## Pegasus rocks Parl; TMC MP suspended for Session

The Pegasus snooping scandal continued to derail the proceedings of Parliament. Both Houses on Friday saw slogan-shouting and repeated adjournments even as the Rajya Sabha suspended TMC MP Santanu Sen who on Thursday snatched a statement read out by Information Technology Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw and tore it off.

The MP has been suspended for the remaining period of the ongoing Monsoon Session.

The strong action against Sen took place after a motion moved by the Government was passed by the House soon after it met for the day. However, the TMC MP refused to leave the House and kept sitting despite repeated pleas by Chairman M Venkaiah Naidu and Deputy Chairman Harivansh. As a result, the House could not function and was adjourned repeatedly.

In a tweet, Sen termed his suspension as “unparliamentary” and said his party’s voice and its leader’s voice cannot be stopped.

The Government made its intentions clear and soon after the obituary references and laying of papers, Minister of State for Parliamentary Affairs V

Muraleedharan moved a motion for Sen’s suspension. “I move that Dr Santanu Sen, AITC, be suspended from the services of the House...for his unruly behaviour, unbecoming of a member of the Rajya Sabha, yesterday...” Muraleedharan said in his motion. It was passed by a voice vote and Naidu asked Sen to leave the House.

However, the TMC members protested and raised objection to the manner in which the motion was brought without listing it in the day’s business. Sukhendu Sekhar Ray (TMC) said the moving of the motion was not mentioned in the revised list of business.

Naidu said he had approved the motion to maintain the dignity of the House. Roy’s party colleague Derek O’Brien claimed a Minister behaved aggressively after the House was adjourned on Thursday.

Sensing the mood of the House, the Chairman adjourned it till 12.00 pm after Sen’s suspension. The agitated members did not allow the House to run when the House met again and despite repeated pleas by Harivansh, Sen did not go out of the House.

The Deputy Chairman first adjourned the House till 12.30 pm and then till 2.30 pm as the TMC protested.

Meanwhile, the Lok Sabha proceedings were adjourned for the day following disruptions by Opposition parties which raised slogans on the Pegasus snooping row and the farmers’ issue by gathering in the Well of the House.

As soon as the House met for the day at 11 am, some Opposition members rushed to the Well but they were prevented from doing so by floor leaders of their respective parties as Speaker Om Birla wanted to make observations on the Indian squad participating in the Tokyo Olympics.

Birla extended best wishes to the Indian contingent on behalf of the House. The mega carnival of sports is from Friday. Members thumped benches in support of the Indian squad.

Soon after Birla had made his observations, several members from the Congress, the Trinamool Congress and the Shiromani Akali Dal gathered in the Well of the House raising slogans and holding placards. The TMC shouted slogans demanding details of the money allegedly spent by the Government on Pegasus spyware.

Congress members had placards demanding a Supreme Court monitored judicial probe into the Pegasus allegations.

## My phones tapped, IB people tell me: Rahul

Amid continuous mudslinging against each other by the BJP and the Congress over the Pegasus spyware phone-tapping controversy, former Congress president Rahul Gandhi on Friday sought a judicial enquiry, claiming he is not a potential target but “every single phone of his is definitely tapped.” The BJP hit back and dared the Congress leader to submit his phone for investigation if he believed it was tapped.

Addressing the media outside the Parliament complex, Rahul said, “I get phone calls from IB [Intelligence Bureau] people who tap my phone. They call me up and say beware we are tapping you. My security people tell me that they have to debrief what I say to their seniors.”

Rahul quipped that only those who are “thieves or corrupt will get scared of Narendra Modi”.

“Pegasus is classified by the Israeli State as a weapon and that weapon is supposed to be used against terrorists. The Prime Minister and the Home Minister has used this weapon against the Indian State,” he said.

“They have used it politically, they have used in Karnataka, they have used to scuttle probes, they have used it against the Supreme Court,



against all the institutions. The only word for this is treason. There is no other word for this and the Home Minister should resign,” Rahul said.

## Mehbooba’s kin, journalists from Kashmir, separatists snooped

Several political leaders, separatists and journalists from Kashmir, including then Chief Minister Mehbooba Mufti’s two relatives, may have been targeted for telephone snooping between 2017 and 2019.

According to the report published by The Wire, even journalists working in Delhi but belonging to Kashmir were

under surveillance using Pegasus spyware.

“Others on the leaked database include at least two members of People’s Democratic party (PDP) chief and former Chief Minister of J&K Mehbooba Mufti’s family. Their selection as potential targets of surveillance happened when Mehbooba was still Chief Minister of the erstwhile State and in a coalition with the BJP. In fact, Mufti’s family members

were chosen for potential surveillance just months before the Government collapsed as the BJP pulled out of the coalition in June 2018,” *The Wire* reported on Friday.

However, Mehbooba said that surveillance, as a concept, for Kashmiris is not new. “People are used to having their thoughts, ideas not only intercepted but even being punished for them,” the former J&K CM said.

## 69 more die of Covid in State

● Casualties in Khordha cross 1K mark

● 1,917 new positives; TPR 2.45%

● Max 518 cases in Khordha

The State on Friday registered 69 more Covid-19 deaths, with which the total toll mounted to 5,377, said the Health and Family Welfare Department.

Khordha district reported the maximum 26 deaths followed by Baleswar with 10, Sambalpur seven, Kendrapada six, Bargarh five, Sundargarh four, Balangir, Jharsuguda, Kandhamal and Rayagada two each and Dhenkanal, Nuapada and Subarnapur one each.

With the 26 more deaths, the total toll crossed the 1,000-mark in Khordha and reached 1,003. Of the total deaths in Khordha district, capital city Bhubaneswar has reported almost 70 per cent.

Bhubaneswar has reported a total of 711 deaths since the outbreak of the pandemic.

On Friday, the State reported 1,917 new positive cases, increasing the total tally to 9,63,851. Out of the new cases,

1,109 cases were from quarantine centres and 808 local cases, informed the Information and Public Relations Department. A total of 78,134 samples were tested in the last 24 hours and the total positivity rate (TPR) was 2.45 per cent.

Khordha district registered the day’s highest 518 cases followed by Cuttack with 256 and Puri 118.

The districts which reported below-100 cases were Jagatsinghpur with 92, Angul 91, Jajpur 87, Baleswar 84, Nayagarh 76,

Kendrapada 73, Mayurbhanj 69, Sundargarh 50, Bhadrak 55, Dhenkanal 37, Keonjhar 33, Kandhamal 25, Bargarh 19, Gajapati 16, Sambalpur 15, Malkangiri 12, Rayagada 11, Balangir, Nabarangpur and Koraput 10 each, Jharsuguda nine, Boudh and Ganjam seven each, Subarnapur and Kalahandi six each, Nuapada five and Deogarh one.

Besides, 109 cases were reported from the State pool.

So far, 9,39,160 patients have recovered in the State.

### 1,797 active cases, 318 new cases, 15 more die, 235 recover in BBSR

Bhubaneswar on Friday registered 318 new Covid-19 positive cases, with which the total tally in the city surged to 97,488. Out of the new cases, 256 were local contacts and 65 quarantine cases.

The local contacts included 21 cases in Khandagiri, 20 in Patia, 12 in Saheed Nagar, 11 in Nayapalli, 10 each in

Laxmisagar abd Dumduma and eight each in Chandrasekharpur and Rasulgarh.

The active cases stood at 1,797. Meanwhile, 15 more patients succumbed to the disease in the city, pushing the total death toll to 711.

However, 235 persons recovered on the day, increasing the total recoveries to 94,959.

## Lords make Niladri Bijе as Rath Yatra ends

### Angry Goddess Lakshmi pacified with Rasagola

The 12-day-long famous Rath Yatra came to an end here in Puri on Friday night with Lord Jagannath, Lord Balabhadra and Devi Subhadra making their Niladri Bijе (entry to the Shreemandir).

At late night, the holy siblings were enthroned on the Ratna Singhasan, the bejeweled throne. Before going to bed, they were served Pakhal (soaked rice) as supper, which is not for public sale.

The public can get Abhada (rice dishes) on Saturday, which is famous as Nilachal Abhada. The Abhada makes prominence, as the deities will be offered rice and pulses with varieties of curries for the first time after returning from the Rath Yatra.

During their stay on the chariots, the deities are usually offered fruits, milks and dry foods without rice dishes. After the Bahuda Yatra, the Lords will first taste the home made cuisines in the Shreemandir.

The day was also celebrated as Rasogola day as Lord Jagannath pacified the anguish of Mahalakshmi with the sweetmeat. As Lord Jagannath had visited the Gundicha Temple without taking Mahalakshmi with Him, the Goddess got irritated and blocked His entry to the temple by shutting the Lions’ Gate. Lord Jagannath confessed His mistake and offered her Rasogola. The ritual was also observed during entry of Lord Jagannath, which is famous as Lakshmi-Narayan Kali (quarrel).

To mark the cheerful return of Lords, quintals of Rasagolas were offered on board the chariots. However, due to Covid restriction on public entry, Rasagola offerings were limited to only servitors, Sadhus of mutts and persons present on duty.

As per schedule, Pahandi Bijе began at 4 pm as Lord Sudarshan was first to enter the Shreemandir. Later, the three siblings entered through Goti Pahandi (marching one after another) and were established in the sanctum sanctorum by the Daitapati servitors.

The Daitapati servitors left the temple at night. Notably,

Daitapati servitors have only rites during a month starting from Snan Yatra (bathing ceremony) up to the Niladri Bijе.

## Heavy rain predicted for another 24 hrs

The low pressure area over northwest Bay of Bengal and neighbourhood has become well-marked over the northwest Bay off north Odisha and West Bengal coasts, said the Regional Office of the Indian Meteorological Department (IMD) here on Friday.

Under the influence of the system, widespread light to moderate rainfall with heavy to very heavy rainfall activity is likely to occur at several parts of the State in the next 24 hours.

The IMD has also issued “Orange Warning” for heavy to very heavy rainfall with isolated extremely heavy rainfall to occur at isolated parts of Sundargarh, Keonjhar, Deogarh, Jharsuguda, Sambalpur, Subarnapur, Bargarh, Balangir and Nuapada districts in the next 24 hours.

“The southwest monsoon has been active over Odisha. Several parts of the State including north coastal Odisha, Mayurbhanj, Dhenkanal, Puri, Subarnapur, Boudh, Balangir and Kalahandi received heavy rainfall in the past 24 hours,” said the weather office.

## Covid situation under control in State: CM

Advise for caution to prevent 3rd wave

Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik on Friday said that even though the Covid-19 situation is under control in the State, people should not be complacent and should be extra cautious.

Reviewing the pandemic situation, Patnaik said that although the test positivity rate has decreased significantly in the last few weeks, there is still a need for further reduction in the infection rate in some districts.

“Even though the pandemic situation is under control, this is no time for complacency. Only by remaining alert will we be safe. Therefore, the Chief Minister has asked people in the State to strictly adhere to Covid-19 rules and not crowded places,” a statement issued by the Chief Minister’s Office (CMO) stated.

He further said if the third wave comes by the end of August, as predicted by scientists, the State would have to deal with the situation.

“The State Government is emphasising on investing in human resources along with strengthening the healthcare infrastructure. The district administration has a responsibility to ensure that people are able to access healthcare without any hassle,” the statement added.

“Therefore, it is the core responsibility of everyone, including police station IICs, BDOs, SDPOs, Sub-Collectors, SPs and Collectors to ensure that there is no problem in healthcare delivery right from the district hospitals to the CHCs.”

Patnaik said the State has spent around Rs 2,004 crore to support the poor, especially small farmers, construction



workers, MGNREGS workers, indigenous tribal families, Scheduled Castes, tribal students and mothers of Mission Shakti and street vendors during the second wave of Coronavirus pandemic.

The assistance programmes included various programmes of ten departments of

the State Government.

Chief Secretary Suresh Mohapatra emphasised on the vaccination of teachers and school staff for the reopening of schools (for Classes X and XII) in the State on July 26.

Health Secretary PK Mohapatra spoke about the preparations for the third wave

during the meeting while Development and Special Relief Commissioner PK Jena, spoke about the implementation of the Chief Minister’s Covid Aid.

The meeting, conducted by 5T Secretary VK Pandian also reviewed the implementation of the Biju Health Welfare Scheme.

## CM inaugurates 3 industrial projects

# No decision yet to reopen engineering colleges

A few days after a group of ABPUT students met Skill Development Minister Premananda Nayak demanding reopening of its affiliated institutions, a letter of the Skill Development and Technical Education Department regarding commencement of physical classes in all engineering and technical institutions from July 26 is doing the rounds on social media.

However, the Government has not made any official announcement in this regard yet. So, is the letter a genuine one? No, the letter, dated July 22, addressing Vice-Chancellors of all Government and private technical universities, Director of IGIT Sarang, Principals of all Government and private engineering Colleges is a fake one.

Accordingly, the Higher Education Department has revised the existing model syllabus ‘Environmental Science’ as ‘Environmental Study and Disaster Management’, an official release stated on Friday.

The revised syllabus would be introduced in undergraduate courses from this academic session, informed Higher Education Minister Arun Kumar Sahoo.

# Soumya had affairs with other women: Bidya

## It’s a ploy to escape police action, says ACF’s family

In a new twist in the death of Parlakhemundi Assistant Conservator of Forests (ACF) Soumya Rajan Mohapatra, his wife Bidyabharati Panda, who had so far been silent over the murder charges levelled against her by her in-laws, on Tuesday claimed that her late husband

had extramarital affairs with other women.

“He used to send ‘I Love You’ messages to other women over WhatsApp chat,” Bidya claimed and said Soumya changed the password of his mobile phone after she learnt of their relationships.

Even though he had removed the contact lists, call

histories and Whatsapp chat histories were there, Bidya further said.

Bidya further claimed that she learnt about Soumya’s affairs three months after marriage.

She refuted the allegations regarding an agreement paper on property transfer. The unsigned agreement paper has been seized by police. Bidya claimed that she was unaware of the agreement that was allegedly made for transfer of Soumya’s salary and properties

in her favour.

However, Soumya’s family denied the extramarital charge levelled by Bidya.

“Her statement is a ploy to escape police action. My son had never kept any illicit relationship with anyone. Many of his friends used to call him on several occasions. Some of them have tied rakhi to Soumya,” Soumya’s mother Tulasi Mohapatra said.

Bidyabharati’s father rubbishes the charges of family feud between his daughter and

son-in-law.

“There was no such conflict between my daughter and son-in-law. Whatever was there between them had been resolved. The family members of my daughter’s in-laws are nice while my son-in-law was Godly,” he said.

About the woman Police Inspector Mamata Panda, who had allegedly detained the ambulance carrying an injured Soumya to hospital, he said Mamata is a distant relative, but I don’t know her personally.”

# Youth mowed down by drunk driver

# From wagger’s child to teacher to IAS officer

## ‘Today is Mine’ tells it all about Kulange

Once, Vijay in his tiny age was crying to get family’s assurance to fulfil his wish of becoming a doctor. Though his father could understand his strong eagerness, he was incapable of telling him, “go ahead, I’ll support”, as he was living with penury and was largely dependent on wage labour.

After a while he could muster up courage only to advise him to continue studies to become a teacher at best.

These are the portion of a book ‘Today is Mine’, an autobiographical account of Ganjam district Collector Vijay Amruta Kulange, now a popular name in Odisha.

Kulange by virtue of his strong commitment and strict discipline contained the first wave and second wave of Covid-19 in the district. Many of his life experiences are narrated in the book.



Apart from dealing successfully with Covid-19 wave in district where lakhs of migrant labourers returned home, during the first wave, it was really a massive task to quarantine, trace, test and treat the positive cases.

Kulange’s innovative ideas to combat the Covid pandemic had set a precedent for others to follow, with many in the country hailing as ‘Ganjam strategy’. Earlier, before Covid pandemic, he had undertaken many progressive steps in the district and had introduced ‘Jala Ghanti’ (Water Bell) in schools for students to drink water at regular intervals, checking child marriage, A

Child, A Tree’, ‘Movement of Revenue Rath’ to name but a few. He also had taken special initiatives to highlight Ganjam’s rich tradition and culture.

During the early part of his career, it seemed to Vijay that his dream was shattered. But, he didn’t lose hope and marched ahead in his studies. After completing academic education, he had completed teacher’s training and became a teacher to fulfil his father’s wish first.

A strong willingness shows path to success, and a doer emerges victorious is all that Kulange proved. He made it to the Indian Civil Services Examinations and became an IAS officer.

in the newly-formed committee.

Das has around 28 years of experience as a member of Indian Revenue Service (IRS) in policy making and implementing direct tax laws in India. He is the Indian Delegate to Inclusive Framework (IF), a group of more than 135 countries monitoring BEPS, and Member of its Steering Group

which is involved in building a consensus-based solution to address direct tax challenges posed by digitalisation of the economy.

Das holds a PG Diploma in Public Policy and Management from the IIM Bangalore and a PG Degree in International Relations from the Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi.

## Meaning of Rasa and Gola in Rasagola theory

The Rasagola theory is derived from a combination of Rasa and Gola. Rasa is a fusion of word and meaning that bathes the minds of readers with savour of bliss. It is the truth of poetry, shining without cessation. Clear to the heart, it is yet beyond the words. Gola means circle which is a simple shape. It is the set of all points in a plane that are at a given distance from a given point, the centre. Equivalently it is the curve traced out by a point that moves so that its distance from a given point is constant.

Rasa also means sugarcane juice and gola symbolises

a circle which is made of boiled Paneer which is also made from milk. The combination made of the two ingredients makes a sweet dish called Rasagola, a tastiest sweet with sugar soup.

A rasa literally means “juice, essence or taste”. It connotes a concept in Indian arts about the aesthetic flavour of any visual, literary or musical work that evokes an emotion or feeling in the reader or audience but cannot be described. Although the concept of rasa is fundamental to many forms of Indian arts including dance, music, theatre, painting, sculpture, and literature, the interpretation and implementation of a particular rasa differs



between different styles and schools. The Indian theory of rasa is also found in the Hindu arts and Ramayana musical productions in Bali and Java (Indonesia), but with regional creative evolution.

The word rasa appears in ancient Vedic literature. In Rigveda, it connotes a liquid, an extract and flavor. In

Atharvaveda, rasa in many contexts means “taste”, and also the sense of “the sap of grain”.

According to Daniel Meyer-Dinkgräfe, a Professor of Drama, rasa in the Upanishads refers to the “essence, self-luminous consciousness, quintessence” but also “taste” in some contexts. In post-Vedic literature, the word generally connotes “extract, essence, juice or tasty liquid”.

Bharata Muni enunciated the eight Rasas in the Natyasastra, an ancient Sanskrit text of dramatic theory and other performance arts, written between 200 BC and 200 AD. In the Indian performing arts, a rasa is a sentiment or emotion evoked in each member of the audience by the art. The Natya Shastra mentions six rasa in one section, but in the dedicated section on rasa it states and discusses eight primary rasa.

Raudram rasa of the destructive fury of goddess Durga in Bharatanatyam is related to love, humour, comic, pathetic, disgust, fury, anger, compassion, sympathy, heroic, terrible, horrifying, marvelous and amazing.

Rasagola is produced from a combination of determinants (vibhava), consequents (anubhava) and transitory States (vyabhicaribhava).

Vibhava (hetu, karana, nimmita) means ‘cause’ of what happens or is happening in life. Bharata has termed it as ‘Vibhava’ and has described its primary purpose as, creating the awareness of the emotions that the creator (poet/author) intends to. With the reference to artistic presentation (creative expression), Vibhava can be interpreted as, ‘developing

the knowledge or understanding of a specific emotion (mental state) that the creator (poet/author) intends to convey through the means and modes of acting. The Vibhavas are of two types; one is ‘Aalambana Vibhava’ and the other is ‘Uddipana Vibhava’. In broader sense, they are the internal and external causes of something. ‘Aalambana Vibhava’ is source of a particular emotion that determines its nature and ‘Uddipana Vibhava’ is the one, which enhances the emotion caused by a stimulant. It has no direct bearing or connection with the cause or consequence and it is not a part of the process but indirectly plays the role of enhancer of a particular emotion borne out of a stimulant. This can be best explained by many literary presentations such as works of Kalidasa or

other renowned authors.

‘Anu’ is a Sanskrit word and in this context, it means “in reaction to”. Here in this case since it is the natural reaction of body to ‘Vibhava’ it is termed as ‘Anubhava’. Apparently, there is a very thin demarcation between the two; yet they cannot be termed as the same because Vibhava is the cause and Anubhava is its consequence. Vibhava is definitive whereas Anubhava is not definitive.

The simple reason for this is it is not possible to link Anubhava with a specific emotion (mental state). For example, physical reaction like ‘strenuous expression on the face’ is a sure physical reaction which is a manifestation of a definite ‘cause’ or Vibhava. Therefore, the physical reaction of strenuous expression on the face will be the

‘Anubhava’.

Nevertheless, since such a reaction could be the result of either a body ache or mental stress or for being thrown in to an awkward condition. As mentioned earlier, the Vibhava is definitive because it is the internal state, which triggers the anubhava, which is the external manifestation.

Vyabhicaribhava “variants” or Sacaribhava refer to the “accessories” of permanent emotions” (like rati etc.) according to Chiranjiva Bha?acharya (fl. 17th century).—These vyabhicaribhavas are thirty-three in number. These vyabhicaribhavas are neither permanent nor inborn. Madness is a variant in the case of sgaras especially in vipralambha-sgara. These three treated above are very much needed for the manifestation of rasa.



# ACF DEATH MYSTERY

## Accused DFO grilled by cops

❖ Refutes charges of affair with deceased's wife

❖ I will quit job for your wishes, states Soumya's letter

In the latest development in Paralakhemundi ACF Soumya Ranjan Mohapatra's death case, accused DFO Sangram Keshari Behera was grilled by police on Friday.

Investigating officer of the case and Paralakhemundi police station IIC Bibekananda Swain, along with SDPO Ramakrushna Pati, went to Behera's office and questioned him.

Crime Branch officials including DSP Bijay Kumar Mallik were also present during the interrogation.

However, the DFO refuted the allegation of his relationship with Soumya's wife Bidyabharati, which was alleged by the deceased's family.

Police said the DFO fully

cooperated in the three-hour marathon interrogation. "Investigation from all angles is underway. We have recorded a statement of DFO Behera," said the SDPO. The DFO was brought to his office 10 days after Soumya's death for questioning.

Police are also likely to question Gurandi police station OIC Mamata Panda, who happens to be the sister-in-law of Bidya. She might be questioned for allegedly stopping the ambulance carrying Soumya to the hospital after he sustained burn injuries.

The ambulance had allegedly been stopped midway by Panda without any valid reasons. On Thursday night, police had questioned the ambulance driver.

Earlier in the day, a handwritten note written by Soumya came to the fore which displays his love for his wife. The note handed over by Soumya's lawyer indicates that the deceased was ready to sacrifice



everything for his wife.

"Whatever you want, I will make arrangements for that. I'll definitely fulfil that. I will resign from my job and be a servant to you. But I want a small place at your feet. I don't want your qualification. I won't ever tell you anything about this. I just need you as my wife and a good friend," the note reads.

But significantly, he also wrote, "After this, if anything happens, if any small thing happens, I won't play any role. I won't explain anything. I won't tell anything. In the end, whatever she decides, she is fine to do. If I interrupt at that time by saying anything for punishment, she can file a case of domestic violence against me."

# Army Canteen rush leads to traffic mess in B'pur

The residents of the New Barracks Road area have been facing huge inconveniences due to traffic rush caused by Brahmapur Army Canteen and URC Extension Centre over past few years.

The parking of a large number of vehicles and long queues of army officials on the 30 ft narrow road of the New Barracks Street that connects to Old Bus Stand and Gandhi Square causes serious traffic and movement issues for com-

mon people, more particularly, the elderly, women and children. Due to non-opening of the gate by the local canteen authorities, thousands of ex-army officials who come to the canteen/store and URC Extension Center every day park their vehicles on the public road.

The women residents and house wives of the locality are scared to come out because of crowd and blockade of public road. A local resident and scribe drew the attention of the Secretary, Department of ESW, New Delhi about the problem

in February this year requesting to direct the military canteen authorities to open their gate and ensure the parking of the vehicles inside their canteen premises instead of on public road, but in vain. Similarly, there are repeated requests by the local residents to have the queue as well as parking inside the premises of the extension counter of the canteen instead of on public road but the local authorities have ignored them. There is a demand to open another entry gate adjoining NCC office of the southern boundary of the URC Center

and Ex-Army Service Hospital as this measure could avoid such huge crowd and parking problem which too remain unheeded.

Former Assembly Deputy Speaker Rama Chandra Panda keeping the public perceptions in mind and on the request of the local residents, too had written a letter in December 2017 and in June 2018 to the Secretary, Department of Defence, Government of India, requesting to open both entry and exist points of ECHS Complex from south or west side of the boundary wall of

# Public Prosecutor held in DA case

The Vigilance police on Friday arrested Ashutosh Mishra, Public Prosecutor in the court of Special Judge, Vigilance, Bhawanipatna on the charges of accumulating properties disproportionate to his known sources of income.

Earlier on July 3, Mishra was caught red-handed by personnel of the Vigilance Cell Division, Cuttack while he was

accepting a bribe of Rs 1 lakh an accused to hush up a case in the Vigilance court.

Following the trap, search was conducted at the residential house of Mishra at Radhakrushna Nagar in Bhawanipatna and assets worth Rs 85 lakh was detected including cash of Rs 15. 60 lakh.

During the course of further inquiry, income and expenditure of Mishra was ascertained and he was found in possession of assets worth Rs 75 lakh, dispro-

portionate to his known sources of income.

Mishra, who was on bail, was re-arrested and produced in the court of Special Judge, Vigilance, Bhawanipatna on the day. The court rejected his bail plea and remanded him to judicial custody.

Meanwhile, the appointment of Mishra as Special Public Prosecutor (Vigilance) has been terminated by the Government.

# ₹1.66-cr assets of GPEO detected

The Vigilance police on Friday conducted simultaneous house searches on five properties of Gobinda Bhoi, Gram Panchayat Extension Officer (GPEO) of Turekela block in Balangir district, on the allegations of possession of assets disproportionate to his known sources of income.

During search properties worth Rs 1.66 crore were detected in the name of Bhoi and his family members.

These included one-double storied building at Kantabanji in Balangir district, 10 plots in Kantabanji, Larkipali, Chatuanka in the district, two four-wheelers, three two-wheelers and other movable and immovable properties. Further search was continuing.

# Kalahandi cop arrested by Vig

# 'Open primary, upper primary schools'

The Odisha Primary Teachers' Association on Friday demanded that without any further delay the State Government should reopen the primary and upper primary schools. Even the ICMR has already said that children have more immunity as has been proved in sero-surveys.

The association also said that while the Government has taken a decision to reopen Classes-X and XII from next week, why should it not allow reopening of Classes-I to VIII? On the basis of recommendations of the ICMR, the primary and upper primary schools could be opened with proper sanitisation, mask wearing and vaccination, it said.

Association president Brahmananda Moharana said that as children of the poor and economically weaker sections are unable to afford the internet fees for online classes, classroom teaching is the only option left.

Moharana further added that as the primary education is the foundation for the students' future, the Government should immediately start classroom teaching and open these schools in the larger interest of the children.

Immediately, they set a trap and intercepted a Honda car at Pudeni Chhak near Nedipadar village. During the search, they found several bags containing 180 kg ganja in the car.

Following the seizure, the three occupants of the car were taken into custody for failing to produce necessary documents for transportation of the ganja.

The trio were booked under relevant sections of the NDPS Act and forwarded to court, police said.



# Maoist camp busted in N'pada

The CRPF 126 Battalion busted a Maoist camp near Kandanjharen village in the Padtarda Reserve Forest under the Boden police station of Nuapada district on Thursday.

The forces seized huge quantities of explosives and several other substances and materials like 25 gelatin sticks, 37 detonators, eight tiffin bombs and a gun from the spot. The CRPF Battalion traced the camp while launching a combing operation there. Sensing the arrival of the CRPF personnel, the Leftwing extremists fled the camp leaving behind the items.

# NTCA safety index: Similipal Reserve ranks 2nd

The Similipal Tiger Reserve in Mayurbhanj district in Odisha has been placed in second position in the safety index of the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA).

The NTCA has issued the safety index using state-of-the-art technology for the conservation of wildlife, tiger conservation projects and rare biodiversity. While the Dudhwa National Park of Madhya Pradesh topped the index, the Satkosia wildlife sanctuary in Odisha's Angul district found the 11th place in the list.

The NTCA has monitored the patrolling system at 34 tiger sanctuaries in the country through the M-STrIPES app. Based on the findings, the Similipal Tiger Reserve project occupied the second spot in terms of forest safety, according to Baripada Regional Chief Conservator of Forest (RCCF) M Yogajayananda.



The M-STrIPES app measures how many kilometers the sanctuary is patrolled within a specified timeframe. According to the NTCA and the Wildlife Institute of India (WII), 50,000 km of patrolling had been carried out in the Similipal sanctuary during the same period.

Yogajayananda said the role of 400 protection assistants (PAs) and about 200 forest guards working for the safety of Similipal was important. Despite inclement weather and harsh conditions, they patrol day and night in every beat of Similipal.

For forest protection, Similipal has been divided into various grids. A team comprising of two or three PAs and a Forest Guard has been formed for safety of the sanctuary. Through this M-STrIPES app, the patrol system is monitored every month and the report is sent to the NTCA. Based on data from various tiger reserve projects across the country, the NTCA carries out an evaluation process. The present index hints that Similipal would be the country's No.1 sanctuary in the coming days in terms of forest protection, the official stated.

# J'suguda woman farmer honoured

# PEGASUS SPYING

## 5 pillars needed to make Indian democracy open, fair

What is Pegasus spyware? It is a "licensed organisation run by an Israeli company, NSO Group". It can be used to infiltrate smart phones that run on both iOS and Android operating systems and

turn them into surveillance devices.

It is a fact of deep concern that Indian democracy is far from an Ideal one. The Prime Minister is having Ministers in his Cabinet but he has a trust deficit in some of them. Some of his Cabinet Colleagues' smart phones are therefore being tapped or "spywared".

This has been made public from what has come out in the *Washington Post* of the US, the *Guardian* of the UK and the *Le Monde* in France. The names of two Central Ministers, namely, Smriti Irani and Prahalad Singh Patel are there in the public domain. Their smart

phones were tapped. Not only this. The services of the spy organisation called the "Pegasus Spyware" were employed probably with several crores of rupees to break the JDS-Congress Government in Karnataka. Over and above, the telephones of scores of journalists namely Swati Chatruvedi and many others including Siddharth Varadarajan of the Wire and poll strategist Prashanta Kishor, Rahul Gandhi, etc were spied upon to gather rich political dividends. The Pegasus spyware can put under perfect surveillance any person whose activities may substantially go

against the Prime Minister or the President of the day. The organisation is being used to subvert democracy. No democracy, which is having morally gifted political leaders both in the Government and in the Opposition, will have any need for any spying organisation like the Pegasus. The Prime Minister or the President who are having a sense of insecurity will try to capture and tame the journalists of the land and the media houses. But there are certain journalists who are freelancers, who cannot be purchased. In addition, there are media houses that do not have any "price tag".

The solution to this horrible image-destroying, reputation-annihilating spying system lies in having the following five pillars here in India to strengthen our democracy and make it an ideal one.

One, the electoral system called the First-Past-the-Post (FPTP) System that gives unequal representation in Vidhan Sabha and Lok Sabha must go and it must be replaced with the Mixed PR System of New Zealand. Why should BJP have 103 Members extra in the Lok Sabha? According to its voting percentage, that is 37%, the BJP is entitled to have only 200 members in the Lok Sabha.

Not at all a single member extra, but it is now having 303 members.

Two, governance must not be "shrouded with secrecy". Governance must be fair and ethical. So the 2nd pillar needed for Indian democracy is Cabinet meetings held by the Prime Minister and Chief Ministers respectively must be open to the Press. Each Cabinet meeting is to be held in the presence of, say, 30 journalists sitting in the Press gallery and covering the Cabinet proceedings.

Third, funding of political parties by corporate houses must be banned. The income

and expenditure of each political party must be audited by qualified people appointed by the Election Commission of India.

Fourth, phased elections must be done away with and instead single-day elections be held. The Election Commission must not act according to the whims and caprices of the PMO. And, in addition, the Prime Minister and Central Ministers must not be allowed to canvas in State elections, ignoring their basic responsibilities at the Central level. Counting must follow soon after the voting is over.

Fifth, it relates to the stability of the Government. Once a Government is formed whether by a single party or by a coalition of parties, it must continue for the whole term of five years. The way the Congress Government was pulled down in MP and JDS - Congress coalition that was de-stabilized by the BJP must not be allowed to happen. The continuance of the Government shall be overseen by the Election Commission of India and Supreme Court of India.

"Always good to meet Chairman HCNR @DrabdullahCE. Appreciate his sentiments and support for our relationship.Value his insights on the region," Jaishankar tweeted.

Incidentally, Jaishankar some days ago in a conclave of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation(SCO)suggested a three-point way forward to restore peace in the strife-torn country.

Afghanistan has been wit-



nessing a series of terror attacks since the US began withdrawing its troops on May 1. The US has already pulled back the majority of its forces and is looking to complete the drawdown by August 31, ending nearly two-decade of its military presence in the country.

With the situation deteriorating in Afghanistan in the last few weeks, India has been in touch with leading international players as well as the Afghan government on the overall developments in that country.

A day ahead of Jaishankar-Abdullah meeting, External

affairs ministry spokesperson Arindam Bagchi on Thursday said India supports the government and the people of Afghanistan in realising their aspirations for a peaceful, democratic and prosperous future that protects the interest of all sections.

India has been a major stakeholder in the peace and stability of Afghanistan. It has already invested nearly USD three billion in aid and reconstruction activities in the country. India has been supporting a national peace and reconciliation process which is Afghan-led, Afghan-owned and Afghan-controlled.

# Parl body: Fix upper limit of air fares during festivals

Taking a serious note of high air fares, especially during the festive season, a Parliamentary Standing Committee on Transport, Tourism and Culture in its report 'Status of Aviation Connectivity in the country', has asked to fix an upper limit of air fares for every sector especially in the economy class.

The Committee also expressed concern that there is no uniformity in the cancellation charges levied by the airlines. The Committee also recommended that five Star/three Star hotels and multiplexes should be constructed near the new airports and asked the Ministry should consider mandatorily earmarking minimum 100 acres of land, while making plans for future airports.

The Committee chairman TG Venkatesh, presented its report in the Parliament on Friday. On the exorbitant air fares, the Committee expressed hope that the Ministry should consider fixing an upper limit for every sector, especially in the economy class of air fares. The Committee also noted that even after reduction of the Aviation Turbine Fuel (ATF)

prices over a period of time, the airlines have not passed on the benefit of reduction in ATF prices to the consumers. The Committee recommended that the Ministry should take effective steps to ensure that the airlines pass on the benefit to the travelers by reducing the air fares and inform the Committee about the specific steps taken in this regard and the outcome thereof.

The Committee emphasized the need for rationalizing the cancellation charges and prescribing an upper limit of cancellation charges that can be collected from the passengers.

The Committee has reiterated its recommendation in this regard, made in its 276th and 291st Reports, requiring the airlines to restrict not more than 50% of the base fare as cancellation charges. The tax and fuel surcharge collected should be refunded to the passengers on cancellation of tickets. The Committee hopes that the Ministry would be able to persuade the airlines for such rationalization in the interest of the passengers.

The Committee also recommended that the Ministry should ensure that designated holding areas should be made

available at all airports to accommodate passengers who are stranded at the airport due to cancellation or rescheduling of flights. The Committee impressed upon the Ministry to urge upon the airlines to make sure that facilities such as food, water, medical help and accommodation are available to stranded passengers.

As per the information provided by the ministry of civil aviation to the committee members, India's domestic passenger throughput has reached around 137 million in 2019-20 from 61 million in 2013-14 and international passenger traffic has reached 67 million in 2019-20 from 47 million in 2013-14. Prior to the outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic, the Indian civil aviation sector was growing at a Compound Annual Growth Rate of 14 percent and was among the fastest growing civil aviation sector in the world. "Despite India being the world's fastest growing aviation market, its airports are grappling with serious capacity constraints because such a pace of growth has resulted in a strain on the aviation infrastructure, resulting in traffic congestions and delays at a majority of the airports," it said.

# India to discuss bilateral strategic ties with US's Secy of State during his 2-day visit

India and the US will discuss the entire range of bilateral strategic ties during the two-day visit of Secretary of State, Antony J Blinken starting July 27. He will meet External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar and National Security Advisor(NSA) Ajit Doval. Giving details of Blinken's visit, the External Affairs Ministry said here on Friday this is his first visit to India after assuming charge as U.S. Secretary of State.

Blinken's visit is an opportunity to continue the high-level bilateral dialogue and bolster the India-US global strategic partnership, the Ministry said.

Both sides will review the robust and multifaceted India-US bilateral relations, and potential for consolidating them further.

Discussions will focus on regional and global issues of mutual interest – including recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic, the Indo-Pacific region, Afghanistan and cooperation in the UN, the ministry statement said.

Blinken and Jaishankar are also likely to do the ground work for the Quad summit and bilat-

eral meetings between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and US President Joseph Biden due to be held in Washington later this year, sources said. Incidentally, Jaishankar and Blinken are in touch on the phone for sometime now, they added.

The US President has said the America's Indo-Pacific strategy that includes India is an area of importance, particularly given increasing tensions between the U.S. and China.

Underlining the growing ties between the two countries in various fields including defence, Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin was the first senior official of the Biden administration to visit Delhi in March followed by Biden's special envoy on climate change John Kerry.

India also reciprocated and Jaishankar visited Washington in May, and held talks with Blinken in London on the sidelines of the G-7 Foreign Ministers' meeting also in May and in Rome at the G-20 Foreign Ministers' meeting in June.

The Quad summit including leaders of the U.S., Japan, Australia and India, which was held virtually earlier this year, is expected to be held in Washington with the leaders 'in-person' in September.

# 22 iconic trees relocated for Central Vista Avenue, Centre tells Parliament

The Centre on Friday informed the Parliament that only 22 heritage trees had to be relocated because of the Central Vista Avenue redevelopment project.

Responding to a question in Lok Sabha on the relocation of trees to the Badarpur Eco-Park, Union Environment Minister Bhupendra Yadav said according to information received from the Central Public Works Department, "only 22 number of trees have been relocated from the Central Vista Avenue to the eco-park, Badarpur, and there is no other proposal to relocate trees from the Central Vista Avenue to Badarpur". He said there is a proposal to plant 10 saplings for every tree uprooted or removed, and the compensatory plantation will be

done at the Badarpur Eco-Park, Badarpur.

The redevelopment project of the Central Vista -- the power corridor of the country -- includes the revamping of the three-km-long Rajpath from the Rashtrapati Bhavan to India Gate. It also envisages a new triangular Parliament building, a Common Central Secretariat and new residences for the prime minister and the vice president.

On another query on census of trees, Yadav said, "As per available information, no tree census has been conducted in the recent past."

"However, the Forest Survey of India (FSI) carries out sample plot based regular inventory of trees in forests and outside forests in the country under its National Forest Inventory Programme," he said.

# Do not politicise Covid-19: Health Min in Lok Sabha

Seeking Opposition parties to Sensure that people were vaccinated, Union Health Minister Mansukh Mandaviya on Friday said in the Lok Sabha that there should be no politics over the Covid-19 pandemic.

Responding during zero hour amidst noisy Opposition protests, the Minister said the Government is still in talks with US company Pfizer with respect to making its vaccine available in India.

"There should be no politics on the issue of Covid and vaccination. The Prime Minister has said this several times," Mandaviya said in response to a question asked by Shiv Sena MP Rahul Shewale.

The Minister detailed how Prime Minister Narendra Modi interacted with the Chief Ministers over 20 times before allowing them to float tenders for 25 per cent of the vaccine as demanded by them. He said on Jul 21 the Centre started a new vaccine policy when the states conveyed that they were not able to get vaccines purchased at their end.

"I will also not want to indulge in politics on this issue but I want to present the facts," he said, adding that the Prime Minister till date has held over 20 meetings and discussions with the State Governments and Chief Ministers.



He said some opposition-ruled states raised the issue that health is a state subject and they should be taken into confidence.

"Many said Health is a State subject, States said we also need permission to buy vaccines. We said that we have no problem with this. The States said that we want to go out for tender to buy the vaccine. Modi ji said that we are ready to do whatever help is needed," the Health minister said.

He said accordingly, the states were allowed to buy 25 per cent and 25 per cent by the private (sector). The Centre was to procure 50 per cent for the people.

"For the 25 per cent, states issued tenders and we said we will provide all possible help. The suppliers were limited and the Indian government too was holding talks," he said.

Many issued global tenders. But there were only two Indian companies which had

started vaccine manufacturing, the Serum Institute of India (Covishield) and Bharat Biotech (Covaxin), Mandaviya said.

He said Moderna has registered in India and taken permission. Johnson and Johnson has tied up with Biological E and work on technology transfer has begun.

"With Pfizer, the Indian government was holding talks with it. But the company said it will not deal with the states and the Indian government is holding talks with us. Even today, an experts group is holding talks with the company," Mandaviya said.

In a meeting with the states, the chief ministers said they were not getting adequate supply of vaccines and the Centre should procure 25 per cent, which the states were to earlier acquire, of the vaccines. So a new policy came into being from June 21 under which the Centre decided to vaccinate all the citizens, he said.

"The issue is about politics. There should be no politics on this issue. Our goal is to vaccinate 100 percent people above the age of 18 years. We all need to work on it together. It is not the time to indulge in politics," said the new health minister who replaced Dr Harsh Vardhan on the July seven cabinet reshuffle at the centre.

# No record of farmers death during protest at Delhi border: Tomar

Union Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar on Friday informed Parliament that the Government has no record of farmers who have died during the agitation at Delhi's borders against three new farm laws since 2020. The Minister said the Government has not undertaken any study to ascertain the apprehensions in the minds of farmers about the three farm laws.

Asked if the Government was aware of the total number of farmers who have died during farm protests since 2020, Tomar said: "The Government of India has no such record." However, the Central Government during discussions with farmers' unions had appealed to them that children and elders, especially women, should be allowed to go home in view of the cold prevailing at that time and the Covid-19 situation, he said in a written reply in the Rajya Sabha.

Further, in a separate reply, Tomar said, "No study has been undertaken to ascertain the reasons for apprehensions created in the mind of farmers on account of these farm laws. However, the Centre has proactively undertaken efforts to reach out the farmers to

remove their apprehensions, he added.

Asserting that the government is serious and sensitive towards farmers' issues, the minister said the Centre has been engaged in active discussions with the farmers unions.

Further, allaying concerns over farmers' privacy data under a new initiative 'Agristack', Tomar said the government has not involved any private company in developing the digital ecosystem on agriculture. Tomar also said his ministry in consultation with the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology is in the process of bringing out a data policy for the agriculture sector.

Agristack is a digital ecosystem for covering everything related to agriculture, including farmers' databases, land records, soil types, and crops. In a written reply to the Rajya Sabha, Tomar said his ministry has commenced the work for creating 'Agristack' in the country and is in the process of finalising the India Digital Ecosystem of Agriculture (IDEA), which will lay down a framework for Agristack. "No private sector companies are involved in building the Agristack," he said.

# JCP examining Data Protection Bill gets extension till Winter Session

Amidst disruption of the Lok Sabha business and slogan-shouting, the Joint Committee of Parliament (JCP) examining the Personal Data Protection Bill was on Friday given an extension till the Winter Session to submit its report.

The Personal Data Protection Bill seeks to regulate the use of individual's data by the Government and private companies.

This is for the fifth time the committee's tenure has been extended. The JPC was constituted in the Lok Sabha in December 2019 and was expected to submit its report in the Budget Session.

P P Chaudhary of the ruling BJP moved a motion in the house seeking extension up to the Winter Session of Parliament for the 30-member panel to submit its report.

"That this House does extend up to the first week of Winter session of Parliament, 2021, the time for the presentation of the report of the Joint Committee on the Personal Data Protection Bill, 2019," the motion read. It was passed by a voice vote.

The lower house was adjourned till 1200 hours and then adjourned for the day as order could not be restored in the house.

# Record rainfall in Satara, IMD issues alert for other districts

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has said that Mahabaleshwar, in Satara district, one of Maharashtra's most well-patrolled hill stations, experienced its wettest day ever on Friday. Ending at 8.30am on Friday, the 24-hour rainfall recorded was 594mm.

The IMD has issued an alert for the next 24 hours for the districts of Raigad, Ratnagiri and Sindhudurg in coastal Konkan and also for Pune, Satara and Kolhapur in Western Maharashtra. The Met Department has predicted isolated extremely heavy falls are very likely over Konkan, Goa and central Maharashtra in the next two days. The Met Department also predicted tht heavy rains WOULD batter several parts of west and south India.

According to the IMD, Mahabaleshwar, some 260 kilometres from here, got 482 mm of rainfall on Wednesday and 461 on Thursday. In the last 10 days, Mahabaleshwar has received 1886.6mm — which was 40 per cent of the total July rain quota. Between 2000 and 2021, on seven occasions extreme heavy rainfall



events (more than 400mm in 24 hours) were reported either in July or August. Even though it is a high rainfall receiving area, with June and September average of 5130mm, this trend of intense spells within a short duration is on a rise.

The IMD predicted scattered to fairly widespread rainfall with isolated heavy falls are likely to continue over Gujarat till July 23, but its intensity will increase from July 24. "Fairly widespread to widespread rainfall with isolated heavy to very heavy falls very likely to continue over west coast during next 2-3 days with reduction thereafter," the IMD said.

"Isolated extremely heavy falls are also very likely over Konkan, Goa, the adjoining ghat areas of central Maharashtra during July 23-24 with reduction thereafter and over coastal and south interior Karnataka, (from) today July 23," it said.

Maharashtra, especially the Konkan region, has been witnessing a deluge. In neighbouring Goa, several parts, including Sattari and Bicholim tehsils in north and Dharbandora in south, are reeling under a flood-like situation. A large number of houses was inundated as the water level of some rivers rose following heavy rains over the past few days. The IMD said scattered to fairly widespread rainfall with isolated heavy falls are likely to continue over Gujarat till July 23, with an increase in intensity from July 24.

"It is likely to increase to fairly widespread to widespread rainfall with isolated heavy to very heavy falls are likely to continue over east and adjoining central India during July 23-25 with reduction thereafter.

Isolated extremely heavy falls also likely over west Madhya Pradesh on July 23 and July 24 and east Madhya Pradesh, Telangana and Odisha on July 23, the IMD added.

## 30TH ANNIVERSARY OF INDIA'S ECONOMIC LIBERALISATION

# Time to introspect, road ahead more daunting: Manmohan Singh

To mark the 30th anniversary of India's economic liberalisation, former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh on Friday said the road ahead is even more daunting than during the 1991 economic crisis and the nation would need to recalibrate its priorities to ensure a dignified life for all Indians.

In a statement, Singh said he was deeply saddened at the devastation caused by the Covid-19 pandemic and the loss of millions of fellow Indians and livelihoods.

Recalling that as the Finance Minister in 1991, he ended his budget speech by quoting Victor Hugo, 'No power on Earth can stop an idea whose time has come, and said, "Thirty years later, as a nation, we must remember Robert Frost's poem -- 'But I have promises to keep, And miles to go before I sleep.'"

"It is not a time to rejoice and exult but to introspect and ponder. The road ahead is even more daunting than during the 1991 crisis," Singh said in the statement.

"Our priorities as a nation need to be recalibrated to fore-



most ensure a healthy and dignified life for every single Indian," said the former PM.

He said that on this day, 30 years ago in 1991, the Congress ushered in significant reforms of India's economy and paved a new path for the nation's economic policy.

Over the last three decades, successive governments have followed this path to catapult the nation to a USD 3 trillion economy and into the league of the world's largest economies, the former prime minister noted.

More importantly, he said, nearly 300 million fellow Indians have been lifted out of poverty in this period and hundreds of millions of new jobs have been provided for the youth.

Singh said the reforms process unleashed the spirit of free enterprise which has helped produce world-class

companies and help India emerge as a global power in many sectors.

"The economic liberalisation process in 1991 was triggered by an economic crisis that confronted our nation then, but it was not limited to crisis management. The edifice of India's economic reforms was built on the desire to prosper, the belief in our capabilities and the confidence to relinquish control of the economy by the government," he said.

Singh said he was fortunate to play a role in this reform process along with several of his colleagues in the Congress party.

"It gives us immense joy to look back with pride at the tremendous economic progress made by our nation in the last three decades. But I am also deeply saddened at the devastation caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and the loss of millions of fellow Indians," he said.

The social sectors of health and education have lagged behind and not kept pace with our economic progress. Too many lives and livelihoods have been lost that should not have been, Singh lamented.

# Ensure that appeals are filed without delays: SC tells CBI

## ASKS TO SET UP A MONITORING MECHANISM

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

The Supreme Court on Friday directed the CBI Director to set up a monitoring mechanism to ensure that appeals are filed without delays. The apex court's direction came when the CBI filed an appeal 647 days after the High Court verdict. As per rules appeals against HC orders are to be filed in SC within 60 days. A Bench of Justices DY Chandrachud and MR Shah while dismissing the appeal on account of delay asked the CBI Director to ensure that steps are taken on the administrative side to monitor filing of appeals.

"We are of the view that the CBI must take all necessary steps to ensure that these kinds of delays do not occur in the future. Delays are liable to cause grave misgivings on reasons for delay. We direct Director CBI to take necessary administrative steps to monitor filing of appeals on an ICT platform so that delays don't take place," the Court said.

In November 2018, a



Special CBI judge at Raipur had convicted the accused for three years in a corruption case. The High Court by its judgment of June, 2019, reversed the judgment and acquitted the accused. The appeal against it was filed by CBI after 647 days. As per rule, appeal against trial court judgment has to be filed in High Court in 180 days and appeal against the High Court Judgment has to be filed in Supreme Court in 60 days.

When CBI stated that delay was on account of COVID, the bench said, "There is a delay of 647 days. In application for condonation of delay, explanation given is on grounds of Covid which doesn't explain the entire duration of delay. Explanation of delay on account of Covid is not acceptable since the judgment was much before the onset of the pandemic in March 2020."



# J&K Police shoot down Pak drone

A Pakistani drone fitted with a ready to be used Improvised Explosive device (IED) was shot down by the alert cops of Jammu & Kashmir police near Kanachak area of Jammu late Thursday night.

The drone, which a senior police officer claimed was assembled with spare parts from China,Taiwan and Hongkong, had penetrated approximately 6-7 kms inside the Indian territory before it was shot down near Gurah Pattan village of Kanachak area in Jammu. After the drone attack on Air Force Station, Jammu on June 27, 2021 the security of several vital installations was beefed up and anti drone technology was installed to prevent the similar strike.

Preliminary investigations of the drone assembly revealed, the strings used to drop the payload fitted with the drone was similar to the one recovered by the investigation agencies from the site of drone attack inside the Air Force station, Jammu on June 27, 2021.

Additional Director General of Police Mukesh Singh told reporters in Jammu, "so far 25 to 30 drone sorties

have been detected and according to intelligence agencies at least Sixteen AK 47 rifles, 3 M4 US made rifles, 34 pistols, 15 grenades and 18 IEDs, 4 lakh currency recovered so far in the last 18 months'.

Sharing details of the operation, ADGP Singh said, 'late Thursday night, we got specific inputs that a Pakistan based terror outfit Jaish-e-Mohammad was planning to drop some payload via a drone in Akhnoor sector. Singh said, ``We rushed a police party to maintain

a strict vigil. At about 1 am, the drone was spotted in the Kanachak area and when it made a low flight to release the payload it was shot down by our police-men'.

ADGP Mukesh Singh said the drone was carrying a payload of five-kg IED material in a semi-assembled state and only wires had to be connected to it to trigger a blast."Preliminary analysis of the drone revealed that it was a hexacopter with six wings and a flight controller and GPS."

Singh said the drone shot down in Kanachak was assembled with parts made in China, Hong Kong, and Taiwan. He added these drones can travel up to 20 kilometres with a payload of 10 to 12 kg. The aerial distance between the place where the drone was shot down and the border is about six to seven kilometres.

Security forces have fired at several drones since June 27, but this is the first time that police have shot down such a flying object carrying a payload. There is a difference of a digit between the flight controller serial number of the drone shot down on Friday and that of another brought down a year ago in Kathua's Hiranagar sector.

"It establishes beyond doubt that the terror group has procured many flight controllers with similar series for the purpose of installing them in drones." Responding to a direct question whether there was any common link with the drone attack on the Air Force Station Singh said as per preliminary investigations We have recovered the same threads and it is now confirmed that a similar drone had dropped the payload at IAF station. The National Investigation Agency is investigating the case, he added.

# Two LeT terrorists gunned down in Sopore

A joint team of security forces on Friday gunned down two Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) terrorists in the Warpora area of Sopore in Baramulla district.

The operation was launched late Thursday evening on the basis of a specific intelligence input about the presence of terrorists in the Warpora area of Sopore.

The slain terrorists were involved in a number of attacks on civilians including the one that killed four innocent civilians and a policeman in Sopore on 12 June 2021.

According to a police spokesman, "both the terrorists have been identified as Fayaz Ahmad War @Rukana @Umar son of Gh Mohi-Ud-Din War resident of Warpora a top commander of proscribed terror outfit LeT and Shaheen Ahmad Mir @Shaheen Molvi son of Mohd Kamal Mir resident of Cherpora Budgam".

According to a police spokesman,Fayaz Ahmad War had a long history of terror crime cases, as he was associated with terrorism since year 2008.

Although he had surrendered earlier with arms & ammunition yet after his release he again worked as terrorist associate for proscribed ter-



ror outfit HM and was detained under PSA. However after his release, in March-2020 he again joined terrorist ranks of proscribed terror outfit LeT. Besides being part of groups involved in several terror crime cases, he was very instrumental in planning and executing terror attacks on security establishments and civilian killings and figured among the list of most wanted terrorists in North Kashmir.

As per the police records, the LeT Commander was the last active terrorist who perpetrated a series of various terror crimes and violence in North Kashmir, He was also involved in a series of grenade attacks on Police/Security establishments in Sopore.

# TMC MPs choose Didi as parliamentary party chairperson CM Yogi distributes appointment letters to 6,696 assistant teachers

Two days ago Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee called upon the Opposition parties to unite and act in advance to throw the BJP out of power. On Friday Banerjee's party appointed her the chairperson of the All India Trinamool Congress parliamentary committee that the Trinamool Congress insiders called a step taken well in advance to beat the "Congress' right to galvanise the Opposition" in the 2024 general elections to say the least.

The decision takes place ahead of the Chief Minister's visit to Delhi where she is likely to meet a number of opposition leaders including NCP chief Sharad Pawar — in a bid to lay the groundwork for a greater national focus for herself and her party.

"Mamata Banerjee will become our Trinamool parlia-

mentary party chairperson. This is a reality we are formalising. Mamata Banerjee is a seven-time MP. She was already guiding the parliamentary party... there are two levels to the development ... a conceptual level and a strategic level," O'Brien said.

"All the MPs who were present were consulted and those who were not were spoken to over telephone and there was a unanimous decision to appoint Mamata Banerjee who is also the Trinamool Congress national president the chairperson of the parliamentary committee ... we are proud and feel empowered," Roy said.

Banerjee a former Union Minister and MP of 26 years replaces Sudip Bandopadhyay to the post and becomes one of very few such leaders apart from Congress' Sonia Gandhi to become the parliamentary committee chairperson of her party without being an MP.



Gandhi became the Congress president as also the parliamentary committee chief in 1998.

Not completely devoid of relevance senior Trinamool leader and Bengal Minister Arup Biswas had on Wednesday said "ebar Bharat Banglar meye ke chai" meaning thereby that not only Bengal but also India wanted the daughter of Bengal at the helm of affairs in Delhi.

The Friday's announcement came in the midst of stormy session in Parliament

post suspension of Trinamool MP Shantanu Sen for alleged misdemeanour shown towards Information Technology Minister Ashwini Vaishnav even when he was responding to the Pegasus snooping scandal.

Soon after Sen's suspension O'Brien said, "We want parliament to run. But at the same time we want two or three issues to be discussed. We want structured discussion on Pegasus issue, and Farmers' Bill ... We want the farm laws to be repealed."

## Adhikari moves High Court against 'political vendetta'

**Kolkata:** Bengal Leader of Opposition Suvendu Adhikari has filed a petition before Calcutta High Court seeking transfer of all criminal cases registered against him to the Central Bureau of Investigation.

The BJP leader who was currently in Delhi to meet Home Minister Amit Shah said that there was a politics of vendetta going on in Bengal and he was being made a prime target of that "political vendetta".

Mr Adhikari also prayed for an order of quashing of FIRs registered against him by the state police.

He said that the writ petition seeking transfer of the

criminal cases against him to the CBI for an "impartial investigation," adding, there was no law and order and rule of law in Bengal. "The CID has been planted against me to harass me ... not only me but all the BJP men are being attacked and harassed," he said.

On the question of post poll violence he said whatever had been submitted before the High Court by the National Human Rights Commission was only tip of the iceberg and "there are more atrocities being perpetrated on our men ... the post-poll violence has not stopped ... it is still continuing." **PNS**

## Chinese Prez makes first visit to Tibetan town bordering Arunachal

**Beijing:** Chinese President Xi Jinping has made a rare visit to Nyingchi, a strategically located border town close to Arunachal Pradesh, during his first visit to the politically sensitive region of Tibet where he underlined the need for "lasting stability" and "high-quality development" for the plateau region. <

Xi was in Tibet from Wednesday, but his important visit was kept under wraps by China's official media till the end of the trip on Friday due to the sensitivities of the trip.

On Wednesday Xi flew directly to Nyingchi not far from the Indian border after visiting several places in the city. Later he travelled to Tibet's capital Lhasa by the recently commissioned high-speed bullet train.

According to state-run Xinhua news agency, Xi visit-

ed the Tibet Autonomous Region in connection with the 70th anniversary of Tibet's "peaceful liberation the first time in the history of the Party and the country."

During his visit, Xi stressed fully implementing the guidelines of the ruling Communist Party of China for "governing Tibet in a new era and writing a new chapter of lasting stability and high-quality development for the plateau region", the report said.

China is accused of suppressing cultural and religious freedom in the remote and mainly Buddhist Himalayan region. China has rejected the accusations.

In footage released by State broadcaster CCTV, Xi, 68, was seen greeting a crowd wearing ethnic costumes and waving the Chinese flag as he disembarked from his plane at the

Mainling Airport in Nyingchi.

Chinese leaders periodically visit Tibet. But Xi, who also heads the ruling Communist Party of China (CPC) and the powerful Central Military Commission -- the overall high command of the Chinese military — is perhaps the first top leader in recent years to visit Tibet's border town.

He visited Tibet as Vice President in 2011 to commemorate the 60th anniversary of "the peaceful liberation of Tibet".

The last sitting Chinese President to officially visit Tibet was Jiang Zemin in 1990. During his visit to Nyingchi, Xi, visited the Nyang River Bridge to inspect the ecological preservation in the basin of the Brahmaputra river, which is called Yarlung Zangbo in the Tibetan language. **PTI**

## Mizoram sets up Boundary Commission to deal with border dispute with Assam

**New Delhi:** The Mizoram Government has constituted a boundary commission to deal with demarcation of the State's border with Assam.

A Government notification issued on Thursday said the boundary commission will be chaired by Deputy Chief Minister Tawnluia and will have Home Minister Lalchamliana as vice chairman.

The boundary commission's formation came at a time when Mizoram and Assam ahead of a visit by Home Minister Amit Shah to the northeast to try and sort out the various border disputes. State home department secretary was made member secretary.

The commission which will have the state home department secretary as its member-secretary, will consider the various aspects of the Mizoram-Assam border imbroglio, the notification said.

The commission will also have one member each from leading NGOs, recognised political parties, Joint Action Committee on Inner Line Reserve Forest Demand apart from three Ministers, chief sec-

retary, additional chief secretary and Director General of Police (DGP), it said.

Prominent citizen and former Lok Sabha member C.L Ruala and former state home secretary Lalsiakzama were also appointed as members of the commission.

Meanwhile, a senior police officer said on Friday that the situation at Aitlang hnar and Buarcheap areas in Kolasib district along the Mizoram-Assam border remained tense.

Mizoram Deputy Inspector-General of Police (Northern Range) Lalsiakthanga Khiangte told PTI that both the states forces are now camping on the border areas, face to face, and warned a serious confrontation could take place at any time if either side tried to make any advances. He however said that Assam police had not made any advances since a standoff on July 10.

Khiangte said that people living along the inter-state borders on Mizoram side are now living a normal life and none of them have had to leave their villages as a result of the confrontation. **PTI**

## BSP holds first sammelan in Ayodhya to woo Brahmins

**Lucknow:** Bahujan Samaj Party on Friday kicked off its poll campaign by holding the first of its seven Brahmin Sammelans at Ayodhya. The UP Assembly elections are due in 2022 and the BSP is struggling to win the confidence of the electorally influential Brahmin community.

BSP supremo Mayawati on July 18 had announced to hold Brahmin Sammelan to woo the Brahmin community ahead of UP Assembly elections from Ayodhya from July 23. Mayawati had entrusted the responsibility of the event on party national general secretary Satish Chandra Mishra.

Addressing the meeting, Mishra, said that his party had made a pre-poll alliance with the public rather than with any political party. The BSP leader first visited the Hanuman Garhi and Shri Ram Lalla Janmabhoomi temples in Ayodhya for darshan.

He said that the BSP had made the biggest alliance with the people of the state for the 2022 Assembly elections in Uttar Pradesh. Mishra said that Bhagwan Shri Ram belonged to everyone and "we have also come to seek his blessings". **PNS**

## 42 children from Assam rescued in Sikkim, 2 held

**Guwahati:** A total of 42 children from Assam have been rescued in Sikkim and brought back to the state on Friday, Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said.

The parents of the children, hailing from four villages of Chirang district along the Indo-Bhutan border, were lured by two persons who assured that their education would be taken care of, but they ended up as domestic helps, Sarma told reporters here.

The two accused have been arrested and during interrogation, one of them claimed that in the last two years, 80 children have been trafficked from the state, with some sent to Dubai as well, officials said.

The operation to rescue the children was initiated by Chirang Police under the guidance of Bodoland Territorial Council Chief Promod Bodo and Special DGP L R Bishnoi, while Sikkim Police provided the necessary help and cooperation. **PTI**

## 17,518 fresh Covid cases in Kerala; TPR crosses 13% mark

Kerala on Friday reported 17,518 fresh Covid-19 cases, pushing the tally to 32,35,533 and taking the Test Positivity Rate (TPR) past the 13 per cent mark. The TPR was 13.63 per cent, up from 12.38 per cent recorded on Thursday.

It had crossed 11 per cent on July 19 after remaining below it for several weeks

The number of people who succumbed to the virus rose to 15,871 with 132 more deaths being recorded today.

As many as 11,067 people have been cured of the infection, taking the total recoveries to 30,83,962 and the number of active cases in the state to 1,35,198, State Health Minister Veena George said.

Malappuram reported the highest number of 2,871 cases, followed by Thrissur with 2,023 and Kozhikode 1,870.

"Of the new cases, 110 had come from outside the state whiel6,638 contracted the disease through their contacts. The source of infection of700 are yet to be traced. Seventy health workers are also among the infected," the release said.

A total of 1,28,489 samples were tested in the last 24 hours and the TPR was found to be 13.63 per cent

The cumulative number of specimens examined so far stood at 2,59,50,704.

There are currently 4,18,496 people under observation in the State, out of whom 25,691 are in isolation wards of various hospitals.

There are 271 local self Government bodies in the state with a TPR of more than 15 per cent, the release said.

George dismissed media reports that Kerala has 10 lakh unused doses of vaccine and said the State has a stock of around 4.5 lakh doses.

## Covid under control in UP but threat of virus not over yet: Yogi

**Lucknow:** Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath said that due to the strategy and continuous efforts of his Government, novel coronavirus infection was under control in the state but warned that the viral infection was not over yet and therefore even a little carelessness on its prevention could be disastrous.

The Chief Minister was reviewing the Covid situation across the State at a high level meeting convened at Lok Bhawan in Lucknow on Friday. In the meeting, the Chief Minister was apprised that 61 new cases of coronavirus infection were reported across the state in the last 24 hours while in the corresponding period, 86 Covid-19 patients had recovered.

At present, the number of active coronavirus cases in the state stands at 994. Besides, the recovery rate of coronavirus infection in the State is 98.6 per cent. The heartening news is that not a single Covid-19 patient has

been reported in Aligarh, Bahrampur, Basti, Etah, Mahoba, Hathras and Shravasti districts.

The chief minister said that vaccination was an important safeguard in preventing the spread of coronavirus and vaccination should be done with the goal of giving jabs to more and more people of the targeted age group at the earliest. He said that the free registration facility being provided for Covid vaccination through Common Service Centres in villages should be given wide publicity.

It was informed in the meeting that till July 22, over 4.27 crore vaccine doses had been administered. The chief minister was also informed that 211 samples were tested in KGMU, Lucknow and BHU, Varanasi in the last days for the purpose of intensive study and testing regarding the new Delta variant of novel coronavirus but not a single sample confirmed the dangerous variant. **PNS**

## Castle in the air

The Delhi High Court has told political leaders that they must honour the promises they make

It took 89 pages of a Delhi High Court judgment to tell politicians holding high positions in Governments that they cannot go on making promises to people and not honour these. The judgment, in a case relating to a promise made by Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal, sends the message that it is important to bridge the gap between law and morality and let the authorities, who are either elected to public positions or who hold positions of power, realise that they “are answerable to the people, especially once they undertake or agree to do or not to do a particular thing” and that the citizens would expect that the Government would implement the promises made. The judgment, by Justice Prathiba M Singh, opens with a telling comment that reflects the mood of the society: “The saying ‘Promises are meant to be broken’ is well known in the social context.” The judgment unambiguously says that promises made by the Government or its officials are “judicially enforceable” if these are broken. The judgment reminds the political leaders of things enshrined in the business of governance but forgotten in the melee of politics. One is that good governance requires the said trust to be maintained between those who govern and those who are governed. Two, the sustenance of this trust coupled with the legal certainty of an assurance given, cements the relationship between the citizen and the Government.



Three, citizens repose a lot of trust in a promise made by those who hold Government positions and an assurance given is like an undertaking that is compatible with public duty. One powerful conclusion is derived from the judgment: Once a representation is made by a high-ranking official, it comes within the scope of its authority. It will have a far-reaching impact on the Indian polity which is used to most politicians in power resorting to populism as forethought and governance as an afterthought. A cursory glance through a day’s newspapers will throw up scores of promises made by elected representatives of the people that are meant to remain unfulfilled. The present case relates to some poor labourers petitioning the court that Kejriwal should be asked to fulfil his promise of paying the house rent on their behalf if they were unable to pay it because of COVID-19 exigencies. Kejriwal did make that promise in March 2020 but did not pursue the matter further. The court correctly observes, in the context of the case, “that ‘puffing’ which may be permissible in commercial advertising, ought not to be recognisable and permissible in governance”. The judgment is a serious caution to politicians for whom people are merely voters, not citizens. There are millions of political and electoral promises that remain ignored because there is no law to punish politicians, in power or seeking to be in power, who routinely evade accountability. The judgment should prod those in power to desist from playing with people’s legitimate expectations.

## Glitz and guts

The Tokyo Olympics have started. Only blood, sweat and tears will lead to glory

The greatest sporting spectacle in the world has begun in Japan, even though under the scary shadow of the pernicious SARS-Cov-2 virus. Over the next two weeks, the best athletes from around the world will compete in 33 sports and 46 disciplines. As always in the 125-year modern history of the Olympics, the global audience will be wowed by the superhuman performances of the athletes, wondering how some people — with the same number of limbs, developed more or less in the same proportion and living on the same planet as us — can achieve the seemingly unattainable or near-impossible. But, put in a nutshell, that’s what the Games are about. However, never before in the history of the modern Olympics have the Games ever been organised in an odd-numbered year even though these have survived boycotts, natural calamities and man-made wars. Another first is that no spectators would be present inside stadia, thanks to the raging COVID-19 pandemic. Think about it, the world’s biggest sporting stage, and not a single soul to cheer the athletes, say, the fastest woman and man on Earth? In a way, it’s poignant.

Focusing on India, a total of only 20 Indian athletes from seven sports (besides six officials) participated in the opening parade on Friday evening. India is being represented by more than 125 athletes in this instalment of the Olympics, with the overall contingent size being 128 members. The parade number was deliberately thinned owing to COVID-19 concerns and the deputy chef de mission had already made it clear that the athletes who have competitions lined up on Saturday — primarily, archery, hockey, shooting and badminton — would stay away from the opening ceremony festivities. From the men’s hockey team, only captain Manpreet Singh participated in the event as he was India’s flag-bearer along with pugilist MC Mary Kom when Team India proudly walked out into the stadium at number 21st as per the Japanese alphabetical order. The expectations of 130 crore Indians must be weighing heavy on the Indian contingent as it tries for the first time ever to take its medals tally into double digits. So far, our best showing was in the 2012 London Olympics, where Indian athletes managed to scoop up six medals, though none of them was gold. Hopefully, things will turn better this time around. Meanwhile, let the Games begin!

# The human-animal conflict on the rise

There’s an urgent need to stop designating animals as ‘vermin’ as it takes the protective shield of the wildlife Act away from animals

A practice that continues despite strong and reasoned opposition is that of proclaiming species of wild animals as “vermin” and thus putting them out of the ambit of the protective umbrella of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, the principal instrument for protecting wild animals in India. The wild boar and nilgai have been proclaimed as “vermin” in Uttarakhand, the nilgai and boar in some districts of Bihar, and the rhesus macaque in parts of Himachal Pradesh.

The Act does not define the term “vermin” in terms of what it connotes. It just states in Section 62: “The Central Government may by notification declare any wild animal other than those specified in Schedule I and Part II of Schedule II to be vermin for any area and for such period as may be specified therein and so long as such notification is in force, such wild animal shall be deemed to have been included in Schedule V.” Animals included in Schedule V can be freely hunted.

The Central Government declares an animal as vermin following requests from State Governments and the ground which has been invariably cited is that it causes damage to crops and poses a danger to human life. There have no doubt been cases in which the Centre has withheld permission. The fundamental question, however, is whether there should at all be a provision for designating an animal as “vermin”.

There are several reasons for asking this. For one thing, an article by Anupam Chakravarty, Rajeshwari Ganesan and Rajit Sengupta, published under the heading ‘Enemies of the state?’ in the *DownToEarth* on June 15, 2016, cites animal rights groups as saying that the drive for killing then underway was based on popular perception rather than data. The country had no data both on the populations of animals proposed to be killed and the extent of crop damage they were supposed to be causing. The article stated that, in fact, Uttarakhand’s proposal on the basis of which the Centre permitted the killing of wild boars, clearly said, “There is no scientific survey or census of the wild boar population that has



been carried out. However, since the crop damage caused by wild boar is increasing, the wild boar is estimated to be overpopulated.”

Further, experience shows that once killing is permitted, villagers or designated hunters have frequently not followed the methods prescribed. An example is the case in Kerala where a pregnant cow elephant died following several days of intense agony after she had bitten on a pineapple filled with explosives. Enquiries revealed that the pineapple was intended to kill a wild boar which, as a species, had been declared “vermin”. Also, such a barbaric way of killing was not permitted even in the case of wild boars.

State Governments have doubtless laid down restrictions on the methods and guidelines governing killings — such as only rifles and pistols to be used and no killing of injured animals running away to forests, and hunting only after receiving permission from the forest department concerned and the village *pradhan*. But who is to ensure compliance? The fact is, methods that are not permitted are often used. These include laying out live wires

for animals to be electrocuted, trapping them for murder and poisoning them. There is no guarantee that animals other than those declared as “vermin” would not come into contact with such wires or consume the poison.

The argument that State forest department personnel should watch out for the transgressors and deal harshly with them hardly holds water. It would take a very large number of people and vehicles for doing that. Given that most forest departments have to make do with numerically inadequate staff, deployment on such an errand would leave them with very few people to carry out essential functions like curbing poaching and preventing illegal felling of trees. The result may be a serious diminution of protected species like elephants (for tusks), rhinos (for their horns) and tigers for their body parts which are sought for the manufacture of so-called aphrodisiacs.

Apart from the fact that declaring an entire species of wildlife as vermin is contrary to the spirit and content of Article 51 A (g) of the Constitution which enjoins upon both the Government

and all citizens to show compassion to all living creatures, animals can hardly be blamed for damaging standing crops and attacking people. The loss of the vegetation they feed on following the destruction of their habitats through encroachment by expanding human settlements, roads and industries, as well as droughts and forest fires, has driven them to agricultural fields for food.

Humans do not realise that their own predatory exploitation of nature is increasing areas of human-animal conflict and making non-human species extinct at the rate of 3,000 a year. In this process, they are also destroying the environment and the conditions that have made human life possible. They need to realise that they are not the lords of the universe and must live in harmony with the world around them, including plants and animals. The Greek sophist Protagoras’ famous aphorism “Man is the measure of all things” needs to be amended to read, “Humans are the preservers and protectors of all things.”

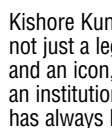

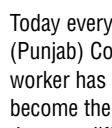

## FIRST COLUMN RAGHURAJPUR PATTACHITRA

Painting murals to welcome tourists  
back to their village

After a gap of nearly six months, Abakash Nayak, 54, a seasoned Pattachitra artist of Raghurajpur, the nationally acclaimed heritage village in Odisha's Puri district has picked up his brush, but this time to paint on the walls of his house. He is painting Lord Ganesh on one wall and Ardhhanariswara (a traditional form of Lord Shiva and Parvati) on another. "I am happy like the rest of the artists of Raghurajpur village that we are being asked to paint murals to decorate the walls of our houses. Once the lockdown will ease and tourists will start returning to our village, they will witness the fresh look of the village," he said. The artists of this village have been sitting idle with no work at hand since March last year after the nationwide lockdown was announced. Recently, the State government declared financial assistance of ₹10,000 to each of the 150-odd families to decorate the walls of their houses with Patta paintings, bringing smiles to their faces. In Raghurajpur



crafts village, almost all family members are involved in Patta painting, sculpture work, and paper masks. Patta paintings are made on a piece of cloth known as Patta, or on a dried palm leaf which is first covered with a mixture of gum and chalk. Over the prepared surface, colourful and intricate pictures of gods and goddesses, and scenes from mythological scriptures are painted. The village saw no tourists after March 2020. In November, some tourists started visiting, but the second wave of the Covid-19 pandemic in February spread among the artists. Banamali Maharana, a Shilpiguru awardee, recalls the times when visitors could see all the family members doing artwork, sitting on the porch of their houses. "We are artists... How are we supposed to pick up spade leaving paint and brush?"

The male members mainly do the painting work, while women prepare traditional colours, the base of the paper mask, and other additional work. Some women have also started Patta paintings. Earlier, they would earn between ₹15,000 and ₹20,000 per month. With overseas buyers, they would earn a little more. Now incomes have drastically dropped. Initially, they managed to make ends meet through loans but money lenders have now stopped giving them money. A few "kind-hearted" art lovers help them out financially. In 2019, Cyclone Fani devastated this artisans' village. All the artwork were damaged. When they began to restart their art, the coronavirus struck. Some started selling vegetables, some opened "paan" shops, or started working as daily wage labourers. But the second wave put paid to these efforts too. Villagers are at present getting vaccinated to fight the virus. "Once unlock happens, the tourists will start coming to our village again. Our vaccination will send a message of reassurance to these tourists," said villager Jitendra who believes that the government should also arrange a vaccination drive for the artists. Raghurajpur is now preparing to welcome tourists with murals on walls. The Department of Language, Literature and Culture in association with Odisha Lalit Kala Akademi has come up with an innovative idea to encourage and support the artists. Each family will receive ₹10,000 as financial assistance while the best five will be awarded after being selected by a special committee. Meanwhile, the younger generation is exploring selling the artwork online. Many have also shifted to the virtual mode to teach Pattachitra-making online. They want the government to train them and arrange for a platform to sell their products to e-commerce companies.

# Cairn looking for arbitration money?

Cairn Energy has submitted a detailed series of proposals to the Indian Government for settlement of the case

On the very same day that Prime Minister Narendra Modi effected a massive reconstitution of his council of ministers, India got in the shock in the form of a French court freezing residential properties belonging to the Indian government in Paris following a retrospective tax dispute with British power and energy giant Cairn Energy.

The decision will impact 20 properties valued at Euro 20 million (₹177 crore), as part of a guarantee of the debt owed to Cairn that exited India a few years ago. The company with a market capitalisation of £755 million (about ₹7,800 crore) - has filed cases in several countries to pursue the unpaid international arbitration award of \$1.7 billion (₹12,750 crore). The company also filed cases in New York, seeking judicial confirmation that Air India can be classed as the alter ego of the Indian state and thereby jointly liable for the arbitral award.

The French court decision is unfortunate as it is feared it can start a new diplomatic conflict and it also impinges on the sovereignty of the country. It might create an image that India can be taken lightly by MNCs and other private players.

And that is what exactly happened. A case similar to Cairn is that of Devas Multimedia, floated by ex-ISRO executives. It had entered into a deal with ISRO's Antrix Corp. and the National Company Law Tribunal said the 2005 spectrum lease deal was fraudulent. Deutsche Telekom later picked up its stake.

Devas moved an arbitration tribunal saying that its multi-million-dollar investments lost value because of the annulment. In 2020 the tribunal awarded Devas \$1.2 billion. It is now seeking payment from India (now stayed by Supreme Court) in a New York court, asking Air India to pay the amount or forfeit its property, including planes, cargo handling, equipment, and artwork.

In both cases, the authorities in India bungled in pursuing the case. In the case of Cairn and Devas, they moved the courts in Germany and The Hague even as the Indian arguments on jurisdiction and criminality in two arbitrations under Bilateral Investment Treaty (BIT) under India-Mauritius and India-Germany agreements were lost.

Cairn and Devas have chosen flagship Air India planes and its prime property as a pressure tactic to force India into payment negotiations. Trying to seize planes or property to realise unpaid dues may be an extreme tactic but there are precedents. Aircraft are valuable, mobile, and relatively easy to sell. A few years ago, US hedge fund Elliott Capital Management seized an Argentine naval vessel to collect on bonds on which the country defaulted in 2001.

The Cairn matter is one of the irrational tax system. The company is in dis-

pute with the government over a 2014 retrospective tax demand. The income-tax department seized a 10 per cent stake in Indian operations that Cairn was trying to sell. After a long dispute, it went for international arbitration and Cairn won the \$ 1.7 billion award.

The issue of high taxation, as recently mentioned by President Ramnath Kovind, retrospective tax, and confusion on predating taxes is an unresolved quagmire. There is an OECD move to have a global minimum tax on corporations at 15 per cent or higher. The UPA government introduced the controversial retrospective tax in March 2012. The NDA II was expected to correct it after 2014 but the bureaucratic system continued with the supposed oddity.

The Supreme Court of India on January 20, 2012 ruled in favour of Vodafone overturning a 2010 decision of the Bombay High Court which ruled that Vodafone was liable to retrospectively pay \$2 billion income-tax because Indian capital gains taxes (CGT) applied on the share transfers between two non-resident entities.

But the smitten tax officials took a different route to circumvent the SC ruling with the introduction of the retrospective tax in March 2012, allowing the government to levy CGT — a move that was piloted by former finance minister Pranab Mukherjee in 2012.

In March 2018 the then finance minister, the late Arun Jaitley, said that the decision to tax Vodafone retrospectively by UPA was erroneous and also that the "present government will not be going down that path". On July 18,

2014, he had said that India would not levy any tax with a retrospective effect that creates an additional burden. But Jaitley made no move to repeal the 2011 law.

The statements of Jaitley and Prime Minister Narendra Modi pledging not to use retrospective taxation to overturn on Cairn Energy were used by a three-member tribunal at the Permanent Court of Arbitration in The Hague on December 20, 2020, to rule that the 2006 reorganisation of Cairn Energy's India business before listing on local bourses was not "unlawful tax avoidance" and ordered the tax authorities to drop the tax demand. This did not happen due to bureaucratic audacity.

Cairn has moved for implementation of the arbitration award in several jurisdictions on different continents, including the US, the UK, Canada, Singapore, Mauritius, France, and the Netherlands as the company intends to focus on high-value assets. Cairn has submitted detailed series of proposals to the Indian government for settlement of the case. The NDA government is now opposing its stand apparently under pressure of officials.

It rattles India. Would the country lose its flagship aircraft carrier and other prime assets? Technically it may be so but authorities say that they are yet to receive a notice or communication from the French court and the government would vigorously defend its case. It translates into more litigations as well as negotiations. Director of Cairn's corporate communication David Nisbet says that the company is keen on an agreed settlement with India and keep the

trust of its shareholders.

So, it has identified \$70-billion worth of Indian assets to retrieve the \$1.7 billion award. However, an international company knows that while it is important to contest governments, it also needs their goodwill to be in business.

The government is also in negotiations since January 2021, even before the present French order was flashed. It may give Cairn Energy one of the surrendered oilfields — Ratna R-series — in the Arabian Sea that was taken away from Essar-Premier Oil in 2016 instead of an arbitration payment. Cairn had spudded the biggest inland oil wells in Barmer, indicated in a survey by NGRI. It exited the country after it was given ₹10247 crore retro-tax demand. Apparently, the government wants that the biggest oil company with one of the lowest operational costs come back to India to shore up its image as also create a show window for the international investors.

It is also looking at the other option of giving it the Barmer oilfield. Vedanta, which now operates the field, has so far has not agreed to the government conditions for extending its contract. Under Vedanta, Rajasthan oilfields have seen a steady decline in output. Cairn has protested against the high \$9 cess per barrel on the oil produced.

The bureaucrats had the issues mired in a web. A political decision to annul retro-tax under Prime Minister Narendra Modi can ensure that a Cairn, Vodafone, Devas, or Vedanta is not repeated and bureaucrats do not muddy the waters.

# Rejuvenating agricultural marketing through cooperatives

Farmer aggregation is necessary to organise them, reduce transaction costs and enable members to share information & take collective decisions

Agricultural and allied activities continue to be the backbone of the Indian economy supporting the livelihood of 60 per cent of the population and contributing 1/6<sup>th</sup> of GDP. It used to account for more than half of GDP in 1951.

Half of the arable area continues to depend on the monsoon for irrigation. The proportion of gross irrigated area to total cropped area could increase from 31 per cent in 1984-85 to only 45 per cent, as per the agriculture census of 2010-11. The total operated area under agriculture decreased from 16 crore hectares in 2010-11 to 15.8 crore hectares in 2015-16.

With succession not based on primogeniture, population explosion has resulted in frag-

mentation of landholdings. Total operational holdings increased from 13.8 crore in 2010-11 to 14.6 crore in 2015-16. The average size of an operational holding declined to 1.08 hectares in 2015-16 from 1.15 hectares in 2010-11.

Small and marginal farmers suffer from the absence of economies of scale, access to information, and their inability to participate in the price discovery mechanism. Their participation is restricted by poor vertical and horizontal linkages, limited access to the market, and poor information flow along the value chain. The challenge now is to optimize benefits through effective and efficient means of aggregation models.

Farmer aggregation assumes significance due to



the shift of Indian agriculture towards high-value commodities as a result of the growing importance of the agri-food market caused by liberalization, globalization, improved purchasing power, demand for safe and quality food, and expansion of niche markets.

Integrating small farmers with agricultural markets is a big challenge. Many forms of farmer producer organizations have been experimented with like cooperatives, self-help

groups, Farmer Producer Companies, and commodity interest groups to aggregate farmers to help them benefit from economies of scale and to link them to the markets.

Contract farming and direct marketing are other institutional interventions that can be undertaken by organised groups of farmers. I have come across even Whatsapp groups being used to connect farmers and consumers, bypassing middlemen and getting better prices for farmers. A Farmer Producer Company (FPC) seems to be the most useful for the aggregation of small farmers. The FPCs offer more benefits compared to other formats of aggregation. Its members are able to leverage their collective strength and bargaining power to access financial and non-

financial inputs and services and appropriate technologies leading to a reduction in transaction costs. They can tap high-value markets and enter into partnerships with private entities on equitable terms.

The performance of cooperatives has been generally poor with the exception of cooperative sugar factories and dairy cooperatives in Maharashtra and Gujarat. Amalsad cooperative Society for sapota and farming cooperative Gambhira in Gujarat, MAHAGRAPHES in Maharashtra, HOPCOMS and CAMPCO in Karnataka, Mulkanoor women's cooperative groups in combined Andhra Pradesh, etc., have performed well. These successful models could not be emulated else where in the

country. In Budget 2019-20, the government announced new central sector schemes to facilitate the formation and promotion of 10,000 new Farmer Producer Organisations (FPOs) and handholding of each FPO for five years from its aggregation and formation.

Rainfall deficit, unseasonal rains, floods are natural and continuing risks. Agricultural production has increased but productivity is generally lower than international benchmarks. Water-use efficiency is particularly low. Some progressive farmers are de-risking themselves by diversifying their produce. However, many relatively well-off farmers continue with water-guzzling crops like rice and sugarcane in water-defi-

cient regions. How to incentivize farmers to move away from the over-production of cereals (particularly rice and wheat)? How to go about agricultural diversification to boost oilseeds, protein, and fruits/vegetable production? These are policy challenges.

Rejuvenation of our agricultural sector needs appropriate diversification and value-addition and loosening of outdated controls on agricultural markets. It is hoped that protests against the farm laws - misguided or mischievous or partly both - abate soon and a sensible farmer leadership works on connecting farmers with FPOs. Farmers' apprehensions about the entry of big corporates can be addressed if they become members of the FPOs.





# SC rejects Airtel, Voda pleas against AGR dues

Supreme Court on Friday dismissed the petition of telecom majors Airtel and Vodafone-Idea for re-computation of dues, claiming errors in Adjusted Gross Revenue (AGR) calculation. Airtel owes due of ₹8,000 crore and Vodafone-Idea owe ₹58,000 crore to Department of Telecom. In the petition, Airtel claimed only ₹18,000 crore and Vodafone-Idea claimed ₹25,000 seeking re-computation.

"All the miscellaneous applications are dismissed," a bench headed by Justice L Nageswara Rao said while pronouncing the order. Shares of cash-strapped Vodafone Idea plunged as much as 10% to ₹8.10 per share post the verdict that came as a setback for the telcos, whereas that of Bharti Airtel was trading over 1% higher at ₹52 on the BSE. Under invoicing of Telecom companies were caught by CAG in 2011 during their audit on 2G Scam. As per the licensing agreement on every call certain portion (Adjusted Gross Revenue - AGR) of the bill, the companies have to



share with Government. The telecom companies went up to Supreme Court against CAG auditing of their revenue and lost the case.

After the 2016 CAG report finding huge under invoicing and DoT issued notice to all companies to pay a total of ₹1.45 lakh crores. Supreme Court Bench headed Justice Arun Mishra also ratified the Government's claim in October 2019 and ordered companies to start paying immediately, citing that this money was collected telcos from public already per call.

Later Government informed Supreme Court that 20 year installment can be given to the companies. In September 2020, Justice

Mishra's Bench allowed 10 years installment starting from March 2021. The bench had asked the Managing Directors (MDs) or Chief Executive Officer (CEOs) of the telcos concerned to furnish undertaking or personal guarantee for payment of dues.

After getting 10 year installment, biggest defaulters Vodafone-Idea and Airtel approached Supreme Court seeking re-computation of their dues, claiming errors in DoT's calculations.

The apex court on Friday had held that demand raised by the DoT in respect of AGR dues will be final and said there shall be no dispute raised by the telcos and that there shall not be any re-assessment.

## Benchmarks build on gains as banks, FMCG stocks spurt; post weekly losses

The Sensex and Nifty mustered gains for the second straight session on Friday, propped up by banking, FMCG and pharma stocks, but closed lower for the week as the surging Delta variant cases sapped risk appetite globally.

Overcoming a choppy start, the 30-share BSE Sensex ended 138.59 points or 0.26 per cent higher at 52,975.80.

On similar lines, the broader NSE Nifty advanced 32 points or 0.20 per cent to finish at 15,856.05.

ICICI Bank topped the Sensex gainers' chart with a jump of 3.18 per cent ahead of its results on Saturday. ITC, SBI, HCL Tech, Axis Bank, Bajaj Finserv, Tech Mahindra and Sun Pharma were among the other winners, advancing up to 2.56 per cent.

On the other hand, L&T, HUL, Reliance Industries, NTPC, Asian Paints and HDFC Bank were the prominent losers, dropping up to 1.80 per cent.

During the week, the Sensex declined 164.26 points or 0.30 per cent, while the Nifty slipped 67.35 points or 0.42 per cent.

"The markets today witnessed a bumper listing of one of the most awaited IPOs in

recent history, Zomato. The exuberance though was not broad based, the market breadth remained negative for the day. The weekly trend too remained marginally negative as all the major market cap based broader indices closed marginally in the negative for the week.

"The strong show of IT stocks continued whereas slip-pages in reported asset quality and expectations of rising NPA risks dragged down the banking stocks. The expected rise in

NPAs may have broader market implications as it exposes the pandemic-caused vulnerability of both household as well as corporate balance sheets," said Joseph Thomas, Head of Research at Emkay Wealth Management.

Vinod Nair, Head of Research at Geojit Financial Services, said, "Domestic indices continued to advance ahead tracking rising global risk appetite and higher domestic inflows from local investors."

## Rupee pares early losses to close 6 paise up against USD

**Mumbai:**The rupee pared its early losses to close 6 paise higher at 74.40 against the US dollar on Friday, rising for the third session in a row on the back of weak crude oil prices and gains in the domestic equities. A stronger dollar in the overseas markets however weighed on the rupee sentiment. At the interbank forex market, the domestic currency witnessed heavy volatility.

## Gold climbs ₹256; silver jumps ₹662

**New Delhi:**Gold in the national capital on Friday rose ₹256 to ₹46,698 per 10 gram amid supportive global trends, according to HDFC Securities.

The precious metal had in the previous trade closed at ₹46,442 per 10 grams.

Silver also jumped ₹662 to ₹66,111 per kg, from ₹65,449 per kg in the previous trade.

## Over 1.37 crore enrolled under PM skill development scheme

The Government on Friday said that under the Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana, 1.37 crore candidates have been enrolled and of them 1.29 crore candidates are trained or oriented as of July 10.

Skill India Mission aims to empower the Indian youth through skill development. Under this mission, the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship is implementing its flagship scheme Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY).

PMKVY has two components - Short Term Training and Recognition of Prior Learning.

"Under PMKVY, as on July 10, 2021, 1.37 crore candidates have been enrolled; Out of which, 1.29 crore candidates are trained/oriented," Skill Development Minister Dharmendra Pradhan said in a written reply to the Rajya Sabha.

In a separate reply, he said 18,353 industrial units are imparting apprenticeship training in the country, at present.

## Textile Ministry in process of obtaining Cabinet nod for MITRA scheme

The textile Ministry is in the process of obtaining approval of the Union Cabinet for the proposed Mega Investment Textiles Parks (MITRA) scheme, under which seven such parks will be set up in the country over the next three years, Parliament was informed on Friday.

Minister of State for Textiles Darshana Jardosh said the scheme was announced in Union Budget 2021-22.

"Ministry of Textiles is in the process of obtaining approval of the Cabinet for the proposed scheme. Once, the proposed scheme is approved and modalities are finalized, the details of location, government funding structure etc. Will be decided," she said in a written reply to the Lok Sabha. In a separate reply, the minister said during the pandemic, CCI (Cotton Corporation of India) procured 20.72 lakh bales valuing ₹5,615 crore from 4 lakh cotton farmers.

However, during the entire cotton season 2019-20, CCI made a record procurement of 105.15 lakh bales (equivalent to around 546.80 lakh quintal kapas).

## Sebi consent not mandatory for compounding offences: SC

**New Delhi:**The Supreme Court Friday held that the consent of regulator Sebi is not mandatory for compounding offences under section 24A of the Sebi Act but taking views of the expert body is necessary for stability in the securities market as well as investor protection.

A bench headed by Justice D Y Chandrachud said though Sebi is not conferred with any authority to veto a decision for proceeding in trial offences, it is a regulatory and prosecuting agency and the Securities Appellate Tribunal and the courts must obtain its views since it is an expert body. The bench said it is clear that Sebi's consent cannot be mandatory before or the Court before which the proceeding is pending, for exercising the power of compounding under Section 24A. The apex court, which elucidated some guidelines that T or such courts must take into account while adjudicating an application under Section 24A, said however that eliciting of views of Sebi was necessary in the interest of the stability of the securities market and protection of investors.

The bench, also comprising Justice M R Shah, said the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Sebi) has vital functions to discharge in maintaining an orderly and stable market so as to protect the interests of investors.

## Govt approves 792 private food processing projects so far

As many as 792 projects out of 818 have been approved for setting up food processing industries by the private sector, with approved grants-in-aid of ₹5,792 crore so far, the Government informed Parliament on Friday.

"Government has been consistently encouraging and incentivising increased private sector investment for the overall development of the food processing sector of the country to promote value addition in agricultural and allied sectors and reduce wastage," Minister of the State for Food Processing Industries Prahlaad Singh Patel said.

The minister in a written reply to as Rajya Sabha also said the Government has recently taken three major initiatives in order to further increase private sector participation in the sector. Firstly, the Government has approved a Production Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme for the food processing sector with an outlay of ₹10,900 crore to support the creation of global food manufacturing champions and support Indian brands of food products in international markets.

## Yes Bank Q1 net jumps over four-fold to ₹207 cr

**New Delhi:**Yes Bank on Friday reported an over four-fold jump in net profit at ₹207 crore for the quarter ended June 2021. The bank said this was its highest net profit since December 2018. It had posted a net profit of ₹45 crore in the same quarter of the previous fiscal year. Total income during Q1 FY22, however, was down at ₹ 5,581.84 crore as against ₹ 6,106.74 crore in Q1 FY21, Yes Bank said in a regulatory filing. Compared sequentially, it was higher from ₹4,805.30 crore in the quarter ended March 2021. The private sector lender said its corporate recoveries/resolutions during the quarter at ₹1,643 crore outpaced the slippages of ₹ 1,258 crore. New business generation continued for the quarter with retail disbursements of ₹5,006 crore, SME disbursements of ₹3,242 crore and wholesale banking disbursements of ₹3,625 crore, it said. On the asset quality front, the bank pared its bad loans proportion with gross non-performing assets (NPAs) falling to 15.60 per cent of the gross advances as of June 30, 2021, from 17.30 per cent in the year-ago period.

## Govt set to overshoot FY22 tax collection target as Q1 mop-up reaches ₹5.6 lakh crore: Icra

With the first quarter gross tax mop-up reaching ₹5.6 lakh crore, Icra Ratings on Friday said the Government is set to exceed the budgeted tax collection target of ₹22.2 lakh crore for 2021-22, led by indirect taxes.

The government has budgeted a modest 9.5 per cent growth in tax collections at ₹22.2 lakh crore for FY22, over FY21 collections of ₹20.2 lakh crore. However, despite the second wave of the pandemic, the April-June quarter tax collections rose to ₹5.6 lakh crore, which is 39 per cent higher than Q1 of FY20. As stated differently, this is 107 per cent more than Q1 of FY21 and 25.1 per cent of the full-year target, according to an analysis by Icra.

The first quarter is traditionally moderate for tax collection, as the economic activity remains tepid. The revenue department is yet to officially release tax collection data, but the finance ministry informed the Lok Sabha on July 19 that Q1 tax revenue mop-up reached ₹5.6 lakh crore.

According to her, Q1 collections at ₹5.6 trillion is 107 per cent higher than ₹2.7 lakh crore in Q1 of FY21, when the whole country was under lockdown last year. "But more meaningfully, this is a full 39 per cent more than the pre-COVID level in Q1 of FY20," she said. She further said while corporation tax, personal income tax and Central GST receipts in Q1 stood at 21-22 per cent of the budget estimates, excise and customs collections already crossed 30 per cent of the budget estimate, boosted by the high taxes on fuels as well as a relatively faster recovery in international trade.

Say Manjot Singh, and most of us would be at sea. But say Lali, and the audience would perk up immediately as they recall the popular character that Manjot played in *Fukrey* and *Fukrey Returns*. He returned with *Chutzpah*, the web series, which was released on SonyLIV yesterday.

His entry in Bollywood is in itself a filmy story. Before starring in films such as *Udaan* and *Student Of The Year*, Singh made his debut as the boy who grows up to be the super-chor Lucky, in *Oye Lucky! Lucky Oye!* Born in Delhi to a Sikh family, he went to audition for Dibakar Banerjee’s film without having ever acted before, even in school plays. After the audition, while the casting director rejected him for the role of little Lucky, Dibakar insisted, later saying, ‘Even though the casting director wasn’t convinced, I just put my foot down.’ It turned out to be an incredible call, as Singh went on to receive rave reviews for his performance in the film.

The actor, who was in Mumbai, initiated the telephonic conversation with the fair warning that as much as he would like to divulge spoilers and other details about *Chutzpah*, he can’t. While the professional in him would not share something he should not but, the other part was that, he was yet to watch the show. Naturally, what he was able to talk about centred around his experience. “For a major portion of the shooting, which wrapped up in January this year, I was by myself on the set created for my character. It took me some time to get my head around the way we shot for *Chutzpah*. You might be aware that the series follows five stories, which are interconnected by the internet. Most of my bit involves me being by myself, in front of my computer, in the set created for the show. From an outsider’s perspective, I was really intrigued by the trailer. While I am aware of the finer details concerning the story revolving around Rishi, my character in the series, I cannot wait to watch the whole thing as soon as it is released,” shared Singh.

His account tickled our curiosity and we asked him how strenuous was the experience of shooting for something as unconventional as *Chutzpah*? “I have been working in this industry for over 12 years now and I believe this

was the most challenging project that has come my way. On the first day of the shoot, I could not really understand the process that was underway; you could very well say that I was clueless. I had a tough time dealing with the fact that I did not get to interact with my co-actors for a major chunk of the production. For scenes in the series, where I am shown interacting with someone via my computer, their lines were read to me and I cannot explain how difficult it is to respond to someone else’s dialogue when they are not around. The reactions that come naturally, by responding to someone else’s dialogue, or before and after your own dialogue had to be consciously expressed. It was extremely challenging to create those reactions by way of imagination, and you would get tired of counting the retakes we did,” he chuckled.

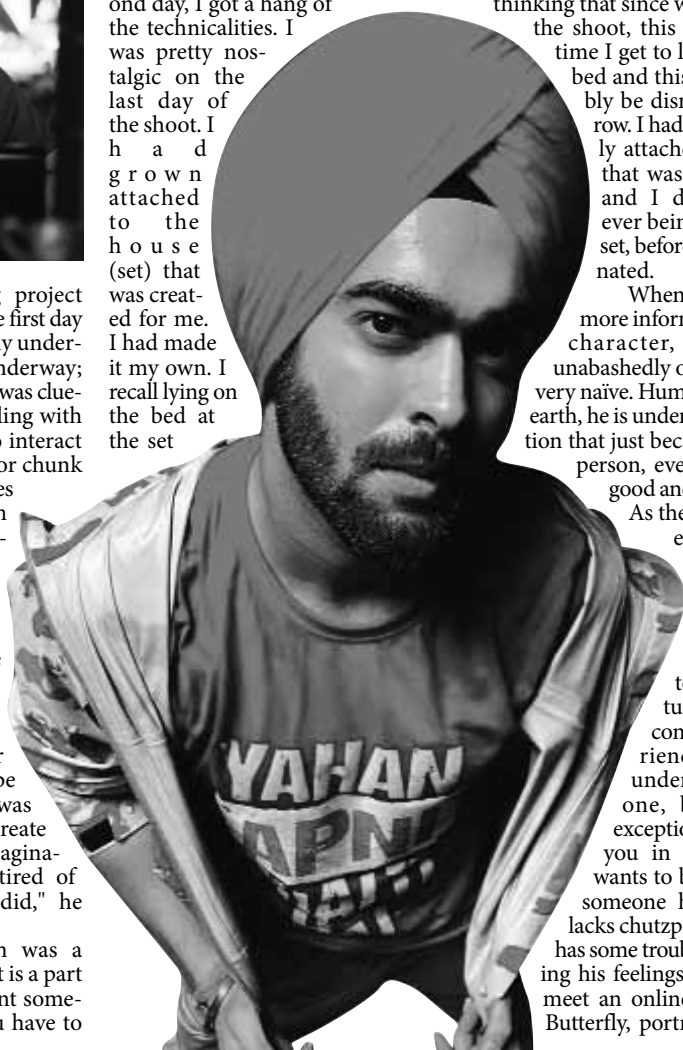
“All in all, production was a painstaking process. But that is a part and parcel of life. If you want something worth cherishing, you have to

pour every ounce of your being into it. I would say shooting for *Chutzpah* was like climbing a mountain. With time, I got used to it. From the second day, I got a hang of the technicalities. I was pretty nostalgic on the last day of the shoot. I had grown extremely attached to the house (set) that was created for me. I had made it my own. I recall lying on the bed at the set

after we were done shooting my bits. While another set alongside mine was lit up, the lights were switched off on mine and I remember feeling numb thinking that since we are done with the shoot, this will be the last time I get to lie down on this bed and this set will probably be dismantled tomorrow. I had grown extremely attached to the home that was created for me and I don’t remember ever being this close to a set, before,” Manjot ruminated.

When we ask him for more information about his character, Rishi, he unabashedly obliges us. “He is very naïve. Humble and down to earth, he is under the misconception that just because he is a nice person, everyone else is as good and helpful as he is.

As the story progresses, little by little, that perception is corrected. He realises that the world bears a stark contrast to how he pictured it and it is a coming of age experience for him to understand that no one, barring a few exceptions, will support you in this world. He wants to bare his heart to someone he likes but he lacks chutzpah and hence he has some trouble communicating his feelings. He goes on to meet an online camgirl, Wild Butterfly, portrayed by Elnaaz



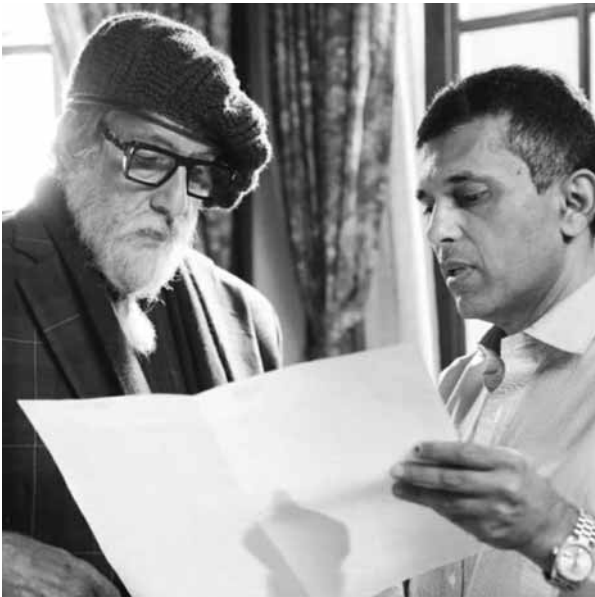
Norouzi, who provides some abstract guidance, of sorts. You have to witness how he goes on to gain some chutzpah which changes his life,” he expressed.

We ask Manjot for his take on the internet, whether it is a curse or a boon, and he said, “I think just about everything has its pros and cons. In moderation, everything is good. Frankly, I feel that the advantages outweigh the disadvantages. But those disadvantages are potent and can ruin someone’s life. Talking in particular about social media, we all know what trolling is and it has also been represented in the show. Now, while at face value it might be disregarded but it may result in a chain reaction of sorts which may lead to some serious consequences. I believe that is partly why people subconsciously choose to not reveal their real selves on social media. However, once again, the advantages cannot be ignored. We all have seen how the internet proved to be a lifesaver for scores of people against the backdrop of the pandemic, earlier this year.”

He went on to highlight that the series is something worth your while. He laughed as he said, “I know everyone keeps raving on about how good their show/film is but have you seen the trailer? While it might seem somewhat amusing, I would say *Chutzpah* is an incredible social drama and the trailer serves as a wonderful teaser to what’s in store for viewers. Well, while I haven’t seen the series, I can vouch for it since it is directed by Simarpreet Singh sir and written by Mrighdeep Singh Lamba, who also wrote *Fukrey*. Additionally, the work done by the DOPs, Amit Babbar and Gianni Giannelli lent a *Black Mirror*-esque feel to the trailer. *Chaa jayega ye* show, you wait and watch.”

Manjot shared that he is just as eagerly waiting for the third part of *Fukrey*, but it all depends on the impending third wave of the pandemic. “Just like the fans of the franchise, we too are waiting for the film to get a little better before we start working on it. We believe we will start shooting sometime next year. Additionally, I have another unnamed project which might commence shooting before *Fukrey*,” he disclosed, as we wrapped up the conversation.

## ‘It would be wise to wait’

Veteran producer ANAND PANDIT says anticipated blockbusters like *Chehre* will hit the big screen only when the circumstances are conducive

Veteran producer Anand Pandit has put the release of his much-anticipated film, *Chehre*, starring Amitabh Bachchan, on hold and says most production houses would like to wait for conducive circumstances before they release potential blockbusters.

“The industry has a tremendous amount of resilience and patience and we know that a pandemic is not the right time to take unnecessary risks. I am waiting for the government’s directives regarding the opening of theatres and then will take a call as to when *Chehre* will be released,” he says. Pandit, who has worked to

speed up the vaccination drive within the industry and helped create oxygen centres across Mumbai, is well aware of the dangers posed by a possible third wave of COVID-19. He voices his thoughts, “At this time, the more careful we are, the better it will be for all concerned. Yes, the industry needs to go back to work and it is already doing that to some extent but the exhibitors are an important part of the ecosystem and till they can open theatres to full capacity, we cannot say that we have truly turned a corner. Hopefully, better times are ahead and we can go back to the movies the way we once did, sooner than later.

## The fight isn’t over

Actor ÉDGAR RAMÍREZ advises everyone to be cautious, in light of the increase in cases of extremely contagious variants of COVID-19

Venezuelan actor Édgar Ramírez wants people to understand that although the world is starting to come out of the pandemic, the fight is not yet over.

“Many families, including mine, continue to be affected terribly. At this very moment I have family members dying of COVID, so it is very important that we remain alert and attentive to this global health hazard,” he said in a remote interview from Los Angeles.

While he did not specify which relatives he was referring to or where they were, he stressed the importance of avoiding fake news, trusting science and getting vaccinated.

“Remember that our grandparents and our parents defeated polio and smallpox with vaccines and that it is very important to be very careful because in times of fear there is a lot of misinformation. We need to trust science and follow the recommendations and be very responsible with the way we handle information in times of fear and uncertainty,” Ramírez shared.

With White House officials stating that



vaccination drives are being ramped up, hospitals in some US states, where COVID-19 cases are soaring, are running out of space because of the delta variant, which is spreading with incredible efficiency.’ Ramírez advised caution

against the spread of COVID-19 while promoting Disney’s upcoming film *Jungle Cruise*, in which he plays the villainous Spanish conquistador Aguirre opposite Dwayne Johnson and Emily Blunt. *Jungle Cruise*, an adventure film inspired by the iconic Disneyland theme park ride of the same name, opens on July 30 in US theaters and on Disney+ with premier access.

Ramírez said that being in this film ‘means a lot’ to him because he grew up watching Disney movies. He also hinted at the possibility of a sequel or new franchise.

“It’s beautiful to be part of the Disney universe in such an iconic movie which we’ll hope becomes the adventure saga of this decade,” he shared.

A: With respect to similarities, both countries share similar climates, terrain and agriculture and the last one is the dominant factor behind what you eat. We’ve grown up on this side of Punjab, listening to stories

about the other side, more so, in terms of food. I think the similarities lie with the spices, spice-mixing and elaborate cooking methods that are primarily born out of similarities in climate and agriculture.

♦You are one of the fastest-growing content creators in the culinary

I am someone who started by romancing food in the lanes of Lucknow, roughing it at Munir Ustad’s kebab stall and worked my way up the ranks. All I knew through it all, was that I was doing what I love and wanted to do it for the rest of my life. And I’ve always believed that food is a giver. When you invest so much in it unconditionally, it will surely give back. Above all, God has been kind.

# CAPTURING THE RIGHT SPIRIT

Actor MEGHNA MALIK realised that Usha Rani Nehwal is a woman of substance after playing the character in *Saina*. By AYUSHI SHARMA

If not as Farah in *Chalte Chalte* or Tulika from *Pagglait*, one would, undoubtedly, remember actor Meghna Malik as Ammaji of *Na Aana Is Des Laado* and Usha Rani Nehwal from the biopic *Saina*. Before the world television premiere of the film, Malik gets candid about her preparation process, a hunger that drives her to the next role, and much more. Excerpts:

**You must have spent a lot of time with Ushaji to get into the skin of character...**

Well, the fact is that I was not able to meet Ushaji but Amolji (Gupte) met Saina and her parents. He was my guiding light here. I prepared by watching a lot of her interviews. I was shown many old pictures of Saina and Ushaji. Right from her dressing sense, aura, dialect, energy to the way she reacts to certain situations and the bond that she shares with Saina, I noticed every tiny detail about Ushaji.

Let me share one instance that I clearly remember. When I was shown her old family pictures, I noticed that Ushaji had a habit of carrying a bag with her at all times. It was because she was very cautious about Saina's needs. In the film, you would have noticed her style of carrying a bag. Just like how mothers are, Ushaji always had the best interest of Saina in her mind. She is somebody who is unburdened by the expectation of perfection.

Ushaji herself was a sports person, a district-level badminton player. I can recall another small but important detail about her; she used to always put on sports shoes on *salwar kurtas*, exuding remarkable confidence. Even without meeting her in person, I know that she is a woman of substance, comfortable in her own shoes. I have tried hard to capture all these intricacies.

There's one sequence in the film where the mother (me) slaps the child (Saina) because she made some wrong move in the tournament. This incident actually happened, and I got to know it while watching Ushaji and Saina's interview, where they discussed this episode. Ushaji told Saina 'arey maine toh halke se

mara tha.' But Saina responds by saying, 'Nahi nahi bhot zor se mara tha, apko yaad nahi hai'. And they were crazily laughing about it. From that interview, I got to know the bond that the mother-daughter share with each other. These were some of the points that I have tried bringing it out into the portrayal.

**How was your experience of playing such a boisterous character?**

The experience was super fun. It was really amazing to capture the spirit of a mother, who has been always there for her daughter. She has been there to motivate her, scold her when she's wrong, praise her for her achievements, and support her for her failures. She was there to ensure that she does not get distracted from anything. There were really beautiful dialogues in the film, which truly conveyed her spirit.

**You have been a part of this industry for nearly two decades. What's your process of picking a film?**

You are sounding as if *mere charon taraf scripts hi scripts rehti ho* (laughs). Sometimes, it's the money because, of course, you need to pay your bills; sometimes, it's the ensemble cast, production house or at times because of the director... I mean it depends on the project. For example, when I did *Pagglait*, it was a very small part and it got edited even further, but it was about the script. I had really loved it. And here, in *Saina*, the character, script, director, everything was amazing. Ushaji coming from Haryana, I could easily relate to that landscape. It was almost to the point where I made Amolji believe to cast me in the film. I said 'aap or kisi ko le hi nahi sakte, yeh toh mujhe hi karna hai'. And he said, 'yehi Usha Rani ki spirit hai jo mujhe chahiye'.

**From *Chalte Chalte* to *Saina*. How would you describe your transition?**

(After a long pause, she says...) Over the years, the journey has been great. As I said, at times you get very small parts,

and other times, you get interesting roles, where you actually want to capture the soul of the character. But I feel you have to be really lucky to always get meaty roles where you can actually bite into them and relish. It's not always like this, at least with me. I consider myself a student even today. I am still learning. The more challenging role, the more confident you eventually get. You feel happy about the learning process. I strongly feel that the audience should love what you do, and you must enjoy the process while you do it. And I have always believed that the journey is often more beautiful than the destination.

I want to do so much more. I want to play different characters, and learn from them. I don't think I have accomplished anything yet. But I still feel lucky that people recognise me. God has been kind to me that way. I am this person who never gets disappointed by rejections. I learn and move on. I believe in focussing on tomorrow. It's not necessary that every time that you want something, will come your way. But what you can do is: Do your best to achieve it. I can only put in the hard work, rest is upon luck!

RAHUL CHAKRABORTY shares that it is painful to see visual artists not getting royalty



can have an extra edge in this era. I believe probable art buyers would be the millennials, who are now in their twenties. We need to make our art visible to those platforms/mediums where our would-be buyers are," says the artist.

Speaking about the concept of artist royalties, he explains, "Artist re-sale rights or Droit De Suite, as known in French terminology, is both an example of an economic right as well as an extension of the personhood theory of Copyright Law, which emphasises upon a work representing the character and personality of the artist/author. It becomes an essential part of moral rights, particularly for visual artists."

"This permits the authors of artistic works to benefit from the rising value of the



work, due to the nature of an artwork being one, wherein, value appreciates with time, popularity and its varied interpretation. The art market has been argued to be too volatile to predict when or to what

extent a piece of artwork may rise in value, if it does at all, and it needs exposure and multiple sales to get to such a point. Artists may initially sell their unique, one piece, artwork for a lower cost, however, the value may appreciate upon garnering popularity, and it is imperative to not jeopardise their interest in the same."

According to Sonam Chandwani of KS Legal and Associates, information about copyright and royalties is not a widely-discussed topic in the creative world, especially the art market. The lawyer says that artists are eligible to get royalties upon the resale of their works.

"The issue of royalty for visual artists has been long overdue. Like musicians and authors, visual artists deserve to

be compensated for their intellectual property and today with blockchain technology, it seems very possible. This will undoubtedly be a positive move for the welfare of the artist community. This is a necessary disruption that requires to happen to bring in more parity for the artist in the secondary art market."

"According to me this is inevitable — if not in the immediate but definitely in the distant future. The bigger question is how it will shape the market. The general perception is that blockchain enabled royalty system will challenge the intermediaries, like galleries, curators and dealers, because it will force transparency in an industry where much of the market thrives on information asymmetry. This might not necessarily be the case. A greater system generated transparency will bring in more professionalism within all the players in the ecosystem," Lubna Sen, art curator and founder of The Art Route, shares.

How is Jumbish tackling the issue? "Piracy, no royalty and a long gestation period are very common challenges faced by an artist. We bring a solution to these through our flagship project — JDAT. This provides better and paperless provenance for our art collectors. Remember royalty and provenance are interrelated. Provenance is a record of ownership of that art work, which includes the owner's history and the painting details."

"To keep track of it, Jumbish has brought a microchip called Jumbish Digital Authentication Tag (JDAT) which is a highly secured chip and it can be read by any NFC reader device. JDAT apparently looks like a thin paper, once it pastes at the back side of the painting then the painting becomes itself an authentication certificate."

With pioneering technology like JDAT, the artist can expect to get paid a predetermined percentage of the resale amount, as soon as the sale is sealed. —IANS

## More than what meets the eye

Telling the story of one of the greatest revolutionaries of the Indian freedom struggle, CHANDRASHEKHAR AZAD, the biography — *Azad: The Invincible* — is a slice of history told in an anecdotal form. By TEAM VIVA

His archival photographs depict him as a sturdy Indian man with a hand twirling his moustache. We also know him for his role in the Kakori train robbery and the Legislative Assembly Bombing of 1929. But there is more to Chandrashekhhar Azad (1906-1931) than most know.

On his 115th birth anniversary on July 23, Garuda Prakashan launched *Azad: The Invincible*, a biographical novel translated from Kannada to English, building a comprehensive portrait of the independent revolutionary luminary through anecdotes, letters, his contemporaries' biographical references, and news sources from pre-Independence India.

Written by legendary Kannada writer Babu Krishnamurthy and translated by Manjula Tekal, author of *Devayani*, the book details Azad's life and times, from being born in a small no-name village to poverty-stricken parents, running away from home as a young boy, becoming a coolie in Mumbai (then Bombay), learning Sanskrit in Varanasi to his beginnings in the freedom struggle through participation in the Non-Cooperation movement and suffering flogging as a punishment.

The book's original Kannada version, titled *Ajeya*, was published several years ago and has seen numerous reprints. Now, it is coming to the readers in English.

Azad later became a revolutionary and commanded a revolutionary movement in North India for around a decade. Chosen to command the Hindustan Socialist Republican Association (HSRA) after the death penalty of Ramprasad Bismil — quotes from whose biography is among the many rich research material in the book — Azad was responsible for the

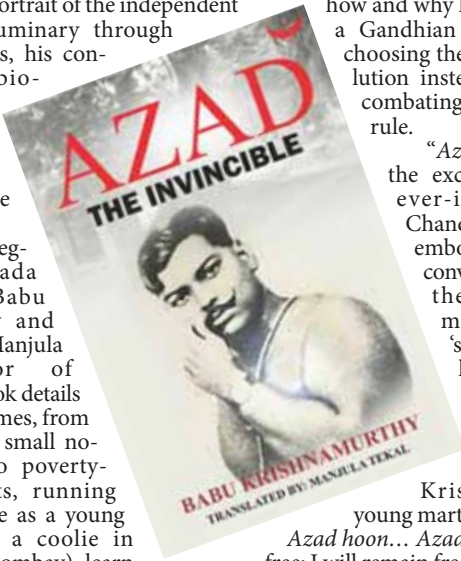
political assassination of Saunders to avenge the death of Lala Lajpat Rai, who was beaten up brutally when he was protesting peacefully in 1928. He was also responsible for orchestrating the bombing in the legislative assembly to protest the introduction of two highly oppressive and unpopular bills designed to increase the dictatorial powers of the British in India.

The book also details the politics at that time and looks into the questions like how and why he moved from being a Gandhian to a revolutionary, choosing the path of armed revolution instead as the means of combating the British colonial rule.

"*Azad: The Invincible* is the exciting, thrilling, and ever-inspiring saga of Chandrashekhhar Azad, the embodiment of courage, conviction and heroism of the Indian freedom movement which is 'stranger than fiction'. It keeps the reader on tenterhooks from the first page to the last page," says author Dr Babu Krishnamurthy. The young martyr, who roared "*Main Azad hoon... Azad Hee Rahoonga* (I am free; I will remain free)"; and lived up to his word, when he engaged with the police in the Alfred Park of Allahabad (now Prayagraj). The book chronicles the episode in every single detail and also what happened to Azad's pistol.

"The book is a slice of history rendered in an easy anecdotal form. In narrating the story of Chandrashekhhar Azad, Dr Babu Krishnamurthy tells the story of his times, his friends and associates, their struggles, and achievements. It describes the values Azad inherited, tried to uphold, and indeed lived by throughout his young life," shares translator Manjula Tekal.

The book was launched in a virtual panel discussion by the author, translator, and Garuda Prakashan co-founders Sankrant Sanu and Ankur Pathak.





The Tokyo Olympics were declared open in an eerily empty stadium on Friday after defying a year's pandemic delay and lingering coronavirus threats that will make them perhaps the most unusual Games in history.

Japan's Emperor Naruhito made the announcement against the backdrop of thousands of vacant seats at Tokyo's 68,000-capacity Olympic Stadium, after Covid-19 forced organisers to ban spectators at all but a handful of venues.

"I declare open the Games of Tokyo," said the monarch, wearing a white surgical mask.

The stripped-down ceremony, simplified to reduce coronavirus risks, unfolded in front of fewer than 1,000 VIPs and several thousand athletes.

A reduced parade of about 5,700 athletes, far lower than the usual numbers, filed into the stadium, not all of them socially distanced but all wearing masks.

International Olympic Committee president Thomas Bach acknowledged the Games would be "very different from what all of us had imagined."

But "today is a moment of hope," he said in an address.

The 16-day Games, with 339 Gold medals across 33 sports, have a surreal air after the pandemic compelled organisers to make this the first Games with virtually no spectators.



## After struggles, sacrifices & success, Indian shooters eye Olympic glory

**Tokyo:** Entering the Tokyo Olympics on the back of an unprecedented run that began sometime after the inexplicable meltdown in the Rio de Janeiro Games, Indian shooters bagging a medal or two, or, even three to four, is a tangible reality.

All of the 15 shooters are capable of winning medals, but few are seen as sure shot to secure podium finishes in the events that start on Saturday.

One among them is the highly-skilled Saurabh Chaudhary, who will have a few Olympic and world champions standing in his way to glory at sport's biggest showpiece.

Alongside Abhishek Verma, Chaudhary will be part of the first competition day action in the men's 10m air pistol event.

But before that, the fate of Apurvi Chandel and Elavenil Valarivan — in the women's 10m air rifle event — will be decided. A good outing for either of them means India will have won their first medal in these Games.

Both Chandel and Elavenil will enter the competition with plenty to look forward to, despite the occasional blips here and there. The 21-year-old Elavenil, world number 1 and considered one of the country's finest rifle shooters after some fine performances since breaking into the senior team, will certainly fancy her chances.

On the second competition day, India will have the sensational Manu Baker and the hard-working Yashaswini Singh Deswal representing the country in the women's 10m air pistol competition.



tol competition.

The women's 10m pistol event has attracted maximum number of entries but that should not worry the two Indian shooters given their skills and consistency over the years.

In the men's 10m air rifle event, India will have the teenaged Divyansh Singh Panwar and the experienced Deepak Kumar, with the former especially seen as a strong contender after his superb run in form since breaking into the

senior team in 2019.

If these eight participants fire on the first two days, India can expect a handful of medals at the Games, which will make up for returning empty-handed from the 2016 Rio Games.

In the middle and towards the end of the shooting events too, India have in its ranks strong contenders in the form of Rahi Sarnobat, Aishwary Pratap Singh Tomar, Anjum Moudgil, Tejaswini Sawant and the seasoned Sanjeev Rajput, besides the two skeet shooters in Mairaj Ahmad Khan and Angad Vir Singh Bajwa.

The likes of Sarnobat, who has won a Silver and Gold in the ISSF World Cups in New Delhi and Oisiek, Croatia respectively, world number one in 10m air rifle Divyansh Singh Panwar and Aishwary Pratap Singh Tomar are all gunning for medals. PTI

## Mirabai favourite to open India's account

**Tokyo:** Former world champion Mirabai Chenu will be in focus for her high medal-winning chances at the Tokyo Olympics as the Indian hopes to exorcise the ghosts of a disappointing Rio Games and write a new chapter in the country's weightlifting history. Competing in the 49kg category, Chenu is being considered a sure shot medal prospect for India as her personal best of 205kg is only second to China's Hou Zhihui's effort of 213kg in the eight-woman field.

The hype is similar to the one five years ago in Rio, where Chenu could manage only one lift from her six attempts and thus could not get an overall total in

women's 48kg event.

The diminutive Manipuri will desperately hope for a different script this time round, one that involves a podium.

While Chenu will have one eye on her competitors' barbells, the 26-year-old's main battle will be with herself. In recent times, her performance in the snatch section has often proved to be her downfall in important competitions.

Chenu has managed to match Zhihui, the favourite to win the Gold, in the clean and jerk category, but her personal best of 88kg in snatch pales in comparison to the Chinese lifter's world record effort of 96kg.

Even USA's Delacruz Jourdan Elizabeth has a better personal best — 89kg — than the Indian's, while Aisah Windy Cantika of Indonesia had managed to pip Chenu to win a Bronze in the snatch section at the Asian championship in April.

It is expected that Chenu will try to better her world record lift of 119kg in the clean and jerk category, should the competition demand it.

Interestingly, Chenu has set the highest entry weight of 210kg, which is five kilograms more than her personal best, followed by Zhihui (205kg), who had lifted 213kg (96g+117kg) at the Asian championship. PTI



## Hockey teams start campaign

He will be the lone Indian boxer in action on the opening day of boxing competitions at the Ryogoku Kokugikan arena.

## Can paddlers do the unthinkable again?



**Tokyo:** The Indian table tennis contingent produced an unthinkable performance at the Asian Games, considered as 'mini-Olympics' by the players. Three years down the line, can they pull off another miracle at the Tokyo Games?

Asian Games may have the presence of continental powerhouses like China, Korea and Japan but the Olympics are a different ball game altogether.

Nevertheless, India exceeded all expectations to win a men's team Bronze and mixed doubles Bronze in Jakarta, ending the country's medal drought at the Asian Games, but getting close

to even one medal here would be a gargantuan task.

Before the paddlers arrived in Tokyo, the only little hope was in the mixed doubles category but an opener against the world number one duo from Chinese Taipei has made the challenge a lot tougher for A Sharath Kamal and Manika Batra.

Sharath along with G Sathiyam has also been handed a tough draw in the men's singles competition.

The 20th seed is drawn to meet reigning champion Ma Long in round three provided he clears the second round (first round bye) in his fourth

## Tennis players need miracle to go deep

**Tokyo:** Indian tennis players need no less than a miraculous performance to get close to the medal rounds as an under-prepared team of Sania Mirza and debutant Ankita Raina faces a tough Ukrainian challenge in the opener while Sumit Nagal has got a tough draw in the singles competition.

Mirza, who is making a record fourth Olympic appearance, and debutant Raina are going into the Olympics without playing a single competitive match together this year, which is far from ideal preparation. They will open their campaign against Ukraine's twin sisters Nadiia and Lyudmyla Kichenok.

In the men's singles, Nagal is extremely lucky to get an entry into the Olympics but his recent performances do not inspire confidence and he faces Asian Games champion Denis Istomin in his first round.

There is a possibility of him getting past the 34-year-old Uzbek but the Indian may next face world number two and Australian Open runner-up Daniil Medvedev from Russia and that could be end of the road for him. PTI

The unseeded Manika is expected to beat Britain's Tin-Tin Ho in the first round and is drawn to meet 20th seed Margaryta Pestoska in the second. Sutirtha, world number 98, plays 78th-ranked Linda Bergstroem from Sweden in the opening round. PTI

## Indian archers brace up for Korean challenge

**Tokyo:** World No 1 Deepika Kumari was inconsistent but the male archers' performance was simply underwhelming in the Olympics' ranking rounds, prompting a rejig of India's mixed pair combination on a topsy-turvy day at the Yumenoshima Park on Friday. The Koreans, who stayed away from all International competitions in the build-up to the Olympics since 2019, reigned supreme, including a top-three finish in the women's section where young sensation An San shattered a 25-year-old Olympic record.

The Indian men's team of Atanu Das, Pravin Jadhav and Tarundeep Rai, however, did not post particularly impressive scores and just about managed to sneak into top 10 in the team rankings.

Deepika slipped from fourth at the halfway mark to finish ninth with 663 points which was way below her best International ranking score of 686. "I feel my performance was good as well as bad...It was in between I would say," Deepika said.

Deepika's biggest challenge is likely to be in the last-eight where she might run into San who is making her Olympic debut. "I want to show my best

performance here and I will show that in my next rounds," Deepika vowed to come back strong.

In fact, there will be Korea in waiting for the Indians in the quarterfinals of both men's team and mixed pair competition. The mixed team, is the country's best bet to win an elusive Olympic medal in archery.

India had identical rankings of ninth in both men's team and mixed pair competitions.

Deepika will not partner her husband Das after the top Indian male archer slipped behind Olympic debutant Jadhav.

Jadhav was the best among the Indian trio with 656 points for a 31st place finish, three points ahead of Das, while Rai, in his third Olympics appearance, took the 37th spot among 64 archers.

India had the option to send entries of Das and Deepika, who recently won a Gold medal together at the Paris World Cup, but the federation went ahead with Jadhav based on his current form.

In all likelihood, the Indian mixed pair team would run into top seed Korea in the quarters after overcoming eighth-ranked Chinese Taipei.

Placed in the same half as

India, top seed Korea will open their main event against 16th ranked Bangladesh.

The men's trio's combined performance was just enough to finish inside top-10 as they tallied 1961 for a ninth place finish in their first Olympic appearance since London 2012.

The Indian men's team might run into top seed Korea, who got a bye into the quarters, should they beat eighth-ranked Kazakhstan in the opening round.

In individual section, Jadhav will face 34th ranked Galsan Bazarzhapov of Russia, Das will take on Deng Yu-Cheng of Chinese Taipei, while Rai's opening challenge will be against Ukrainian Oleksii Hunbin. PTI
