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SC slams arbitrary change in NEET speciality syllabus

Authorities can't treat doctors as footballs, tell us justification: SC

In a stinging snub to the Centre, the Supreme Court on Monday warned that it may pass strictures if it is not satisfied with justification for the last-minute changes to the NEET Super Speciality Examination 2021 syllabus. The court also asked the Centre not to treat "young doctors as football in the game of power."

Asserting that it will not allow these young doctors to be placed in the hands of some insensitive bureaucrats, the court asked the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW), National Medical Commission (NMC) and National Board of Examination (NBE) to "put their house in order".

The court was hearing a plea from 41 postgraduate doctors who have challenged the last-minute changes made to the syllabus after the notification for examination was issued.



A bench of Justices DY Chandrachud and BV Nagarathna asked Additional Solicitor General Aishwarya Bhati, appearing for the Centre, to hold a meeting with the other two authorities within a week.

"Better come with some strong reasons, and if we are not satisfied, we will pass strictures," it said.

"Don't treat these young doctors as footballs in the game of power. Hold the meeting and put your house in order. We will not allow the lives of these young doctors to be placed in the hands of some



insensitive bureaucrats," it added. In their plea, the doctors pointed out as per the prevailing pattern of examination, 60 per cent marks are given on questions from super speciality courses while 40 per cent on

questions from other courses. "But as per the notification issued on August 31 for modifying the pattern of examination, 100 per cent marks will now be given on questions from general medicines," they said.

Senior advocate Shyam Divan, who represented the doctors, said that there is urgency in the matter and they have filed a written submission also in the matter.

Advocate Gaurav Sharma, appearing for NMC, said he would like to file reply in the matter and sought adjournment of one week.

Kisan Bharat Bandh: Road, railway traffic grinds to halt

The Bharat Bandh call given by farmers on Monday to demand scrapping of three controversial farm laws affected normal life as the farmers blocked highways and disrupted railway traffic at many places across the country.

The 10-hour bandh called by farmers' body Samyukta Kisan Morcha (SKM) hit normal life in Punjab and Haryana as 50 trains were cancelled, highways and key roads blocked. Flow of traffic at Delhi's borders with Uttar Pradesh and Haryana was affected, but shops and businesses remained open.

The impact of bandh was felt the most around Delhi, Punjab, Haryana and western Uttar Pradesh and also in large pockets of Kerala, Bihar, Jharkhand, West Bengal and Odisha. The massive jams that prevented the cross border movement of commuters as well as trucks carrying essentials. The blockade was lifted at 4 pm.

Bharatiya Kisan Union (BKU) leader Rakesh Tikait said, "Our Bharat Bandh was successful. We had the full support of farmers...We can't seal down everything as we have to facilitate the movement of people. We are ready

for talks with the Government but no discussions are happening."

The SKM termed it's an historic bandh as there was an unprecedented response from every part of the country. "Crores of farmers came together in a show of unity and solidarity," it said.

The Delhi-NCR region, including the satellite towns of Gurgaon, Ghaziabad and Noida, was particularly hit as cross-border movement was badly hit.

PM launches Digital Health Mission

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday launched the Pradhan Mantri Digital Health Mission (PM-DHM) which will ensure that every citizen in India has a separate health ID containing all health details.

While launching the Ayushman Bharat digital mission, Modi said, "The drive to strengthen the health facilities of the country, in the last 7 years, is entering a new phase today. This is not an ordinary phase. This is an extraordinary phase."

The nationwide rollout of PM-DHM coincides with the National Health Authority (NHA) celebrating the third anniversary of Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB PM-JAY).

On August 15, 2020, Modi had announced the

mission (Ayushman Bharat Digital Mission) from the ramparts of the Red Fort.

Union Health Minister Mansukh Madaviya, who was present on the occasion, said, "I believe that this will bring a revolutionary change in the health sector."

Currently, over one lakh unique health IDs have been created under the National Digital Health Mission (NDHM), which was initially launched across six States and Union territories on a pilot basis.

Based on the foundations

laid down in the form of Jan Dhan, Aadhaar and Mobile (JAM) trinity, and other digital initiatives of the Government, PM-DHM will create a seamless online platform through the provision of a wide range of data, information, and infrastructure services, duly leveraging open, interoperable, standards-based digital systems while ensuring the security, confidentiality, and privacy of health-related personal information, said a senior official from the Union Health Ministry.

India important player in Indo-Pacific: German Envoy

'New Berlin Govt to continue to have strong ties with New Delhi'

With the Quad emerging as a major grouping amid China's growing assertiveness in the Indo-Pacific region, Germany on Monday said India is becoming an important player in that region, and the next coalition Government in Berlin is expected to continue strong ties with New Delhi.

These remarks by German envoy to India Walter J Lindner came as a new coalition Government is expected to assume charge in his country soon.

The German envoy said relations between India and Germany saw a significant upswing, including in areas of trade and investment, in the last over one decade and that the upward trajectory in ties is

likely to continue.

"None of the global issues can be solved without India, be it climate change, global warming, trade issues, Covid-19 vaccination and terrorism...India is important for us," he told reporters.

His comments came as the federal elections in Germany marked the end of Angela Merkel's 16-year tenure as the Chancellor, a period that saw significant expansion of India-Germany ties.

Merkel has already

announced that she will not seek a fresh term at the helm of the country. According to reports, Social Democrats (SPD) was ahead of the ruling conservative bloc of Merkel in the federal elections.

"The Indo-Pacific is becoming more and more important and India has emerged as a major player in the region," the German envoy said. On Afghanistan, he said there was a need to address the need for humanitarian assistance in the country.

Stop bypolls, demands Dilip Ghosh after TMC attack

BJP national vice-president Dilip Ghosh on Monday demanded countermanding of the election process at Bhawanipore after an alleged gang of Trinamool Congress men attacked him and BJP workers wounding two of them seriously.

Ghosh, who was heckled by the crowd too, escaped unhurt after his security personnel pulled out guns and escorted him to safety. Ghosh had gone to Bhawanipore to campaign for party candidate Priyanka Tibrewal who is contesting against Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee who is seeking election to the Assembly.

Mamata, who contested from Nandigram Assembly constituency was defeated BJP's Suvendu Adhikari in the April-May elections by a margin of 1,900 votes, needs get elected to the Assembly within six months of swearing in as the Chief Minister.

Covid caused biggest fall in life expectancy since WWII: Oxford

Covid-19 has caused the biggest decrease in life expectancy in 2020 by a huge amount — the largest since the Second World War — according to an Oxford study. The paper was published in the *International Journal of Epidemiology*.

"Life expectancy in 2020 was slashed by more than six months compared to 2019 in 22 of the 29 countries that were analysed. Of the 29 sampled countries, 27 belonged to Europe, while the other two were Chile and the United States," the study said.

The results highlight a large impact that is directly attributable to Covid-19. "This shows how devastating a shock it has been for many countries," Dr Ridhi Kashyap,



co-lead author of published paper, said. Highlighting the urgency of more research on Covid-19, she called for the publication and availability of further information and data to better understand the worldwide impacts of the coronavirus. She also urged the Governments of other

countries, especially low-income and middle-income countries, to make available their data on Covid-19 mortality rates. The study also shows that due to Covid-19 life expectancy of men dropped by a greater margin than that of women in most of the sample countries.

Asit elected BBSR Club president

Vishal, also a bureaucrat, wins as gen secy

Western Odisha Development Council (WODC) Chairman and former Chief Secretary Asit Kumar Tripathy was elected as new president of the prestigious Bhubaneswar Club on Monday.

Bharat Bandh

Normal life affected; transport hit in State

Normal life was thrown out of gear in different parts of the State on Monday as various organisations staged protests in support of the 10-hour-long Bharat Bandh from 6 am to 4 pm called by the Samyukt Kisan Morcha (SKM) against the Centre's farm laws.

Business and educational institutions remained closed in several districts while bus and train services were affected. However, emergency services continued as usual.

The Odisha State Road Transport Corporation (OSRTC) suspended all bus services during the shutdown period. The agitators, including members of the Congress and Left parties staged road blockades at different places in Bhubaneswar, Baleswar, Rourkela, Balangir and other urban areas. Besides, the protestors also staged a rail roko at



the Bhubaneswar station that affected rail services for some time. Holding placards and banners, SKM supporters squatted on the roads, thereby affecting movement of vehicles. Hundreds of vehicles, especially trucks, were stranded on NH-16 in Bhubaneswar.

Tension prevailed for some time as agitators snatched the keys of a 'Mo Bus' which was plying during the bandh in Bhubaneswar. Trade and bank unions along with several non-NDA parties including

Congress backed the strike called by the SKM, an umbrella body of over 40 farm unions. "The farmers are on strike since last 10 months. But PM Modi did not get time to discuss the issue with agitating farmers. We have chosen PM Modi to look after the interest of 130 crore citizens of India, but they are more concerned about Ambanis and Adanis," said an agitating leader in Bhubaneswar. PCC president Niranjana Patnaik said bandh was a big success in the State.

Custody death: Bargarh SP urges HRPC to probe

The district Superintendent of Police has written to the Odisha police Human Rights Protection Cell (HRPC) to conduct an independent inquiry into the alleged custodial death of a youth, Gobinda Kumbhar, of Tora village in Bargarh district on Saturday.

Investigation into this unfortunate incident is being carried as per NHRC guidelines. Apart from a judicial Magistrate inquiry, I have requested the HRPC ADG to carry out a separate probe into the case," SP Rahul Jain said.

The brother of deceased, Jiten has alleged that his Gobinda was killed due to police excess and demanded stringent punishment for culprits. A joint action forum demanding justice to family of Gobinda following the incident has said that it hopes the independent HRPC and judicial inquiry by a former High Court judge would ascertain exact cir-

444 new Covid cases, 5 deaths in State

59 children among infected

The State witnessed a slight dip in Covid19 cases with 444 persons being infected in 23 districts and the State pool on Monday, with which the total tally rose to 10,24,764. Among those infected were 59 children in the age group of 0 to 18 years. Notably, the State had detected 585 cases on

Sunday. Of the new cases, 258 were from quarantine and 186 local contacts. Khordha district reported the day's highest 170 cases followed by Cuttack with 73, Mayurbhanj 37, Jajpur 22, Baleswar 16 and Jagatsinghpur 13.

Among the districts reporting below-10 cases were Rayagada, Angul and Nayagarh eight each, Puri and Sambalpur seven each, Ganjam six, Kendrapada and Sundargarh five each, Bhadrak four, Balangir, Dhenkanal, Jharsuguda and Keonjhar three

each, Subarnapur two and Bargarh, Deogarh and Nuapada one each.

Besides, 37 cases were reported from the State pool. The active cases stood at 5,702. Five more persons succumbed to the disease in the State, mounting the total death toll to 8,180.

Three casualties were reported from Sundargarh district and two from Nabarangpur. However, 653 persons recovered on the day, increasing the total recoveries to 10,10,829.

BBSR adds 147 infections

BHUBANESWAR: State capital Bhubaneswar on Monday registered 147 new Covid-19 cases, with which the caseload in the city increased to 1,12,326. The active cases stood at 3,681. Out of the fresh cases, 103 were local contacts and 44 quarantine cases. Notably, the city had detected 176 infections on Sunday. So far, 1,115 persons have succumbed to the disease in the city. However, 184 patients recovered in last 24 hours, increasing the total recoveries to 1,07,609.

Naveen's image to clinch BJD victory in Pipili

Allegedly, various disenchanted BJD elements are ruining the chances of a BJD victory. What is your response to this?

Covid 3rd wave unlikely in State

But Health Dept warns to maintain caution

Even though the State is recording more than 400 Covid-19 positive cases daily, the Health Department on Monday ruled out the possibility of a third wave of the pandemic. Health Director Bijay Mohapatra said, "Even though the daily infection graph in the State has witnessed a marginal spike in the last few days, the situation in Odisha is better in comparison to other States." Mohapatra said the recent serosurvey report is satisfactory. It shows people of all groups have developed anti-bodies

against coronavirus. The seroprevalence in healthcare workers was 93 per cent while the same was 73 per cent for general population. Anti-bodies among vaccinated people is also satisfactory which proves that the immunisation drive has worked well in the State. There is not much difference between Covaxin and Covishield vaccines, he added.

Besides, people in rural areas have also developed antibodies and the transmission rate is under control now, he said. "Unlike the earlier assumptions, a Covid third wave is not expected to have significant impact in the State. But we should not be careless. As festive season is ahead, we should strictly follow the Covid protocols," Mohapatra warned.

Classes begin in hybrid mode at IIT-BBS, following SOPs

About 40per cent of the students of the IIT Bhubaneswar are now in the campus and attending classes in hybrid mode. The addition of the newly-constructed Pushpagiri Lecture Hall Complex (PLHC) with electronic gadgets for facilitating hybrid mode lecturing has facilitated the institute to run classes distributing the students so that each classroom has less than half the strength and full social distancing, followed.

Director Prof Raja Kumar said, "For those students who are attending the lectures in person, these are like any modern lecture halls with facilities for multimedia projection, document camera, power point presentations and use of other gadgets like a tablet.

Now in order to facilitate live streaming of the lecture, the board work and the faculty member giving the lecture including the interaction, video and audio capturing and streaming facility is used.

This will facilitate streaming of the lecture live to a remote student including on an interactive or one way streaming session."

"We use MS Teams running on a laptop for the same. A faculty member can also interact with a remote student in the streaming session. On top of this, the faculty members are encouraged to use own innovative methods over and above this basic mechanism," Prof Kumar said.

In the recently-arrived batch of nearly 480 students, about 95per cent have got vaccinated.

As of now, the campus has only one Covid active case, where the spouse of an employee who works in the Bhubaneswar city was tested Covid positive and promptly isolated by the institute as per its SOP, he informed.

Cuttack Club elects woman president

First time in its 156 years

ber of this club is very important. Your role, support and help throughout the year shall certainly help me fulfil my vision," she added.

The Cuttack Club, located with the imposing Barabati Fort and the Barabati Stadium in its vicinity, is not just Odisha's but one of India's oldest clubs. With more than 1,500 members including bureaucrats, doctors and judges, it is also affiliated with 161 noted clubs across country.

Gulab turns into deep depression

More rains predicted in south Odisha

Even though cyclonic storm 'Gulab', which did not do much harm in the State, weakened into a deep depression on Monday, some parts of the State would continue to experience heavy rain and thunderstorm activities for the next three to four days, forecasted the Regional Office of the India Meteorological Department (IMD) here.

The IMD said the deep depression over south Odisha and adjoining north Andhra Pradesh has moved westwards and lies centred over south Odisha and adjoining south Chhattisgarh, about 90 km southeast of Jagdalpur in Chhattisgarh and 65 km east-northeast of Malkangiri. "The

system is likely to move nearly westwards and weaken into a depression during next six hours and into a well-marked low pressure area during subsequent 24 hours," said the weather office.

"Heavy rainfall warning for next 24 hours over some districts of south Odisha in connection with deep depression (remnant of Cyclonic storm Gulab) over south Odisha and adjoining north Andhra Pradesh," the IMD tweeted.

Squally wind, speed reaching 50-60 kmph gusting to 70 kmph, very likely to prevail over west-central and adjoining northwest Bay of Bengal off Andhra Pradesh and adjoining south Odisha coasts during next six hours and decrease thereafter, the weather office said.

The weather office warned fishermen not to venture into sea along and off the Odisha coast northwest and adjoining west central Bay of Bengal during next 24 hours.

City soon to have seven EV charging stations

The city will have seven electric vehicle (EV) charging stations soon in the first phase and gradually more such stations would come up for use by public and public transport vehicles.

The decision was taken at a meeting held on Monday and chaired by BMC Commissioner Sanjay Singh in the presence of market leaders in EV infrastructure in India.

The priority on selection of locations would be given to malls, public parking lots, hotels, residential complexes, workplaces and highways. The city is going to add a fleet of electric buses to its public transport network.

In the first phase, the EV charging stations are coming in the KIIT and SUM Hospital areas, near Esplanade Mall Rasulgarrh, DN Regalia and Krishna Plaza, CRP Square.

Akash Prime test-fired successfully

A new version of Akash Missile, 'Akash Prime', was successfully flight-tested from the Integrated Test Range (ITR), Chandipur here at around 4:30 pm on Monday.

The missile intercepted and destroyed an unmanned aerial target mimicking enemy aircrafts in its maiden flight test after improvements, said a DRDO release. Akash Prime is equipped with an



indigenous active RF seeker for improved accuracy. Other improvements also ensure more reliable performance under low temperature environment at higher altitudes. Modified ground system of the existing Akash weapon system has been used for the current flight test.

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh congratulated DRDO, Indian Army, Indian Air Force, Defence Public Sector Undertaking (DPSU) and industry for the successful trials of Akash Prime. He said the test proves the competence of DRDO in design and development of world-class missile systems.

DD R&D Secretary and DRDO Chairman Dr G Satheesh Reddy also congratulated the team for the successful flight trial and said the Akash Prime system would further boost the confidence of the users (Army and Air Force) as it is already inducted and now getting improved with more lethal missiles.

Police reforms needed to be implemented

Last week was the 15th anniversary of the landmark judgment in the famous Prakash Singh case that was

delivered by the Supreme Court on September 22, 2006, in which seven important directives were passed to bring in nation-wide police reforms. It is a fact that there are lots of issues of public discontent over the functioning of the police force. However, nothing significant has changed since the judgment.

There are several compelling reasons for police reforms to take place as public at large still see the police force as unprofessional, lacking sensitivity, savage and corrupt. It should be understood that without good policing and public faith in police which is essential to maintain a sense of safety and security in society, it

is difficult to ensure social order and have economic progress.

Our Constitution envisions a rule-of-law society, which is impossible without having a good police force as it is not a secret that police, as an agency of the state, is primarily responsible to protect the rule of law and, hence, it should be away from politics and it must be fair, impartial and free from political prejudices and extraneous influences.

The problems within the Indian police system are owing to its colonial inheritance with its foundations resting on the Indian Police Act 1861. The intention behind the 1861 law was to keep the British rule

intact by using the state agency of police and, therefore, the need was to keep the force away from the common man even if the methods of policing cause adversarial relationship or animosity with the public.

Consequently, the police system introduced by the British was structured on the Irish Constabulary, which wasn't about public service but an occupational force. However, the British had their own police system based on the celebrated Peelian Principles.

The Central and various State Governments too have appointed several commissions and committees to examine the problems and infirmities of police functioning and subse-

quently, eight volumes of the Report of the National Police Commission were published, in which the structures and methodologies of policing were studied and analysed especially with respect to the needs of modern secular and democratic India.

The sad part of the story is that despite volumes of such studies and recommendations being published, our police forces remain in the same condition as their colonial past; and it seems that the Supreme Court judgment in the Prakash Singh case has not been implemented properly.

The judgment directed for setting up an apparatus within the system focusing at insu-

lating police from all kinds of extraneous influences be it political or otherwise and for providing for professional autonomy to the police; at the same time ensuring accountability in case of misconduct, unlawful actions.

To ensure autonomy of police, it dealt with abrupt transfers, which was used by the political executive to control, regulate and manipulate officers.

Therefore, it directed for bringing in a State Security Commission for each State headed by the Chief Minister/Home Minister and having the Leader of Opposition, a retired High Court Judge, a few non-polit-

ical independent individuals, etc., as members, which would act as a restraint against exercise of illegal 'superintendence' over the police by the State Government.

It was also directed in the judgment to have a Police Establishment Board as a collegium comprising the DGP and four other senior police officers to decide on transfer/postings, etc., and to have a Police Complaint Authorities headed by retired judges, one at the State level and one each for the districts, to inquire into the complaints of serious misconduct.

Another important directive mandated a transparent, merit-based process of selec-

tion of DGP with a fixed minimum tenure of two years. This was aimed at eliminating extraneous considerations impacting such appointments.

The hope behind the implementation of these directives is that it would ensure good functional autonomy and accountability and would improve the quality of policing and increase public faith and trust in the institution of police.

Banks' NPAs rise to ₹13,645 cr in State

With poor recovery of loans, nonperforming assets (NPAs) in Odisha is rising alarmingly, for which bankers are concerned. Now, the NPA stands at more than Rs 13,645 crore, which is constantly on the increase.

While the NPA as on March 31, 2021 was Rs 11,339.37 crore, it has risen to Rs 13,645.17 crore, which is 7.20per cent of the total credit facility extended to people. This is at much higher side and alarming, said a senior member of the State-Level Bankers' Committee (SLBC).

While the banks have provided total advance of Rs 1,89,404.28 crore, the NPA is Rs 13,645.17 crore. Each quarter, there is rise in NPA; and due to absence of stimulant recovery measures, the hike has been accelerated. The Pradhan

Mantri Employment Guarantee Programme (PMEGP) has turned out to be having the highest NPA of 21.17per cent. The agriculture term loan sector has also become a concern for bankers as the NPA level is as high as 11.10per cent.

The State Government is harping on more and more advances to be extended to the Self-Help Groups (SHGs), but cases of NPA are coming to the fore. By 31 August 2021, credit of Rs 1,321 crore has been extended to SHGs and more than 8per cent of it has turned out to be NPA.

The NPA issue was raised in a recently-held SLBC meeting, in which major bankers sought the State administration's cooperation to arrest the NPA rise.

The SLBC advised the banks to stimulate the recovery measures to curtail the growing NPAs and the State

Government was requested to extend support in this regard. While the district administrations' support was also sought in this regard, it was felt that proper monitoring and hand-holding support is also required to restrict fresh slippages.

The banks were advised to increase advance portfolio by extending more priority sector credit in the State. In the programmes like PMEGP, MULM, NRLM and SHG, the NPA is high and on rise owing to non-repayment of loans, mounting overdue.

While NPA is on rise, banks require support from District Magistrates for attachment of property and quick enforcement of the SARFAESI Act, it was felt.

More than 630 applications for such attachments are pending with several district administrations across State, it was pointed out.

MUNDULI BARRAGE TRAGEDY

'Build ramps to prevent animals from drowning'

Wildlife Society of Orissa (WSO) secretary Biswajit Mohanty has urged for construction of elephant / animal friendly ramps at both ends of the Munduli barrage on the Mahanadi river and of other barrages so that any animal trapped in river water current can climb up the steep embankment.

While citing the elephant rescue operation by an ODRAF team that led to a tragic boat capsizing incident and death of two persons on board and an elephant who was trapped in the running water of the Mahanadi at Munduli barrage on September 24, Mohanty in a letter to the Principal Chief Conservator of Forests (Wildlife) and Chief Wildlife Warden, Odisha, said the tragedies could have been averted had there been elephant / animal friendly ramps on both sides of the river bank near the barrage. "We have observed that the trapped tusker made at least

two attempts on that day to climb out of the river by walking to the end of the barrage spillway and walking up the shore towards a suitable slope to climb up. Unfortunately, for a length of more than 100 feet, there is a sharp straight and tall concrete wall to protect the river bank from scouring which

prevented him from climbing. Had there been a 8 feet concrete/stone ramp leading to the top of the embankment at that point he could have climbed up. Building a ramp does not compromise the safety of the river bank and hence this measure can be considered as a mitigation plan," said Mohanty. He fur-

ther stated that whenever elephants will be swept away in floods in the future they will land up at the barrages which are the first obstruction. So there is a need to provide some sort of mitigation step at this point to enable them to climb out of the river easily. Unfortunately, due to the high concrete straight walls at the barrage ends, they are not able to do so.

Besides, due to strong current flow, they cannot walk upstream on the edge of the river from this point. Similar ramps can be thought of also at Naraj barrage as well as other barrages of the State where elephant river crossing is recorded like Samal Barrage on Brahmani river and Kanpur barrage on Baitarani river, suggested Mohanty.

He also cited the ramps constructed on the Rengali main canals, especially the one near Kulei in Angul district and said the Government should construct similar ramps in all barrages to stop animals, including elephants from drowning.

GANDHI WON OVER ENEMIES BY LOVE, SUFFERING, SACRIFICE

If philosophy is wisdom, then Mahatma Gandhi is among our foremost philosopher. He had the wisdom of Socrates, the humility of St Francis of Assisi, the mass appeal of Lenin, the saintliness of the ancient Indian Rishis and the profound love of humanity of the Buddha. He was a revolutionary who was

committed to the overthrow all forms of tyranny and social injustice but who never bore ill-will towards anyone, who led a mighty movement against British imperialism but never allowed the movement to be accompanied by hatred, rancour or resentment against Englishmen.

He was not an intellectual in the conventional sense of the term. He was not an academic philosopher propounding his philosophy in a precise, dry and formal manner. It would not be difficult to find inconsistencies and contradiction in some of his statements.

He was supremely consistent in his devotion to truth. He was like the ancient sages, an earnest seeker of truth, a spiritual explorer or a scientist, experimenting to discover truth and apply it to the practical problems facing man. His sources of inspiration were not confined to his country or to

his religion. His respective mind was open to various influences. From his very childhood he was brought into contact with religious and moral ideas. He studied the Ramayan, the Bhagabata, the Vaishnava poets of Gujarat and the popular writings of the Jains. During his stay in England he studied Buddhism and the Gita, met quakers and missionaries, read the Upanishads in translation, 'Ruskin's 'Unto the last', theosophist literature and books on Islam.

He was also profoundly impressed by Thoreau and Tolstoy. Thoreau taught him that it was more honorable to be right than to be law-abiding—a revolutionary concept, which inspired his philosophy of passive resistance. Tolstoy's 'The Kingdom of God Within You' taught him how man could liberate himself and control ill through suffering. Gandhiji was throughout his

life a God-conscious, God-fearing man. He never passed through the valley of doubt and darkness. Nothing could shake his confidence and faith in God and His Scheme of life. God with him was not an abstraction or a mere metaphysical concept, but an intensely felt reality. Belief in God was with him a question of faith and conviction. He needed no arguments to establish God's existence. His whole being was permeated with God-consciousness; his heart

vibrated with it. Gandhiji was no mystic who communicated with God in his trances or in moments of ecstasy but a man of action not living in forests and meditating on eternal verities, but living amidst men, engaged in an epic struggle against alien rule. He had, however, the ability to withdraw himself from the life of excitement and meditate even amidst action. The Mahatma

described God in various ways. God to him was kind, just and loving. Gandhi's bold affirmation of faith in God, in the moral nature of the universe, in human society as an association of kindred souls and in free will may be criticized by the modern cynics on the ground that no valid intellectual grounds have been offered, but none can dispute the fact that his faith leads to a way of life which is in complete harmony with the needs of the times. If God is love or truth, there can be no bar to the realisation of God through diverse ways.

Religion does not divide people, unless it is understood in the sense that it is a matter of dogma, a church, a holy book; it emphasizes the fundamental unity of the human race. The Gandhian way is the way of universal love and tolerance, of profound reverence for all great religions which are

so many ways of apprehending the reality and identifying ourselves with its purposes.

Distinctions of race, nationality and sect have no room in Gandhian ethics. Patriotism is not enough. A truly religious man does not restrict his allegiance to any country or nation. His loyalty is to the whole of humanity.

He acknowledges all great religions as embodying the truth and therefore, worthy of deep reverence. Mahatma Gandhi was an admirer of all religions—Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, Sikhism, Islam, Christianity and others.

This does not mean that he accepted everything they preached. "He does not mouth the name of the Founder of Christianity", writes Will Durant in his appreciation of the Mahatma, "but he acts as if the Sermons on the Mount were his perpetual guide". If God is truth and truth is God,

then there is nothing which stands in the way of persons of various religious affiliations coming together on the same platform as seekers of truth.

Even an earnest atheist trying to explore the reality is a truly religious man. What is repugnant to the Gandhian way of life is dogmatism, fanaticism, intolerance, selfishness? Gandhi was a secularist in the sense that he was against any discrimination between citizen and citizen on grounds of religion, sect or caste. But he firmly believed that a State or society would be stable only to the extent to which it was based on ethical and spiritual ideals.

The Mahatma was the greatest exponent of Satyagraha-soul force, non-violence, noncooperation. He condemned the use of force; he hoped to win even his enemies by love, suffering and sacrifice. Underling his faith in

Satyagraha was his conviction that no man, however tyrannical, can long withstand the pressure of the soul force. The Mahatma was a kind of philosophical anarchist who believed in voluntary organisation on co-operative lines. He was opposed to highly centralised States. He stood for village autonomy with a federation of village republics. He hated everything that degraded man like untouchability, inferior status for women, child marriage etc.

The Mahatma was neither a capitalist nor a socialist. He propounded the theory of the rich classes being the trustees of the national wealth. He preferred the method of Satyagraha and moral persuasion as a mean of achieving a truly classless society of kindred souls.

ED questions Raj CM's brother in fertiliser scam

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Monday questioned Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot's brother Agrasain Gehlot in a money laundering case linked to fertiliser scam entailing alleged fertiliser export irregularities.

Gehlot's statement was recorded under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), officials said.

Gehlot, accompanied by a lawyer, appeared before the agency here for questioning at around 11.30 am.

The agency had questioned him earlier also but he had approached the court seeking relief from the ED action.

The Rajasthan High Court recently asked him to cooperate with the agency in the

investigation as it directed the ED not to take any coercive action against him.

The agency had raided his business premises located in Rajasthan in July last year. The raids came when a political slugfest was then on between CM Ashok Gehlot and his then deputy CM Sachin Pilot in the State.

Agrasain Gehlot's son Anupam too had deposed before the agency in this case.

The ED searches against him came after it filed a criminal case under the PMLA based on a 2007-09 Customs department case in which it was alleged that irregularities took place in the procurement and export of subsidised Muriate of Potash (MOP) meant for farmers and investigation in this case was finalised in 2013.

The ED took cognisance of the Customs FIR and a charge sheet (filed on July 13, 2020) in this case to press money laundering charges and probe a "smuggling syndicate" allegedly linked to Agrasain Gehlot, his firm Anupam Krishi and others.

The agency had said the case pertained to fraudulent export of MOP, a restricted commodity for exports, in the guise of industrial salts to buyers based in Malaysia and Taiwan.

Its export is restricted so that it is available to Indian farmers.

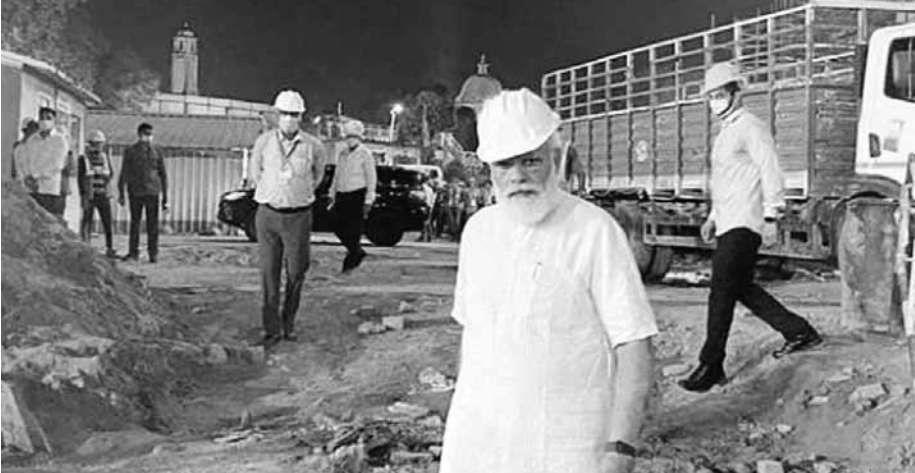
Agrasain Gehlot and his firm were slapped with over ₹60 crore in penalties by the Customs for these alleged export irregularities in 2013.

Gehlot's company allegedly "diverted" 35,000 metric tonnes of MOP that had a value of ₹130 crore in the international market, according to sources.

The ED has claimed that Gehlot, in his capacity of being a dealer, was the custodian of the MOP and was "solely responsible" for its proper distribution to the farmers.

Gehlot's alleged connivance with a company Saraf Impex Pvt Ltd and others resulted in the diversion of MOP that was imported by Indian Potash Limited at concessional rate of duty.

Opp plays Modi for visiting Central Vista project site

The Opposition, led by the Congress, on Monday hit out at Prime Minister Narendra Modi for visiting the construction site of the Central Vista project, and dubbed it as a "thoughtless and insensitive" gesture.

It said the timing of the Central Vista project was questionable as the country was still recovering from the coronavirus pandemic after losing precious lives during the second wave.

"We would have supported him had he visited some hospital site. I am sorry we cannot support a gesture as thoughtless, as insensitive as this," Congress spokesperson Pawan Khera said at AICC briefing.

When asked about the PM's visit to the under-construction

site of the new Parliament complex, the Congress leader asked whether he ever visited a hospital or an oxygen plant site.

"I don't know if the Prime Minister was seen visiting a hospital or an oxygen plant under construction. Three months ago, we were trying to save our loved ones and today our PM goes to visit the ₹25,000 crore Central Vista project, the timing of which is questionable. The country is yet to recover from the pain, grief

and sorrow that we went through," he said.

AIMIM questioned why the Prime Minister was there without the Lok Sabha Speaker as Parliament is the domain of Speaker.

AIMIM president Asaduddin Owaisi slammed Modi saying the PM violated the principle of separation of powers, which is part of the basic structure of the Constitution. "Parliament isn't PMO's domain. Why was he there without Lok Sabha Speaker? Did Speaker permit him? This violates principle of separation of powers, which is part of basic structure of Constitution. Maybe it was the jet lag from his US tour. It was AM there but PM was here," Owaisi said.

Reviewing the ongoing construction work of the new Parliament building, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said that a digital archive must be set up to recognise the contribution of workers employed there.

He also told officials to ensure Covid-19 vaccination and monthly health check-up of all workers engaged at the site, the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) said in a statement on Monday. Modi had visited the site on Sunday evening and had laid emphasis on timely completion of the project.

He interacted with workers engaged at the site and also enquired about their well-being. Prime Minister Modi stressed that they are engaged in a "pious and historic" work. The digital archive at the site should also reflect their personal details, including their

name, place they belong to, their picture, while noting their contribution to the construction work, he said. Workers should also be given a certificate about their role and participation in this endeavour, the statement said.

The surprise inspection by the Prime Minister was done with minimal security detail, and he spent over an hour at the site, it added.

The new Parliament building will be ready by Winter Session in 2022. The new building will have an area of 64,500 square metres. It will also have a grand Constitution Hall to showcase India's democratic heritage, a lounge for members of Parliament, a library, multiple committee rooms, dining areas and ample parking space. In the new building, the Lok Sabha chamber will have a seating capacity for 888 members, while the Rajya Sabha will have 384 seats for members.

ED grills Azam Khan in money laundering case

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Monday questioned Samajwadi Party leader Azam Khan in Sitapur jail in a money laundering case.

The ED move comes after the agency on September 20 secured an order from a designated Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) court to grill Khan in the jail where he is currently undergoing judicial custody.

Khan is accused in several criminal cases in Uttar Pradesh and the ED questioning related to alleged illegal construction of a university in Rampur on an enemy property, sources said.

Based on similar court orders for questioning inside the jail premises, the agency is set to question two other strongmen from the State—Atiq Ahmed lodged in Sabarmati Jail, Ahmedabad and Mukhtar Ansari undergoing judicial custody in Banda Jail of Uttar Pradesh. The duo is accused of separate cases of money laundering.

VP exhorts security forces to establish their superiority in cyber warfare

Vice President M Venkaiah Naidu on Monday urged the security forces to prepare themselves to dominate not only in a conventional war but also establish their superiority in the new and emerging areas of conflict such as information and cyber warfare along with the increasing use of robotics and drones in the battlefield.

He said the geo-strategic environment around us was turning unpredictable. "We are facing both symmetric and asymmetric threats from outside and within", he observed.

Making these observations during an interaction with the officers and troops of 12 RAPID Division of Indian Army in Jaisalmer, the Vice President termed peace as



War Museum' where he was received by Major General Ajeet Singh Gahlot, General Officer Commanding 12 RAPID.

He praised the Indian Army's Battle Axe Division (12 RAPID) for defending the nation and also guarding the borders in scorching Thar desert and in harsh climatic conditions. "The nation is assured that any misadventure by an adversary will be given a befitting reply by the Indian Army," he told the troops of 12 RAPID.

Reiterating that Jammu and Kashmir is an integral part of India, the Vice President said by doing away with Article 370, which was a temporary provision only, Parliament removed a major barrier between the people of Jammu and Kashmir and the rest of India.

India must expedite its artillery modernisation programme: Artillery chief

India has to fast track its Artillery modernisation plan with stress on self-reliance by manufacturing the guns within the country, artillery chief Lt General TK Chawla said here on Monday.

He also said the army is handholding two programmes to develop indigenous guns including Dhanush and Advanced Towed Artillery Gun System (ATAG). These projects are running behind schedule.

Addressing a news conference on the eve of the Gunners' Day here, the artillery chief said the army is keen that the two projects succeed.

Elaborating upon the delay, he said the summer trials of the ATAG could not meet the required parameters and will go for more modifications. The parameters needing improvement include firing and non-firing parameters, Chawla said. The trials were conducted in Pokhran, Rajasthan.

He also said it was difficult to put down a timeline for the induction of the guns into the Army. Chawla said the issues were flagged to the DRDO, adding the army wants a robust and reliable gun capable of firing accurately. The ATAG programme took

off in 2012.

As regards the Dhanush gun, Chawla said he discussed some issues with the Gun Carriage Factory, Jabalpur which is manufacturing the gun. The army had placed an order for 114 Dhanush guns in 2019 and so far only 12 of them with long range firing capability have joined service.

These two projects are part of the Field Artillery Rationalisation Programme (FARP). As per the FARP, the Army has planned to procure a mix of around 3,000-3,600 155mm howitzers — with different calibre types by 2025-27.

The K9 Vajra and M-777 lightweight howitzers projects part of the FARP are on track. The K-9 Vajra howitzers, manufactured by Larsen and Toubro in collaboration with a South Korean firm are now induced.

On the US made M-777, assembled by India's Mahindra Defence, the artillery chief said half of those ordered have reached the Army, adding that the Covid pandemic caused a delay.

He ruled out the Army looking at ordering more M-777s, adding that three regiments of the howitzers have been deployed along the Line of Actual Control (LAC).

3.08 crore jobs generated in April-June quarter of 2021-22, claims Govt

The Government on Monday claimed that 3.08 crore jobs were generated in nine sectors in the April-June quarter of 2021-22, reflecting a growth of 29 per cent. These nine selected sectors are Manufacturing, Construction, Trade, Transport, Education, Health, Accommodation and Restaurant, IT/ BPO and Financial Services.

The Government made the claim as it released a report of Quarterly Employment Survey (QES) part (April to June 2021) of the All-India Quarterly Establishment-based Employment Survey (AQEES) prepared by the Labour Bureau.

According to the report released by Labour and Employment Minister Bhupender Yadav on Monday, the most impressive growth of 152 percent has been recorded in the IT/BPO sector, while growth rates in Health 77 percent, Financial Services 48 percent, Education 39 percent, Manufacturing 22 percent, Transport 68 percent and Construction 42 percent were also quite significant. However, employment in Trade came down by 25 percent and in Accommodation and Restaurant the decline was by 13 percent.

The survey report said that nearly 90 percent of the establishments have been estimated to work with less than 100 workers, though 34.8 percent of the IT/BPO establishments worked with at least 100 workers, including about 13.8 percent engaging 500 workers or more.

In the Health sector, 18 percent of the establishments had 100 or more workers. It may be mentioned that 95 percent of the establishments were reported to working with less than 100 workers in the Sixth Economic Census. And in the IT/BPO sector the figures during 2013-14 for the size classes 100 or more and 500 or more stood at 19 and 6 respectively. Regular workers constitute 88 per cent of the estimated workforce in the nine selected sectors, with only 2 per cent being casual workers.

However, 18 per cent of workers in the construction sector are contractual employees and 13 per cent are casual workers. Only 9 per cent of the establishments (with at least 10 workers) were not registered with any authority or under any act. While 26 per cent of all the establishments were registered under the Companies Act with 71 per cent registration in IT/BPO, 58 per cent registration in construction, 46 per cent in manufacturing, 42 per cent in transport, 35 per cent in trade and 28 per cent in financial services.

Four in CBI net in coal pilferage case

The CBI on Monday arrested four persons in the ongoing investigation of a case related to multi-crore coal pilferage scam in Eastern Coalfields Ltd. areas during the last seven-eight years in which West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee's nephew Abhishek Banerjee is also embroiled.

The four arrested accused are Jaydeb Mondal, Narayan Kharka alias Narayan Nanda, Gurupada Maji and Nirad Baran Mondal.

"The Central Bureau of Investigation has today arrested four persons in on-going investigation of a case related to alleged theft of coal in Eastern Coalfields Ltd. areas during the last 7/8 years," the agency said in a statement here.

It was alleged that the arrested persons were close associates of other accused and assisted him in engaging miners, arranging transporters and



sold the illegally excavated coal. The arrested accused will be produced before the Court of CBI Special Judge, Asansol, District Paschim Bardhaman (West Bengal), it said.

The four arrested were close aides of prime accused Anup Majhi, alias Lala, who is the alleged mastermind behind the alleged pilferage of dry fuel from Eastern Coalfields Limited (ECL) mines in Asansol in Paschim Bardhaman district, officials said.

The Anti-Corruption Branch of the CBI in Kolkata summoned the four to appear before its officials at the agency's office there. They were arrested following a brief interrogation.

Earlier, the agency had arrested Vikash Mishra, brother

of Trinamool Congress youth leader Binay Mishra, in connection with the case.

The CBI had registered an FIR in November last year against Lala, the alleged kingpin of the pilferage racket, ECL general managers Amit Kumar Dhar and Jayesh Chandra Rai, ECL security chief Tanmay Das, Kunustoria area security inspector Dhananjay Rai and Kajor area security in-charge Debashish Mukherjee.

Earlier, the agency had raided Lala's official premises, residences and other properties in Asansol, Raniganj and Kolkata. It had also issued a look-out circular against him.

The scam, arising out of illegal mining from abandoned mines of ECL, runs into thousands of crores of rupees and part of the crime proceeds had been transacted through the hawala route for which the Enforcement Directorate (ED) has also joined the case to investigate the money laundering aspect.

Herbal drugs like Fifatrol helpful in Covid recovery, boosting immunity: Experts

As Covid-19-battled India grapples with influenza, viral fever and dengue, ayurveda experts have claimed that immunity boosting herbal drugs like Fifatrol can not only hasten the recovery from the infection but also strengthen immunity of the patients.

Prof KN Diwedi from the Banaras Hindu University (BHU) said there are some herbs which can prevent progression of the infections due to seasonal influenza, viral fever and vector-borne diseases.

Fifatrol comprises such time-tested immunity strengthening herbs, he said. Some of them are guduchi, sanjeevini ghan vati, daruharidra, apamarga, chirayata, karanja, kutaki, tulsi, godanti (bhasam), mrityunjaya rasa, tribhuvana kriti rasa and sanjivani vati.



The herbal drug is being recommended by ayurveda experts to even dengue patients and has been found to give positive results.

Professor Divedi explained that there are four types of dengue — serotypes 1 to 4 at play. "The prevalence of serotype-2 has been growing very fast across the States. It is more severe than other variants of dengue stereotypes. In serotype-2 dengue infections, platelets drop rapidly and the body's immune response is hyperactive, resulting in a cytokine storm which can damage the organs. This variant of dengue also impacts the kidneys," he said.

Dope tests on flight crew from 2022 for fliers' safety: DGCA

To ensure safety and security of air passengers, the Director General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) on Monday issued guidelines under which pilots, cabin crew, maintenance staff and air traffic controllers would face dope tests on a random basis.

The DGCA has asked all scheduled commercial aircraft operators to carryout, random drug testing on flight crew members and Air traffic controllers. The rules will be effective from January 31, 2022. This is the first time that DGCA has come out for such random testing of flying and ground staff crews.

According to the DGCA, the rules will be applicable to aircraft operators engaged in commercial operations, Maintenance & Repair Organizations, Flying Training Organizations and Air Navigation Service Providers.

"All scheduled commercial aircraft operators and Air navigation service provider shall

carryout, random drug testing for the consumption of psychoactive substance by flight crew members and Air traffic controllers employed by them respectively at the facilities established by them using the services of an appropriate laboratory. The medical personnel of the concerned Organisation shall associate during this process. This programme shall ensure that at least 10% of the employees of an organization," DGCA chief Arun Kumar said.

The rules said that the organizations shall use a scientifically valid method such as a random-number table or a computer-based random-number generator to select the employees for testing using the unique identifying number. The organization must ensure that all employees have an equal chance of being tested each time the selection is made. Specific individuals or groups must not be targeted including certain locations.

The Organisations shall ensure that Flight Crew Member, Air Traffic Control

Officers, Aircraft Maintenance Engineers/ certifying staff, trainee pilots and Instructors/examiners in their employment are tested for consumption of psychoactive substances on the following occasions: a) Before employing a person b) Before admitting a trainee pilot in a FTO c) Follow-Up testing of confirmed cases. d) At first available opportunity, in case an aviation personnel has refused drug test to a foreign regulator during flight operation to that country/duty in that country. It said that all the positive cases shall be reported by the organization to DAS, DGCA (HQ) within 24 hours. In addition the information shall also be submitted to DDG/JDG Air Safety and DMS (CA).

In case a person refuses for the test on second occasion or is tested positive after first occasion of refusal for testing, the license shall be suspended for a period of three years and any subsequent violation shall lead to the cancellation of licence.

Opp helps Bharat Bandh in Kerala

Monday’s Bharat Bandh held under the auspices of the Opposition political parties turned out to be a big success in Kerala with all Government and private establishments downing shutters and vehicles remaining off the roads. The dawn to dusk bundh was to express solidarity with the farmers across the country who are protesting against the three agricultural reforms bills enacted by the Union Government. The farmers who have been waging relentless agitation against the Union Government feel that the bills would destroy their agricultural operations and deny them the right to have minimum support price.

Since the bundh was held on Monday, Government employees could enjoy an

extended weekend. “Had it been held on Tuesday or on Wednesday, it would have upset the rhythm of our life,” said Sujit Thannikkal of Ernakulam, an entrepreneur.

The weekend that began on Saturday night went up to late Monday night in the State. The CPI(M)-led LDF and the Congress-led UDF had declared their support to the Bundh which gave the shut-down an official seal. All KSRTC and private buses along with taxis and auto rickshaws stayed off the road throughout the State.

But the State saw seven persons losing their lives in different road accidents during the bundh hours sensing the message that roads in Kerala are not safe even on a bundh day. Leaders of the CPI(M) and the Congress thanked the people of the State for their coop-

eration in making the shut down a success.

But cynics were quick to find fault with the Kerala Government’s support to the Bharat Bundh. September 27 was the World Tourism Day and the Kerala Government had launched an advertisement campaign in all newspapers in the State about the sound tourism practiced in the State. “In this ad on World Tourism Day, Kerala tourism minister Mohammed Riyaz says the world has started to ‘travel worry-free’ & that our centres are ‘safe’. His party is conducting a State hartal today! Are people ‘safe’ because they sit at home? - Can they ‘travel worry-free’ today?,” asked Sreejith Panickar, political commentator in his social media site.

The strongest condemnation of the frequent Bharat

Bundh calls by political parties was made by G Vijaya Raghavan, former chief executive officer of Techno Park.

1. Whom is the protest against? The answer is of course the central Govt.

2. Has this strike affected the working of the PMO or the offices of any union minister or Secretary to Govt of India. The answer is a big No.

3. Then who is the one who is impacted by the Bandh or Hartal? The common man of course and they have no means to protect themselves and are forced to stay away from work and they get no wage and a day’s income is lost.

It is high time we changed our methods of protest. A protest is successful and makes an impact only when it affects the person or group of persons against whom the protest is targeted at,” said Vijayaraghavan.

Protect identities in POSH cases: HC

The Bombay High Court has issued fresh guidelines relating to the Sexual Harassment of Women at the Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (“the POSH Act”) and Sexual Harassment of Women at the Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Rules, 2013, prohibiting publication of names and addresses of the people involved and mandating that all hearings be held in the judges’ chamber or in Camera.

“It is imperative, therefore,

to protect the identities of the parties from disclosure, even accidental disclosure, in these proceedings. This is in the interest of both sides. There appear to be no established guidelines so far in such matters,” Justice G.S. Patel of the high court noted, as he prefaced his order, imposing restrictions for hearing, dealing, and reporting on cases pertaining to the POSH Act and POSH Rules.

The order came during the course of a hearing of a POSH case involving a major blue-chip company and its woman staffer who was represented by advo-

cate Abha Singh.

“This order, setting out a working protocol for future orders, hearings and case file management, is a first endeavour in that direction. These are only initial guidelines, and will necessarily be subject to revision or modification as needed,” the Judge ruled, in his order passed on September 24.

Among other things, the guidelines have stated: “In the order sheets, the names of the parties will not be mentioned. The orders will read “A v B”, “P vs D” etc. In the body of the order, the parties will not be

referred to by their names but only as Plaintiff, Defendant No.1 etc” The HC has restricted all from mentioning the names of the parties in the case, their Personally Identifiable Information (PII) such as email ids, mobile or telephone numbers, addresses etc.

No witness’ names will be mentioned, nor will their addresses be noted. (d) Orders/judgments on merits will not be uploaded. Because this order sets out general guidelines and does not address the merits, it is permitted to be uploaded.

Hardeep Singh Puri launches ‘Swachchh Survekshan 2022’

New Delhi: Union Housing and Urban Affairs Minister Hardeep Singh Puri on Monday launched the ‘Swachchh Survekshan 2022’, the seventh edition of the annual cleanliness survey under which district rankings have been introduced for the first time.

In a statement, the ministry said that this year’s survey will create a level playing field for smaller cities by introducing two population categories -- under 15,000 and between 15,000-25,000. The scope of the survey has been expanded to now cover 100 per cent wards for sampling as compared to 40 per cent in previous years, according to the HUA Ministry.

Speaking at the event, Puri said that the Swachh Bharat Mission is an important and transformative programme of the country which has achieved success due to involvement of all stakeholders at the grassroot level. "Prime Minister Narendra Modi is the catalyst for converting the vision of Mahatma Gandhi into reality by leading from the front and converting it into a peoples’ movement. The road to success was not easy but today we have not only achieved ODF but also succeeded in solid waste management," the statement quoted him as saying.

He said SBM 2.0 and Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT) 2.0 will be launched by the Prime Minister on October 1. The ministry said that in order to seamlessly carry out this ambitious exercise, ‘Swachh Survekshan 2022’ will see more than twice the number of assessors deployed last year for on-field assessment.

ED raids home of ex-Sena MP Anandrao Adsul, son

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) officials on Monday raided the residence of former Shiv Sena MP Anandrao Adsul and his son Abhijit Adsul in connection with a complaint of alleged scam worth ₹980 crore in the City Cooperative Bank Ltd, here.

As part of an on-going bitter political battle between them and Adsuls, independent MLA from Badnera, Ravi Rana, the husband of ex-actress and independent MP from Amravati, Navnit Kaur-Rana had lodged a complaint against Anandrao and his son Abhijit with the ED.

Acting on Ranas’ complaint, ED had summoned Adsuls for questioning on Monday.

In their complaint, Ranas have accused the Adsuls of alleged misappropriation of the City Cooperative Bank Ltd. ’s depositors’ funds to the tune of ₹900-crore. However, Anandrao and his son Abhijit have vehemently denied the charge.

A former five-time MP from Amravati and Buldhana Lok Sabha seats, Anandrao Adsul is the chairman, while his son Abhijit is a director in the

Mumbai-based bank.

After the IT department descended on their residence at Kandivli in north Mumbai, Anandrao became indisposed and was rushed to a nearby hospital.

After ED had issued first summons to him in connection with the complaint, Anandrao had appeared before the instigating agency and recorded his statement. “Later on my father lodged a complaint with the NM Marg police in connection with the alleged fraud in the bank,” Abhijit said

On his part, Anandrao has gone on record saying: “How could there be a fraud of 980 crore in a bank that has a turn-over of ₹800 crore? After I came to know there was fraud in the bank, I had complained to the Economic Offences Wing (EOW) of Mumbai Police. An inquiry is going on in the case”.

Ravi Rana’s allegation is that Anandrao, who is the chairman of the bank, had illegally diverted the money deposited in the bank by the account holders in his real estate business and as a result, the bank went into liquidation. He has alleged that Anandrao and his son had indulged in a massive scam in the bank.

China defends visa curbs against stranded Indians

Says it’s ‘appropriate’ to combat Covid

Beijing: China on Monday defended its visa curbs which have prevented thousands of stranded Indians from returning to Beijing, saying they are "appropriate" to control the spread of Covid-19 and do not target India alone, but are applied to even Chinese citizens coming back from overseas.

Responding to questions on Indian ambassador to Beijing Vikram Misri’s criticism of China’s prolonged stringent travel restrictions, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Hua Chunying also ruled out the easing of the curbs in the near future. Misri, in his address to the Track-II Dialogue on China-India Relations last week, expressed “disappointment” over China’s reluctance to permit the return of thousands of stranded Indian students, employees and their families due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

He described China’s restrictions as an "unscientific approach" to a purely humanitarian issue. Asked for her reaction, Hua told a media briefing here that the measures were taken for the safety and wellbeing of the people.

“China’s measures are appropriate and also I would like to say that China applies quarantine measures to all inbound travellers. China is willing to have good arrangements on the bilateral travel of personnel,” she said.

Maha RS bypolls: Rajani may be elected unopposed

Congress’ former MP and CAICC general secretary Rajani Patil on Monday appeared poised to get elected unopposed to the Rajya Sabha in the elections scheduled for October 4 after the Opposition BJP responded to the ruling party’s call and withdrew its candidate Sanjay Upadhyay keeping in view with the political traditions followed in the state

The BJP’s decision to withdraw its candidate from RS poll fray came four days after

State Congress president Nana Patole and senior state Congress minister Balasaheb Thorat met former chief minister and current leader of the Opposition Devendra Fadnavis at the latter’s Mumbai residence and requested him to ensure the election of their party candidate Rajani Patil unopposed. Announcing the withdrawal of his party’s candidate

from the RS by-poll fray, Maharashtra BJP president Chandrakant Patil said: “Keeping in view the request made by the Congress leaders and tradition followed in the elections held after the death of a sitting member, we withdrew our candidate Sanjay Upadhyay from the RS poll fray”.

The October 4 by-election to one RS seat from Maharashtra has been necessitated by the untimely demise of sitting Congress member Rajeev Satav who died because of Covid-19 complications on May 16 this year.

On its part, the BJP had earlier said that in the first place it would not have fielded a candidate if the Congress were to put up a candidate from Satav’s family member and that the ruling party had instead nominated a former MP for the seat.

The Congress high command has chosen Rajani Patil, who is a Gandhi-Nehru family loyalist, as the party candi-

date for the RS by-polls, ahead of Rajeev’s widow Pradnya Satav, who had lobbied with the party leadership for nomination, veteran party leader Sushilkumar Shinde, party general secretary Mukul Wasnik himself, former Rajasthan state in charge Avinash Pande, former MP Rajiv Shukla and former union minister Milind Deora.

Sixty-two-year-old Rajanitai – as she is known in the state political circles -- is currently the All India Congress Committee (AICC) in-charge for Jammu and Kashmir. She was elected unopposed to the Rajya Sabha in 2013. In 1996, Patil had won the Beed Lok Sabha seat in Maharashtra for the Congress. She had replaced AICC general secretary and former Maharashtra chief minister Shushil Kumar Shinde as the in-charge for Himachal in September, 2018. Patil enjoys close rapport with the Gandhi

family, especially party president Sonia Gandhi.

After the state Congress leaders Patole and Thorat met Fadnavis and requested the latter to withdraw his party’s candidate to ensure the election of Rajani Patil unopposed, there was intense speculation in the media that the BJP had reportedly offered to support to the Congress candidate on a condition that in lieu of its support, the MVA Government withdraw the suspension of 12 of its MLAs who were acted against when they “abused” and “misbehaved” with the presiding officer inside and outside the State Assembly in July this year.

It may be recalled that on July 5, as many as 12 BJP MLAs were suspended from the Maharashtra Assembly on Monday for a period of one year “abusing” and “misbehaving” with the presiding officer inside and outside the House.

Two minors gangraped, blackmailed in Kannauj

In a sensational incident reported from Kannauj, two girls were allegedly held hostage and gangraped in a cyber cafe when they went there to get some documents photocopied.

Police said on Monday that four men took the two girl students hostage at the cyber cafe on September 13 and gang-raped them and one of the accused also recorded the act. The accused also extorted ₹10,000 from the girls by threatening to circulate the video.

Superintendent of Police Prashant Verma said a case was registered at Sadar Kotwali on Sunday against six people, including a woman, based on the complaint of one of the girls.

The 17-year-old student in her complaint said she had gone to the cyber cafe along with her friend at noon on September 13 when four people, who were already present there, raped them.

One of the accused also made a video of the act and handed it over to his brother-in-law who extorted ₹10,000 by threatening to make it viral, police said.

The girl said she and her friend stole money from their houses to give it to the accused, the police said. It was the missing money which alerted their family members after which the incident came to light, they said.

The girls were sent to the district hospital for medical examination.

Police were raiding all possible

places, the SP said, adding in the initial investigation, the police found signs of prostitution from the cyber cafe.

The victim had said that after the incident, the wife of one of the accused made her phone calls, pressurising her into prostitution and some neighbours had also spoken about presence of young girls there, the SP said, adding that efforts were on to nab the accused.

Meanwhile, in a brutal killing, the body of a youth was found in the Dadiyamau area of Fatehpur Kotwali in Barabanki district on Monday morning.

The victim was brutally beaten by some blunt object and the accused escaped after the youth succumbed to his injuries.

On Monday morning, the body of the youth was found lying on the side of the road covered in blood. The police reached after getting the information and started investigating the case by sending the body for post-mortem.

According to the police, the victim, Ajay Kumar Verma (35) son of Ramchandra of village Dadiyamau of Kotwali area, had left the house on Sunday evening after taking Rs 500 from his father.

When he did not return home till late in the night, the family members and villagers started searching for him. On Monday morning, the body of Ajay Verma was found lying in a pool of blood on the Nandanakala Dadiyagau contact road. There were injury marks on the head of the deceased.

UP to begin ethanol production from cane from October

Uttar Pradesh will commence production of ethanol directly from sugarcane from the next cane crushing season commencing from October. Ethanol used for blending with petrol will be produced at the public sector undertaking Pipraich sugar mill at Gorakhpur and Balrampur sugar mill. The UP government had decided in October last year to produce ethanol directly from sugarcane and a pilot project was started at the Pipraich sugar mill.

UP is the top producer of the ethanol in India and more use of the commodity for blending with petrol will help the industry to earn more revenue and clear the payment of the farmers. There are 53 distilleries producing ethanol and annual installed capacity is 158.44 crore litre. In the financial year 2016-17, UP produced 42.70 crore litres of ethanol which increased to 99.31 crore litre in 2020-21. UP has 72 distilleries which include 25 standalone and 47 attached with the sugar mills. Sugar Industry Minister Suresh Rana said in a press conference on Monday that the hike in State advisory price of sugarcane for the next crushing season 2021-22 would fetch an additional over ₹4,000 crore to the farmers. He said the sugar mills had cleared 100 per cent payment of the 2019-20 and over 85 per cent of the last season (2020-21) had been cleared by the industry. He said against the demand of ₹33,014 crore, the sugar mills had so far paid ₹28,015 crore to the farmers for the 2020-21 season.

He said during the 10-year rule of the Bahujan Samaj Party and Samajwadi Party from 2007 to 2017, sugar mills made total payment of ₹1,47 lakh crore to the farmers while the during the four years of Yogi Adityanath government, the payment made from 2017 to 2021 was ₹1,44 lakh crore till September 21 this year.

“The focus of the Bharatiya Janata Party government in the last four years was on ensuring payment to the farmers, reviving the closed sugar mills and introducing the latest technology in the industry,” the Minister said.

Dalits in India live in a sorry state, whether it is spoken about or not

In the 21st century, while India plans to reach the Moon and Mars, Dalits cannot afford to go a hundred yards riding a horse. In a country that the Government wants to make self-reliant as a way out of its economic morass, Dalits dare not make themselves “*aatma nirbhar*”. What is a more unnerving aspect of our ultra-modern society is the inglorious fact that the Government authorities are, as we speak, formally searching for hamlets and villages where untouchability is still practised with two hoots to the law. The search follows two quick incidents of untouchability reported from the Koppal district of Karnataka within a fortnight. In the first instance, a Dalit family was fined ₹25,000 by upper caste village elders because their three-year-old child entered a temple. Dalits are banned from entering the temple in that village. In the second incident, a Dalit youth was asked to pay ₹11,000 for entering a temple in another village.



The fine would be used to purify the temple, the upper caste villagers told him. These incidents are not new. They happen dime a dozen in most Indian States. Dalits have no right to worship, believe, celebrate or cremate their dead on public property because the upper castes treat all public property as fief and the Dalits have none in their names.

However, what is startling is the Koppal administration telling the media that untouchability is still practised in 25-30 villages in that district. The very admission of such a fact is violative of the Constitution but all that the administration and the

police are willing to do is search for those villages. Obviously, they are not going to find them because nobody will admit to practising untouchability. What is scary is the routinisation of the Indian, casteist social order, immune to the Constitution, even as the society claims to embrace modernity. The Dalit is so untouchable s/he can get killed for touching an animal. A youth was hacked to death in Gujarat in 2018 because he rode a horse. In 2019, a Dalit groom's family was socially boycotted because he sat on a horse, again in Gujarat. In 2020, a Dalit youth found out being an army jawan does not make him immune to upper caste taunts as he was forced down from his horse, also in Gujarat. After dozens of similar cases were reported in Uttar Pradesh, a Dalit groom in Meerut managed to reach the bride's home on his horse because of police protection. The only consolation for the poor Dalits is that even prosperous Dalits suffer the same insults. Young Dalits get a taste of the discrimination quite early, during mid-day meals in schools. Whom can Dalits turn to seek equality as human beings in everyday life and not be beaten or killed for wearing new clothes or walking on a paved street or drinking water from a public tap?

High time

It's time to take a leaf out of Kerala's book to take steps to nurture our next generation

Come November 1 and schools and colleges in Kerala would reopen after a 21-month hiatus caused by COVID-19. November 1 assumes significance as it was on this day in 1956 that the State came into existence following the merger of Travancore, Kochi and Malabar. This is the longest ever closedown seen in the educational sector of the State known more for its militant trade unionism and student agitation.



The LDF Government, led by Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan, has been doubly cautious about announcing the lifting of lockdown in schools and colleges because of the 'once bitten twice shy' syndrome experienced by the State. Vijayan had declared on May 8, 2020, that Kerala had become COVID-free, thanks to the State's well-functioning health sector. However, within weeks, the pandemic returned with renewed potency and caused devastating havoc by claiming nearly 25,000 lives. This time round, the State administration is leaving no stone unturned to ensure student safety. The bio-bubble scheme under the

Government's consideration envisages three offline classes and an equal number of online classes for each batch of students. Only those parents who are confident of the cleanliness of the schools need send their wards for physical classes. The rest could continue with the on-line sessions which are in vogue now.

Another Government initiative is the de-addiction centres planned across the State to ensure that students do not fall to drugs. Narcotics smugglers are out in the open across the State and schools and colleges are on their target. Since the lockdown was slapped in the State, another social evil in the name of online games has hit Kerala. This has resulted in suicides by students and parents, who were left in financial distress. Vijayan said that all police inspectors have been instructed to establish close rapport with head masters and parent teachers' associations to save students from drug pushers and online gaming operators. The State also saw some students resorting to the extreme measure of suicide because of mental agony arising out of the absence of peer company. The partial opening of schools is expected to go a long way in resolving the issue while the students have to be trained to face the changed lifestyle as they emerge from COVID-19. Life will not be the same anywhere in India and Gen-Next should be warned about the ground reality. This step should be replicated across India.

The history of the Assam problem

The tale of illegal migrants into Assam is old, told by all observers but swept under the carpet by the Congress and its Muslim supporters

What happened in Darrang district a few days ago, where by two alleged infiltrators were killed, was sad but reflected the historic agony of the Assamese people. Under the Government of India Act of 1935, provincial governments were formed by political parties. Soon enough, a Sir Mohammed Saadulla of the Muslim League became the Premier. In the 1937 elections, the League led by MA Jinnah was disappointed with its meagre winnings in UP, the largest province. Talk of a distinctly separate Muslim holy land began in seriousness.

The idea was first concretely mooted by the poet Iqbal who presided over the 1930 League session at Allahabad. A few years later, Cambridge University scholar Chaudhry Rehmat Ali worked out a theoretical note and innovated the name Pakistan, the land of the devout. Jinnah's idea was that five provinces should form the holy land including Assam, Bengal, North-West Frontier, Punjab and Sindh. Balochistan came in later. From the Muslim majority angle, Assam appeared touch and go to Jinnah although the Hindu impression was that they had a clear majority. Premier Saadulla got down to the business of facilitating as many east Bengali Muslims to come across and settle in Assam. A whispering campaign was started that the Adivasis were not really Hindus but worshipped animals or were Christian. There was thus a race to somehow prove that there were more Muslims in Assam than Hindus.

In the course of a discussion at Shillong in 1945, Viceroy Lord Wavell noted in his diary that while the reason for the encouragement of this migration was officially justified as being to grow more food, the real object was to increase Mohammadans (as recorded by BK Nehru in his book *Nice Guys Finish Second*). The tale of illegal migrants into Assam is an old one told by all observers but swept under the carpet by the Congress and its Muslim supporters. Other distinguished Muslims like Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and late Pakistan PM Zulfikar Ali Bhutto,



who openly expressed the view that without Assam, the economy of East Pakistan could not be complete.

The entire episode is heart rending for those who care for Assam. The writer has often visited the state and seen all its tea growing sub-districts. He was there for some ten days during the 1983 elections, which were boycotted by those who loved Assam. In many of the assembly constituencies, the voting was pathetically low although the Hiteswar Saikia Government had ensured perfect law and order. Most of the electoral officers in the heartland constituencies and the booths therein were manned by men flown in from other States. Nevertheless, for five days, the Assamese districts seemed as dead as graveyards.

Quoting from the *Hindustan Standard*, a well patronized Kolkata daily of those days, Rajendra Prasad in his book *India Divided*, stated: "It is sad but by no means improbable that in another 30 years Sibsagar district will be the only part of Assam in which an Assamese will find himself at home."

The Census Report of 1941 completes the story with a short but significant sentence, quoted: "The most noticeable rise in the Muslim population

is in Assam and once again represents migration from Mymensingh and east Bengal generally." This policy of colonisation of Assam by the Muslims of Bengal was continued under the joint auspices of the Muslim League ministries of Sir Saadullah in Assam and Sir Nazimuddin in Bengal, as the following Bengal Government communique published in the press, in the last week of October 1944, shows. It goes on to quote the Census Report of 1941: "The Government of Assam in their resolution dated the 21st June 1940 prohibited settlement of land with persons coming from outside the province after the 1st January, 1938 — The Bengal Legislative Council went on to appeal to the Governor to ask for the Viceroy's intervention in Assam.

Dr Prasad quoted a retired SP Desai (ICS) writing in *Hindustan Standard* of December 1944: "Every day, new bamboo sheds and temporary huts are springing up in the reserves. I found that the immigrants absolutely ignore the local officers." The few Nepali graziers and Assamese Pamasu finding no protection from anywhere give 'dohai' in the name of the King Emperor. Verily, the cup of humiliation for the Assamese was full.

Thus the Indira Gandhi

Government in collaboration with Assam CM Hiteswar Saikia suppressed the people of Assam and their sentiments. They continued to protest and agitate but to no avail. As if to rub salt on their wounds, the Central Government passed the pernicious Illegal Migrants (Determination by Tribunals) Act in 1983. Hereby, in Assam the onus of proving that a particular person is an infiltrator rested with his complainant or the Government of Assam, not on the suspect. The Foreigners Act of 1946, whereby the onus of proving his bona fides is on the suspect, continued to apply to all other States in India. The only exception made was Assam to help out the illegal migrants. When travelling from Guwahati to Shillong, one does not spontaneously realise when one has crossed from Assam to Meghalaya. Yet in the latter State, the Central law was the old 1946 Act! Such was the discrimination against the Assamese people.

Seven years in orbit



It's truly delightful and a matter of pride to know that India's Mars orbiter has completed seven years in its orbit, well beyond its designed mission life of six months. 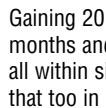

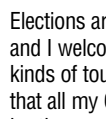

CHILD ADVERSITY AND CHRONIC PAIN

It is necessary to understand what links early life adversity to poor adult health

There is a widely held belief that our health is largely preordained by the genes we inherit from our parents. Indeed, this lottery of inheritance plays an instrumental role in some health outcomes. Early onset diabetes is an example of an inherited disease which, although debilitating, is relatively uncommon with only three new cases per 100,000 children in India. Late onset diabetes is much more common afflicting 12 per cent in urban populations and, like most predominant diseases, lacks a clear pattern of inheritance. The evidence suggests a greater role for nurture (environment) rather than nature (genes) in maintaining well being. That is good news because we can improve the environment. Chronic pain (pain that lasts longer than three months) is another debilitating con-



dition that lacks clear genetic origins. It is much more common than all forms of diabetes, estimated to affect approximately 20 per cent of adults in India. A report this year reveals that pain of the lower back and extremities afflicted 83 per cent of an adult population in rural Gadchiroli in Maharashtra in a period of one year, leading to 11 lost workdays per study participant.

In addition to unquantifiable personal suffering, the estimated economic costs of lost work and medication are staggering; each person with pain lost 4.9 per cent of the annual per capita regional income. Even a small reduction in the prevalence of chronic pain would be exceptionally beneficial. Unfortunately, pain treatment options have limited efficacy and for many recurring chronic pain becomes a way of life. However, not all adults living in similar circumstances are vulnerable to chronic pain. Some are remarkably resilient. If this is not because of genetics, then why are some vulnerable and others resilient? The answer may lie in exposure to childhood adversity. Adverse childhood experiences include physical or emotional abuse, neglect and domestic violence. The World Health Organisation describes adverse childhood experiences as the most common and intense childhood stressors. Many of us experience at least one and children exposed to several adverse events are likely to have more frequent and severe health problems later in life, including chronic pain. Furthermore, childhood adversity is emerging as a leading contributor to health disparities, disproportionately affecting the poorest in society. There is a strong relationship between exposure to childhood adversities and social deprivation. However, there is a lack of screening for exposure to childhood adversity, which might otherwise enable targeted health interventions. Reasons for this include inconsistent screening methods and poor understanding of factors that may contribute to vulnerabilities following exposure. The Consortium Against Pain Inequality (CAPE), led by the University of Dundee, seeks to overcome these deficiencies in understanding. CAPE will develop a comprehensive tool for screening exposure and establish mechanisms linking early life adversity to chronic pain in adulthood. By understanding what links early life adversity to poor adult health, we hope to address pain inequality by identifying those at greatest risk and providing tailored interventions. By raising awareness of the long-term impact of childhood adversity we will promote efforts to improve childhood and adult well being.

Banks' bailout — Make it transparent

The proposed 'bad bank' scheme by the Government is merely an attempt at using taxpayers' money for bailing out NPA-afflicted banks

In the Union Budget for 2021-22, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman had proposed setting up of a bad bank. Crafted as National Asset Reconstruction Company Limited (NARCL), it will bundle up all the non-performing assets (NPAs) of banks and sell them to investors such as private equity funds, alternative investment funds (AIFs) and so on, by putting a turnaround plan in place. On September 16, 2021, she announced the broad contours of the action plan.

Under it, the NARCL will purchase NPAs from banks under 15:85 structure, wherein it will pay up to 15 per cent of the agreed or discounted value of the loans in cash and issue Security Receipts (SRs) for the rest. The Government will provide sovereign guarantee - valid for a period of 5 years - for the SRs issued by NARCL. The guarantee would be invoked to cover the loss being the difference between the realized value (resolution/liquidation) and face value of SRs. A provision of ₹30,600 crore has been made for this purpose.

The Indian Banks' Association (IBA) has already started the process with incorporation of the NARCL and applied to the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) for a license as an Asset Reconstruction Company (ARC) with a capital base of ₹6,000-crore. The public sector banks (PSBs) will have 51 per cent ownership in the NARCL. The remaining shareholding will vest in 16 entities including private banks and non-bank finance companies.

The NARCL is intended to resolve stressed loan assets above ₹500 crore each amounting to about ₹200,000 crore. In phase I, it will take over fully provisioned assets of about ₹90,000 crore while the remaining assets would be transferred in phase II.

High NPAs have been haunting the Modi Government ever since it took charge in 2014. In 2016, it enacted the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC), an overarching law that gives lenders and banks the power to drag defaulting borrowers to a judicial authority. It also amended the Banking Regulation Act giving RBI powers to force banks to act within strict timelines.

As per RBI circular dated February 12, 2018, for accounts with aggregate exposure of over ₹2,000 crore, as soon as there was a default in the account with any lender, all lenders - singly or jointly - shall initiate steps to cure the default by preparing a resolution plan. The plan had to be readied within 6 months from the default date. If not, proceedings under IBC would be initiated by referring the case to National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT) which would get six months to resolve.

According to a statement in parliament by Minister of State for Finance Bhagwat K Karad, PSBs alone have

recovered over ₹500,000 crore. The NPAs ought to have gone down by this much but the decline is only about ₹200,000 crore and the difference of ₹300,000 crore is due to fresh slippages. This figure excludes the Covid period — March 1, 2020 to March 24, 2021 — during which banks were not allowed to recognize bad loans. On their inclusion, we could get back to March 31, 2018 level.

Much lower yield than expected from the IBC mechanism has a lot to do with a revised RBI circular dated June 7, 2019 — issued under Supreme Court orders - which took away powers from the banking regulator and gave too much of flexibility to the latter in working out the resolution plan. Effectively, it rendered the IBC process dysfunctional.

Now, the Government wants the 'bad bank' do the trick. Look at the first lot of ₹90,000 crore. These loans being in default for over 3 years, the banks have already made a full provision and captured in the profit and loss figures. There is no compulsion on them to recover this money. They will not object to NARCL paying a very low price.

However, what prevents other asset reconstruction companies (ARCs) from bidding for a higher price. Indeed, the proposed mechanism requires NARCL to go for the "Swiss Challenge" auction wherein other ARCs will be invited to better the offer made by it.

However, in the present case, this will not work as the bank would play safe by giving asset to NARCL whose SRs enjoy sovereign guarantee.

As for the remaining ₹110,000 crore for which a lower provision has been made and the chances of recovery are better, the bank could have reason to offer lower discount on the face value. This is provided transfer happens fast. If, this is delayed and default period increases even exceeding three years, the fate of these loans too will be no different from those in the first lot.

In short, the entire bad loan book on offer (read: ₹200,000 crore) would be available to the 'bad bank' at heavy discount to the face value. What if this is fixed at say 18 per cent?

In absolute terms, this works out to ₹36,000 crore. Of this, NARCL pays 15 per cent or ₹5400 crore in cash to the banks and for the balance ₹30,600 crore, it will issue SRs. To redeem them, the former must realize at least ₹30,600 crore from selling the NPAs to investors. If, the NARCL doesn't realize even one rupee, then also it need not worry as SRs valued up to ₹30,600 crore being guaranteed by the Union Government, the latter will pay for it in full.

Short of jargon and high-sounding phraseology, the proposed 'bad bank' is merely an attempt to use tax payers' money

for bailing out NPAs afflicted banks. Put simply, of the ₹200,000 crore, the Union Government will give ₹30,600 crore by way of sovereign guarantee and the rest (sans a tiny sum of ₹5400 crore) as direct budgetary support.

The Government should stop taking recourse to disingenuous methods. Instead of following a circuitous route, making things non-transparent, setting up new institutions, adding to administrative and overhead costs and so on, it should candidly accept the dire need to inject that much capital in to the banks and give it from the Budget. During the last four years, it gave them ₹300,000 crore to deal with their NPAs; it can give a further ₹200,000 crore.

At the same time, to recover bad loans and stem their proliferation, first, it should revitalise the IBC mechanism by restoring the February 12, 2018 circular and strengthening the NCLT; secondly, expeditious disposal of challenges to NCLT orders in High Courts and SC; thirdly, stepping up 'tracking' and 'surveillance' within banks for early detection of bad loans including frauds (at present, it takes years for them to report) and lastly, stem corruption and nepotism.

Sans these harsh steps, the tide of NPAs will not stop forcing the Government to repeatedly bail them out.

US corp pledge elusive; bad bank is expensive

Economic development is a complex matter. The Government alone cannot make it happen but needs the involvement of all – businesses and the public

The visit of Prime Minister Narendra Modi to the US has tried to kindle hopes in an economy that needs investment but the American companies have not yet given any firm commitment to him. He held meetings with five global CEOs for potential investments.

India has taken many steps to bring in reforms through an asset reconstruction construction company (ARC) or the bad bank, lower interest rates, networked businesses and chain of roads. Companies like Qualcomm have investments in wireless modem, digital media networking, dairy transportation and defence. Now Modi has suggested to them to invest in hi-tech sectors and

in measures to strengthen innovation ecosystem. General Atomics, which opened its first office in India in 2018, is making significant contributions to deepen India-US defence and security cooperation. It is working with both governments to provide India with the latest defence systems.

Investments in real estate too are always lucrative. Blackstone has so far invested \$15 billion in real estate, private equity, real estate, education, fashion, packaging and housing finance. It would continue to do so as per the assurance of its CEO Stephen Schwarzman.

Blackstone Real Estate Fund is said to be the largest owner of commercial real estate in India. The company

played a key role in launching India's first real estate investment trust (REIT) along with its partner Embassy Group in 2019 and has since then launched two REITs in the country.

The Quad is a symbolic multilateral body. It provides a platform to seek cooperation from like-minded countries on issues like ensuring respect for territorial integrity, sovereignty and peaceful resolution of disputes. Quad leaders agreed to scale up collective

strategic cooperation.

There may be gains in the future. As of now, there are only expectations amid not-a-so-good domestic economic situation. The country's non-performing assets have increased. Steps like taming inflation, the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Act, Real Estate Regulatory Act, and GST did not add to the desired growth. These have shaken the system and market confidence. The rules are more stringent and do not help the people. The foreign investors though keen to invest may also have apprehensions, which the scrapping of the retrospective taxation may partially help resolve.

Corporate tax rates were cut but it ignored the pivot the individual. His taxes peaked during 2019. It hit the basic

capacity of the individual to ride through a crisis like the COVID-19 pandemic situation. At 42 per cent plus various cesses, India has the highest tax rates. The gestures by foreign countries would not be enough to bring that confidence back. It would be welcome even now to cut the income tax rates. It would boost the individual's capabilities and benefit the whole economy as the individual consumes more.

The lower interest rate is playing havoc along with tax deductions on deposit hedging against inflation that interest accrual does. It affects the developmental process. To accelerate development, the interest rates must be lowered. Economic development is a complex matter. The govern-

ment on its own cannot make it happen. It needs the involvement of all — businesses and the public in their various spheres of activity. The country needs to ponder how the entire system is revamped.

The new ARC or the bad bank with the limited government guarantee will remove ₹22.14 lakh crore (\$30 billion) of NPAs from the system. Since now it will be now under one entity resolution would be easier, it is being said. Bad bank is not all virtue.

The world experience with bad banks is that they have excessive and hidden fees, bouncing cheques, expensive debits, big banking errors and failure to honour promises. It can create a new kind of market in dealing with stressed loans but there

are apprehensions that asset buyers may resort to harsh unethical methods.

In a difficult situation, new methods are inevitably tried out but it has to be remembered that all Euro-US models of capital market should not be copied as the financial literacy is poor here. Moreover, Indian society is far more complex and heterogeneous. A complicated system may not be a proper solution. Hiving off bad assets may be practical but settling or reselling those for realization of dues is not easy and would have many complications as each of the cases are different. True, the nation will chart out its course. Setting the new course is not easy and none as of now has a clear idea how it would function.

Afghanistan, Myanmar will not address UNGA

United Nations: Afghanistan and Myanmar "withdrew" their participation from the General Debate of the high-level 76th session of the UN General Assembly, a spokesperson for the President of the 193-member world body said.

According to the latest list of speakers for the last day of the General Debate on Monday, Afghanistan and Myanmar are not listed to address the session, even as previous provisional speakers' lists had the countries' diplomats listed to speak at the General Debate.

When asked why Afghanistan and Myanmar are not listed as speakers for the final day of the General Debate, Monica Grayley, Spokesperson to the President of the 76th session of the UN General Assembly Abdullah Shahid, confirmed to PTI that: "we have received information that the Member State withdrew its participation in the General Debate

which was scheduled for today".

Grayley said Myanmar withdrew its participation "some time back and Afghanistan over the weekend, when we heard of it."

On Friday, spokesperson for the Secretary-General, Stephane Dujarric had said that "as for now, the Afghanistan representative inscribed on the list for Monday is H.E. Mr. Ghulam M. Isaccai," the Permanent Representative.

Last week, the Taliban had written to UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres nominating their spokesman Suhail Shaheen as Afghanistan's ambassador to the UN and had asked to participate in the high-level

76th session of the UN General Assembly.

Following the coup in Myanmar, its military rulers have said the country's Ambassador at UN Kyaw Moe

Tun has been dismissed and they want Aung Thurein to replace him.

Given that the current dispensation in both Myanmar and Afghanistan nominated their own envoys to the UN, while the Permanent Representatives of the toppled Governments continued to be stationed here, the decision of who represents the two countries at the United Nations fell to the UN Credentials Committee.

On September 20, on the eve of the commencement of the high-level UN General Debate, the Secretary-General had received a communication with the letterhead "Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan, Ministry of Foreign Affairs" dated September 20, 2021, signed by "Ameer Khan Muttaqi" as "Minister of Foreign Affairs", requesting to participate in the "76th session of the UN General Assembly on September 21-27 2021". **PTI**

Important to incentivise Taliban so that they fulfil promises: Pak PM

Islamabad: Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan has said it is important to incentivise the Taliban so that the new rulers of Afghanistan fulfil the promises they made after they seized power in Kabul last month.

The Taliban are yet to get international recognition. The heavily armed group have promised an inclusive government, a more moderate form of Islamic rule than that of their previous regime from 1996 to 2001, including respecting women's rights. However, their recent moves indicate that they are returning to their repressive policies, particularly toward women.

According to an official statement, Khan in an article published in US-based The Washington Post newspaper on Monday said the world desired an inclusive Afghan government, respect for the rights, and commitments that Afghan soil shall never again be used for ter-

rorism.

"Taliban leaders will have greater reason and ability to stick to their promises if they are assured of the consistent humanitarian and development assistance they need to run the government effectively," he said.

Khan said providing incentives would also give the outside world additional leverage to continue persuading the Taliban to honour their commitments.

"If we do this right, we could achieve what the Doha peace process aimed at all along: an Afghanistan that is no longer a threat to the world, where Afghans can finally dream of peace after four decades of conflict," he said.

The Prime Minister said abandoning Afghanistan as tried before would lead to a meltdown. "Chaos, mass migration and a revived of international terrorism will be natural corollaries. Avoiding this must surely be our global imperative," he said. **PTI**

Prosecutor seeks to resume ICC probe in Af

The Hague: The chief prosecutor of the International Criminal Court sought urgent clearance on Monday from the court's judges to resume investigations of war crimes and crimes against humanity in Afghanistan, saying that under the country's new Taliban rulers "there is no longer the prospect of genuine and effective domestic investigations" in the country.

Judges at the global court authorised an investigation by Prosecutor Karim Khan's predecessor, Fatou Bensouda, in March last year. The probe covers offences allegedly committed by Afghan Government forces, the Taliban, American troops and US foreign intelligence operatives dating back to 2002.

The decision to investigate Americans led to the Trump administration slapping sanctions on Bensouda, who left office over the summer at the end of her nine-year term. **AP**

Social Democrats narrowly beat Merkel's bloc in German vote

Germany's center-left Social Democrats won the biggest share of the vote in a national election Sunday, narrowly beating outgoing Chancellor Angela Merkel's center-right Union bloc in a closely fought race that will determine who succeeds the long-time leader at the helm of Europe's biggest economy.

The Social Democrats' candidate Olaf Scholz, the outgoing vice chancellor and finance minister who pulled his party out of a years-long slump, said the outcome was "a very clear mandate to ensure now that we put together a good, pragmatic Government for Germany."

Despite getting its worst-ever result in a federal contest, the Union bloc said it too would reach out to smaller parties to discuss forming a government, while Merkel stays on in a caretaker role until a successor is sworn in.

Election officials said early Monday that a count of all 299

constituencies showed the Social Democrats received 25.9% of the vote, ahead of 24.1% for the Union bloc. No winning party in a German national election had previously taken less than 31% of the vote.

Armin Laschet, the governor of North Rhine-Westphalia state who outmaneuvered a more popular rival to secure the nomination of Merkel's Union bloc, had struggled to motivate the party's base and suffered a series of missteps.

"Of course, this is a loss of votes that isn't pretty," Laschet said of results that looked set to undercut by some measure the Union's previous worst showing of 31% in 1949. But he added that with Merkel departing after 16 years in power, "no one had an incumbent bonus in this election."

Laschet told supporters that "we will do everything we can to form a government under the Union's leadership, because Germany now needs a coalition for the future that modernizes our country."

Some countries are hyping 'China threat': Beijing on Quad summit

Beijing: China on Monday slammed the Quad grouping, saying some countries are forming "exclusive cliques" and "hying" the "China threat" and the move is doomed to fail.

The Quad leaders at their first-in-person summit in Washington on September 25 pledged to ensure a "free and open" Indo-Pacific, which is also "inclusive and resilient", as they noted that the strategically vital region, witnessing China's growing military manoeuvring, is a bedrock of their shared security and prosperity.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, his Australian counterpart Scott Morrison, Japanese premier Yoshihide Suga and US President

Joe Biden described the summit as an opportunity to refocus themselves and the world on the Indo-Pacific and on their vision for what they hope to achieve.

Asked for her reaction at a media briefing here, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Hua Chunying said that China took note of the Quad summit and is "closely following the situation".

"For some time, a handful of countries have been obsessed with attacking China by citing the rules-based order. They hype up the 'China threat'," she said.

"Facts have shown that China is an advocate of world peace, provider of public goods and

China's development is important to international development. Coercion and undermining of international order can by no means be pinned on to China," she said.

China, she said, upholds the UN centred international order and rules-based international law.

"We don't think that the rules can be defined by a few countries. What the US wants is the rules where it can wantonly interfere with other countries without paying any price. It is the rule under which the US can bully in any manner and other countries bow to its hegemony which is against the trends of the times and aspirations of the people," she said. **PTI**

Iran, Saudi sides continue tension-easing talks in Baghdad

Baghdad: Representatives from Iran and Saudi Arabia have held a new round of talks in Baghdad, two Iraqi officials said Monday, in the first such meeting between the regional foes since a new president was sworn in in Tehran.

The meeting held last week discussed "pending issues between the two countries according to a previously agreed on roadmap, including diplomatic representation between the two countries," according to one Iraqi official.

The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorised to give official statements, said the meeting was not on a ministerial level, but described the talks as positive.

Iraq has recently played the role of mediator between the two regional foes whose rivalry has often played out to deadly consequences in Iraq and elsewhere in the region.

Multiple rounds of discussions have been held in Baghdad since the first direct talks between Riyadh and Tehran took place in early April.

Saudi Arabia has sought talks with Iran as the kingdom tries to end its years-long war in Yemen against Iran-backed Houthi rebels, having lost an unflinching supporter in President Joe Biden's predecessor, Donald Trump.

Iran, meanwhile, appears to have calculated that a gradual detente with Saudi Arabia, a longtime US ally, will work in its favour during renewed nuclear talks with Washington and world powers.

Last month, Baghdad hosted a regional conference that brought together Arab heads of state and senior officials including the foreign ministers of Iran and Saudi Arabia. The meeting, meant to ease Mideast tensions, cemented Baghdad's new role as mediator. **AP**

2 women, political opposites, vying in race for Japan PM

Tokyo: The inclusion of two women among the four candidates vying to become the next prime minister seems like a big step forward for Japan's notoriously sexist politics. But their fate is in the hands of a conservative, mostly male governing party — and the leading female candidate has been criticized by observers for her right-wing gender policies.

Sanae Takaichi and Seiko Noda are the first women in 13 years seeking the leadership of the ruling Liberal Democratic Party in an election Wednesday.

The winner is certain to become the next prime minister because of a parliamentary majority held by the LDP and its coalition partner.

While both are LDP members, they are political opposites in many ways. The ultra-conservative Takaichi advocates a kind of paternalistic nationalism and a stronger military, while the liberal-leaning, pacifist Noda supports women's advancement and sexual diversity. **AP**

US officials: Biden aide to meet Saudi Crown Prince on Yemen

Washington: President Joe Biden's national security adviser Jake Sullivan is traveling to Saudi Arabia on Monday to meet with Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman as the US tries to press the kingdom to move toward a cease-fire in its yearslong war with Houthi rebels in Yemen.

Sullivan will be the highest-ranking Biden administration official to visit Saudi Arabia. Besides seeing the crown prince, often referred to by his initials, MBS, Sullivan is expected to meet with deputy defense minister Khalid bin Salman, a brother to the crown prince, according to two senior administration officials.

The officials were not authorized to comment publicly and spoke on the condition of anonymity. The Biden White House has

largely steered clear of the crown prince since making public in February a CIA report that showed MBS likely approved the killing of Washington Post columnist and Saudi critic Jamal Khashoggi in a 2018 operation at the kingdom's consulate in Istanbul.

But the White House has resolved that bringing an end to perhaps the world's most complex conflict can't be done without engaging with the most senior Saudi officials face to face, one senior administration official said.

National Security Council spokesperson Emily Horne confirmed to The Associated Press that Sullivan was traveling to Riyadh on Monday and would also visit the United Arab Emirates, a Saudi ally in the war, but did not provide additional detail. **AP**

2 Canadians in prisoner swap freed for health reasons in China

Taipei: Two Canadians detained in late 2019 who were allowed to return to Canada in a prisoner swap were released on bail for health reasons, China's Foreign Ministry said Monday.

A Ministry spokesperson made the comment as Beijing sought to downplay the connection between their release and the return to China of a long-detained executive of Huawei Technologies.

Canadians Michael Spavor and Michael Kovrig were detained in December 2019, days after Huawei's chief financial officer, Meng Wanzhou, was arrested in Canada at the request of US authorities.

Many countries labelled China's action "hostage politics", while China accused Ottawa of arbitrary detention. The two Canadians were jailed for more than 1,000 days.

Meng fought the US demand for extradition from Canada. She landed in China on Saturday after reaching a deal with the US Justice Department that led to a prisoner swap. **AP**

UK suspends competition law to cut petrol station queues

The UK Government on Monday temporarily suspended rules under its Competition Act to allow fuel companies to address a supply crisis, which has led to long queues at several petrol stations across the country.

Known as the Downstream Oil Protocol, the step will allow the government to work with fuel producers, suppliers, hauliers and retailers to ensure that disruption is minimised as far as possible.

The measure will make it easier for the fuel industry to share information so that they can more easily prioritise the delivery of fuel to the parts of the country and strategic locations that are most in need.

"We have long-standing contingency plans in place to work with industry so that fuel supplies can be maintained and deliveries can still be made in the event of a serious disruption," said UK Business Secretary Kwasi Kwarteng.

UK's Johnson finally agrees to meet Covid-bereaved group

London: British Prime Minister Boris Johnson will on Tuesday finally meet with members of the Covid-19 Bereaved Families for Justice campaigning group, who for more than a year have sharply criticized his handling of the coronavirus pandemic.

Johnson's Downing Street office confirmed Monday that the prime minister will hold a "private meeting" with members of the group.

At the meeting, the group said family members will tell the stories of how their loved ones caught the virus and reiterate their calls for a statutory inquiry into the pandemic to start soon.

The group, which has requested a meeting with Johnson on at least eight occasions, has asked for it to take place outside and that social distancing is observed — even though all restrictions on social contact have been lifted. "It has been over a year since the prime minister first said he would meet us and in that time over 100,000 people across the country have lost their lives with Covid-19," said Jo Goodman, co-founder of the group.

"One of the hardest parts of the pandemic for us has been seeing new families join each week with the same pain and grief that we've experienced and distressingly similar stories to our own," she added.

The UK has recorded the world's eighth-highest virus-related death tolls with more than 136,000 deaths, according to figures compiled by Johns Hopkins University.

Johnson and his Conservative government have faced an array of criticisms from Covid-19 Bereaved Families for Justice since it was formed in May 2020, including delaying lockdowns, a too-lax travel policy and a shortage of crucial personal protective equipment.

Covid-19 Bereaved Families for Justice, which has around 4,000 members, have been calling for a public inquiry into the government's handling of the pandemic so lessons can be learned to limit future virus-related deaths. After months of deflecting calls, Johnson confirmed in May that a public inquiry will start to hear evidence next year. However, Covid-19 Bereaved Families for Justice thinks that's too late and that the delay could lead to many more people dying with the virus. **AP**

Govt to borrow ₹5L cr to fund revenue gap

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

The Government will borrow ₹5.03 lakh crore in the second half of the current fiscal to fund the revenue gap for reviving the pandemic-hit economy, the Finance Ministry said on Monday.

During the first half, the government has raised ₹ 7.02 lakh crore by issuing bonds, the ministry said in a statement.

“Out of gross market borrowing of ₹12.05 lakh crore projected for FY 2021-22 in the Union Budget, ₹7.24 lakh crore (60 per cent) was planned to be borrowed in first half (H1).

“The effective borrowing in H1 of FY 2021-22 was ₹ 7.02

The Budget has pegged fiscal deficit at 6.8 per cent for the next fiscal

lakh crore. The Government now plans to borrow the balance ₹5.03 lakh crore in second half year (H2) of FY 2021-22,” it said.

The H2 projection also factors requirements for release of balance amount to states on account of back-to-back loan facility in-lieu of GST compensation during the year, it added.

According to the Budget

for 2021-22, the government’s gross borrowing was estimated at ₹12.05 lakh crore, while net borrowing was pegged at ₹ 9.37 lakh crore in the financial year beginning April 1.

Gross borrowing includes repayments of past loans. Repayment for past loans in the next financial year has been pegged at ₹2.80 lakh crore.

The Government raises money from the market to fund its fiscal deficit through dated securities and treasury bills.

The Budget has pegged fiscal deficit at 6.8 per cent for the next fiscal, down from 9.5 per cent of the GDP in the current financial year.

Ministerial panels set up to review GST exempt list, rate merger, identify evasion sources

The Finance Ministry has set up two committees of state finance ministers which would rework rate slabs, review GST exempt items and identify potential evasion sources.

Four years after the roll out of the national Goods and Services Tax (GST), which replaced the complex indirect tax structure, the centre and states have started work on moving towards a “simpler rate structure in GST” by reviewing the current rate slabs, including special rates and merger of rate slabs.

The Group of Ministers (GoM) on rate rationalisation would also review items under inverted duty structure to help minimise refund payout, and

review the supply of goods and services exempt under GST with an objective to expand the tax base and eliminate breaking of input tax credit (ITC) chain.

The 7-member panel, which would submit a report in two months, would be headed by Karnataka Chief Minister Basavaraj Bommai and include West Bengal Finance Minister Amit Mitra, Kerala Finance Minister K N Balagopal, Bihar Deputy Chief Minister Tarkishore Prasad.

Under GST a four-rate structure that exempts or imposes a low rate of tax 5 per cent on essential items and top rate of 28 per cent on cars is levied.

The other slabs of tax are 12 and 18 per cent.

Commercial mining: Govt launches ‘2nd attempt’ of auction process for 11 coal mines

The Centre on Monday announced the launch of the “second attempt” of auction process for 11 coal mines for commercial mining.

These were the mines which were offered in the first attempt launched on March 25 this year and had fetched single bids, the coal ministry said in a statement.

“The Nominated Authority of the Ministry of Coal has launched today the second attempt of auction process for eleven coal mines (4 mines under the Tranche 12 of CM(SP) Act and 7 mines under the Tranche 2 of MMDR Act) earmarked for sale of coal in accordance with the rules prescribed under these Acts,” the

statement said.

Out of these 11 mines, six are fully explored and five are partially explored.

The auction will be held online through a transparent two-stage process, on the basis of percentage revenue share.

Key features of auction process include introduction of National

Coal Index, ease in participation with no restriction for prior coal mining experience, full flexibility in coal utilisation, optimised payment structures, efficiency promotion through incentives for early production and use of clean coal technology.

“The commencement of sale of tender document shall start from September 27, 2021,” the ministry said.

99% Indian business travellers want to resume work trips: Study

About 99 per cent of Indian business travellers aim to resume work trips within the next 12 months, a new study showed on Monday. Over 78 per cent are “very willing” to get back on work trips which is higher than the global average. The study commissioned by SAP Concur Respondents was carried out in India, Singapore, Malaysia, China, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Japan, South Korea, Australia, and New Zealand. AAWhile professionals are eager to restart in-person meetings soon, they also want greater control over how they will travel, so that their safety and health can be better safeguarded amidst the pandemic.

Diesel price rises by 70 paise in 4 days; petrol rate hike next

Diesel price on Monday was hiked by 25 paise per litre - the third increase since last week - and more rate hikes for both diesel and petrol are in the offing in the coming days as international oil prices have soared to a three-year high.

The price of diesel was hiked to ₹9.32 per litre in Delhi and to ₹96.94 in Mumbai, according to a price notification of state-owned fuel retailers.

This is the second straight day of increase in diesel prices and the third since September 24 when the state-owned oil firms ended a three-week hiatus in rates.

Just like the previous two occasions, petrol price was not changed on Monday. It costs ₹ 101.19 a litre in Delhi and ₹ 107.26 in Mumbai.

However, industry sources said the price of petrol, alongside diesel, is likely to be increased in the coming days as the rally in

international crude oil prices has continued, with Brent Future prices quoting at more than USD 78 per barrel since September 24.

Crude oil prices have reached a nearly three-year high as global output disruptions have forced energy companies to draw more crude oil out of their stockpiles.

Accordingly, US crude oil inventory levels are also nearing a three-year low.

“Global demand for crude oil has been increasing consistently with the easing of pandemic restrictions and improving vaccination rates.

On the supply side, OPEC+ alliance has been slow in easing output restrictions, contributing to the tightened supply in the market,” a source said.

Additionally, hurricanes Ida and Nicholas have impacted crude oil production in the US Gulf of Mexico region, when they hit in late August and September respectively.

Sensex, Nifty tick higher to fresh records; auto stocks in top gear

Equity indices pared most of their early gains but managed to close at fresh lifetime highs on Monday as robust buying in RIL and auto stocks offset profit booking in the IT pack.

Rising for the third straight session, the 30-share BSE Sensex ended 29.41 points or 0.05 per cent higher at its new closing peak of 60,077.88. Intra-day, it soared to an all-time high of 60,412.32.

On similar lines, the broader NSE Nifty inched up 1.90 points or 0.01 per cent to end at its fresh lifetime high of 17,855.10.

Maruti Suzuki was the top gainer in the Sensex pack, rallying 6.53 per cent, followed by M&M, Bajaj Auto, NTPC, Reliance Industries, HDFC Bank and UltraTech Cement.

On the other hand, HCL Tech, Tech Mahindra, Bajaj Finserv, Infosys, L&T, Nestle India and HUL were among the main laggards, shedding up

to 4.58 per cent.

The market breadth was negative, with 17 of the 30 Sensex components ending in the red, while 13 mustered gains. “Domestic equities traded range-bound amid positive cues from global equities. Heavy profit-booking in IT and pharma nullified the impact of sharp recovery in auto stocks,” said Binod Modi, Head - Strategy at Reliance Securities.

Auto stocks witnessed strong rebound as continued underperformance for last couple of months, expectations of improvement in demand scenario from October and positive commentary from select companies about semiconductor issue made investors buy quality names in OEMs, he noted.

Vinod Nair, Head of Research at Geojit Financial Services, said, “Due to profit booking in IT, Pharma and FMCG, domestic markets failed to uphold its winning streak to close flat in a volatile session.”

I-T dept detects ₹300-cr black income after raids on Maharashtra-based steel rolling mills

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

The Income Tax department has detected unaccounted income of over ₹300 crore following raids on a group of four major steel rolling mills based in Maharashtra, the CBDT claimed on Monday.

The searches on the business groups, engaged in manufacturing steel TMT bars and billets mostly using steel scrap as raw material, were conducted on September 23 on 32 premises located in Jalna, Aurangabad, Mumbai, Pune and Kolkata.

“Evidence detected so far indicates that unaccounted income is likely to exceed ₹300 crore and the four companies have already disclosed additional income to the extent of ₹ 71 crore consequent to the search,” the Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) said in a statement.

It added that “unaccounted” cash of more than ₹2.10 crore and jewellery worth Rs 1.07 crore have also been seized.

NMDC dedicates equal amount for villages covered under Slurry Pipeline Project

Hyderabad: The public sector mining company NMDC asserts that an equal amount has been sanctioned for the development work of all villages from Bacheli to Nagarnar covered under its ambitious Slurry Pipeline Project.

As per the guidelines of Petroleum and Mineral Pipeline Act 1962, NMDC proposed the laying of underground pipeline and sanctioned an amount of ₹30 lakhs to each of the affected 61 villages in the route of the Slurry Pipeline from Bailadila to Nagarnar.

NMDC has constructed an Iron Ore Stockpile in one of the villages in this route - Dongriguda, in Tokapal Block, Bastar District. The company has been allotted 3.15 hectares of land in Dongriguda village especially for the iron ore stockpile.

Agribazaar expects trade volume to rise at 2.5 mn tonne this kharif season

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

Agri-tech player Agribazaar on Monday said it expects an increase in traded commodity volume to 2.5 million tonne on favourable prospects of kharif (summer) crops this season. In the last kharif season of 2020-21 crop year (July-June), the company handled 1.5 million tonne of commodities, with a gross merchandise value of about ₹9,000 crore, it said in a statement.

“However, the outlook for the kharif harvest seems even more promising this year, as rains have been abundant since mid-August, and there are chances of strong crop prospects in soyabean and cotton,” it said.

Agribazaar Co-founder and CEO Amith Agarwal said: “Agribazaar is investing in strengthening its trading plat-

form and is also in the process of building a proof of concept for the Agriculture Ministry’s digital platform.”

The solutions in the digital agri platform are for crop identification and estimation. For this, the company is leveraging remote sensing technology and providing advisory services to farmers, post-harvest intelligence and market linkages, he said. “We are also planning to launch trading in cotton on our platform by December and Guntur red chilli by January,” he added. Agribazaar is already operating in about 100 villages in the Guna district of Madhya Pradesh and Kota in Rajasthan. It is planning to expand to Maharashtra to provide advisory services to farmers and equip them with the latest tools while also adding more commodities to the platform.

Get rid of chronic pain



Chronic pain – defined as any persistent pain lasting more than three months – is rapidly emerging as a significant healthcare challenge in India that is going to extract a heavy toll on the social and health infrastructure of the country in the coming years. This was said by pain specialists of Interventional Pain and Spine Centre (IPSC), a chain of single-specialty centres offering state-of-the-art spine care and chronic pain management with less invasive techniques. More than 19% of Indian adult population today suffers from chronic pain of some kind, with prevalence being higher in females (25%). The prevalence increases steeply beyond the age of 65 years, according to a survey. This may be the tip of the iceberg as Indians usually understate their health issues and would rather not reveal their pain problems to others.

Chronic pain will take a huge social and economic toll in the next two decades with significant spending on surgical treatment and hospitalisation. It has a serious impact on work, with increasing loss of workdays associated with chronic pain, especially low back pain. It also interferes with one's social life, daily routine like walking or exercising, taking care of oneself and the family, and leading an independent lifestyle. Many patients start suffering from depression, anxiety and sleeping problems. Chronic pain does not occur in isolation. There are often a variety of mental and physical health problems behind it.

There has been a gradual rise in the number of older people in the society due to rising life expectancy. This is driving an increase in the incidence of chronic pain. The younger population too is getting affected, mainly due to leading a sedentary and physically inactive lifestyle. The commonest types of chronic pain faced by people include spinal pain, joint pain and migraine. Arthritis, degenerative conditions of the spine, and cancer are the most common contributors to chronic pain.

In the West, pain medicine has been a super-specialty for the last three to four decades. In India, it is only 15-20 years old. Several hospitals in the country now offer pain management as a separate discipline. Till five years ago, Western protocols were being used to manage Indian patients of chronic pain. However, now India-specific protocols have been developed for better outcomes.

For most cases of chronic pain, less invasive and target-specific interventions (called interventional pain management) are better alternatives compared to open surgical methods, as these involve less risk and trauma to patient. They are also much safer and don't require hospital admission.


Since most of these non-surgical procedures can be done in a day care setting, they cost almost half compared to conventional surgeries. Patients can go back home the same day. Early interventions not only relieve pain, but also reduce morbidity and improve quality of life. We currently have Indian protocols for all interventional procedures for pain management, which is a big step forward.

A 2018 survey of 20,000 patients of back pain from Indian metro cities estimated that 46% of Bengaluru's population in the younger age group suffers from spinal problems. This is among the highest incidence in the country. About 43% of patients neglect their pain for more than 7 weeks, leading to delayed treatment and increased risk of surgery.

With better understanding of chronic pain and technological advancement, pain physicians can now control chronic pain adequately and cure it in most cases. However, it is the responsibility of the doctors to treat acute stages of pain promptly to prevent patients from sliding into chronic pain.

Know reason for cardiac failure

According to the National Center for Biotechnology Information (NCBI), the annual number of deaths from cardiac diseases is 4.77 million. DR BB CHANANA shares how early diagnosis can be of great help

The term heart failure doesn't indicate that the heart has completely stopped working. In simple terms, heart failure is the heart's inability to pump enough to meet the body's need. The heart pumps the blood at a slower rate which increases the pressure on the heart.

Some common signs and symptoms of heart failure are shortness of breath, fatigue, dizziness, irregular heartbeat, nausea, bloating, swollen ankles and weakness during an activity. Generally, heart failure develops if a person has or had one or more conditions described below.

■ Coronary artery disease is a disease in which the arteries supplying oxygen and blood to the heart get blocked and the heart receives insufficient oxygen. Plaque builds up due to cholesterol and fats on the walls of the arteries, causing them to narrow, this is known as atherosclerosis.

■ High blood pressure is a major risk factor for causing heart failure. When the pressure in the arteries is high, it causes the heart to pump the blood harder than normal for proper blood circulation. With time it becomes difficult to pump the blood and makes the heart muscles too weak to function.

■ Diabetes causes abnormal blood sugar levels in the body. High sugar levels in the blood cause damage to the blood vessels and nerves. People with diabetes may develop other conditions like high blood pressure which increases the risk of heart failure.

■ Cardiomyopathy is a condition in which the muscles of the heart make it difficult to pump blood. It may be a genetic condition in some cases or might develop due to blood pressure conditions or any other infection in the heart.

■ Abnormal heart valves can be the result of infections, certain diseases or a birth defect. Due to improper functioning of the heart valves, the muscles of the heart have to work harder for the blood to keep circulating at normal rates. When the pressure on the heart increases, heart failure can occur.

■ Congenital heart defects are the defects present from birth and can cause deformities in the development of the heart. If the valves and the heart chambers aren't developed correctly, the healthier portions of the heart must work harder for it to function properly. With heart defects, the chances of heart failure increase.

■ Obesity can make it difficult for the heart to pump blood properly. Obesity causes the buildup of fats and cholesterol inside the arteries, elevates blood pressure and increases the risk of diabetes, all of these are linked to heart failure. Besides this, the chances of developing cardiomyopathy increase.

These underlying conditions can cause the 'wear and tear' of the heart which leads to heart failure.

■ Early diagnosis can help in timely treatment for heart failure. A physical examination and electrocardiogram (ECG) testing can help in determining potential chances of heart failure. Some lifestyle changes that make an impact on heart health are avoiding high cholesterol food, getting good sleep, giving up smoking and limiting alcohol consumption.


■ Treatment options for heart failure depend upon the severity of your condition. From lifestyle habits to managing the pumping of the heart through angiotensin-converting-enzyme inhibitor (ACE) drugs, there are various treatment options available today. Patients with increased complications or delayed detection, advanced palliative care is the solution. Depending upon the rhythmic patterns, a doctor can also advise patients to undergo a cardiac resynchronization therapy defibrillator (CRT-D). CRT-D is a special device for heart failure patients. It functions like a pacemaker and implantable cardioverter-defibrillator (ICD) to treat heart rhythms. A CRT-D device delivers electrical impulses to the left and right ventricles, helping the heart to pump efficiently.

With technological advancements, come greater responsibility of educating people about them along with symptoms and preventive measures of dealing with heart failure.

CONTRACEPTION DURING COVID



Contraception is an important component of reproductive health. DR LOVLEENA NADIR tells you how contraceptives can be helpful in preventing cases of unwanted pregnancy and miscarriage

Everyone has a right to access the quality and affordable contraceptive options. They can be helpful in preventing cases of unwanted pregnancy and miscarriage. They also play a role in preventing many sexually transmitted diseases. World Contraception Day is observed every year on 26th September.

Even during the pandemic, our focus has been to ensure availability of high quality contraceptive options to the people, thereby ensuring the right health of the mother and reducing the number of premature deaths.

Every person should choose the option of contraception according to his/her need and choice. In general, contraceptive options are divided into two categories, reversible and permanent. Awareness about fertility (calendar method, birth control app, withdrawal method), barrier method (condom, diaphragm, cervical cap, contraceptive sponge, spermicidal jelly), intrauterine device, hormonal pills, transdermal patch etc. fall under the reversible category. At the same time, sterilization in men and tubal ligation in women are kept in the permanent category of contraception.

In this time of the corona epidemic, counseling regarding contraception is a mandatory step. Now, while choosing long-term reversible contraception, such as intrauterine devices etc provisions related to the corona pandemic such as social distancing, wearing of masks etc. should be taken care of.

Permanent contraception procedures like bilateral tubal ligation are done at the time of cesarean section /normal delivery for those who opt for it. Advice is given on correct use of lactational amenorrhea (some patients do not have period at the time of breastfeeding). The option of user-controlled contraceptives is also given to lactating and non-lactating women. Postpartum contraception is advised to patients immediately after delivery before hospital discharge.

All methods of contraception are safe even in this time of pandemic. Due to limited movement in hospitals, user controlled reversible options should be adopted. Condoms, fertility awareness methods & lactational, amenorrhea methods (for exclusive breastfeeding mothers) are good contraceptive options for self-care.

Condoms also protect against sexually transmitted infections and are used correctly & consistently. If hospitalization is not possible due to restrictions on movement, do not be concerned about delays in the implant or removal of an intrauterine contraceptive device. There are no medical problems caused by delayed removal of IUDs or implants. There is no harm in contraceptive options even if a person is corona positive. However, the use of hormonal drugs etc. should be avoided. Instead of combined hormonal contraceptives, progesterone-only pills or non-hormonal methods may be used. After complete recovery, combined hormonal contraceptive options can be used.

National Snakebite Awareness Summit

Public health experts, policymakers and administrators gathered at the maiden National Snakebite Awareness Summit, organised by the leading health awareness institution Integrated Health & Wellbeing (IHW) Council, have underlined the need to spread awareness on means to prevent attacks by snakes as well as gather adequate data to formulate the right and better ways to treat the cases at the primary health centres.

Dr Tamilisai Soundararajan, Governor of Telangana and Lieutenant Governor of Puducherry; Ms Vinita Srivastava, Advisor for Tribal Health Cell, Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Government of India; Mr. Vishwanath Swarup, COO, Bharat Serums & Vaccines Limited; Dr Priyanka Kadam, President, Founder, Snakebite Healing and Education Society along with others were the key speakers.

"There is an inadequacy of antivenom supply and we need expertise in administering antivenom – following the protocol is important but we may need protocols according to the region. Availability of dialysis facility and antivenoms are important as much as ambulance facility to take the affected person to the healthcare provider," says Soundararajan. She adds, "Walking in accumulated rainwater can be dangerous. We have seen a lot of cases where people dealing with snake carcasses were poisoned through the teeth of dead snakes."

'Ki hawaan si hoti hain ladkiyan,
Unhe behne me maza aata hai,
Unhe manzoor nahi unhe bewajah roka
jane.

(Girls are becoming like the wind,
They delight in frolicking freely
They cannot accept being stopped for
no reason.)

The chants of 'Azadi' wouldn't sound the same anymore. Ever. The weekend brought heartbreak as the news that Kamla Bhasin, the renowned women's rights activist, author and poet, had passed away at 75, or maybe finally found freedom from cancer. Even as the cry that she raised, as a part of the feminist movement, continues to reverberate as it is yet to find its logical conclusion.

Born in Shahidanwali village of Pakistan, Bhasin grew up in a rather progressive household. She rode bikes and played with boys. Having said that, Bhasin expressed sadness for all her female friends who were never allowed to play with boys or even outside, for that matter. The discrimination against men and women was ever since then embedded in her system and she wanted to change that. I can safely say that she did.

Activist Kavita Srivastava who thought Bhasin always celebrated life, no matter how great the adversity was, expressed, on Twitter, "This is a big setback for the women's movement in India and the South Asian region."

I will tell you just why this is such a huge setback. The seminal feminist is known for popularising and improvising the 'Azadi' slogan in India, and for her poems like *I'm A Girl, I Must Study*.

After studying sociology from Germany, she returned to work with the UN's Food and Agriculture Organisation. She worked there for 25 years, during which she organised numerous campaigns and participated and led countless protests and movements, while reaching out to women across the country. Bhasin was the voice of change. She founded Sangat, a South Asian feminist network, and co-founded Jagori, a resource centre for women. Besides this, she was the coordinator, from South Asia, of the campaign One Billion Rising.

Her house, with ex-husband late Baljit Malik, a well-known journalist and social activist himself, was located on Bhagwan Das road in Delhi. It was a centre of umpteen social activities and initiatives, along with standing as a refuge for many activists.

One of my friends, who worked with her in the One Billion Rising campaign, shared his experience, "I've visited her home a few times, and it never felt like she's such a senior or has some illness. She was always energetic, encouraging, and instead, made us question our energy levels. She would do a lot of *masti-mazak* but also would create a serious and engaging environment to help us focus and get engrossed in our projects. Her life-journey was so traumatic and even while carrying all that, she was so stoic and dedicated towards her goal to empower women in India and worldwide. She came up with literature to help us, and her songs, and books will always remain inside me to power me up."

Even though Bhasin created a revolution while living, touching innumerable lives, she did not have it easy. A lesser mortal would not be able to put her head above water with the losses she experienced.

She lost her daughter Meeto Malik, a brilliant activist, social worker and alumni of Oxford University, to suicide in 2006. Meeto suffered from manic depression, like her father. "That's been the biggest tragedy of my life and I feel that if I didn't have this work, I would have perhaps collapsed," Bhasin had opened up in an interview. The same year, her marriage fell apart, too.

Jeet Malik or *Chottu*, her younger son, was six months old when they gave him a DPT vaccine. It had a reaction on him which destroyed almost all parts of his brain. He developed cerebral palsy and is dependent on caregivers. Even the best treatments and prayers could not reverse the effects. Even with this, Bhasin had decided to learn on every step

of the way, still traversing the path with her head held high. "I think *Chottu* has also added a lot to our personalities," she had admitted in a video.

Bhasin wrote over 30 books and about eight children's works. Besides some of her works like *Understanding Gender*, *What Is Patriarchy?*, *Exploring Masculinity*, and so on, she compiled rhymes in books like *Geela Chotu*, *Housework is Everyone's Work - Rhymes for Just and Happy Families*, and many more.

She often highlighted and emphatically shared her opinion on the double marginalisation that women face. "Amongst the poor, the women were poorer. On all indicators I saw, women were behind men. Patriarchy sits in our bodies... Look at our body language. We've been messed up by patriarchy. We can't stand straight, we can't stand without our *dupatta*, we can't show our breasts," she had expressed in one of the interviews.

On an episode of *Satyameva Jayate* with Aamir Khan, Bhasin disclosed about the time she was sexually assaulted by men in her childhood.

In one of her books called *If Only Someone Broke The Silence*, she said she was always questioned why she, being an extroverted feminist, did not divulge about her sexual assault earlier. She wrote, "I lived with my family with six brothers and sisters... How come I didn't tell anybody about it? So when people ask now why women are speaking ten years later, I say it took me forty years to speak up. It's because of the women's movement that this is possible. Soon, this 10 will reduce to two, and one, and eventually young women will speak up on the same day and say, 'Stop'."

"I made a list of these thirteen fellows (attackers), and thought about what I'd do to them all the time. When I grew up and became strong, (I thought about) what I'd do to these fellows, and I still do not know the answer," she added.

I was fortunate to have a candid conversation with Kajri Akhtar, a successful filmmaker and producer from India, who had created a documentary on Kamla Bhasin's life called *Kamla Bhasin - A Woman, By Choice*. Kajri's mother, Tarkeshwari Negi, currently a professor at the University of Delhi, had worked in a feminist movement with Bhasin.

On asking her what it was like working with Bhasin, Kajri noted, "I grew up watching the absolutely inspiring woman that she was. I followed her ideology and even achieved



half of the life that she had created for herself would have been sufficient for me. The woman was bold and honest, the most open anybody can be. I was just out of college and I realised that there was no film around such a great person, and I realised it was high time someone did that. So my very first documentary was around her life, merely because I wanted to document it, to give a bit back to so much I had received. I remember she was so welcoming. Meeting her after college made me realise that the living legend was so real. She was extremely honest and vulnerable."

"At first, I did not want to name the documentary anything but later I came up with the name *A Woman, By Choice* because that was literally it. Kamla Bhasin was a woman who lived on her own terms and took pride in being a woman. Not once did she claim that she did something 'like a man', no. She embraced the fact that she was a woman and lived by it," Kajri concluded.

According to Bhasin, the biggest slogan that feminism rendered to the community was 'the personal is political'. She shared in the documentary, "It has various meanings and interpretations. For instance, when my children were born, I, like all mothers, went and looked for rhymes for children and found them either stupid or sexist. So, just playing around with these children, I started writing rhymes. I found that my feminism was coming out."

In one of her feminist rhymes called *Mama Dearest Mama*, she wrote,

*'Mama's back, Mama's back
She's brought me books and toys
She'll tell me lots of stories..
She'll teach me many new things..
She knows how rainbows form and
how cats see in the dark.
When mama comes from office
I want to shout hurray!..'*

She saw that her ex-partner was deeply involved in raising the children but she realised that he was an exception. This was because she garnered a lot of criticism for writing gender-neutral rhymes. Many fathers were unhappy with them for they faced the uncomfortable truth and answer to the age-old patriarchy.

I got a recent opportunity to speak with one of the writer's associates and well-wishers, Shanti ji.

"For me, Kamala *Didi* was everything. She never backed out, kept supporting us with all that she had in her. We were all in complete awe of her personality. I remember *Didi* would lead protests against violence, and would carry them as if every loss was personal to her. She felt deeply for every cause she stood up for. She has planted such seeds of humanity, feminism, and justice in the hearts of lakhs of people that I am certain these plants would be green till the end of the world. No storm or down-pouring would be able to shake the roots," the 80-year old shared in an emotional message.

Bhasin will, undoubtedly, always live in the hearts of the lives she touched with her heart-rending efforts and revolutionary work.

From countryside to the city

CHRISTY VARGHESE glimpses into artist RAJU BARAIYA's perspective against the backdrop of his solo show, *Social Gathering*



Last year, after the first lockdown, most of us were overwhelmed with the imagery of people walking back to their hometown in distant, rural areas, from the cities where they sought better living conditions. Odds are most of us, even though we were touched by the images and tried to help in some way or the other, forgot their plight. We have no qualms in admitting that we had forgotten all about it, until we witnessed the works on display at Raju Baraiya's latest solo show.

Based out of Baroda, Baraiya was awarded a three-month global art residency programme which he fulfilled at the Glenfiddich distillery in Scotland. He attended his show, titled *Social Gatherings*, to understand that his artworks are based on what emerges from the shift of coming to an urban setup from a rural background. During our conversation, he shared that the works on display were inspired by the incidents following the first lockdown and the widespread sensitisation on social distancing norms.

You can view *Social Gathering* at Gallery Art District XIII, F213A, Lado Sarai, New Delhi, till October 16, 2021. Provided below are excerpts from our interview:

♦What is the underlying theme of your show, *Social Gathering*?

My solo show, *Social Gathering*, is an exhibition of art works that play with the idea of masking and social distancing, with a mixed media on paperwork titled *Remind Me Of My Childhood* drawing parallels between the imageries of the circles in a game of hopscotch and the chalk-drawn ones that ensure social distancing in public spaces now. There are also acrylic paintings titled *Evening Tune* and *A Season Of Plastic* that use the motif of the Indian human body to transfer onto canvas what a regular everyday scene in a rural or semi-urban city would look like.

♦Your work is a commentary on the current social situation; what led you to conceptualise the works on display at the *Social Gathering*?

I was in Baroda when the first lockdown was announced due to Covid-19. In a few weeks, I felt very upset, nervous and worried looking at the images and news reports of migrants walking to their villages. While I kept thinking about them, I also decided to bring to life their circumstances, pain and struggle on canvas.

♦Who would you say are your biggest influences?

My art practice springs out of the shift from a strong rural background to an urban one. Villages, for me, are unique spaces holding their intrinsic character. These spaces demonstrate an inherent belief about 'what they are' in the 'way they are'. Although with easily available technologies and ever-spreading urban boundaries, there has been a gentle merging of the two for the sake of communication and advancement. This nevertheless does not deprive the rural of its rural character. One can easily find rural traits in people migrating to cities for various reasons. This rural character remains intrinsic and contradicts the urban. My inspiration comes from observing, correlating the rural, the urban and vice versa.

♦Which current trends are you in-touch with, from the art fraternity?

My work images are mostly driven by current social and political effects, which I observe in day to day life. We all know about today's contemporary art trends and its prevalence. I feel Baroda has great space for me to continue my art practice. In Baroda there are different regional



artists that come together, meet each other at places as simple like at tea stall. My inspiration comes from observing and diagnosing the rural in relation to the urban and vice-versa. The continuous push and pull between the rural and urban is what makes me wonder. I have been deriving imagery from these seemingly ambiguous notions of the urban and the rural. This is the way I am working and I am in touch with art. In my work you will mostly find group of people and animals forms so I should say it's formalistic and contemporary art where I explore my art practice.

♦What do you seek from your art?

The continuous push and pull between the rural and urban makes me wonder and trigger the visual intrigue. The nature and complexities between the two spaces give me, innate sense of the vulnerability that I feel being in the city and being away from my native town becomes a matter of the question of my vulnerable existence and to further emphasized by the past year struggling to combat the Coronavirus. I find my effort of locating myself in my paintings as a very synonymous act. There is a constant struggle to redefine and relocate the self in the painting through marks, gestures and superimposing images.

♦Do you explore different mediums?

When I was at the Glenfiddich distillery in Scotland for three-month residency, I used different material for my works — including the stone slate (a fine-grained grey metamorphic rock slide split into smooth, flat piece) used for constructing roofs in most of the houses in the vicinity and the lid of whiskey drums, I like to work on the wooden surface.

During my regular art practice in the studio I always used canvas and paper. But Scotland was uncharted territory and everything was new for me so I got the chance to explore my medium in different environment. During the residency period we visited Glenfiddich and Balvenie distillery, that time Andy took us to a big godown of whiskey drums and I got very excited to use the drums surface for art work. During the residency period I used to go to Dufftown to buy some groceries and I often saw that most of Dufftown village house roofs were done with stone slate. That's how I explored different mediums.

♦How did the Glenfiddich's Artist in Residence programme help you?

The initiative, Glenfiddich Artists in Residence, was launched in 2002. Samson's 82 take RR to 164

Skipper Sanju Samson produced a well-calculated 82-run knock on a sluggish track to help Rajasthan Royals reach 164 for five in their Indian Premier League match against Sunrisers Hyderabad, here on Monday.

It is second consecutive fifty for Samson after conjuring up an unbeaten 70 against Delhi Capitals on Saturday.

The captain sent the ball seven times to the fence and three times over it in his impressive 57-ball innings, with which he became the leading run-scorer (433) of the season, surpassing Delhi Capitals' Shikhar Dhawan (430).

Yashasvi Jaiswal (36) and Mahipal Lomror (29 not out), who was dropped twice (23 and

29), were the other two batters to provide valuable contributions on a wicket where the ball did not come on to the bat easily for a major part of Royals innings.

Asked to bowl, pace spearhead Bhuvneshwar Kumar (1/28) bowled a splendid length ball, on leg stump which worked perfectly for SRH as the dangerous Evin Lewis (6) hit straight to Abdul Samad at deep backward square leg in the second over.

Despite snaring Lewis' wicket early, the Sunrisers bowlers were guilty of bowling wide and short and Jaiswal took the opportunity to counterattack. The youngster, who smashed four boundaries and a six, played some splendid shots with skipper Samson also slowly finding his feet as the two collected 46 runs in the

Powerplay.

The duo went on to share a 56-run stand before Sandeep Sharma (1/30) got rid of Jaiswal, who had hit a stunning six just a ball earlier.

To keep the pressure on the Royals, SRH skipper Kane Williamson brought in star Afghan leg-spinner Rashid Khan (1/31) back into the attack and a mis-hit by Liam Livingstone (4) meant the move was met with the desired result.

With Lomror playing second fiddle to perfection, Samson took over the proceedings. But Siddharth Kaul (2/36) bowled a great last over, dismissing Samson and Riyan Parag (0) to restrict the Royals to 164 after being hit for 20 runs in his third over.

'Content' Moeen Ali retires from Test cricket

England's spin bowling all-rounder Moeen Ali on Monday announced retirement from Test cricket to prolong his career in white-ball formats, saying he is "content" despite the widespread belief that he could have achieved a lot more.

The 34-year-old leaves the Test arena with 2,914 runs in 64 matches at an average of 28.29.

Besides his five centuries with the bat, Ali has taken 195 wickets with his off-spin bowling at an average of 36.66 since his Test debut in 2014.

"I'm 34 now and I want to play for as long as I can and I just want to enjoy my cricket," Ali said.

"Test cricket is amazing, when you're having a good day it's better than any other format by far, it's more rewarding and you feel like you've really earned it."

Ali had already informed his England captain Joe Root and head coach Chris Silverwood of his decision.

will miss just walking out there with the lads, playing against best in the world with that feeling of nerves but also from a bowling point of view, knowing with my best ball I could get anyone out.

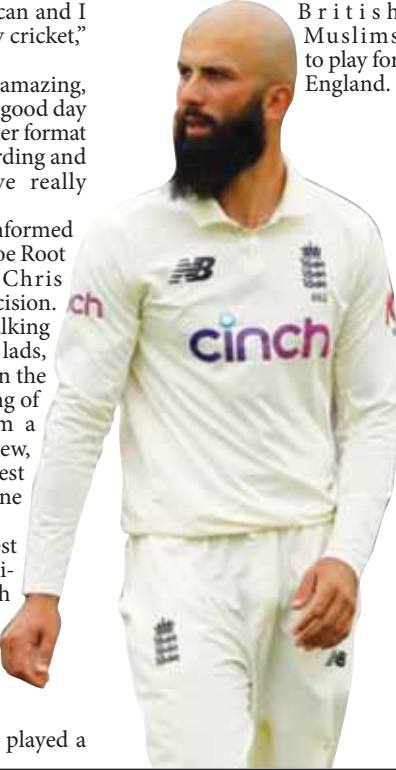
"I've enjoyed Test cricket but that intensity can be too much sometimes and I feel like I've done enough of it and I'm happy and content with how I've done."

Ali, who has not played a

lot of Test cricket since the 2019 Ashes, was recalled for the recent home series against India. He was apparently not comfortable with the thought of staying away from family for extended periods.

He had made up his mind even before the COVID-19 protocols were shared with the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) for the Ashes tour to Australia.

Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) has recently faced a severe blow after New Zealand and England cancelled their respective tours. The Kiwis cited security as a reason whereas England stated the 'mental and physical well-being' of the players was an issue. The cancellation of the tours has affected Pakistan financially and 'morally' as well. The newly appointed chairman of PCB Ramiz Raja lambasted the two nations for abandoning their respective series.

However, now some of the Pakistan Ministers and former cricketers have started "dragging India's" name in their statements. They are also allegedly blaming BCCI for the cancellation of their tours.

To this, a senior BCCI official told IANS that Pakistan has an old habit of 'using' India's

name in all their 'big or small news' that too without any proof. "We wish Ramiz Raja good luck...Pakistan cricket reaches new heights under him. We want to clear one thing that the BCCI has no role in the cancellation of England and New Zealand tours to Pakistan."

"We don't have time for all this...And also, I don't know why some ex-Pakistan players are cursing the IPL (Indian Premier League) for no reason? I read somewhere that Raja said that the Aussie players have even changed their DNA for the sake of the money they make by playing in the IPL. He accused Aussies of playing happily against India without their usual aggressive approach. "Now from where the IPL came here? What kind of frustration is that? We understand you are feeling bad but there is no need to drag India everywhere," official added.

Arsenal humiliates Spurs, seasons head in opposite direction

However bad things have seemed for Arsenal over the last decade, beating Tottenham at the Emirates Stadium can usually be relied on.

Just not usually as emphatically as Sunday's north London derby triumph — a 3-1 victory helping to clear the early-season gloom for Mikel Arteta's side.

Never before in the Premier League has Arsenal scored three goals as quickly in a derby. The goals inside the opening 34 minutes from Emile Smith Rowe, Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang and Bukayo Saka rattled Tottenham and gave Arsenal fans an afternoon of gloating in the late September sun.

"It's quite easy when you have boys like this — they always listen, always ready to learn," Aubameyang said. "They feel free when they play. That's why they're doing amazing."

It was a month ago as August was drawing to a close that Arsenal had opened the season with three losses — including at defending champion Manchester City — without scoring while Tottenham was top with a perfect start.

The captain wanted to put things right.

"After the game after City, we needed to have a chat between players," Aubameyang said. "We're doing really well right now." The only thing consistent this month for Tottenham has been losing all three games and conceding

three in each. Arsenal, meanwhile, has won all three games since the international break.

But in a sign of recent inferiority for the neighbors, they aren't challenging at the top but midtable with Arsenal 10th on goal difference and Tottenham 11th in the standings.

Spurs haven't won at Arsenal in the league since 2010, and they did everything to ensure that dismal run wouldn't end.

Just look at how much space was gifted to Arsenal to launch the attack that ended in the opening goal in the 12th minute.

Smith Rowe wasn't tracked by the visitors as he found space in the penalty area to get on the end of Saka's cross, evading a futile late tackle by Davinson Sanchez to net.

"I've always wanted to score against Tottenham in a derby," the 21-year-old academy graduate said. "It's just the best feeling ever." Arteta will be feeling relieved.

"He just tells us to keep calm," Smith Rowe said, "and he encourages us."

A couple of months into the job, Tottenham manager Nuno Espirito Santo was unable to have any impact in preventing this humiliation.

"I am very honest," he said. "If the game plan didn't work out the way you wanted, it's because you didn't decide it well."

Not even Harry Kane, stopped from joining Manchester City, could come to the rescue.

In fact, the striker managed

to give away the ball inside Tottenham's half to Thomas Partey that led to Arsenal scoring again on the break.

Kane did try to recover the situation as Arsenal advanced, but his tackle on Saka could not prevent him from getting the shot away to add the third.

Although Son Heung-min turned in a cross from Sergio Reguilon in the 79th, there would be no late Tottenham comeback. Especially not after Lucas Moura had a strike tipped onto the crossbar by goalkeeper Aaron Ramsdale.

"It is one of the nicest things I have experienced in this stadium," said Arteta, who has finished eighth in both of his seasons in charge of Arsenal.

It was at Arsenal in November 2020 that Raúl Jiménez suffered a head injury from a clash with David Luiz that might have ended the Wolverhampton striker's career.

He's back this season and now scoring again. It was a moment of magic that clinched a 1-0 victory over winless Southampton.

Wearing protective head gear, the Mexican breezed through the defense in the 61st minute before striking past goalkeeper Alex McCarthy.
