India's military might, diversity on show

The 74th Republic Day parade on Kartavya Path saw 'Agniveers' participate for the first time Women and 'Shramyogis' got place of prominence

India on Thursday displayed its military prowess and cultural diversity during the Republic Day parade at Kartavya Path with special focus on 'nari shakti (women empowerment)' and 'atmanirbharta (self-reliance)' in Defence production. 'Agniveers' took part in the parade for the first time since the Aginpath scheme for recruitment in the armed forces was launched in June last year.

President Droupadi Murmu took the salute and Egypt President Abdel Fattah El-Sisi was the chief guest. A marching contingent from his country also took part in the parade to celebrate the 74th Republic Day of India.

A group of 'Shramyogis' involved in the construction of the Central Vista, the Kartavya Path, and the new Parliament Building, along with milk, vegetable, and street vendors were specially invited for the parade.

BBC docu wildfire spreads across States

Ignoring police crackdown students in Hyderabad, Mumbai watch film, Kerala Cong screens it too

PNS NEW DELHI

Tgnoring the police crackdown Lon students in several varsities for screening of the BBC documentary 'India: The Modi Question, student bodies in Hyderabad and Mumbai and the Congress in Kerala on Thursday

screened the documentary. The Centre last week directed blocking of multiple YouTube videos and Twitter posts sharing links to the documentary. Meanwhile, student groups at Kolkata's Presidency and Jadavpur universities and Mumbai's Tata Institute of Social Sciences have planned multiple screenings of the controversial BBC documentary on their cam-

puses over the next few days. Though there is no declared ban on viewing the documentary, universities have disallowed students from screening it and the police have cracked down on those defying the unofficial firman. The Kerala Pradesh Congress Committee (KPCC) on Thursday screened the BBC documentary at the Shanghumugham beach here

for the general public. The screening of the documentary on the 2002 Gujarat riots when Prime Minister Narendra Modi helmed the western State was first done at

the KPCC headquarters here for its staff and party workers, KPCC general secretary GS
Babu said. He further said the response indicates that people want to know what is there in the documentary and what it is all about. Various wings of the Congress have already screened the first part of the documentary

in several parts of the State. In Hyderabad, the Student Federation of India (SFI) of the University of Hyderabad (UoH) screened the two-part BBC documentary for over 500 students at the campus' North Hostel Gate

on Thursday evening. SFI HCU president Abhishek Nandan said the SFI is not looking for any altercation with the ABVP, which is currently screening 'The Kashmir Files.'

"We do not want to create any ruckus or fight with the ABVP. In fact, we do not want any kind of disturbance. Students just want to watch the BBC documentary," Nandan said.

Meanwhile, the police in Chennai briefly detained A Priyadharshini, the Greater Chennai Corporation (GCC) Councillor for Teynampet, on Thursday, during a protest against the Union Government's decision to block links on the BBC documentary on Prime Minister Modi.

Several students were detained on Wednesday at Jami University in Delhi for trying to screen the documentary. The Students of JNU and Punjab University have also tried to screen the documentary on the

'ED's power confined to probing PMLA cases'

Can't assume predicate offence committed: HC

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

The Delhi High Court has held that the Enforcement Directorate (ED) has the power to investigate and inquire into an offence of money laundering under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) only and it cannot assume that a predicate offence has

been committed. The High Court said the predicate offence has to be necessarily investigated and tried by authorities empowered by law in that regard and the ED cannot possibly arrogate unto itself the

power to investigate into the alleged commission of those offences. "What needs to be emphasised is that the PMLA empowers the ED to investigate

Section 3 offences only.

"Its power to investigate and enquire stands confined to offence of money laundering as defined in that Section. However, the same cannot be read as enabling it to assume from the material, that it may gather in the course of that investigation, that a predicate offence stands committed.

"The predicate offence has to be necessarily investigated and tried by authorities empowered by law in that regard," Justice Yashwant Varma said in a 111 page judgement.

AAP moves SC, seeks mayoral polls in time-bound manner

The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) candidates for the Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) mayoral polls, Shelly Oberoi Goyal and Mukesh, have moved the Supreme Court for the completion of the election in a time-bound manner.

The AAP leaders also sought the top court's intervention for the prohibition on voting by Aldermen as per law. On the other hand, the BJP has accused the AAP and Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal of diverting the issue, saying it was the AAP leaders who created chaotic scenes in the House which led to the adjournment for the second time. The Congress said it was a political stunt to go to the top court for holding

Mayoral polls. The MCD House was adjourned on January 24 without electing the Mayor and Deputy Mayor amid a ruckus by some Councillors. This was the second time in three weeks wherein a ruckus broke out in the House minutes after the nominated members and Councillors were sworn in and the mayoral poll was going to start. The AAP and the BJP blamed each other for the ruckus. Accusing the BJP of hooliganism and halting MCD House proceedings, AAP national spokesperson Saurabh Bharadwaj said that the Leader of the House, Mukesh Goel, and mayor candidate Shelly Oberoi approached the top court to allow the mayoral elections be conducted in a time-bound manner. Mission to study Sun likely to be launched by June-July: ISRO

Indian Institute of Astrophysics (IIA) on Thursday handed over to ISRO, the Visible Line Emission Coronagraph (VELC), the primary payload on board Aditya-L1, which is India's first dedicated scientific mission to study the Sun, to be launched by June

The handing over ceremony was held in the presence of the ISRO Chairman S Somanath at the Centre for Research and Education in Science and Technology (CREST) campus of IIA near

IIA said it has successfully finished assembling, testing and calibrating the VELC, which is the largest and one of the most technically challenging of the seven payloads/telescopes that will fly on Aditya-L1, at its CREST campus.

ISRO will now conduct further testing of VELC and its eventual integration with the Aditya-L1 spacecraft, it said in

Congratulating the VELC team, Somanath said the launch of Aditya-L1 is expect-

ed to be around June or July. He said, "Understanding the effect of the Sun on Earth and its surroundings has become very important now and Aditya-L1 aims to shed light on this topic. It has taken 15 years for VELC from concept to completion, and this period was needed for a com-

Aditya L1 is the first spacebased Indian mission to study the Sun from a halo orbit around the Lagrangian point 1 1) of the Sun-Earth system.

This mission with seven payloads on board to observe the photosphere, chromosphere and the outermost layers of the Sun (the corona) will provide greater advantage of observing the solar activities and its effect on space weather, according to officials of Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO).

Noting that ISRO aims to play an important role in future science experiments in space and an ecosystem needs to be created for this, including a roadmap for the next few decades, Somnath said ISRO encourages Indian scientists to come up with new and novel ideas for future space science instruments that have not been done before by others in the world. "Many students tell me that they want to become

astrophysicists and institutes like IIA should further enhance their efforts to explain their work to the public," he said. IIA Director Prof. Annapurni Subramaniam, who released the official logo of the VELC payload, said "VELC is a team

load after it is operational. The space solar mission was initially conceived as Aditya-1 with a 400 kg class satellite carrying one payload (VELC), and was planned to be launched in an 800 km low earth orbit.

Since a satellite placed in a halo orbit around the L1 of the Sun-Earth system has the major advantage of continuously viewing the Sun without any occultation/eclipses, the mission was revised to Aditya-L1, and it would now be inserted in a halo orbit around the L1, which is 1.5 million km

Sun. The other six payloads are: Solar Ultraviolet Imaging Telescope, Aditya Solar Wind Particle Experiment, Plasma Analyser Package for Aditya, Solar Low Energy X-ray Spectrometer, High Energy L1 Orbiting X-ray Spectrometer and Magnetometer

The scientific studies by the satellite will enhance our current understanding of the Solar Corona and also provide vital data for space weather studies". ISRO officials said.

The Principal Investigator of the VELC payload, Prof Raghavendra Prasad explained that no other solar coronagraph in space has the ability to image the solar corona as close to the solar disk as VELC can.

"It can image it as close as 1.05 times the solar radius. It can also do imaging, spectroscopy and polarimetry at the same time, and can take observations at a very high resolution (level of detail) and many times a second", he said, adding that this capability will revolutionise solar astronomy around the world and the data is expected to answer many outstanding problems in the field.

Former Chairman of ISRO A S Kiran Kumar said, VELC is not a trivial piece of engineering and it has taken 15 years to produce such a complex system. "This augurs well for future space missions and I look forward to more such novel space science missions in

"This is a point we make in our relationships around the world. It's certainly a point we've made in India as well," he added. Last week, UK Prime Minister Rishi Sunak defended Prime Minister Modi and distanced himself from the BBC documentary series, saying he "does not agree with the characterisation" of his Indian counterpart.

The BBC's two-part series on Modi's tenure as the Chief Minister of Gujarat (during the 2002 riots) sparked a major controversy and hence, was removed from social media platforms.

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) had responded to the BBC story by saying it was entirely biased. "We think this is a propaganda piece. This has no objectivity. This is biased. Do note that this hasn't been screened in India. We do not want to answer more on this so that this does not get much dignity," MEA spokesperson Arindam Bagchi had said

> Suraksha programme. A rollout of iNCOVACC is expected to begin in private hospitals that have placed advance orders. An initial manufacturing capacity of several million doses per annum has been established, this can be scaled up to a billion doses as required.

The High Court said, "The primary function to investigate and try such offences remains and vests in authorities constituted under those independent statutes...In any case, it (ED) cannot and on its own motion proceed on the surmise that a particular set of facts evidence the commission of a scheduled offence and based on that opinion initiate action under the PMLA."

It said if in the course of its enquiry and investigation, ED was to come to the conclusion that the material in its possession evidences the commission of an offence created under any other enactment, it would be obliged to furnish requisite information in respect thereof to the agency concerned for necessary action.

The high court's verdict came while allowing two separate petitions filed by Prakash Industries Limited and Prakash Thermal Power Limited challenging the Provisional Attachment Orders (PAO) issued by the ED on November 29, 2018. The proceedings drawn by the ED emanate from an allocation of the Fatehpur Coal Block in Chhattisgarh.

It was alleged that the two companies misrepresented their net worth to procure coal block. An FIR was lodged by the CBI under the provisions of the Indian Penal Code and Prevention of Corruption Act. Based on the FIR, the ED registered an Enforcement Case Information Report on the allegations relating to share price manipulation and generation of proceeds of crime from such

Later, the allocation of coal block was cancelled following the Supreme Court's judgement in 2014. The high court quashed the November 29, 2018 PAO as well as the original complaint. It also dealt with the objection raised by ED counsel that in view of the directions of the Supreme Court, the high court would not be permissible to either entertain these petitions or take cognisance of the challenged raised.

The ED counsel referred to the July 25, 2014 order passed by the apex court in the coal

was held that any prayer for stay or any order impeding the progress of investigation relating to coal block allocations would be liable to be placed before the special court only and that no other court could entertain the same.

The high court, however, said it was unable to accede to the preliminary objection raised by ED and said the special court which came to be constituted was so identified solely to deal with and exclusively try offences emanating from coal block allocations and for the trial of offences that may have been alleged to have been committed either under the IPC, PC Act and PMLA.

The direction for transfer of pending cases also clearly appears to be confined to criminal matters arising out of coal block allocations," it said, adding that those directions cannot possibly be construed or interpreted as extending to PAOs that may be made under PMLA. Justice Varma said the spe-

cial judge constituted to try criminal cases and offences would clearly lack the authority to either deal with or rule upon the validity of PAOs that may be made.
"If the submission addressed by and on behalf of

the ED in this regard were be accepted, it would also amount to short circuiting the adjudicatory mechanism with respect to attachment orders as structured and placed in terms of the provision of the Act," the high court said. It said the apex court's

directions cannot be construed as denuding the high court of the jurisdiction to entertain a challenge relating to a PAO and the exercise of power by the ED under Section 5 of the

If the submissions of ED are accepted, it would essentially amount to recognising a power inhering in the special judge to not only don the robes of the adjudicating authority but to also deprive the appellate forums of the jurisdiction to decide appeals against the orders that may ultimately come to be passed under section 8 of

The case is likely to be taken up on Friday, AAP leaders said. Bharadwaj said that the party has also sought a prohibition on voting by aldermen as per law. "We have placed two Court, the first is to elect the mayor in a time-bound manner and form the Government in the MCD. Second, as aldermen do not have the right to vote under Article 243R of the Constitution and Section 3 of the DMC Act, they should be prohibited from casting votes,'

"They have no moral right to capture and illegally control the MCD for so long. The MCD was put under the central Government on the pretext of unification and delimitation works. People of Delhi gave the AAP the mandate in the MCD and despite that, the BJP resorted to dirty politics.

They (BJP) have been creating ruckus and not allowing the mayoral elections to be conducted in the House," he alleged. Lashing out at the

AAP for approaching court, BJP State working president Virendra Sachdeva alleged that Kejriwal and the AAP have been misleading the public and that they have no faith in the Constitution.

"Whenever they have to divert people's attention from their mistakes, they move the decision doesn't favour them, they refuse to accept it. The AAP should also tell the court how it resorted to hooliganism in the House, who threw the mic and which party's councillors climbed the chair of the presiding officer," Sachdeva said. He further claimed that there are photographs and videos in the House which "prove" that the AAP councilors "deliberately obstructed" the mayoral election.

Leader of Opposition Ramvir Singh Bidhuri said that AAP was running away from the mayoral election by first creating the ruckus and now moving the court where no one knows how much time it may take for a decision. Bidhuri said going to the court is a ploy to delay the election as AAP is not sure of its majority.

s India celebrated its 74th A Republic Day on Thursday, it was also the first time the parade was held on the revamped Rajpath that was renamed the Kartavya Path

India became a Republic on January 26, 1950, and since 1951, all Republic Day celebrations have been held on this historic avenue that was officially known as Rajpath till early September 2022.

The Central government

then rechristened it and Prime Minister Narendra Modi had on September 8 inaugurated the Kartavya Path, the stretch of road from Rashtrapati Bhavan to India Gate.

And, with this year's Republic Day parade, the historic precinct of Delhi and the history associated with it has also turned a page

For people in India who have grown up in post-Independence era, Rajpath had become synonymous with Republic Day celebrations, thanks to the annual ceremonial parade that it hosted every January 26 with many heads of state and other eminent personalities gracing the event as

But, January 26, 2023 was in many ways both an ordinary and an extraordinary day for India. been lent by the government. However, the Central government's rechristening of Rajpath to Kartavya Path last September had drawn mixed reactions from the public, and criticism from a section of scholars and historians, who

have alleged that it was an "attempt to erase history".

On the day of its inauguration, Modi had said Rajpath symbolised India's "slavery" and it has now been consigned to history, as he dedicated the revamped avenue to people and also unveiled a statue of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose at

Spectators could not fully Senjoy the fly-past during the Republic Day parade at the Kartavya Path as a layer of fog lowered visibility levels to around 800 metres in the national capital on Thursday. The fly-past is one of the major attractions during the parade.

Fifty aircraft took part in the 74th Republic Day celebrations that included an aerial display by Rafale, Mig-29 and Su-30 MKI fighters as well as C-130 Super Hercules and C-17 Globemaster transport planes.

People stood at their places with their phone cameras open but faced trouble capturing aircraft formations due to the layer of fog and smoke cloaking the capital.

Their eyes probed the skies searching for the flying machines, but could only hear the roar of passing aircraft.



According to the Central Pollution Control Board data, Delhi's air quality index stood at 287 at 12 noon, rapidly worsening from 160 at 4 pm on Wednesday.

The India Meteorological Department said visibility levels stood at 600 metres at 7 am and improved to 800 metres by 11 am. Overcast conditions prevailed in Delhi and the minimum temperature settled at 12.8 degrees Celsius, the highest this month so far.

In a statement, Kejriwal thanked the LG for his invitation but said, "I am going to Punjab tomorrow. We are requesting Hon'ble LG for some other time." According to government officials, Kejriwal



will inaugurate 400 Mohalla Clinics in Punjab on Friday.

The LG's invitation assumes significance as his office and the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) dispensation have been at loggerheads over multiple issues, a Delhi Government proposal to send its teachers for training in Finland being the latest bone of

contention. The LG and the Chief Minister have their weekly meetings on Friday. The scheduled meetings were disrupted with tensions rising between the LG office and the AAP dispensation. On January 16, Kejriwal and his party MLAs



had marched from the Vidhan Sabha to Rai Niwas to meet Saxena over the teachers' training proposal.

The Chief Minister returned after waiting for nearly an hour, claiming the Lt Governor refused to meet him, his deputy Manish Sisodia and AAP MLAs.

Saxena denied the charge in a letter he wrote to Kejriwal days later, saying the Chief Minister insisted for a meeting which would be attended by all his MLAs, and that it was not possible at a short notice.

Kejriwal, replying to the LG letter, had suggested a fresh proposal for a meeting between

the two sides. However, AAP leaders had later claimed that Saxena refused to meet the Chief Minister and AAP MLAs. A scene of bonhomie was, however, witnessed as Kejriwal attended the 'at home' function ahead of Republic Day hosted by the Lt Governor at Raj Niwas on Tuesday.

The two were seen warm ly greeting each another during the function that was also attended by politicians from BJP and other parties.

The relations between the two sides have worsened in recent weeks with the AAP dispensation hitting out at the LG over his decisions to nominate the presiding officer and aldermen to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi House, Haj Committee members and the row over the proposal to send Delhi government teachers to Finland for training.


Rare surgery: 3 fingers rejoined, thumb reconstructed from toe

In a rare surgery, doctors at Sir Ganga Ram Hospital rejoined three fingers including index, middle and ring finger and reconstructed a thumb with a toe finger in a 44-yearold patient from Uttarakhand who had suffered an industrial injury. The patient, a factory worker, severed his index, middle, ring finger and a thumb during an accident at his unit in Uttrakhand.

Patient arrived at Sir Ganga ram hospital in the evening around 8 hrs after injury, bleeding profusely bringing the severed 3 fingers in a polythene bag but the thumb was not present in the bag.

With alleged Khalistani supporters vandalising Hindu temples in Australia in the last few days, India on Thursday strongly condemned the incidents and said these were clear attempts to sow hatred and division among the peaceful multi-faith and multicultural Indian-Australian community. New Delhi also urged the Australian authorities to ensure safety and security of Indians living there.

Registering its condemnation, the Indian High Commission in Canberra said in a strongly worded statement The frequency and impunity with which the vandals appear to be operating are alarming, as are the graffiti which include the glorification of anti-Indian terrorists.

"This came about after three incidents of targeting the temples in the last few days. Earlier, this month, the Swaminarayan temple in Melbourne, the historic Shri Shiva Vishnu Temple in Carrum Downs, Victoria and the ISKCON temple in

'anti-social elements' with anti-India graffiti.

The High Commission also noted that these incidents were clear attempts to sow hatred and division among the peaceful multi-faith and multicultural Indian-Australian

community.

The High Commission highlighted "that pro-Khalistan elements are stepping up their activities in Australia, actively aided and abetted by members of proscribed terrorist organisations such as the Sikhs for Justice (SFJ) and other inimical agencies from outside Australia."

"It is hoped that not only will the perpetrators be brought to justice but suitable action will also be taken to prevent further attempts," the statement said. In addition, the High Commission has conveyed concerns about the so-called referendum in Melbourne and Sydney, announced by the proscribed organisation, the Sikhs for Justice next week.

The High Commission urged the Australian Government to ensure the safety and security of members of the Indian community and

and to not allow the use of Australian territory for activities detrimental to the territorial integrity, security and national interest of India. The Australian High Commission in New Delhi has also expressed concern over the incidents, saying the matters

are under investigation.
"Like India, Australia is a proud, multicultural country. We have been shocked at the vandalism of two Hindu temples in Melbourne, and Australian authorities are investigating. Our strong support for

freedom of expression does not include hate speech or violence," Australia's High Commissioner to India Barry O'Farrell tweeted recently. According to the 2011 census, about 2,95,362 in Australia were born in India and there were 3,90,894 responses for

Indian ancestry.
In 2011-12 Indians were the largest source of permanent migration to Australia. Indians formed 15.7 per cent of total migration programme in 2011-12, according to information from Indian High Commission in Canberra website.

The paper, prepared by Indian Police Service officers and submitted at the DGPs/IGPs meet held last week, said the country's border defense strategy should be given a new meaning and purpose with an economic incentive for the future, given India's limitation to be a part of the One Belt One Road (OBOR) or the China–Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) project. The paper suggests the strategy needs to be area-specif-

ic e.G. Border tourism can be promoted aggressively in the Turtuk or Siachen sector, and Daulat Beg Oldi (DBO) or Depsang plains, On the the Karakoram pass in the DBO, the paper said it is an ancient connection to India's silk route history, and opening the area to domestic tourists shall counter the remoteness of the idea. It suggested that expeditions on the pass which were famous since the 1930s can be restarted and trekking and hiking areas be opened in a limited manner.

Review procedure for declaring monuments to be of national importance, Govt told

The Economic Advisory Council to the Prime Minister (EAC-PM) has suggested that the government should come up with substantive criteria and a detailed procedure for declaring monuments to be of national importance.

In a report titled 'Monuments of National Importance - Urgent Need for Rationalisation', the EAC-PM pointed out that expenditure on the conservation and maintenance of monuments of national importance is inadequate.

Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) should come up with substantive criteria and a detailed procedure for declaring monuments to be of national importance. "It also should publish a book of notifications with detailed information about the provenance of all Monuments of National Importance (MNI)," the report said. India currently has 3,695 MNI that are under the protection of ASI. The

Sites and Remains Act (AMASR Act), 1958, (amended in 2010) provides for the declaration and conservation of ancient and historical monuments and archaeological sites and remains of national importance.

The report prepared by EAC-PM member Sanjeev Sanyal has also recommended that the proceeds from these monuments should vest with the implement-

As per the report, a large number of the present list of MNI were identified as such before 1947 under colonial-era laws.

No attempts were made to comprehensively review the list after independence, it added.

EAC-PM also recommended that minor monuments and antiquities protected as monuments should be denotified as MNI and monuments with local importance should be transferred to respective states for protection. "Allocation of funds

for the protection of MNI should be increased," the report said, adding that at the same time, revenue streams such as tickets, events, fees and other sources should be leveraged more proactively.

The EAC-PM is of the view that an effort should be made to restore geographical balance in the list of MNI.

'Along with rationalising the existing list, other monuments should be added to the list based on well-defined criteria and procedures," it said.

According to the report, around 75 British cemeteries/graves are considered as monuments of national importance'.

"Also, various monuments declared as MNI are of local importance and do not necessarily have national significance per se," the report said, adding that 24 monuments of national importance are untraceable. The report pointed out that over 60 per cent of MNI are located in just 5 states - Uttar Pradesh, Karnataka, Tamil Nadu, Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra.

Traffic pollution can impair brain function in just 2 hours: Study

nommon levels of traffic Cpollution can impair human brain function in only a matter of hours, according to a peer-reviewed finding, published in the journal Environmental Health.

The study showed that just two hours of exposure to diesel exhaust can cause a decrease in the brain's functional connectivity, thus providing the first evidence in humans, from a controlled experiment, of altered brain network connec-

tivity induced by impure air. "For many decades, scientists thought the brain may be protected from the harmful effects of air pollution," said senior study author Dr. Chris



Carlsten, professor and head of respiratory medicine and the Canada Research Chair in occupational and environmental lung disease at UBC.

"This study, which is the first of its kind in the world, provides fresh evidence supporting a connection between air pollution and cognition." For the

study, the researchers briefly exposed 25 healthy adults to diesel exhaust and filtered air at different times in a laboratory setting. Brain activity was measured before and after each exposure using functional magnetic resonance imaging

The researchers analyzed changes in the brain's default mode network (DMN), a set of inter-connected brain regions that play an important role in memory and internal thought. memory and internal thought. The fMRI revealed that participants had decreased functional connectivity in widespread regions of the DMN after exposure to diesel exhaust, compared to filtered air.

"We know that altered functional connectivity in the

functional connectivity in the DMN has been associated with reduced cognitive performance and symptoms of depression, so it's concerning to see traffic pollution interrupting these same networks," said Dr. Jodie

Gawryluk, a psychology professor at the University of Victoria and the study's first author. "While more research is needed to fully understand the functional impacts of these changes, it's possible that they may impair people's thinking or

ability to work. Notably, the changes in the brain were temporary and participants' connectivity returned to normal after the exposure. Dr. Carlsten speculated that the effects could be long lasting where exposure is continuous.

He said that people should be mindful of the air they're breathing and take appropriate steps to minimize their exposure to potentially harmful air pollutants like car exhaust. People may want to think

twice the next time they're stuck in traffic with the windows rolled down," said Dr.

"It's important to ensure that your car's air filter is in good working order, and if you're walking or biking down a busy street, consider diverting to a less busy route." While the current study only looked at the cognitive impacts of traffic-derived pollution, Dr. Carlsten said that other products of combustion are likely a

"Air pollution is now recognized as the largest environmental threat to human health and we are increasingly seeing the impacts across all major organ systems," says Dr. Carlsten. "I expect we would see similar impacts on the

brain from exposure to other air pollutants, like forest fire smoke. With the increasing inci-

dence of neurocognitive disorders, it's an important consideration for public health officials and policymakers."

The study was conducted at UBC's Air Pollution Exposure Laboratory, located at Vancouver General Hospital, which is equipped with a stateof-the-art exposure booth that can mimic what it is like to breathe a variety of air pollu-

In this study, which was carefully designed and approved for safety, the researchers used freshly-generated exhaust that was diluted and aged to reflect real-

Incidentally, Kushwaha's disgruntlement has become pronounced ever since Kumar ruled out having any other Deputy CM besides Yadav whom he has also, virtually, declared as the future face of the ruling 'Mahagathbandhan'.

Kushwaha had been with the 'Mahagathbandhan', as the RLSP chief, for more than a year before breaking away ahead of the 2020 assembly polls. In his mid-60s, he has been known to be uncomfortable with accepting Yadav, nearly three decades his junior, as his leader.

Rift between BRS Govt, T'gana Guv surfaces again

In an apparent rebuttal to his **▲**former deputy, Sachin Pilot, Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot on Thursday said the Congress returned to power in 2018 because of the work done by him in his previous dispensation.

As he said this, he set the target of winning 156 seats in the assembly election due later this year. Pilot, who has been locked in a power tussle with Gehlot for long, had recently said the return of Congress to power was due to the struggle of the party leaders and workers from 2013 to 2018, when he was the PCC chief.

In one of the public programmes, Pilot also spoke

"So an atmosphere was created and that was a big reason for the Congress to come back. Other reasons are there, such as the party workers struggle on the streets", he said.

Spirit of India

President Murmu's speech will inspire some people to imbibe the essence of her address to the nation

■ n her address to the nation on the eve of the 74th Republic Day, President Droupadi Murmu began with her emphasis on "the spirit of India" which, she said, has remained undeterred despite long foreign rule. We have succeeded as a democratic republic because so many creeds and so many languages have not divided us, they have only united us, she said, adding that that is the essence of India. This was in tune with the famous lines of the national song Saare jahaan se achha..., where Iqbal said, "Kuchh baat hai ki hasti mitati nahin hamaari... We fought against the British Empire, but this fight didn't embitter against the British or Western civilisation; so, when the Constitution was prepared in the late 1940s, the founding fathers and moth-



ers (for there were also 15 women in the Constituent Assembly) of the Republic went through, in the President's words, "a long and profound thought process" which culminated in our Constitution. Revolutionaries and reformers, visionaries and idealists helped us learn about our age-old values of peace, brotherhood and equality, she said. Those who shaped the modern Indian mind also welcomed progressive ideas from abroad. This was in consonance with the Vedic prescription, "Let noble thoughts come to us from all directions." This is how the ancient civilisation and modern republic made a tryst with President Murmu underlined the progress made

on the economic front: India becoming the fifth largest economy in the world against the backdrop of high economic uncertainties around the world; its ability to rise after the devastating effects of Covid-19, with most sectors shaking off the pandemic effect; the Government's 'Atmanirbhar Bharat' initiative. Economic development has accompanied concern for "those on the margins." Being the first President of a tribal origin, she knows this very well. She showered fulsome praise on the generations of people for their invaluable contribution in the development story of our Republic so far. Her speech should be appreciated and its messages imbibed in our lives, be it about national unity, economic development, inclusiveness, concern for the environment, or healthy lifestyles. But, unfortunately, such speeches are received with insouciance. From the man on the street to the high and mighty, most people don't pay attention. One reason is that there is a great deal of cynicism in our politics and public life. Politicians and public intellectuals say nice things about the nation, economy, society, etc., to achieve their own goals; and once their personal targets are achieved, they become part of the very system they had criticised in the not-so-distant past. Idealism becomes a vehicle to reach their destination; once they reach where they wanted to, they usually abandon the vehicle. Hopefully, President Murmu's speech will inspire some people, particularly those who matter, to imbibe its spirit.

The Supreme court says news channels create divisions in society

he supreme court recently made an observation that is apt and timely. The Supreme Court on Friday said the television channels are creating divisions in society, as they are agenda-driven and compete to sensationalize the news. The apex court also asked the news channels to do away with the anchors who create a schism in society while anchoring the news programs and debates. Sadly, this is true and continues despite the Supreme Court's earlier warning. Hate-mongering on the news channels has now become a norm. Divisive agenda and hate mongering has grown exponentially in recent years as news channels as also their anchors are immune to legal action, hiding behind the shield of freedom of Press. In the guise of news agenda-driven propaganda is being dished out to the people while engaging them in toxic communal debates that only lead to hatred in the society. The court observation comes from

> a bench of Justices KM Joseph and BV Nagarathna who observed that channels seem to sensationalize issues and work in tandem to promote a specific agenda. It is bizarre that often, even the vocabulary used by the news anchors is the same on a topic. This cannot be a mere coincidence.

> A free and fair press that talked about the issues of the people and had people's interests in the heart is long gone. It suits the news channels to have toxic debates as news gathering and research is a costly proposition while having a debate in the studio is easy; all you need is a foul-mouthed anchor to provoke the panel. This is a win-win for everyone; news channels get TRPs, anchors, get popularity, and panelists get

mileage to set shop based on their TV appearances. Nupur Sharma got her chance to indulge in blasphemy on a TV channel (which caused uproar and led to the loss of lives) thanks to a TV anchor. While FIR was lodged against Nupur, the TV channel and the anchor got away without a blemish. If one digs deeper, it is not only about the TRPs alone but also about pleasing powers that be who benefit from such toxic debates as the people's attention is deflected from the main issues and the irrelevant issues become the talk of the town. Such polarization comes in handy at election time. The Govt has informed the court that a comprehensive amendment to CrPC is in the pipeline and the Govt is in the process of taking people's suggestions. One can only hope that such a law would rein in the errant anchors and their bosses.

Tragedy of the commons




A knee jerk approach won't help. A fresh development strategy for the Himalayas based on its ecosystem, needs to be worked out

he media is agog with the breaking news "Joshimath is sinking" and there is a situation of alarm around. However, the symptoms of this tragedy were visible for a long time and people in the town have been pleading for assistance from the state and dis-trict administration to help mitigate the damage or find solutions to the problem which has affected their health and home. In August 2022, experts from reputed institutions. IIT-Roorkee, the Geological

Survey of India, Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology, Dehradun Central Building Research Institute, Roorkee, and the Uttarakhand Disaster Management Authority shared their apprehensions of an approaching disaster. They warned about the cracks surfacing not only in Joshimath but also in other areas of the Chamoli district. However, nobody took notice and worse still the officials turned a blind eye. Now, that the damage has been done, the government is proactive and has announced a host of remedial measures like ceasing the construction of the NTPC Hydro Power plant and along the Helang Bypass till fur-ther orders and all sorts of technical resources from far and wide are being summoned to Joshimath to mitigate the situation which has gone out of hand. At this critical juncture, we

need to analyze the reasons for the prevailing situation and try to find solutions. The first reason for this sorry state of affairs is that despite the suggestions of an expert group appointed by the Supreme Court that 'the terrain above the Main Central Thrust (MCT) in general and above the winter snowline in particular, should be kept free from hydropower interventions, the Central government allowed the commissioning of large Hydropower projects even after the 2013 Kedarnath tragedy. Again, in December 2014, the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change in an affidavit warned of direct and indirect Worst still, as per the study of impact on hydropower projects in the Vidi Centre for Legal



The second reason is the blatant disregard for following environmental norms while executing the projects. All large projects are subject to Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) and must have an Environment Management Plan (EMP). The Char Dham project was broken into 53 projects of less than 100 Km each to escape these regulatory requirements. So, given the fact that the projects harmed the environment, the projects escaped all regulatory scrutiny and the need for a remedial EMP

Policy, between 2020 to 2022, 123 regulatory changes were made in environmental rules to relax rules and give exemptions to projects from the statutory requirements. The third reason was the unregulated promotion of religious tourism in ecologically sensitive areas at the cost of environmental degradation. The Himalayan terrain demands sustainable tourism and not mass tourism as is happening at present. The records indicate that during last year the daily footfall of tourists along the Char Dham route was reported to be around 58,000 and due to the convergence of tourists in such large numbers the plastic waste dumped in pits and cleaning operations resorting to open burning is highly hazardous. The Kedarnath floods in 2013 which were directly proportional to the unregulated rise in tourism, leading to the construction boom in the unsafe zone such as river valleys, floodplains, and slopes vulnerable to landslides was a wake-up call.

Now, let us focus on the solution part. The April 2022 report of the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) shows the mirror stating that 'in the long term, it will be necessary to focus on finding alternative sources of energy, as the area appears to be environmentally sensitive.

A fresh development strategy for the Himalayas based on the region's natural resources such as forest, water, biodiversity, and ecotourism needs to be worked out. The focus should be on small projects that would help provide a local energy supply without causing envi-ronmental degradation. The majority of the farmers in Uttarakhand Himalayan districts have given up traditional farming and most of the land lies fallow. There is a need to formulate an appropriate strategy for the well-being of the local population which should be based on traditional knowledge, environmentally friendly agricultural practices, construction practices,

and local cultural aspects. Joshimath episode is yet another timely warning to stop intrusive anthropogenic activities in the form of massive construction projects of building townships, highways, tunnels, railway tracks, and dams. The holistic approach toward the sinking Himalayas is the need of the hour. The sooner we understand, the better it is for the coming generations.



FIRST COLUMN BUDGET: A TIGHT-ROPE WALK FOR THE FM

She has to strike a balance between prudence and populism

udget for 2023-24 will be presented in less than a week's time. However, there are additional policy documents such as the Economic Survey which really are a better report card of the country's economic health and the direction it will take in the medium term. Last year's Economic Survey was a clever document which insist-

ed on a "agile approach" in policy response, for an economy facing the downturn and uncertainty of a once in a century pandemic. It was pointed out that some of the elements in the "policy feedback loop" were always present, however, the agility in policy making became the key element with the boom in datasets available to policy makers on a real time basis. Put simply it means policy makers had access to huge swathes of datasets such as digital payments, movement of trucks across highways, railway freight, trade numbers, etc., at the click of a button and it helped them tailor-make policies for a specific sector or target group.

The second theme highlighted in last year's Economic Survey was the "art and science of policy making during extreme uncertainties." This was a great attempt to provide a curious person, peek into the minds of the lawmakers. The survey stated "that various policies of the Government of India are all about protection from or taking advantage of an uncertain future." The uncertainties highlighted were rapid shifts in technology, consumer behaviour, corporate work styles, geopolitical calibration, climate change, etc., in the post-Covid world.

2023 BUDGET

The Economic Survey is a less glamorous document (generally in two volumes) as compared to the Budget, providing diagnosis on the economic health and suggested remedies, or wellness solutions.

The Govt of late, keeping with the times, started to make this document less of a statistical aggregate and more of a short nonfiction novel. This is a welcome change and it would be worth a wait if, Finance Ministry officials and the Chief Economic Advisor, take a cue from information technology ministry colleagues, who have started attaching an explanatory note on all major policy documents. The Economic Survey is not a regulatory policy document, but more of a diagnostics report, written in simple language with ample real-life illustrations, could make it more reader-friendly. Meanwhile, the extreme uncertainties impacting global growth have increased significantly. Last year the economic survey hadn't factored the ongoing war in Ukraine, which has pushed global growth rates further south. The uncertainty over fuel prices, rapid changes in geopolitical alignments, the heightened threat from non-state actors using emerging technologies such as AI to disrupt critical national infrastructure, slowdown in the US and Europe, post-zero-Covid China, emerging cyber-security challenges, have just been added to the list.

Some of these are sure to find their place in the economic survey for FY 2022-23 and more importantly the final full budget of the Government. The task set out for the Finance Minister and her team is to find a judicious balance between fiscal discipline and populism. She will have to, more than in any other year, present a right mix of political populism while leaving ample trails for the fiscal prudence glide path. To paraphrase PMi's now famous quote, this is not a time for wasteful expenditure. The spending power of the common household will be the deciding factor for the Finance Minister, as she would like the economy to pick up towards the third quarter, once some of the larger shocks in the global economy have passed. The Govt's current policy of investing heavily in creating public infrastructure, pushing enterprises and global businesses to set up factories through various incentives and schemes, thereby creating more skilled jobs are in the right direction. However, persuading the private sector, which is more sensitive to 'extreme uncertainties' as a result of global headwinds, to start investing in the domestic economy again, would be critical.

ollywood has entertained the people for decades. Films have fired the dreams of audiences. They have also made the people laugh and cry. But in the age of virtual reality when the lines are fast getting blurred, Bollywood has sneaked into



Students of all levels from the underprivileged sections of society enjoy reservations in admissions to various professional and traditional programs of study, apart from enjoying various types of scholarships and fellowships. While such reservations and facilities have ensured inclusivity, the net impact of these in the quality of education is a point wor-

thy of serious discourse. Some sections of the academia, especially in the Modi

era, are strategically engaged in a debate detrimental to the Indian learning ecosystem. Today's youth live in the era of 4.0 Version of Education which is outcome-based and can be realised through quality education only.

Moreover, we urgently need to develop global competencies in our learners to empower them with skills to face the challenges of the highly uncertain and volatile future that 21st Century has in store for them.

They cre-

ated a plethora of doctrines of a supreme quality, such as the Vedas and the Upanishad, which have relevance across time and space.

If human civilization progresses along the contours of these doctrines, its longevity, quality, vitality and health can be ensured. The moot questions, thus, are: Can we recapitulate and recapture this supreme quality in sharpening minds for the creation of abstract knowledge again? Should we not desist from criticism and downplaying of such policies which aim at restoring much-needed universal quality in education? Should we not exclude such policies from the basket of policies in vogue for the uplift of the underprivileged

Why should affluent sections from our own society be deprived from access to quality education merely on the grounds that the underprivi-

leged sections will be left behind? The quality bars and the rigorous process of recruit-ment of faculty and staff, paypackage and amenities, admission criteria, infrastructure, curriculum, pedagogy and assessment tools, skill development and campus placement initiatives, etc., on such campuses should be similar to the main campus of foreign universities. These campuses should be allowed to offer

new-age programmes only. It will be good for aspiring students to study in premier institutes of the world without leaving their homeland This may also work as a stimulus to

Indian institutions. Moreover, this may also

discourage our youth from studying abroad at an exorbitant cost and will eventually halt currency, brain and cultural drain. Lastly, the argument that our youth will fall prey to foreign culture in these campuses holds no water as the allencompassing Sanatan culture is robust enough to embrace all other cultures and yet maintain its unique traits. After all, one of our cultural traits is 'Aano Bhadra Kritvo

Yantu Vishwatah'. In essence, this regulation will facilitate the fusion of learning systems of the East and the West in Modi's India and pave the path for the internationalization of education—one of the key elements of New Education Policy or NEP2020.

Russian attacks on Ukraine reported; tank training to start

 R^{ussian} forces fired another rash of missiles and selfexploding drones across several parts of Ukraine early on Thursday, causing the first attack-related death of the year in Kyiv even as air defences shot down many of the incoming projectiles. The attacks adhered to Russia's recent pattern of launching widespread strikes about every two weeks. But the wave of weapons came a day after Germany and the United States upped the ante in Russia's 11-month war by promising to send high-tech battle tanks to Ukraine and green-lighting other allies to do the same.

Kyiv Mayor Vitali Klitschko said a strike killed one person, the city's first such death since New Year's Eve.

Two others were injured, he said. The head of the Kyiv city administration, Serhii Popko said Ukrainian air defences shot down 15 cruise missiles heading to the area were shot down.

Russia has carried out massive strikes on Ukrainian power plants and other infrastructure since early October. Valerii Zaluzhnyi, the commander of Ukraine's armed forces said Thursday's volley involved 55 missiles, of which 47 were intercepted.

Self-exploding drones swept in overnight before the missile strikes, in what a spokesperson for Ukraine's Southern Defence Forces said appeared to be a Russian attempt to overwhelm or distract Ukraine's air defences.

It was the first such barrage of Russian firepower across the country since January 14.

more. The US said it planned to ship 31 Abrams M1 tanks to Ukrainian forces.

Along with Germany and the US, Britain, Poland, the Netherlands and Sweden are

among the nations that have sent or announced plans to supply hundreds of tanks and heavy armored vehicles to fortify Úkraine as it enters a new phase of the war and tries to break through entrenched Russian lines. The conflict has largely

been a stalemate in recent months, though Ukrainian forces acknowledged on Wednesday a controlled pullout from the salt-mining town of Soledar in Donetsk province, a battle-scarred area of eastern Ukraine that has been embroiled in war since Russiabacked separatists seized large swaths of the broader Donbas region in 2014.

Gian Gentile, a US Army veteran and senior historian with the Rand think tank, said the M1 Abrams and the Leopards would give Ukraine a "mechanized armoured punching force."

Boris Pistorius said Ukrainian crews will start their training in Germany in coming days on German-made Marders, which are infantry fighting vehicles, while training on the heavier Leopard 2 tanks would start "a little later". "In any case, the aim with the Leopards is to have the first company in Ukraine by the end of March, beginning of April," he added. "I can't say the precise day."

In an interview with Britain's Sky News on Wednesday, Ukrainian Wednesday, Volodymyr President Zelenskyy said he didn't know when the tanks from the US and Europe would arrive.

NATO Secretary-General Jens Stoltenberg, also speaking to the British network, declined to speculate on the timing, but said "allies are extremely focused on the importance of

Ukraine lauds Western move on

From Washington to Berlin to Kyiv, a Western decision to send battle tanks to Ukraine was hailed enthusiastically. Moscow sought to downplay it.

The Kremlin has previously warned that such tank deliveries would be a dangerous escalation of the conflict in Ukraine, and it has strongly denounced the watershed move by Germany and the United States to send the heavy weaponry to its foe.

"The potential it gives to the Ukrainian armed forces is clearly exaggerated," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said. "Those tanks will burn just like any others.

Moscow played down the move in an apparent attempt to save face as the West raised the stakes in Ukraine. Some Russian experts also emphasised that the supply of the deadly armour will be relatively limited and could take months to reach the front.

On Thursday, Russia launched a new wave of missile and self-exploding drone attacks across Ukraine. The attack initially appeared to be a continuation of previous attacks rather than retaliation for the announcements on the

President Vladimir Putin,



warned the West that supplying long-range weapons capable of striking deep inside Russia would mark a red line and trigger a massive retaliation. While other weapons like tanks and certain air defence systems have drawn warnings from Russian officials, the wording has been deliberately vague, perhaps to allow the Kremlin to avoid getting cornered by making specific threats.

Poland, the Czech Republic and other NATO allies have provided Ukraine with hundreds of smaller Soviet-made tanks from the Cold War era when they were

Ukrainian armed forces, who have used similar aging weaponry, needed no extra training to use them. They played an important role on the battlefield, helping Ukraine reclaim broad swaths of territory in 11 months of fighting. 'As Ukraine's armoured

US: Goal to get Ukraine capabilities to succeed on battlefield against Russia



¬he Biden administration's The Bluen administration the goal is to get Ukraine the requisite capabilities needed to be successful on the battlefield against the Russian troops the White House has said, after Washington and Berlin announced they will send advanced battle tanks to Kyiv.

President Joe Biden has announced that the US will send 31 state-of-the-art Abrams battle tanks to Ukraine to help its troops push back Russian forces that remain entrenched in the country's east for almost a year since Moscow's invasion.

The US decision came after Germany agreed to send 14 Leopard 2 A6 tanks to Ukraine.

"It is our goal -- and a goal shared by our allies and partners that we get to Ukraine the capabilities they need to be successful on the battlefield today but, just as critically, in the future, going forward this year," National Security Council Coordinator for Strategic Communications John Kirby told reporters during his daily news conference Wednesday.

Kirby said the Germans

Nobel laureate wants more help to probe Russian war crimes

Ukrainian human rights Alawyer who shared last year's Nobel Peace Prize called Thursday for more international investigative and legal help to deal with the staggering amount of war crimes cases since Russia invaded its neighbour almost a year ago.

Oleksandra Matviichuk of Ukraine's Centre for Civil Liberties told a session of the 46-nation Council of Europe, the continent's foremost human rights organisation, that Ukraine had documented some 31,000 cases of potential war crimes since the February 24, 2022 invasion.

But the glut of work the process entailed left the legal system unable to properly deal with most of them, Matviichuk said. "The war has turned people into numbers. The scale of

it's become impossible to recognise all the stories," she said, insisting it remained essential to give each individual a sense of justice done. The war crime allegations

against Russians involve the rape, torture and murder of

innocent civilians, forced deportations, child abductions and the destruction of churches, schools and hospitals, the human rights lawyer said. "I work with people who have survived hell," Matviichuk continued, "and I'm certain that above and beyond their own lives, ruined families,

ruined vision of the future, these people crave to restore their trust that justice exists, even though delayed in time." The United Nations human rights office said that as of January 23, 7,068 civilians

had been killed in the war.

have called for modern tanks and advanced weapons to beef up the defence of their nation, Matviichuk wants a similar effort to reinforce its legal capabilities.

'We must ingrain international elements into the level of national investigation and national justice," she said. She called on the Council

Germany arrests 2nd suspect in Russia spying case

German authorities said Thursday that they have arrested a second person in connection with a high-profile espionage case that embarrassed Germany's foreign intelligence agency.

Federal prosecutors said Arthur E., whose surname wasn't released for privacy reasons, was detained at Munich airport last month after arriving from the United States.

"The public should be able to hear what politicians are saying so they can make informed choices," he said.

Clegg asserted that under

Syrian Kurdish-led forces Captured a local commander of the Islamic State group in eastern Syria as part of an ongoing operation targeting sleeper cells in the city of Raqqa, the US-backed forces announced on Thursday.

The commander served as the chief of the extremist group's faction for Raqqa and was among the 68 militants detained in the operation, the Syrian Democratic Forces said.

The operation started earlier this week, in response to a December attack by IS that targeted military and security buildings in Raqqa and killed at least six Syrian Kurdish fighters.

A Kurdish commander, Mazloum Abdi, said they had indications of "serious preparations" by IS for attacks.

The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a Britainbased opposition war monitor,



said IS militants also targeted a military intelligence prison holding some 200 militants in the December attack.

IS lost all territorial control in Iraq and Syria in 2019, following a yearslong US-backed campaign that defeated the socalled caliphate, where Raqqa was once the IS de facto capi-

However, militant sleeper cells persist and have since killed scores of Iraqis and Syrians. Syrian Kurdish and US

forces frequently conduct raids targeting IS sleeper cells in northern and eastern Syria.

The captured IS commander was identified as Atallah al-Maythan. Syrian Kurdish forces said he headed the militant group's operations across Raqqa province, and allegedly "confessed to his involvement in planning and leading terrorist acts," extorted money from residents in the area and kept IS sleeper

Israel's Pres Herzog urges EU to fight resurgent anti-semitism

Israeli President Isaac Herzog Isaid Thursday that antisemitism is on the rise in the Western world and urged the European Union to ensure that Jews can live safely on the continent where the Holocaust took place.

Speaking at the European Parliament on the eve of the annual commemorations of the liberation of the Auschwitz death camp, Herzog said EU countries as well as the 27nation bloc's officials should use legislation, education and security to eradicate antisemitism.

"You must read the warn-

ing signs, detect the symptoms Facebook post and the smashof the pandemic of antisemitism, and fight it at all costs," he said. "Unfortunately, think." the picture is disturbing. Deeply disturbing. Antisemitic discourse festers not only within dark regimes, but within the heartlands of the free, democratic West.' Antisemitism gained trac-

tion during lockdowns as the coronavirus pandemic exacerbated hatred online. Herzog said antisemitism is spreading "at record pace, at the click of a button.

ing antisemitism said it documented more than 2,700 incidents in the country in 2021, including 63 attacks and six cases of extreme violence, while Europe's Fundamental Rights Agency said nine out of 10 Jews think antisemitism has increased in their country.

"It is antisemitism in the full sense of the word, and it must be thoroughly uprooted," he said. "The rule is simple: Criticism of us must pass the basic test of fairness and integrity, and it must not cross the line into dehumanisation or delegitimisation."

Herzog also lashed out at Iran as Tehran continues its brutal crackdown over widespread protests led by young Iranians. He called for the international community to fight against "the forces of

darkness and hatred that threaten to destroy us. "I speak first and foremost

of the Iranian regime, which not only publicly calls for the complete annihilation of my country but is also murdering its own countrymen and women, who are demanding liberty and human and civil rights, stoking civil wars throughout the Middle East, playing an active and lethal role in the war in Ukraine, and developing weapons of mass destruction on the way to dramatically threatening the stability of the entire globe," he

The finance ministry is looking into proposals sent by various government departments on specific steps which may be announced in the Budget, benefitting a large section of the middle class, sources said.

The government has not raised income tax exemption limit from Rs 2.5 lakh which was fixed in 2014 by the then Finance Minister Arun Jaitley in his first Budget.

Also the standard deduction has remained at Rs 50,000 since 2019. Several experts

are of the opinion that the exemption limit as well as standard deduction need to be increased to compensate salaried middle class for elevated level of inflation.

The recent statement of Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman that she was aware of pressures of the middle class has raised hope that some incentives may come for them in the upcoming

Budget.
"I too belong to the middle class so I can understand the pressures of the middle class. I identify myself with the middle class so I know," she had said earlier this month.

the basement of North Block, which houses the ministry in the national capital, and is attended by the finance minister and other high-ranking officials. The ceremony was cur-

tailed last year in view of the COVID-19 pandemic and instead sweets were distributed to the core staff. This year, the customary 'halwa' ceremony, performed every year before the 'lock-in' process of Budget preparation begins, coincided with Republic Day.

Besides Sitharaman,



Minister of State for Finance Pankaj Chaudhary and Bhagwat K Karad and other senior officials including Finance Secretary T V Somanathan, Economic Affairs Secretary Ajay Seth, DIPAM Secretary Tuhin Kanta Pandey, and Revenue Secretary Sanjay Malhotra were present at the ceremony on Thursday, visuals of the event shared on the

official twitter handle showed.

Chief Economic Advisor Anantha V. Nageswaran, Central Board for Direct taxes (CBDT) Chairman Nitin Gupta, Central Board for Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC) Chairman Vivek Johri, Additional Secretary (Budget) Ashish Vachhani and other officers and staff of Ministry of Finance, involved in the Budget preparation and compilation process, were also present on the occasion.

Sitharaman is scheduled to present on February 1 her fifth straight budget for the fiscal year beginning April 1. Like the previous two, Union Budget 2023-24 will also be delivered in paperless form.

All the 14 Union Budget documents, including the

Annual Financial Statement (commonly known as Budget), Demand for Grants (DG), Finance Bill etc. As prescribed by the Constitution, will be available on the "Union Budget Mobile App" for hassle-free access of Budget documents by Members of Parliament and the general public, the finance

ministry said in a statement.

The app is bilingual (English & Hindi) and will be available on both Android and iOS platforms. It can also be downloaded from the Union Budget Web Portal www.Indiabudget.Gov.In, it

The Budget documents will be available on the app after the completion of the Budget speech by the finance minister in Parliament on February 1, 2023, it added.

As part of the 'halwa' ceremony, the finance minister also took a tour of the Budget Press and reviewed the preparations besides extending her best wishes to the officials concerned.

What is 'halwa' ceremony? The ceremony is kind of a 'send-off' for finance ministry officials and staff involved with the preparation of the Union government's annual financial statement. They enter what is called a

'lock-in' period, during which

they stay in the basement of North Block, cut off from the world outside with a view to maintaining the secrecy around the final budget docu-They will emerge only after the finance minister com-

pletes her Budget speech in the Lok Sabha on February 1. It is considered a gesture of appreciation for those who have worked on the Budget. The basement of North Block houses a printing press

that was traditionally used to print budget documents for 40 years from 1980 to 2020. Thereafter, the budget went digital with bare minimum documents printed and the bulk distribution happening via mobile app or on the web-

Going digital also meant that the lock-in period has gotten shorter to just five days from the previous one that lasted up to two weeks.

Govt may announce measures to further strengthen startup ecosystem

The government is expected to announce in the forthcoming Budget steps to further strengthen the startup ecosystem in the country and address inverted duty issues in certain sectors to promote domestic manufacturing, official sources said. Fiscal incentives under the production linked incentive (PLI) scheme to some more sectors are also likely to be announced in the Budget, which will be presented on February 1.

Besides, the government may consider providing funds to infrastructure projects approved by the Network Planning Group (NPG), constituted under the PM Gati Shakti initiative, they said.

On October 13 last year, Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched the Gati Shakti -National Master Plan aimed at developing integrated infra-

structure to reduce logistics costs. The NPG has representations from various connectivity infrastructure ministries/ departments involving their heads of network planning division for unified planning and integration of the proposals. All these departments approach the NPG first for approval before making a DPR (detailed project report) at the planning stage.
Inverted duty structure

refers to taxation of inputs at higher rates than finished products that results in build-up of credits and cascading costs.

The government has already taken a series of steps to promote startups in the country. 

T+1 (trade plus one) means that market traderelated settlements will need to be cleared within one day of the actual transactions taking place. Earlier, trades on the Indian stock exchanges are settled in two working days after the transaction is done (T+2).

The stock exchanges --NSE and BSE -- in November 2021 in a joint statement announced that they will implement the T+1 settlement cycle in a phased manner, starting February 25, 2022, with the bottom 100 stocks in terms of market

ties -- including stocks, ETFs, debt instruments, real estate investment trusts (REITs) and infrastructure investment trusts (InvITs) -- will be moving to the T+1 settlement cycle from Friday, informa-tion available with the Zerodha website showed.

This is not the first time that markets regulator Sebi has chosen to shorten the settlement cycle. Earlier in 2002, the capital markets regulator had cut the number of days in the settle-ment cycle from T+5 days to T+3 days, and then in 2003, it was reduced to T+2 days.

Market experts believe that the T+1 settlement system will allow the cycle of money to move faster without waiting for an extra day.



No surprises: World's top 4 battle out in semis of WC

The four top-ranked sides expectedly made it to the semifinals of the FIH Men's World Cup but with little separating Australia, Germany, Netherlands and Belgium it is difficult to predict which two's quest for the title will continue after the last four stage matches here on Friday.

World number one Australia face Germany, ranked fourth in the FIH chart, in the first semifinal while defending champions Belgium take on last two edition's runner-up Netherlands in the second last four match in the Battle of Lowlands at the Kalinga Stadium on Friday.

Of the four teams, world number three and three-time champions Netherlands have had the easiest passage to the semifinals with a 5-1 win over South Korea, who punched above their weight, in their quarterfinal match.

Germany, who have won the tournament twice but made it to the last four for the first time since 2010, had the toughest route to the semifinals. They had to play in the crossovers after finishing second in their pool, while the other three teams directly qualified for the quarterfinals.

Germany were all but out of the semifinal race after trailing 0-2 till the 58th minute of their quarterfinal

match against a brilliant England side but the never-say-die Die Honamas struck twice in the last two minutes through Grambusch brothers to take the game to the penalty shootout, which they won 4-3.

Australia, the last edition bronze medallists, may start as slight favourites against Germany but it will be anybody's game as the Kookaburras have also shown their vulnerability in the two of the four matches they have played in this World Cup so far.

The Australians needed a 58th minute goal from their star penalty corner expert Blake Govers to steal a draw against Argentina in their pool

They also trailed 0-2 till just before the half time against Spain in the quarterfinals and had to toil hard to win the match 4-3. The match could have gone to the penalty shootout -- where it could have been anybody's game -- but for a costly penalty stroke miss from Spain captain Marc Miralles.

Australia have scored the most number of goals from penalty corners with nine coming from the set piece. They have scored 24 goals, second most after the Netherlands (27) with penalty corner experts Jeremy Hayward and Blake Govers in top

Hayward is currently the highest



goal scorer with seven strikes while overs is joint-third with five.

Australia's physical and attacking play will be matched by the Germans who can also play power games, along with a well organised defence and counter-attacking hockey.

Captain Mats Grambusch and his ounger brother Tom, as well as Niklas Wellen, who have scored five goals, will be the key players for Germany while they would hope that penalty corner expert Gonzalo Peillat also comes good after scoring just two

goals so far.

"We have to be at our best, there is no escape from that. It will be a tough match," Australia captain Aran Zalewski said ahead of the semifinals.

"Australia is a great team, physically very strong and with some very

good individual players. But it is the same as we have. We will analyse our game and will improve, especially with the ball. It is going to be a tight match but hoping that we will get through," Germany captain Mats Grambusch said.

Playing in their 12 straight semi-finals, Australia are looking to make their fifth final appearance in the last six editions and clinch their third title in the last four editions. They finished runners-up in 2002 and 2006, won titles in 2010 and 2014 before winning

bronze in the last edition.

Netherlands would be looking for their third straight final but they will face the toughest test of the tournament in the form of defending champions and reigning Olympic gold medallists Belgium.

The Dutch have not faced much resistance from any opposition, be it in the pool stage where they have easily won all their three matches or in the quarterfinals. The second semifinal will be a contest between the oldest and one of the youngest sides in the tournament.

Belgium have 11 players above the age of 30 while the Netherlands have eight players below 25 and just two above 30.

The Red Sticks, who have come with almost all the players who have won gold in Tokyo, are among the fittest and no doubt among the most

Netherlands have scored most goals in the tournament with 27 strikes and Friday's second semifinal will be a contest between the most attacking side against a team with a top class attack and defence with the added advantage of winning high pressure and most crucial games.

Belgium will depend mostly on Tom Boon -- the second highest scorer with six strikes -- for goals while Arthur Van Doren and Arthur de Sloover will be the main men at the defence after they lost Alexander Hendrickx due to injury. Captain Felix Denayer and Victor Wegnez will try to control the midfield.

"Christie (Christopher Ruhr) took the first one and missed. Then we switched because I am the second penalty-stroke taker in the team. So, Mats told me to take it and I did.

"Luckily, I scored. My mom must be proud as both of us scored. They were watching on TV," the 27-year-old six-feet tall defender told PTI.

Rybakina tops Azarenka to make Australian Open women's final

Wimbledon champion Elena Rybakina reached her sec-ond final in the past three Grand Slam tournaments by beating Victoria Azarenka 7-6 (4), 6-3 at the Australian Open on Thursday. Rybakina added to what

already was an impressive run through a string of top opponents. Azarenka, the champion at Melbourne Park in 2012 and 2013, joined a list of players eliminated by Rybakina over the past two weeks that includes No. 1 Iga Swiatek and No. 17 Jelena Ostapenko -- both owners of major titles -- and 2022 Australian Open runner-up Danielle Collins.

As usual, Rybakina did it with her powerful serve, delivering it at up to 117 mph (189 kph) and accumulating nine aces on Thursday to bring her total to a tournament-high 44, and stinging groundstrokes that she used to close points seemingly at will. 

Soccer's international transfer market continued to rebound from the COVID-19 pandemic with a record 20,000 deals between clubs from different countries last year, FIFA said Thursday.

Total spending worldwide was \$6.5 billion in transfer fees for players who moved across borders between FIFA member federations — an increase of 33.5% from 2021, according to FIFA's annual review of the transfers it processed.

"While this figure is still below the levels of 2018 and 2019, clubs are clearly recovering," FIFA said in a 75-page report.

The biggest deals in the report included Erling Haaland to Manchester City, Antony and Casemiro to Manchester United, Aurélien Tchouaméni to Real Madrid and Darwin Núñez

The FIFA report, however, does not include

domestic deals between two clubs in the same country, like Arsenal buying Gabriel Jesus and Oleksandr Zinchenko from Manchester City.

Chelsea's spending spree on Wesley Fofana, Marc Cucurella and Raheem Sterling, Tottenham signing Richarlison and Antoine Griezmann's return to Atlético Madrid from Barcelona are also not included. International spending included \$73 million

Chase for Champions League spots intensifying in Serie A

While it seems only a total collapse could keep Napoli from winning its first Serie A title in 33 years, the chase for the three remaining Champions League spots is intensifying.

Napoli's victory over Salernitana on Saturday combined with losses for AC Milan and Inter Milan has given the southern team a 12-point lead at the top of the standings. Only three points separate the five teams immediately below it with second-place Milan having 38 points; Lazio, Inter and Roma with 37; and Atalanta with 35.

Milan will be hoping to end a terrible run when the defending champions host Sassuolo on Sunday, less than a week after Tuesday's 4-0 loss at Lazio left the team without a win in its past five matches. That streak has seen Milan

eliminated from the Italian Cup by Torino before drawing 2-2 at Lecce. Perhaps the most painful loss came last week when Milan was beaten by city rival Inter 3-0 in the Italian Super Cup. "We lost in the Super Cup,

we've conceded 11 goals in three matches. This is a delicate moment," Milan director Paolo Maldini said. "At the same time we're alone in second place, so I don't think it's a massive disaster. "It's clear that this is a

ndia are set for a T20 appetiser ahead of their marquee ▲ Test series against Australia when they face the touring New Zealand in a three-match series beginning here on Friday.

With less than two weeks left for the Border Gavaskar Trophy matches against Australia that will determine India's World Test Championship Final fate, a T20 series in the midst of a packed ODI calendar ahead of the 50-over World Cup may seem purposeless

As a result, Hardik Pandya who led a 2-1 series win over Sri Lanka earlier this month, is back leading the T20 side with some regulars and fringe players in the squad.

While skipper Rohit

Sharma, Virat Kohli, KL Rahul, Mohammed Siraj and Mohammed Shami are being rested, the likes of Shubman Gill, Suryakumar Yadav, Ishan Kishan and Kuldeep Yadav will get an extended run before they assemble for Test series camp at Nagpur from February 2.

There is also the welcome addition of attacking Mumbai opener Prithvi Shaw, who returns to the team on the back of a series of superlative performances in the domestic cricket including a record-breaking 379 against Assam in the Ranji Tro-

It's been over a year since the 23-year-old last played for India in July 2021 — and it remains to



be seen if Pandya is tempted to fiddle his set opening combination of Gill and wicketkeeper batter Ishan Kishan.

Gill has been in the form of his life, especially in the ODIs where he has scored his careerbest 208 to go alongside two centuries in last four innings.

When it comes to the T20 format, the elegant Punjab batter may look a bit iffy but he has showed that he has all the shots in his armoury to cement the opening slot.

In such a scenario, it remains to be see how Pandya slots in the spirited Shaw as he may have to wait for his chance. Suryakumar also had a quiet

While the batting looks sorted, it's the bowling depart-ment that may demand some attention.

Left-arm pacer Arshdeep Singh, who returned from injury, was in the eye of storm in the series against Sri Lanka. He leaked 37 runs in two overs

as India lost the T20I in Pune, their only reverse in the 2-1 series win. He would look to come up with a tidy show.

But there was also a bright spot in the bowling department with Shivam Mavi capping an impressive debut with 4/22.

Mavi bowled with pace and the way he cleaned up Pathum Nissanka is still fresh in the mind. The speedster would look to form a potent combination with Umran Malik.

In the last ODI, India had got a chance to witness 'Kul-Cha' in action after a long time but come the T20s, India may have

her Kuldeep Yadav or Yuzvendra Chahal.

Chahal has been the preferred option in the format and in the absence of Axar Patel it remains to be seen if the legspinner is persisted.

India have been at their marauding best in the ODIs they would expect some fightback by the Kiwis team led by Mitchell Santner in the T20 leg.

Left-hander Devon Conway showed his imperious form for the Black Caps scoring 138 from 100 balls as they gave India a run for their money in their defence of 386 in Indore.

Michael Bracewell too was at his consistent best with 188 runs from three matches as they would look to carry their momentum in the T20 leg.

India all-rounder Ravindra Jadeja, on a comeback trail following a knee injury and a long is ready for series against Australia after picking up seven wickets for Saurashtra against Tamil Nadu in a Ranji Trophy game here. "Yes, yes, yes...," the left-handed all-rounder said in response to a question if he was ready for touring side led by Pat Cummins after the third day's play of the Ranji Trophy fixture at the MA Chidambaram stadium here.

Jadeja's haul helped Saurashtra bowl out TN for 133 in the second innings and the visitors require 262 runs for an outright victory on Friday.

Jadeja last played for India in the Asia Cup in August last year. India take on Australia in the four-Test Border-Gavaskar series beginning at Nagpur on February 9. Jadeja, who is leading Saurashtra in place of the rested Jaydev Unadkat in the final Ranji Trophy league fixture, had figures of 7/53 in 17.1 overs in the second innings.

Karnataka thrash Jharkhand by nine wickets

Karnataka thrashed marking 2, wickets at the Keenan Stadium here on Thursday to further cement their position at the top of Group C in Ranji Trophy.

The team, led by Mayank Agarwal, had made it to the quarter-final stage after the previous round of Ranji matches. But following the six points earned from the rubber on Thursday, they have put a huge roadblock in Jharkhand's path to securing a lasteight berth.

Karnataka are now on 35 points, while Iharkhand have 23. Rajasthan (20 points), Kerala (20) and Goa (18) too have a chance of making the last-eight from the group.

Karnataka, who had restricted Jharkhand to 164 in the first innings and then notched up 300 to take a handsome 136-run lead, struck back in the second innings with their veteran off-spinner Krishnappa Gowtham grabbing another

five-wicket haul. The hosts were dismissed for 201 in their second essay, giving Karnataka a paltry target of 66 to chase down.



Karnataka achieved victory in the 19th over of their innings with Nikin Jose (42 not out) and Ravikumar Samarth (24 not out) guiding them to the target.

Much of Karnataka's bowling revolved around the 34-year-old Gowtham. He broke partnerships at crucial junctures to ensure Jharkhand batters didn't score big.


