India gets new temple of democracy

The new Parliament isn't just a building, it is a symbol of the aspirations of 140 cr people of India, says PM

In a 'tryst with destiny' moment, Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday delivered his first speech in the new Parliament affirming that the august complex would "witness realisation of our developed India resolution" and the new building will become a means of "realising the dreams of our freedom fighters and will witness the sunrise of a self-reliant

Inaugurating the new Parliament, Modi first installed the scared 'Sengol' in the Lok Sabha chamber, right next to the Speaker's chair, after seeking the blessings of the 'Adheenams' from various temples in Tamil Nadu. Amid Vedic chants by priests from Karnataka's Shringeri Math, Modi performed "Ganapati Homam" to invoke the gods to bless the inauguration of the new Parliament building. A multi-faith prayer was also held to mark the occasion

In the second-leg of the event, Modi addressed packed new Parliament receiving a standing ovation from the attendees. He described the occasion as one that is "immortal"." In the development journey of every country, some moments come which become immortal. 28th May is such a day," said Modi amidst thunderous applaud. 'The new Parliament isn't just a building, it is the symbol of the aspiration of the 140 crore people of India. It gives a message to the world about India's determination", he said.

"The new building will become a means of realising the dreams of our freedom fighters and will witness the sunrise of self-reliant India. This new building will see the fulfilment of the resolutions of a developed India", Modi announced amid

Sengol will inspire us in our duty, says Modi

New Delhi: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday asserted the significance of Sengol as a symbol of transfer of power saying that the sceptre will continue to inspire the parliamentarians in their duty. In his address in the Lok Sabha chamber of the new Parliament to mark the inauguration of the building, Modi said the Sengol in 1947 symbolised of transfer of power under the guidance of Rajaji and the Adheenams. On the contrary, Congress has been claiming that there has been no documented evidence of Lord Mountbatten, C Rajagopalachari, and Jawaharlal Nehru describing the sceptre as a symbol of transfer of power by the British to India.

"I believe it is our good fortune that we have been able to restore the dignity of the sacred Sengol. Whenever proceedings begin in this Parliament House, Sengol will continue to inspire us all," Modi said. After the Sengol was installed in Lok Sabha Sunday morning, he said, "In the great Chola Empire, Sengol was considered a symbol of path of duty, the path of service and the path of nation service." *PNS*



BJP raps RJD for 'coffin' dig at new Parl building

Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) on Sunday likened the architecture of the new Parliament building to a coffin, drawing a sharp response from the BJP which said people will bury the Bihar party in such a coffin in the 2024 Lok Sabha polls.

As the new building was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the ruling party in Bihar put out a tweet that showed a coffin and the new legislature building side by side and asked, "What is this?" The Delhi Police on Sunday I removed tents and other installations set up by the protesting wrestlers at Jantar Mantar as they were detained for allegedly breaching the security cordon and not following the directions issued by the law enforcement agency. The wrestlers were trying to move towards the new Parliament building for a planned 'Mahapanchayat'.

Later in the evening, the Delhi Police booked the organisers of the wrestlers' protest at Jantar Mantar and their supporters on charges of rioting and obstructing public servants in discharge of duty. The police said 700 people were detained across Delhi, including 109 protesters at Jantar Mantar. According to a senior police officer, the FIR has been registered under Sections 188 (disobedience to order duly

40 militants killed in violence-hit Manipur since ops began: CM

Manipur Chief Minister N Biren Singh on Sunday said nearly 40 armed militants involved in torching houses and firing at civilians have been killed by security forces since they began an operation to bring peace to the north eastern State beset by ethnic

Separately, police officials said on Sunday said at least two persons were killed and 12 injured in different instances of firing upon civilians and clashes between militants and security forces since the early hours of the day. At Phayeng in Imphal West district, one person died and another sustained bullet injuries after being fired at by suspected Kuki militants, police officials said. The latest clashes began after the army and para-military forces

commenced combing operations to de-arm communities in order to bring peace, officials said. The Chief Minister who was interacting with the media persons at the State secretariat, claimed the latest round of "conflict is not between communities but between militants and security forces".

Singh also said there had been cases of Armed militants firing at civilians with AK-47s, M-16 and sniper rifles. These militants were targeted by security forces in counter-attacks.

The CM appealed to the public not to hinder the movement of security personnel and urged them to have "faith in the Government and support the security forces." "We have experienced hardship for so long and we will never allow the state to disintegrate," Singh said.

Rahul was disqualified as an MP following his conviction and two-year sentence by a Gujarat court in a defamation case over his Modi surname remark.

 $T^{\text{he much-awaited meeting of}}_{\text{parties opposed to the BJP}}$ may be held here on June 12, according to hints that have emanated from a meeting of Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar's JD(U) here on Sunday.

While no significant office bearer confirmed or denied the same, many present at the meeting said on condition of anonymity that the disclosure was made by the chief minister himself. Kumar, the JD(U)'s supreme leader, has been pitching for "opposition unity" ever since he snapped ties with the BJP in August last year, following accusations that the ally was trying to create fissures in his party and diminish his standing.

Kumar, who is now heading an alliance government in Bihar which includes RJD, Congress and the Left, has reached out to leaders like Arvind Kejriwal, Mamata Banerjee, Akhilesh Yadav, all of whom are opposed to BJP but not very comfortable with the grand old party either.

After new Parl, focus on new structures under construction

As the new Parliament building inaugurated, the focus now shifts to the construction of the Vice President Enclave, Common Central Secretariat buildings, Defence Enclave, MPs' chambers, and the prime minister's new residence and office. The new parliament building is the second project that has been completed. The first was the redevelopment of Central Vista avenue stretching from Vijay Chowk to India Gate. The stretch which was earlier known as Rajpath has been renamed Kartavya Path.

The plan for the redevelopment of the Central Vista -the nation's power corridor -includes the new Parliament building that was inaugurated on Sunday. The Central Public Works Department (CPWD) under the Union Housing and Urban Affairs Ministry has

been executing projects under the redevelopment plan. The tender to construct the new Parliament building was awarded to Tata Projects in September 2020 at an estimated cost of Rs 861 crore. Later, the cost rose marginally due to certain changes.

Infrastructure firm Larsen & Toubro Limited is constructing the Executive Enclave housing the PMO, cabinet secretariat, India House and the National Security Council Secretariat at an estimated cost of Rs 1,189 crore. The company was awarded the tender in November last year and the project is slated to be completed in 24 months.

The Executive Enclave will come up on the south side of the South Block. India House will be used as a conference facility like Hyderabad House where high-level talks, especially with top visiting leaders of various countries, are currently held.

delivered the historic address, Rajya Sabha Deputy Chairman Harivansh read out messages from President Droupadi Murmu and Vice-President Jagdeep Dhankhar.

To mark the inauguration Modi also launched a special Rs 75 coin as India is celebrating the 75th year of its Independence. Along with it, he released a special commemorative postage stamp at the inauguration event held at the Lok Sabha chamber of the new building.

As India entered the new Parliament, leaving behind the one built during the British era, Modi said, "Several years of foreign rule took away our pride from us. But today, India has left behind that colonial mindset. India is the mother of democracy. It is also the foundation of global democracy. Democracy

tion". Recalling his address to the nation from the Red Fort on the occasion of Independence Day, Modi said there comes a time in the history of every country when the consciousness of that country is awakened.

He underlined that such a time had come in India 25 years before Independence during Mahatma Gandhi's non-cooperation movement which filled the entire country with a belief.

"Gandhi ji had connected every Indian with the resolution of Swaraj. This was the time when every Indian was fighting for freedom", the Prime Minister remarked as he highlighted that its result was India's Independence in 1947.

Modi said that the 'Azadi Ka Amrit Kaal' is a stage in independent India which can be compared to the historic period in the pre-Independent India. The grand event was

President Ram Nath Kovind, former Prime Minister Deve Gowda, parliamentarians, chief ministers as well as people from different walks of life

Modi said that the new Parliament building is the perfect example of the co-existence of the old and new. "The new Parliament building is a reflection of the aspirations of 'new India' and a testament to the dawn of a self-reliant nation," he

"There was a need for new Parliament. We also have to see that the number of seats and MPs will increase in the coming time. A new Parliament was the need of the hour," he said.

The new Parliament building is designed to enable 888 members to sit in the Lok Sabha. In the present building of the Parliament, there is a provision for the sitting of 543 members in the Lok Sabha and 250 in the Rajya Sabha.

Speaking about the newly inaugurated Parliament building, Modi said, "This building is equipped with modern facilities and equipped with the latest gadgets. It has given employment to over 60,000 labourers. We have created a digital gallery to honour their hard work".

Modi said that when India is celebrating 'Azadi ka Amrit Kaal', the people of India have gifted its democracy a new Parliament House. Éarier in the morning, soon after inaugurating the new Parliament Modi tweeted, "As the new building of India's Parliament is inaugurated, our hearts and minds are filled with pride, hope and promise. May this iconic building be a cradle of empowerment, igniting dreams and nurturing them into reality. May it propel our great nation to new heights of

Insult to tribal Prez, disdain for House procedures: Opp

The Left parties too hit out at Modi, comparing the inauguration of the new parliament building by him with the coronation of a monarch and relegating the people of the country to "subjects ('praja')".

Former Congress chief Rahul Gandhi said Parliament is the voice of the people but the Prime Minister is treating the inauguration of the new building like a "coronation". "Parliament is the voice of the people! The Prime Minister is treating the inauguration of the Parliament House as (a) coronation," Rahul Gandhi said in a tweet in Hindi soon after Modi inaugurated the building.

NCP president Sharad Pawar said that various rituals performed at the inauguration of the new Parliament building in New Delhi by Prime Minister Ñarendra Modi show that the country was being taken backwards by decades. He said the country's first Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru had envisaged a society having a

scientific temperament, but what happened at the new Parliament inauguration ceremony was opposite to that as Modi inaugurated the new building this morning at a grand ceremony which included a havan, a multi-faith prayer ceremony and the installation of the Sengol in a special enclosure in the Lok Sabha chamber.

Speaking to reporters in Pune, Pawar said, "There is a huge difference between the country's first Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru talking about the concept of modern India and a series of rituals performed at the new Parliament building today in New Delhi. I fear that we are taking our country backward by decades." "One cannot compromise on science. Nehru was persistent about his wish to form a society with scientific temperament. Wrestlers Vinesh Phogat, Sakshi Malik and Bajrang Punia were among those detained. Women detainees were released later in the evening. Earlier in the day, Jantar Mantar turned into a scene of chaos when Vinesh Phogat and her cousin Sangeeta Phogat tried to breach the barricades and as police tried to contain the breach with a lot of shoving and pushing. Protesting wrestlers jumped over the police

Videos showed a scuffle breaking out between protesters and police personnel even as the former tried to resist. In one of the videos, a few female police officers can be seen forcefully dragging a woman away from the protest site. Vinesh provided a strong resistance against her detention and Sangeeta clung on to her cousin sister while lying on the road as the struggle contin-

ued for a few dramatic minutes. The police officials dragged and lifted them into buses along with several other wresters and their supporters. The wrestlers were pushed into buses and taken to different unknown locations. The police claimed the wrestlers broke and crossed the barricades, misbehaved and

pushed the police personnel including the women constables. They broke the barricades and didn't follow the directions given by the police. They broke the law, hence they were detained. We will take legal action after inquiry in due course of time," said Dependra Pathak, Special CP (Law & Order). "We need to assess the entire

situation. As you have seen the barricades have been broken and they moved ahead despite why we have removed them from here. "The bottom line is, peace and tranquility will be maintained. We will ensure professional steps to see to it that nothing goes wrong," he added. It seems the police will not

allow the wrestlers back to the protest site though no official statement has been made in this regard. The police had warned the wrestlers not to move towards Parliament but they went ahead, leading to the scuffle. Immediately after the wrestlers were taken to different unknown locations, the police officers began clearing the protest site by removing the cots, mattresses, coolers, fans and the tarpaulin ceiling along with other belongings of the wrestlers. Taking to Twitter, Olympic medallist Sakshi Malik vowed to continue their protest at Jantar Mantar. "Our movement is not over. After being released from police custody, we will start our satyagraha at Jantar Mantar. In this country, there will be no dictatorship but there will be satyagraha held by women wrestlers," she tweeted in Hindi.

Scores of farmers led by BKU leader Rakesh Tikait held a sit-in at the Ghazipur border enter the national capital to take part in a protest called by agitating wrestlers. The protesters later dispersed. "All farmers who had gathered at the Ghazipur border have left for their homes. The Ghazipur border is now open for vehicular traffic," a senior police officer said in the

In Haryana, several farmer leaders were detained as they proceeded towards Delhi with a large number of supporters for the "Mahila Maha Panchayat" called in support of the wrestlers protesting at Jantar Mantar, farmers' outfit BKU (Charuni) claimed. Police stopped hundreds of farmers at the Haryana-Punjab border near Ambala city in the morning.

He said many militants involved in killing civilians and destroying property and torching houses have been captured by the Jat regiment.

The Chief Minister said the Government is also "deeply saddened by the casualties on both sides" and assured "all possible steps in bringing back

The public entrances lead to three galleries -- the Sangeet Gallery which exhibits dance, song, and musical traditions of India; the Sthapthya Gallery depicts the architectural heritage of the country and the Shilp Gallery showcases distinct handicraft traditions of different States.

The interiors of the Lok Sabha chamber are based on the theme of the national bird peacock, while that of the Rajya Sabha depict national flower lotus. According to officials, eminent musicians and their family members including Ustad Amjad Ali Khan,

The four-storey Parliament House has a built up area of 64,500 sqm and has two chambers - 888-seater Lok Sabha, which can accommodate 1,272 members for the joint sitting of both the Houses, and the 384seater Rajya Sabha chamber.

The building opens into a central courtyard with a banyan tree. The new building also has six new committee rooms and 92 rooms for use as offices for the Council of Ministers.

The material used for the new building has been acquired from various parts of the country. The teakwood used in the building was sourced from Nagpur in Maharashtra, while the red and white sandstone was procured from Sarmathura in Rajasthan. The sandstone for the Red Fort and Humayun's Tomb in the national capital was also known to have been sourced from Sarmathura. The Kesharia green stone has been procured from Udaipur, the red granite from Lakha near Ajmer and the white marble has been sourced from Ambaji in Rajasthan.

"In a way, the entire country came together to construct the temple of democracy, thus reflecting the true spirit of Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat," an official said.

The steel structure for the false ceilings in the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha chambers have been sourced from the Union Territory of Daman and Diu, while the furniture in the new building was crafted in Mumbai. The stone 'jaali' (lattice) works dotting the building

were sourced from Rajnagar in

Rajasthan and Noida in Uttar

Pradesh. The materials for the Ashoka Emblem were sourced Aurangabad in Maharashtra and Jaipur in Rajasthan, while the Ashok Chakra on the massive walls of the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha chambers and the exteriors of the Parliament building were procured from Indore Madhya Pradesh. The new Parliament build-

ing used manufactured sand or M-sand from Charkhi Dadri in Haryana for creating concrete mix for the construction activ-

M-Sand is considered environment friendly as it is manufactured by crushing large hard stones or granite and not by dredging of river beds. The fly ash bricks used in the construction were sourced from Harvana and Uttar Pradesh. while brass works and pre-cast trenches were from Ahmedabad in Gujarat.

Kejriwal retweeted a video shared by Malik that showed wrestlers being dragged by police to a detention van after a lengthy scuffle. Police stop farmers from entering Capital to join wrestlers' protest

Scores of farmers led by Bhartiya Kisan Union (BKU) leader Rakesh Tikait were on Sunday stopped by the Delhi Police at the Ghazipur border as they tried to enter the national Capital to take part in a protest called by agitating wrestlers outside the new Parliament building. been stopped (by the police). We will sit here for now and decide what to do next," Tikait, who had spearheaded the antifarm law protests, said after being stopped by the police at the heavily fortified Ghazipur border. Heated arguments erupted between security personnel and farmers, who tried to break barricades to enter Delhi amid heavy police pres-



police barricade at the Ghazipur border to join wrestlers protesting against WFI chief Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh, in New Delhi on Sunday

Discoms approach HC, seek stay on DERC business plan

The three Delhi distribution companies (discoms) have challenged the Delhi Electricity Regulatory Commission (DERC) business plan regulations in the Delhi High Court, seeking an interim stay. The DERC business plan regulations were issued in March 2023 and set out a framework for the discoms to submit their annual revenue requirements (ARRs) to the DERC.

The DERC will then use the ARRs to determine the tariffs for electricity in Delhi.

According to sources, the discoms have argued that the regulations are illegal and violate the Electricity Act, 2003. As directed by the DERC, Delhi power utilities have submitted their ARR's for FY 2023-24. However, many aspects of the tariff determination process

being followed by the DERC are in contravention of the laid down guidelines and prevailing law.

For one, the Return on Equity (ROE) is an intrinsic part of the Delhi privatisation model. The DERC's Business Plan Regulations have reduced this from 16% to 14% against these very tenets putting the viability of the power sector in Delhi into question. This is not aligned with the CERC framework and guidelines.

Sources said that the discoms have challenged the reg-ulations on a number of grounds.

First, they argue that the regulations violate Section 61(a) of the Electricity Act, which requires the DERC to be guided by the principles and methodologies for tariff adopted by the Central Electricity Regulatory Commission

NGT orders SC panel, CPCB, DPCC to probe illegal dyeing units

The National Green Tribunal has directed the Supreme Court-appointed monitoring committee, the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) and the Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC) to look into illegal dyeing units in the national capital and to jointly file an action taken report on the compliance status in respect of the units named in the appli-

The Tribunal was hearing a petition claiming that dyeing factories were operating without consent or permission in the Bindapur, Matiala, Ranhola, Khyala, Meethapur, Badarpur, Mukundpur and Kirar areas of the national capital.

A bench of Chairperson Justice AK Goel said the monitoring committee appointed by the Supreme Court has to look into the matter in coordination with other authorities concerned, including the CPCB and the DPCC.

In 2004, the Supreme Court directed the shifting or closure of industrial activities operating in violation of the master plan of Delhi and also laid down the monitoring mechanism.

For stopping illegal industrial activities, the apex court formed a monitoring committee comprising Delhi's chief secretary, police commissioner, municipal commissioner and the Delhi Development Authority vice-chairman.

The report may mention consent status and compliance status with reference to disposal of effluents into the drain... location of these units in the non-conforming areas and proposed remedial actions within three months...," the bench, also comprising Judicial Member Justice Sudhir Agarwal and Expert Member A Senthil Vel, said. The matter has been posted for further proceedings on October 4.

The petition alleged that there are over 500 such factories discharging effluents in open areas, the Najafgarh drain or the Swaroop Nagar drain, besides illegally extracting groundwater. It also alleged that there are no common effluent treatment plants for treating the effluents.

"Testing of water quality in the area shows high pH, turbidity, bad odour, total dissolved solids, total suspended solids, biochemical oxygen demand, chemical oxygen demand, chloride, nitrate, sulphuric acid, heavy metals and low dissolved oxygen. Effluents are highly toxic, carcinogenic and hazardous to the health of the people residing nearby," the petition had said.

Two PWD officials get jail term for contempt over conservation of trees STAFF REPORTER NEW DELHI

The Delhi High Court has sentenced two PWD officials to simple imprisonment for contempt in view of their "recalcitrance" to follow the law and court orders in relation to conservation of trees in the Chittaranjan Park area.

The judge opined that there was a consistent disregard in compliance of these orders, which merited a sentence under contempt law and sentenced the executive engineer and the engineer-in-chief of the Public Works department (PWD) to undergo simple imprisonment for a period of four months and two months, respectively. The court also slapped a fine of ₹2,000 on

Justice Najmi Waziri noted

that not only did the court earlier direct the authorities to exercise due caution with respect to the wellbeing of trees while undertaking any civil work but the National Green Tribunal also passed similar directions, including the removal of the concrete surrounding tree trunks.

What is seen from the

above is that despite repeated directions and orders passed of this court and of the NGT (National Green Tribunal), there has been a consistent disregard in compliance of the same. Such recalcitrance to abide by the law and defiance of the court's orders cannot merit anything less than a sentence," said the court in its order dated May 18 on a contempt petition by the New Delhi Nature Society. "In the circumstances,

"When I talk about big powers, of course we have a particular challenge from China. That challenge is a very complicated challenge, but in the last three years it has been particularly visible in the border areas," Jaishankar said, apparently referring

"There are clearly responses that are required, and those responses have been undertaken by the government. And a lot of it to ensure that no attempt is made to unilaterally change the status quo in the border areas," he said.

The two countries will have to find some kind of equilibrium, and all the past

governments in their own ways tried to find a balance, the External Affairs Minister said

"But that balance cannot be on the terms of the other party. Then it is not a balance. There has to be something mutual," he said. Mutual respect, sensitivity and interest have to be the basis of the relationship, Jaishankar said.

"How can we get along long term if you don't respect me, if you are not sensitive to my concerns, if you ignore my interest?" he said, adding that if India sees respect, sensitivity and recognition, it can think of a better relationship with China. "But if we do not. I think we need to stand up for our rights, and we need to be firm in asserting opposition. And that, unfortunately, currently is the situation," he said.

GS Entertainment, directors, CA booked in IDBI bank fraud

The CBI has booked Mumbai-based firm GS Entertainment Pvt. Ltd., its directors Jaspreet Singh Walia and Guneet Singh Walia and Chartered Accountant Stany Saldanha in a case of bank fraud involving IDBI Bank that had financed 2009 Hindi film Lamhaa.

The case refers to sanction of foreign currency loan to the tune of USD 2.35 million (Rs 10 crore) and term loan of Rs 4.95 crore in June 2008 under the film financing scheme for production of Hindi film Lamhaa". Later, the loans turned into non-performing asset (NPA).

The outstanding principal and interest to the principal borrower GSEPL stood at Rs 119.05 crore as on June 1,

The company also submitted the recall action notification for the lenses from the Department of Health, Therapeutics Goods (TGA), Administration Australian government, along with the alert recalling the product in India. The company has its Indian arm as Hoya Medical India Pvt Ltd, in New

In its filing with the TGA, the company said that it has asked customers to place all impacted devices on hold in their inventory system and quarantine them for collection by its responsible entity in the country. It also recommended that the patients involved, that is the cases where lenses with PP adhesion have been left in the eye, be monitored for the need for any

future medical treatment. Hoya says that Vivinex is made from a novel hydrophobic acrylic, using a proprietary manufacturing process that includes a unique, active oxygen posterior surface treatment. Journal: 20% healthy adults have pre-diabetes glucose metabolism

A bout 20 per cent or one in five adults considered healthy by medical standards, have glucose metabolism similar to those with prediabetes, according to a study published in the journal Mayo Clinic Proceedings: Digital Health. These healthy adults were identified using

a new method of analysis, developed by scientists at Klick Health, a US based life sciences company, that flags a precursor to prediabetes called impaired glucose homeostasis (IGH). The team has stressed the need for inter-

"For people with diabetes, blood glucose levels can rise and fall like a wild roller-coaster ride with steep drops and peaks," said Jaycee Kaufman, study lead author and research sci-

vention to stop these adults from becoming dia-

'We found a similar pattern in patients with IGH, albeit those patterns were more like gentle waves than dramatic peaks, but intervention on this population could limit the likelihood of progression to full diabetes," she added.

A total of 384 people were equipped with a continuous glucose monitor for the study and assessed by a physician over a two-week time

Participants were diagnosed diabetic, pre-



diabetic, or healthy, according to guidelines outlined by the American Diabetes Association.

After applying the mathematical model, patients were then re-classified into two groups based on their glucose homeostasis parameters: effective or impaired. "What was most surprising is that 20 per cent of participants, who were assessed using the

standard screening tools for diabetes and cleared as healthy by a physician, were then found to have impaired glucose homeostasisreinforcing it is now possible to provide an earlier, more accurate and sensitive assessment of eople's diabetic status," said Yan Fossat, Vice President of Klick Labs.

With research suggesting it is possible to reverse diabetes, or at least slow its progression, there is growing demand for screening tools that can flag at-risk individuals.

Screening and monitoring involve reviewing risk factors such as age, BMI, and family history; and diagnosis relies primarily on the blood tests like glycated haemoglobin (HbA1c) and Oral Glucose Tolerance Test (OGTT).

Ground water with arsenic harmful for farm products: Study

Groundwater should not be used for farming purposes to prevent arsenic (As) exposure for farm products, especially in the case of rice, a team of researchers has said citing the case of West Bengal where arsenic has been found in high content in groundwater. Large-scale arsenic (As) poisoning, mainly through food chain contamination, is deemed to be a lethal problem in the rice-growing areas of the

Bengal Delta Plain (BDP) and other parts of the world. The study paper by schol-

ars and researchers from the School of Environmental Studies, the National Institute of Biological Genomics and Australia's University Of Newcastle pointed out that since groundwater is more prone to arsenic exposure, farm products produced by using that water also become prone to the same exposure.

To prevent this, the report

dy is extremely important considering that West Bengal is among those states which have extremely high arsenic concentration in groundwater. Historically as many as 83 blocks scattered over seven districts in West Bengal have arsenic levels in groundwater higher than the permissible

The decadal Census, which was postponed for an indefinite period due to the pandemic, is unlikely to be held before the next Lok Sabha elections that are due in April-May 2024, officials said.

Access to smartphones, internet, laptops, computers, cars, two-wheelers, main cereal consumed are some of the 31 questions to be asked in the Census, whenever it is held.

The house listing phase of

the Census and the exercise to update the National Population Register (NPR) were scheduled to be carried out across the country from April 1 to September 30, 2020, but was postponed due to the COVID-19 outbreak.

The Census operation continues to be on hold and the government has not yet announced a new schedule.

In January, the Office of the Registrar General and Census Commissioner of India conveyed that the date of freezing of administrative



districts or sub-districts -- has been extended to June 30, the officials said.

According to the norms, the Census can be conducted only three months after (post September 30) freezing of boundary limits of administrative units such as districts, sub-districts, tehsils, taluks and police stations.

Two to three months will also be required to train the entire 30 lakh government employees/teachers across India who will be engaged as enumerators for the Census.

Bengal mango exports this season to start from early June

Mango exports from West Bengal are expected to begin from early June with shipments to Middle East countries, an official said on Sunday. There have also been



Respect the temple

Leaders say Parliament is the temple of democracy, so they should not desecrate it with pandemonium

The inauguration of the new parliament building and installation of a historic sceptre 'Sengol' near the Lok Sabha Speaker's chair by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, along with other related activities on Sunday, will continue to be debated for some time. Supporters and members of the Government and Bharatiya Janata Party will reiterate grandiloquent statements, lauding the very idea of getting a new Parliament, its symbolism-heavy architecture and furnishing, and so on. The Opposition, on the other hand, will continue to make barbed remarks about the entire affair, as it has been in the last few days. Senior Congress leader Shashi Tharoor had earlier quoted Articles 60 and 111 of the Constitution, claiming that as head of Parliament, the President should have inaugurated the building. The TMC's reaction was a mix of condemnation and ridicule: the Prime Minister inaugurating the new Parliament building was akin to "I only love myself day," party MP Derek O'Brien said on Sunday. It



is indubitable, however, that the country needed a new Parliament. The need was felt not just by this Government but also earlier. In 2012, Lok Sabha speaker Meira Kumar had constituted a high-powered committee to recommend an alternate complex to the old Parliament building. But the need was just on the grounds of functionality, though these were sufficient enough for the alternate building. The old structure, made a century ago, could not cope with the requirements that have arisen in this period. The Prime Minister rightly said that the new

Parliament is not just a building but a reflection of the aspirations and dreams of 140 crore Indians. "This is a temple of our democracy that gives a mes-

sage of India's resolution to the world," he said. "This new Parliament building connects planning to reality, policy to realisation, willpower to execution, and sankalp to siddhi," he added. He went on to say, "India is not only a democratic nation but also the mother of democracy." For, he asserted, democracy is not just a system that is practiced in India but it is a culture, thought and tradition. The roots of democracy in our country, he correctly said, go back to the Vedas and Vaishali in modern Bihar. Parliament has been called the temple of democracy by many people, both from the Government and the Opposition. So, it is the duty of all political parties and leaders to ensure that the sanctity of this temple is upheld by everyone in every circumstance all the time. This temple should not suffer any desecration. It means that business is conducted in both Houses in the best traditions of democracy. Senior leaders should ensure that when an opponent is speaking, he or she is allowed to say whatever they want to, that they are not shouted down. Also, all parliamentarians should respect the chair, speak within the timeframe that is provided to them, and so on. This will strengthen our democracy.

ndia surpasses China as the world's most populous country in demographic composition, with a staggering 65 per cent working-age population having an average age of 28 years old. This population has the potential to propel the nation towards remarkable socioeconomic progress and has the ability for transformative global impact. To reap the benefit of demographic advantage, it is imperative to equip our working population with employable skills and knowledge that meet the requirements of the globalized labour market. Skill development in educational institutions is the critical enabler for improving employment outcomes and higher productivity leading to faster and more sustainable economic growth.

There is a significant gap between the skills imparted in educational institutions in India and the skills required for jobs. The International Labour Organization (ILO) has projected that India will face a 29 million skill deficit by 2030. India Skills Report 2023

reveals a rise in employability of 52.8% with women and men at 47.2%. Women surpassed men in employability because, in the post-covid era, nursing, beauty and wellness and other soft skills showed the highest employability rates among the women. Not only for women but for men also the beauty and wellness sector has unlimited potential in terms of domestic and global markets. The beauty and wellness market in India was valued at Rs 901.07 billion in 2018 and is forecast to reach Rs 2,463.49 billion by 2024, expanding at a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of around 18.40 per cent during 2019-2024.

There is an extra advantage in the employability of women because the companies have also adopted new recruitment strate gies centred around soft skills like communication, teamwork, and emotional intelligence. However, institutes haven't adopted the dividend to achieve remark-

norm of educating their students on as of now employable skills, thus hurting the freshers entering the job market.

Battling cultural taboos in Uttarakhand



The need for comprehensive menstrual education, access to hygienic sanitary products, and an end to discriminatory practices is paramount

lthough menstruation is a natural process for **∠**women and girls, it continues to be associated with deep-rooted stigma, imposing daily challenges, and hindering their growth. Lack of scientific menstrual awareness and management pushes adolescent girls in most parts of India to seclusion and torment within their own homes, making it a harrowing experience. In villages that are tucked away in the hilly states, the situation is quite shocking.

Disha (name changed), a 16-year-old from Pothing village in Bageshwar district, Uttarakhand, shares her distressing experience, "At times, I hide from my parents while I menstruate because it's a torture to stay in a cowshed. Often, I go through severe cramps, but as I don't inform my parents about getting periods, I refrain from sharing my pain. But I cannot put up this act every month because my mother ends up suspecting pregnancy."

Culturally in India, women and girls still face discrimination and inhumane treatment during menstruation, and Uttarakhand is no fewer blankets during winter 17-year-old Maya.

exception. The practices around menstruation differ in each village but there are certain rules across the region that menstruating girls and women have to follow.

In Pothing village, for instance, when a girl gets her period for the first time, she is banished to a cowshed outside the house for 21 days. Consequently, these girls spend a total of 60 days each year eating, sleeping, and studying with cattle. During this time, they not only stay away from their homes but are also forbidden from using the household toilet. "The most dreaded times are the bitterly cold months of December and January when we have to go to the river at 4-5 AM in the morning to

take a bath. We try to use

nights as washing them every day is quite laborious," reveals Nisha Gadiya, another adoles-

cent girl from the village. Aside from the unsanitary conditions, the girls lack essential support during their periods. "During this time, we do not even receive timely meals, which leaves us feeling weak. Because of this, we can't study properly. Moreover, sanitary pads are not readily available even at the chemist shops located quite far away from our village, and affording them is another challenge. We resort to using clothes during our periods," adds

Nisha. These practices have turned the menstrual cycle into a traumatic experience for adolescent girls as they fear staying alone outside their homes. "Younger girls are usually afraid to sleep alone away from home in the cowshed at night. When we were young, we dreaded being imprisoned for a few days each month, as if we had committed a crime. We would cry alone at night, thinking how good it would have been if our period had never come at all," expresses

The villagers firmly believe that menstruating women are impure, and any physical contact during this period will make the other person fall sick. Purification rituals involving cow urine are performed to counter such perceived impurities. While highlighting the deep-rooted nature of these superstitions, Chandra Gadia, a teacher from the village, shares, There is an urgent need to challenge these 'man'-made laws. It is imperative to put an end to any form of violence inflicted upon women and adolescent girls in the name of customs and rituals, emphasizes Chandra. The need for comprehensive menstrual education, access to hygienic sanitary products, and an end to discriminatory practices is paramount. Advocacy and awareness programs should be implemented, not only in Pothing Village but throughout the region, to combat these deep-seated taboos and foster a society that embraces menstrual health and dignity.

Ever increasing threat of transnational terrorism



The purpose of terrorism is to create an state of extreme fear among target groups to alter their behaviour and bring about a radical change



he recent attacks by terrorists in Rajouri that killed 4 soldiers and a few days earlier ambushed an Army vehicle in the Poonch district of Jammu and Kashmir in which 5 Army Soldiers have been martyred ahead of G 20 meeting have confirmed that terrorists were down but not wiped out. The purpose of these attacks is to destabilize security and create a vulnerable atmosphere in the region. This is not an isolated incident but just an addition to the long saga of terrorist violence in the region. Earlier the series of terrorist attacks in Sopore, Budgam, Chadoora, Noorbagh and Dooru Shahabad raised serious concerns for security agencies.

Both the Central and State

Governments have done an excellent job resolve the issues but terrorists are deliberately creating problems as they work to the tune of outsiders. Besides, to a large extent, clinging to terrorism provides livelihood to terrorists who have nothing to lose except their lives for some money and self-generated fake popularity among their masters as a bonus. Be it the case of Ajmal Kasab and a few others who were misled and driven to commit a most heinous crime in Mumbai. Although the central government has made efforts to find a solution to the problem plaguing the region by initiating talks with Pakistan and addressing the grievances of the separatists yet insurgent activities against the government and clashes between terrorists and the Army have continued unabated.

The region provides an excellent base for the rebels to carry out guerrilla activities. Several security officials have died in controlling the terrorist onslaught for many years. World over, the new breed of terrorists seems to be reasonably confident of their access to vantage points.

NOT THEIR IMMEDIATE GOAL, AND THAT'S WHY THEY INSIST **UPON PSYCHOLOGICAL** RATHER THAN **PRACTICAL** RESULTS

Moreover, their strategies have become more sophisticated and they are successful in acquiring more lethal weapons from across the border. The rapid international transportation and use of sophisticated weapons like assault rifles and plastic explosives (RDX) have helped to facilitate the expansion of terrorist networks around the world. Besides, the new suicide squads of terrorists have left the entire security apparatus of the affected states in a state of shock.

The recent incidents in Europe and Asia and Africa need to be understood properly. History bears testimony to various such tragic events.

Mr. Alison Jamieson, a British analyst on organized crime and political violence commented that the distinction between terrorism and organized crime has become very blurred recently. Italian organised crime expert Professor Ernesto says "The goal is different.

The terrorist's goal is an ide-ological one, while organized crime's goal is financial, but the instrument is the same. They both need money and arms". In Sri Lanka, the Tamil Tigers engage in drug trafficking to finance their struggle, in north-eastern India guerrillas kidnap tea planters and hold them to ransom to help fund their fight for independence. In Chechnya, the secessionists were heavily involved in drug distribution. These days terrorists are more confident than ever before of their access to vulnerable points before carrying out any of their attacks and they plan their

justification and fulfilment of a cause that they think is just. Thus, they attempt, by their

acts, to inspire and manipulate fear to achieve a variety of purposes. William Henry once explained the problem of international terrorism and commented that "some politically motivated acts are rooted so deeply in dedication to a cause that no sanction can deter them, other acts of terrorism spring from frustration of legitimate means, caused in turn by acts of government repression and terrorism." It is basically a self-created perception of misled people to give an ideological fervour to their misdeeds. Terrorist groups are generally too small and weak to operate successrully against governments.

Therefore, violence is not their immediate goal and that's why they insist upon psychological rather than practical results.

The purpose of terrorism, therefore, is to create an emotional state of extreme fear among specific groups, and thereby, ultimately alter their behavior and bring about general or particular changes in the structure of society and government. Therefore, scholars working on strategic affairs in the international arena need to examine and analyze the genesis and changing nature of the problem of international terrorism and its causes. It is true that present anti-terrorism laws such as extradition treaties, etc are sufficient enough in handling the problem provided they are implemented promptly and effectively. Besides, Intelligence, Interception

most effective ways of combating modern terrorism. In this regard the following suggestions may be worth considering:

(a) Carefully examining important incidents and preparing detailed action-oriented reports on terrorist-affected

(b) Building a sophisticated communication network as part of a wider modernization drive that gives access to the latest technology.

(c) Better management of local contacts and sources of assistance. #developing new techniques of security and maintenance of secrecy.

(d) Developing the capability to anticipate security needs. I his is possible by conducting spe-cialized courses for monitoring security situations

Although individual countermeasures have been taken against terrorism, the world is not yet in a position to completely eliminate this curse of human civilization. The important task is to find out the emerging new cause of terrorism or analyze the psychology.

The efforts of the state to

maintain security in the face of terrorist threats should go hand in hand with a new international mechanism bolstered by a multidimensional and multilayered approach based on coordination and intelligence sharing. The world has got tremendous opportunities and excellent platforms such as G 20 and Quad wherein a lot of sharing and learning can generate a solid combating mech-

Transition from road to rail is an opportunity worth exploiting

Chugging along the sustainability track, the railway holds tremendous potential to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and an opportunity for logistic providers

◄ransition from Road to rail', a topic of great traction from all quarters, is finally gaining heat with the concerted efforts from all the stakeholders government, logistics players and the user fraternity. But why is this shift necessary? According to some research estimates, Rail produces 75% fewer CO2 emissions per tonne-kilometre than that of road freight transport. Congress nod a must to prevent calamitous default

but now Congress has only but now Congress has only days to approve a package that includes spending cuts and would avert a potentially disastrous US default. The compromise announced late Saturday risks angering both Democratic and Republican lawmakers as they begin to unpack the concessions. Negotiators agreed to some Republican demands for increased work requirements for recipients of food stamps that House Democrats had called a nonstarter. But bargainers stopped short of greater spending cuts overall that Republicans wanted.

Support from both parties will be needed to win congressional approval before a projected June 5 government default on US debts.

Lawmakers are not expected to return to work from the Memorial Day weekend before Tuesday, at the earliest, and McCarthy has promised law-makers he will abide by the rule to post any bill for 72 hours before voting.

Driving hard for a deal to impose tougher work requirements on government aid recipients, Republicans achieved some but not all of what they wanted. The agreement would raise the age for existing work requirements on able-bodied adults, from 49 to 54, without children. Biden was able to secure waivers for veterans and the homeless.

Joe, McCarthy reach 1 killed in 'largest drone attack' on Kyiv Day

Ukraine's capital was subjected to the largest drone attack since the start of Russia's war, local officials said, as Kyiv prepared to mark the anniversary of its founding on Sunday.

At least one person was killed. Russia launched the "most massive attack" on the city overnight Saturday with Iranian-made Shahed drones,

ranian-made snaned drones, said Serhii Popko, a senior Kyiv military official.

The attack lasted more than five hours, with air defense reportedly shooting down more than 40 drones. down more than 40 drones.

A 41-year-old man was killed and a 35-year-old woman was hospitalised when debris fell on a seven-story nonresidential building and started a fire, Kyiv Mayor Vitali Klitschko said.

Debris from a drone damaged the building of the Ukrainian Society of the Blind. On Sunday morning, organisation member Volodymyr Golubenko came to

Mykola, who searched for his try. father's belongings among the rubble and at the same time tried to describe to his father what his office looks like now. "This wall on the right is

destroyed and on left also," said Mykola to his father.

Volodymyr Golubenko worked at this place for more than 40 years. He says it is a home for many blind people, because they come here to talk

and support each other.

"If you don't even have a job, it's difficult to get a job now, because these events (war) have been going on since last year. At least people come here to chat," said Volodymyr.

Like Golubenko, many people in his district heard the sound of Shahed drones for the first time. Among them was 36year-old Yana, who has three boys. The family hid in a corridor all night. "Something started to explode above us. The children ran here in fear,"

Ukraine's air force said that Saturday night was also recordbreaking in terms of Shahed

Of the 54 drones launched, 52 were shot down by air defense systems.

In the northeastern Kharkiv province, regional Gov. Oleh Syniehubov said a 61-year-old woman and a 60year-old man were killed in two separate shelling attacks.

Kyiv Day marks the anniversary of the city's official founding. The day is usually celebrated with live concerts, street fairs, exhibitions and fireworks. Scaled-back festivities were planned for this year, the city's 1,541st anniversary. The timing of the drone attacks was likely not coinci-

dental, Ukrainian officials said. 'The history of Ukraine is a long-standing irritant for the insecure Russians," Ukraine's chief presidential aide, Andriy Yermak, said on Telegram.

"Today, the enemy decided to congratulate' the people of Kyiv on Kyiv Day with the help of their deadly UAVs (unmanned aerial vehicles)," Popko also wrote on the messaging app. Local officials in

tems destroyed several drones as they approached the Ilsky oil refinery. Russia's southern Belgorod region, bordering Ukraine, also came under attack from Ukrainian forces on Saturday, local officials said.

Drone attacks against Russian border regions have been a regular occurrence since the start of the invasion in February 2022, with attacks increasing last month.

Earlier this month, an oil refinery in Krasnodar was attacked by drones on two straight days.

Ukrainian air defences, bolstered by sophisticated Western-supplied systems, have been adept at thwarting Russian air attacks — both drones and aircraft missiles. Earlier in May, Ukraine prevented an intense Russian air attack on Kyiv, shooting down all missiles aimed at the capiacross Ukraine, included six Russian Kinzhal aero-ballistic hypersonic missiles, repeatedy touted by Russian President Ýladimir Putin as providing a key strategic competitive advantage and among the most advanced weapons in his country's arsenal.

Sophisticated Western air defence systems, including American-made Patriot missiles, have helped spare Kyiv from the kind of destruction witnessed along the main front line in the country's east and south. While most of the ground fighting is stalemated along that front line, both sides are targeting other territory

with long-range weapons.

Against the backdrop of Saturday night's drone attacks, Russia's ambassador to the UK, Andrei Kelin, warned of an escalation in Ukraine. He told the BBC on Sunday his country had "enormous resources" and it was yet to "act very seriously," cautioning that Western supplies of weapons to Ukraine risked escalating the war to a

Turkiye elections: Erdogan takes lead in unofficial count

Preliminary, unofficial results from Turkiye's state Anadolu news agency showed incumbent President Recep Tayyip Erdogan ahead with 67 per cent of ballot boxes counted, while a competing news agency gave a slight lead to the opposition candidate in a presidential runoff that will decide whether the country's longtime leader stretches his increasingly authoritarian rule into a third decade. Anadolu showed Erdogan at 55 per cent, and his challenger, Kemal Kilicdaroglu, at 45 per cent.

Meanwhile, the ANKA news agency, close to the opposition, showed the results at 51 per cent for Kilicdaroglu and Erdogan at 49 per cent, with 69 per cent of ballot boxes counted. The outcome could have implications far beyond Ankara. Turkiye stands at the crossroads of Europe and Asia, and it plays a key role in

Erdogan's government vetoed Sweden's bid to join NATO and purchased Russian missile-defence systems, which prompted the United States to oust Turkiye from a US-led fighter-jet project. But it also helped broker a crucial deal that allowed Ukrainian grain shipments and averted a global food crisis.

"But I trust in the common sense of the people. Democracy will come, freedom will come, people will be able to wander the streets and freely criticize

Speaking to reporters after casting his vote at a school in Istanbul, Erdogan noted that it's the first presidential runoff election in Turkiye's history.

He also praised high voter turnout in the first round and said he expected participation to be high again on Sunday. He voted at the same time as Kilicdaroglu, as local television showed the rivals casting ballots on split screens.

"I pray to God, that it (the election) will be beneficial for our country and nation," he

Erdogan transformed the presidency from a largely ceremonial role to a powerful office through a narrowly won 2017 referendum that scrapped Turkiye's parliamentary system of governance. He was the first directly elected president in 2014, and won the 2018 election that ushered in the executive presidency.

The first half of Erdogan's

tenure included reforms that allowed the country to begin talks to join the European Union, and economic growth that lifted many out of poverpress freedoms and the media and concentrated more power in his own hands, especially after a failed coup attempt that Turkiye says was orchestrated by the US-based Islamic cleric Fethullah Gulen. The cleric denies involvement.

Erdogan's rival is a softmannered former civil servant who has led the pro-secular Republican People's Party, or CHP, since 2010. Kilicdaroglu campaigned on promises to reverse Erdogan's democratic backsliding, to restore the economy by reverting to more conventional policies, and to improve ties with the West.

In a frantic effort to reach out to nationalist voters in the runoff, Kilicdaroglu vowed to send back refugees and ruled out peace negotiations with Kurdish militants if he is elected. A defeat for Kilicdaroglu would add to a long list of electoral losses to Erdogan, and put pressure on him to step down as party chairman.

Erdogan's AKP party and its allies retained a majority of seats in parliament following a legislative election that was also held on May 14.

Erdogan's party dominated in the earthquake-hit region, winning 10 out of 11 provinces in an area that has traditionally supported the president. Erdogan came in ahead in the first round presidential race in eight of those provinces.

Man who opened plane's exit door mid-air gets ten years in prison

Seoul (AP): A man who opened an emergency exit door during a flight in South Korea was formally arrested on Sunday and faces up to 10 years in prison on a charge of violating the aviation security law, officials said. During a preliminary questioning, the 33-yearold told investigators that he felt suffocated and tried to get off the plane quickly, according to

Twelve people were slightly injured on Friday after he opened the door of the Asiana Airlines Airbus A321-200, causing air to blast inside the cabin and terrifying passengers.

Some testified they suffered severe ear pain and saw others screaming and crying. A video shared on social media shows passengers' hair being whipped by air blowing into

Normally, the emergency exit doors cannot be opened mid-flight due to the difference in air pressure inside and outside of the aircraft. But during Friday's inci-

dent, the man succeeded in opening the door likely because the plane was flying at a low altitude while preparing to land and there wasn't much difference in pressure, according to Asiana Airlines officials.

The Transport Ministry said the plane was at 700 feet (213 metres) when the man pulled the door open. The plane was preparing to land in Daegu on an hour-long flight from the southern island of Jeju with 200 people on board.

n Daegu approved a warrant to formally arrest the man. CBIC issues SOPs for scrutiny of GST returns for FY'20 onwards

PTI NEW DELHI

The CBIC has come out with ▲ a standard operating procedure (SoP) for scrutiny of GST returns for fiscal 2019-20 onwards under which the analytics unit will identify returns for scrutiny depending on various risk parameters.

As per the SoP, the selection of returns for scrutiny will be done by the Directorate General of Analytics and Risk Management (DGARM) based on various risk parameters identified by them. DGARM will select the GSTINs registered with the Central Tax



authorities, and the details of the GSTINs selected will be made available on the scrutiny dashboard of the concerned Central Tax officer on the ACES-GST application.

The details of the risk parameters, in respect of which risk has been identified for a particular GSTIN, and the amount of tax/ discrepancy involved in respect of the conLikely revenue implication), will also be shown on the scrutiny dashboard of the proper officer for their convenience," this month, the Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC) had rolled out a module for automated scrutiny of

GST returns.

The module enables tax officers to carry out scrutiny of GST returns of Centre administered taxpayers selected on the basis of data analytics and risks identified by the System.

The SoP further said that as the data made available on the dashboard has been generated at a particular point in time for the calculation of risk parameters, this data may undergo a change at the time of scrutiny of returns, due to subsequent compliances carried out by the taxpayer or by the suppliers of the taxpayer. The concerned tax officer shall, therefore, rely upon the latest available data, it

The concerned Central Tax officer would have to conduct scrutiny of returns pertaining to a minimum of 4 GSTINs every month, which would include scrutiny of all returns pertaining to a financial year for which

added.

the said GSTIN has been selected for scrutiny.

"As far as possible, scrutiny of return should have a minimal interface between the proper officer and the registered person and, there should normally not be any need for seeking documents/ records from the registered persons before issuance of Form GST ASMT-10," it added.

GST ASMT-10 is a scrutiny notice that a tax officer would send to an assessee.

On receipt of such notice in GST ASMT-10 on the common portal, the registered person may accept the discrepancy and pay the tax, interest and any other amount arising from such discrepancy and inform the same or may furnish an explanation for the discrepancy in Form GST ASMT-11, through the common portal, to the proper officer within the specified time period of 30 days, the

SoP added. Abhishek Jain, Partner & National Head - Indirect Tax, KPMG in India said these SOP would bring a uniform and consistent methodology to authorities to perform the scrutiny of returns filed by tax-

payers. Now businesses should

pare requisite reconciliations with intact reasons/ records to substantiate such differences.

'UPI to account for 90% of retail digital payments by 2026-27'

rowing at a steady pace, UPI transactions are likely to reach 1 billion per day by 2026-27, accounting for 90 per cent of the retail digital payments in the country, said a

PwC India report.
Unified Payments Interface
(UPI), which is driving the digital payments revolution, accounted for about 75 per cent of the total transaction volume in the retail segment during 2022-23, said the PwC report titled "The Indian Payments Handbook - 2022-27".

UPI is projected to account for 90 per cent of the total transaction volume in retail digital payments over the next five years, the report said.

The Indian digital payments market saw steady growth at a CAGR of 50 per cent (volume-wise) and is expected to reach 411 billion transactions in FY 2026-27 from 103 billion in FY 2022-23,

"It is estimated that UPI will record 1 billion transactions per day by FY2026-2027, going from 83.71 billion transactions in 2022-23 to 379 billion transactions by 2026-27,"

It further said the credit card segment continues to

grow at a healthy rate, as card (both debit and credit) payment is one of the most used instruments for retail digital payments after UPI. The volume of transactions in credit cards is expected to surpass debit cards by FY 2024-2025.

While credit card issuance is expected to grow at a healthy CAGR of 21 per cent in the next five years, debit card issuance is expected to have a stagnant growth with a CAGR of 3 per cent in the same period, the report said. The decline in debit card

usage is because the major use case of debit card transactions is cash withdrawal, which can now be replaced by an easier way of withdrawing cash using UPI," it added.

Mihir Gandhi, Partner and Payments Transformation Leader, PwC India, said that in the next five years, the payments industry is expected to

focus on ecosystem expansion and new use cases for existing payment platforms.

"Areas like embedded and ecosystem finance, digital lending based on payment trans-actions and offline payments will drive the next phase of growth for the payments industry. In the ever-evolving Indian payments landscape, innovation and inclusion are paving the way for a seamless digital economy," Gandhi said.

The PwC report further said revenue through the credit card business accounts for nearly 76 per cent of the overall cards' revenue in 2022-2023, making it a lucrative business segment for banks, NBFCs and FinTech.

The revenue for credit card issuance increased by 42 per cent in 2022-2023 compared to 2021-2022 and is likely to grow by a CAGR of 33 per cent for the next five years, it added.

Global trends, macroeconomic data to drive equity markets this week: Analysts

Stock markets would be largely driven by macroeconomic data, auto sales numbers, FII inflows and global trends this week, analysts said.

The US debt ceiling negotiations and institutional flows will also be watched by investors

"This week, market participants will closely monitor institutional flows, as there is a historical observation that when both FIIs and DIIs become net buyers simultaneously, there is a likelihood of some profit-booking in the market," said Santosh Meena, Head of Research, Swastika Investmart Ltd.

On the global front, the US debt ceiling issue holds significant importance, alongside US macroeconomic indicators, movement of the US bond yields, the dollar index and crude oil prices, Meena added.

President Joe Biden said a deal to resolve the government's debt ceiling crisis seemed "very close" late Friday, even as the deadline for a potentially catastrophic default was pushed back to June 5.

Domestically, attention will be directed towards key macroeconomic data, including GDP figures and monthly auto



"This week marks the beginning of the new month also so participants will be eyeing high-frequency data viz. Auto sales, manufacturing PMI and services PMI data. Before that, GDP data scheduled on May 31, will also be on their radar," said Ajit Mishra, VP Research, Religare Broking.

PMI data for the manufacturing sector is scheduled to come on Thursday.

Apart from these factors the performance of the US markets amid the ongoing debt ceiling talks will be in focus, he added. Last week, the BSE benchmark jumped 772.01 points or 1.25 per cent.

Stock markets ended a two-week-long consolidation phase and gained over oneand-a-half per cent.

Tax collection in India one of the highest, reduce direct tax to 25% from 40%: Bhalla

While India is not the richest country in the world, the tax collection here is one of the highest and the income tax rate should be reduced to 25 per cent from around 40 per cent at present, eminent economist Surjit Bhalla said.

While speaking to PTI, Bhalla said reduction in tax rate is required to accelerate the pace of economic growth.

"We are a much more globalised economy in the world and the world is a lot more globalised. If you look at the overall tax rate structure in India, collection of taxes is one of the highest in the world and we are not the richest economy of the world," Bhalla said.

He said that tax collection by state, Centre and local bodies is around 19 per cent of India's GDP.

"We should move towards reducing it by 2 percentage points. As far as direct taxes are concerned, I think the overall tax rate should not be more than 25 per cent. Right now it is close to 40 with surcharges etc. 25 per cent, which is our corporate tax rate, that's what our income tax rate should be," Bhalla said.

Currently, the highest income tax rate in India stands at 39 per cent. The Budget

2023-24 had lowered India's highest rate of income tax from

42.74 per cent, by reducing the

surcharge applicable on high

net-worth individuals. Bhalla said that taxes need to come down for all and not just benefit a select section of the

India's gross direct tax collection during the last fiscal ended March 2023 grew over 20 per cent to Rs 19.68 lakh crore.

This includes gross corporate tax collection growth of 16.91 per cent at over Rs 10.04 lakh crore. Gross personal I-T collection jumped 24.23 per cent to over Rs 9.60 lakh crore.

Bhalla said direct tax is one of the areas where there is a lot of bureaucratic involvement and it should be a lot more streamlined to minimise tax

The upcoming Digital Personal Data Protection al changes" among those platforms in India that have for long exploited or misused personal data, Union minister Rajeev Chandrasekhar has asserted.

In an interview to PTI, the minister of state for IT and electronics also sought to allay concerns around the issue of government-appointed fact check body, saying the move is not about censorship at all, rather it gives the Centre an opportunity to clarify and respond to any misinformation related to it, something that is critical in a democracy

Misinformation, he said, is not to be confused with right to free speech. The minister noted that misinformation tends to travel 10-15 times faster, and reaches an audience 20-50 times more, than truth. He emphasised that it is absolutely critical that in a democracy if someone says something false about the



government, to create hatred, to incite violence, or to just create mistrust, "the government must have an opportunity to say no, this is not true".

"So there is no censorship, there no restriction on free speech. This is simply about saying what is patently false, is patently false. And that is certainly not to be confused or deliberately distorted to imply that this is a crackdown on free speech," Chandrasekhar said.

The minister's comment assumes significance as the decision to notify an entity that will flag false information posted online pertaining to the government has raised concerns in some quarters on whether it gives government absolute powers.

"I think there is some misunderstanding about what it is we are trying to do," the minister said when asked about the

"Misinformation is expressly an area that has already been prescribed in the rules as an area that platforms have to do significant work in moderating misinformation if they are to enjoy Section 79 protection. It is already mandated in the rules

of October 2022," he said. Rather, the fact check unit aims to help platforms in identifying false content posted about the government.

"It is not an opinion. It is not about saying that we will create another narrative about the government," Chandrasekhar

On the digital personal data protection (DPDP) bill, which will be introduced in the coming session of Parliament, the minister said the draft legislation has undergone a lot of consultation and is designed as "a truly world class piece of legis-

Investors are give due importance to ESG aspects into their decision-making processes, and consumers are expecting more goods and services from businesses that exhibit ethical and sustainable business practices. Governments and regulatory organizations are also stressing on the need of achieving sustainable development and enforcing higher reporting standards

As a statutory body, the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) regulates the profession of Chartered Accountants in India. A strong tradition of public ser-

vice and economic development prehensive and integrated has distinguished the ICAI as the world's leading body of knowledge for accountancy. With the mission to formulate comprehensive and globally comparable standards for measuring and disclosing non-financial information about an entity's progress towards the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 2030, theICAI constituted the Sustainability Reporting Standards Board (SRSB) in February 2020. Several initiatives have been launched by the Board over the years to revolutionize the ideology behind sustainable reporting such as introduction of Sustainability Assurance Engagement Standards, certificate courseon BRSR reporting, social audit standards, etc.

In May 2021, SEBI made a notable shift towards the adoption of Business Responsibility Sustainability Reporting (BRSR) framework in recognition of the need for a more com-

approach towards sustainability reporting. The BRSR framework acknowledges that sustainability issues should not be ignored or considered as a side issue, instead, they ought to be thoroughly incorporated into a company's overall operations and strategies by acknowledging the connection between sustainability and commercial performance. BRSR framework focuses on transparency and comparability. Organizations can give stakeholders reliable information about their sustainability practices by adopting a standardized approach to reportingand can also better streamline decisionmaking, increase transparency, and align sustainability with their core business strategy. This makes it possible for stakeholders like consumers, employees, and investors to assess the sustainability performance of various businesses and make educated decisions. The sustainabil-



ity board of ICAI has come out with an innovative approach towards measuring an organs ISAR ion maturity towards BRSR. On 18th March 2021, SRSB launched itsSustainability Reporting Maturity Model (SRMM Version 1.0") as a grading/scoring methodology for BRSR released by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) as part of its initiatives to build the sustainability ecosystem in the nation. This maturity model records an organization's progress towards sustainability reporting through four distinct degrees of sustainability maturity. Based on the changes brought in by the SEBI BRSR circular, SRMM Version 1.0, was further updated to Version 2.0 by the board. To assist organizations in implementing the SRMM, the SRSB has also set up a network of training and support facilities and tools and resources. The SRMM is a self-assess-

ment tool which gives organizations a clear structure and path so they can evaluate where they are now and where they need to improve. Second, the model also encourages organizations to go up through the levels, promoting the maturity of sustainability reporting. The approach helps organizations gradually improve their reporting procedures and incorporate sustainability into their primary business strategy by outlining a clear path. The model has four unique stages, each of which corresponds to a different level of sustainability reporting maturity. All 4 levels are defined based on the overall range of scores that a corporate entity has scored within a fiscal year using the BRSR scoring system. The SRMM has a total score of 300 points divided across all the sections of BRSR. By assigning a score of 75 out of 300 to leadership indicators, firms are encouraged to set goals for achieving them.

A company scoring up to 25% falls in the first stage or the Formative stage of SRMM. This stage implies that the company is in the nascent stage of reporting and is still outlining the fundamental facts and identifying the need and responsibility of BRSR. A company scoring more than 25% and up to 50% falls under the Emerging stage which is the 2nd stage in the SRMM. Tsitsipas survives scare to reach second round

Stefanos Tsitsipas held off a Spirited comeback from Jiri Vesely to reach the second round of the French Open on Sunday with a four-set win.

The Greek fifth seed, who blew a two-set lead to lose the 2021 final to Novak Djokovic, won 7-5, 6-3, 4-6, 7-6 (9/7) on Court Philippe Chatrier.

He will next face either Spaniard Roberto Carballes Baena or qualifier Emilio

Tsitsipas appeared to be cruising to victory after battling through the first two sets. But world number 455 Vesely, who had previously only played in two second-tier

forced a fourth set. The Czech left-hander should have pushed the match into a decider, but saw four set points slip away in the fourthset tie-break before Tsitsipas clinched a round-two place with a crunching forehand



Aryna Sabalenka kept her Acool to win a politically-charged French Open duel against Marta Kostyuk on Sunday as jeers rained down after the defeated Ukrainian refused to shake hands with her

Belarusian opponent. World number two and Australian Open champion Sabalenka swept 10 of the last 12 games to win 6-3, 6-2 as she kick-started her push to reach the second week in Paris for the

Kostyuk honoured her pledge not to shake hands with Sabalenka in protest at Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Belarus is a key military ally of Moscow.

"It was a very tough match, tough emotionally. I didn't know if the booing was against me but thank you so much for your support, it's really important," said Sabalenka who performed a theatrical bow to the sparse Court Philippe Chatrier crowd.

Kostyuk, 20, famously refused to shake hands with Sabalenka's Belarusian compatriot and former world number one Victoria Azarenka at the US Open last year.

She opted instead for a cursory touch of racquets at the net. The 39th-ranked Kostyuk



of her country.

When she won her first career WTA title in Austin earlier this year with victory over Russia's Varvara Gracheva, she dedicated it to her country and "all the people who are fighting

and dying".

On Sunday, Kostyuk, ranked 39, enjoyed the first break of the match to lead 3-2 but the more powerful Sabalenka roared back, sweeping the next four games to

No extra pressure on Alcaraz at French Open: Ferrero

There is no added pressure on Carlos Alcaraz to win his second Grand Slam title at the French Open, his coach Juan Carlos Ferrero said on Sunday.

The world number one will start his first Slam tournament since winning last year's US Open in the next two days, attempting to step into the absent Rafael Nadal's shoes by lifting the tro-

Alcaraz will play Italian qualifier Flavio Cobolli in the first round.

"I think of course (having) won a Grand Slam already, 19 years old, now 20, it's gonna help him to believe that he can make it again," said Ferrero, who won the Roland Garros title 20 years

sure. So that's what we believe, and I think we are prepared to make a great tournament. "Of course everybody can lose in

the first round, you don't have a clue. "But I think we (have) played a very good clay season at the moment, and this is the last one, so we are gonna try to give our best to make the

best tournament possible with no Alcaraz, the youngest man to ever reach the top of the world rankings, has successfully defended the Barcelona and Madrid Open titles in the clay-court

The 20-year-old Spaniard, who lost in the quarter-finals at the French Open to Alexander Zverev last year, faces a tricky path to a potential semi-final against Novak Djokovic.

He could face in-form youngster Lorenzo Musetti in the last 16, while 2021 runner-up Stefanos Tsitsipas is a possible quarter-final opponent. Ferrero thinks that Alcaraz is bet-

Verstappen wins Monaco GP to extend F1 championship lead and more suited to the wet

Formula One champion Max Verstappen's lights-toflag victory win at the Monaco Grand gave the Red Bull driver his fourth victory of the season and extended his championship lead on Sunday.

Spanish veteran Fernando Alonso was a season's best second for Aston Martin as he collected a fifth podium in six races, while Frenchman Esteban Ocon secured third place and a rare podium for

For most of the race, Verstappen coasted on a dry

and narrow track where overtaking is the hardest in F1.

But an incident-free race in Monaco is rare and heavy rain played havoc with about 20 of the 78 laps left. Some drivers had pitted for the wrong medium tires shortly before the downpour and slid around.

Ferrari's Carlos Sainz Jr. Glided sideways into the barriers and was lucky not to damage his Ferrari. Kevin Magnussen lost control of his Haas and Lance Stroll retired after damaging his Aston

Red Bull had wisely put Verstappen on the versatile



conditions intermediates on Lap 56 and they carried him to his second win in Monaco. The first was in 2021.

Lewis Hamilton finished fourth for Mercedes and picked up a point for fastest lap. His teammate George Russell was fifth, having earlier almost slammed into Sergio Perez's Red Bull as visibility worsened. A serious crash was somehow avoided in a hectic few minutes before the rain eased off.

On Saturday, Verstappen just edged out Alonso to deny the 41-year Spaniard his first
