India's nightingale Lata falls silent

Eldest Mangeshkar sister breathes her last in Mumbai hospital

Lata Mangeshkar — who Nightingale of India and whose mellifluous voice will remain as immortal as her iconic song "Naam gum jaayegaa, Chehara ye badal jayegaa, Meri aavaaz hi pahachaan hai..." — is no more.

Considered blessed by Goddess Saraswati herself, 92 year-old Lata didi — as Lata Mangeshkar was known fondly by one and all — breathed her last after battling with pneumonia, Covid-19 and postrecovery complications for nearly a month, at the Breach Candy Hospital south Mumbai on Sunday morning, ironically a day after the nation invoked the blessings of the goddess of learning, thus bringing down curtains on her illustrious 79year-long music career.

Lata, whose iconic song "Aye mere vatan ke logon, zara aánkh mein bhar lo paani jo shaheed hue hain unki zara yaad karo qurbaani" continues to arouse patriotic fervour across the country, was cremated with full State honours at the Shivaji Park here. Prime Minister Narendra Modi himself flew 28 September 1929-6 February 2022



respects to her and bid adieu to the "Queen of Melody" who ruled the hearts and minds of film-goers across the country after she sang her first song for a Marathi film 79 years ago. Earlier in the day, Modi captured the mood of the country when he said that Lata had left "a void in our nation that cannot be filled?

A recipient of the Bharat Ratna, Padma Vibhushan, Padma Bhushan, Dadasaheb Phalke Awards and three National Film Awards, Lata had sung more than 15,000 songs in 36 languages and was considered a rare unifying force in the country. Born in Indore in 1929 in a family steeped in

eldest daughter of Marathi and Konkani musician Deenanath Mangeshkar and wielded a microphone at the age of 12 after the death of her father. She got a break in her career when she rendered her first Hindi song "Mata ek sapoot ki duniya badal de tu" for the Marathi film Gajaabhaau (1943).

Lata, who was the eldest among five singing siblings (Meena, Asha, Usha and Hridaynath) all accomplished singers and musicians, moved to Mumbai in 1945 along with master Vinavak's company. After landing in Mumbai, she took lessons in Hindustani classical music from Ustad Aman Ali Khan of Bhendi Bazaar

EC extends ban on roadshows for **Assembly polls**

PNS NEW DELHI

The Election Commission (EC) on roadshows will continue to remain in effect in poll-bound States but granted more relaxations for smaller physical public meetings in halls and outdoors.

For indoor rallies, a 50 per cent crowd of the capacity of the hall is allowed, while for outdoor rallies, 30 per cent of the capacity is permitted. The new relaxations will help political parties hold bigger physical campaigning events in the run-up to the polls in Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Goa, Punjab, and Manipur. The campaigning for phase one of the Uttar Pradesh Assembly elections on February 10 ends on February 8

This comes after the EC held a meeting with the secretary of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare on Saturday to assess the Coronavirus pandemic situation in the country and inputs from chief secretaries and chief electoral officers of the poll-bound States.

The Chief Secretaries had told the EC that there had been a "significant improve-ment" in the Covid-19 situation and a "considerable decrease" in positive cases and hospitalisation.

UP polls: Sonia not in star campaigners' list | Sri Lankan Foreign Min

Manmohan Singh, Raj Babbar don't figure either

PNS LUCKNOW

Congress president Sonia Gandhi, who represents Rae Bareli in the Lok Sabha, does not figure among the party's star campaigners for the fourth phase of Assembly elections in Uttar Pradesh.

The fourth phase poll on February 23 will see elections in five Assembly constituencies of Bachhrawan (SC), Harchandpur, Rae Bareli, Sareni and Unchahar that come under the Rae Bareli Lok Sabha constituency represented by Sonia Gandhi.

While party's interim chief Sonia Gandhi and former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh have not been included in the list for the fourth phase of UP polls, sources cited health issues as the reason for omitting their names.

Congress has also dropped actor-turned-politician and for-mer Uttar Pradesh party pres-ident Raj Babbar from the fourth phase campaign. This comes days after it left Lok Sabha MP Manish Tewari from its Punjab list. There were speculations of Babbar leaving the Congress and joining the Samajwadi Party. He was listed as a star campaigner along with Ghulam Nabi Azad in the first phase of UP polls.

Senior Congress leader Ghulam Nabi Azad and former party chief Rahul Gandhi and AIĆC general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra are among the 30 star campaigners that the party has named for the fourth phase of Uttar Pradesh assembly polls.

Azad, the former leader of opposition in Rajya Sabha, is a prominent leader of the 'Group of 23' who sought organisational overhaul and has been critical of the party leadership.

The Congress on Sunday released its list of star campaigners for the fourth phase of assembly elections in Uttar Pradesh on February 23.

Among the other star campaigners include Punjab Chief Minister Charanjit Singh Channi, Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot and Chhattisgarh Chief Minister Bhupesh Baghel. Former Rajasthan deputy chief minister Sachin Pilot, who had rebelled against the Congress government in the state, is also among the star campaigners for the fourth phase of Uttar Pradesh assembly elections.

Party leaders from Uttar Pradesh, Salman Khurshid, Pramod Tiwari, PL Punia, Rajiv

Shukla, Ajay Kumar Lallu and Aradhana Mishra 'Mona' have also been named as star campaigners by the party. Besides, former cricketer Mohd Azharuddin, Maharashtra cabinet minister Varsha Gaekwad, Gujarat PCC working president Hardik Patel and Rajya Sabha member Deepinder Singh Hooda are also in the list of party's star campaigners. AICC minorities cell head Imran

Pratapgarhi has also been named the star campaigner besides party spokesperson Supriya Shrinate among others.

Meanwhile, the Uttar Pradesh Congress has suspended four of its office-bearers, including party's Balrampur district chief Anuj Singh, for six years over charges of indiscipline. The other three suspended members are party's Balrampur district vice-president Akhtar Hussain, district general secretary Vinay Mishra

and Deepak Mishra. The four accused party members allegedly attempted to assault All India Congress Committee national secretary Satyanarayan Patel during a party meeting in Balrampur district last Friday. It is believed that the meeting was regarding ticket distribu-tion for the upcoming Uttar Pradesh assembly elections.

Satyanarayan Patel is a for-mer MLA and is considered close to the party high command. When asked about the matter, Congress party's Balrampur district chief Anuj Singh said that the allegations against him were 'baseless'.

"I have been a disciplined soldier of the party for 30 years. There was no assault. Some people were behaving indecently and we only tried to stop that. I will put my point across and also communicate the same to Sonia Gandhi," he

India on Wednesday extended a USD 500 million credit line to Sri Lanka to help it purchase petroleum products.

eign ministers are expected to delve into ways to further expand bilateral cooperation in diverse areas, including trade and investment.

The contentious fishermen issue is also likely to figure in the talks.On January 25, Sri Lanka had released 56 Indian

India's assistance of USD 500 million to Colombo came over two weeks after a virtual meeting between Jaishankar and Sri Lanka's Finance Minister Basil Rajapaksa. Last month, the island

nation signed a deal with the Sri Lankan chapter of Indian Oil Corporation (LIOC), Ceylon Petroleum Corporation (CPC) and the Joint Venture between LIOC and CPC to redevelop around 75 oil tanks in Trincomalee. The deal is expected to assist Sri Lanka in the development of Trincomalee as an energy and transport hub to further bolster

its energy security.

During Peiris's visit, India is also likely to convey to him the need for fulfilling the expectations of the Tamil people living in that country for equality within a united Sri

Thackeray's was the first-ever funeral held in full public view at the Shivaji Park.

The Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) had barricaded a 2,000 sq feet area at the Shivaji Park for the funeral. The BMC had also made available 25 kilograms of sandalwood for the funeral.

Earlier in the evening, the body of the singer – who died at the Breach Candy Hospital at 8.12 am was brought from the hospital to the Mangeshkar residence Prabhu Kunj at Pedder Road residence in south Mumbai around noon and was kept on the premises of the residence for public darshan for a couple of hours.

Several Bollywood personalities, politicians, and industrialists visited the residence to pay respects to her.

Lata's mortal remains -wrapped in the Tricolour - was taken to the Shivaji Park in a flower-decked cortege that carried a huge photo of a smiling

The band of Indian armed forces and Mumbai Police sounded the Last Post and rifle shots were fired in the air as a mark of respect to the departed soul.

The funeral procession began from Prabhu Kunj and headed slowly on a 10 km final journey to Shivaji Park. Several VVIPs like Minister Aditya Thackeray and Leader of Opposition Devendra Fadnavis Municipal Commissioner IS Chahal and others joined the funeral procession on

On its part, the Maharashtra Government has announced a 3-day State Mourning and declared Monday (February 7) as a public holiday as a mark of respect

Thousands of teary-eyed people had lined up along the 10-km long route from Pedder Road to Shivaji Park to have a last glimpse of the "Nightingale of India". Chants like "Lata Didi, Amar Rahe", "Lata Didi Zindabad" rent the air as a flower-decked cortege moved slowly towards Shivaji Park.

The EC said most of the chief secretaries and the special observers appointed for the polls had recommended easing restrictions. It said the health secretary informed the commission that the number of cases was on the decline in the country and the maximum cases being reported were from non-poll-going States.

In a statement, the EC said the ban on roadshows, padyatra, cycle/bike/vehicle rallies and processions will remain as of persons permissible for doorto-door campaigning fixed at 20 will also remain as before. Ban on campaigns between 8 PM and 8 AM will also continue as before. On January 31, the EC had further extended the ban on physical rallies and roadshows till February 11.

The EC said that restrictions regarding "outdoor meetings, indoor meetings, rallies" will be further relaxed subject to the condition that the number of persons attending these events will be limited to a maximum of 50 per cent of the capacity of indoor halls and 30 per cent of the open ground capacity or as fixed by district election officer as per the requirement of the social distancing norms, and whichever is less. "If the State disaster man-

agement authority has set the ceiling limits or percentage of the capacity for a number of persons attending indoor hall or open ground and they are stricter, SDMA guidelines will prevail," the EC said.

"Open ground rallies" can be held only on the grounds specifically designated by the district authorities and subject to compliance with all the conditions of SDMA. The organisers of the rallies need to set up seating arrangements to ensure adequate physical distancing, and the use of masks has been made mandatory at all times. The EC has stated that all provisions for hand hygiene and thermal screening. "An adequate number of hand sanitizers should be kept at the entrance as well as within the rally area," the EC stated. Capacities of these grounds will be fixed by the district administration well in advance and notified to all the parties.

"There should be multiple entry and exit points so that there is no crowding as people are coming and leaving the venue. All entrances must have adequate hand hygiene and thermal screening provisions," it said.

According to the EC, chief secretaries of poll going States have written to the commission and have apprised that there

appointed 228 expenditure observers and 15 former bureaucrats as special observers for the poll-bound States. "Many special observers have sent their reports and have stated that the Covid situation has improved substantially and the positivity rate has come down significantly," the EC said.

Shallow fog likely today in Capital

New Delhi: It was a sunny and pleasant Sunday in the national Capital as the maximum temperature settled at 24.2 degrees Celsius, a notch above the season's average, the Met office said.

According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), similar weather is likely on Monday with shallow fog in the morning and clear sky

The maximum and minimum temperatures would hover around 25 and 6 degrees Celsius. On Sunday morning, several parts of the city witnessed dense fog and the minimum temperature settled at 5.4 degrees Celsius, four notches below the normal. Delhi's air quality was recorded in the poor category. The air quality index (AQI) read 284 at 7 pm, according to the Central Pollution Control Board data.

The AQI in neighbouring Faridabad stood at 294, Ghaziabad 336, Greater Noida 258, Gurgaon 238 and Noida An AQI 256, it said. between zero and 50 is considered "good", 51 and 100 "satisfactory", 101 and 200 "moderate", 201 and 300 "poor", 301 and 400 "very poor", and 401 and 500 "severe"

On Saturday, the minimum recorded at 6.9 degrees Celsius, two notches below normal while the maximum settled at 19.5 degrees Celsius, four notches below the season"s average. On Thursday,

Delhi saw its maximum temperature go down by eight notches to 14.4 degrees Celsius, the coldest for the month of February in 19 years. On February 1, 2003, the national capital had recorded a high of 14.3 degrees Celsius.

2 police stations in Delhi to highlight contributions of Bhagat Singh, Gandhi to freedom struggle

Street and Tughlak Road police stations will soon be revamped to highlight their historical significance and connections to freedom fighter Bhagat Singh and Father of the Nation Mahatma Gandhi, officials said on Sunday. The two police stations, which

are drenched in multicolour lights every night, will soon have posters with quotes of Singh and Gandhi, reminding people about their contributions to the Indian freedom struggle.
Police officials said the idea is

to celebrate the two legends and create awareness among people about their history associated with the police stations.

Deputy Commissioner of Police (New Delhi) Deepak Yadav said, "Two of our police stations in the district -- Parliament Street and Tughlak Road are heritage buildings. We have already started facade lighting at these stations. However, taking it forward, we are now in the process of putting up posters with quotes on the walls of the stations to commemorate memories of our freedom fighter Bhagat Singh and Gandhiji.

'As part of the initiative, we have also planned to make arrangements to play 'bhajans' and patriotic songs within the available open premises of the two police stations," he said. Yadav said the work has already

begun. "At Parliament Street police station, we have already put up a huge board with lighting in the background with pictures and quotes of Singh and other related information in the gallery area," he

"At Tughlak Road police station, facade lighting has been put up but we are yet to put up posters of Gandhi ji. We are in the process of doing that," he added. At the entrance of Parliament

Street police station, a huge board with a photo of Singh on the right reads: "It is easy to kill individuals but you cannot kill the ideas. Great empires crumbled, while the ideas survived - Bhagat Singh." Singh was lodged in a lock-up at this police station in connection with the Assembly Bombing case

in April 1929. Elaborating why Singh was chosen, a senior police officer said at 12.30 pm on April 8, 1929, Singh along with freedom fighter Batukeshwar Dutt hurled two bombs inside the Central Legislative Assembly in the jurisdiction of Parliament Street police station. "They raised the slogans of Inquilab Zindabad' there and threw pamphlets into the hall. They did not flee and court-

ed arrest. 'An FIR was registered at Parliament Street police station and both of them were kept in the

lock-up of this police station. This act of Bhagat Singh is considered to be a part of one of the most illustrious chapters of the freedom struggle," the officer said.

The trial of the Assembly Bombing case began in the first week of June 1929. On June 12, both Singh and Dutt were sentenced to life imprisonment. In the meantime, they were connected to the 1928 John Saunders murder case in Lahore and arrested in that as well, the

Singh was taken to Lahore. After the trial, he was executed along with Rajguru and Sukhdev on March 23, 1931, he said.

Besides Singh's detention during the freedom struggle, the station is also known for the Bandit Queen case, the officer said. In Congress leaders Manmohan Singh, Sonia Gandhi and Rahul Gandhi were also detained at the police station for protesting against the BJP government.

The officer said Parliament Street police station was built in 1913 to protect the Raisina Hills encompassing the President House, North and South blocks as well as Parliament. According to police, Tughak

Road police station, which was built in the 1930s and set up in Gandhiji's assassination was reg-1941, is where the FIR of

Single-window facility ___

First private EV charging point installed at Munirka resident's home

New Delhi: Under the AAP Government's single-window facility, the first private electric vehicle charging point has been installed at a south Delhi resident's home under BSES discom BRPL area, a company spokesper-

son on Sunday. The single-window facility seeks to facilitate the rapid expansion of charging infrastructure for electric vehicles at private and semi-public places like apartments, group housing societies, hospitals, malls and the-The first private charging point was installed earlier this week at DDA Flats in south Delhi's Munirka, while the second one was installed next to it in east Delhi's Vivek Vihar, the BSES spokesperson said.

Consumers of BSES discoms BRPL and BYPL can get a private EV charging point installed through an online single-window portal (Switch Delhi) at their homes, group housing societies, multi-storey apartment complexes, RWA offices, commercial shops etc., through the empanelled vendors," he said.

Twelve vendors have been empanelled by the Transport Department for the installation of charging points.

For the promotion and expansion of the private

charging network, the government is providing a onetime subsidy of Rs 6,000 for the first 30,000 charging points. EV chargers can be purchased by consumers from the empanelled vendors through the single-window portal as per capex or subscription model. Under the capex model, the consumer makes the complete payment upfront to the empanelled vendor. Under the subscription model, the total cost to the vendor is paid by the consumer as equal monthly instal-

The private charging infrastructure development programme aims to create an enabling environment for the provision of private as well as public charging infra-

HC junks plea by farmers' society to restrain DDA from taking over land on Yamuna banks



seeking to restrain DDA from taking over the land on the banks of the Yamuna river, the Delhi High Court said it was an attempting to cling on to the land while they have been held to be unauthorised occupants.

It said since records show that members of the petitioner society, Yamuna Bank Kishan Bachao Morcha, are in unlawful occupation, the relief for compensation on the ground of DDA damaging the crop is not maintainable.

The high court said the society's members have violated the undertaking given to the Supreme Court that they would vacate the area by December 2019. "This writ petition is nothing but an abuse of the process of law and another attempt by the members of the petitioner society to cling on to the land while they have already been held to be unauthorised occupants and encroachers," Justice Subramonium Prasad

The high court said since the society ments over three years after which the charger gets transclaimed its members are farmers, the court was not imposing costs on the petitioner and dismissed the petition. It said the petition showed the petitioners are growing crops in the land which is prohibited by a 2015 order of the

National Green Tribunal. its plea, said it consists of farmers who had inhabited on the banks of the Yamuna river for over 100 years cultivating about 15,000 bighas

It said the members have proof of 'lagaan' being since 1932 till 2012, that the farmers were rowing radish, brinjal, potato and onion and hey cannot be deprived of the land without following the procedure as laid down under the

The plea said on November 8, 2020, DDA officials gathered at the Bela Estate with earthmoving machines and with police to evict the members of the society with an "intent to grab the land"

The Delhi Development Authority (DDA), represented through advocate Prabhsahay Kaur, said the NGT had held that Yamuna Plains are to be protected and no encroachment of any

kind is permitted there.
It said DDA has been entrusted with an affirmative duty to protect the river, its morphology and its flood plains. In a bid to fulfil this manate and keep the Yamuna floodplains encroachment free, the DDA undertakes regular demolition and removal actions, it said.

The Parliament is likely to be adjourned for an hour on Monday as a mark of respect to legendary singer Bharat Ratna Lata Mangeshkar, who was an

ex member of the Raya Sabha. With a two-day national mourning announced, both the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha are likely to be adjourned for some time keeping in view the precedent of adjournment for an hour when former President and an ex member of the upper House Pranab Mukherjee died.

Sources said Prime Minister Narendra Modi is likely to reply to the debate on the motion of thanks to the President's speech in the Lok Sabha on Monday evening and in Rajya Sabha likely on Tuesday and in this regard all the parties have issued whips to their Parliamentarians to be present in the house.

While the upper house proceedings are conducted till 3pm Lok Sabha begins at 4pm as per the arrangements due to covid pandemic.

Despite disruptions over Pegasus snooping issue, both the houses functioned very smoothly with Parliament recording 100 percent produc-

Significantly, the Rajya Sabha recorded hundred per cent productivity in the first week of the budget session during which the debate on the motion of thanks to the President's address was taken

The smooth functioning of the House was acknowledged and appreciated by Chairman M Venkaiah Naidu, who urged the members to continue with this spirit for the remainder of

The upper house made full use of the available 15 hours and 17 minutes during the first week of the budget session, clocking 100 percent productivity for the week, not witnessed often, officials said.

There were no adjournments due to disruptions during the week, unlike in the previous winter and monsoon sessions last year which witnessed frequent disruptions and adjournments.

After the Prime Minister's reply, the Union Budget for 2022-23 will be discussed for 11 hours and Finance Minister

Nirmala Sitharaman will reply on Friday.

To enable this, Private Members' Business on Friday has been dispensed with.

During the first week in Rajya Sabha, 25 of the listed starred questions have been replied to orally in three days of Question Hour and 31 Zero Hour and 14 Special Mentions were made by members during Zero Hour, reduced by half an hour per sitting, the officials

Rajya Sabha witnessed functioning for three consecutive days during the week without forced adjournments after year, the last time being March 15-17, 2021, during the Budget session last year, officials in the Rajya Sabha Secretariat have said.

The productivity of Rajya Sabha has been 100 percent or more for four consecutive Budget sessions of 2014 to 2017 and of regular Budget session in 2019, officials said.

The Election Commission (EC) has issued a notice to the Uttarakhand BJP for alleged violation of the model code and asked it to reply within 24 hours for tweeting a morphed image of former chief minister and Congress leader Harish Rawat. He has been shown as a Muslim cleric in the image.

The action comes after the Congress complained to the poll body on Friday, alleging that the BJP Uttarakhand from its official Twitter handle on February 3 at 9.34 PM tweeted a morphed image of Rawat, wherein he has been falsely depicted as belonging to a particular com-

Congress leader Randeep Surjewala had spoken to the CEC on Saturday and demanded the registration of an FIR against the BJP, while alleging that it has violated the model code and other provisions of the law, as it seeks to create disharmony on religious grounds between people of diverse faith. The said tweet has since been removed.

"Whereas, the Commission has carefully considered the matter and is of the considered view that the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) Uttarakhand has in violation of the clauses (I) & (2) laid down in the part 'General Conduct' of the Model Code of Conduct...Of Section-123 of the Representation of the People Act,

1951 and sub-section (I)(a) of Section 153(A) of the Indian Penal Code 1860, made statements that are provocative and can seriously incite the emotions and lead to breakdown of law & order situation thereby adversely affecting the election process," the EC said in its notice sent last on February 5.

therefore, Commission gives an opportunity to the BJP Uttarakhand to explain its stand on putting the morphed image of Shri Harish Rawat on its official Twitter handle as alleged by AICC, the poll body also said. The explanation, the EC said, should reach the Commission within 24 hours of receipt of this notice, failing which the Commission shall take appropriate decision in the matter without further reference to BJP Uttarakhand.

The Congress has also demanded that the said tweet be taken down immediately and the official Twitter handle of BJP Uttarakhand be suspended till the completion of the Assembly Elections in the State of Uttarakhand.

The Congress urged the Election Commission that it is vested with vast powers to ensure a level playing field amongst the political parties during elections and in a healthy and a peace loving democracy, use of religion to create divisiveness and disharmony has always been eschewed by the Commission.

Air India: A name chosen through opinion poll more than 75 years ago by Tata

New Delhi: Do you know how India's first airline 'Air India' got named? Air India was named via an opinion poll among Tata Sons employees over 75 years ago, in 1946. The Tata group also shared its monthly bulletin letter issued back in 1946, which stated that "to the innately democratic mind of the head of the Tata organisation, it seemed a good idea to let the selection be made by popular opinion in Bombay House through a sort of Gallup Poll or Sample Opinion

While sharing this information via social media, 10 days after the state-owned airline was handed over to the group, the Tata Group also shared two pictures, including an excerpt from the Tata Monthly Bulletin of 1946. Air India retweeted the tweets. The first tweet mentioned 'WHO NAMED AIR INDIA?' in a box with the background of an old Air India aircraft. It was followed by a tweet saying, "But who made the final decision? Read this excerpt from the Tata Monthly Bulletin of 1946 to know. #AirIndiaOnBoard #WingsOfChange #ThisIsTata" along with excerpt from the bulletin. "The choice for India's first airline company came down to Indian Airlines, Pan-Indian Airlines, Trans-Indian Airlines & Air India. #AirIndiaOnBoard#WingsOfChange," Tata Group said.

According to the bulletin, Tatas were faced with the problem of finding a name for the new Airline Company which they were forming to take over and extend the activities of the Tata Airlines which had hitherto functioned as a department of Tata Sons Limited. Voting papers were distributed to ascertain the views of

representative sections of opinion among Tata employees and they were requested to indicate their first and second pref-"The first count revealed 64 votes for Air-India, 51 for

Indian Air Lines, 28 for Trans-Indian Air Lines and 19 for Pan-Indian Air Lines. When the less favoured names had been eliminated, the final count showed 72 votes for Air-India and 58 for Indian Air Lines.

"Thus, the name of the new company comes to be 'AIR-INDIA'," the bulletin said.

As tobacco-induced cancer is emerging as a major public health threat in the country, top medical experts have suggested a three-pronged tobacco control strategy— public awareness, strengthening legislation and hiking taxes -- to make the cancerous item out of reach of the common man, especially kids.India reports at least 14 lakh new cancer cases and 8 lakh mortalities due to cancer every year. With at least 27 per cent cancer cases due to use of tobaccorelated products like cigarettes, gutka and khaini, the oncologists felt that passage of the proposed amendments for a stricter tobacco-control law, COTPA, will

menace "Tobacco products are major reason for various cancers and other diseases. In India, tobacco-related cancers (TRCs) contribute nearly half of the total cancers in males and one-fifth in females. This is scary," Dr GK Rath, former Head, National Cancer Institute, said at a webinar organised on the World Cancer Day on February 4. Equating tobacco with poison, he

said that it kills slowly given that tobacco consumption causes 17 types of cancers of which many are preventable. He also criticized tobacco firms for targeting children as young as ten years old by adopting various marketing strategies.

Dr Rath was equally dismayed at

some Bollywood celebrities engaged in surrogate advertisements of health hazardous items like gutka, luring impressionable minds to adopt the suicidal

"This is very unfortunate. We have been writing to them that how their action is harming the children and youth who take them as a role model," said at the event.

Experts suggest 3-pronged tobacco control strategy:

Dr Alok Thakar, Professor of headneck surgery and otorhinolaryngology at AIIMS, New Delhi, flagged the concern of rising oral cancer cases due to unabated sale and consumption of tobacco products like cigarette, beedi, khaini, tambaku, gutka and zarda.

"Since these are yet to be regulated in true sense and not many people are aware about its ill-effects, it will increase the country's health burden dramatically," he said.

Dr Rahul Bhargava, leading hemato-oncologist from Gurugram-based Fortis Hospital, echoed similar views and asserted that as long as tobacco products were easily available and affordable for poor and children, achieving 'Tobacco ree India' mission will remain a dream.

While stressing on strengthening the opulation-based cancer screening under the NPCDCS programme, Dr Bhargava pointed out that the burden from tobacco use amounted to Rs. 177,341 crores in 2017-18 which is 1 percent of India's GDP. He also suggested that reforming tobacco taxes provides an easy way for the government to raise much needed

According to an ICMR report, tobacco contains at least 69 cancer-causing agents. Yet another report by the National Cancer Registry Programme (NCRP), the number of new cancer cases in India is likely to increase from 13.9 lakh in 2020

to 15.7 lakh by 2025, a rise of nearly 20

Dr Rambha Pandey, Additional Professor, radiation oncologist, AIIMS, New Delhi lamented that women too are increasingly taking up tobacco consumption, viewing it as a 'fashion symbol'. "This is a very disturbing trend. The habit of smoking and chewing start at the age of 10-12 years among kids and once they get into the habit it is difficult to

Dr Pandey hoped that the stringent COTPA amendments having provisions such as ban on designated smoking zones (DSA) will help in cutting down tobacco consumption and thus cancer cases. People must be told that tobacco has no single benefit, she said.

'The link between tobacco consumption and cancer is very clear. There is a need to look into the financial toxicity caused by tobacco consumption resulting in cancer. A multi-pronged strategy focussing on awareness, higher taxes and stringent laws is needed to make these killer products unaffordable and inaccessible to make India healthy," emphasized Dr Rakesh Garg, Additional Professor of Anaesthesiology, Critical Care, Pain and Palliative Medicine, AIIMS, New Delhi.

According to the health experts, tobacco-induced cancers impact lungs, mouth, pharynx (upper throat), nose and sinuses, larynx (voice box), oesophagus (food pipe), liver, pancreas, stomach, kidney, ovary, bladder, cervix, and some types of leukaemia. Smoking causes other diseases too, such as heart disease and various lung diseases.

Jammu: Facing criticism over the withdrawal of vacancies referred to the Public Service Commission (PSC) and Service Selection Board (SSB) before October 31, 2019, the Jammu and Kashmir administration on Sunday said the posts would be advertised again for transparent recruitment.

"All the vacancies recalled by a recent decision of the administrative council would be referred again to recruitment agenvation and recruitment rules providing equal opportunity to all. A free, fair and merit-based selection shall be quickly ensured," an official spokesperson said. He said it is also clarified that the withdrawal of posts referred to the PSC and SSB before October 31, 2019 was done for those where selections were not made and results not declared. "It is important to note that a number of posts referred to PSC/SSB by various departments have remained stuck for a long time, in some cases, since 2004. Some of these posts could not have been advertised as they were against the recruitment rules," the spokesperson said. "Therefore, selection against these posts could not have been made. Withdrawing these posts was essential to ensure that they can be filled up as per rules in vogue and opening opportunities for youth of Jammu and Kashmir," he added.

Andhra employees agitating against pay revision withdraw strike

Amaravati: Marathon talks 2020. The amount would be between agitating employees Andhra Pradesh Government ended on a fruitful note late Saturday night, following which the former withdrew their call for an indefinite strike.

Thousands of Andhra Pradesh Government employees and teachers had marched on the streets of Vijayawada city on Thursday, in protest against the recent pay revision. They had threatened to launch an indefinite strike from Sunday midnight. The government conceded to the employees' demands and agreed to enhance certain benefits, including the house rent allowance (HRA), and also to undertake pay revision every five years.

The government committee comprising ministers and others was engaged in talks with the Pay Revision Commission Struggle Committee for over seven hours on Saturday, a follow-up to the seven-hour talks late Friday night.

The government said there would be no change in the 23 per cent fitment announced last month. Also, there would be no immediate adjustment of the interim relief dues for the period July 1, 2019 to March 30,

adjusted in the retirement benefits of the employees. Addressing a press conference at the end of the talks, government advisor (public affairs) S R K Reddy said the talks with the employees' leaders ended on a fruitful note as the government agreed to revise the HRA slabs as per the population (of a location).

Government employees in all the district headquarters would now get a 16 per cent HRA. State Secretariat and Heads of Departments staff, who relocated from Hyderabad after the state bifurcation, would get a 24 per cent HRA till June 2024. This is, however, six per cent less than what they have been getting so far.

The revised HRA slabs will be applicable from January this year. Similarly, retired employees in the 70-74 age group will get a seven per cent additional quantum of pension and those in the 75-79 age group will get 12 per cent,"

ic situation was done today and in view of a decline in the number of Covid cases as well as a decline in the positivity rate, it has been decided that full office attendance shall be resumed from tomorrow and employees at all levels, without any exemption, shall attend office on a regular basis with effect from February 7, 2022," the minister of state for per-

sonnel said. He said the heads of the

departments shall, however, ensure that the employees wear face masks at all times and continue to follow Covid-appropriate behaviour. The Centre ĥad, on January 31, extended the work-from-home arrangement for 50 per cent of its employees below the level of under secretary till February 15.

"But after obtaining inputs from the relevant quarters and a review of the situation, a fresh office memorandum has been issued by the Department of Personnel and Training (DoPT), informing that all the employees at all levels, without any exemption, will report to office from tomorrow, that is, February 7," Singh said.

There will be no "workfrom-home" option for any nployee anymore, he added. The personnel ministry

had, on January 3, issued an order allowing work from home for 50 per cent of the employees below the level of under secretary till January 31 in view of a spike in the number of coronavirus cases. PTI

Lab urges DCGI to register Sputnik as booster dose

PNS NEW DELHI

Drug major Dr Reddy's Laboratories has submitted a proposal to the Drugs Controller General of India (DCGI) to register Sputnik Light vaccine as a booster dose against Covid-19, a top company official has said.

The Hyderabad-based drug major had partnered with the Russian Direct Investment Fund (RDIF) to conduct the clinical trials of Sputnik V and distribute the vaccine in India in September 2020.Last year, the company received permission from the DCGI to import the Sputnik vaccine into India for restricted use in emergency situations in April.

"As regards to Sputnik, we are now ready with capacities in India. We are working actively with the Government of India for registering Sputnik Light as a vaccine and as a booster dose of Sputnik V," Dr Reddy's Laboratories CEO Erez Israeli said in an analyst call.

The drug maker has also submitted a proposal to DCGI to conduct a trial to test Sputnik Light as a booster to other vaccines, he added, according to a

The Voice

There may not be anymore songs coming from her but it has certainly not gone mute

he legend that gave voice to the finer emotions of at least three generations and ruled the Indian music industry for nearly 70 years has fallen silent. And the irreparable loss was palpable in the watery eyes and on the twisted-in-pain faces of lakhs of heartbroken people who paid their respects during the last journey of Lata Mangeshkar on Sunday evening, which incidentally was also the day of Saraswati Visarjan in Maharashtra, Goa and Karnataka. Named Hema in her initial years and fondly called Lata didi since, she started her career in 1942 and passed away at Mumbai's Breach Candy Hospital. She had been hospitalised for over 28 days after being diagnosed with COVID-19 and pneumonia. The songs she so effortlessly rendered ranged from happy, peppy, playful, naughty, romantic, melancholic, downright sad, folk, religious and patriotic. It's famously recalled that when she sang the iconic song '.. Ae mere watan ke logon, zara aankh mein bhar lo paani...' live in the presence of then President S Radhakrishnan and Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru on the Republic Day in 1963 at the National Stadium in New Delhi while commemorating Indian soldiers who had died in the 1962 war with China, tears welled up in



the eyes of the latter leader and it made our collective heartbeats spring an octave. Popularly called the 'Nightingale of Bollywood', Lata, along with her younger sister Asha Bhosle, for decades ruled the roost and hearts of music aficionados across age groups and geographical barriers.

She holds the honour of being the first Indian to perform at the prestigious Royal Albert Hall, London. In her long career, Lata worked with the greatest of Indian composers and music directors, though OP Nayyar remains an exception. She was so passionate about her craft being impeccable that thespian

Dilip Kumar once made a mildly disapproving remark about her pronunciation while singing Hindi-Urdu songs, so for a period of time she took Urdu lessons. It is alleged that the sisters, who in their heyday were known to split between them four of every five songs recorded, discouraged film producers and music directors from using the voice of other talented, upcoming singers; else they would throw a tantrum or even boycott their songs. They shared the microphone to sing around 80 songs together and belted out several unforgettable numbers such as Kya hua, ye mujhe kya hua (Jis Desh Mein Gangta Behti Hai); Koi ayega ayega (Professor); Jab jab tumhe bhulaya tum aur yaad aaye (Jahan Ara); Paake akeli mohe chhed raha (Jail Yatra); and Mann kyun behka ri behka aadhi raat ko (Utsav). Listing her bibliography here would amount to holding a candle to the sun, but the Bharat Ratna recipient sang in over 1,000 Hindi films, and also across multiple languages. Considered one of the greatest Indian playback singers, she will live on through her melodies: Naam gum jaayega, chehra ye badal jayega; meri awaaz hi pehchan hai, 'gar yaad rahe...

Tangled issue

The Karnataka college uniform row will keep spreading until HC passes a ruling

he Karnataka Government has enacted a State law to support the ban on Muslim girls wearing hijab in some colleges. The controversy surfaced in a Udipi college and has now spread to several colleges, in the process taking political overtones. The controversy may eventually have to be resolved by the courts. The State High Court will be hearing two petitions in the coming week. It is relevant to understand what exactly the Government means by saying, in its statement, that "students in some institutions are following their religious practices and this is threatening equality and unity in school colleges". Its solution is to order the colleges to "maintain



equality and unity and wear clothing that does not disrupt public order". In the same breath, the statement that includes this order also recognises that the Supreme Court and various High Courts have said that covering "the head with a headscarf is not (sic) violation of Article 25 of the Constitution". However, these judgments notwithstanding, the State pushes for what it calls "uniformity of learning". It quotes the Karnataka Education Act, 1983, that says "...all students and students of all schools of Karnataka should act in the same manner and not be confined to any class.. Must act in favour of justice (sic)".

The Government thus bases its hijab ban on the principles of 'uniformity', 'equality', 'unity' and 'public order'. However, the statement does not clearly explain how these words are linked to one another and how the ban upholds them. Secondly, there is no clarity on how "uniformity of learning" is linked to a religious practice "threatening equality and unity in schools and colleges". Thirdly, the State Government may need to clarify if the "uniformity" its order refers to is the same as the principle of healthy coexistence of religions. Does it mean that the people of all religions are free to wear at all times clothes or accessories their religions prescribe? Or does it simply mean a total ban on people of all religions wearing any religious symbols? The former is practising secularism. The latter is enforcing uniformity. There is a tendency for such issues to sidetrack society if these are left unattended. It is up to the courts to reiterate the basic definition of secularism, once again, for the benefit of all the parties concerned.

Elections can't ignore Constitution's spirit



The Indian voter needs to take responsibility for all his constitutional duties, which include carefully electing representatives to legislatures

he nation is in election mode. People in the five States are aware that these elections are being keenly watched; and possible outcomes being conjectured not only in India but also abroad. Every party, each candidate enters the fray claiming to adhere faithfully to the basic valenshrined in our Constitution. Candidates with tainted records also formally swear by the Constitution at the time of filing papers. At election times, the need for electoral reforms - particularly debarring candidates facing serious criminal cases — is cursorily mentioned. Not much happens, though, as the lawmakers are not interested for obvious reasons. The overall credibility of elected representatives is nowhere near what was expected when the Constitution was finalised.

It would be worthwhile to ecall what Dr Rajendra Prasad, the Constituent Ássembly president, mentioned in his speech on November 26, 1949: "Whatever the Constitution may or may not provide, the welfare of the country will depend on the way it is administered. That will depend upon the men who administer it. It is a trite saying that a country can have only the Government it deserves. If those elected are capable, and men of character and integrity, they will be able to make the best even of a defective Constitution. If they are lacking, the Constitution cannot help the country. After all, a Constitution like a machine is a lifeless thing. It acquires life because of the men who control it and operate it, and India needs today nothing more than a set of honest men who will have the interest of the country

These apprehensions come straight from the heart of the person who had sacrificed his entire life for the country, and was speaking to all those with a similar background. Those stalwarts were concerned about the nation's future, and that included the quality, character and integrity of the elected representatives. They would constitute the Government and Opposition in legislatures. Their integrity,



In his historic Gettysburg address on November 19, 1863, US President Abraham Lincoln gave a definition of democracy that is invariably quoted in every discussion on Governments, systems of governance and their relationship to the aspirations of people: .this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom - and that Government of people, by people, for people, shall not perish from the earth." This, obviously, describes an ideal democracy which, in actual practice, slowly transforms in various allotropes, depending upon the system people accept and the way they elect representatives. Further, the extent to which these representatives comprehend democracy in letter and spirit makes a difference. Power corrupts and, in democracy, railing prey to the bounties of power is very likely.

In Indian democracy, people talk about 'dispropor-

tionate assets' of their representatives throughout the country, at every level. It is in public knowledge and has led to serious erosion of (exceptions apart) the credibility of representatives. The bond of mutuality now stands tattered. There are umpteen instances of elected Lok Sabha or State legislature members not being seen in their constituency for years together. Corruption in high places is discussed but, in final analysis, generally goes unpunished. Was all this unexpected? Probably not. Eminent constitutional expert and jurist Dr Subhash Kashyap presents a brilliant indepth analysis of democracy, governance and Parliament. In his treatise 'State of the Nation' (2018), he refers to one of the greatest jurists, Joseph Storey, who said that "howsoever immaculately built by founding fathers to last for eternity, a Republic may perish in an hour by the folly, or corruption, or negligence of its only keepers, the people". In his own words: "Republics are created by the virtue, public spirit and intelligence of citizens. They fall when the wise are banished from public councils because they dare to be honest, and the profligate are rewarded because they

flatter people, to betray them."

Celebrating 75 years of freedom, every Indian citizen stands witness to absence of virtue on every count in elections and that includes the manner people change their loyalties unashamedly, when unsure of a ticket for themselves or family members, and the astonishing temerity with which they claim to do it in public interest! One wonders how the Constitution's founding fathers would have reacted to every party wel-coming each and every 'Aaya Ram Gaya Ram' without hesitation. They get tickets, may even win and become Ministers. In the Indian Republic, as per constitutional guarantee, people are supreme; all are equal and entitled to every public office. Could they ignore their role in such cases? Could any alert, active and responsive democracy, and people constituting it, permit the continuation of criminals and partyhoppers in politics?

The maturity of the Indian voter is by now wellestablished. He has to realise that in Loktantra, sovereign power rests with him. How to use it as a duty is to be decided by people, nobody else.

They are also national symbols of joy or solidarity

here was a time when elections to Parliament and State assemblies used to be held together. Hence the election season used to come once in five years and the whole country was in an election mood. Gradually for various reasons, one State assembly or another got dissolved and for that State a mid-term election became necessary. With the states reorganisation becoming an oft practised intervention, some assemblies had to be reconstituted into more than one.

The results were simple. The election season was no longer a fiveyearly affair. Ever so often, an election had to be called in some state. There have been instances where for one reason or another, the Lok Sabha term got curtailed and fresh elections to the Lok Sabha became a necessity. As a consequence, therefore the frequency of elections increased and the Election Commission had to be almost continually at work.



The constancy of the election season created its own syndrome. Occasionally there has been talk of restoring the election schedule to its old cadence. The consensus on this is still to emerge.

One thing which, however, comes out from all this is that change is the order in anything alive.

This applies to rituals also. Rituals include say, the Republic Dayrelated celebrations and the symbolic events which accompany it. They are also national symbols of joy or solidarity. The canopy which stands today at Rajpath, New Delhi sans the Statue of the British Emperor, which was installed there to begin with, would be an example. Examples such as this have their contradictions. Many agreed that the Statue needed to be removed from the canopy in free India and so it was. There were some suggestions on whose statue should be installed there instead. Now finally the Government has decided that the statue of Netaji Subash Chandra Bose will be installed there. However, the major landmark in Kolkata continues to be the Victoria Memorial. With its exquisite marble and architecture, it is an eyeful. No one seems to particularly bother that it is a relic of a colonial past where enslavement was celebrated with grand monuments. Such are the contradictions of life!

To get back to the Republic Day story, not many recall that the ini-Republic Day celebrations were in what is now the Dhyanchand Stadium. Gradually, Republic Day Parade became a display of India's cultural richness and military preparedness, so the Rajpath was chosen. No one particularly bothered about the India Gate relic, perhaps because it was such a grand landmark. Not many noticed that literally thousands upon thousands of Indian soldiers who lost their lives in World War I did so, under orders, essentially in defence of an imperial power under whose yoke Indian was groaning. That too is another story.

In a strange fusion of history, the relic of imperial wars got fused with celebration of the 1971 event and an Amar Jawan Jyoti was installed near Indian Gate in memory of 'The unknown soldier'. The then Prime Minister 'stole' as it were, the Republic Day opening focus, from the Head of the State by beginning the celebrations by a drive to the Amar

In the meanwhile, the political climate changed and many latent urges which had been quasi-dormant came to life. A National War Memorial was built near India Gate and the Amar Jawan Jyoti was merged with the National War Memorial. There followed the announcement of dropping of the hymn 'Abide with me' from the Beating of the Retreat ceremony of January 29th. Air India sale: More unanswered questions



What is the cost of the national carrier's deal to the nation's exchequer, is the real question?

eams of writings attempted to understand the advaita of disinvestment as an economic policy instrument. For the last three decades, we are told that the disinvestment is a strategic weapon the governments deploy across the world to reduce the burdens on exchequer and realise the proceeds for larger public good. Anything that is government except the government itself is approached with suspicion, be it infrastructure, service, education, or even health. Most of the vocal and otherwise thinking minds ate the fruit from Eden and started perceiving Satan in every public sector employee. A new breed of intellectuals made their careers with well-oiled arguments defending the philosophy of disinvestment and joined chorus business is not the business of the governments.'

The policy of disinvestment under Modi dispensation reached its pinnacle. Prime Minister Narendra Modi's oratory attributed the disinvestment with an amazing ability to resolve the problems of governance. Given the way things are happening in India at present only shows that even this government has to prostrate before the market demi-gods. Whatever you may name it, the ultimate aim of policy prescription is to benefit the private capital at the expense of nation's wealth. There are two examples before the country whose rationale cannot be defended even by Adi Sankara, the demigod of advaita philosophy. Let us consider those two examples.

Vodafone Idea, the third biggest cel-

lular network in India is reeling under Rs. 1.95 lakh crore debt burden, including Rs. 16000 crores interest payable to government of India. Vodafone offered to allot 35 per cent equity share to government in lieu of the interest burden. The Central government is happy to doit. That too this happened when one of the country's monopoly capitalist group Mahindra declared that it cannot set the Vodafone's financial record straight and walked out of the joint venture.

The second case in question is Air India sale. As it is clear by now, the firm floated by Tata paid cash of Rs. 2700 crores to acquire full ownership of the nation's premier flying company, Air India. The reserve price fixed for this sale is a mere Rs. 12906 crores for a firm that winged aircraft, 4400 domestic and 1800 international flight landing and parking slots at various airports across the country and abroad. The central government wanted us to believe that only seven companies thought of participating in the bidding process of whom five were disqualified due to technical reasons. Only Tata's business development team could catch the imagination of the policy makers and stood out as the successful bidder. For this and several other reasons, the Air India sale is filled with an air of suspi-

cion. If one goes by the government's written reply to parliament on July 21, we have to believe that through this sale, the government realised the full cost through this sale process. What is the cost of this deal to the nation's exchequer is the question.

On the completion of this sale, almost all the news makers commented that the prodigal son finally returned home. This is to remind the readers that Air India was originally owned by JRD Tata and later it was nationalised in independent India. Missing in this narration is the fact that the Nehru government nationalised Air India only after paying due compensation to the promoters.

There are enough clues available in the public domain that the central government, since 2018, consistently relaxed and revised the conditions of sale to suit the interests of a selected bidder. Under whose behest these relaxations were granted is the core question the nation warrants transparent answers. Even before the commencement of sale ity criteria, the committee of secretaries opined, as reported by Business Standard, that the government should not insist on negative net worth of bidders, if they are already in airlines business. Ít should be reminded that including Vistara, owned by Tatas, all the airlines' net worth was showing negative growth only. In 2018, the Air India's outstanding debt was Rs. 33392 crore. Surprisingly, within the span of an year and a

half, the outstanding debt rose to Rs. 61562 crores by August 2021. That means, Air India's accumulated debt for about 68 years was only Rs. 33392 crore and in just two years it accumulated additional debt burden of Rs. 28170 crore. This single point itself proves who is best manager of the public assets.

What the nation is told that once the sale is affected, the government will realise a handsome amount which will be useful to offset the debts, if not making outright profit from the sale.

When the sale process was inithe Cabinet committee on Economic Affairs that the government will retain 26 per cent stake in the company and only 74 per cent is proposed to put up for sale. It was also decided that the successful bidder has to take over 70 per cent of Air India's debt. Stating no bidder expressed interest, the government altered the conditions of sale. Firstly, government put up 100 per cent stakes sale. Secondly, it gave discretion to the

bidder to choose to what extent it would take the quantum of debt. After giving these two key concessions, the qualified bidders were asked to present their financial plan. And also, the government got parliamentary nod to spend Rs. 62,057 crores to clear all outstanding dues and liabilities of the Air India. That means, the share at stake has gone up by 25 per cent but the cost of the bid stands same.

This brings us full circle. First,

the government reduced the cost

of the bid by half, there by impos-

ing a burden of about Rs, 30000

As on sale date, the outstanding debt stood at Rs. 61562 crore by August 2021. Surprisingly, once the decision to sell is finalised, on the pretext of making the bid attractive for the prospective bidders, the government simply floated an Air India Asset Holding Company and transferred 50 per cent of Air India's consolidated debt to this asset holding company. This simply reduced the amount to be realised from the sale

crores on the exchequer. On the other hand, instead of repaying the outstanding dues from sale proceeds, the government cleared all dues by spending Rs. 62057 crores from the exchequer. If we add both these, to off-load Air India to Tata, the government had holes in its pockets to the tune of a staggering Rs. 92000 crores. The story does not end here. The Tata's have got a commitment from the pubic sector banks consortium a loan approximating Rs. 33000 crores at the interest rate of mere 4 -5 per India till now paid 9 per cent interest rate on its outstanding debts. But the pubic sector banks are willing to grant loans at half the servicing charge they charged from the public sector undertaking. Thus, the series of concessions offered to the successful bidder is nothing short of a scam which needs to be thoroughly and impartially looked into by nothing short of a Joint Parliamentary



tion. Lack of remunerative employment opportunities, access to quality education and health services are forcing many to out-migrate at a rising rate.

As regards the employment scenario, among the workforce of 40.8 million persons in the state in 2019-20, over 47 per cent are employed in agriculture, which contributes less than onetenth in the GSDP of the state. The next important sectors are manufacturing, construction and trade contributing onetenth each to total employment in the state. In the plains, however, non-agriculture sector is the dominant source of livelihood, providing employment to over 72 per cent of workforce therein. Surprisingly, dependence on agriculture as a source of employment in hill region

The Paris-based Reporters Without Borders (RSF) said that journalists and media workers in Afghanistan are facing increasing "harassment" under the Taliban regime.

RSF said the threats, interogations and arbitrary arrests of journalists have increased and these actions are in violation of Afghanistan's press law, TOLO News reported.

According to RSF, since the Taliban came to power in August last year, at least 50 journalists and media workers , have been detained, lasting from several hours to nearly a

"Threatening to rip out journalists' tongues in order to prevent them from covering certain subjects is completely unacceptable," said Reza Moini, the head of RSF's Iran-Afghanistan desk.

"Journalists must be able to practice their profession with-out being under a permanent threat of arrest and torture. These unlawful threats, which violate Afghanistan's media legislation, are all the more horrifying for coming at a time of growing harassment and increasingly restrictive rules for the right to news and information.

According to the RSF, the Ministry for the Propagation of Virtue and the Prevention of Vice had also issued a decree in November last year defining certain rules for media in Afghanistan. On February 3, the

International Federation of Journalists also raised concerns on the status of media in Afghanistan, saying at least 318 media outlets have closed since the fall of the Westernbacked government in 33 of 34 provinces in Afghanistan.

"The crisis has hit newspapers the hardest with just 20 out of 114 continuing to publish," the report read. Over 1 million Afghans migrated in 4 months: Report

The head of a private transportation industry said that around 4,000 people are heading to Iran on daily basis, TOLO News quoted The New York Times report.

Many of the migrants entering Iran are seeking to cross the borders of Turkey and from there go on to Europe for asylum.

The New York Times said the mass migration has raised alarms in the region as well as Europe about a repeat of the 2015 migrant crisis, when more than a million people, mostly Syrians, sought asylum in Europe. "Though many are choos-

ing to leave because of the immediate economic crisis, the prospect of long-term Taliban governance — including restrictions on women and fears of retribution — has only added to their urgency, the report said. Refugee rights defenders

in Iran expressed concerns over the status of Afghan refugees in Iran. "The Afghan refugees in Iran are facing various challenges such as lack of access to work and refugee identification cards. A refugee is always at risk of being back deported," Naqibullah Rasikh a refugee rights activist, told TOLO News.

Meanwhile, the Taliban government has said that efforts were underway to tackle the economic and humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan.

"The statistics of the Islamic Emirate show that between 1,500 to 2,000 people are going to Iran from Afghanistan on a daily basis, said Bilal Karimi, the govern-ment's deputy spokesman.

Apartment purchases by S **Korean youth** hit record high

The proportion of apartments bought by South Koreans in their 30s or younger reached an all-time high last year amid "panic buying" over soaring housing prices, data showed on Sunday.

The buyers of this age group accounted for 31 percent of the country's total apartment sales in 2021, up from 29.2 per cent in 2020, according to the data compiled by the Korea Real Estate Board. The agency began compiling the related data in 2019, and the figure for the year came to 28.3 per cent, reports Yonhap News Agency. In Seoul, 41.7 per cent of

the total apartment purchases last year were made by those in their 30s or younger, compared with 37.3 per cent in 2020 and 31.8 per cent in 2019. The surrounding Gyeonggi Province and the western port city of Incheon also saw the proportion rise about 6 per cent, each, on-year to 36.3 per cent and 33.2 per cent, respectively, the data showed. The country's housing prices have skyrocketed over the past couple of years.

RBI likely to maintain status quo in policy rate next week, say experts

Tn view of inflationary concerns, the Reserve Bank is likely to maintain the status quo on key policy rates in its next bi-monthly economic policy, which will be the first after the presentation of the Union Budget for 2022-23.

Experts, however, are of the opinion that RBI's monetary policy committee (MPC) may change the policy stance from 'accommodative' to 'neutral' and tinker with the reverserepo rate as part of the liquidnormalisation

The next bi-monthly monetary policy is scheduled to be announced on Wednesday at the end of three-day deliberations of the MPC beginning

Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist, Bank of Baroda, said given the assurance on growth as per the budget and the possibility of inflation rising mainly due to crude oil, "we

The Centre will bring for discussion in the next meeting of the GST Council the issue of bringing aviation turbine fuel (ATF) into the goods and services tax regime, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said on Sunday, as she noted that rising global fuel prices is a "concern

When the GST was introduced on July 1, 2017, amalgamating over a dozen central and state levies, five commodities - crude oil, natural gas, petrol, diesel and ATF were kept out of its purview given the revenue dependence of the central and state gov-

Sitharaman, in a post-Budget discussion with industry chamber Assocham, said a final decision of inclusion of ATF in GST will be taken by the Council, which comprise finance ministers from Central and state governments.

"It is not with ... (the Centre) alone, it has got to go to the GST Council. The next time we meet in the Council, I will put it on the table for them discuss it,"

The minister was responding to views expressed by SpiceJet Founder Ajay Singh where he sought the support of the Union finance minister in bringing ATF into the GST

"Oil is at \$90, the rupee is at 75 to a dollar and, therefore, the civil aviation sector has become chronically ill. Your kind support (in bringing ATF into GST) in this process will be extremely helpful," Singh Currently, the central gov-

ernment levies excise duty on ATF while State Governments charge VAT. These taxes, with excise duty, in particular, have been raised periodically with rising oil prices. Including oil products in

GST will not just help companies set off tax that they paid on input but will also bring about uniformity in taxation on the fuels in the country.

"Of course just not for the airline but the global price of

fuel is now a concern for all of us, more so for airlines which have not seen a complete headup post the pandemic,' Sitharaman said.

India's digital currency to debut by early 2023

▼ ndia's very own official dig-Lital currency is likely to debut by early 2023, which will mirror any of the currently available private companyoperated electronic wallets, but with a change that it will be a sovereign-backed facility,

a top government source said. Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman in her budget speech last week talked about launching a central bankbacked 'digital rupee' soon.

A top government source. who wished not to be identified said, the digital currency issued by the RBI would be numbered in units, just like every fiat currency has an unique number.

The units issued in digital rupee would be included in the currency in circulation. It would not be very different rupee instead of holding a note from fiat currency. It would be

more like an electronic form of fiat currency, so in a sense it would be a government-mandated electronic wallet," the

The RBI has indicated that the digital rupee would be ready by the end of next financial year, the source added. The digital rupee

blockchain, being developed by the Reserve Bank, would be able to trace all transactions, unlike the current system of mobile wallet offered by private companies.

Explaining further, the source said that using electronic wallet offered by private companies, people currently transfer money to the private company who holds the money on his/her behalf and pays to a merchant when there is any transaction.

"In the case of a digital you will be holding a digital

currency in your phone and it would be with the central bank and from there it would be transferred to any merchant. It is fully backed by the sovereign," the source

If the money is transferred to the e-wallet of a private company, then credit risk of that company is also attached to the money besides charges levied by such companies.

"Instead of carrying this wallet, I will carry money on the phone," the source

In the 2022-23 Budget, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman had said that introduction of Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC) will give a big boost to digital economy.

"Digital currency will also lead to a more efficient and cheaper currency management system. It is, therefore,

proposed to introduce Digital Rupee, using blockchain and other technologies, to be issued by the Reserve Bank of India starting 2022-23," the

minister had said. The exact regulation governing this Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC) is

yet to be finalised. CBDC is a digital or virtual currency but it is not comparable to the private virtual currencies or cryptocurrency that have mushroomed over the last decade. Private virtual currencies do not represent any person's debt or liabilities

as there is no issuer. The government has already said that private cryptocurrencies will never be a legal tender. The RBI has been strongly opposing private cryptocurrencies as they could have implications on national security and financial stabili-

Audi weighing local production of EVs in India

"It's a continuous evaluation at this point in time...We are evaluating the acceptability of electric mobility in India," Áudi India Head Balbir Singh Dhillon told PTI when asked about the company's plans with rival Mercedes-Benz announcing to locally assemble allelectric EQS sedan in India from this year.

He further said,"But you have to also understand (that) we have, as Audi India or Audi AG, already decided that by 2033 we will become an allelectric car company. So, it's a matter of time. It's a question of when, not if that whether we will do it.

In the last seven months, he said Audi India has launched five electric cars in India and will continue to sell these throughout these 12 Audi's five electric cars in

India are the e-tron 50, e-tron 55, e-tron Sportback 55, e-tron GT. RS e-tron GT. These have played a key role, along with its petrol powered Q-range and with A-sedans in the company recording a two-fold jump in retail sales at 3,293 units in India in 2021 as compared to 1,639 units in 2020.

"So far, it has been fourth extremely successful. This is

one segment, which actually has performed even better than what we initially anticipated," Dhillon said.



the lack of proper healthcare infrastructure — centres, doctors and paramedical staff — in several remote villages in the Kishtwar district of Jammu and Kashmir has made the lives of residents of this hilly

region difficult. Left with no option,

they are forced to travel 200-250 km

to Jammu, even for basic treatment. In the Primary Health Centre (PHC) Nali in the Bunjwah region of this district patients are treated in an open area as it lacks basic built infrastructure, staff and medical equipment

to cater to people. The PHC Nali was set up in 1980 in a small space. It took authorities almost two decades to expand the infrastructure. Some rooms were added to the centre in 1999. It's been over two decades since the infrastructure remains as is. It is running with limited, old facilities making it almost impossible for the existing employees and doctors to handle the increase in

a patient rush. At present, the PHC has five rooms — a medical officer's room, a labour room, a laboratory, one dental section and an emergency room. Besides, the beds are often shared by two to three patients at any given time. Even after so many years, the PHC still lacks the ability to provide proper services without compromising the dignity of the people of this distant region.

A HOSPITAL TOO FAR

The lack of medical facilities in several remote villages in the Kishtwar district of Jammu and Kashmir has made the lives of its residents difficult, says Shafqat Sheikh



Expressing the difficulty faced while catering to the needs of the patients, Dr Haroon Rashid Bhat, the medical officer of PHC Nali, said, "With the current strength of staff members and accommodation, it is difficult to run the PHC at night and during sudden emergencies. Moreover, the rise of Covid-19 has further highlighted the gaps in the PHC's operations

Noor Din, a local from the region, recalls how as a young child he would visit the PHC with his parents. "Today, I bring my child to this centre but, unfortunately, nothing has changed. In 2012-13, the administration had announced to provide a 20-bed hospital while also improving the existing health centres in Bunjwah on a priority basis. But to our dismay, nothing has happened," he rued.

Social activist, Ashiq Wani, informed that during 2010-11, 10 kanal of land was acquired for the construction of a separate block, but, to

date, no action has been taken. Moreover, according to him, the district administration has been requested to upgrade the PHC to a Community Health Centre and to add more staff, separate blocks, X-rays, ECG, blood bank, and other health facilities. "During the Covid-19 pandemic,

the shortage of space, medicine, and oxygen cylinders hampered the life of a common public in rural regions, as they were at the mercy of God," Wani further added.

Complaints are regularly made by the people, social activists and NGOs, but the concerned administration is yet to address the issue. During disasters, people need immediate treatment, but without any proper medical arrangements, their lives are often at stake. Moreover, the unwillingness of health professionals to work in remote areas also affects the functioning of an adequate health centre. This requires the administration to take appropriate steps to improve the healthcare facilities of people living in far-flung areas of Bunjwah. Locals should also be consulted while strategising the action plan to address the issue.

Compared to this, the budget presented by the finance minister of some other country in some other continent will have a different philosophy of life and society and a different ethical and world-view as its it can be understood that economics or finance cannot be divorced from the philosophy of life and system of ethics, or, to put it in more clear words, it cannot be alienated from spirituality and morality. It, therefore, brings out the necessity of having a proper world-view, a correct philosophy of life and a right ethical system. This is as much in one's own interest as it is beneficial for society as a whole and is of added significance if an individual is devoted to social service.

In the context of the budget and the formulation of the financial policy of a nation, it becomes all the more important than the one who has his mind anchored in moral values and has cultivated a spiritual outlook, he alone should formulate the budget for he alone would be able to formulate one that reflects such values as compassion for the weak, and overall welfare of the country. Today we are witnessing the fall of many governments, empires, kingships, democracies across the world. The reason behind their collapse is that the values and aims of both the leaders and people are not fair. The seed of difficulties in our system is

the lack of awareness and practice of values such as cooperation, honesty, serving, selfexamination and self-discipline. This is mainly because since childhood we have been taught to compete fiercely to succeed rather than to develop individual talents to complement each other; to possess and accumulate more as a means of security rather than sharing our resources and realising that security comes when there is unity, a sense of belonging among everyone in the society. In 2008, stunning opening ceremonies including 5,000 syncopated dancers telling tory astonished the international audience. The power of that first time cannot be repeated.

Nonetheless, China has spared no expense to prepare, with a report from Insider pegging the total cost "in excess of US\$38.5 billion, 24 times the country's initial budget of \$1.6 billion." As with everything China does, when it wants to occupy the center stage internationally, it will put on a big show.

The domestic payoff of the Olympics matters because China will face a trying year in 2022. Xi is seeking an unprecedented third term as general-secretary of the Communist Party. The nation's economy is slowing.

International opposition to China's human rights abuses in Xinjiang and Hong Kong and to its aggressive foreign policy is growing. Xi is hoping that the "bread and circuses" diversionary aspect of the Games will help him overcome the stresses of this year and advance his political standing.

Chinese leaders care about improving the nation's international status, but they're already working from a position of relative

China's rise internationally, especially since 2008, is undeniable.

Its status as the number two power in the world is almost universally acknowl-

As a scholar of Chinese politics and for-

eign policy, I believe that Xi wants the Games to impress the world. But that is less important to him than the domestic effect of the Games.

China is not traditionally strong in winter sports. But the country has invested heavily in preparing increasingly competitive teams for these Games. The success of Chinese athletes at the Games will enhance China's reputation and thus Chinese citizens' sense of pride. In turn, this will mute competition from

INDIA WIN FIFTH U-19 WORLD CUP TITLE

n utterly dominant India won a record-extending fifth U-19 World Cup title here on Saturday, beating England by four wickets in the final of an extraordinary campaign that was almost derailed by a COVID-19 outbreak.

The triumph bore resemblance to the exploits of world-class Indian U-19 teams of the past.

Intrepid and industrious in their approach, the starry-eyed Indian players' success stories also gave a glimpse into the world's most perfectly calibrated youth structure, which is capable of consistently producing world-class cricketers who are ever ready to take on the biggest of

In a reflection of India's dominance, wicketkeeper Dinesh Bana finished the chase of 190 with two sixes and 14 balls

On winning the toss in the big final, England captain Tom Prest rightly chose to bat first to avoid the "scoreboard pressure" during the chase. India did the next best thing: bowl out the opposition for a total -- 189 in this case, in 44.5 overs -that failed to put them under pressure.

India were all over England before a gritty 95 by James Rew saved his team the blushes.

Bowling his medium pacers to deadly effect, Raj Bawa (5/31) ran through the English middle-order after the in-from left-arm seamer Ravi Kumar (4/34) laid the opposition low with two early blows.

India kept taking wickets at regular intervals but not for once did the intensity of the team dropped.

For close to 19 overs, Rew and James Sales (34 not out) defied India with their 93-run eight-wicket stand, ensuring the 1998 edition winners recover from a horror 61 for six and then 91 for seven.



In response, India lost Angkrish Raghuvanshi without a run on the board but the extremely talented Shaik Rasheed shone with a composed 50 off 84 balls.

Coming off his magnificent century in the semifinal against Australia, skipper Yash Dhull fell for 17, but the duo of Nishant Sindhu (50 not out) and Bawa (35) took the team within striking distance of victory with a 67-run partnership for the fifth wicket.

It has been an extremely challenging ride for the Indian team in this edition of the tournament as multiple players from the side were infected by the coronavirus and at one stage even struggled to field eleven fit personnel. However, despite the huge setback that almost derailed their

campaign, India came back a stronger unit focussed on correctly doing the things that were within its control.

Their clinical on-field performance told a very different story, a story far removed from all the troubles that the team went through off it, when as many as seven players were infected with the virus. India struck as early as the second over when Ravi sent back the dangerous Jacob Bethell (2) cheaply. The man from Bengal darted one in and then got it to hold its line as Bethell missed it completely after playing across the line.

The early blow did not have any impact on George Thomas as he smashed Rajvardhan Hangargekar for 14 runs, including two fours and a six over deep

midwicket, in the very next over.

However, Ravi struck again, this time bowling out Prest who dragged the ball on to his stumps, putting the Indians on the top at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium.

Having failed to execute his pull shot, thanks to a bottom edge, Prest, who had earlier won a good toss, walked back dejected with his team in a spot of bother at 18 for two in the fourth over.

Ravi had 2/2 in the first two overs. Notwithstanding the situation his team found itself early into the big final, Thomas continued to attack and collected two boundaries against Ravi.

With Hangargekar going for 19 runs in his first spell, Dhull effected a bowling change and it worked almost immediate-

ly, but Kaushal Tamble could not hold on to Thomas' thick edge off Raj Bawa in the slip. England needed a partnership at that stage but that was not going to be. Medium pacer Bawa got the well-set Thomas to play an irresponsible shot that got a thick outside edge and landed in the nands of Dhull at cover.

In all sorts of trouble at 37 for three at the start of the 11th over, England's desperate quest for a partnership was not answered, with William Luxton edging Bawa to be out caught behind before England could reach 50 runs.

Bawa was on a hat-trick as George Bell had no answer to an excellent delivery that kicked up and took a deflection on its way to the wicketkeeper Dinesh Bana.
