# Prachand gives IAF unique advantage

It's only light attack copter in world that can take off at 5K m altitude

India on Monday got its fleet of the first indigenously built light combat helicopter (LCH) named 'Prachand' nearly 23 years after the Kargil war. The helicopter is capable of destroying enemy targets, including bunkers, tanks and drones in high-altitude areas.

Built by the public sector aerospace conglomerate Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL), the light combat helicopter is the only attack helicopter in the world that can land and take off at an altitude of 5,000 metres (16,400 ft) with a considerable load of weapons and fuel.

The 5.8-tonne twin-engine gunship helicopter is armed with air-to-air missiles, 20 mm turret guns, rocket systems and other weapons.

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh on Monday presided over the ceremony to induct "Prachand" into service at

Jodhpur Air Force station. He also flew in the helicopter and later said, "No need to define 'Prachand', message received by the enemy."

The fleet comprising four helicopters was inducted into the IAF in Jodhpur in the presence of the Defence Minister, IAF chief VR Chaudhari and other senior military officials.

Rajnath described the induction of the indigenously-built LCH into the IAF as a

"momentous occasion" for India's defence production. "The IAF has been playing an important role in protecting India's sovereignty and I am confident that its overall capability will enhance further following induction of LCH," he said.

"We have been focusing on boosting the country's defence production following certain developments.... Security of the country has been our foremost priority and it will remain

so," he said.

Rajnath also complimented the IAF for reposing confidence in indigenously developed platforms.

He noted the LCH meets the requirements of modern warfare and necessary quality parameters under varied conditions of operations. It is capable of self-protection, of carrying a wide variety of ammunition, and delivering it to the field quickly.

# 5 killed in pandal inferno

**3 kids among the dead, SIT to investigate Bhadohi blaze****PNS ■ LUCKNOW**

Five people, including three children, have so far died after a fire broke out at a Durga puja pandal in Bhadohi district, police said on Monday.

A Special Investigation Team (SIT) has been constituted to probe the cause of the incident from all angles, including it being part of any subversive activity.

Fire broke out on Sunday in a Durga puja pandal in Aural town during the aarti session to mark the Saptami, or the seventh day, of Navratri festivities.

Bhadohi District Magistrate Gaurang Rathi said on Monday, "The death toll in the Bhadohi Durga puja pandal fire incident has risen to five. Three children and two women have died."

Among the five deceased were one Jai Devi and her two grandchildren and their death has left the family in a state of shock.

Devi's husband said, "Along with my wife, three of her daughters-in-law and two grandchildren had gone to the pandal. While the woman and one of the children died in hospital, one more child died today (Monday) morning at home."

# Gandhi-lookalike Mahishasur: Hindu Mahasabha booked

A day after a controversy erupted over the installation of a Mahishasur idol (buffalo demon) that resembled Mahatma Gandhi at a Durga puja here, the Kolkata Police lodged an FIR against the organisers on Monday.

The Mahishasur idol had a bald head and was dressed in a white dhoti and round glasses. "The police got an artist to remove spectacles, put a moustache and hair on the asura,"

Sundargiri Maharaj, the president of the state unit of Akhil Bharat Hindu Mahasabha (ABHM) — the organiser of the pandal — said.

The Mahishasur idol now sports a moustache and hair, though it still holds a wooden stick in its left hand.

Parties, cutting across political lines, have denounced the depiction. The Congress on Monday sought arrest of the accused. The BJP has also castigated the representation of Mahishasur at the marquee.

# J&K DG Prisons found dead with his throat slit

Jammu & Kashmir Director General of Police, Prisons department, HK Lohia was found murdered under suspicious circumstances here with police suspecting his domestic help as the culprit, a senior police officer said.

Additional Director General of Police, Jammu zone, Mukesh Singh said the domestic help is absconding and a search for him has started.

The 57-year-old Lohia, a 1992 batch IPS officer, was found dead with his throat slit at his Udaiwala residence on the outskirts of Jammu.

He was posted at the DGP prisons in August.

The ADGP said first examination of the scene of crime reveals this as a suspected murder case.

"The domestic help with the officer is absconding. A search for him has started. Investigation is in progress," he said, adding forensic and crime teams are on the spot.

# Sweden's Svante Paabo gets Nobel for insight into human evolution

Swedish scientist Svante Paabo won the Nobel Prize in medicine on Monday for his discoveries on human evolution that provided key insights into our immune system and what makes us unique compared with our extinct cousins, the award's panel said.

Paabo has spearheaded the development of new techniques that allowed researchers to compare the genome of modern humans and that of other hominins — the Neanderthals and Denisovans.

While Neanderthal bones were first discovered in the mid-19th century, only by unlocking their DNA — often referred to as the code of life — have scientists been able to fully understand the links between species.

This included the time when modern humans and Neanderthals diverged as a species, determined to be



around 800,000 years ago, said Anna Wedell, chair of the Nobel Committee.

"Paabo and his team also surprisingly found that gene flow had occurred from Neanderthals to Homo sapiens, demonstrating that they had children together during periods of co-existence," she said.

This transfer of genes between hominin species affects how the immune system of modern humans reacts to infections, such as the coronavirus.

About 1-2 per cent of people outside Africa have Neanderthal genes.

# Russian arrested for JEE (Mains) hacking

The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) on Monday arrested a Russian national accused in an ongoing investigation of a case related to the irregularities in the JEE (Mains) 2021.

Mikhail Shargin, the accused, was earlier detained by the Bureau of Immigration at IGI Airport, Delhi, after his arrival from Almaty, Kazakhstan.

A lookout circular was issued against him at the behest of the CBI. Shargin is suspected to be the main hacker for the alleged manipulation of the JEE Mains.

"During the investigation, it came to light that some foreign nationals were involved in compromising many online examinations, including JEE

(Mains), colluding with other accused in the instant case.

"The role of one Russian national was revealed who had allegedly tampered with the iLeon software (the platform on which the JEE (Main)-2021 examination was conducted) and he helped other accused in hacking the computer systems of suspect candidates during the examination. Therefore, a lookout circular was issued against the said Russian national," the CBI said in a statement.

On September 1 last year, the agency had booked Affinity Education Pvt Ltd and its three directors — Siddharth Krishna, Vishwambhar Mani Tripathi and Govind Varshney — besides other touts and associates/conduits for the alleged manipulation of the JEE Mains 2021.

# SU-30s escort Iranian flight out of India after bomb hoax

A bomb scare on board an Iranian civil aircraft bound for China forced the IAF on Monday to scramble its SU-30 fighter jets. The plane remained in the Indian airspace for nearly 40 minutes.

After Tehran informed India to disregard the bomb scare, the plane was escorted by the fighter jets to the Indian airspace limit for an onward journey to the designated destination. The initial warning about the bomb on the Mahan Air aircraft was sounded by the Lahore Air Traffic Control (ATC) about 9 am, it was learned.

A call regarding the threat was received at 9.20 am, said the Delhi Police. The Delhi airport was subsequently put on



alert. The IAF scrambled two SU-30s from Punjab and Rajasthan respectively.

Mahan Air later tweeted that the report was "fake" and that the flight was safe.

"In the name of Allah. Following the publication of an allegation of a 'threat to bomb' a Mahan Airlines flight over India and request an emergency landing the public relations of Mahan Airlines informed that the Airbus 340 passenger plane of this company was traveling from Tehran

to Guangzhou in China," read a statement by Mahan Air.

"The pilot, as soon as he learned about the possibility of a bomb in the flight, shared the situation with the control center... and recognised that this story was fake and the flight was completely safe."

"It seems that the design of such reports in the current international and domestic conditions was proposed in order to disturb the security and peace of mind," it added.

Giving details here, the IAF said, "On October 3, intimation was received of a bomb scare on an airline bearing Iranian registration, when it was transiting through Indian airspace. IAF fighter aircraft were scrambled, which followed the aircraft at a safe distance.

# UAPA slapped on PFI

The Delhi Police on Monday booked the Popular Front of India (PFI) under the Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA) in Southeast Delhi's Shaheen Bagh.

The development comes after Delhi Police's Special Cell unit along with district police conducted raids across six districts in the city last week and nabbed 30 people allegedly linked with the PFI.

The Government has already declared the PFI, Rehab India Foundation (RIF), All India Imams Council (AIIIC), National Confederation of Human Rights Organisation (NCHRO) and other organisations as "unlawful associations".

According to the FIR, Delhi Police Commissioner Sanjay Arora vide a gazette notification dated September 29, declared and notified some addresses in Shaheen Bagh,



Abdul Fazal Enclave and Jamia Nagar as being used for the purposes of carrying out unlawful activities of PFI and its associates or affiliates.

"Even after the said prescription and notification, reliable information has been received that certain leaders, members and associates of the referred unlawful associations, in continuation of their unlawful activities, are secretly conspiring to disrupt public order with the ultimate objective of targeting the sovereignty and territorial integrity of India," the FIR stated.

"The leaders, members, and associates of the proscribed unlawful association/s are, in

continuation of their unlawful activities, conspiring further to cause massive disruption of public order by promoting communal enmity and for the purposes, are mobilising supporters for spreading incitement at various places of worship," it further stated.

According to a senior police official, based on the information, a case under sections 120 B (criminal conspiracy) and 153A (promoting enmity between different groups) 9f the IPC along with Section 10 of the UAPA, has been registered at Shaheen Bagh police station.

"In order to unearth the conspiracy, to prevent deterioration of public order and to curb the intended unlawful activities by the leaders, members and associates of the said proscribed organisations. All these matters will be investigated and the culprits will be caught," police stated.

Rising prices of vegetables Rare jeopardising the common man's kitchen budget due to the supply crunch caused by heavy rain.

Apple, pomegranate and banana are cheaper than cauliflower, carrot, capsicum, and coriander in most parts of the north India. But there is not much change in the prices of onion, potato and garlic. Traders and vendors have blamed the short supply due to excessive rain in central India for the higher prices of vegetables.

According to the Ministry of Consumer Affairs and Agriculture, retail prices of vegetables will remain high till the arrival of the new crops.

The data collected from several vegetable markets across the national Capital showed that average retail prices of vegetables have surged sharply in the past few weeks. Retail prices of cauliflower have sharply risen to nearly ₹100 per kg from ₹60 per kg a few weeks ago.

Carrot (Orange) is selling at ₹100 per kg; coriander leaves at ₹300-400 per kg; bottle gourd (Lauki) is around ₹55-60 a kg from ₹20-30 a kg a few days ago. Radish is selling at ₹60 per kg which was being sold at ₹30 a kg two weeks ago.

Sponge Gourd is selling at ₹60 a kg which was at ₹30-40 a kg last week. Capsicum price is selling at ₹120-150 a kg. Retail prices of potato and onion are stable being sold at ₹25-30 per kg. Tomato is also being sold at ₹35-40 per kg.

Spinach, a seasonal vegetable, is selling at ₹80 a kg from ₹60 per kg last week. Garlic is selling at ₹25-30 per kg. Lemon prices have gone up from ₹20 per 250 gram to ₹30 per 250 gram. Retail price of radish is at ₹60 per kg.

The retail prices of vegetables at Blinkit online stores showed that average retail prices of ladies' finger is at ₹60 per kg; french beans ₹228 per kg; cucumber ₹80 per kg; sponge gourd ₹110 per kg; carrot ₹120 per kg; green capsicum ₹220 per kg; pointed gourd ₹80 per kg; brinjal ₹60

a kg; round gourd (tinda) ₹120 per kg; Radish ₹80 a kg and drumstick ₹360 per kg.

Similarly, in Bigbasket, retail prices of carrot (orange) is ₹75 per kg; tomato ₹39 per kg; lady finger ₹50 per kg; capsicum ₹86 per kg; coriander leaves ₹120 a kg; cabbage one piece (400-500 gram) ₹33; chilli green ₹60 a kg; ginger ₹118 a kg; radish ₹44 a kg; drumstick ₹150 a kg; brinjal ₹60 a kg and cucumber ₹60 a kg.

According to Naseeb Singh, a wholesaler in Ghazipur vegetables and fruits market, the unusually high rainfall in major and trading centres, causing extensive damage to vegetable crops and the high transportation cost due to spiralling diesel prices have significantly contributed to the increase in prices.

The monsoon which was around 8 per cent deficient in June is now 7 per cent excess. Several parts of the country, except Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand, West Bengal, and parts of Odisha, have experienced good rains this season.

# Gujjar Bakerwals protest against ST tag for Pahari

Hours before Amit Shah's arrival in Jammu, protesters submit written submission to DC

Even as expectations were running high among the members of the Pahari community over the issue of grant of scheduled tribe status to them during the visit of Union Home Minister Amit Shah, their opponents belonging to the Gujjar Bakerwal community are determined to oppose any such move.

On Monday, hours before the arrival of the Union Home Minister in Jammu, a large number of students belonging to the Gujjar Bakerwal community staged a protest demonstration and submitted a memorandum to the office of Divisional Commissioner, Jammu demanding no such attempt should be made at the highest level to dilute their existing ST status/reservation quota.

On the other hand, senior BJP leaders Monday dropped clear hints claiming vested interests were trying to create a wedge between the two groups and instead of dousing the flames of fire they are trying to add fuel to the fire.

Former state minister and Pahari leader Mushtaq Bukhari Monday said, "The Pahari people are indebted to the Prime Minister and Home Minister for publicly acknowledging their role in nation building. One lakh people are ready to welcome Amit Shah in Rajouri. We have high hopes that we will be granted the coveted ST status soon."

Ahead of addressing the massive public rally in Rajouri, Amit Shah is scheduled to pay obeisance at the cave shrine of Mata Vaishno Devi. Tight security arrangements have been made in and around Rajouri to prevent any untoward incident during the visit of the Union Home Minister.

"Svante Pääbo has discovered the genetic make up of our closest relatives, the Neanderthals and the Denisovan hominins," Nils-Göran Larsson, a Nobel Assembly member, told the Associated Press after the announcement. "And the small differences between these extinct human forms and us as humans today will provide important insight into our body functions and how our brain has developed and so forth."

Paabo, 67, performed his prizewinning studies in Germany at the University of Munich and at the Max Planck Institute for Evolutionary Anthropology in Leipzig.

Paabo is the son of Sune Bergstrom, who won the Nobel prize in medicine in 1982. According to the Nobel Foundation, it's the eighth time

that the son or daughter of a Nobel laureate also won a Nobel Prize.

Only once has a father-son duo shared the same Nobel Prize: in 1915 when Sir William Henry Bragg and his son William Laurence Bragg won the physics award together. Scientists in the field lauded the Nobel Committee's choice this year.

David Reich, a geneticist at Harvard Medical School, said he was thrilled the group honored the field of ancient DNA, which he worried might "fall between the cracks."

By recognising that DNA can be preserved for tens of thousands of years — and developing ways to extract it — Paabo and his team created a completely new way to answer questions about our past, Reich said. That work was the basis for an "explosive growth" of ancient DNA studies in recent decades.

"It's totally reconfigured

our understanding of human variation and human history," Reich said, adding that Paabo "was, more than anyone, the pioneer of this field."

The medicine prize kicked off a week of Nobel Prize announcements. It continues Tuesday with the physics prize, with chemistry on Wednesday and literature on Thursday. The 2022 Nobel Peace Prize will be announced on Friday and the economics award on October 10.

Last year's medicine recipients were David Julius and Ardem Patapoutian for their discoveries into how the human body perceives temperature and touch.

The prizes carry a cash award of 10 million Swedish kronor (nearly \$900,000) and will be handed out on December 10. The money comes from a bequest left by the prize's creator, Swedish inventor Alfred Nobel, who died in 1895.

The aircraft was offered the option to land at Jaipur and then, at Chandigarh. However, the pilot declared his unwillingness to divert to either of the two airports. After a while, information was received from

Tehran to disregard the bomb scare, following which, the aircraft continued on its journey towards its final destination.

All actions were taken by IAF as per the laid down procedure, jointly with the Ministry of Civil Aviation (MoCA) and the Bureau of Civil Aviation Security (BCAS). The aircraft was under close radar surveillance by the Air Force throughout the Indian airspace."

The incident happened on the Mahan Air flight W581 that was flying from Tehran to

Guangzhou, sources said. Meanwhile, senior Delhi Police officers said they received a call about the bomb scare in a Tehran-China flight from the Air Traffic Control but soon they were informed by the ATC that the flight was not landing in Delhi.

The Air Traffic Control (ATC) at Delhi airport remained in contact with the IAF when the aircraft was in Indian airspace, sources said. The Delhi ATC received inputs from the Lahore ATC that there was a bomb threat on the

Mahan Air flight. Subsequently, the Delhi ATC informed the pilots but they decided to fly on. As the aircraft did not follow the suggestion, laid down operational procedures were put into action, they added.

As per the flight tracking website flightaware.com, flight W581 is being operated with an Airbus 340-600 aircraft. It had taken off from Imam Khomeini International Airport in Tehran and was to arrive at Guangzhou Baiyun International Airport in Guangzhou.

The Defence Minister said the recent conflicts in Ukraine and elsewhere showed us that heavy weapon systems and platforms, which do not allow for rapid movement in the battlefield, are sometimes vulnerable and become easy targets for the enemy. Therefore, the need of the hour is to move towards the development of those equipment and platforms, which are mobile, have ease of movement, are more flexible, and at the same time meet the requirements of the armed forces. In this context, LCH has been developed with an unprecedented balance of all these features and HAL should be congratulated for this, he said. Chaudhari said the capabilities of LCH are on a par with the helicopters of its class globally. The heli-

copters were given a traditional water-canon salute that followed a multi-religious prayer ceremony.

The need for developing a light combat helicopter for mountain warfare was felt during the Kargil War in 1999. Subsequently, the IAF and HAL began exploring the possibility of developing the platform with a capacity to carry an adequate weapon load, sufficient fuel and still be capable of operating in the higher reaches of the Himalayan ranges.

By mid-2010, the prototype of LCH completed a major flight test and it was deemed to have fulfilled the desired parameters. In February 2020, the LCH was declared ready for production.

In March, the Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) approved the procurement of 15 indigenously developed Limited Series Production (LSP) LCH at a cost of Rs 3,887 crore. The Defence Ministry had said 10 helicopters would be for the IAF and five will be for the Indian Army.

The LCH has similarities with Advanced Light Helicopter Dhruv. It has a number of stealth features, armoured-protection systems, night attack capability and crash-worthy landing gear for better survivability, officials said.

## Punjab AAP Govt wins trust motion; Cong, BJP abstain

The Bhagwant Mann-led AAP Government in Punjab on Monday won the Confidence Motion, an expected outcome, with thumping majority as 91 of the ruling party legislators voted in support of the motion.

The confidence motion, which was moved by Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann on September 27 after the ruling party accused the BJP of trying to topple the State Government, saw main Opposition Congress abstaining during the voting.

The BJP already announced to boycott the assembly session as it had accused the AAP government of violating the Constitution by bringing the confidence motion in the assembly.

Congress MLAs staged a walkout from the House on another issue.

Traders opined that there has been a significant reduction in the stock of local vegetables as well as those sourced from other States. "The State sources cabbage, cauliflower, carrot, beans, beetroot, raw papaya, raw banana, drumstick, capsicum from Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu and a few other States. The prolonged monsoon has not only damaged vegetable crops but also lowered the yield," said Azadpur mandi traders.

"Uttar Pradesh, Karnataka, West Bengal, Punjab, and Bihar are major producers of cauliflower, which is harvested from August or early September, witnessed either excessive rain or no rain which impacted the production this year. Retail price of cauliflower is Rs 100 per kg," Singh said. Rain in Karnataka, Tamil Nadu, Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra have upended

supply lines and damaged crops in key growing regions.

Similarly, West Bengal, Jharkhand, Karnataka, and Haryana are top growers of capsicum. This year West Bengal, Karnataka and Haryana received excessive rain in August and September which is known for the harvesting period of capsicum while Jharkhand and Himachal Pradesh received less rains that impacted the crop," said an official of the Haryana agriculture department.

In the case of carrots, Haryana, West Bengal, Punjab, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh and Bihar are top producers in the country. This year's monsoon has impacted the production as some States got heavy rain while some had less rain during the harvesting period, said officials.

The retail prices of Sabzibhaji online vegetables and fruits store showed that retail prices of cauliflower is Rs 120 a kg; potato is at Rs 30 a kg; tomato is at Rs 35 a kg; onion is at Rs 30 per kg; peas is at Rs 160 a kg; Cabbage is at Rs 70 a kg; bottle gourd is Rs 50 a kg and ladies' finger is at Rs 60 a kg.

It was further alleged that the said company and its directors were manipulating the online examination of JEE (Mains) and facilitating aspiring students to get admission in top National Institute of Technology (NITs) in consideration of huge amount by solving the question paper of the applicant through remote access from a chosen examination centre in Sonapat (Haryana).

It was also alleged that the

accused used to obtain Xth and XIIth mark sheets, the user IDs, passwords, and post dated cheques of aspiring students in different parts of the country as security, and once admission was done, they used to collect a heavy amount ranging from Rs 12-15 lakh per candidate.

Searches were earlier conducted on September 2 last year at 19 places, including Delhi and NCR, Pune, Jamshedpur, Indore, and Bangalore, which led to the recovery of 25 laptops, seven personal computers, around 30 post-dated cheques along with voluminous incriminating documents/devices, including PDCs and mark-sheets of different students.

Earlier, last week, the Centre banned PFI and several of its associates/ fronts for five years under the stringent anti-terror law Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, accusing them of having "links" with global terror groups like ISIS and Jamat-ul-Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) and involvement in radicalization. The PFI was accused of indulging in "disturbing" the communal and secular fabric of the country and "posing a grave threat" to national security by advancing its radical ideology and calling for the establishment of political Islam in India besides allegedly carrying out targeted killings of Hindu activists.

The PFI, the Home Ministry alleged, is encouraging and trying to enforce a terror-based regressive regime, continue to propagate anti-national sentiments and radicalizing a particular section of society to create disaffection against the country, aggravating activities that are detrimental to the integrity, security and sovereignty of the country. Besides PFI, the associated outfits banned under the UAPA include the Rehab India Foundation, Campus Front of India, All India Imams Council, National Confederation of Human Rights Organisation, National Women's Front, Junior Front, Empower India Foundation and Rehab Foundation, Kerala.

With the ban, the PFI joins a dubious club of 43 proscribed outfits notified by the Union Home Ministry, including Communist Party of India (Maoists), Students Islamic Movement of India (SIMI), Pakistan-based Lashkar-e-Taayyaba and Jaish-e-Mohammad, Hizbul Mujahideen, Al Badr, global terror groups Al Qaeda and ISIS, Jamat-ul-Mujahideen Bangladesh, a host of Khalistani terror groups like Sikhs for Justice (SFJ) and several insurgent groups of the Northeast.

Superintendent of Police Anil Kumar said an FIR had been lodged at Aurai police station. Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath expressed grief at the loss of lives in the incident, his office said in a tweet on Sunday.

Yogi has directed officials to ensure that the injured get proper treatment. Meanwhile, sources confirmed that a digital show was going on at the pandal when the fire broke out on Sunday night, reducing the pandal in Narthua village to ashes.

More than 300 people were in the pandal when the blaze erupted and a majority of them were women and children.

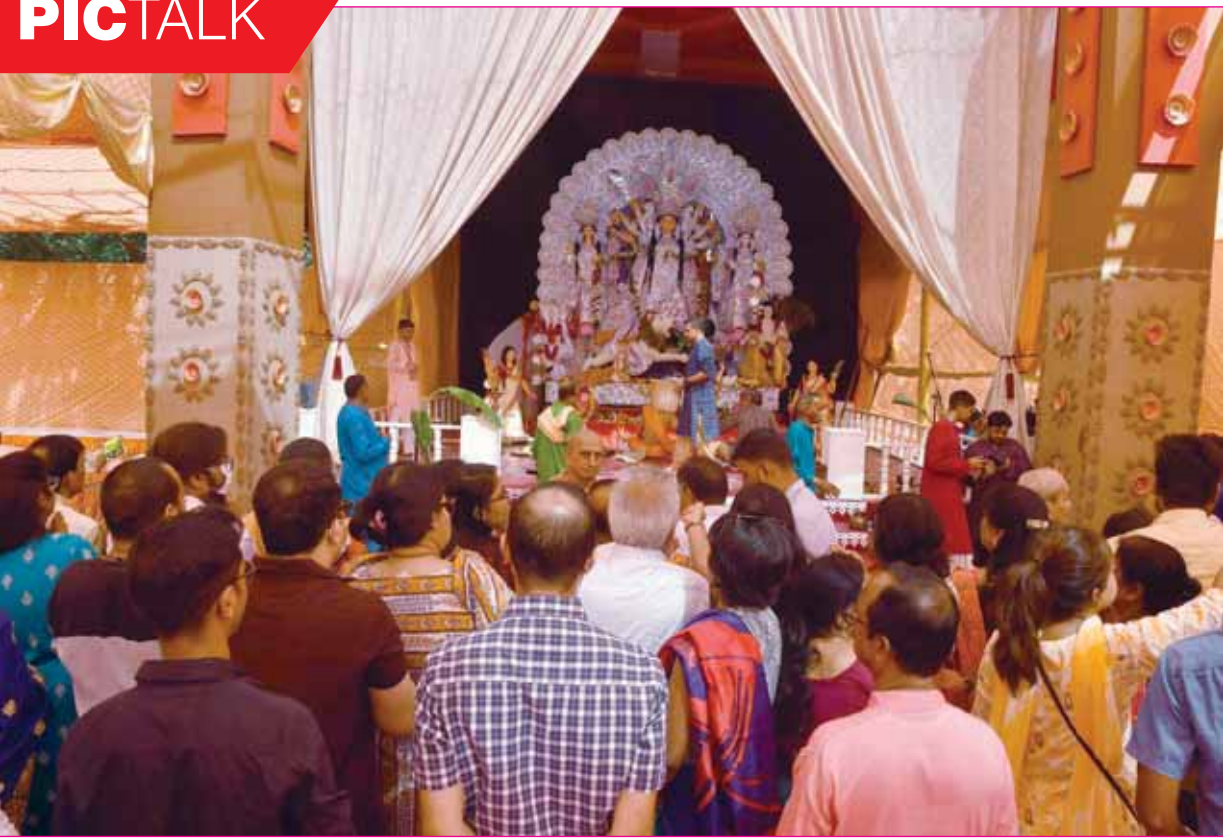

# L-G, AAP spar over Gandhi, Shastri jayantis

## CM should have been present, says Saxena; Kejriwal was campaigning in Guj, hits back party

STAFF REPORTER ■ NEW DELHI

Delhi Lieutenant-Governor (L-G) VK Saxena on Monday took strong exception to Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's absence at Raj Ghat and Vijay Ghat on October 2 and termed it appalling.

Saxena termed the absence of Kejriwal and his Ministers at Raj Ghat and Vijay Ghat, memorials to Gandhiji and Shastriji, on Sunday "unacceptable" and "appalling", saying such events call for "commemoration of much beyond the issuing of symbolic advertisements in newspapers that your Government very promptly did". The Aam



Aadmi Party (AAP) hit back at the L-G, saying Kejriwal could not attend the programmes as he was campaigning in Gujarat

for the Assembly polls and also accused Saxena of acting at the behest of Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

In his letter, the L-G wrote, "What makes this absence all the more unacceptable and appalling is the fact that President of India and Vice-President of India were invited for the program after approval from the Chief Minister, and the Deputy Chief Minister and Minister In-charge of General Administration Department (GAD), GNCTD, were in the loop."

"While Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia was perfunctorily present there for a few minutes, he did not deem the occasion fit enough for him to stay the course," the letter read. The L-G also reiterated that the importance of

propriety and bi-partisanship on matters of national sentiments and interests cannot be undermined and hoped that "you would take points raised by me in the right stead and spirit and take necessary measures to avoid such derelictions in future."

"Moreover, in accepting the invite from the Delhi Government, the President's Secretariat had clearly apprised the Chief Minister through his Additional Secretary, that it was expected of the Chief Minister to be present at the programme and receive the President at Vijay Ghat," the letter read. Saxena said organising the homage function at Vijay Ghat

is the responsibility of the city Government and the invitations were issued in the name of the Chief Minister. "This is not only highly improper but prima facie amounts to deliberate breach of protocol indicative of disrespect and insult to the President of India -- the highest constitutional authority of the Republic," the letter said.

The L-G noted that the Chief Minister's presence would have been befitting, but since he was travelling due to a prior political commitment, it "would have been in the gracious fitness of things" for him to have nominated a senior Minister on his behalf to attend

the events and accompany the President and Vice-President.

Saxena also flagged the general apathy in the maintenance and basic upkeep of the venue. "Right opposite the Samadhi gate, there was garbage and C&D waste strewn and basic cleanliness compromised. This again, was reflective of utter disrespect of one of our most respected leaders and an insult to his memory," he said.

In a statement, the AAP said Kejriwal has always been attended Gandhi Jayanti and Shastri Jayanti programmes in last several years. "CM was in Gujarat on that day and that's why he could not attend the

programme. It is important to understand the reason for L-G's letter.

CM addressed a very massive rally in tribal area of Gujarat against empty chairs of PM's programme in Ahmedabad just two days ago. PM is livid. This letter has been written by L-G on PM's instructions," the AAP claimed.

In a tweet, Sisodia said, "If BJP had walked the path shown by Gandhiji and Shastriji and built schools and did something for the farmers, it would have been better. This letter has been written after the crowd gathered for @ArvindKejriwal ji in Gujarat and there were empty chairs in the PM's rally."

# Fugitive killer of cop during Delhi riots nabbed in Aligarh

## Accused Wasim had not been in touch with his family in national Capital

Delhi Police has arrested a 33-year-old man, accused of killing Head Constable Ratan Lal during the 2020 northeast Delhi riots. He was nabbed from Aligarh in Uttar Pradesh. Police said that he was declared a 'Proclaimed Offender' by the Delhi High Court.

The accused has been identified as Mohammad Wasim alias Bablu alias Salman, a resident of Chand Bagh. Police said that after the riots, he had destroyed his mobile phone and did not even contact his relatives in the last two years.

Apart from Lal, the then Shahdara DCP, Amit Sharma and then ACP Gokulpuri, Anuj Kumar also sustained serious injuries along with 50 other policemen during the riots.

According to Ravindra Singh Yadav, Special Commissioner of Police, Crime, during the investigation, police identified and arrested 22 accused after



Thereafter, information was developed from Aligarh and it was confirmed that the accused was working in a small lock-making factory of one Dilshad. By then the team had also established his precise location, which subsequently paved the way for his arrest.

During interrogation, Wasim told police that in 2010, he came to Delhi and started living at his parents' house. He along with his friends started participating in the anti-CAA protest in February 2020 where he came in contact with several rabble rousers and anti-social elements.

On the day of the incident, he along with his associates, placed a carton of thinner-filled glass bottles also called crude bombs on the terrace of a house. These bottles were later thrown at police officers during the riots, he said.

According to police, on January 24, 2020, HC Lal, who was suffering from mild fever and was advised to take rest by his colleagues, joined duty in view of the grave tension in the area.

He helped the then DCP and ACP in pacifying the crowd and controlling it as the situation started heating up. He succumbed to 24 injuries he received while shielding officers when the crowd started attacking them.

# 1,700 responses to delimitation commission's draft report

The State Election Commission (SEC), set up by the Centre to re-carve municipal wards in the national Capital ahead of municipal polls, has received over 1,700 suggestions and objections on the delimitation commission's draft report.

Sources said after publication of the public notice on September 13 around 1,720 suggestions/objections were received till 5 PM on October 3. "These include suggestions from the public, political parties,

Resident Welfare Associations and Non-Governmental Organisations relating to either changing the ward boundaries or changing the names," they said.

Many applications received by the SEC are repeated in numbers and will be disposed off as per extant guidelines, thereby setting in motion process for issuance of Final Delimitation Order by Central Government. Last week, the AAP objected to the delimitation commission's draft report, flagging wide variations in number of electorates in dif-

ferent municipal wards. The party demanded equal distribution of voters across seats and civic elections "at the earliest".

To unify the three MCDs, a Bill was approved by the Lok Sabha on March 30 and by the Rajya Sabha on April 5. The Bill became an Act after President Ram Nath Kovind gave his assent to it on April 18. According to the Act, the number of wards in Delhi will reduce from the existing 272 to 250, which means that civic body will have to undergo a delimitation exercise before the election.

# SC stays gencos from cutting power supply to BRPL, BYPL

The Supreme Court has restrained Delhi power utilities from disconnecting electricity supply to BSES Rajdhani Power Ltd (BRPL) and BSES Yamuna Power Ltd (BYPL) and directed them to maintain status quo till further orders.

The power generation companies (gencos) Indraprastha Power Generation Company (IPGCL) and Pragati Power Corporation (PPCL)

had issued notices to BRPL and BYPL seeking payment of dues and threatening disconnection of supply to these distribution companies. A Bench of Justices SA Nazeer and V Ramasubramanian issued notices to the Ministry of Power, Delhi Electricity Regulatory Commission, Delhi Government and others while seeking their responses. "Issue notice. Until further orders, status quo, as it exists today, shall be maintained by the parties,"

the Bench said while posting the matter for resumed hearing after eight weeks.

The order came on a plea filed by BRPL seeking a direction to IPGCL, PPCL and others to act as per the top court's earlier orders and not take any coercive steps against them.

The apex court had, by its two orders dated March 26, 2014 and May 12, 2016, granted protection to the discoms against any coercive action, the petition stated.

Following a directive from the Union Home Ministry, the Delhi Police has provided Z-Plus category security cover to the newly-appointed Chief of Defence Staff (CDS) General Anil Chauhan.

Nearly 33 armed Delhi Police commandos will be stationed at the CDS' residence and accompany him during his travels. "CDS General Chauhan has been provided with Z-Plus security on the MHA's order," confirmed a senior police officer.

Gen Chauhan, a former Eastern Army Commander, took charge as the CDS over nine months after CDS Gen Rawat died in a helicopter crash in Tamil Nadu. The CDS is also the Principal Military Advisor to the Defence Minister on all tri-service matters as well as head of the

Department of Military Affairs as Secretary. He is also the Permanent Chairman of the Chiefs of Staff Committee. For the first time, a three-star retired officer has been appointed to hold a four-star rank office.

Born on May 18, 1961, Chauhan was commissioned into the 11 Gorkha Rifles of the Indian Army in 1981. The Z-Plus security cover, highest category after the Special Security Group that secures the Prime Minister, will comprise pilot/escort, close protection team of armed commandos, home guard, spotter, search-and-frisking staff.

Each person in the Z Plus security cover has received expert martial arts/unarmed combat training as also armed combat drills. They will carry high-end weapons and communication gadgets as part of the security detail.

# BJP gifted Delhi three mountains of garbage in 15 years, says AAP

# DU launches 6 courses to hike employability of students

With an aim to provide job-oriented programmes, the Delhi University on Monday launched six new courses, including Master of Business Administration, in the School of Open Learning (SOL). Addressing a press conference, Delhi University Vice-Chancellor Yogesh Singh that new courses have been added to the SOL curriculum after 28 years and these new courses will be job-oriented and professional curriculum-based.

"We are launching six new courses in SOL. The first course in Master of Business Administration. The second is Bachelor of Business

Administration (Financial Investment Analysis), Bachelor of Management Studies, Bachelor of Arts-Economics (Hons), Bachelor of Library and Information Sciences, Masters of Library and Information Sciences," said Singh.

Except MBA, the number of seats in all five new courses is unlimited. About 20,000 seats have been reserved for MBA for which admission will be merit-based.

"For the first time in the history of DU, through DDCE some management and other professional courses at both UG and PG-level have been started. It will set a standard by providing inclusive and quali-

ty education to all," he said.

The Vice-Chancellor noted that these UG-level and PG-level courses will increase the employability of the students manifold and help them to take strategic decisions.

"These courses have been launched after the approval from the Distance Education Bureau and All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE)," said Director of Campus of Open Learning Payal Mago.

During the launch, Mago gave a power-point presentation about the courses.

She said that about 5.5 lakh students take admission in SOL every year and with the addition of the new courses,

this number will only increase.

"These are very important courses – BBA, MBA, which is a very prestigious course of DU, Bachelor of Management Studies. There are management courses and job-oriented courses. A lot of students are unable to get admission into Economics courses in regular mode. This is also a flagship course of Delhi University," she said.

Meanwhile, the JNU Teachers' Association (JNTA) called on Vice Chancellor Santishree D Pandit to convene an "emergency" meeting to discuss "uncertainty" in the admission to PG and PhD programs due to CUET exercise.

# Rai launches Green War Room to combat city air pollution

NEW DELHI: To ensure effective implementation of the Winter Action Plan to curb pollution in the national Capital, the Delhi Environment Minister Gopal Rai on Monday launched an advanced Green War Room to monitor air pollution 24X7 in the city.

Addressing a press conference, Rai said that the Green War Room will work from the seventh floor of the Delhi Secretariat where a 12-member team comprising environment scientists and other officials will be deployed. "We have launched an advanced Green War Room from today and it will work round the clock. It will moni-

tor air pollution levels 24X7 and ensure that all necessary measures are taken to curb the pollution in accordance with the amended GRAP. The war room will also analyse pollution data of the city," Rai said.

Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) is a set of anti-air pollution measures followed in the national Capital and its vicinity according to the severity of the situation.

Rai said the war room will also be linked with Green Delhi App through which residents can send their complaints regarding pollution, such as garbage burning, to the war room. SR



# Curb stubble fire: Govt to Punjab

'Take crop residue management steps holistically'

The Centre on Monday asked the Punjab Government to chalk out a comprehensive action plan at the micro level for effective control of paddy stubble burning during the ensuing season. Abhilaksh Likhi, Additional Secretary in the Union Agriculture Ministry, told state officials to chalk out a detailed plan while attending a farm demonstration on Crop Residue Management (CRM) at Rangian village in Kharar tehsil of SAS Nagar district in Punjab.

"The states were also told to establish a mechanism to ensure effective utilisation of machines, promote the use of bio-decomposer in a complementary mode with the CRM machines, and promote ex-situ utilisation of straw by way of mapping demand from adjoining industries like biomass-based power plants, etc. ...If all the actions are taken at the State level in a holistic manner, stubble burning can be effectively controlled during



the coming season," Likhi said. Dr Likhi further stated that the objectives of the Crop Residue Management Scheme to check air pollution caused by residue burning. The residues burning also impact the soil fertility. He urged farmers to use crop residue management scheme for better future.

To promote the use of bio-decomposer technology, the Centre has revised the operational guidelines of the CRM scheme in August 2022 and provisions have been made for conducting large-scale demonstrations of bio-decomposer on farmers' fields by way of utilising flexi-funds under the

scheme.

To support the efforts of the Governments of Punjab, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh and Delhi to address air pollution caused due to stubble burning and to subsidize machinery required for management of crop residue, a Central Sector Scheme on Crop Residue Management has been introduced in 2018-19.

Under this scheme, financial assistance @ 50per cent is provided to the farmers for purchase of crop residue management machinery and @ 80per cent is provided to Coop. Societies, FPOs and Panchayats for establishment of

Custom Hiring Centres. The Scheme promote the usage of machines such as Super Straw Management Systems, Happy Seeder, Super Seeder, Smart Seeder, zero till seed cum fertilizer drill, Mulcher, Paddy Straw Chopper, hydraulically reversible mould board plough, Crop reapers and Reaper binders for in-situ management of crop residue and Balers & Rakes which are used for straw collection in the form of bales for other ex-situ uses of straw.

During the period from 2018-19 to 2021-22, ₹2440.07 crores (Punjab – ₹1147.62 crores, Haryana – ₹693.25 crores, Uttar Pradesh – ₹533.67 crores, NCT of Delhi – ₹4.52 Crores and ICAR– ₹61.01 crores) have been released.

During the current year, so far, an amount of ₹240.00 crores, ₹191.53 crores, ₹154.29 crores and ₹14.18 crores have already been released to the State of Punjab, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh and ICAR, respectively.

During the last four years, the states have distributed more than 2.07 lakh machines to the individual farmers and to more than 38000 CHCs in these 4 States, which also include more than 3243 Balers & Rakes which are used for ex-situ collection of straw.

# Modi to gift ₹3K cr projects to poll-bound Himachal

As in Gujarat, Prime Minister Narendra Modi will inaugurate a slew of developmental projects in poll-bound Himachal Pradesh including an AIIMS at Bilaspur, and participate in the famous Kullu Dussehra celebrations during his visit to the State on Wednesday.

Ahead of the visit BJP president JP Nadda and Union Minister Anurag Thakur visited the spot to oversee the preparation at Luhnu ground at Bilaspur. Himachal Pradesh and Gujarat would be electing new assemblies by the year-end.

The Prime Minister has also inaugurated a number of developmental projects in Gujarat including a super specialty hospital. On September 29, he laid the foundation stone and dedicated various projects worth more than Rs 3,400 crore in Surat, Gujarat.

Modi will inaugurate and lay the foundation stone for development projects worth over Rs 3,650 crore and also address a public meeting in Himachal Pradesh, an official statement said. It said Modi's vision and commitment to strengthening health services across the country is being



showcased again with the inauguration of AIIMS, Bilaspur.

The Prime Minister had laid the hospital's foundation stone in October 2017 and it has been established under the Centre's Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana, the statement said.

AIIMS, Bilaspur, constructed at a cost of more than Rs 1,470 crore, is a state-of-the-art hospital with 18 specialty and 17 super-specialty departments, 18 modular operation theatres and 750 beds, including 64 ICU beds.

Spread over 247 acres, the hospital is equipped with 24-hour emergency and dialysis facilities, modern diagnostic machines such as ultrasonography, CT scan and MRI among others. It also has a Jan Aushadhi Kendra and a 30-bed AYUSH block. The hospital has also set up a Centre for Digital Health to provide health

ED carries out search op, freezes ₹5.59 cr of E-nuggets app owner, associates

New Delhi: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) has carried out a search operation and froze the account balance of Rs 5.59 crore of one Aamir Khan and his accomplices under Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) in connection with an investigation relating to the mobile gaming app E-nuggets.

So far, an amount of Rs 36.96 crore has been frozen in this case.

The instant case was registered on the basis of an FIR dated February 15, 2021 filed under various sections of IPC by Park Street Police Station, Kolkata Police, against Aamir Khan and others, based on a complaint filed by Federal Bank authorities.

Accused Aamir Khan, who is in police custody now, launched a mobile gaming application namely E-Nuggets, which was designed for the purpose of defrauding the public. It was revealed during investigation that multiple accounts (more than 300) were used to launder the money.

On the basis of information available, the amount of Rs 5.59 crore lying in balance in the said related bank accounts has been frozen.

# Job on compassionate ground concession, not right: SC

Appointment on compassionate ground is a concession, not a right and the object of granting such employment is to enable the affected family to tide over a sudden crisis, the Supreme Court has said. The apex court last week set aside the judgement of a division Bench of the Kerala High Court, which confirmed the verdict of a single judge directing the Fertilisers and Chemicals Travancore Ltd and others to consider the case of a woman for appointment on compassionate ground.

A Bench of Justices MR Shah and Krishna Murari noted that the father of the woman was employed with

Fertilisers and Chemicals Travancore Ltd and died while on duty in April 1995.

At the time of his death, it noted, his wife was serving and therefore not eligible for appointment on compassionate ground. "After a period of 24 years from the death of the deceased employee, the respondent shall not be entitled to the appointment on compassionate ground," the Bench said.

According to the law laid down by the apex court on appointment on compassionate ground, equal opportunity for all Government vacancies should be provided to all aspirants as mandated under Articles 14 and 16 of the Constitution.

Article 14 of the Constitution deals with equality before law and Article 16 with equality of opportunity in matters of public employment.

"However, appointment on compassionate ground offered to a dependent of a deceased employee is an exception to the said norms. The compassionate ground is a concession and not a right," the Bench said in its judgment delivered on September 30.

The apex court noted that when the employee had died in 1995, his daughter was a minor. On attaining the age of major-

# Delhi court rejects bail plea of ex-DHFL promoters in loan scam of ₹42,871 cr

New Delhi: A Delhi court has dismissed the statutory bail plea of former Dewan Housing Finance Corporation Limited (DHFL) promoters, Kapil Wadhawan and his brother Dheeraj, arrested by the CBI in connection with a multi-crore bank loan scam case.

The accused had claimed before the court that since the CBI failed to file the charge-sheet against them within the mandatory 60-day period from their arrest, they had "indefeasible right" to statutory bail, also known as default bail, in the matter. The two accused were arrested in the present FIR on July 19. Special Judge Vishal Gogne, however, said the filing of the present charge

-sheet in the investigation shall rather be governed by Section 167(2)(a)(i) CrPC, which provides for a maximum period of 90 days. The judge noted that the accused were also charged with section 409 (criminal breach of trust by public servant, or by banker, merchant or agent) for which the maximum punishment was life imprisonment, "which brings the period of completion of investigation within the purview of Section 167(2)(a)(i) CrPC i.e. 90 days."

"Since the period of 90 days has not yet expired in the present investigation, which also relates to Section 409 IPC, applicants Kapil Wadhawan and Dheeraj Wadhawan are not

entitled to statutory bail under Section 167(2) CrPC. Both applications are dismissed," the court said in an order passed on September 30.

According to the FIR based on a complaint made by Union Bank of India, DHFL, Kapil Wadhawan, the then CMD, Dheeraj Wadhwan, the then Director, and other accused persons allegedly entered into a criminal conspiracy to cheat the consortium of 17 banks led by Union Bank of India and in pursuance of the said criminal conspiracy the said accused Kapil Wadhwan and others induced the consortium banks to sanction huge loans aggregating to Rs 42,871.42 crore.

with the Sikh community 'Heartfelt - The Legacy of Faith' will also be released on the occasion.

Jaishankar will also interact with several other New Zealand ministers, including Priyanka Radhakrishnan, Minister for Community and Voluntary Sector, Diversity, Inclusion and Ethnic Communities, and Youth. Radhakrishnan is the first person of Indian origin to become a minister in New Zealand.

Jaishankar will interact with parliamentarians, members of the business community as well as Indian diaspora, including students. In Wellington, Jaishankar will inaugurate the newly con-

structed building of the High Commission of India.

In Australia, the External Affairs Minister will visit Canberra and Sydney. Jaishankar will hold the 13th Foreign Ministers' Framework Dialogue with his Australian counterpart Penny Wong.

He will also meet Deputy Prime Minister and Defence Minister Richard Marles and have interactions with the Australian Navy, the media and think tanks, including the Lowy Institute in Sydney.

This will be Jaishankar's second visit to Australia this year. He had visited the country in February to attend the Quad Foreign Ministers' Meeting in Melbourne.

# CPWD again cancels bid for PM new house for admin reasons

For the second time in the last few months, the Central Public Works Department (CPWD) on Monday cancelled pre-qualification bids for the construction of the Rs 360-crore new residence for the Prime Minister citing "administrative reasons".

The new PM residence will be constructed as part of the Central Vista redevelopment project adjacent to the Rashtrapati Bhawan and South

Block. The bid was floated on October 1. An official said that the agency would soon call for pre-qualification bids again. According to the bid documents that were cancelled, the PM's residence would come up adjacent to Rashtrapati Bhawan and South Block and opposite to DRDO building in Blocks A & B, Dara Shikoh Road.

It stated that the CPWD had estimated the project (construction and maintenance for five years) to cost Rs 360 crore and take 21 months to com-

plete. On July 18, the CPWD, which comes under the Union Housing and Urban Affairs Ministry, had first floated the pre-qualification bid, but had withdrawn it on July 22 citing "administrative reasons". The redevelopment project of the Central Vista — the nation's power corridor — envisages new triangular Parliament building, a common central secretariat, new PM's residence and prime minister's office, and new vice-president's enclave, among others.

# Vaccination only form of protection against polio: Kapur

Rotary International, a non-profit global organization, has expressed concerned over the reemergence of polio in neighbouring countries in recent months with over 27 incidents of wild poliovirus being reported from different parts of the world including Afghanistan (2), Pakistan (19) and Mozambique (6).

"The detection of poliovirus, and even cases of Polio, in places where it hasn't been found for years has

demonstrated once again that eradicating a human disease isn't easy, especially in the final stages," said Deepak Kapur, Chairman, Rotary International's National PolioPlus Committee.

"The re-emergence of polio in these places highlights the importance of vaccination as the only form of protection against Polio and many other diseases. It draws attention to the work needed to encourage people to get vaccinated at a time when vaccination rates are dropping in some communities," said Kapur at a cycle

rally held here to commemorate Mahatma Gandhi's anniversary.

It's been over a decade since the last case was detected in 2011 and 8 years to India being declared Polio-free by the WHO in 2014.

Satish Upadhaya, Vice Chairman, North Delhi Municipal Corporation (NDMC), said, "With knowledge about the disease, the ostracization of patients will end, allowing them to live a life of dignity and security."

For every 10 microgram/metre cube increase in ambient pollutant PM2.5 exposure, the average anaemia prevalence among women increases by 7.23 per cent. PM 2.5 pollution are tiny air particles that are hazardous to human health.

On the contrary, says a study as it linked specific PM2.5 pollution to the common blood disorder, if India meets its recent clean-air targets, anaemia prevalence among women with reproductive age will fall from 53 per cent to 39.5 per cent, taking 186 districts below the national target of 35 per cent. The

study findings "Reducing the burden of anaemia in Indian women of reproductive age with clean-air targets" are published in journal Nature Sustainability Ironically, India has one of the highest, ie 53 per cent, global prevalence of anaemia among women of reproductive age.

The NFHS-5 findings too reveal that the prevalence of anaemia has increased among children, women of all age groups including pregnant women, and men. This increase in prevalence was observed in almost all the states barring a few exceptions.

Even as the Government is finding reasons to cut down anemia prevalence, the study



by the researchers shows that long-term exposure to ambient fine particulate matter (PM2.5), a type of air pollution, may increase the prevalence of anaemia through sys-

temic inflammation. The researchers used a linear mixed model adjusted for potential confounding factors, showing that for every 10µg/m<sup>3</sup> increase in ambient PM2.5

exposure, the average anaemia prevalence among Indian women of reproductive age increases by 7.23 per cent. Among PM2.5 species, sulfate and black carbon are more

associated with anaemia than organics and dust. Among sectoral contributors, industry was the greatest, followed by the unorganized, domestic, power, road dust, agricultural waste burning and transport sectors.

"Our results suggest that the transition to clean energy would accelerate India's progress towards the 'anaemia-free' mission target," said the scientists led by the Indian Institute of Technology-Delhi, who used multiple datasets, including NFHS and satellite data to link pollution and health. Thus, ambient air pollution, which is known to cause not only substantial morbidity and mortality globally

but also adverse health outcomes, including cardiovascular and respiratory disease, diabetes and low birth weight, is now known to cause anaemia also. The researchers included Ekta Chaudhary, Sagnik Dey, Santu Ghosh and, Srishti Jain (All from IIT-Delhi) and Anura V Kurpad( both from St. John's Medical College, Bengaluru), Sumit Sharma, Nimish Singh, Shivang Agarwal (All from TERI, Delhi) Kushal Tibrewal and Chandra Venkataraman (IIIT-Mumbai), Aaron J. Cohen(Health Effects Institute, USA) and Shuxiao Wang (School of Environment, Tsinghua University, Beijing, China).

# Nothing more insulting: Cong on Min Misra's continuation on 1st anniv of Kheri killings

Misra's son Ashish Misra was arrested in the case after four farmers were crushed under the wheels of a convoy of cars and four others, including two BJP workers, were killed in apparently retaliatory violence.

It was a historic day and shows people's support to the yatra, he said. The more Gandhi and people are praised for this, the less it will be, he claimed. Congress delegates who are part of the foot march may vote in the election for the party president through postal

ballots, he said, adding there is also a possibility that they can come down to Bengaluru to vote on October 17. The yatra will be passing through Karnataka around that time.

Ramesh claimed that popular support to the yatra has rattled the BJP and slammed the Enforcement Directorate's summons to Karnataka Congress president D K Shivakumar in the National Herald case as continuation of the government's 'vendetta politics'.

# ED attaches assets of ex-IT Dept officer in PMLA case

## Andasu Ravinder was forced into retirement on charges of graft by Centre years ago

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Monday said it has attached assets on money laundering charges worth ₹7.33 crore of a former Income Tax Department officer Andasu Ravinder who was compulsorily retired by the Union

Government a few years back on charges of corruption.

Five immovable properties of Andasu Ravinder have been provisionally frozen as per an order issued under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) on September 30.

Ravinder, an Indian Revenue Service (IRS) officer of the 1991 batch, last served as an Additional Director of the Income Tax (I-T) department in Chennai.

He was arrested by the CBI in August, 2011, when an alleged bribe amount of ₹50



lakh was being delivered at his residence.

Ravinder was compulsorily retired from service, along with a number of other I-T department officers, on charges of corruption by the Union

finance ministry in 2019 under Section 56 J of Central Civil Services Conduct Rules.

The money laundering case was filed against the officer on the basis of a CBI FIR against him which which claimed that "during the check period from 01.01.2005 to 29.08.2011 disproportionate assets (DA) of more than ₹ 2.32 crore was generated by the former I-T department officer and his wife Kavitha Andasu."

The CBI had said the DA of the couple was 171.41 per cent more than their known sources of income.

# Man playing Hanuman suffers heart attack, dies on stage

A 50-year-old man playing the role of Lord Hanuman in a Ramlila died on stage during his performance in Salempur village of Fatehpur district. The incident happened on Saturday night when Ram Swaroop, who was dressed as Lord Hanuman, suffered a heart attack after his tail caught fire. "During Ramlila's presentation, soon after the tail of Hanuman was set afire, Ram Swaroop, who was playing the character, slumped to the

ground and died within a minute. He was taken to the hospital where he was pronounced dead," an official said.

According to reports, Ram Swaroop's wife Anusuiya and other family members were present when the incident took place. "He is survived by his wife and two-year-old daughter, Roopa," officials said.

Village head Gulab said Ram Swaroop used to ferry a cart to make his living.

The family performed the last rites of the body on Sunday evening without informing the

police. Station House Officer of Dhata, Praveen Kumar, said the incident had come to his notice and a police team would visit the village to investigate the incident.

In yet another similar incident in Mainpuri, a young man, Ravi Sharma, was playing the role of Lord Hanuman in a play staged on the occasion of Ganesh Chaturthi a few days back. He was seen dancing on the stage during his act when he suddenly slumped on the ground and later died in the hospital.

## Man dies while dancing at garba event, shocked father too passes away

**Palghar:** A 35-year-old man died while dancing at a garba event in Virar town of Maharashtra's Palghar district, police said on Monday.

Manish Narapji Sonigra collapsed while dancing at the garba event. He was rushed to a hospital and was declared dead. Unhinged by the news, the man's father also collapsed and died on the spot. **PTI**

It also signifies creation as trees and-plants grow on earth."

Down South at Tridhara Sanmilani the organisers have made a superb artistic depiction of Daur (Run) as their theme through chains, amultitude of ladders, cycle handles, car steering and statuette toshow how the mankind right from womb to grave are engaged in the mighty Run to achieve their respective goals be it mundane, be it divine. In the process they are all rendered puppets in the hands of

Mahakaal or the Great Time.

"Like puppets are devoid of self conceit ... those involved in the Run are expected to dissolve their egotism ... this is why the Asura(demon), Mahisha (buffalo) or the Lion here have been depicted in a humble mood with no anger or pride ... they are all under the feet of the Mother residing in peace," says Gauranga Quilla the artiste.

The exquisitely designed marquees and the sparkling presence of theMother seem to have driven people mad this year. And with the pandal hoppers ready to compensate for the two-year loss that they suffered "Corona Asura" invaded the earth the Kolkata streets are witnessing overwhelming rush: 24x7 . "It could well be beyond 45-50lakh people on the road anytime," said a senior police officer.

## Discordant note

RSS leader Dattatreya Hosabale talks about poverty, joblessness, and the growing inequality

Whenever there are reports highlighting some unlovely aspect of India—low human development indices, hunger, press restrictions, *et al*—the Government and the Bharatiya Janata Party go hammer and tongs after the authors and publishers concerned. Often their motives and methodologies are questioned; there are also *ad hominem* attacks on such reports. The BJP's IT Cell greatly relishes in rubbishing such accounts. But what would they do with RSS general secretary Dattatreya Hosabale? On Sunday, he talked about the issues the Government and the BJP dislike to discuss: poverty, joblessness, and the growing inequality in the country. Poverty in the country is standing like a demon in front of us, he said, adding that it is important that we slay this demon. He also talked about 20 crore people who are below the poverty line and 4 crore who are unemployed. The unemployment rate is 7.6 per cent, he said. It is obvious that Hosabale's views cannot be dismissed as the rants of the Khan Market gang or the fulminations of *tukde-tukde* folks; he is one of their own, and that too from the RSS, the nucleus of the saffron family. If he says something, he has to be heard—not just what he is saying but also what he is not. And what is between the lines.



While the Narendra Modi Government has done well on many fronts—infrastructure development, managing the fiscal deficit, privatisation being some of them—its record in other spheres has been less than satisfactory. On individual freedom and civil liberties, for instance, its performance has been, to put it mildly, suboptimal; that, however, doesn't bother the RSS. But poverty and unemployment are visible and palpable; only ardent BJP supporters can say that joblessness or poverty is not a very big issue; apparently, Hosabale is not one of them. Therefore, it is time the Government addressed these grave issues with the seriousness that they call for. To begin with, it should discard the denial mode and accept that there are problems. It should try to get out of the echo chamber that it has built with itself, with its propaganda machinery working round the clock and a large section of the media becoming its cheerleaders. Once out of the echo chamber, the Government should take right steps, which are essentially on the supply side, to take the economy out of the morass it is in. And, by the way, grand announcements and tokenist measures make sound economic policy. As for Hosabale, his candour and straightforwardness regarding the problems of the economy are admirable, but we don't know what kind of solutions he or his organisation, RSS, has in mind. The RSS-affiliate Swadeshi Jagran Manch, at whose webinar he made his remarks, offers something as nebulous as 'Bharatiya Economic Model,' which is nothing but a hodgepodge of homilies. Economic policy needs more than homilies; both the Government and the RSS must realise this.

# In pursuit of truth and self discovery

Gandhi ji's experiments with truth continued throughout his life as did his perseverance to purge him of all defilements

The life of MK Gandhi is the unique saga of a person; pure in heart, word, and deed, one who was consistently, consciously growing up. This author of 'My Experiments with Truth' grew from 'truth to truth' and, as was inevitable in such a case, had no hesitation in changing his views and comprehension based upon new experiences and insights.

In the current national political scenario, with elected representatives and 'leaders' changing sides and dumping their so-called ideological commitments without any hitch or hesitation, it may be relevant to point out how 'growing up' has been stunted in the absence of a principled, value-based approach to public service. When one is committed to truth, the contrast becomes evident, so succinctly articulated by Gandhi Ji in the 'Harijan' of April 29, 1933: "*I am not at all concerned to be consistent in my search after truth. I have discarded many ideas and learned many new things. Old as I am in age, I have no feeling that I may cease to grow inwardly or that my growth will stop at the dissolution of the flesh. What I am concerned with is my readiness to obey the call of truth, my God, from moment to moment*". This statement indicates the purity in thought and words, as also the transparency in approach and action. Only such a person could proclaim unequivocally that my life is my message!

It may be worthwhile to recall two of the initial impacts young Barrister MK Gandhi encountered on his arrival in South Africa, one highly painful and humiliating, and the other so inspiring that it overhauled his approach to life. Both of these are well known, the first being so traumatic and devastating that it could unsettle any mature person.

The other is uniquely transformative, inspiring enough to change the very course of Gandhi's life and living. His



being thrown out of the first class train compartment despite having a valid ticket simply because of his color, and subsequent human thrashing in a horse-drawn carriage again because of the policy of apartheid, hurt him immensely. Anyone who reads his description of these two in the autobiography would be rattled beyond words. When he was being slapped by a white man in the horse carriage, there were some Englishmen who protested and mentioned that as he had the ticket, he should be allowed to retain his seat, but that was of no avail.

He could discover positivity even during that episode! For a person who trusted in growing up, there was a realization: not all white men are inhuman, and not all of them support color prejudice. Expand it: in every caste, color creed, and religion, not all persons are the same!

Even before alighting from the ship for the first time on the shores of South Africa, he had witnessed how Dada Abdullah was being humiliated when had gone to receive him. The young Barrister, not yet familiar with all that sprung out of color prejudice, was upset, 'why Dada Abdullah' was

suffering all that! It was only after the subsequent personal agonies he suffered, a fresh realization dawned upon him, and that expanded his horizons beyond self or individual sufferings.

What if I get one or two persons punished for the pain and insult inflicted upon me? Generations have suffered for no fault of theirs; they were forced to lead a sub-human life, for no fault of theirs! Why should I not fight against the widespread inhuman malice? And his entire struggle - and stay in South Africa - was a consequence of the thought process that emanated from these tragic experiences. An American Dr. Mote once asked Gandhi Ji: "What was the most creative incident in your life?" To this Gandhi Ji replied that there were several that he could recall as the most significant creative incidents in his life.

However, the most creative one was the throwing out of the railway compartment at Pietermaritzburg! It was at Pietermaritzburg Mohandas Gandhi realized "any individual who lies or is unjust is most scared of his lie or injustice being found out"! And from the womb of fear,

cruelty is born! The seeds of the first principle of Satyagrah were born here: The malice; he realized; is deep and such a person is indeed 'diseased'!

So, this person must be treated with care, treated on a human level, and cured! Why have any prejudices towards him? Maybe the seeds of his great conviction 'hate the sin, and not the sinner' were sown during the churning of ideas at that stage. Generations ahead shall continue to study and analyze Gandhi.

The two instances cited above are often casually recalled, but these probably deserve a far deeper comprehension and conviction given their strength and potential. One could conclude with the words of Narayan Desai: "*It is possible that if we want to bring about social change by the methods that Gandhi gave us, it is a mental challenge. Let us accept it.*" And this is not a small challenge; it is the only alternative in times of the global realization that for the survival of humanity and the planet earth, we have to 'learn to live together'!

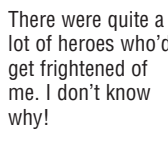

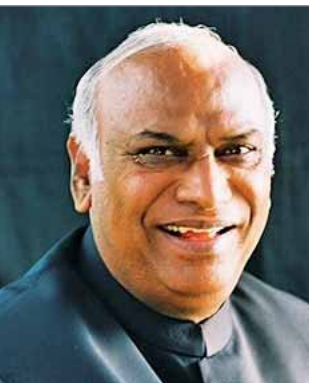

time he opens his mouth much to the consternation of the party's high command. Juxtaposed to the congress the BJP got its party chief nominated JP Nadda once again without any fuss. The congress election is drawing attention for all the wrong reasons. Though a benign exercise in making the party more democratic and showing that the Gandhis are not inflicting, is not carrying much weight. It all started well as Shashi Tharoor and Ashok Gehlot were in the fray but after the Gehlot debacle the high command sort of backed Mallikarjun Kharge as their man Friday. This is as bad as having Gandhi at the helm of affairs. And this is precisely the reason the congress election is being watched so eagerly by one and all. Besides, the one consideration that weighs in his favor is his unflinching loyalty to the first family. He is perhaps the only dependable guy the congress leadership has.

At the age of 80, unlike Shashi Tharoor, he is bereft of ambition and is widely accepted in the party for his nonpartisan stance. Besides, he is non-controversial and no motor mouth like Digvijay Singh who has a habit of landing in trouble every

While addressing a meeting of Vice Chancellors of state-run universities, Tamil Nadu Chief Minister MK Stalin spoke of a Bill passed by the state Assembly which empowers the government to appoint them. Stalin said that the Bill empowers the state government to appoint the Vice-Chancellors. He said that it is the right of the state government to appoint Vice-Chancellors. "This is an issue related to the state government's right; it is the right of the government elected by the people; it is related to education rights of state universities," he said.

The said Bill is still pending with the Governor and it is possible that he may give his assent or he can withhold the bill with him for any uncertain period of time. Can any person holding any office be expected to give his assent to a bill which curtails his power?

Article 200 of the Constitution provides that "the Governor shall declare either that he assents to the Bill or that he withholds assent therefrom".

In 1976, by the 42nd Amendment of the Constitution, education was placed in the concurrent list. It is also well settled that if there is a conflict between the Parliament and the State Legislature on any law in the Concurrent List, the Union Law will prevail.

The University Grants Commission (UGC) was formulated in November 1956 as a statutory body of the Indian Government via an Act of Parliament which is for the coordination, determination, and maintenance of standards of university education in India and these Act/Regulations shall apply to all recognized Universities as defined under Section - 2(f) of the UGC Act and all such recognised universities as per UGC Norms.

On 5th September 2019, the UGC issued a handbook for vice chancellors. It contains the recommendations of various committees namely 'The Radhakrishnan Commission (1948)', 'The Kothari Commission (1964)' and the 'Gnanam Committee (1990)'.

As per the Radhakrishnan Commission, the appointment of VC is done by the Governor. Though subsequent committees have prescribed various methods to be adopted while searching for a fit person for the VC's post, there is no change in this.

Since education is in concurrent list and as UGC has been established under a Central Act and as per UGC guidelines only the Governor can appoint VCs, the validity of the present bill passed by Tamil Nadu Assembly is doubtful.

During March 2022, (Writ Petition (Civil) No.1525 OF 2019 Gambhirdan K Gadhvi (S) versus The State of Gujarat & Others), the Supreme Court held that appointment of a Vice Chancellor of a University, even under a State legislation, cannot be contrary to the provisions of the UGC Regulations. The apex court noted that in cases where the State legislature is repugnant to the Central legislation, Central legislation is to prevail as per Article 254 as education is in the Concurrent List.

The court said, "It cannot be disputed that the UGC Regulations are enacted by the UGC in exercise of powers under section 26(1)(e) and 26(1)(g) of the UGC Act 1956. Even as per the UGC Act every rule and regulation made under the said Act, shall be laid before each House of the Parliament. Therefore, being a subordinate legislation, UGC Regulations become part of the Act. In case of any conflict between State legislation and Central legislation, Central legislation shall prevail by applying the rule/principle of repugnancy as enunciated in Article 254 of the Constitution as the subject 'education' is in the Concurrent List of the Constitution".

# Skilling is amplifying capable workforce

Skilling institutions have seized opportunities to make a difference as new opportunity knocks at India

Even though the first Industrial Training Institute (ITI) was established in 1950 and around 10,000 ITIs were opened in the country in the following seven decades, it took 72 years for the first-ever convocation of ITI students. This fact is another example which proves that in India, skilling has been a neglected area for policymakers.

It was only in the eleventh five-year plan that skill development got a chapter for it. However, since then there had been a steady increase in its importance and a dramatic change happened when Narendra Modi took charge of the country. Enhancing the employability of Indian workers through world-class skill training has been a major thrust area in the past eight years.

If we closely examine the Prime Minister's approach to skilling, three major dimensions appear. One, bring skill development to the centre of policy making. In 2014, a separate ministry to look at skills came into existence and one of the early flagship programmes of the government was 'Skill India'. The efforts paid off and nearly 5,000 new ITIs have been opened in the country and over four lakh seats have been added in the last eight years.

Annually, more than one crore youth has been joining and benefitting from the 'Skill India' programme, a Mission under the Ministry to equip youth with skills for better livelihood. More than 1.3 crore candidates have been trained under PMKVY, and numbers will surely increase in the future as the Centre is going to open more than 5,000 new 'Skill Hubs' to promote skill development in India.

Increasing the aspirational value of skill development and its integration with formal education has been the second dimension of the Prime Minister's approach. It has been mentioned on many occasions that knowledge must not be limited to academic qualifications only, skill to do something is equally important and this skill must be treated as equivalent to the other qualifications. This idea is best spelt out in the National Education Policy, which encourages experience-based learning.

The Prime Minister considers skill development as the way to develop a future-ready workforce and this brings us to the third dimension of his approach, i.e., research to understand the changing world of work and be proactive and agile in formulating the policies and designing the action. If we look at the recent speeches of the Prime Minister, especially his address to the national labour conference where he not only mentioned Industry 4.0 and robotics but also underlined the change in the employment relations like work from anywhere and flexible working hours. He called these changes opportunities for women's labour force participation and asked the labour

ministry which is preparing its vision for 2047 in 'Amrit Kaal' to think in the direction of what can be done for women in the newly emerging sectors in the country.

When we look from this perspective, the Prime Minister's address at 'Kaushal Dikshant Samaroh' of ITI looks like a follow-up. Unlike the National Labour Conference, this time the PM was talking to a heterogeneous group that consisted of students as well as policymakers. So, this time he had tasks for both of them. Highlighting that job opportunities in the country are also rising with the advancement of technology, he asked students to upgrade their skills in line with the future with the mantra of 'Skilling, Reskilling and Upskilling', while keeping an eye on the latest developments in their fields.

At the same time, he also emphasized that as India is taking a lead in the fields of renewable energy, solar power, and electric vehicles, the introduction of courses related to these areas in several ITIs will further facilitate job seekers. If we look at India's journey since independence, it is a sad state of affairs that despite establishing a few institutions that find themselves among the world leaders in research, a culture of research and development with the aim to lead the world failed to develop. It happened in the field of science, social science, business and also in policymaking. The Prime Minister tried to address the issue from the very beginning, and the formation of NITI Aayog was meant for this purpose only.

Besides, there is also PM-

EAC that advises the Prime Minister on economic issues. But, similar arrangements at the level of different ministries and institutions, that not only understand the Prime Minister's vision but decode it in the light of the mandate of that ministry or institution needs further strengthening.

If we limit ourselves to the labour ministry, which is responsible for looking after the largest chunk of our population and directly addressing the issues coming up because of the changing world of work, it has two institutions that have the mandate for labour market research -- VV Giri National Labour Institute and Dattopant Thengadi National Board of Workers Education and Development (DTNBWED). These institutions served the country well during the second and third industrial revolutions.

We were laggards during the first three industrial revolutions but one of the leaders in industry 4.0. We are ahead of many developed countries in digital infrastructure and this lead is going to be there at least for the near future. We need a similar lead in terms of labour market regulations and the employability of our workforce. The labour codes especially the one that deals with social security are very much open-ended and have a futuristic approach like the importance of the gig and platform economy. DTNBWED has taken a few steps in this direction, as it signed one MoU with Motilal Nehru National Institute of Technology (MNNIT) for resource sharing and another with Indira Gandhi National Open

University (IGNOU) that paves the way for diploma and certification of the workers. The courses aim to promote digital literacy, promote new age trade unionism, produce certified experts on labour laws and build capacity.

But a lot needs to be done on the employability front to realize the potential of the emerging sector. As the International Labour Organization (ILO) stated that a large part of the success in the era of industry 4.0 depends upon the workers being pre-informed about the new emerging sectors and skilled for new job roles. It enables them to make better educational and training choices, and the country also gets benefited because of better use of skills and human capital development. The proactive identification of the future skill requirement, and their impartation requires a high level of synchronization between different institutions, agility and focus on fundamental research.

We are also looking to certify the skills of the unorganized workers registered on e-Shram with the help of the institutions and schemes meant for this purpose. The era of Industry 4.0 is going to be very different. To successfully meet the new challenges and maintain the position of leadership, not only the Ministry of Labour and Employment, but its institutions also need to immediately re-calibrate themselves for the future, because as the Prime Minister himself said the 'Fourth Industrial Revolution' requires quick decisions and fast implementation.

# Lungs bear the brunt of growing air pollution

Reports suggest alarming rise in air pollution in India and the consequent damage because of ailments related to bad air

Lungs as we know are the primary organs for respiration. They work tirelessly to supply oxygen to the body and expel carbon dioxide. Breathing also assists in the ability to speak and sing. Life begins with the first breath and ends with the last breath. It is important for the functioning of the body and all its organs up to the minutest cellular level. We breathe 10,000 liters of air daily to have 350 liters of oxygen. We can live without food for three weeks, without water for three days, but we can't live without oxygen for more than three minutes. The Covid-19 pandemic revealed the importance of oxygen, lungs and lung specialists. The respiratory system is continuously affected by exposure to various types of harmful agents

or pollutants present in the environment. It is estimated that at least two billion people worldwide are exposed to toxic fumes produced by the combustion of biomass fuels. More than seven billion people breathe polluted air.

The respiratory system and lungs are the most affected human organs because of air pollution. Some common effects are cough, wheezing, shortness of breath, asthma, pneumonia and reduced lung capacity in children, airway obstruction, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), lung cancer, and many more.

Air pollution is now considered the world's biggest environmental health threat, causing seven million deaths worldwide each year. Every

year 17 lakh people die in India due to the air pollution. Air pollution exacerbates asthma, lung cancer, other lung diseases, while also aggravating many ailments such as heart diseases.

Almost all Indians breathe air that is in excess of World Health Organization guidelines. Its 2021 Report highlights that 11 of the 15 most polluted cities in Central and South Asia were from India. Around 16.7 lakh deaths in India were attributable to air pollution accounting for 17.8 per cent of the total deaths in the country in 2019. This means, three deaths per minute were attributable to air pollution in India.

Among risk factors for early death globally after high blood pressure, tobacco, and poor diet in 2019, air pollution takes

the fourth spot. Globally, around 40 per cent of deaths from chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), 30 per cent of deaths from lower respiratory infections, and 19 per cent of deaths from lung cancer were attributable to air pollution. In India, lung diseases due to air pollution lead to around 45 per cent of deaths and 40 per cent of loss due to ill-health, disability, or early death. Immediate and proper action is needed to combat air pollution and bring about change.

The impact of respiratory diseases includes both chronic conditions like COPD and acute illnesses like pneumonia or lower respiratory tract infections. More than 2.5 million people died from pneumonia in 2019, making it one of the most prevalent acute

illnesses and causes of death in the world. It is also the greatest cause of death for people over 65 and for children under the age of five, who are not newborns.

Additionally, SARS-CoV-2 mortality increased dramatically as a result of Covid-19 in adults who had underlying comorbidities, notably in those who developed respiratory disease or pneumonia, killing more than 6.3 million individuals, mostly from respiratory causes. In 2020, 1.5 million people died from TB, making it the most prevalent lethal infectious disease after the COVID-19 pandemic. Worldwide, more than 10 million individuals contracted TB, while 2.6 million people were affected in India. The onset of chronic respiratory disease may

also be linked to such acute respiratory infections and other genetic-environmental interactions, with childhood illness establishing a developmental trajectory for poor health. Globally, an estimated 544.9 million people suffered from a chronic respiratory condition in 2017. In the world, COPD affects almost 200 million people, or four per cent of the population, and kills 3.2 million people annually, making it the third greatest cause of mortality. Asthma affects 350 million people worldwide (35 million in India) and is the most frequent chronic disease in children.

Children are particularly vulnerable because they are still growing and their lungs, brains, and immune systems are developing. Exposure to air pollu-

tion at a young age can hinder lung growth, inhibit brain development and increase the risk of conditions such as asthma. Asthmatic children's lungs and airways become easily inflamed, resulting in bothersome daily symptoms that interfere with play, sports, school, and sleep.

LiFE (Life For Environment) movement was launched by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on June 5, 2022. He said that LiFE's vision is to live a lifestyle that is in tune with our planet and does not harm it. Those who lead such a life are known as 'Pro-Planet People.' Mission LiFE borrows from the past, operates in the present, and looks forward. Our lives are woven with the concepts of reduce, reuse, and recycle.



# Ukraine claims gains in Russia annexed region

Ukrainian troops continued to push forward Monday with their offensive that has embarrassed Moscow, with Kyiv officials and foreign observers hinting at new gains in the strategic southern region of Kherson that the Kremlin wants to annex.

Kherson has been one of the toughest battlefields for the Ukrainians, with slower progress when compared with Ukraine's breakout offensive around the country's second largest city of Kharkiv, in the northeast, that began last month.

Kherson is one of the four regions illegally annexed by Moscow last week after a "referendum" orchestrated by the Kremlin. The lower house of the Kremlin-controlled parliament is set to ratify the treaties Monday, and the upper house will follow the next day.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said Monday that two of those regions, Donetsk and Luhansk, are joining Russia with their administrative borders that existed before a conflict erupted there

in 2014 between pro-Russian separatists and Ukrainian forces.

He noted that the issue of the borders of the two other regions — Zaporizhzhia and Kherson — remains open.

"We will continue to discuss that with residents of those regions," Peskov said in a conference call with reporters. He did not provide additional details.

Ukrainian media outlets on Monday highlighted an image of Ukrainian troops displaying flags at a marker for the village of Khreshchenivka, which is in the same area of Kherson where troops apparently have broken through Russian lines.

Ukraine has pressed its counteroffensive in the Kherson region since the summer, relentlessly pummeling Russian supply lines and making inroads into the areas west of the Dnieper River held by the Russians.

The Ukrainian military has successfully used U.S.-supplied HIMARS multiple rocket launchers to repeatedly hit the main bridge across the Dnieper in the city of Kherson and a dam that served as a second main crossing.



It also has struck pontoon bridges that Russia has used to supply its troops on the western bank of the river after the main crossings were made inoperable.

Despite the successful strikes on supply lines, Ukrainian offensive operations in the south so far have been

slower and less successful compared with the northeast, as the open terrain easily exposed the attacking force to Russian artillery fire and airstrikes.

Russian military bloggers close to Moscow have increasingly acknowledged that Ukraine has superior manpower, backed by tank units, in

the area.

A Russian-installed official in the Kherson region, Kirill Stremousov, admitted in a video statement on Monday morning that the Ukrainian forces "have broken through a little deeper." However, he insisted that "everything is under control" and that Russia's

"defense system is working" in the region.

Russia attacked Ukrainian President Vladimir Zelenskyy's hometown and other targets Sunday with suicide drones, and Ukraine took back full control of a strategic eastern city in a counteroffensive that has reshaped the war.

Russia's recent loss of the eastern city of Lyman, which it had been using as a transport and logistics hub, was a new blow to the Kremlin as it seeks to escalate the war by illegally annexing the four regions of Ukraine and heightening threats to use nuclear force.

Russian President Vladimir Putin's land grab has threatened to push the conflict to a dangerous new level.

It also prompted Ukraine to formally apply for fast-track NATO membership.

In his nightly address Sunday, Zelenskyy discussed the recent liberation of Lyman, a key Russian node for logistics on the front line in the northeast. "The story of the liberation of Lyman in the Donetsk region has now become the most popular in the media — but the successes of our soldiers are not limited to Lyman," Zelenskyy said.

Lyman, which Ukraine recaptured by encircling Russian troops, is in the Donetsk region near the border with Luhansk. In his broadcast, Zelenskyy also thanked troops from his hometown near Kherson. "To the soldiers of the 129th Brigade of my native

Kyryv Rih, who distinguished themselves with good results and liberated, in particular, Arkhanhelske and Myroliubivka," he said.

Those two villages are in the same area where Ukrainian troops have been making advances.

A photo emerged at the weekend showing Ukrainian forces' operation southwest of Novovorontsovka on the banks of the Dnieper River.

Ukraine's presidential office said Monday that Russian shelling of eight Ukrainian regions over the past 24 hours killed two civilians and injured 14 more.

It also reported advances in the Kherson region and said that the Russian authorities in response restricted people from leaving the city of Kherson, introducing special permits for those who want to leave.

Since the Russian offensive started in February, Ukrainian forces have recently managed to retake swaths of territory, notably in the northeast around Kharkiv, in a counteroffensive in recent weeks that has embarrassed the Kremlin and prompted rare domestic criticism of Putin's war.

## Fleeing Russians follow path of 1917 refugees to Istanbul

Vladimir Putin's military draft "changed everything" for the tens of thousands of Russians who have fled their country since the Russian leader's mobilisation was announced last month, according to recent arrivals in Istanbul.

Niki Proshin, 28, left St Petersburg last week, part of a torrent of Russian men escaping their homeland following Putin's September 21 declaration of a "partial mobilisation" for the war in Ukraine.

The Russian military call-up came as some Russian troops have been forced to retreat amid a Ukrainian counteroffensive.

"Last week changed everything for hundreds of thousands of other people who decided to leave Russia," he said. "The main reason is the danger of being drafted into the Russian army."

Turkey, which has maintained air links with Russia while other countries blocked flights and does not impose visa restrictions on Russian visitors, has been a popular destination for those leaving for "any place" they can reach.

Turkish officials have not released data on how many Russians may have arrived in Turkey to flee the draft, but Russia is close to the top of a list of countries that sends tourists to Turkey, after Germany.

Some 3 million Russians have visited the country so far



this year.

Turkish media have also reported an increase in the number of Russians purchasing or renting houses in Turkey.

The NATO-member country, which relies on Russia for its energy needs and tourism, has not joined US and EU sanctions against Moscow.

It has tried to balance its relations with both Russia and Ukraine, positioning itself as a mediator between the two.

Proshin, a YouTube vlogger originally from the Siberian city of Omsk, said setbacks on the battlefield in Ukraine had eroded Russian support for the war, even among "patriotic" Russians.

"Right now, when the Russian army is having some trouble and the Ukrainian army is pushing them out of their lands, people who were

supporting this war are saying they don't understand why this war is happening," he said.

"They don't want this war and they don't want to lose their friends, husbands, brothers or themselves in this useless war."

Proshin said his family were "very relieved" that he left Russia and now plans to wait for his girlfriend to join him before leaving for another country.

Eva Rapoport, the Istanbul coordinator for The Ark, a group helping Russians fleeing their country, said there had been a significant increase in the numbers arriving in Turkey since Putin's mobilisation declaration.

While those who left Russia in the immediate aftermath of its February invasion of Ukraine were a "well-edu-

cated, Western-oriented, cosmopolitan crowd," now her organisation was seeing "just about everyone who can escape the country."

"Many of these people used to support Putin, they used to cheer for the war," she said.

"When it was from the safety of their homes and there was nothing at stake for them it was fine. But now they don't want to support this by their actions.

"They don't want to support it with their lives. They don't want to go and fight and die in this war."

Still, she described the decision by the Baltic states and Poland to block entry for such Russians as "unjust."

"It's literally a life or death situation for them, it's a humanitarian issue," Rapoport said.

Many Russians arriving in Turkey after the start of the war were suffering from shock caused by the invasion, she said, as well as difficulties in finding a place to live or ways to pay for goods due to sanctions on the Russian finance sector. "Everyone was discussing symptoms of psychological distress. They could not eat, could not sleep and could not focus," she said.

New arrivals in Istanbul described the situation in Russia as "rapidly deteriorating," and many feared being trapped.

"If you stay, you may never be able to leave, and if you want to (leave) you better act fast," she explained.

## UK and allies meet to discuss pipeline security after blasts

The Joint Expeditionary Force group of northern European nations will meet on Monday to discuss the safety of undersea pipelines and cables after blasts ruptured two natural gas pipelines in the Baltic Sea, British Defence Secretary Ben Wallace said.

Wallace said the virtual meeting has been called by the UK and the Netherlands. The force brings together troops from 10 countries, including the Baltic and Nordic nations, and has seen its importance increase since Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February.

Wallace also said Britain will acquire two specialist ships to protect undersea cables and pipes, with the first "multi-role survey ship for seabed warfare" operational by the end of next year.

Undersea blasts that damaged the Nord Stream 1 and 2 pipelines last week have led to huge methane leaks. Nordic investigators said the blasts involved several hundred pounds of explosives.

Russian President Vladimir Putin on Friday accused the West of sabotaging the Russia-built pipelines, a charge vehemently denied by the United States and its allies.

Britain has not officially blamed anyone for the blasts, but Wallace told the Conservative Party's annual conference that "Putin's reactions are wider than just Ukraine. His reach goes further. This week, we saw the mysterious damage inflicted to the Nord Stream pipelines. And it should remind us all how frag-



ile our economy and infrastructure is to such hybrid attacks."

Britain has been a major contributor of military aid to Ukraine.

Wallace said Britain would train another 20,000 to 30,000 Ukrainian troops in the UK, in addition to the 10,000 it has trained this year.

Speaking at the UK Conservative Party's annual conference in Birmingham, central England, Wallace said Britain was not seeking to remove Putin as Russia's leader.

"We're not in the business of regime change," he said.

But he also said Putin was unlikely to de-escalate the conflict.

## Japan's Kishida vows to regain trust in church controversy

Japan's Prime Minister Fumio Kishida said on Monday that he will humbly listen to people's "harsh voices" criticising his governing party's cozy ties to the ultra-conservative Unification Church and help victims of its allegedly fraudulent businesses and huge donation collection.

Kishida has come under fire in a widening scandal that has exposed decades of close ties between former Prime Minister Shinzo Abe, who was assassinated in July, his ruling Liberal Democratic Party and the Unification Church, which has been accused of raking in huge donations by brainwashing adherents.

Kishida has split public opinion by honouring Abe with a state funeral, which opponents assailed as a pre-war tradition designed to stir nationalism, without an acceptable legal basis or parliamentary discussion. Abe, on top of his divisive legacy, is now seen as a key figure behind the governing party's church ties.

## Sweden sends special diving vessel to area of pipeline leaks

Sweden has sent a vessel capable of "advanced diving missions" to the Baltic Sea area where ruptured undersea pipelines had leaked natural gas for days, the Swedish navy said Monday.

Russian President Vladimir Putin on Friday accused the West of sabotaging Russia-built natural gas pipelines under the Baltic Sea to Germany, a charge vehemently denied by the United States and its allies, who noted that Russia has been blackmailing Europe with reduced gas supplies for months.

Last week, undersea blasts damaged the Nord Stream 1 and 2 pipelines off southern Sweden and Denmark and have led to huge methane leaks, with those governments saying that several hundred pounds of explosives was involved.

The emissions leaks occurred in international waters. Capt. Jimmie Adamsson, a spokesman for the Swedish navy, told The Associated Press that a submarine rescue ship had been sent to the site of the leaks off Sweden and was sup-



porting the Swedish coast guard, which is in charge of the work. It was unclear when anyone or anything would be able to go down to the pipelines, either divers or a submarine. The coast guard said one of its vessels, Amfritrute, was at the site to monitor nearby sea traffic.

It added that bad weather is expected, which will complicate the situation.

Over the weekend, authorities in Denmark said the Nord Stream 1 and 2 natural gas pipelines had stopped leaking.

However, the Swedish coast guard said one of its planes had reported that the smaller leak

over Nord Stream 2 "has instead increased somewhat again," was about 30 metres in diameter and it may take "some time" before it stops.

The coast guard offered no explanation as to why the leak had increased. The other one, over Nord Stream 1, has stopped, it said.

Danish authorities were monitoring the two leaks east of the Danish Baltic Sea island of Bornholm — above Nord Stream 1 and Nord Stream 2 — with the frigate Absalon, the environmental ship Gunnar Thorson, and a military helicopter.

## US SC will hear social media terrorism lawsuits

The Supreme Court said on Monday it will hear two cases seeking to hold social media companies financially responsible for terrorist attacks.

Relatives of people killed in terrorist attacks in France and Turkey had sued Google, Twitter, and Facebook. They accused the companies of helping terrorists spread their message and radicalise new recruits.

The court will hear the cases this term, which began on Monday, with a decision expected before the court recesses for the summer, usually in late June. The court did not say when it would hear arguments, but the court has already filled its argument calendar for October and November.

One of the cases the justices will hear involves Nohemi Gonzalez, a 23-year-old US citizen studying in Paris. The Cal State Long Beach student was one of 130 people killed in the Islamic State group attacks in November 2015. The attackers struck cafes, outside the French national stadium and inside the Bataclan theatre.



Gonzalez died in an attack at La Belle Equipe bistro.

Gonzalez's relatives sued Google, which owns YouTube, saying the platform had helped the Islamic State group by allowing it to post hundreds of videos that helped incite violence and recruit potential supporters. Gonzalez's relatives said that the company's computer algorithms recommended those videos to viewers most likely to be interested in them. But a judge dismissed the case and a federal appeals court upheld the ruling.

Under US law — specifically Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act — internet companies are generally exempt from liability for the material users post on their networks.

The new Liz Truss-led UK government on Monday made its first major U-turn on its central plank of tax cuts by withdrawing a policy to abolish the top rate for the wealthiest, following market turmoil and to avert an expected rebellion within the governing Conservative Party.

Chancellor Kwasi Kwarteng declared that the announcement in his mini-budget last month of a proposed abolition of the 45 pence tax rate, which applied to the top tier of income taxpayers from next April, had become a "massive distraction" to an otherwise sound growth plan for the economy.

It came after days of turmoil on the global financial markets spooked by the prospect of huge government borrowing costs and the pound tumbling against the dollar as the Bank of England had to step in to shore up the country's pension funds.

"We get it, and we have listened," Kwarteng tweeted before taking to the airwaves to defend what has been dubbed a screeching U-turn



by the newly appointed government. Truss, who replaced Boris Johnson as prime minister after a hard-fought leadership battle with British Indian former Chancellor Rishi Sunak last month, soon referenced her Chancellor's tweet to add: "The abolition of the 45pc rate had become a huge distraction from our mission to get Britain moving."

"Our focus now is on building a high growth economy that funds world-class

public services, boosts wages, and creates opportunities across the country."

It came just a day after she had insisted that her government remained committed to abolishing the top rate of tax for the highest earners in a BBC interview on Sunday, despite critics within her own party seeing it as sending out the wrong signal at a time when the majority of the country was struggling with a cost-of-living crisis and soaring household bills.



# ‘We’re with you,’ Biden tells Puerto Rico ahead of visit

President Joe Biden on Monday will survey damage from Hurricane Fiona in Puerto Rico, where tens of thousands of people are still without power two weeks after the storm hit.

The Category 1 hurricane knocked out electrical power to the US territory of 3.2 million people, 44 per cent of whom live below the poverty line.

Power has been restored to about 90 per cent of the island's 1.47 million customers, but more than 137,000 others, mostly in the hardest hit areas of Puerto Rico's southern and western regions, continue to struggle in the dark. Another 66,000 customers are without water. Biden has pledged that the US government will not abandon Puerto Rico as it starts to rebuild again, five years after the more powerful Hurricane Maria devastated the island in 2017.

During his visit, Biden planned to announce the administration will provide USD 60 million through last year's



bipartisan infrastructure law to help Puerto Rico shore up levees, strengthen flood walls and create a new flood warning system so the island will be better prepared for future storms, the White House said.

“We see what you're going through, and we're with you,” Biden told Puerto Ricans and Floridians in a message on Sunday on his official Twitter account.

Florida is cleaning up after Hurricane Ian churned across that state last week, killing more

than 60 people, decimating some coastal communities and flooding others. Biden plans to visit Florida on Wednesday to survey damage.

The president, accompanied by first lady Jill Biden and Deanne Criswell, the Federal Emergency Management Agency administrator, was to touch down Monday in Ponce, Puerto Rico, a city on the southern coast. Most of the storm damage is in southern Puerto Rico.

Puerto Rico Gov Pedro

Pierluisi said he would update Biden on recovery efforts.

“We will make sure to keep working together to ensure the continuity of a reconstruction already underway,” the governor tweeted on Sunday.

Fiona caused catastrophic flooding, tore apart roads and bridges, and unleashed more than 100 landslides when it hit Puerto Rico on September 18.

At least two people died after being swept away by floods, and several others were killed in accidents related to the use of candles or generator during the island-wide power outage. Government officials have estimated some USD 3 billion in damages, but warn that costs could rise significantly as evaluations continue.

Some people in Puerto Rico wondered whether Biden's visit would change anything as they recalled how President Donald Trump visited after Hurricane Maria hit as a more powerful Category 4 storm in 2017, and tossed rolls of paper towels into a crowd in a display that riled many.

# Iran’s supreme leader blames US for anti-hijab protests

Iran's supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei responded publicly on Monday to the biggest protests in Iran in years, breaking weeks of silence to condemn what he called “rioting” and accuse the United States and Israel of planning the protests.

The unrest, ignited by the death of a young woman in the custody of Iran's morality police, is flaring up across the country for a third week despite government efforts to crack down. On Monday, Iran shuttered its top technology university following an hours-long standoff between students and the police, that turned the prestigious institution into the latest flashpoint of protests and ended with hundreds of young people arrested.

Speaking to a cadre of police students in Tehran, Khamenei said he was “heartbroken” by the death of 22-year-old Mahsa Amini in police custody, calling it a “sad incident”. However, he sharply condemned the protests as a foreign plot to destabilise Iran, echoing authorities' previous comments.

“This rioting was planned,” he told a cadre of



police students in Tehran. “These riots and insecurities were designed by America and the Zionist regime, and their employees.”

Meanwhile Sharif University of Technology in Tehran announced that only doctoral students would be allowed on campus until further notice following hours of turmoil on Sunday evening, when witnesses said antigovernment protesters clashed with hardline pro-establishment students.

The witnesses, who spoke

on the condition of anonymity for fear of reprisals, said the police kept hundreds of students holed up on campus and fired rounds of tear gas to disperse the demonstrations.

The university's student association said that police and plainclothes officers surrounded the school from all sides and detained at least 300 students as protests rocked the campus after nightfall. Plainclothes officers beat a professor and several university employees, the association reported.

# King Charles III in 1st engagement since Queen’s death

King Charles III and his wife Camilla, the queen consort, visited Scotland Monday in their first joint public engagement since the royal mourning period to remember Queen Elizabeth II ended. Large crowds turned out on the streets of Dunfermline in Fife, north of Edinburgh, hoping to get a glimpse of the new monarch.

Charles, who wore a kilt for the visit, spent some time shaking hands with well-wishers after he greeted Scottish First Minister Nicola Sturgeon and other leaders.

The royal couple were visiting to formally give city status to Dunfermline, the birthplace of another King Charles: Charles I, who reigned in the 17th century before his execution, was the last British monarch born in Scotland.

Dunfermline was among towns that won city status as part of Platinum Jubilee celebrations to mark Elizabeth's 70 years on the throne.

# The Oath Keepers’ Capitol riot trial, explained

A trial starting this week in Washington, D.C., is the biggest test yet in the Justice Department's efforts to hold accountable those responsible for the attack on the Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021, a violent assault that challenged the foundations of American democracy.

On trial is extremist leader Stewart Rhodes, founder of the Oath Keepers extremist group, and four associates.

Prosecutors and defence attorneys will make their opening statements on Monday and the trial will last several weeks.

Here is a look at what's to

come:

## WHO ARE THE OATH KEEPERS?

The anti-government group was founded in 2009 by Rhodes who was educated at Yale Law School and served briefly as a U.S. Army paratrooper before a training accident left him with a back injury.

The group was named after its stated goal of getting past and present members of the military, first responders and police officers to honour the promise they made to defend the Constitution against enemies.

They issued a list of orders that its members wouldn't



obey, such as disarming citizens, carrying out warrantless searches and detaining Americans as enemy combatants in violation of their right to jury trials.

That relatively benign framing and leveraging of social media helped the group

grow to one of the largest anti-government militia groups in U.S. History, but the internal dialogue was often darker, experts said.

Oath Keepers participated in the standoff with federal off with officials at Nevada's Bundy Ranch in 2014, and later along rooftops in Ferguson, Missouri after a grand jury declined to charge a police officer in the fatal shooting of 18-year-old Michael Brown.

The group would eventually embrace then-candidate Donald Trump's rhetoric and his false claims that the 2020 election was stolen.

## WHY ARE THEY ON TRIAL?

On trial with Rhodes are Kelly Meggs, leader of the Florida chapter of the Oath Keepers; Kenneth Harrelson, another Florida Oath Keeper; Thomas Caldwell, a retired U.S. Navy intelligence officer from Virginia; and Jessica Watkins, who led an Ohio militia group.

They have been charged with seditious conspiracy in one of the most high profile cases to come out of the Jan. 6 riot at the U.S. Capitol.

Prosecutors say they spent several weeks amassing weapons, organising paramilitary training and readying armed teams outside Washington to stop Joe Biden from becoming president.

# Stadium tragedy exposes Indonesia’s troubled soccer history

Gaining the right to host next year's Under-20 World Cup was a major milestone in Indonesia's soccer development, raising hopes that a successful tournament would turn around long-standing problems that have blighted the sport in this country of 277 million people.

The death of at least 125 people at a league game between host Arema FC of East Java's Malang city and Persebaya Surabaya on Saturday is a tragic reminder, however, that Indonesia is one of the most dangerous countries in which to attend a game.

“Do remember that the FIFA U-20 World Cup will be the worldwide spotlight since the event will be joined by 24 countries from five continents,” Indonesia's President Joko Widodo said last month as he pushed for thorough preparations for the tournament.

Since Saturday, the domestic league has been suspended. Widodo has ordered the sports

minister, the national police chief and the soccer federation to conduct a thorough investigation into the deadly stadium crush. Indonesia was the first Asian team ever to play at a World Cup — participating in 1938 as Dutch East Indies — but despite an undoubted national passion for the sport, it has never returned to the global stage because of years of corruption, violence and mismanagement. Data from Indonesia's soccer watchdog, Save Our Soccer, showed 78 people have died in game-related incidents over the past 28 years. Those accused are often associated with supporter groups that attach themselves to clubs, with the biggest boasting hundreds of thousands of members.

Arema's intense rivalry with Surabaya meant that no visiting fans were allowed in the stadium on the weekend. Yet violence broke out when the home team lost 3-2 and some of the 42,000 Arema fans, known as “Aremania” threw bottles and other objects at players and soccer officials.

# ‘Cities globally warming nearly 30% faster than rural areas’

Cities worldwide are warming by 0.5 degrees Celsius on average per decade, 29 per cent faster than in rural areas, according to a study which suggests that climate change and urban expansion are accelerating surface temperatures.

Researchers from Nanjing University in China and colleagues noted that planting trees and vegetation in cities — also known as urban greening — is reported to offset about 0.13 degrees Celsius of surface warming per decade in European cities.

People who live in cities experience greater heat exposure during heat wave events than the



general population due to the urban heat island effect, in which urban land gets hotter than surrounding rural land, they said.

Climate change and population growth in cities are projected to increase the surface urban heat island effect, but many current estimates of future human heat exposure assume equal rates of surface temperature increase between urban and

rural areas, the researchers said.

In China and India, they estimated that urban expansion was responsible for over 0.23 degrees Celsius of the observed surface warming in cities per decade. Urban greening is suggested to reduce surface warming, but whether it can slow the accelerating surface urban heat island effect remains unclear, the researchers said.

The study, published recently in the journal Communications Earth & Environment, analysed satellite land surface temperature data for over 2,000 city centers worldwide between 2002 and 2021 and compared them to background rural surface temperatures.

# West African mediators head to Burkina Faso following coup

Regional mediators were headed to Burkina Faso on Monday in the wake of the West African country's second coup this year amid concern the latest power grab could further postpone elections and deepen the region's Islamic extremist violence.

News that the delegation from the regional bloc known as ECOWAS is travelling to the capital, Ouagadougou, came after diplomats confirmed that Lt. Col. Paul Henri Sandaogo Damiba had left for the neighbouring nation of Togo following talks mediated by reli-



gious leaders.

Burkina Faso's new leader, Capt. Ibrahim Traore, 34, is officially head of state pending

future elections, the junta announced Sunday.

While ECOWAS, a 15-nation West African bloc, had reached an agreement to hold a new vote by July 2024, it remained unclear whether that date would still hold.

Burkina Faso's last democratically elected president was overthrown by Damiba in January amid frustration that his government had not been able to stop extremist attacks. But the jihadi violence, which has killed thousands and forced 2 million to flee their homes, continued and has now brought an end to Damiba's tenure, too.

# Al-Shabab attack kills 12 in Somalia

Officials and witnesses say at least 12 people are dead after two explosions by extremist fighters targeted local government headquarters in the capital of Somalia's Hiran region, which has been the centre of a recent mobilisation against the rebels.

The Somalia-based extremist group al-Shabab claimed responsibility for the attack in Beledweyne, about 300 kilometres (186 miles) north of Somalia's capital, Mogadishu.

The Hiran governor, Ali Jayte Osman, who survived the attack, told The Associated Press by phone that the health minister of Hirshabelle state

and the deputy governor of Hiran in charge of finance were among those killed in Monday's attack.

“The first explosion occurred at the entrance gate, and after a few minutes a big truck rushed toward the headquarters building and exploded, killing many civilians who came to the office to receive services,” the governor said.

# Palestinians: Israel military kills 2 during West Bank raid

The Israeli military shot and killed two Palestinians during a raid in the occupied West Bank early on Monday, Palestinian officials said.

The military alleged that the men tried to ram their car into soldiers, a claim that could not

be independently verified.

Palestinians and rights group often accuse Israeli troops of using excessive force against Palestinians, who live under a 55-year military occupation with no end in sight. Israel says it follows strict rules of engagement and opens fire in life-threatening situations.

# Gas price hike: CNG prices may go up by ₹8-12 a kg

CNG prices are likely to be hiked by Rs 8-12 per kg and that of gas piped to household kitchens by over Rs 6 per unit after the government raised the prices of input natural gas to a record, analysts said on Monday.

The government last week raised the prices of gas produced from old fields, called APM gas, to USD 8.57 per million British thermal unit from USD 6.1. The rates for gas produced from difficult fields were hiked to USD 12.46 from USD 9.92 per mmBtu.

APM gas makes up for two-thirds of all gas produced in the country. This gas is converted into CNG for automobiles and piped to household kitchens for cooking.

Kotak Institutional Equities said APM gas prices are up nearly 5x in just a year - from USD 1.79 per mmBtu till September 2021 to USD 8.57.

"We expect CGDs to raise prices, but only in tranches, impacting near-term earnings," it said. For each USD per mmBtu gas price rise, city gas distribution (CGD) entities need to raise the CNG price by Rs 4.7-4.9 per kg.

"For USD 2.5 per mmBtu price rise, and also for recent currency weakness, CGDs will



need an immediate CNG price increase of Rs 12-14 per kg," it said adding CGDs cannot absorb gas price increases.

In the past, CGDs have been able to pass on all cost increases, and per unit margins have been on long-term rising trends for CGDs.

According to ICICI Securities, piped cooking gas, called PNG, CNG prices will need to be raised by Rs 6.2 per standard cubic meter and Rs 9-12.5 per kg to fully pass on the impact of these high input costs. "At best, we see only a slow gradual pass-through of these costs over third quarter (October to December)," it said. Jefferies

said Indraprastha Gas Ltd, the firm that retails CNG and PNG in the national capital, will need to raise CNG price by Rs 8 per kg while Mahanagar Gas Ltd - the retailer in Mumbai - will have to increase prices by Rs 9.

"This would reduce CNG's discount to petrol/diesel from 45/30 per cent to 40/20 per cent for IGL. Similarly, the discount for MGL would reduce from 45/30 per cent currently to 40/20 per cent," it said. "This could impact volume growth."

As a key producer of domestic APM gas, a sharp 40 per cent increase in price is positive for upstream producers ONGC and Oil India. The price

hike will boost ONGC's earnings by about 16 per cent, Kotak said.

"However, in our view, such high prices may not sustain for long. In addition, there is a risk that the government may take away benefits by imposing additional taxation, like the recent windfall tax on oil prices," it said. But unlike APM gas, the benefits of higher rates for gas from new and difficult fields can sustain. Reliance Industries Ltd, with the largest new gas production, is a key beneficiary. Kotak said there is a serious need to revisit the domestic gas price formula and introduce floor/ceiling price for several reasons.

The current formula, it said, has led to high volatility in APM gas prices - up 5x in just a year while rates stayed below breakeven price of USD 3-3.5 for earlier six and half years (October 2015 to March 2022). "This gas is produced from legacy nominated blocks with low taxation (no profit petroleum, etc.); and APM gas is allocated by the government to price-sensitive segments (CGDs, fertilizers, power), where both high prices and volatility can impact demand, conversion from pollution fuels to gas and future investments," it said detailing reasons for the review.

# Sensex, Nifty fall over 1% on selling in banking, auto shares

Key stock indices Sensex and Nifty declined over 1 per cent at close on Monday due to heavy selling in banking, auto and FMCG shares amid weak global market trends and continued foreign fund outflows.

Reversing its previous session's gains, benchmark BSE Sensex tumbled 638.11 points or 1.11 per cent to settle at 56,788.81. During the day, it

tanked 743.52 points or 1.29 per cent to 56,683.40.

The broader NSE Nifty fell by 207 points or 1.21 per cent to end at 16,887.35 as 42 of its constituents declined.

Among Sensex stocks, Maruti fell the most by 3.16 per cent, Hindustan Unilever by 2.77 per cent, IndusInd Bank by 2.55 per cent, ITC by 2.32 per cent, Bajaj Finance by 2.26 per cent, State Bank of India by 2.15 per cent and Kotak Mahindra Bank by 2.03

per cent. Dr Reddy's, NTPC, Bharti Airtel and Wipro were the winners.

Sensex had surged by 016.96 points or 1.80 per cent to settle at 57,426.92 on Friday. The Nifty climbed 276.25 points or 1.64 per cent to end at 17,094.35.

"Markets started the week on a feeble note and lost over a per cent, tracking weak global cues," Ajit Mishra, VP - Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said.

In the broader market, the BSE midcap gauge declined 1.24 per cent and smallcap index fell by 0.54 per cent. Among the BSE sectoral indices, power fell by 3.24 per cent, utilities by 3.14 per cent, auto (2.11 per cent), FMCG (2.05 per cent), commodities (2.01 per cent), consumer discretionary (1.26 per cent) and realty (1.24 per cent).

Healthcare and telecommunication ended in the green.

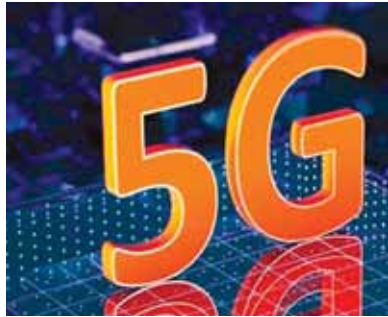
# C-DOT 5G mobile antenna to be ready in 6 months for commercial rollout

Made in India 5G radios will be ready for commercial deployment in six months, a top official of state-run C-DoT said. The technology jointly developed by C-DoT, Jio's Radisys India, VVDN Technologies and Wisig Networks was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi at the India Mobile Congress to make a 5G call.

C-DOT Executive Director Rajkumar Upadhyay told PTI during an interaction at IMC that the organisation has completed prototype development and proof of concept of the 5G radios that are for sending and receiving wireless signals.

"Our 5G core and 5G radio are completely indigenously developed which makes India among a few countries that have their own 5G technology. Operators desire multiple integration and call sce-



nario tests in their network before it goes for commercial deployment. We will start these tests soon in BSNL's network and we hope to complete this in the next six months," Upadhyay said.

C-DoT is part of a TCS-led consortium which has been selected for deploying 4G technology.

"C-DOT's role will be limited to technology development. We will sign a technology transfer agreement with vendors who will commercially deploy it," Upadhyay said.

C-DOT has also developed a 5G core (NSA) which was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi at India Mobile Congress by making an end-to-end 5G call. The Radio Access network used in making this call is also developed indigenously in collaboration with VVDN Technologies, Radisys India and Wisig Networks.

"We have already deployed our 5G core in the BSNL network for trial," Upadhyay said. Talking about network speed, Upadhyay said that 5G can deliver a download speed of 1 gigabit per second and C-DOT's gears will be able to deliver it depending on the capacity put at the back-end.

# Rupee plunges 49p to 81.89/\$ as crude spikes

The rupee fell by 49 paise to close at 81.89 (provisional) against the US dollar on Monday as heavy selling pressure in the domestic equities and a spike in crude oil prices weighed on the local unit.

Besides, a stronger greenback against key rivals and persistent foreign fund outflows put pressure on the domestic currency, forex dealers said.

At the interbank foreign exchange market, the local currency opened weak at 81.65, fell further to 81.98 against the American currency.

It finally ended at 81.89,



down 49 paise over its previous close.

In the previous session, the rupee settled at 81.40 against the greenback.

On the domestic equity market front, the 30-share BSE Sensex dropped 638.11 points or 1.11 per cent to end at 56,788.81, while the broader NSE Nifty fell 207 points or 1.21 per cent to 16,887.35.

# India Inc's credit quality continues to improve in H1, may moderate going ahead: Crisil

India Inc's credit quality showed further improvement in April-September period with the ratio of upgrades to downgrades inching higher.

The credit ratio's improvement to 5.52 in H1FY23 as compared to 5.04 in H2FY22 was driven by leaner balance sheets led by healthy cash flows and muted investments, Crisil Ratings, which rates 6,800 companies, said.

However, the agency clarified that the data may not be fully representative as many small businesses with outstanding ratings have turned non-cooperative in sharing data on a continued basis which can be driven by adverse financial health.

"India Inc has emerged



stronger post-pandemic," its managing director Gurpreet Chhatwal said, exuding confidence that the corporate India can weather the current storm caused by global events like higher inflation and monetary tightening which will hurt India's

exports.

Crisil's senior director Somasekar Vemuri said there can, however, be a moderation in the credit ratio going ahead due to some of the challenges faced by companies.

During the first half of the

fiscal year, the credit ratio moved ahead majorly driven by the infrastructure sector, which contributed a third of the upgrades, the agency said, attributing the same to higher project work being undertaken and improvement in project clearances and payments.

The six months saw 569 upgrades and 103 downgrades, while ratings on 80 per cent of the companies being reaffirmed, it said.

The ongoing interest rate tightening may result in some of the companies going slow on investments, and the higher interest costs will have an adverse impact on the renewables sector the most with the project viability itself coming under pressure, its chief ratings officer Subodh Rai told reporters.

# SBI report warns of freebies time-bomb, urges SC to cap such spends at 1% of state GDP

With states after states competing to offer freebies, a report has suggested that the Supreme Court-led panel could cap such welfare schemes at 1 per cent of the state's GDP or 1 per cent of its own tax collection.

Citing the examples of just three states, a report penned by Soumya Kanti Ghosh, the group chief economic adviser to State Bank of India, said annual pension liabilities of the poor states of Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand and Rajasthan are estimated at Rs 3 lakh crore.

When looked in relation to these states own tax revenue, pension liabilities are quite high for Jharkhand, Rajasthan and Chhattisgarh at 217, 190

and 207 per cent respectively.

While for states contemplating the change, it would be as high as 450 per cent of own tax revenue in case of Himachal Pradesh, 138 per cent of own tax revenue in case of Gujarat and 242 per cent of own tax revenue for Punjab, which is also planning to revert to the old pension system wherein the beneficiaries pay nothing.

Ghosh also points out that according to the latest available information, the off-budget borrowings of states, which are loans raised by state-owned entities and guaranteed by the states, have reached around 4.5 percent of GDP in 2022 and the extent of such guarantees have achieved significant proportion of GDP for various states.

# Office space supply up 49% in Jan-Sep in top 6 cities: Report

New supply of office space rose 49 per cent during January-September period across six cities to 32.8 million square feet on completion of many commercial projects to meet rising demand, according to Colliers India.

Real estate consultant Colliers India said that the same stood at 22 million square feet in the year-ago period across six cities -- Bengaluru, Chennai, Delhi-NCR, Hyderabad, Pune and Mumbai. Fresh supply declined in Bengaluru and Mumbai, but rose in other four cities.

As per the data, the new office supply declined 1 per cent to 8.1 million square feet in January-September 2022 from 8.2 million square feet in the corresponding period of the previous year. Mumbai saw a 16 per cent decline in new supply to 1.8 million square feet from 2.1 million square feet.



Among cities that saw uptick in supply, the fresh supply of new office in Chennai jumped to 4.2 million square feet from 0.9 million square feet.

Delhi-NCR witnessed a 133 per cent growth in new supply to 6.3 million square feet from 2.7 million square feet.

New supply of office space in Hyderabad rose 56 per cent to 7.9 million square feet from 5.1 million square feet.

Pune witnessed a 49 per

cent rise in fresh supply to 4.5 million square feet during January-September 2022 from 3 million square feet in the corresponding period of the previous year.

The gross leasing of office space nearly doubled to 40.6 million square feet during January-September across six major cities on pent-up demand driven largely by technology and co-working firms. The absorption of office space stood at 20.6 million square feet in the year-ago period across six cities.

Colliers India expects absorption of office space to hit an all-time high in the 2022 calendar year, with gross leasing set to cross 50 million square feet. The previous high was seen in 2019 at 44.8 million square feet.

Gross absorption does not include lease renewals, pre-commitments and deals where only a letter of intent has been signed.

# BSNL to start rolling out 4G network from November

State-owned telecom firm BSNL will start rolling out 4G network from November onwards and gradually upgrade it to 5G by August next year, a top company official said on Monday. The company has plans to roll out almost 1.25 lakh 4G mobile sites in 18 months, BSNL chairman and managing director PK Purwar told PTI at India Mobile Congress.

"The first roll out (of planned 4G network) should take place in November," Purwar said. The company is in discussion with IT major TCS and state-run telecom research and development organisation C-DOT-led consortium to deploy indigenously developed 4G technology in the network.

Purwar said the 4G network gears that the company is purchasing will be upgradable to 5G through software updates.

When asked about the timeline of BSNL's plans to roll out 5G services, Purwar said the

company is on its path to deploy 5G as per the deadline of August 15, 2023, set by Telecom Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw.

"The minister has given us a clear path that the 15th of August 2023 should be the date when BSNL should be in the 5G domain. We are working in that direction which we have received. We should be able to meet it (the target timeline)," Purwar said.

Talking about revenue dynamics, all telecom operators should look at digital inclusiveness and connect the unconnected with digital technologies.

"There should be an investment in the network for everyone to get good service and roll out should be faster. Unless operators have enough resources they will not be able to make the investment in the network. Unless investment is not made in network technology, many people will be left out from taking advantage of newer technologies," Purwar said.

# Financial planning is key amid increasing digitalisation, says FPSB CEO

Maye said, "This World Financial Planning Day, we want the public to know how financial planning can help them feel more confident and in control of their finances."

# Sebi: Be wary of investors' portfolio management services promise

Capital markets regulator Sebi on Monday cautioned investors against unauthorised money mobilisation by entities claiming to provide portfolio management services.

Further, the regulator noted that these entities have been luring the public, with a promise of high returns, through pamphlets and social media platforms. It was observed that in such schemes, the entities have been mobilising money in relatively smaller amounts and promising assured returns, Sebi said in a statement.

The advisory comes after the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Sebi) noted that some entities are collecting money from the public claiming to provide portfolio management services.

Some of the entities have names similar to that of Sebi-registered intermediaries, misleading the public, as though the fund raising is genuine and



done by entities registered with the regulator.

Sebi, therefore, cautioned "investors not to fall prey to such unauthorised money collection" and advised them to deal only with Sebi-registered intermediaries while investing in the securities market.

Further, Sebi-registered intermediaries, including portfolio managers (who manage portfolio management schemes) cannot offer products with assured or fixed return on investment. Many such unauthorised schemes are run like ponzi schemes without any real investment made in the securities market.

# REAL DROP FIRST POINTS

Karim Benzema missed a penalty for Real Madrid as they finally blinked in the La Liga title race, dropping their first points of the season in a 1-1 draw with Osasuna on Sunday.

Elsewhere Real Sociedad won 5-3 at Girona and high-flying Real Betis fell to a 1-0 defeat at Celta Vigo.

After Barcelona beat Real Mallorca on Saturday, Madrid knew they had to win to stay top but were frustrated by Jagoba Arrasate's well-organised side at the Santiago Bernabeu.

Benzema, on his return to the side after injury, won a spot-kick but then fired it against the crossbar, and also had a goal disallowed for offside as Madrid tried to force a way through.

Vinicius Junior broke the deadlock just before half-time with a cross that snuck all the way into the far corner, but Kike Garcia's well-taken header early in the second period earned Osasuna a point.

"What we were missing was scoring that penalty, normally Karim scores them," Madrid coach Carlo Ancelotti told DAZN.

"He had no problem playing the 90 minutes. It's been a month since he's played, he has to get his best form back. He did his part, he had the chance from the penalty. It's an accident, sometimes it happens."

Real Madrid president Florentino Perez told the club's fans at an assembly on Sunday morning that a European Super League project was essential, but Osasuna showed domestic football can still offer a significant challenge.

Benzema made his first



appearance since September 6, while Andriy Lunin and Dani Ceballos started in place of injured duo Thibaut Courtois and Luka Modric.

Madrid probed promisingly down the flanks, while at the other end Abde Ezzalzouli, on loan at Osasuna from Barcelona, crashed a shot into the side netting on a bright display.

Madrid opened the scoring in fortuitous fashion, with Vinicius whipping in a low cross which caught out goalkeeper Sergio Herrera and crept

in at the far post.

Osasuna complained that Benzema and Antonio Rudiger were offside and interfering with play, but their protests were dismissed.

The visitors were level five minutes into the second half, when Kike Garcia brilliantly looped a backwards header over Lunin.

The goal meant Madrid have failed to keep a clean sheet in any of the first seven league games.

"We were quite solid at the back," insisted Ancelotti. "We

conceded a goal from a deep cross, it was quite strange. The team was balanced, the objective is always to be strong to avoid conceding."

## NO WAY THROUGH

Turning up the heat, Benzema drew a stunning save from Herrera, although he was offside, then neatly slipped through Rodrygo Goes, who fired over.

The French striker won a penalty when he was shoved over by David Garcia, who was sent off, but hit the crossbar

with his effort. Moments later Benzema had the ball in the net, but it was disallowed for offside.

The draw means Barcelona lead Madrid on goal difference after seven games, with both teams on 19 points and unbeaten. It is the first time the Catalans lead the league at the end of a fixture round since June 2020.

"We have to celebrate, they had won all their games and we came back from a goal down, the team did great work and played a great game," said Arrasate.

"If Madrid's players weren't offside then the goalkeeper's position would have been different (for the opening goal)."

Earlier Real Sociedad, seventh, came out on top after an eight-goal thriller at Montilivi.

Norwegian striker Alexander Sorloth hit a first-half brace for the visitors either side of goals for Girona's Rodrigo Riquelme and Arnau Martinez.

Valentin Castellanos put Girona ahead but Brais Mendez and Martin Zubimendi struck in the space of six minutes to restore the Basque side's lead.

Takefusa Kubo made the game safe for La Real late on.

Real Betis fell to a narrow defeat at Celta Vigo, playing most of the game with 10 men after Luiz Felipe's 20th-minute red card.

Gabriel Veiga slammed home in the opening stages from distance for the hosts at Balaidos and they moved 10th while Betis remained fourth.

Espanyol and Valencia shared a thrilling 2-2 draw which saw both sides reduced to 10 men after red cards for Martin Braithwaite and Marcos Andre respectively.

Nagelsmann may save Coman for Saturday's high-profile Bundesliga clash between his third-placed side and Borussia Dortmund -- who are fourth level on points with Bayern -- instead of giving him a run out against Plzen.

Coman's return is welcome news for France who are struggling both on the pitch and off it with several stars injured and battling to be fit for the World Cup finals which begin in Qatar in less than two months.

Paul Pogba, who scored in the 4-2 win over Croatia in the 2018 World Cup final, is among the players sidelined and another key midfielder N'Golo Kante also missed the recent Nations League matches through injury.

Presnel Kimpembe, Lucas Digne and captain and first-choice goalkeeper Hugo Lloris were other absentees from the Nations League matches which were coach Didier Deschamps final preparation games before the World Cup.

## Lyon face Arsenal in tough women's CL draw

Former US Open winner Cilic, chasing a 21st career title but first of 2022, was broken in the first game of the second set and the 34-year-old never recovered.



## Sai Praneeth edges out HS Prannoy as Telangana beat Kerala to win team Gold

ahead.

"We only gave the coach the option of trying us out," Sumeeth said, even though they had last played together

way back in the 2021 Thailand Open.

The couple fumbled at the start as the speedy Arjun and Treasa jumped into an early 5-2 lead.

"We were playing after a long time. We don't even practice together as we quite often get into arguments. It took some time to get into a rhythm. But once we found our groove, we got into a good rhythm," said a smiling Sikki.

The Kerala pair, however, fought back to win the second game, with Arjun sending powerful smashes from the backline and Treasa being efficient at the net.

The third game went close till 12-all before a change of strategy did the trick for Telangana.

"I think the turning point was when I went for variations in my service, not giving them any length," Sikki explained.

The next match was crucial with Prannoy, who is currently ranked 15th in the world and

is enjoying a dream season, starting as the favourite against Praneeth, whose BWF world ranking has slipped to 40 due to his poor form.

"I knew it would be a tough match, especially as we know each other's game as we often train together. But gradually I found my strokes," said 2017 Singapore Open champion Praneeth.

The first game was played fiercely. A tentative Praneeth made a few unforced errors while Prannoy looked good with his all-round game. They went neck-and-neck till 18-18 before Prannoy clinched it with a couple of well measured shots.

Praneeth was in full flow in the second game, with his repertoire of strokes catching Prannoy on the wrong foot. He surged ahead 13-7 and held on to it to make it 1-1.

In the third game, Praneeth built a healthy lead of 13-7 before Prannoy clawed his way back to make it 18-18 all.

"I was suddenly blank as Prannoy began to play a fast game. With the shuttle also coming off slowly, I was little taken back. But luckily, I held on to my nerves and pulled off this crucial win. It will boost my morale," Praneeth said.

## Indian men's hockey team to play 5-match 'Test series' in Aus

The Indian men's hockey team will tour Australia to play a five-match 'Test series' in November-December.

A senior national Indian hockey team has not played in Australia since the 2018 Commonwealth Games in Gold Coast.

"From the moment we raised the prospect of hosting these matches in Adelaide, the South Australian Government has shown enormous enthusiasm and eagerness to host, so we are delighted to bring these series to South Australia," said Hockey Australia CEO David Pryles in a statement.

"Australia and India have developed a fierce rivalry on the hockey pitch in recent times. Coupled with there being a large and passionate Indian population in Adelaide, there is no doubt this series will be a hot ticket to get hold of and attract terrific crowds," he added.



# INDIA AIM TO WHITEWASH PROTEAS

With no second reserve batter in the squad, Shahbaz Ahmed or one among Mohammed Siraj or Umesh Yadav could get a look-in.

Since their early exit from the T20 World Cup 12 months ago, the Indian batting has come a long way and looks formidable ahead of the next edition beginning later this month.

Majority of the batters remain the same from the UAE edition but it is the drastic change in approach which has made the difference.

Heading into the ICC event, India's high-profile top-three have hit top form including Rahul who allayed concerns about his strike rate with a sublime effort on Sunday.

teammates, so much so that Rohit is contemplating to play him straight in the team's World Cup opener against Pakistan on October 23.

Pant is yet to bat in the series and though Dinesh Karthik got seven balls in the second T20, he too would be hoping to get a hit in the middle.

Jasprit Bumrah's absence has compounded India's bowling woes, especial-

ly in the death overs, but the team needs to find a way if the star pacer doesn't get fit in time for the ICC event.

Deepak Chahar, who is among World Cup reserves, has been impressive with the new ball but question marks remain over his efficacy towards the back end of the innings.

Arshdeep Singh has made an impact both with new and old ball but was unusually expensive on Sunday. Having bowled as many as three no balls, it was a forgettable night for the left-arm pacer who would be eager to bounce back.

The variations that Harshal Patel relies on to keep the batters in check have not been producing the desired results since his return from injury.

Red ball great R Ashwin is yet to get a wicket in the series and India will be looking to him for wickets in the middle overs.

Drafted into the squad in Bumrah's absence, Siraj could also get to play at Holkar Stadium but India might continue with the out of rhythm Harshal Patel as he would need more game time post injury.

In the extreme humidity of Guwahati, the South Africa pacers struggled to grip the ball and ended up offering far many full tosses to the Indian batters. They would want to rectify that.

Despite the series loss, there has been plenty of positives for the visitors in the batting department. Continuing his menacing form this year, David Miller smashed an unbeaten hundred while Quinton de Kock got much needed runs before the World Cup.

The biggest concern for the Proteas is the form of their skipper Temba Bavuma, who is yet to score a run in the series.

## Bumrah out of T20 WC: BCCI

India's pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah has been ruled out of the ICC T20 World Cup due to a back injury, the BCCI announced on Monday.

That Bumrah is ruled out of the big-ticket event due to a stress fracture was first reported by the PTI on September 29.

Bumrah's absence will certainly affect India's chances in the marquee event in Australia as death bowling still remains a grey area.

The BCCI was awaiting medical reports while the pacer did his rehab at the National Cricket Academy but it was a foregone conclusion that he would be out for months.

"The BCCI Medical team has ruled out Team India fast bowler Jasprit Bumrah from the ICC Men's T20 World Cup squad. The decision was taken following a detailed assessment and in consultation with the specialists," BCCI secretary Jay Shah said in a statement. Bumrah was initially ruled out of the ongoing three-match T20I series against South Africa due to a back injury.

While the BCCI will be naming a replacement for Bumrah in the squad for the marquee tournament soon, one among Mohammed Shami and Deepak Chahar will make it to the main squad. Jammu and Kashmir pacer Umran Malik is expected to be named in the standby list.



## India beat Malaysia by 30 runs via D/L method

Opener Sabbhineni Meghana (69) batted with authority to record her maiden T20I half-century as India defeated Malaysia by 30 runs via the Duckworth-Lewis method in the rain-curtailed Asia Cup match here on Monday.

Replacing vice-captain Smriti Mandhana at the top, Meghana hit a career-best 69 off 53 deliveries to help India post 181 for 4.

In reply, Malaysia was tottering at 16/2 in 5.2 overs when rain stopped play, far behind the 46-run mark which was the D/L par score when the match was called off.

With the win, India moved to the second spot on the points table -- with four points -- behind Pakistan.

Meghana took the Malaysian bowling attack to the sword as she brought up her career-best score in the format after India were asked to bat.

The big-hitting Shafali Verma, who is struggling for

form, also pitched in but the teenager looked scratchy for the most part of her 46-run knock.

Meghana made most of the opportunity provided to her as she donned the role of the aggressor from the very first ball.

She milked boundaries every over, hitting the ball all across the ground in the powerplay as India fetched 47/0 in the first six overs.

She was dropped on 14 by skipper Winifred Duraisingam (2/36) in the third over and the right-hander made the Malaysian's pay for the error as she raced to fifty with a boundary.

Poor fielding only added to Malaysia's woes as the Indian women looked on course for a 200-plus score.

However, Duraisingam got the big-wicket of Meghana. The Indian looked to drive only to chip the ball straight into the hands of extra cover, sending the entire Malaysian team into frenzy.

Shafali, who had played the

second second fiddle to perfection, smashed a couple of sixes but failed to carry on the momentum once Meghana was out.

Richa Ghosh was elevated to the number three spot and the young wicketkeeper played a fluent 33-run knock, finding the gaps beautifully.

But Shafali struggled to accelerate as Malaysia tightened their bowling and fielding while also triggering a mini-batting collapse.

In the eventful penultimate over, Shafali was bowled by 17-year-old Nur Dania Syuhada (2/9) off the first delivery before the spinner got rid of Kiran Navgire (0) in the next ball.

It would have been three-wicket haul for the teenager had Richa not been dropped at deep mid-wicket on 31.

Defending 181, spinners Deepti Sharma (1/10) and Rajeshwari Gayakwad (1/6) got rid of openers Winifred Duraisingam (0) and Wan Julia (1) before rain stopped play.

## Kohli thanks Guwahati for 'terrific atmosphere'

## Miller not much worried about South Africa's form

Formidable South African batter David Miller has a firm belief that the series-defeat against India won't make them a lesser force at the fast-approaching T20 World Cup as he cited Australia's title triumph in the previous edition despite their wretched run ahead of the big-ticket event.

South African top-order batters struggled badly while their bowlers were also not at their best on Sunday as India took an unassailable 2-0 lead in the three-match series with a 16-run win in the second game here.

The loss will hurt them little, said Miller, saying Australia had also struggled badly in 2021 but eventually they became the world champions. Australia had entered the World Cup after five back-to-back series defeats in the format.

"There're a lot of stories in the past with one being Australia not doing too well before the World Cup, and then they end up winning the World Cup. So I don't think it's too much to worry about," Miller



told reporters at the post-match interaction here.

"We've built up a really good squad over the last year and a half. We get on really well with each other. We've linked in nicely, great partnerships. We've won a lot of series last year.

"To have lost the series tonight was obviously very disappointing, but in the past

we've really competed well and at least we can walk away with our heads held high, but it is still disappointing losing the series."

The Temba Bavuma-led side was set a stiff target of 238 but the skipper departed without bothering the scorer for the second successive time. Rilee Rossouw also scored a duck.

However Miller produced a counter-attacking knock of 106 not out from 47 balls and was well-supported by Quinton de Kock's 48-ball 69 not out to make a match of it.

"We didn't bat well the previous game. We didn't start this game too well but we managed to get a really good partnership and put on a competitive game at the end of it," he said.

Miller, though, chose not to be very "harsh" on his bowlers.

"There were over 400 runs in the game, I don't want to be too harsh on the bowlers, but I think that there was a little bit of lack of execution at times."

"But they were really good in the previous game -- extremely good. A few areas that we can work on still leading up to the World Cup, so we still have time."



## Saurashtra delay inevitable with spirited batting show

Saurashtra's middle and slower-order showed a lot of stomach for fight, adding 281 runs by No. 6 to 8 batters, but Rest of India remained firm favourites to win the Irani Cup match here on Monday.

At stumps on third day, Saurashtra reached to 368/8, riding on half-centuries from the quartet comprising Sheldon Jackson (71), Arpit Vasavada (55), Prerak Mankad (72) and skipper Jaydev Unadkat (78 batting). The overall lead is 92 runs now and Saurashtra will like to stretch it to at least 175 in order to set the cat among the pigeons.

With 276 runs in arrears, Saurashtra were literally staring at a humiliating innings defeat after being reduced to 87 for 5 before lunch.

However, Jackson and Vasavada, who have bailed Saurashtra out many-a-times in the past, added 117 runs for the sixth wicket to steady the ship. But, it was the 144-run eighth wicket stand between Unadkat and all-rounder Mankad that raised visions - however improbable it may look at the moment -- of pulling off a heist.

The duo not only had a century stand but also scored the runs at a quick clip -- in only 29.3 overs -- to keep the

contest alive.

If it was Jackson who took the attack back to the opposition by repeatedly stepping out to left-arm spinner Saurabh Kumar (3/80 in 25 overs) to disturb his length, the pair of Unadkat and Mankad used the extra pace of Kuldeep Sen (3/85 in 16 overs) and Umran Malik (0/59 in 16 overs) to their advantage.

They hit six sixes from the bowling of Jackson, Vasavada and Unadkat.

Cheteshwar Pujara (1) would like to forget this Irani Cup match in a hurry as a rookie pacer like Kuldeep made life difficult for him with his extra pace and bounce.

On this ground, Pujara has hardly failed but his lack of feet movement and late reaction to deliveries with that extra kick will surely not go unnoticed as far as selectors Chetan Sharma and Sunil Joshi are concerned.

The problems that has been his undoing at the Test level is now resurfacing at the domestic level where he earlier used to rule.

Bowlers with extra pace at the domestic level are also asking Pujara probing questions. Kuldeep got one to rear up from length on the off-stump and Pujara just dangled his bat with KS Bharat taking an easy catch.

## Malan, Woakes star in England's T20I series win

Dawid Malan hit a brilliant half-century and pace bowler Chris Woakes took three wickets as England thrashed Pakistan by 67 runs in Lahore on Sunday to win the seven-match T20 international series 4-3.

Malan hit a 47-ball 78 not out and was ably supported by Harry Brook (46 not out) and Ben Duckett (30) to lift England to 209-3 in 20 overs.

The visitors then restricted the home team to 142-8 to end their first tour to Pakistan in 17 years with a series victory.

England won the first, third, sixth and seventh games while Pakistan won the second, fourth

and fifth.

Pakistan never recovered from losing the in-form Babar Azam and Mohammad Rizwan, their top run-scorer in the series, in the opening two overs.

Woakes had Azam caught at short cover for four before Reece Topley bowled Rizwan for one with his second delivery.

Shan Masood's 43-ball 56 came in vain as Pakistan were never in the hunt for their highest successful chase.

Pakistan's best chase in a T20I was the 208 they achieved against the West Indies in Karachi last year.

Khushdil Shah made 27 off 25 balls and added 53 for the fourth wicket with Masood but



leg-spinner Adil Rashid removed him to break the stand.

Woakes, who took 3-26, dismissed Asif Ali (seven) and had Masood caught brilliantly by

Adil Rashid in the 19th over to end Pakistan's hopes.

Earlier, Malan and Brook led England's recovery from a jittery 39-2 with openers Alex

Hales (18) and Phil Salt (20) gone after a quick 39-run start -- both falling in the fifth over.

Dropped twice by Pakistan skipper Azam on 29 and

Mohammad Wasim on 62, Malan struck eight fours and three sixes in the 13th half-century of his T20I career.

Malan added 62 for the third wicket with Duckett to put the innings back on track.

Brook, dropped on 24 by Azam off Harris Rauf, struck four sixes and a four in his 29-ball innings and added 108 for the fourth wicket with Malan in 10.1 overs.

For Pakistan, fast bowler Mohammad Hasnain took 1-32 while fellow paceman Wasim went for 61 runs in four wicket-less overs.

England took the attack to Pakistan and scored 60 in their last five overs.
