott 8,114.

Root, playing in his 99th test match, now has 8,238 test runs and is fourth among England batsmen.

Apart from Embuldeniya, the rest of Sri Lanka's bowling failed to impress, with off-spinner Dilruwan Perera failing to pick up a wicket despite the 38-year-old bowling 32 overs.

England resumed from the overnight score of 98 for two and lost Jonny Bairstow (28) and Daniel Lawrence (3) early. Vice-captain Jos Buttler (55) added 97 runs for the fifth wicket with Root.

An 81-run stand for the seventh wicket between Dominic Bess (32) and Root took England's total to 333 for six. But Sri Lanka struck back, taking three wickets for six runs late in the day to reduce the tourists to 339 for nine.

Leach's accuracy key to success in India: Swann

Former off-spinner Graeme Swann wants England's tweekers to stay patient in the upcoming Test series in India and has picked Jack Leach to play a key role during the tour.

The spin duo of Leach and

Dom Bess had five-wicket hauls in England's win in the first Test against Sri Lanka, but returned wicket-less in the home team's first innings of the ongoing second Test in Galle.

Having picked up 60 of his 255 wickets in India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh at an average of

25, the 41-year-old Swann, a veteran of 60 Tests between 2008 and 2013, is aware of the skills required to succeed in sub-continent pitches.

"The one thing that I used to say to myself is, it's going to spin and it does spin — even on day one where they are fairly flat

pitches," Swann said on the Hussain and Key Cricket show.

"If you bowl well enough, especially against India, they play you very respectfully. There is not a Virender Sehwag in that current team; Virat Kohli when he bats against spin waits for the bad ball.

"India are very, very patient but if you are willing to be patient and bowl all day you will take wickets," he observed.

"You might have to work very hard for them and you'll lose some timber, which isn't a bad thing."

Pak include 6 uncapped players

KARACHI: The Pakistan selectors on Sunday retained six uncapped players in the pruned 17-man squad, named for the first Test against South Africa. The uncapped players include off-spinner Sajid Khan and left-arm spinner Nauman Ali, who are expected to partner the experienced leggie Yasir Shah in the match, starting Tuesday in Karachi. The other uncapped players are opener, Imran Butt, who recently toured New Zealand and pacers, Haris Rauf and Tabish Khan. Rauf played in the T20 matches in New Zealand but is yet to play a Test. He has just three first class games under his belt. The selectors also retained former captain and wick-

etkeeper, Sarfaraz Ahmed in the squad as a standby to vice-captain, Muhammad Rizwan. Sarfaraz has been part of the Pakistan squads which toured England and New Zealand but has played just one T20 game on both tours where Rizwan has been the first choice keeper. The PCB said in a press release that the three players dropped from the 20-member squad — Kamran Gulam, Abdullah Shafique and Salman Agha — will continue to be part of the squad and will feature in warm-up and training sessions at the National Stadium. The playing line-up with now be finalised by the captain in consultation with the head coach.

Playing while staying in bubble not sustainable for players: Du Plessis

South African veteran Faf du Plessis reckons playing cricket while staying in a bio-secure bubble for months could soon become a "major challenge" for players and is not sustainable in the long run.

Cricketers have to follow strict protocols while touring with their respective teams due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We understand that this is a very tough season and a tough challenge for a lot of people out there, but if it's back-to-back bubble life, things would become a big challenge," du Plessis said during a virtual press conference on Saturday.

Du Plessis is in Pakistan to represent South Africa in a two-match Test series and three T20 Internationals. The first Test will start here on January 26 while the second match will be played from February 4 in Rawalpindi.

The Test series will be followed by a three-match T20I series from February 11 to 14 in Lahore.

"The main priority is to play cricket, to be out there doing what we love instead of being at home — so I think that still remains the most important thing. But I think there would definitely come a point where players would struggle with this (bubble)," du Plessis said. "If you look at a calendar of the last eight months, you're looking at about four or five months in a bubble, which is a lot. For some of us (being) without family, it can get challenging.

"Right now, I'm still in a good place. I'm still feeling really motivated and driven, but I can only speak for myself.

It'll be disrespectful for India if Eng doesn't play best XI: KP

Lambasting Jonny Bairstow's Lomission from the England squad for Tests against India, former skipper Kevin Pietersen said that it will be disrespectful to the host team if visiting team does not put on field its best XI in the marquee series.

Not only Bairstow but all-rounder Sam Curran and pacer Mark Wood have also been left out of the squad.

Bairstow has been rested for the first two Tests as part of the England and Wales Cricket Board's (ECB) player management policy, which stresses on giving adequate rest to every English cricketer in a packed calendar year, which includes 17 Tests and the ICC T20 World Cup.

The 40-year-old said a win against India is similar to a victory against arch-rivals Australia and urged the selectors to play both Stuart Broad and James Anderson.

"Big debate on whether ENG have picked their best team to play India in the 1st Test. Winning IN India is as good a feeling as winning in Aus. It's disrespectful to ENG



fans & also @BCCI to NOT play your best team. Bairstow has to play! Broad/Anderson have to play!" Pietersen tweeted.

In another tweet, Pietersen said the best players wouldn't want to miss the opportunity to play against an in-form Indian team at home, while suggesting players can be rested after the Indian Premier League.

"The BEST England players will want to play as many games as possible against India, in India. PICK THEM! Then they go to IPL & earn everything they deserve. Cash is key for every sportsman. They're a business! They can have a break after that!"
