## CBI MAKES SOCIAL MEDIA DEBUT AHEAD OF INTERPOL GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Social media shy CBI has made a maiden appearance on Twitter and Instagram ahead of the upcoming Interpol General Assembly in which 195 countries are likely to participate, officials said on Sunday. The agency created its accounts on both platforms with user ID CBI\_CIO for the three-day-long 90th General Assembly starting October 18, they said. Unlike its peers, the Enforcement Directorate and the National Investigation Agency, the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) had kept social media at an arm's length, sticking to the age-old practice of issuing press releases.

## GANDHI STATUE MADE OF SCRAP INSTALLED AT ODISHA INSTITUTE

A six-foot-high statue of Mahatma Gandhi, made of scrap, was on Sunday installed on the campus of a government-run Industrial Training Institute (ITI) here. The statue, weighing around 105 kg, was erected as a tribute to the Father of the Nation on the occasion of Gandhi Jayanti. The sculpture has been made of various scrap materials, including 1,600 electric fan bearings, car seat belts and iron rods among other items, the institute's principal Rajat Kumar Panigrahy said. Around 30 students from the fitter and welder wings along with some teaching faculties took around 15 days to complete the sculpture.

The Delhi High Court has directed a woman to provide sanitary napkins to a girls' school for two months as condition to quash an extortion case lodged against her. The high court also asked a lawyer, who was the complainant in the extortion case, to report to the office of Delhi High Court Legal Service Committee (DHCLSC) and undertake pro bono (done for public good free of cost) work to the best of his ability and capability for the next three months. It quashed the FIR after noting that no purpose would be served in prosecuting the complainant as the parties have arrived at a settlement and wish to put a quietus to the dispute between them.



## TS tops in nation

### Nets first prize in Swachh Survekshan Grameen awards

Telangana won the first prize under the large states category under the Swachh Survekshan Grameen (SSG) 2022 which looks into the sanitation status of rural areas.

Haryana was in the second position while Tamil Nadu was third. The awards were presented by President Droupadi Murmu.

The Swachh Survekshan Grameen-2022 award ranks states and districts on the basis of their performance attained on key quantitative and qualitative Swachh Bharat Mission Gramin (SBM-G) parameters and engagement of the rural community in the improvement of their sanitation status.



## Kishan warns TS IB sleuths against visiting BJP office

## 125 die in deadly stampede

### Tear gas triggers crush at Indonesia soccer match

Panic and a chaotic run for exits after police fired tear gas at an Indonesian soccer match to drive away fans upset with their team's loss left at least 125 dead, most of whom were trampled upon or suffocated, making it one of the deadliest sports events in the world. Attention immediately focused on the police use of tear gas, and witnesses described police beat them with sticks and shields before shooting canisters directly into the crowds.

The president of FIFA called the deaths at the stadium a dark day for all involved in football



and a tragedy beyond comprehension, while President Joko Widodo ordered an investigation of security procedures. While FIFA has no control over domestic games, it has advised against the use of tear gas at soccer stadiums.

## Tremendous growth in Telangana

### State attracted over Rs 2.5 lakh cr investments: KTR

Telangana has attracted over 2.5 lakh crore in investment across various sectors in the last 8 years due to business-friendly policies and atmosphere, state Industries Minister KT Rama Rao said.

Rao -- who also holds the portfolio of Telangana Minister for Commerce, IT and Urban Development -- made the remarks in a reply to a question on state investment policies.

"We gave more than 20,000 clearances (to business proposals) in last 8 years through TS iPass attracting more than Rs 2.5 lakh crore of investment and created 1.6 million



or 16 crore direct job opportunities," he told PTI in an interview.

Under the TS iPass or Telangana State Industrial Policy, an investor is given all clearances within 15 days, Rao said.

However, if an investor does not

receive any communication from the Telangana government, his or her investment proposal is entitled to be deemed approved, the minister said, adding the officer responsible for the delay is fined accordingly.

"Further, if one already complies with all rules and regulations, the person can begin construction from day 1 by just filing a self-declaration document with the government," he said.

Rao said sectors like IT, pharma and manufacturing have shown tremendous growth over the last 8 years.

## It is raining yatras across the nation

It is raining yatras this political season. With all the latest technology at the disposal of the political parties and the advent of social media, many are going back to the good old formula of mass contact through a yatra (march). While Rahul Gandhi, along with several other Congress leaders, embarked on a 3,570-km Kanyakumari-to-Kashmir Bharat Jodo Yatra last month, two more yatras began on Sunday -- BJD's Jan Sampark Padayatra, led by Odisha Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik, and poll strategist Prashant Kishor's 3,500-km padayatra (foot march)

within Bihar from the Gandhi Ashram in West Champaran.

Patnaik launched the mass contact programme on the occasion of Gandhi Jayanti near the Lingaraj temple in Bhubaneswar, calling upon the Biju Janata Dal (BJD) leaders and workers to work in tandem with everyone for the development of Odisha. Kishor's march is being seen as a precursor to his re-entry into politics. Kishor and his supporters will attempt to reach every panchayat and block in Bihar during the yatra, which is likely to take anywhere between 12 and 15 months to complete. Kishor started the march from the Bhitiharwa Gandhi

Ashram, from where Mahatma Gandhi had launched his first Satyagraha movement in 1917.

As the poll strategist and his followers embarked on the 'padayatra', they were greeted by people along the route.

The Congress's Bharat Jodo Yatra, which entered its 25th day on Sunday, has passed through Tamil Nadu and Kerala and entered Karnataka.

The yatra is being billed as the Congress's biggest mass contact programme since independence and a 'turning point' in the country's political history. The Congress has said it is a "transformational

moment" for Indian politics and a "decisive moment" for the party's rejuvenation. The "yatra bandwagon" is not new in politics. There have been several such events along with their hits and misses in terms of the impact. In 1983, former prime minister Chandra Shekhar's Bharat Yatra saw him undertake a foot march from Kanyakumari. Monikers such as the "marathon man" were given to the Janata Party leader when his yatra, which was launched on January 6, 1983, reached New Delhi six months later. Chandra Shekhar's stature and the traction to the yatra kept rising as he passed village after village to connect with people.



Though observers regard Chandra Shekhar's foot march as a largely successful event, dramatic political developments such as then prime minister Indira Gandhi's assassination diluted its impact in the 1984 general election, which was swept by

the Congress. In 1985, the Sandesh Yatra was announced by then prime minister and Congress president Rajiv Gandhi at the AICC plenary session in Mumbai.

## A TOP GUN WHO LETS HIS WORK SPEAK

Few top guns in the Police Department manage to maintain the mystique about them. They either court or are sucked into controversies. Telangana Director-General of Police Mahender Reddy, whose tenure is about to end, continues to keep himself away from media glare. Unlike most of his peers who have been media-friendly, Mahender Reddy has surprised many circles by keeping a low profile. Media houses are hoping to get his time, but the DGP says: "Let our work speak". Bureaucratic circles are discussing how the senior IPS officer may be having political aspirations. They seem to know about the calm before the storm.

## BLUE-EYED BOY AMONG BABUS

Nirmal district has faced floods and issues concerning IIIT Basara, with even District Collector Musharraf Faruqi being caught in controversies. The searing condemnatory comments on social media prompted her to apologise and delete the map along with the related tweet. On the occasion of Dasara festival, Smita Sabharwal

had posted the tweet with the map in question to illustrate the male to female ratio in various states. She mentioned that Amma is worshipped with devotion in all the states; yet, the ratio of women to men is different in the states. In the offending map, Gujarat, Rajasthan, Punjab, Haryana and Delhi were shown as states where the population of women was less compared to that of men. Netizens went beyond that and saw red because Kashmir was not complete in the map posted by Smita.

## EXTENDED FESTIVE SEASON WITH OFFICIATING CS

For bureaucrats in Telangana it is going to be an extended festive season. ## ANOTHER BABU IN LINE TO BECOME NETA

These days babus make no bones about their political ambitions. Andhra Pradesh Education Department advisor and IAS officer A Murali has resigned from his post professedly to mend matters in his native state Telangana. A Telangana cadre officer, he had quit in 2019 miffed at being transferred by the Telangana government while serving as a Collector. After that, he was appointed as advisor to the Education Department by the AP government. Murali started the Social Democratic Forum to fight for the development of education and health fields. In 2021 IPS officer RS Praveen Kumar also resigned and later joined BSP. Both Praveen Kumar and Murali, after their retirement, targeted the TRS government and made serious criticism. Now, Murali also is planning to enter politics. He may join BSP or Aam Admi Party, going by his aides' reading of the situation. # KCR hints at handing over reins to KTR

The comments made by TRS supreme Chief Minister K. Chandrasekhar Rao at the Warangal meeting on Saturday have become a hot topic in party circles.

KCR had said, "I am 68 years old and our time is over. The future belongs to youth and students." TRS circles are discussing the secret behind the comments made by KCR.

In the backdrop of the reported floating of a national party, KCR's comments are significant. Some TRS sections think that KCR has given an

indirect hint about making his son IT Minister KT Rama Rao the Chief Minister.

In this context, TRS circles remember KCR's tweet on September 30. In that tweet, KTR had said, "This September marks the completion of 16 years in public life for me. I have lots of memories from the Telangana agitation which lasted eight years followed by eight plus years in government."

Quoting this tweet TRS circles said that KTR had indirectly said that he is capable of becoming the Chief Minister with around one-and-a-half decades of political experi-

ence.

In fact, in TRS circles there is a discussion since a long time about KTR becoming the Chief Minister. Some senior TRS leaders and ministers have also openly said that KCR should go to national politics and make KTR the Chief Minister.

TRS circles strongly believe that KTR will become the Chief Minister one day. But when that day will come is important. Some TRS leaders said that as of now KCR may not make him CM immediately.

They said that KCR is planning to tour other states after launching his national party.

While touring other states he will get security and other facilities if he continues as Chief Minister. After the next Assembly elections, KCR will become the Chief Minister a third time and that will be a record.

Five months after the Telangana Assembly elections there will be Lok Sabha elections. During the Lok Sabha elections, KCR may have to campaign in other states too. Then also he will get security and other conveniences if he is the Chief Minister.

TRS circles feel that KTR can become the Chief Minister only after the next Lok Sabha

elections. After the Lok Sabha elections KCR will actively participate in national politics making his son the Chief Minister.

But some TRS leaders said that they cannot rule out the possibility of KCR making KTR the Chief Minister after launching the national party.

After floating the national party KCR has to appoint state presidents. KCR may make KTR the Telangana unit president of his party and also make him the Chief Minister so that he can concentrate full time on national politics and build up his national party in other states.

## After CUET, how major central varsities change admission process

The much-delayed admission season has finally taken off with major central universities in Delhi having opened up the process to admit students into various undergraduate (UG) courses.

This year, the admission process has changed in the universities as they have adopted Common University Entrance Test (CUET) for admissions to UG courses. While the Delhi University earlier admitted students based on 12th class marks, Jamia Millia Islamia and Jawaharlal Nehru University used to have separate entrance tests for admissions to UG courses.

Relinquishing the old practices of admitting students, the universities have partially or wholly adopted the CUET



from the academic session 2022-23. Take a look at how admission process is panning out in these universities.

In Delhi University, admissions are being done in 79 UG programmes across 67 colleges, departments and centres of the varsity. The university launched an online platform for seeking admission through Common Seat Allocation System (CSAS)-2022 earlier this month. The admission process, which began on September 12, is being conducted in three phases: First phase is to apply to the univer-

sity, second phase is preference filling and third phase is seat allotment-cum-admission. Currently, the second and third phases are underway.

Phase I started on September 12 and phase II on September 26. However, both phases will remain open till October 10. The CUET scores are required in the second phase. The university has earlier announced that the university will consider the subject-based normalised scores as declared by the NTA in the CUET (UG)-2022 scorecards of the candidates.

## 'Just top 20% of consumer driving demand'

That the rich got richer during the pandemic has become more evident with research data showing just 20 per cent of the population are leading the discretionary consumption wagon as the rest are still recovering.

The pandemic has not impacted affluent consumers' income levels in the country is clear from the fact that the top 20 per cent of the population account for the bulk of discretionary consumption -- 59 per cent in rural areas and 66 per cent in urban areas, Tanvee Gupta-Jain, chief economist at UBS Securities India, said in a report.

Citing an in-house UBS survey (conducted in August among 1,500 higher-income consumers) results, she says more than half of the respon-

dents have bought gold/ jewellery as planned or more in the past three months and more than half of them planning to invest in properties and buying cars/two-wheelers over the next two years.

That the rich will continue to drive consumption demand is clear from the UBS survey findings, with more than 70 per cent of respondents anticipating their income will increase in 2023.

Similarly, nearly 70 per cent of the respondents expect festive spending to rise, while 20 per cent expect stable spending on online shopping, healthcare, online entertainment, household consumables like groceries, food, etc. Spending on durables and education is likely to remain largely the same. Only 9 per cent expect a slowdown in their festive spending.

In a reply to a question on the number of companies operating in Telangana, Minister said, "We are the world's largest vaccine hub. 33 per cent of the world vaccine is produced in Telangana. We manufacture 35-40 per cent of India's pharmaceuticals. We are an important hub in information and technology. In fact, the world's largest IT companies like Google, Apple, Microsoft, Facebook, Amazon and Qualcomm all are here".

The ecosystem in the IT sector is about 8 lakh people in

direct jobs and at least 2 fold of them are working indirectly for the segment.

Out of 4,50,000 jobs created in the IT sector last year, 1,50,000 jobs were created in Telangana alone. One over of every 3 jobs in IT gets generated in Telangana, he said.

In life sciences, more than 5,00,000 people have direct jobs.

When asked about the investment his government is expecting over the next 5 years, Rao said, "I will not pose any numbers. We will speak when things materialise. The state is seeing repeat invest-

ments from already operating players".

Telangana is number 3 in the ease of doing business index. "We also provide peace of doing business that is why out of Rs 2.5 lakh crore of investment, 24 per cent was repeat investment from players who had already invested in the state," the minister said.

Recently a textile company signed an MoU with the state government to invest Rs 24,000 crore and Schneider Electric is setting up its second unit in Telangana, Rao said, citing examples of repeat investments.

During a five-hour long meeting of the council of ministers held on Friday that was also attended by all secretaries in the Union government, Modi cited the case of the dependence on imported Active Pharmaceutical Ingredients (APIs) used for manufacturing drugs, which was highlighted by the NSCS several years back, the sources said. Thereafter, on the instruction of Prime Minister Modi, Deputy NSA Vikram Misri gave a presentation on NSCS to apprise ministers about the secretariat, they said.

In the presentation, Misri shared the details about changes taking place across the world, especially in Europe, Russia and the US, and their impact on India, the sources added. According to sources, Misri's presentation was not

originally scheduled and was added on the intervention of the prime minister, sources said.

Before Misri, Finance Secretary TV Somanathan and Commerce Secretary BVR Subrahmanyam also gave their presentations.

During the meeting, Modi also underlined that the policy-making process is dynamic and it needs to be modified with changing times.

Citing an example from his tenure as Gujarat chief minister, the prime minister said there were some rules related to a ministry that were named after some other state and this was changed only after he pointed it out to officials, the sources said.

He told the meeting that there is a tendency of being complacent in framing and implementing policies and this should be avoided.

# Hyd police thwart ISI plot to carry out terror attacks in city

● Three suspects were arrested, Rs 5,41,800 cash and four hand grenades recovered from them

A conspiracy hatched at the behest of the Pakistan Intelligence agency, Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI), to carry out terror attacks in the city was thwarted by the Hyderabad police on Sunday. The police arrested three suspects, who, they said, were involved in hatching the conspiracy. The police said that four hand grenades, Rs 5,41,800 cash and a motorcycle were seized from them.

Acting on a tip-off, the police arrested Abdul Zahed (39), a resident of Malakpet, who was involved in several terror-related cases in Hyderabad. He revived his

contacts with known persons from Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI) and conspired to carry out terror attacks, including blasts and 'lone wolf' attacks in the city of Hyderabad to create terror

among the people. Two persons arrested are Mohd Sameuddin (39) and Maaz Hasan Farooq (29).

Abdul Zahed was previously involved in several cases, including the attack on the

Task Force office in Begumpet in 2005. It was a suicide bombing where the bomber detonated explosives, killing himself and a 45-year-old homeguard. Three more suspects, identified as Farhatullah Ghori, Siddique Bin Osman and Abdul Majeed, who are natives of Hyderabad, are absconding.

All the three have now gone to Pakistan and are working under the aegis of the ISI. In the past, they recruited local youth and after radicalising them, terror attacks were carried out near Saibaba Temple at Dilshuknagar in 2002, Bus Blast in Ghatkopar Mumbai and the 2005 Begumpet Suicide Bombing attack. In 2004, the trio had also attempted to cause blasts near

Secunderabad Ganesh Temple.

The police said Abdul Zahed had revealed that the trio from ISI got in touch with him and provided finance to them to carry out a terror attack in Hyderabad. At the behest of Pakistan-based handlers, he recruited Samiuddin and Maaz Hasan. They were planning to hurl hand grenades at public gatherings and thereby creating communal tension in the city.

Abdul Zahed was found with two hand grenades, Rs 3.91 lakh cash and two mobile phones. Samiuddin was found with one hand grenade, Rs 1.5 lakh cash and one mobile phone. Maaz Hasan was in possession of a hand grenade and two mobile phones.

# CPHHD urges stricter enforcement of Smoke-Free Rules with road art

Marking the 14th anniversary of Smoke-Free Rules and in an attempt to make people aware of COTPA-2003, the Council for Planetary Health and Human Development (CPHHD) launched an awareness initiative with thought-provoking road art in association with fine arts students at Khairatabad Junction in Hyderabad on Sunday.

Smoke-Free Rules were introduced in 2008 to eliminate smoking in public areas and the risk of passive smoking. While there has been some progress regarding this, the rules have mostly remained on paper and execution has not been satisfactory.

According to Section (4) of the Cigarettes and Other Tobacco Products (Prohibition of Advertisement and Regulation of Trade and Commerce Production, Supply



Planetary Health and Human Development said, "Framing rules without implementing them on the ground is of no use. Fourteen years into implementation, it is no exaggeration to say that most Indians are still unaware of them. The onus is on government agencies to implement these rules effectively and ensure that no lives are lost due to passive smoking. From our NGO's side, we are doing our bit to create awareness among people, and we will continue to do so. I humbly appeal to all citizens to read COTPA-2003 and save future generations from tobacco," he said.

A public place is defined as any place to which the public has access, whether as of right or not, and includes all places visited by the general public.

Boards with the warning, 'No Smoking Area - Smoking Here is an Offence; have to be displayed prominently at the entrance of all public places. Expressing the need for a deeper look into the implementation of these rules, Dr Suresh Kumar Cherukula, the Founder of the Council for

She said that according to that day's particular goddess they used to cook prasad, sing Bathukamma-related songs and dance in circles. "I remember Atla Bathukamma, one of the forms of the goddess. During the nine days we used to make something like dosas with wheat flour," she added.

But where do we find anything of that

now? Some of them teach their children but the essence of the celebrations is lost, she said.

As the woman said it is DJ mixed music in most places. Either new songs or Bathukamma songs with fast-beat music are being played.

There are also places where a list of Bathukamma devotional songs dedicated to Bathukamma such as Kalavari Kodalu Uyyalo, Okkesi Puvvesi Chandamma and Chittu Chittula Bomma are in the playlist.

Northern style Navaratri is also seen in Telangana. People play dandiya around Bathukamma.

Youngsters who play music said, "Of course, we like to dress up and dance to music. The festival comes only once a year and we would like to enjoy the moment.

That does not mean we ignore what our elders say, but we have our creative ways of having fun-filled festivals. We also think that devotional songs are boring after a certain point of time."

Every year the festival is celebrated as per the Satavahana calendar for nine days starting Bhadrpada Pournami (also known as Mahalaya Amavasya for Pitru Amavasya) till Durgashtami.

# Medical Assns demand end to quackery in Telangana

An emergency meeting with all the medical associations of Telangana was held on Sunday in connection with the comment made by Health Minister T Harish Rao openly encouraging quacks, who are endangering public health.

The meeting was held at the Indian Medical Association (IMA) Telangana building at Koti, the medical representatives demanded implementation of laws to shut down all establishments being run by quacks/unqualified persons.

The meeting was attended by representatives from Healthcare Reformers Doctors Association (HRDA), Junior Doctors Association (JUDA),



Senior Residents Doctors Association (SRDA), Telangana Teaching Government Doctors Association (TTGDA) and other doctor forums. An action plan was unanimously approved at the meeting which would begin on Monday. On Monday, there will be black badge protests in all

medical institutions and private clinics. On Tuesday, the medical representatives would complain against the Health Minister and BJP State unit president Bandi Sanjay to the Chief Minister and National Medical Commission (NMC) for supporting quackery. On October 7, representatives would represent the District Collectors, District Medical and Health Officers, Director of Public Health and Telangana State Medical Council, appealing to them to shut down all establishments run by quacks.

They would embark on an awareness campaign in all medical colleges between October 10 and 13 and they threatened to stage a sit-in outside the DPH office.

# Govt of Telangana earns excise revenue targeted for one year in just 6 months

The Telangana State Beverages Corporation accounts indicate that the state has earned an excise revenue of Rs 17,324 crore in just six months. In fact, the state government in its budget for 2022-23 predicted earning Rs 17,500 crore in a year provided the annual sales are Rs 22,500 crore. At this rate, in just two months, the state government is all set to reach its target.

The sale of liquor in April was Rs 2701.38 crore, while it

increased to Rs 3076.26 crore in May and dipped a little to Rs 3020.66 crore in June. In July, the sales further dipped to reach the Rs 2985.75 crore mark. However in August, the sales improved to reach Rs 3005.98 crore. In September, the sales crashed to Rs 2533.21 crore.

According to a national survey done in 2001, Telangana ranked number three after Arunachal Pradesh and Sikkim among the liquor consuming states. The survey indicates that 29 per cent of the population

has the liquor habit.

Because of the binge drinking indulged in by the tipplers in the state and because of hiking the prices of liquor, the state government earned higher excise revenue surpassing the expectations.

The beverages corporation accounts indicate that the sales are the highest in Rangareddy district of all the districts in the state. From April 1 this year to September 30, Rs 3,970.82 crore worth liquor was sold in Rangareddy district. The districts of Hyderabad (Rs

1828.10 crore), Karimnagar (Rs 1463.93 crore), Khammam (Rs 1100.38 crore), Mahabubnagar (Rs 1,233.53 crore), Medak (Rs 1,424.09 crore), Nalgonda (Rs 1,774.46 crore) and Warangal Urban (Rs 1,745.73 crore) figured among those districts where the liquor sales crossed Rs 1000-crore mark.

These districts together accounted for total sales of liquor worth over Rs 14,000 crore, while the rest of the districts accounted for sale of liquor worth Rs 3000 crore.

# Application invited for firecracker licence

The Hyderabad City Police Commissioner on Sunday issued a notification which stated that applicants desirous of possessing and selling firecrackers on the eve of Diwali will have to submit their applications online before October 18. Applications submitted thereafter will not be accepted.

The notification said, "Those wanting to sell firecrackers on a temporary basis within the jurisdiction of Hyderabad City Police will be issued a licence under the explosives Act 1884 and Rules 1983 (amended in 2008) by the Deputy Commissioner of Police of the concerned zones. Any contravention would attract penal provisions and other action as stipulated under the Act and Rules.

# Inaccessible schools force many kids out of school in Jawaharnagar

Jawaharnagar, with around 100 slums, has a migrant population living with inadequate schools.

The children who are dropping out do so due to their limited access to government schools or their inaccessibility.

The local community and child rights workers have a single point request to concerned officials, sanction a new primary and high school near the Gabbilalpet slum of Jawaharnagar Municipal Corporation, as there are only two high schools for around 100 slums.

As per the Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 (Act No: 35 of 2009), particularly Section 5 of the Act, which talks of access to educational facilities, states that for children studying in classes I to V



a school should be established within walking distance of their neighbourhood.

For children studying in classes VI to VIII, a school should be provided within 3 km of their neighbourhood. But most of these slums have no school within the said distance. Speaking to 'The Pioneer', local families pointed out that after Covid, their jobs are in danger and that they are not in a position to pay for private schools. These families are helpless and end up considering the child as a source of income.

Additionally, most school-children are either forced to opt for private transportation, with each day costing around Rs 60 for auto-rick fares, a luxury the daily wage labour families cannot afford, or walk long distances. Beyond a point, it just increases dropouts and eventually translates into child labour or child marriage.

Addressing inaccessibility is the way forward, pointed out Hima Bindu, a child rights worker in Jawaharnagar slums, and said that they track the patterns of child labour and dropouts.

# Helpline 1930 established to help cybercrime victims

Did cyber criminals loot your hard-earned money from your bank account? Are you thinking of how to get it back? Then the victims are required to call helpline number 1930.

Then the concerned banks will freeze the concerned account. All online frauds can be reported to the call centre to access a free service.

In the wake of increasing cyber crimes, the Union Ministry introduced 1930 in place of 155260, avoiding the need for people to make rounds to police stations and

banks. The call centre works under the supervision of the police departments in respective States. The call centre in Telangana has been set up in Cyber Crime Department of Cyberabad Police Commissionerate.

With the help of the 1930 toll-free number, the Cyberabad police over the last few months resolved many cases.

The helpline works 24x7. To receive online complaints from victims, a T-4C portal has been launched to enable the victims to lodge their com-



plaints from anywhere.

When the victims call the helpline, the call centre employees give information to the bank nodal officer concerned.

The officials will find out to which bank account was transferred and send information to the bank officer concerned,

leading to freezing of that particular bank account.

In the process, the bank account of the cyber fraudsters will get frozen. With the help of the frozen bank account, the police will investigate the case to identify the fraudsters.

In case the money from the fraudster's account has been withdrawn before freezing the account, the police use the money transfer as a clue to trace the criminals. The police will apprehend criminals on the basis of the technical information shared by the banks.

For this to happen, the banks should lodge their complaint

with the call centre as early as possible in case of loss of money to a cybercriminal.

Many are reluctant to report the loss of money to the police, feeling insulted. The online portal has been launched to prevent victims making rounds to the police stations.

The portal is called T-4C (Telangana Cyber Crime Co-ordination Centre). People can lodge their complaint with the police from anywhere with the help of the portal.

The concerned cyber police will call up the victim and gather information and take suitable remedial measures.

# Four children of a family drown in tank

In a heart-wrenching incident, four children of a family were drowned in a village tank at Tadiparthi under Yacharam mandal in the district on Sunday. A 12-year-old girl was among those drowned in the tank.

The divers, deployed by the administration, retrieved the bodies.

The deceased children have been identified as Md Khaleel (12), Md Samreen (14), Rehan (10) and Imran (8).



According to the information, the children drowned in the tank when they ventured into it to swim. Upon receiving information, the local police reached the spot. Their bodies were shifted to Osmania General Hospital for post-mortem.

Organs of AIIMS official's sister give life to four

Organs of a senior Delhi AIIMS official's sister who was declared brain dead a few days ago were donated, giving a fresh lease of life to four people and vision to two. Snehlata Choudhary, sister of Rabindra Agarwal, an IAS officer posted as the additional director of administration at AIIMS here, had sustained a severe head injury during her morning walk last month. The 63-year-old was initially operated for head injury in Jharkhand's Jamshedpur and then airlifted to AIIMS Trauma Centre for further treatment, a senior doctor said. Choudhary was health conscious and used to go for morning walks regularly for the last 25 years. "Despite best efforts, her condition did not improve and was declared brain dead on September 30," the doctor said. She was a home maker and a social worker. "She was a strong supporter of the eye donation campaign and supported the cause of organ donation throughout her life. She had also qualified for Kaun Banega Crorepati," the doctor added.



Gujarat: Campaigning heats up ahead of announcement of Assembly polls

Campaigning is heating up in Gujarat ahead of announcement of dates for the Assembly elections, with prominent political leaders like Narendra Modi, Arvind Kejriwal and Rahul Gandhi visiting the state. The elections are crucial for the ruling BJP which aims to retain power in the home state of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, while the Congress hopes for a win after remaining out of power for 27 years in the key state. For new entrant Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), the elections, scheduled to be held in two months, will be an opportunity to emerge as a pan-nation party. The state will see a three-cornered contest between BJP, Congress and AAP. Gujarat has seen frequent visits of top national leaders ahead of the elections, and parties are firming up their strategies. The roads of cities and villages of Gujarat are filled up with advertisement banners of political parties. Political parties have started high decibel campaigns for the elections, whose dates may be announced any time this month, political observer Hari Desai said.



Moosewala murder case: Accused gangster Tinu escapes from custody

Gangster Deepak Tinu, one of the accused in the Sidhu Moosewala murder case, escaped from police custody in Punjab's Mansa district, official sources said on Sunday. A manhunt has been launched to nab Tinu, who escaped on Saturday night when he was brought on a production warrant from Goindwal Sahib jail in another case by the Mansa police, they said. Police of neighbouring states, including Rajasthan and Haryana, have been alerted, the sources said. Tinu is a close aide of jailed gangster Lawrence Bishnoi, also an accused in the murder case of the Punjabi singer. When asked about the incident, Patiala Range Inspector General Mukhwinder Singh Chhina, who is currently holding additional charge as Bathinda Range IG, told PTI over the phone, "We are working on it, police parties are on the job and we will catch him soon." Shubdeep Singh Sidhu, popularly known as Sidhu Moosewala, was shot dead in Punjab's Mansa district on May 29.

CONGRESS PREZ POLL CANDIDATES

Open to public debate, say Tharoor; I only know how to work: Kharge

Set for an electoral face-off with Congress veteran Mallikarjun Kharge for the party president's post, Lok Sabha MP Shashi Tharoor on Sunday said he would be open to the idea of a public debate between the candidates as it would evoke people's interest in the party similar to the recent British Conservative Party leadership race. Asked about Tharoor's remarks on holding a debate, Kharge, however, did not appear inclined towards having such an engagement, saying, "I don't want to get into that, I only know how to work, give me an opportunity to do that." In an interview with PTI, Tharoor also said the Nehru-Gandhi family has held and will always hold a special place in the hearts of Congress party members. He said the answer to the Congress' current challenges



lies in a combination of effective leadership and organisational reforms. Kharge and Tharoor were left in the fray in the Congress presidential poll after former Jharkhand minister K N Tripathi's nomination was rejected on Saturday. Talking about what he brings to the table, Tharoor has he has a "proven and credible track record in leading at the highest levels of organisations, whether it has been at the UN" or more recently for the Congress party as founder-

chairman of the All-India Professionals' Congress. At the UN, Tharoor said, "as the under-secretary-general in-charge of the body's public information department, I managed the communications of the UN's largest department comprising of over 800 staff in 77 offices worldwide, rationalised its structure, trimmed its budget and sharpened its efforts all of which prompted many to urge me to contest to lead the UN Organisation itself." Referring to the All-India

Professionals' Congress, he said, "I had to create from scratch and which in just five years since 2017 has over 10,000 fellows from across 20 states in the country." In terms of organisational reforms, the former Union minister said, he has outlined a set of priorities that he believes can help strengthen the Congress and take on the machinery of the BJP. "Since our current situation is widely deplored, it may be an advantage not to be burdened by the baggage of having spent too much time in the present party organisation and be able to approach it from a fresh perspective," the 66-year-old leader said. Asked if he would want a public debate between the party's presidential candidates as is seen in many western democracies and if such an exercise would help delegates make up their minds, Tharoor said, "I would be open to the idea."

'NATIONAL HERALD' CASE ED again summons Karnataka Congress chief D K Shivakumar

The Enforcement Directorate has summoned Karnataka Congress President D K Shivakumar for questioning in its ongoing money laundering probe into the operations of the Congress party-owned National Herald newspaper, official sources said. He has been asked to depose before the federal investigative agency on October 7 in Delhi, they said. The 60-year-old former cabinet minister was last questioned by the federal agency on September 19 in the national capital in another money laundering case linked to alleged possession of disproportionate assets. The latest summons comes

at a time when the 'Bharat Jodo Yatra' of the Congress party, led by its leader Rahul Gandhi, entered Karnataka on Friday, September 30, and will be in the state for 21 days. Shivakumar is involved in the conduct of this leg of the yatra. While exiting the ED office after his questioning last month, he had told the waiting mediapersons that he has been charge-sheeted by the agency in one money laundering case but he does not know what is the new case (disproportionate assets) against him. "Surprisingly, they (ED officials) have asked me about the payment from one of my trusts from me and my brother to Young Indian," he had told reporters.

Family remembers Sir Sultan Ahmed's participation in Round Table Conference



Today being Gandhi Jayanti, it reminds us of his participation in the Round Table Conference in London," his great-grandson Alamdar Hussain said. "We have old, black and white pictures of him sitting at the second Round Table Conference, and Gandhiji, Pt Madan Mohan Malviya and other leaders sitting across him during the conference," he said, with pride in his voice. Hussain, a lawyer at the Patna High Court where Ahmed had a stint as a judge before becoming a member of the Viceroy's Executive Council, said he brought his legal acumen and clarity of thinking to the table during the 1931 conference. Prior to that he was also the first Indian vice chancellor of Patna University from 1923-30.

'The Last Heroes': Author P Sainath to return with new book after two decades

After his immensely successful "Everybody loves a Good Drought", a researched study of poverty in the rural districts of India, award-winning author-journalist P Sainath will soon come out with a new book on India's freedom struggle. The book, titled "The Last Heroes" and scheduled for release on November 21, celebrates little known fighters -- farmers, labourers, homemakers, forest produce gatherers, artisans and others -- from India's freedom struggle as it tracks the role of ordinary, everyday people in achieving Independence.



Published by Penguin Random House India (PRHI), it is touted to be an attempt to tell these freedom fighter stories, giving them a recognition they "truly deserve, but were never granted." "In the next five or six years,

there will not be a single person alive who fought for this country's freedom. Newer generations of young Indians will never get to meet, see, speak or listen to India's freedom fighters. That's why and for whom I wrote this book," said Sainath, whose last book is currently on its 56th-print run. "For quite a while now, we see young people being robbed of their history, denied any knowledge of what India's fight for freedom and Independence was about -- and who it was who spearheaded that struggle," he added. The book highlights the distinction between freedom and independence that these fight-

ers speak of. It also shows that Indian Independence was not the gift of a handful of 'Oxbridge elites', and does so by revealing the diversity of these foot soldiers who fought the great battles of freedom. According to the publishers, "The Last Heroes" goes beyond their fight for Independence only as many continued their battle for freedom long after 1947. "P Sainath's book, his first in more than two decades, captures a critically important slice of history by documenting the participation of ordinary people in India's freedom struggle."

## Loose talk

Kejriwal says that an 'Intelligence Bureau report' foresees his victory in Gujarat Assembly poll

If a political party frequently makes 'explosive' claims, over a period of time people get inured to its statements—especially when the claims seldom correspond with the objective reality. So, if Delhi Chief Minister and Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) boss Arvind Kejriwal thought that he would set the Yamuna on fire with a statement, based on an "Intelligence Bureau report," he may be in for an unpleasant surprise. This report, Kejriwal claimed, says that his party will win the Gujarat Assembly elections if these are held today. Apparently, he did not explain the small matter of how he got hold of the IB report. After all, the IB is an intelligence agency, not a ministry or department which posts its documents on its website. The casualness with which Kejriwal mentions an IB report to score political points is disconcerting; it is unbecoming for an incumbent Chief Minister to have disclosed the findings of an intelligence report (if he really saw it). A few weeks ago, while slamming Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the alleged Operation Lotus, he had said the Centre's recent action against Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia had increased the AAP's vote share in Gujarat by 4 per cent. And, for good measure, this increase would rise to 6 per cent if Sisodia was arrested. Nobody knows from where Kejriwal got these numbers—some pollster carrying out a survey, his own party doing it—but he said it nonetheless. The media too reported it faithfully.



Such loose talk doesn't cover Kejriwal in glory, but it has been quite useful for him and his party. Before coming to power in Delhi, he flooded the political arena in the national capital with all manner of accusations against Congress leaders (as the Congress-led United Progressive Alliance was in power) and some big industrialists. Former Delhi chief minister Sheila Dikshit, who died in 2019, was a favourite target. He pledged to throw all corrupt people behind bars if elected. He did get elected, but did nothing against those whom he had called corrupt. It's true that the Delhi Police is not under him, but he didn't even initiate any serious investigation or prosecution against the corrupt. If a private citizen Subramanian Swamy can get powerful people prosecuted and even jailed, why couldn't Kejriwal? Unfortunately, Kejriwal is not the only politician who has acquired the habit of hurling wild allegations against the people he doesn't like; Bharatiya Janata Party leaders have also said nasty things about Robert Vadra, without taking action against him if he did anything wrong. Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar said all kinds of things about Lalu Prasad Yadav in the past, though now they are allies. At the heart of the issue is politicians' belief that they will not be held accountable for their statements, so they say anything that suits their political purpose. But they must realize that there is something called the law of diminishing returns.



## Adieu comrade kodiyeeri

Unlike his fellow partymen Kodiyeeri Balakrishnan was civil, his death leaves a void in state politics of Kerala

A Communist and a Gentleman are two mismatched terms. To be precise, it is an oxymoron description. But Kodiyeeri Balakrishnan, CPI(M) leader and former home minister of Kerala who breathed his last on Saturday night stood out as an exception to this usage. Starting as an ordinary activist of the Kerala Students Federation (the predecessor to the Students Federation of India), Balakrishnan rose through the ranks with his organizational skills and leadership qualities to become the home minister of the State and then the party's Kerala secretary. Kodiyeeri, an innocuous village in the Kannur district figured in the national political landscape only because of Balakrishnan. For an average Keralite, whether he is the camp follower of the Congress or BJP or the Muslim League, Kodiyeeri meant Balakrishnan and vice versa. Balakrishnan, who was the home and tourism minister during the tenure of V S Achuthanandan as chief minister (2006-2011) is the only politician in the State to come out of that office without a blemish.



While Communists, especially the Marxists in Kerala and elsewhere are strangers to civility and dignity, Balakrishnan, a hardcore Marxist, remained a pleasing personality. There were no instances in his career when he reportedly lost his cool and temper. He was dear to the public because he spoke their language and the Keralites saw in him a mirror image of themselves. Upcoming politicians should take a cue from Balakrishnan who rose from humble beginnings and became a member of the CPI(M)'s Polit bureau, the apex national body of the Marxists. Balakrishnan steered the CPI(M) for six years as its secretary. No other past secretaries had commanded the kind of popularity he had enjoyed among the masses cutting across party lines. The recent Party Congress (the triennial conclave of the CPI(M)) held at Kannur was a standing monument of his leadership qualities. At a time when people were skeptical about the move to hold such a massive event amidst the Covid-19 pandemic, Balakrishnan who was in semi-retirement due to illness, staged a comeback to make the event a grand success. The only blot on his five decades-long public life was caused by his two sons who faced charges ranging from narcotics trade and money laundering. But Balakrishnan was bold enough to declare that they themselves would face the charges while neither he nor the party had any role in it. Kodiyeeri Balakrishnan was a Communist and a Gentleman.

# Rights and duties are interrelated

Though fundamental duties are not enforceable constitutionally, they are as vital as fundamental rights enshrined in the constitution.

President of India Droupadi Murmu in her address to the nation on Independence Day eve said that the keyword for India today is compassion; for the downtrodden, for the needy, and those on the margins. Stating that some of our national values have been incorporated in our Constitution as the fundamental duties of the citizen, she appealed to every citizen to know about their fundamental duties and follow them in letter and spirit so that our nation reaches new heights. After independence in 1947, India has made tremendous progress in various spheres of activity more so in economic development. But despite welfare measures, the distribution aspect of this development has not percolated down properly to lower sections of society. After the political change that occurred in the country following the general elections in 2014, this aspect of development too has been taken care of more vigorously and the poverty line brought down but still much needs to be done to eliminate the evil of poverty. The President appealed to every citizen to know about their fundamental duties and follow them in letter and spirit. It is a common observation that in India a vast dichotomy exists between rights and duties.



While we are keen on our rights we talk very rarely about our duties as citizens of free India. There is hardly any realisation that our fundamental rights entail responsibilities and fundamental duties. We also appear to be generally not aware of the dictum that a person's rights start from where others' rights end. In his 'Man Ki Baat' program from Akashvani on 29.1.2017, Prime Minister of India Narendra Modi spoke about rights and duties and the need to bridge the gulf between the two in our country. The concept of duties has not been new to India as these have been a part of our traditions in various spheres of human activity from times immemorial. A long spell of foreign rule for over a millennium in our coun-

try had distorted our sense of rights and duties, drained us of most of our rich values, and left us bereft of any positive inculcation of the spirit of duties and responsibilities. Even the concept of Dharma assiduously evolved in Hinduism had got much distorted. The cumulative effect of this long foreign subjugation had been that despite our unique spiritual heritage we had turned into self-oriented individuals out to further our interests at any cost. Even our value of the correlation of means and ends had got mauled.

Framers of the Constitution of free India were conscious of it when they finalised the Constitution of India. It guaranteed various fundamental rights to every citizen of India which are enumerated and defined in part III of the Constitution. These are enforceable by courts and broadly include the right to equality, freedom of religion, freedom of speech and expression, right against exploitation, cultural and educational rights, and right to constitutional remedies. In section IV, the Constitution has also laid down directive principles enunciating fundamental obligations of the State to its citizens. Though not enforceable by courts, these

aim at making India a progressive and developed nation and welfare State. Apart from these fundamental rights and directive principles, the fundamental duties of the citizens of the country were incorporated into the Constitution of the country through the forty-second amendment to it in 1976. Like directive principles, these too are not enforceable by courts but constitute moral obligations of the citizens of the country.

These include respect for our Constitution, the pursuit of noble ideals laid down by our national struggle for independence, work for protecting our sovereignty, promotion of harmony and spirit of common brotherhood among all people transcending religious, linguistic and regional, and sectional diversities, valuing and preserving our rich cultural heritage and protecting environment, safeguarding public property and abjuring violence, developing scientific temper, humanism, the spirit of inquiry and reform and striving for excellence in all spheres of individual and collective activity. The time has come when the people of India will have to bridge this wide gulf between our constitutional rights and duties. To examine lending legal support to the gigantic task, in

February this year the Supreme Court asked Centre and State governments as to how they intend to sensitise citizens on the importance of knowing their fundamental duties enshrined in our constitution. It also agreed to examine a PIL seeking that moral obligations of duties be converted into legal commitment by enacting a law.

After decades and for many years now India has a working, stable central government poised yet again for faster socio-economic growth in a more corruption-free atmosphere. With this background as already pointed out by this writer in his article on "Rights and Duties" published on 24.2.2017 and with vast technological and other resources at their command, the government and people of India have to carry out this sustainable campaign with the same missionary spirit with which our leaders carried out successfully the freedom struggle. This has also to be done with the same zeal with which Ashoka erected his famous edicts in far-flung areas of his vast empire over two thousand years ago to instill discipline, a sense of duty, and moral values in the people.


### AN ERA ENDS WITH KODIYERI





### INDIAN ECONOMY RISES AS PHOENIX TO FLY HIGH

After going past UK, it should improve HDI ranking

Phenomenal march of India to become the fifth largest economy in the world after going past its colonial master the UK when the country is celebrating 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav' is worth appreciating. Many economic accolades have revisited India. However, India has invited fresh challenges like high inflation rate, huge income disparity, unemployment and excessive taxation, which are likely to be difficult to tackle in the days to come.

Going past the colonial master, the UK, to become the fifth largest economy in the world is definitely not an easy feat for India. During the period ending March 2022, India's GDP stood at \$854.7 billion as compared to the UK at \$816 billion. This is just a speck of other achievements that India managed to garner during this period. India's weightage in the Morgan Stanley Capital International (MSCI) rose to the second spot, just behind China. It has spread its exports to penetrate new markets, earlier monopolized by China.

Export orders have seen an uptick from both the US and Europe, especially for products from labour intensive sectors such as handicrafts, apparels, and non-electronic consumer goods. Economic projections from the World Economic Forum and management consulting firm Kearney point towards India owning the world's largest labour force with a probable contribution of more than \$500 billion to the global economy.

This rising tide of global impact in terms of economic growth can be sustained and multiplied by India if the economic benefits percolate deep down to touch the lives of the common man. Moreover, this is a subject which has been debated since India's independence also. A more humane and holistic society governance can do wonders to keep the momentum of the current trend of GDP and economic development in full swing.



It would be wise to ponder on this fact in the light of the United Nations Human Development Index for 2020-21. This report projects that India has moved down in its global rankings in Human Development Index (HDI) values from 130 to 132 in 2021. Also, in terms of the per capita income report of 2021, India was ranked 145th compared to the UK at the 22nd rank, which essentially translates to the fact that the average income of an Indian continues to remain low compared to the average income of a UK citizen.

It is required to contemplate whether India surpassing the UK as the fifth largest economy in the world also translates into higher productivity of an average Indian compared to a UK citizen. If the answer is negative, then India should look into ways and means to enhance the productivity and per capita income of an average Indian to become the biggest economy in the world, which we can easily achieve with the current governance.

When we critically encounter issues like high inflation rate, huge income disparity, unemployment and huge taxation, these need to be dealt carefully. India can be able to pull its economically weaker citizens from poverty by ensuring that policies and benefits reach them. Only through sustained poverty alleviation programmes and policies directed at benefitting the common man economically, India can sustain its economic bull run for over a period of time.

Yes, the phoenix is rising after a long slumber of ages, and this rise could be the dawn of India's march into its lost glory if supported by an equally economically strong common man who is, after all, the pillar on which this phoenix will finally rest on.

# Sabarmati, Yamuna: Tale of two rivers

### The Sabarmati Riverfront is a story still unfolding that matches only with Singapore, while Yamuna in Delhi remains dead

Until 2005, washer men held forth on the banks of Sabarmati River in Ahmedabad, washing and drying clothes of the big city, while slums dotted its floodplains, with garbage sprawling around to present a nauseating look to the visitors to Gujarat's capital. The people covered their noses as they passed by the riverbanks of Sabarmati. The river was as dead in the city, as is Yamuna in the national capital. People in Ahmedabad faced long traffic jams, as the roads were clogged, because of massive encroachments of the floodplains and the adjoining public land. The scene filled one with despondency.

But by that time Narendra Modi had already chalked out the plan for the development of the Sabarmati Riverfront. The project would cost a total of Rs 1200 crores. The project would be a city level intervention, conceived and implemented as a pioneering multi-benefit project, with significant urban transformation potential to transform the historic, but neglected river Sabarmati into a vibrant urban space.

The vital focus was to return the river back to the citizens of Ahmedabad, and in the process also ensure that the city gains a major asset, which will improve the efficiency of its infrastructure and the quality of life. The aims also envisaged revitalizing the river, which in fact was carrying significant sewage flow and used as a dumping yard for disposal of garbage.

The project ensured that it would be financially self-sustainable, while entailing environmental improvement, along with cultural and social sustainability to transform the non-perennial river for better.

Now that Gujarat is hosting the 36th National Games at a short notice, the Paldi Sports Complex at the Sabarmati Riverfront is one of the sporting venues for the big sporting event. This turnaround is at a scale seen in Singapore only. The East Asian city-state is a major tourism destination. The city planner has aligned Singapore in such a way that a tourist would always see something new, thus finding something novel and innovative, which leaves the tourists with impressions that they should again come. This has been the model of Singapore for several decades. The city administrator will develop an amusement park and other attractions.

The Sabarmati Riverfront is on the same pattern. The visitors will always find that there is something new in line with the spirit of a lively city. This has been reflected in the development of green cover and Miyawaki plantation of 14.30 hectare of land on the banks of the Sabarmati River, which has seen over 23000 tree plantations in four public parks with a total area of 12.45 hectare, besides a biodiversity park of eight hectares.

Last month, over 100 Mayors and Deputy Mayors came visiting the Sabarmati Riverfront, and they were awed with the scale of development at the place. The urban administrations would be the next engine of the growth of the nation, and the mayors have to lead their corporations with innovative solutions to the challenges faced by the cities in the country. The leaders of the local bodies were thrilled as they walked on the Atal Bridge, which was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on August 27 this year. The bridge is now a major tourist attraction, and the people make a beeline to buy tickets to spend half an hour on the iconic place. This has not only boosted the tourism potential of Ahmedabad and Gujarat, but is also filling the coffers of the local municipal corporation to take up further development works, which would again scale up the attractions of the Sabarmati Riverfront.

This is not the end of the story, for it's just the beginning, as the next phases of development of the Sabarmati Riverfront would give new wings to the lives of the people in Ahmedabad. The masterplan for 'Riverfront Phase 2' will encourage development that is in harmony with nature, with a combination of high, medium and low density zones, carefully planned amidst green and open spaces, besides the masterplan also proposing an efficient and integrated mobility network. But it must be noted that the overall development will be sensitive, sustainable and will aim to promote wellness and mindfulness of the city-dwellers.

In the next five years, when people would visit Ahmedabad and the Sabarmati Riverfront, they may see a Singapore rising there with a similar or grander energy of the people, driving the economy of the city and Gujarat to greater heights, while at the same time being in full harmony with nature, sticking firmly to sustainability and setting the example for urban renewal and development worth replication across the country.

Cities in India for ages have developed on the riverbanks. The developments of riverbanks will only ensure the renewal of the cities. There should be no second opinion about this aspect. This explains why Delhi is regressing. The city is dying. The people are depressed. The population of Delhi, in place of taking pride in living in the national capital, finds themselves stuck in matchboxes, struggling to breathe and walk.

In Delhi, the people can neither breathe nor walk, and they each year spend more and more money on their health expenses. Yamuna gave life to Delhi, and the river is now reduced to gutters. The ruling politicians in the national capital have fooled the people with promises of reviving the Yamuna River to only fatten their purses with the looted money. The people are now resigned to their fate that there could be no progress for better in their lives.

First, Sheila Dikshit, chief minister of Delhi from 2003 to

2015, sold false promises of cleaning Yamuna. She was succeeded by Arvind Kejriwal who has filled the people with so much skepticism that no one is now hoping that they would ever walk on the banks of Yamuna in the evenings as they do on the Sabarmati Riverfront. In 2015, Kejriwal sold the dream to the people in Delhi that he would transform Yamuna into the Thames River of London. In 2020, he presented a 10-point guarantee card in the Delhi Assembly that Yamuna would not only be cleaned but one could even start swimming in the waters!

Delhi Chief Minister had also claimed that he would reduce pollution in Yamuna by 90 per cent by 2023. We are just two months away from knocking the deadline, and the Yamuna in the national capital is exhaling foams of chemicals. The Centre also made available the funds to the extent of Rs 2419 crores. But there was no will on the part of the city government. To make a change in the lives of the people, the city administrators need vision, but the Kejriwal-led Aam Aadmi Party believes in making quick gains by the politics of freebies. Thus, Yamuna remains dead in Delhi, while Sabarmati flows in Ahmedabad with all the youthful energy.

Now that Delhi is approaching another winter, the people may be condemned to inhale the toxic air, for there is no sink to absorb the carbon and the pollution. The Yamuna Riverfront could have taken shape if there was a vision and will to change the lives of the people for the better.

# The Great Indian identity chase for KYC updates

### Aadhar occupies place of eminence in KYC update documents, but its anomalies give citizens a harrowing experience

There is only one thing that is more dangerous than doing something without fully knowing its implication. And that one thing is doing something without knowing fully the implications and yet defending it. In the second case, the danger is of half-baked competencies at work.

The job gets done, because with the apparatus and systems, all the superficial skills are there, and the implementation of the decision becomes a logical flow. In the chain reaction that is triggered, the doer himself knew only the techniques and operated it without understanding the full implications of the action. The others in the team only did their bit to keep it going.

Yet, as an upshot, undesirable results emerged. This

happens very often in governance and in certain related domains. Any action should be undertaken only when the complete implications of that action are understood, to the extent possible.

When the Aadhar card was introduced into the system more than a decade ago, it was portrayed as a harmless and welcome intervention in the process of establishing identity. Gradually, the instrument grew larger and larger in its significance. It grew from being innocuous to becoming essential in many ways and acts. Gradually, not only did governmental circles and quasi-independent institutions start using it, but the interloper in the form of the private sector too appeared. In a distant way, Aadhar tended to become the

equivalent of a social security identity in certain countries. Matters reached a head where the courts had to intervene.

The rollercoaster ride of reference to and use of Aadhar was stymied. That may be another story. Closer to the narrative is the fact that, throughout, Aadhar found a critical pride of place in many situations, including KYC (Know Your Customer) efforts. Slowly, there was an attempt to sanitise various systems with KYC. Nothing wrong with that either. The problem, however, was elsewhere. KYC became a double-edged sword. The enterprising individuals reportedly found ways of having more than one Aadhar card. Predictably, this was both identified and tracked. The problem was contained. However, some



thought that some damage had been done. The magic of the instrument of the Aadhar card started to receive a shadow on the side.

However, along with the PAN card, 'establishment of identity' became a common requirement. And, as it happens often in the case of overkill, in certain cases, the claims of Aadhar and PAN cards as identity symbols still needed to be supplemented.

Here, the Voters cards surfaced. In some cases, even the Passport document was dug out from its usual recalcitrant position in domestic matters, and occupied the pride of place in identity documents.

Put simply, institutions such as the DGCA took a fancy to the Passport as an identity proof. So the citizen, with all his humility, was on the road to collecting identities: Aadhar, PAN, Passport, Voter cards, et al. The list continues to grow. Some agencies wanted the electricity bill as proof of identity and residence. Others wanted the Municipal Corporation Tax Receipt, and so the search for identity items grew larger, as the choices widened.

In fact, as the wise crack once said "there is nothing wrong with anything if you are

not affected". Like the story of Betal, the identity story of documents and evidence almost never ends. There were spelling errors in names and cases of mixed up identities of lanes with common house numbers. One could have the right block and number, but say the name South City in a town could become the 'Water Colony' of the same town. The error was innocent and unintended, but the citizen had to pay the price. He had to work very hard to get the system to get it right.

He was supposed to first identify the error and then track it to where it originated in the system. These efforts were stressful and none of them could be set right at one place. A number of people refused to help to sort it out, because they did not want to be 'dragged in.

Nevertheless, the system continued to chug along relentlessly. This kind of being 'protective' to the system needs a thorough review. It cannot be anybody's case that the ineligible should be pandered to. But equally it should not be anybody's case that harassment, endless at that, must be supported in the name of 'protecting' the system. There are many dangers which start surfacing when this happens.

Of them, the biggest is the impunity with which the non-descript misuses the confusing elements in a system to get 'away with the booty'; He would be pretending to be the aggrieved party, while he was actually exploiting the system. Few things are sadder than legitimate cases being lost because of the convolutions in the system.

## Gehlot targets Pilot, says Rajasthan MLAs got agitated

In a veiled attack on party leader Sachin Pilot, Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot on Sunday said it was important to know why there was resentment among MLAs over the name of a new chief minister in the state. Several MLAs loyal to Gehlot, who was seen as the frontrunner for the post of the Congress national president, had last week submitted resignation letters over a possible move to appoint Pilot as the next chief minister. Gehlot later announced that he will not contest the Congress presidential polls as he took moral responsibility for the political crisis in his state. Referring to the crisis, he said 80-90 per cent MLAs switch sides when a new chief minister is going to be appointed but this did not happen in Rajasthan. "When a chief minister is changed, 80-90 percent (MLAs) leave him and switch sides. They turn to the new candidate. I too don't consider it wrong. But it was a new case in Rajasthan where the MLAs got agitated just in the name of the new chief minister," Gehlot said without naming Pilot.



## Email threat to blow up IndiGo flight turns out to be hoax

A case was registered after an unidentified person sent an email to the Mumbai International Airport Limited (MIAL) threatening to blow up a flight of IndiGo airline, a Mumbai police official said on Sunday. The email threat, which was received on Saturday night, turned out to be a hoax after nothing suspicious was found post a thorough check of the aircraft, the Sahar police station official said. The email had a sentence that read "I will blow up flight 6E 6045", he said, adding that an FIR has been registered under Indian Penal Code section 506B (issuing death threat) and other offences. IndiGo, in a statement, said "due to a specific bomb threat, IndiGo flight from Mumbai to Ahmedabad was impacted on October 1, 2022." The bomb threat protocol was initiated and the flight operated after all the checks were completed, the airline said in its statement, though it did not share details like the number of passengers on board, flight number and delay in departure due to the incident.



## Crystal methamphetamine, cocaine worth Rs 1,476 cr seized

Revenue intelligence officers have seized 198 kg high purity crystal methamphetamine (ice) and 9 kg cocaine worth Rs 1,476 crore, the finance ministry said. In one of the biggest seizures of amphetamine and cocaine in the country, Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) officers intercepted and seized a truck in Mumbai on October 1. The DRI recovered 198 kg high purity crystal methamphetamine (ice) and 9 kg high purity cocaine worth Rs 1,476 crore in Navi Mumbai, the ministry said in a statement. The team of DRI Mumbai officers intercepted a truck in Vashi, carrying imported oranges. On thorough checking and examination, large quantity of drugs were found concealed in the cartons carrying oranges. "This is a new kind of modus operandi involving concealment of drugs in the boxes of 'Valentia Oranges' imported from South Africa. After clearance of such oranges from Customs area, the goods used to get stored in some cold storages located in Vashi," the ministry said.



# Inflation may fall to 5.2 % next fiscal on normal rains

Persistently high inflation remains a key policy concern for the Reserve Bank, which has raised rates aggressively so far this year, but the pressure might ease next fiscal assuming normal rains and further normalisation of global supply chains without any exogenous shocks, according to an RBI report.

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) expects retail inflation to come under control at 5.2 per cent in the next financial year beginning April, down from 6.7 per cent it has forecast for the current year.

"For 2023-24, assuming a normal monsoon, a progressive



normalisation of supply chains, and no further exogenous or policy shocks, structural model estimates indicate that inflation will average 5.2 per cent," RBI said in its 'Monetary Policy Report September 2022'.

The central bank is mandated to keep retail inflation in a

range of 2-6 per cent.

However, inflation has been above the RBI's upper tolerance level since January 2022 mainly due to adverse supply shocks amid geopolitical tensions arising out of the Russia-Ukraine war since late February.

Both the countries are key

suppliers of foodgrains, edible oil, fertilisers and energy resources such as crude oil and natural gas.

Even as inflation has eased from its April peak of 7.8 per cent, it remains at unacceptably high levels, the central bank said in the report.

On Friday, the Reserve Bank hiked the key repo rate by 0.50 per cent to 5.90 per cent to bring inflation under control. During the May-August period of this fiscal, it raised the policy repo rate by 140 basis points or 1.4 per cent.

The six-member Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) of the RBI met four times during April-September 2022, including an off-cycle meeting in

May, in the backdrop of a sharp jump in global commodity prices and uncertainties around the pace of monetary policy normalisation globally.

RBI Governor Shaktikanta Das, while announcing the policy, said the world already witnessed two major shocks of the pandemic and the Ukrainian situation over the last two-and-a-half years and a third shock comes in the form of aggressive monetary policy actions by central banks globally.

The RBI projects the inflation to remain above the upper tolerance level of 6 per cent through the first three quarters of 2022-23 (till December) and expects it to come under control from January 2023 onwards.

## Cycle Pure Agarbathies to set up 100 stores across India

NR Group, manufacturers of Cycle Pure Agarbathies, has drawn up aggressive expansion plans that includes opening 100 stores by 2024 besides tapping the online market to boost sales, according to a top company official.

The Mysuru-based NR Group is known for the popular Cycle brand of agarbathies (incense sticks) and also diversified into other products like sambrani, turmeric, kumkum among others, company Managing Director Arjun Ranga said here.

"Cycle - as a brand is known

for agarbathies (incense sticks) but we are into other products also. We want to be known as a prayer-and-fragrance brand and not just an agarbathi brand," he told PTI.

Elaborating, he said, "We are into sambrani segment and have also launched 'nai vaidhya' under spiritual products category, it is one of the fastest growing segments for us...we also have pooja oil, camphor, kumkum and turmeric," he said. To a query, he said revenue from Agarbathi business accounts for more than 90 per cent and his company wants to increase the sales of other products as well.

## Housing sales up 87 % in 7 cities

Housing sales rose 87 per cent in January-September across seven cities to 2,72,709 units and breached the transactions clocked in entire 2019 pre-COVID year on strong demand, according to Anarock.

Sales stood at 1,45,651 units in the January-September period of 2021.

Property consultant Anarock, which is one of the leading housing brokerage firms, tracks primary sales of seven major cities -- Delhi-NCR, Mumbai Metropolitan Region (MMR), Chennai, Kolkata, Bengaluru, Hyderabad and Pune.



As per the data, housing sales in these seven cities increased to 2,72,709 units during January-September this year from 1,45,651 units in the corresponding period of the previous year.

The January-September figure of this calendar year is higher than the 2,61,358 units sold during entire 2019.

Sales plunged to 1,38,344 units in 2020 due to the

adverse impact of the COVID-19 induced lockdowns.

India's primary housing market revived last year on pent up demand coupled with incentives offered by some state governments like Maharashtra in the form of lower stamp duty.

As a result, sales rose to 2,36,516 units in 2021 and the momentum has continued so far this year.

The impact of rise in interest rates on home loans -- from a decade low of around 6.5 per cent to over 8 per cent now -- has not been felt so far on the housing market. The RBI has increased the repo rate by 190 basis points since May this year to contain inflation.

## FPIs turn net sellers again; withdraw Rs 7,600 cr from equities

After infusing funds in the last two months, foreign investors turned net sellers again in September and pulled out over Rs 7,600 crore from the Indian equity markets amid hawkish stance by the US Fed and sharp depreciation in rupee.

With this, the total outflow by Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs) from the Indian equity markets has reached Rs 1.68 lakh crore so far in 2022, data with depositories showed.

FPI flows are expected to remain volatile in the coming months on slew of global and domestic factors, experts said.

"The UK government's expansionary fiscal policies amid elevated global inflation roiled the global currency markets and resulted in risk-off sentiment in equities," said



Shrikant Chouhan, Head - Equity Research (Retail), Kotak Securities.

On the domestic front, there is some fuel related concerns, besides marginal drop in GDP estimates, he added.

According to the data, FPIs have sold equities worth a net Rs 7,624 crore in September. This came following a net investment of Rs 51,200 crore in August and nearly Rs 5,000 crore in July.

Prior to that, FPIs were net sellers in Indian equity markets

for nine months in a row beginning October 2021.

Although FPIs started the month of September on a positive note, the pace of net flows was lower compared to August on the back of enhanced global uncertainty.

"Concerns over the aggressive rate hike by US Fed to control rising inflation, sharp depreciation in rupee, surge in US bond yields and fear of a global recession, fuelled pessimism among investors.

"Continuing Russia-Ukraine war also dented sentiments," said Himanshu Srivastava, Associate Director - Manager Research, Morningstar India.

The scenario turned adverse after hotter-than-expected inflation report dashed hopes that the US Federal Reserve would scale down its rate hikes in the coming months.

## Concessional import duties on edible oils

Concessional import duties on specified edible oils are in place till March 2023, the food ministry said on Sunday.

This decision was taken on August 31, 2022 by the Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC) in order to boost domestic supply and keeping retail prices under control.

The food ministry in its latest statement said that the CBIC's decision of extending existing concessional import duties on specified edible oils is in place till March 2023.

"The concessional customs duty on edible oil import has been extended by another 6 months, which means that the new deadline will now be March 2023," the statement said.



The ministry also said that domestic edible oil prices have been on a declining trend driven by a fall in global prices. With falling global rates and lower import duties, retail prices of edible oils have fallen considerably in India.

According to the statement, the current duty structure on crude palm oil, RBD Palmolein, RBD palm oil, crude soybean oil, refined soybean oil, crude sunflower oil and refined sunflower oil remains unchanged till March 31, 2023.

## Govt issues draft guidelines for listing of RRBs

In a bid to enable regional rural banks (RRBs) to raise resources by listing on stock exchanges, the government has issued draft guidelines that set certain basic criteria, including net worth of at least Rs 300 crore during the previous three years.

They should also have capital adequacy above the regulatory minimum level of 9 per cent in each of the preceding three years.

The RRBs should have a track record of profitability and earned operating profit of minimum Rs 15 crore for at least three out of the previous five years, according to the draft guidelines issued by the finance ministry recently.

Besides, there should not be



any accumulated loss and the lender should have given return on equity of minimum 10 per cent in three out of the preceding five years, it said.

As per the draft norms, the responsibility of identifying suitable lenders for issuing initial public offering (IPO) has been left with the respective sponsor banks.

The sponsor bank would take into account the relevant norms and regulations of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Sebi) and Reserve Bank of India (RBI) regarding capital raising and disclosure requirements while identifying RRBs for IPO, it said.

RRBs, which play an important role in agriculture credit, are sponsored by Public Sector Banks (PSBs).

Currently, the Centre holds 50 per cent in RRBs, while 35 per cent and 15 per cent are with the concerned sponsor banks and state governments, respectively.

These banks were formed under the RRB Act, 1976 with an objective to provide credit and other facilities to small farmers, agricultural labourers and artisans in rural areas.

## Power consumption grows 13.31 % to 127 bn

India's power consumption grew 13.31 per cent on an annual basis to 127.39 billion units (BU) in September 2022 and 11.65 per cent during the first six months of this fiscal, as per government data.

The double-digit growth highlights recovery in economic activities following the pandemic-induced lockdown, experts said.

They are also of the view that demand as well as consumption of electricity will increase due to the festive season and improvement in economic activity.

Power consumption in



September last year was recorded at 112.43 BU, higher than 112.24 BU in the same month of 2020, power ministry data showed.

Electricity consumption during April-September 2022 grew by 11.65 per cent to 786.5 BU compared to 740.40 BU in the same period in 2021. It was 625.33 BU in April-September 2020.

Businesses of course do not operate in a vacuum. They are inherently plugged into a moving and fast developing ecosystem, marked by revolutionary transformation and lightning speed change. At its core, business is the key driver for economic, social, and societal change and development. In fact, it is of such pivotal interest that every stakeholder, including local and state/provincial governments, are deeply engaged in the on-going discussion and debate about what constitutes good, ethical, fair, and sustainable business practice.

Business education with its primary purpose of "developing business leaders", must be in total alignment with trends in global business and commerce. The primary challenge for business school leaders is not to be blinded by a myopic view of trends and changes. But to have a significantly longer-term perspective with a missional lens to prepare business students for a future that is yet to unfold.

Employers are watching closely. They want and expect graduating students with all the

requisite knowledge, skills, and attributes to utilize them productively from the moment they join the firm. From an individual's perspective, employability rates are seen as a key metric in the selection and choice of a business school apart from ranking, accreditation, and general perception of the "quality" of an institution of higher learning.

Dr. Franco Gandolfi, Dean, D-School of Business powered by Pearl Academy and LSBF, shares, "A myriad of perspectives exists and the notion of best pedagogy is widely debated in academic and non-academic circles. Even the Top of the Top Business schools typically struggle with that. Harvard University with its pre-eminent business school and the inventor of the Harvard Case Study pedagogy continues to examine its own practices as voices of more "high-impact" graduate and executive education have become loud."

The most critical part of business education is neither the knowing nor the doing part. The most critically important part of the development of a business leader is the being part of business education. True business leadership is neither about knowing nor doing but being. Leaders are not defined by what they know or do but by their very essence of who they are and their deeply held values and principles to the business equation.

Finally, the failure of large companies has been frequently attributed to the moral failure of senior leaders.

# 'Acting for me is contextualising the emotional data files'

Actress Gul Panag needs no introduction, whatsoever. After her last venture *Paatal Lok*, opened to critical acclaim, she is all ready to light the screens on fire with her latest release, *The Ghost* starring Nagarjuna Akkineni directed by Praveen Sattaru.

Ahead of her Tollywood debut with *The Ghost*, actress Gul Panag known for her films like *Ab Tak Chhappan 2*, *420 IPC*, *The Family Man*, and *Paatal Lok*, opens up about her experience working in the Telugu film industry and takes us through her acting process.

Being adventurous is second nature to this Former Miss India. However, this time around, acting in Nagarjuna's *The Ghost* wasn't a cakewalk for the actress.

The *Dhoop* actress will be seen playing King Nagarjuna's sister in the film. She plays a businesswoman who is not on talking terms with her sibling for around two long decades, but quite naturally reaches out to him for help when in trouble.

Actors work on a project for various reasons, known only to them. The versatile actor that she is, she shares her reason for giving the nod to *The Ghost*. She says, First of all, the opportunity to work with Praveen Sir itself was great. He is a director who's known for his clarity of vision. To work with someone with the stature of Nagarjuna Sir was something that I was looking forward to. I have never acted in a Telugu film before, so it was like going on an adventure. I feel like one grows in life when they put themselves in uncomfortable situations and makes an attempt to adapt to

them."

There are so many permutations and combinations for actors to say yes to a script. Some have the audience in their mind while reading the script while others simply go by their gut feeling. The *Paatal Lok* actress explained, "There is no formula to speak when it comes to saying yes to a script. After a while, you go by your gut instinct and the experience you have gathered over the years. I tend to work with people whom I enjoy working with. It is not about the screen time or the number of shots that you get to be in. It is all about how relevant the character is. You know, if the story is incomplete without my character, chances are that I will say no to that film. In the case of *Ghost*, I play a crucial character that serves as one of the important pieces in the film."

She further elaborated, "This film has the most challenging role that I have played till date. To sort of act in a different language was tough. I would say, the first day of the shoot was the hardest of my professional life. I am not someone who likes to mug up lines and say them out loud. It is just not about saying the dialogue, it is about emoting in the right way. I was really concerned about how it would come out on the screen, but Nag Sir really made me comfortable on the sets."

Actors like Hrithik Roshan, Vidya Balan, and Thovino Thomas use a distinct perfume for every character they play to get into the character. Ranveer Singh listens to a customised playlist while doing his part to get the emotion right. What does Gul Panag do? In conversation with *The Pioneer*, the vivacious actress gives a rare

insight into her acting process. "It totally depends on what the part needs. There are multiple approaches that one can use, but as you live your life, you accumulate all the experiences and events over a period of time. What I do is contextualise the emotional data files that are stored in my memory. Now that I am more experienced, it takes half the time that it'd take some 20 years ago. For me, acting is all about contextualizing the emotional data files that are relevant for the character that I am playing."

When asked about her acting idols, the talented actress replied with quite a unique answer, "Who wouldn't idolize an actress like Meryl Streep? After a point, you become your own idol. You'll have to outperform yourself in every endeavor that you embark on as an actor."

You must've seen Tom Cruise cruising a Formula One at Southern California's 2.5-mile (4km) Willow Springs circuit. Did you know that *The Ghost* actress is one of the few people in the world who's had the honour of driving Formula One and

Formula E cars? "I am very cool that way. I got the opportunity to drive a retired 2007 Renault F1 car. They said they needed someone from Bollywood. The brief was, 'We need someone like a Miss Universe or someone as an opinion maker', others have been approached too, but they all went like we're not going to go all the way to Prague to drive an F1 car if we're not getting paid. I was like, 'Can I pay you to drive the car?' (she laughs)," enthused Gul.

Currently, she is busy promoting *The Ghost* alongside her upcoming Sony Liv OTT release *Good Bad Girl* which is up for its release on 14 October.

She ended the interview by saying, "I am still figuring out what to do next and something exciting is brewing for sure. I will keep you'll be informed about my upcoming projects."



Rohit Sharma (43 off 37 balls) and KL Rahul (57 off 28 balls) started it before Suryakumar Yadav (61 off 22 balls), Virat Kohli (49 not out) and Dinesh Karthik (17 not out) finished it off in style.

Replying to his critics, Rahul (57) was back at his aggressive best, slamming a 24-ball fifty, his second in a row, as he and Rohit put on 96 runs for the opening wicket that came off just 59 balls.

Yadav then continued to raise his standards higher with a third successive half-century that came off just 18 deliveries and India crossed the 200-mark in the 18th over.

With the top-four doing the bulk of the scoring, India's designated finisher Karthik got just seven balls but he made the most of the opportunity, smashing two sixes and one four in his quickfire 17 not out.

The South African pacers looked lacklustre and bowled full and the Indians feasted on them.



Rohit first began the onslaught and Rahul followed it up in style after Temba Bavuma put them in.

After being hit on his hand from Wayne Parnell in the second over, Rohit came out all guns blazing while Rahul was a mute spectator with nine from five balls.

It was then the turn of

Rahul who whipped the ball over square leg with perfect demonstration of his wrist work.

It was a shot that summed up his dominating innings as he took on Nortje in a similar fashion, this time whipping the bowler a little deep.

There was no signs of tentativeness in Rahul's batting that

had copped much criticism as he raced to his fifty in just 24 balls, stepping down to Aiden Markram for a six over long-on.

India were 57 for no loss inside the power play and there was no stopping the duo when a snake gave South Africans a bit of a breather.

In a rare sight, the snake slithered out onto the field

from the extra cover region to stop play for about five minutes before the groundsmen captured it in a bucket.

Trust Assam Cricket Association (ACA) to mess it up every time.

Chaos once again reigned supreme at the ACA Barsapara

Stadium here during the India-South Africa second T20I on Sunday.

If a snake slithering onto the field during India's innings was not enough, the worst was in store when the stadium went into partial darkness during South Africa's chase of the massive target of 238, causing a second interruption in the match.

Just after the first ball of Deepak Chahar in the third over when South Africa were reeling at 5/2, play came to halt after one of the four floodlight towers went off, halting play for 18 minutes.

All the players went back to the dressing room and it took about six minutes for the lights to slowly turn on one by one before play resumed.

Blaming it on a "technical glitch", Assam Cricket Association secretary Devajit Saikia told PTI: "We have three parties handling the power aspect - our own 25-member team, a third (outsourced) party and the state power department. It was perhaps a voltage problem, some technical glitch."

Saikia said the ACA has used generator sets to power the match and not depended on electricity supply from the power department.

The media contingent also faced similar problem before the match as there were no lights till a few overs into the match as the officials took hours to find out the fault.



## India take on Malaysia in Asia Cup T20

With the quality of the Malaysian bowlers no where close to their English counterparts, it is important that Shafali uses this opportunity to be fullest to gain her confidence.

For vice-captain Smriti Mandhana, who failed to get going against Sri Lanka, the game will be about quality hitting time in the middle against an attack that is sure to feel intimidated.

Rodrigues, who came off a wrist injury, made instant impact with a sensational career-best performance while Harmanpreet has also been in imperious touch.

The tournament provided Indian with the perfect platform to experiment and several new players like Kiran Navgire could be seen in the playing XI come Monday.

Finding the right combination with the ball is also high on India's priority list.

With the pitch here producing knee length bounce on the opening day of the competition itself, India are expected to field a spin heavy attack with Renuka Singh being the sole specialist pacer.

## Saurabh's all-round show puts ROI in firm control

All-rounder Saurabh Kumar hit a strokeful fifty before returning to snap two wickets as Rest of India tightened the noose around Saurashtra on day 2 of the Irani Cup match here on Sunday.

Saurabh smashed 10 boundaries in his 78-ball 55 and added 71 with Jayant Yadav (37) for the seventh wicket to take ROI close to the 350-mark after Sarfaraz Khan dominated the opening day with a century.

It was Saurabh's innings which helped ROI grab a solid 276-run first-innings lead over Saurashtra.

The 29-year-old from Uttar Pradesh then returned to dismiss both the Saurashtra open-

ers -- Harvik Desai (20) and Snell Patel (16) -- as ROI gained further ascendancy in the match.

At stumps, Chirag Jani (3 batting) and Dharmendrasinh Jadeja (8 batting) were at the crease with Saurashtra, the 2019-20 Ranji Trophy Champions, at 49 for two in 17 overs, still trailing by 227 runs.

Earlier, left-arm fast bowler Chetan Sakariya gave Saurashtra a glimmer of hope with a five-wicket haul as they dismissed ROI for 374 in 110 overs.

The 24-year-old (5/93) snapped four wickets to go with the one scalp he took on the opening day after Chirag Jani removed the overnight batters Hanuma Vihari (82) and Sarfaraz (138) in the first

sessions.

After dominating the opening day, ROI resumed day two at 205 for three with skipper Vihari and centurion Sarfaraz batting for more than an hour, adding another 33 runs to their overnight partnership.

However, both departed in quick succession with Jani producing the breakthroughs.

Jani first had Hanuma caught by Harvik Desai before trapping Sarfaraz in front of wicket in his opening spell to reduce ROI to 239 for 5 in the 65th over.

It was a Sakariya show after that as he drew Srikr Bharat (12 off 44) with a full delivery after coming round the wicket and induced an edge which was caught by Harvik Desai.



## Mukesh, Rajat earn maiden India call-up for SA ODIs

Uncapped Bengal seamer Mukesh Kumar and prolific domestic performer Rajat Patidar on Sunday earned their maiden India call-up for the upcoming three-match ODI series against South Africa, starting October 6 in Lucknow.

Mukesh, a prolific red ball bowler for Bengal, had performed just at the right time, emerging as top wicket taker in first class games against New Zealand 'A' and followed that up with another stupendous show in the Irani Cup.

The 28-year-old quick had taken nine wickets in the three matches against New Zealand 'A', besides snapping 20 wickets for Bengal in the Ranji Trophy this year.

He also emerged as the wrecker-in-chief for Rest of India in the ongoing Irani Cup with a four-wicket haul which broke the back of the Saurashtra batting in Rajkot on Saturday.

Patidar, a stylish hitter, on the other hand, has scored centuries in IPL play offs, in the Ranji Trophy final and in 'Tests' against New Zealand 'A' in the last three months.

The 29-year-old from Indore gained prominence after slamming a sizzling 112 not out for Royal Challengers Bangalore against Lucknow Super Giants in the IPL eliminator. He also scored a 58 against Rajasthan Royals in the next match.

Switching to red-ball cricket, Patidar came up with scores of 85 and 79 against Punjab and Bengal respectively in knockout matches in the Ranji Trophy before slamming a decisive hundred in the Ranji Trophy final to guide Madhya Pradesh to the title.

His performance earned him a place in India A squad and Patidar grabbed the opportunity by producing two hundreds in the three four-day matches against New Zealand A. He also fired a quick unbeaten 45 to help India A beat New Zealand A in the first one-dayer.

While Mukesh and Patidar will be the new faces, the Indian team would once again be led by ODI specialist Shikhar Dhawan, while Shreyas Iyer will be his deputy this time.

Shreyas and Deepak Chahar will link up with the T20 World Cup squad in Brisbane after the ODI series. They were named as stand-by players for the ICC flagship event. The team will train in Perth in first week.

The second and third ODIs of the South Africa series will be played on October 9 and 11 in Ranchi and Delhi respectively.

KL Rahul bats at his best when he has "nothing to lose" approach and that is how former Australia all-rounder Shane Watson wants the opener to play at the T20 World Cup beginning later this month.

Rahul's strike rate came under scanner during the Asia Cup and the ongoing home series against South Africa.

Though India had to chase down only 107 in the first T20 against the Proteas, questions were raised over Rahul's intent as he ended with 51 not out off 56 balls.

Speaking to PTI, Watson said Rahul needs to be aggressive from ball one in the World Cup Down Under.

"KL Rahul is one of my favourite batters. To me when he is batting at his best, when he is aggressive, he takes the game on and is not trying to control the

game." He has got that skill, when he is just reacting to the ball coming down, he has all the shots all around the ground against the best bowlers in the world.

"I love seeing him when he feels like he's got nothing to lose, then he can even strike at 180 without taking too much risk. If he is able to do that (in Australia), there will be a lot of bowlers in trouble," said one of the best all-rounders to have played for Australia.

With serious question marks over the availability of the injured Jasprit Bumrah for the ICC event, India's pace attack seems like their weakest link.

Watson thinks on similar lines and wants Mohammad Siraj to take Bumrah's place if the latter is deemed unfit for the World Cup.

"India have certainly got the batting to do incredibly well in Australian conditions but the biggest question mark is around their fast bowling.



"The spinners, Axar Patel and Yuzi Chahal, are as good as anyone in the world in all conditions but the fast bowling without Bumrah in particular, whether they can execute skills under pressure at the back end of the game. That is where teams will be trying to expose India." India need a bowler who can bowl in excess of 140kmph in the absence of Bumrah, said Watson.

"It is a genuine concern (lack of express pace), that is why Siraj will be a good option if Bumrah isn't there.

"The pace at which he bowls and the skills he has got, swinging it away and pushing towards 150 kmph with the brand new ball and he can execute well in the end as well.

"He provides that element that other Indian bowlers don't necessarily have," said the 41-year-old adding that he would pick Siraj over Mohammad Shami in the squad.

## Perez wins Singapore Grand Prix

Sergio Perez won a rain-affected Singapore Grand Prix on Sunday meaning his Red Bull teammate Max Verstappen, who finished seventh, must wait at least another week to retain his Formula One world championship.

The Mexican took the chequered flag 7.5sec ahead of the Ferrari of Charles Leclerc, whose teammate Carlos Sainz was third in the night race that started more than an hour late because of a storm.

Verstappen had a mathematical chance to clinch a second world title in Singapore, but needed to win and have other results go his way.

The Dutchman was always going to struggle after starting eighth on the grid at the

Marina Bay Street Circuit but he battled back from a slow start where he dropped to 13th to finish seventh.

It means his world championship lead over Leclerc has been cut to 104 points ahead of next week's Japanese Grand Prix. Perez is two points behind Leclerc.

Verstappen will need to be 112 points ahead at the end of next Sunday's race in Suzuka to retain his title.

It means a win will be enough for Verstappen if Leclerc fails to finish second.

"It was certainly my best performance," Perez said. "I controlled the race. The last three laps were so intense. When I got out of the car, I felt it. I gave everything today."

Perez was under investigation for an infringement under



one of numerous safety car periods during the race, and potentially faces a time penalty that could hand the victory to Ferrari.

"I have no idea what's going on, they just told me I was under investigation and to

increase the gap," Perez said. Leclerc started on pole but had a sluggish getaway on intermediate tyres in the slippery conditions allowing Perez to reach the first corner in the lead.

"I pushed all the way," said

Leclerc. "The bad start put us on the back foot and it was a really difficult race after that."

"I need a good night's sleep and to get ready for Japan."

Sainz said he felt he could never threaten the front two after he crossed the line 7.7sec behind his teammate.

"It was very tough out there," Sainz said. "I never really got into a rhythm in the wet and then couldn't challenge the top two guys."

"I had to settle for P3, but the good thing is I didn't do any mistakes and could bring the car home and be quick towards the end of the race."

Lewis Hamilton started third in his Mercedes and lost a place at the start before later slithering into a barrier and finishing ninth.

## Kenya's Kipruto and Yehualaw triumph at London Marathon

Kenyan Amos Kipruto marked his London Marathon debut with a decisive victory in the men's race on Sunday as Ethiopian 23-year-old Yalemzerf Yehualaw became the youngest winner of the women's race.

It was a maiden London victory for Yehualaw in what was just the second marathon of her career.

The 30-year-old Kipruto, a world bronze medalist in Doha in 2019, crossed the line in London in two hours, four minutes and 39 seconds after breaking away late on.

Leul Gebresilase of Ethiopia finished second in 2:05:12, with Bashir Abdi of



Belgium third in 2:05:19.

Ethiopian distance great Kenenisa Bekele was fifth with compatriot Sisay Lemma, last year's London Marathon winner, seventh.

Yehualaw's winning time of 2:17:26 was just three seconds outside the personal best she set at Hamburg in April when making the fastest debut in any women's marathon.
