US SECRETARY OF STATE BLINKEN TO VISIT INDIA FOR TWO DAYS FROM JULY 27

US Secretary of State Antony J Blinken will visit India on July 27 and 28 to discuss a range of issues including the recovery from the coronavirus pandemic and the situation in Afghanistan and the Indo-Pacific, the Ministry of External Affairs announced on Friday. It will be Blinken's first visit to India after assuming charge as the second by a high-ranking official of the Biden administration since it came to power in January. "US Secretary of State, Antony J Blinken, will visit India on July 27 and 28," the MEA said. A statement by the US State Department said Blinken will also meet Prime Minister Narendra Modi.



CUMULATIVE VAX DOSES ADMINISTERED IN INDIA EXCEED 42.75 CRORE: CENTRE

The cumulative Covid-19 vaccine doses administered in the country has exceeded 42.75 crore, the Union health ministry said on Friday. Nearly 38,87,028 vaccine doses have been administered on Friday, according to the 7 pm provisional report. The ministry said 18,09,954 vaccine doses were administered as first dose and 1,92,363 vaccine doses given as second dose in the age group 18-44 years on Friday. Cumulatively, 13,52,21,119 persons in the age group 18-44 years across states and union territories have received their first dose and total 57,54,908 have received their second dose since the start of phase-3 of the vaccination drive.



NO PLANS TO SUSPEND NEET, OTHER COMMON ENTRANCE EXAMS: GOVT

The Union government does not have any plans to suspend NEET and other common entrance examinations, Minister of State for Health Bharati Pravin Pawar informed Lok Sabha on Friday. The National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (PG) and NEET (Undergraduate) 2021 examinations are scheduled to be held this year on September 11 and 12, respectively, she said in a written reply. The examination shall be conducted with all due precautions and following all protocols, including maintaining Covid-appropriate behaviour, Pawar said. Further, the additional protective measures for candidates and examination personnel are proposed towards the safe conduct of the exam, she stated.



CONG SAYS HUGE RISE IN NSC GRANT IN 2017-18, ASKS IF IT WAS FOR 'PEGASUS'

Amid the Pegasus snooping row, the Congress Friday claimed the grant allocation to the National Security Council secretariat went up to Rs 333 crore in 2017-18 from Rs 33 crore the year before, and asked if this hike was related to "purchasing" the Israeli spyware. Congress spokesperson Pawan Khara said the UPA government in 2011-12 had allocated Rs 17.43 crore to the National Security Council Secretariat in terms of grants. This amount was marginally increased to Rs 20.33 crore in 2012-13 and further to 26.06 crore in 2013-14, he said, noting that National Security Council Secretariat is largely concerned with administration and co-ordination.

60.1% of TS population has antibodies: ICMR-NIN

About 60.1% of Telangana's population, including 55% of children aged 6-9 years, had a silent prior exposure to SARS-CoV-2. These findings were disclosed by the Indian Council of Medical Research- National Institute of Nutrition (ICMR-NIN) as part of the report on the 4th Covid sero survey conducted in June 2021. 'TS' figure is less compared to the overall sero-prevalence in the country put at 67.6%. The sero-prevalence in Telangana went up from 24.1 per cent in the first round to 60.1 per cent; while, at the national level, it went up from 24 per cent in December 2020 to 67 per cent in June 2021. About 61 per cent of adolescents



had COVID-19 antibodies. The survey was conducted in Nalgonda, Janagaon and Kamareddy districts.

Only 30% of the required vax doses supplied to TS

The Center has so far provided 1.06 crore vaccine doses to Telangana. As on 20th July 2021, a total of 1.59 crore doses of COVID-19 vaccines were supplied to the State, including 1.06 crore doses free of cost, by the Government of India. The remaining 9.25 lakh doses have been procured by the State Government and 43.59 lakh doses have been procured by private hospitals.

Bharat Bio ends MoU with Brazil after graft claims

Bharat Biotech on Friday said it terminated the Memorandum of Understanding entered with Precisa Medicamentos and Envixia Pharmaceuticals LLC for its COVID-19 vaccine Covaxin for the Brazilian market. The termination of the MoU came after the deal with the Brazilian government for supply of 20 million doses of the vaccine landed in controversy and attracted investigation by authorities in that country. Precisa Medicamentos is Bharat Biotech's partner in Brazil, providing assistance, guidance and support with regulatory submissions, licensure, distribution, insurance and conduct of phase III clinical trials, among others.

KTR and Harish Rao combo for Huzurabad?

Huzurabad will change the way TRS campaigns for and faces the election battle in what has become a key constituency. Unlike in the past, the pink party has put the responsibility on two big leaders this time. Visit RLIS independent of AP govt, submit report: NGT to KRMB

In what can be construed as a shot in the arm for the Telangana government, the National Green Tribunal's southern zone bench at Chennai on Friday directed the Krishna River Management Board to visit the Royalaseema Lift Irrigation Scheme (RLIS) project site "independent of the AP government" and submit a detailed report upon inspection of the works taken up there. Till date, there had been no progress on the petitions filed in the National Green Tribunal, including the contempt of court petition filed by the Telangana government against the ongoing work on the RLIS taken up by the Andhra Pradesh government in violation of Tribunal's orders. The Contempt of Court petition came up for hearing in the NGT, Chennai on Friday. The Tribunal, in its previous



order on July 12, directed the Krishna River Management Board and the Central Environment Department to visit RLIS project site and submit a report if indeed work was going on without any approvals as complained initially by the individual petitioner G Srinivas and subsequently by the Telangana government. On Friday, KRMB submitted an affidavit stating that the Andhra Pradesh government was not cooperating for their proposed visit to the project site. The Central Environment

2 Telugu academicians among 12 VCs appointed to central universities

There are two Telugu teachers among 12 full-time VCs appointed to 12 Central Universities by President Rama Nath Kovind on Friday. They were identified as Prof Battu Satyanarayana and Dr Basoottkar Jagadishwar Rao. Prof Satyanarayana was appointed as Karnataka Central University Vice-Chancellor. He retired as the head of the department of chemistry in Osmania University. He held the post of President of OU Teachers' Association (OUTA) for about 15 years. He was unanimously elected to the post for three terms.

Mothkupally quits BJP; spits fire at Eatala

As expected, former minister Mothkupally Narsimhulu resigned from the BJP on Friday and expressed his willingness to join the Telangana Rashtira Samiti party. Mothkupally would join TRS in the presence of TRS president and Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao very soon, according to sources. Immediately after announcing

his resignation from the BJP, Mothkupally targeted former minister Eatala Rajender, while showering praises on KCR for announcing the Dalit Bandhu scheme for the sake of Dalits. He termed KCR as 'Ekaika mogadu' for giving Rs.10 lakh to Dalit families in the state. Mothkupally also described KCR as "a real heir to Dr BR Ambedkar". He called upon Dalits of the state to stand by KCR.

Plastic sticks used in candies, ice-cream to be prohibited by Jan 1

Candy sticks and ice-cream sticks made of plastic may get phased out from January 1, 2022, the Centre informed Parliament on Friday. Responding to a query on the phasing out schedule of single-use plastic, Minister of State for Environment Ashwini Choubey said as per the draft notification issued earlier this year, manufacture, import, stocking, distribution, sale and use of some of the identified single-use plastic items are proposed to be prohibited by January 1, 2022. Earbuds with plastic sticks, plastic sticks for balloons, plastic flags, candy sticks, ice-cream sticks, poly-



styrene (thermocool) for decoration are proposed to be phased out by January 1, while single-use plastic (including polystyrene and expanded polystyrene) items - plates, cups, glasses, forks, spoons, knives,

straw, container and container lids, trays, plastic/PVC banners less than 100 microns and stirrers are expected to be phased out by July next year. Single-use plastic items expected to be phased out by September 30 this year include carry bags made of virgin or recycled plastic less than 120 microns in thickness and non-woven plastic carry bag less than 60 GSM (gram per square metre) or 240 microns in thickness, the minister informed Lok Sabha in a written response, adding that the provisions shall not apply to commodities (including carry bags) made of compostable plastic material.

Several low-lying areas face inundation in TS

Several low-lying areas faced inundation and road links were disrupted in Telangana on Friday following heavy rains that lashed the state during the last two days. Relief operations were taken up in Nirmal and other districts as several residential localities faced inundation, official sources said. National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) personnel rescued a group of seven people who were stuck at an ashram in Nizamabad district.

Bharat Biotech to supply 500 mn doses of Covaxin to Centre

Bharat Biotech on Friday said it has committed to supply over 500 million doses of its COVID-19 vaccine Covaxin to the Centre under the country-wide immunisation programme.

Speaking at a virtual conference organised by the Confederation of Indian Industry, Suchitra Ella, joint Managing Director of the city-based vaccine maker, said the company's facilities in four cities - Hyderabad, Bengaluru, Pune and Ankalleshwar - are currently producing Covaxin. "In a nut-

And it is still ongoing as we continue to manufacture, taking

a commitment of more than 50 crore (500 million) of doses to be submitted to the government of India for its immunisation programme," she said narrating

the journey of Covaxin.

Minister of State for Health Bharati Pravin Pawar had said in Parliament on Tuesday that from January to July 16, 5.45 crore (54.5 million) doses of Covaxin by Bharat Biotech and 36.01 (360 million) crore doses of Covishield have been supplied by the Serum Institute of India to the Centre.

Suchitra Ella said the data of Phase 3 trials has been submitted to the Drug Controller General of India for its perusal and efficacy of the vaccine against many of the coronavirus variants was also tested. Covaxin demonstrated 77.8

per cent effectiveness against symptomatic COVID-19 and 65.2 per cent protection against the B.1.617.2 Delta variant, Bharat Biotech said recently, while announcing the final analysis of the jab.

It had said the Efficacy Analysis demonstrates Covaxin to be 93.4 per cent effective against severe symptomatic COVID-19 cases.

The MD further said that when it comes to vaccines not only for COVID-19, India, when compared to some other countries, has more capacity to produce vaccines in large numbers.

Dasoju appeals to CS to audit Covid death reports

AICC official spokesperson Dasoju Sravan has appealed to the Chief Secretary Somesh Kumar to constitute an apex-level committee to audit death reports, including the hospital medical treatment records and arrive at the actual number of deaths in Telangana, which will provide a basis of receiving the financial relief from Government of India as per the Supreme Court directions. He appealed to Somesh Kumar to provide compensation to all those needy spouses and orphaned children, who lost their bread earners due to Covid-19. He also appealed to the CS to issue formal document wherein the cause of death of those, who succumbed to the Covid-19 virus is stated as "death due to Covid-19".

On Friday, Dasoju Sravan addressed a letter to the Chief Secretary alleging that the state government indulged in under-reporting of innumerable deaths that occurred in Telangana due to Covid-19 between April, 2020 and now, thereby violating the fundamental right to die with dignity, ICMR guidelines for Covid

deaths registration and principle of natural justice. He requested the CS for the re-audit and rectification of death records/ reports and provide justice by enabling the deceased families to get compensation or compassionate appointment or any ex-gratia by the Government of India in view of the orders of the Supreme Court.

He mentioned in his letter that in the State of Telangana, a large number of people died during the first and second waves of the Covid-19 pandemic. In every locality and in every village, there were deaths due to both the waves of Covid-19, he said. It is a known fact that during the second wave of Covid-19, a greater number of deaths have happened in rural Telangana. In every village and every ward, several people have died due to Covid-19. Thousands of children were orphaned as their parents succumbed to the virus and several families severely suffered due to the death of their sole bread earners, he said.

Particularly, during the second wave of Covid-19, countless people died not only in the

hospitals, both public and private, but also at their homes while taking self-treatment due to lack of access to beds in hospitals, oxygen and other life-saving drugs.

However, ironically, the government of Telangana in order to create a camouflage and mislead people into believing that "all is well" and further, to cover up their colossal failure in handling the Covid-19 pandemic, seems to have completely underreported the number of deaths in entire Telangana. The Government of Telangana has falsely reported 6,29,054 Covid-19 cases with 3,710 deaths from March 14, 2020 to June 30, 2021, he said.

If only the Government of Telangana would have strictly adhered to the above-mentioned ICMR guidelines, most of the deaths that occurred during the pandemic would have been reported as "deaths due to Covid-19". However, for reasons better known to them, the government of Telangana willfully made an unlawful attempt to underreport the deaths and kept the families of the deceased persons in the dark about the cause of their death, he alleged.

The Telangana government procured 4,90,590 doses in May and 4,34,630 doses in June.

Vaccine allocations have not improved for Telangana, considering that 12 states have seen better allocations than it. From January to April - 48,96,700 vials were supplied. In May 12,43,060 vials were supplied, while in June 29,56,710 vials were made available. Up to 20 July, 15,04,090 vials were given by the Center to the state. Apart from vaccines, the Center allocated 1,400 ventilators, 2.93 lakh Remdesivir, 42.5 lakh HCQ 1.06 lakh

The sero-positivity was as high as 82.4 per cent among healthcare workers. This is attributed to early vaccination of the frontline workers. It may be mentioned here that in the first round of the sero-survey, the sero-prevalence was 0.33 per cent, while the second survey found 12.5 per cent antibodies and 24.1 per cent sero-pervallence.

Amphotericin B and 1,113 Tocilizumab to Telangana.

According to the Central government, the vaccine wastage is 1.99%.

Responding to a question raised by BJP MP Bandi Sanjay, Minister of State Dr. Bharati Pravin Pawar said, "Between 1st May 2021 and 13th July 2021, a total of 60.29

lakh doses of COVID-19 vaccine were administered in Telangana, of which 1.20 lakh doses were extra doses extracted from the vials which constitute 1.99% of the total doses administered".

Dismissing claims of shortage of vaccine, the Center said it did not face any difficulty in procuring vaccines.

The Minister said, "Advance visibility of these allocations i.e. the total doses of vaccine that would be available to a State/UT, is provided to States/UTs 15 days in advance so as to enable States/UTs to plan for acceleration of vaccination coverage while being cognizant of the available vaccines."

The Government of India allocates vaccines to States/UTs based on criteria such as pro-rata target population, the progress of vaccination in the State/UT, and vaccine wastage. As per the latest Supply Order, the Center is purchasing Covishield at Rs. 205 per dose and Covaxin at Rs 215 per dose.

TS clocks 643 new Covid cases, 4 deaths

Telangana on Friday reported 643 fresh COVID-19 cases, taking the tally to over 6.40 lakh while the death toll rose to 3,778 with four more deaths.

The Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation accounted for the highest number of cases with 77 followed by Karimnagar at 68, a state government bulletin said.

Active cases stood at 9,729. The infection caseload was 46,40,012, while 767 people being cured, total recoveries climbed to 6,26,505.

Over 1.20 lakh samples were tested on Friday and cumulatively, over 2.11 crore samples have been tested.

The samples tested per million population were over 5.67 lakh, the bulletin said.

Considering that the AP government had not been cooperating with the KRMB. He said that the Telangana government was ready to provide helicopter and other facilities for the NGT team to visit and inspect the project site.

However, the Tribunal again ordered the KRMB to visit the project site independent of the AP government and submit a detailed report, after carrying out an inspection of the RLIS. It postponed the next hearing to August 9.

Meanwhile, Telangana government sources said that they had been requesting KRMB to complete the inspection and submit a report at the earliest. "No doubt it is an emotive issue

and activists and people will come out to give their views. But it is the responsibility of the AP government to provide protection to the KRMB team for completing their task as directed by the Tribunal. Only then the truth will come out."

"We are hopeful of progress as the Tribunal on Friday categorically directed the KRMB again to inspect the RLIS site and give its report", they said. It may be mentioned that Telangana has been opposing AP's Rayalaseema Lift Irrigation Scheme, designed to lift water for the Potreddipadu canal, on the ground that it was being illegally constructed on the Krishna River without any environmental clearance and without water allocation.

Tata Boeing Aerospace, Boeing's first equity joint venture in India, is the result of a 2015 partnership agreement with TASL.

Spread over 14,000 square meters, the facility has been producing aero-structures for Boeing's AH-64 Apache helicopter, including fuselages, secondary structures and vertical spar boxes for customers worldwide.

Recently, Boeing announced the addition of a new production line to manufacture complex vertical fin structures for the 737 family of airplanes.

Customers globally operate more than 1,200 Boeing-made Apache helicopters.

The helicopter has been fielded or selected for acquisition by the armed forces of 16 countries, including India.

The Ministry of Environment had issued a notification containing draft provisions on March 11, 2021 for amending Plastic Waste Management (PWM) Rules, 2016, inter alia prohibiting the use of identified single-

use plastic items by 2022 for public consultation.

Replying to another query on the steps taken to strengthen the implementation of Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016 and also to reduce the use of identified single-use plastic items, the minister said the states/UTs have

been requested to constitute a special task force under the chief secretary or the administrator.

"Already, 14 states/UTs have constituted the special task force till date. A national level task force has also been constituted by the ministry for taking coordinated efforts to eliminate iden-

tified single-use plastic items and effective implementation of Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016," he said.

The state and UT governments and the central ministries and departments concerned have also been requested for the development of a com-

prehensive action plan for elimination of single-use plastics and effective implementation of the rules in a time bound manner, he said, adding that the government has been taking measures for awareness generation towards elimination of single-use plastics.

stay in the party. However, Peddi Reddy may quit the party if he gets an assurance from the TRS party. Besides these developments, former TDP leaders, who were in the BJP now, are getting ready to follow suit Mothkupally to quit the BJP and join their former colleague KCR's party TRS. The leaders like Boda Janardhan and Chada Suresh Reddy were unhappy with the treatment they were getting in the BJP.

They were bemoaning to their close associates that the BJP is not using their experience and not giving due respect to them. According to sources, the former Minister Mukhesh Goud's son and former Congress leader Vikram Goud was also not happy with the BJP. Most of the leaders joining BJP from other political parties are in a suffocating feeling in BJP. After two days of heavy rain, Telangana gets a let-up on Friday

After receiving heavy rain for two days, there was let up in the downpour in Telangana on Friday and no major incident of loss of human life or property was reported.

No report of casualty had been received from the districts though an incident of a man being washed away in a swollen rivulet was reported in the media, a senior official told PTI here.

Three hundred people in Nirmal town and another 100 in Bhainsa town were evacuated on Thursday night and they had since returned to their homes, he said.

No relief camps had to be set up. National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) personnel rescued a group of nine people who were stranded at a temple in

Nizamabad district. In a separate incident, seven persons who were stuck between two streams in Asifabad were also rescued, he said.

Water levels receded from the inundated localities in Nirmal and Bhainsa towns, he said. Road networks suffered damage in Nirmal, Asifabad, Jagtial, Vikarabad and other districts.

The state had a let up in the heavy rainfall on Friday except for Asifabad, Mancherial and Adilabad districts, the official said.

Kothapalli-Dharmaram in Karimnagar district received 40 mm of rainfall, followed by 39 mm of rain at Kolvai in Jagtial district, official sources said, citing rainfall data during 0830 AM to 4 PM on Friday.

The Met Centre of IMD here in its heavy rainfall warning (Red) issued at 1600 hours on

Friday, up to 0830 hours on Saturday, said heavy to very heavy with extremely heavy rain is very likely to occur at isolated places in Adilabad, Kumram Bheem Asifabad and Mancherial districts.

It said heavy to very heavy rain is very likely to occur at isolated places in Nirmal, Nizamabad, Jagtial, Rajanna Sircilla and other districts during the same period.

It also said heavy rain is very likely to occur at isolated places in Bhadradi Kothagudem, Nalgonda, Suryapet, Siddipet and other districts.

Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao, who held a meeting with officials on Thursday on the rain situation, directed them to be on alert and ensure that people living in low-lying areas do not face any hardships following the heavy rains.

Projects on Godavari and Krishna get good inflows

With incessant rains across Telangana and extensive rains in Maharashtra and upper riparian States, the Godavari River is in spate with the water level rising steadily at Bhadrachalam.

Ministers in the districts in the catchment areas of the Godavari and Krishna rivers are constantly monitoring the situation as directed by Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao.

State Transport Minister Puvvada Ajay Kumar and Women and Child Welfare Minister Satyavathi Rathod monitored the situation in Bhadrachalam and Mulugu districts and coordinated with the respective District Collectors.

An alert was sounded for Godavari basin as the IMD has predicted heavy rainfall over the next two days.

Meanwhile, the intensity of flood inflows into the Sri Ram Sagar Project continued at 2.15 lakh cusecs and the outflow at 2 lakh cusecs, while the present storage capacity is at 84.29 tmc ft as against full storage capacity of 90.31 tmc ft.

On Thursday, 35 gates of SRSP were opened as the water level in it reached almost its capacity and on Friday 33 gates were lifted to let water flow downstream.

Sripada Yellampally received inflows at 4.78 lakh cusecs and the outflow was at 4.78 lakh cusecs, with the water level reaching 480.32 ft as against FRL of 485.56 ft. The present storage level is at 15.88 tmc, as against the full capacity of 20.18 tmc.

Singur project in Sanga Reddy continued to get inflows on Friday at 4,385 cusecs and the outflow was at 386 cusecs. The present storage capacity is at 20 tmc, as against the full storage capacity of 29.91 tmc at FRL of 1717. The present water level at the project is 1,711 feet.

In the Krishna basin, Jurala continued to get heavy inflows at 1.5 lakh cusecs and the outflow was at 1.59 lakh cusecs. The storage level on Friday was at 6.46 tmc, as against full capacity of 9.66 tmc.

Water level at Tungabhadra touched 1,623 ft as against 1,633 ft and the present storage capacity is at 67.18 tmc (full capacity 100.86 tmc).

Srisailem reservoir received inflows at 1.57 lakh cusecs and the outflow was at 31,783. The water level reached 848.6 ft as against FRL of 885 ft. The water storage is at 77 tmc, against the full capacity of 215.81 tmc.

Pulichintala is almost filled to the brim with the storage capacity at 43.6 tmc, as against 45.77 tmc.

Godavari river in spate, normal life badly affected

The heavy downpour across the state caused flash floods to River Godavari, pushing the people living in the catchment areas of the river into a danger zone.

The normal life in Adilabad, Jagtial, Mancherial, Asifabad, Peddapalli, Jayashankar, Bhupalapally, Mulug, Khammam, Bhadradi Kothagudem district has been paralysed.

Villages have been flooded and crops submerged. The streams and minor water bodies are overflowing their banks. Authorities are releasing floodwater through the crest gates as inflows into various irrigation projects increase.

The water level in the Kaleswaram reservoir reached 121.5 meters mark, leading to authorities hoisting the first cautionary signal.

The water level in the Annaram Saraswati barrage has increased as the authorities lifted the gates of Sundilla reservoir and Pravati barrage gates. Out of the 66 gates, 60 gates of Annaram Saraswati



Barrage have been lifted on Friday. Inflow into the barrage is put at 8,02,300 cusecs and the outflow was put at 9,02,300 cusecs. The capacity of the barrage is put at 10.87 tmc. The water quantity in the barrage was put at 4.29 tmc.

The irrigation department officials have also lifted 85 gates of the Medigedda barrage. The capacity of the barrage is put at 16.17 tmc. But the water level in the barrage is put at 8 tmc. The officials predict more floodwater entering the Medigedda barrage as the authorities lifted SRSP project gates.

If the inflows into the Kadem project increase, other gates of



the Yellampalli project are also likely to be lifted. During the past three days, the district received 512.2 mm (July 21), 330 mm (July 22) and 658 mm on July 23 were recorded.

The officials lifted Saraswati barrage's 60 gates simultaneously flooding Pranahita river,

whose backwaters are affecting Vilasagar, Damera Kunta, Gundaratpalli, Mahadevapur, Annaram, Chandurupalli, Maddulapalli villages in Mahadevapur mandal. Standing crops in hundreds of acres have been inundated. Flood water is entering the villages. The people living there are in the grip of fear. Tahsildar who set out to reach the villages in his car was caught in the floodwaters. Authorities have managed to pull the car out of the floodwaters with the help of ropes. The Medigedda project is full of water up to the brim.

The floodwaters have inundated crops in Yedapalli, Kudurpalli, Mahadevapur, Brahmanapalli, Begulur, Suraram, Ambatpalli limits.

District Collector Krishna Aditya on Thursday night visited the Medigedda project and inspected the flood level. He asked the authorities to take all precautions to rule out any untoward incidents.

The rain threat to the state continues for the next 48 hours. Therefore, the officials should not show any slackness, the collector said.

Special teams deployed in flood-hit areas

Friday inspected the overflowing waters at Godavari Mullakatta Bridge in Eturu Nagaram. He also visited flood-hit villages in the district following the torrential rains that battered the district for the last two days.

Students' protest at TS Bhavan in Delhi

They demanded the government should take up the



land acquisition of submerged lands after a thorough investigation and pay compensation to the farmers. The farmers and Congress leaders squatted on the road in front of the irrigation office to express their protest over the submersion of their standing crops. Additional Collector Rizwan Basha and revenue officials spoke to the agitators and convinced them. The farmers submitted a memorandum to the Additional

Collector. Rizwan Basha promised them that a report will be submitted to the Government, if they can furnish details of crop loss.

Bhupalapally district Congress president Ayitha Prakash Reddy, ZPTC Gundala Aruna, mandal Congress president Akbar Khan, block Congress party mandal president Kota Rajababu and farmers from Annaram participated in the agitation.

Man swindles Rs 5 lakh Rythu Beema claim

As the video has gone viral, the lawyer filed a petition alleging that his sentiments have been hurt with the pledge insulting the Hindu deities in the Principle Judicial Magistrate court on March 22. He said in his complaint that he lodged complaints at the three town police



stating on March 16 and Police Commissioner on March 20. As they failed to take action against the IPS officer, he filed a petition in the court, he said.

As the court declared holidays in view of the corona pandemic, Justice Saisudha issued directives to the police on Thursday to probe into the matter. Following the court order, the police filed a case against Praveen Kumar and Sankar babu on Thursday. Lawyer Mahender Reddy urged the police to conduct a thorough investigation against them.

Mahender Reddy also demanded that the government should prohibit the Sweroes institute which is spreading hatred against the Hindu religion among the gurukul students.

police register complaints.

The police, district panchayat raj, transport, R and B, RWS, municipalities and other relevant government departments should take responsibility in this regard. He asked the officials to give wide publicity in villages, mandals, municipalities to sensitise people about it by getting the news by beating drums.


Tiger spotted on Srisaillam road

Ajit Pawar speaks with Rajnath Singh over Maha flood situation

Aseem Gupta has been appointed as the nodal officer for coordination with the Defense Ministry, the statement added. District guardian ministers and local elected representatives have been asked to stay put in the flood-hit districts till the situation is normal. Raigad guardian minister Aditi Tatkare, Ratnagiri guardian minister Anil Parab, Sindhudurg guardian minister Uday Samant, Satara guardian minister Balasaheb Patil and all MLAs from these areas have been asked to remain available to participate in and oversee the rescue and relief operations, the release said. Heavy rains are battering the coastal Konkan and parts of Western Maharashtra for the last two days.

Any attempt of booth-capturing, bogus voting should be dealt with iron hands: SC

Any attempt of booth capturing or bogus voting should be dealt with iron hands because it ultimately affects the rule of law and democracy, the Supreme Court said on Friday while dismissing an appeal of a man convicted for rioting at a poll booth in Jharkhand. Referring to its earlier verdicts, a bench of Justice D Y Chandrachud



and Justice M R Shah said freedom of voting is part of freedom of expression. "The essence of the electoral system should be to ensure freedom of voters to exercise their free choice. Therefore, any attempt of booth capturing or bogus voting should be dealt with iron hands because it ultimately affects rule of law and democracy," the bench said. The apex court said the secrecy of casting votes is necessary for strengthening the democracy. Observing that in elections to the Lok Sabha and state legislatures maintenance of secrecy is a must, the bench said in democracies where direct elections take place it is important to ensure that voter casts his vote without fear and being victimised if his vote is disclosed.

3 cases registered for violation of HC order on animal sacrifice for Bakri Eid

At least three cases have been registered so far against people who violated the Bombay High Court's order by offering animal sacrifice at temporary slaughterhouses for Bakri Eid in Bhiwandi of Maharashtra's Thane district, an official said on Friday. The three offences have been registered under sections 188 (disobeying order issued by a public servant), 429 (mischief by killing, maiming cattle) among other provisions of the IPC, Cruelty to Animals Act, Maharashtra Police Act and Disaster Management Rules, at Shanti Nagar and Narpoli police stations, the official said. The Bombay High Court had earlier set aside an order



issued by the commissioner of the Bhiwandi Nizampur Municipal Corporation (BNMC) permitting the setting up of 38 temporary slaughterhouses for offering animal sacrifice for Bakri Eid. The court had stated that these temporary spaces were not licensed slaughterhouses and hence, could not be allowed to operate, as the ritual can take place only at designated, pre-licensed slaughterhouses, in accordance with law.

Don't indulge in politics over Covid vax: Mandaviya

Union Health Minister Mansukh Mandaviya on Friday appealed to Opposition parties not to play politics on the issue of COVID-19 vaccines and asserted that everyone should work together to ensure people are vaccinated against coronavirus.



Responding to supplementaries during Question Hour in Lok Sabha, the minister said the government is still in talks with US company Pfizer with respect to making its vaccine available in India.

"There should be no politics on the issue of COVID and vaccination. The prime minister has said this several times," Mandaviya said in response to a question asked by Shiv Sena MP Rahul Shewale. "I will also not want to indulge in politics on this issue but I want to present the facts," he said, adding that the prime minister till date has held over 20 meetings and discussions with the state governments and chief ministers.

He said some opposition-ruled states raised the issue that health is a state subject and they should be taken into confidence. "Many said Health is a state subject, states said we also need permission to buy vaccines. We said that we have no problem with this. The states said that we want to go out for tender to buy the vaccine. Modi ji said that we are ready to do whatever help is needed," the Health minister said.

on technology transfer has begun. "With Pfizer, the Indian government was holding talks with it. But the company said it will not deal with the states and the Indian government is holding talks with us. Even today, an experts group is holding talks with the company," Mandaviya said.

In a meeting with the states, the chief ministers said they were not getting adequate supply of vaccines and the Centre should procure 25 per cent, which the states were to earlier acquire, of the vaccines. So a new policy came into being from June 21 under which the Centre decided to vaccinate all the citizens, he said.

"The issue is about politics. There should be no politics on this issue. Our goal is to vaccinate 100 per cent people above the age of 18 years. We all need to work on it together. It is not the time to indulge in politics," Mandaviya, who assumed charge of the Health ministry earlier this month following a Cabinet reshuffle, said.

He said those spreading confusion should be stopped from doing so and the public should be connected with the free vaccination campaign.

Rahul Gandhi should submit his phone for probe: BJP

The BJP on Friday dared Rahul Gandhi to submit his phone for investigation if he believes it was tapped, and asserted that no one's phone has been tapped illegally by the Modi government.

BJP spokesperson Rajyavardhan Rathore told reporters that the Congress is determined to stall Parliament for one reason or another after being rejected twice by people in Lok Sabha polls of 2014 and 2019.

Amid a row over the suspected Pegasus snooping, Gandhi had said earlier that all his phones were tapped. Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Home Minister Amit Shah allegedly used the Pegasus spyware against India and its institutions, and "the only word for this is treason", Gandhi charged. Rathore said everybody has the right to what they want in a democracy.

Gandhi should submit his phone to probe agency, and investigation will take place as per the Indian Penal Code (IPC), he said.



PEGASUS SNOOPING ROW

Oppn MPs protest in Parliament; demand SC-monitored probe

Several Opposition MPs, including Congress' Rahul Gandhi, on Friday protested against the government inside Parliament complex over the Pegasus snooping issue and demanded a Supreme Court-monitored judicial probe into the matter.

Besides Gandhi, a host of senior Congress MPs like Leader of Opposition in Rajya Sabha Mallikarjun Kharge, party's leader in Lok Sabha Adhir Ranjan Chowdhury, KC Venugopal and Shashi Tharoor, DMK's Kanimozhi and Shiv Sena's Priyanka Chaturvedi, were present during the protest in front of Mahatma Gandhi's statue inside Parliament complex. Carrying a banner which read "#PegasusSnoopGate We demand Supreme Court Monitored Judicial Probe", the MPs raised slogans like "ye jasoosi bandh karo (stop this spying)".

Opposition parties have stalled proceedings in Parliament alleging the union government's involvement in the alleged snooping following reports that nearly 300 mobile phone numbers including of journalists, activists, opposition leaders from India and even of union ministers figured in a list of potential snooping targets by Israel's NSO group which sells its Pegasus spyware only to "vetted" governments and government agencies. The government and the ruling BJP have dismissed the Pegasus Project reports as concocted and evidence-less. The media reports have been published by The Wire in collaboration with 16 other international publications including the Washington Post, The Guardian and Le Monde, as media partners to an investigation conducted by Paris-based media non-profit organisation Forbidden Stories and rights group Amnesty International.

CENTRAL VISTA AVENUE REDEVELOPMENT

'Only 22 heritage trees relocated'

Only 22 heritage trees had to be relocated because of the Central Vista Avenue redevelopment project, the government informed Parliament on Friday.



The redevelopment project of the Central Vista -- the power corridor of the country -- includes the revamping of the three-km-long Rajpath from the Rashtrapati Bhavan to India Gate. It also envisages a new triangular Parliament building, a Common Central Secretariat and new residences for the prime minister and the vice president.

Responding to a question in Lok Sabha on the relocation of trees to the Badarpur Eco-Park, Union Environment Minister Bhupendra Yadav said according to information received from the Central Public Works Department, "only 22 number of trees have been relocated from the Central Vista Avenue to the eco-park, Badarpur, and there is no other proposal to relocate trees from the Central Vista Avenue to Badarpur".

Venkaiah flays tearing of copy of Minister's statement

Rajya Sabha Chairman M Venkaiah Naidu on Friday described the snatching and tearing of the copy of the IT Minister's statement in the House as an assault on the country's parliamentary democracy.

Expressing anguish over the frequent disruptions in the House after the laying of papers, Naidu made a passionate appeal to members to allow the smooth functioning of the House so that more meaningful discussions like the one on COVID-19 issue could be held.

He also posed several questions to the members to ponder over the developments that have taken place in the House. Referring to the statement of IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw on the Pegasus spyware issue, Naidu said he had made it clear in the business advisory committee meeting that members may seek clarifications which would have enabled them address their concerns in the matter. "But unfortunately, the proceedings of the House hit a new low with the papers being snatched from the Minister and torn into pieces and thrown in the air. Such actions are a clear assault on our parliamentary democracy," he said in the House.

Bhabha Atomic centre scientist develops superabsorbent cotton to tackle oil spills

PNS ■ MUMBAI

The city-based nuclear research institute BARC on Friday said it has developed a cotton-based superabsorbent which will help tackle oil spills on water.

The cotton is highly efficient super-hydrophobic or water disliking and also super-oleophilic or oil liking, and has been developed using radiation technology, an official statement said.

"There is no absorbent currently available that can remove floating oil from water surface and sediment oil (underwater) simultaneously," A K Mohanty,

the director of Bhabha Atomic Research Centre, said. He added that the 'superabsorbent cotton' was developed by Sudhendu Ray Chowdhury, a scientist working BARC's Isotope and Radiation Application division. The innovation has already received a national award from the Union Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilisers in 2019.

One gram of the material can pick up a minimum of 1.5 kg of oil from water media which can be collected by simple squeezing or compression from the superabsorbent cotton, it said. The cotton is biodegradable



and can be used up to 50-100 times, it added. The statement said the material was developed by bio-inspired molecular-scale surface engineering through tuning of surface roughness or topography and surface energy with the help of radiation assisted covalent integration.

The cotton can be deployed to remove toxic organic liquids such as benzene, toluene, ethylbenzene, chloroform, dichloromethane, tributyl phosphate (TBP), triphenyl phosphate (TPP) from industrial or municipal waste water, the statement said. It can also be used for separation of various oily solvents in industry or laboratory setups and cleaning of solid surfaces in oil stations and spillage on road.

Covid-19 patient dies after hospital collects his sperm

A day after a Vadodara-based private hospital collected the sperm of a COVID-19 patient as per the Gujarat High Court's directions following a plea filed by his wife, the man died. The lawyer of the man's wife gave this information on Friday. The 32-year-old man was on life support at Sterling Hospital as he was suffering from multi-organ failure following coronavirus infection.

Porn films case: Court extends Raj Kundra's custody

A court in Mumbai on Friday extended till July 27 the police custody of businessman Raj Kundra in a case related to alleged creation of pornographic films and publishing them through some apps. Kundra, husband of actor Shilpa Shetty, was arrested on the night of July 19 by the city police's crime branch after being booked under relevant sections of the Indian Penal Code and the Information Technology Act.

Rlys lost 2,903 employees due to Covid-19: Minister

The Railways has lost 2,903 employees due to COVID-19, minister Ashwini Vaishnaw informed Parliament on Friday. In a written reply in the Rajya Sabha, he said settlement of dues has been made with families of deceased Railway employees in 2,782 cases. "Indian Railways has a policy for giving appointment on compassionate ground to dependents of Railway servants who lose their lives in the course of duty or die in harness or are medically incapacitated.

Priests body demands representation in management of temples, writes to Modi

J&K police shoots down drone carrying IED material in Jammu, uncovers terror plot

The Jammu and Kashmir police averted a cross-border terror plot by shooting down a drone carrying improvised explosive device (IED) material weighing five kg in the border belt of Jammu district on Friday, officials said.



Following information about a drone flying over the border belt of Kanachak along the International Border (IB), a quick reaction team (QRT) of the police swung into action and shot it down using anti-drone strategy in the early hours, they added. "At about 1 am, the drone made a low flight to release the payload (IED), when it was shot down," Additional Director General of police (ADGP) Mukesh Singh told reporters here.

He said the drone was carrying a payload of five-kg IED material in a semi-assembled state and only wires had to be connected to it to trigger a blast.

According to a preliminary analysis, the flying object was a hexa m-copter with six wings and had a GPS device and a flight controller, the officer said. "A possible IED blast has been prevented," he added. There is a one-digit difference in the serial number of this drone and the drone shot down in Kathua last year, which points towards the fact that terrorist organisations across the border such as the Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) and the Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) have acquired flight controllers and are sending drones with arms and IEDs to the Indian side, the ADGP said.

Castle in the air

The Delhi High Court has told political leaders that they must honour the promises they make

It took 89 pages of a Delhi High Court judgment to tell politicians holding high positions in Governments that they cannot go on making promises to people and not honour these. The judgment, in a case relating to a promise made by Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal, sends the message that it is important to bridge the gap between law and morality and let the authorities, who are either elected to public positions or who hold positions of power, realise that they "are answerable to the people, especially once they undertake or agree to do or not to do a particular thing" and that the citizens would expect that the Government would implement the promises made. The judgment, by Justice Prathiba M Singh, opens with a telling comment that reflects the mood of the society: "The saying 'Promises are meant to be broken' is well known in the social context." The judgment unambiguously says that promises made by the Government or its officials are "judicially enforceable" if these are broken. The judgment reminds the political leaders of things enshrined in the business of governance but forgotten in the melee of politics. One is that good governance requires the said trust to be maintained between those who govern and those who are governed. Two, the sustenance of this trust coupled with the legal certainty of an assurance given, cements the relationship between the citizen and the Government.



Three, citizens repose a lot of trust in a promise made by those who hold Government positions and an assurance given is like an undertaking that is compatible with public duty. One powerful conclusion is derived from the judgment: Once a representation is made by a high-ranking official, it comes within the scope of its authority. It will have a far-reaching impact on the Indian polity which is used to most politicians in power resorting to populism as forethought and governance as an afterthought. A cursory glance through a day's newspapers will throw up scores of promises made by elected representatives of the people that are meant to remain unfulfilled. The human-animal conflict on the rise

There's an urgent need to stop designating animals as 'vermin' as it takes the protective shield of the wildlife Act away from animals

A practice that continues despite strong and reasoned opposition is that of proclaiming species of wild animals as "vermin" and thus putting them out of the ambit of the protective umbrella of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, the principal instrument for protecting wild animals in India. The wild boar and nilgai have been proclaimed as vermin in Uttarakhand, the nilgai and boar in some districts of Bihar, and the rhesus macaque in parts of Himachal Pradesh.

The Act does not define the term "vermin" in terms of what it connotes. It just states in Section 62: "The Central Government may by notification declare any wild animal other than those specified in Schedule I and Part II of Schedule II to be vermin for any area and for such period as may be specified therein and so long as such notification is in force, such wild animal shall be deemed to have been included in Schedule V." Animals included in Schedule V can be freely hunted.

The Central Government declares an animal as vermin following requests from State Governments and the ground which has been invariably cited is that it causes damage to crops and poses a danger to human life. There have no doubt been cases in which the Centre has withheld permission. The fundamental question, however, is whether there should at all be a provision for designating an animal as "vermin".

There are several reasons for asking this. For one thing, an article by Anupam Chakravarty, Rajeshwari Ganesan and Rajit Sengupta, published under the heading 'Enemies of the state?' in the *DownToEarth* on June 15, 2016, cites animal rights groups as saying that the drive for killing then underway was based on popular perception rather than data. The country had no data both on the populations of animals proposed to be killed and the extent of crop damage they were supposed to be causing. The article stated that, in fact, Uttarakhand's proposal on the basis of which the Centre permitted the killing of wild boars, clearly said, "There is no scientific survey or census of the wild boar population that has



been carried out. However, since the crop damage caused by wild boar is increasing, the wild boar is estimated to be overpopulated."

Further, experience shows that once killing is permitted, villagers or designated hunters have frequently not followed the methods prescribed. An example is the case in Kerala where a pregnant cow elephant died following several days of intense agony after she had bitten on a pineapple filled with explosives. Enquiries revealed that the pineapple was intended to kill a wild boar which, as a species, had been declared "vermin". Also, such a barbaric way of killing was not permitted even in the case of wild boars.

State Governments have doubtless laid down restrictions on the methods and guidelines governing killings — such as only rifles and pistols to be used and no killing of injured animals running away to forests, and hunting only after receiving permission from the forest department concerned and the village pradhan. But who is to ensure compliance? The fact is, methods that are not permitted are often used. These include laying out live wires

for animals to be electrocuted, trapping them for murder and poisoning them. There is no guarantee that animals other than those declared as "vermin" would not come into contact with such wires or consume the poison.

The argument that State forest department personnel should watch out for the transgressors and deal harshly with them hardly holds water. It would take a very large number of people and vehicles for doing that. Given that most forest departments have to make do with numerically inadequate staff, deployment on such an errand would leave them with very few people to carry out essential functions like curbing poaching and preventing illegal felling of trees. The result may be a serious diminution of protected species like elephants (for tusks), rhinos (for their horns) and tigers for their body parts which are sought for the manufacture of so-called aphrodisiacs.

Apart from the fact that declaring an entire species of wildlife as vermin is contrary to the spirit and content of Article 51 A (g) of the Constitution which enjoins upon both the Government

and all citizens to show compassion to all living creatures, animals can hardly be blamed for damaging standing crops and attacking people. The loss of the vegetation they feed on following the destruction of their habitats through encroachment by expanding human settlements, roads and industries, as well as droughts and forest fires, has driven them to agricultural fields for food.

Humans do not realise that their own predatory exploitation of nature is increasing areas of human-animal conflict and making non-human species extinct at the rate of 3,000 a year. In this process, they are also destroying the environment and the conditions that have made human life possible. They need to realise that they are not the lords of the universe and must live in harmony with the world around them, including plants and animals. The Greek sophist Protagoras' famous aphorism "Man is the measure of all things" needs to be amended to read, "Humans are the preservers and protectors of all things."

Glitz and guts

The Tokyo Olympics have started. Only blood, sweat and tears will lead to glory

The greatest sporting spectacle in the world has begun in Japan, even though under the scary shadow of the pernicious SARS-Cov-2 virus. Over the next two weeks, the best athletes from around the world will compete in 33 sports and 46 disciplines. As always in the 125-year modern history of the Olympics, the global audience will be wowed by the superhuman performances of the athletes, wondering how some people — with the same number of limbs, developed more or less in the same proportion and living on the same planet as us — can achieve the seemingly unattainable or near-impossible. But, put in a nutshell, that's what the Games are about. However, never before in the history of the modern Olympics have the Games ever been organised in an odd-numbered year even though these have survived boycotts, natural calamities and man-made wars. Another first is that no spectators would be present inside stadia, thanks to the raging COVID-19 pandemic. Think about it, the world's biggest sporting stage, and not a single soul to cheer the athletes, say, the fastest woman and man on Earth? In a way, it's poignant.

Focusing on India, a total of only 20 Indian athletes from seven sports (besides six officials) participated in the opening parade on Friday evening. India is being represented by more than 125 athletes in this instalment of the Olympics, with the overall contingent size being 128 members. The parade number was deliberately thinned owing to COVID-19 concerns and the deputy chef de mission had already made it clear that the athletes who have competitions lined up on Saturday — primarily, archery, hockey, shooting and badminton — would stay away from the opening ceremony festivities. From the men's hockey team, only captain Manpreet Singh participated in the event as he was India's flag-bearer along with pugilist MC Mary Kom when Team India proudly walked out into the stadium at number 21st as per the Japanese alphabetical order. The expectations of 130 crore Indians must be weighing heavy on the Indian contingent as it tries for the first time ever to take its medals tally into double digits. So far, our best showing was in the 2012 London Olympics, where Indian athletes managed to scoop up six medals, though none of them was gold. Hopefully, things will turn better this time around. Meanwhile, let the Games begin!

Painting murals to welcome tourists back to their village

After a gap of nearly six months, Abakash Nayak, 54, a seasoned Pattachitra artist of Raghurajpur, the nationally acclaimed heritage village in Odisha's Puri district has picked up his brush, but this time to paint on the walls of his house. He is painting Lord Ganesh on one wall and Ardhanariswara (a traditional form of Lord Shiva and Parvati) on another. "I am happy like the rest of the artists of Raghurajpur village that we are being asked to paint murals to decorate the walls of our houses. Once the lockdown will ease and tourists will start returning to our village, they will witness the fresh look of the village," he said. The artists of this village have been sitting idle with no work at hand since March last year after the nationwide lockdown was announced. Recently, the State government declared financial assistance of ₹10,000 to each of the 150-odd families to decorate the walls of their houses with Patta paintings, bringing smiles to their faces. In Raghurajpur



crafts village, almost all family members are involved in Patta painting, sculpture work, and paper masks. Patta paintings are made on a piece of cloth known as Patta, or on a dried palm leaf which is first covered with a mixture of gum and chalk. Over the prepared surface, colourful and intricate pictures of gods and goddesses, and scenes from mythological scriptures are painted. The village saw no tourists after March 2020. In November, some tourists started visiting, but the second wave of the Covid-19 pandemic in February spread among the artists. Banamali Maharana, a Shilpiguru awardee, recalls the times when visitors could see all the family members doing artwork, sitting on the porch of their houses. "We are artists... How are we supposed to pick up spade leaving paint and brush?"

The male members mainly do the painting work, while women prepare traditional colours, the base of the paper mask, and other additional work. Some women have also started Patta paintings. Earlier, they would earn between ₹15,000 and ₹20,000 per month. With overseas buyers, they would earn a little more. Now incomes have drastically dropped. Initially, they managed to make ends meet through loans but money lenders have now stopped giving them money. A few "kind-hearted" art lovers help them out financially. In 2019, Cyclone Fani devastated this artisans' village. All the artwork were damaged. When they began to restart their art, the coronavirus struck. Some started selling vegetables, some opened "paan" shops, or started working as daily wage labourers. But the second wave put paid to these efforts too. Villagers are at present getting vaccinated to fight the virus. "Once unlock happens, the tourists will start coming to our village again. Our vaccination will send a message of reassurance to these tourists," said villager Jitendra who believes that the government should also arrange a vaccination drive for the artists. Raghurajpur is now preparing to welcome tourists with murals on walls. The Department of Language, Literature and Culture in association with Odisha Lalit Kala Akademi has come up with an innovative idea to encourage and support the artists. Each family will receive ₹10,000 as financial assistance while the best five will be awarded after being selected by a special committee. Meanwhile, the younger generation is exploring selling the artwork online. Many have also shifted to the virtual mode to teach Pattachitra-making online. They want the government to train them and arrange for a platform to sell their products to e-commerce companies.

Cairn looking for arbitration money?

Cairn Energy has submitted a detailed series of proposals to the Indian Government for settlement of the case

On the very same day that Prime Minister Narendra Modi effected a massive reconstitution of his council of ministers, India got in the shock in the form of a French court freezing residential properties belonging to the Indian government in Paris following a retrospective tax dispute with British power and energy giant Cairn Energy.

The decision will impact 20 properties valued at Euro 20 million (₹177 crore), as part of a guarantee of the debt owed to Cairn that exited India a few years ago. The company with a market capitalisation of ₹755 million (about ₹7,800 crore) - has filed cases in several countries to pursue the unpaid international arbitration award of \$1.7 billion (₹12,750 crore). The company also filed cases in New York, seeking judicial confirmation that Air India can be classed as the alter ego of the Indian state and thereby jointly liable for the arbitral award.

The French court decision is unfortunate as it is feared it can start a new diplomatic conflict and it also impinges on the sovereignty of the country. It might create an image that India can be taken lightly by MNCs and other private players.

And that is what exactly happened. A case similar to Cairn is that of Devas Multimedia, floated by ex-ISRO executives. It had entered into a deal with ISRO's Antrix Corp. and the National Company Law Tribunal said the 2005 spectrum lease deal was fraudulent. Deutsche Telekom later picked up its stake.

Devas moved an arbitration tribunal saying that its multi-million-dollar investments lost value because of the annulment. In 2020 the tribunal awarded Devas \$1.2 billion. It is now seeking payment from India (now stayed by Supreme Court) in a New York court, asking Air India to pay the amount or forfeit its property, including planes, cargo handling, equipment, and artwork.

In both cases, the authorities in India bungled in pursuing the case. In the case of Cairn and Devas, they moved the courts in Germany and The Hague even as the Indian arguments on jurisdiction and criminality in two arbitrations under Bilateral Investment Treaty (BIT) under India-Mauritius and India-Germany agreements were lost.

Cairn and Devas have chosen flagship Air India planes and its prime property as a pressure tactic to force India into payment negotiations. Trying to seize planes or property to realise unpaid dues may be an extreme tactic but there are precedents. Aircraft are valuable, mobile, and relatively easy to sell. A few years ago, US hedge fund Elliott Capital Management seized an Argentine naval vessel to collect on bonds on which the country defaulted in 2001.

The Cairn matter is one of the irrational tax system. The company is in dis-



pute with the government over a 2014 retrospective tax demand. The income-tax department seized a 10 per cent stake in Indian operations that Cairn was trying to sell. After a long dispute, it went for international arbitration and Cairn won the \$ 1.7 billion award.

The issue of high taxation, as recently mentioned by President Ramnath Kovind, retrospective tax, and confusion on predating taxes is an unresolved quagmire. There is an OECD move to have a global minimum tax on corporates at 15 per cent or higher. The UPA government introduced the controversial retrospective tax in March 2012. The NDA II was expected to correct it after 2014 but the bureaucratic system continued with the supposed oddity.

The Supreme Court of India on January 20, 2012 ruled in favour of Vodafone overturning a 2010 decision of the Bombay High Court which ruled that Vodafone was liable to retrospectively pay \$2 billion income-tax because Indian capital gains taxes (CGT) applied on the share transfers between two non-resident entities.

But the smitten tax officials took a different route to circumvent the SC ruling with the introduction of the retrospective tax in March 2012, allowing the government to levy CGT - a move that was piloted by former finance minister Pranab Mukherjee in 2012.

In March 2018 the then finance minister, the late Arun Jaitley, said that the decision to tax Vodafone retrospectively by UPA was erroneous and also that the "present government will not be going down that path". On July 18,

2014, he had said that India would not levy any tax with a retrospective effect that creates an additional burden. But Jaitley made no move to repeal the 2011 law.

The statements of Jaitley and Prime Minister Narendra Modi pledging not to use retrospective taxation to overturn on Cairn Energy were used by a three-member tribunal at the Permanent Court of Arbitration in The Hague on December 20, 2020, to rule that the 2006 reorganisation of Cairn Energy's India business before listing on local bourses was not "unlawful tax avoidance" and ordered the tax authorities to drop the tax demand. This did not happen due to bureaucratic audacity.

Cairn has moved for implementation of the arbitration award in several jurisdictions on different continents, including the US, the UK, Canada, Singapore, Mauritius, France, and the Netherlands as the company intends to focus on high-value assets. Cairn has submitted detailed series of proposals to the Indian government for settlement of the case. The NDA government is now opposing its stand apparently under pressure of officials.

It rattles India. Would the country lose its flagship aircraft carrier and other prime assets? Technically it may be so but authorities say that they are yet to receive a notice or communication from the French court and the government would vigorously defend its case. It translates into more litigations as well as negotiations. Director of Cairn's corporate communication David Nisbet says that the company is keen on an agreed settlement with India and keep the

trust of its shareholders. So, it has identified \$70-billion worth of Indian assets to retrieve the \$1.7 billion award. However, an international company knows that while it is important to contest governments, it also needs their goodwill to be in business.

The government is also in negotiations since January 2021, even before the present French order was flashed. It may give Cairn Energy one of the surrendered oilfields - Ratna R-series - in the Arabian Sea that was taken away from Essar-Premier Oil in 2016 instead of an arbitration payment. Cairn had spudded the biggest inland oil wells in Barmer, indicated in a survey by NGRI. It exited the country after it was given ₹10247 crore retro-tax demand. Apparently, the government wants that the biggest oil company with one of the lowest operational costs come back to India to shore up its image as also create a show window for the international investors.

It is also looking at the other option of giving it the Barmer oilfield. Vedanta, which now operates the field, has so far has not agreed to the government conditions for extending its contract. Under Vedanta, Rajasthan oilfields have seen a steady decline in output. Cairn has protested against the high \$9 cress per barrel on the oil produced.

The bureaucrats had the issues mired in a web. A political decision to annul retro-tax under Prime Minister Narendra Modi can ensure that a Cairn, Vodafone, Devas, or Vedanta is not repeated and bureaucrats do not muddy the waters.

Agricultural and allied activities continue to be the backbone of the Indian economy supporting the livelihood of 60 per cent of the population and contributing 1/6th of GDP. It used to account for more than half of GDP in 1951.

Half of the arable area continues to depend on the monsoon for irrigation. The proportion of gross irrigated area to total cropped area could increase from 31 per cent in 1984-85 to only 45 per cent, as per the agriculture census of 2010-11. The total operated area under agriculture decreased from 16 crore hectares in 2010-11 to 15.8 crore hectares in 2015-16.

With succession not based on primogeniture, population explosion has resulted in frag-

mentation of landholdings. Total operational holdings increased from 13.8 crore in 2010-11 to 14.6 crore in 2015-16. The average size of an operational holding declined to 1.08 hectares in 2015-16 from 1.15 hectares in 2010-11.

Small and marginal farmers suffer from the absence of economies of scale, access to information, and their inability to participate in the price discovery mechanism. Their participation is restricted by poor vertical and horizontal linkages, limited access to the market, and poor information flow along the value chain. The challenge now is to optimize benefits through effective and efficient means of aggregation models.

Farmer aggregation assumes significance due to



the shift of Indian agriculture towards high-value commodities as a result of the growing importance of the agri-food market caused by liberalization, globalization, improved purchasing power, demand for safe and quality food, and expansion of niche markets.

Integrating small farmers with agricultural markets is a big challenge. Many forms of farmer producer organizations have been experimented with like cooperatives, self-help

groups, Farmer Producer Companies, and commodity interest groups to aggregate farmers to help them benefit from economies of scale and to link them to the markets.

Contract farming and direct marketing are other institutional interventions that can be undertaken by organised groups of farmers. I have come across even Whatsapp groups being used to connect farmers and consumers, bypassing middlemen and getting better prices for farmers. A Farmer Producer Company (FPC) seems to be the most useful for the aggregation of small farmers. The FPCs offer more benefits compared to other formats of aggregation. Its members are able to leverage their collective strength and bargaining power to access financial and non-

financial inputs and services and appropriate technologies leading to a reduction in transaction costs. They can tap high-value markets and enter into partnerships with private entities on equitable terms.

The performance of cooperatives has been generally poor with the exception of cooperative sugar factories and dairy cooperatives in Maharashtra and Gujarat. Amalsad cooperative Society for sapota and farming cooperative Gambhira in Gujarat, MAHAGRAPES in Maharashtra, HOPCOMS and CAMPCO in Karnataka, Mulkanoor women's cooperative groups in combined Andhra Pradesh, etc., have performed well. These successful models could not be emulated elsewhere in the

country. In Budget 2019-20, the government announced new central sector schemes to facilitate the formation and promotion of 10,000 new Farmer Producer Organisations (FPOs) and handholding of each FPO for five years from its aggregation and formation.

Rainfall deficit, unseasonal rains, floods are natural and continuing risks. Agricultural production has increased but productivity is generally lower than international benchmarks. Water-use efficiency is particularly low. Some progressive farmers are de-risking themselves by diversifying their produce. However, many relatively well-off farmers continue with water-guzzling crops like rice and sugarcane in water-defi-

cient regions. How to incentivize farmers to move away from the over-production of cereals (particularly rice and wheat)? How to go about agricultural diversification to boost oilseeds, protein, and fruits/vegetable production? These are policy challenges.

Rejuvenation of our agricultural sector needs appropriate diversification and value-addition and loosening of outdated controls on agricultural markets. It is hoped that protests against the farm laws - misguided or mischievous or partly both - abate soon and a sensible farmer leadership works on connecting farmers with FPOs. Farmers' apprehensions about the entry of big corporates can be addressed if they become members of the FPOs.

DIGITAL & SUSTAINABLE TRADE FACILITATION

India witnessing significant improvement in UNESCAP score

India has seen a "significant improvement" in the UNESCAP's Global Survey on Digital & Sustainable Trade Facilitation with a 90.32 per cent score.

After evaluation of 143 economies, the Survey 2021 has highlighted India's significant improvement in the scores on all five key indicators -- transparency, formalities, institutional arrangement and cooperation, paperless trade and cross-border paperless trade.

India has scored 90.32 per cent in the global survey on Digital and Sustainable Trade Facilitation. This is a remarkable jump from 78.49 per cent in 2019.

Under the transparency indicator, the country scored 100 per cent in 2021, up from 93.33 per cent in 2019. The score for 'paperless trade'



improved to 96.3 per cent in 2021, from 81.48 per cent in 2019. The score in the institutional arrangement and cooperation indicator improved to 88.89 per cent, from 66.67 per cent in 2019.

In a statement, the Finance Ministry said that India has seen "significant improvement"

in the score in United Nations' Global Survey on Digital and Sustainable Trade Facilitation.

The Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC) has been at forefront of path breaking reforms under the umbrella of "Turant" Customs to usher in a Faceless, Paperless and Contactless Customs by way of

a series of reforms, it said.

"This has had a direct impact in terms of the improvement in the UNESCAP rankings on digital and sustainable trade facilitation," the ministry added.

The Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP) serves as the

United Nations' regional hub promoting cooperation among countries to achieve inclusive and sustainable development.

Further, during the Covid-19 pandemic, Customs formations have made all efforts to expedite Covid-related imports such as Oxygen related equipment, life-saving medicines, vaccines etc. A dedicated single window COVID-19 24*7 helpdesk for EXIM trade was created on the CBIC website to facilitate quick resolution of issue(s) faced by importers, the finance ministry said.

The Global Survey on Digital and Sustainable Trade Facilitation is conducted every two years by UNESCAP. The 2021 Survey includes an assessment of 58 trade facilitation measures covered by the WTO's Trade Facilitation Agreement. A higher score for a country also helps businesses in their investment decisions.

Textile Ministry likely to get Cabinet nod for MITRA scheme

The textile ministry is in the process of obtaining approval of the Union Cabinet for the proposed Mega Investment Textiles Parks (MITRA) scheme, under which seven such parks will be set up in the country over the next three years, Parliament was informed on Friday.

Minister of State for Textiles Darshana Jardosh said the scheme was announced in Union Budget 2021-22.

"Ministry of Textiles is in the process of obtaining approval of the Cabinet for the proposed scheme. Once, the proposed scheme is approved and modalities are finalized, the details of location, government funding structure etc. will be decided," she said in a written reply to the Lok Sabha.

In a separate reply, the minister said during the pandemic, CCI (Cotton Corporation of India) procured 20.72 lakh bales valuing Rs 5,615 crore from 4 lakh cotton farmers.

However, during the entire cotton season 2019-20, CCI



made a record procurement of 105.15 lakh bales (equivalent to around 546.80 lakh quintal kapas) and an amount of Rs 28,500 crore was disbursed to around 21.50 lakh cotton farmers directly into their bank accounts, she said.

"During current cotton season 2020-21 (October 1, 2020 to September 30, 2021), CCI opened more than 450 procurement centres in all cotton

growing state. CCI continued its procurement of cotton under MSP operations since beginning of season to avoid the eventuality of distress sale by farmers and has procured 91.89 lakh bales so far (equivalent to around 482 lakh quintal kapas)," Jardosh said.

CCI disbursed an amount of Rs 26,700 crore to around 19 lakh cotton farmers, she added.



Sensex ends 139 pts higher

Equity benchmark Sensex rose 139 points on Friday following gains in ICICI Bank, ITC and SBI amid a largely positive trend in global markets.

The 30-share BSE index ended 138.59 points or 0.26 per cent higher at 52,975.80, while the broader NSE Nifty advanced 32 points or 0.20 per cent to 15,856.05.

ICICI Bank was the top gainer in the Sensex pack, rising over 3 per cent, followed by ITC, SBI, HCL Tech, Axis Bank, Bajaj Finserv and Tech Mahindra.

On the other hand, L&T, HUL, Reliance Industries and NTPC were among the laggards. Domestic market traded range-bound but extended

gains moderately on sustained rebound in financials, said Binod Modi, Head-Strategy at Reliance Securities.

"Improved prospects of credit growth rebound with visible pickup in economy and comfortable valuations bode well for financials. However, it was not a broad-based rally as midcap and smallcap indices lagged as profit booking was visible in many counters," he noted.

A sharp recovery in global markets along with buying on dips propelled domestic equities to see sharp rebound in the last two days, Modi added.

Elsewhere in Asia, bourses in Shanghai and Hong Kong were in the red, while Seoul ended with gains.

Gold climbs Rs 256; silver jumps Rs 662

Gold in the national capital on Friday rose Rs 256 to Rs 46,698 per 10 gram amid supportive global trends, according to HDFC Securities.

The precious metal had in the previous trade closed at Rs 46,442 per 10 grams.

Silver also jumped Rs 662 to Rs 66,111 per kg, from Rs 65,449 per kg in the previous trade.

In the international market, gold was trading in the green at USD 1,808 per ounce and silver was flat at USD 25.33 per ounce.

HDFC Securities Senior Analyst (Commodities) Tapan Patel said, "Gold prices continued its upside on Friday after gaining about USD 1,800 on Thursday evening session with fall in US treasury yields."



Timely refund by online retailers must be a criterion: Nasscom

Rationalising obligations in line with activities of relevant entities, and limiting fallback liability of online retailers to ensuring timely refund to consumers are among the recommendations suggested by Nasscom to the proposed e-commerce rules.

The IT industry body on Friday said its recommendations on the proposed e-commerce rules "focus on strengthening consumer protection, ensuring that the obligations are proportionate to the underlying risks and are unambiguous".

The draft e-commerce rules released by the government on June 21 propose to ban fraudulent flash sales and mis-selling of goods and services on e-commerce platforms. Appointments of chief compliance officer/grievance redressal officer are among the key amendments proposed under the Consumer Protection (E-Commerce) Rules, 2020. Nasscom said some of the



proposed amendments "appear to be beyond the scope of the Consumer Protection Act 2019 (COPA19) and are instead a subject matter of either the Competition Act, 2002 or the Information Technology Act, 2000...in our submission, we undertook a clause-by-clause review of the proposed amendments and suggested the way forward".

The government on Monday extended till August 5 the deadline for public comments on pro-

posed amendments to the Consumer Protection (E-Commerce) Rules, 2020. Earlier, the last date for public comments on the draft e-commerce rules was July 6.

Some of the recommendations include removal of the word 'own' from the definition of an e-commerce entity.

"This is with the aim of excluding from the scope those technology entities that own the digital platform and license/provide it to e-commerce companies.

Maruti Nexa completes 6 yrs with cumulative sales of 14 lakh units

Maruti Suzuki India (MSI) on Friday said its premium sales network Nexa has crossed 14 lakh sales milestone in six years of coming into existence. With the first showroom in 2015, Nexa has touched the imagination of young and aspirational customers and the



testimony to this is that nearly half of the customers are under 35 years of age, the auto major said. Nexa has attracted first time buyers, which makes up to nearly 70 per cent of its total sales, it added. MSI currently has over 380 Nexa outlets spread across about 234 cities in the country. "Driven by innovation, Nexa marks the first initiative by an automobile company to go beyond selling cars and create new formats of car buying experiences," MSI Senior Executive Director (Marketing and Sales) Shashank Srivastava said in a statement. With over 380 showrooms across the country, the premium sales network has helped the company attract a new set of customers who were earlier not considering a Maruti Suzuki vehicle, he added.

Govt approves 792 private food processing projects

As many as 792 projects out of 818 have been approved for setting up food processing industries by the private sector, with approved grants-in-aid of Rs 5,792 crore so far, the government informed Parliament on Friday.



"Government has been consistently encouraging and incentivising increased private sector investment for the overall development of the food processing sector of the country to promote value addition in agricultural and allied sectors and reduce wastage," Minister of the State for Food Processing Industries Pahlad Singh Patel said. The minister in a written reply to the Rajya Sabha also said the government has recently taken three major initiatives in order to further increase private sector participation in the sector. Firstly, the government has approved a Production Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme for the food processing sector with an outlay of Rs 10,900 crore to support the creation of global food manufacturing champions and support Indian brands of food products in international markets.

Rupee pares early losses, settles 6 paise higher at 74.40/USD

The Indian rupee pared early losses to close 6 paise higher at 74.40 against the US dollar on Friday following gains in the domestic equities.

At the interbank forex market, the domestic currency witnessed heavy volatility. The local unit opened weak at 74.55 a dollar and touched a low of 74.58 in morning trade.

The local unit recovered later and touched a high of 74.37 during the day. It finally closed at 74.40 against the American currency, registering a rise of 6 paise over its previous close. On Thursday, the rupee had settled at 74.46.



Biocon Q1 net profit declines 35 pc

Biotechnology major Biocon has reported a 35.39 per cent decline in its consolidated net profit at Rs 108.4 crore for the quarter ended June 30, 2021 mainly on account of its share of loss in associate startup entity Bicara Therapeutics Inc. The company had posted

a net profit of Rs 167.8 crore for the corresponding period of the previous fiscal, Biocon said in a late night filing on Thursday.

Consolidated revenue of the company stood at Rs 1,807.8 crore for the quarter under consideration. It was Rs 1,712.1 crore for the same period a year ago, it added.

Persistent to hire 2,000 freshers in FY-2022

Mid-sized IT player Persistent Systems is looking to hire 2,000 freshers in 2021-22 and will recruit lateral entries as per business growth, a senior official said on Friday.

The company also flagged concerns about pressures on attrition returning back in the information technology industry as the business sees an overall improvement due to greater focus on digitalization.

The Pune-based company had reported a 68 per cent growth in its June quarter net at Rs 151.2 crore late on Thursday.

"We will be hiring 2,000 freshers in FY22 and will hire laterals as per the business growth," the company's chief financial officer Sunil Sapre



told PTI over a call. Its chief executive Sandeep Kalra said typically a fresher is trained for six months before being put on a project.

Sapre said in the last three quarters, it has hired 4,200 people, which included 3,500 lateral hires, and added that the

fresher to lateral hires ratio will not be the same any more.

Kalra said sequential pressures are being observed on the attrition front as it happens whenever the business environment is good in the sector. "There will be pressure on the talent side," he said.

Today is a big day for us, a new 'Day Zero': Zomato CEO

Exports rise 45 pc during July 1-21: Comm Min data

The country's exports grew 45.13 per cent to USD 22.48 billion during July 1-21 on account of healthy growth in sectors such as gems and jewellery, petroleum and engineering, according to the provisional commerce ministry data. Imports also rose 64.82 per cent to USD 31.77 billion in the said period, leaving a trade deficit of USD 9.29 billion. Exports of gems and jewellery, petroleum and engineering during July 1-21 stood at USD 424.5 million, USD 923.33 million and USD 551.4 million, respectively, the data showed. Imports of petroleum, crude and products rose by about 77.5 per cent to USD 1.16 billion. During the period, exports to the US, UAE and Brazil increased by 51 per cent to USD 493.24 million; 127 per cent to USD 373.36 million; and 212 per cent to USD 144.5 million, respectively.



Sebi consent not mandatory for compounding of offences

The Supreme Court Friday held that the consent of the market regulator Sebi is not mandatory for the compounding of offences under section 24A of the Sebi Act but taking views of the expert body is necessary. A bench of Justices D Y Chandrachud and M R Shah said though Sebi is not conferred with any authority to veto a decision for proceeding in trial offences, it is a regulatory and prosecuting agency and the Securities Appellate Tribunal (SAT) and the courts must obtain its views since it is an expert body. The apex court said eliciting views of Sebi is necessary in the interest of the stability of the securities market and protection of investors. "Before taking any decision to compound an offence punishable under section 24A, or the court must obtain views of Sebi for furnishing guidance to its decision. These views unless manifestly mala fide must be accorded high degree of deference. The court must be wary of substituting its own wisdom on the gravity of the offence or the impact on the markets while discarding the expert opinion," the bench said.



HYDERABAD IS A CHANGEMAKER, TRENDSETTER

An individual with innovative solutions to society's most pressing social, cultural, and environmental challenges, Nayonika Roy hailing from Ranchi, has worked for women's rights and safety under the Ministry of Women and Child Development, Delhi and MV Foundation, Hyderabad. Ambitious and persistent, she's tackling major issues and offering new ideas for systems-level change in our city through 'Soch for Change'.

She who moved to the city of Hyderabad to pursue her higher studies in the year 2016, barely knew would impact the lives of so many people across the city. Simultaneously, the instant lure that the city was offering her made her decide to stay here for a lifetime thereafter. "I love Hyderabad. I have always hated huge cities because of their lack of culture. But Hyderabad is that one city that makes me feel like a small-town girl while also giving me the comfort of a metropolitan city. Moving to a new home here was very exciting! Many who have never lived in a big city have had the desire to eventually succumb to the lure of city life, and find themselves living in a much more concentrated area than they experience in the suburbs. I, for one, feel the big city life is not for everyone, nonetheless, Hyderabad made me feel like one of its own," says the outspoken young woman.

Even though city living has its inconveniences, it makes up for these inconveniences with all that it has to offer. Hyderabad having a major cultural center that has vibrant art and music scenes, a wider variety of food, several places of interest such as museums, events like concerts, and a diverse population with a shared experience of living — all this made the changemaker stay back! "My ideas about the



city were mostly positive. When I was moving here, I was told about its famous Biryani, the rich street food that actually made my inner foodie scream its lungs out, and of course the pearl stores. My heart goes with the food, and in no way do I feel that the city could have ever offered me more. Biryani is not the only delicacy that this ancient city has to offer. The land of Nizams doesn't let its food lovers down, it stands out for its unique creations and beloved contributions to the culinary world," she adds.

Nayonika encountered many new faces every day. Meeting and talking to new people who have had very different life experiences than hers, gave her a refreshing and new perspective. Going back to her remembrance of where she's from, she tells, "I was born and brought up in Ranchi. I have spent eighteen years of my life there. For the last eight years, I have lived in Cuttack, Hyderabad, and Delhi, but Hyderabad is my most favourite city to live in. I consider this to be my home! It is a city that makes me feel

safe, I got my first job in this city and it is the place where I decided to stay independent and make a living. Every city is made by the people who live there. Hyderabad is different because of this exact reason. People are friendly here and they go beyond their capacity to help each other out." This place remains very close to my heart. In the last couple of years, I have performed at Shilparamam several times and the stage and the place hold too many memories. In 2018, when I started working with Voice 4 Girls at Hyderabad, I applied for the Day of Girl Challenge conducted by the British Deputy High Commission. Recently, they made headlines for their work on Amit Masurkar's *Sherni*, headlined by Vidya Balan, which won accolades not just for its hard-hitting performances and gripping narrative but also for its haunting background score. Just a fortnight after the release of the film, the pair were in the news for their work on the score for *Hungama Hai Kyon Barpa* from Ray, an anthology based on the works of Satyajit Ray. Going through their itinerary, we knew we had to talk to them before they get any bigger than they already are.

Not much is known about how their collaboration came to be and when we ask them Benedict shares that ever since they were introduced to each other by another musician, Salome Rebello, they got along really well. "It wasn't one definite moment that initiated our alliance. We both floated the idea

working remotely all along. And they have been doing it splendidly. Known for stitching their genre-bending music according to the director's vision, Benedict says that it is just how they work. "We embark on a voyage of discovering new sounds, playing with different elements, with each project. However, it has to be said that we enter the realms of the unknown with our working styles in place — which we've spent time refining — and with those foundations, we can then work individually with each director to realise his/her vision of what the music should be like," he reveals. Naren goes on to add, "With each project, our process changes slightly with the director we work with. However, our journey always starts by gaining clarity on what role music needs to play in the film and what we instinctively feel usually works. It is always about finding musical solutions to the right questions. There is trial and error but it's directed in a specific direction with the hope of

finding what we're looking for." When we ask them if they have any favourites that they regard as the cream of the lot from their growing repertoire of composition, Benedict has a very fitting response, "Impossible to pick one, as you take a great deal from each project. In any project, there are always elements you're thrilled with and things you'd like to change, but that's the nature of the work. Plus, importantly, every project is so different. If I listen to *Paatal Lok* one day, *Ray* the next, and *Tryst* the day after, I'll be entering drastically different worlds, all of which serve a certain purpose."

As we wrap up our conversation, Naren shares that both of them spend time making their own music. "While Benedict produces a lot of singles and albums, we are currently working on a body of work as a duo for release outside of the scoring arena," he tells us.



The Tokyo Olympics were declared open in an eerily empty stadium on Friday after defying a year's pandemic delay and lingering coronavirus threats that will make them perhaps the most unusual Games in history.

Japan's Emperor Naruhito made the announcement against the backdrop of thousands of vacant seats at Tokyo's 68,000-capacity Olympic Stadium, after Covid-19 forced organisers to ban spectators at all but a handful of venues.

"I declare open the Games of Tokyo," said the monarch, wearing a white surgical mask.


The stripped-down ceremony, simplified to reduce coronavirus risks, unfolded in front of fewer than 1,000 VIPs and several thousand athletes.

A reduced parade of about 5,700 athletes, far lower than the usual numbers, filed into the stadium, not all of them socially distanced but all wearing masks.

International Olympic Committee president Thomas Bach acknowledged the Games would be "very different from what all of us had imagined."

But "today is a moment of hope," he said in an address.

The 16-day Games, with 339 Gold medals across 33 sports, have a surreal air after the pandemic compelled organisers to make this the first Games with virtually no spectators.

After struggles, sacrifices & success, Indian shooters eye Olympic glory

Tokyo: Entering the Tokyo Olympics on the back of an unprecedented run that began sometime after the inexplicable meltdown in the Rio de Janeiro Games, Indian shooters bagging a medal or two, or even three to four, is a tangible reality.

All of the 15 shooters are capable of winning medals, but few are seen as sure shot to secure podium finishes in the events that start on Saturday.

One among them is the highly-skilled Saurabh Chaudhary, who will have a few Olympic and world champions standing in his way to glory at sport's biggest showpiece.

Alongside Abhishek Verma, Chaudhary will be part of the first competition day action in the men's 10m air pistol event.

But before that, the fate of Apurvi Chandela and Elavenil Valarivan — in the women's 10m air rifle event — will be decided. A good outing for either of them means India will have won their first medal in these Games.

Both Chandela and Elavenil will enter the competition with plenty to look forward to, despite the occasional blips here and there. The 21-year-old Elavenil, world number 1 and considered one of the country's finest rifle shooters after some fine performances since breaking into the senior team, will certainly fancy her chances.

On the second competition day, India will have the sensational Manu Baker and the hard-working Yashaswini Singh Deswal representing the country in the women's 10m air pistol competition.



The women's 10m pistol event has attracted maximum number of entries but that should not worry the two Indian shooters given their skills and consistency over the years.

In the men's 10m air rifle event, India will have the teenaged Divyansh Singh Panwar and the experienced Deepak Kumar, with the former especially seen as a strong contender after his superb run of form since breaking into the senior team in 2019.

If these eight participants fire on the first two days, India can expect a handful of medals at the Games, which will make up for returning empty-handed from the 2016 Rio Games.

In the middle and towards the end of the shooting events too, India have in its ranks strong contenders in the form of Rahi Sarnobat, Aishwary Pratap Singh Tomar, Anjum Moudgil, Tejaswini Sawant and the seasoned Sanjeev Rajput, besides the two skeet shooters in Mairaj Ahmad Khan and Angad Vir Singh Bajwa.

The likes of Sarnobat, who has won a Silver and Gold in the ISSF World Cups in New Delhi and Oisjek, Croatia respectively, world number one in 10m air rifle Divyansh Singh Panwar and Aishwary Pratap Singh Tomar are all gunning for medals. PTI

Mirabai favourite to open India's account

Tokyo: Former world champion Mirabai Chanu will be in focus for her high medal-winning chances at the Tokyo Olympics as the Indian hopes to exorcise the ghosts of a disappointing Rio Games and write a new chapter in the country's weightlifting history.

Competing in the 49kg category, Chanu is being considered a sure shot medal prospect for India as her personal best of 205kg is only second to China's Hou Zhihui's effort of 213kg in the eight-woman field.

The hype is similar to the one five years ago in Rio, where Chanu could manage only one lift from her six attempts and thus could not get an overall total in

women's 48kg event.

The diminutive Manipuri will desperately hope for a different script this time round, one that involves a podium.

While Chanu will have one eye on her competitors' barbells, the 26-year-old's main battle will be with herself. In recent times, her performance in the snatch section has often proved to be her downfall in important competitions.

Chanu has managed to match Zhihui, the favourite to win the Gold, in the clean and jerk category, but her personal best of 88kg in snatch pales in comparison to the Chinese lifter's world record effort of 96kg.

Even USA's Delacruz Jourdan Elizabeth has a better personal best — 89kg — than the Indians, while Aisah Windy Cantika of Indonesia had managed to pip Chanu to win a Bronze in the snatch section at the Asian championship in April.

It is expected that Chanu will try to better her world record lift of 119kg in the clean and jerk category, should the competition demand it.

Interestingly, Chanu has set the highest entry weight of 210kg, which is five kilograms more than her personal best, followed by Zhihui (205kg), who had lifted 213kg (96g+117kg) at the Asian championship. PTI

The mixed team, is the country's best bet to win an elusive Olympic medal in archery.

India had identical rankings of ninth in both men's team and mixed pair competitions.

Deepika will not partner her husband Das after the top Indian male archer slipped behind Olympic debutant Jadhav.

Jadhav was the best among the Indian trio with 656 points for a 31st place finish, three points ahead of Das, while Rai, in his third Olympics appearance, took the 37th spot among 64 archers.

India had the option to send entries of Das and Deepika, who recently won a Gold medal together at the Paris World Cup, but the federation went ahead with Jadhav based on his current form.

"Simply put, we picked Jadhav based on his current form, it's no rocket science," Archery Association of India official Virendra Sachdeva, who

Indian archers brace up for Korean challenge

Tokyo: World No 1 Deepika Kumari was inconsistent but the male archers' performance was simply underwhelming in the Olympics' ranking rounds, prompting a rejig of India's mixed pair combination on a topsy-turvy day at the Yumenoshima Park on Friday.

The Koreans, who stayed away from all International competitions in the build-up to the Olympics since 2019, reigned supreme, including a top-three finish in the women's section where young sensation An San shattered a 25-year-old Olympic record.

The Indian men's team of Atanu Das, Pravin Jadhav and Tarundeep Rai, however, did not post particularly impressive scores and just about managed to sneak into top 10 in the team rankings.

Deepika slipped from fourth at the halfway mark to finish ninth with 663 points which was way below her best International ranking score of 686. "I feel my performance was good as well as bad...It was in between I would say," Deepika said.

Deepika's biggest challenge is likely to be in the last-eight where she might run into San who is making her Olympic debut. "I want to show my best performance here and I will show that in my next rounds," Deepika vowed to come back strong.

In fact, there will be Korea in waiting for the Indians in the quarterfinals of both men's team and mixed pair competition.



is accompanying the team said. In all likelihood, the Indian mixed pair team would run into top seed Korea in the quarters after overcoming eighth-ranked Chinese Taipei.

Placed in the same half as India, top seed Korea will open their main event against 16th ranked Bangladesh.

The men's trio's combined performance was just enough to finish inside top-10 as they totalled 1961 for a ninth place finish in their first Olympic appearance since London 2012.

The Indian men's team might run into top seed Korea, who got a bye into the quarters, should they beat eighth-ranked Kazakhstan in the opening round.

In individual section, Jadhav will face 34th ranked Galsan Bazarzhapov of Russia, Das will take on Deng Yu-Cheng of Chinese Taipei, while Rai's opening challenge will be against Ukrainian Oleksii Hunbin. PTI

Hockey teams start campaign

Can paddlers do the unthinkable again?



Tokyo: The Indian table tennis contingent produced an unthinkable performance at the Asian Games, considered as 'mini-Olympics' by the players. Three years down the line, can they pull off another miracle at the Tokyo Games?

Asian Games may have the presence of continental powerhouses like China, Korea and Japan but the Olympics are a different ball game altogether.

Nevertheless, India exceeded all expectations to win a men's team Bronze and mixed doubles Bronze in Jakarta, ending the country's medal drought at the Asian Games, but getting close

Tennis players need miracle to go deep

Tokyo: Indian tennis players need no less than a miraculous performance to get close to the medal rounds as an under-prepared team of Sania Mirza and debutant Ankita Raina faces a tough Ukrainian challenge in the opener while Sumit Nagal has got a tough draw in the singles competition.

Mirza, who is making a record fourth Olympic appearance, and debutant Raina are going into the Olympics without playing a single competitive match together this year, which is far from ideal preparation.

They will open their campaign against Ukraine's twin sisters Nadiia and Lyudmyla Kichenok.

In the men's singles, Nagal is extremely lucky to get an entry into the Olympics but his recent performances do not inspire confidence and he faces Asian Games champion Denis Istomin in his first round.

There is a possibility of him getting past the 34-year-old Uzbek but the Indian may next face world number two and Australian Open runner-up Daniil Medvedev from Russia and that could be end of the road for him. PTI

Rain break does the trick for SL

Colombo: India's young batsmen paid for their profligacy and inexperience as Sri Lanka's spinners made best use of a rain break to dismiss the visitors for a lowly 225 in 43.1 overs in the third and final ODI here on Friday.

With the series pocketed, India coach Rahul Dravid rejigged the bowling line-up along with a couple of changes in the batting order, but it was evident that the lack of game awareness became their undoing on the day.

The rain-break at the end of the 23rd over, which reduced the game to 47-overs per side, helped the home team. The pitch suddenly had a bit of freshness and the ball would both grip and skid, making life easier for the spinners, who rocked the middle-order.

The latest trend of young batters not being able to cope up with slow bowlers was on show as the middle-order looked clueless against left-arm spinner Praveen Jayawickrama (3/59 in 10 overs) and off-spinner Akila Dananjaya (3/44 in 10 overs), who, in his second spell, blew away the lower middle order with turn and bounce.



However, after skipper Dasun Shanaka got one to skid and trapped Shaw, Manish Pandey's (11 off 19 balls) inclusion brought about a break in momentum.

Samson was in no mood to relent but an uppish inside-out check drive was plucked by Avishka Fernando at extra-cover, like a fruit from the tree.

Post the break, when India resumed at 147 for three, the spinners suddenly started getting more turn and the rain had spiced up the pitch. PTI
