Body with hands cut off found at farm protest site

Nihang surrenders
in case of lynching
of Punjab labourer
at Singhu border

In a gruesome murder, a man was lynched, his hand chopped off and the body was found tied to a barricade at a farmers' protest site at Delhi's Singhu border in Haryana's Sonapat district on Friday morning.

The deceased identified as Lakhbir Singh, a labourer from Chima Khurd village in Punjab's Tarn Taran district, was allegedly killed by a group of Nihangs for desecrating a Sikh holy book.

A Nihang, Saravjeet Singh, surrendered to the police, taking responsibility for killing a man at Singhu border in the evening. An FIR was registered in the case under Sections 302 and 34 of the Indian Penal Code (IPC) at Kundli police

station by the Haryana Police.

A police spokesman said that investigation in the case is going on to ascertain the allegation of desecration.

As tension prevailed at the farmers' protest site at Singhu border after the murder, Haryana Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar held a high-level meeting in the evening to review the law and order situation.

The Chief Minister also

directed DGP PK Agrawal to take strict and prompt action against those responsible for the murder.

After the murder, a few videos from the protest site went viral on social media. In a video clip, the Nihangs were seen standing near a body and were heard in the clip saying the man has been punished for desecrating a holy book of the Sikhs. The Nihangs are a Sikh order, distinguished by their

blue robes and often seen carrying spears.

After the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) blamed the farmers' leaders for the incident, the Samyukta Kisan Morcha (SKM) claimed that the killing of a man at the protest site was an internal matter of the Nihang Sikhs and had nothing to do with the ongoing farmers' protest against three central farm laws.

The SKM leaders condemned the incident and also demanded a thorough probe into the matter alleging that a religious colour is being given to their movement.

While talking to the mediapersons, SKM leader Jagjit Singh Dallewal said, "When we reached the spot some people were saying that the deceased man, before dying, admitted he was sent by someone and given ₹30,000. I don't have the video proof of it but the Government should probe this matter thoroughly. This is an attempt to give communal colour to the farmers' protest.

Shield generated by other strains not immune to Delta

Delhi Covid-19 cases
shot up in April when
Alpha was displaced
by Delta rise: Study

The severe outbreak of Covid-19 in Delhi in first quarter of this year when cases shot up from approximately 2,000 daily cases to alarming 20,000 (between 31 March and 16 April) showed that not only the Delta variant of SARS-CoV2 is extremely transmissible but that it can also infect individuals previously infected by a different strains of the virus, according to a team of international scientists.

SARS-CoV-2 had spread widely throughout India in the first wave, with initial results from the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) finding one in five (21%) adults and one in four (25%) 10 to 17-year-old adolescents had been infected. The figures were much higher in Indian megacities like



Delhi where by February 2021, over a half (56%) of individuals were thought to have been infected.

Since the first case of Covid-19 was detected in Delhi in March 2020, the city had experienced multiple outbreaks, in June, September and November 2020. After reaching a high of almost 9,000 cases daily in November 2020, new cases steadily declined, with very few new infections between December 2020 and March 2021.

However, the situation reversed dramatically in April 2021 when Delhi reported 20,000 infections every day

with huge rise in hospitalisations and ICU admissions, severely stressing the healthcare system, with daily deaths spiking to levels three-fold higher than previous waves.

The international team of scientists led by the National Centre of Disease Control (NCDC) and the CSIR Institute of Genomics and Integrative Biology, India, with collaborators from the University of Cambridge and Imperial College London, UK, and the University of Copenhagen, Denmark used genomic and epidemiological data, together with mathematical modelling, to study the outbreak.

Iran calls Adani Ports' decision not to handle cargo 'unprofessional'

Iran has taken strong exception to the decision by Adani Ports and SEZ Ltd (APSEZ) not to handle any cargo originating from that country. Iran Embassy here on Friday termed the action as "unprofessional and imbalanced move."

The Adani Ports took the decision after the seizure of nearly 3,000 kilos of heroin at its Mundra port last month. It said it will not handle any cargo originating from Iran, Pakistan and Afghanistan.

Conveying its displeasure to India, Iran said it was praised even by the United Nations for its fight against drug trafficking and that it has again been "targeted unfairly" through denial of trade and banning its consignments while describing the restriction as an "unprofessional and imbalanced move." The Iranian Embassy issued a statement on the matter but did not directly mention the Adani Ports.

The APSEZ, which operates Mundra Port in Gujarat,



on Monday said it will not handle container cargo originating from Iran, Pakistan and Afghanistan at all its terminals from November 15. The decision came nearly a month after the seizure of heroin at Mundra Port located in Kutch district of Gujarat.

Unhappy over the move, Iranian authorities are learnt to have taken up the matter with Indian narcotic drug control authorities.

The Iranian Embassy said the discussion also focused on mutual co-operation in the fight against drug trafficking and that it resulted in some positive outcomes.

2 jawans martyred in drive to smoke out ultras in J&K

Op enters into fifth day in thickly forested area of Poonch

The Indian Army has suffered more losses even as the ongoing counter-terrorist operation entered into its fifth day in the thickly forested area of Mendhar tehsil in Poonch district on Friday.

The traffic remained disrupted on the Jammu-Poonch highway for the second consecutive day even as massive searches were being conducted in the area to track down the footprints of the terrorists.

So far seven Indian soldiers, including one JCO, six other ranks have sacrificed their lives in the line of duty. Two more Army personnel were killed in an encounter with terrorists in Poonch, officials said on Friday. During the exchange of fire, two Army

personnel were critically injured and they later succumbed to their injuries, he said, adding the operation is still going on.

Earlier, the a defence public relation officer (PRO) had said the body of a junior commissioned officer (JCO) is yet to be recovered. However, he later said the body was identified of that of a jawan and not of the JCO.

"In an ongoing counter-

terrorism operation in the general area of Nar Khas forest in Mendhar sub-division there was an exchange of fire between army troops and terrorists during the evening hours of Thursday," the PRO said.

A militant involved in the recent civilian killings in Srinagar was gunned down in an encounter with security forces in Pulwama on Friday, police said.

Address demographic imbalance in country, asks Mohan Bhagwat

A part from calling for "re-formulation" of the national population policy to address what he called "demographic imbalance" in the country and implement it uniformly to all, RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat on Friday asked the Government to speed up efforts to "curb and finish off" the activities of terrorists indulging in "targeted killings" of national-minded citizens in Jammu & Kashmir.

He also asked the Government to totally curb "illegal infiltration from across the borders", prepare a National Register of Citizens and prevent "these infiltrators from acquiring citizenship rights and purchasing lands".

Addressing the annual Dussehra rally at the RSS head-

quarters in Nagpur, Bhagwat demanded that the Hindu temples controlled by the Government be returned to the Hindu devotees and the wealth of the Hindu temples should be utilised for the worship of the deities and the welfare of the Hindu community only.

Alluding to a resolution passed at the RSS' Akhil

Bharatiya Karyakari Mandal meeting held in Ranchi in 2015, Bhagwat said, "Vast differences in growth rates of different religious groups, infiltration and conversion resulting in religious imbalance of the population ratio, especially in border areas may emerge as a threat to the unity, integrity and cultural identity of the country."

Self-reliance to make India world's biggest military power: PM

After undertaking a major reform by corporatising the ordnance factories, Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday here said the objective is to propel India as the world's biggest military on its own through self-reliance.

He also said there is more transparency, trust and technology-driven approach in India's defence sector now than ever before and major reforms are taking place for the first time since Independence while discarding stagnant policies.

He made these assertions in a virtual address to dedicate seven new defence companies after reorganising the Ordnance Factory Board (OFB) on the occasion of Vijayadashmi.

The seven state-run companies were created after dissolving the over 200-year-old OFB. The assets of the OFB, including its 41 ordnance fac-



tories, were transferred to the seven new firms. The new companies started functioning from October 1.

Modi mentioned that the target should be that the companies not only establish expertise in their products but also become global brands. He urged that while competitive cost is India's strength, quality and reliability should be its identity.

He said the world saw the strength of India's ordnance factories at the time of World War I and that they used to have better resources and world-class skills, but the companies were ignored in the post-Independence period, leading to the country's dependence on foreign supplies.

Fidayeen attack on Shia mosque kills 32 in Af

Suicide bombers attacked a Shia mosque packed with worshippers attending Friday prayers in southern Afghanistan, killing at least 32 people and wounding 68, according to a Taliban official.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the carnage at the Fatimiya mosque in Kandahar province. It came a week after a bombing claimed by the local Islamic State affiliate killed 46 people at a Shia mosque in northern Afghanistan.

The sectarian bloodletting has raised fears that ISIS — an enemy of both the Taliban and the West — is expanding its foothold in Afghanistan.

Murtaza, who and like many Afghans goes by one name, said he was inside the mosque during the attack and reported four explosions: two outside and two inside. He said

Friday prayers at the mosque typically draw hundreds of people.

Another witness, also named Murtaza, was in charge of security at the mosque and said he saw two bombers. He said one detonated explosives outside the gate, and the other was already among the worshippers inside the mosque.

Shivraj Singh Chouhan to hold virtual Griha Pravesh

Concrete efforts are being made for effective implementation of housing schemes in Madhya Pradesh. By effectively implementing the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (Gramin), 21.05 lakh houses have been built in the state. In the financial year 2021-22, despite excessive rainfall in some districts of the state, maximum one lakh 60,000 houses were built in the three months of rainy season.

Against the target of construction of 26.28 lakh residential houses given to Madhya Pradesh under the scheme, the feat achieved is not only satisfactory but also commendable from the point of view of providing housing to the poor. It is noteworthy that residential houses have also been made available for the people of three special backward tribes of Madhya Pradesh namely Baiga, Saharia and Bharia under the special project. It was unimaginable for these sections of people living in dilapidated houses that they would get a house so soon and they would

be able to celebrate Deepotsav in the new house.

Madhya Pradesh is doing good work in fulfilling Prime Minister Narendra Modi's ambitious target of providing housing to all the homeless people of the country by 2022. In the coming week Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan will hold a virtual Griha Pravesh of 2.51 lakh beneficiaries of Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (Gramin) for their entry in the residential houses simultaneously. Necessary preparations are being made in this regard. Madhya Pradesh has set an imitable example in fulfilling the target of housing for all 2022.

The families who have got the gift of their house are especially grateful to Prime Minister Modi and Chief Minister Chouhan. This year before Diwali, they have agreed to reach their newly constructed residences. Now they will celebrate Deepotsav in the new residence itself. Chouhan says that every poor family in the state will be given land lease and the amount of housing

construction according to their eligibility.

Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan, while reviewing continuously, gave clear instructions to increase the speed of implementation of housing schemes. As a result, the work of housing construction did not stop in the state even during the Corona period. More than 3 lakh residential houses were constructed during this period. Usually, the average time taken for the construction of a residential house is 4 months, but the Panchayat and Rural Development Department has completed the work of construction of pucca houses for the poor at a fast pace and completed the construction of 1 lakh houses in a short span of one month. The duration of housing construction is 114 days at the national level. In view of this, the work of construction of houses has been completed in Madhya Pradesh at good speed. This was not possible in the rainy season but the construction agencies have achieved this feat by working diligently.

Police busts gang of vehicle lifters, arrests 3 persons

Koh-e-Fiza police have nabbed a vehicle lifter gang and nabbed three persons involved in the nexus. Besides the cops have also recovered three two wheelers and three four wheelers worth Rs 25 lakh.

Acting on a tip off regarding gang involved in stealing vehicles and selling them in different areas.

The nabbed accused were identified Mohammad Umar (37), Danish Khan (30) and Allahrakha Parsala alias Rehman (39) while Amit Vishwakarma and Rahul.

On October 2021, information was received that two persons are going from Lalghati to Bairagarh in a Scooty Honda Dio, the number of MP 04 SP 9699 is which has been stolen from Kohefiza and they were nabbed. They confessed stealing vehicle from Colony Koh-e-Fiza and parked at Kakhasha complex four months ago, stole a Bullet motor cycle and a Honda shine worth a month ago from Khajuri road, Sehore road in front of Bhaskar factory. Danish told that three months ago Rahul of Sikarpur, Bulandshahr, bought a Creta car without number worth Rs 4 lakh.

The car was given by the accused Danish to his friend Amit Vishwakarma of Parwlia. Danish accepted to buy four more cars from Rahul which include Creta car, 2 Innova Crysta, 1 Honda CRB and 1 Baleno. The accused gave 5 cars to Amit. The search is on for the remaining absconding accused Amit Vishwakarma and Rahul. Many more vehicles are likely to be recovered from the absconding accused.

The accused used to roam around the city by breaking the locks of two wheelers parked at isolated places, changing their number plates and driving themselves and four wheelers Rahul resident of Sikarpur, District Bulandshahr, U.P. He used to buy a car without papers and without number and sell it with the help of his partner Amit Vishwakarma. Accused Danish and Amit both buy vehicles by investing equal money and after selling those vehicles, both of them share the profit that is made between them. The police recovered vehicles from 1 vehicle from Ashoka Garden police station, 1 from Eithkhedi, 7 from Kotwali Bhopal, 1 from Kotwali Vidisha, 4 from Koh-e-Fiza, 1 from TT Nagar, 2 from Nishatpura, 1 from Piplani, 4 from Shahjehanabad, 1 from Saraf Indore and 3 from Hanumanganj police station area.

UK Carrier Strike Group enters Bay of Bengal

Signaling a strong strategic and defence partnership between the two countries, the United Kingdom's (UK) Carrier Strike Group, led by its largest warship HMS Queen Elizabeth, sailed into the Bay of Bengal on Friday. It was the second such voyage in the last three months. The British High Commission said here the Carrier Strike Group (CSG) will take part in the "most demanding exercise" ever between the UK and India, incorporating elements from all

three military services. HMS Queen Elizabeth and its strike task group had carried out a mega wargame with a number of Indian warships and submarines in the Bay of Bengal in July that featured a range of complex drills. "The deployment is a powerful demonstration of the UK's commitment to deepening its diplomatic, economic and security-based ties in the Indo-Pacific region. India is essential in ensuring a free, open, inclusive and prosperous Indo-Pacific," the High Commission said in a state-

ment. A carrier battle group or carrier strike group is a mega naval fleet comprising an aircraft carrier, accompanied by a large number of destroyers, frigates and other ships. British High Commissioner to India Alex Ellis said India is an "essential" partner for the UK in the Indo-Pacific region and that the Carrier Strike Group's visit demonstrates the deepening of the bilateral defence and security partnership. The envoy also referred to the resolve by Prime Minister

Narendra Modi and British Prime Minister Boris Johnson to work towards shared security and prosperity. "This visit will boost the cooperation of our armed forces and show the living bridge connecting our people," he said. First Sea Lord Admiral Tony Radakin said the CSG's engagement with India showcases the deepening comprehensive strategic partnership. "Both the Indian and the Royal Navy are blue-water, multi-carrier navies, which places us in a very exclusive club," he said. "Our growing interactions are a testimony to the shared commitment to the rules-based international system, a belief in the values of open trade, and in the importance of the freedom of the high seas — a right conveyed on all nations," he added. HNLMs Evertsen, a Provincien-class frigate of the Royal Netherlands Navy, is also visiting Mumbai along with the British CSG. Ambassador of the Netherlands to India Marten van den Berg said the Indian Ocean is a gateway for Europe into the Indo-Pacific and his country definitely recognises India's crucial role in the region. "The visit to the port of Mumbai by HNLMs Evertsen is a confirmation of our long-standing strong relationship and a step towards enhancement of the Netherlands and India defence relations," the envoy said.

ED attaches ₹146.67 cr in bank forgery case

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) has attached assets worth ₹ 146.67 crore of Future Metals Pvt. Ltd. (FMPL) and Future Exim India Pvt. Ltd. (FEIPL) under the provisions of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act in a case connected with fraud committed on banks under the guise of merchant trade. The attached proceeds of crime are in the form of immovable properties located in Maharashtra, Punjab, New Delhi, Gujarat, Bengaluru and Bellary. The ED had initiated investigation on the basis of FIR dated July 18, 2009 registered by Bengaluru Police under Indian Penal Code sections relating to cheating and criminal conspiracy and another FIR dated October 9, 2009 registered by Anti-Corruption Branch, CBI, New Delhi for the offences committed by the accused persons relating to cheating, criminal conspiracy and using forged documents as genuine. The accused firms FMPL and FEIPL approached STCL for entering into merchandise trade and requested the latter to facilitate the trade.



Subsequently, FMPL and FEIPL entered into tripartite agreements with STCL Ltd., a fully owned subsidiary of the State Trading Corporation of India Ltd. (Public Sector Enterprise) along with Overseas buyers and sellers for export and import of copper and nickel. FMPL and FEIPL had signed the agreements guaranteeing the payment to be made by the overseas buyers. Money laundering investigation has revealed that FMPL and FEIPL did not honour the tripartite agreements that they had entered with STCL and overseas buyers and sellers. Chairman of FMPL and FEIPL, Naveen Sriram and Managing Director Sudheer Sriram had executed deed of personal and corporate guarantee in favour of STCL against the latter agreeing to provide finance for the merchandise

trade transactions and this corporate guarantee could be invoked by STCL in the event of any default in repayment of amount due to STCL. STCL established irrevocable Letters of Credit for 90 days towards purchase of goods with a condition that the LCs would not be allowed to devolve under any circumstances as per the undertaking given by FMPL/FEIPL. However, the LCs were devolved due to non-payment by overseas buyers which was guaranteed by FMPL and FEIPL causing wrongful loss of USD 249.572 million to STCL. Earlier, in 2018, the ED had provisionally attached assets worth ₹39 crore and a Prosecution Complaint (charge sheet) was filed on December 10, 2018. With the present attachment, total attachments by ED have reached ₹185.67 crore.

IMD predicts clear sky in Delhi



New Delhi: The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has predicted a 'mainly clear sky' in the national capital on Friday with the maximum temperature likely to hover around 34 degrees Celsius and the minimum at 18.6 degrees Celsius. As per the morning update, a temperature of 22.6 degrees Celsius was recorded at 8.30 a.m. with a relative humidity of 68 per cent. The wind was blowing in the southern direction at a speed of 7.5 km per hour. The city observed sunrise at 6.22 a.m. and the sun is likely to set at 5.52 p.m. In the past 24 hours, the maximum temperature was recorded at 33.9 degrees Celsius, a notch departure from normal, and the minimum was at 18.6 degrees Celsius. System of Air Quality and Weather Forecasting And Research (SAFAR) said the Air Quality Index (AQI) in the national capital was 190 for PM10 and 77 for PM2.5. As PM10 went over 100, the department has issued a 'moderate' health advisory which means that sensitive people should consider reducing prolonged or heavy exertion and heavy outdoor work. The PM2.5 level was also under the moderate category. Notably, Delhi has 36 monitoring stations that accurately record the levels of both particulate matters. As per the latest update at 9.31 a.m., the other pollutants Nitrogen dioxide (NO2) and ozone (O3) were recorded at 12 and 197, respectively. The data for carbon monoxide (CO) was not available. IANS

Global Hunger Report 2021 lowers India's rank, Centre calls it devoid of ground reality

With India slipping behind even Nepal, Bangladesh and Pakistan on the Global Hunger Index (GHI) 2021, the Centre on Friday said the report is devoid of ground reality and facts and the methodology used to calculate is unscientific. With a score of 27.5, India has slipped to the 101st position out of 116 countries.

"It is shocking to find that the Global Hunger Report 2021 has lowered the rank of India on the basis of FAO (UN's Food and Agriculture Organization) estimate on proportion of undernourished population, which is found to be devoid of ground reality and facts and suffers from serious methodological issues. The publishing agencies of the Global Hunger Report, Concern Worldwide and Welt Hunger Hilfe, have not done their due diligence before releasing the report," the government said in a statement.

"The methodology used by FAO is unscientific. They have based their assessment on the results of a 'four question' opinion poll, which was conducted telephonically by Gallup. There is no scientific methodology to measure undernourishment like availability of food grains per capita during the period. The scientific measurement of undernourishment would require measurement of weight and height, whereas the methodology involved here is based on Gallup poll based on pure telephonic estimate of the population," it said.

"The report completely disregards government's massive effort to ensure food security of the entire population during the Covid period, verifiable data on which are available. The opinion poll does not have a single question on whether the respondent received any food support from the government or

Sibal takes a dig at Centre as India slips to 101st rank

Senior Congress leader Kapil Sibal on Friday Sibal took a dig at the Government over India slipping to 101st position in the Global Hunger Index (GHI) 2021 of 116 countries, from its 2020 position of 94th. "Congratulations Modi ji for eradicating: 1) poverty 2) hunger 3) making India a global power 4) for our digital economy 5) so much more. Global Hunger Index: 2020 : India ranked 94. 2021: India ranks 101," the Rajya Sabha MP tweeted. Sibal also alleged that attention was diverted from the Lakhimpur Kheri incident through the Aryan Khan drug

case. He alleged that a "guilty till proven innocent" template was being applied in the case of Aryan Khan, son of Bollywood actor Shah Rukh Khan. Aryan (23), arrested by the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) on October 3, will have to remain in jail for some more days as a court on Thursday, after hearing arguments, posted the matter for orders on October 20. "Aryan Khan -- Narcotics Control Bureau investigation -- New Jurisprudence: No evidence of: consumption, possession. Guilty till proven innocent. Attention successfully diverted from Ashish Mishra (Lakhimpur Kheri)," Sibal tweeted.

other sources. The representativeness of even this opinion poll is doubtful for India and other countries," it added. The report, prepared jointly by Irish aid agency Concern Worldwide and German organisation Welt Hunger Hilfe, mentioned the level of hunger in India as "alarming" with its GHI score decelerating from 38.8 in 2000 to the range of 28.8 - 27.5 between 2012 and 2021. Neighbouring countries like Nepal (76), Bangladesh (76), Myanmar (71) and Pakistan (92) are also in the 'alarming' hunger category but have fared better, added the report.

Meanwhile, China, Brazil and Kuwait shared the top rank with a GHI score of less than five, reported the GHI website. GHI is a tool designed to comprehensively measure and track hunger at the global, regional, and national levels. The GHI is designed to raise awareness and understanding of the struggle against hunger, provide a means to compare the levels of hunger between countries and regions and call attention to the areas of the world in greatest need of additional resources to eliminate hunger.

I-T detects unaccounted income of ₹184 cr after raid on realtors

The Income Tax Department detected unaccounted income of about ₹184 crore after it recently raided two real estate business groups of Mumbai and some family members of Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar, sources said on Friday.

The searches were launched on October 7 at 70 premises in Mumbai, Pune, Baramati, Goa and Jaipur, the Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT), the policy making body for the tax department, said in a statement. "The evidence gathered during the search has revealed several prima-facie unaccounted and benami transactions," it said.



"Incriminating documents, evidencing unaccounted income of about Rs 184 crore of the two groups have been found," the statement said without naming the entities involved. Pawar had told the media on the day of the raids that the tax searches were also carried out at the premises of his three

sisters, one living in Kolhapur district and two in Pune district of Maharashtra. The CBDT said unaccounted cash of Rs 2.13 crore and jewellery of Rs 4.32 crore were seized during the operation. "The search action has led to identification of transactions by these business groups

Stubble burning cases go down

The number of stubble-burning events in Punjab, Haryana and the eight NCR districts of Uttar Pradesh has come down significantly this year, with a total of 1,795 such incidents reported this month as against 4,854 in the same period last year, the Union Environment Ministry said on Friday quoting a report by the Commission for Air Quality Management in NCR and Adjoining Areas (CAQM). The Commission said according to a report based on the protocol framed by the ISRO, paddy residue-burning events have been reduced by 69.49 per cent in Punjab, 18.28 per cent in Haryana and 47.61

per cent in the eight NCR districts of Uttar Pradesh during a one-month period, as compared to the corresponding period last year. "Active paddy residue-burning events in Punjab, Haryana and eight NCR districts of Uttar Pradesh have come down significantly this year, fewer fire counts reported in 2021 as compared to last year. "Total 1,795 fire counts reported for the one-month period till October 14 as against 4,854 instances reported in the corresponding period during 2020. Enforcement agencies have so far inspected 663 of the total reported sites in Punjab, Haryana and NCR districts of Uttar Pradesh," the commission

said. It said of the 1,795 sites from where stubble burning was reported in Punjab, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh, 663 fields have been inspected by the enforcement agencies and the officials concerned of the respective states and that an environmental compensation (EC) has been imposed in 252 cases. During the said period in the current year, 1,286 stubble-burning events were reported in Punjab as against 4,216 for the same period last year while Haryana reported 487 such incidents as against 596 for the corresponding year last year. The total number of stubble-burning incidents reported from the eight NCR districts of

Uttar Pradesh during this period was 22 as against 42 for the corresponding period last year. No stubble-burning incident was reported from Delhi and the two NCR districts of Rajasthan. In a statement, the CAQM said crop harvesting will be at its peak in the next few weeks and the state governments are taking steps in accordance with the plan of action to improve the efficacy of enforcement and implementation to effectively tackle the problem of stubble burning. The hotspots of paddy residue-burning in Punjab are Amritsar, Tarn Taran, Patiala and Ludhiana, accounting for 72 per cent of the stubble-burning events in the state.

Diabetes, obesity, heart-related ailments rising in India at disturbing pace: Survey

Non-communicable diseases (NCDs) like diabetes, obesity and heart related ailments are rising in India at a disturbing pace and one way of curbing this may be by mandatory front of package labelling (FoPL) on food products as has been revealed by a national online survey. The survey found that a majority of parents, a significant 80 per cent respondents, favoured a mandatory FoPL to regulate the food industry dishing out high fat, sugar and salt (HFSS) containing packaged food to the kids. The nationwide survey

conducted by IGPP (Institute of Governance, Policies and Politics) and released on the eve of the World Food Day also revealed that almost 60% of parents respondents expressed concern over the increasing presence of the packaged junk food products in the markets and its aggressive unregulated marketing. Similarly, 77% felt that information related to harmful ingredients like salt, sugar and fat, if made mandatory by the government and displayed in a simple, easy to interpret manner, would steer them towards making healthier choices. Also, more than 62% showed their readiness to permanently give up the habit of

eating HFSS laden food, found the survey titled 'People's Awareness about the Relationship between Food Habits/Ingredients and NCDs/CVDs'. It also indicated that parents were keen for mandatory warning labels on the front of pack on all foods so that it can help them explain to their children why they should not buy HFSS food. Dr Madhukar Mittal, Addl. Professor, Dept. Of Endocrinology, AIIMS, Jodhpur said, "majority of packaged foods contain extra calories - also known as zero calories because they lack nutritional value, vitamin and natural fiber which lead to weight gain and high blood

sugar. India is already facing the devastating impact of an unhealthy diet. If this eating pattern continues, soon India will be the capital of diabetes and obesity." Dr Vandana Prasad, Community Pediatrician and member of Nutrition Advocacy in Public Interest (NAPI) noted that, "...Though this study had been done with an urban middle class sample, we see the penetration of junk food to the remotest villages of the country without any attempts at regulation or public information. "Most attempts to provide FoPL are being diluted by big food companies at the level of Food Safety and Standard

Authority of India (FSSAI) that does not seem to bother with preventing conflict of interest in favour of the health of the general public. Clearly the consumers will have to force adherence to WHO standards where FoPL is concerned." Manish Tiwari, Director, IGPP added, "the online survey results clearly reflect growing concern among parents about easy availability of HFSS filled packaged foods causing NCDs also known as 'Silent Killers'. In fact, an easily understandable, readable and acceptable label may facilitate usage by people to

make healthy food purchases. "The top food regulatory body, FSSAI, and the policy makers should take a cue from such evidence to enact a strong legislation to implement FoPL policies as a viable strategy to reduce obesity and NCDs risk," he added. The survey which was primarily concentrated around the urban middle-class nuclear families covering a sample pool of 237 parents was aimed to have an idea about the entrenchment of packaged food items in Indian markets and to test if people would find warning labels on the front of pack useful in guiding them towards healthier food choices. According to the Global Burden of Diseases Report 2017, cardiovascular disease (CVD) kills 1.7 million Indians every year. Moreover, the premature mortality (years of life lost because of CVD) in India increased to 37 million in 2010 from 23.2 million in 1990 (by 59 per cent).

of Police and other senior officials at Port Blair. Tikait slams ‘red carpet’ arrest of Mishra’s son

The BKU leader told reporters here that the ‘red carpet’ arrest of the minister’s son, who is the prime accused in the incident, has fueled the anger of the protesting farmers. Tikait said at an event in Tappal said that the whole world knows that there can be no justice until the father of the

main accused is not removed from office.

Expressing dissatisfaction over the ongoing probe in the case, he claimed that the Union minister was influencing the investigation of the SIT. He reiterated that if Ajay Mishra is not removed from his post, then the ongoing protest against Lakhimpur Kheri violence will intensify.

The BKU leader said that there would be a “rail roko” demonstration on October 18. He also said that BKU would organize a huge Kisan Panchayat in Lucknow on October 26.

Security Forces avenge PSI killing, neutralise ultra

A joint team of security forces Friday avenged the killing of a Probationary Sub-Inspector (PSI) Arshid Ahmad by eliminating a terrorist behind his killing in the Khanyar area of Srinagar on September 12.

And while bidding farewell Durga and her family are treated to sweets and the Mother Goddess along with Laxmi and Saraswati are smeared in vermilion or Sindoor.

After this, the women apply Sindur on each others’ foreheads before play with it much

like they do during Holi. This is called Sindoor Khela when they smear each other and dance to the rhythm of Dhak (the drum) while wishing good to all.

Philosophically however Vijay Dashami is celebrated as the victory of good over evil which connote manifestation of evil and good that make a man --- who experience a sustained battle within between these two qualities with the good winning in the ultimate run.

Meanwhile, Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee and Governor Jagdeep Dhankhar on Friday wished the people of Bengal on the occasion of Vijay Dashami wishing all peace, good health and prosperity.

BJP has neither understood Savarkar nor Gandhi:Uddhav

Singling out his party’s erstwhile saffron alliance partner for severe criticism on several counts, Maharashtra chief minister and Shiv Sena president Uddhav Thackeray on Friday made a cryptic comment on Friday that “BJP has understood neither Veer Savarkar nor Mahatma Gandhi”.

Uddhav was apparently referring to a recent comment by Defence Minister Rajnath Singh who raked up a controversy through a claim that Gandhi had advised Savarkar, who was languishing at Andaman’s Cellular Jail then, to write mercy petitions to the British.

Addressing the annual Dussehra rally at Shanmukhananda Hall at Sion in north-central Mumbai, Uddhav did not spare RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat either. “Mohan Bhagwat has said that all our ancestors came from the same planet. Supposing I take his statement to be true, I would like to know from him if the ancestors of the Opposition leaders came from other planets. Did those farmers who were crushed to death in Lakhimpur Kheri also come from some other planet?,” the Sena president asked the RSS chief.

“On one hand, you (Mohan Bhagwat) say, the Hindutva does not practise

enmity and jealousy, while on the other, do you accept what happened at Lakhimpur Kheri in broad daylight?,” Uddhav asked Bhagwat.

Uddhav also had a dig at the BJP – which “prides itself as the World’s largest political party”, for fielding a former Shiv Sena candidate in Deglur Assembly by-poll. “See the irony, the world’s largest political party has to import candidates even for an assembly by-poll,” he said.

As he tore into the BJP on various counts, Uddhav made a stunning claim that had the BJP fulfilled its pre-Assembly poll promise of giving the CM’s post to his party, he would have perhaps stepped aside, made Shiv Sainik the chief minister and even retired from politics.

“If the BJP had fulfilled its promise of giving (the first term) of the chief ministership, I would have perhaps stepped aside, made a Shiv Sainik the chief minister and even retired from politics. I am being criticised in politics. This is not my field. I came here to fulfil the responsibility as a son (of late Balasaheb Thackeray). I will not keep quiet till I fulfil my responsibility. It is with this intent that I am here,” Uddhav said.

Slamming the BJP for calling the Shiv Sena corrupt after the two parties’ alliance ended in 2019, Uddhav dared it to topple his Sena-NCP-Congress coalition government which will complete two years next

month.

“I do not go after anyone. But, if someone targets me, I would not spare them. What is your stature to attack me? If you have some strength in you to take on me directly, please do it. But, do not use CBI, ED and IT to hand over threats to me. If you take on directly, I will retaliate as the Shiv Sena and not as the chief minister. Unlike you, I am not the one to hide behind police or enforcement agencies. I will do whatever I can through my Shiv Sainiks,” Uddhav said.

Coming down heavily on the BJP for making a song and dance of the arrest of Bollywood super star Shah Rukh Khan’s son Aryan Khan and its efforts to defame the Mumbai and Maharashtra police, Uddhav wanted to know as to why was the ruling party at the Centre talking about the seizure of multi-thousand crore worth drugs from Mundra port.

“Drugs worth several thousand crores were found at Mundra port in Gujarat. The court has ordered a probe into the whole thing. Why are the BJP leaders not talking about it?,” It has launched a campaign that the drugs are freely sold here in Maharashtra. If drugs are found with someone, can he be declared a criminal? Do you make efforts to reform the youngsters so that they can think about their future and not go wayward as they did earlier?,” the chief minister asked.

Lakhimpur case: Arms recovered from Lucknow flat owned by accused

Lucknow: The special investigation team (SIT) probing the Lakhimpur Kheri violence on Friday brought two accused persons, Ankit Das and Latif alias Kale, to a flat in Hussainganj area of Lucknow and recovered a revolver and a gun from there, police sources said.

They said the Hussainganj flat belongs to Das. The revolver licence holder is Das, while Latif holds the licence of the gun. After the incident on October 3, Das had escaped from the spot and hid the weapons in his apartment. Police will take the arms for a forensic test, so that it could be known whether it was used during the violence.

Sources also said that after the violence in Tikononia village on October 3, Das fled from there and hid himself in a hotel in Lucknow. After recovering the weapons from the flat, police reached the hotel located on Lohia Path, and took the CCTV footage.

Das is the nephew of late Congress leader and former Union minister Akhilesh Das.

The SIT probing the Lakhimpur Kheri violence on Thursday took Union Minister Ajay Mishra’s son and three others arrested in the case to recreate the sequence of events leading to the incident in Tikononia village.

Amid tight security, the three accused were taken to the site of the incident on the Tikononia-Banbirpur road, around 60 km from district headquarters of Lakhimpur, police said. Eight people died in the violence and of them, four were farmers, allegedly knocked down by a vehicle carrying BJP workers.

Infuriated farmers then allegedly lynched some people in the vehicles. The other dead included two BJP workers and their driver. In the incident, a journalist was also killed. Kerala logs 8,867 Covid cases while doctors launch stir

Kerala on Friday logged 8,867 new Covid-19 patients from 79,554 samples tested during the last 24 hours. The State recorded 67 deaths taking the fatalities to 26,734 till date.

Doctors belonging to the Kerala Government service launched the second phase of their agitation on Friday demanding better service condition and restoration of pay and allowances that were reduced drastically since the pandemic struck the State.

Things took a turn for the worse on Friday as a group of politicians including the panchayath president of Sooranadu



in Kollam district physically assaulted Dr Ganesh, the duty doctor of Sasthamkotta. Sreekumar, the panchayath president and a group of politicians had brought the dead body of a young woman late Thursday night to the hospital and wanted the duty doctor to issue a death certificate. But Dr Ganesh, who was the lone doctor on duty asked them to wait for few minutes as he was attending to an emergency case

, said Dr T N Suresh, general secretary, Kerala Government Medical Officers Association.

“Moreover, there are guidelines to issue death certificate. The doctor has to check the factors that led to the death. Adanis take over Thiruvananthapuram int’l airport; Tharoor hopes for best

Congress MP Shashi Tharoor on Friday said he was hoping for the best after the Adani Group took over the operation and management of the Thiruvananthapuram international Airport.

The Thiruvananthapuram MP said people would extend support if the group works keeping in mind the development of the capital city of Kerala and its surroundings.

Noting that developments cannot be implemented through strikes, he said for the progress of Thiruvananthapuram, a neat and tidy airport with equipment of the highest standard is required besides increasing the number of flights and airlines operating from there.

“I go forward hoping for the best,” Tharoor, known for his views supporting privatisation of airports, told reporters

here.

A day after the Group announced taking over the management of the international airport, the Congress leader said the private player would get the support of the people if it rises up to their expectations.

While the ruling LDF and the opposition Congress-led UDF opposed the handing over of the airport to the Adani group, Tharoor stuck to his stand that privatisation would help development of the city and its surrounding areas.

Unfazed by criticism over his stand, he had said privatisation would help tap potential and attract investors. The Congress MP has been drawing flak not only from the Left parties but even from his own party for his stand.

Actor-turned politician and Rajya Sabha MP Suresh Gopi too welcomed the privatisation of the airport. “It is

a positive move”, Gopi said. Denying the allegations of the airport having been sold to the Group, he said only the administration of the airport was handed over to it.

When the airport-users are satisfied with the service provided there, such criticisms would end, Gopi told reporters. Last year, the State Assembly unanimously passed a resolution protesting the privatisation of the airport with the Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan criticising its takeover by the Adani group. Vijayan said such a takeover was not for development but to protect the interest of monopolies.

The Thiruvananthapuram International Airport is the first of the four airports in the State to be established. It was set up in 1932, was owned and operated by the Airports Authority of India. PTI RRT TGB RRT

Drugs case: Aryan Khan speaks to parents via video call from jail

Mumbai: Aryan Khan, son of Bollywood actor Shah Rukh Khan, who is lodged in Arthur Road prison in central Mumbai in a case of alleged seizure of drugs from a cruise ship, has spoken to his parents through a video call from inside the prison once, an official said on Friday.

Aryan also received Rs 4,500 though money-order sent by his father, he said.

Aryan (23) was arrested by the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) on October 3 from the cruise ship off the Mumbai coast.

He will have to remain in jail at least till October 20, as a special court has posted his and two others’ bail pleas for orders on that day. He is lodged in the Arthur Road prison along with five others arrested in the case. **PTI**

Farmers’ body burns effigy of PM Modi, HM Shah

Jaipur: The Samyukt Kisan Morcha burnt a multi-headed Ravana-like effigy of Prime Minister Narendra Modi having faces of Home Minister Amit Shah and others in Jaipur on the occasion of Dussehra on Friday.

Apart from the faces of Modi and Shah, the effigy had the faces RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat, UP Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, Haryana CM Manohar Lal Khattar and businessmen Mukesh Ambani and Gautam Adani.

The effigy also had lines like ‘I am Narendra Damodardas Modi, I am anti-farmer’ written on it in Hindi.

Morcha workers assembled at Swami Kumaranand Bhawan at Hathroi from where they

marched towards Shaheed Smarak near a government hostel shouting slogans against PM Modi and others in protest against the Lakhimpur Kheri violence in UP and agriculture laws enacted by the Centre.

“Keeping up with the spirit of the festival - victory of good over evil, we burnt the effigy while symbolising the BJP, RSS, PM Narendra Modi and others as evil.

The central government has forgotten all democratic values and is working to benefit select businessmen and acting against farmers,” Sanjay Madhav, state joint secretary of Samyukt Kisan Morcha said.

He said the effigy was burnt under a national call given by the Morcha. **PTI**

Three held for slaughter of cows in B’luru

Bengaluru: Three people have been arrested for allegedly slaughtering many cows in an illegal slaughterhouse here, police said on Friday.

Admission carnival

The preference for DU across the nation is a sad commentary on the state of higher education

The process of admissions to undergraduate courses in Delhi University (DU) is an annual celebration of cosmopolitan student life in the national capital. Not even the COVID-19 pandemic could dent the fervour last year. Ironically, this year, all it took was a mindless remark by a Delhi University professor to dampen the spirit. The professor, who is of a certain political disposition, claimed a “marks jihad” by the Kerala education board. He contented that the board gave 100 per cent marks to its students to “over admit” those from Kerala to particular courses. The university bosses did not like his insinuation and he was ticked off. Two years ago, Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal promised in the Aam Aadmi Party manifesto before the assembly elections that 85 per cent of Delhi University seats would be reserved for the Capital’s residents. The Chief Minister, like the physics professor, did not realise that DU is a central university, bound by the Delhi University Act, and it does not come under the purview of any State Government. It treats all education boards alike and nobody can reserve seats for any demographic grouping. Such parochial outlooks apart, admissions time in DU involves millions of people all over India — students, parents, guardians and counsellors — making it a national event. The cut-offs, including 100 per cent for some courses, the number of applications, the numerous lists, make front-page news. Of the 70,000 seats up for grabs this year, over 41,000 seats were secured at the end of the first cut-off. Of this number, around 10,000 seats went to students from various State boards, the rest going to CBSE students.



By the end of the admissions process, Delhi would have become a bit more cosmopolitan than last year. In a broader sense, however, the overwhelming preference for DU across the country is a sad commentary on the general health of higher education in the States. Meritorious students leave for Delhi just as after their graduation they will leave India for abroad. Most outstation students come to Delhi because they are dissatisfied with the teaching standards, academic environment and competition back home and Delhi’s perceived importance as a stepping stone. Pushing this migration, if it can be called that, is a growing force of senior students and even State Governments. Students’ associations of north-eastern and southern States set up help desks in State capitals and Delhi to guide prospective students in selecting courses and colleges, acclimatising themselves in Delhi, or even learning Hindi and getting used to local street food. In the south, the Government-run Telangana Tribal and Social Welfare Residential Educational Institutions Society encourages students from lower castes and classes to get admissions in DU, covering their fees and hostel expenses. What makes the Telangana case unique is the Government’s overt push to enable marginalised young people to make the long journey from their remote homes to Delhi University.

Cunning edge

The unprecedented number of young women trafficking drugs in Kerala is disturbing

Friday marked Vijaya Dashami and the conclusion of this year’s Navratri Puja. The day is celebrated to mark the victory of good over evil. In Kerala, meanwhile, hundreds of thousands of tiny tots got initiated into the world of letters. Parents and teachers made them write the first letters of the alphabet, a ritual to mark their ‘graduation’ as students. In Sanskrit, the word Guru is made up of two letters: ‘Gu’ means darkness while ‘Ru’ stands for remover. The one who removes darkness is the Guru. It is the teachers who mould future citizens. No wonder, teachers were accorded the status of God in ancient India. Things have changed a lot and it is foolish to expect that customs and tradition would remain constant though there are some values which should never change. The relation between a teacher and student should remain eternally the same because it is imbibed in Indianness. The trigger to point out these values is the recent arrest of a school teacher at Ernakulam for being a drug trafficker. Susmitha Philip, who has been employed as a



teacher at a high-end public school in the city, was arrested by the police for being an agent and drug pusher among the young and old alike.

Susmitha was one of the prime sources who supplied narcotics to rave parties, the police say. The investigators are yet to get the details of students who have been converted into addicts by this special “teacher”. One of the disturbing trends being seen in the State is the arrest of an unprecedented number of young women in connection with drug trafficking. They are good-looking, fluent in English and Hindi and well-mannered, the mandatory requirements to succeed in Kerala. Nobody would be able to resist when they stride into the hearts with their sweet talk. Narcotic traffickers are employing all tricks in the game of marketing which may baffle even multinational enterprises. Rajasthan-born Rishiraj Singh, a brilliant IPS officer who was the director of the Excise Department, had warned the Government and society about the alarming increase in drug trafficking in the State. Not a single day passes in Kerala without reports of drug seizure and sexual abuses. Deployment of women and drug traffickers is the new modus operandi. Are the authorities listening? Would they care enough this Dussehra to ensure that kids’ innocence doesn’t lose out to the evil?

The Taliban 2.0 is no different

The Taliban doubtless said that their governance would be different this time. Developments on the ground, however, tell a different story

Three issues have emerged as being of key concern to the United States and the European Union — whose representatives have recently met those of the Taliban — and members of G-20, in respect of the developments in Afghanistan. These are the humanitarian situation in that country, the danger of its becoming a spawning ground of international Islamist terrorism, as it had become during the earlier Taliban dispensation (1996-2001), and the human rights of all Afghans, particularly women, girls and the minorities. The US, on its part, has the specific issue of evacuating out of Afghanistan its own citizens and people who had sided with it — and are now in danger. They got left behind given to the utterly hurried and disorganised manner in which they retreated from the country.

The humanitarian situation is doubtless grim with the country facing an economic collapse, rising food prices and unemployment, at a time when hundreds of thousands of people have been rendered internal refugees — either fleeing the Taliban or what were, until recently, conflict zones. Understandably, the US and the EU have been deeply concerned and the latter has promised one billion euros (\$ 1.15 billion) as humanitarian aid.

Nor is concern about terrorism surprising considering that Osama bin Laden and Al Qaeda, who were behind the attack of twin towers of the World Trade Centre in New York and E-Wing of the Pentagon in Washington DC on September 11, 2001, operated from Afghanistan. It was the Taliban’s refusal to hand them over to the US that led to the invasion that to their ouster.

Unfortunately, one has the impression that the issue of human rights of women, girls and the minorities, though on the table, is not receiving the same amount of importance as the first two. It is, therefore, essential to emphasise their importance given the fact that they had virtually ceased to exist during the earlier Taliban dispensation from 1996 to 2001. What happened then? What happened during Taliban rule? Kamal Matinuddin,



a retired lieutenant-general of the Pakistan Army, puts it in a capsule in *The Taliban Phenomenon: Afghanistan 1994-1999*:

“Girls are being denied education; women have been prevented from working; if they leave their house, they have to be covered from head to foot with a veil (*burqa*); besides being veiled, women have to be accompanied by a male relative when they venture out in the streets. Shopkeepers have been directed not to sell goods to unveiled women. Rickshaw drivers are not to pick up women passengers unless they are fully covered. Women caught violating these rules are imprisoned, as are the shopkeeper and the rickshaw driver.”

Ahmed Rashid writes in *Taliban: Islam, Oil and the New Great Game in Central Asia*, “that edicts of the Department of Promotion of Virtue and Prevention of Vice, headed by Maulana Qalamuddin, “had changed

the lifestyles of Kabul’s once easy-going population and forced Afghan women to disappear from public view.” The entire repressive and joyless system rested on terror and ubiquitous espionage. All forms of entertainment were forbidden. Cinema halls were shut and music forbidden. Shaving or trimming of beards was forbidden. Administration of justice was medieval and based on the Taliban’s understanding of sharia law. Punishments were savage — such as public hangings and amputation in the case of thefts.

The Taliban doubtless said after coming to power in August that their dispensation would be different this time, that theirs would be an “inclusive Government”, women and girls would enjoy rights under Islamic law, and would be able to study and work. Developments on the ground, however, tell a very different story. Women are facing a very severe shrinkage of their

rights. Nothing is more emblematic of this than there is not a single woman in the interim Government they have formed. Women demonstrating for a place in it have been violently dispersed. Nor can one miss the symbolism of the closure of the Women’s Affairs Ministry and the use of the premises to house Ministries of Prayer of Guidance and the Promotion of Virtue and Prevention of Vice. Women employees of the wound-up ministry, who have been trying to come to work, have been told to go home.

The Taliban-appointed Chancellor of Kabul University, Mohammad Ashraf Ghairat, said on September 27, “As long as a real Islamic environment is not provided for all, women will not be allowed to come to the universities or work.” Schools for boys have opened but not for girls.

FIRST COLUMN THREAT WITHOUT A DEADLINE FOR TAIWAN

Beijing can invade the island even now but will be fully prepared in three years' time

China's President Xi Jinping promised that "the historical task of the complete reunification of the motherland...will definitely be fulfilled." That was a threat to Taiwan, but a threat without a deadline. The next day, President Tsai Ing-wen replied that "nobody can force Taiwan to take the path China has laid out for us." And the United States, while not directly promising to defend the island at the expense of a war with China, let it be known that there are US special forces and Marines in Taiwan on training missions. Beijing already knew that, of course (Trump sent them there two years ago), but Washington's open confirmation of it was a clear warning to China. So there is a crisis of sorts, although a slow-moving one. As Defence Minister Chiu Kuo-Chen said in Taiwan, Beijing is capable of invading the island even now, but will be fully prepared to do so in three years' time. "By 2025, China will bring the cost and attrition to its lowest. It has the capacity now, but it will not start a war easily, having to take many other things into consideration." What did he mean, exactly, and is it true? In part it's a recognition that China is rapidly accumulating weapons that will make a seaborne invasion across the Taiwan Strait possible, although it is 180 km. wide at its narrowest point. The key Chinese weapon is long-range



rocket artillery that can reach all points in Taiwan with high accuracy, and can be launched in such numbers that Taiwanese anti-missile defences would be overwhelmed. Such a weapon exists. It's called the PCL-191, and it's a glorified version of the 'Stalin organ' and other multiple rocket launchers of Second World War vintage, but with a range of 350 km. There are already two brigades of these rocket-launchers stationed on the Chinese coast facing Taiwan, and the number is going up all the time. Soon, if not already, they will give Beijing the power to launch saturation strikes on all of Taiwan's airfields, radar stations, anti-aircraft defences and ports simultaneously. If all the runways and ports in Taiwan are shattered, then its planes and warships cannot stop Chinese assault troops crossing the Strait in ships (ten hours), and nobody else will be close enough to help even if they want to.

Taiwan is at extreme range for fighter aircraft based in Japan, and the US Pacific Fleet is very unlikely to be within reach if the attack is a surprise. So what 'other things' may still deter China from making such an attack even after it has enough rocket launchers on the coast? Just one is enough: the certainty that even if the United States could not intervene militarily in time to save Taiwan, it would certainly institute a complete naval blockade of China immediately afterwards. Ships from China crossing the Pacific must pass between the 'first chain' of islands (Japan, Taiwan, and the Philippines); shipping to the Indian Ocean, the Middle East and Europe has to go through the Strait of Malacca (Malaysia and Indonesia). In practice, there's no way out: China's economy would be strangled within months. Further escalation by either side would be deterred by the fear of nuclear war, and some sort of deal would have to be made. It could be very humiliating for China, perhaps so humiliating that it would even undermine the control of the Communist Party. So Xi Jinping won't ever really risk it. That's the way people steeped in classic strategic thinking see it, and they're probably right. Although you don't get your money back if they're wrong.

Doubling farmers' income by 2022

The Dalwai committee report is a very comprehensive document according to which the issue of doubling farmer's income depends upon increasing crop productivity, increasing livestock productivity, bringing about resource use efficiency or saving in cost of production, increasing cropping intensity, diversification to high value crops, increase in real prices to farmer and shift from farm to non-farm occupations. Except for the last one the rest of the suggestions are all related to the agriculture sector. Doubling in real income is possible only with a 10.4% annual growth rate in farm sector. This requires investments "in" agriculture like irrigation, agriculture market and land development and "for" agriculture like roads, power and transport. Gross capital formation has to be stepped up in both public and private sector.

The recent release of the decennial NSS 77th round situation assessment of Agriculture households (SAS) provides interesting insights which could be useful for public policy makers. This survey gives the figures for 2018-19 and it would be meaningful to compare with the SAS of 2012-13. Taking the base year as 2011-12 the growth in the income of the farmers in real price terms is six per cent. Even in this, the growth rate is much higher in advanced states like Punjab as compared to UP and Bihar. The share of crop production in the total income of agriculture household is 37.7 per cent and that of livestock is 15.48 per cent. The share of income in wages is as high as 40 per cent.

Hidden behind this figure is the fact that in poorer states like UP and Bihar the average size of the land holding is continuously becoming smaller and today 90 per cent of the farmers are small and marginal farmers. These small farms are not viable and so are not able to contribute to growth in income of farmers. They are not efficient in the use of inputs. It is clear that for agriculture productivity and incomes to grow aggregation of farm holdings in the form of farmer producer organizations (FPO) is absolutely essential. NABARD is working in this direction but the pace is slow.

Further, I noticed that in states like UP FPO's are being setup through directives from the top instead of evolving naturally at the ground level leading to a situation where most of these FPO's exist only

on paper and are not active. I feel proper training to officers and farmers is required so that proper functional FPO's are created. They need initial financial support also from the Government. This is perhaps the only way in getting out of the small holdings trap. Another option could be to adopt the model land leasing Act formulated by the Niti Ayog.

The cost of cultivation for the farmers is steadily going up. Fertilizers are costing more and the prices of electricity as well as diesel have gone up substantially. However, as far as the market price is concerned the farmer is still subjected to the volatility of the market. The MSP mechanism is benefiting farmers in an uneven manner covering less than 20 per cent of the farmers and mostly those belonging to Punjab, Haryana, MP and western UP. Moreover, this is restricted further to wheat and paddy. Even though the MSP is declared for 23 crops including oil seeds and pulses there is hardly any procurement done for them. Very limited market intervention is resorted to by NAFED.

There is no MSP either for horticulture crops or milk where the phenomenon of prices crashing is seen more often than not. It is imperative in this situation to develop an ecosystem and institutional mechanism which protects the farmers from the vagaries of the market and enables them to avoid distress sale. This requires the building up a post-harvest

infrastructure including WDRA (warehouse development regulatory authority) compliant warehouses and cold storages where the farmer can store his crop and get bank financing under the warehouse receipt negotiable instrument act. Farmers should be able to choose when to sell and not compelled to sell at throw away prices. The agriculture market typically behaves in a manner that prices fall at the time of harvest but tend to rise in future months and farmers need to be economically empowered to take advantage of this.

I was APC (Agriculture Production Commissioner) in UP for more than three years. This post is unique to UP as it coordinates the functioning of nineteen departments concerned with agriculture. My experience was that one of the most under-rated sectors of the economy is animal husbandry which happens to be a major source of employment and it is my firm belief that this is the critical sector which can bring about increase in the income of the farmers. Merely crop production is not sufficient and has to be complemented by animal husbandry. In UP, during my tenure as APC, we started an interest subvention and breed improvement scheme, "Kamdhenu", in the dairy sector which resulted in substantial increase in the income of the farmers.

Similarly, we introduced a scheme for large scale poultry development with similar benefi-

cial results to the farmers. In fact, before the scheme UP used to import 1 crore eggs per day from other states and during my tenure itself this amount was brought down to 60 lakhs. Unfortunately, both these schemes have not been continued by the current government. The SAS clearly shows that income from livestock is showing an increasing trend and has a great potential for the future. The net receipt from crops has declined from 47.9 per cent in 2012-13 to 37.7 per cent in 2018-19 while that from rearing animals has gone up from 4.3 per cent to 15.7 per cent within the same time frame.

It is also important to keep in mind that agriculture is a State subject and that policy interventions have to respond to state specific issues. In fact, states like UP have nine agro climatic zones each requiring a different strategy and approach.

The RKVY (Rashtriya Krishi Vishist Utpadan Yojna) of the Government of India is an excellent example of a centrally sponsored scheme where sufficient leeway is given to the states to formulate state specific interventions. Agriculture requires many more such policy interventions and finances to create an ecosystem where the income of the farmers keeps on increasing on a regular basis. Doubling of income of the farmers by 2022 does not seem to be within the realm of possibility but substantial improvement can be brought about with the right kind of interventions.

Do we need to pay more for quality education?

Education has been removed from the service sector to the corporate sector. Many private universities address students as consumers

In present-day society, there is a lot of discussion on delivering education in a subsidised manner. Even an illiterate parent feels that only if one pays there would be quality and does not like their children to be taught in government institutions. The quality of education in many government schools and colleges have been badly affected due to over-indulgence of political parties in education. Most of the teachers and professors do not give dedicated service, as they have financial security irrespective of whether they teach properly or not. There is no evaluation system to monitor the quality of their teaching.

Teachers who undertake research projects concentrate less on teaching, as if teaching

and research are two different domains. Teaching has changed from a service to a workload-based profession. This attitude has badly affected the quality of many public sector institutions.

The attitude of few irresponsible people should not take away the right of meritorious students to pursue their education at subsidised rates. Otherwise, what is the difference between a student who scored high marks by regularly attending classes and an irresponsible student who somehow managed to get through the exams?

Present day bureaucrats, academicians and politicians all see education through commercial corporate eyes. There was a time when a scholarship was deemed to be a symbol of



quality. Old-time school teachers used to advise students that after qualifying 10th standard one should be self-sufficient in meeting the expenses of his or her studies. So, students used to work hard to get admission to prestigious government institutions. Getting admission in a government college or university is considered as a symbol of quality, as only merit prevails in these centres, whereas in private institutions with money you can buy a seat. Students would vie for the National Merit Scholarship

and University Merit Scholarship.

The starting of private deemed universities and autonomous institutions like IITs, IIMs have destroyed the social fabric of education. Even though clearing IIT -JEE and CAT is the most challenging task in the life of a student, studying in IITs and IIMs is the most expensive education in the country. After clearing such tough examinations, a student is expected to get free education.

Successive governments have removed education from the service sector to the corporate sector. In many private universities students are addressed as consumers in their official communication to teachers. There is an organized effort by vested interests

across the country to destroy good institutions under the government sector. Even UGC is granting autonomy to every college that has been accredited by NAAC. But all these accreditation processes are not fool-proof. You can see science colleges without basic laboratory infrastructure or libraries getting A Grade and many coming in the list of top 100 in NIRF. Most of the colleges show infrastructure on record, but in reality, it is not accessible to students. On record, college authorities say that they function from 9 am to 5 pm, but in reality, the timings are from 9.30am to 3.30pm. The rest is shown as tutorial hour, gardening hour, etc.

This is why most students aspire for institutions like central universities where educa-

tion is highly subsidized. It is the prize they get for their dedicated learning and hard work. These are the places where students enjoy total freedom to learn. The centres of excellence in higher learning should be made totally free for meritorious students and it should be kept exclusively for them. In earlier times we had fewer higher education centres, so only the best got admission to such centres. But over the period of years, the government has created more central universities and autonomous institutions like IISERs and IITs based on their policy of political appeasement. This is eroding the quality of higher education.

Mushrooming of IITs, IIMs, IISERs and central universities has changed the

demographic diversity earlier observed on these campuses. In some institutions one can see the over dominance of students from the host state, similar to a state university, instead of pan-India representation. Today many IITs graduates are finding it difficult to get a job; that was not the case two decades back.

Instead of starting new institutions, the focus should be on improving the quality of already established institutions. Every school, college and university funded by public money should rise to the status of an international centre. Then only we would be able to bring academic enlightenment to our students. Giving free hand to private institutions will ultimately make education elusive to the common man.

British MP stabbed to death at church, suspect held

London: British Conservative MP, Sir David Amess, was on Friday repeatedly stabbed by a knife-wielding man at his constituency in Essex, and succumbed to his injuries later, media reports said.

Sir David, who has been an MP since 1983, was stabbed as he was going to hold his “constituency surgery” -- a public meet where voters can meet their MP and discuss their concerns -- at the Belfairs Methodist Church in Leigh-on-Sea, when he was attacked, the BBC reported.

He was treated by emergency services, but he died at the scene. Sir David is the second British MP to be killed after Labour’s Jo Cox, amid the rising tensions over the Brexit vote since 2016.

The BBC quoted the police as saying that a 25-year-old

will send shockwaves across the parliamentary community and the whole country.”

He said he was shocked and deeply distressed by the killing of a “lovely man”, and said in the coming days they would need to examine MP’s security.

Labour London Mayor Sadiq Khan said he was “deeply, deeply saddened” and described Sir David as “a great public servant”. Flags around Parliament and at 10 Downing Street are being flown at half-mast.

EU says anti-Semitism has no place in bloc after Jansa tweet

BRUSSELS: The European Union reiterated on Friday that anti-Semitism “has no place” in the 27-nation bloc after Slovenian Prime minister Janez Jansa posted a message on social media that was criticized by some European lawmakers as anti-Semitic.

Jansa, whose country currently holds the rotating EU Council presidency, accused several members of the European Parliament of being “puppets” of George Soros. The Hungarian-American billionaire investor, who is Jewish, has been the subject of anti-Semitic attacks and conspiracy theories for decades.

Jansa made his comments

on Twitter during a visit to Slovenia by a European Parliament delegation assessing press freedom and the rule of law in the Balkan state.

“Social media should be a space for constructive and respectful debate,” said European Commission spokesman for rule of law, Christian Wigand. “It should not be a place for personal attacks, against individuals, be it private or public figures, as was the case with the tweet you mention.”

Wigand added that anti-Semitism is not “only a threat to Jewish communities but also to an open and diverse society.”

Jansa was also involved in a Twitter clash with Dutch caretaker Prime Minister Mark Rutte, who said he condemned the “tasteless” tweet “in the strongest possible terms,” and that he had conveyed the message to the Slovenian ambassador in The Hague.

Jansa responded by urging Rutte not to “waste time with ambassadors and media freedom in Slovenia” and instead “protect your journalists from being killed on the streets.” That was an apparent reference to the murder of crime reporter Peter R. de Vries in Amsterdam.

The EU has repeatedly expressed concerns about

media freedom in Slovenia.

Jansa has long been under scrutiny for keeping a stranglehold on the country’s only news agency, STA. The head of the agency has recently stepped down over a new public service contract that would dictate the way it is funded.

Sophie in ’t Veld, the lawmaker heading the visiting EU delegation, said the STA funding should be “addressed urgently.”

Jansa, a nationalist politician with close links to hardline Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban, insists that much of Slovenia’s media is biased against him, but he said in July that the funding issue would be

Evacuated over 100 football family members from Afghan after complex negotiations: FIFA

Lausanne: Football’s world governing body FIFA on Friday said it has evacuated almost 100 members of the “football family”, including women players, from Afghanistan after “complex negotiations” and with support from Qatar.

The evacuation, especially of women footballers, was necessitated by Taliban’s takeover of the strife-torn country in August this year.

“FIFA can confirm, following complex negotiations, it has, with the support of Qatar, evacuated almost 100 members of the football family from Afghanistan, including female players,” stated the world body

“FIFA would like to express its sincere thanks to the government of Qatar for its support facilitating extensive discussions and for ensuring the safe passage of these individuals, deemed to have been at the highest risk,” it added.

The evacuees were brought

ASEAN Ministers mull censoring Myanmar for hindering envoy

Kuala Lumpur: Southeast Asia’s top diplomats will discuss in an emergency meeting Friday whether to allow Myanmar’s military leader to attend an annual summit after a crisis envoy was barred from meeting ousted leader Aung San Suu Kyi. The Association of Southeast Asian Nations had appointed Brunei Second Foreign Minister Erywan Yusof in August as its special envoy to mediate an end to the Myanmar crisis. However, he abruptly cancelled his trip to the violence-wrecked nation this week after being informed by his hosts that he would not be able to meet Suu Kyi and others as he wanted.

Myanmar officials have said Erywan couldn’t meet with Suu Kyi because of criminal charges against her. The foreign ministry said in a statement Thursday it hoped Erywan would seek to build trust instead of putting politically motivated pressure on Myanmar.

France pays tribute to teacher beheaded by radical Islamist

Paris: French schools on Friday were paying tribute to a teacher beheaded by a radical Islamist last year after he showed caricatures of the prophet of Islam to his class.

Samuel Paty, a history and geography teacher, was murdered on Oct. 16 last year near his school in a northwest Paris suburb by an 18-year-old of Chechen origin who had become radicalised.

The attacker was in turn shot dead by police.

The two-day national homage includes a minute of silence to be held in schools on Friday, with teachers to organise a discussion in classes with students around the memory of Paty.

A ceremony will take place on Saturday at the Ministry of Education, where a plaque honoring Paty will be unveiled.

His family will also meet with President Emmanuel Macron and Prime Minister

Putin: No rush in officially recognising Taliban’s rule

Moscow: Russian President Vladimir Putin said on Friday there must be no rush in officially recognising the Taliban as the new rulers of Afghanistan, but emphasised the need to engage in talks with them.

Speaking during a video call with leaders of other ex-Soviet nations, Putin said that “the interim government formed by the Taliban regrettably doesn’t reflect the entire spectrum of Afghan society”, but also noted their pledge to hold elections, and their efforts to restore the functioning of state structures.

“We shouldn’t hurry with the official recognition of the Taliban,” he said.

“We understand that we need to interact with them, but there shouldn’t be any hurry and we shall discuss that together.”

At the same time, Putin mentioned Moscow’s intention to host another round of talks between Afghan parties next week and underlined the need to restart consultations on

Afghanistan between Russia, the United States, China and Pakistan.

“We need to support the process of inter-Afghan settlement and try to help normalise the situation in the country,” he said.

Russia is set to host the Taliban and other Afghan factions for talks Wednesday in a move that reflects Moscow’s efforts to expand its clout.

Zamir Kabulov, the Kremlin envoy on Afghanistan, said Friday that the Taliban confirmed they will attend the so-called “Moscow format” talks in the Russian capital.

Diplomats from Russia, the US, China and Pakistan are also set to meet in Moscow for talks on Afghanistan this month.

Soviet Union fought a 10-year war in Afghanistan that ended with its troops withdrawing in 1989.

Since then, Moscow has made a diplomatic comeback as an influential power broker in international talks on

Afghanistan, hosting the Taliban representatives and members of other factions for a series of bilateral and multi-lateral meetings.

Unlike many other countries, Russia hasn’t evacuated its embassy in Kabul and its ambassador quickly met with the Taliban after they took over the capital.

The Taliban were added to the Russian list of terrorist organisations in 2003, and Moscow has not yet moved to remove the group from the list.

Any contact with such groups is punishable under Russian law, but the Foreign Ministry has shrugged off questions about the seeming contradiction by emphasising the need to engage the Taliban to help stabilise Afghanistan.

Putin on Friday emphasised the security challenges posed by the Islamic State group and other militants based in northern Afghanistan, and noted that drug trafficking from Afghanistan will continue to present a challenge.

Biden nominates Indian-American aerospace and defence expert to key position in Pentagon

Washington: US President Joe Biden has announced his intent to nominate Indian-American aerospace and defence expert Ravi Chaudhary to a key position in the Pentagon, the White House has said.

A former US Air Force officer and pilot, Chaudhary was on Thursday nominated for the position of the assistant secretary of the Air Force for Installations, Energy and the Environment.

He needs to be confirmed by the United States Senate before he can be sworn in for this key Pentagon position.

The Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Energy, Installations, and Environment (SAF/IE) is a civilian office in the United States Department of the Air Force.

The office has overall responsibility for installations strategy and strategic basing processes; built and natural infrastructure; facility, process and operational energy; environment, safety and occupational health; and to ensure the sustainability and operational readiness of the Department of the Air Force, according to the information on the department’s website.

Chaudhary previously served as a senior executive at the US Department of Transportation where he was Director of Advanced Programs and Innovation, Office of Commercial Space, at the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), according to his bio released by the White House.

In this role, Chaudhary was responsible for the execution of advanced development and research programs in support of the FAA’s Commercial Space Transportation mission.

While at the Department of Transportation, he also served as the executive director, Regions and Centre Operations, where he was responsible for the integration and support of aviation operations in nine regions located nationwide.

On active duty from 1993 to 2015 in the US Air Force, he completed a variety of operational, engineering, and senior staff assignments in the Air Force, the White House said.

As a C-17 pilot, he conducted global flight operations, including numerous combat missions in Afghanistan and

Iraq, as well as a ground deployment as Director of the Personnel Recovery Center, Multi-National Corps, Iraq.

As a flight test engineer, he was responsible for flight certification of military avionics and hardware for Air Force modernisation programmes supporting flight safety and mishap prevention.

Earlier in his career, he supported space launch operations for the Global Positioning System (GPS) and led third stage and flight safety activities to ensure the full operational capability of the first GPS constellation, the White House said.

As a systems engineer, he supported NASA’s International Space Station protection activities to ensure the safety of NASA Astronauts.

He also served as a member of the President’s Advisory Commission on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders during the Obama Administration.

In this role, he advised the President on executive branch efforts to improve veterans support for the AAPI community.

Why China did not attack Taiwan

New Delhi: For more than seven decades, China and Taiwan have avoided coming to military face-offs.

The two entities have been separated since 1949 following the civil wars in the 1940s. Taiwan considers itself a sovereign state. China, however, views Taiwan as a breakaway province, and has always maintained that the island should at some point be reclaimed. It has not ruled out the possible use of force to achieve unification.

Tensions with China are at their worst in 40 years, Taiwan’s Defence Minister said, warning of the risk of an accidental strike between the two. China scrambled Taiwan’s defence zone with a record number of fighter jets for four consecutive days earlier this month, triggering massive jitters of war-mongering messaging.

The Taiwanese Defence Minister also warned that China would be capable of mounting a full-scale invasion of the island by 2025 while speaking at the parliamentary committee in Taipei, considering a multi-billion-dollar defence spending bill to build missiles and warships.

Lately, Beijing is becoming increasingly concerned that Taiwan’s government is moving the island towards a formal declaration of independence and wants to deter its President Tsai Ing-wen from taking any steps in that direction.

However, US President Joe Biden has said that his Chinese counterpart Xi Jinping had agreed to abide by the “Taiwan agreement”.

On October 12, the People’s Liberation Army Daily published an article titled “The historical task of the complete reunification of the Motherland must be realised”, based on Xi’s speech to commemorate the 110th anniversary of the Revolution of 1911.

The article stated that President Xi’s speech revealed the historical trend of the reunification of the motherland and national rejuvenation.

“The historical task of the complete reunification of the Motherland must be realised and will certainly be realised.”

It is an inevitable requirement for the great rejuvenation of the Chinese nation in the new era and the sacred mission of the People’s Liberation Army (PLA).

The Chinese PLA has firm will, full confidence, and sufficient ability to thwart all external forces interference and separatist acts of “Taiwan independence”, and resolutely defend national sovereignty and territorial integrity, the

article said.

Recently, the Communist party media released a military drill video revealing preparations towards going into war with Taiwan. Is CCP intensively preparing for the plan to attack Taiwan ahead of the schedule?

Revealing the true intention of the Chinese design, on 12 October, Epoch Times published an exclusive internal document of the Chinese Communist Party, which is closely related to the recent tension on the Taiwan issue.

According to the report, the document was issued by the National Defense Mobilization Committee of Hui’an County, Quanzhou, Fujian Province, on January 2, 2020, informing the party officials and government departments to survey the local national defence mobilisation potential.

S Korea seeks Interpol notice for two cyber gang leaders

Seoul: South African police said Friday they have arrested 56 people who will likely face charges of kidnapping after two government Cabinet ministers and a deputy minister were held hostage for three hours when a meeting with military veterans of the fight against apartheid ended in disagreement.

Police were called to a hotel in the Centurion area near the capital Pretoria on Thursday night to rescue Defence and Military Veterans Minister Thandi Modise, her deputy minister Thabang Makwetla, and Minister in the Presidency Mondli Gungubele, who had been meeting with veterans of various groups that were part of the armed struggle which started in the 1960s against the apartheid regime in South Africa.

The meeting broke down quickly and the three government officials were prevented from leaving the room by some of the veterans, Gungubele said.

Police tried to negotiate with the hostage-takers and when that failed they resorted to a tactical approach and successfully rescued the hostages, the South African Police Services said.

Police said no shots were fired in the operation, denying allegations by some veterans that they were shot at.

Three of the people who were arrested were sent for medical checkups, police said.

Of the 56 arrested, seven were women.

Gungubele said the meeting was an attempt to address the grievances of the veterans’ groups, who want, among other things, cash payouts and housing and medical benefits for their service during the fight for democracy in South Africa more than 25 years ago.

The veterans’ latest demand is that they should each be paid the equivalent of \$270,000 and receive other benefits.

Apple removes Quran app in China after request from officials

New Delhi: Apple has taken down one of the world’s most popular Quran apps in China after a request from Chinese officials, the BBC reported.

Quran Majeed is available across the world on the App Store, and has nearly 150,000 reviews.

However, Apple removed the app at the request of Chinese officials, allegedly for hosting illegal religious texts, the company said.

The Chinese government has not responded to a request for comment.

The deletion of the app was first noticed by Apple Censorship - a website that monitors apps on Apple’s App Store globally, the report said.

The Chinese Communist



Party officially recognises Islam as a religion in the country.

However, China has been accused of human rights violation, and even genocide, against the mostly Muslim Uyghur ethnic group in Xinjiang.

It is not clear what rules the app has broken in China. Quran Majeed says it is “trusted by over 35 million Muslims

globally”, the report added.

Last month, both Apple and Google had removed a tactical voting app devised by jailed Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny.

Russian authorities had threatened to fine the two companies if they refused to drop the app, which told users who could unseat ruling party candidates.

China is one of Apple’s biggest markets, and the company’s supply chain is heavily reliant on Chinese manufacturing.

Apple Chief Executive Tim Cook has been accused of hypocrisy by politicians in the US for speaking out about American politics, but staying quiet about China.

PIA official was held at gunpoint for hours by Taliban commanders

New Delhi: The Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) suspended its flights to Kabul after what it called “heavy handed” interference by Taliban authorities, including arbitrary rule changes and intimidation of staff, The News reported.

The The Pakistan International Airlines said that ever since the new Taliban Government was formed, its staff in Kabul had faced last-minute changes in regulations and flight permissions along with “highly intimidating behaviour” by Taliban commanders.

It said its country representative had been held at gunpoint for hours at one point and was only freed after the Pakistan Embassy in Kabul intervened, the report said.

The suspension of flight operations came as the Taliban government ordered the airline, the only international company operating regularly out of Kabul, to cut ticket prices to

levels seen before the fall of the Western-backed Afghan government in August.

A PIA spokesman told Geo News that operations have been suspended for an “unspecified period” and that the decision was taken in the backdrop of “inappropriate behaviour” demonstrated by the Afghan authorities.

Undesirable conditions for the operation of international flights in Kabul and the Taliban government’s “last minute changes in decisions” are also part of the reason PIA made the move, the spokesman said.

The PIA said it has decided that no aircraft will go to Kabul without insurance, the report said.

Earlier, the Taliban had warned the PIA and Afghan carrier Kam Air that their Afghan operations risked being blocked unless they agreed to cut ticket prices, which have reached levels increasingly out of reach for most Afghans.

Iran urges ‘practical’ steps, ‘tangible’ results in nuke talks

Tehran: Taking “practical” steps with “tangible” outcomes should be the purpose of an upcoming nuclear talks between Iran and the remaining parties to the 2015 nuclear deal, known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), said Deputy Foreign Minister Ali Bagheri.

The Iranian official made the remarks at the meeting with visiting Deputy Secretary-General of the European External Action Service Enrique Mora in the capital Tehran, reports Xinhua news agency.

During the meeting, Bagheri said Iran had always proved a responsible player in the international affairs, while the behaviour of the other side, the US, showed that it was far from being a responsible player.

He added that the side showing more responsibility was closer to the negotiating table.

“Achieving tangible results

is important for Iran, as Tehran is always ready for serious negotiations that result in a practical agreement and not merely a paper agreement,” he was quoted as saying.

Meanwhile, he cast “serious doubts” on the real intention of the US to fulfil its obligations.

Bagheri also criticized what he called “inaction” of the European parties in meeting their commitments under the JCPOA, stressing the need for them to “act responsibly”.

For his part, Mora announced his readiness as the EU coordinator to cooperate with Iran and other parties at negotiations to reach acceptable results for all sides, according to a press release by the Iranian Foreign Ministry.

As for the relations between Iran and the EU, the two officials emphasized the promotion of cooperation in a range of regional and international areas and agreed to continue consultations in the coming days in Brussels.

Coal ministry to augment fuel supply to power sector from captive mines

New Delhi: The coal ministry on Friday said it has taken various measures, including diverting the output from captive coal mines, to augment fuel supply to the power sector.

The development assumes significance in the wake of country's power plants grappling with coal shortages.

"The ministry of coal has taken all efforts to augment coal supplies to the power sector and decided to divert and augment the supplies to power sector from captive coal blocks," the coal ministry said in statement.

Captive mines are those that produce coal or mineral for exclusive use by the company that owns the blocks.

The ministry offered coal supply from NLC India's Talabira II & III mines in Odisha to NTPC.

In this connection, both the companies worked together to commence the supply of coal from Talabira II & III open cast project (OCP) to NTPC (Darlipali & Lara Power Plants).

With timely support and necessary coal delivery permits from the department of mines, Government of Odisha, the coal delivery to the Darlipali power station has been commenced, within 24 hours from the directives from the Ministry of Coal.

Coal India to refrain from conducting any e-auction till situation stabilises

New Delhi: Amid the low stock position at the electricity generating plants, state-owned CIL has asked its subsidiaries to refrain from conducting any further e-auction of coal, except special forward e-auction for the power sector, till the situation stabilises.

The development assumes significance as the supply of coal is being prioritised to the power sector to replenish the dwindling stock in the wake of reports of an electricity crisis looming large.

"In view of the current low stock position at the powerhouse end, supply of coal is being prioritised to the power sector to replenish the dwindling stock...Coal companies are advised to refrain from conducting of any further e-auctions of coal with the exception of special forward e-auction for the power sector, till the situation stabilises," Coal India said in a recent letter to its arms, including Eastern Coalfields Ltd

navratna company under the administrative control of the Ministry of Coal is operating Talabira II & III coal mines

(ECL), Bharat Coking Coal Ltd (BCCL), Central Coalfields Ltd (CCL).

In case, any coal company finds it necessary to liquidate any slow-moving stock through the e-auction route without affecting despatch to the power sector, the same may be communicated to Coal India along with proper justification before any such auction is planned, the letter said.

"This is only a temporary prioritisation, in the interest of the nation, to tide over the low coal stock situation at the stressed power plants and scale-up supplies to them. It does not mean stoppage of e-auction format," Coal India said.

The company said it is augmenting its production and off-take steadily. Once the situation stabilises, expectedly within a short time, and stock at coal-fired plants attains comfort level, other sectors will be brought back to their regular supply norm, the public sector firm said. **PTI**

Aluminium plants grappling with critically low level of coal stock: AAI

New Delhi: Aluminium plants in the country are grappling with critically low level of coal stocks and if the fuel supply is not restored immediately it would lead to irrevocable collateral damage, industry body AAI warned on Friday.

The statement comes at a time when the supply of coal by CIL to non-power sectors has been kept suspended temporarily amid electricity generating plants in the country facing fuel shortages.

"Today also, aluminium industry has not received any relief with respect to the ongoing coal supply crisis. Indian aluminium plants are grappling with critically low levels of coal stock, with no recourse or alternative means to meet their power needs and keep the plants operational," Aluminium Association of India (AAI) said.

It further warned that if coal supply is not restored immediately, it would lead to an irrevocable collateral dam-

age of these national assets.

"Any power outage in aluminium plants will lead to catastrophic impact & complete shutdown which will take minimum 12 months of recovery, resulting in job loss of more than 8 lakh people. Banks will have debt exposure of over Rs 1 lakh crore and additional national forex loss of Rs 90,000 crore," it warned it a statement.

"Aluminium production is a 24x7, 365 days continuous process industry. There is no provision to switch off and switch on. It is highly power intensive industry, just to illustrate one tonne of aluminium requires 14,500 units of continuous power which is 15 times in comparison to steel...And 145 times as that for cement," it explained.

It further said that Coal India should immediately resume continuous coal supply to the aluminium industry to prevent closure of the plants, it added. **PTI**

Petrol, diesel prices rally to highest ever levels

New Delhi: Petrol and diesel prices on Friday rallied to their highest ever levels across the country, as fuel rates were hiked again by 35 paise a litre.

The price of petrol in Delhi rose to its highest-ever level of Rs 105.14 a litre and Rs 111.09 per litre in Mumbai, according to a price notification of state-owned fuel retailers.

In Mumbai, diesel now comes for Rs 101.78 a litre; while in Delhi, it costs Rs 93.87.

This is the second straight day of 35 paise per litre increase in petrol and diesel prices. There was no change in rates on October 12 and 13.

Since the ending of a three-week-long hiatus in rate revision in the last week of September, this is the 14th increase in petrol price and the 17th time that diesel rates have gone up.

While petrol price in most of the country is already above Rs 100-a-litre mark, diesel rates have crossed that level in a dozen states, including Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Odisha, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Gujarat, Maharashtra, Chhattisgarh, Bihar, Kerala, Karnataka and Leh.

Prices differ from state to state depending on the incidence of local taxes.

Shedding the modest price change policy, state-owned fuel

retailers have since October 6 started passing on the larger incidence of cost to consumers.

This is because the international benchmark Brent crude is trading at USD 84.61 per barrel for the first time in seven years.

A month back, Brent was trading at USD 73.51.

Being a net importer of oil, India prices petrol and diesel at rates equivalent to international prices.

The surge in international oil prices ended a three-week hiatus in rates on September 28 for petrol and September 24 for diesel.

Since then, diesel rates have gone up by Rs 5.25 per litre and petrol price has increased by Rs 4.25.Before that, the petrol price was increased by Rs 11.44 a litre between May 4 and July 17. Diesel rate had gone up by Rs 9.14 during this period. **PTI**

Export curbs on diagnostic kits, reagents removed

New Delhi: With COVID-19 cases coming down in the country, the government on Friday removed export curbs on all diagnostic kits and reagents including instruments, which are used in detection of coronavirus infections.

India logged 16,862 new coronavirus infections, taking the total tally of COVID-19 cases to 3,40,37,592, while the active cases declined to 2,03,678, the lowest in 216 days, according to the Union Health Ministry data updated on Friday. The death toll climbed to 4,51,814 with 379 fresh fatalities.

The daily rise in new coronavirus infections has been below 30,000 for 21 straight days and less than 50,000 daily new cases have been reported for 110 consecutive days now.

"The export policy of all diagnostic kits and reagents (including instruments (apparatus)...Is being made free with immediate effect," the directorate general of foreign trade (DGFT) said in a notification.

The DGFT is an arm of the commerce ministry which deals with export and import related norms.

The export restrictions on these products were imposed in June last year and August 16, 2021 on account of increasing COVID-19 cases. An exporter has to seek licence or permission from the government for exports of goods which are under a restricted category. **PTI**

India most cost-effective globally in rooftop solar power: Report

Mumbai: A global study has found that India is the most cost-effective country for generating rooftop solar energy at USD 66 per megawatt-hour, while the cost in China is marginally higher at USD 68 per megawatt-hour.

Due to the lower cost, rooftop solar photovoltaics (RTSPV) technology, such as roof-mounted solar panels used in homes, and commercial and industrial buildings, is currently the fastest deployable energy generation technology. This, according to this global study, is projected to fulfil up to 49 per cent of the global electricity demand by 2050.

Over the past decade, the massive drop in deployment cost coupled with policy-driven initiatives has led to a rapid uptake of RTSPV globally. Between 2006 and 2018, the installed capacity of the RTSPV has grown from 2.5 gigawatts (GW) to 213 GW.

With an additional capacity installation of 41 GW, RTSPV currently accounts for 40 per cent of the global cumulative installed capacity of the solar energy and nearly one-fourth of the total renewable capacity additions since 2018, which is more than the combined new installed capacities

of both coal and nuclear.

At the same time, RTSPV technology has shown a steep decline in deployment cost, which ranged between USD 63 and USD 265 megawatt-hour in 2019. It is a reduction of 42-79 per cent over 2010 value.

Rooftop solar photovoltaics account for 40 per cent of the global solar photovoltaics installed capacity and one-fourth of the total renewable capacity additions.

According to the study, India has a significant solar rooftop potential of 1.7 petawatt-hour per year. This is against the country's current electricity demand of 1.3 petawatt-hour per annum, it said.

To understand the electricity generation potential of RTSPV globally and its associated costs, the study mapped 130 million square km of the global land surface area to identify 0.2 million sq km of rooftop area using a machine learning algorithm.

This rooftop area was then analysed to document the global electricity generation potential of RTSPV and together represent 27 petawatt-hour per year of electricity generation potential for cost between USD 40 and USD 280 per megawatt-

hour and of this, USD 10 per megawatt-hour can be realised below USD 100.

The cost of attaining the potential is the lowest in India (at USD 66 per megawatt-hour) and China at USD 68, while the same is at USD 238 per megawatt-hour in the US, and USD 251 per megawatt-hour in England, said the study.

The study has been co-authored by Priyadarshi Shukla, a professor at Ahmedabad University and director of its global centre for environment and energy; Shivika Mittal from the Imperial College, London; and James Glynn from Columbia University. The team was led by Siddharth Joshi, researcher at MaREI, the SFI Research Centre for Energy, Climate and Marine in University College Cork.

The global potential of RTSPV is 27 petawatt-hour per year and the global average megawatt-hour cost for this varies in the range of USD 40-280 per megawatt-hour with the greatest energy generation potential in Asia.

The global potential is predominantly spread between Asia (47 per cent), North America (20 per cent) and Europe (13 per cent), accord-

ing to the study.

The second cheapest market for this method is China where it is pegged at USD 68 per megawatt-hour -- USD 2 higher than the potential Indian rate, while England and the US are among the costliest.

Maharashtra, with 181 terawatt-hour per year and Uttar Pradesh with 168.07 terawatt-hour per year have the highest solar rooftop potential in the country now.

The average cost of obtaining solar rooftop potential in India will be between USD 60 and USD 65 per megawatt-hour, with Gujarat and Rajasthan offering the lowest rates, according to the study.

The findings have an important implication for sustainable development and climate change mitigation efforts.

The International Solar Alliance, a joint initiative launched by India and France, is planning to mobilise USD 1 trillion in investments by 2030 to increase penetration of solar energy.

This means that from powering the Nasa's Vanguard satellites in 1958 to lighting homes in the sub-Saharan Africa, solar photovoltaics technology has come a long way. **PTI**

Forex reserves rise by USD 2.039 bln to USD 639.516 bln

Mumbai: The country's foreign exchange reserves rose by USD 2.039 billion to USD 639.516 billion in the week ended October 8, according to RBI data.

In the previous week ended October 1, the reserves had dipped by USD 1.169 billion to USD 637.477 billion. The reserves had surged by USD 8.895 billion to a life time high of USD 642.453 billion in the week ended September 3.

During the reporting week ended October 8, the rise in the reserves was on account of an increase in the Foreign Currency Assets (FCAs), Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) weekly data released on Friday showed.

FCA rose by USD 1.55 billion to USD 577.001 billion in the reporting week, as per the data.

Expressed in dollar terms, FCA include the effect of appreciation or depreciation of non-US units like the euro, pound and yen held in the foreign exchange reserves. Gold reserves were up by USD 464 million to USD 38.022 billion in the reporting week.

The Special Drawing Rights (SDRs) with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) rose by USD 28 million to USD 19.268 billion. **PTI**

Mumbai: Even as the motor insurance segment, which had a massive decline in FY21, is returning to the growth path, public sector general insurers have been steadily losing ground to the private insurers overall and more so in the bread and butter motor segment, with pie crimping to 32.6 per cent in August, down from 36.6 per cent a year ago.

As against this, the private sector has improved their market pie to 67.4 per cent in the reporting month from 63.4 per cent in the same period last year, shows an analysis of the monthly data by Care Ratings.

That the decline is so stark for the public sector players is clear from the FY18 market share number when they held 46.5 per cent of the total motor segment premia, while private players had only 53.5 per cent then.

Come FY19, the respective share declined to 40.7 per cent for the public sector while jumped to 59.3 per cent for the private players. The share of public sector players declined to 36.8 per cent in FY20 and further dropped to 34.2 per cent in FY21 while that of private players rose to 63.2 per cent in FY20 and further escalated to 65.8 per cent in FY21, according to Care report.

Similarly, in FY18, the pub-

lic sector had a market share of 37.5 per cent of the motor OD (own damage) market, and the private players had it 62.5 per cent, which declined and increased respectively to 32.5 per cent and 67.5 per cent in FY19 and further to 28.3 per cent and 71.7 per cent, respectively in FY20.

In FY 21 the respective shares were 25.5 per cent and 74.5 per cent. In August 2020 the pie was 27.8 per cent and 72.2 per cent and which further declined to 24.3 per cent and 75.7 per cent respectively.

Its only in motor TP (third-party) segment that the public sector have some leeway as they had a market share of 52.7 per cent as against private players' 46.3 per cent in FY18, but within a year they lost that too.

In FY19 it declined to 46.5 per cent and to 42.2 per cent in FY20 while for private players the pie increased to 53.5 per cent in FY19 and to 57.8 per cent in FY20.

In the last fiscal, the share of public players was at 39.7 per cent and private players at 60.3 per cent. In August 2021, this is at a low of 38.3 per cent for the public sector, down from 42.3 per cent in August 2020, as against private players' 61.7

per cent and 57.7 per cent.

This downtrend is particularly important for the public sector player as the motor TP segment has emerged as the larger segment driving the overall motor insurance growth.

According to industry data, there were over 23.12 crore vehicles on road in the country as of March 2019, of which 57 per cent were uninsured vehicles. Two-wheelers were the largest component of the uninsured vehicles with over 60 per cent of them being uninsured, whereas uninsured cars were only 10 per cent, showing massive potential for growth.

In FY21, motor premium had declined after the pandemic but retained the top spot which it has ceded in FY22 to the health segment.

This is also in line with the international market, where health is significantly larger than the motor segment. Motor TP segment has continued to grow faster than the Motor OD segment.

Amongst the states, Maharashtra continues to occupy the top spot followed by Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, and Uttar Pradesh in motor business for insurers. **PTI**

India notifies 8,424 tonnes of raw sugar exports to US under TRQ

New Delhi: The government on Friday permitted export of 8,424 tonnes of raw or white sugar under tariff-rate quota (TRQ) to the US, which enables shipments to enjoy relatively low tariff.

TRQ is a quota for a volume of exports that enter the US at relatively low tariffs. After the quota is reached, a higher tariff applies on additional imports.

"The quantity of 8,424 tonnes of sugar (raw and/or white sugar) to be exported to the US under TRQ scheme from October 1 to September 30, 2022, has been notified," the Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT) said in a public notice.

India enjoys duty-free sugar exports to the US for up to 10,000 tonnes annually under the preferential quota arrangement.

India, the world's second biggest producer and the largest consumer of sugar, has a preferential quota arrangement for

sugar export with the European Union as well.

The country's sugar export rose 20 per cent to an all-time high of 7.1 million tonnes in the 2020-21 marketing year ended last month, on the back of better demand and financial assistance from the government.

Sugar exports stood at 5.9 million tonnes in the marketing year 2019-20.

According to ISMA, the sugar production is estimated to remain flat at 31 million tonnes in the marketing year 2021-22.

The total availability of sugar is estimated to touch 39.5 million tonnes, including an opening stock of 8.5 million tonnes of sweetener. **PTI**

Gold futures fall on low demand



New Delhi: Gold prices fell Rs 501 to Rs 47,381 per 10 grams in the futures trade on Friday, as speculators reduced their positions amid low demand.

On the Multi Commodity Exchange, gold contracts for December traded lower by Rs 501, or 1.05 per cent, to Rs 47,381 per 10 grams in a business turnover of 12,889 lots.

Analysts attributed the fall in gold prices to trimming of positions by participants.

Globally, gold traded 0.95 per cent lower to USD 1,780.80 an ounce in New York. **PTI**

Budget and safety top criteria for Chennai households during festive season: LocalCircles

Chennai: Budget and safety were to be the top criteria for households in Chennai during the coming festive season, a study conducted by a leading community social media platform LocalCircles has revealed.

Sixty per cent of the households have opted for 'budget and value' while shopping during the festive season while 40 per cent backed 'safety', the study said.

More than 24,000 responses were received from over 9,000 households across the city.

As many as 40 per cent of the residents have said that they would like to visit the stores physically to buy, while 30 per cent responded saying that they would like to have stores have their catalogue online to order for delivery.

According to the study, 60 per cent of Chennai households will shop this festive season and are likely to do so by ordering online and via local stores for home delivery.

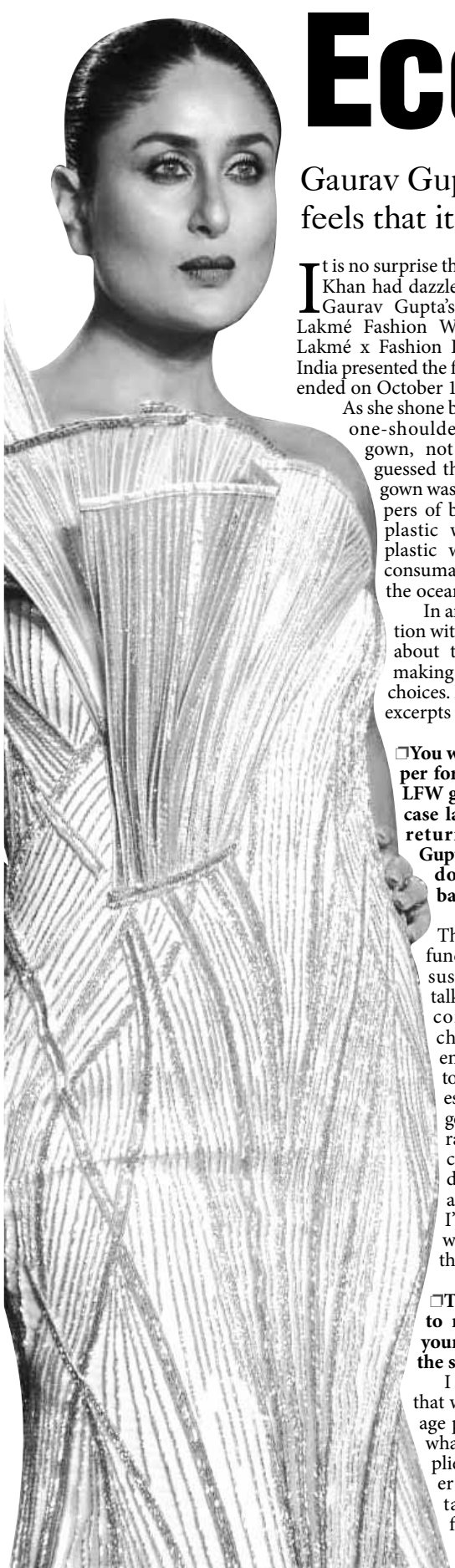

□We are aware Gaurav has used upcycled ocean plastic collected from aquatic water bodies, thus, making complete use of sustainable and eco-friendly fabrics.

Talk to us about his collection. Well, Gaurav is known for his diva looks, his OTT outfits, cocktail cuts, and so much more. People love wearing his designs, and I, personally, love wearing his clothes, too. The fact that you can look amazing, look sexy, and still use recycled material — that is a huge statement coming from a designer, you know. It is very commendable. He is a designer who is used to dressing celebrities and getting them ready for big functions, whether it is weddings or



cocktail parties or engagements. It kind of makes you feel inspired, and, in turn, dress sensibly, make conscious choices, and yet look beautiful and stylish. That is the whole idea of his collection.

□Are you incorporating slow fashion and sustainability in your personal wardrobe? And how?

I completely support it. I live in my kaftans which are recycled. I am all for the Indian artisans and for wearing conscious clothing. The pandemic has taught you that there is nothing more responsible than that. People decided to face these questions during Covid, so, I definitely promote it.

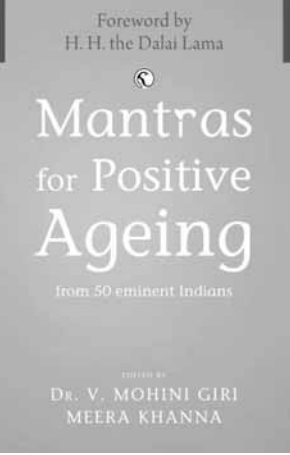
among others.

NATURE WALK 60 MINUTES

FLOWING AGAINST CONVENTION

Documentary filmmaker SHRIDHAR SUDHIR's feature, *Moving Upstream: Ganga*, addresses the issue of humans disassociating from nature at ALT EFF. By CHRISTY VARGHESE

While traditionally documentary films do not have many takers in India, with commercial cinema ruling the roost, one can see how the winds of change are being actualised in the past several years, with the pandemic playing a part in the same.

This week, with the second edition of the All Living Things Environmental Film Festival (ALT EFF) underway, we have to keep you posted on what has been going on at this one of a kind film festival. Among the 44 films, there were some noteworthy Indian names. One of them being *Moving Upstream: Ganga*.

A finalist in ALT EFF's 'Indian Features' award category, the film was screened at the festival after making its way through numerous accolades. It was awarded the 'Cinema of Resistance' award at SIGNS Film Festival at Kerala earlier this year. Additionally, the film was curated to be part of the South Asia Foreground Showcase on Labocine and happened to be an official selection at the 18th Indian Film Festival at Stuttgart in July 2021.

Directed by Patna-born Shridhar Sudhir, *Moving Upstream: Ganga*, depicts Siddharth Agarwal's, who also happens to be the producer of the feature-documentary, walk from Ganga Sagar in West Bengal (where the river Ganga



flows into the Bay of Bengal) to Gangotri in Uttarakhand (the source of the river). The thought behind the film was to capture a very personal narrative of the Ganga as well as stories of the people who affect and are affected by it. "The idea was conceptualised by my friend Siddharth, who I met on the banks of Ganga. He was on his mission to walk to the source of the river, when we bumped into each other. When he shared what he was up to, I couldn't help but feel that it was a very nice idea and expressed my desire to join him. And on the last leg of his almost 3,000 kilometre walk, I tagged along for 500 kilometres, shooting the entire film. The initial idea was not of a film that was going to be made in collaboration, but the walk itself. However, after spending so



much time together, over a span of 40-45 days, I realised that it's much bigger than the walk and that we had to share this experience," recalled Sudhir, during our telephonic conversation.

He revealed that it took Siddharth six months to cover the distance. He further shared that the protagonist

was slowed down by a ligament injury while covering Bengal, which is why the last 500 kilometres took 45 days. "The first month Siddharth had a crew with him, travelling in a car. He would walk the entire day and post-sunset he would join the crew, who were carrying the equipment and help him with food, water and other essentials. After that month, the crew could not commit to the project and left, leaving Siddharth to trudge on by himself. When I joined him for the last 500 kms, we carried everything we needed on our backs because we couldn't help it. I was carrying my camera on a monopod with a mic on top of it, the entire way. I learnt from Siddharth that during his time by himself, he had to rely on the goodwill of passersby to help with the shoot," recounted

ed Sudhir. So, what did he learn during his time walking alongside Ganga? "So, I come from an urban space. For me, the real takeaway was actually understanding India from a place that I had not seen before. The basic rules of human interaction is very different in urban vs rural spaces. The gratitude of folks in a rural setup is overwhelming. Every evening we would walk from sunrise to sunset and every day at sunset we would either reach a temple or a village. We would ask people with folded hands whether they could give us some food, since we were walking across the river and they would oblige us. They would give us a place to sleep and insist that we stay with them for a week. Can you imagine anyone in an urban space extending such hospitality? It is not a paradigm within which we urban-dwellers function. That was my major takeaway with respect to their perspective. Another major realisation that dawned upon me was how disassociated we are from nature in urban spaces. Let me share an example, right off the top of my head. If you visit a rural space, generally they know what trees grow around them and ways to utilise different parts of the tree. And most of us who reside in an urban setup won't even know the name of trees," concluded Sudhir with a chuckle.

When we mention the name Lupita Nyong'o, you might recall her role in the Marvel film, *Black Panther*. However, did you know that she was the narrator behind the stories featured in the popular wildlife docuseries, *Serengeti*?

She is back, at her animated best for the second season of the show. The *Serengeti*, a rich ecosystem in northern Tanzania, is known for its vast grasslands and prancing zebras. The first season of *Serengeti* grabbed eye-balls with the breath-taking stories from the wild. Lupita shares that season two will feature some new characters, fresh rivalries and tender moments that punctuate the lives of some of nature's most captivating characters.

Read on for excerpts of the interview:

You've been fortunate to visit the Serengeti since the first series. How did you find the experience?

It was an extraordinary privilege to see the animals featured in *Serengeti* in real life, in the place where they were actually filmed. Growing up in Kenya, I was lucky enough to go on safari to our national parks often and it helped give me the passion I have for animals to this day. Being involved in the *Serengeti* series has been a great experience for me and has given me real insights into their family lives. Seeing them living out the dramas of their daily lives, amidst the beauty of the Serengeti, was quite a moving experience for me.

The story of Bakari was a particular favourite of yours in series one. What is next for him?

Everyone loves Bakari! In the last series he became leader of the

tional to watch and it made clear how intelligent and loving their families are. The wildebeest were a surprise as their whole lives seem to be a succession of almost impossible challenges. How they managed to survive jumping off these huge vertical cliffs to reach the river below was confusing. I also loved the scene where the baboon, Bakari, was trapped by lions in a tree and had to sneak down to escape without waking them up; it was very funny. Another great moment was when Bakari's troop was trapped by a flood and had to make death-defying leaps to survive.



How did you approach your narration — what is the process? Is there anything you learned from narrating Series 1 that you did differently for did more of, for this new series?

When I narrated the first series the director suggested I use my natural Kenyan accent, as he felt its East-African tones were apt for the programme, and also loved how the musical lilt of the accent worked with both picture and music. Having lived in so many different places, my accent does vary quite a bit, so it was sometimes hard to record in New York and find my natural Kenyan voice. This time it was so much easier as I had just spent four months back home in Kenya, reconnecting with my family and culture, so the accent came more naturally to me.

Tell us about some of the new characters and stories you think audiences will particularly resonate with this time around?

There are quite a few new characters to fall in love with. Two adorable leopard cubs, Mzuri and Duma, who get up to all sorts of adventures that bring a smile to your face. There's also Gnu, a wildebeest calf who has to face incredible challenges just to survive. The cheeky jackals, Shavu and Shaba, are also great fun to watch. They are new parents with some very cute pups, and they survive by stealing food from under the noses of the most dangerous animals in the savannah.

Did any animal behaviours you witnessed surprise you/ challenge your perceptions?

There were so many. The elephants rescuing their babies in the flooded river was incredibly emo-

She's named after a bird and Sparinda Joshi, born and raised in Ahmedabad and now based in the Silicon Valley, is on cloud nine with her fourth novel, *A House Full Of Men* (published by HarperCollins), a tale about a loving Indian family that's also dysfunctional, people who can take a bullet for each other but can also be inconsiderate and selfish.

"There are delightful stories of family bonds hidden in there with witty and humorous dialogues. It also deals with love that is complicated and obsessive and glorious in all its messiness. Not to mention some pertinent issues that have organically made their way into the story such as parent remarriages, gender stereotypes, body shaming, teenage angst, et al related with depth and levity, Joshi shared in an interview.

Twenty-five-year-old Kittu has left Lucknow only on two occasions in her life. The first trip involved the last rites of her grandmother. The second involved a wedding, thankfully, but she returned home to her mother's funeral.

She has never forgiven her mother for leaving her alone in a house full of men. Is there anyone at home she can share her deepest thoughts with? Anyone who can lend an ear to her endless relationship issues, manic obsessions and simple aspirations? Who's got the time?

Kittu might live in a full house, but sometimes, she feels like she's all alone in the world.

How did *A House Full Of Men* come about?

Many years back, in the US she had to make a product pitch to the leadership team. She walked into the main conference room bright and early one morning and froze. "There were 14 men seated there; mostly in their 50s and mostly white. It was intimidating. But I took a deep breath and went about my business as usual. That evening when my husband asked me how it went, all I could say was, it was a boardroom full of men. He asked more questions about my pitch, and I repeated, subconsciously, that it was a boardroom full of men. My mind had interpreted that situation in a completely different way as if it were a conspira-

puppy was rechristened from Bittu to Bark Twain. Kittu had expressed immense relief that day.

"As for PG Wodehouse, I grew up reading his books. I love the witty banter and the biting sarcasm and the delightful humor in his books. I had many posters of famous personalities in my room during my younger years. I remember talking to them. Of course, they never talked back. But that's where I borrowed the concept from. Kittu goes to the poster of PG Wodehouse in her room with all her issues and even non-issues. Sometimes he gives her quirky advice. Other times it's banal. Sometimes it's life-altering. I even got him to attempt speaking Hindi. It was a lot of fun," Joshi explained.

How did she come to be named Parinda?

"My mother was reading *Arabian Nights* when she was pregnant with me. There was a character named Parizade in it. She modified it slightly and voila, I was given a rare name. It wasn't so rare, as I quickly learnt during my childhood when my family would visit various palaces in the neighboring state of Rajasthan and invariably a guide or a security guard would point at large swaths of nets covering the palace and proudly say, "These nets were to keep the parindas (pigeons) away so they wouldn't ruin the space". It always left my little self dejected -- but she soldiered on.

She's covered a vast spectrum in

cy, as if I was being set up for failure. The reality was different; it was just like any other meeting. My own reaction to that situation took me by surprise. And it stayed with me," Joshi elaborated.

Fast forward a few years and, "When I was searching for the topic for my next novel, I realised I loved dysfunctional family dramas. Hadn't read too many books in this space but watched several shows and movies — *Schitt's Creek*, *Two & A Half Men*, *Everyone Loves Raymond*, Woody Allen movies, *Kapoor & Sons*. And I love Lucknow for its art, architecture, and culinary history. So, I decided to marry the 'room full of men' con-

"Bark Twain was named Bittu when he'd been sourced as a puppy. The puppy would hang around with him, playing footsie, jumping over and under the rocking chair and tugging at his starched white pajamas. High BP took this for a literary bent and thus the

her four novels. How has she managed such a wide sweep?

"The first two novels were because of my experience working in the sports and music industry in LA. My debut novel — *Live From London* — was about a young musician against the backdrop of the British music industry. My second novel — *Powerplay* — was about the acquisition of a fictional IPL team. My third novel — *Made in China* — was based on a wacky newspaper article I had read about the black-market trade in China. I'm Gujarati so entrepreneurship stories float all around me. I married those stories to the article, and I had a novel. And my latest novel is about a genre I'm a big fan of," Joshi elaborated.

Made In China was adapted into a film starring Rajkumar Rao, Mouni Roy and Boman Irani. It was Joshi's first exposure to screenwriting, which she describes as an "enriching experience".

"I spent a year along with the director (Mikhail Musale) to translate the book into a screenplay. From that point on, more writers and even a dialogue writer was brought on and the script took on a life of its own. It was an enriching experience. Writing a book and writing a screenplay are two entirely different things. Essentially, an entirely new art form needs to be studied for a novelist who wants to venture into the screenwriting space.

"It's not all just about tools and techniques either. It's a personality thing; some people are just better suited for a specific type of craft. Screenwriting, for instance, is more dialogue heavy and requires a knack for it. I really took to it and my new screenplay recently got commissioned by a leading production house in India," Joshi explained.

Like *Made In China*, is there any possibility of the present book being turned into a movie?

"I hope so. I'm in talks with a few production houses who've expressed interest in it. I feel like this story has enough meat and varied characters to be converted into a web series," Joshi concluded.

CHENNAI IS SUPER KING

Mahendra Singh Dhoni played his part to perfection in an extraordinary script as he led Chennai Super Kings to their fourth Indian Premier League title, outwitting Kolkata Knight Riders by 27 runs in a one-sided final on Friday.

As the final delivery was bowled, the old 'Band Master' had that lingering smile at the far corner of his lips having orchestrated his 'Men', who knows may be one last time.

Unarguably, the most loved and revered Indian captain of all time led a team of old warhorses with oodles of experience as they first posted a formidable target of 192 for 3 and then squeezed Knights for only 165 for 9 despite a promising opening stand of 91 between Shubman Gill (51 off 43 balls) and Venkatesh Iyer (50 off 32 balls).

It was canny captaincy that ensured 91 for no loss turned into 125 for 8 and before one realised, it seemed there was only one team on the park.

Josh Hazlewood (2/29 in 4 overs), Ravindra Jadeja (2/37 in 4 overs), Shardul Thakur (3/38 in 4 overs) got the wickets at regular intervals but it was the wily old Dwayne Bravo (1/29 in 4 overs), whose first two overs for eight runs with five dots which actually became a game-changer.

Dhoni and Bravo go back a long way. The skipper knows what his 'Go To Man' is capable of and the 'Champion' knew that he had to deliver.

Not many words were exchanged between the General

and his loyal soldier as they had their blueprint ready.

When India won the 1985 Benson & Hedges World Championship of Cricket, Sunil Gavaskar, Mohinder Amarnath, Madan Lal, all then on the wrong side of 30s, used to congratulate each other after every dismissal calling "Well Done OT" which meant 'Over Thirty'.

That class of 85 was a very experienced bunch that won a big trophy and one could see similar traits in Dhoni's brigade, which since its comeback in 2018, has been called the 'Dad's Army'.

And it was indeed a 'Daddies' Day Out' as 37-year-old Fa'Du Plessis smashed 86 off

59 while Robin Uthappa, now at 35, did what he used to as a cocky 21-year-old nearly decade-and-half back. He smashed 31 off 15 balls with three sixes.

Then it was left to the recently-retired Test

cricketer, the 34-year-old Moeen Ali (37 off 20 balls), who found gaps with ease to give the perfect finishing touch.

When it came to bowling

and fielding, the main job was done by 38-year-old Bravo and 32-year-old Jadeja. The only aberration was 'Orange Cap' winner Ruturaj Gaikwad (635 runs), who probably would be synonymous with the franchise for years to come.

These are players who decided they would make this 'Charge of the Old Brigade' a reality and show that T20 is a format where experience worth its weight in gold is way more important than mere youthful exuberance and brilliance of talent.

IPL success requires game awareness, an attribute which the 'Man from Jharkhand' possesses abundantly.

When KKR chased, Dhoni took some time to gauge that the pitch was slowing down and once Bravo operated post Powerplay, it was CSK's game to win and they did it in style reaffirming that Dhoni in retirement remains the 'Captain of Captains' even when there is another world champion skipper at the other end.

CSK needed a slice of luck at the start and former Proteas skipper du Plessis got that reprieve in the third over when Dinesh Karthik bungled an easy stumping chance.

He then made full use by smashing seven fours and three sixes and also finished as the second highest run-getter behind Gaikwad.

All standout shots came off Lockie Ferguson and there was a cracking over drive and two sixes over the long-off region. Ferguson (0/56 in 4 overs) had a forgettable day in office.

An opening stand of 61 in eight overs with 'flavour of the season' Gaikwad (32 off 27 balls) set the tone and then Uthappa, who had decided to roll back the years, hit his signature pick-up sixes over the deep mid-wicket region.

The 63 runs added in



only 5.2 overs did derail KKR's bowling with only Sunil Narine (2/26 in 4 overs) getting his length and variations in pace right.

If that wasn't enough, another veteran Moeen joined the party as suddenly du Plessis played the second fiddle letting the England international go hammer and tongs

at the KKR bowling. They added 68 in 6.3 overs.

He first snuffed out Gaikwad, who was caught in the deep, and then bowled a straight one which Uthappa missed the line trying to go for the reverse sweep.

The reason why KKR lost the plot during the first 10 overs was

Shakib (0/33 in 3 overs) losing his confidence after Karthik's missed stumping and in the process the length going all awry.

Adding insult to the injury was Ferguson, whose express pace which had been the difference during the UAE leg, became his undoing from the moment

Gaikwad sliced him between cover and point.

Du Plessis then transformed using the pace for big hits into art form with an able hand in Moeen, who found the gaps on both sides of the wickets with finesse while lofting the maximums with effort-less ease.

MS Dhoni becomes first to captain in 300 T20 games

Chennai Super Kings skipper Mahendra Singh Dhoni on Friday became the first player in world cricket to captain a team in 300 T20 games across various competitions during his side's IPL summit clash against Kolkata Knight Riders here.

The 40-year-old former India captain, playing his 10th IPL final (ninth for CSK as captain), has led the 'Yellow Brigade' in 214 games across 12 editions that they have taken part out of the 14 IPL seasons. He has also led Rising Pune Supergiants during one IPL season apart

from leading India in six T20 World Cups.

His crowning glory would certainly be leading India to T20 World Cup title in South Africa back in 2007.

Before that tournament, India had played only one T20I in 2006 in South Africa of which Dhoni was a part.

"It's been a long time. We started T20 in around 2005-06 and most of the games have been franchise cricket and in the last five years there have been a lot of T20 games in international cricket as well," Dhoni said at the toss.

In fact, second in the list is Darren Sammy, who has led a team in 208 games for West Indies and various franchises.

Interestingly, both Dhoni and rival captain Eoin Morgan are playing their 347th T20 game.

PVR Cinemas to screen ICC Men's T20 World Cup matches

"The big screen offers a unique opportunity to maximise the coverage of the ICC Men's T20 World Cup. Cricket and movies complement each other as in India they are considered as two religions that unite the country.

Familiar conditions in UAE will help Pakistan: Sana Mir

Pakistan emerged as "one of the best teams in the world" playing in UAE and Babar Azam and his men will fare well in the men's T20 World Cup due to familiarity with the conditions, says the country's former women's skipper Sana Mir.

The T20 World Cup is set to begin here on Sunday with Pakistan playing their opening fixture against India on October 24.

Since the 2009 terror attack on the Sri Lankan team, the PCB have been hosting most of their international matches in Dubai, Abu Dhabi and Sharjah as other teams showed reluctance to tour Pakistan, citing security concerns.

"T20 cricket is so unpredictable and it is almost impossible to pick a winner,



especially with squads changing all the time," Mir wrote in her column for ICC.

"But with the conditions in mind, it is hard to look past Pakistan.

They know UAE so well of course and became one of the best teams in the world while playing there.

"So, I'm not just following my heart in predicting a good tournament for them. My head says the same thing."

However, Mir feels inaugural champions India and New Zealand can't be ruled out either.

"I like the look of England and the West Indies, while India and New Zealand will always be dangerous too and that's the beauty of T20 cricket – it's so open."

Mir, who retired from all forms of cricket in 2019, feels T20 has "changed the game and especially the women's game."

"In Pakistan, women's cricket is very different from what it was before. Firstly, it has given us an opportunity to play a different brand of cricket.

"When I started with Pakistan, we were such a young and inexperienced squad and learning to construct a 50-over game was not easy for us at the international level. But T20 changed that, it helped us to be more attacking."

The joy is back for Neymar in World Cup qualifying

Neymar started the week facing criticism after a poor performance in a World Cup qualifying match and his suggestion that the next tournament in Qatar might be his last.

But the striker helped erase many of those thoughts by providing key elements in all of the Brazil goals in Thursday's 4-1 win against Uruguay.

The 29-year-old Neymar, who had a disappointing performance in Sunday's 0-0 draw at Colombia in the previous round. Arrived in the northwest Brazilian city of Manaus on



Monday with dozens of fans in front of the team's hotel. That would be the usual, were it not for a wave of criticism he has faced at home for months.

Neymar scored the opening goal against Uruguay after dribbling past goalkeeper Fernando Muslera. He then took the shot that allowed Raphinha to add

the second. And then he provided two assists; one in a through pass to Raphinha and a cross that landed on the head of Gabriel Barbosa.

Midfielder Fred, who assisted Neymar on his goal, said Brazil players felt the difference in atmosphere since they arrived in Manaus. And that includes the team's star.

"These fans gave us support every day in the stadium, in the hotel. They bought all the tickets and it was an extra strength for us," he said, referring to the attendance of 12,500, the maximum allowed by COVID-19 protocols in Brazil.

India seek eighth SAFF C'ships title
