# Is the third Covid wave knocking on our door?

Scientists find infectious mutant AY.4.2 cases in Maha

Is the third wave of Covid-19 all set to knock on India's door? While there have been divergent views whether the third wave if it comes, will be virulent or not, scientists of the INSACOG network monitoring variations in SARS-CoV-2 have found prevalent in India "in very low numbers," a new mutated form (AY.4.2) of the coronavirus. The AY.4.2 has caused panic in Europe as it is presumably more contagious than the Delta variant. AY.4.2, which is one of the 45 sub-lineages of Delta and is dubbed by many as Delta plus, is likely to be named 'Nu'. While research regarding the new mutant is still in the initial phase, studies so far show that this mutant is far more transmissible than the Delta variant. The Government has already been warning the people to not lower their guard during the ongoing festival season. West Bengal which just celebrated

Durga Puja has reported a surge in Covid cases. Though the health system is already geared up to meet the emergency and hopes to perform better in the third wave when compared to the second and first wave, the mutation is suspected to be the cause for the exponential rise in Covid-19 cases in the UK, Russia (a lockdown will start in Moscow next week) and Israel last week. The UK has recorded about 50,000 new Covid infections,

marking another three-month high. Hospitalisations and deaths are also on the rise. However, scientists say the AY.4.2-related findings still carry a high level of uncertainty and it is still early to say this lineage carries a higher risk of illness and/or death. On October 21, the US Centers for Diseases Control said it has less than ten reported cases of AY.4.2 in its database so far, but the UK health authorities have found 15,120

cases of VUI-21OCT-01 — the other name for AY.4.2 — since it was first detected in July. Dr Anurag Agrawal, director at CSIR Institute of Genomics and Integrative Biology (IGIB) in Delhi, said, "AY.4.2 is present in India based on the revised definition, but at very low numbers, less than 0.1 per cent." IGIB is one of the main laboratories involved in the INSACOG genomic surveillance exercise.

# Mid-sea drug bust case turns murky

**Witness makes charges of pay-offs against NCB's Wankhede**

In a sensational twist to the ongoing investigations in the mid-sea drug bust case, a "panch witness" picked holes in the statements by the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) regarding the circumstances leading to the detention of the accused in the case on October 2 and alleged a "money deal" involving the NCB's western Zonal head Sameer Wankhede. Talking serious cognisance of the allegations made in a notarised affidavit by a "panch witness" Prabhakar R Sail (40) that Wankhede had conducted himself in a questionable manner in the investigations and had among other things taken his signatures on ten blank papers, NCB Deputy Director-General, South West Region Mutha Ashok Jain issued a formal statement to the media. "Our Mumbai unit Zonal Director Sameer Wankhede has categorically denied these allegations. As some of the contents of the affidavit relate to the vigilance matters, I am



hereby forwarding the affidavit to the Director-General of the Narcotic Control Bureau and requesting for further action," Mutha Jain said in a statement issued here in the evening. Alluding to the affidavit released to the media by Sail, Mutha Jain said: "A witness has given details of movements and activities on October 2" — the day the mid-sea bust was registered. As he is a witness in the case and as the case is before the honourable court and sub-judice, he needs to submit his prayer to the honourable court rather than (release it) through social media if he has anything to say. In addition, there are several vigilance related allegations against certain persons in the

affidavit which are based on overhearing by Prabhakar." Meanwhile, the NCB's Mumbai zonal director Sameer Wankhede on Sunday approached the Mumbai Police Commissioner seeking protection from likely legal action "being planned" against him by unknown persons to falsely frame him concerning an alleged vigilance related issue. In his single-page letter addressed to Police Commissioner Hemant Nagrale, Wankhede stated he came to know that some "precipitate" legal action for falsely implicating him is being planned by unknown persons in relation to the alleged vigilance related issue in NCB.

# Four JeM ultras planning attack on CRPF camps, IAF bases in J&K

**Intelligence input has come amid spiral in violence against civilians**

Amid a spurt in terrorist attacks in Kashmir Valley, an intelligence input has warned that four heavily-armed terrorists of Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) could attack CRPF camps and IAF bases in Jammu & Kashmir in the coming weeks. The input has come amid a spiral in violence against civilians, especially Hindu minority including local Sikhs and migrant labourers in the Valley. The warning also coincides with an increase in terror



attacks against security forces and the Army alone has suffered at least nine casualties in the ongoing counter-terror operations in Poonch district. The jacked-up violence is being seen as part of a renewed bid by Pakistan to rekindle terrorism in the Valley and led to

Union Home Minister Amit Shah to Srinagar to assess the security situation on the ground. Shah held meetings with the top brass of the security set up there in the wake of concern at the highest level due to the recent surge in violence there. "The terrorist cadres are

equipped with heavy weapons and are controlled from Pakistan," reads the alert that has been shared to various stakeholders of security in Kashmir Valley. Earlier in June, a similar alert was issued by the Defence Intelligence Agency (DIA) suggesting a group of four terrorists had on June 11 attempted terrorist action on CRPF on June 11, 2021 and lobbed/fired grenades on CRPF and ran away into a nearby jungle. The modus operandi of the group of the four terrorists was identified by the security agencies to be snatching weapons from the district police and snatching weapons from the CRPF by firing on them when the paramilitary personnel lay down on the grenade when fired upon and hence weapons can be easily snatched.

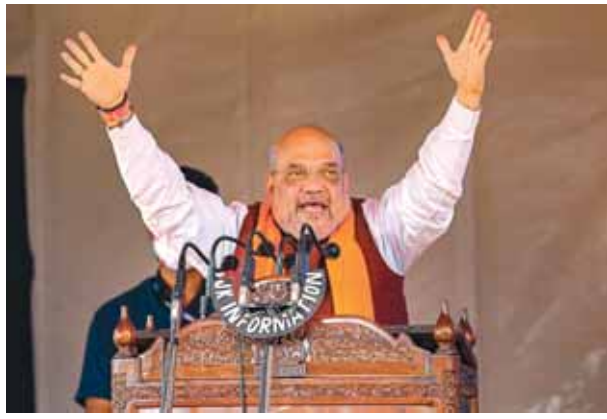

# Modi to travel to Rome for G-20 meet, UK for COP-26

**Will meet world leaders, discuss pandemic fight, eco recovery**

Prime Minister Narendra Modi along with the leaders of the G-20 nations will take stock of the ongoing fight against the corona pandemic and ways to speed up economic recovery. He will travel to Rome for the G-20 summit and then attend the World Leaders' Summit in Glasgow. The five-day visit commences on October 29. Giving details of his schedule, the Ministry of External Affairs said here on Sunday, the Prime Minister will participate in the 16th G-20 Summit in Rome from October 30-31 at the invitation of the Prime Minister of Italy Mario Draghi.



Heads of State of G-20 member countries, the European Union, and other invited countries and international organizations will also take part in the event. This will be the 8th G-20 Summit that the Prime Minister would be attending. The G-20 has emerged as the premier global forum for

international economic cooperation. India is scheduled to host the G-20 Summit in 2023 for the first time. The forthcoming Summit under the Italian Presidency is centred around the theme "People, Planet, Prosperity, focussing on the areas of Recovery from the Pandemic and Strengthening of Global Health Governance, Economic Recovery and Resilience, Climate Change and Energy Transition, and Sustainable Development and Food Security". Modi will also hold several bilateral meetings, including with the Italian Prime Minister, the Ministry said. Thereafter, Modi will travel to Glasgow to attend the World Leader's Summit of the 26th Conference of Parties (COP-26) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), at the invitation of British Prime Minister Boris Johnson.



# Renovation work begins at Muri yard

Several trains cancelled

In view of the renovation work at Muri yard, South Eastern Railway (SER) has cancelled several trains. In a circular issued by Garden Reach, the Kolkata-based headquarters of South Eastern Railway, due to four days pre non- interlocking work and nine days non- interlocking work for the removal of Diamond Crossing at Muri Yard train services would be affected.

According to information, the 08695/08696 Bokaro Steel City-Ranchi Special will remain cancelled from October 24 to November 1. Some passenger trains would also be cancelled between October 24 and November 1. The 08615/08616 Howrah-Hatia Special will run on a diverted route via Purulia-Kotshila from October 24 to November 1.

A railway spokesman said that announcements over the public address system would be made in various railway stations in Ranchi and Chakradharpur divisions



regarding the disruption in train services for the renovation work at Muri railway yard.

The SER notification was circulated across all stations under Chakradharpur division. He said they have already informed the authorities concerned and added that they are spreading the message for the passengers so that they are aware about the decisions.

The Tatanagar railway station is the only A1-category railway station under Chakradharpur division of South Eastern Railway (SER). The footfall at the station is

gradually on the rise because of the increasing number of trains and also because of the fact that Tatanagar falls on the Howrah-Mumbai main line. Several important trains travel via Tatanagar, including the high-profile Rajdhani Express and Duronto Express. The station sees a daily traffic of 90 mail, express and passenger trains, besides a footfall of more than 60,000 passengers. But, in view of the pandemic around a dozen trains pass through the station these days. The footfall of passengers has also come down drastically.

# Man beaten to death in Khunti, 3 arrested

A 46-year-old man, identified as one Pankaj Choudhary, was badly beaten on Saturday night in Khunti and died at RIMS in Ranchi during treatment.

The deceased suffered grievous injuries after he was assaulted at Tapkara locality under Tapkara police station area, barely 50 meters away from Tapkara police station. The incident took place around 8 PM.

Meanwhile, police have arrested three accused Istiyak

Miyan alias Tajo, Nazir Ansari and Suhail Alam. According to information arrested accused assaulted him in a minor dispute after he was taken to a referral hospital at Torpa. But owing to his serious condition he was referred to RIMS. After the postmortem, the body was handed over to the family. All of them were said to be in an inebriated condition. A local resident claimed that the entire incident was captured in the CCTV camera. Apparently, he died due to internal injuries as he was vomiting blood.

Tension also erupted in Tapkara locality as a large number of people gathered outside of the police station as they were agitated over the killing. But no untoward incident was reported as the Khunti police patiently handled the issue. Police immediately arrested the accused and also deployed force.

Deceased was a carpenter by profession and he was the sole bread earner of his family. Belonging to poor economic background he was survived with three children and wife. Two of his sons are divyang

whereas the daughter reads in class nine. One of them is blind.

Residents also demanded compensation for the family besides widow pension for his wife, a house and disability pension for his children. The district administration gave Rs 20000 to the family to perform last rites. The district administration assured all possible help to the family. The local MLA Koche Munda also visited the family and demanded Khunti police for a speedy investigation and to ensure that accused are punished.

# 4 jailed for murdering girl over refusal to join prostitution

Two sisters were sent to jail today in Daltonganj for allegedly killing their youngest sibling and projecting her death as suicide over her refusal to work as a sex worker. Two more persons involved in the case, a pimp and husband of one of the two accused sisters, were also imprisoned.

Rakhi and Rupa allegedly killed their youngest sibling Santoshi and buried her body

Involved in this crime are Dhananjay, husband of Rupa and one pimp, identified as Prapat. All the four accused have been remanded in judicial custody, said additional SP Palamu K Vijay Shankar.

Town police discovered Santoshi's body five days after her murder on March 26. It was unidentified again for two more days when her two sisters came and identified saying she committed suicide.

Police had to send her highly devastated body to RIMS Ranchi for post mortem as here it was denied because of the poor condition of her body.



The post mortem report said she had head injuries. The police got a big help from one more sister of Santoshi called Ramba.

Ramba told police that her sister didn't commit suicide but she was murdered by her own sisters and others just for her refusal to be a prostitute.

K Vijay Shankar said the sisters wanted her to bring home money by sleeping with men which she declined to do.

AK Mahatha said in fact it is Ramba who is the whistle

blower of this heinous crime. This sister of the deceased Santoshi proved a courageous woman as she knew her other sisters and their men would make her life miserable for taking the lid off this murder.

Sources said the town police acted professionally as this case could have dashed simply because it was a blind one with no identity of the deceased in the beginning and there was no one to mourn for her as her sisters tried hard to tell police she

committed suicide.

Mahatha said Ramba showed the police the way to unravel this mystery of murder and burial.

K Vijay Shankar said, "Had each one of us not pursued this case this murder of a young girl for not accepting the profession of prostitution would not have come to the fore."

The sisters who wanted Santoshi to be a sex worker are poor and they had wanted her to support them by her flesh sale earning.

# CBI questions Gomia residents in connection with judge's murder

The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), probing the death of Dhanbad judge Uttam Ananad, has shifted its focus to cases that were pending in the deceased judge's court.

CBI officials probing the case reached Gomia on Saturday to study cases pending in the deceased judge's court.

The CBI team has collected the details of cases pending or heard by Uttam Anand. The agency is also probing whether any person denied bail by the judge was involved in the murder. The CBI is sending notices to several people, including the accused and the litigants, and is calling them in for questioning.

The CBI has interrogated several key persons at Gomia

police station whose cases were being dealt by judge Uttam Anand.

Many of the people of Gomia, who were interrogated by the CBI team, were not aware of why they had been called to the police station. But later inquiries were made regarding Judge Uttam Anand. They said that some of their cases were heard in court. The judge in that case was Uttam Anand.

According to the reports, Judge Uttam Anand was also posted in Tenughat Court. He had been working as Additional District and Sessions Judge from the year 2017 to 2020 in the Civil Court Tenughat.

According to information available, the judge was jogging on one side of the road when an auto-rickshaw run over him.

# Married woman's body recovered

A married woman died under suspicious circumstances in Jagdishpur area of Pihra West Panchayat under Gawan police station area of the district. The incident happened late on Saturday night.

The deceased has been identified as Rani Devi, married to Vikendra Sao, aged 24 years, and a resident of Jagdishpur. In the case, the relatives of the deceased have accused her in-laws of murder.

Village head Jitendra Yadav said that Rani Devi had gone towards the forest to collect wood sticks and suddenly dropped unconscious near a river. After the incident, the police reached the spot and took the body in their possession and sent it to the Sadar Hospital, Giridih for post-mortem.

Police station in-charge Suraj Kumar said that the investigation of the matter is going on. Necessary action will be taken after receiving the application.

# Lemongrass cultivation transforming lives of rural women

Lemongrass cultivation has transformed the lives of several women residing in different villages under Paterwar block, situated on the banks of Damodar river of Bokaro district. Around 140 women farmers cultivate lemongrass on 28 acres of barren land here. They have set an example by earning about Rs 3.5 lakh from Lemongrass cultivation.

These rural women who were living in penury a few months ago now have become an inspiration for others.

"We have started cultivation of Lemon Grass through the Jharkhand Opportunities for Harnessing Rural Growth (JOHAR) project under in the

year 2020, for the first time in the Kharif season in four producer groups," said Lal Muni Devi, a woman farmer.

"We were worried about losing money (investments) when we first started farming, but we persisted. Today, our burgeoning harvest is a living testament to our accomplishments," said Munia, another woman of the farmer group who grows lemon grass.

"When we joined the producer group, we learned how to increase our profit by doing collective farming and collective sale," said another woman of the farmer group. "We came up with the idea of growing lemongrass only after extensive discussion and training among the growers' group members. The

main benefit of this farming method is that after five years of planting, the crop does not need to be replanted, and it pays every year," she said.

JOHAR project is a holistic package of rural livelihoods interventions that work together to enhance and diversify the incomes of targeted rural households across 68 blocks in 17 districts of Jharkhand. It uses a collectivisation approach and builds on the community institutions platform established by another Government-World Bank initiative, the National Rural Livelihoods Mission, to form producer groups and producer organisations. JOHAR uses this platform to deliver the interventions package designed to push rural producer households

up the value chain. Cultivation of lemon grass is easily done in less fertile land or even on barren land. Once the plant is planted, profit can be earned by harvesting and selling its leaves 4 to 5 times per year till five years, said an official.

This time, lemon grass saplings have been sold to 10 producing groups by the four producing groups cultivating last year. And the women farmers (who cultivated) have earned an income of about Rs 3.50 lakh, the official said.

Lemon grass is significant because of its fragrant leaves. Steam distillation is used to extract the oil from the leaves, which is rampantly used in cosmetics, soaps, insecticides, and medicines.

“Passengers who have not been fully vaccinated will have to undergo tests upon arrival if they do not produce a negative report of RT PCR test conducted within 72 hours prior to the journey. The doctors deployed at the main gate take the final call on which passenger has to be tested,” said Sharma.

The Ranchi Railway Division has also intensified Covid testing at the two railway stations in the city, Ranchi Railway Station and Hatia

Ranchi, requesting not to be named.

According to a source in the Integrated Disease Surveillance Programme (IDSP), as many as 68 people, including passengers, tested positive for Covid-19 in Ranchi on Saturday and 41 of them

were from other districts or states. The remaining 27 people who tested positive for Covid-19 took the active caseload in Ranchi to 148.

As per government data released on Sunday morning, the active caseload of Covid-19 in Jharkhand was 221, which is four times more than the active caseload back in September. The state, however, has not reported Covid casualties in the recent past.

Meanwhile, doctors have warned against any complacency during the upcoming festivals of Diwali and Chhath, fearing that the festivals may lead to a rise in cases. Additional

Chief Secretary (Health) Arun Kumar Singh has said that the next 100 days, which would cover Diwali, Chhath, Christmas and New Year, were crucial for Jharkhand in context of the Covid-19 situation.

Ranchi, which alone accounts for more than 60 per cent of the active cases of Covid-19 in the state is most prone to rise in cases due to its connectivity with most of the metros and other important cities in India, sources said. The number of Jharkhand districts with zero active Covid cases has also reduced from 12 in October first week to eight on Sunday, highlights government data.

## Govt, BJP clash over vaccination figures in State

Spike in Covid cases  
in past few days

Jharkhand has no shortage of vaccines, but the vaccination process in the State is slow. The State has the potential to vaccinate three lakh people every day, but only one lakh people are being vaccinated. There is also confusion between the central and state figures. According to the centre, only 40.54% of the total population in Jharkhand has got the first dose, while as per state figures 59% of the people here have got their first dose.

Centre's figure is based on the total population of the State, while the State figure is based on those above 18 years of age. This



makes the percentages of both look different, but the result is the same. In terms of population, Jharkhand is not only in the last three positions, but also in terms of 18 plus the condition is

equally bad.

The State's sluggish rate of vaccination has given an opportunity to state BJP leaders to attack the JMM/Congress government. BJP ST morchha national president Sameer Oraon said, “While on one hand, the Country has achieved 100 crore vaccination target, the vaccination process in the state is very slow. The State Government should speed up the vaccination process.”

However, a health department official requesting anonymity said, “The state was not receiving enough vaccines from the Centre until a few months ago.”

However, sources said that there are several reasons behind slow vaccination. More than one lakh vaccines are not

being given every day, but the health department is not very serious in vaccination.

Also, many districts are far behind in vaccination. In Garhwa, 43 per cent have been vaccinated while in Sahibganj 47 per cent have been vaccinated. Moreover, people have also become careless after a decline in corona cases. People are not reaching the centre to get the vaccine.

Sources said people being careless about corona vaccination are at risk. On Saturday 68 positive cases were found in Ranchi. A total of 65 people were found infected in the investigation at Ranchi and Hatia stations, while samples of three infected people were taken from mobile testing vans. All these passengers had come by

Tapaswini Express and Rourkela Passenger train coming from Odisha. Among the infected, 27 are from Ranchi and 41 from other districts. Earlier on Friday, 70 infected were found. Out of these, only one patient from Doranda has been admitted to the trauma center of RIMS.

Meanwhile, experts have warned of an increase in corona cases in coming weeks due to festivals citing migration of people from Western India. An IMA official requesting anonymity said, “In next two weeks, there will be a rise in corona cases as people will reach Jharkhand from across the country. The Government should put up stringent measures to check people at entry and exit points at railway stations, bus stands and airport.”

The issue of Sarna religious code is once again going to raise the political temperature of the State, as the State BJP unit targeted the JMM/Congress alliance government over allegedly misleading people on the issue. On the side-lines of a two-day national working committee meeting of the BJP Scheduled Tribe (ST) morchha, BJP Rajya Sabha member and ST morchha national president Sameer Oraon said, “The Sarna religious code is a complex issue. The State Government by raising the issue has once again tried to mislead people on the issue.”

The BJP Rajya Sabha member said that Sarna religious code is a complex issue and the present government is raising the issue so as to divert the attention of people from real issue.

Tribal representatives from nine states are gearing up for a mass agitation to press for a separate Sarna religious code in the 2021 census if the Centre does not accept their demand.

Another set of tribal lead-

ers under the banner of the Rashtriya Adivasi Samaj Sarna Dharma Raksha Abhiyan have threatened an economic blockade in tribal-dominated states on the same issue.

The Jharkhand Assembly had in November last year unanimously passed a resolution for a Sarna Adivasi religious code in the 2021 census in a special one-day session and sent it to the Union government.

On the issue of Adivasi are not Hindus remarks of Chief Minister Hemant Soren, the BJP leader said that the Chief Minister should introspect before making such remarks.

He said, “Chief Minister Hemant Soren's father Guruji Shibu Soren is a big devotee of Lord Shiva and his name is one of the names of Lord Shiva. Hindu is not a religion but a way of living, but the Chief Minister is making such a remark due to political compulsions.”

Meanwhile, at the two-day working committee of ST morchha which concluded today important decisions were

taken. The party decided to constitute Sankul Parishar Vikas Yojana under which 40-50 cluster groups will be formed. These Sankul Parishar Vikas Yojana will help in creating job opportunities for tribal and local population which will help in checking migration.

At the working committee meeting which was attended by 147 delegates including 23 MPs and ministers from 27 states also passed political resolutions.

The national working committee meeting was inaugurated by union tribal welfare minister Arjun Munda on Saturday, while at the concluding session BJP national general secretary (organizational) BL Santosh was the chief guest.

Munda on Saturday had lamented that opposition ruled states like Jharkhand, Bengal and others are creating hurdles for the execution of this scheme meant for the betterment of children of tribal society.

He alleged opposition for politics in the matter of Eklavya schools adding land allotment for schools were politicised.

## Ranchi airport to get latest in-line baggage screening for passengers TO ENHANCE SECURITY, SAVE PASSENGERS' TIME

Birsa Munda Airport in Ranchi will soon get the latest In-Line Baggage Screening (ILBS) system, which will automatically screen the baggage of travellers at the check-in counter with minimal human intervention, thereby saving passengers from the hassle of standing in long queues for X-Ray screening of their luggage prior to the check-in process, airport officials said on Sunday.

“Once the latest system is installed, passengers will be able to directly move to the check-in counter without having to take the trouble of getting their baggage screened at the X-Ray screening machines at the departure,” said the Director of Birsa Munda Airport, Vinod Sharma.

According to Sharma, the latest ILBS system will not only help passengers save time, but also enhance the security at

the airport by detecting explosives and items prohibited in aircrafts with more efficiency. “We have set a target of installing the system by November 15. Even if we take a few extra days, the ILBS system should be operational latest by November 30,” he said.

The decision of installing ILBS system has been taken in compliance with the latest security norms of the Bureau of Civil Aviation Security (BCAS), said airport officials, adding that the latest ILBS system is already operational in some of the busiest airports in India.

Currently, passengers have to first stand in a line at the baggage screening centre where their luggage is screened manually, and then move to the check-in counter. The process of getting baggage screened manually often becomes time-consuming during busy hours at the airport, causing trouble to passengers who are either running late or are unwell,

sources said.

The Birsa Munda Airport will also get two new aerobridges, the moveable tunnels that connect airport buildings to the aircraft and help in hassle-free boarding or deboarding for passengers, the airport director said. At present, the airport has two aerobridges. The additional two aerobridges will help in easing flight movement.

Currently, at least 20 flights connect Ranchi to New Delhi, Bangalore, Chennai, Kolkata, Mumbai, Ahmedabad and Hyderabad. The Birsa Munda Airport, which bagged the top position in Customer Satisfaction Index (CSI) last year, at present has a 75 meter basic strip, which is the minimum length required for any airport. The basic strip is likely to be extended to 140 meter. Ranchi was likely to get more flights earlier this year, but the second wave of Covid-19 caused a delay in the process, officials said.

## Accused in ‘plot to topple Govt’ out on bail

Ranchi police fail to submit chargesheet in 90 days

In the sensational case related to the alleged attempt to topple the Hemant Soren government, the Anti-Corruption Bureau court of Ranchi district granted bail to all three arrested.

All three accused, Amit Singh and Nivaran Prasad Mahto (both natives of Bokaro) and Abhishek Kumar Dubey (Palamu) lodged at Birsa Munda Central Jail were granted bail under provision 167 (2) of CrPC as Ranchi police failed to submit the charge sheet within 90 days of the FIR. They were charged with sedition.

They were arrested in July and police claimed that their arrest was made from the Hotel Le Lac Sarovar of Ranchi. Police further claimed that the accused had traveled to Delhi along with some MLAs and they met some senior BJP leaders of Maharashtra BJP in Delhi.

However, the police did not disclose MLAs who travelled along with them. But they were identified as Irfan Ansari and Uma Shankar Akela of the Congress and Independent Amit Yadav.

It was also said that these three accused along with others were in touch with as many as nine Congress MLAs and they were ready to pay any amount to them to break the party and help the BJP to form the government. Ranchi police had claimed that the accused confessed that they were the cogs of a high-level notorious game plan.

Ranchi police acted on the

basis of a complaint lodged by Congress' Bermo MLA Jaimangal Singh who had claimed some financier and political brokers trying to destabilize Hemant Soren led JMM-Congress-RJD government.

But the political circle and common people began to doubt the story as the arrested accused are small fries. Their nondescript backgrounds led people to doubt police theory as a superfluously and loose script of a Bollywood film.

Singh is a contractual worker, Mahto is a fruit seller and Dubey is an unemployed engineering graduate.

Ranchi police had revealed that Dubey in his confessional statement given before police said that he along with other accused and three MLAs had boarded to Delhi bound flight on July 15 and returned on the next day.

Police said that they had stayed at Hotel Vivanta and the meeting of MLAs with several BJP leaders was arranged where they were also offered Rs one crore as advance payment to go against the Soren government. MLAs also met BJP MLAs from Maharashtra Chandrashekhar Rao Babankule and Charan Singh.

Police claimed that Dubey in his confessional statement has said that one Maharashtra-based person Jaikumar Belkhe had arranged logistics for them. Quoting Dubey, police said that since MLAs were only promised payment and no part payment was made these MLAs were unhappy and returned to Ranchi.

While he informed that "Rangoli", "Lori" and "patriotic song" competitions will form part of the celebrations of the 75th year of the country's Independence, he also spoke about the rise of the 'Nari-Shakti' in the country. Modi touched on a range of issues such as the vaccination drive against Covid-19, the United Nations Day, Centre's new drone policy and women empowerment.

citizens and even walked long-distances in hills to accomplish the task as he spoke with a health worker at Bageshwar, in Kumaon hill region of Uttarakhand. While asking people to enliven their lives with various traditional cultural forms, the Prime Minister also said that the modern drone technology should be increasingly used to make life easy for the people. "Drone Technology. Up until a few years ago, when the name of Drone used to come up, what used to be the first feeling in the minds of the people?... Of the army, of weapons, of war. But today if we have any wedding procession or function, we see a drone shooting photos and videos", he said. "The spectrum of a drone's usage and its capabilities is not just limited to that. India is one



of the first countries in the world, which is preparing digital records of land in its villages with the help of drones. India is working extensively on using drones for transportation. Whether it is farming in the village or delivery of goods at home; Providing help in emergency or monitoring law and order", said the Prime Minister. "It is not long before we will see drones being deployed for all these needs of ours. Most of these have already started. Like a few days ago, nano-urea was

sprayed in the fields through drones in Bhavnagar, Gujarat. Drones are also playing their role in the Covid vaccine campaign. We got to see a picture of this in Manipur, where vaccines were delivered via a drone to an island. Telangana has also done trials for vaccine delivery by drones", said Modi, elaborating on the potential future role of drones in the day-to-day life. The Prime Minister also pointed out that the strength of women joining the police force has more than doubled and reached 2.15 lakh. "Earlier it was believed that services like army and police are meant only for men. But today it is not so. The statistics from the Bureau of Police Research and Development show that in the last few years, the number of women police

personnel has doubled. In 2014, while their number was close to 1 lakh 5 thousand, by 2020 it has increased by more than double and this number has now reached up to 2 lakh 15 thousand", he said. Even in the Central Armed Police Forces, Modi said the number of women has almost doubled in the last seven years. "And I'm not talking just about numbers. Today the daughters of the country are performing even the toughest duties with full force and zeal. For example, many daughters are currently undergoing one of the most difficult trainings, that of Specialized Jungle Warfare Commandos", he said. Steering his talk to Indian traditions and culture, Modi said 'Rangoli', 'Lori' and 'patriotic songs' competitions organised by the culture ministry

would form part of 'Amrit Mahotsav' of the country's independence. "A listener of "Mann Ki Baat" has suggested that Amrit Mahotsav should be connected to the art of Rangoli too. For centuries, we have had a tradition of lending colours to festivals through Rangoli. The diversity of our country is visible in Rangoli. Rangoli is drawn in different states with different names and on different themes. "Therefore, the Ministry of Culture is also going to conduct a National Competition associated with this. Just imagine, when a Rangoli related to the freedom movement will be created", wondered Modi while accepting new ideas to celebrate national independence ", he said.

Modi also touched on another art form known as 'Lori' where "sanskars are inculcated in young children through lullabies and they are introduced to the culture. Lullabies also have their own diversity", he said. "So why don't we, in the Amritkaal period, revive this art also and write lullabies pertaining to patriotism, write poems, songs, something or the other which can be easily recited by mothers in every home to their little children. In these lullabies there should be reference to modern India, the vision of 21st century India and its dreams. "The ministry has decided to organize a competition related to it after receiving suggestions from the listeners", said the Prime Minister. Modi, in his address, also

remembered freedom-fighter and warrior Birsa Munda and his great role in preserving local culture and forest. "Next month, the birth anniversary of one such icon and a brave warrior, Bhagwan Birsa Munda ji is falling on the 15th of November. Bhagwan Birsa Munda is also known as 'Dharti Aaba'. Do you know what this epithet means? It means the father of earth. "The way Bhagwan Birsa Munda fought to protect his culture, his forest, his land, it could have only been done by 'Dharti Aaba'! He taught us to be proud of our culture and roots. The foreign rule subjected him to countless threats and applied immense pressure, but he did not relinquish the tribal culture", the Prime Minister said in his tribute to Munda.

## INS Vikrant's 2nd phase sea trials begin

The second phase of sea trials of the first indigenously designed and built aircraft carrier Vikrant commenced on Sunday with the warship sailing out from Kochi. The maiden trials lasting more than a week were held in early August. With the maiden trials completed successfully, India had joined the elite club of nations having the capability to build aircraft carrier. US, UK, France, China and Russia are other countries have this niche expertise.



als are over, the aircraft carrier will be put through the stringent aviation trials before induction into service. The aircraft carrier is around 262 metres long and 62 metres wide. In June, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh reviewed the construction of the aircraft carrier that will be able to accommodate up to 30 fighter jets and helicopters. The warship will have a fleet of Mig-29K fighter jets and Ka-31 helicopters. There are 14 decks in all,

including five in the superstructure. The ship has over 2,300 compartments, designed for a crew of around 1,700 people, including specialised cabins to accommodate women officers. The ship has been designed with a very high degree of automation for machinery operation, ship navigation and survivability, 'Vikrant' has a top speed of around 28 knots and cruising speed of 18 knots with an endurance of about 7,500 nautical miles. At present, India has only

one aircraft carrier INS Vikramaditya. It was built by the Russians as per Indian specifications. The Indian Navy has been focusing on significantly bolstering its overall capabilities in view of China's growing efforts to increase its military presence in the Indian Ocean Region. The Indian Ocean, considered the backyard of the Indian Navy, is critical to the country's strategic interests. In order to achieve self-reliance in shipbuilding, the Navy's programme is rightly poised to provide requisite 'Economic Stimulus', with 44 ships and submarines on order being built indigenously. After the completion of the first phase of trials, the Navy had said performance of the key systems was found to be satisfactory. Navy spokesperson Commander Vivek Madhwal had said the ship's performance, including of the hull, main propulsion, power generation and distribution (PGD) and auxiliary equipment were

tested during the sea trials. "Trials, which were reviewed by Vice Admiral AK Chawla, Flag Officer Commanding-in-Chief Southern Naval Command on the last day, have progressed as planned and system parameters have been proved satisfactory", Madhwal said. The delivery of Vikrant is being targeted to coincide with celebrations to commemorate the 75th anniversary of India's independence 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav', he said. The construction of the ship began in 2009. Commander Madhwal said that the successful completion of the maiden trials, despite challenges faced due to the coronavirus pandemic, was a testimony to the dedicated efforts of a large number of stakeholders. Around 550 Indian firms including about 100 MSMEs are registered with the Cochin Shipyard Limited(CSL) and they provided various services for the construction of the aircraft carrier.

## Neurological disorder GBS possible side effect of AstraZeneca vaccine: UK regulator

The UK regulator has listed Guillain-Barre Syndrome (GBS)-- a neurological disorder that affects the feet, hands and limbs-- in the list of the possible side effects of the AstraZeneca Covid vaccine. The European Medicines Agency, had last month already listed the condition to the single-shot dose Johnson and Johnson vaccine, which uses the same technology as the AstraZeneca jab. It said last month that 833 cases of Guillain-Barre syndrome had been reported worldwide out of 592 million doses dished out. The benefits of the vaccine still far outweigh the risks, regulators have stressed. The EMA previously said they considered it "at least a reasonable possibility" that Guillain-Barre is a side effect of the Oxford-made jab. Guillain-Barre syndrome, which sees the immune system go haywire and start to attack



nerve cells, was added by the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) in the UK. Most people who suffer from the autoimmune disorder make a full recovery, but one in five can be left with long-term problems such as difficulty walking and one in 20 die, the report said. The European Medicines Agency said last month that 833 cases of Guillain-Barre syndrome had been reported worldwide out of 592 million doses dished out. The benefits of the vaccine still far outweigh the risks, regulators have stressed. The EMA previously said they considered it "at least a reasonable possibility" that Guillain-Barre is a side effect of

the Oxford-made jab, the report added. Up to September, there were 393 UK cases after vaccination with the jab but the watchdog is not certain the condition is occurring more often than it normally would, the report added. It is not clear how many of these led to long-term complications, but three Britons have died. The MHRA added there have been 44 suspected cases following administration of the Pfizer jab, and one death. There have also been three cases after inoculation with the Moderna jab. Professor Ian Douglas, a pharmacoepidemiologist at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, said the benefits of the vaccine still vastly outweighed the risk, according to the Daily Mail. The incidence of the side effect remains extremely rare, with only 833 cases reported worldwide from about 592 million administered doses of the adenovirus-based AstraZeneca vaccine, as of July 25.

## Process for providing new battalions for ITBP in last stages: Min

New Delhi:The process to authorise new battalions for the Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP), guarding the Line of Actual Control (LAC) between India and China, is in the last stage and the Government is determined to provide transport and logistical support to all security forces, Union Minister Nityanand Rai said on Sunday. Addressing the 60th Raising Day event of the mountain-warfare-trained ITBP, Mr. Rai said the Government had last year sanctioned 47 new border posts and a dozen staging camps (operational bases for troops undertaking border patrol) to the force. "Deliberations for providing new manpower and battalions for the ITBP are in the last stages", Mr. Rai, the Minister of State for Home Affairs, said. Officials said the force is expected to get a sanction of

seven new battalions comprising about 8,000 personnel for its new border posts that will mainly come up in the Arunachal Pradesh sector of the LAC on India's eastern flank. The proposal for sanctioning new ITBP battalions and a sector headquarter in the north-east has been under the consideration of the Home Ministry for over two years now. But with the last year's sanction of the new border outposts and staging camps, the proposal is expected to get approval soon, they said. An ITBP battalion has a strength of just over 1,000 personnel. At the rising day event, Mr. Rai lauded the ITBP for their bravery and for giving a "befitting reply" to their opponents during the clashes between Indian and Chinese forces in Ladakh during May-June last year.



He also decorated 20 ITBP officers and personnel as he pinned police medals for gallantry on their uniform for displaying bravery and courage during the clashes. These medals were announced by the Centre on Independence Day eve. The Minister said the 'Operation Snow Leopard' conducted by the ITBP in Himalayan ranges gave a "big message that India will never compromise on its sovereignty and security". The force proved it was "second to none" when it

came to guarding the country, Mr. Rai said, adding, "It is a matter of pride that the ITBP won these many bravery medals in one instance for the first time in its history". Mr. Rai said the country's security forces have got "independence to operate and decide" under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi. The minister said the Modi government was working to plug all gaps along India's international borders and trying to enhance the capabilities of the security forces and also equip

them with better weapons and technology. ITBP Director General Sanjay Arora also praised his troops for their gallant action during the clashes with the Chinese People's Liberation Army last year in the Ladakh area. He recounted the initiatives taken by the force to combat the coronavirus pandemic in the country by operating health facilities in the national capital region. Union Home Minister Amit Shah, who is in Jammu and Kashmir, greeted the personnel and their families through a Twitter message. "ITBP is well known for protecting the motherland in the toughest of terrains and serving the nation during natural calamities. India is proud of ITBP's valour and determination," he said.

## Centre to hold meetings with States on its order to limit edible oil stock

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

The Centre will hold a meeting with State Governments to review action taken on the stock limit order on edible oils. In a letter written to all States by Food Secretary Sudhanshu Pandey, the department has outlined initiatives taken by the Centre to ease prices of edible oils for relief to consumers and in view of the festive season. Retail prices of edible oils are still high despite steps taken by the Government to reduce prices during the festive season. The Department of Food and Public Distribution (DFPD) on Sunday said it is monitoring the prices of cooking oils as demand rises during the festive season and will hold a virtual meeting with States on October 25 to review action taken by them on its stock holding limit order. On October 10, the Centre had imposed stock limits on traders of edible oils and oilseeds, barring certain importers and exporters, till March 31, in a bid to control domestic prices and provide relief to consumers.

states/UTs may consider/explore the previous stock limit imposed for edible oils and oilseeds by the state/UTs. "It may be considered that any stakeholder (refiners, miller, wholesaler etc.) should not hold the stocks in excess two months of the storage capacity. For guidance states may prefer to indicative limits which may have been imposed by states earlier is enclosed for consideration. However, for other categories similar quantities as appropriate for the state may be fixed. For example: for refiners, stocks of maximum of 2 months of the average scale of last six months could be used. Similarly, quantities may be fixed for extractors/millers may be fixed," the department said. On Friday, the Centre said it was hopeful that key oilseeds- and edible oil-producing states would start imposing stock limits from the next week. The average retail price of mustard oil on Friday was ruling at Rs 185.55 per kg, groundnut oil at Rs 182.86 per kg, sunflower oil at Rs 168.21 per kg, soya oil at Rs 154.91 per kg, vanaspathi at Rs 138.31 per kg and palm oil at Rs 132.64 per kg. Prices have fallen by Rs 3-4 per kg following the recent cut in import duty. During November 2020 to September 2021 (11 months), the imports of vegetable oils increased 2 per cent to 1,24,70,784 tonnes compared to 1,22,57,837 tonnes in the corresponding period of the previous year. Out of the total vegetable oil imports, edible oil imports rose to 1,20,85,247 tonnes from 1,19,50,501 tonnes. Non-edible oils rose to 3,85,537 tonnes from 3,07,333 tonnes. Vegetable oils marketing year runs from November to October.

## 'Antidepressant mirtazapine not effective in treating dementia'

Antidepressant mirtazapine, a drug used to treat agitation in people with dementia is no more effective than a placebo, and might even increase mortality, according to a new study. The research, led by the University of Plymouth and published in the journal The Lancet, has shown that mirtazapine offered no improvement in agitation for people with dementia - and was possibly more likely to be associated with mortality than no intervention at all. Agitation is a common symptom of dementia, characterised by inappropriate verbal, vocal, or motor activity, and often involves physical and verbal aggression. Non-drug patient-centred care is the first intervention that should be offered but, when this doesn't work, clinicians may move to a drug-based alternative. Antipsychotics have proven to increase death rates in those with dementia, along with other poor outcomes, and so mirtazapine has been routinely prescribed. This study was designed to add to the evidence base around its effective-



Lead researcher Professor Sube Banerjee, Executive Dean of the Faculty of Health and Professor in Dementia at the University of Plymouth, explained why the results were so surprising but important. "Dementia affects 46 million people worldwide - a figure set to double over the next 20 years. Poor life quality is driven by problems like agitation and we need to find ways to help those affected," he said. In India, it is estimated that 5.3 million people above the age of 60 have dementia. This equals to one in 27 people, according to the Dementia in India 2020 report. Alzheimer's dementia is the most common type of dementia. "This study shows that a common way of managing symptoms is not helpful - and could even be detrimental. It's really important that these results are taken into account and mirtazapine is no longer used to treat agitation in people with dementia. "This study has added important information to the evidence base, and we look forward to investigating further treatments that may help to improve people's quality of life."

# Cong slams Centre over rising fuel prices

Rahul alleges ‘tax dacoity’ on petrol prices

**New Delhi:** The Congress on Sunday slammed the Centre over rising fuel prices, with former party chief Rahul Gandhi alleging that the "tax dacoity" on petrol prices is rising and there would be some respite from it if elections take place somewhere.

Congress general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra also attacked the Centre over rising prices of petrol and diesel, alleging that the Narendra Modi Government has created records in "giving trouble" to people.

Taking to Twitter, the Congress general secretary tagged a media report which said this year, petrol prices have increased by a record ₹23.53. "Modi ji's Government has made big records in giving trouble to the public. Highest unemployment: in Modi Government. Government properties being



sold: in Modi Government. Petrol rates increased the most in a year: in Modi Government," she said in a tweet in Hindi.

Taking a swipe at the Government, Rahul Gandhi, in a tweet in Hindi, said, "Tax dacoity over petrol prices is rising. There would be some respite from it if elections take place somewhere."

He used the hashtag "TaxExtortion" with his tweet.

Senior Congress leader P Chidambaram also took a swipe at the Government, saying PM Modi led his Ministers

in celebrating 100 crore vaccinations and should also lead by example in celebrating other centenaries -- petrol crossed ₹100 per litre a few weeks ago and now diesel has crossed ₹100 per litre.

When a gas cylinder crosses ₹1,000 per cylinder, there will be another opportunity to celebrate, Chidambaram said.

Congress chief spokesperson Randeep Surjewala tagged the same media report shared by Priyanka Gandhi and tweeted, "Achche Din" (good days).

Petrol and diesel prices on Sunday were hiked for the fifth straight day by 35 paise per litre each, pushing pump rates to a new high across the country.

The price of petrol in Delhi rose to its highest-ever level of ₹107.59 a litre and ₹113.46 per litre in Mumbai, according to a price notification of state-owned fuel retailers. **PTI**

## Modi Govt has created records in giving trouble to people, says Priyanka

**New Delhi:** Congress leader Priyanka Gandhi Vadra on Sunday attacked the Centre over rising prices of petrol and diesel, alleging that the Modi Government has created records in "giving trouble" to people.

Petrol and diesel prices were hiked for the fourth consecutive day on Saturday by 35 paise per litre, pushing the total increase in rates on petrol to ₹36 per litre and on diesel to ₹ 26.58 since early May 2020 when taxes on the two fuels were raised to record levels.

Petrol in Delhi now costs ₹107.24 a litre and diesel comes for ₹95.97, according to a price notification of state-owned fuel retailers. **PTI**

## TMC protests in Kolkata



**Kolkata:** The Trinamool Congress protested against the rising fuel prices in Kolkata on Sunday. Carrying an empty LPG cylinder decorated with flowers, TMC supporters burnt an effigy of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, shouting slogans against the BJP-led government at the Centre.

"The country is reeling under an unprecedented rise in fuel prices for several months now, but the BJP government seems unconcerned about the plight of the people," TMC state general secretary Kunal Ghosh said.

The protest rally toured Raja Dinendra Street, APC Road and Sukia Street in north Kolkata with TMC supporters armed with placards, slamming the Centre.

Ghosh said the rise in fuel prices has triggered a cascading impact on the people of the country. Petrol was retailing at ₹108.11 per litre in Kolkata on Sunday, while diesel was being sold at ₹99.43 per litre in the city. Diesel prices have already crossed the century-mark in several districts of the State. **PTI**

## Lakhimpur deaths: Min's son gets dengue; hospitalised

**Lakhimpur Kheri (UP):** Union Minister Ajay Kumar Mishra's son Ashish Mishra, arrested in connection with Lakhimpur Kheri violence, has contracted dengue and shifted to the district hospital, an official said on Sunday.

Ashish, who was taken in police remand, was sent to the district jail Saturday evening for treatment at its healthcare facility, Additional Superintendent of Police (ASP) Arun Kumar Singh said.

Ashish, along with three others, was taken in two-day police custody on Friday evening for further interrogation in the case.

Chief Medical Officer of Lakhimpur Kheri, Shailendra Bhatnagar along with his team examined Ashish.

"The samples (of Ashish Mishra) collected Saturday night tested positive for dengue. His sugar levels were found to be critical. Some changes were also observed in the ECG. This demands treatment under observation by expert doctors at the district hospital," he told reporters on Sunday. Eight people, including four farmers, were killed in Uttar Pradesh's Lakhimpur Kheri on October 3 in violence that erupted during a farmers' protest.

Thirteen people, including Mishra, have so far been arrested in connection with the incident.

Three accused arrested on Saturday -- Mohit Trivedi, Rinku Rana and Dharmendra -- were produced before a magistrate. The investigators moved an application for their 14-day police custody remand. The hearing on the application will take place on Monday. **PTI**

## Secularism constitutional, moral commitment for BJP, says Naqvi

## Senior advocates must render pro bono legal aid to poor for quality access to justice: SC judge

**New Delhi:** Supreme Court judge justice U U Lalit on Sunday called upon senior advocates to render pro bono legal aid to the poor and marginalised sections to ensure that they get quality access to justice.

Justice Lalit, who is the Executive Chairman of the National Legal Services Authority, was speaking at a function organised by Karnataka State Legal Services Authority in association with the District Legal Services Authority, Kalaburagi on 'Actualisation of Rights and Entitlements in Achieving Sustainable Development Goals –2020'.

"Merely training the panel lawyers will not be sufficient. The solution to the problem is that some of the senior advocates must take legal aid as a matter of choice and keep on appearing for matters pro bono so that the man who comes through the door of legal aid service clinic is assured that it is not going to be a matter which is botched up and a quality legal aid will be extended to him," Justice Lalit said.

Stressing the importance of empowering the poor and downtrodden, he said legal aid to the poor does not mean it is of poor level and it has to be of better quality and standard. **PTI**

## Social Justice Ministry for decriminalising possession of small amount of drugs for personal use

**The** Social Justice and Empowerment Ministry has recommended decriminalising possession of small quantities of drugs for personal consumption in its review of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act submitted to the Revenue Department.

Currently, there is no provision for relief or exemption under the NDPS Act and it only gives addicts immunity from prosecution and imprisonment if they volunteer for rehabilitation.

In its recommendations shared with the Department of Revenue last week, the ministry suggested decriminalising possession of small quantities of drugs for personal consumption, officials said.

## Police: More Myanmar refugees entering Mizoram due to clashes

**Aizawl:** More refugees from Myanmar's Chin state are entering the southern and eastern border districts of Mizoram due to continuing clashes between the neighbouring country's army and rebels, a senior police officer said on Sunday.

At least 12,939 Myanmarers, including women and children, are currently taking shelter in different parts of Mizoram, he said.

Of them, the detailed information of 1,518 Myanmarers is yet to be recorded, the officer said.

The numbers keep changing as there are new entrants almost every day, while some who live near the international border enter and exit India on a regular basis, he said. The police officer said that Myanmar nationals are being provided with shelter and food by locals, community leaders, NGOs and churches.

As per Mizoram Police data accessed by PTI, six border districts Champhai, Lawngtlai, Siaha, Serchhip, Hnahthial and Saitual together housed 9,411 refugees. **PTI**

## China does not have any right to choose next Dalai Lama: Head of Tawang monastery

**Tawang (Arunachal Pradesh):** China has no authority at all to get involved in choosing the next Dalai Lama as it does not believe in religion and the succession plan is entirely a spiritual matter and not a political issue for the Tibetan people, the head of the Tawang monastery in Arunachal Pradesh has said.

Gyangbung Rinpoche, the Abbot of the nearly 350-year-old monastery near India's border with China, also said that it is important to counter Beijing's "policy of expansionism" and New Delhi must maintain a strict vigil over the Line of Actual Control (LAC) with that country, in an oblique reference to the eastern Ladakh standoff. Referring to China's aggressive

posturing along the LAC, Rinpoche said though India believes in peace and prosperity, its approach in dealing with such belligerence has to be based on the ground reality.

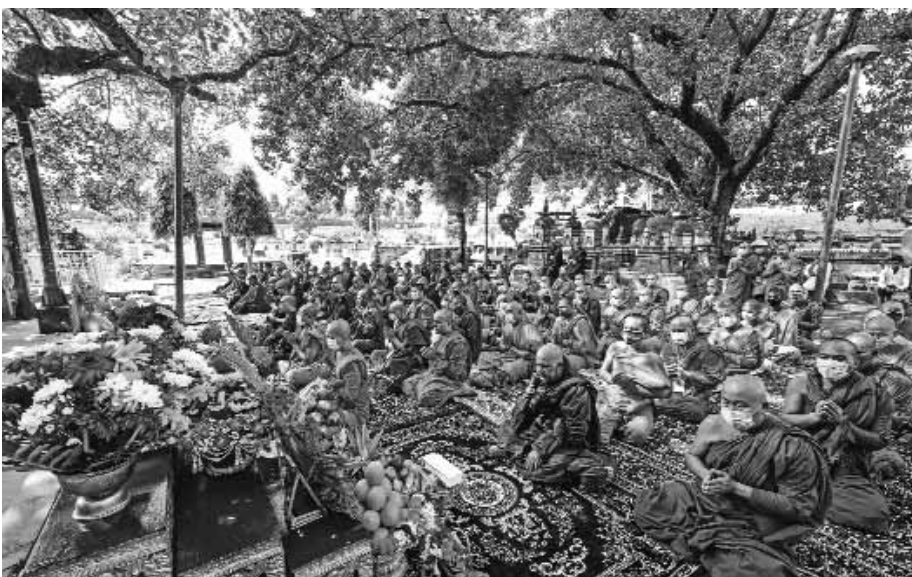
"It is important to counter China's growing assertiveness. It is necessary for India to keep a strict vigil over the border (with China)," he told PTI in an interview.

The head of the second largest monastery in the world after the Potala Palace in Tibet's Lhasa said only the current Dalai Lama and the Tibetan people have the right to decide about the successor to the Tibetan spiritual leader and China has no role to play in the matter.

"The Chinese Government does not believe in religion. How can a government that does not believe in religion decide the next Dalai Lama. The succession plan is a matter of religion and faith; it is not a political issue," Rinpoche said.

"China does not have any right to even get involved in the process of choosing the next Dalai Lama. Only the current Dalai Lama and his followers have the right to decide on the issue," he said.

The comments by the Abbot of the monastery that is located in a region claimed by China came amid strain in ties between the two countries following the eastern Ladakh border standoff. **PTI**

## New Kashmir

Amit Shah has extended his hand; it's now time for the youth to reciprocate

Union Home Minister Amit Shah is on his first visit to Kashmir after the abrogation of Article 370. From his point of view, he pressed all the right buttons on his first day in Srinagar. He wants calm in the region that is like a becalmed ship in the last two years. Shah kicked off the visit by chairing a security meeting. Two aspects of the Valley's disquiet were jarring: Continuing violence despite heavy security presence and radicalisation of local youth. The Minister was worried that the unending violence was undoing the Government's efforts to stabilise the situation. He was probably told in return that with the terrorists targeting ordinary individuals, it was difficult to give protection to every citizen. The toll has already crossed 30. Shah later interacted with people at the Raj Bhavan, addressed youth and visited the house of a slain police officer. His wife was given a Government job. As outreaches go, the visit is a serious outreach campaign of the Centre in Kashmir by the Home Minister himself. It comes at a time when recent violence is threatening to stall Delhi's attempts at rapprochement, the usual pressures from the international community and the snide remarks from Pakistan. The Government would not want the ongoing exercise of constituency delimitation to be delayed. It has perhaps set an agenda for itself wherein the constituencies would first be subjected to delimitation, favouring the Jammu region as Kashmir complains or rectifying its under-representation as Jammu counters, after which elections would be held.

The formation of the next Government will reveal which region has an edge and that may determine future State politics. Like he announced in the Parliament, Shah also said in Srinagar that the return of statehood would be taken up thereafter. The Government is of the view that the Kashmiri youth should be persuaded to join the national mainstream as the region returns to a new normal. Nearly 70 per cent of the State's population is under the age of 35. Shah said he was in Srinagar to make friends with the Kashmiri youth, assuring them of all help for education, employment and development. It is not yet known how these youth have reacted to the Home Minister's persuasion. That is the key. They are being asked to forget all of the past and embrace a "new era in Kashmir". The "era" was brought in on the back of decisions like the internet ban and curfew that were necessary to foil a plot to provoke Kashmiris, as the Home Minister explained. Tourism is flourishing and there is no curfew now, he said, even as Srinagar was enveloped in one of the toughest security blankets with the use of drone cameras, detention of hundreds of people, including youth, and seizure of hundreds of motorcycles in preparation for the Minister's visit. Shah amplified his aspirations in earnest. It is up to the aspirations of the youth to match his.

## Under fire

The Oppn is sharpening its claws to take on the BJP, especially in Punjab and Goa

The BJP is coming under increasingly ferocious attack from various quarters ahead of next year's Assembly elections in five States. The ruling party at the Centre has its Government in UP, Uttarakhand and Goa and is a governing alliance partner in Manipur while Punjab currently has the Congress Government at the helm. In Punjab's politics, there is a lot of churning going on, especially in the Congress. Going into the elections, it is one of the few States where the beleaguered party is still considered to be on a better footing than its rivals. The open, long-drawn power struggle between Navjot Singh Sidhu and then Chief Minister Capt Amarinder Singh has not really done the Congress any good turn. Following the acrimonious duel, the party high command was forced to opt for Dalit leader Charanjit Singh Channi as the Chief Minister. All eyes are now on the leadership to see how the forced change and the sulking Captain affect its fortunes: Will it manage to retain power despite the

bad blood within and anti-incumbency, or whether the AAP will concretise its hold or if the BJP will turn out to be the dark horse?

According to poll pundits, the BJP faces a tough competition only in Punjab and is set to romp home comfortably in the other four States. However, there is a silent storm brewing against it over the coastal horizon of Goa, too. While TMC supremo Mamata Banerjee has since July's 'Martyrs' Day' event started making an outreach to the electorate there, her nephew and TMC national general secretary Abhishek Banerjee has now made a shriller pitch for the party's all-out debut in Goa, saying they will register a win in the State. The AAP is also pulling out all the stops in both Punjab and Goa to fulfil Arvind Kejriwal's aspiration to go national. However, all said and done, the impact of the BJP's mammoth poll machinery can't be underestimated, whenever it starts rolling full throttle. There already is speculation in the media that Goa Chief Minister Pramod Sawant may be replaced soon for the party to contest the election on a clean slate. Besides, hundreds of the RSS cadres have fanned across the State and are working silently to ensure that the BJP stages a comeback. Time will tell which party's calculations hit the bull's-eye at the hustings.

# Educate to achieve attitudinal changes

The strength and resilience of Indian democracy receive widespread appreciation. For the outside world, it is amazing that a Prime Minister loses House confidence by one vote, and accepts it without even asking for a recount. But the fading away of the Independence struggle-generation has led to severe erosion of values, the impact of which is visible all around. The violence and murder in Lakhimpur Kheri, lynching of a young Dalit person in Rajasthan and the barbaric killing of a young man at the Singhu border are among the instances of avoidable loss of life in a civilised society. Is it not a shame that blatant discrimination is practised even in *ex gratia* payment to victims? This is not the democracy that MK Gandhi and numerous other luminaries fought for. Selfish motives, shortsighted goals and vested interests are denting India's image globally. Gandhi found everything in India attractive as "India has everything that a human being with highest aspirations could aspire for". He found India "fitted for religious supremacy of the world", and that India is a *karmabhumi*, not a *bhogbhumi*. He was convinced that India's mission was different from that of others.

On October 20, 1927, he said about Hindu dharma: "I have found it to be the most tolerant of all religions known to me. Its freedom from dogma makes a forcible appeal to me inasmuch as it gives the votary the largest scope for self-expression. Not being an exclusive religion, it enables the followers of that faith not merely to respect all the other religions, but also to admire and assimilate whatever may be good in other faiths." Gandhi did not mean that "everything in India that attracted" him included abhorrent practices like untouchability, dowry, child marriages, and much more. He loved India, its diversity, its culture, and lamented its downfall over the centuries because of foreign invaders and internal deficiencies. He was very clear in his priorities for resurgence of a new India: Education for all, dignity for all. As one goes through his writings that indicate his vision for India, political freedom was only



one of the steps towards a new democratic India; freedom from hunger, poverty and ill-health was the prerequisite in the march towards equality, transparency, brotherhood and human dignity. His was a unique endeavour, the essence of which could be comprehended in that immortal sentence: "My life is my message."

This was the level of transparency he had set for those who were to take over the reins of power after India's Independence. He preached only what he could practice. His approach, as is well known by now, attracted global interest only because he became a unique example of courage, bravery and commitment to conviction. Billions the world over were convinced during his lifetime that only the Gandhian way could extricate mankind — and our planet — from the clutches of distrust, bigotry, racism, caste prejudices, terrorism, fundamentalism and much more that jeopardised the very human existence. The global foundation for a world of peace was to be laid in the pragmatic implementation of the universalisation of education which, Gandhi thought, was the only ray of hope for the suffering masses. The *Hind Swaraj* he penned in 1909 is now being perused with much

more respect and sincerity. Violence must totally vanish from Gandhi's land. One is convinced that the solution lies in reverting to Gandhi and re-articulating his thoughts in the current idiom. While those in power have the obligation to find immediate solutions, the long-term strategy must focus on education, right from the early days to universities. Attitudinal transformation can be possible only through Gandhian vision, the essence of which he had presented to the nation in the 'Basic Education', which he thought was his most significant contribution. Why Gandhi was so enamoured by this idea? He wanted education to draw the best out of "head, hand and heart". This, he thought, was the best way to transform a lay learner into a full-grown personality. It is indeed laudable that with literacy below 20 per cent at Independence, India is touching 80 per cent and, that too, when population growth has been more than three times. It has also led to certain aberrations in teaching and learning, most prominent being the concentration on "head", and near-total neglect of "hand and heart". The consequences are before us. The 75-year experience must put the system on

the right path.

The manner in which the National Education Policy-2020 lays focus on character building, value inculcation and recommends the integration of academic and vocational education clearly indicates the impact of Gandhian education philosophy. Sadly, the philosophy that Gandhi and his colleagues had articulated was simply ignored by the earlier decision makers. No effort was made to bring forth a model of education rooted in Indian culture and, at the same time, committed to new knowledge. This formulation would be complete when synchronised with Gandhi's writing in the *Young India* issue of June 3, 1926: "The highest form of freedom carries with it the greatest measure of discipline and humility. Freedom that comes from discipline and humility cannot be denied; unbridled license is a sign of vulgarity injurious alike to self and one's neighbours."

To re-emphasise, education must concentrate on preparing men and women of character and commitment who practise integrity, honesty and selfless service as their dharma.

### AI CAN'T TAKE OVER JOURNALISM

Sir — As industries are being affected by the age of automation, it is feared that journalism could be next. But this ever-busy field needs more human power for reporting and publishing news and stories than machines. The profession involves much more than mechanisation. Publishing houses might soon opt to switch journalists with Artificial Intelligence robots and applications to minimise human hands. But clearly, AI involved works can account for only about 10 per cent of the total function in journalism. Another key aspect of journalism is that it involves a lot of emotional intelligence. For example, a journalist visiting a flood-ravaged area or a fire-affected spot and speaking to people who are rendered homeless, can never be compared with a robot's workmanship.

It is important to remember that journalism is more than just the sum of its parts and the profession's human character cannot be automated, as journalists provide more than just information. As former journalist and professor at the University of Minnesota Rodrigo Zamith aptly sums up, "Accuracy requires proper verification. Robots cannot get it right every time."

LEBANON IS A SHIP WITH MANY HOLES

Off the Lebanese coast about 60 km north of Beirut a 104-metre battleship stands vertically, with her bow and some 30 metres of her length plunged into the mud. The seabed is 140 metres down, but you can even scuba-dive on the stern if you are a technical diver. The ship is a bit like Lebanon, for reasons I'll explain later.

Five years ago Lebanon still looked like a middle-class country with a lot of poor people. Now it looks like a very poor country with a few rich people. Indeed, even the civil war of 1975-1990 did less damage to the economy, though it destroyed several hundred thousand lives and much of the country's infrastructure. The current disaster's roots are in that war. It drove the Lebanese back into the relative safety of their own sectarian communities, Christian, Sunni Muslim, and Shia Muslim, and warlords arose to protect those communities. By the end of the war in 1990, they were the new political and financial elite, with well-paid militias to enforce their will on their own communities — and they didn't go back to their day jobs. They became a corrupt and nepotistic club.

That system was visibly coming apart by the 2010s. There simply wasn't enough money to share out among the elites. Lebanon produces almost nothing, not even enough food for its own people, and its imports are paid for with remittances, foreign aid, and loans. With not enough money coming in to sustain their immense patronage networks, the elites started taxing the poorer sections, and in 2019 something snapped. Suddenly Beirut's streets were full of protesters demanding fundamental change.

Lebanon is a former French colony, so French President Emmanuel Macron flew in and offered the Lebanese government £11 billion in return for structural reforms that would root out the corruption at the heart of government. But the elites who benefit from that system are the government, in practice, so of course they said no, thanks. Then came the massive explosion in Beirut's port district last year. That got the International Monetary Fund involved, offering Lebanon huge loans if the corrupt system is reformed, but it's likely that the government will turn them away again.

It's getting close to the edge. Last Thursday Hezbollah staged a mass protest in Beirut, demanding the removal of the judge presiding over the inquiry into who was responsible for importing the 2,750 tonnes of fertiliser that caused last year's port blast. When the march entered a Christian district at least one sniper opened up on it. Seven Shias died, and the crowd (some of whom were armed) tried to storm Christian neighbourhoods in retaliation. And still the Lebanese political class refuses to bend.

So why does that political class resemble the captain of HMS Victoria, the defunct battleship that did a nose-dive in 1893? Because the officer commanding the British Mediterranean Fleet, Vice-Admiral Sir George Tryon, was one of the most stubborn men in history. He ordered a very complex manoeuvre in which two parallel lines of battleships would make simultaneous U-turns towards each other, winding up going in the opposite direction but with the parallel lines much closer together. And he got the distance wrong.

Everybody else on the bridge could see the ships were actually going to collide, and several of them spoke to Tryon about it, but he ignored their advice. The ship that was going to ram him also queried his orders, but he persevered. So they collided, and the admiral went down with his ship.

Think of Lebanon's political class as Admiral Tryon, and the country as HMS Lebanon. Technical divers only.

# Artificial Intelligence in counter-terrorism

Security agencies need unhindered data access to predict future radicalisation apart from the spread of fake news that supplements ulterior agendas

In 2015, the IS declared its expansion to include the Khorasan region, which includes the modern political boundaries of Iran, Central Asia, Afghanistan, and Pakistan. Since early 2020, the IS-K has been regularly publishing its 'Voice of Hind' in the Kashmir Valley to radicalise the youth and destabilise the Valley. The scope of the IS-K has expanded to India and Bangladesh. The killings of non-Kashmiris and Hindus in the Valley, apart from the pre-planned vandalising of the Durga Puja pandals in Bangladesh, point out the increasing tentacles of IS-K working in tandem with the Taliban. The developments call for the incorporation of new methods in the domain of counter-terrorism.

The most prominent measure that can be adopted is the pre-detection of the people with terror intent. The current usage of drones, sting operations and informants do not suffice under the prevailing circumstances. Artificial Intelligence (AI) can immensely help the forces and reduce their vulnerabilities. AI technologies are being used actively by many nations for policing and counter-terrorism operations with offensive weaponry. The objective here is to make accurate predictions and adopt an approach to 'what will happen' rather than 'what happened'? The government should recognise the legal entity of the AI technologies for counter-terrorism operations. It should become legally obligatory for the telecommunications service providers to mirror the conversations of suspected terrorists in sensitive zones such as Kashmir, Punjab and West Bengal, apart from the other border areas.

Security agencies should have unhindered data access to predict future radicalisation apart from the spread of fake news that supplements the ulterior agendas. Tracking the financial transaction information and the travel patterns of suspected individuals apart from identifying sleeper cells that purchase dual-use explosive materials are some of the methodologies followed. To enhance the efficacy of the existing methods and check further radicalisation apart from the exposure to other hybrid warfare tactics such as fake news, the surfing data of institutes of higher education should be monitored.

New indigenous platforms supporting the Google and Yahoo search engines that identify potential recruits through scanning their internet browsing history should be encouraged. These surveillance centers and their servers should be under the strict vigil of the central police forces or the armed forces. Google has developed the redirect method, which uses search algorithms, keywords, and phrases frequently used by people with violent tendencies.

The second step for pre-detection can involve reversal through psychological and mindset change through soft counter-radicalisation measures that can be locally tailored through AI. Such novelty has to be brought about in counter-terrorism operations. For instance, Saudi Arabia has

a holistic counter-terrorism program since 2005 that consolidates even the "correct notions and concepts of Islam". 'Sakina' programme is one such example of Saudi Arabia.

According to the reports, one of the most preferred recruitment platforms of IS is Facebook and Twitter, wherein the IS, through its tweets and re-tweets, can create a closed online micro-community around the recruit or the targeted recruit. As the communication between recruit and the handling agency develops, end to end encryption platforms like WhatsApp and Telegram are used for private 'dark' conversations to compel the individual to commit violent crimes.

The problem lies in 'one standard encryption' policy throughout the country, making no distinction between an 'operational' area and a 'peace' area. A counter move can perhaps be possible wherein sensitive areas are out of bounds for these encrypted platforms due to national security. Privacy perhaps should only be allowed in 'peace' areas where there are no immediate threats to national security. As new threats such as Talibanization of Pakistan and re-radicalisation of the Valley emerge, it becomes imperative for the government to adopt novel law enforcement tools to counter them.

At the level of land-based counter-terror operations, where troops operate at the level of small teams, methods have to be revolutionised. Besides the satellite data providing real-time intelligence, thermographic cameras can be installed in the forests apart from

surveillance from UAVs. In the bordering villages, various AI-enabled cameras with monitoring at two undisclosed locations (to avoid sabotage) can immensely help the security forces. Cameras fitted with Facial Recognition (FR) features can help locate any suspicious 'entry' in sensitive areas.

In the cities, especially around the festivals, crowd scanning with multiple AI tools for locational tracking and thwarting terrorist attacks can be done. In some critical areas, the government can also introduce identity cards with biometric chips that have data of iris, facial expressions, and fingerprints.

The tools of AI can be customised even for regular policing in case the terrorists intermingle with the crowd. For instance, China uses Hikvision and Cloud Walk while the US depends upon Pred Pol in cities like Los Angeles for counter-terrorism and policing. Also, gunfire detection software-Shot Spotter is also used by the American agencies to detect shooting by using acoustic sensing technology to deter crimes.

Even the minute details of the number and the types of weapons in possession of the terrorists and other anti-national elements can be ascertained if specific biologically inspired AI surveillance mechanisms involving high-speed data processing can be used for preventive search operations and threat elimination. The same technologies can also be effectively used during counter-terrorism operations to overview, monitor and report the operational developments of the ter-

rorists to the security agencies.

Third, the Indian industries using 'dual use' AI should be brought within the domain of a new initiative of 'civil-military interface' in which certain companies can be roped into implanting AI technologies to the existing indigenous weapons under the supervision of DRDO. For instance, indigenous guns or rifles can be experimentally mounted with low weight AI cameras or biometric systems with an ability to detect and eliminate potential terrorists if they use a ring of human shields to escape or launch attacks on the forces.

For this, establishing an AI intelligence cell in the armed forces and civilian intelligence agencies with active coordination can probably solve the issues in implementing such novel methods. Agencies have to be working in tandem with detailed distinctions and overlaps of their duties and responsibilities to ensure that there is no 'conflict of interest' which can potentially hamper the counter-terrorism strategies. The larger aim of the AI intelligence cell of the Indian army should be to increase its own operability domestically and develop an ability to be able to work with the AI divisions of our allies such as Israel, the US, and Japan apart from the others. Finally, equal importance has to be given to the increasing role of perception management through regular media briefings by the army to raise the social acceptance of the government security measures. Citizen surveillance and alertness also have to be encouraged to thwart the terrorist attacks.

There is a need to link school education with college and thereafter, research. Students must be sensitized through webinars which are low cost and quite intense interactive experiences. The role of mass media in political and social mobilization can be ensured through active participation of students in communicating initially with fellow students and then with the masses at large.

Increasing participating

of students through myriad baskets of activities has to be ensured. This practice can gradually be transformed into community-wide physical activity campaigns to help the new generation understand the benefits of physical activities and coordination and cooperation to make them strong, energetic and sensible.

There is a need to provide an ambience of contiguity, working in unison, harmony and critical thinking through multidisciplinary scholarly culture for educational impetus. It is expensive as it only requires a positive attitude towards contribution and reiterating our commitment towards the nation.

A new culture of liberal literature is necessary to nurture a feeling of self-less service.

This would ensure that students contribute ideas and engage with them in a creative environment.

Academicians are the epitome of sacrifice and inspiration whose relentless drive brings out the best in their students. Students can be taught how learning the essential precepts through practical teaching mechanisms can make them reflective. The philosophy of the academics should be to ensure that even the rural and left-out segments of the student population are guided to enter the mainstream of life. The mentors ought to broaden the horizon of comprehension and supplement the practice of argumentation with more inclusive and wholistic approach.

**TAIWAN SHAKEN BY 6.5-MAGNITUDE QUAKE**  
Taipei: An earthquake shook Taiwan's capital, Taipei, on Sunday and caused falling rocks that injured a woman and damaged a car. No deaths were reported. The 6.5-magnitude quake struck at 1:11 p.m. and was centered near Yilan, a city about 35 kilometers (22 miles) east of Taipei near the northeastern coast, according to the Central Weather Bureau. It was followed seconds later by a 5.4-magnitude quake. Buildings in Taipei swayed. The subway and some other mass transit services were suspended. A woman was injured by falling rocks in Taroko National Park in Hualien County, south of Yilan, the Central News Agency reported. It said one car on a highway was damaged also by falling rocks but no one was injured.

**TEXAS DRAG RACE DRIVER SLAMS INTO SPECTATORS**  
**Kerrville:** A driver lost control during a Texas drag racing event on an airport runway and slammed into a crowd of spectators, killing two children and injuring eight other people, authorities said. A 6-year-old boy and an 8-year-old boy were killed in the crash Saturday afternoon at an event called "Airport Race Wars 2" at the Kerrville-Kerr County Airport, police said in a news release.

**AFRICA TRIES TO END VACCINE INEQUITY**  
**Cape Town:** In a pair of Cape Town warehouses converted into a maze of airlocked sterile rooms, young scientists are assembling and calibrating the equipment needed to reverse engineer a coronavirus vaccine that has yet to reach South Africa and most of the world's poorest people. The energy in the gleaming labs matches the urgency of their mission to narrow vaccine disparities. By working to replicate Moderna's Covid-19 shot, the scientists are effectively making an end run around an industry that has vastly prioritized rich countries over poor in both sales and manufacturing.

**PAK: ISLAMISTS SUSPEND MARCH UNDER PACT**  
**Lahore:** A radical Islamist party agreed Sunday to suspend for three days its march of thousands toward the capital Islamabad after Pakistan agreed to drop pending charges against the party's leader. Party supporters Saturday departed the eastern city of Lahore, clashing for a second straight day with police who lobbed tear gas into the crowd.

## Over 2K migrants march out of southern city in Mexico

Over 2,000 migrants, mainly Central Americans, began walking out of a city in southern Mexico on Saturday where they have essentially been trapped. The migrants walked along a highway leading west and north toward the U.S. border, and pushed past a line of state police who were trying to stop them. There were minor scuffles and a small child suffered a slight head wound, but the migrants continued on their way. They made it only a few miles (kilometers) to the nearby village of Alvaro Obregon before stopping to rest for the night at a baseball field. José Antonio, a migrant from Honduras who did not want to give his last name because he fears it could affect his case, said he had been waiting in Tapachula for two months for an answer on his request for some sort of visa. "They told me I had to wait because the appointments were full," said the construction worker. "There is no work there (in Tapachula), so out of

# US sabotaging CPEC: Pakistan PM's aide

Chief of the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) Authority has accused the United States of sabotaging the multi-billion dollar project, the economic lifeline of Pakistan, a media report said. The ambitious CPEC was launched in 2015 when Chinese President Xi Jinping visited Pakistan. It aims to connect western China with the Gwadar seaport in southwestern Pakistan through a network of roads, railways and other projects of infrastructure and development. "From the point of view of the emerging geo-strategic situation, one thing is clear: the United States supported by India is inimical to CPEC. It will not let it succeed. That's where we have to take a position," Khalid Mansoor, the

Special Assistant to Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan on CPEC affairs said while addressing the CPEC Summit at the Institute of Business Administration in Karachi on Saturday. Islamabad is the seventh largest recipient of Chinese overseas development financing with 71 projects worth USD 27.3 billion currently underway as part of the CPEC. Many Western think tanks and commentators have termed the CPEC an economic trap that has already resulted in bloated public debt levels and disproportionately high Chinese influence in Pakistan's economy, a report in the Dawn newspaper said. The premier's aide said the United States and India continue to "make attempts to manoeuvre Pakistan out of" China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) — a global infrastructure

development plan — under which the Chinese government has been investing heavily in about 70 countries, the report said. "There's no way Pakistan will forgo any of its benefits. It has more than once burnt its fingers in (the Western) alliance in the past," he said, adding that their attempts to dilute China's strategic influence in the region will fail. Mansoor said the Western powers view the CPEC as a symbol of China's political ambition. "That's the reason CPEC is seen suspiciously by both the United States and Europe... they view CPEC more as a move by China to expand its political, strategic and business influence," Mansoor said, noting that China has been able to allay that apprehension "to a great extent". The United States

is now "taking stock of the economic and political consequences" of withdrawing from the region, he reasoned. "I had a detailed discussion with the people in the American embassy. I told them CPEC is available for them as well. They have also expressed their wish that they would like to develop some kind of involvement and see how it can be beneficial for both countries," he said. Mansoor said Islamabad is seeking the expansion of the CPEC to Afghanistan and has discussed the possibility of Taliban-led Afghanistan joining the multibillion-dollar economic corridor. He said there has been "deep interest" in developing economic connectivity between Afghanistan and Pakistan and with other neighbouring countries, including Iran.

## US urges N Korea to stop missile tests, return to talks

AP ■ SEOUL

A senior US diplomat on Sunday urged North Korea to refrain from additional missile tests and resume nuclear diplomacy between the countries, days after the North fired-off its first underwater-launched ballistic missile in two years. Sung Kim, the top US official on North Korea affairs, spoke after meeting with South Korean officials to discuss North Korea's recent missile tests that have come amid a long-running stalemate in nuclear diplomacy between Washington and Pyongyang. "We call on the DPRK to cease these provocations and other destabilizing activities, and instead, engage in dialogue," Kim told reporters, referring to North Korea by its official name, the Democratic People's Republic of Korea. "We remain ready to meet with the DPRK without preconditions and we have made clear that the United States harbours no hostile intent towards

the DPRK," he said. Last Tuesday, North Korea fired a newly developed ballistic missile from a submarine in its fifth round of weapons tests in recent weeks. South Korean officials said the submarine-fired missile appeared to be in an early stage of development. That marked the North's first underwater-launched test since October in 2019 and the most high-profile one since President Joe Biden took office in January. Missiles fired from submarines are harder to detect in advance and would provide North Korea with a secondary, retaliatory attack capability. Tuesday's launch violates multiple United Nations Security Council resolutions that ban any activity by North Korea in the area of ballistic missiles. Kim said the test poses a threat to the international community and is "concerning and counterproductive" to efforts to promote peace on the Korean Peninsula. Kim's South Korean coun-

terpart, Noh Kyu-duk, said the two had an "in-depth" discussion on Seoul's push for a symbolic, political declaration to end the 1950-53 Korean War as a way to bring peace. Noh said he and Kim also reaffirmed that North Korea's issues of concern can be discussed once talks are restarted. The US-led talks on ending North Korea's nuclear programme have been largely stalled since early 2019, when a summit between then President Donald Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un collapsed due to disputes over US-led sanctions on the North. The Biden administration has repeatedly said it's ready to meet North Korea "anywhere and at any time" without preconditions. But North Korea says a return to talks is conditional on the US dropping what it calls a hostile policy toward Pyongyang, an apparent reference to the sanctions and regular military drills between Washington and Seoul.

## Obama criticizes Youngkin in Virginia Gov's race

AP ■ RICHMOND, VA

Former President Barack Obama offered a sharp rebuke of the Republican candidate for Virginia governor, Glenn Youngkin, as he encouraged voters on Saturday to support Democrat Terry McAuliffe in the closely watched race. Obama accused Youngkin of portraying himself as a friendly everyman while encouraging what Obama called "lies and conspiracy theories" about widespread voting fraud in the 2020 elections. Former President Donald Trump has continued to push the false narrative about election fraud, which fueled the Jan. 6 insurrection at the U.S. Capitol. "Either he actually believes in the same conspiracy theories that resulted in a mob, or he doesn't believe it but he is willing to go along with it, to say or do anything to get elected. And maybe that's worse ... because that says something about character," Obama said.



Youngkin, a former private equity executive and a first-time candidate, initially made "election integrity" the centerpiece of his campaign and refused for months to say whether President Joe Biden was legitimately elected. He has since said that Biden was, and that there was not widespread fraud in last year's elections.

The Palestinians seek the West Bank, along with the Gaza Strip and east Jerusalem — areas Israel captured in the 1967 Mideast war — for their future state. The Palestinians view the settlements, which house some 700,000 settlers, as the main obstacle to peace. Most of the international com-

munity considers settlements illegal. Israel views the West Bank as the biblical and historical heartland of the Jewish people. Ofran said Israel is also set to approve 1,600 units for Palestinians in the areas of the West Bank that it controls. But critics say the move comes at the initiative of villagers and not the Israeli government and that the figure is a fraction of the building permits requested by Palestinians over the years.

## Another country stops Sputnik jabs after South Africa HIV fears

Namibia has discontinued the use of Russia's Sputnik V Covid-19 vaccine following concerns raised by neighbouring South Africa, the health ministry said on Saturday. Neighbouring South Africa earlier this week said it would not approve Sputnik V due to concerns it could increase the risk of HIV infection among men, a claim the vaccine's developer says is unfounded. The Namibian health ministry said in a statement that following South Africa's decision it was suspending, with immediate effect, use of the shots until the formula is listed for emergency use by the World Health Organization. "The reason for discontinuation of the administration of the vaccine is being done out of abundance of caution that men who received Sputnik V may be at higher risk of contracting HIV when exposed to it," said the ministry.

## Pope Francis: Don't send migrants back to Libya and inhumane camps

AP ■ VATICAN CITY

Pope Francis on Sunday made an impassioned plea to end the practice of returning migrants rescued at sea to Libya and other unsafe countries where they suffer "inhumane violence." Francis also waded into a highly contentious political debate in Europe, calling on the international community to find concrete ways to manage the "migratory flows" in the Mediterranean. "I express my closeness to the thousands of migrants, refugees and others in need of protection in Libya," Francis said. "I never forget you, I hear your cries and I pray for you." Even as the pontiff appealed for changes of migrant policy and of heart in his remarks to the public in St.

Peter's Square, hundreds of migrants were either at sea in the central Mediterranean awaiting a port after rescue or recently coming ashore in Sicily or the Italian mainland after setting sail from Libya or Turkey, according to authorities. Dozens of others sent out a plea for help from a flimsy rubber dinghy. "So many of these men, women and children are subject to inhumane violence," he added. "Yet again I ask the international community to keep the promises to search for common, concrete and lasting solutions to manage the migratory flows in Libya and in all the Mediterranean." "How they suffer, those who are sent back" after rescue at sea, the pope said. Detention facilities in Libya, he said "are true concentration camps."

## Turkey decision on envoys regrettable, says Finland's PM

Finland's leader said Sunday that the Turkish president's decision to order that 10 foreign ambassadors, including the Nordic country's envoy, be declared persona non grata after calling for the release of a jailed philanthropist and human rights activist was a "regrettable situation." Prime Minister Sanna Marin told public broadcaster YLE that "this is a tough reaction" from Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, who announced the move on Saturday. A declaration of persona non grata against a diplomat usually means that the individual is banned from remain-

ing in their host country. The diplomats were summoned to Turkey's foreign ministry on Tuesday. The envoys from the U.S., France, Germany, Netherlands, Canada, Denmark, Sweden, Finland, Norway and New Zealand had issued a statement calling for a resolution to the case of Osman Kavala, a businessman and philanthropist held in prison since 2017 despite not having been convicted of a crime. "This is a very regrettable situation. We've considered it important that the decisions of the European Court of Human Rights are respected and complied with, and therefore have called for the release of this human rights activist," Marin said.

## Biden hosting budget talks in Delaware with Schumer, Manchin

AP ■ WASHINGTON

President Joe Biden was hosting two pivotal senators for meetings in Delaware on Sunday in hopes of resolving lingering disputes over Democrats' long-stalled effort to craft an expansive social and environment measure. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., and Sen. Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., were scheduled to attend the session, the White House said. Manchin and Sen. Kyrsten Sinema, D-Ariz., two of their party's most moderate members, have insisted on reducing the size of the package and have pressed for other changes. Democrats initially planned that the measure would contain \$3.5 trillion

worth of spending and tax initiatives over 10 years. But demands by moderates led by Manchin and Sinema to contain costs mean its final price tag could well be less than \$2 trillion. Disputes remain over whether some priorities must be cut or excluded. These include plans to expand Medicare coverage, child care assistance and helping lower-income college students. Manchin, whose state has a major coal industry, has opposed proposals to penalize utilities that do not switch quickly to clean energy. The White House and congressional leaders have tried to push monthslong negotiations toward a conclusion by the end of October.

## Cheaper Covid-19 tests in place for vaccinated travellers to England

Fully vaccinated travellers returning to England from countries not on the travel ban red list can use a Covid-19 negative Lateral Flow Test (LFT) instead of the more expensive Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test, under the new rules effective from Sunday, which could boost the country's tourism sector. Other parts of the UK — Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland — are also expected to follow similar LFT rules for vaccinated travellers in the coming weeks. Travellers vaccinated in over 100 countries, including

India, will also be treated the same as returning fully vaccinated residents in England, the government said. This means that travellers arriving in England from a non-red list country can use LFT instead of the PCR on or before day two. "I'm delighted that from today eligible travellers to England, who've had the life-saving Covid-19 vaccine can benefit from a cheaper lateral flow test, providing faster results," UK Health Secretary Sajid Javid said. "This huge boost to the travel industry and the public will make it easier and cheaper for people to book holidays

and travel abroad, and it is because of our incredible vaccine programme that this is possible. Anyone who tests positive must take a PCR test, which, if positive, may be genomically sequenced to check for variants and further help us fight this virus," he added. Travellers must take a photo of their LFT and booking reference supplied by a private provider and send it back for verification. They will also be able to book a test which they can take on arrival at several testing centres located at certain airports in England. "The change in rules for post-arrival tests will give pas-

sengers more options and faster results, just in time for many half-term holidays. It's thanks to the success of our vaccination programme that we can make this switch — giving the industry and consumers a much-needed boost," said UK Transport Secretary Grant Shapps. Travellers who have already bought PCRs for travel do not need to undergo another test. "Testing and self-isolating if you are positive remain crucial steps to managing the pandemic and stopping the spread of Covid-19 in the community," Dr Jenny Harries, Chief Executive of the UK Health Security Agency, said.

## China reports 43 new Covid cases

China reported 43 new Covid cases, including four locally transmitted infections in Beijing, health authorities said on Sunday. The four new locally transmitted coronavirus cases detected in Beijing pushed the total infections in the city during the current outbreak to 13. The four people, who live in the same residential community in Beiqijia Township located in the northern suburban district of Changping, are all close contacts of previously confirmed cases, the municipal health commission said.

They have been sent to a designated hospital for treatment and epidemiological investigation is underway, state-run Xinhua news agency reported. National Health Commission (NHC) said besides the four infections in Beijing, 39 other cases were reported from different parts of the country. This include 17 imported cases. Of the new 26 local cases, seven were reported in Inner Mongolia, six each in Gansu and Ningxia, four in Beijing and one each in Hebei, Hunan and Shaanxi, the commission said.



WINTER SESSION OF PARLIAMENT  
Govt likely to introduce 2  
key financial sector Bills

The Government may introduce two key financial sector bills, including the proposed law for facilitating privatisation of public sector banks as announced by the Finance Minister in the Budget.

The Government is also likely to table amendments to the Pension Fund Regulatory and Development Authority (PFRDA) Act, 2013, to enable separation of the National Pension System Trust (NPS) from the PFRDA for ensuring universal pension coverage.

The Government is likely to table amendments in the Banking Regulation Act, 1949, during the forthcoming Winter Session of Parliament, sources said. Apart from this, amendments would be needed in the Banking Companies (Acquisition and Transfer of Undertakings) Act, 1970, and the Banking Companies (Acquisition and Transfer of Undertakings) Act, 1980, for privatisation of banks, sources said.

These Acts led to the nationalisation of banks in two phases and provisions of these laws have to be changed for the privatisation of banks, they said.

A month-long winter session of Parliament is expected to start by the end of the next



month. The second batch of Supplementary Demands for Grants, allowing the Government to undertake additional expenditure other than the Finance Bill, would also be introduced for approval.

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman while presenting the Budget for 2021-22 had announced the privatisation of public sector banks (PSBs) as part of disinvestment drive to garner Rs 1.75 lakh crore.

“Other than IDBI Bank, we propose to take up the privatization of two Public Sector Banks and one General Insurance company in the year 2021-22,” she had said.

For ensuring privatisation of a general insurance company, the government has already received approval from Parliament for the

General Insurance Business (Nationalisation) Amendment Bill, 2021, in the

monsoon session ended in August 2021.

With the amendment in the PFRDA Act, sources said, powers, functions and duties of NPS Trust, which are currently laid down under PFRDA (National Pension System Trust) Regulations 2015, may come under a charitable Trust or the Companies Act.

The intent behind this is to keep NPS Trust separate from the pension regulator and managed by a competent board of 15 members. Out of this, the majority of members are likely to be from the government as they, including states, are the biggest contributor to the corpus.

The Trust was established by PFRDA for taking care of the assets and funds under NPS. The proposal to separate the two job roles has been under consideration for the last couple of years.

A country can provide fishery subsidies if it maintains  
stocks at sustainable levels: India's proposal in WTO

A member country of the World Trade Organisation (WTO) can provide subsidies to its fishermen if it maintains stocks at a biologically sustainable level, according to a proposal submitted by India last month.

India has also proposed that a country engaged in distant water fishing (fishing beyond 200 nautical miles from its sea shores) cannot provide fishery subsidies for 25 years from the date of entry into force of the fisheries subsidies agreement, an official said.

Fishing in distant waters or in some other country's territory is a major problem when it comes to maintaining fish stocks at sustainable levels. Such activities lead to depletion of fish stocks in the oceans and this happens because of use of highly mechanised vessels or boats for industrial fishing.

This agreement is under discussion among the 164 WTO members in Geneva.

The aim of these negotiations is to discipline subsidies with the overall objective to have sustainable fishing and to eliminate IUU (illegal, unreported and unregulated) fishing subsidies and prohibit subsidies contributing to overcapacity and overfishing.

There are primarily three areas of fishing -- territorial waters (12 nautical miles from the sea shore), EEZ (exclusive economic zones - 200 nautical miles), and high seas. There are certain developed countries



which go into high seas for exploiting the fishing stock.

The current proposal submitted by India assumes significance as it has stated that the draft text which is at present under negotiations is unbalanced.

“The present text is unbalanced and only when Indian suggestions (from its proposal) are considered and incorporated suitably, then only it will be a balanced text for negotiations. The present text cannot form the basis of negotiations because it is not balanced.

Only when these suggestions are discussed, deliberated and in some manner incorporated in the revised text, then India can start the text-based negotiations,” the official said. In the WTO, member countries negotiate through a text to finalise an agreement.

The official added that the current draft text, which is under negotiations, does not provide a conducive policy space for developing and least

developed countries (LDCs) that are yet to develop their fishing capacities.

“Therefore, the principle of polluter pays and common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities concept must be applied in line with the popular demand of developing countries made at a meeting on July 15 this year,” the official said.

The suggestion of India for a moratorium of 25 years on countries that are engaged in distant water fishing is based on FAO's (Food and Agriculture Organization) code of conduct for responsible fisheries, which was adopted in 1995. It has recognised the issues of overfishing and depletion of fish stocks.

Further, India has also proposed that member countries engaged in distant water fishing after this agreement comes into effect should have to reduce such activities by certain specified percent every year till overcapacity or overfishing persists.

India sees registration  
of over 16,570 new  
firms in September

As many as 16,570 new companies were registered in the country in September, taking the total number of active companies to more than 14.14 lakh, according to official data.

Data from the corporate affairs ministry showed that a total of 22,32,699 companies were registered in the country as on September 30.

Out of them, 7,73,070 companies were closed, 2,298 were assigned dormant status as per the Companies Act, 2013, 6,944 were under liquidation and 36,110 were in the process of being struck-off.

As per the ministry's monthly information bulletin for the corporate sector, there were 14,14,277 active companies as on September 30.

Citing an analysis registration of new companies during September 2019 to September 2021 period, the

ministry said the data indicates that monthly registration of companies has increased after hitting lowest of 3,209 in April 2020.

“A total of 16,570 companies were registered in September 2021 as compared to 16,641 in September 2020. An increase (24.68 per cent) in registration of companies has been witnessed in September 2021 over the previous month...

A total of 4,535 LLPs were registered in September 2021 as compared to 4,016 LLPs in September 2020,” the ministry said. Out of the 14,14,277 active companies, the ministry said 14,05,098 were limited by shares, 8,872 were limited by guarantee and 307 were unlimited companies. Among the 7,73,070 closed companies at the end of September, 7,13,052 were declared defunct and struck-off after issuance of notice under the Companies Act.



Petrol, diesel  
prices hiked for  
5th straight day  
DIESEL ABOVE ₹100 IN WEST BENGAL

Petrol and diesel prices on Sunday were hiked for the fifth straight day by 35 paise per litre each, pushing pump rates to new high across the country. The price of petrol in Delhi rose to its highest-ever level of ₹107.59 a litre and ₹113.46 per litre in Mumbai, according to a price notification of state-owned fuel retailers.

In Mumbai, diesel now comes for ₹104.38 a litre, while in Delhi, it costs ₹96.32 per litre.

This is the fifth consecutive day of the price hike. There was no change in rates on October 18 and 19, prior to which prices were hiked by 35 paise per litre each on four straight days.

While petrol has already hit the ₹100-a-litre mark or more in all major cities of the country, diesel has touched that level in over one-and-a-half dozen states and UTs from



Jammu & Kashmir to Tamil Nadu. West Bengal on Sunday became the latest state to have the nation's most used fuel above that level.

Purulia, Krishnanagar, Baharampur and Cooch Behar districts of the state had diesel above ₹100-a-litre mark.

Prices differ from state to state, depending on the incidence of local taxes.

Petrol price has been hiked on 21 occasions since September 28, when a three-week-long hiatus in rate revision ended. In all, prices have gone up by ₹ 6.4 a litre.

438 infra projects  
show cost overrun  
of ₹4.3 lakh crore

As many as 438 infrastructure projects, each worth ₹150 crore or more, have been hit by cost overruns totalling more than ₹4.3 lakh crore, according to a report.

The Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation monitors infrastructure projects worth Rs 150 crore and above.

Of the 1,670 such projects, 438 reported cost overruns and 563 were delayed.

“Total original cost of implementation of the 1,670 projects was ₹21,66,048.11 crore and their anticipated completion cost is likely to be ₹25,96,907.70 crore, which reflects overall cost overruns of ₹4,30,859.59 crore (19.89 per cent of original cost),” the ministry's latest report for September 2021 said.

According to the report, the expenditure incurred on these projects till September 2021 is ₹12,54,512.40 crore, which is 48.31 per cent of the anticipated cost of the projects.

However, the report said that the number of delayed pro-



jects decreases to 380 if delay is calculated on the basis of latest schedule of completion.

Further, for 808 projects neither the year of commissioning nor the tentative gestation period has been reported.

Out of the 563 delayed projects, 100 have overall delay in the range of 1-12 months, 120 have been delayed for 13-24 months, 216 for 25-60 months and 127 projects have delays of 61 months and above.

The average time overrun in these 563 delayed projects is 47 months. Reasons for time overruns as reported by various project implementing agencies include delay in land acquisition, delay in obtaining forest and environment clearances, and lack of infrastructure support and linkages.

Govt may raise over  
₹10,000 cr via Bharat  
Bond ETF by Dec

The Government is likely to launch the next tranche of the Bharat Bond ETF by December and expects to raise over ₹10,000 crore to fund growth plans of central public sector enterprises, according to a senior finance ministry official.

The official added that the fund requirements of CPSEs are being worked out and the third tranche of the exchange-traded fund (ETF) will be launched by the end of the calendar year.

“We are finalising on the amount to be raised but it would be over ₹10,000 crore,” the official said.

Bharat Bond ETF is an exchange-traded fund that invests in debt of public sector companies. The ETF currently invests only in ‘AAA’-rated bonds of public sector companies.

The funds raised through the debt ETF helps in smoothening borrowing plans of the participating CPSEs or public sector banks. It also helps them in meeting their capital expenditure needs.

The second tranche of the Bharat Bond ETF, which was launched in July 2020, was oversubscribed more than three times, collecting about ₹11,000 crore. It had fetched about ₹12,400 crore in its debut offer in December 2019.

New Delhi: India will bargain for supply of undelivered gas quantities of past years when it negotiates renewal of its multi-billion dollar LNG import deal with Qatar, an official said. Petronet LNG Ltd's 7.5 million tonnes a year liquefied natural gas (LNG) import deal with Qatargas is ending in 2028. Renewal, if any, has to be confirmed 5 years ahead of that. Talks for renewal will start next year and will be conditioned on Qatargas delivering in 2022 the 50 cargoes or shiploads of LNG that weren't taken in 2015, Petronet Director-Finance V K Mishra said. India in 2015 had not taken delivery of the cargoes as it renegotiated the pricing of the long-term supply contract after prices hit double-digit. Qatar had then agreed to revise the pricing formula subject to India buying an additional 1 million tonnes per annum of LNG. As regards the cargoes that were not taken, it was decided that India can see the cargoes anytime during the remainder of the contract that ends in 2028.

Rent of retail space up  
11-17% in Delhi's  
upscale mkts in July-Sep

Rentals of high-street retail Rare inching back to pre-Covid levels in Delhi-NCR on the back of revival in business, as rents in upscale Khan Market, South Extension and Connaught Place have risen 11-17 per cent during July-September compared to the previous quarter, according to Cushman and Wakefield.

“Rentals inching back to pre-Covid levels as market activity strengthens,” global property consultant Cushman and Wakefield (C&W) said in its report ‘Marketbeat- Delhi-NCR, Retail Q3 2021’ (July-September).

The Delhi-NCR market recorded improved retail activity during the September quarter, the consultant said, adding

that early signs of recovery could be seen with a pick-up in retail leasing.

“With rentals inching back to pre-COVID levels and accommodation on commercial terms narrowing, the only direction for retail in the coming months is upwards,” said Vibhor Jain, Managing Director, North, Cushman & Wakefield.

“Increased vaccination and a low caseload have certainly played an important role in the return to normalcy and higher consumer confidence,” the report said. On rent scenario, the consultant found that the rentals of high street location Khan Market increased 12.5 per cent to ₹1,350 per square feet during the July-September quarter as against the previous quarter.

Mcap of five of top-10 most valued  
firms down by over ₹1.42 lakh cr

The combined market valuation of five of the top-10 most valued companies eroded by ₹1,42,880.11 crore last week, with Hindustan Unilever, Reliance Industries and Tata Consultancy Services emerging as major laggards. Last week, the 30-share BSE benchmark Sensex declined by 484.33 points or 0.79 per cent. Market benchmarks — Sensex and Nifty — declined for the fourth consecutive session on Friday.

The market valuation of Hindustan Unilever Ltd (HUL) tumbled ₹45,523.33 crore to reach ₹5,76,836.40 crore. Reliance Industries Ltd (RIL) valuation eroded by ₹45,126.6 crore to ₹16,66,427.95 crore and Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) market worth tanked by ₹41,151.94 crore to ₹12,94,686.48 crore.

The market capitalisation (Mcaps) of Bajaj Finance plunged ₹8,890.95 crore to ₹4,65,576.46 crore and that of HDFC Bank Ltd fell by ₹2,187.29 crore to ₹9,31,371.72 crore. In contrast, Kotak Mahindra Bank added ₹30,747.78 crore taking its valuation to ₹4,30,558.09 crore.

ICICI Bank's market valuation zoomed by ₹22,248.14 crore to reach ₹5,26,497.27 crore. The valuation of HDFC jumped ₹17,015.22 crore to ₹5,24,877.06 crore and that of State Bank of India gained ₹11,111.14 crore to ₹4,48,863.34 crore. Infosys added ₹1,717.96 crore taking its valuation to ₹7,29,410.37 crore.

According to the Crisil research report on economic recovery and pace of investment in the economy, the Industrial Entrepreneur Memorandum (IEM) filings with the Government, the pace of environmental approvals, and the surge in foreign direct investments (FDI), the investments have already crossed pre-pandemic levels, all clearly indicating and confirming a recovery in the economy.

# ADDING EXTRA TO THE ORDINARY

Replicating his real life, actor-philanthropist SONU SOOD focusses on the impactful work by individuals through his forthcoming show, *It Happens Only In India*. He tells SAIMI SATTAR why it has become essential to narrate such inspirational stories

Sonu Sood had made a career of playing the antagonist after his debut in supporting roles in Tamil films *Kallazhagar* and *Nenjilile*. That was till the time the pandemic struck.

From distributing food packets and sending migrant labourers home to supporting students and providing employment, all it took was two years. The mere mention of his name is enough to evince widespread admiration all around. Not surprisingly, National Geographic Channel roped him for a new show, *It Happens Only In India*, where he narrates stories of people who have gone above and beyond the daily grind to leave a lasting imprint on lives around them.

♦ **It happens only in India is something we say a lot about this country. So, what was it that made you take the show up?**

The kind of social media madness that we are obsessed with means that we do not have time to tell stories. As children, we heard stories being narrated by our grandparents which have left an imprint on our minds. However, the younger generation does not have anyone to tell them stories and neither do they have the time.

Coming to this show, *It Happens Only In India*, on National Geographic, which features people who were unaware that they have a hero within them and unknowingly they tapped into it to do something that astonished and inspired the country. It was important to tell the world that rather than stories beginning from, 'Once upon a time', they are some that start with, 'There was this common man in Jharkhand who...' And when we tell the story of a common person to another of his ilk, it makes him/her special. It is important to narrate these incidents. I am happy that I can narrate these stories which happen to inspire me as well. It is striking that, with just an idea, a person can change lives and inspire people.

♦ **Why is India unique, in your opinion?**

If we talk about India, there are



so many people, religions, languages. We see everything changing every day. When we meet people abroad, they always react to us coming from the country and express a desire to visit India. They want to explore India. Even as an Indian, if you visit the four corners of our nation, it would appear as if you are in four different countries. Not just geographically, the people, attire, food, everything is starkly different. There is definitely a certain uniqueness. While we might be saying it because we are Indians, yet we can't dismiss the fact that there is something special about our country that exerts a sense of awe across the globe.

♦ **Do you believe in the power of one? That a single person can make a difference?**

I always believe that you can only fight battles alone. *Karwaan to baad me judta hai* (People joined me later). During the pandemic, when we were helping people and I told some friends who have settled abroad that

I am planning to send people to their homes. Their reaction was, "How is it even possible that when we can't even step out of our buildings, how can you send people in buses?" I told them, "Let me try." And when those 10 buses were leaving with 350 people on board for Karnataka, I did not know a single person. But the happiness on their faces and the thankfulness in their folded hands told me that this story is not restricted to these few. It is spread across the entire country. I still don't know how I was able to do this. It isn't about what's inside a person that propels him/her forward. It is the prayers and the blessings of the people that take this ahead. When I was sending people to their homes, it was the prayers of their parents and family members that enabled me to get permission from different authorities. I hope, the blessings will keep coming.

♦ **Initially, you started with distributing food packets, realised that people wanted to go home and**

**then your focus shifted to generating livelihoods. Essentially, one thing has led to another.**

To date, I have been able to employ 2.80 lakh people. Earlier we were assisting 2,000-2,200 students in education and now we are teaching around 22,000 children. We are distributing medicines to people... but I do not know how all of this is happening. We start an initiative, people get motivated and got involved with it. In medicine, for instance, doctors, hospitals and pharmaceutical companies came forward to do their bit. It was a chain reaction which spread like a wildfire. I recall the CEO of a big hospital telling me, "We were doing a lot of charity work earlier as well but after getting involved with your initiative, we have seen the transformation in the doctors, staff, pharmaceutical companies who feel that you are doing this for people you don't know. As a result, doctors waived off their fee, pharmaceutical companies gave medicines for free, hospitals did not charge for beds." So, more and more

people became involved with the effort. The reaction was magical. I do not know how it happened. That is the biggest lesson of our life. We wonder how this will happen... and then it does. We often leave things midway but that is what we shouldn't be doing. We should persevere. We might fall or falter in the effort but we have to dust that off and move forward.

♦ **You played an anti-hero on screen but now you are perceived as a hero in real life. How do you bridge the gap between the two?**

I don't know. A number of times it has happened that brands have debated whether to take me on board for endorsing their products as I have played negative roles on screen. They wondered if the brand was in sync with my image. And then, there came a time when I signed every single brand. When you try to change your image, it might not happen. It does on its own, with the blessings of others. I can give examples of some iconic films which were not made but just came about. If you had asked me about this work earlier, I would not have been able to visualise it. Two years back if you had told me that, "Two hundred people would come to your house every day to ask for help," I would have replied, "You have lost your mind. How is that even possible?" You learn every day but you have to remember the lesson so that when you are put to test, you pass with flying colours.

♦ **On the professional front, do you have any projects in the pipeline?**

I completed a Telugu film, *Acharya*, with Chiranjeevi and it will release next year. There is a Yash Raj film with Akshay, Prithviraj and me. Then, there is a home production which will start next year. I have missed many big offers as I am caught up with meeting people and do not get the time to read scripts. But three-four films are up for release next year.

With more openness about understanding a student's mental state, teachers can appreciate their grit and resilience in cruising through this challenging year.

□ **Engage with your students**

In the initial days of the school reopening, students might feel that they've fallen behind on their curriculum. Spending the whole year in front of the com-

puter can make them feel highly non-competitive. Thus, students need to be kept engaged through various activities and other learning initiatives. An excellent attendance record and active participation can be the key to bridging the prevalent learning gaps and strengthening the bonds.

□ **Ask for help if the going gets tough**

Managing students is not an easy feat; add the pandemic, and it's a different ball game altogether. Kids are still trying to make headway in a post-pandemic world and are highly dependent on their teachers to guide them. Hence, teachers need to take the reins and help students come to terms with these new changes. However, things can get overwhelming for a teacher as well. At such times, calling for additional help can assist help you become better at managing the students during these tough times.

Time can heal anything, so all we have to do is give things some time. Schools need to realise that students seek to experience a sense of normalcy when they return to school. By acknowledging the way they feel and giving them the space to come to terms with their feelings, schools can become an integral part of the students' emotional journey.

# ONE STEP TOWARDS GOODNESS

Bank Sakhis travelled to the hinterlands to provide banking facilities to the villagers, thus, ensuring their financial inclusion during the lockdown. By SURYAKANT DEWANGAN

There are several inspiring stories of Covid-19 warriors from across the country that have helped society to overcome the hardships brought by the pandemic. This story is about the 'Bank Sakhis' from Kanker district in Chhattisgarh, who travelled far and beyond to provide banking facilities to the villagers and ensured their financial inclusion even during the lockdown.

The Chhattisgarh state government has been running the Bank Sakhi model under the National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM), in which rural women, preferably from Self Help Groups (SHGs), are provided training to open bank accounts for SHGs, to assist transactions of different pension schemes like old-age pensions, widow pensions, social security pensions, and to facilitate credit linkages of these groups and other banking facilities. When the rest of the world was afraid to leave their houses, these Bank Sakhis were out there bringing banking services to the doorsteps of villagers.

Residents of isolated villages often find it difficult to avail banking services as the banks are often located in towns or cities at considerable distance. During lockdown, it had become even more challenging for the communities from low socio-economic background to avail benefits of government schemes which have turned digital in the recent years. It were the Bank Sakhis who came to the rescue of the rural communities.

Working as a Bank Sakhi in and around Murumtara village of Narharpur tehsil in Kanker, Sarita Katendra said, "Earlier, I would sew clothes for a living, but it wasn't enough to make ends meet. Being a member of the SHG, however, provided me an opportunity to work as a 'Bank Sakhi'. Currently, I am earning around ₹ 8,000-10,000 per month." Sarita is now known as the 'Bank Lady' in her village. Any woman who has completed education till class 10<sup>th</sup> is eligible to become a Bank Sakhi. After the selection, they are provided with basic computer knowledge and banking skills. Once they start working, they receive an honorarium through banks.

"I was always interested in the banking sector but owing to my poor financial background, I was unable to make a career out of it. As I was a member of an active SHG, I applied for the role and have been working as a Bank Sakhi since May 2020," shared Poonam Jain from Madabhari village in the same tehsil which has facilitated transaction of over



₹ 30 lakhs so far. According to her, with every transaction, the Bank Sakhis receive a commission through which they are able to earn around ₹ 8,000-10,000 every month.

Last year, when livelihoods were greatly affected due to the nationwide lockdown, Bank Sakhis went from door to door to provide beneficiaries their pension, MGNREGA payments and any incentive received during that period.

"I work in the Bhanupratappur area in the villages of Dumarkot, Bhainsakanhar and Narsinghpur. During the lockdown, we transacted ₹ 30,000-40,000 every day," informed Nimita Dhruv, another Bank Sakhi from Dumarkot village in Bhanupratappur.

Working as Bank Sakhis has also strengthened the economic condition of these courageous women. "I use the honorarium I receive working as a Bank Sakhi for my college expenses and to financially support my family," shared Dipika Bhuariya who works at Baansala and Junwani village. She added that ever since she started working as a Bank Sakhi, people seek her support to withdraw or deposit money from their account. The initiative has proved beneficial to both Bank Sakhis and villagers who are saved from undertaking long travels to access banking facilities.



Bridging the gap between banks and the rural areas, the Bank Sakhis appointed by different banks have emerged as a viable alternative for ensuring financial inclusion of the remote communities. Different types of Bank Sakhis have been appointed under this scheme. The Banking Correspondent (BC) Sakhi has a laptop and a printer to conduct banking transactions and even open a bank account. The ATM Sakhi has a swipe machine through which she can only transact, whereas the DIGI-Pay Sakhi has a mobile phone through which she can conduct transactions. She can process transactions from those accounts that are linked to Aadhaar without filling any forms.

Several government and private sector banks are operating in the Kanker district, but Chhattisgarh Grameen bank has maximum reach and also, the highest number of branches. This is why a greater number of Bank Sakhis are associated with the grameen banks. Currently, there are 113 Bank Sakhis working in all the seven blocks of Kanker district—16 in Narharpur, 22 in Charama, 17 in Kanker, 12 in Bhanupratappur, 14 in Durgukondal, 15 in Antagarh and 17 in Koyailbeda. Through the scheme, the BC Sakhi and ATM/DIGI-Pay Sakhis receive an honorarium of ₹ 2,500 and 1,000, respectively, and additionally earn commission from the bank based on transactions. They are linked to the nearest branch which provides them cash to conduct these transactions.

As expressed by Ravi Kumar Gupta, the Financial Institution (FI) manager of Chhattisgarh's regional office of *grameen* bank in Dhamtari, the selection of Bank Sakhis is done through the corporate business correspondent. "While the village panchayat also plays a role in selecting the candidates, preference is given to women associated with a SHG. Besides their designated tasks, they have been given responsibility of additional tasks such as insurance, loan recovery and KCC during the pandemic," said Ravi. Currently, 90 Bank Sakhis are a part of *grameen* banks in Kanker district.

During the last financial, despite the lockdown, 113 Bank Sakhis from Kanker district have carried out transactions of approximately ₹10 crores, ensuring financial assistance to the people and, at the same time, strengthening their own economic status while building an identity in their respective regions.

In his recent address, on the eve of 71<sup>st</sup> Indian Republic day, the President of India highlighted, among other things, the need to 'hold fast to constitutional methods of achieving our social and economic objectives' (in the words of Dr Babasaheb Ambedkar). He also spoke of following the life and values of our father of the nation, Mahatma Gandhi. He spoke at length about India's health-care and educational sector progress and expressed how in both these sectors, we have come a long way in the last seven decades. He showered words of praise for our armed forces, paramilitary and internal security forces and thanked them for their sacrifices to preserve the integrity and unity of our country. At the end of his address, he said that "When fighting for a cause, people, particularly the youth, should not forget the gift of Ahimsa that Gandhi ji gave to humanity. In view of all this, one would like to know whether there is no peaceful method of resolving such disputes which cause great social upheavals and huge economic losses. It should, in this context, not be hard to appreciate that an emerging economy, like India, cannot afford to waste its energies on avoidable conflicts. Let us, therefore, have a fresh thought-process about all these national issues in the light of our ancient spiritual heritage. There, definitely, are solutions, provided we have not closed our minds and also have not built up walls of prejudices against the alternatives.

Most of us can vouch for feeling liberated and happy as soon as Friday rolls around. It brings with it the promise of an exciting and relaxing weekend that entices the mind. Conversely, enthusiasm soon dwindles as Monday approaches with its weeklong pledge of dreary chores, work, and tedious commitments. But why? The answer is simple — people need the external circumstances to be the way they desire and in their control in order to be happy. Else, misery, despair, and frustration take over their mind.

However, it doesn't have to be this way — we can be happy every day of the week irrespective of the circumstances. When our mind is controlled, it is our best friend, while an uncontrolled mind is our worst enemy. If we wish to always feel happy and positive, we need to harness the power of the mind. We must begin by improving the thoughts we harbour within the mind by learning the art of positive thinking.

Let us next look at effective techniques to always stay happy.

### VAX PEOPLE SHOW LOWER NON-COVID DEATHS

People vaccinated against Covid-19 may have a lower non-Covid-19 death rates than people who are not inoculated, according to a new research.

The study, published in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, indicated that Pfizer Covid-19 vaccine recipients had a mortality rate of 4.2 deaths per 1,000 vaccinated people per year after the first dose and 3.5 deaths after the second dose. Meanwhile, Moderna Covid-19 vaccine recipients had 3.7 deaths per 1,000 people per year after the first dose and 3.4 deaths after the second dose. Both the unvaccinated comparison groups had a mortality rate of 11.1 deaths per 1,000 people per year.

Electronic health records of 6.4 million Covid-19 vaccine recipients compared to 4.6 million unvaccinated people with similar demographics and geographic locations from December 2020 through July 2021, were evaluated.



### NEED TO USE ALTERNATIVE FINANCIAL MODELS

There is a need to incorporate alternative models to address financial gaps in health sector and to ensure mandatory health coverage for all to support the universal health coverage targets, said a report titled *COVID-19 Induced Healthcare Transformation in India*.

With a healthcare expenditure of 1.5 per cent of India's GDP in 2018-19, there is a need to increase the public health spending to 2.5-3.5 per cent to support the healthcare transformation, underlined the report.

The report has listed six thematic areas that require immediate deliberation and gives actionable recommendations, in view of need for greater investment in enhancing health outcomes and a strategic diversion of funds towards sustaining these outcomes.

The pandemic also paved way for India to demonstrate unprecedented resilience and dynamism in terms of system strengthening and rapid policy-making as well as unified efforts by all stakeholders, according to the report.



### 50 PER CENT RISE IN BREAST CANCER IN INDIA

In the last three years, there has been a 50 per cent rise in middle-aged women reporting cases of breast cancer in India. The estimates are based on OPD records by doctors, the Indraprastha Apollo Hospitals said in a statement.

"We have observed, in the last three years, that 50 per cent women reporting breast cancer and related manifestations have been between the age of 35-50 years," stated Dr Ramesh Sarin, senior consultant, Surgical Oncologist.

"With our hospital-based consultation data for breast cancer, it is found that 53 per cent of the reported cases are in the initial stages of cancer and 47 per cent in the advanced stages, by a total of 20 per cent in stage four and 27 per cent in stage three cancer," he added.

Breast cancer is the most common form of cancer in women, and accounts for almost 30 per cent of the entire cancer burden reported among women. With limited awareness and hesitancy towards preventive diagnosis, one in every 20 women is diagnosed with this cancer.



### MOLNUPIRAVIR MAY BE THE GAME CHANGER

Anti-viral drug Molnupiravir may emerge as the game changer in the fight against Covid-19 as studies suggest it can reduce the risk of hospitalisation or death in newly-diagnosed patients, an expert says.

Distinguished cardiologist and health systems expert, Dr Krishna Reddy Nallamalla, believes that Molnupiravir as an effective oral drug for treatment of Covid-19 assumes significance as cases are still being reported despite vaccination.

"Molnupiravir was earlier developed as an oral drug against influenza. It is also an analogue of ribonucleic acids, similar to Remdesivir. In a preprint of June, virus isolation was noted in 1.6 per cent of those patients receiving Molnupiravir, compared to 16.7 per cent of those receiving a placebo on day three, and zero per cent and 11.1 per cent, respectively, on day five," Reddy explains.



### ARTHRITIS COULD AFFECT GIRLS MORE

While arthritis is not uncommon in children as everyone thinks, it affects girls more than boys, health experts said on Thursday.

Rheumatoid arthritis is an autoimmune and inflammatory disease, which means that the disease is caused when the body's immune system attacks healthy cells by mistake. When this condition affects children, it is known as juvenile rheumatoid arthritis or juvenile idiopathic arthritis. Children suffer from joint pain, swelling, limited joint movement, and early morning stiffness lasting more than 15 minutes.

"It is the most common pediatric rheumatological disorder and affects about an estimated 350,000 to 1.3 million children in India," stated Dr Sanjeev Kapoor, senior consultant, Rheumatology, at the Indian Spinal Injuries Centre.

# KOHLI'S 50 TAKES INDIA TO 151

Skipper Virat Kohli wasn't at his fluent best but his 57 off 49 balls was the saving grace in India's middling score of 151 for seven against Pakistan in their opening Super 12 match of the ICC T20 World Cup here on Sunday.

His 29th half-century in T20 Internationals wasn't as good as some of his other innings but considering that he diffused a potentially troubling situation created by Shaheen Shah Afridi's (3/31 in 4 overs) menacing opening spell, this knock was significant. Shaheen also did his bit at the death, removing the Indian skipper in the penultimate over.

Kohli got support from Rishabh Pant (39 off 30 balls) during a 53-run stand but had to do the bulk of heavy lifting in a pressure cooker scenario, something he has been accustomed to for the past one decade.

His innings had five fours and a six as India managed a score which would give the bowlers at least something to



fight for on a track that can't exactly be called batting-friendly. In an India-Pakistan game,

one should always add "20 invisible runs", simply because of the weight it carries.

Shaheen, one of the most exciting fast bowlers produced two unplayable deliveries at the

biggest stage under pressure, which any batter would have found difficult to negotiate.

The most difficult delivery from a left-arm fast bowler is the one that holds the line just when the batter had committed for the angle. In the case of Rohit (0), before he could adjust his footwork, he got one that was pitched on block hole and straightened. It caught him plumb in-front.

KL Rahul (3) thought that the ball will straighten but it shaped in to breach his defence and disturb the off-stump.

Suryakumar Yadav (11) did get a six over backward square leg off Shaheen and a boundary off Imad Wasim (0/10 in 2 overs) but Hasan Ali bowled one back of the length which he edged while trying to cut and a diving Mohammed Rizwan behind the stumps pounced it. Pant joined Kohli as the Powerplay score read a disastrous 36 for three. They added 53 runs in 6.4 overs to get some momentum back in an exciting stand dominated by the left-hander.

The Indian captain did

show Shaheen, who is the boss as he made room by shuffling towards leg-stump and lofted him straight into his team's dug-out for a six.

For Hasan Ali, he reserved an exquisite square drive before he let Pant take over the show, having partially stabilised the initial rot. Watching that there is a fielder placed at '45', Pant first played a lap shot off leg-spinner Shadab Khan (1/22 in 4 overs) and then back-cut Mohammed Hafeez from the middle-stump to get two boundaries. But the real fun was when he smoked Hasan for two one-handed sixes.

Shadab had the last laugh as a mistimed slog sweep turned into a return catch. Kohli, who was playing the second fiddle then took charge as he attacked Hasan with a pull-shot and a then played a cover drive as 10 runs came off the 16th over.

However, Pakistani bowlers didn't err much at the death to keep the score under check, credit for which should go to Harris Rauf (1/25 off 4 overs).

## Shakib becomes T20 World Cup's highest wicket-taker

Bangladesh's premier all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan on Sunday became the leading wicket-taker in the history of T20 World Cups, surpassing former Pakistan skipper Shahid Afridi when he dismissed Sri Lanka's Pathum Nissanka during their Super 12 match here.

Shakib entered the game with 39 wickets in 28 matches.

Having produced a match-winning spell (4/9) against Oman in the preliminaries, Shakib, one of the world's leading all-rounders, found himself among the wickets in the teams' first Super 12 game, against Sri

Lanka.

Afridi picked 39 wickets in 34 matches.

Shakib went past Afridi's record when he used his vast experience to get the better of Nissanka with a flighted delivery.

Two balls later, Shakib bowled Avishka Fernando for his 41st wicket in the tournament.

With Bangladesh having made the Super 12s and guaranteed to play at least five matches, it was only a matter of time before the left-arm spinner bettered Afridi's record.

Shakib is also the current highest wicket-taker in T20Is.

## Asalanka's unbeaten win against B'desh

Young left-hander Charith Asalanka smashed an unbeaten 80 off 49 balls while fellow southpaw Bhanuka Rajapaksa made a quickfire half-century as Sri Lanka beat Bangladesh by five wickets in their T20 World Cup Super 12 Group 1 match here on Sunday.

Sri Lanka suffered a mid-innings mini batting collapse but recovered in time to chase down the target of 172 with seven balls to spare, thanks to brilliant half centuries from Asalanka and Rajapaksa (53 off 31 balls) with the duo stitching 86 runs in quick time for the fifth wicket in jus 8.4 overs.

The 24-year-old Asalanka, who has played just eight ODIs and four T20Is before Sunday's match, held the Sri Lanka innings together, hitting five

four and as many sixes in his entertaining unbeaten knock.

Coming in the 10th over, the 30-year-old Rajapaksa smashed three fours and as many sixes in his 31-ball innings as Sri Lanka reached 172 for 5 in 18.5 overs.

However Bangladesh would certainly be disappointed with their shoddy outfielding as Litton Das dropped regulation catches of both Rajapaksa and Asalanka denying his team a shot at victory.

Bangladesh got the breakthrough with the fourth delivery itself as left-arm spinner Nasum Ahmed got rid of opener Kusal Perera (1) who failed to read a flatter and quicker delivery and was clean bowled.

Despite the early jolt, Sri Lanka were on the ascendancy with Asalanka getting the

boundaries with ease. He hoisted Nasum for two sixes in the third over and then punished Mahedi Hasan for another maximum to take Sri Lanka to 54 for 1 at the end of powerplay.

But Shakib Al Hasan triggered a mini batting collapse with two wickets — that of Pathum Nissanka (24) and Avishka Fernando (0) — in four balls.

Mohammad Saifuddin then dismissed Wanindu Hasaranga (6) as Sri Lanka lost three wickets in 10 balls for the addition of nine runs.

Sri Lanka were 80 for 4 at the halfway mark and set-batter Asalanka, who reached to his fifty off 32 balls, kept them in the hunt. He was going great guns by hoisting Mahmudullah for two sixes in the 14th over.

Sri Lanka needed 46 from

the final five overs but Asalanka and new batsman Rajapaksa decisively titled the balance of the game in their favour. Rajapaksa smacked three sixes in a sensational show of batting pyrotechnics in the 16th over bowled by Saifuddin from which Sri Lanka took 22 runs.

Earlier, opener Mohammad Naim and Mushfiqur Rahim cracked impressive half centuries to steer Bangladesh to a competitive 171 for four.

Joining forces in the eighth over when their side was struggling at 56 for two, Naim and Rahim stitched a quick 73-run stand in 8.3 overs to keep the momentum going.

Naim hit six boundaries in his 52-ball 62-run knock while Rahim remained unbeaten on 57 from 37 balls with the help of five fours and two sixes.



## Chelsea, Man City win big without playing a striker in EPL

Chelsea and Manchester City didn't field a recognized striker between them for their Premier League games.

It didn't stop them combining for 11 goals in ominous displays by the two title contenders.

Missing injured strikers Romelu Lukaku and Timo Werner, Chelsea still powered to its biggest win of the season — 7-0 against Norwich — with playmaker Mason Mount scoring a hat trick.

City doesn't have an out-and-out striker in its squad after failing to sign a like-for-like replacement for Sergio Aguero in the offseason but that isn't stopping the champions scoring freely this season.

A 4-1 victory at Brighton, secured mainly

thanks to two goals by Phil Foden, followed a 5-1 win at Club Brugge mid-week in the Champions League. It was the sixth time in 14 games in all competitions that City has scored three or more goals.

Chelsea will spend another week leading the league — it is two points ahead of City and four clear of Liverpool, whose game in hand is at Manchester United on Sunday — and the strength in depth in the squad should ensure Thomas Tuchel's team maintains a title challenge this season.

There have been 16 different scorers for Chelsea in all competitions this season, with Callum Hudson-Odoi, Reece James and Ben Chilwell also netting against last-place Norwich alongside Mount's first Premier League hat trick.
