SC reserves order on I'm alive: Baradar audio Pegasus snooping

Court gives Govt 2-3 more days as it refuses to file detailed affidavit over security issue PNS NEW DELHI

A fter the Centre's refusal to field a detailed affidavit in the Pegasus snooping scandal, the Supreme Court on Monday said it will pass an interim

order in the matter soon. Chief Justice NV Ramana told Solicitor General Tushar Mehta that the interim order will come in two-three days and the Centre can re-think on filing a detailed affidavit before that time.

"We are reserving order. We will pass some interim order. It will take two-three days. If you have some rethinking on this, you can mention the matter before us," the bench, also comprising justices Surya Kant and Hima Kohli, told Mehta.

"You (Solicitor General) have repeatedly been saying that the Government does not want to file an affidavit. We also do not want any security issues



that is not the question here". The petitions before the courts are related to reports of an alleged snooping by the Government agencies on eminent citizens, politicians and journalists by using Israeli firm NSO's spyware Pegasus. On the last date of hearing, the SC suggested that the Government might consider filing an affidavit on the limited question if

were "tapped." During the hearing, Mehta told the bench that the Government has "nothing to hide" and that is why the Centre has on its own said that

it will constitute a committee of domain experts who will look into these allegations. Mehta told the bench that report of the committee of domain experts will be made available to the apex court.

The Solicitor General said the issue whether a particular software is used or not by the Government cannot be a subject matter of public discourse as it has its "own pitfalls" and it would be better if the target groups, like terror outfits, does

not know what is being used to combat their activities.

"The insistence that it must come in public domain, please appreciate the harm it may cause. Suppose, I say this particular software I am not using, it would alert all potential targets. It can be terror groups, it can be any other groups. If I say yes, I am using it, there would be different consequences," he "Your lordships are aware

that every technology has its own counter technology to protect the system from being examined by the security agencies. Therefore, the only distinction is instead of the petitioners insisting that everything must come in public domain by way of an affidavit, I am saying let the experts go into it and place it before your lordships," Mehta told the bench.

Speculation was rife that Afghan **Deputy PM died** in a shootout

AFP KABUL

The Taliban co-founder and now Deputy Prime Minister of Afghanistan released an audio statement on Monday saying he was alive and well after news of his supposed demise went viral on social media. Abdul Ghani Baradar, who

was last week named as a number two to Mullah Mohammed Hassan Akhund, blamed "fake propaganda" for the death rumours in an audio message posted by the Taliban.

Taliban spokesperson from Qatar office Suhail Shaheen tweeted: "Mullah Bradar Akhund, Deputy PM, Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan, in a voice message rejected all those claims that he was injured or killed in a clash. He said it is a lie and totally baseless." Social media has been in a

frenzy over the speculation particularly in India, where rumours swirled that he had been mortally wounded in a shootout between rival Taliban factions at the presidential

'There had been news in



the media about my death," Baradar said in the clip.

"Over the past few nights I have been away on trips. Wherever I am at the moment, we are all fine, all my brothers and friends

"Media always publish fake propaganda. Therefore, reject bravely all those lies, and I 100 per cent confirm to you there is no issue and we have no problem." It was not possible to

In what could be the good Inews for those who have taken Covaxin shot, the World Health Organisation (WHO) is ze nod made Covid-19 vaccine in this week, according to sources. In yet another good news, cumulative jabs administered in the country crossed 74 crore on Sunday.

The Union Health Ministry said all adult people in Sikkim, Dadra and Nagar Haveli, Himachal Pradesh, Goa, Ladakh and Lakshadweep have received at least one dose of Covid vaccine.

Over 52 lakh vaccine doses were administered on Sunday, according to data from the CoWIN portal.

"Congratulations to these States and Union Territories for



administering the first Covid-19 vaccine dose to 100 per cent of the adult population. Special appreciation for the health workers in these regions for their diligence and commitment, the office of Union Health Minister Mansukh Mandaviva tweeted.

Along with the tweet, the

Minister also put up a chart which stated that Dadra and Nagar Haveli and Daman and Diu (6.26 lakh doses), Goa (11.83 lakh doses), Himachal Ladakh (1.97 lakh doses), Lakshadweep (53,499 doses), and Sikkim (5.10 lakh doses) are the States and UTs with 100 per cent eligible population vaccinated with the first dose of the vaccine.

Regarding the proposed approval to the indigenous vaccine Covaxin which is manufactured by Hyderabad-based manufacturer Bharat Biotech, sources said that an emergency approval from the WHO will allow Bharat Biotech to export Covaxin and also ease international travel of people

Veteran Congress leader Oscar Fernandes (80), a former Union Minister and Rajya Sabha member, died at a private hospital in Mangaluru in Karnataka on Monday Fernandes was hospitalised in July after he suffered a head injury due to a fall while practising yoga at his home. He had also undergone a surgery to remove a clot in his brain.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed anguish at the death of Fernandes. "Saddened by the demise of Rajya Sabha MP Oscar Fernandes Ji. In this sad hour, my thoughts and prayers are with his family and well-wishers. May his soul rest in peace.

Congress president Sonia Gandhi, former party chief Rahul Gandhi, senior party leaders too condoled the demise of Fernandes and all remembered him as a guide and mentor. Rahul and Priyanka described Fernandes death as a "personal loss".

Maharashtra: Total Covid-19 infections cross 65L mark

T N RAGHUNATHA MUMBAI:

The total number of Covid-19 positive ■ patients crossed a milestone of 65 lakh in Maharashtra on Monday, while the total number of pandemic deaths touched 1,38,169 in the State.

On a day when 2,740 more people tested positive for the Covid-19, the total infections -- with 2,740 new cases - went up from 6,49,78,77 to 65,00,617.

With 27 fresh deaths reported on Monday, the total number of deaths in the state increased from 1,38,142 to 1,38,169.

The daily pandemic fatalities remained below the 50 mark for the fourth consecutive day. After it logged 44, 35 deaths and 46 deaths on Friday, Saturday and Sunday respectively, Maharashtra recorded 27 deaths on Monday.

Similarly after recording 4,174, 4,219, 4,154, 3,075 and 2,740 infections on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday respectively, the state logged 2,740 new cases on Monday.

There has been a near consistent drop in the number of daily deaths during the past days. After the daily deaths dropped to 52 on August 30 (Monday), the daily fatalities remained below 100 mark for five more days during the last eight days -55 deaths on September 2, 92 deaths on September 3, 64 deaths on September 4, 67 deaths on September 5, 37 deaths on September 6, 86 deaths on September 7, 65 deaths on September 8, 55 deaths on September 9, 44 deaths on September 10, 35 deaths on September 11, 46 deaths on September 12

and 27 deaths on September 13.

As many as 3,233 patients were discharged from the hospitals across the state after full recovery, the total number of people discharged from the hospitals since the second week of March last year increased from 63,05,788 to 63,09,021. The recovery rate in the state stood static at 97.05 per

22 Assam groups to protest against NHPC project from Sept 20

More than 22 organisations in Assam have threatened to launch a joint movement against the mega 2,000 MW capacity hydropower project being set up by the state-owned National Ĥydroelectric Power Corporation (NHPC) along the Arunachal Pradesh-Assam border from September 20.

Asom Jatiyatabadi Yuba Chatra Parishad (AJYCP) leader, Palash Changmai on Monday said more than 22 organisations have decided to launch a series of protests, including blockade of the project site, against the NHPC.

The AJYCP, an anti-Bharatiya Janata Party organisation, on Saturday organised a public meeting where various experts, including geologists and hydrologists, had highlighted a threat to downstream areas of the Subansiri river. The AJYCP leader said work on the project was resumed without consulting 965 villages across four districts in the downstream of the hydroelectric project.

These districts in eastern Assam adjoining Arunachal Pradesh include Biswanath, Dhemaji, Lakhimpur and Majuli. The 22 organisations, which are opposing the mega power plant, include the influential All Assam Students' Union and All Assam Adivasi Students Association whose leaders had attended the Saturday meeting.

The stay on the ZP and Panchayat by-polls had followed a Supreme Court directive. It may be recalled that on July 6, the apex court had asked the SEC, Maharashtra, to decide on whether to hold or postpone the by-elections to the vacant positions of five ZP and 33 panchayat samitis after considering the Disaster Management Authority

The SC directed SEC to pro-

ceed in the matter in accordance with law and report compliance within two months.

The apex court told Mehta that it had already made clear that it did not want the Government to disclose anything which compromises national security. On September 7, the apex court had granted more time to the Centre to decide on filing a further response on the petitions after Mehta had said that due to some difficulties he could not meet the officials concerned to take a decision on the filing of the second affidavit.

The Centre had earlier filed a limited affidavit in the top court saying the pleas seeking an independent probe into the Pegasus snooping allegations are based on "conjectures and surmises or on other unsubstantiated media reports or incomplete or uncorroborated material. In its limited affidavit filed in the court, the Centre had said the position on the issue has already been clarified in Parliament by Information Technology Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw. With a view to dispelling any wrong narrative spread by certain vested interests and examining the issues raised, the Government will constitute a committee of experts, it had said.

The top court, while issuing notice to the Centre on the pleas on August 17, had said that it did not want the Government to disclose anythe Centre what is the "problem" if the competent authority files an affidavit before it on the issue. "Our considered response is what we have respectfully stated in our last affidavit. Kindly examine the issue from our point of view as our affidavit is sufficient," the law officer had told the bench, adding, "The Government of India is before the highest court of the country." Meanwhile, Akhilesh kept ruling out any alliance with his uncle all these years. The duo did not come together even for Lok Śabha elections in 2019.

Earlier this year hinting at a possible electoral tie-up with his estranged uncle's Pragatisheel Samajwadi Party for the Uttar Pradesh Assembly polls, Akhilesh said Shivpal will be given a Cabinet berth if his party forms the Government in the State. However, he made it clear that the SP will not enter into any electoral alliance with the Mayawati-led Bahujan Samaj Party (BSP).

To a question whether the SP will form an electoral alliance with his uncle Shivpal's party, he said, "We will adjust that party. Jaswantnagar is his (Shivpal) seat and the SP will not field from this seat. Shivpal was elected from the Jaswantnagar Assembly constituency in the 2017 State elections.

INSTALLATION OF ROOFTOP RAINWATER HARVESTING SYSTEMS

Govt to give ₹50k aid, 10% off on water bills

To encourage residents to instal rooftop rainwater harvesting systems, the Delhi Government will provide financial assistance of ₹50,000 and a rebate of ten per cent on water bills.

Delhi Water Minister and Chairman of the Delhi Jal Board (DJB), Satyendar Jain, convened a meeting with officials and took stock of the progress of the work of installation of Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting Systems.

The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) Government has also extended the last date for the compulsory implementation of the rooftop Rainwater Harvesting (RWH) system until December 31, 2021.

Interestingly, in order to increase the groundwater levels, the Delhi Government has followed the INLINE-RWH, popularly known as the Dungarpur model. This model is also known

as the INLINE Rainwater Harvesting (RWH) system. This model is cost effective and is being implemented in the tribal-dominated Dungarpur district of Rajasthan.
Jain said, "This model uses

innovative techniques and is centred on routing the rainwater directly to a borewell, instead of a regular rainwaterharvesting pit.

In this system, the rainwater gets filtered within the pipe, removing any need for an additional filter system and harvesting pit. The INLINE-RWH comprises a pipe filter installed horizontally in the rainwater

ED notice to leader under | 51 dengue cases PMLA; AAP cries foul

The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) on Monday accused the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) of targeting its leaders, saying that the Enforcement Directorate (ED) has sent a notice to its national secretary Pankaj Gupta under a fabricated case under the 'Prevention of Money Laundering Act, 2002' (PMLA).

"In Delhi, they tried to defeat us with the Income Tax Department, the CBI, the Delhi Police - but we won 62 seats. As we grow in Punjab, Goa, Uttarakhand, Gujarat, we get an ED notice! The people of India want honest politics. These tactics of the BJP will never succeed, they will make us stronger," Kejriwal said in a

Addressing the media, AAP's national spokesperson Raghav Chadha said that in the ED has asked Gupta to appear before the agency on September 22 at 11.30 AM at its

"In an unending quest to persecute the AAP, the Modi Government's favourite agency the Enforcement Directorate has been pressed into service and has dispatched a love letter (notice) to the AAP. They (ED) have sent a notice to party's national secretary under some section of Prevention of Money Laundering Act 2002," Chadha said.

ith 51 cases of dengue reported in the ' week, the number of people infected with the vector borne disease has reached 353 cases on Monday.

According to a report released by municipal Corporations on Monday, 121 cases of malaria and 40 cases of chikungunya have also been reported till September 11 this

The number of dengue cases for January 1-September 11 period is also the highest this year since 2019 when the count had stood at 171 in that same duration.

Seventy-two cases were recorded in the month of August, which is about 45 per cent of the total reported cases, according to the report.

Thirty-four cases have been recorded in the first 11 days of September. Dengue mosquito larvae breed in clear, standing water, while those of malaria thrive even in dirty water. Cases of vector-borne

diseases are usually reported between July and November, but the period may stretch till

mid-December. According to a civic report issued by the municipal corporations last week, 124 cases of dengue were recorded till

September 4 this year.

At least 158 cases have been reported this year till September 11. No cases were recorded in January, two in February, five in March, 10 in April, 12 in May, seven in June and 16 in July.

In the previous years, the cases in the same period were - 1,158 in 2016, 1,177 in 2017, 243 in 2018), 171 in 2019 and 131 in 2020.

However, no deaths have been reported due to dengue in the city till now. Malaria, dengue and chikungunya are accompanied with high fever and therefore, doctors feel that people might suspect that they nave contracted COVID-19.

Two killed in building collapse; more feared trapped Pollution, weather

In a tragic incident, two children, both brothers aged seven and 12, died after a four storey building collapsed in North Delhi's Sabzi Mandi area on Monday. Police said that the boys were passing by when the incident occurred and they got trapped under the debris. The officials said that a 72-yearold man, who was also trapped under the debris, was rescued and rushed to a nearby hospital for treatment. It is suspected that three to four more people are trapped under the debris and rescue operation is

going on.

The ground floor of the building is believed to be 75years-old and it was being used for commercial purposes while the rest of the building was used for residential purposes. Locals said that construction work was also going on the ground floor of the building. A car parked nearby was severely damaged as the debris from the building fell on

The incident comes days after record heavy rains pounded Delhi, throwing life out of gear. Following the incident, the locals also gathered at the spot to help with rescue operations, but were later removed from the area by the police.

According to a senior police official, the two children, who were trapped under the rubble were also rescued and sent to hospital but succumbed to their injuries.

"Both of them are brothers and were declared brought dead by the doctors at the hospital. An elderly man identified as Ramji Das was also rescued from the debris and he sustained head injury," said the

senior police official. "The children were passing

by the road with their mother when the building collapsed and the two brothers got trapped under the debris. A case will be registered in the matter and legal action will be taken accordingly," he said.
"The Delhi Fire Service

(DFS) received a call about the incident at 11.50 AM following which five fire tenders and rescue teams were rushed to the spot. Later two more fire tenders were dispatched for the spot," said Atul Garg, the director of DFS.

Teams of North Municipal Corporation Delhi (NMC), NDRF among others were at the spot and were participating in the rescue operation.

"On the ground floor of the building, there was a sweet shop whereas the upper floors were reportedly residential in



the upper floors of the building were vacant and no construction activity was going-on. Further, no complaint regarding any unauthorised construction in the said building was received from any source in the Building Department, Civil Lines," said an official of the NMC. "An inquiry has been

ordered by the Commissioner, NMC in this unfortunate incident to be conducted by the Building Department (HQs) and directed for submission of

report within seven days. Further, necessary action against delinquent officials, if any, will be taken after receipt of the report," he said.

After the incident, the Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal said he is closely monitoring the situation.

The incident of building collapse in Sabzi Mandi area is very sad. The administration is engaged in relief and rescue work. Through the district administration, I am monitoring the situation," he tweeted in

Delhi reports 17 new Covid-19 cases, zero deaths; positivity 0.04%

Delhi reported 17 new Covid-19 cases and zero death on Monday, while the positivity rate stood at 0.04 percent. According to data shared by the health department, 40,399 tests were conducted a day ago to detect Covid-19. It included 30,266 where RTPCR, CBNAAT and TrueNat tests while 10, 133 were rapid-antigen tests.

"The number of containment zones declined to 92 on Monday while the death toll was 25,083. The case fatality rate stood at 1.74 per cent. While, on the vaccination front, 10621955 beneficiaries in Delhi have received at least one dose since the inoculation exercise started on January 16, according to Government data," it said. The Capital has recorded

only one fatality due to the infection in September so far.

With the new cases, the overall infection tally in the city climbed to 14,38,250. Of this, over 14.12 lakh patients have recovered from the infection. The death toll stands at 25,083 according to the bulletin.

VACCINE DELIVERY BY DRONES

ICMR, IIT-B allowed use to reach rough terrains

The Ministry of Civil Aviation on Monday granted conditional exemption of usage of drones from the existing rules for ICMR to allow it to experiment delivery of Covid-19 vaccines in inaccessible and rough terrains of regions of Andaman and Nicobar, Mizoram and Nagaland. According to a statement from the Ministry of Civil Aviation (MoCA) and Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA), allowed conditional exemption from Drone Rules, 2021 granting the two premier institutes in the country to use the ultra manned vehicles.

Foodgrain output likely to touch record 150 mn tonnes this year

PNS NEW DELHI

ndia's foodgrain production is likely to touch a new record of over 150 million tonnes in the Kharif season of the 2021-22 crop year (July-June) due to good rains.

The Agriculture Ministry is expecting foodgrain production to be more than 150 million tonnes in the Kharif sea-

son this year, higher than 149.56 million tonnes achieved in the same season of the 2020-21 crop year. "We have received good rains so far this year. Total Kharif foodgrain production was 149.56 million tonnes last year as per the fourth estimate. As there is likely to be an increase in area under pulses and paddy, foodgrain produc-tion will definitely be much higher than last year's Kharif season," Agriculture Secretary Sanjay Agarwal said on

Sowing of Kharif (summer) crops like paddy, which begins with the onset of the Southwest monsoon from June, will get over by the end of this month. Harvesting in most of the parts will commence from October.

The first estimate of the country's overall foodgrain production for this Kharif season will be released around September 15, he said. Agarwal said Kharif foodgrain production has been pegged higher despite area sown to summer crops so far remaining lower by 10 lakh hectares compared to the year-ago period, as the ministry is expecting the gap in the coverage to get reduced by the end of September. Total area sown to Kharif

crops reached 1,096.70 lakh hectares till September 10 this year as against 1,106.57 lakh hectares in the year-ago period, he said. Intubation is a procedure where a tube is inserted into the windpipe to make it easier to breathe

The research, published in the journal Nature Medicine, also found that the antibody profile in the blood of people who have had the virus is extremely variable and this may modify the response to the treatment. Convalescent plasma therapy uses blood from people who have recovered from an illness to help others

India had dropped convalescent plasma therapy (CPT) from its national clinical management protocol for Covid-19 in May itself. The Canadian researchers

also found that patients receiving convalescent plasma experienced significantly more serious adverse events than those receiving standard care.

The majority of those events were an increased need for oxygen and worsening respiratory failure, they said. However, the rate of fatal incidents was not significantly different from the control group of patients who did not receive the blood.

The clinical trial, called CONCOR-1, included 940



The trial found that con-

valescent plasma had highly variable donor antibody content due to the highly variable immune response to the virus. Different antibody profiles

in the convalescent plasma were observed to significantly impact whether or not patients experienced intubation or Unfavourable antibody

profiles, meaning low antioody titres, non-functional antibodies or both, were associated with a higher risk of intubation or death.

"These findings may explain the apparent conflicting results between randomised trials showing no benefit, and observational studies showing better outcomes with higher titre products relative to low titre products," said study coprincipal investigator Jeannie Callum, an associate scientist at the Sunnybrook Research Institute in Canada.

"It appears that it may not be that high-titre convalescent plasma is helpful, but rather that low-titre convalescent plasma is harmful," Callum said.

The researchers noted that the harm may come from the transfusion of convalescent plasma containing poorly func-

Tn a first, the Centre has **⊥**decided to cross check land records before the procurement of paddy from next month in a bid to ensure the MSP reaches farmers and not traders. Most procuring states, Āssam Uttarakhand as well as Jammu and Kashmir, are ready and have also integrated digital land records with the Centre's nodal procurement agency Food Corporation of India (FCI) for this purpose.
Asserting that this new

mechanism is in the interest of farmers, Food Secretary Sudhanshu Pandey said the crop cultivated by farmers whether in their own land or in rented land will be procured by the government. "It is not necessary for farmers to own the land or not. If farmers have cultivated any land, that will be procured," he said.

The whole idea is to cross check how much crop has

said, adding this is where digital land records integrated centrally with FCI will help during the procurement process. The main objective behind this mechanism is that the government procures the crop from genuine farmers and not from traders.

India—Africa defence talk to be held alongside DefExpo

With the objective of further strengthening defence and strategic ties, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh will host his counterparts from African nations in the next India- Africa Defence Dialogue on the sidelines of the DefExpo to be held at Gandhinagar, Gujarat in March next vear.

The broad theme of this India Africa Defence Dialogue will be 'India - Africa: Adopting Strategy for Synergizing and Strengthening Defence and Security Cooperation, 'defence ministry officials said here on Monday.

India and Africa share a close and historical relationship. The foundation of India-Africa defence relations are based on the two guiding principles namely 'SAGAR', Security and Growth for All in the

Region' and 'Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam', The World is One Family. The first-ever India Africa

Defence Ministers Conclave (IADMC) was held in Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh in conjunction with DefExpo in February last year coorganised by the Ministry of Defence and Ministry of External Affairs.

This was the first in the series of Pan Africa events at the Ministerial level in the run-up to India Africa Forum Summit IV. A Joint Declaration, 'Lucknow Declaration' was adopted after conclusion of IADMC 2020 as an outcome document of the Conclave.

In furtherance of the declaration and in consultation with stakeholders, India proposes to institutionalise the India Africa Defence Dialogue during successive DefExpos to be held once every two years.

he BJP and the CPI(M) on I Monday fielded Priyanka Tibrewal and Srijib Das respectively from the high-profile Bhawanipore Assembly constituency against Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee. While the Chief Minister is a qualified lawyer the two contestants fielded by the BJP and the Left are legal practioners too making the Bhawanipore by-elections an all-advocates affair so to say.

While Das is a complete green-horn in terms of contesting elections, Tibrewal a vocal BJP leader and a Calcutta High Court lawyer unsuccessfully fought the April-May Assembly polls losing to TMC leader and minister Javed Khan from the Entally constituency in central Kolkata

When reminded of the towering personality she is contesting against Tibrewal said "there is nothing called a superstar in the field of elections because the voters of a democratically conscious con-stituency like Bhawanipore always weigh up the issues

more than anything else."

The BJP candidate who was earlier referred to as a "Bacchha" (a kid) by Banerjee's election-manager Firhad Hakim also said that "some people look like Bacchha but have explosive qualities ... let the time come and the Mr Hakim will understand whether I am a bacchha or a veteran."

The BJP would give the Chief Minister a taste of Nandigram --- where Banerjee was defeated by her onetime protégé-turned-BJP leader Suvendu Adhikari by 1,900 votes --- Tibrewal said. "Here the people of Bhawanipore has got a chance to give the Chief Minister a taste of Nandigram

... I think they will not miss out on that opportunity."
State BJP president Dilip

Ghosh on the other hand said that "the BJP has come to fight the elections with high spirits as we are the principal opposition party in Bengal ... we will go all out to win the elections about which we are pretty confident... the TMC should remember that no one becomes a star overnight ... even Mamata Banerjee was a newcomer when she created history by defeating in her first election a political heavy-weight like Somnath Chatteriee in 1984.

While Karnataka Chief Minister Basavaraj Bommai hailed the service of Oscar Fernandes to the state and nation, former CM H D Kumaraswamy said Oscar Fernandes looked up to the Congress as a mother figure and loved



"It is a personal loss for me. He was a guide and mentor to many of us in the Congress party. He will be missed and fondly remembered for his contributions," Congress leader Rahul Gandhi said in a tweet.

Farmers in western TN agitated over shifting of organic farming centre

 $R^{\text{esentment is brewing up}}_{\text{among thousands of organ-}}$ ic and natural farmers spread across the districts of Coimbatore, the Nilgiris, Tirupur, Erode and Dindigul following the announcement by the DMK Government that the headquarters of Tamil Nadu Organic Certification Department at Coimbatore would soon be shifted to Chennai.

The TNOCD was launched with the objective of ensuring sustainable productivity without the use of artificial external inputs such as agro chemicals, fertilizers and pesticides, said G K Nagaraj, president of the Agricultural Wing of Tamil Nadu BJP, who is a lead farmer in the region. He said the decision to shift the head quarters comes at a time when the entire Kongu region consisting of the seven districts were on the verge of switching over to organic and natural farming.

The farming community in this region would be put to difficulties once the State

administration shifts the TNOCD to Chennai where there is no kind of natural farming. All of us may have to commute to Chennai to meet our needs for natural farming at this critical juncture," said Nagaraj who along with hundreds of farmers handed over a representation to the District Collector pleading with the government not to go ahead with the shifting. "This is yet another proof

of the indifference of the Tamil Nadu Government towards the problems faced by people in the western region. More than 30 per cent of the tax revenue of Tamil Nadu is generated from this region and we need a fair deal from the Government in Chennai," Vanathi Srinivasan, who represents Coimbatore South in Tamil Nadu Legislative Assembly. Srinivasan who is also the national president of the BJP's women's wing said that instead of shifting the TNOCD from Coimbatore, the Government should have modernised the centre by incorporating the new technologies that would benefit natural and organic farming.

Not so neat

The NEET exam in its current form continues to divide the Centre and several States

 \blacksquare amil Nadu wants to get rid of the National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (NEET) for admission to undergraduate medical courses for favouring rich and privileged students. The DMK Government also moved a Bill in the Assembly on Monday to "eliminate" NEET. The reason is a political storm in the State over the death by suicide of a farm labourer's son hours before he was to take Sunday's NEET exam because he had failed twice in the past and was afraid of failing for a third time. It is déjà vu of a similar suicide in the same State in 2017 that shook the nation, though nothing was done to address the malaise. A Scheduled Caste girl, also the child of a labourer, ended her life because she scored only 86 out of 720 marks in the CBSE-based NEET even though she passed her State board examination with 1176 marks out of 1200. Given the cut-offs that year, she would have



secured admission on the basis of her Class XII marks. She even had impleaded herself as a respondent in a Supreme Court case challenging NEET, but in vain. No admission test is worth the trauma of losing young students. The test should be subjected to a review because there is a discrepancy. The issues are not complex to understand. In Tamil Nadu, like in all States, the syllabi of the State board and the CBSE are not aligned. So, the NEET syllabus, based on CBSE, appears tough for the State board students.

Incidentally, the JEE Mains, for engineering seats, is also CBSE-based and yet controversy dogs only NEET. Majority of the students belong to the non-CBSE stream. Poor students who cannot afford private tuitions suffer the most. The Tamil Nadu parties insist that the admissions be left to the States. The Centre insists on a centralised procedure. The judiciary supports NEET. With neither the Centre nor the States attempting to find a middle path, the issue is turning political. What was a matter related to syllabus has already transformed into one between haves and have-nots. Some politicians are raising the insider-outsider binary, arguing that NEET may end up hurting local students while benefiting CBSE students who may be from outside Tamil Nadu. These are polarising arguments best nipped in the bud by taking a re-look at the syllabus. The revised NEET examination should not discriminate against students of any background, strike a balance between the CBSE and State boards syllabi and give weightage to Class XII marks. Given that medical education is a concurrent subject, the Centre and the States, as well as the Medical Council of India, should jointly finalise the syllabus. The second step is for students of State boards to get time to adjust themselves to the revised syllabus. There is no need to reject NEET. The point of a national education policy is lost in the absence of a nationally centralised admission system.

Happy tidings?

Vaccination is gaining pace while COVID-19 cases plummet; is it the calm before the storm?

any parts of the country, including the Capital, have seen a steady fall in the COVID-19 daily caseload in the last few weeks. The respite came after a horrid second wave that claimed thousands of lives while many continue to struggle. Several developments surrounding the virus and vaccination have surfaced lately, the most recent being Union Health Minister Mansukh Mandviya's tweet announcing that India has admin-



istered at least one dose of the vaccine to 75 crore citizens. The numbers are encouraging, but they did not come without a price. Poonam Khetrapal Singh, WHO's regional director, said while it took 85 days to administer the first 100 million doses, India reached 750 million doses from 650 million in just 13 days. Going by the current rate, India will be able to fully vaccinate about 43 per cent of its population by December end. According to the Health Ministry, all eligible people in even far-off places like Sikkim, Dadra and Nagar Haveli, Ladakh, and Lakshadweep have received at least one dose. Kerala, too, saw a considerable sink in the daily

log and reported 15,058 fresh cases and 99 deaths on Monday.

Bharat Biotech's Covaxin, which is one of the three vaccines currently administered in India, is expected to receive the WHO's nod of approval this week which would ease the international travel of Covaxin recipients. India, which was the largest vaccine exporter till April with over 66 million doses, has currently suspended export. The approval from the WHO is expected to facilitate exports as well. A few days ago, the Government stated that it had in August administered more vaccines than all the G7 countries combined, with more than 180 million doses. However, it does not justify the fact that only about 20 per cent of the country's population has been fully vaccinated yet. On the other hand, the G7 countries have fully inoculated more than 50 per cent of their respective population. Comparing the two would be absurd. However, it is noteworthy that a significant portion of the overly hesitant tribal population of the Nilgiri district of Tamil Nadu has been partially or fully inoculated. A recent study by the US's Centers for Disease Control observed that death risk increases 10 times in case of a non-vaccinated person, which is all the more reason to shun vaccine hesitancy or complacency and go for that jab right away.

When artists turned into Communists




There are no simple answers why many artists/writers gravitated towards Communism. They opposed Fascism but were purblind to Stalinism

nternationally renowned Greek composer Mikis Theodorakis (1925-2021) Arecently passed away in Athens at an advanced age of 96. Globally, he would be best remembered for his music in films like 'Zorba the Greek', 'Z' and 'Serpico'. However, in his death, he was also recalled for something more. It was his strong commitment to Marxist ideology, for which he had suffered privation, incarceration, torture and exile in different phases of life. An immensely gifted Theodorakis could become an opulent virtuoso by monetising his talent. He did not disavow Communism, though he transcended it. Entire Greece mourned Theodorakis in his death, as they had celebrated the composer in his lifetime.

This brings us to the broader question why a number of leading artists, writers and creative personalities in the 20th century gravitated towards the Communist ideology. Communism never projected itself as 'artistic' as candidly as it claimed itself to be 'scientific'. The simplest answer would be that many artists/writers felt inspired by the vision of an egalitarian society, oppression-free world and warless international order that Communism promised. A more complex psychological explanation would be that artists/writers who moved in the subtle world of ideas, colours, rhyme and melody — saw in Communism an opportunity to change the world. Being the "unacknowledged legislators of the world", as Percy Bysshe Shelley said of the poets, was a noble temptation. The opening line of a Hindi song by lyricist Shailendra would sum it up: "Tu zinda hai to, zindagi ki jeet mein yakin kar/Agar kahin hai swarg to utaar laa zameen par (If you are alive, believe in the triumph of life/If there is a heaven somewhere, bring it down upon earth). Shailendra himself was a Communist, and his song became an anthem in Indian People's Theatre Association (IPTA).

The devastation caused by the First World War, followed by rise of ultranationalist ideologies like the Fascists and Nazis, was a trigger for emergence of progressive litrature/art not only in Europe but far-off India. It was difficult to think of Berthold Brecht without the background of Inter-War period. into that "Big Tent". Paucity of



Maxim Gorky, the iconic Russian author and member of Communist Party himself, wrote an unflattering description of the Bolshevik horrors. Gorky, "conscience of the Revolution", became an inconvenient person, and sent to Germany, by the Russian leadership. Yet, he could not stir up the conscience of Europe on Bolshevism as he had about Czarist repressions once. Brecht's poem Grabinschrift für Gorki (Epitaph for Gorky) is so weak in comparison to his anti-Fascist poems that it was better that he never wrote it.

Anti-Fascism provided the trigger for "organising" Progressive Literature and Culture in India in the 1930s. The Communists merely fitted

This columnist had to depend upon the memoirs of exact contemporaries author-filmmaker Khwaja Ahmad Abbas (1914-87) and Communist researcher Chinmohan Sehnabis (1913-1987) to understand the growth of progressive litera-ture and theatre in Bombay and Calcutta. Abbas, one of the founding members of the Bombay branch of Progressive Writers Association (PWA) in 1942, dismisses the myth that PWA was a front organisation of the Communist Party of India. He informs that less than half of the PWA members were Communists. However, "there was such energy in them, and their writings, such mesmeric dynamism in their character and personality, such evangelical fervour in the talk" that the legend arose that PWA was a Communist "front" organisation (KAA, I am not an Island, P.227).

Similarly, IPTA was an "odd spectrum of deepest Red and zhich brought rich socialites, socialists and thousands of mill workers together. "They were united by their desire to revitalise Indian theatre and to use it as a medium of progressive thought" (KAA, I write as I feel, P.30).

Sehnabis provides a similar picture in his Bengali collective writings — "46: Ekti Sanskritic Andolon Prasange" (46: About a Cultural Movement). Here, the numerical stands for the address 46, Dharmatala Street, Kolkata, from where the Youth Cultural Institute functioned since 1941. The YCI was actuated by anti-Fascist outlook but its guest speakers were not confined to believers in Communism. The YCI literary gatherings, which include music and films, were equally popular with a wide section of people. Sehnabis emphasises that in those days, no dog-

matism of ideology prevailed.

This was how the Left entered the world of art and culture in alliance with others, but later gave a particular orientation to it. While one could criticise their dominance in the field of academia, media, historiography, literature and theatre, the criticism alone cannot provide an alternative. Left's influence is on the wane, but they worked methodically to achieve what they achieved.



FIRST COLUMN TOO BIG TO BE EQUAL?

The Party's basic failure is to create a society that is about as unequal as that of the US

ever mind the destruction of the relatively free society of Hong Kong (no emergency airlift like Kabul, but the number of people fleeing Hong Kong may ultimately be larger). Never mind the persecution of the Uyghurs, or the Orwellian surveillance society that the Communist Party is building, or the tens of millions who died in wars, famines and 'cultural revolutions' to bring equality to China. The Party's fundamental failure is to create a society, after seventy years of absolute power, that is about as unequal as that of the United States. Per capita incomes are still much lower in China than in the US. But since then, the gulf between the rich and the rest has inexorably widened until it now approaches the American standard. If you take the incomes of the top 20 per cent of the US population and compare them with those of the lowest 20 per cent of American earners, the wealthiest fifth earns 9.4 times more than the poorest fifth. In China, the top fifth earn 10.2 times as much as the bottom fifth. Drill down and compare



the incomes of the top 10 per cent with those of the bottom 10 per cent, the wealthiest tenth of Chinese people get 21.5 times more money than the poorest tenth. In the United States it's 18.5 times more. Americans are used to these disparities, and can console themselves with the myth of 'equal opportunity'. Chinese people are new to this situation, and the official ideology still says that people should be equal. That's the goal that supposedly justifies the perpetual dictatorship of the Party. So, the grotesque inequality is embarrassing for the Party, and potentially quite dangerous. Back in the days when the Chinese economy was growing at 8-10 per cent a year it could be ignored but the fast-growth era is over. Sooner or later the losers in the race will realise that they have lost permanently. Last May, Premier Li Kegiang revealed that 600 million Chinese citizens earn \$5 a day or less.

This is not a good look in a country that has more billionaires (1,058) than the United States, and the Party leadership is not stupid. Something must be done. That's why President Xi Jinping is talking up a new policy of 'common prosperity'. while also imposing stricter censorship and other social controls. The idea is to head off trouble by evening out the grossest inequalities and teaching the highest-flying billionaires a little humility: don't stall the economy, but spread the wealth around a little. The Party knew this day would come when it first abandoned Communist ideals forty years ago in order to escape from three decades of no growth. "Let some people get rich first." said Deng Xiaoping, and took the capitalist road. Rich capitalist democracies like France, Germany, Canada, and Japan manage to have income gaps between the rich and the rest only about half as big as the US and China. But the very biggest developed countries, China and the US, seem unable to manage it. Maybe it's just a question of size. Income disparities in the United States have been widening for forty-five years now, with grave social consequences, but being democratic doesn't enable the US to deal with it any better. Instead, American police have been turned into a militarised force that essentially manages the social results of the inequality by force. In 1970, there were 200,000 people in US prisons; now, there are 2.3 million. More than a quarter of adult Americans have a criminal record. What are the odds that the ageing autocrats who rule China will do any better?

Shun duopoly in telecom industry

elecom operators including Airtel, Vodafone Idea or Vi and Reliance Jio have submitted a charter of demands to the Centre.

They primarily relate to licence fees: reducing the license fee from three per cent of adjusted gross revenue (AGR) to one per cent, USOF (Universal Service Obligation Fund) contribution from five per cent of AGRto one per cent, spectrum usage charge (SUC) from 3-6 per cent (depending on when the operator acquired spectrum in respective bands) to a uniform three per cent for all operators,

A demand is also to extend the tenure of leased spectrum to operators from 20 years to 40 years. They want a7-10-year moratorium on payments (in addition totwo years already given). They demand reducing interest rate on all outstanding deferred payment liabilities (for acquiring spectrum) and outstanding AGR dues from 9-10 per centto four per cent or less, only telecom revenue be considered for levying license fee and SUC, early completion of the TRAI (Telecom Regulatory Authority of India) consultation paper on 'floor price for tariffs and waiver of financial and performance bank guarantees (BGs).

Reportedly, the Government has agreed to reduceSUC by per cent 'prospectively', allowadditional moratorium of two years for payments, consider telecom revenue only for AGR calculation 'prospectively' and reducing BG on AGR dues and deferred spectrum payments (DSP). Additionally, it has kept an option open for "converting a portion of Vi dues to equity after four years".

The above relaxations will ease cash flow of the operators, though there is scope as well as strong justification for doing more particularly with regard to levies. Under the current environment wherein, the operators are buying spectrum unlike in the past when it came bundled with the license - there is no logic in collecting license fee and SUC also. There is also no valid casefor continuing with USOFlevy (meant to fund building rural infrastructure) all the more when there is un-used money in the Fund.

Even so, a drastic reduction in the levies will not help in extricating a major operator from the financial disaster it is currently facing. The real culprits are the policies and regulatory environment that nave favored one player even while target ing others.

On the policy front, even as other operators paid gargantuan sums for obtaining license and spectrum, RJio got these at a throwaway price. It acquired an internet service provider (ISP) license from an unknown entity, Infotel Broadband Services Pvt Ltd (IBSPL) in 2010, and got with it pan-India broadband wireless spectrum (BWA) by paying ₹12,837 crore. In 2013, this was converted into a unified license (UL) to provide voice services also by paying an addition-

In September 2016, in a bizarre move rarely seen before, RJio entered the market with 'free' and 'unlimited' voice calls and low-cost data-a case of 'predatory' pricing. The incumbent operators were forced to reduce tariff drastically to match RJio.Post-revision, the tariff in India at less than \$ 1 per GB was a fraction of what customers in other countries pay (\$30 in Japan, \$18 Korea, \$15 the UK and 10 in USA). amended the Telecom Tariff Order (TTO) to define a firm to be predator, if in a relevant market (circle) it offers services at less than its average variable cost (AVC) and controls 30 per cent market share or above. During 2017-18, even as all firms were selling below AVC, incumbent operators had a market share above 30 pre cent whereas, RJio had a share of under30 per cent. In the eyes of the regulator, the former were predators even as the latter was not. The amended order being 'one-

sided' and 'discriminatory', was set aside by the Telecom Disputes Settlement Appellate Tribunal (TDSAT). But, by the time TDSAT gave its verdict (December 13, 2018), the damage was already

As a result, incumbent operators, who were making profits prior to RJio's entry, started incurring losses. Several operators downed shutters while others were bought over. Today, there are only three private operators — Vi, Airtel besides RJio — down from over a dozen prior to 2016. The hike in tariff - by all three operators in December 2019 - by up to 50 per cent may have given some breathing space but, at under \$2 per GB, the rate continues to be woefully

The other major factor that pushed Vi to the brink (besides Airtel) was the October 2019 order of the Supreme Court requiring them to pay "unpaid" dues towards licence fee and SUC. The "unpaid" dues resulted from a stance taken by DoT (upheld by the SC) that for determining these levies, apart from telecom services revenue, AGR should also include revenue from non-telecom services viz. rent, profit on sale of fixed assets, dividend, interest etc.

The demand pertained to a period of over a decade being the differencebetween the levies should go for majority ownership amountcalculated by usingboth telecom and non-telecom revenue and actual paymentsmade by operators (based on telecom revenue only)'. Together with interest on differential amount, plus penalty and interest on penalty, this works out to ₹58,000 crore for Vi (₹36,000 crore for Airtel).


This has seriously undermined the finances of Vi and Airtel even as the impacton RJio was negligible at ₹13 crore. While, Airtel has somehow managed to come out of

the morass (helped to some extent by December 2019 tariff hike), Vi continues to be in doldrums due to the sheer magnitude of AGR and DSP liabilities totaling ₹160,000 crore. The concessions granted by the Government do little to address the huge handicap faced by Vi.

Left to fend for itself, the company will go into liquidation leaving only two operators which does not augur well for a population of 1.35 billion. The global experience shows that in markets with fewer operators, tariffs tend to be high. Under a duopoly, the risk of a steep increase will remain. The way forward is to give a special package to Vi say by converting a portion of its dues into equity but this should be done 'now' instead of waiting for four years (as proposed by DoT).

Given its huge customer base of around 255 million, massive network and quality of assets, potential for growth in telecom services, the Union Government and control over V₁ in lieu of its dues from the latter. However, this should be treated as one-off event; for efficient and profitable running, the firm must be ring-fenced from the bureaucracy.

Meanwhile, the Government should nudge TRAI to finalize its recommendations on 'floor price' for tariffs promptly and take steps to strictly enforce it. It should make sure that in the name of fostering competition, there is no repeat of

Trans-Asian rail connectivity: South Asian perspective

The new corridor could provide transport connections to ensure the development of landlocked countries such as Afghanistan, Bhutan and Nepal

o develop connectivity and boost commercial activity, ITI-DKD-Y(Istanbul-Tehran-Islamabad-Delhi-Kolkata-Dhaka-Yangon) route has been long proposed as the major rail freight transport corridor. It has great potential and can have a positive impact on the

economy of the sub-region and of the countries involved. The proposed ITI-DKD-Y corridor will be part of the Southern Corridor of the Trans Asia route (TAR), which is the least integrated, but crosses the most populoussub-regions in the world with a maximum potential of consolidating Asia's industri-

al activity. The new corridor could provide transport connections to ensure the accessibil-

ity and development of landlocked countries such as Afghanistan, Bhutan and Nepalbecoming an artery for intra-regional trade.

Currently, the Turkey-Iran part of the corridor is operational. There is no sanction plan for construction of a rail link to Moreh from Imphal and is not likely to happen in the near future.

The other route to Mayanmar is through Bangladesh Railway network. Chittagong-Dohazari-Gundum(Cox bazaar route) and further on to Maynmar. This needs Chittagong-Cox Bazar rail network to be completed and corresponding link to Yangon on Myanmar side also implemented. The gaps in both sides are too long to be bridged soon.



China asks US, world to step-up aid to Afghanistan

hina on Monday asked the US and the international community to take "active actions" to help ease the economic crisis in Afghanistan by providing aid to the war-torn country even as it called on the Taliban to stay true to its commitment not to allow terrorist

groups to operate from the Afghan soil.
"The Afghan Taliban should stay true to its commitment and earnestly make a clean break with all terrorist forces and take effective measures to crack down on them to avoid the spillover effects," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Zhao Lijian told a media briefing on Monday.

"Terrorism remains a common threat for the international community. China stands ready to work with other countries to deepen counter-terrorism cooperation to prevent Afghanistan from becoming a hotbed and safe haven for terrorism and jointly safeguard the regional peace and stability," he said.

the UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres appeal for aid to Afghanistan to prevent economic meltdown of the country, which would be a "gift for terrorists," Zhao said China has committed to provide 200 million Yuan (about \$31 million) aid comprising food, winter clothing and medicines to the war-torn country.

He said the international community should provide humanitarian assistance to Afghanistan. On September 8, Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi had announced at a conference on Afghanistan's neighbours organised by Pakistan that China would provide \$31 million aid to the war-ravaged country. "When security conditions

are ripe China will help Afghanistan to build projects and support the country's peace, reconstruction and development to the best of its ability, Zhao said. "This shows China's friend-

Geneva: The United Nations is hosting a high-level donors conference on Monday to drum up emergency funds for Afghanistan after last month's Taliban takeover of the country that stunned the world.

UN seeks \$606m

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres was leading the world body's call for more than \$600 million for the rest of this year in a "flash appeal" for Afghans after their country's government was toppled by the Taliban and US and NATO forces exited the 20-year war in a chaotic departure.

There are concerns that instability and upended humanitarian efforts, compounded by an ongoing drought, could further endanger lives and plunge Afghanistan toward famine.

The conference will put to the test some Western governments and other big traditional UN donors who want to help everyday Afghans without handing a public relations victory or cash to the Taliban, who ousted the internationally backed government in a light-

ning sweep.
The UN says "recent developments" have increased the vulnerability of Afghans who have already been facing decades of deprivation and violence. A severe drought is jeopardizing the upcoming harvest, and hunger has been rising. The UN's World Food Program is to be a major beneficiary of any funds collected during Monday's conference.

First foreign commercial flight after Taliban takeover lands in Kabul

An international commercial flight left Kabul on Monday, the first since the Taliban retook power last month, offering some hope to Afghans still desperate to leave the country.

The Afghan capital's airport was left trashed after USled forces finished a chaotic evacuation of more than 1,20,000 people, and the Taliban have since scrambled to get it operational with technical assistance from Qatar and other nations.

On Monday morning, a Pakistan International Airlines jet touched down in Kabul, before making a return flight to Islamabad. Around 70 people were on the flight to the Pakistani capital, mostly Afghans who were relatives of staffers with international organisations such as the World Bank, according to airport ground staff.

"I am being evacuated. My final destination is Tajikistan," said a 35-year-old World Bank evacuee, who did not want to give her name.

"I will come back here only if the situation allows women to work and move

Å 22-year-old university student said he was taking a one-month trip to Pakistan.

"It's like a vacation. I am sad and happy. Sad about the country, but happy to leave for some time," he said.

Nepal issues alert against possible spread of Nipah virus from India

Kathmandu: Nepal Government on Monday sounded an alert against the possible spread of Nipah virus, found in neighbouring India.

Early this month, a 12-year-old boy in Kerala succumbed to the infection, the first such incident three years after it wreaked havoc in parts of Kozhikode and Malappuram districts of the

Nepal's Ministry of Health and Population has urged the general public to remain alert to the possible risk of Nipah Virus (NIV) infection after its outbreak was reported in India.

Health Ministry spokesperson Dr Krishna Prasad Poudel said in a press statement on Monday that the risk of the virus outbreak and spread in Nepal could not be ruled out as Nepal and India share open borders. 'The infection of the deadly NIV, which is

New Bill can help Indians,

get Green Card in US by

paying supplemental fee

Millions of people stuck for years in the employmentbased Green Card backlog in the US, including a sizable number of Indians, can hope for a lawful permanent residency in America by paying a supplemental fee if a new

House Bill is passed into law. The move, if included in the reconciliation package and passed into law, is expected to help thousands of Indian IT professionals who are currently stuck in an agonising Green

Ćard backlog. A Green Card, known officially as a Permanent Resident Card, is a document issued to immigrants as evidence that the bearer has been granted the privilege of residing permanently in the US.

According to the committee print released by the US House of Representatives Iudiciary Committee, which has jurisdiction over immigration, an employment-based immigrant applicant with a "priority date that is more than 2 years before" can adjust to permanent residence without numerical limits by paying a "supplemental fee of \$5,000."

The fee is \$50,000 for the EB-5 category (immigrant investors). The provisions expire in 2031, the Forbes

For a family-based immigrant who is sponsored by a US citizen and with a "priority date that is more than 2 years before", the fee for getting a Green Card would be \$2,500. The supplement fee would

be \$1,500 if an applicant's priority date is not within two years but they are required to be present in the country, according to the committee print. This fee would be in addition to any administrative processing fee paid by the applicant.

However, the bill does not contain permanent structural changes to the legal immigration system, including eliminating country caps for green cards or increasing the annual quotas of H-1B visas.

Before becoming law, the provisions would have to pass the Judiciary Committee, the House of Representatives and the Senate and be signed by the president, the report said. According to a report in

CBSNews, if successful, the legalisation plan would allow undocumented immigrants who came to the US as children, Temporary Protected Status (TPS) beneficiaries, farmworkers and other pandemic-era essential workers to apply for permanent US residency, or green cards.

Xi praises PLA's model **border battalion in Tibet**

hinese President Xi Jinping has praised a border-guard battalion in Tibet, which shares boundary with the Indian state of Arunachal Pradesh, saying its troops have done a "great job" in the past five years, offi-

cial media here reported. Xi visited Nyingchi, the Tibetan border town close to Arunachal Pradesh in July, becoming the first Chinese President to visit the remote border areas in Tibet.

"President Xi writes back to a plateau-stationed borderguard model battalion, saying they have done a great job in the past five years and encouraging them to make new contributions to the Party and the people," the state-run Global Times reported on Monday.

The model battalion is under the Xizang (Chinese name for Tibet) Military Command of the People's Liberation Army (PLA), it said.

Xi commended the battalion members for their remarkable efforts in guarding China's border region, noting that they have dedicated their youth to securing the country's territorial integrity and have accomplished their missions well state-run Xinhua news agency reported. Border troops are on the frontline of strengthening China's national defence and shoulder massive responsibilities, said Xi in the letter.

He called on them to continue to strengthen their sense of responsibility, carry forward fine traditions, and enhance their combat readiness in order

to perform their duties well.

The battalion is stationed

in a region with an average altitude of over 4,800 meters. The lowest temperature in the region reaches minus 40 degrees Celsius, and strong wind blows for over 200 days a year, the Xinhua report said. In 2016, Xi bestowed spe-

cial honours on a PLA military battalion posted in Tibet for its "outstanding performance in safeguarding borders". Xi, who heads the Central

Military Commission (CMC) the overall command authority of the PLA, signed orders to give honorary titles for the battalion in 2016.

'Troop 77656 is now titled as a 'model plateau battalion' for its outstanding performance in safeguarding borders, ensuring stability and helping disaster relief," the state-run Xinhua news agency had said in a report in August 2016.

The model plateau battal-

ion is reportedly one of the six battalions functioning under the Tibet Military Area Command. China claims Arunachal

Pradesh as part of South Tibet, which is firmly rejected by India. The India-China border dispute covers the 3,488-km Line of Actual Control (LAC).

KYC frauds: RBI cautions public not to share account details, passwords with unidentified agencies

PTI MUMBAI

The Reserve Bank on ■ Monday cautioned people against frauds in the name of KYC updation and advised them not to share key information like account details or passwords with unidentified persons or agencies.

In a release, the RBI said it has been receiving complaints/reports about customers falling prey to frauds being perpetrated in the name of KYC updation.

'The usual modus operandi in such cases include receipt of unsolicited communication, such as, calls, SMSs, emails, etc., by customer urging him/her to share certain personal details, account / login details/ card information, PIN, OTP, etc. Or install some unauthorised/ unverified application for KYC updation using a link provided in the communication," it

Such communications are

also reported to carry threats of account freeze, block or clo-

Once the customer shares information over call/message/unauthorised application, fraudsters get access to his/her account, the central bank noted.

"Members of public are hereby cautioned not to share account login details, personal information, copies of KYC documents, card information, PIN, password, OTP, etc. With unidentified persons or agencies," RBI said.

Also, such details should not be shared through unverified or unauthorised websites or applications. In case they receive any such requests, customers should get in touch with their bank

The RBI further said that while the Regulated Entities (REs) are required to undertake periodic updation of KYC, this process has been simplified to



The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) defines endemic as the constant presence and/or usual prevalence of a disease or infectious agent in a population within a geographic area. This observed baseline or the endemic level of the disease is not necessarily the desired level, which may in fact be zero. The disease may continue to occur at this level indefinitely, in case of lack of any intervention and assuming that the disease level is not high enough to exhaust the entire pool of susceptible persons. Therefore, this baseline level is often regarded as the expected level of the disease in the population. Because of the difference in timing of achieving herd immu-

nity in various populations and nations and the uncertainty in duration of protection from COVID-19 vaccines, it is likely that some measures such as booster vaccines might be required indefinitely. SARS-CoV-2 will continue to exist. Even when a country reaches herd immunity, ongoing surveillance, booster vaccines, and potentially other measures may be required. As of now, Delta variant has effectively shifted the overall herd immunity out of reach in most countries at least in the short

This has prompted some developed countries to start offering booster doses to high-risk populations or planning for their roll-

Therefore, many countries including India would like to reach a stage of endemic COVID-19. But India remains as an at risk country for significant waves of the disease. The overall immunity is low, owing to the fact that large part of the Indian population is not yet fully vaccinated. The possible time frame for India to manage COVID-19 as an endemic disease is also less clear. There has to be a shift in focus of public-health efforts from managing COVID-19 case counts to managing severe diseases and deaths when the Delta driven wave of cases decline.

The challenges in reaching endemicity as the endpoint continue to be the emergence of new variants that evade vaccinemediated immunity. They frequently cause severe disease in the vaccinated persons and are highly transmissible, waning of natural and vaccine-mediated immunity over time, rolling out vaccine booster doses quickly enough to maintain immunity and defining an acceptable burden of disease (for example, setting different targets for disease burden in vaccinated and unvaccinated populations). The biggest task will be determining what burden of disease is low enough to warrant lifting of public-

However, with time, against all odds, we will be better protected against hospitalisation and mortality due to COVID-19 owing to more vaccination coverage, natural immunity from prior infection, booster doses, full approval of vaccines in India and authorisation of vaccines for children.

The Nipah virus is again taking rounds after a death of a 12-year-old boy was reported in Kerala's Kozhikode district. How worried should we be? SUPRIYA RAMESH talks to experts to know more about the virus

ripah virus (NiV) was first recognised in 1999 during an outbreak among pig farmers in Malaysia. In India, its first outbreak was reported in Kozhikode, a district of Kerala, which has spread via Bangladesh. While the first case of NiV was reported three years back, recent news is suggestive of its third outbreak since then. NiV infection is a zoonotic ill-

ness that is transmitted to people from animals and the primary source of the NiV are bats. It can also be transmitted to human either through contaminated food or can be directly contagious. "While it was also noted that the virus had a tendency to severely affect pigs, consumption of virus factor," Dr Ashutosh Shukla, Senior Director - Internal Medicine & Medical Advisor says.

Even though it is a known disease, the reappearance of the virus is a matter of concern and thus all possible preventive measures need to be taken before it engulfs the planet just like the COVID pandemic. "In severe infections, a person may die on the spot, but other symptoms may include acute respiratory illness, vomiting, headache and neck stiffness, and the complications increase when the virus starts affecting the brain and the nervous system, leading to swelling in the brain and eventually death," says Shukla.

According to the World Health

Organisation (WHO), Nipah virus infection in humans causes a range of clinical presentations, from asymptomatic infection (subclinical) to acute respiratory infection and fatal encephalitis.

NiV is primarily diagnosed through Polymeric Chain reaction (PCR) as done in cases of dengue or other viral ailments. Early detection and monitoring is the key to prevent complications. Currently, there are no licensed treatments available for NiV infection and it is limited to supportive care, including rest, hydration, and treatment of symptoms as they occur.

WHO reported that initial signs and symptoms of Nipah virus infection are nonspecific, and the diagnosis is often not suspected at the der accurate diagnosis and creates challenges in outbreak detection, effective and timely infection control measures, and outbreak response activities. In addition, the quality, quantity, type, timing of clinical sample collection and the time needed to transfer samples to the laboratory can affect the accuracy of laboratory results.

The case fatality rate is estimated at 40% to 75%. This rate can vary by outbreak depending on local capabilities for epidemiological surveillance and clinical management. Usually the infection of Nipah virus occurs through the contaminated bodily fluids. In that case, the infectivity rate is not very high but if it is not maintained in the local

spread, it might be of great concern," says Dr Ankita Baidhya, Consultant, Infectious Diseases.

The symptoms include high fever, vomiting, headache and neck stiffness and the complications increase when the virus starts affecting the brain and the nervous system. Infection can cause mild to severe disease including swelling of the brain leading to death. Symptoms typically appear in 4-14 days following exposure to the virus. "The illness initially presents as 3-14 days of fever and headache, and often includes signs of respiratory illness, such as cough, sore throat, and difficulty in breathing. A phase of brain swelling may follow, where symptoms can include drowsiness, disorientation, and ly progress to coma within 24-48 ³ Shukla tells you.

Like in any other disease, early detection and monitoring is a must. And even though communication of the virus through humans is less common, it is more important to follow precautionary steps to prevent it from spreading. If you are living somewhere a lot of bats are found, you should be extra careful. In Kerala, where a lot of bad population is there, people should be careful if any bat in the vicinity is found dead. "If people are reporting fever and headache and some sort of brain infection symptoms like forgetfulness, immediate testing should be done," Baidhya says.

Growing Up Jewish In India juxtaposes the resilience of jews in India with the the help of artworks by the Indian-Jewish artist, SIONA BENJAMIN, says ORI Z SOLTES

Growing Up Jewish In India – Synagogues, Customs, And Communities From The Bene Israel To The Art Of Siona Benjamin is a double delectation. Put together by Ori Z Soltes, professor of Art History, Theology, Philosophy and Political History at Georgetown University, it's an inspiring chronicle of the resilience of the Jewish community in India over the concommunity in India over the centuries and a tribute to the artwork of Siona Benjamin, who grew up in Mumbai's Bene Israel community and whose extensive portfolio reflects her background of being born Jewish in a country that is predominantly Hindu and Muslim but also gives ample space to other religions to flourish.

"The book came about because of a desire to produce a more substantial work on the art of Siona Benjamin than I (or anyone else, for that matter) had written up to this point, because I have long admired her work and the multi-faceted ways in which it presents not only as beautiful, but offers a social agenda directed to improving the world. The book grew, however, to encompass the larger matter of the diverse Jewish community within a very diverse India, and the fact that such diversity placed it in a position to be welcoming to the Jewish communities who arrived on Indian shores at various times from various places," shared Soltes in an interview.

"The book begins with a broad discussion of the arrival of Jews into South and East Asia, followed by a slightly narrower discussion about the religious history of India and within that of the Jews immigrating to India, followed by three essays that focus on the three major Indian Jewish communities, before arriving at a memoir by Siona and an analysis of her work. She was the inspiration and remains a central part of the overall volume," he added.

The book is the outcome of intense research, of 'many, many hours reading everything' that Soltes could find about the Bene Israel, supplemented by questions to friends from that community.

"This book includes years of interest, study, and teaching and lecturing about India, about aspects of Jewish history, religion and culture, and about Jewish art and architecture and of course, writing and lecturing specifically about Siona's work. This includes many years of studying and also teaching Sanskrit and Vedic (texts), providing me with more of a linguistic basis for my understanding than could be achieved simply in translation," Soltes explained.


Benjamin's work, he said, makes use of the visual heritage of India — Hindu elements, such as the imagery of Krishna as well as of Siva Nataraja; Moghul stylistic elements Moghuls from the Persian miniature

All this is combined together with elements that resonate from the Byzantine Christian tradition (such as her sometimes lavish use of gold leaf); and symbols, like the sevenbranched candelabrum, that derive from the Jewish visual tradition as well as concepts like 'Tikkun olam'

anything and everything in my life and the consolation I felt after telling her, is irreplaceable and will always stay with me. Her strong sense of belief in her Jewish values taught me that it was not necessary to be strictly observant in all ways but to just carry the essence of who I was always with me," Benjamin writes in her 38page memoir in the book.

"In my work and life I find it important to stress not just the uniqueness of my culture but to try and cultivate the specifics of my culture, and to try to connect with a diverse universe of people. My transcultural Jewish upbringing taught me to use these specifics, but also to universalise, so anyone and everyone can hopefully identify with my work. This is what I would transmit to my own daughter; it is the gift I got growing up Jewish in India," she adds.

To what does Soltes ascribe the resilience of the Jewish community in India?

The resilience of the community is, I think, a function of two features in particular. One is that, as a global community, Jews have needed to learn how to be resilient over many centuries of more than frequent intolerance and sometimes very active persecution. In this respect the Indian Jewish community is similar to many other Jewish communities.

"However, the second element is India itself that, in its strong tendency to be open to varied perspectives on both humanity and divinity, due its own religious and cultural traditions, afforded to its Jewish communities the opportunity to flourish. the only time Jews experienced anti-Semitism was in the brief period in Goa — when the Portuguese were in charge. Being a tiny minority, even within an accepting majority culture, Jews experienced challenges with respect to defining their identity, which pushed them to flourish in India," Soltes explained.

He also noted that Indian Jews, most of whom currently live in complementary religious and cultural identities — India as their mother and Israel as their father".

"With that in mind, members of that population maintain consistent contact with India and its now even smaller Jewish population. I don't see any reason why that would change in the near future: the roadmap of the varied Jewish community is likely to continue along a landscape of maintaining a presence in India, even if that presence is accompanied, paradoxically, by their living for the most part elsewhere," Soltes maintained.

Thus, in combining discussions of the Indian Jewish communities with Benjamin's own story and an analysis of her artistic output — and in introducing these narratives within the larger story of Jews across eastern Asia — the book offers a unique verbal and visual portrait of a significant slice of Indian and Jewish culture and tradition. It would be of interest to Jews and non-Jews, Indian and non-Indian alike, as well as to history enthusiasts and the general reader interested in art and culture.





Want rescheduled Test to be fifth of series: Ganguly | Sad we ended up

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

he proposed "standalone" Test between India and England should be treated as the series-deciding fifth match that was cancelled last week owing to a COVID-19 outbreak in the Indian camp, BCCI President Sourav Ganguly told PTI on Monday and ruled out the possibility of it being treated as a one-

off game.

The England and Wales
Cricket Board (ECB) has written to the ICC seeking a Dispute Resolution Committee (DRC) verdict on the fate of the cancelled match that was to be played at Old Trafford, Manchester. The ICC is yet to comment on the matter.

"We want the series to be completed as this will be our first series win (in England) since 2007," Ganguly told PTI in an exclusive interview.

"The BCCI maintains that Test cricket is the ultimate format and we won't compromise it for anything," he made it clear.

India were leading 2-1 when the match was called off last week after the visiting players refused to step on to the field following positive COVID-19 cases among its support staff, including head coach Ravi Shastri.

A forfeiture will allow the ECB to get insurance reimbursement of 40 million pounds that, it claims, would help offset its losses because of the cancellation.

Asked if BCCI has offered to play two extra T20 Internationals



year for a white-ball series in lieu of the Test, Ganguly said: "We are ready to play extra ODI and T20Is and that's not an issue.

"Just that the Test match that will be played later will be the fifth match of the series."

If the ICC deems that the match was abandoned due to COVID-19, then India will officialwhen the team tours in July next ly win the series 2-1 as such a can-

cellation is considered an "acceptable non-compliance" under the World Test Championship rules.

There is precedence of series being cancelled because of COVID-19 in the past 18 months. The BCCI cancelled its home series against South Africa last vear which cost us around 40 to 50 million pounds," the former captain

He also hoped that in near future there will be concrete "medical advice" on offer that will allow series to go on even with COVID cases within the team.

"Because we understand how detrimental it is to the game in terms of spectators and viewers' interest (TV and OTT) especially when the series has been of such high quality. Test cricket is BCCI's foremost priority," he stated. Ganguly said that the BCCI is

"disappointed" that the match was called off but it could not have pushed the worried players beyond

"We are extremely disappointed that this series had to be called off. The only reason is COVID-19 outbreak and players' safety. We could only push them to a point.

"But the pandemic is so severe that one can only go that much distance," he explained.

Asked if the option of fielding a fresh team by resting some of the senior players, who were not comfortable, was considered, Ganguly answered in the negative.

"No that wasn't an option. If you see the Yogesh Parmar (the junior physio who tested positive just before the match) was a close contact of every player," Ganguly "So obviously that was a cause

of worry. It was something nobody had any control on and they (the players) had families travelling with them," he added, justifying the anxiety in the camp.

ECB CEO Tom Harrison had

also said that every effort was made to comfort the travelling players but the "perception of what might happen" made them fearful of playing.

Asked if he would try and sort it "amicably" with Harrison and ECB head Ian Whatmore during his personal visit to London on September 23, Ganguly said: "Even the Test match was called off amicably. I am going there and let's see, we will figure out something.

Benzema hat trick as Madrid makes winning return to Bernabeu

Vinícius Júnior sent his low shot into the net and rushed to the sideline, jumping over the barrier and going into the stands to be quickly engulfed by Real Madrid fans. It was a scene that wouldn't have been possible during the last 18 months. With goals by Vinícius Júnior and debutant Eduardo Camavinga and a hat trick by Karim Benzema, Madrid twice came from behind before comfortably beating Celta Vigo 5-2 in the

Spanish league on Sunday. The game marked Madrid's return to the Santiago Bernabéu Stadium more than 18 months after it was closed because of the coronavirus pandemic and a massive renovation project. "It was a special night for us," Benzema said. "I always say that we need the support of the fans and today they gave all they had to help us again."

The remodeling of the Bernabéu is not expected to finish until 2022 but the stadium reopened to a limited crowd of 19,874 in the first match at the venue since March 1, 2020, when Madrid defeated Barcelona 2-0 with Zinedine Zidane still as its coach. Defending champion Atlético Madrid earlier also needed to rally to avoid a disappointing result in a milestone match scoring two late goals - including one in the ninth minute of stoppage time - to beat Espanyol 2-1 in Antoine Griezmann's first game back since a stint with

Madrid took advantage of the prohibition on spectators in
