Brahmins back in focus as UP readies for polls

Jitin Prasada's entry into BJP, another Brahmin as EC may cut community ire against Yogi raj

With Assembly elections in Uttar Pradesh just seven months away, the contour of caste politics has started taking shape with focus now on Brahmins, who account for almost 10 per cent of the vote in this politically sensitive State.

Two important developments happened on Wednesday. One, former Union Minister and two-time former MP Jitin Prasada joined the BJP. Second, a retired IAS officer of 1984 batch of UP cadre Anoop Chandra Pandey joined as Election Commissioner. Both are Brahmins.

When Jitin was in the Congress, he had launched Brahmin Chetna Parishad in 2020, an umbrella organisation that had given a voice to the Brahmins in central UP. Then he talked about persecution of Brahmins in Yogi Raj. With his

joining the BJP, the saffron party can now go to the town claiming that Brahmins are still with the ruling party.

Prasada, who represented Shahjahanpur Lok Sabha Constituency in UP in 2004, joined the BJP at party headquarters here in the presence of Union Minister Piyush Goyal on Wednesday.

"I felt the party I was in was not helping and working for people. I realised I cannot work for people being in Congress party. What is relevance of staying in a party if you can't protect interests of your people or work for them. I think people in Congress who blessed me all these years but now I'll work as a dedicated BJP worker," said Prasada after joining the BJP. Anoop Chandra Pandey, on the other hand, was the Chief Secretary in Yogi's initial term and had successfully organised Investors Summit. His performance was even appreciated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

It is no longer a secret that Brahmins are upset with the BJP and Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath for dominance of Thakurs in every sphere of Government administration, particularly at lower level.

Cong refuses to learn lesson

The exit of former Union Minister Jitin Prasada, yet another tall leader of the Congress, on Wednesday, was well summed up by his erstwhile party colleague and now Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma, who noted that the grand old party as a wrecked and rudderless "Titanic" which continues to sink.

The Congress high command seems to have learned no lesson from the exit of the likes of Jyotiraditya Scindia and rebellion of Sachin Pilot. Scindia defected to the BJP and brought down the Congress Government in Madhya Pradesh while the Congress leadership remained clueless. Pilot did nearly the same, only to be persuaded to stay back. But after that the Congress leadership has done nothing to rehabilitate him. With this latest "exit" more than 50 top and prominent leaders which includes former Union Ministers, Chief Ministers, State party presidents have quit the grand old party and joined the BJP ever since the run up to the Lok Sabha elections of 2014 when the country witnessed "Modi wave".

Delta can reinfect even after full vaccine doses

Severity and death possibilities reduce after vaccination

Even if you have received both doses of Covaxin or Covishield vaccines against Covid-19, you can still get re-infected with the virus.

Blame it on the highly contagious Delta variant (B.1.617.2) of SARS-COV-2, the version first detected in India in October last year.

Separate studies by AIIMS (Delhi) and the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC), which are yet to be peer reviewed, have indicated that the Delta variant is the most common factor behind majority of "breakthrough" infections in India. However, no death has been reported among those vaccinated.

A breakthrough infection is a Covid-19 infection occurring in people who are vaccinated against the disease.

Research, including one

by British health authorities, say that Delta variant is between 40 and 50 per cent more infectious than the "Alpha" version first reported from the UK. Health experts feel there is nothing to be worried about as

vaccination reduces the severity impact as has also been shown by the study. Of the 63 cases of vaccine breakthrough infections in the study, including 36 who received full doses, not a single person succumbed to Covid-19.

WHAT IS DELTA VARIANT?

New Delhi: Scientifically termed as B.1.617.2 of the Covid-19 infections, the Delta variant refers to the merging of two mutations of a virus strain that go on to form a third, super-infectious strain. The B.1.617.2 variant contains mutations from two separate virus variants, namely E484Q and L452R, according to reports. The Delta variant is highly transmissible (50% more than alpha) and has significant immune escape properties.

sequencing and sample testing, the first case of double mutation in India was discovered in Maharashtra.

The "double mutant" virus or the "Indian variant", was officially assigned the name "Delta variant" by the World Health Organisation in order to avoid any confusion regarding the same. Hence, the first mutant virus detected in Kent, UK, is now called "Alpha", whereas the South African and Brazilian Variant are known as 'Beta' and 'Gamma' respectively.

Delta spreads to 60 countries

New Delhi: WHO's technical lead on Covid-19 Maria Van Kerkhove has said the Delta variant first found in India has now been seen in over 60 countries and is more transmissible than the alpha variant found in the UK.

In India, the Delta variant of coronavirus is said to be present in all States across the country but has infected people mostly in Delhi, Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat, Maharashtra, Odisha, and Telangana, which were the worst hit in the second wave of the deadly pandemic.

It is also said to be casting shadow over Australia's efforts to contain the infections where cases are on rise recently.

ICMR loses 31 staff, scientists to Covid

The Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), the apex body in India for the formulation, coordination and promotion of biomedical research, has lost at least 31 of its staff, including a few senior scientists and retired personnel to Covid-19.

A senior official from the ICMR said some of the employees who died during the coronavirus pandemic were associated with the research body for the past 30 years. He said these scientists and staff were posted in various posts at the ICMR's regional offices across the country.

However, it was the ICMR-NIV at Pune which was worst hit, probably because the institute was engaged in the testing of corona samples. At least seven employees from ICMR-NIV lab succumbed to virus. "These colleagues served in various capacities across ICMR and its institutes, and breathed their last during these pandemic times. They will serve as a reminder for remainder of us to strive forward and work towards a better world," said the



official. Former director of National Institute of Virology (NIV), Pune, Dr Kalyan Banerjee, passed away at a private hospital from heart-related problems and was infected with Covid-19 later. He was a fellow of the National Academy of Medical Science, Indian National Science Academy, Indian Academy of Science and National Academy of Science.

Similarly, Dr Namita Mahapatra of Scientist G grade, who was at ICMR-RMRC, Bhubaneswar, succumbed to the virus in September last year. Another scientist Dr Kiran Shrivastava, at ICMR-NJIL and OMD, Agra, in April this year lost battle to deadly virus. At least seven personnel, including AR Mendes (Sr TO), VV Petha (senior store officer), AS Lot (MTS) SN Singh (Sr LIO), Richard Disa (Sr Tech Assistant) and SS Shelke (Laboratory Assistant), all from ICMR-NIV, Pune, died due to Covid-19.

GOVT SERVANTS TO SUBMIT PROPERTY LISTS

OAS CADRES' POSTS TO BE INCREASED

A State Cabinet meeting held under the chairmanship of Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik on Wednesday took 11 major decisions relating to the Departments of Finance, Fisheries and Animal Resource Development, General Administration and Public Grievances, Works and Housing and Urban Development.

Chief Secretary Suresh Chandra Mahapatra said the Cabinet decided for construction and widening of the Biju Expressway for enhanced connectivity between western and southern Odisha to boost economic and industrial development in the regions. Besides, the Cabinet also resolved to develop the box culvert carriage road over main drain No-1

from Pattapol to Matrubhawan in Cuttack city.

An expanded 174.5-km Biju Expressway would boost trade and industrial activities as the State Government is also working on leveraging development of the expressway as a 'Biju Express Economic Corridor' through the Department of Industries.

With a total approved cost of Rs 448.02 crore, the project would be developed in EPC mode as a 4-lane carriageway and include construction of 17 minor bridges and eight major bridges.

The total length of the expressway would include 104.65 km from Ghatipada to Sinapali in Nuapada district and 69.85 km from Dharmagarh to Ampani in Kalahandi district. The Cabinet also took a decision to amend the Odisha Govt. Servants' Conduct Rules, 1959, as per which every servant is required to make a true and complete declaration of all his movable and immovable assets with their value. Earlier on

December 28, 2020, the Cabinet had decided that all Government employees and peoples' representatives are required to submit their annual property returns to the Government and the same shall be placed in the public domain for information of general public. A copy of the property statement shall also be forwarded to the Lokayukta for his information.

The provisions under the Rule-21 of the Odisha Govt. Servants' Conduct Rules, 1959 are required to be amended to implement above decision. The Cabinet also decided to increase strength of OAS posts in different cadres in view of new requirements in various departments.

While OAS Group A (JB) posts would remain unchanged, the Group A (SB) posts would be increased from 330 to 385, Super Time Scale posts from 235 to 270, Superior Administrative Grade posts from 125 to 215 and Special Secretary posts from 25 to 65.

In a bid to increase the farmers' income, the Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs on Wednesday approved an increase in minimum support prices (MSP) for various kharif crops or the summer-sown crops ranging between 50 per cent and 62 per cent for marketing season 2021-22.

The Centre has hiked paddy MSP by ₹72 to ₹1,940 per quintal for 2021-22 crop year from ₹1,868 per quintal last year. The highest absolute increase in MSP over the previous year has been recommended for sesamum

(₹452 per quintal) followed by tur and urad (₹300 per quintal each).

The MSP is the rate at which the Government buys grains from the farmers to prevent exploitation and distress sale to private traders.

The price of common grade paddy has been increased from ₹1,868 a quintal to ₹1,940 a quintal, a rise of ₹72 a quintal. For grade A the support price has been increased from

₹1,888 a quintal to ₹1,960 a quintal, again an increase of ₹72 per quintal. Paddy is the main kharif crop, the sowing of which has begun with the onset of the Southwest monsoon. The hike is in sync with the Government's plan to encourage farmers to go for coarse cereals (nutri-cereals), oilseeds and pulses in a big way. Addressing a Press briefing on Cabinet decisions, Union Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar said, "None should have any misconception about MSP."



State to lift lockdown curbs in some dists

3rd Covid wave likely in Sept-Oct: Health Director

Amidst speculation that the State Government may begin an unlocking process after June 17 as the number of daily Covid-19 cases have declined significantly, Director of Health Services Bijay Mohapatra on Wednesday informed that discussions are on to lift the lockdown restrictions in certain districts. He told mediapersons that the

Government is considering to start the unlocking process by relaxing certain restrictions in the districts where the test positivity rate (TPR) has dropped below 5 per cent.

Notably, the districts like Ganjam, Gajapati, Kandhamal, Malkangiri, Nuapada, Balangir, Subarnapur, Jharsuguda and Deogarh now come under green zone with a steady fall in the infection.

Earlier on Tuesday, Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik had also stated that the Government is considering an unlocking process in a phased manner in the districts with declining TPR. Regarding the State's preparedness for a pos-

sible third wave of Covid-19 pandemic, Mohapatra said the next wave is likely to arrive in September-October and affect children the most. "We have already started our preparations to tackle the impending situation.

Training to doctors has already begun to ensure that children, to be infected by the disease, get the best treatment at hospitals. General and ICU beds have already been put in place," he said.

However, as per AIIMS New Delhi Director Dr Randeep Guleria, children would not be affected much during the third wave, Mohapatra pointed out.

547 new infections emerge in BBSR
3 die; 1,138 recover

Bhubaneswar on Wednesday registered 547 new Covid-19 positive cases, with which the total tally in the city rose to 82,117. Out of the new cases, 447 were local contacts and 100 were quarantine cases.

The local contacts included 18 cases in Chandrasekharapur, 16 in Dumduma, 14 in Badagada, 13 in Jayadev Vihar and eight in Acharya Vihar.

Currently, the active cases stood at 6,628 in the city. Meanwhile, three more persons succumbed to the disease in the city, mounting the total death toll to 365. However, 1,138 persons recovered on the day, increasing the total recoveries to 75,103.

43 more succumb to coronavirus in State 6,019 new cases; max 796 in Khordha

Total toll mounts to 3,123

As many as 43 more patients succumbed to Covid-19 in the State in 18 districts in the last 24 hours, it was officially reported on Wednesday. With this, the total death toll surged to 3,123.

Khordha district registered the highest five casualties followed by Angul, Cuttack, Jharsuguda and Sundargarh with four each, Bargarh, Balangir, Boudh three each, Ganjam, Puri and Mayurbhan

two each and Baleswar, Dhenkanal, Kendrapada, Koraput, Nuapada, Rayagada and Sambalpur one each. Meanwhile, 6,019 persons tested positive in the State in the last 24 hours in the 30 districts and the State pool, surging the total tally to 8,25,110. Of the new cases 3,397 were detected from quarantine and 2,622 were local contacts.

Khordha district continued to register the day's maximum cases at 796 followed by Cuttack with 531, Jajpur 406, Angul 335, Mayurbhanj 333, Puri 324, Dhenkanal 291, Baleswar 286, Sundargarh 283, Bhadrak 262, Kendrapada 218,

Jagatsinghpur 196, Nayagarh 191, Nabarangpur 151, Koraput 142, Sambalpur 131, Bargarh 122, Keonjhar 120 Rayagada 108, Malkangiri 85, Boudh 79, Kandhamal 76, Ganjam 73, Kalahandi 70, Balangir 66, Subarnapur 65, Jharsuguda 41, Gajapati 34, Deogarh 24 and Nuapada 23. Besides, 157 cases were reported from the State pool. Currently, the active cases in the State stood at 71,312 and the cumulative samples tested so far were 1,23,87,968, including 68,778 on Tuesday. The State's positivity rate stood at 6.71 per cent. Till now, 7,56,641 persons have recovered from the disease in the State.

Doors still open for parleys with Centre, says Gupkar alliance

Lying dormant for over six months now, constituents of the Peoples Alliance for Gupkar Declaration (PAGD) on Wednesday woke up to assemble at the residence of Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) chief Mehbooba Mufti where they "unanimously" announced that doors have not been closed for holding parleys with the Central Government. "Remember this, we have not closed any doors. If they will invite us for talks we will take a call at that point of time.

We are not closing our doors. What we want is betterment of our people," said Chairman of the alliance Farooq Abdullah. The Peoples Alliance for Gupkar Declaration was floated by Kashmir based mainstream political parties.

EOW cracks ₹5-crore NHM fund fraud case

₹3.30 crore recovered; 2 held

In a significant breakthrough, the Economic Offences Wing (EOW) of the Crime Branch police on Wednesday cracked the case of alleged embezzlement of Rs 5-crore fund of the Subarnapur National Health Mission (NHM) by arresting two persons in this connection.

The accused were identified as Rajkishore Nayak of Bhawanipatna in Kalahandi district and Ananta Charan Pradhan of Pipili in Puri district. The duo were arrested under Sections 420, 467, 468, 471, 120 (B) of the IPC and Section 66 (C) & (D) of IT Act and forwarded to the court of Subarnapur SDJM. The case was registered on the basis of

a complaint filed by the Subarnapur CDMO. As per the FIR, an amount of Rs 5,01,50,000 was unauthorisedly diverted from the account of Zilla Swasthya Samiti, National Health Mission (ZSS, NHM) of Subarnapur on April 7, 2021 by hacking the NHM Public Financial Management System (PFMS).

During probe, the EOW ascertained that Rajkishore Nayak previously served as an Accountant on temporary basis in NHM, Subarnapur and he left the job on December 24, 2020.

Later, he was appointed temporarily as an Accountant in the Swami Vivekanand National Institute of Rehabilitation Training and Research (SVNIRTAR) at Olatpur. In March 2021, Nayak hatched a criminal conspiracy with Ananta Charan Pradhan

and others, and generated an e-cheque amounting to Rs 5,01,50,000 by unauthorisedly hacking the portal of NHM system i.e. PFMS. They manufactured duplicate seal of the Subarnapur CDMO and ADMO and put the same on the e-cheque and placed the cheque at SBI, Subarnapur for clearance.

On April 7, 2021, the amount was diverted to the account of a firm named 'NATURALS'. The mobile phone used for manufacturing the e-cheque was seized along with other incriminating articles.

Out of the siphoned amount, around Rs 3.30 crore has been freed during the investigation, so far. Earlier, Samir Kumar Pati, an employee of 'NATURALS', was arrested in this connection by the EOW.

Besides, Dr Deepak Kumar, on repatriation from Central deputation, was posted as DIGP (NR); OPS officer RK Paikray, at present DCP headquarters Bhubaneswar, was transferred as SP, Deogarh; and OPS officer DP Tripathy, at present ADCP Bhubaneswar, transferred as SRP in Cuttack.

Low pressure to drag monsoon into State

Rains likely from today

Low pressure is likely to form over north Bay of Bengal and its adjoining area by June 11. Under its influence, the southwest monsoon is likely to advance to a few places in Odisha in the next two to three days.

Several places in interior and coastal Odisha are likely to witness rains or thundershowers from Thursday under the impact of the fresh phenomenon, the Regional Centre of the Indian Meteorological Department (IMD) here said

on Wednesday. Heavy to very heavy rainfall is likely to occur in parts of the State between June 10 and 14. The coastal areas would experience wind with speeds of 40-50 kmph.

The fishermen have been warned against venturing into the sea during the period as the sea condition will be phenomenal, said IMD Regional Director HR Biswas.

The weather department also predicted rains accompanied by lightning in several places of Malkangiri, Koraput, Nabarangpur, Mayurbhanj and Nuapada districts. If favourable conditions persist, the low pressure area would intensify into a depression and then deep depression before converting into a cyclonic storm, the IMD said.

Drug store staff to get jobs on priority

As employees of the medicine shops have been working during the Covid pandemic and lockdown and shutdown, the State Government on Wednesday decided to provide them with Covid vaccine on a priority basis.

Additional Chief Secretary, Health, PK Mohapatra in a letter asked the district Collectors, Municipal Commissioners, CDMOs and PHOs to ensure vaccination of the employees of medicine shops on priority subject to availability of the vaccine.

The letter stated that employees of medicine stores aged 45 years and above would be given vaccine supplied by the Government of India whereas employees aged 18 to 44 years shall be vaccinated with state procured vaccines.

Bishnupriya shows how to detect cyclones before satellites

A team of scientists comprising Odisha-born Bishnupriya Sahoo and Jiya Albert and Prasad K Bhaskaran from IIT Kharagpur, with support from the Department of Science & Technology, Government of India under the Climate Change Programme (CCP), has devised a promising technique for early



detection of development or strengthening of tropical cyclones in the atmospheric column prior to satellite detection over the Bay of Bengal (BoB) basin. A researcher in Physical Oceanography, Sahoo

currently works as a Research Scientist at the Yantai Institute of Coastal Zone Research, China. She pursued her PhD at IIT Kharagpur in Physical Oceanography from 2014 to 2018. Sahoo had pursued her MSc in Mathematics at NIT, Rourkela and BSc and +2 Science at Rama Devi Women's Autonomous College, Bhubaneswar. Her schooling took place at the Basipitha Government High School,

Mayurbhanj. Early detection of tropical cyclones has wide socioeconomic implications. So far, remote sensing techniques have detected them the earliest. However, this detection was possible only after system developed as a well-marked low-pressure system over the warm ocean surface. A large time gap between the detection and the impact of the cyclone could help preparation activities. Prior to the formation of cyclonic system

over the warm oceanic environment, the initial atmospheric instability mechanism as well as the vortex development is triggered at higher atmospheric levels. These cyclonic eddies are prominent features in vertical atmospheric column encompassing disturbance environment with a potential to induce and develop into a well-marked cyclonic depression over warm ocean surface. They could be used for detection of

prediction of cyclones. The method developed by scientists would identify initial traces of pre-cyclonic eddy vortices in atmospheric column and track its Spatio-temporal evolution. They used coarser grid resolution of 27 km for identification and finer resolution of 9 km to evaluate characteristics of eddy vortices. The study was conducted with cases of four post-monsoon severe cyclones. Phailin (2013), Vardah (2013),

Gaja (2018), Madi (2013) and two pre-monsoon cyclones Mora (2017) and Aila (2009) that developed over North Indian Ocean. The team observed that method could bring about genesis of prediction with a minimum of four days (~ 90 h) lead time for cyclones developed during pre- and post-monsoon seasons. Initiation mechanisms of genesis of tropical cyclones occurs at upper atmospheric levels and

are also detected at higher lead time for pre-monsoon cases, unlike post-monsoon cases. The study made a comprehensive investigation on behavior of eddies in an atmospheric column for non-developing cases and compared these findings with developing cases. The technique was found to have potential for an early detection of tropical cyclogenesis in atmospheric column prior to satellite detection over ocean surface.

PCC chairperson slams Centre on Covid-19 mgmt

Pradesh Congress president Niranjan Patnaik on Wednesday slammed the Central Government for creating an unwarranted situation in the country, for which millions of people suffered and thousands died. "All these happened because of lack of vision and clear policy guidelines of the Modi Government, which even lacks sympathy to the people," said Patnaik.

He said Congress national leader Rahul Gandhi has time and again reminded the Government of the Covid-19 seriousness and about severe public health crisis in offing, but the latter didn't pay heed to it. Even, the suggestion of Gnadhi for providing free vaccine was also undermined. When millions lost jobs, small traders, businessmen and street vendors lost livelihoods, poor and marginal communities suffered food crisis, the prices of essential commodities skyrocketed and that of petroleum products reached all-time high, the Modi Government's announcement of free rice is just eyewash, said Patnaik.

The search for their own identity is an engaging pursuit of poets. In his quest, a poet traipses into many unfamiliar territories and strange experiences, but he always comes back richer and a step closer to self-discovery.


In 'Beyond Here and other Poems', Bishnupada Sethi embarks on such a journey from the here and now to beyond. The upshot of his endeavour is a hamper of beautiful and discerning nuggets of wisdom that give life its profundity and imbues it with myriad colours.

The poet is mindful that our grasp of any truth will remain fragmentary if it is explored in isolation of its opposite. Hence, death pops up again and again when the poems grapple with the meaning of life. Ruminating on the

sudden vanishing of life, the poet wonders, "The living energy/Does it ever come to a halt/Can that be extinguished/ Or dissipated?" And then, "How that only thing/ which makes you feel exist/ Vanish once for all/ Leaving no discreet link?" ("From Inside a Room of Life, Page-41"). Even while reminiscing about his romantic moments spent in the fragrance of jasmine, he begs his sweetheart to lay on him the garland he has been making as he embarks on "life's last journey" ("Garland in My Cupboard" (P42)).

While death shows up amid the celebration of life, it does not intrude as a herald of sorrow and finality. On the contrary, the living and the dead come together as fundamental parts of a cosmic whole, pointing to the soul's permanence.

In the eponymous piece, "Beyond Here", the poet declares, "I don't appear in a body/ No one judges me ugly/ I'm loved/ I'm eternal/ I'm in a blissful state (P-62)." The poet knows that his time on this earth is limited and that "with the passage of time/ I will be gone," but his soul craves, "I wish to know/ How do I connect/ to the places and people/ After I am gone." "I wish to Know (P-59)." Although the



lines obsess with mortality, the allusion is largely tangential: death is treated as only an

undeniable fact of life. However, death becomes vivid and sensory once the pandemic plays havoc with humanity with all its instruments of torture. The poet moans as a "great grief, panic and deep pain/ Seems looming all over." "Where are the Children Gone! (P-109)". He surveys the gloom that surrounds the locked-down world as people are dying in their droves. The stench of death is too overpowering to ignore.

Yet, the overarching death consciousness fails to rattle the poet's world not only because he considers death the flipside of life but also because life should be celebrated in full force.

He presents happy memories of his childhood, conjugal love, time of celebration with young ones in the family. While observing Daughter's Day, the poet exhilarates, "How lucky/ have I been/ To have a daughter/ Lively and pretty!/ She is a blessing/From the heavens." "On Daughter's Day (P-28)."

Just as the poet shuns the idea that life is confined between birth and death, he also sets aside the concept of linearity of time. In his universe, past, present and future

seesaw and take each other's place, conjuring up the essence of eternity, continuity of life and reappearance of memories. He writes, "Future is never an extrapolation/ of the present state on the passing away of a loved one." Also, "Something was to leave soon/ To be part of something else", "Quote Unusual (P-96)". In many pieces in the book, the continuity of life comes out as a dominant motif.

The essence of the father lives on in the child. The five elements that constitute our beings are shared by all, in the past and the future, "Like I'm an aggregate/ of all my forefathers."

"Till Infinity (P-104)." Besides death, separation, leaving, irrational fear and nightmares are recurring themes of the poems. But despite their preponderance, what gives succor to life is faith in the soul's indestructibility, close unity of humanity despite outward divisions and eternal bliss of the almighty. These are the 'beyond' parts. The poems, in their bite-sized pithy lines, exude a rare lyrical grace. The subjects are disparate yet fit nicely under the central theme of life and death.

Capital Hospital also to get ECMO machine

The State Government has decided to install a lifesaving Extracorporeal Membrane Oxygenation (ECMO) machine at the Capital Hospital here. The tendering process has already started and CSR funds would be utilised for the purpose, said Health Minister Naba Das on Wednesday.

Earlier, the Government had announced to set up six ECMO units at the SCB Medical College Hospital, Cuttack. The machines would be installed in the Cardiothoracic & Vascular Surgery Ward of the hospital.

There is no ECMO machine in any Government hospital in the State as yet, due to which three serious patients have already been airlifted to other States in just a week's time.

One Amrit Pradhan from Ganjam was airlifted to Chennai. Vigilance Director Debasish Panigrahi was airlifted to Kolkata on Tuesday and Abhishek Mohapatra from Bhadrak to Kolkata on Wednesday. Odisha has only two ECMO machines and these are in private hospitals, SUM and KIMS.

HITTING THE BULL'S EYE

Vaccines do work but not without appropriate behaviour

part from India, fierce new Covid-19 waves are engulfing other developing countries, placing enormous pressure on their healthcare systems. The countries are Laos, Thailand and most others bordering India in Southeast Asia, except perhaps Pakistan. Even hills states of Bhutan and Nepal are literally crying for help. The new surge is mainly due to the horrifically infective character of the virus variants coupled

with state complacency after the wane of the first wave which kind of spared these nations in a way. Lack of resources to set up healthcare facilities and procure medicines and oxygen has devastated these countries.

Only a week ago, the Laos Health Minister was at his wit's end as there was virtually nothing in hand by way of money, medical equipments and drugs. The doctors there have not been exposed to this difficult pandemic spreading at mad speed.

A 200-fold jump in infection across one month overwhelmed the best brains in Laos, Nepal and Bhutan. Thailand with a whopping 98% rise in infection has its authorities groping in absolute dark. The post-first wave India, only for turning complacent, is having nightmarish times presently. The second wave caused by what's called the 'Delta thing' has shattered India beyond imagination.

Life has just begun turning manageable because of divine desire rather than through human efforts. Though

unforgivable blunders have been committed by the Modi-headed national Government, specifically in the matter of vaccination, India is witnessing the peak having occurred and the natural wane beginning to happen.

The second wave might not have happened so furiously if only Modi had forced vaccination quite when jabs surfaced on own soil in January 2021, two of them being churned out on the home turf.

Modi, like many other politicians, imagined corona had come and gone for good. So, he got off the guard, opened the floodgates all around and let every crowd-pulling religious event happen. Even the Kumbh Mela was celebrated with pomp, ending up in Sadhus being badly infected and spreading the virus wherever they moved.

Not a single BJP super brain had ever cared to know how the US, the UK and the European Union were on bigger guard than before to contain a second wave of the pandemic. The vaccines emerged around this time, but India

rulers were hesitant and ignored vaccination. They believed more the routine contraindications and reactions that happen even when one drinks a glass of iron-heavy water. The Modi administration screamed everything had turned honky dory for India because the virus seemed to have melted away in thin air and the spiked flu virus dared not touch Indians ever again.

So, the lurking mutated virus made its kill all on a sudden the way a man-eater does on seeing a hapless, unarmed village lad. The virus spread faster than wildfire and India was kneeling under pressure soon while Israel and many Western nations were busy concluding the mass vaccination programme.

Today, Israel is completely mask-less as life is back to normal. Most parts of America and Europe are fairly back to normal as mass vaccination has brought in appreciable herd immunity. They are ready to thwart the third wave knowing full well the difficult spiked flu virus would not vanish soon enough. Now when India got

to know vaccines do work like magic, there was stamped at all empty centres to grab a jab which was not available at all. Sadly, the Government of India has seven fantastic vaccine plants across the country, the latest having been set up in Tamil Nadu around 2016 with state-of-the-art plant and sophisticated gadgetry.

Shockingly, all are gathering dust. Though it's true that no drug or therapy is one hundred-per cent efficacious anywhere in the world, vaccines that have come up are simply fantastic with a few routine efficacy issues.

The elderly consumed all the available vaccines, turned immune; and therefore, the younger lot below sixty fell prey and many among them died in the second wave. That very fact proves vaccines are efficacious enough. Only 0.03-4% has suffered mild infection.

No infected person has been put on ventilator or died unless of course he or she had other unrecognised health issues. The vaccine develops full immunity after two weeks of receiving the second dose, a

fact many people don't care to know. Medical experts have also made it clear that quite a few poorly-managed vaccine centres have been the cause of infection for many who have contracted the virus and developed Covid due mainly to uncontrolled and unruly crowd and poor hygiene at the vaccine locations.

A few recipients have become serious and a minus-cure number may have died before the desired antibodies developed in their bodies. Even after vaccination, the recipient has to maintain Covid-appropriate behaviour strictly as infection cannot be ruled out though only severe disease and death are least likely to occur.

There are few cases where some immune-compromised individuals have shown lower antibody levels post vaccination. In such cases too, the vaccine would still provide good level of protection to be able to remain away from ICUs and ward off death.

There is also talk of the third wave coming soon to ravage India for nearly one hundred days. But because most

adults will have been vaccinated in a couple of months from now, the virus will find it impossible to get a host. So, the unvaccinated infants and children under 18 years will unknowingly play host. If by any chance, governments get them vaccinated, the virus will have no host to enter and survive; it will perish.

Odisha State has proven to be incredibly smart on the Covid-prevention front. It took all known measures by garnering support from everywhere to contain the virus during the first wave.

It scored over most of the so-called advanced States like Maharashtra, Kerala, Punjab, Delhi, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu. Before the second wave struck, Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik had rightfully asked for vaccines against payment from its own dwindling coffers. But since the Prime Minister himself was blank in head himself, nothing much could be organised to provide vaccines.

Now lately, the Union Government has taken over charge to vaccinate the whole

nation. But Naveen is still on his own trying to procure vaccines from any source, internal and external. He has never allowed his people to pay a dime for the jabs. It's all free from the beginning, a policy a bit-confused Modi is now adopting to gain popularity.

Incidentally, the pan-India people's think-tank gives an impression that Modi is no match with Naveen purely because the former is guided by two forces, the political class and the bureaucratic community.

Naveen is open and clear about his choice of advisors. The vote-stealing political class for him is deadwood or wicked. They have no brains to guide heads in governance. They are only expected to move across constituencies to figure out what's ailing the masses.

The highly-skilled and sensitive bureaucrats who understand the basics and the rule-book are the fit ones to guide him on governance. Needless to say he has his carefully chosen team which only listens to his wish list and gets that organised into schemes.

8 S'garh jobseekers duped of ₹50L; 3 held

Three inter-State fraudsters were arrested and forwarded to court by the Lahunipada police on Monday evening allegedly for duping eight local youths of ₹50 lakh on the pretext of giving them jobs in railway and bank sector.

According to sources, one Chinmay Naik of Lateimundi village under Lahunipada police limits and three other youths had been trapped by a fraud group, and the miscreants had assured them to provide them jobs in railway and probationary officer jobs in bank.

The fraudsters had allegedly taken from them about Rs 33 lakh each in different phases and had not given them any employment. Finding no other alternative, Chinmay Naik and three other youths had lodged an FIR in Lahunipada police station. The Lahunipada police

after registering a case and investigating the case, nabbed one Santosh Patra of Kbalang Lamsi area under Lahunipada police limits and could come to know from him that one Tarakanta Jena alias Sahani, a native of Anandpur, Keonjhar and another Dipak Rout, a native of Mahakalapada, Kendrapada, are the masterminds of the fraud.

Later, four other youths under Lahunipada police limits lodged a complaint that they had been duped of more than Rs 17 lakh under the same pretext.

The police could come to know that Tarakanta, Dipak, Santosh and some of their associates had cheated the eight youths in the name of providing them employment and had taken more than Rs 50 lakh from them.

These fraudsters had given fake appointment letters of railway to six youths and had given fake appointment letter

on SBI letter head to two other youths for PO job, about one and a half years ago and used to collect money from them in different phases. They were also calling these youths to Kolkata and Bokaro to take training for their job.

During investigation, the police also came to know that these fraudsters had also cheated youths in Bokaro, Kolkata and in some other States in the name of giving them employment.

On Monday afternoon, Lahunipada police arrested Tarakanta, Dipak and Santosh and seized 12 mobiles from them, four fake appointment letters, railway and SBI stamp and six bank accounts.

The police forwarded them to court on Monday evening. Lahunipada police station IIC Santosh Jena said, "We are further investigating the case and the associates of these cheaters will also be arrested soon."

'Buy Rabi paddy from all registered farmers'

BJP Farmers' Union submits memo to J'suguda DM

In spite of provision for purchase of paddy in Rabi season from May 1, the State Government has initiated sale and purchase of paddy through common market system at different dates from May 15.

Due to mismanagement in paddy purchase during last Kharif season, the farmers sold their paddy at a price less by Rs 700 to Rs 800 in open market, as the Government failed to purchase their paddy. Now also, same situation is noticed in Rabi season for paddy purchase. Due to lapse of token of farmers, they are now selling paddy in open market incurring loss of Rs 1,100 to Rs 1,200 per quintal.

In this situation, a memorandum was given on Tuesday to Chief Minister through the district Collector by Jharsuguda District BJP Farmers Union president Murari Panigrahi in presence of district BJP president Mangal Sahoo and former MLA Radharani Panda. The

main demands in the memorandum were that the Government purchase paddy of all the farmers who have completed registration for selling of paddy in Rabi season; take responsibility to purchase paddy after it reaches market place without fixing the validity of the tokens and provide details of the charges to the farmers like pay loading, unloading, transportation and gunny bag charges paid by Central Government.

While the purchasing agency, RMC is getting 2% commission per quintal from the Government, the PACS have stock of crores of rupees. But, unfortunately, these agencies are not making permanent arrangement to keep paddy in the market yard for which farmers are incurring heavy losses every year.

Farmers are suffering due to deductions like "Katni" and "Chhatni" for which the Government should take strong action against millers. The district administration should be given power to distribute tokens. In case, the Government does not take immediate steps to fulfil these demands, a State level agitation will be launched by union members said.

A couple was killed and three other persons sustained grievous injuries when the car by which they were travelling rammed into a roadside tree at

Chari Chhak under the Purunacuttack police station in Boudh district on Wednesday morning. One of the deceased was identified as Surendra Nayak. The deceased were residents of Belaguntha in Ganjam district.

The injured were initially rushed to the Purunacuttack hospital and later shifted to the District Headquarters Hospital (DHH) after their health condition worsened. The mishap occurred when Surendra along with his wife and three relatives was on his way from Brahmapur in Ganjam district to Rourkela in Sundargarh dis-

trict when the driver lost control over the wheels and the car hit a roadside tree. The couple died on the spot.

Fire Services personnel rushed the spot after receiving the information and rescued the injured from the badly mangled vehicle. The Purunacuttack police also reached the spot and sent the dead bodies for postmortem.

Police have also started an investigation to ascertain the exact reason behind the mishap. It is suspected that the driver of the car might have dozed off which led to the accident, said sources.

'Coastal Odisha needs disaster-resilient housing'

As long-term measure to tackle storms

As a long-term measure in the disaster prone areas, building a disaster resilient housing is the need the hour, said Special Relief Commissioner PK Jena.

He also stressed the need for a housing support service hub in the all disaster affected blocks of the State.

The hub can provide technical assistance, ensure credit linkage from the banks and microfinance institutions and undertake reskilling of the construction workers and experts such as masons and engineering professional. Principal

Secretary, Finance Ashok K Meena opined that, "A strong movement is necessary to sensitise people on safety aspects during house construction and integrate sanitation and rain water harvesting structure, wherever possible."

Interest subvention could be an incentive for Government to consider for constructing a disaster resilient house." He called upon the financial institutions including the microfinance sector to play a major role through innovative products for the affordable housing.

Chairman ICC Odisha State Council JB Pany urged the corporate and industry leaders to join the disaster resilient

housing movement in the State. He focused on the need for using the local building materials in the rural areas. Convener CSR and Sustainability Committee, ICC Odisha State Council Jagadanda emphasised the need for a social movement on 'Kucha to Pucca' housing.

He urged the Government and industry leader to consider housing from a dignity prospective, in addition to safety and security.

He also urged the civil society organisations of the State to undertake social mobilisation at the ground zero to motivate people to join the movement keeping community at the centre.

K'put tribals fetch better price for turmeric

Thanks to support by IFFCO Kisan B'lore

In a first of its kind of facilitation, market linkage has come as a boon for tribal turmeric farmers of Laxmipur block in Koraput. With ORMAS through KAPCO, the farmers sold about 21 metric tonne (MT) of turmeric to Indian Farmers Fertilizer

Cooperative Limited (IFFCO) Kisan's Bangalore unit at Rs 9,200 a quintal on Saturday. Earlier, turmeric was sold to local traders at Rs 8,000 a quintal.

The district chapter of ORMAS engaged one self help group (SHG) and six farmer producer groups to procure turmeric from tribals, facilitated to market the produce through IFFCO Kisan, a cooperative society in Bangalore and helped sell 21 MT. Tribal farmers of Champi, Timajhola,

Koapadi, Lachamani, Toyaput and Pipalpadar produce good quality turmeric every year and sell it to local traders at throwaway prices. With the aid coming in, the tribals are now hopeful to reap benefit every year.

Koraput ORMAS chapter officer R Kartik said turmeric worth Rs 18.86 lakh was sold to IFFCO Kisan.

"Earlier tribals were selling turmeric at Rs 75 to Rs 80 per kg to local traders but they sold the produce at Rs 92 a kg

through ORMAS," said Kartik. He added, "According to a research our turmeric are having 5-6% of cucumin which can be used for medicine. So demand of our turmeric will increase in future. The district administration also played a key role in the marketing process."

Earlier eight hillbroom producer groups were formed at Semliguda, Potangi, Naryanpatna Block and financial support of Rs 2.04 lakh to each group was given and also

they were tained on value addition on hillbroom with plastic

and steel pipe which has created a record sale.



'Roll back K'kote Varsity amalgamation order'

Rename it Biju Patnaik University of Intensive Research

Noted Documentary film producer and advocate Kumuda Prasad Acharya in a statement strongly protested the State Government's recent action in amalgamating the six years old prestigious Khallikote University with the Berhampur University.

Due to this amalgamation, the people of Southern Odisha in general and the

people of Ganjam district in particular not only lost a university from their soil, but also the move has downscaled and undermined the growth of higher education in the region, he said.

Moreover, this university has six most demanding professional courses with an excellent team of faculty and was running very well since last half a decade.

Within a short span of time, the university could acclaim recognition both at national and international level for its quality research and work of several research projects carried out by different faculty members worth crores of rupees, he informed.

According to information available, the Government reportedly at the behest of someone deliberately stopped the construction work of the university's own new building on a patch of land allotted by the district revenue authority near Kanishi 10 months back.

This shows how some people have hatched a well planned conspiracy for about a year to abolish the university, he alleged.

He further suggested the State Government to desist from the move and instead of amalgamating the Khallikote University with Berhampur University, rename the university as "Biju Patnaik University of Intensive

As per the report filed by the BJP to the Election Commission of India, the party received ₹785.77 crore in donations/contributions above ₹20,000. At an individual level, Arunachal Pradesh Chief Minister Pema Khandu was the politician with the highest contribution to the BJP's kitty with ₹1.11 crore.

As for BJP's one-time NDA ally Shiv Sena, it received only ₹18.61 crore while the All India Trinamool Congress (AITC) got just ₹8.08 crore

during the period.

Political parties are required to declare donations above ₹20,000 every financial year received by them from any source under the provisions of The Representation of the People Act.

The treasurer of every party has to present a report on political donations exceeding Rs 20,000. Political parties are required to furnish the name, address and PAN of the donor along with information about mode of payment and amount contributed by each donor to the Election Commission.

As per the report, the highest donation to the BJP came from Prudent Electoral Trusts which donated ₹208.25 crore. The other donors were

ITC Limited ₹55 crore; New Democratic Electoral Trust ₹30 crore; Oasis Realty ₹20 crore; Lodha Developers ₹14.55 crore; ITC Infotech India ₹12.80 crore; Triumph Electoral Trust Rs 10 crore; AB General Electoral Trust ₹9 crore; BG Shirke Construction Technology ₹5.15 crore; Jankalyan Electoral Trust ₹6.15 crore; Harmony Electoral Trusts ₹5.50 crore; ILABS Hyderabad ₹5 crore; Megha Engineering & Infrastructure Limited Rs 5 crore Muthoot Finance Limited Rs 4 crore; Paradeep Phosphates Ltd Rs 3.5 crore; Kalyan Jewellers India Ltd Rs 3 crore; Hero Cycle Limited Rs 2.5 crore; Motilal Oswal Financial Service Ltd Rs 2.5 crore; Mewar University Rs 2 crore;

Janhit Electoral Trust Rs 2 crore; Samaj Electoral Trust Rs one crore; Janam Multimedia Ltd Rs one crore and Haldiram Snacks Rs 30 lakh.

Former union minister Rajyavardhan Singh Rathore donated Rs 3 lakh while former Chhattisgarh Chief Minister Dr Raman Singh contributed Rs 1.20 lakh to the BJP. Security forces hunt for 100 foreign terrorists in Valley

The 750-km-long Line of Control (LOC) in Jammu and Kashmir may be silent for the last more than three months due to the ongoing ceasefire between India and Pakistan but the security forces are hunting for nearly 100 foreign militants who are lying low to avoid the dragnet and planning to launch major attacks in the Union Territory.

Coupled with this, militants have started moving from one terrorist camp to another across the LOC indicating the Pakistan Army and the Inter Services Intelligence (ISI) are getting active again. There are more than 40 terror camps located close to the border in Pakistan Occupied Kashmir (POK).

Flagging these two developments, sources in the security establishment said here on Wednesday that the recent activities in the terrorist camps indicate that despite the ceasefire, the terrorist infrastructure is intact.

India and Pakistan mutually agreed to observe ceasefire on the LOC on February 25 and both sides have not fired a single shot since then. Moreover,



no infiltration bids from across the LOC were detected so far, they said.

Earlier, the summer months used to be the busiest for security forces as militants lodged in the launch pads tried to sneak into Kashmir after the mountain passes opened up due to the melting of snow. The Pakistan Army provided covering fire to the militants to enable them to infiltrate.

Sources said the highly-trained and battle-hardened foreign militants are now hiding in North Kashmir. Intelligence about them has dried up as they are refraining from moving about to avoid any leak or detection.

In all, there are more than 230 militants including foreigners now present in Kashmir. The anti-insurgency grid

including the army, Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) and the local police is spreading its net to neutralize the foreign ultras.

The focus of the drive is in South and North Kashmir. As regards activities in terrorist camps in POK, officials said reports from across the LOC in Poonch sector indicate the ultras have resumed weapons and basic infantry field craft training. It had stopped for some weeks after the ceasefire and its resumption is a matter of concern, they said.

Besides these developments, the law and order machinery is also keeping a close watch on the trend of locals joining the terrorist 'tanzems (organisations)'. So far, 50 to 55 youth have jumped

the fence this year, sources said.

Though this figure is the lowest as compared to last two to three years, officials said more efforts are required to wean away the young men from the path of violence. The highest figure of 214 was noticed in 2018 while 140 local youth joined militant ranks in 2019 and more than 130 last year.

Agreeing to adhere to the ceasefire announced by then Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee in 2003, a joint statement issued by both the countries on February 25 said the two armies will observe all agreements on ceasefire along the 750-km long LOC and other sectors, according to a joint statement issued on Thursday.

There were 5,133 ceasefire violations last year in which 22 civilians were killed and 71 injured on the Indian side. Moreover, 24 security personnel were also killed in the firing while 126 were wounded. Moreover, nearly 300 incidents of ceasefire violation were recorded till January end this year.

Don't share jab stocks at public forum, States told

The Centre has written to the States and Union Territories, advising them not to share the data of the Electronic Vaccine Intelligence Network (eVIN) system on vaccine stocks and the temperature of vaccine storage at public forums, and stating that it is a "sensitive information and to be used only for programme improvement".

In a recent letter to the states, the Union Health Ministry said the Centre, with support from the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), has rolled out the eVIN system under UIP, which is used to track the vaccine stock status and the temperature at all levels of vaccine storage, from national to the sub-district level.

In the letter, the Ministry said it was overwhelming to see that all the states are using the system to update the stock



and transactions of Covid vaccines on a daily basis.

"In this regard, please be advised that data and analytics generated by eVIN for inventory and temperature is owned by the Ministry of Health and not to be shared with any other organisation, partner agency, media agency, online and offline public forums without the consent of

the ministry.

"This is very sensitive information and to be used only for programme improvement," said the letter written by Pradeep Halder, Advisor, Reproductive and Child Health (RCH) to all mission directors of the National Health Mission in all the states and Union territories.

Desi 2-DG priced ₹990 per sachet

Just like Covaxin and Jcovishield, the indigenously-developed drug, 2-deoxy-D-glucose (2-DG), for management of coronavirus would not come cheap either. The 2-DG has been priced at a steep ₹990 per sachet.

The drug has been developed by scientists at the Institute of Nuclear Medicine and Allied Sciences (INMAS), a DRDO lab, and is being commercialised by pharma major Dr Reddy's Laboratories. It was considered to be homemade and hence, was anticipated to be affordable.

Dr Reddy's had last month issued a statement saying that the pricing of the drug was "being determined with a view to making it accessible and affordable to as many patients as possible".

The price was announced by Deepak Sapra, CEO, API & Services, Dr Reddy's Laboratories who said: "The goal at Dr Reddy's is to max-

imise production and make it accessible as much as possible to patients all over the country in as short a time frame as possible."

The Government on Tuesday capped the price per dose to be charged by private hospitals for Covid-19 vaccines. Covishield will be available at ₹780 while Covaxin at ₹1,410 and one will have to shell out ₹1,145 for the Sputnik jabs.

This includes the vax price, service charge of ₹150 and GST of 5 per cent.

For its part, the DRDO has now invited the Indian pharmaceutical industry to produce it after the technology is transferred to the selected companies.

Giving details, officials said the government has called for Expression of Interest from the industry to manufacture 2-DG.

Tomar: Govt ready to talk with protesting kisan

Union Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar on Wednesday reiterated that the Government is ready to talk with the protesting farmers but yet again asked their unions to come up with logical objections to the provisions of the three farm laws.

"All political parties of the country wanted to bring the farm laws, but they could not gather courage to bring them. The Modi government took this big step in the interest of farmers and brought reforms. Farmers got the benefit of that in several parts of the country. But in the meantime farmers' agitation started," Tomar said at the Cabinet briefing.

He said the Government held 11 rounds of talks with farmers and Unions were asked about their objections in the laws and which provisions they think were against farmers. "But neither the leader of any political party gave its answer in the House (Parliament) nor any farmers' leader, and the talks did not move forward". The minister said that the government is committed towards farmers and it also respects farmers.

"So, whenever farmers want discussions, Government of India will be ready for discussion. But we have repeatedly asked them to tell the objections in the provisions with logic. We will listen and find a solution," Tomar said. The government and unions have held 11 rounds of talks, the last being on January 26, to break the deadlock and end the farmers' protest. Talks have not resumed following widespread violence during a tractor rally by protesting farmers on January 26.

Reacting on Tomar's statement, the farmers' leaders said that the government's attitude is unjustifiable and unreasonable, and is resting on ego and optics-games. Condemning the government's approach, the farmers leaders said that the farmer agitation is going to completely nearly 200 days of protests at Delhi's Borders and 502 farmers have sacrificed their lives in the movement.

CBI books G'gram-Delhi-based firm for cheating Yes Bank

The CBI has booked Delhi and Gurugram-based Avantha Group and Oyster Buildwell promoted by Gautam Thapar and conducted searches on Wednesday at the premises of the directors and promoters of these firms in a case of defrauding the Yes Bank to the tune of ₹466.51 crore.

The firms allegedly availed a term loan facility of Rs 515 crore from Yes Bank Limited in December, 2017. The loan amount was declared as NPA on October 30, 2019.

"Further, the borrower was allegedly declared 'Red Flagged Account' on March 6, 2020 on the basis of Early Warning Signals (EWS). It was also alleged that the accused including the said private company and its holding company, its directors/promoters and others committed breach of trust, cheating, criminal conspiracy, forgery for diversion/misap-

propriation of the public money during the period from 2017 to 2019, thereby causing loss to the tune of Rs 466.51 crore to Yes Bank," the CBI said in a statement.

Searches were conducted at 14 locations including at Delhi/NCR, Lucknow, Secunderabad and Kolkata which led to recovery of incriminating documents/digital evidence, it said adding investigation is continuing.

Besides Oyster Buildwell Pvt. Ltd. and its holding company Avantha Realty Ltd., its directors/promoters like Raghuraj Kumar Sharma, Rajendra Kumar Mangal, Tapsi Mahajan, Gautam Thapar and unknown officials of private companies/bank have been named as accused in the case. Unknown officials of Jhabua Power Investment Ltd., Jhabua Power Ltd., Avantha Ltd. and Avantha Power and Infrastructure Ltd. have been listed as accused in the FIR.

Suvendu meets PM, appraises him of post-poll violence in Bengal

Leader of Opposition in the West Bengal Assembly and BJP MLA from Nandigram Suvendu Adhikari on Wednesday met Prime Minister Narendra Modi at his official residence here and apprised him of the alleged post-Assembly-election violence against BJP workers in the State.

His meeting also comes against the backdrop of many

former TMC leaders and workers, who had switched over to the BJP before the polls, now planning to do a 'ghar wapsi' to their old party.

The BJP MLA informed Modi about the current political situation in the state and the post-poll atmosphere of 'fear' in the state, apprehensions of the BJP workers and their 'migration' to Assam.

"I met PM Modi, JP Nadda and briefed them on the current situation in West Bengal.



More than 40 BJP workers were murdered in the state. This violence in the State should end," he said. Adhikari, who defeated State Chief Minister Mamata



Banerjee from the prestigious Nandigram constituency, had a day before also met union home minister Amit Shah and BJP president J P Nadda and several other Union Ministers and BJP leaders from Bengal.

He has been visiting the Capital for the first time after the West Bengal assembly

elections and subsequent violence allegedly against the BJP supporters.

The West Bengal government on May 25 informed the Supreme Court about the arrest of three people in connection with the alleged killing of two BJP workers on May 2 in the state.

IISc now world's top research varsity

The Indian Institute of Science (IISc), Bengaluru, has been ranked the "world's top research university" as per the prestigious Quacquarelli Symonds (QS) World Rankings 2022. It has also been judged the third best institution in India with IIT Bombay and Delhi occupying the first and second positions, respectively. The three Indian institutions

have made it among the top 200 in the world.

"According to the Citations Per Faculty (CPF) indicator, when universities are adjusted for faculty size (the size of the institution is taken into account for calculating the CPF), IISc Bangalore is the world's top research university, achieving a perfect score of 100/100 for this metric," a press statement issued by QS stated.

Though IIT Bombay has

maintained its position as the top Indian institution in the QS ranking for the fourth consecutive year now, at the global level it ranks a joint-177, having fallen five places over the past year. IIT Delhi has become India's second-best university, having risen from 193rd rank in last year's ranking to 185 in the latest ranking. "It has overtaken IISc Bangalore, which ranks joint-186 in the world," the press statement mentioned.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated those figuring in the top-200 positions and said efforts are underway to ensure more universities and institutions of India scale global excellence and support intellectual prowess among the youth.

Union Education Minister Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank' congratulated IIT Bombay, IIT Delhi and IISc Bengaluru for securing the positions in universities rankings. Pokhriyal said that India is taking a leap in the field of Education and Research and is emerging as a Vishwaguru. "We are equally proud to have a Guru like Prime Minister Narendra Modi who has constantly been thinking about the welfare of students, faculty staff and all other stakeholders associated with the Indian Education sector," Nishank said in a statement.

The other Indian institutes that have made it to the top 500 in the ranking are IIT Madras,

which has improved 20 places from its last year rank and now ranks in the 255 bracket. IIT Kanpur, Kharagpur, Guwahati and Roorkee are the other institutes in the 500 bracket, in that order.

Delhi University is in the 501-510 bracket, while Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) has for the first time been ranked in the top 600 bracket in QS World Rankings. Thirty-five Indian institutions have found a place in the QS rank this year.

The top three institutions globally are Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), University of Oxford and Stanford University respectively.

Ashwin Fernandes, Regional Director for QS Intelligence Unit in Middle East, North Africa & South Asia, said that this is the first time that any Indian institute has scored a 100 in research or any other parameter.

Making every effort to abide by new IT rules, says Twitter

Having been served a final warning, Twitter on Wednesday said it is making every effort to comply with the new IT rules which came into force last month and has shared a progress report with the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY), wherein it is said to have cited the pandemic-induced constraints for the delay on its part.

According to sources, in its progress report to the MeitY, Twitter has stated that it is in advanced stages of finalising a chief compliance officer as per the new IT

rules and additional details will be submitted to the government within a week. Twitter in its reply to the final notice of the government dated June 5, said that it is making all efforts to comply with the new guidelines but has been unable to do so because of the global impact of COVID-19 pandemic.

"...We are in advanced stages of finalising the appointment of the role of chief compliance officer and we plan to provide additional details to you in the next several days, and at the latest within a week," Twitter said. Source said, the letter was sent on June 7 to the Ministry.

Mamata wants a 'union of States' against Centre

Didi meets Tikait, backs farm laws repeal

Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee on Wednesday called upon all the States to form a "union of states" to counter central harassment and linked it to a credible unity of opposition parties in order to get rid of the Narendra Modi Government. The Chief Minister who met Bharatiya Kisan Union leader Rakesh Tikait at State secretariat Nabanna in Kolkata said a time had come when "there should be a union of the States in order to save the federal structure of the country ... so that whenever a state gov-

ernment is harassed by the Centre all the states can stand behind that state and take on the central government."

This was "necessary to save the federal structure of the country which is threatened by the incidents that are taking place for the past several years," Banerjee said, throwing her weight behind the BKU which has been fighting against the Centre for the repealing of new farm laws that would in the final run "lead to complete corporatization of agriculture and impoverishment of peasants." Apart from Banerjee her senior party colleague and former Union Minister Yashwant Sinha --- as former BJP leader --- too met the delegation led by Tikait.

"The farmers, youth and workers of the country are under threat ... their future is

in danger ... it is an urgent need to throw out the Black (farm) laws along with its creator the BJP Government," Banerjee said.

On whether she would like to lead the larger unity of opposition parties or for that matter the UPA against the BJP, Banerjee skirted the issue saying "I only want to remove the Government this ... I only want to remove Narendra Modi ... they are torturing the entire country for the past several years... my full support is for Tikait ji and the farm leaders and I will call upon him to unite all the farmers of UP, Punjab, Haryana and the country against Modi Government ... my support is fully with him."

There has been a buzz in the social media circles and also in the Trinamool Congress

about Banerjee's prime ministerial plans. In fact the elevation of her nephew Abhishek Banerjee as the national party general secretary is considered a step towards taking TMC to other States and preparing the junior Banerjee for the Bengal masnad.

Attacking New Delhi for its insensitive approach towards the farmers' cause she said, "For the last 7 months, they (Centre) didn't bother to speak to farmers. I demand that all three farm laws are withdrawn," reminding how her Government had earlier "passed the resolution against the farm laws. We are with farmers, with their movement until their demands are met."

Alleging that the GST was being levied though the industries were suffering, Banerjee said "even medicines and vac-

cines are not being spared from GST."

In return Tikait lauded Banerjee for standing firmly behind the farmers. "The Chief Minister assured us that she will continue to support the farmers' movement. We thank her for this assurance. West Bengal should work as a model state and farmers should be given more benefits," he said.

On whether he had faith in Banerjee's ability to lead the country the farm leader said "she has saved Bengal from BJP now I will request her to take a lead in saving India from this party as they are against the interests of the farmer, poor and workers," adding his party would make a coordination team to fight off the black laws. "Mamata didi has supported our idea of a joint fight," he maintained.

Kerala to see re-energised Cong under Sudhakaran

Kerala will soon see a rebooted and re-energised Congress party striving hard to regain its lost vitality and strength. The target set for the newly appointed Pradesh Congress Committee president K Sudhakaran is the 2024 Lok Sabha and 2026 legislative Assembly elections.

A day after the appointment of Sudhakaran as the State Chief of the Congress, the party high command decided to disband the entire organizational set up from the State to the block level in Kerala. Three working presidents have been appointed to help Sudhakaran in his mission to revive the

party. Former Union Minister of State Suresh Kodikkunnil, P T Thomas MLA and T Siddique (who was kind enough to hand over the Wynadu Lok Sabha seat to former AICC chief Rahul Gandhi during the 2019 Lok Sabha election) are the new working presidents of the KPCC.

Sources close to Sudhakaran said that he has been given a blank cheque for rebuilding the party. The sources said that the days of Oommen Chandi and Ramesh Chennithala are over as far as the KPCC is concerned. Chandi (78) is not in the best of health and it is doubtful whether he would be actively campaign during the 2024 Lok Sabha elec-

tion when he would be on the wrong side of 80.

The new look organizational team would be selected from the youth and those who are below the age of 50, if the indications from Tariq Anwar, the representative of the Congress High Command is any indication. Anwar who interacted with all party MLAs, MPs and office bearers of the party is believed to have told the High Command that groupism and quota system had damaged the good will enjoyed by the party in the State. "There are many elements occurring in party posts only because of the family lineage and this would soon be a thing of the past," said an aide to Sudhakaran.

Ladakh L-G reserves Subordinate Services for residents of UT

Fulfilling the long pending demand of the people of Ladakh region, Lt Governor Ladakh RK Mathur has reserved all types of Subordinate Services for the "Residents of UT". Significantly, rules to define the criteria of such locals are yet to be framed.

According to the Union Territory of Ladakh Employment (Subordinate) Service Recruitment Rules, 2021, notified by the UT Administration, "No person shall be qualified for appointment to the Service unless the person is a Resident of Union Territory of Ladakh".

Welcoming the announcement Chief Executive Councilor, Ladakh Autonomous Hill Development Council-Kargil, Feroz Ahmed Khan said, It has been our demand since the bifurcation of J&K almost two years ago. It's a welcome move. He, however, added the order has come very late as many

unemployed youths have crossed the upper age limit in the past two years. "We will also demand relaxation in the age bar for fresh recruitments.

According to the notification this rule shall not apply to persons allotted service in UT of Ladakh under the provisions of section 89(2) of Jammu and Kashmir Re-organization Act 2019, or such Rules as may be prescribed by the Administration.

These Rules shall come into force from the date of their publication in the Official Gazette and from the date of commencement of these Rules, Union Territory of Ladakh Employment (Subordinate) Service shall be constituted.

As per the Rules, appointment to the Service shall be made by direct recruitment or by promotion, failing which by absorption. The competent authority to appoint a person to the Service by absorption shall be the Administration.

2 dreaded Punjab gangsters killed in Kolkata shootout

Kolkata: Two dreaded gangsters from Punjab Jaipal Bhullar and Jaspreet Kharar were on Wednesday killed in an encounter at the plush residential complex of New Town, north-east of Kolkata.

A team of Special Task Force raided the up market premises where the duo were hiding for the past more than three weeks, sources said adding "as soon as the police entered the area they were received with gunshots in which an inspector KM Ghosh was injured... the STF commandos retaliated in which they were killed."

Son of a police officer Bhullar had 40 cases --- including murder,

extortion, robbery, kidnapping, drug-racketing, arms-smuggling etc --- registered against his name. He had fled Punjab after shooting dead two assistant sub-inspectors and Jagraon. He was wanted in Punjab, Rajasthan, Haryana and Himachal Pradesh, police said adding they carried a bounty of Rs 10 lakh on them announced by Punjab Police.

The police got information of their presence in the area following seizures of truck loads of explosives and sophisticated weapons from Siuri in Birbhum district and another arms haul at Baidyabati in Hooghly district, sources said. PNS

Kerala logs 16,204 new cases, 156 fatalities

There is no respite for Kerala from the Covid-19 as the State logged 16,204 new cases and 156 deaths on Wednesday, according to the Department of Health, Government of Kerala. Health officials tested 1.15 lakh samples on Wednesday.

The end of the day saw 1.39 lakh patients undergoing treatment in various hospitals across the State. A senior Government physician told The Pioneer that most district general hospitals and taluk head quarters hospitals reported full capacity by Wednesday.

"Situation is grave in Kerala because the figures thrown out daily after the RT-PCR tests are inconsistent. There is no uniformity in the number of persons testing positive or in the fluctuation in TPR, a measure than indicates the real status," he said.

The doctor also added that the situation is unlikely to see any change before July 31. "All we can hope is that the number of daily positive cases remain static or stable if not lessening," he said. Ernakulam with 1972 new cases topped the table of districts with highest number of new cases. Malappuram with 1685 cases continued to be a problematic district despite the efforts of the administration to bring down the number of cases.

Karnataka may opt to unlock in 4 to 5 phases: Minister

Bengaluru: Karnataka Revenue Minister R Ashoka on Wednesday indicated that the state may go for unlocking in four to five phases after June 14, as the Covid-19 induced lockdown comes to an end.

"Keeping the number of deaths and new cases in mind and aimed at bringing down the Covid infections further, lockdown will not be relaxed at one go. Home Minister Basavaraj Bommai, Health Minister K Sudhakar and I have held detailed discussions with the Chief Minister in this regard," Ashoka said.

Speaking to reporters here, he said lockdown will be relaxed in phases, most probably it may be done in four to five phases.

"First will be timings, now the relaxation (for shopping) that is there between 6 to 10 am, it may get extended further. Also those who go for a walk at parks may get some relief. All this is subjected to a final decision by the Chief Minister. Lockdown will not be relaxed at one go," he added.

Chief Minister B S Yediyurappa is likely to call a meeting of Ministers, officials and experts on June 11 or 12, to discuss and take a decision on the unlocking process.

The State Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), comprising experts, is also said to have recommended a gradual unlocking of activities in the state. PTI

Bharat Biotech expects peer review of Covaxin's Phase 3 trial data in Q4 2021

Bharat Biotech, which is yet to publish the data of its Covid-19 vaccine Covaxin phase-3, expects a peer review of the job in two to four months after it was given to scientific journals, Raches Ella Project Lead Covid-19 Vaccines at Bharat Biotech said on Wednesday.

In a series of tweets, Ella said there were nine publications on Covaxin so far and the efficacy paper of phase-3 trials would be the tenth one.

To remain unbiased, Bharat/ICMR cannot access any data. Our service provider IQVIA has started the final statistical analysis. After submitting efficacy and 2 months of safety to CDSCO (July), it is expected to instantly reach a pre-print server. Peer review takes 2-4 months, he tweeted.

According to his tweet, as many as 25,800 participants took part in phase-3 trials and there were 30 separate forms pertaining to each volunteer amounting to individual data points of 70.4 lakh.

"The last participant (participant #25,800) received the second dose in mid-March, add two months (based on CDSCO/FDA requirements for 2-months post-dose-2 safety follow-up), and we are in mid-May with sufficient data for quality checks and analysis, he said in another tweet.

Showers cripple normal life in Mumbai Metro gets entire June's quota of rain in a single day

The south-west monsoon arrived in the country's commercial capital and the neighbouring satellite townships in Mumbai Metropolitan Region (MMR) with a bang on Wednesday, inundating the low-lying areas, paralysing the road and train traffic and crippling normal life in the metropol-

is. Mumbaiers woke up to the incessant lash of heavy rains which began late on Tuesday night and continued all through Wednesday --- a feature that they have been used to witnessing for years on end on the day of the arrival of the monsoon.

The high intensity and quantum of downpour could be gauged by the fact that the city registered a record rainfall for a day in June --- 280.2 mm rain in the city suburbs and 123 mm in the Island city, during the past 24 hour.

Between 8.30 am and 8.30 pm on Wednesday, the Island city received 102.29 mm, while the eastern and western suburbs recorded 169.17 mm and 137.33 mm respectively.

While most low-lying areas of Mumbai lay under thick sheets of water, the neighbouring satellite townships of Thane, Palghar, Navi Mumbai and Kalyan-Dombivli --- all of which fall under separate municipal corporations --- bore the brunt of the first first bout of rain during the

current monsoon.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has forecast "heavy to very heavy rains" accompanied by thunderstorms till June 13 in Mumbai, Thane and other districts of Palghar, Raigad, Ratnagiri and Sindhudurg in the coastal Konkan region.

It has also forecast heavy rain in other parts of Maharashtra. Like it happens during the monsoon months, several roads in Mumbai and suburbs were flooded.

Similarly, suburban trains on the Western Railway, the main and harbour lines of the Central Railway --- considered the lifelines of Mumbai and its suburbs --- were badly affected.

However, in what came as a blessing in disguise was that the trains were not operating to their full capacity, as a majority of Mumbaiers are confined to their homes owing

to the near lockdown restrictions, while a Central Railway spokesperson said that owing to water-logging near Chunabhatti station all services on the Harbour Line between Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Terminus and Vashi (Navi Mumbai) remained suspended in the morning.

Similarly, owing to intense flooding on tracks near Kurla, the mainline services on the Central Railway between Thane-CSMT had to be suspended. However, the CR operated shuttles between Thane-Karjat, Thane-Kasara and Vashi-Panvel sectors.

According to a Western Railway spokesperson, the water-logging of tracks near Wadala station resulted in the indefinite suspension of all-harbour line trains on the Andheri-CSMT routes. The Railway authorities deployed water pumps to drain out the

excess water from the railway tracks. Maharashtra Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray --- who has been warning the people for the past three days about the impending heavy rains in Mumbai and neighbouring areas --- visited the Disaster Management Centre of the Birhanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) along with Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar and took stock of the rain situation in the metropolis with Mumbai Mayor Kishori Pednekar and Municipal Commissioner I S Chahal, and other senior officials.

Meanwhile, the flight operations at Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport (CSMIA) remained normal during the day, but the inclement weather conditions resulted in "go-around" for at least four flight.

As it normally happens during the heavy rains, heavy inundation was witnessed at Sion, Kings Circle, Wadala, Dadar, Matunga, Kalachowky, Kurla, Mankhurd, while the subways at Andheri, Khar, Malad and Santacruz were flooded and remained out of bounds for traffic all through the day.

Traffic snarls were witnessed on the stretches of the Eastern Express Highway, Western Express Highway, major roads like S. V. Road in the west suburbs and LBS Marg in the east suburbs remained flooded.

5 MHz spectrum in 700 MHz to be allocated to Indian Railways: Centre

New Delhi: In a major technical advancement towards improving safety of passengers on trains, the Centre on Wednesday approved the allocation of 5 MHz spectrum in the 700 MHz band to Indian Railways for a greater precision in the national transporter's communication and signalling systems entailing an investment of ₹25,000 crore.

With this spectrum, Indian Railways has envisaged providing LTE-based mobile train radio communication on its route and the project will be completed in the next five years.

The decision was taken in the Cabinet meeting chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi. Briefing about the Cabinet decisions, Union Information and Broadcasting Minister Prakash Javadekar said

railways currently relies on optical fibre for its communication network but with the allocation of fresh spectrum, it will be able to use high-speed radio on a real-time basis.

It will help in augmenting both communication and signalling networks of the railways, Javadekar outlined.

In its statement, the Indian Railways said, "It brings a strategic shift in Railways' operations and maintenance regime. It will help in improving the safety and increasing the line capacity to accommodate more trains using the existing infrastructure. The modern rail network will result in reduced transportation cost and higher efficiency. Also, it will attract multinational industries to set up manufacturing units to fulfil the 'Make in India' mission and gener-

ate employment."

In addition, Indian Railways has approved an indigenously developed automatic Train Collision Avoidance System.

The purpose of LTE (Long Term Evolution) for Indian Railways is to provide secure and reliable voice, video and data communication services for operational, safety and security applications.

It will be used for modern signalling and train protection systems and ensure seamless communication between loco pilots and guards. It will also enable Internet of Things (IoT) based remote asset monitoring especially of coaches, wagons & locos, and live video feed of CCTV cameras in the train coaches to ensure efficient, safer and faster train operations, the Railways said. PNS

Centre resumes action in gold smuggling case

The gold smuggling through diplomatic baggage case which has been in the cold storage for the last six months returned to hog national limelight on Wednesday morning as a team of officials from the National Investigation Agency's (NIA) Kochi office took into custody 36-year-old Mohammed Manzoor from Kochi International Airport on early Wednesday morning.

Manzoor, hailing from Kozhikode district had returned to Kerala early Wednesday morning by a scheduled flight from West Asia and he was whisked away by the waiting NIA team to the latter's office in Kochi.

He is the 35th accused to be arrested in connection with the case.

The NIA officials said that Manzoor was the source in West Asia who procured and sent the gold consignments to Kerala through diplomatic channels in the international airports in Thiruvananthapuram and Kochi. The scam has seen the arrest and incarceration of M Sivsankar, the then principal secretary of Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan for his alleged dealings with Swapna Suresh, the kingpin behind the operation that saw the smuggling of 167 kg gold in 2019 qne 2020.

Though agencies like Enforcement Directorate and Customs too had joined the probe, the investigation has been in limbo and did not make any progress for the last six months. All accused who were arrested except Swapna Suresh, her henchmen P S Sarit and

Sandeep Nair, charged with COFE-POSA have been granted bail. Though the NIA and the Customs had claimed that they would nab Faizal, the main brain behind the planning and execution of the smuggling operations, he remains elusive in the safe havens of West Asia even after one year.

The arrest of Manzoor comes at a time when the BJP leadership in Kerala have come under police investigation for heist of ₹3.5 crore, malpractices during assembly election and swindling of ₹240 crore meant for election funding.

The BJP's State chief K Surendran is likely to be questioned in connection with a complaint filed by the CPI(M) that the former threatened Sundara, the BSP candidate from Manjeswaram in the assembly election held on April 6.

The police recorded the statement from Sundara who alleged that the State BJP president threatened him and made him withdraw from the race.

A delegation of leaders led by former Mizoram Governor K Rajasekharan called on Kerala Governor Mohammed Arif Khan and complained to him that the CPI(M) and Chief Minister were misusing police and other official machinery to destroy the BJP in the State. "The ₹3.5 crore hawala case and all such cases have been foisted on the BJP leaders with the motive to tarnish the image of the party. The Special Investigation Team probing the case has been packed with police officials with tainted background and owing allegiance to the CPI(M)," the BJP leaders charged in the representation.

Good intent

The Election Commission of India is pushing the Government over the next batch of electoral reforms

The Election Commission, trolled by the non-BJP parties during the last round of Assembly elections for reasons ranging from impartiality towards the Opposition and alleged kowtowing before the BJP Government, took the lead this time in inquiring with the Government about the next tranche of electoral reforms. The Commission wrote to the Union Law Ministry to get back on the nearly 40 reform proposals pending with it. The Commission identified five main reforms it urgently wants implemented: Allowing voters turning 18 to register themselves with the Commission; punishment for candidates furnishing false information in their affidavits; paid news to be made an electoral offence; ban on advertising in print media during the silence period; linking Aadhaar number to electoral rolls to avoid duplication of voter ID cards. Reforms are currently of three levels in terms of ease of implementation. The Commission is already implementing the elementary level, comprising digitising the election process and enabling remote voting for NRIs and migrant workers. The five reforms listed above come in the intermediate level because they first need amendments to laws and they are not really politically controversial. Some reforms implemented over a decade ago made the electoral process a bit more credible, including candidates' affidavits on criminal antecedents and assets, criminalisation of politics, limitations on exit and opinion polls, prohibition on surrogate advertisements, compulsory maintenance of poll accounts by parties. However, feet are being dragged on a crucial



reform: Restricting the number of seats a candidate can contest from.

It is the final level of reforms that are contentious and which form the real core of electoral reforms India urgently needs. One is overall transparency of the Commission's actions. The run-up to every Assembly election sees various interpretations of Commission's actions, particularly the Opposition's charge of alleged leniency shown to ruling party bigwigs. The second issue is electoral bonds. At present any Indian citizen can buy electoral bonds and donate it to a political party of choice, but anonymously. While anonymity is intended to prevent political victimisation of the donor, the Commission in 2017 did not favour the donor's identity being kept secret as that may allow shell companies and foreign entities to fund and influence Indian elections. Hate speech and communal polarisation have of late become the biggest negative factors in Indian elections, their impact worse than caste considerations. The Commission has been found wanting in issuing exemplary punishment to the wrongdoers. Another issue is the demand for taking the collegium route, like the judiciary, for appointment of commissioners and elevating the senior-most as the chief. Last but not the least is Prime Minister Narendra Modi's "one nation one election" proposal as well as a single voters' list for the Lok Sabha, Assembly and panchayat elections to cut down costs. Clearly, the latter reforms will hold a candle to the Commission's sincerity of purpose subject, of course, to the Union Government being eager to clear the proposals.

Better tomorrow?

Crushed, the tourism industry is hoping that the run of bad luck would soon be over

The travel and tourism industry, along with associated arms like the hospitality and aviation sectors, has been in the doldrums for at least two seasons in a row. Depression has set in, hope has touched nadir, jobs have been lost and revenue — both for individual players and the Governments, alike — is shying away from the invested entrepreneurs like Vijay Mallya from the Indian law-enforcement agencies. But the Centre and State Governments' ongoing inoculation drive, as it gathers momentum, has injected a sense of optimism and enthusiasm among the stakeholders. From Kashmir to Uttarakhand to Himachal Pradesh to Goa and Kerala, basically almost all the States where the economy thrives on travel, tourism and hospitality, it's the same story of despair. But Wednesday brought with it a sliver of hope and positivity when Culture and Tourism Minister Prahlad Patel fanned the embers of their dying hope. He said in unequivocal terms that the ongoing vaccination drive is going to drive the revival of the tourism sector. Giving the entrepreneurs in the above-mentioned sectors another reason to smile, he added that the Government is working on a uniform policy and setting up protocols for travellers getting vaccinated against COVID-19.



Speaking to a conglomerate of well-known companies operating in the related fields, he lauded their efforts in coming together to "promote the interests of the smallest and often under-represented operators". Meanwhile, in Goa, the tourism stakeholders were trying to decipher Chief Minister Pramod Sawant's statement that re-opening of tourism would be considered after its entire population is vaccinated with at least one dose. Similarly, in Kerala, the tourism sector is in peril as the State has lost three consecutive seasons for the first time. The two consecutive floods in 2018 and 2019, and now the COVID-19 pandemic have flattened the tourism sector. The tour operators are clueless as to when they will see a return to the good old days. In Kashmir, too, the sector has been hit two successive years. In March this year, tourist arrivals had picked up to 1,25,000 from about 19,000 in January before the second wave of COVID-19 hit home. Here's hoping that the lives and livelihood of all of them, as well as of their families, get back on track as early as possible.

Likud oxygen for Israel's polity

Irrespective of whether Netanyahu stays or goes, it can't be denied that his Likud party has changed the contours of Israeli politics forever

With four inconclusive elections to the Knesset in the last two years, Israel's politics is badly fragmented. While Likud is still the leading party in the 24th Knesset, its 30-seat performance is the poorest in recent times. Many attribute it to Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's brashness, arrogance and corrupt policies. He might have to stand trial for four distinct charges of corruption and sleaze against him. Politics in Israel has always been fissiparous. Parliamentary groupings (alliances) are common for cobbling up a majority in the 120-member legislature. On most occasions, the Knesset failed to complete its four-year term and a new Government was sworn in sooner than the Knesset dissolved. Israel witnessed 34 Governments during the previous 23 Knessets.

Whether Israelis have practised democracy to the hilt, or to a fault, is a matter of opinion. They organised the first general elections to the Knesset on January 25, 1949 — less than a year after declaring independence on May 14, 1948. Israel's declaration of independence was accompanied by its battle for survival against the Arab Army's attack aimed at annihilating the new State. Despite many Arabs of Palestine fleeing, a portion stayed back. Almost 30,000 Arabs voted in the first general elections (1949) and nearly 70,000 in the second (1951). Israel, based on universal adult suffrage, was the first country in the world to enfranchise Arab women.

Democracy in Israel might be seen as an American influence, its stalwart ally. However, it is largely forgotten that a Communist USSR was the first country to recognise an independent Israel *de jure* and supply it with arms and ammunition (through Czechoslovakia), which helped Israel survive the Arab attack. Previously, on May 14, 1947, (exactly a year before Israel's declaration of independence) it was the USSR's permanent representative at the UN Andrei Gromyko who had proposed in the UN the plan to partition the mandated territory of Palestine between the



Arabs and Jews; thus leading to creation of sovereign Israel. It is another thing that the USSR, which turned anti-Israel and pro-Arab by 1950, tried to erase these aspects from the public discourse.

The birth and survival of Israel is popularly presented through the prism of Jewish-Arab discord. It is generally overlooked that pro-Zionist Jews were themselves affected by tumultuous ideological disputes. One of the best-kept secrets is how this dispute led an independent Israel to practise apartheid against a section of its own Jewish citizens for the first 30 years. The struggle has its origins in the ideological conflict between David Ben-Gurion (1886-1973), a committed Socialist, and Zeev Jabotinsky (1860-1940), who espoused Revisionist Zionism and created Jewish self-defence units for the first time in two millennia. Both were from the former Russian Empire. This split the Jewish underground active defence into mainstream Haganah and fringe Irgun and Lehi. The more militant Irgun and Lehi, following Jabotinsky's footsteps, believed in fighting the British as well as Arabs, while fighting the former was not on the agenda of Haganah.

In this power struggle, Ben-Gurion apparently emerged victorious. Not only he became the first Prime Minister of Israel, but his Mapai (Labour) Party ruled Israel for a quarter century, ending with his protégé Golda Meir's exit in June 1974. Despite its splintered politics, the Social-Democratic nature of Israel made Mapai an extremely powerful agency to control the economy, education, labour market, media and Army.

Ben-Gurion acted vindictively against the Jewish families which had served in Irgun and Lehi. Though their citizenship could not be cancelled as per Israel's Law of Return (1950), they were practically ostracised. While Irgun and Lehi were demonised as terrorist organisations in history books, their former fighters like Yitzhak Shamir (who later became the PM) could not get even a simple clerk's job and Israel Eldad was removed from professorship after Ben-Gurion's personal intervention. The graves of former fighters were not marked with Israel Defence Force symbols.

These families, restricted to a few colonies in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, stayed close to each other sharing pride and pain. Their only notable representa-

tive in Knesset was Menachem Begin, a disciple of Jabotinsky. They named their children, born mostly in 1940s, after fallen fighters and heroes and brought them in the family tradition of pride, pathos and patriotism. It was from these families that emerged a whole generation of politicians including Ehud Olmert, Yair Shamir, Uzi Landau, Ruby Rivlin and, later, Tzipi Livni and Benjamin Netanyahu who would transform the scenario in Israel.

Shortly after Israel's pyrrhic victory in Yom Kippur War, 1973, an 87-year old David Ben-Gurion died. Golda Meir resigned and Menachem Begin, along with Major General Ariel Sharon (Retd), formed the Likud (Consolidation) party, with Revisionist Zionism as its creed. This party has produced, apart from Begin, other Prime Ministers like Yitzhak Shamir, Ariel Sharon, Ehud Olmert and Benjamin Netanyahu. In one generation, led by Menachem Begin, children (often called Princes) from ostracised fighters' families had turned the politics of Israel around.

Keep staying in battle mode

WHEN DOCTORS BECOME PATIENTS

It's an Indian medical conundrum: How long will the doctors tolerate violence against themselves?

Seneca, the great Roman philosopher and statesman once said on the importance of doctors: "People pay the doctor for their troubles, but for his kindness, they still remain in his debt." We are fighting against an invisible and an infinitesimal enemy in size, the coronavirus, which brought mankind to its knees, and it is our bounden duty to give every possible aid to the phalanx of our front warriors - the doctors and healthcare workers. Doctors have been revered in India as the proxies of god since ancient times. But attitudes have changed with time and doctors are subjected to hardships by the very people they strive to save.

Of late heinous instances of doctors and healthcare workers being assaulted and mistreated are being reported across the nation. It is a shame that during such a critical phase of pandemic, when the whole medical system is on trial, people are not recognizing these gods in white coats.

In the last fortnight, there have been at least four to five cases reported of violence against healthcare workers, including vandalism in hospitals. A video infamously went viral on social media platforms in which a junior doctor at a Covid-19 care centre in Assam, Dr Seuj Kumar Senapati, was mer-



cilessly beaten with utensils and crockery items by a mob which was the outraged over the death of a Covid-19 patient.

The mob, not only assaulted the doctor, but also rendered heavy damage to the care centre. There have been 28 arrests made by the police so far, including the main accused. The National Human Rights Commission has been strictly scrutinizing the case and has demanded an action taken report from the Director-General of Police within four weeks. Assam, having the fifth highest literacy rate in our country, simply cannot live down this shame.

A similar case is from Karnataka where a senior pediatrician, Dr Deepak was seriously assaulted following the death of a six-year-old boy due to complexities after a dengue attack. A relative of his and three others attacked the doctor while he was returning home riding on his bicycle after finishing his duty.

The doctors do have every right to protest such violence. In the Assam incident, the doctors even boycotted OPD services and the IMA, Assam chapter threatened to boycott Covid-19 services if doctors' safety is not ensured. In several towns and cities, doctors and healthcare workers are wearing black badges to express solidarity with the victims.

Its psychology that when in pain anger is a bosom friend. How long will the doctors tolerate violence against them? As it is they are under tremendous pressure, working long, stressed hours. The safety equipment they wear is anyway cumbersome - they have to wear two masks, PPE kits, double gloves and a face shield for stretches of up to 12 hours. There is no guarantee of timely, hot meals or the much-needed rest. And the unrelenting queues of patients.

The IMA has released this data: Last year, 748 doctors across India succumbed to Covid-19 in the first wave and 642 in the second wave. They must receive praise for facing the virus storm to keep people safe. In the very least they should not be de-motivated by bouts of violence that helps no one and only hampers medical care to other patients

G7 plans end of tax paradise for MNCs

It will end a lucrative business model of the MNCs that park most of their profits in tax havens, bringing curtains down on the golden era of the havens themselves

The June 4-5 agreement between the G7 Finance Ministers (FMs) from the USA, Britain, Germany, Canada, France, Italy and Japan to plug the cross-border tax loopholes used by the giant multinational companies (MNCs) to evade taxes has immense potential to reform and revolutionise the global tax system. The reform blueprint is based on two pillars: first, to distribute the profits equitably among countries where these are generated, enabling them to tax such profits, and second, adoption of a minimum corporate tax rate of at least 15 percent globally.

By forcing the MNCs irrespective of their nature of business to pay taxes where they operate, it can bring to an end the decades-long "race to the bottom" in which some countries compete with each to attract corporate giants with ultra-low tax rates and exemptions, depriving the governments of other countries where the MNCs reap most of their profits of billions of dollars in taxes - money badly needed by them now to prop up their pandemic-ravaged economies. It will also bring to an end a very lucrative business model of these MNCs that park most of their profits in tax havens, bring to an end the golden era of the havens themselves. The tech giants which operate remotely through digital medium like Google, Amazon, Facebook, Apple etc. would also start feeling the pinch.

Rich nations like G7 as well as emerging economies have equally struggled in vain for decades to make the MNCs operating within their jurisdictions to pay taxes to them. But using a tax avoidance strategy called Base Erosion and Profit Shifting (BEPS), MNCs have been artificially shifting their profits year after year from higher-tax jurisdictions to tax-havens where they pay little or no tax, thus 'eroding' the 'tax-bases' of the former. Countries like Ireland, Luxembourg, Cyprus, Caribbean countries like British Virgin Islands, Bahamas or Cayman Islands, and Central American countries like Panama have used their tax rate arbitrage to attract the MNCs - about 40 percent of MNCs' overseas profits are estimated to be shifted to low-tax countries in this way.

The tax losses are stupendous - estimated to be \$50 billion for the USA and over \$10 billion for India. A global minimum tax rate of 15 per cent would preclude countries from undercutting each other, yielding an estimated \$50 billion-\$80 billion in extra tax annually from the MNCs. Governments would still have the sovereign power to set their own corporate tax rates but not below the floor rate and if the MNCs still continue to shift their profits to a country with a lower tax rate, their home governments can 'top-up' their taxes to the minimum rate to eliminate the benefits from shifting of profits.

The US tax rate was cut down to 21 per cent from 35 per cent by then President Donald Trump in 2017, which his successor Joe Biden now proposes to increase to 28 per cent. The average OECD corporate tax rate in 2020 was 21.5 per cent, with 18 out of 37 members charging higher rates. Only three countries charge rates lower than 15 per cent: Ireland (12.5 per cent), Hungary (eight per cent) and Switzerland (8.5 per cent).

The average tax rate for Asian countries is around 23 per cent; while China and South Korea charge 25 per cent, Singapore charges only 17 per cent rate. In 2019, India also sharply reduced its corporate tax rates to 22 per cent for domestic

companies (15 per cent for new manufacturing companies) without any deductions, aligning its corporate tax rate to global standards.

However, there are several zero-tax territories, mostly small economies like Bermuda, British Virgin Islands or Cayman Islands, in which even the crumbs thrown by the MNCs by way of investment on subsidiaries and opportunity for employment that they create however limited could be a bonanza. Corporate and financial services account for more than 50 per cent of government revenue in many of these small economies. Over many past decades, the low-tax or tax-less countries have thus enticed investments with lax rules that favour the MNCs and serve as conduits for them to avoid tax in other countries.

The *Economist* reported an IMF study in 2019 which found that such "phantom" investments by MNCs had pushed Luxembourg's stock of foreign-direct investment to \$4 trillion, "an improbable one-tenth of the global total". Many small countries like Ireland, Cyprus, Hong Kong and Singapore have also benefited in this manner.

To book profits in low tax regimes, MNCs have all the leverage and wherewithal to relocate their subsidiaries and headquarters in any country across the globe - they can relocate their production units anywhere by arm-twisting the smaller countries to agree to their terms. By choosing a suitable trans-

fer pricing mechanism, they can always transfer profits to their subsidiaries located within such jurisdictions to avoid paying taxes in the tax havens. It would be in the interest of these countries to have their taxing rights over these companies in their own jurisdictions.

As the communique from the G7 had stated, "We commit to reaching an equitable solution on the allocation of taxing rights, with market countries awarded taxing rights on at least 20 per cent of profit exceeding a 10 per cent margin for the largest and most profitable multinational enterprises." The principle is that MNCs must pay taxes equitably in every market where they generate their profits, thereby apportioning their global profits to countries where their customers and users are located.

The business model of MNCs that rely on the tax havens would collapse like a pack of cards, as would the economy of tax havens themselves - especially of those that lack other significant sources of revenue - once the G7 proposals are translated into an international treaty, contours of which may be finalised in the broader G-20 meeting at Venice in July, which, in addition to the G-7 countries includes emerging economies like China, India, Brazil, Russia, South Africa, Indonesia and others. An agreement

would usher in nothing short of a tax-revolution that would nudge the other countries also to fall in line. MNCs and tax havens would be the losers - indeed it might signal the ultimate end of the tax havens' business model, while large economies that give the MNCs most of their profits which are now being siphoned off to the tax havens would stand to gain the most. Countries like Ireland whose economy has boomed with the influx of billions of dollars in investment from the MNCs would be deeply unhappy and unlikely to give in, as would be the tax havens themselves.

To tax the digital transactions of global digital giants like Apple, Google etc. that carry out their activities remotely from another country, India had imposed a six per cent Equalisation Levy in 2016 on incomes accruing to foreign e-commerce companies from India in certain business to business transactions above a threshold. Several other countries had followed suit. This, however, hardly compensated for the revenue loss. Once the new tax regime comes into force, it will bring to an end such digital taxes as they will become redundant. India which is one of the largest and fastest expanding global internet markets has much to gain from the new tax regime, but must follow up with further reforms of its tax system and reduction of factor costs to attract international investment and industries.

Environment is forever, not diamonds

The permission to mine for diamonds in a 364-hectare area in MP will lead to felling of 225,000 trees, besides adversely impacting the groundwater table

Even as India celebrated the World Environment Day recently, the environment itself had little to cheer for. The fact that the ambitious pledges taken to protect the environment are only a symbolic exercise has been made evident by the ongoing controversy involving the Madhya Pradesh government granting diamond mining rights to Aditya Birla Group (ESSEL Mining) to mine for diamonds in the Buxwaha forest area of Chatarpur.

The grant of permission for mining a 364-hectare area will lead to felling of approximately 225,000 trees besides clearing the forest area which comprises rare plant species and also adversely impact groundwater table. In addition to this the indigenous communities also

stand to be adversely impacted as about 8,000 local forest dwellers will get displaced.

The rights to mine the Bunder diamond block estimated to contain 34 million carats of rough diamonds was won by Essel Mining in 2019. The project with an outlay of Rs. 2500 crore investment is supposed to eventually become the largest diamond mine project in Asia. However, so far, the project could not make much headway due to ecological concerns pertaining to air and water pollution. These concerns combined with stiff resistance from the local population has kept the project in a suspended state. There is a need for urgent measures to ensure that the work does not begin in the area unless a renewed environmen-

tal impact assessment report is commissioned that has the inputs of local environmental experts and the opinion of the local communities as well.

Even as opinion builds up against the diamond mining project, an environment activist from Jabalpur Dr.P.J. Najpande has moved the National Green Tribunal against the project. Conservation committees too have been formed for the districts of Sagar, Damoh and Chatarpur as these districts stand to be the most affected by the diamond mining projects. The committees are preparing the grounds for registering demand for a proper tree audit and a public hearing on the matter with the presence of all affected stake holders. These efforts however are from either



the local communities or environmental conservationists, but sincere and impactful interventions form the government are yet to be seen.

In India, Andhra Pradesh, Chhattisgarh and Madhya Pradesh are the three states that produce the most diamonds in the country with Madhya Pradesh accounting for over 90

per cent of the produce which is an average 39,000 carats per year. Given these figures it is easy to understand why there is so much pressure on Madhya Pradesh as far as diamond mining goes.

The Bunder mining block falls in the Bundelkhand region of Madhya Pradesh, which is a traditionally water-stressed region. The project pre-feasibility report clearly states the project is water-intensive as it requires an estimated 5.9 million cubic meters per day which is a tall order for a water-challenged region. Unfortunately, this is yet to ring alarm bells for the government even though the Central Ground Water Authority has declared the region to be in a semi critical area water resources wise.

The ecological biodiversity of Madhya Pradesh has already borne the brunt of projects such as the river interlinking project linking the Ken and Betwa rivers which is threatening 2.3 million trees. On the other hand, the Bundelkhand Expressway project has resulted in the felling of over 1,90,000 trees. The diamond mining project promises to deliver yet another blow to the environment from which the state may not really recover this time.

In this mad drive for development and prosperity the environment is not the only collateral damage; the people especially at the grass root level who labour at these diamond mines in Madhya Pradesh are the worst affected. The labourers at the mines, especially in the

Panna district, already suffer from malnutrition, chronic poverty and migration related problems such as housing and unemployment.

The exploitation of earth's natural resources is not only causing the abuse of the environment but is also resulting in immeasurable suffering to the people who are directly impacted by these activities. The government cannot be a mute spectator to this devastation and take ages to respond even as natural resources, environment get exploited while the social fabric is tattered. The alacrity in government actions alone will establish genuineness of its concern and commitment for the environment and Buxwaha forests in Madhya Pradesh are earnestly waiting for the same.

China has ability to try to 'disturb' rules-based order: Blinken

China is both most consequential and most complicated relationship US has, says US Secretary of State

China is the single nation that militarily, economically, diplomatically and politically has the ability to try to "disturb" the rules-based order that America, its friends and allies strongly defend, US Secretary of State Tony Blinken has said.

and prosperity for so many years," he said.
Testifying before the Senate Appropriations Committee during the hearing on the 2022 Budget Request for the State Department, Blinken said the US-China relationship has increasing adversarial aspects to it.
"It certainly has competitive ones. And it still has some cooperative ones as well. But the common denominator is to approach each of those aspects of the relationship from a position of strength. I think that strength starts with a few things," he said.
Blinken said that it starts with alliances and partnerships.
"This is a unique strategic asset for us, something that

China does not enjoy. That's why we're working to revitalise those alliances and partnerships. It includes our engagement in international organisations and international life because when we pull back, China fills in and starts to shape the rules and set the norms.

"It absolutely includes our military and our deterrent capability... Some years ago we started to shift resources to the Asia Pacific, including about 60 per cent of our Navy. Continue to take the steps necessary to make sure we have a strong deterrent," Blinken said.
China claims almost all of the 1.3 million square mile South China Sea as its sovereign territory. It has been building military bases on artificial islands in the region also claimed by Brunei, Malaysia, the Philippines, Taiwan and Vietnam.
Blinken said: "Investments in our technology, our workers, innovation and research and development, all of those elements together or how we approach China from a posi-

tion of strength".
Responding to a question, the secretary of state said that China is making more investments in its nuclear programme and seeks to build its arsenal.
"This is something that I think we need to engage in because it presents a growing challenge. So, this is something that we're focused on. We're working on it," he said.
Blinken said that the foundational piece of ties with China has to be approaching it from a position of strength. The elements of that strength are strong alliances and partnerships.
"That is a strategic asset for us that China doesn't have. When we are working and speaking collectively with oth-

ers who are aggrieved by China's practices in one area or another, we are much stronger. We're much more effective just in the economic realm, to cite one example.
"Alone, we're about 20 per cent, 25 per cent of the world GDP. When we're working in concert with other democracies, we are 50 per cent or 60 per cent of the world GDP. It's a lot harder for China to ignore. So, alliances and partnerships, that's a critical piece," Blinken said.
Second is actually leaning in and engaging in these very imperfect international institutions, he said.
"The challenge there is that these institutions tend to set the rules, the standards, the norms. When we pull back,

China fills in, and it has a stronger hand in setting the rules on new technologies, for example leaning. We are leaning in, making sure with our allies and partners that we're present.
"Third, what you've just done or are on the verge of doing, I think this afternoon, with this very important legislation that is making the right investments in ourselves, and our technology, in research and development, in our workers, that is fundamentally our greatest source of strength when it comes to competing and dealing effectively with China," Blinken said.
He said of course, "our military, our deterrent capacity, all of those things have to be married together."

Senate passes Bill to boost US tech industry, counter rivals

The Senate overwhelmingly approved a bill on Tuesday that aims to boost US semiconductor production and the development of artificial intelligence and other technology in the face of growing international competition, most notably from China.
The 68-32 vote for the bill demonstrates how confronting China economically is an issue that unites both parties in Congress. That's a rarity in an era of division as pressure grows on Democrats to change Senate rules to push past Republican opposition and gridlock.
The centerpiece of the bill is a USD 50 billion emergency allotment to the Commerce Department to stand up semiconductor development and manufacturing through

research and incentive programs previously authorized by Congress. The bill's overall cost would increase spending by about USD 250 billion with most of the spending occurring in the first five years.
Supporters described it as the biggest investment in scientific research that the country has seen in decades. It comes as the nation's share of semiconductor manufacturing globally has steadily eroded from 37 per cent in 1990 to about 12 per cent now, and as a chip shortage has exposed vulnerabilities in the US supply chain.
"The premise is simple, if we want American workers and American companies to keep leading the world, the federal government must invest in science, basic research and innovation, just as we did decades after the Second World War," said Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y.

Russian court mulls motion to outlaw Navalny's organisations

Moscow: A Moscow court on Wednesday is considering a request by prosecutors to outlaw the organisations founded by Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny — part of authorities' efforts to muzzle critics ahead of a crucial parliamentary election in September.
The Moscow City Court is expected to grant the request to designate Navalny's Foundation for Fighting Corruption and his sprawling network of regional offices across Russia as extremist organizations.
In conjunction with a new law, the ruling would bar people associated with the groups from running for public office, derailing hopes by Navalny's allies to seek parliament seats.
The extremism label also could potentially carry prison terms for activists who have worked with the organisations, anyone who donated to them, and even those who simply shared the groups' materials.
The court is expected to issue its verdict later in the day, according to the lawyers in the case. AP

Nepal's SC issues show cause notice to Prez, PM in House dissolution case

Kathmandu: Nepal's Supreme Court on Wednesday issued a show cause notice to the Office of the President, the Office of the Prime Minister and the Council of Ministers on the dissolution of the House of Representatives and sought a reply within 15 days. President Bidya Devi Bhandari, at the recommendation of Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli, had dissolved the House for the second time in five months on May 22 and announced snap elections on November 12 and November 19.
Prime Minister Oli is heading a minority government after losing a trust vote in the House. The five member constitutional bench, headed by Chief Justice Chandra Shumsher Rana, has sought clarification from the defendants, according to sources in the Supreme Court.
The proceedings of the politically significant case, which had been disrupted since Sunday, finally resumed on Wednesday. It has been learnt that regular hearings on the case will resume from June 23 after the completion of 15-day

On 1st overseas trip, Biden to assure allies and meet Putin

Washington: Set to embark on the first overseas trip of his term, President Joe Biden is eager to reassure the United States on the world stage, steadying European allies deeply shaken by his predecessor and pushing democracy as the only bulwark to rising forces of authoritarianism.
Biden has set the stakes for his eight-day trip in sweeping terms, believing that the West must publicly demonstrate it can compete economically with China as the world emerges from the coronavirus pandemic.
Building toward his tripartite summit with Russia's Vladimir Putin, Biden will aim to reassure European capitals that the United States can once again be counted on as a dependable partner to thwart Moscow's aggression both on their eastern front and their internet battlefields.
The trip will be far more about messaging than specific actions or deals. And the paramount priority for Biden, who leaves Wednesday for his first stop in the United Kingdom, is to convince the world that his administration is not just a fleeting deviation in the trajectory of an American foreign policy that many allies fear irrevocably drifted toward a more transactional outlook under former President Donald Trump. AP

Albanian Parl impeaches Prez for vote comments

Tirana (Albania): The Albanian Parliament on Wednesday impeached President Ilir Meta for violating the constitution and discharged him from the post.
In an extraordinary session, the parliament voted 104-7 to discharge the president. Three abstained. The final approval comes from Albania's Constitutional Court within three months. A report of a parliamentary investigation concluded that Meta had violated the constitution with his biased approach against the ruling Socialists during the April 25 parliamentary electoral campaign. The report said Meta violated 16 articles and also incited violence.
"Ilir Meta has betrayed the mission of the president of ... Albania," Prime Minister Edi Rama said in his speech before the vote. "Ilir Meta has humiliated the constitution."
Meta has denounced the investigation and impeachment attempt, arguing they are illegal. There was no reaction from Meta during the debate or after the vote. During the parliamentary debate Meta continued his daily agenda, awarding a medal to a folk music ensemble. AP

Finance Min releases third instalment of revenue deficit

GRANT OF ₹9,871 CR TO 17 STATES

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

The Finance Ministry on Wednesday said it has released third monthly instalment of revenue deficit grant of ₹9,871 crore to 17 States.

With the release of this instalment, total ₹29,613 crore has been released in the first three months of the current financial year as Post Devolution Revenue Deficit Grant to States.

"The Department of Expenditure on Tuesday released the 3rd monthly instalment of Post Devolution Revenue Deficit (PDRD) Grant of ₹9,871 crore for the year 2021-22 to 17 States," the ministry said in a statement.

The Centre provides PDRD grant to states under Article 275 of the Constitution. The grants are released as per



the recommendations of the Finance Commission in the monthly instalments to meet the gap in Revenue Accounts of states post devolution.

The 15th Finance Commission has recommended PDRD grants to 17 states — Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, Punjab, Rajasthan, Sikkim, Tamil Nadu, Tripura, Uttarakhand and West Bengal.

The eligibility of states to receive this grant and the quantum of grant was decided by the Commission based on the gap between assessment of revenue and expenditure of the state. Assessed devolution for financial year 2021-22 was also taken into account by the Commission.

The 15th Finance Commission has recommended total PDRD grant of ₹1,18,452 crore to 17 States in 2021-22. The grant is released to States in 12 monthly instalments.

White House drops Trump orders trying to ban TikTok, WeChat

AP ■ WASHINGTON

The White House has dropped Trump-era executive orders that attempted to ban the popular apps TikTok and WeChat and will conduct its own review aimed at identifying national security risks with software applications tied to China, officials said Wednesday.

A new executive order directs the Commerce Department to undertake what officials describe as an "evidence-based" analysis of transactions involving apps that are manufactured or supplied or controlled by China. Officials are particularly concerned about apps that collect users' persona data or have connections to Chinese military or intelligence activities.

The department also will make recommendations on how to further protect Americans' genetic and personal health information, and



will address the risks of certain software apps connected to China or other adversaries, according to senior administration officials.

The Biden administration's move reflects the ongoing concern that Americans' personal data could be exposed by popular apps tied to China, a chief US economic and political rival. The White House and Congress have both taken action to address Beijing's technological advancement. On Tuesday, the Senate passed a bill that aims to boost US semiconductor production and the development of artificial intelligence and other technology in the face of growing international competition.

Sensex slumps 334 pts as bears return; RIL, banks top laggards

PTI ■ MUMBAI

Domestic markets surrendered early gains to finish deep in the red on Wednesday as profit-booking emerged in Reliance Industries, banking and infra stocks amid a weak trend in global equities.

Concerns over frothy valuations and a depreciating rupee also sapped investor confidence, traders said.

After a firm opening, the 30-share BSE Sensex suddenly succumbed to selling pressure in mid-afternoon trade. It finally closed 333.93 points or 0.64 per cent lower at 51,941.64, extending its losing streak to the second session.

On similar lines, the broader NSE Nifty slumped 104.75 points or 0.67 per cent to end at 15,635.35.

L&T was the top loser among the Sensex companies, shedding 1.80 per cent, followed by Reliance Industries, Bajaj Finserv, IndusInd Bank, Bajaj Finance, SBI, Maruti, Axis Bank and Bajaj

Auto.

On the other hand, PowerGrid, NTPC, Titan, HCL Tech and Asian Paints were among the gainers, spurring up to 3.42 per cent.

"Domestic equities fell sharply as selling pressure in financials, auto and RIL dragged indices down," said Binod Modi, Head - Strategy at Reliance Securities.

Further, Asian markets traded weak, reacting on higher-than-expected jump in China's producer price index at 9 per cent for May, he added.

"Global investors remained cautious ahead of European Central Bank (ECB) policy decision and US inflation data to be released on Thursday. ECB is expected to continue its bond-buying policy to support a recovering economy." And US inflation is forecasted to be high but transitory. Both these factors, if in line, will provide comfort to the market," said Vinod Nair, Head of Research at Geojit Financial Services.

Rupee slides by 8 paise to 72.97 against dollar

Mumbai: Falling for the second day in a row, the rupee closed lower by 8 paise at 72.97 against the US currency on Wednesday amid a lacklustre trend in domestic equities.

At the interbank foreign exchange market, the rupee opened on a negative note at 72.90 per dollar as against its previous close of 72.89. It hovered in the range of 72.88 to 73.02 per dollar during the day before ending at 72.97. The domestic currency has lost 17 paise in the two trading sessions to Wednesday.

The local unit traded in a narrow range amid lack of any major data on Wednesday in the domestic and the international markets, traders said. PTI

WTO to intensify talks over protections of Covid-19 vaccines

AP ■ GENEVA

World Trade Organisation member states agreed on Wednesday to intensify talks toward improving access to Covid-19 products, as developing nations push for a proposal to ease patent and other legal protections on coronavirus vaccines - and some wealthier countries remain stiffly opposed.

A WTO panel focusing on intellectual property, which includes patents on technological know-how like vaccines and the processes to manufacture them, wrapped up a two-day meeting on Wednesday with an agreement to start a "text-based process" to pull together proposals about improving the fight against Covid-19 through the Geneva-based trade body's intricate system of rules.

The goal is to help jumpstart lagging efforts to get vaccines to developing-world countries that badly need them, according to a Geneva-based trade official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorised to speak publicly on the matter. New, informal talks will

start next week among members of the panel, with an eye toward pulling together a report for a meeting of WTO ambassadors on July 21-22.

South Africa and India floated the proposal for a temporary easing of patent protections for Covid-19 vaccines, therapies and tests - known as an "IP waiver" -- last fall. While many developed countries with strong pharmaceutical industries hesitated about or were outright opposed that idea, the debate received a jolt last month when the Biden administration announced support for an IP waiver for vaccines alone.

In the two days of talks, South Africa and India laid out a revision of their proposal - now backed by over 60 countries - that insisted on the three-year temporary nature of the waiver for COVID-19 products, the trade official said.

But some countries - notably the European Union's 27 member states, as well as Britain, Switzerland and Korea - continue to oppose a waiver, the official said, relaying deliberations in the closed-door talks Tuesday and Wednesday.

Govt buys record 418.47 lakh tn wheat at MSP

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

The Centre on Wednesday said it has procured a record 418.47 lakh tonnes of wheat so far in the current marketing year that started in April, costing exchequer ₹82,648 crore.

The record procurement of wheat has been achieved amid farmers' protests at Delhi borders since late November 2020. Farmer unions are demanding a repeal of three new farm laws and a legal guarantee of the Minimum Support Price (MSP). The Rabi marketing season (RMS) 2021-22 runs from April to March but the bulk of the procurement gets completed by June.

"Procurement of Wheat in ongoing RMS 2021-22 is continuing smoothly in the procuring states of Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Rajasthan, Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh and Jammu & Kashmir at MSP, as was done in previous seasons," an official statement said.

Till June 8, the Government has purchased 418.47 lakh tonnes of wheat as against 373.22 lakh tonnes in the corresponding period of the previous year.

Inflow in equity MFs at 14-month high in May amid stock mkt rally

New Delhi: Equity mutual funds witnessed a net inflow of over ₹10,000 crore in May, making it the highest infusion in 14 months, due to rally in stock markets on the back of declining Covid-19 cases and robust quarterly earnings.

This is also marks the third consecutive monthly inflow after ₹3,437 crore net inflow seen in April and ₹9,115 crore in March, data from the Association of Mutual Funds in India (Amfi) showed on Wednesday. Prior to this, equity schemes had consistently witnessed outflow for eight straight months from July 2020 to February 2021. "With stock markets moving to all time highs, investors continued their preference towards mutual funds and this trend could continue in the coming months," Gopal Kavalireddi, Head of research, FYERS, said.

Himanshu Srivastava, Associate Director - Manager Research, Morningstar India, said that significant improvement on the coronavirus situation with daily Covid-19 cases falling consistently, along with improving recovery rate, over the last few weeks, would have provided comfort to investors.

Quickening vaccination coverage critical for regaining growth momentum: FinMin report

Quickening the pace of people against Covid is critical for regaining growth momentum as economic activities are inextricably linked to the path of the pandemic, the finance ministry said in its monthly economic report on Wednesday.

"As we cautiously recuperate from the second wave, rapidly improving vaccination delivery and frontloading the fiscal measures planned in the Union Budget hold key to invigorating the investment cycle in the coming quarters," it said.

Regarding the impact of the second Covid wave, the report said that with state-level lockdown restrictions being more adaptive to learnings from the first wave, manufacturing and construction are expected to experience a softer economic shock in the current quarter.

The report emphasised that quickening the pace and coverage of vaccination is critical to help India heal and regain

the momentum of economic recovery.

Continued vigilance in terms of pandemic preparedness, upscaling health spending and health infrastructure, faster rollout of vaccines and vaccination, investing in research and development to guard against possible mutants of the virus, prudent and pre-emptive restrictions, and strict observance of Covid-appropriate behaviour are essential to maintain the delicate balance of lives and livelihoods, it said.

India's second Covid wave situation has been improving lately with a continuous decline in 7-day average of active cases since May 13, 2021. Data showed that the second wave reached its peak of 7-day average of daily new cases around May 8, with the pace of decline being as fast as the rise.

The daily case positivity rate has plummeted sharply from 24.9 per cent in early May to reach 3.6 per cent as on June 2. Concomitantly, the report said that high frequency indicators in real and financial sectors like power consumption.

Cabinet approves extension of New Investment Policy benefits to RFCL

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

The Government on Wednesday extended the subsidy benefits under the amended New Investment Policy 2012 to Ramagundam Fertilisers and Chemicals Ltd (RFCL), located in Telangana.

A decision in this regard was taken in the Cabinet meeting, chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

Briefing media after the Cabinet meeting, Information and Broadcasting Minister Prakash Javadekar said, "The subsidy benefit under the (amended) New Investment Policy 2012, which was brought in 2014, was applicable to those factories set up till 2019. But, RFCL has been set up in 2021, and this policy has now been extended to this also."

As per norms, the urea factories set up till 2019 were eligible for subsidies under the amended New Investment Policy 2012. Still, the benefits are extended to RFCL that was set up in 2021 because farmers will benefit at the end of the day, he said.

RFCL will manufacture 12.70 lakh tonnes of urea annually. This would help reduce the country's dependence on imports and move towards the direction of self-reliance, he added. The New Investment Policy 2012 was amended on October 7, 2014.

RFCL is a joint venture company of National Fertilisers Ltd (NFL), Engineers India Ltd (EIL) and Fertilisers Corporation of India Limited (FCIL).

Clean mode of goods transportation can save logistics fuel worth ₹311 lakh cr: Report

New Delhi: India can save logistics fuel worth ₹311 lakh crore from 2020 to 2050 by deploying clean and cost-effective mode of goods transportation, a Niti Aayog report said on Wednesday, and added that the country can also save 10 gigatonnes of cumulative carbon dioxide emissions over the next three decades.

The Aayog and Rocky Mountain Institute (RMI) in a report titled 'Fast Tracking Freight in India: A Roadmap for Clean and Cost-Effective Goods Transport' said due to the rising demand for

goods and services, freight transport demand is expected to grow rapidly in the future.

"India can save logistics fuel worth ₹311 lakh crore between 2020 and 2050. Can save 10 gigatonnes of cumulative CO2 emissions between 2020 and 2050," the report said. According to the report, India has the potential to reduce its logistics cost by 4 per cent of GDP and also reduce nitrogen oxide (NOx) and particulate matter (PM) emissions by 35% and 28 per cent, respectively, until 2050.

The Govt has approved the proposal of the Department of Financial Services for extending the term of Kumar from June 30, 2021 till March 13, 2022, the date when he completes three years, sources said. The sources said the rules under the Life Insurance Corporation Act, 1956, have been amended to provide extension beyond 60 years in view of the ongoing preparation for the IPO, they added.

Working towards an ideal rainbow workplace

The reading down of section 377, the decision legalising consensual adult same-sex relationships in 2018, creation of the Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Act 2019 and the inclusion of transgender persons in paramilitary forces in 2020 have been some monumental milestones in building an equal and inclusive ecosystem for the LGBTQIA community. These laws and initiatives have set the premise in place, but a large part of the onus lies with organisations in the corporate sector to create adequate avenues to implement these changes. Today, we see a genuine interest among corporations to be inclusive when it comes to individuals from the LGBTQIA. It has become a priority for many organisations. They have started with multiple initiatives to back individuals from the LGBTQIA community but many organisations are still at a nascent stage in their journeys.

What is it that organisations need to do to help their workplaces in becoming inclusive in the truest possible sense?

Ensuring inclusion that goes beyond cultural symbols

Creating a sustainable and inclusive environment for LGBTQIA individuals has to go beyond tokenism, mere symbolic actions, checking boxes for diversity goals. With the pride month here we see rainbow colours streaked everywhere, organisations signalling their support to the LGBTQIA community in their marketing and on social media platforms. Social media and advertising have the potential to impact attitudes and opinions in society. Symbols do play an important role as they show visible commitment to the inclusion journey creating awareness around the topic, but what is important to note is whether such branding and advertising initiatives align with some real actions.

Create awareness


The first step towards building the right culture is creating awareness in the workforce by educating them. Most initiatives to enhance inclusiveness fail not because of malintent but a lack of awareness. The employees need to know about the ground realities of the LGBTQIA community, who they are, their chal-

lenges and their aspirations. It will help filter unconscious bias and demystify myths around their LGBTQIA colleagues to aid the organisation's commitment to be inclusive. Apart from this, being trained on using inclusive language and calling out inappropriate behaviour will not only improve their knowledge but also encourage employees to engage in candid conversations with colleagues from the LGBTQIA community, making them feel more included in the organisation.

Revisit your policies and processes

Having created awareness on the topic, it is the key to strengthen your policies by reviewing them with an inclusive lens. Policies impacting the touchpoints in LGBTQIA employees' professional and personal life cycle need to be reconsidered. Policies should not only provide equal benefits but at the same time empower them with equal opportunities to learn and grow. Some changes we see today in many organisations are— an inclusive hiring policy, extending health insurance benefits to domestic partners, gender-neutral sexual harassment policy, health insurance benefits covering hormone therapy and gender confirmation surgery for employees seeking to transition, parental policies, HR systems and documents that are inclusive of genders and personal pronouns, having gender-neutral washrooms and revising the dress code so that it is gender-inclusive et al.



Engagement programmes

Understanding that the inclusion of the LGBTQIA community in the corporate sector is still at an early stage, individuals from this community still look for acceptance in the organisation. Hence, it becomes essential to keep employees from the community engaged by connecting them with like-minded people by initiating pride programmes, creating ERGs (Employee Resource Groups), having inclusive work-family initiatives to explicitly include non-traditional families, amongst other such activities. These initiatives will help enhance employee experience and

create allies within the organisation.

Challenges

When addressing concerns revolving around LGBTQIA inclusion, anti-discrimination policies and employee resource groups (ERGs) are mostly seen as the first steps to establish a more inclusive environment. As important as these are, at times, they may not have the intended impact. One reason here is the challenge around 'coming out with their identity' in the workplace. It could be the first step for them to create a connection with colleagues in the workplace, giving them the freedom and ease to work productively. However, employees from the LGBTQIA community may feel uncomfortable revealing their identity through day-to-day casual conversations with their colleagues. There is continuous social pressure that keeps them from opening up. Removing the various pressures LGBTQIA employees feel to hide their identities may appear intimidating but encouraging everyday conversations, casual interactions, continuous listening and learning from their experiences may become more important than just policies and processes. It is such small gestures, daily conversations that can really make a difference.

Another challenge is their under-representation in the corporate world. Being the only one, or one of the few causes a lot of anxiety and isolation. The solution to this is only through hiring more from the community and giving them the environment to grow and open up. This will set the right example and provide role models for future employees to look up to within the organisation.

Overcoming these challenges and social barriers is not going to be easy. But with the growing awareness across organisations and the impetus given by legal reforms in this direction will go a long way in creating the ideal rainbow workspace which embraces the LGBTQIA community with respect and love.



DDA meeting to discuss MPD-2041

The Master Plan for Delhi prepared by Delhi Development Authority is a statutory document that facilitates the capital's development by assessing the city's present condition and guiding to achieve the desired development. The implementation of the Master Plan is the collective responsibility of all the agencies involved in the development of Delhi, including the Central Government, concerned departments of the Government of the NCT of Delhi, service providers, landowning agencies, regulators, and local bodies among others. The first Master Plan for Delhi was promulgated in 1962 under the Delhi Development Act 1957, followed by the Master Plans of 2001 and 2021, each of which was an extensive modification of the respective previous plan document. These plans were prepared with a 20 years' perspective and provided a holistic framework for the planned development of Delhi. The Draft MPD-2041 is a 'strategic' and 'enabling' framework to guide the future growth of the city. The Draft Master Plan for Delhi-2041 (MPD-2041) has been divided into two volumes, nine sections, which contain 22 chapters. The DDA held its meeting, the day before yesterday, through video conferencing under the chairmanship of Anil Bajjal, Lt Governor, Delhi/Chairman, DDA. It was attended by Anurag Jain, IAS, Vice Chairman, DDA and other members of the authority including Vijender Gupta MLA, Somnath Bharti MLA, Dilip Kumar Pandey MLA, OP Sharma MLA and Adesh Kumar Gupta Municipal Corporation Councillor, North Delhi Municipal Corporation. The following major decisions were taken:

The modification in MPD 2021 with respect to development control norms for unauthorised colonies: Unauthorised colonies (UCs) are unplanned settlements built in contravention of the 'Master Plan' and zoning regulations char-



acterised by poor infrastructure and amenities, leading to poor quality of living standards. Understanding the importance of the same, the above requirement was also stressed upon in the National Capital Territory of Delhi (Recognition of Property Rights of Residents in Unauthorised Colonies) Regulations, 2019. The Government of India launched the PM-UDAY scheme (*Pradhan Mantri Unauthorised Colony in Delhi Awas Yojana*) for recognising ownership rights to the residents of 1,731 UCs in the city. The DDA has been made a nodal agency of the scheme, which delineates the boundaries of these UCs with the help of a survey of India and Revenue Department, GNCTD using satellite imageries of 2015. Under the scheme, DDA will scrutinise documents and will issue a Conveyance Deed for Government Lands and Authorisation Slip for private lands, only for residential purposes. The beneficiaries can get these documents registered with the sub-registrar's office. The development control norms for unauthorised colonies in Delhi are formulated to pave the way for the planned development

of the existing colonies. A two-pronged approach with differentiated norms has been formulated to improve the quality of the built environment, to provide continued affordable rental housing and to improve the existing physical and socio-economic conditions of the area.

Facilitating medical oxygen infrastructure: To ensure that medical oxygen infrastructure is facilitated in the hospitals in Delhi, the authority has approved the amendment to the Unified Building Bye-Laws 2016. This amendment will allow oxygen-related infrastructures such as PSA plants, Liquid Medical Oxygen to be set up in the open area of the existing hospital premises. Further, no notice and building permit will be required from the sanctioning authority for installation of the PSA plant/Liquid Medical Oxygen Plant and similar related infrastructure in hospitals if it is on the ground and in open/clearance areas. However, fire safety clearance, PESO and other mandatory clearances, wherever applicable, will be required. Further, as per information received from Delhi Fire Services,

the oxygen plants having an area less than 250 square meters are not covered under Rule 27(9) of Delhi Fire Service Rules 2010 and therefore, the issue of Fire Safety Certificate is not required. However, the following shall be maintained:

- The plant shall be approachable to fire engines through a six metres wide motorable road.
- Fire safety arrangements that have already been provided in the hospital building shall not be altered.
- Fire safety arrangements as per National Building Code 2016, Part 4 shall be provided in the interest of the public.

The proposed amendment will now be sent to MoHUA for final approval. On receipt of the approval, the same shall be notified by DDA.

Opportunity for small format houses: The authority has approved disposal of some Group Housing Plots for construction of small houses up to 60 square metres through freehold basis through e-auction. This will cater to the demand of 40-60 sqm affordable housing due to the

growing trend of reduction of family member sizes, single-parent families, only elderly couples dwellings. The small format houses are in line with National Housing Policy. It was felt that there should be another category for smaller houses which are cheaper to the standard two/three bedroom houses/flats and can be purchased by lower middle class or low salaried and small family persons.

Boost to commercial built-up shops: The authority has reviewed the method of pricing of built-up units/shops and approved significant changes in the pricing policy which aim to keep the prices fair and competitive. As per the existing policy, the cost of construction was enhanced every year by 10 per cent with respect to the year of construction while fixing the reserve price, whereas generally, structures are depreciated as they age. Accordingly, the new policy accounts for depreciation. Considering the general economic scenario, the multiplication factor for the land has also been reduced. Under the new policy, the reserve price of these built-up units is reduced by about 30 per cent to 55 per cent. This presents an excellent opportunity to the interested buyers as the shops are going to be offered at reduced rates.

Change of land use for multilevel car parking at Idgah Road, Zone-A: To cater to the acute demand for parking in the area, the authority has approved change of land use of land measuring 2.6 Ha. from 'Residential (Redevelopment)' to 'Transportation (MLCP)' for multilevel car parking at Idgah Road, Zone-A, other than the walled city. The proposed modification would help North MCD and DMRC with the construction of car parking and the Nabi Karim Metro Station. A public notice will now be issued for inviting objections/suggestions from the general public.

Relief for families of Covid-affected

Union Minister Dr JITENDRA SINGH says that instructions have been issued for the immediate release of pension to the household of government servants who lose their life due to COVID-19

The Central Government has issued instructions for the immediate release of pension to the family of a government employee who loses his/her life due to COVID -19 infection. In a landmark order, the Department of Pension and Pensioners' Welfare (DoPPW) -- under the Union Ministry of Personnel -- has instructed all ministries, departments, Controller General of Accounts as well as CMDs of Pension Disbursing Banks to ensure that the family pension is started within one month of the receipt of the claim from the eligible family member of a Government servant who has lost his or her life due to COVID. The Union Minister of State (Independent Charge) Development of North Eastern Region (DoNER), MoS PMO, Personnel, Public Grievances, Pensions, Atomic Energy and Space, Dr Jitendra Singh informed that as per the new O.M., all secretaries have been asked to personally monitor the in-service death cases and ensure the start of family pension within a month of the receipt of claim and death certificate, periodically. The secretaries shall also nominate for this purpose, an officer of the respective ministry/department, whose name and contact details shall be reflected on the website for any family member to contact in case of delay. At the same time, every ministry/department shall send a monthly position of such cases to the DoPPW, he added.

Dr Jitendra Singh said, "The O.M. has been issued in the spirit of the sensitivity and concern with which Prime Minister Narendra Modi is personally monitoring every aspect of the COVID pandemic on a day-to-day basis. The government is committed to assist and help every section of cit-



izens and families affected by the pandemic. The notification issued by the Department of Pension states that the COVID-19 pandemic has claimed the lives of several Government employees during the recent surge. In many cases, the deceased employees were the sole breadwinners of their family and the casualties have left the families in urgent need of funds for livelihood. It is, therefore, incumbent to ensure that the family pension and other entitlements are released to their families expeditiously. "The new O.M. also implies that action may be taken on a priority basis for disbursement of regular family pension to the bank and for payment of other entitlements of the family on the death of the government servant. It may be ensured that the Pension Payment Order (PPO) for family pension is issued and disbursement of regular family pension is commenced by the bank not later than one month after the receipt of the claim for the family pension. Dr Jitendra Singh hoped that all the departments of the government will follow these instructions in letter and spirit, and the respective Heads of Departments will monitor the same regularly.



Next stop, Paris

In the hunt for a ticket to Tokyo Olympics, Indian archers set off for France for the last qualifying tournament before the Olympics. Following the tournament, they will be competing in the third stage of the Archery World Cup

To commemorate the completion of 75 years of India's independence, our nation will celebrate a year-long mega event, Bharat Ka Amrut Mahotsav, which will conclude on August 15, 2022. The Central Government ministries have scheduled programmes to focus on the high points of social, cultural, scientific and technological aspects in the country's post-independence journey. Along these lines, ICAR-Central Research Institute for Jute and Allied Fibres (ICAR-CRIJAF), Barrackpore organised three virtual lectures during the week coinciding with World Environment Day, on the theme Making of Clean and Green India.

Dr Gouranga Kar, Director of ICAR-CRIJAF in his introductory remarks of the programme said that jute will see its golden days again as the most ideal fibre to replace plastics and save the environment.

Dr S. K. Jha, Principal Scientist for ICAR-CRIJAF, in the first lecture, explained the different kinds of pollution caused by plastic waste, its negative impact on agriculture, wildlife, aquatic life, marine ecosystem and human health. The reasons for seeking

alternatives to plastic and why natural fibres, especially jute fibre, can be a good alternative was explained.

In his special remarks, Dr Kar expressed concern over plastic pollution and emphasised that the technologies and road map have been framed to achieve the future demand of jute fibres in case of phasing out of single use plastics. Dr Kar emphasised on the need to prepare a roadmap to use genome-editing technology in a systematic manner to develop improved jute and allied fibre varieties that will sustain and perform well in the climatic condition of the coming decades.

Oxygen plant inaugurated at Northern Railway Central Hospital



In order to augment oxygen-related infrastructure in railway hospitals, a plant having 500 litres per minute (LPM) oxygen generation capacity was inaugurated at the Northern Railway Central Hospital, New Delhi, under the CSR initiative. It was commissioned in the presence of Ashutosh Gangal, General Manager Northern Railway and Ravindra Kumar Jain MD/DFC and officials of Northern Railway Central Hospital.

Providing a 500 litres per minute (LPM) oxygen generation plant at the Northern Railway Central Hospital, New Delhi under the CSR initiative was assigned to DFCCIL. It was pro-

vided in a record time of less than a month from the time DFC committed to set it up and to its actual installation.

This plant works on the pressure swing absorption (PSA) technology in which a special absorbent material is used to separate gases based on their molecular characteristics and absorb the target gas at high pressure and ambient temperature. The gas is then absorbed at lower pressure. The total requirement of oxygen of the hospital in normal times is about 1,500 LPM and this plant will help fulfil 30 per cent of the baseload and about 10 per cent in peak Covid times.

Powergrid commissions VSC based HVDC System

Power Grid Corporation of India Limited (Powergrid), a Maharatna CPSU under Ministry of Power, Government of India, has commissioned Monopole-I of the ± 320 kV, 2000 Mega-Watt (MW), Pugalur (Tamil Nadu) - Thrissur (Kerala) Voltage Source Converter (VSC) based High Voltage Direct Current (HVDC) System on June 8, 2021. This project strengthens the power system of the southern region of the country. It may be recalled that Monopole-II of the project was inaugurated by Prime Minister, Narendra Modi, on February 19 and with the commissioning of Monopole-I, the project has attained its full capacity.

The Pugalur-Thrissur HVDC system, costing ₹5,070 crore, is a part of the Raigarh-Pugalur-Thrissur 6,000 MW HVDC system and enables the transfer of 2,000 MW to Kerala through the VSC HVDC station at Thrissur.

The state-of-the-art VSC Technology has been brought to India for the first time by POWERGRID through this project.

The VSC technology significantly reduces the land requirement compared to the conventional HVDC systems and is particularly suitable for areas, where land is scarce. It also facilitates the development of a smart grid and improves system resilience under various operating conditions. A unique feature of this project is the combination of overhead lines and underground cables to address the restricted availability of the transmission corridor in Kerala.

Major HVDC equipment like interface transformers and IGBT-based power converters, AC equipment such as gas insulated sub-station, switchgear, controls and relay panels have been supplied by factories in India, thereby giving a major boost to the Prime Minister's Make In India programme. A significant part of the design, engineering, testing and commissioning for this first-time VSC project has been done in India, aligned to the Prime Minister's vision of Aatmanirbhar Bharat.

Sakkari ends Swiatek win streak

World No 18 will face unseeded Krejčíková for a place in Saturday's final

Maria Sakkari ended defending champion Iga Swiatek's 11-match and 22-set winning streaks at the French Open on Wednesday and reached the semi-finals of a major tournament for the first time.

The 17th-seeded Sakkari used strong and steady baseline play to eliminate Swiatek 6-4, 6-4 at Court Philippe Chatrier in the quarterfinals and ensure that the clay-court tournament will end with a new Grand Slam champion. "I couldn't have done it without my team and their support and I just want to thank them and we still have a long way to go, of course," Sakkari said, "but we made a huge step today."

All four women remaining in the field are making their Slam semifinal debuts. This is only the second time in the professional era that's been the case at any major tournament, according to the WTA; there also was a quartet of first-time semifinalists at the 1978 Australian Open.

On Thursday, Sakkari plays unseeded Barbora Krejčíková, and No 31 Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova faces unseeded Tamara Zidansek.

Krejčíková advanced earlier on Wednesday by beating 17-year-old Coco Gauff 7-6 (6), 6-3.

Sakkari, who is from Greece, and Krejčíková, who is from the Czech Republic, are both 25. Each has won only one tour-level title. Neither had been past the fourth round at a major until now.

And both dealt with early deficits on Wednesday. Swiatek, a 20-year-old from Poland who has looked untouchable

on clay, jumped out to a 2-0 lead, but then Sakkari took over, collecting eight of 10 games. When Sakkari smacked a backhand winner down the line to close a 15-stroke point that claimed the first set, she leaned over and punched the air with her right fist.

That ended Swiatek's set streak at Roland Garros, which dated to the beginning of last year's tournament, when she dropped only 28 games in all. She'd only lost 20 games this year through four matches. But Sakkari, who beat 2020 French Open runner-up Sofia Kenin

in straight sets in her previous match, used clean strokes — accumulating 26 winners, nine more than her opponent — and a strategy of serving to Swiatek's forehand to gain control.

Down 2-0 in the second set, Swiatek took a medical timeout and left the court with a trainer, returning with her upper right leg taped. During the break, Sakkari tried to stay warm by hopping and skipping side-to-side behind the baseline and did not lose a beat when play resumed.

In the day's first quarterfinal, Gauff led 3-0 at the outset, then 5-3, and held a total of five set points in the opener, but failed to convert any. Krejčíková grabbed that set by taking the last four points of the tiebreaker and reeled off 15 consecutive points during one stretch en route to a 5-0 edge in the second set.

Closing out the most important victory of her singles career was not easy, though: Krejčíková needed six match points to do it, raising her arms overhead when she finally won when Gauff sent a forehand wide.

Krejčíková has won two Grand Slam doubles titles with Katerina Siniakova — and they're into the semifinals in Paris — but is playing in only her fifth major tournament in singles.

"Everybody, they just put a label on me like, 'Yeah, you play doubles. You are a doubles specialist.' But I never thought I just want to be a doubles specialist," Krejčíková said.

"So I was just working hard all the time. I just wanted to play singles. It was really, like, frustrating that I just wasn't able to get there," she said. "But I always felt ... sooner or later, I'm just going to get there."

Tsitsipas, Nadal in semis

Rafael Nadal dropped a set for the first time at this year's French Open but ultimately advanced to the semifinals for a record-extending 14th time.

The 13-time Roland Garros champion faced a stiff challenge from gritty 10th-seeded Diego Schwartzman and prevailed 6-3, 4-6, 6-4, 6-0 on Court Philippe Chatrier on Wednesday.

Nadal was down 4-3 in the third set but won nine games in a

row to seal the match.

Nadal will be up against either top-ranked Novak Djokovic or Matteo Berrettini in the semifinals.

On Tuesday night, Stefanos Tsitsipas defeated Daniil Medvedev in straight sets to stay on track for a first Grand Slam final at the French Open.

Greek fifth seed Tsitsipas qualified for his third successive major semi-final, winning 6-3, 7-6 (7/3), 7-5 to avenge his defeat by second-ranked Medvedev at the Australian Open and set up a showdown with Alexander Zverev.

"I was playing against one of the best guys on the tour and I had to keep up with the intensity and elevate my game," said Tsitsipas.

"I thought I was playing good and not giving him space to do things and I think my performance was close to one of my best this week. I love being in Paris, it brings back good memories and I'm happy to keep going."

Tsitsipas had won just one of seven previous matches with Medvedev, but the former arrived at Roland Garros favoured to reach the final after titles in Monte Carlo and Lyon, with Novak Djokovic and Rafael Nadal in the opposite half of the draw.

Look at her now. She's ranked a career-high 33rd and on a 10-match winning streak in singles.

Krejčíková ended the nine-match run of the 24th-seeded Gauff, who is based in Florida and was the

youngest French Open quarterfinalist since 2006. Gauff's 41 unforced errors included seven double-faults — and after one, she mangled her racket frame by whacking it three times against the ground.

Dahiya to fight for Gold at Poland Open

Olympic-bound Indian wrestler Ravi Dahiya put himself in line for his second title of 2021 season on Wednesday by reaching the 61kg final of Poland Open, the last Ranking Series event before the Tokyo Games.

All his opponents targeted Ravi's left leg again and again but the reigning Asian champion and 2019 World Championship Bronze medalist grappler's superior stamina pulled him through in his bouts.

Competing in only his second competition of the season, Ravi began with an easy 10-1 win against Uzbekistan's Gulomjon Abdullaev but struggled against Kazakhstan's Adlan Askarov before prevailing 13-8.

He sealed his spot in the semifinals with a 9-5 win over American Nathan Khalid Tomasello, who like Ravi, usually, competes in 57kg.

Ravi then reached the final with a 7-4 win over Iran's Reza Ahmadali Atrinagharchi.

He will now fight for Gold against Abdullaev, whom he trounced easily in his opening bout.

The most challenging bout for Ravi turned out to be his sec-



ond round duel against Askarov. It was all about stamina and power as the Indian effected a dramatic turnaround after trailing 0-8 to win against the Kazakh.

Askarov, the Asian Championship Silver medalist, stunned Ravi with a flurry of double-leg attacks as the Indian was struggling to negotiate with the Kazakh wrestler's fast moves. Even as Ravi got himself positioned for counter attacks, he could not execute them.

It was a strange sight to see Ravi struggling and his defence falling apart. He was just one move and two points away from an embarrassing defeat by technical superiority.

However, his rival lost steam in the second period and Ravi took advantage of that to pull off take-down moves one after another to log 13 straight points.

Buttler, Morgan under investigation for alleged racist remarks against Indians

London: England's white-ball skipper Eoin Morgan and wicketkeeper batsman Jos Buttler are under investigation by the country's cricket board after their alleged racist tweets, mocking Indians, surfaced on the social media.

The England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) has promised "relevant and appropriate action", saying each case will be considered on an individual basis.

The posts, in which Buttler and Morgan used the word 'sir' to mock the Indians, started doing the rounds on social media after the ECB suspended pacer Ollie Robinson for some of his offensive tweets dating back to 2012-13.

"Screenshots have also been shared of a message by Buttler in which he says 'I always reply

sir no1 else like me like you like me' and, separately, Morgan includes Buttler in a message which says, 'Sir you're my favourite batsman', according to a report in the telegraph.co.uk.

"Although there are questions over the precise context of the tweets, they were written at a time when Buttler and Morgan were established England players and have caused offence on social media," the report added. The ECB said the matter will be dealt in an appropriate manner.

A homophobic tweet dating back to 2010 from veteran pacer James Anderson has also emerged. "For me it's 10-11 years ago, I've certainly changed as a person. And I think that's the difficulty, things do change, you do make mistakes," Anderson told the British media.

Benzema injured in France's win

Karim Benzema was forced to leave the pitch with a dead leg on Tuesday as world champions France beat Bulgaria 3-0 in their final friendly one week before beginning their Euro 2020 campaign.

Benzema was taken off in the 39th minute at the Stade De France in what is France's last match before they take on Germany in their opening Group F match of the European Championship against Germany on June 15.



France also face reigning European champions Portugal and Hungary, who will play two

of their group matches in front of big crowds at the Puskas Arena in Budapest.

The 33-year-old Benzema had been recalled with great fanfare to the national team following a near six-year exile, but his replacement Olivier Giroud showed why Les Bleus are considered among the favourites for trophy with a late brace which took his France total to 46.

Giroud, 34, is now just five goals behind France's all-time top scorer Thierry Henry but will likely be sidelined when Benzema returns.

Williamson out of 2nd Eng Test but 'will be back' for WTC final

New Zealand captain Kane Williamson was on Wednesday ruled out of the second Test against England to give much-needed rest to his 'irritated' left elbow ahead of the World Test Championship final against India.

Left-handed batsman Tom Latham will don the captaincy hat in Williamson's absence in the second Test beginning here on June 10.

While Latham will lead the Kiwis only for the third time, Will Young will replace Williamson in the playing eleven.

According to a statement issued by New Zealand Cricket, Williamson has been managing the elbow injury "since first missing matches in March".

New Zealand coach Gary Stead said that the injury has been troubling the 30-year-old batsman for quite some time.

"It's not an easy decision for Kane to have to miss a Test, but we think it's the right one," he said.

"He's had an injection in his elbow to relieve the irrita-



tion he's been experiencing when he bats and a period of rest and rehabilitation will help maximise his recovery.

"The decision has been made very much with the ICC World Test Championship Final at Southampton in mind and we are confident he will be ready for that match starting on June 18," he added.

Latham assured Williamson will be back for the WTC final.

"I am sure he will be back. From our point of view, it is a precautionary thing. We would love for him to be available for the game but we have also got the eye on the (WTC) final in a week's time.

"So it is about Kane giving himself the best opportunity to be fully fit and available for that game. The decision was made for him to rest this one and get that right for the final," said Latham in the pre-match interaction ahead of the second Test against England.

Latham also said that New Zealand will be resting their pacers on a case-by-case basis rather than resting all of them. Senior pacer Trent Boult is set to play the game after missing the first one, considering the WTC final in the following week.

"His coming back into the side is a massive boost for us. The way he can swing the ball, his leadership as well. He has been in this part of the world and knows how to perform," said Latham.

On resting the likes of Neil Wagner, Tim Southee and Kyle Jamieson, Latham added: "While we have an eye on that final, this is such an important game for us to put a performance that we can be proud of. We will take a call on the 11 or 12 after training but it (resting pacers) is more of a case by case situation."

IOA in search of new kit sponsor

New Delhi: After dropping Chinese sportswear company Li Ning as India's Olympic kit sponsor, Sports Minister Kiren Rijiju on Wednesday said the country's athletes will not wear branded apparel in the upcoming Tokyo Games even as the Indian Olympic Association (IOA) claimed that the search is on for a new partner.

Rijiju's statement came hours after IOA president Narinder Batra told PTI that the National Olympic Committee (NOC) was hoping to find a new kit sponsor for the contingent by the end of this month after cutting ties with Li Ning on Tuesday.
