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## MAHA ST CONDUCTOR LEAVES BUS MIDWAY TO DRINK ALCOHOL, SUSPENDED

A Maharashtra State Road Transport Corporation bus conductor was suspended for allegedly leaving his bus mid-route in Latur to drink alcohol, an official said on Friday. The incident took place on Thursday morning on the route between Latur and Kalamnagar, he said. "The conductor got the bus to halt at Katgaon village and got off. Irrate passengers, who waited for more than an hour, set out in search of him and found him sitting at a local vend having liquor," the official said. "He was suspended after a medical check up showed he had consumed alcohol during duty hours. There were 38 passengers in the bus," the MSRTC Osmanabad divisional traffic controller said.

## 1,200-YEAR-OLD IDOLS FOUND IN NALANDA, ASI SEEKS POSSESSION

Two stone idols believed to be about 1200 years old was found from a waterbody close to the ancient Nalanda University during desilting of a pond, an ASI official said. The idols were found earlier this week from Tarsinh pond at Sarlichak village near the ancient Nalanda Mahavihara, a world heritage site about 88 km from here, during desilting under Bihar government's 'Jal-Jeevan-Hariyali' project launched to protect and conserve water and the environment. Details of the two idols were, however, not divulged either by Archeological Survey of India or the administration.

## AI EXPRESS PLANE RETURNS TO ABU DHABI AIRPORT AFTER ENGINE FAILURE

Calicut-bound Air India Express plane returned to Abu Dhabi airport early morning on Friday due to engine failure while taking off, and aviation regulator DGCA will probe the incident, according to officials. As per initial report, fire was noticed in one of the engines, a senior official at the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) said. The Boeing 737-800 aircraft had 184 passengers onboard and all are safe, an airline spokesperson said. A source said there was an engine failure. VT-AYC operating flight IX 348 from Abu Dhabi to Calicut was involved in air turnback due to No.1 engine flameout at 1,000 feet during climb, according to the DGCA official.

## EX-STUDENT LEADER FACING TRIAL IN ULFA BLAST TOPS CLASS IN MA EXAM

A former student leader facing trial for his alleged role in an ULFA-triggered bomb blast in Guwahati has been awarded the gold medal by the Assam governor for topping his post-graduation examination, which he took from behind the bars. Sanjib Talukdar, among the suspects in a 2019 Guwahati blast that had left 12 injured, topped his class in Sociology in which he enrolled and completed his Master of Arts from Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOU) while being lodged in a jail here. Governor Jagdish Mukhi presented the gold medal to the under-trial, who had scored 71 per cent marks, at the convocation here on Thursday.

## 18% of nation's pharma exports from TS

Increasing year on year ■ Exports to top 10 countries

Nearly 18% of pharma exports from the country are from Telangana. At USD 4,446.78 million, pharmaceutical exports of Telangana during fiscal year 2021-22 accounted for 18% of India's share of 24,594.27 million dollars.

The share of Pharma Exports from Telangana has been increasing from 14% in 2019-20, to 15% in 2020-21 and 18% in 2021-22.

In 2020-2021, Pharma exports from Telangana cost 3,672.65 million USD while it was 2,972.25 million dollars in 2019-2020.

In 2020-2021, Pharma exports from India were 24444.03 million



dollars while it was 20703.46 million dollars in 2019-2020

Union Minister of State for Commerce and Industry Anupriya Patel on Friday responded to a question in the Rajya Sabha raised by B. Parthasaradhi Reddy, a BRS MP.

The major destinations for Indian pharma products are the US, UK, South Africa, Russia, Nigeria, Brazil, Germany, France, Netherlands, Belgium. India's pharma exports to these top 10 countries stood at Rs 12149.83 million dollars for 2021-22.

With this, the Centre sent the file to Solicitor General Tushar Mehta for his opinion. A decision on the formation of a new tribunal is likely to be taken after hearing the opinion of Tushar Mehta.

Telangana is demanding a new tribunal to decide the distribution of Krishna waters between the two Telugu States. After that, Telangana approached the Supreme Court to notify the verdict of the Brijesh Kumar Tribunal.

## SCR gets Rs 4,418 crore for Telangana projects

Going by the Railway Budget tabled in Parliament, Telangana will get Rs 4,418 crore. This is 45 per cent more than last year.

The South Central Railway has been allocated Rs 13,786.19 crore, a nearly 65 per cent jump over last year. The MMTS was given Rs 600 crore, said Arun Kumar, the General Manager of South Central Railway. The long pending works of MMTS



Phase II will be completed as the money allotted in the budget is Rs 600 crore against the Rs 817 crore allotted in 2012-13.

Officials said that a mini version of the Vande Bharat named Vande Metro works will begin soon. The Hydrogen train part of green growth will also be inaugurated by December 2023.

Later, officials said that although the sanctioned amount is less the South Central Railway will complete the work.

The sections completed till now are the Malkajigiri to Bolarum double line electrification (14 km), the Telapur to Ramchandrapuram line (6 km), the Medchal-Bolarum line doubling (14 km), the Moula Ali to Ghatkesar quadrupling (12.2 km), and the Falaknuma-Umdanagar line doubling (13.5 km).

Currently, work is underway on two more sections.

This apart another 8,22,658 cases are pending during the last three years in the District and Subordinate courts of Telangana. Across India 4,28,26,777 cases are pending in District and Subordinate Courts.

Across different high courts, 53.51 lakh cases are pending. Pending

# A nation first Budget that looks far ahead than a year

Although 'annual' budgets seldom look beyond the implied period, this year's Budget presented by Finance Minister Nirmala Sitaraman is an exception of gigantic proportions. It is a budget that visualises what a developed India looks like economically and socially and how, when and with whose participation the present leadership plans to get us there.

This year's budget comes against the backdrop of the Ukraine war, record-setting inflation afflicting major economies, the steep slowdown of the Chinese economy - the driver for global growth over the past few decades - and finally, a possible global recession. Going through the budget speech delivered by the Finance Minister, the vision for a developed India becomes

This budget has allocated a record-breaking Rs 13.7 lakh crore for building public infrastructure - roadways, railways, airports, seaports, inland waterways, mobile and high-speed internet connec-

tivity. In addition, this budget also makes huge allocations to improve private infrastructure for the poor so they can live with dignity: a life where every citizen has a pucca home to dwell in, with water and sanitation facilities; access to electricity, cooking gas, and roads, as well as health insurance and social security. The vision continues beyond. Every individual, especially the youth, are equipped with education and skills to enhance their living standards while contributing to the country's growth.



A developed India will be a healthy India, a green nation. A country where its land, environment and citizens are healthy. India's agriculture is going to see a paradigm shift towards more and more organic practices. Focus on improving access to information, best practices and technology will enhance land pro-

ductivity, while optimising the usage of chemical fertilisers and pesticides. Renewable energy sources, including solar, wind, hydel, ethanol and compressed biogas blending, adoption of electric vehicles are all to be encouraged. From food security, India will move towards nutrition security for every citizen. Native grains like millet - 'Shri Anna' -- and health practices like yoga will play a significant role in this transformation.

Until recently, India could only dream of catching up with the advanced world, especially in technology. The Covid experience involving indigenous vaccine discovery and production at scale, to using digital technology (CoWin) for fast distribution on the one hand and the innovations in financial technology with UPI (Unified Payments Interface) and their rapid adoption mak-

ing India the numero uno in digital transactions have shown the world that India's "techade" has arrived. India will now focus on using technologies like Artificial Intelligence, hydrogen cells, drones, 5G and many more to achieve rapid economic development. A developed India will be a leader in technology innovation and its usage to improve Indians' lives.

The public and private sectors are the two major organised formal sectors in every world economy. Capitalist USA to Communist China, these are the only two large-scale formal sectors powering the economy. Imbalances in negotiating power arise from this structure where individual, small-scale producers and service providers are disadvantaged. The recent apprehensions over agricultural reforms introduced via 'Farm

laws' are an example. This budget lays a clear path for equalising this imbalance via the cooperative sector. Women, farmers, vishwakarma, small businessmen & producers - all will be encouraged to organise into cooperatives or collectives, enabling them to access finance, expertise and markets easily. Amul has been a great example. A developed India will be an India where economic participation is not disadvantaged due to lack of scale. This is undoubtedly a path-breaking initiative that can provide a new path to the world if India makes it a success.

To sum it up, this budget provides a glimpse of what this government envisages for India@100 and lays a solid foundation to achieve it.

The ace filmmaker breathed his last here on Thursday night. Born in 1930 in Repalle in Andhra Pradesh, Viswanath was recognised as "Kalatapasvi" (sage of art) and shot into the limelight after "Sankarabharanam."

What naturally followed was fame and awards. It was exactly 43 years ago on February 2, the epic drama was released.



Though he was flooded with several offers, Viswanath chose to make films with the ideology he believed in. His films used to revolve around art and culture.

An ardent fan," he said in a handwritten note posted on his official Twitter page. Calling the actor-director's demise an "irreplaceable" loss, Chiranjeevi said it would be difficult to fill the void Viswanath has left in the Indian film industry.

The Telangana Assembly began on Friday with the Governor's address. Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao's government is expected to table the Budget in the House next week commencing.

"Today, the state is not only economically stronger, but also one of the top performers in the country in welfare and development," she said narrating the KCR government's achievements in the past eight years.

The per capita income of the state which was Rs 1,24,104 in 2014-15 has increased to Rs 3,17,115 by 2022-23, she said.

When the state was formed in 2014-15, Telangana had irrigation facilities for only 20 lakh acres. The same has increased to 73 lakh, 33 thousand acres today, she further said.

Telangana is the only state in the country which has transferred Rs 65,000 crore to 65 lakh farmers as investment assistance under the Rythu Bandhu scheme.

"When the state was formed, the installed capacity of electricity was 7,778 MW only. Due to the enormous efforts made by my government, now the installed capacity has gone up to 18,453 MW," Soundararajan said.

According to her speech, Telangana is taking up recruitments for 2,21,774 jobs in a short period of eight and half years.

The Governor moved forward greeting members of the Legislative Assembly and Council with a smile. Chief Minister KCR followed her. Ministers, MLAs and MLCs also got up from their seats and honoured the Governor and the Chief Minister. Council Chairman Gutta Sukhender Reddy and Speaker Pocharam Srinivas Reddy took the Governor to the podium. Everyone sang the national anthem.

**'Guv's address was factually incorrect'**

Congress MP Capt. N. Uttam Kumar Reddy described the address by the Governor, Dr. Tamilisai Soundararajan, to the Telangana Legislature on Friday as factually incorrect and misleading. Other highlights of the Railway Budget pertaining to South Central Railway are doubling, third line and bypass line works. The capital outlay is Rs 3,374.44 crore compared to Rs 1,531 crore last year. For new lines, the total budgetary grant including capital and safety fund (excluding deposit) is Rs 819 crore, compared to Rs 285 Crore last year. For electrification, the budgetary grant is Rs 588 crore.

The budget allocations for

some important safety-related works in 2023-24 are Rs 768.14 crore for road safety works (level crossings, bridges and ROB/RUB), compared to Rs 758 crore allotted the previous year.

An allotment of Rs 1,360 crore was given for track renewal compared to Rs 1,040 crore allotted last year.

An amount of Rs 68.34 crore has been allocated for the implementation of Kavach, the indigenously developed Train Collision Avoidance System (TCAS).

The new sections are Wadi- Renigunta, Duvvada-Vijayawada, Balharshah-Vijayawada-Gudur, Manmad- Parbhani-Nanded-Secunderabad-Gadwal-Dhone-Guntakal, Bidar-Parli Vajinath-Parbhani and Wadi-Guntakal.

The pendency in the apex court was recorded on March 2 this year. In a written reply, Law Minister Kiren Rijju said 4,10,47,976 cases are pending in district and subordinate courts.

The figures from Arunachal Pradesh, Lakshadweep, and Andaman and Nicobar Islands were not available on the National Judicial Data Grid, the reply noted. The total number of pending cases comes to 4,70,12,190, Rijju said.

Disposal of pending cases in courts is within the domain of the judiciary, he said, adding that no timeframe has been prescribed for the disposal of various kinds of cases by the respective courts.

## SRCA decries anomalies in TS royalty slips

PNS ■ HYDERABAD

The State Mining Department and National Highways Authority should prevent irregularities in the royalty slips issue, said Southern Regional Contractors Association (SRCA).

A statement issued by the association, said, "The National Highways Authority India (NHAI) floats tenders for roads and bridges development projects at a global level. Companies taking up tenders have to provide royalty slips to NHAI for the gravel soil, blue metals used in the infrastructure development projects."

The State Mining Department periodically checks the quality of gravel soil, blue metals while issuing royalty slips to the contractors.

For example, a royalty certificate of Rs 25 crore will be required to be submitted for a project costing Rs 500 crore. It has become a practice for some companies to issue a royalty certificate for around Rs 5 crore and get a fake royalty certificate for around Rs 20 crore in the name of the State Mining Department and submit it to the NHAI.

Due to this, the government is losing crores of rupees of revenue. At the national level, violations of regulations and loss of revenue to the government continue to occur through fake royalty certificates across various states - Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Maharashtra, Karnataka, Kerala and Madhya Pradesh.

# Rs 20.57cr disbursed under Startup India Seed Fund

Telangana has utilised just about half of the Startup India Seed Fund Scheme (SISFS) released by Centre. As per the data tabled in Rajya Sabha, Rs 39.95 crore has been allocated to selected incubators in Telangana. Of this, Rs 20.57 crore has been disbursed to the selected incubators. This is just about 51 per cent of the allocation.

SISFS is implemented with effect from April 1, 2021. Under the scheme, Rs 477.25 crore has been approved to 133 incubators of which Rs. 211.63 crore has been disbursed as on December 31, 2022.

Minister of State in the Ministry Of Commerce & Industry Som Parkash said, "The SISFS has been approved with a corpus of Rs 945 crore for the period of four years starting from 2021-22. Under

SISFS, as per provisions of the scheme, the government has constituted an Experts

Advisory Committee (EAC) which is responsible for the overall execution and monitor-

ing of the SISFS. The EAC evaluates and selects incubators for allocation of funds under the scheme. The selected incubators thereon shortlist the startups based on certain parameters outlined in scheme guidelines".

To encourage private capital at early/seed stage of startups, the government is implementing scheme. SISFS aims to provide financial assistance to DPIIT recognised startups for proof of concept, prototype development, product trials, market entry and commercialisation to enable these startups to graduate to a level where they will be able to raise investments from angel investors or venture capitalists, or seek loans from commercial banks or financial institutions. Under the scheme, funds are disbursed to eligible startups through eligible incubators across India.

## Panel for merger of Secunderabad cantonment in GHMC set up

The Union Minister of State for Defense Ajay Bhatt revealed that an eight-member committee has been set up to study the proposal to merge the Secunderabad Cantonment area into the GHMC. He said that according to the recommendations of the 15th Finance Commission, allocation of special funds is being done for the development of cantonment areas through

Central schemes like Amrit, National Urban Health Mission, Smart City Mission, Ayushman Bharat.

Law Minister Kiran Rijiju answered another question raised by Revanth Reddy that the number of pending cases in various courts including the Supreme Court has increased in the last three years. The Minister said that 69,768 cases

are pending in the Supreme Court in 2022. As on September 30 last year in Telangana, 236,549 cases were pending in the High Court and 822,658 cases were pending in the District and Subordinate Courts. Rijiju said that the central government along with the Supreme Court has taken several steps to try the pending cases quickly.

## IndiGo airlines records 150+ daily departures from city

Home Minister Mohd Mahmood Ali inaugurated the event featuring dairy products, processing and packaging exhibits. The expo will continue till February 5 at Madhapur.

Bharath Kumar, said, "Vijaya Dairy, which was once speculated to be closed, is doing well, achieving Rs 700 crore turnover and aiming for Rs 1,000 crore. It is also on an expansion spree. It is adding 2,000 more outlets across



Telangana. Currently, we have 27 products and we will be adding 100 more products such as milk shakes, coffee, tea, flavoured milk, icecream, kulfi, cookies, health bars and others. Hyderabad city needs one crore liters of milk every day. But the production is somewhere around 60 to 70 lakh. We are also planning to introduce 2 lakh milk-giving animals into the system, which will enable additional production of about 6 to 8 lakh liters."

He further added, "We are taking proactive measures with a 100 of Animal Mobile Medical Ambulances, to ensure that emergencies in remote areas are attended to swiftly. The federation is taking measures to stop milk that is produced by using Oxytocin injections used to secure higher milk yield from the cows and buffaloes. The milk we receive is checked well at the procurement place itself for any sort of adulteration. If any such milk

is detected the entire lot is abandoned. Strict checks and balances are in place to discourage such practices."

Home Minister Mohd Mahmood Ali emphasised the importance of milk as a wholesome food.

## Youngster stalking minor imprisoned for 3 years

A youngster accused of stalking a minor and harassing her in the guise of love was sentenced to three years imprisonment.

The case was reported in the year 2017 at Gundala police station where they received a complaint that accused Maroju Satheesh known as Satyanarayana Chary (20) used to stalk and harass his daughter in the name of love. Though he informed the matter to the parents of the accused, he did not change his behaviour.

One day while his daughter was going to college, the accused asked his daughter to love him and threatened his daughter that he will kill her or else he will kill himself and gave his daughter cell phone where his daughter refused to take the phone.

Based on the above com-



plaint a case was registered vide Cr.No.54/2017 U/s 354(D), 506 IPC and Sec 12 of POCSO Act 2012 of Gundala PS.

During the course of investigation, the evidence was collected and the accused was arrested and sent to judicial custody. During the trial, Special POCSO Court Judge K Maruthi Devi at Bhongir convicted the accused person Maroju Satheesh to undergo three years rigorous imprisonment and imposed a fine of Rs 3,000.

## Doctors launch awareness campaigns in Hyderabad

Cancer is one the leading causes of death in the world. Every year in India 1.39 million new cancer cases are detected. By 2025 the annual incidence of cancer in India is projected to be 1.5 million. To raise awareness on growing cases of cancer, February 4 is observed as the World Cancer Day.

Cancer can affect various parts of the body. However, doctors say that cancer is not only curable but also preventable with the advancements in oncology and research. Healthcare experts say that changes in lifestyle and constant monitoring for early detection can bring down the fatal effects of cancer.

Dr P. Vijay Anand Reddy, Director, Apollo Cancer Centre, said, "Worldwide cancer prevention strategies focus on these



modifiable risk factors through primary prevention and secondary prevention. Primary prevention involves the avoidance of risk factors that may cause cancer. This includes cessation of smoking, reduced consumption of alcohol, healthy lifestyle changes and vaccination against Human Papilloma virus.

Secondary prevention includes regular screening of most common cancers, to facilitate the diagnosis of cancer in an early stage thereby increasing the chances of cure. Diet plays a major role in cancer pre-

vention. American Institute of Cancer Research (AICR) recommends low alcohol, low calorie, low fat, high dietary fibre, low red meat and low processed meat in diet for prevention of cancer."

According to Oncologists, around 45% of cancers arise mainly from the oral cavity, breast, female reproductive system, lung and stomach.

Dr Srinath Bharadwaj, Consultant Medical Oncology, Apollo Hospitals, said, "I would like to bring to your notice the five major scientific milestones, like Immunotherapy, Next Generation Sequencing, Targeted Therapies, PROTON Therapy, and Developments in supportive care. If theory part remains at this stage the practical exams assistance has not been started and students sighted the change in syllabus for practical exams. They added, "The

schedule was also released for Intermediate first year as they have only 70 per cent in practical exams because the syllabus is not yet completed. The exposure or attempting practical exams began 20 days ago but we have exams from February 15 and we are preparing for it by ourselves."

However, the teachers have said that complaints must be as students are attempting the full syllabus and doubts on the question patterns is making them nervous and assurance of completing the syllabus is under question.

According to the survey report, Hyderabad ranked number 3 as the city having the most colleges (488) after Bengaluru Urban (1,058 colleges) and Jaipur (671 col-

The number of SC students securing admissions rose by 28% compared to admissions held in 2014-15, while admission of ST students increased by 47% and that of ST women rose by 63.4%. The number of OBC admissions rose by 32%, while that of OBC women rose by 39%. The students enrolling in distance education rose by 7% compared to admissions held in 2019-20.

# 700 missing children from TS yet to be traced

Of the number of children who went missing, the police traced 500

As many as 700 children who went missing over the past three years are yet to be traced. As per the data tabled in Lok Sabha, the number of children who went missing in Telangana is 1,260 during the last three years period i.e. January 1, 2020, to December 31, 2022. Police have traced 560 children.

Across India, 1,46,316 children went missing and only 1,28,667 had been traced. Likewise in Andhra Pradesh, 1,048 missing children are yet to be traced. Over the past three years, 3,185 children went missing of which 2,137 were traced in Andhra Pradesh.

The highest number of children went missing in Madhya Pradesh (32976), West Bengal (27133), Karnataka (14383), Odisha (13220) and Gujarat (10529).

Minister of Women and Child Development Smriti Zubin Irani said, "The Ministry of Women and Child

Development developed the "TrackChild Portal", which enables tracking of the missing and found children. One component of Track Child has "Khoya Paya" where any citizen can report any missing or sighted children.

The TrackChild Portal is implemented with the support and involvement of various stakeholders namely the Ministry of Home Affairs, Ministry of Railways, State Governments/ UT Administrations, Child Welfare

Committees, Juvenile Justice Boards, National Legal Services Authority, etc. Standard operating procedures have been issued for the "Track Child" Portal. Advisories have also been issued to all States and UTs including the Director General of Police of all States & UTs and other stakeholders regarding the implementation of the TrackChild portal.

She said that the Ministry is implementing a Centrally sponsored scheme namely "Mission Vatsalya" to support the State and UT Governments in delivering services for Children in Need of Care and Protection (CNCP) and Children in Conflict with Law (CCL) in difficult circumstances, including for the missing children. The Child Care Institutions (CCIs) established under the scheme support inter-alia age-appropriate education, access to vocational training, recreation, health care and counselling. The children in need of care and protection staying with their relatives or in foster care receive support under Mission Vatsalya.

## IIT Hyd finds a solution to predict accurate rainfall

An accurate understanding of Indian rainfall will help us understand global climate change. The Indian Institute of Technology Hyderabad has established a world-class Raindrop Research Facility (RRF) for simulating atmospheric conditions from the clouds to the ground in order to better predict rainfall. Member, NITI Aayog, Government of India, Dr VK Saraswat inaugurated the facility in the presence of Prof BS Murty, Director, IITH, Prof Vidyasagar of the IITH, guests from other institutes, faculty, staff and students of IITH.

Complimenting RRF at IITH, Prof BS Murty said, "Prof Sahu, a faculty in the Chemical Engineering Department at IITH, is one of the stars of the country working in the area of raindrop dynamics.

## Nation leprosy eradication programme held

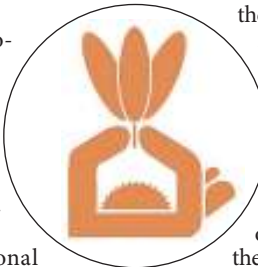

The AEROs should be aware of election expenses and check the performance of EVMs from time to time and Have knowledge about mock polls. Ballot paper must be used in troubled areas. Strong measures should be taken for effective polling. Voters should be given advance information about changes in their name, address and constituency."

The CEO told the gathering

to be particularly familiar with processes relating to Electoral rolls, Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs) and the conduct of elections.

He said that there is no change in existing Form 6-A for "inclusion of name in electoral rolls by an overseas Indian elector" and it shall continue to remain in force/existence. Form 001 "Application for issue of Replacement EPIC" has been discontinued and the provision for the same has been made in the newly modified Form-8. Form 7 for "Objection for proposed inclusion/deletion of Name in Existing Electoral roll" has also been slightly modified and a provision for attaching the death certificate has also been made.

The existing Form 8A for transposition of entry in the electoral roll in case of shifting from one place of residence to another place of residence within the same constituency has been discontinued and existing Form-8 for Correction to particulars entered in the electoral roll has been substituted with a new Form-8 for shifting of residence, correction of entries in the existing electoral roll, Replacement of EPIC, and marking of a person with a disability.

## Four arrested for illegal blasting

Bombay HC refuses to stop tender for sanitary napkins for govt schools

The Bombay High Court on Friday rejected a petition that objected to certain conditions in Maharashtra government's tender to procure sanitary napkins for girls in state-run schools, noting that the safety and hygiene of the students are important and that the clauses are necessary to maintain quality. A division bench of Acting Chief Justice S V Gangapurwala and Justice Sandeep Marne disposed of the petition filed by a start-up owned by a 69-year-old man challenging the conditions imposed by the state in its tender for the supply of sanitary napkins to 9,940 government schools. "Safety and hygiene of school girls are important and for that purpose, the quality has to be maintained. We do not find any illegality in the tender conditions," the court said. The conditions were that the bidders had to have three years of experience in supplying sanitary napkins and an annual turnover of Rs 12 crore.



Congress kickstarts Praja Dhvani Yatra covering parts of Karnataka

Former Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and state Congress President D K Shivakumar on Friday embarked on separate bus tours as part of party's 'Praja Dhvani Yatra' ahead of the Assembly elections, which is about three months away. The team headed by Siddaramaiah will tour Assembly constituencies in north Karnataka region while Shivakumar will cover the southern districts. The Siddaramaiah-led team comprising 35 leaders started from Basavakalyan in Bidar district. He will visit 'Anubhava Mantapa' to pay respects to the statue of 12th century social reformer Basaveshwara before addressing a public meeting there. The state Congress chief's poll campaign started from Mulbagal in Kolar district after paying homage at the ancient Ganapati temple in Kudumalai. He later tweeted, "Worshipped Maha Ganapati's Saligram statue at Kudumalai in Mulbagal. I prayed that the Praja Dhvani Yatra should go on without any hassle in Kolar district."



Liquor, fuel to cost more in Kerala; Vehicle tax, land fair price value to go up

Petrol, diesel and liquor are to cost more and motor vehicle tax and fair price value of land to go up in Kerala as the state government acted tough to mobilise additional revenue to carry forward their social security schemes and development programmes in the budget presented here on Friday. Despite wide expectations, the social security pension received no hike but Finance Minister K N Balagopal, while presenting the budget for the fiscal 2023-24, assured that the financial constraints would not impact the welfare schemes of the Left government. The Health and Education sectors were allotted Rs 2,828.33 crore and Rs 1,773.09 crore respectively. The FM said it is proposed to levy a Social Security Cess on Indian Made Foreign Liquor (IMFL) and on the sale of petrol and diesel as the commitment to continue protecting the decent lives to vulnerable sections of society require supplementing the financial resources.



'Govt doesn't want discussion on embarrassing issues'

The Narendra Modi dispensation has been "stalling" the Opposition's demand for discussions on every issue which it feels would embarrass it, Congress MP Shashi Tharoor alleged Friday, slamming the government for "not allowing" discussion in Parliament on Adani Group stock rout. Lok Sabha proceedings were adjourned till 2 pm on Friday due to protests by opposition members demanding a probe by a joint parliamentary committee into the fraud-allegation-triggered rout in Adani Group company stocks. The Thiruvananthapuram MP said Parliament is a place to discuss issues facing the nation so that people can see "the concerns of the MPs and what the MPs are focussing on". "Sadly, however, our government doesn't see the merit of it. So they are stalling (dis-



cussions). As a result, now we have lost two days," he charged. "All the opposition parties unitedly want to discuss this (Adani Group issue) extremely important issue as it affects the citizens of this country. They believe that this is a matter of sufficient importance that the government should permit," Tharoor told PTI in the Parliament House complex. But the government doesn't want to discuss any issue that it thinks would embarrass it, he alleged. "The government didn't want China (border situation) to be discussed in the last

session. It also didn't want unemployment and price rise to be discussed," Tharoor claimed. "I just hope there are some points they will see the merit in coming to an accommodation with the opposition and in working out an arrangement whereby every issue that matters to our public can be discussed," he added.

Opposition's demand for JPC probe into Adani issue not justified: Jethmalani

BJP MP Mahesh Jethmalani on Friday dismissed the Opposition's allegation that investments by LIC in the Adani Group were made at the government's behest and said there was no justification to the demands for a joint parliamentary committee probe into the matter. Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha proceedings were adjourned till 2 pm and 2:30 pm, respectively, on Friday due to

protests by opposition members into the fraud-allegation-triggered rout in the group's stocks, with members in the Lower House demanding a probe by a joint parliamentary committee (JPC). Wrongdoing in these investments, if any, would be probed by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) and the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), the Rajya Sabha member said.

CBI searches 37 locations in J-K over irregularities

The CBI Friday conducted searches at 37 locations in six districts of Jammu and Kashmir in connection with alleged irregularities in the recruitment exam of accounts assistants in the finance department held on March 6 last year, officials said. CBI sleuths swooped down at the premises of middlemen and other accused at 30 locations in Jammu in R S Pura, Karan Bangh and several other areas on Friday morning, they said, adding the operation was conducted in other districts including Udhampur, Rajouri, Reasi and Doda. The premises of several touts who helped candidates in the selection process were searched during the operation, officials said. The CBI registered a case in November last year over alleged irregularities in the examination conducted by the Jammu and Kashmir Services Selection Board (JKSSB), officials said.

Saradha: ED attaches assets of 'beneficiaries'

The ED on Friday said it has attached assets worth more than Rs 6 crore of "beneficiaries" like Nalini Chidambaram, wife of former Union finance minister and Congress leader P Chidambaram, former CPM MLA Debendranath Biswas and a company owned by former Assam minister late Anjan Dutta in the Saradha money laundering case. A provisional order for attaching movable properties worth Rs 3.30 crore and immovable assets worth Rs 3 crore has been issued under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), the federal agency said in a statement. These properties were owned by the Saradha Group and other people, who were beneficiaries of the "proceeds of crime" generated by the group, it said. The "beneficiaries" include Nalini Chidambaram,

Debabrata Sarkar (East Bengal Club official), Debendranath Biswas (former IPS officer and ex-CPM MLA) and Anubhuti Printers and Publications owned by Dutta, a former Assam cabinet minister and president of state Congress party. The money laundering case pertains to an alleged hit

fund scam perpetrated by the Saradha Group in West Bengal, Assam and Odisha till 2013. "The quantum of total money mobilised by this group company is about Rs 2,459 crore out of which nearly Rs 1,983 crore remains unpaid to the depositors till date excluding the interest amount," the ED said.

Five names recommended by Collegium for SC judges

The Centre on Friday assured the Supreme Court that the Collegium's recommendation of December last year for the appointment of five judges in the apex court will be cleared soon. Attorney General R Venkataramani told a bench of justices S K Kaul and A S Oka that warrant of appointments of these five names is expected to be issued shortly. During the hearing, the Supreme Court also expressed displeasure over the delay by the Centre in clearing recommendations for transfer of high court judges, saying "it is a very very serious issue". "Don't make us take a stand which will be very uncomfortable," the bench told the attor-



ney general. The Supreme Court Collegium on December 13 last year recommended five judges for elevation to the apex court -- Rajasthan High Court Chief Justice Pankaj Mithal, Patna High Court Chief Justice Sanjay Karol, Manipur High Court Chief Justice P V Sanjay Kumar, Patna High Court judge Ahsanuddin Amanullah and Allahabad

High Court judge Manoj Misra. Later, on January 31, the Collegium headed by Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud recommended to the Centre the names of Allahabad High Court Chief Justice Rajesh Bindal and Gujarat High Court Chief Justice Aravind Kumar for elevation as apex court judges. The top court, which has a sanctioned strength of 34 judges including the Chief Justice of India (CJI), is currently functioning with 27 judges. The Supreme Court was hearing a matter related to the Centre's alleged delay in clearing names recommended by the Collegium for appointment as judges to the Supreme Court and high courts.

No proposal to use remote voting machine in "upcoming election"

There is no proposal to use the remote electronic voting machine (RVM) in the "upcoming election" in the country and it is also not proposed for the use of Non-Resident Indian (NRI) voters, Lok Sabha was informed on Friday. Responding to a question in the Lower House of Parliament, Law Minister Kiren Rijiju said in a written reply that according to the Election Commission (EC), it has "not proposed to introduce the RVM for the upcoming election in the country". Several assembly polls are due this year, while the Lok Sabha elections will be held in 2024. The minister said the EC has also informed that the RVM is not proposed for the use of NRI voters. Rijiju noted that public sector unit Electronic Corporation of India Limited (ECIL), under the guidance of the EC and the Technical Expert Committee of the poll panel, has developed a prototype of the Multi Constituency Remote Electronic Voting Machine. The EC, he said, had circulated



a concept note to all national and state political parties on improving voter participation of domestic migrants using remote voting. The note included matters such as defining a 'migrant voter', addressing the territorial concept, the method of remote voting and counting of votes, enforcement of the Model Code of Conduct, and setting up of controlled environment to ensure free and fair voting. Citing details shared by the EC, he said the introduction of RVM would not increase fake votes. The prototype RVM developed by ECIL is a robust and stand-alone system based on the existing EVMs... Independently, various statutes will ensure that the confirmation/genuineness of voter identity is verified," Rijiju said.

SC to Maha govt: No hate speeches at Hindu body's event

The Supreme Court asked the Maharashtra government on Friday to ensure that no hate speeches are delivered if authorities allow the Hindu Jan Akrosh Morcha to hold an event in Mumbai on February 5. A bench of Justices KM Joseph and JB Pardiwala was told by Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, who appeared in the matter on behalf of the Maharashtra government, that the state undertakes that if the event is allowed to be held, it will be subject to the condition that "nobody will make any hate speech and act in defiance of law or disturb the public order". The bench recorded Mehta's statement and asked the state government to ensure that no hate speeches are delivered at the event. "We also direct that in case permission is granted and in case the occasion arises for invoking power under section 151 of CrPC, it shall be the duty of the police officers concerned to invoke the provision," it said.

Woman rejects freebies from Meghalaya poll candidates

An elderly woman in Meghalaya, where Assembly poll will be held later this month, has allegedly refused to accept freebies from contestants in East Khasi Hills district and has returned the 'gifts' given to her family. Purity Phawa, president of the women's organisation in her locality, reportedly even told candidates' agents in person that she wants to elect legislators and not distributors. Election to all the 60 seats in the state Assembly will be held on February 27 and counting will be held on March 2.

Phawa's family, which resides at Lumdiengiri in West Shillong constituency, had reportedly received freebies from the agents of ruling National People's Party candidate Mohindro Rapsang and United Democratic Party (UDP) contest Paul Lyngdoh on January 28 and 30 respectively. "I was not at home when the freebies arrived. When I returned, my daughter told me that the candidates had sent us a pressure cooker and two sets of imported bowls on January 28 and 30," Phawa told PTI on Friday. "I called up the agents who had delivered the freebies and



they confirmed that the candidates had sent the gifts. The UDP candidate sent a calendar too," she said. Phawa claimed that she returned the freebies on Thursday and asked the can-

dicates not to distribute them if they want to become legislators. "Or else they can choose to become distributors," was her pithy rejoinder. Phawa also claimed that she would meet the district election officers on Friday to formally inform them of the 'freebies' being distributed by the candidates in her constituency, Rapsang, a first time MLA of the opposition Congress who switched over to the ruling NPP of Chief Minister Conrad K Sangma recently, has been reportedly distributing pressure cookers to the voters publicly in the run up to the elections. He vehemently denied giving any freebies and insisted that the pressure cookers are from his MLA funds. Paul is a sitting member of the tribal council and a former MLA who lost to Rapsang in 2018.

Houses in J-K's Doda develop cracks

Nineteen families were evacuated after their homes developed cracks at a village in Jammu and Kashmir's Doda district, officials said on Friday. The authorities also declared unsafe a mosque and a religious school for girls at Nai Basti village in Thathri, 35 kilometres from Doda town along the Kishtwar-Batote National Highway. A few structures in the village started developing cracks a couple of days ago but the situation was exacerbated by a landslide on Thursday with the



number of buildings damaged reaching 21. "We have shifted 19 affected families to a safer location after their houses were rendered unsafe. We are observing the situation and taking steps as per need to ensure their safety," Sub-Divisional

Magistrate (Thathri) Athar Amin Zargar said. The deputy commissioner and the senior superintendent of police visited the spot and assured all help to the affected families, he said. Zargar, however, refused to compare the situation to that in Uttarakhand's Joshimath -- the gateway to famous pilgrimage sites like Badrinath and Hemkund Sahib -- that is facing a major challenge due to land subsidence. "Comparing the situation in Nai Basti with the sinking town of Joshimath will be an exaggeration.

SP 'insulting' marginalised sections, says Mayawati

BSP chief Mayawati on Friday attacked the Samajwadi Party, saying it should not "insult" the marginalised sections of society by calling them "Shudra". She also asserted that the Constitution of India is the book of the weaker and marginalised sections of the society, and not the Ramchar itmanas and Manusmriti. Mayawati's remarks came a day after senior Samajwadi Party leader and national general secretary Swami Prasad Maurya said only women

and Shudras can feel the pain of the "derogatory" remarks made against them in the guise of religion. In a series of tweets in Hindi, Mayawati said, "Ramcharitmanas and Manusmriti are not the books of the weaker and marginalised section of society, but it is the Constitution of India, in which Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar had not called them as Shudra, but as SC, ST and OBC. Therefore, the Samajwadi Party should not insult them by calling them as Shudra, nor they should defy the Constitution."

LOK SABHA AND LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLIES

PIL to see feasibility of simultaneous polls

A PIL has been filed in the Delhi High Court seeking to direct the Centre and the Election Commission to ascertain the feasibility of conducting polls for Lok Sabha and legislative assemblies simultaneously in 2024 to save money and reduce the burden on security forces and public administration. The petition said the elections to assemblies whose terms are expiring in 2023 and 2024 may be brought together with the 2024 Lok Sabha polls by curtailing and extend-

ing the tenure. If a consensus evolves among political parties, assembly elections of 16 states -- Meghalaya, Nagaland, Tripura, Karnataka, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Mizoram, Rajasthan, Telangana, Sikkim, Andhra Pradesh, Arunachal Pradesh, Odisha, Haryana, Maharashtra and Jharkhand -- can be held with the 2024 General Elections, it said. Petitioner and advocate Ashwini Kumar Upadhyay has also sought to direct the Centre and the poll panel to ascertain the feasibility of conducting elections on Saturday, Sunday



and some holiday to save time of schools, colleges, universities, service industries and manufacturing organisations. The plea claimed that as per a provisional estimate, the conduct of 2014 Lok Sabha elections entailed an expenditure of almost Rs 4,500 crore and it is estimated that an

undeclared Rs 30,000 crore was spent on the 2014 Lok Sabha polls. Thus, doing away with several separate elections every year is likely to reduce expenditure substantially, it said. The plea said conducting the elections together will save public money, reduce burden on security forces and public administration, ensure timely implementation of government policies and control election paralysis. "There are many advantages in holding the Lok Sabha, state legislative assemblies, panchayats and municipal

body elections together. It would reduce the time and cost involved in conducting elections in terms of the use of paramilitary forces, government staff on election duty and election commission staff organising booths, electronic voting machines and voter slips. In addition, the cost of campaigning for parties would be less. The imposition of the Model Code of Conduct delays implementation of central and state government projects and welfare schemes, and takes away time and effort from governance issues," it claimed.



## Debate needed

Discussion in Parliament over the Adani affair will help the Government rather than the Opposition

The free fall of Adani scrips, which began after the US short-seller Hindenburg Research's report last week, continued on Friday. Bad news for the group continues to pour in; S&P Dow Jones Indices on Thursday removed Adani Enterprises shares from the Dow Jones Sustainability Indices. This, S&P Dow Jones Indices, said was "triggered by allegations of stock manipulation and accounting fraud." The carnage on Dalal Street found its resonance in Parliament. With the Opposition determined to have a discussion on the Adani Group, proceedings of the Budget Session were disrupted on the fourth day on Friday. While Rajya Sabha Chairman Jagdeep Dhankar adjourned the House for the first half of the day, in the Lok Sabha too the proceedings were adjourned till 2 pm. On Thursday also both Houses got adjourned for the day amid shouting by Opposition members. They wanted discussions over the allegations of fraud by the Adani Group. The issue seems to have united the Opposition, with Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge seeking an investigation into the matter either by a Joint Parliament Committee or a CJI-appointed panel. Neither the presiding officers of the two Houses nor the Government seems inclined towards a debate. Kharge is reported to meet the floor leaders of Opposition parties in his chamber on Friday. Evidently, the parties against the Bharatiya Janata Party scent an opportunity to launch a serious attack on it.



So far, the Opposition has not been able to hurt or even badly embarrass the BJP or its Government at the Centre. Anti-BJP leaders have said a lot of bad things about Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the ruling party, and the saffron bodies seen aligned with the regime; the Government is flayed, rightly, over its inability to generate jobs; high oil prices and soaring inflation last year also attracted a great deal of criticism; allegations of cronyism are made routinely against the Government. But all the criticisms are just water off a duck's back; nothing sticks. This time, it may be different—this seems to be the idea that is animating the Opposition. The Government would be well-advised to let discussions happen over the subject; this will help the Government rather than the Opposition, for it would be able to easily deflect the charges of favouritism. This will also deprive the Opposition of the opportunity to say that the Government is fearful of discussing the issue involving a controversial tycoon. Second, this will send across a good signal to the public, investors, and the corporate sector that the Government is concerned about the capital market. Third, meaning discussions, if they take place in Parliament, can also throw up ideas that would strengthen the functioning of the stock market. Finally, this will strengthen our system, for good debates in Parliament are the soul of democracy. And when democracy is strengthened, it is a win-win situation for all parties.

## Rejig higher education

The UGC guidelines for foreign universities to setup campus in India are ill-conceived

Higher education in India has always been an underperformer. Though we have 40,000 colleges and 1000 universities most of them do not impart quality education to the students and leave them high and dry after they pass out. This is one big reason for unemployment as most students passing out from the colleges with degrees are unemployable as the curriculum, as well as the quality of education they receive, is below par. Though we have world-class institutions like IITs and IIMs, they can be counted on tips and even there after taking a subsidized fee structure students to leave the shores and give their best years to the multinational companies abroad. Some \$3 billion are spent by Indian parents to fund their children's education abroad. But the fact is most of them have good returns as they get employed easily and are able to pay back their loans etc. On the other hand, students who study in India go through a grind to get a job; their ordeal begins after they leave college and most end up working in jobs they were not trained for.



The government has recently come up with the idea to offset this lacuna by allowing foreign universities to open their campuses in the country. But that the UGC guidelines to this effect are flawed and would not lead to universities from abroad coming here and starting their classes here. The biggest problem is that in India education institutions cannot make a profit that is they have to work on a pro bono model. If the foreign universities set up campuses here, the same rule would apply to them and they would not be able to remit money. After all profit would be their motive to come here. Most private colleges make a profit by manipulating the account books to skirt this clause. Moreover, the foreign campuses would indeed hit the private colleges hard as they would not be able to compete with them on brand and facilities, curriculum, etc. Moreover, if foreign universities do come to India they would have their own agenda and not the best interest of India in mind which is another major drawback. UGC had earlier invited foreign universities, but none showed interest. So the Government would do well to go back to the drawing board and rethink the whole higher education policy rather than finding easy solutions. Besides the interest of the private colleges must also not be overlooked and a level playing field must be provided to all else it would destroy the education system we have.

# A tale of two nations poles apart

Pakistan and Bangladesh charted their course differently, while former was fixated with the 'two nation theory' latter adopted a liberal approach

Two nations emerged from non-contiguous territories in 1971, one willingly and the other unwillingly, after violently disproving a religion-based assumption i.e., the 'two-nation theory' that beset the 'Idea of Pakistan'. Over fifty years since, both these countries have invested and institutionalized a starkly different path, trajectory, and consequently an inevitable socio-economic narrative. Bangladesh under Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had inherited a land subjected to genocide and plunder that had ensured shipment of anything of value to West Pakistan (soon, just Pakistan) — even in defeat, Pakistani leadership had displayed unbelievable avarice and wantonness. While newly independent Bangladesh had gone about putting its ravaged house in order, Pakistan had simply refused to learn any lessons. The Pakistani leadership baton passed from its defeated dictator, General Yahya Khan, to an equally unhinged, imperious, and morally compromised, Zulfikar Ali Bhutto. Instead of reflecting on its regressive underpinnings of the 'two-nation theory', Pakistan under the civilian leadership of Zulfikar Bhutto further strengthened its religio-populism with puritanical moves — he appeased the pernicious clergy, declared Ahmadis as heretics, recklessly funded the 'Islamic Bomb', banned alcohol (even though he drank himself), etc. Whereas Mujibur Rahman decided to walk a contrarian path in terms of land reforms, nationalization, and perhaps the most revolutionary of all, adopted the word 'secularism' in its newly adopted constitution. It had inadvertently modeled itself like another Muslim-majority Turkey (of Kemal Ataturk's sensibilities, not Erdogan's) — whereas Pakistan after tenures of Zulfikar Bhutto and General Zia-ul-Haq went on a sliding slope of a total abyss.

Indeed, Bangladesh's story was not linear or smooth and it had to deal with its subliminal regressions, natural disasters, and frequent disruption to democracy. Mujibur Rahman himself toyed with a one-party state and



censorship when things were not going in his favour. He was assassinated in a military coup. Bangladeshi Military soon rewrote the constitution obliterating the word 'secularism' and the same was reinstated only in 2010, when the Bangladesh Supreme Court ruled that the removal was illegal, leaving Bangladesh with a coexistent State religion and the principle of 'secularism', to imply neutrality of religion. Again, the phenomenon of Pan-Islamism and political Islam has not spared Bangladesh either, yet in relative terms, Bangladesh under the current Awami League government has not gone the Pakistani route of religious puritanism.

Importantly, Sheikh Hasina has insisted, "You live in equal rights. You will observe your religion and celebrate festivals with equal rights. This is the real policy of Bangladesh and our ideal. I urge you never to think of yourself as a minority". While there have been multiple communal issues and provocations in Bangladesh, at least the leadership has spoken in favour of religious pluralism. Contrast this with Pakistan even in recent times, with the former Imran Khan (popularly known as Taliban Khan) promising a 'Riyasat-e-Madina' and even the current coalition government has Maulana Fazlur

Rehman, the emir of Jamiat Ulema-i-Islam, as its Presidents! These political-societal wirings have inevitable socio-economic consequences owing to governance structures and choices and therefore the contrasting fate of current Pakistan and Bangladesh is only natural. This week the headlines from Bangladeshi newspapers were 'Metro Rail transported 3.35 lakh commuters since opening', 'Two committees formed over mistakes and errors in textbooks', 'cancellation of Jamaat's registration', 'Bangladesh to get \$4.7 bn IMF package' etc., Whereas the headlines from across the Line-of-Control (LOC) were 'Death toll from an attack on mosque rises to 92', '35-rupee hike in petrol prices', 'failed policy of suing for peace with terror group' and 'No IMF loan, a mission to visit Pakistan for talks on 9th review'. A combusting Pakistan grapples with abject political, financial, diplomatic, security, and social failure. On easily securing the IMF loan as opposed to a Pakistan, Bangladeshi Finance Minister said, "This loan approval proves that our economy is standing on a solid foundation and our fundamentals are better than many other countries". However, the Pakistani Finance Minister in 2023 was still banking on divine intervention as he stated incredulously, "If Allah can create Pakistan, then he can

also protect, develop, and make it prosper". Pakistan's fixation with its foundational 'two-nation theory' and its inevitabilities have led to imploding relations with neighboring Afghanistan to a perennially tense equation with Iran. Pakistan simply refuses to come to terms with its genealogical flaw, which was wisely skipped by the founding fathers of Indian independence and constitutionality who opted for an inclusive, liberal, and progressive agenda.

Bangladesh went ahead of even India in 2021-22 in terms of per capita income, and this is especially impressive as in 2007 (15 years back), India's per capita income at \$1028 was almost double of Bangladesh at \$558. It is the same story with various UN Sustainable Development Goals. The invaluable lesson to India, given that Pakistan suffers from ostrich syndrome and simply refuses to learn, is to put economic and progressive agendas over petty religious 'divides' and the supposed rewriting of history. Our politics could look westwards or eastwards for learning different lessons and implications of choices made.

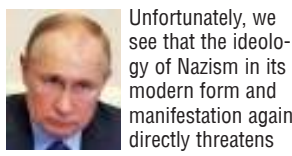

MILLETS' IMPORTANCE GROWS WORLDWIDE

They help us fight problems of malnutrition, obesity

Milletts were a major crop consumed in India and numerous other nations till about five decades ago. According to a 2014 National Council of Applied Economic Research (NCAER) report, the plate share of millets has declined significantly in favour of wheat, rice, and processed foods.

As a result of increased land being used for wheat and rice production, the cultivation area for millets has decreased by 58 per cent for small millets, 64 per cent for sorghum, 49 per cent for finger millet, and 23 per cent for pearl millet since 1956. Millets are considered to be the sole crop that can handle critical challenges in the future such as food, fuel, malnutrition, health, and climate change.

With India's growing malnutrition problem—both under-nutrition (vitamin, mineral, and protein deficiencies) and over-nutrition (obesity, metabolic syndrome, and lifestyle diseases)—there is a growing awareness of the need to move to healthier, more accessible, and inexpensive diets that include millets. In addition to being naturally gluten-free and nutrient-dense, millets are also a rich source of protein, essential fatty acids, dietary fibre, and vitamin B.



When it comes to the global scenario of millet production, India is the top producer of millets in the world and the fifth-largest exporter of millets globally. As the demand for millets rises quickly, their exports are expanding dramatically. More business opportunities are being created for entrepreneurs as millets' demand rises.

The millet market has a value of over \$9 billion in 2018, and is expected to grow at a rate of over 4.5 per cent from 2018 to 2025, with a value projection of over \$12 billion.

Apart from creating business opportunities, millets also aid in the prevention of numerous non-communicable lifestyle diseases such as diabetes, hypertension, and cardiovascular disease, and are considered to be a potential choice or solution to lessen the negative effects of rising malnutrition and to improve the food and nutrition security of the nation.

Due to their adaptability to a wide range of temperatures and moisture regimes as well as their low input requirements, millets are resistant to climate change. They are resilient crops with small water and carbon footprints.

Millets can withstand droughts and can even survive on 350-400 mm of rain, making them an ideal crop for production.

As proposed by India to the Food and Agriculture Organization, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a resolution declaring 2023 as the International Year of Millets. The main goal of this initiative is to raise public awareness of the health benefits of millets and their suitability for cultivation under challenging conditions brought on by climate change.

The International Year of Millet provides an excellent chance to:

1. improve millets' contribution to food security
2. increase millet output globally
3. make sure that the processing, transport, storage, and consumption are efficient
4. and sustainable millet production and quality with stakeholder participation

Millet farming is still an area with a lot of room for ecosystem-level interventions. Promoting millets not only raises awareness of these wonder crops, but also of women farmers and their farming knowledge.

Raising awareness among farmers and the general public about the numerous benefits of millets can help to revitalise millets production and consumption in India.

# Govt must step in to help tobacco users

In several countries, the government has provided tobacco alternatives to deal with nicotine use and addictions

The Constitution asks citizens to develop a scientific temper and this could well be their greatest contribution to health. The Covid-19 has been an eye-opener to the importance of modern science. Many understand diseases better and that knowledge helps to combat it through vaccines, prophylactics and medical treatment.

That same scientific temper is lacking when it comes to tobacco use. More than a third of the Indian male population uses tobacco. The situation is particularly grim in rural India, where 42 per cent of men use tobacco products. It is time to employ science to combat death and disease by tobacco.

The data is culled from the National Family Health Survey, which is an important vehicle to understand the status of India's health. The most recent one, NFHS-5, was carried out in 2019-21.

The data from the NFHS on the consumption of tobacco in India has thrown up shocking data. There has been a little change in patterns of tobacco use amongst the Indian population despite advertising ill-effects.

There are graphic images on tobacco pouches and cigarette packets yet these seem to have little effect. The data on tobacco use also throws up several scary observations on the smoking population, which is quite high. But the message is not percolating down to the smokers, particularly in rural areas.

The study of tobacco consumption also shows that the prevalence of smoking decreases with increased exposure to schooling. The NFHS-5 reports that 39 per cent of men and nine per cent of women age 15 and over currently use any tobacco products. This percentage is less than reported in the NFHS-4 (conducted in 2015-16) which had shown that tobacco use amongst 45 per cent of men and seven per cent of women in the 15-49 age group.

However, it is far from ideal in the modern world. Those who smoke in a family are not smoking alone. The NFHS-5 survey revealed that, in 25 per cent of Indian households, at least one person smokes tobacco on a daily basis, exposing others to passive smoking and its ill-effects. This is down a few notches from 29 per cent in NFHS-4.

The percentage of men aged 15 years and above who use any kind of tobacco exceeds 40 per cent in most parts of Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Odisha, Jharkhand, West Bengal, Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Northeastern states, northern part of Maharashtra, western Gujarat, and southern Rajasthan.

Use of tobacco is also high (30-40 per cent) in Ladakh, Uttarakhand, most parts of Maharashtra, Karnataka, northern parts of Rajasthan, and north-western Gujarat.

The lowest kind of tobacco use (below

30 per cent) is mostly observed in Punjab and southern states. The five states with the highest tobacco use in rural population are Mizoram (73.1), Andaman & Nicobar Islands (58.7), Manipur (58), Meghalaya (57.8), Tripura (57.2). For women, it's Mizoram (61.7), Tripura (50.5), Manipur (43.3), Andaman & Nicobar Islands (31.2), and Meghalaya (28.3).

The data shows that these five states have the highest percentage of tobacco users for both men and women. These five states are also the top five states of India with the highest tobacco consumption in rural areas.

The NFHS-5 shows that tobacco consumption is much higher in rural India than urban. Among women, there are 5.5 per cent tobacco users in urban areas and 10.5 per cent (or nearly double) in rural areas. For the men, there are 28.8 per cent tobacco users in urban areas and 38 per cent in rural areas.

Indians both smoke and chew tobacco. The smokers consume bidis and cigarettes and account for around 20 per cent of tobacco users in the country. The rest use different forms of chewing tobacco.

The chewing or buccal consumption of tobacco is a traditional practice that was once rooted in consumption of paan. Traditionally, tobacco (zarda, kimam, patti) was added to betel leaves along with betel nuts, ground limestone and other natural substances. That has undergone a sea change in recent years. Most chewing tobacco consumers prefer gutka, or packets of readymade paan-like products. Previously, these came in two varieties: a benign one

without tobacco and one with tobacco pre-mixed into it. Following changes in regulations, all manufacturers were asked to sell packets of tobacco separately with the risks of cancer advertised through graphic images on tobacco pouches, same as on cigarette packets.

The paan is a perishable item but the gutka packets are convenient to buy and store for long periods. The result is that there are different grades available and their quality is subject to manufacturing standards and preservatives may be added to make them last longer. This means that inorganic substances are added to preserve the tobacco or betel nuts in the packets.

Another popular form of chewing tobacco is khaini—raw tobacco mixed with limestone and stored in the cavity between the gums and the cheeks for the buccal absorption of nicotine.

Indian law prohibits the sale of tobacco to minors. But, when was the last time you saw a tobacco seller asking for proof of age? The NFHS-5 survey was conducted amongst those who are aged 15 and above. This itself is an indicator that minors in India are using tobacco products. Most minors use tobacco secretly and away from the gaze of their parents and guardians. There is no evidence that minor tobacco users have scientifically explained the consequences of using tobacco, that it leads to an addiction and attracts a range of diseases.

The NFHS report says: "Tobacco use is associated with a wide range of diseases, including several types of cancers and heart and lung diseases, diabetes, eye disease, and rheumatoid arthritis. Studies have shown that in addi-

tion to sharing the same health risks as men, women who use tobacco experience difficulty in becoming pregnant and are at an increased risk of infertility, pregnancy complications, premature births, low birth-weight infants, stillbirths, miscarriages, and infant deaths."

Earlier, some doctors would ask smokers to cut down during the course of ailments or treatments and would tell them to quit in case of some conditions. Now, doctors advise all smoking patients to quit smoking.

This is regardless of whether the patient has a lifestyle disease, a life-threatening one or one that directly affects the lungs. Even for bone or muscle injuries, physiotherapists and orthopaedic doctors advise quitting smoking because tobacco use can delay/stunt the healing time and process.

The NFHS-4 survey had found that around 50 per cent of all tobacco users were asked by a doctor to quit smoking tobacco in the 12 months before the survey. Where does science come in?

Creating regulations and following the bare minimum will also reap the bare minimum results. A sea change in attitudes is required and this is only possible with sustained, aggressive drives to create awareness amongst the Indian population.

In several other countries, the government has provided tobacco alternatives to deal with nicotine use and addictions. These alternatives have to be pushed especially amongst the rural population amongst India, where the numbers of tobacco users is increasing.

The celebration by a healthy, tobacco-free nation will be the biggest tribute to the republic.

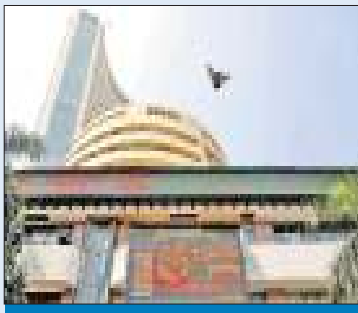
## Gold tumbles Rs 681; Silver plummets Rs 2,045 amid weak

Gold price tumbled Rs 681 to Rs 57,929 per 10 grams in the national capital on Friday amid a decline in rates of precious metal globally, according to the HDFC Securities. The yellow metal had ended Rs 58,610 per 10 grams in the previous trade. Silver also plummeted Rs 2,045 to Rs 70,335 per kilogram. "Spot gold prices in the Delhi markets traded at Rs 57,929 per 10 grams, down Rs 681 per 10 grams," Saumil Gandhi, Senior Analyst - Commodities at HDFC Securities, said. In the overseas market, both gold and silver were traded in red at USD 1,913 per ounce and USD 23.38 per ounce, respectively. Comex gold prices retreated from fresh high of USD 1,975 per ounce and closed lower by 1.94 per cent on Thursday as investors locked in profits after the precious metal scaled a nine-month peak on dovish remarks on the interest rates from Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell, Gandhi said.



## Sensex, Nifty jump over 1% on heavy buying in banking stocks

Equity benchmarks rallied over 1 per cent on Friday due to heavy buying in banking and financial counters amid mixed trend in the global markets. The 30-share BSE benchmark Sensex zoomed 909.64 points or 1.52 per cent to settle at 60,841.88. During the day, it jumped 973.1 points or 1.62 per cent to 60,905.34. The broader NSE Nifty advanced 243.65 points or 1.38 per cent to end at 17,854.05. From the Sensex pack, Titan, Bajaj Finserv, Bajaj Finance, HDFC Bank, HDFC, State Bank of India, Mahindra & Mahindra and IndusInd Bank were among the major winners. HCL Technologies, Wipro and Tech Mahindra were among the laggards. Elsewhere in Asia, equity markets in Seoul and Tokyo ended in the green, while Shanghai and Hong Kong settled lower. Equities in Europe were trading mostly lower during mid-session deals. Markets in the US ended mostly in the positive territory on Thursday.



## Kansai Nerolac Paints net profit falls 13% to Rs 108.97 crore

Kansai Nerolac Paints Ltd on Friday reported a 13 per cent decline in consolidated net profit at Rs 108.97 crore in the December quarter, impacted by higher expenses. The company had posted a consolidated net profit of Rs 125.32 crore in the year-ago period, it said in a regulatory filing. Consolidated revenue from operations during the quarter under review stood at Rs 1,826.81 crore as against Rs 1,810.35 crore in the corresponding period last fiscal, it added. Total expenses were higher at Rs 1,684.74 crore as compared to Rs 1,648.39 crore in the same quarter last year. "The quarter witnessed good demand in automotive coatings. Demand in decorative was impacted on account of early Diwali, extended monsoons and higher than normal channel stocking due to price increases during October 21 and November 21," Kansai Nerolac Paints Managing Director Anuj Jain said. Raw material prices showed a decline during the quarter, which continued to witness a high exchange volatility with the rupee sharply depreciating further, he added.



## Coal India arm MCL introduces drone technology in coal mines

Coal India arm MCL has introduced drone technology in coal mines for environmental monitoring, volume measurement and photogrammetric mapping of mines for digitalisation of the mining process.

The technology has been introduced through the launch of a web-based portal 'VIHANGAM' along with a drone and ground control system.

"The portal allows an authorised person to access real time drone video from the mine through a dedicated 40 Mbps internet lease line near the mines," the coal ministry said in a statement.

There is a control station that flies the drone and the system can be operated through the portal from anywhere.

## Sebi tones up framework for green bonds

### Introduces concept of blue, yellow bonds

Markets regulator Sebi on Friday strengthened the framework for green bonds by introducing the concept of 'blue' and 'yellow' bonds as new modes of sustainable finance.

Blue bonds relate to water management and marine sector, while yellow bonds pertain to solar energy. These are sub-categories of green debt securities.

For this, the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Sebi) amended norms governing issue and listing of non-convertible securities, according to a notification.

The amendment came after the board of Sebi approved a proposal in this regard in December.

As per the notification, the



watchdog has strengthened the framework for green bonds by enhancing the scope of definition of green debt security by including new modes of sustainable finance in relation to pollution prevention and control and eco-efficient products. These measures have been taken in the backdrop of increasing interest in sustainable finance in India as well as around the globe, and with a view to align the extant frame-

work for green debt securities with the updated Green Bond Principles (GBP) recognised by IOSCO.

The regulatory framework defines Green Debt Securities as debt securities issued for raising funds that are to be utilised for projects or assets falling under certain categories.

Indian companies raised nearly USD 7 billion through ESG (Environmental, Social and Governance) and green bonds in 2021 compared to USD 1.4 billion in 2020 and USD 4 billion in 2019.

Most of the green bonds issued by Indian issuers are listed on offshore exchanges as issuers are finding it more attractive to list on bourses falling outside Sebi's framework.

## Rlys to upgrade its capacity of issuing tickets

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

The railways plans to upgrade its capacity of issuing tickets from 25,000 to 2.25 lakh per minute and attending to enquiries from four lakh to 40 lakh per minute, Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said on Friday.

At a press conference here, the minister also said a target has been set to lay new railway tracks for a distance of 7,000 kilometres in financial year 2023-24.

"We plan to improve the passenger reservation system's back-end infrastructure. At present, the capacity of ticketing is around 25,000 tickets per minute. The target is to upgrade it to 2.25 lakh per minute," he said.

"The capacity for attending to enquiries will also be upgraded from four lakh per minute to 40 lakh per minute," Vaishnaw added.

## Budget focuses on growth with inclusion: NITI CEO

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

NITI Aayog CEO Parameswaran Iyer on Friday described the Budget 2023-24 as 'very comprehensive and balanced' which will promote growth with inclusion.

He also observed that the Budget continues all the reforms and other social welfare programmes undertaken by the government over the past few years.

Iyer further said the Budget has something for all, from the bottom, right up to industry to trade.

"This is a Budget which focuses on growth, with inclusion. It's very balanced, it carries on from all the reforms and other social welfare programmes which the government has undertaken over the past few years," he told PTI in an interview.

Iyer noted that the Budget focuses on infrastructure



investment, social sector, and also on reaching out to the poor and marginalised section of society.

According to Iyer, the huge focus on infrastructure and capex in the Budget will also incentivise states.

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman raised the capital expenditure by 33 per cent to Rs 10 lakh crore for infrastruc-

ture development and announced a lower fiscal deficit target of 5.9 per cent for 2023-24, while retaining it at 6.4 per cent for current financial year.

Replying to a question on the Modi government's Aspirational Block Programme (ABP), Iyer said ABP is under the Aspirational Districts Programme.

## Wheat prices fall over 10% on sale of FCI wheat

The government on Friday said wheat prices have fallen more than 10 per cent in the past one week following its decision to sell the grain in open market to check rising prices. State-run Food Corporation of India has so far sold 9.2 lakh tonnes of wheat to bulk users at an average rate of Rs 2,474 per quintal on the first two-days of e-auction held this week.

Recently, the Centre decided to offload 30 lakh tonnes of wheat from the buffer stock in the open market under the open market sale scheme (OMSS). Out of which 25 lakh tonnes will be sold to bulk consumers, flour millers, 3 lakh tonnes to institutions like Nafed and remaining 2 lakh tonnes to



state governments.

"The e-auction has already left an impact of a fall in market prices of wheat by more than 10 per cent in the past one week," the Food Ministry said in a statement.

The 'prices are set to fall further' after wheat sold in the e-auction is lifted and wheat flour (atta) is made available in the market, it said. As per the

data maintained by the consumer affairs ministry, the average all India retail price of wheat was ruling at Rs 33.47 per kg and price of wheat flour was at Rs 38.1 per kg on February 2.

On the same date in 2022, average retail price of wheat and wheat flour stood at Rs 28.11 per kg and Rs 31.14 per kg, respectively, the data showed.

## US India's top destination for goods exports

The US has emerged as India's top destination for merchandise exports during April-December this fiscal at USD 59.7 billion, Parliament was informed on Friday.

In a written reply to the Rajya Sabha, Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal said the government has taken a series of measures to promote the country's exports.

The steps include an extension of existing foreign trade policy till March 31; an extension of interest equalisation (subsidy) scheme on pre and post-shipment rupee export credit till March 31 next year; and a roll-out of Remission of Duties and Taxes on Exported Products (RoDTEP) scheme.

## 'Growth projection in Budget conservative; scope for upside'

Economic affairs secretary Ajay Seth has said that the Budget has taken conservative estimate of nominal GDP growth of 10.5 per cent with some scope for upside for the next fiscal beginning April 1.

In her fifth straight Budget, finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman has projected a nominal GDP growth of 10.5 per cent the next financial year.

"We feel that that is a conservative number with some scope for an upside, but not very significant upside. For example, in the current financial year we assumed 11 per cent and the actual is 15 per cent. So that kind of thing we don't expect next year. However, with 10.5 per cent we don't see any downside from that number," he told PTI



in an interview. With regard to real GDP, Seth said, somewhere upward of 6.5 per cent perhaps may be the number to make assumptions for the next year.

The Economic Survey 2022-23 released earlier this week too projected India's economy to grow at slower pace at 6.5 per cent in the fiscal year starting April but will remain the fastest

growing major economy in the world as it fared better in dealing with the extraordinary set of challenges the globe has faced.

India's gross domestic product (GDP) growth of 6.5 per cent in 2023-24 compares with an estimated 7 per cent expansion in current fiscal year (April 2022 to March 2023) and 8.7 per cent in the previous year.



## Tata Power Q3 net profit Rs 1,052 crore

Tata Power on Friday said its consolidated net profit almost doubled to Rs 1,052.14 crore in the quarter ended December 2022 compared to a year ago, mainly due to higher revenues.

The consolidated net profit of the company was Rs 551.89 crore in the quarter ended on December 31, 2021, a BSE filing showed.

Total income rose to Rs 14,401.95 crore in the quarter from Rs 11,018.73 crore in the same period a year ago.

## Total Energies says not re-evaluating investment in Adani companies

French energy giant TotalEnergies, which had in past years taken stakes in two Adani group listed firms, on Friday said it has not performed any re-evaluation of its holdings because of volatility in stock prices following allegations of fraud. In a statement, the French firm said its investment in Adani group entities were undertaken in full compliance with the Indian laws and its own internal governance processes.

## Moody's says stock plunge to hurt Adani's ability to raise funds

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

Moody's Investors Service on Friday warned that the rout in Adani Group shares could hurt the conglomerate's ability to raise capital, while its peer Fitch saw no immediate impact on its ratings.

Adani Group's listed companies have lost over USD 100 billion in value in just over a week after short-seller Hindenburg Research's scathing report flagged concerns about the ports-to-energy conglomerate's debt levels

and alleged stock manipulation, accounting fraud and the use of tax havens.

Adani Group has denied any wrongdoing and has threatened to sue Hindenburg.

"Given the significant and rapid decline in the market equity values of the Adani Group companies following the recent release of a short-seller report highlighting governance concerns, our immediate focus is primarily on assessing the rated entities' overall financial flexibility,

including their liquidity position and access to funding to support refinancing and ongoing growth initiatives," Moody's said in a statement.

Moody's said its ratings for Adani Ports and Special Economic Zone Ltd, Adani Green Energy Ltd, and Adani Transmission Ltd are underpinned by their regulated infrastructure businesses with long-term sales contracts, or their strong operating cash flows and dominant market position.

## Rann of Kutch to host first G 20 Tourism Working Group meet

As part of India's G20 presidency, Gujarat will host the first Tourism Working Group (TWG) meeting in the state's Rann of Kutch from February 7 to 9, an official said on Friday.

The TWG meeting, which will be attended by Union Tourism Minister G Kishan Reddy, will be the second G20 event in the state after the 'Business 20 Inception' programme held in Gandhinagar last month, he said.

## BoB Q3 net profit rises 75% on core income growth

State-owned Bank of Baroda on Friday reported a 74.76 per cent jump in its consolidated net profit at Rs 4,305.66 crore during the quarter ended December 2022, helped by improving asset quality and higher core income.

On a standalone basis, the lender's net profit jumped 75.4 per cent to Rs 3,853 crore. Without naming the embattled Adani Group, the bank's managing director and chief executive Sanjiv



Chadha told reporters that BoB's overall exposure to the ports-to-media conglomerate's entities is one-fourth of the single group

exposures allowed under the Large Exposures Framework (LEF) but refused to share a number. He said the overall exposure has declined as a percentage of the balance sheet in the last two years, and the bank does not have any asset quality concerns pertaining to it.

For the reporting quarter, the lender registered a 26.5 per cent rise in the core net interest income at Rs 10,818 crore, helped by a nearly 20 per cent growth in advances and a 0.24 per cent widening of net interest margin to 3.37 per cent.

# CBDT scheme to help dispose small appeals

The Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) will soon come out with a scheme on the Budget announcement of reducing pendency of appeals related to TDS default issues, board chairperson Nitin Gupta said.

In her Budget speech on Wednesday, Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said she proposes to deploy about 100 joint commissioners of the Income Tax department for disposal of small appeals and to reduce the pendency of appeals at the commissioner

level. "We will come up with a scheme, the appeals dealt here will be mainly relating to TDS (tax deducted at source) default, the orders on TDS default, the orders on the processing of return of income where we feel that it requires adjustment and the taxpayer feels otherwise...there could be cases of small income (under dispute)," Gupta told PNS during a post-Budget interview.

The scheme will aim to expedite the process of disposal of appeals by the first appellate authority, which is the Joint Commissioner for



Appeals, he said. Under the Income Tax scheme, an order issued by the tax authority can

be challenged by the taxpayer first before an officer holding the charge of Commissioner

(Appeals) followed by appeals to the Income Tax Appellate Tribunal (ITAT), the High Courts and the Supreme Court. The CBDT chief said the board will "divert" manpower from its present cadre to man the 100 posts of joint commissioner for this purpose.

Talking about another Budget proposal of the taxman being "more selective in taking up cases for scrutiny of returns already received this year", Gupta said this was doable because of the increased use of technology tools by the tax department and introduction of measures such as the e-ver-

ification and ITR-U. The intent behind this proposal, announced by the finance minister, is that "we are now better equipped in terms of technology to identify cases which have more potential", he said.

Technology is enabling the department to look at the mismatches -- in returns filed by the taxpayer and data available with the tax authority -- and deepen and widen the tax base, Gupta said. He said about 10 lakh updated returns (ITR-U) have been filed by taxpayers till now. "We are of the view that we can pick better cases for

scrutiny... selection of cases can be more incisive and more specific and mismatch can be taken care through the route of e-verification. This will help to reduce litigation too," the CBDT chief said. According to officials, the tax department

currently picks a very "miniscule" number of cases, post filing of the returns, for limited or full scrutiny where an assessee is supposed to provide a number of documents, proofs and explanations to satisfy queries.





# Inspired by tradition, infused by modernity

Angelique Dhama, founder of Obeetee Carpets, aims to spread the 100-year-old tradition of the carpet-making company across India. A few months ago, the century-old Obeetee Carpets launched its first-ever flagship store in Hyderabad at Jubilee Hills.

For this week's edition of Hyderabad, The Pioneer connects with Angelique Dhama, who shares what she likes about the city and why Hyderabad could be the best place for someone who's just starting out.

Born in Calcutta, Angelique pursued her English Honors degree and, soon after graduating, took up the role of a flight attendant. The repetitiveness of the job pushed her to make the much-needed switch. Although she initially found it difficult to find a job that would pay an equal amount, in 1996, a businessman who was setting up retail operations in Kathmandu, Nepal, approached her. He was keen on hiring someone with no experience and fixed notions about the retail industry.

The 22-year-old Angelique took up the job, and for one year she spent time understanding the trade. After her training period, she moved to Chennai and set up successful luxury brands like Swarovski and Lladro. Angelique mastered the retail trade and stuck with the company for 11 years. Then she made a segue into the fashion industry and worked in Bombay for three years before she moved to Timex.

Her journey with Obeetee began ten years ago when she got a call to join the company. "At first, I was hesitant because I had previously worked with very large brands. I was not aware of the legacy. The person who called me said, 'Angelique, you've been selling international brands in India. Now, you start selling Indian brands international-

ly". It sounded interesting. So, I took up that experience, and for the last two years, I wanted to make sure that this brand was known in India. We opened our stores in Delhi, Mumbai, and now Hyderabad. We're also planning to launch a store in Kolkata," said Angelique.

In the process of setting up the first ever Obeetee store in Hyderabad, she has travelled to the city six times now, and she shared, "When you come from North India to set up something in South India, you are a bit skeptical. The scepticism comes from, 'Will we be accepted?' That's the big challenge. I have lived in Chennai for eight years. The people are really lovely there, but there is a language barrier. So it was quite challenging. Before we launched the store in Hyderabad, we did some reconnaissance and met some



architects and interior designers, and I was made to feel very welcome. Everybody was very excited that all the brands were finally coming to Hyderabad. They were happy that they didn't have to go outside to source products. Most of the time, they were either going to Delhi, Bombay, or Bengaluru. For the last two years, brands have been eyeing Hyderabad."

Talking more about the City of Nawabs, Angelique said, "I really like the Hyderabad biryani, and it's a beautiful city with lovely people. We did this show and met around 100 architects, and everyone was so warm. People here don't say things just for the sake of it. If they say they'll come, they come and support us. Also, the city shares that synergy with carpets, and people need no introduction to carpets here. The city is used to the culture of carpets, and it's not a new culture. It's just a matter of availability."

Looking at how enthusiastically she spoke about the city, we wondered if she'd ever move here in the near future. When asked about it, she quipped, "I'm done with all that experimentation. I am from Kolkata, and I worked in Chennai, Mumbai, and now Delhi. I have a pretty stable family life in Delhi. There's no chance of me rooting and coming to another city."

However, she has some interesting things to say to those who are considering making a move to Hyderabad. "When my colleague asked me if she could be posted in the city, I asked her what's so exciting about the city. You know, there's this buzz that's happening in the city. You guys are having a moment. The city is expanding in terms of technology and infrastructure, such as roads and buildings, and it would be wonderful to live here. There's a lovely airport where you land, and there's definitely a method to the madness. The whole city looks beautiful."

She further added: "I think I would say that expect a very westernised South City. When you go to the south, you think it's very traditional and conventional, but with this city, there's heritage also, and suddenly you'll see rocks coming out of a building, and then there's a huge multinational building. You know, it is a happening place, and for youngsters who're going to start out in their careers, it is an amazing place."

"We definitely want to be one of the top three brands in India when it comes to home. For the first time, there's a standalone store in Hyderabad. We came here with a lot of conviction because we believe there is a market here," Angelique concluded.



# Case 'load' of overwhelmed oncologists

As per the cancer registry data, it is estimated that there will be about 800,000 new cancer cases in our country every year — alarming is the only emotion we can express right now. With a predominantly clinical approach to managing cancer, the relentless onslaught of cases not only causes distress to increase numbers of patients and caregivers but also puts oncologists and the healthcare system under inordinate stress!

"There are many reasons that this consideration is important, especially in a country with a ratio of one medical oncologist per 3000 new patients a year. For one, we cannot afford long consultations with such caseloads, even though longer consultation times are proven to lead to better health outcomes. Further, burnout is experienced by 20%-70% of practicing oncologists worldwide, leading to medical errors, professional misconduct, or leaving medical practice altogether. Reducing the case-load will improve the capacity of the healthcare system to deliver quality care, yielding more positive patient outcomes. This can be achieved by the twin approaches of prevention and palliation," enlightened Dr. Vishal Rao, Group Director for Head & Neck Surgical Oncology and Robotic Surgery at HCG Cancer Centre.

Up to 50% of cancer cases are preventable, though avoiding cancer altogether is tricky because we are all exposed to the ever-growing list of carcinogens to some degree. We can however take measures appropriate to our risk profiles.

For example, Dr. Rajesh Kumar Reddy, an Uro Oncologist at AINU shared something serious about urological cancers: "Theme of the close the care gap campaign is to address the inequities in cancer care is continued this year. Cancers found in the urinary and male reproductive organs are one of the most common tumors encountered in clinical practice. Risk factors of cancer development can be broadly divided into biological factors and lifestyle-related factors like consumption of tobacco products and alcohol, obesity, and dietary factors. Then there is environmental exposure and occupational risk factors like many chemicals, radioactive materials, and asbestos. The deadliest is the infectious cause which is the Human Papillomavirus! Early detection of cancer significantly increases the chances of successful treatment. Some signs of cancer include lumps or swellings, sores that fail to heal, blood in the urine, unexplained loss of weight, and loss of appetite. However, for all practical purposes most of the cancers, genitourinary cancers, in particular, are silent in the initial stages. These can only be detected with regular health screenings by means of lab tests or imaging. With the advent of recent technologies in medical care, cancer cure has become a possible entity for localised cancers. Robotic surgeries revolutionised urological cancer care over the past decade! Surgical robot featuring endo-wrist technology and 3D vision enables surgeons to perform surgical dissection with great precision. The advantages are minimal blood loss and fewer chances of injuring surrounding organs. A clear-cut benefit is seen for prostate cancer surgeries where nerve preservation is possible to preserve urinary continence as well as potency. The earlier the better is the final take-home message. This enables urologists to perform minimally invasive, organ-preserving surgeries with curative intent!" Meanwhile, Dr. Vishal shared, "The real struggle lies in managing the social

determinants of health outside of individual control. Life today is hurried and intense, with crowded living conditions, increasing pollution, financial pressures, uncontrolled consumption, sensationalising media playing up threats around us, and so on. We need to introspect and collaborate as a society to reduce these triggers. Palliation enters the picture when the disease has taken root. Treatment protocols include chemotherapy, immunotherapy, radiation, or surgical measures. Each is accompanied by a host of side effects such as nausea, gastrointestinal distress, fatigue, anxiety, and depression. But patients and caregivers experience pain and discomfort well before this point. Cancer is so feared that

free life during and after treatment. Altogether, it would result in better health outcomes across the board."

On the other hand, Dr. Madhu Devarasetty, senior consultant surgical oncologist and minimal invasive surgeon at KIMS Hospitals, stressed that the revolution in cancer care with technological advancements must reach village level too where cancer care needs to be streamlined. "This can be addressed by establishing more centers at the district level and recruiting more specialists. Organising more screening camps, promoting awareness through social media, and enriching knowledge through websites will help this society to know more about cancer. It's very important to know that most cancers are curable if they are detected early in breast cancer, thyroid cancer, colorectal cancer, etc. Awareness in society and standardisation of treatment will enable to close of the care gap," he added.

Seconding Dr. Dr. Madhu Devarasetty, Dr. Srinath Bharadwaj, consultant oncologist, Apollo Hospitals, Jubilee Hills, listed five major scientific milestones which have made a huge impact in care for cancer in the past decade.

## Immunotherapy:

This is definitely one of the path breaking discoveries in the past decade. Tumors grow in our body by evading / misleading our immune system. This therapy brings back the cancer under the radar of our immune system and increases the effectiveness of other therapies in turn providing longer periods of remission. Significant impact has been seen in many cancers especially Lung cancer.

## Next generation sequencing:

Massive Parallel Sequencing of tumor DNA / RNA to detect specific mutations in the genome which could have been the cause of his / her cancer. Once a mutation is detected, we also get to know if this is hereditary and if there is any drug which can target this mutation. This makes Cancer treatments more personalized. BRCA gene testing in breast and ovarian cancers, EGFR, ALK, Ros testing in lung cancers, MSI testing in colonic and many other cancers are examples.

## Targeted therapies:

These medicines are a direct consequence of our ability to delineate targets in individual tumors through various molecular tests including Next Generation Sequencing. Most of the targeted therapies come in tablet form which makes administration very easy for the patients and avoids multiple chemotherapy injections.

## PROTON therapy:

The therapies previously discussed are either tablets or injections. This therapy is a form of Radiation therapy. Conventional Radiation therapy Consists of Photons generated at Mega voltage to treat cancers. In proton therapy particles called Protons are used instead of photons to improve precision and decrease side effects and Apollo is the first hospital to introduce it in India. This is most useful in treating tumors which are nearby critical organs like brain and spinal cord.

## Developments in supportive care:

Array of new Medicines have come up in the last decade which are much more effective in tackling nausea and vomiting associated with chemotherapies. Scalp cooling machines are available which prevent hair loss for patients on chemotherapy. Various interventions from Radiology and Pain Medicine have made treatments more tolerable and the journey of fight against cancer more comfortable than ever before.

He continued, "The crucial significance of palliation cannot be understated. Early initiation of palliative care has been proven to reduce depression and anxiety because of its holistic, empathetic approach. Patients are also empowered on the clinical front because palliative care professionals ensure they are well-informed of the appropriate use of different medical treatments, can identify their own preferences, and are mentally prepared for possible outcomes. Everyone stands to gain when oncologists' caseloads are reduced through prevention and palliation. Systemic efforts are necessary to build awareness of prevention, and the capacity to provide palliative care. At the same time, each individual must do what is necessary for their particular positions, starting from the person taking adequate healthy measures to avoid meeting an oncologist, all the way to someone living a fulfilling and pain-

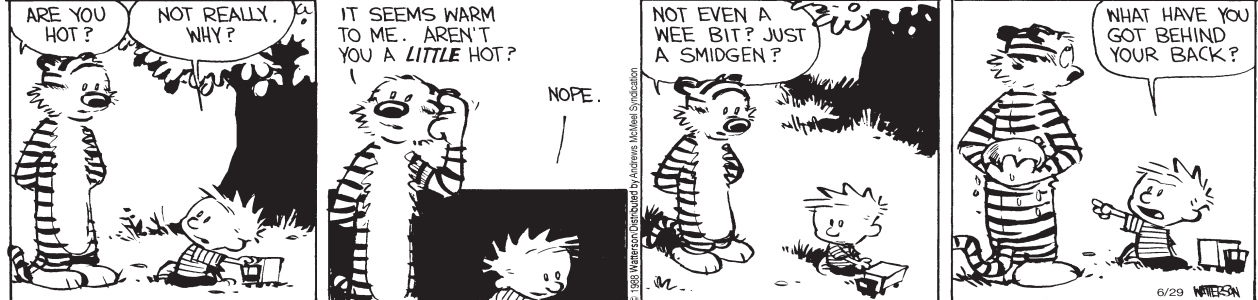

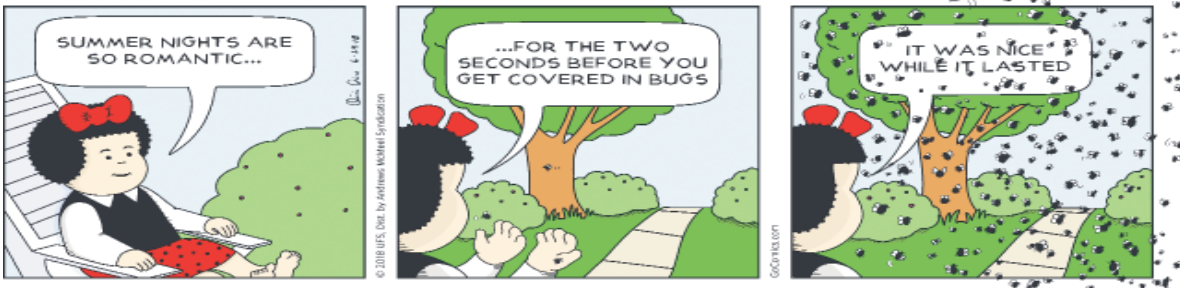

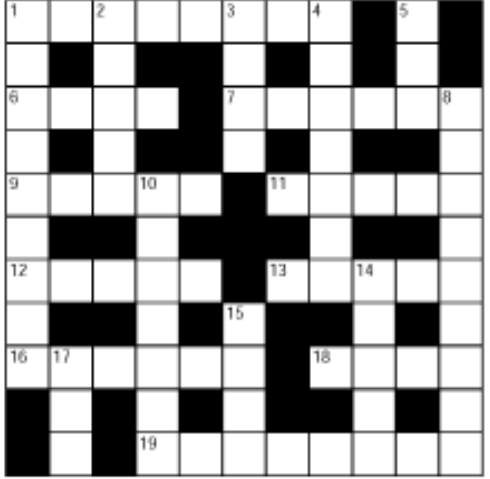

# Michael

## Sandeep Kishan tries to break the curse but gangster film falls apart

Produced by Karan C Productions LLP and Sree Venkateswara Cinemas LLP, and directed by Ranjit Jayakodi, *Michael* features Sandeep Kishan, Gautam Vasudev Menon, Varun Sandesh, Divyansha Kaushik, Vijay Sethupathi and Varalaxmi Sarathkumar in important roles. The film was simultaneously released in Telugu, Tamil, Malayalam, Kannada, and Hindi on Friday.

With erstwhile 1980s and '90s Bombay as its backdrop, the story revolves around *Michael* (Sandeep Kishan), who's a loner and is fixated on the end goal of killing his father. Right from the onset, *Michael's* ideals are made clear to the audience. In the opening sequence of the film, where the local vendor beats his woman for asking money to feed her kid, the angry young *Michael* who's around the corner gets up, puts his plate down, washes his hands, goes straight to the store, and stabs the man. He grabs the cash from the counter and gives it to the woman. He says, "You shouldn't beg for the things that belong to you. You should just take it."

When the woman enquires in a loud tone, "What's your name?", the young *Michael* simply wears his "Walkman headset" and walks

away. The evidently emotional woman says, "One day the whole world will notice you!"

The entire story is narrated from the perspective of Swamy (Ayyappa P. Sharma), who's kidnapped by a rival gang. The narrative initially begins in the 80s and makes a quick transition into the 90s. For the most part, the film lingers in the 90s.

Gautam Vasudev Menon plays Gurnunath, a powerful gangster. Gurnunath is feared by every other gang in the city and he's not the regular villain. He reads William Shakespeare's *Macbeth* and Ernest Hemingway's *The Old Man and the Sea* in his free time. Young *Michael* grabs the attention of Gurnunath and the gangster takes a liking to the kid's attitude and agrees to help him kill his father. Years later, the grown-up *Michael* saves Gurnunath's life from the rival gangs. This makes their bond special and often brothers Gurnunath's wife and son.

Gurnunath's wife Charulatha (Anasuya) is a cunning woman who's always worried about losing her spot and goes to any extent to keep her son Amarnath (Varun Sandesh) in contention for the throne. At one point, she burns down the house of a club singer for having an affair with Gurnunath. Bonkers! Isn't it?

Varun Sandesh hits it out of the park with

this particular role. Everything about his performance is praiseworthy. He reminds us of Fredo Corleone from *The Godfather* (1972). He's mentally weak, often giving in to the pleasures of life and he wants that approval from his stoic father. He's caught up in this circle of proving his worth. In a nutshell, Amarnath is like the "Merchant of *Venom!*"

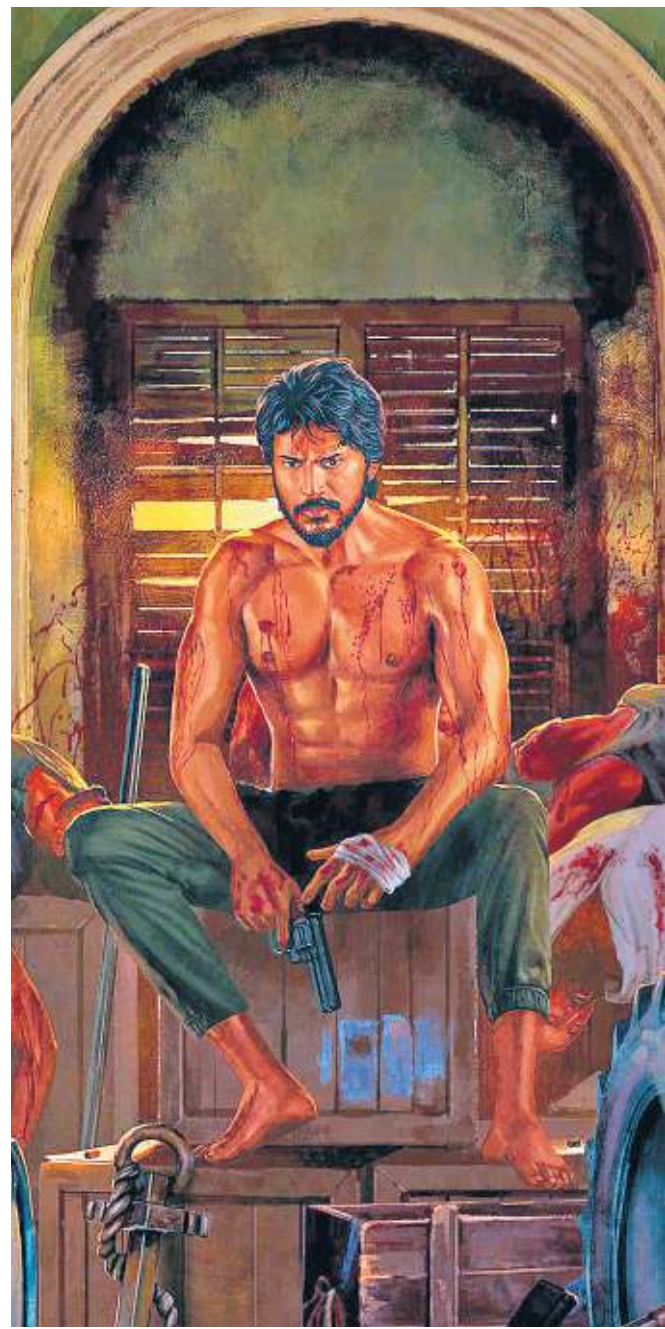
The driving plot point occurs when Gurnunath asks the grown-up *Michael* to kill the last of the six men involved in plotting against him. *Michael* sets off to Delhi to find the suspect. Here he meets Theera (Divyansha Kaushik) and everything goes downhill from there in *Michael's* life. In his interaction with the media, Sandeep described the film as a romantic drama set in the evil world of gangsters. This hinders the narration and tests our patience. The film is a slow burn. It has its momentary highs but it keeps falling flat. It shines at one moment and slips away the very next moment. If romance was supposed to be the film's main theme, the filmmaker certainly didn't succeed in packing it well. All said, it leaves the audience wanting for more of that romance from the lead pair. Divyansha plays her part with great conviction.

The best thing about the film is its aesthetic value. Ranjit excels in getting the best out

of cinematographer Kiran Koushik. The shots literally teleport you to the 90s. Each frame is pure gold. The orange-teal color palette looks fantastic on the big screen giving you a sense of visual cinematic brilliance. Editor R. Sathyanarayanan's editing is crisp and he makes no mistake in spoiling the flow of the film. The music scored by Sam C.S. enhances the highs and covers up the low points in the film. Sandeep Kishan carries the film on his shoulders. He's fit and looks the part and this has to be one of his best performances to date. Vijay Sethupathi and Varalaxmi Sarathkumar play a couple and make their entry in the second half. They do their usual thing with sheer perfection but the film would have been so much more enticing if their characters had more screen time.

Director Ranjit Jayakodi shows his technical brilliance. The film is a visual spectacle in the neo-noir genre. Let me put it this way, you will think the film is aging like fine wine. The content is packed in a glossy-looking bottle. However, the wine tastes just fine and it doesn't keep you buzzed for a long time either. *Michael* is a fantastic attempt by Sandeep Kishan to break his jinx at the box office but it is far from being the best film in the gangster genre.

Today, as a doting mother, she is leading a very satisfying personal and creative life and says, "When I look back, I

realise that I have taken every big and small decision with complete conviction and never let circumstances or societal pressures change my trajectory. There is great joy in carving your own path and in exercising agency in every aspect of your life."

Dia continues to display the same mindful decision-making in the roles she is choosing today and says, "Yes, I tend to gravitate towards characters that do their bit to break gender stereotypes. Over the years, I have come to see a bit of me in them and a bit of them in myself because regardless of their circumstances, they have held on to a certain point of view and a very clear idea of who they are."

Her recent work in Sakshi Gurnani's short film *Gray*, in Anubhav Sinha's feature *Thappad* and her award-winning portrayal of Kainaaz in the ZEE5 series *Kaafir* encompassed diverse female characters who had something important to say. Dia says, "I played a therapist in *Gray* who simplifies the meaning of consent for a survivor

of forced intimacy. In *Thappad*, my character Shivani Fonseca, was a strong, independent, single woman who refuses to gaslight a victim of domestic abuse and very firmly articulates her take on the matter. Kainaaz of course was a deep dive into a woman's trauma whose humanity has been brutalised by border politics. Yet, her resilience, grace and dignity are phenomenal."

Dia is also very excited about her forthcoming film *Dhak Dhak*. This is a road movie about the journey of a lifetime where she plays a hijab. The best way to make kids know this story is to watch it."

Australia have roped in Maheesh Pithiya, a 21-year-old spinner with uncanny resemblance to Ravichandran Ashwin, to train on spin-friendly tracks as part of their preparation for the upcoming Test series against India.

Off-spinner Ashwin may prove to be a major threat for Australia, who haven't won a Test series in India since 2004.

Expecting spin to play a major role in the four-Test series, the visitors have opted for tailor-made pitches and have availed the services of Pithiya to get accustomed to the action of Ashwin.

The four-Test series begins in Nagpur on February 9.

"Of all the stops Australia have pulled out to prepare for their trip to India, the most noticeable at their Test tour's first training session was the presence of a Ravichandran Ashwin duplicate," a report in cricket.Com.Au said.

"With facing spin the major focus on Thursday, Pithiya was the standout among the local 'netties', bowling tirelessly and virtually without break through the day as he troubled the likes of Smith, Marnus Labuschagne and Travis Head, who all had long batting sessions."

Pithiya, interestingly, didn't see Ashwin bowl until the age of 11. Growing up in Junagadh, Gujarat he didn't have access to TV and when he finally watched the India

## Aussies will miss Zampa's ability to zip ball: Sriram

Former Australia assistant coach Sridharan Sriram is disappointed that spinner Adam Zampa is not with the touring team for the four-match Test series against India beginning on February 9.

Sriram said that Zampa was someone who could "hold" his action for long periods of time like Ravichandran Ashwin and Ravindra Jadeja, something which Ashton Agar and Mitchell Swepson might find difficult in tough subcontinental conditions.

Veteran tweaker Nathan Lyon, Agar, leg-spinner Swepson and young off-spinner Todd Murphy got the nod in the 18-

member Australia squad with Zampa missing out.

Sriram, who served the Australian team for six years, has seen Zampa evolve his game, and felt the 30-year-old wrist spinner's ability to zip the ball would be hugely missed by Pat Cummins' side during the Border-Gavaskar series.

"I would have personally loved to see Zamps bowl here (in India), because he's got the pace, he's got that zip off the pitch," Sriram was quoted as saying by 'Sydney Morning Herald' on Friday.

"That's something I keep an eye out for, who has got the ability to beat you off the pitch, so I think that Zamps has got that,"

said Sriram who has also played eight ODIs for India between 2000 and 2004.

Sriram, also a domestic heavyweight having scored more than 9,500 first-class runs, added Zampa was extremely keen to tour India and had even called him up a couple of times.

"He wanted it more than anyone, he wanted to play Test matches in India, he had called me a couple of times a couple of months ago saying 'Sri, I'm so excited that I could be on that tour', so he wanted it and he started to play first-class cricket for NSW. He did well, three wickets in each innings, so he's pretty disappointed that he's not on this tour."

ace in action against the West Indies in 2013, he started idolising him.

The youngster, who made his first-class debut in December for Baroda, was flown in for the four-day training camp at the KSCA Ground in nearby Alur by Australia after seeing his footages in social media.

It was Pritesh Joshi — one of the bowlers giving throw downs to

the Australian batters with the 'side-arm' aid — who first brought Pithiya to the attention of assistant coach Andre Borovec.

He also arranged for Mehrotra Shashank, a left-arm spinner who played first-class cricket for Hyderabad, to attend the camp.

"While no spinner in the world can perfectly mimic the challenge Ashwin will pose in this series, facing Pithiya over the coming days

will at least help the Australians come to terms with the visual cues of the world's top-ranked Test spin bowler," the report said.

"The Aussie batters were also tested out by a self-described throwdown specialist Khaleel Shariff, who has worked with numerous Indian Premier League teams and was known to coach Andrew McDonald and Vettori from their time at RCB.



## India's 2007 T20 WC hero Joginder Sharma announces retirement

Former India medium pacer Joginder Sharma, who bowled the iconic match-winning final over in the 2007 World T20 summit clash against Pakistan, on Friday announced retirement from all forms of cricket.

The 39-year-old represented India in four ODIs and as many T20s between 2004 and 2007, picking five wickets. He played domestic cricket for Haryana.

"My journey from 2002-2017 has been the most wonderful years of my life for it was an honour representing India at the highest level of sport," he said in a message posted on Twitter.

"To all my team-mates, coaches, mentors and support staff: It has been an absolute privilege to have played with you all, and, I thank you all for helping turn my dream into reality."

Handed the ball by skipper MS Dhoni in the final over of the inaugural T20 World Cup final, the inexperienced

Sharma bowled India to victory, scripting one of the most iconic moments in the history of cricket.

Pakistan were well on course for a famous win with Misbah-ul-Haq reducing the equation to six runs off four balls. But the Pakistan batter mis-timed a scoop shot with Sreesanth completing a simple catch at short fine-leg to help India lift the trophy.

However, the final was Sharma's last game for India.

He turned out for Chennai Super Kings in the IPL before joining the police service where he served as the deputy superintendent of police and was on the frontline during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Sharma added that he will be exploring new opportunities in the game.

"I am excited to announce that I will be exploring new opportunities in the world of cricket & the business side of it, where I will also continue to participate in the sport that I love and challenge myself in new and different environment."

## Fit-again Jamieson hopes to make it count against Eng

New Zealand pace bowler Kyle Jamieson is hoping to get his rhythm back after returning to the squad for the upcoming two-Test series against England following a long injury layoff.

The lanky seamer had to leave the field during the second Test against England at Trent Bridge due to a stress reaction in his back in June last year and since then has not played an international game.

He was included on Friday in the 14-member New Zealand squad for the Test series against England beginning at Mount Maunganui on February 16.

Jamieson, who has made a successful return to domestic cricket, will now be targeting a spot in the playing XI following his extended period of rehabilitation.

"It's nice to be included in the squad and back in the fold for the first time in a while," Jamieson told SEN Radio.

"My body is feeling good, I'm excited to be back with the group ... I've been bowling plenty of overs in practice and in training, I just need to get used to the rhythm of playing again. I've been bowling to empty nets for a long time so to see a few batters in the middle and see the ball get hit, it's a bit of a change."

He said he had full faith in coach Gary Stead and the support staff despite New Zealand having last won a Test series in 2021.



"Yeah, of course," said Jamieson.

"That's not something we've really thought about because there's so much confidence from the playing group in our coaching staff."

He added that the New Zealand side was a tight-knit unit where players had complete faith in the coaching staff.

"I'm not sure if it (pressure) is there or not, we sort of keep a pretty tight-knit circle. I have complete faith in our group and what we can do."

Jamieson is expected to play just one Test in series as his

recovery is monitored, and the pacer said the decision on which match he will play will depend on the conditions.

"It is a little bit different, the first Test will be under the lights with the pink ball. Wellington (venue for the second Test) with the red ball, it tends to be more seamer-friendly than the Mount (Maunganui)," he said.

"But at the Mount (Maunganui) with the pink ball under lights, it could be pretty spicy as well. We'll see how it unfolds and how it goes up there."

"The Women's Premier League is such an exciting addition to the cricket landscape. The opportunity to be involved in the inaugural season with the Adani Sportline owned Gujarat Giants and work with the brilliant Mithali Raj is something I'm really looking forward to," said Haynes.
