MOST WANTED TERRORIST NABBED IN DELHI

In a breakthrough against the Pune ISIS module, the Delhi Police arrested three Islamic State terrorists on Monday. One of them is Mohammad Shahnawaz, also known as Shafi Uzzama, who had a reward of ₹3 lakh on his head. Shahnawaz was on the most wanted list of the National Investigation Agency (NIA).

According to the Delhi Police, the trio had been planning to carry out terror incidents in north India, taking instructions from handlers based abroad.

Addressing a Press briefing, Special Commissioner of Police (Special Cell) HS Dhaliwal, said, "Last month NIA declared award on three persons allegedly involved in blast cases. Among them, Mohammad Shahnawaz, the main accused, has been arrested with his two associates — Mohammad Rizwan Ashraf and Mohammad Arshad Warsi."

Shahnawaz was arrested from Southeast Delhi's Jaitpur area on Sunday night. Ashraf and Arshad were nabbed from Lucknow and Moradabad in Uttar Pradesh, respectively All the three suspected terrorists, who are engineers and have expertise in assembling bombs, were produced in a court earlier in the morning and have been sent to seven days of police custody.

While responding to media queries, Dhaliwal said, "Shahnawaz is a mining engi-

neer from Visvesvarava Institute of Technology, and he had knowledge of blast mechanisms. He hails from Hazaribagh in Jharkhand. His wife, Basanti Patel, is converted to Islam and is now known as Mariam. She is currently on

Dhaliwal added that bomb making literature sent from Pakistan-based handlers and other incriminating materials were recovered from Shahnawaz's hideouts.

He said initial interrogation revealed that these people conducted elaborate reconnaissance in Western Ghats, southern India, including Hubbali, Dharwad, and Ahmedabad in Gujarat to establish their hide-

They wanted to make their base in Western Ghats, the police said. During the investhey had been instructed to procure all items they needed locally so that external role in their work is not exposed.

Shahnawaz had managed to escape from the custody of the Pune Police. Last month, the NIA had released pictures of Shahnawaz, who was wanted in the Pune ISIS (Islamic State of Iraq and Syria) mod-

'The arrests were made following a tipoff from an arrested accused of another ISIS module in Delhi. Elementary plastic tubes, iron pipes, different types of chemicals, timing devices, etc, which could have been used in making explosive devices, were seized from Shahnawaz, along with a pistol and cartridges," the police

alleged.
Dhaliwal said the ongoing

tigation, it was revealed that crackdown has exposed the pan-India reach of the ISIS module. "Their aim was to target well-known people and inflict maximum casualties," he said, adding that they have also uncovered the funding trail behind such activities.

> Warsi, police said, is also from Jharkhand. He had completed a BTech in Mechanical Engineering from Aligarh University and was pursuing a doctorate from Jamia Millia Islamia in Delhi. Ashraf holds a BTech in computer science. Originally from Azamgarh in Uttar Pradesh, he had also trained as a cleric.

Shahnawaz, Abdulla and Rizwan were radicalised into joining the ISIS mission over Telegram app, it is learnt. It is alleged that they were linked to an ISIS module at Pune in Maharashtra.
Initially dismissed as petty

thieves, further questioning revealed their association with ISIS as part of a sleeper cell.

Shaĥnawaz, along with two accomplices named Mohammad Imran Mohammad Yunus Khan and Mohammad Yunus Mohammad Yakub Saki, faced arrest by the Kothrud police in Pune on July 18 after attempting to steal a two-wheeler. While the police were en route to their residence in Kondhwa, Pune, for a search operation,

Shahnawaz made a daring escape by leaping out of the police vehicle. Police uncovered that Khan and Saki, who originally hailed from Ratlam in Madhya Pradesh, were purportedly implicated in a different terrorism case registered in Rajasthan.

In this case, explosives were found inside a car back in March 2022. Both Khan and Saki carried a reward of ₹5 lakh each for information leading to their capture. On July 22, the Maharashtra Anti-Terrorism Squad assumed control of the investigation. As part of their probe, the ATS detained more individuals, including an IT engineer named Qadir Dastagir Pathan and SN Kazi in

Khalistanis lay siege to Indian mission in UK

Agroup of pro-Khalistan protesters on Monday gathered outside the High Commission of India here. waving anti-India placards and chanting slogans amid strong Scotland Yard presence.

The protest, which was promoted by British Sikh groups on social media, was organised to draw attention to Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's allegations last month of alleged Indian involvement in the killing of wanted terrorist Hardeep Singh Nijjar in Canada.

The allegation has been strongly rejected by the Ministry of External Affairs as "absurd and motivated".

"Sikhs will raise domestic issues, including the suspicious death of activist Bhai Avtar Singh Khanda," reads the call for Monday's protest.

There were several uniformed Metropolitan Police officers on guard and patrolling on foot outside India House, which was cordoned off to restrict the small group of turbaned men and some women opposite the building outside Waldorf Hotel at Aldwych in

central London.

Several police vehicles also patrolled the area throughout the roughly two-hour-long demonstration during which the protesters made speeches in Punjabi and raised pro-Khalistan slogans. Earlier on Monday, the Sikh Federation (UK) organ-

ised a press conference in London to announce a formal request being submitted to the Chief Coroner for England and Wales to open an inquest into the death of Avtar Singh Khanda, a pro-Khalistan UKbased Sikh activist who died in Birmingham in June. "Given the timing of

Khanda's death, and the fact that death threats had been made by those with connections to Indian politics before his death, his case is at the very least suspicious," said Michael Polak, the family's barrister.

Following speculation around the 45-year-old's passing earlier this year, the local West Midlands Police had stated that there were "no suspicious circumstances" surrounding the death. The official cause of death post-mortem was stated as acute leukaemia or blood cancer.

Earlier on Saturday, pro-Khalistan extremists blocked the Indian High Commissioner the UK, Dorwaiswami, from entering a gurdwara in Glasgow. The Indian mission dubbed the incident "disgraceful" before reporting it to the UK government.

In a statement issued on Saturday, the High High Commission of India in London said that three people from outside Scotland "deliberately disrupted" the visit on Friday evening, and one even attempted to violently force open the diplomatic vehicle as senior diplomats arrived at Glasgow Gurdwara Guru Granth Sahib on Albert Drive.

As they hurled threats and abuses, abuses, the High Commissioner (HC) and the Consul General of India (CG) decided to leave the premises to avert any further altercation.

"On September 29, 2023, three persons — all from areas outside Scotland — disrupted a planned interaction organised by the Gurdwara Committee for the community, the High Commissioner (HC) and the Consul General of India (CG)," said the High Commission of India statement.

Caste survey opens can of worms Jeene Bhi Do Yaaro

The Nitish Kumar-led Government in Bihar on Monday released findings of its long-awaited caste survey, disclosing that Other Backward Backward Classes (EBCs) together make up a significant 63 per cent of the State's entire population.
The first Caste Census was

conducted during the British colonial era in 1872, with the last one taking place in 1931.

The data which could spur demands for similar castebased census elsewhere is a key agenda of the Opposition INDIA bloc. And this could provide an advantage to Nitish and his alliance in the upcoming elections in the Hindi heartland, where caste-based politics holds significant sway.

The Congress, which is a major constituent of the Opposition grouping called INDIA, has welcomed the announcement while another Grand Alliance partner Lalu Prasad-led RJD has expressed satisfaction that their longstanding demand for a caste census has finally been fulfilled.

The Opposition BJP, however, voiced dissatisfaction with the caste survey, stressing that it did not give an idea of the

realities" over the years.

State BJP president Samrat Choudhary said his party had "given its consent" for the exercise and would make an assessment of the findings which have now been made public.

According to the data released here by Development Commissioner Vivek Singh, the State's total population stood at a little over 13.07 crore, out of which the Extremely Backward Classes (36 per cent) were the largest social segment followed by the Other Backward Classes at

27.13 per cent. Backward caste politicians

"changed social and economic have long claimed that the

population of castes they represented numbered far more than the conventional wisdom based on the 1931 census, which was the last time a caste headcount was conducted and released.

The survey also stated that Yadavs, the OBC group to which Deputy Chief Minister Tejashwi Yadav belongs, were the largest in terms of the population, accounting for

14.27 per cent of the total. Dalits, also known as the Scheduled Castes, accounted for 19.65 per cent of the total population in the State, which is also home to nearly 22 lakh (1.68 per cent) people belonging to the Scheduled Tribes.

Those belonging to the "unreserved" category, which denotes the proverbial "upper castes" who dominated politics till the Mandal wave of the 1990s comprise 15.52 per cent

Nitish said he will convene a meeting of all the nine political parties with an electoral presence in the State legislature and the facts and figures will be shared with them

RJD president Lalu Prasad said declaring the survey will set the tone for a nationwide caste census which will be undertaken if "We form the next Government at the

Centre" Both the leaders have played an instrumental role in the formation of the INDIA bloc, which affirmed its commitment to holding a caste census at a meeting it held in

Bengaluru recently. The survey establishes that the State's population is overwhelmingly Hindu, with the majority community comprising 81.99 per cent of the total population, followed by

Muslims (17.70 per cent). Christians, Sikhs, Jains and those following other religions as also the non-believers have a minuscule presence, together making up for less than one

per cent of the total population.
The grand old party in recent months has pushed for caste census and announced if the Modi Government does not carry out a caste census, it will be conducted as soon as the Congress Government is ed so that every

can get their right. Interestingly the Congress in 2010 felt, being a secular State, should "discourage community distinction". The Group of Ministers headed by the then Union Minister Pranab Mukherjee decided that caste

census is not advisable.

Before that first Prime Minister late Jawaharlal Nehru took a stand against caste census while late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi too followed the

Nehru policy. Another Congress stalwart and former Prime Minister late Rajiv Gandhi had hit out at the VP Singh Government for implementing the Mandal Commission report on OBC reservations by saying it will

divide the country. The caste survey in Bihar was ordered last year after the Narendra Modi Government at the Centre made it clear that it would not be able to undertake a headcount of castes other than SCs and STs as part of the

Nobel for COVID saviours

Two scientists won and Prize in medicine on wo scientists won the Nobel Monday for discoveries that enabled the creation of mRNA vaccines against COVID-19 and that could be used to develop other shots in the

Hungarian-born American Katalin Karikó and American Drew Weissman were cited for contributing "to the unprecedented rate of vaccine development during one of the greatest threats to human health in modern times," according to the panel that awarded the prize in Stockholm.

The Nobel panel said the pair's "groundbreaking findings... Fundamentally changed

our understanding of how MRNA interacts with our and an adjunct professor at the immune system."

Traditionally, making vaccines required growing viruses or pieces of viruses — often in giant vats of cells or, like most flu shots, in chicken eggs — and then purifying them before next steps in brewing shots.

The messenger RNA approach is radically different. It starts with a snippet of genetic code that carries instructions for making proteins. Pick the right virus protein to target, and the body turns into a mini vaccine factory. But simply injecting lab-grown mRNA into the body triggered an inflammatory reaction that

mRNA technology, COVID would have been much worse.. Vaccines generally were the turning point in slowing down COVID and the mRNA vaccines were just so much better than all the others," he said, noting that the main vaccine used in the UK, made by AstraZeneca, is barely in use

"We would likely only now be coming out of the depths of COVID without the mRNA vaccines," Hunter said. Dr Bharat Pankhania, an

infectious diseases expert at Exeter University, said that a major advantage of mRNA technology was that vaccines could be made in extremely large quantities since their main components are made in laboratories.

Pankhania predicted the technology used in the vaccines could be used to refine vaccines for other diseases like Ebola, malaria and dengue, and might also be used to create shots that immunise people against certain types of cancer or auto-immune diseases like lupus. Continued on Page 2

INDIA tries to wrest BJP bastion

 $E^{\text{ven though Assembly elections}} \ \text{are nowhere on the}$ horizon in the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir in the near future, some of the key constituents of the INDIA alliance are gathering here to discuss their future strategy to checkmate the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in its stronghold of

the Jammu region.

A formal invitation has been extended to the opposition party leaders on behalf of Dr. Farooq Abdullah, President of the National Conference and Member Parliament from Srinagar, to take stock of the emerging political scenario in the region on Tuesday.

The invitation to attend the meeting has been extended to leaders of various opposition parties including Congress, People's Democratic Party (PDP), Awami National Conference (ANC) of Muzaffar Shah, CPI and CPI (M), Panthers Party (PP), Dogra Sadar Sabha (DSS), Shiv Sena, Akali Dal and few other small-

er political groups of the UT.

The meeting is scheduled to take place at the residence of Dr. Abdullah in the Bhatindi area of Jammu in the postlunch session.

Earlier, Dr Farooq Abdullah had convened similar meetings in Jammu to meet leaders from different political parties at his residence.

As per the political



grapevine, this crucial meeting is taking place amid growing resentment among the masses across the Jammu region.

The leaders from the opposition parties are expected to share their feedback and brainstorm on their future strategy to checkmate the BJP in its stronghold of the Jammu

The Opposition parties have already increased their political engagement with the masses across the Jammu

Leaders from the Kashmirbased mainstream political parties have been holding regular meetings with the party cadre and highlighting the grievances of the common masses to consolidate their footprints across the Jammu region. To begin with, they are focusing on the Pir Panjal and Chenab valley regions.

These parties had earlier lost their sizeable voter base across the Jammu region but now they are hopeful of finding a foothold amid growing resentment among the masses.

"It is too early to speculate whether these Opposition parties will join hands and contest 'unitedly' against the BJP to prevent it from winning the majority seats from the Jammu region", a senior political commentator told *The Pioneer*.

Leaders from different political parties have already onfirmed their attendance in Jammu in response to the invitation extended on behalf of Dr Abdullah by the former MLA from Kulgam, Mohd Yousuf

Barring the BJP several leaders from the opposition parties have been questioning the delay in holding the maiden assembly, Urban Local Bodies, and Panchayat polls in

Taking a dig at the BJP, J&K Congress president, Vikar Rasool Sunday said, "Why is BJP running away from holding Urban Local Bodies and Panchayat elections on time and finding security reasons & other excuses to defer these polls? The Congress party local unit Chief said, "the BJP was aiming to win 50 plus seats and suddenly they have gone into hiding and shying away from facing these elections".

"People are dissatisfied and the public at large is feeling restless in the absence of popular government in J&K", he

wenty-four deaths, including that of 12 infants, were reported between September 30 and October 1 in a government hospital in Nanded, a top Maharashtra health official

said on Monday. "In the last 24 hours, 24 deaths have been reported at Nanded government Hospital and Medical College (GMCH). Out of these, 12 are infants who were referred here by some local private hospitals. The remaining deaths are of adults for various reasons," Dr Dilip Mhaisekar, Director, Medical Education and Research, Maharashtra, told PTI.

Dean Dr S R Wakode of Dr Shankarrao Government Medical College and Hospital told reporters the 12 infants comprise six males and six females, adding that most were in the 0-3 day age group and had "very low

There are 142 admissions in the paediatric department, of which 42 are still critical. Oxygen as well as ventilator facilities are there. The patients are from neighbouring districts, including Hingoli, Parbhani and Washim. Some are from villages in neighbouring Telangana," he said.

Bengal BJP cries scams, justifies blocking of funds

While the BJP and Trinamool Congress locked horns over the freezing of the central funds under Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MNREGA) and Prime Minister's housing schemes Bengal Opposition Leader Suvendu Adhikari on Monday justified the Centre's action saying, "1.30 crore fake job cards have been found in Bengal after the Aadhar and voters cards were linked ... this is a big scam and needs a thorough investigation ...

Curiously Union Rural Development Minister Giriraj Singh too echoed Adhikari's views but provided different statistics to justify his claims. He too demanded a CBI investigation into what he called "job-card scam" but provided a different figure saying, "our probe teams were met with sus-tained non-cooperation from the Bengal Government and its administration. When the hour came to link the Aadhar cards with the job card holders of the scheme, we found that as many as 25 lakh job cards in the state were fake, belonging to either

Stations were being implemented in the right earnest, due to the lack of proactive interventions by other stakeholder agencies apart from Metro, their effectiveness was getting limited to the premise of the Metro Stations only.

Mother of constable killed by ex-colleague seeks strict punishment to accused

The mother of the woman L constable who was allegedly killed by her former colleague two years ago demanded strict action against the accused who had been deceiving them into believing that she was alive.

Three men, including the Delhi Police constable, his brother-in-law and another accomplice have been arrested for allegedly killing the woman, police said on Sunday.

The trio also deceived the victim's family into believing that she was alive by dropping false clues, they said.

"I had been running from pillar to post just to know about my daughter's whereabouts," the victim's mother told PTI over the phone from Bulandshahr.

"My younger daughter decided to meet the Delhi Police Commissioner a few months ago. He understood our problem and assured proper investigation. Police have now arrested the accused constable. We want strict action against him," she added.

Surender Singh (42) had been stalking the victim to marry him and when she refused to give in to his demands, he first strangled her and later buried the body near



a nullah near Pushta area.

His brother-in-law Ravin (26) and Rajpal (33) helped him in hiding the crime, the police had said

The police have recovered the skeletal remains of the victim from the Pushta area of Burari and sent them for DNA profiling to ascertain if they

belong to the woman, they said. The victim had resigned from Delhi Police after she was selected as a Sub-Inspector in Uttar Pradesh Police. She was meanwhile staying as a paying guest in the Mukherjee Nagar area when she went missing under mysterious circumstances.

A missing report of the 28year-old woman was lodged at the Mukherjee Nagar police station on October 20, 2021. Later, her family members had met the CP to know about her whereabouts. The Crime Branch of Delhi Police on September 30 had arrested the constable and two of his associates.

Abhishek, TMC stage dharna at Rajghat for release of funds

Trinamool Congress general secretary Abhishek Banerjee, along with party leaders and workers, sat on a dharna at the Rajghat on Mahatma Gandhi's birth anniversary on Monday demanding the release of funds for West Bengal by the Centre. The Lok Sabha member, accompanied by party leaders including MPs, MLAs and state ministers who had arrived from West Bengal to take part in the protest, paid tribfor two hours, sporting black armbands and displaying placards, after which they were escorted out by security personnel.

"They are scared that is why they are doing this... They talk about being a big party, but it is now visible that they are scared," Banerjee told media persons outside Rajghat before he was stopped by the police and the TMC protesters were asked to clear the area.

West Bengal Chief Minister and TMC supremo Mamata Banerjee was scheduled to attend the programme in New Delhi, but is unlikely to do so as she has been advised ten days of rest by doctors after she suffered an injury in her left knee during a recent trip to Spain and Dubai. The chief minister held a two-day sit-in in March this year against the Centre's alleged move of "not releasing funds" to the state for MGNREGA and other welfare schemes.

The TMC lashed out at the central government for "stopping" it from holding a "peaceful protest" and alleged that the protesters were heckled and manhandled by the security personnel. Banerjee later visited Lal Bahadur Shastri's memorial Vijay Ghat and paid tributes to the former prime minister on his birth

At Gandhi's samadhi, Banerjee held a placard demanding that the Centre "release fund for Bengal". Another placard read 'Bengal Deprived: 1 lakh 15 thousand crore families, ₹15,000 crore

The ruling Trinamool Congress in West

Bengal has accused the BJP-led NDA government of withholding ₹15,000 crore in dues to the state under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) and PM Awas Yojana.

HC stops pizza outlet from using 'Dominick Pizza' trademark **STAFF REPORTER** ■ NEW DELHI tion pertain to food items or

The Delhi High Court has issued a permanent injunction, barring a Ghaziabad-based pizza outlet from utilising the trademark 'Dominick Pizza', deeming it an infringement on the trademark of multinational pizza giant, Domino's Pizza.

Justice C. Hari Shankar, presiding over the case, stressed on the phonetic similarity between 'Domino's Pizza' and 'Dominick's Pizza,' characterising them as deceptively similar. The case stemmed from a

trademark infringement lawsuit filed by Domino's against Dominick Pizza for employing an identical name and employ-ing registered trademarks like 'Cheese Burst' and 'Pasta Italiano? The judge pointed out that

confusion was highly likely to arise when a customer of average intelligence with an imperoutlet and subsequently frequents a Dominick's Pizza out-The court further stressed

the responsibility of courts to prevent such imitative attempts in trademarks, particularly in the context of consumable items

"When the marks in ques-

eateries where food items are dispensed and served, a somewhat higher degree of care and caution is expected to be observed," the court said.

In August 2022, the court had issued an interim order against Dominick Pizza. In the final order, Justice Shankar expressed disapproval of operating an eatery with a mark deceptively similar to a wellknown mark. "The intent to capitalise on

the reputation of a known and established brand, by using a mark which is deceptively similar to the mark used by the brand, can, in a given case, give rise to a legitimate apprehension of quality compromise by the imitator," the court said. Moreover, the court clari-

fied that the determination of whether an infringing mark may cause confusion is primarily a matter of subjective dismatter to be decided based on customer evidence.

The court found that Dominick Pizza had unmistakably infringed Domino's Pizza's trademark. Hence, it restrained Dominick Pizza from using the name 'Dominick Pizza' as well as the marks 'Cheese Burst' and 'Pasta Italiano.'

Reproduction, dissemination of ISKCON Trust's work restrained

The Delhi High Court has restrained several entities from reproducing and disseminating content belonging to Bhaktivedanta Book Trust, established by ISKCON founder Srila Prabhupada, saying while there can be no copyright in religious scriptures, their adaptations which are "transformative works" like Ramanand Sagar's Ramayana or BR Chopra's Mahabharat — are entitled to protection from piracy.

Justice Prathiba M Singh, while dealing with the Trust's lawsuit on the issue, said copyright would vest in original parts of works which preach, teach or explain the scripture and the piracy of such copyrighted works of the plaintiff cannot be permitted.

"Defendant Nos.1 to 14 shall stand restrained in any manner from printing, reproducing, communicating, disseminating any part of the Plaintiff's works to the public either in print form or in



tronic form including through websites, mobile applications, weblinks, Instagram posts or any other posts on the social media as would result in the infringement of Plaintiff's copyright," ordered the court recently in an ex parte interim order.

It also directed Google LLC and Meta Platforms Inc to take down the infringing works from their platforms while ordering suspension and blocking of the offending links by the authorities.

The plaintiff submitted that it has copyright in all works of spiritual teacher Abhay Charanaravinda Bhaktivedanta

Prabhupada who simplified the religious books and scriptures and made it easy for the common man to understand

It was stated that during Prabhupada's lifetime and after his "Mahasamadhi" the plaintiff spread his teachings in various forms including printed and audio books, and the defendants were making them available on their online platforms, mobile apps and Instagram handles without any licence or right to reproduce or communicate them.

film on Mahatma Gandhi. "Gandhi", Attenborough's 1982 film which won multiple Academy Awards, continues to hold its magic for the audience, even more than 40 years since it hit the theatres. The biopic was shot on different locations in India, in cities like Delhi, Mumbai, Pune and Patna, among others.

In Delhi, Attenborough,

known for his attention to details, used original locations, such as the Birla House, the Rashtrapati Bhavan (earlier Viceroy House) and Rajpath (now Kartavya Path), as much as possible to recreate key events including Gandhi's assassination and the funeral march of 1948, for which an army of extras were hired. At Roshanara Club, a crick-

et match sequence was shot, with its lush green ground and British-era pavilion adding a layer of authenticity to the scene that was set in the early 20th century when Gandhi had visited Bihar, particularly Champaran district which would later serve as his 'karma-

Arsh Dala planning terror attacks: Intelligence

Designated "individual terrorist" Arshdeep Singh Gill alias Arsh Dala, based in Canada, involved in various criminal activities such as extortions and murders in India through his network of gangsters has now diversified his network to perpetrate terror attacks in the country.

Arsh Dala has formed an association with another USbased terrorist Gurpatwant Singh Pannun of banned terror outfit "Sikhs for Justice" for fanning anti-India activities, an Intelligence dossier has warned.

Arsh Dala has been designated "individual terrorist' under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967.

"It has come to notice that Arsh Dala has formed an association with USA-based Gurpatwant Singh Pannun of



Sikhs for Justice. It has been learnt that Arsh Dala and Gurpatwant Singh Pannun have colluded to carry out suspicious activity in Gurdaspur in Punjab," the report said.

The dossier further said, "Previous activities of Gurpatwant Singh Pannun suggest that he might look to hoist pro-Khalistan flags and graffiti on Government buildings and other public places but

his collusion with Arsh Dala this time suggests that they might try to carry out some terror activity."

Dala, according to the National Investigation Agency (NIA), has been operating from Canada for the last three-four years and allegedly executed many killings in Punjab over the last few years. "He has been guiding and commissioning

ing terror, violence and large scale extortion in India on behalf of the Khalistan Tiger Force (KTF). Besides smuggling weapons from Pakistan, they (Dala and his associates) were also involved in recruitment of youth to carry out acts of violence and terror in the country at the behest of the KTF," the NIA had earlier said.

NIA had registered a suo moto case on August 20, 2022 under various sections of the Indian Penal Code (IPC) and Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967 in connection with the terror activities of banned Khalistani ter-

rorist organisations in India. The agency has been cracking down on individual terrorist outfits and terrorists conspiring to smuggle terrorist hardware, such as arms, ammunition and explosives besides raising funds for carrying out terrorist acts in the

The syndicates run by Dala, Lakhbir Singh alias Landa and Lawrence Bishnoi among others have been alleged to be spreading their mafia style criminal networks in the northern States of India and were involved in commission of many sensational crimes, such as the murder of popular singer Sidhu Moosewala. and large-scale extortions from businessmen

and professionals. Their crimes, according to the NIA, included killing of Maharashtra builder Sanjay Biyani, as well Sandeep Nangal Ambia, an international Kabaddi organiser in Punjab.

Many of these conspiracies were found to have been masterminded from abroad, including Pakistan and Canada, or by leaders of syndicates lodged in jails, according to the

Personal consumption, possession of e-cigarettes violation of law: Ministry

 $\mathbf{I}^{ ext{n}}$ the wake of no let up in cases of air travellers arriving with e-cigarettes at various airports in the country, Union Health Ministry has clarified that its personal consumption as well as possession of any such devices in any form, quantity or manner is in violation of the Prohibition of Electronic Cigarette Act (PECA) 2019.

The clarification was sent to the Ministry of Civil Aviation (MCA) last month, official sources said, adding it will strengthen the enforcement of the ban.

There has been cases of consification of vaping devices from travellers passing through Mumbai, Bangalore, Chennai, Kolkata, Delhi and Bhavnagar airports. The travellers argue that they had purchase them for personal use.



Bengaluru Customs officials had held two persons for allegedly smuggling 1,590 packets of e-cigarettes worth Rs 15.9 lakh from Malaysia

The ministry said that though there is no explicit mention of prohibition of individual use of e-cigarette in PECA, the law has been enacted to prohibit the production, manufacture, import, export, transport, sale, distribution, storage and adver-

tisement of e- cigarettes. Therefore, possession of

in any quantity is not possible without contravening the provisions of PECA, 2019," said Dr Pulkesh Kumar, Deputy Secretary, Ministry of

The ban includes a prohibition on all forms of Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems, Heat Not Burn Products, e-Hookah and similar devices.

The law was enacted in the interest of public health and to protect the people from harm, the health ministry said.

Despite heavy penalties and imprisonment, e-cigarettes are reported to be widely available across a range of sources including tobacco vendors, general stores, and online providers.

The health ministry has also launched an online portal to facilitate reporting of violations under PECA. This portal will allow the ministry to take necessary action on violations. Anyone can report these violations


India scouting for indigenous POC test for antibiotic resistant typhoid strains

Grappling with two highly antibiotic resistant strains of typhoid fever, India is now scouting for indigenously developed improved point of care (POC) test that can help distinguish the duo variants so as to ensure effective management of the life-threatening dis-

In this connection, the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) under the Union Health Ministry has invited expression of interest (EOI) from the manufacturers and research institutes for development of diagnostic In Vitro kits for diagnosis of the drug resistant strains.

The move follows concerns that existing typhoid diagnostic tests, such as the Widal test, TUBEX, Typhidot, and Test-It (KIT), have shown sub-optimal sensitivity and specificity to the two serovars namely Salomenella. Typhi (S.



ca serovar Paratyphi (S. Paratyphi) which have become resistance to many antibiotics.

Moreover, the S Typhi and Paratyphi strains are indistinguishable, thus making it crucial for clinicians to differentiate between them before starting antibiotic therapy due to their different antibiotic susceptibility profiles, said an ICMR scientist on the need for

next generation in vitro kits. There is an urgent need for indigenously developed, improved typhoid POC tests

that offer higher sensitivity and specificity. Such tests would enable healthcare pro-Typhi) and Salmonella enterifessionals to promptly and accurately diagnose typhoid,

leading to more appropriate and targeted treatment, which in turn, could result in better patient outcomes and reduced antibiotic misuse," further added the scientist.

While the morbidity and mortality of S. Typhi make it a greater public health concern, the increasing prevalence of S. Paratyphi in certain regions necessitates a next-generation

Power play

Mamata sends her troops to Delhi to embarrass the Centre over non-payment of dues

Inile the BJP brass is busy formulating strategy for the upcoming Assembly elections in five States and meeting voters there, the wily West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee has unleashed a 4,000-strong contingent in Delhi under her TMC MP and nephew Abhishek Banerjee's charge. Mamata's party leaders and cadres are here for a two-day protest rally to highlight the NDA Government's apathy towards non-payment of Central scheme funds to the State's workers. Interestingly, while the BJP is seeking action in the poll-bound States, Mamata has brought her fight right at its very doorstep and fired the Capital's political atmosphere. The rally has garnered attention for several reasons, ranging from demands for the release of funds to the TMC's clash with the Enforcement Directorate (ED). Another interesting point remains as to why Mamata chose to hold her mega show of strength in faraway Delhi and what the BJP feels about it. The two-day protest in Delhi was prompted by mounting concerns



over the Centre's alleged neglect of West Bengal's development and the delay in releasing funds for vital schemes like the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA). Thousands of TMC leaders and supporters descended on the national Capital with a resolute mission — to voice their grievances against the Central Government.

On Gandhi Jayanti, the TMC MPs embarked on a sit-in at Rajghat to highlight their dedication to the principles of Mahatma Gandhi. The peaceful rally followed with TMC supporters and MGNREGA job card holders marching together to air their concerns. However, it was not a smooth ride for the TMC cadres from

Bengal to Delhi, with them facing unexpected hurdles. Initially, a special train was booked for the TMC supporters and MGNREGA job card holders, along with the party's 'panchayat pramukhs'. But the Railway Ministry abruptly cancelled the train, forcing the TMC to arrange for private buses to transport its supporters. Adding to the intrigue, the Enforcement Directorate summoned Mamata's nephew and party's number 2 leader Abhishek Banerjee for questioning on October 3, coinciding with the rally. Abhishek, however, has chosen to ignore the ED summons. As the rally unfolds, the nation awaits the outcome of this high-stakes showdown between the prominent parties. Though Mamata is challenging the BJP in the Capital, she has a lot to answer to people in her home State as there have been alleged irregularities in the disbursement of MGNREGA salaries by her Government, besides numerous cases of misappropriation of such funds. Union Minister Smriti Irani has also questioned the rationale behind the rally as TMC has failed to ensure even the minimum wages to tea garden workers in North Bengal. The BJP Minister is currently in Bengal, where she met tea workers in Siliguri. On the other hand, Mamata is a strong leader in her State and an important member of the INDIA bloc; her message in Delhi is indeed something the BJP must be watching very carefully.

BJP-AIADMK split: What next?



The AIADMK-BJP split does not augur well for the BJP which is trying hard to get a foothold in southern India

ould the split between the AIADMK and BJP be permanent? If so, this could hurt the BJP's chances of winning in Tamil Nadu since the AIADMK had supported them since J Jayalalithaa's passing in 2016. The decision to end its partnership with the NDA on a national and state level may put the BJP at a disadvantage.

The future political landscape could have an impact on the upcoming 2024 elections. It could cause a shift in power among Tamil Nadu parties and their alliances. This may result in the AIADMK losing the support of the Modi government, which has acted as a powerful ally.

According to experts, the separation between the BJP and AIADMK is expected to be temporary. The leaders of both parties have advised their members to refrain from making negative comments about each other. The BJP seeks more support in the Southern region and hopes to secure additional seats through partnerships.

Last week, former AIADMK minister Munuswamy announced that his party is severing ties with the BJP and NDA. He accused the BJP state chief, Annamalai, of deliberately tarnishing the reputation of respected party members, including former Chief Ministers CN Annadurai and Jayalalithaa. The decision may have a sig-

nificant impact on state and national politics. AIADMK is the lone major partner of the BJP at the national level. Previously, NDA included bigger parties like Shiv Sena, Akali Dal, Telugu Desam, and AIADMK. Still, now only AIADMK remains in the alliance. For the BJP, the loss is more significant. Despite earnest efforts, it has not established a substantial presence in Tamil Nadu — the power switches between the DMK and AIADMK since 1967. The AIADMK has ruled 30 out of their 50 years.

Tamil Nadu has two main political parties: AIADMK and DMK. AIADMK is a popular party with a large membership of AIADMK cadres view their two crore people, and it offers an alternative to DMK. The DMK hindrance. The BJP's attempt and AIADMK, the two main to win over voters in Tamil

The party's performance in the most recent Assembly polls in 2021 decreased the seats won, from 136 to 75. The DMK-Congress coalition took control of the government. In the 2019 Lok Šabha polls, AIADMK only secured one seat, a significant drop compared to their previous 37. Meanwhile, the DMK coalition's seats increased from Consequently connection with the BJP as a

Nadu failed due to differing ideologies. The Dravidian par-ties are non-believers, while BJP's primary election strategy is centred around Ram Temple in Ayodhya earlier and Sanathan dharma now.

The upcoming Lok Sabha elections are significant for the BJP, while the AIADMK focuses on the 2026 Assembly polls. The outcome will largely depend on the coalitions formed by the two Dravidian parties. Prime Minister Modi is determined to secure a third term in the 2024 elections.

Insiders suggest that Annamalai's behaviour was not the main reason for the

Despite numerous com-plaints, AIADMK is unhappy that the BJP has not taken action against Annamalai. There is a more significant disagreement over seat sharing. Both parties failed to win seats in Tamil Nadu in the 2019 elections due to a lack of shared ideology. Annamalai has suggested running independently in the election, and some BJP members are considering the idea. Annamaiai wants to form a coalition with smaller parties.

AIADMK chief Edapadi Palaniswamy has successfully

united the party and worked with senior leaders to prevent the re-entry of Sasikala, TTV Dhinakaran, and former Chief Minister O. Pannerselvam. It is a no-no for him even if the BJP provides them seats under its quota. Palaniswamy was able to remove them from AIADMK and now holds complete control. He appre-

The ruling DMK coalition apprehends it could be affected, and some suggest that Congress may ally with the AIADMK. The results will depend on the number of seats won by each alliance.

Orders by Govt officers are for the larger good



It is imperative to abide by just orders promulgated by Govt servants in public interest and any objection to such orders, must be through legal channels

hat we often come across is the law of contempt concerning courts. It may pertain to maligning the reputation of the judiciary or for that purpose obstructing the functioning of the court. The law of contempt concerning court has now been well established and the educated section across the country mostly have a rough idea about the same if they keep themselves informed by print or electronic media, including social

This article aims to bring into the limelight the less known and less discussed issue, which is disobedience of orders that are duly promulgated by government authorities. We have witnessed such orders during an unprecedented time of covid pandemic. As a citizen, we are at the centre of such orders. For brevity of our understanding, I should inform you that such orders are being promulgated under various acts, one such being the Epidemic Disease Act of 1897. Under the said act, Sections 2 & 2A, give powers to the state government and central government respectively to



such orders which may help contain the infectious disease.

Section 3 of the Epidemic Disease Act imposes a penalty for disobeying any order or regulation made under this act. It makes the act of disobeying or abatement punishable under section 188 of the Indian Penal Code. For instance, if we take the step of price capping by the respective state governments on the treatment of COVID-19 in private hospitals, passing an order under this act or any other act for the time being in force, they impose a duty on private hospitals not to charge above the limits fixed by government authorities.

If private hospitals are charging more than the limit imposed by the government, they are inviting prosecution u/s 188 of the Indian Penal Code i.e., Disobedience to an order duly promulgated by a public servant. Bombay High Court in the case of HLA Shwe v. State of Maharashtra peeled section 188 and mentioned its ingredients as follows - The order must be duly promulgated by a public servant authorised to do so; The order directs the accused to abstain from certain acts; Accused was aware of such order; Accused disobeyed such order and lastly, such disobeying resulted in obstruction, annoyance or

This section is part of chapter X of IPC which deals with contempt of lawful authority of public servant. Prosecution under this is slightly different to that of other offences where the victim himself/herself reports the crime to police officials. Cognizance under this chapter X of IPC can only be taken under section 195 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) which requires a written complaint by a public servant concerned or of some other public servant to whom he is administratively subordinate. This means, that if a person 'X' is aggrieved that he

has been charged more than

the prescribed amount (as prescribed by the government during covid times) in a private hospital for Covid19 treatment, he cannot directly report that to the police station and ask the police to register FIR under section 188 of IPC, but he needs to report the same to the official or ministry that promulgated such order and it will be upon the written complaint of such ministry or official that an action can be brought against the private hospital under section 188 of IPC.

In India, we very well know that crimes often are not reported by individuals because of a lack of awareness which further encourages the wrongdoer, initiative should be taken by the government to check the implementation of their orders. This can be done by audits and taking the views and experiences of the intended beneficiaries of those orders. Therefore, for a peaceful society to exist, it is imperative to abide by just orders promulgated by public servants and any objection to such orders, should only

Timeless traditions: Thathera metal craft



Thathera metal craft has been on the UNESCO list for almost a decade now, but the struggle of the artisans making these utensils continues



espite the UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage inscription of the thathera craft of Jndiala Guru since 2014, the financial and social condition of the craftsmen has not improved much. Recognising the cultural heritage worth of the 'thathera' metal craft in Jnadiala Guru, in its 9th session held in Paris in 2014, UNESCO 'Intergovernmental Committee (IGC) for the Safeguarding of Intangible Heritage' decided to inscribe the craft on its list. This is the first metal craft from India to find a place in UNESCO's Intangible Cultural Heritage list. Thus, not only Punjab but India should be proud of it. "But just the pride cannot feed the craftsmen and keep the craft vibrant", says a craftsman seeking anonymity.

S Hardev Singh of the 'father' community says, "The younger generation is opt ing out of this family profession because it neither earns money nor respect. Although Ayurveda recognises the advantages of eating in copper, bronze and brass utensils, the 'use and throw' cheaper alternatives are pushing it out of use". Instead of popular cosmetic measures, the government should take concrete steps of waiving taxes and continuing the old quota system of issuing scrap as the raw material directly and only to the working craftsmen to reduce the cost and prices of objects to face the competition. Further, it can help market the products as art pieces and utilitarian objects. The government can check the entry of middlemen who buy raw materials from the Indian Army on auction and then distribute them among the craftsmen to produce objects for them at low labour rates. "In the current practice, a craftsman has no claim of ownership of the product and after the day-long hard work earns only 500-600 a day", a craftsman quips. He asks, "Is this the value of skill or the wage of labour? How would my son like to pursue this profession"?



THE SCIENCE OF AYURVEDA IN INDIA **RECOGNISES** THE RELEVANCE OF THESE **METALS** FOR HEALTH

Recently, the Punjab government has declared the Thathera Bazar a Heritage street and built a gate at the street entry symbolising the value of the craft, but has neither waived off its share in GST nor taken any serious steps to help them improve their condition. The question is how the gate and the heritage street status would help if there were no craftsmen in the street.

The UNESCO recognition has, of course, created some hype in the media. Some agencies have succeeded in getting the study projects sanctioned adding to their profiles and justifying their jobs but have not advocated the case forcefully enough to deliver at the ground. Some art and craft dealers have tried to reap benefits by tagging the prod-ucts with UNESCO recognition to sell them at premium prices while the craftsmen continue to work as labourers at low rates.

This is where the shoe pinches and the government should step in to save the craft, the craftsmen and the cultural heritage of the state. The thathera craft is practised at several other places in India but the uniqueness of the craftsmen in Jandiala Guru is their continuance as a community to practice the family tradition of handmade copper and brass utensils. The ten to twelve-generation tradition of fathers in Jandiala Guru and their craft is a journey of place and people in and through time. The knowledge systems transmitted from generation to generation and the continued relevance of their products to the people make the craftsmanship a 'living tradition', fulfilling the three-tier criterion of 'people, place and time' to identify the craft as the Cultural Heritage.

According to the Amritsar District Gazetteer of 1883, "Besides the city [Amritsar]...the only trade centre worthy of notice is the town of Jandiala, which is known for its manufacture of brass and copper vessels in which it has a brisk export trade"(p.117). If so, the trade perfected worthy of export must have started during the days of Maharaja Ranjit Singh or before.

While the utensils are tangible objects, traditional knowledge, skills and art are intangible. Both the craft and its knowledge conventions have been recognized in the UNESCO inscription. The craftsmen of Jandiala Guru use the conventional knowledge and skills of forging' instead of casting' metal to shape it as a utensil. Using the method of forging, they hammer the metal plates with the help of a mallet. After heating the plates in a small hand-driven furnace, they consistently thump and beat a plate to

make it malleable and ductile. Then the parts of a utensil are made by cutting, heating and curving the metal sheet; then these parts are joined with each other. There are five methods for joining of metals: soldering, brazing, flux, riveting and welding. The fathers of Jandiala Guru use brazing and riveting. Brazing is a process of joining two or more metals by pouring a molten filler metal into the joint. The utensils made from the metal sheets are then cleaned with diluted acid and scrubbed with tamarind water and sand. The whole process of polishing is carried out with hands and feet. This final process brings out the

rich texture and colour of the metal. Finally, the utensils are ornamented with hand-engraved designs with patterns of delicate dents of small size and round shapes look-

ing like small stars. Utensils are art objects "produced not only for their use but also for their beauty possessing an artistic image which expresses their function". Thus the contribution of craftsmen to the development of culture and civilization, on the one hand, and to the fulfilment of utilitarian and aesthetic needs, on the other, has been great in human his-

Eating and cooking in the mud, copper, brass and bronze utensils is good for health and taste. The science of Ayurveda in India recog nizes the relevance of these metals for health. The references to Bronze for health healing can be found in several tracts like Ashtanga Samgraha/ Hridaya, Rajtarangini and Bhavprakasha. In contrast with glass, plastic and steel, bronze shows nil microbial presence one hour after being washed in hot water. Copper is said to kill harmful bacteria and viruses. It helps prevent cell damage and slow ageing due to its antioxidant and anti-carcinogenic properties.

As copper, which is well known as a biocide, is the major content in alloy metal of brasses, utensils made from brass have the beneficial effect of restricting the growth of microorganisms. While the craftsmen must be acknowledged as educated and skilled worthy of social respect and honour; their craft must be supported and promoted as our precious

Food loss can impact food security and nutrition by influencing the four aspects of food security: food availability, access, utilisation, and stability

Pand environmental degradation are being aggravated by food loss and waste, globally. The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) estimates that - in terms of economic value — 14 per cent of the world's food is lost from post-harvest up to, but not including, the retail level. In India, 4-6 % of cereal and 5-12 % of vegetables are being lost every year.

FAO on the fourth International Day of Awareness of Food Loss and Waste (IDAFLW), calls upon the need to adopt the Food Loss Index (FLI) methodology and monitor losses throughout the supply chain from production to consumption. In collaboration with FAO, IASRI-ICAR

has estimated the FLI for India. These estimates are based on the three nationallevel surveys conducted by the Ministry of Food Processing Industries to estimate the harvest and post-harvest losses of major crops and commodities in the country. India has been a torchbearer for the world as the only country that has established a robust system of regular surveys for monitoring food losses. These surveys conducted in India have provided the foundations for the development of the FLI methodology globally and for the technical support, FAO provides to countries across the world.

Food loss is a recurring (The writer is a country head & representative of issue due to several causes FAO in India; views are perstemming from different stages of the food supply chain and

socio-economic factors. To address these issues and to ensure food security in the country, mitigating the challenges along the supply chain is critical. FAO works closely with the government and relevant bodies to identify these challenges and find solutions. Food Loss, a leading cause of Hunger, Food Insecurity and Climate Change. Food loss can impact food security and nutrition by influencing the four aspects of food security: food availability, access, utilization, and stability. As per FAO's report, India's food loss percentage stands at approximately 4.5%.

The highest levels of food loss occur in nutrient-rich foods such as fruits and vegetables, meat and fish. It is also estimated that 8 to 10 % of global greenhouse gases are generated by the food that ends up in landfills. This results in unstable climate conditions thereby affecting crop yields, reducing the nutritional crop quality and supply chain disruptions.
FOOD LOSS IN INDIA

Inadequate storage and transportation infrastructure coupled with post-harvest losses contribute to a substantial amount of food loss in the country. The fragmented and complex supply chain with multiple intermediaries involved further escalates the problem leading to food loss at almost every stage.

Food loss is a pervasive issue resulting in critical economic, social, and environmental implications in the country, limiting India's ability to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

AY FORWARD

FAO draws attention to the critical need to measure postharvest losses across the country. This approach aligns with achieving SDG 12, Target 12.3 which seeks to halve per-capita global food waste at the retail and consumer levels and reduce food losses along production and supply chains, including post-harvest losses, and SDĞ 2 — Zero Hunger.

FAO firmly believes that it is crucial to identify the channels where significant losses occur. Disaggregation of data at subnational levels throughout the supply chain will help locate loss points and their impact. This, in turn, will support targeted intervention

and necessary aids. A critical requirement for effective decision-making is improved data, which can drive innovation. promote best practices, and optimize resource allocation.

Addressing India's food loss challenge requires a comprehensive and coordinated effort from various stakeholders, including the government, farmers, food processors, retailers, and consumers. Improvements in localised infrastructure, storage, transportation, processing, packaging, market linkages, and awareness campaigns to change consumer behaviour,

are critical. It is essential to identify the channels in harvest and postharvest operations in which substantial losses are taking place for further technological

interventions. Food loss is a global challenge. Countries must adopt the globally agreed methodology and measurement techniques for the computation of FLI which also provides a platform for global comparability and cross-learning opportunities.

Reducing food loss will help conserve resources and reduce the environmental footprint associated with food production and disposal. FAO firmly believes that India as the leader for the Global South can address this issue and demonstrate a way forward in reducing food loss that is essential to achieving efficient, inclusive, sustainable, and resilient agrifood systems for better production, better nutrition, better environment, and a better life, leaving no one behind.

At least 10 die after church UK Treasury chief to hike min wage roof collapses in Mexico

The roof of a church collapsed in northern Mexico during Sunday Mass, killing at least 10 people and injuring around 60, authorities said as searchers probed in the wreckage throughout the night and into Monday morning looking for survivors and more victims.

Approximately 30 parishioners were believed to have been trapped in the rubble when the roof caved in, officials

Searchers crawled under the roof slabs and officials brought in dogs to help search The Tamaulipas state

police said about 100 people were in the church at the time of the collapse. The state

security spokesman's office said early Monday that 10 people had been confirmed dead from the

collapse, which it described as likely being caused by a structural failure" The office said 23 of the 60 injured remain hospitalized, with two in serious condition.

Tamaulipas state police said units of the National Guard, the state police and state civil defense office and the Red Cross were involved in the

The Mexican Council of Bishops issued a statement saying that "we join in prayer at the tragic loss of life and those injured." Bishop José Armando Alvarez of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Tampico said the roof caved in while parishioners were receiving communion at the Santa Cruz church in the Gulf coast city of Ciudad Madero, next to the port city of

The diocese later posted a list of people who had been injured, including a 4-month-old baby, three 5-year-olds and

The number of young vicpolice officers said three of the dead were children - may have been due to the fact that baptisms were to take place at the church.

"We lament the painful loss of people who were there celebrating the baptism of their children," Alvarez wrote. At the same time, there were signs of

"From underneath the rubble, thanks to Divine Providence and the work of the rescue teams, people have been pulled out alive!" Alvarez's diocese wrote in a statement posted on it social media accounts. "Let's keep praying!" He also called on anyone

who had wood to donate to bring it to the church, apparently to shore up the roof while rescue teams crawled

Photos published by local media showed what appeared to be a concrete and brick structure, with parts of the roof fallen almost to the ground.

Security camera footage from about a block away showed the unusual, gabled roof simply collapsed down-

Walls did not appear to have been blown outward, nor was there any indication of an explosion, or anything other than simple structural failure. The roof appeared to be

made of relatively thin poured concrete, and photos distributed by state authorities showed the roof slab resting on the top of pews in some parts of the church. That left open the possibility there were air spaces for any survivors. "At this time, the necessary

work is being performed to extract the people who are still under the ruble," Alvarez said in a taped message. "Today we are living through a very difficult moment."

Tax cuts ruled out while inflation stays high

Britain's Treasury chief announced a hike in the national minimum wage on Monday, as the governing Conservative Party tries to persuade voters it is on the side of those who are struggling finan-

But Chancellor of the Exchequer Jeremy Hunt ruled out tax cuts, saying they would fuel inflation. "I do want us to have lower taxes," Hunt told Sky News before his speech. But he said "it's very difficult to see" it happening this year.

That message was not what many Conservatives at the party's annual conference wanted to hear. Hundreds of them packed a room to applaud as former Prime Minister Liz Truss whose seven weeks in office plunged Britain's economy into crisis — demanded Hunt slash taxes in his fall budget next month. Hunt told the Conservatives' annual confer-

"Those who won't even look for work do not deserve the same benefits as people trying hard to do the right thing," he said. The party is trying to sprinkle voter-pleasing measures such as the pay increase at the conference, which may be the last before a national election due in 2024. But the government's spending power is constricted by the UK's sluggish economy and stub-bornly high inflation that hit double digits last year and now stands just below 7%. The rightof-centre Tories, in power since 2010, are lagging far behind the centre-left opposition Labour Party in opinion polls. Voters are weary after years of political turmoil over the UK's exit from the European Union, the coronavirus pandemic and a cost-ofliving crisis fuelled by Russia's invasion of Ukraine last year. Prime Minister Rishi Sunak, who took office just under a year ago, is facing grumbling — and even open rebellion — from some Conservative members

Sunak steadied the economy after his predecessor Truss crashed the pound and trashed Britain's reputation for fiscal prudence with her tax-slashing

economic plans. She left office after just 49 days.

Many Conservatives doubt whether Sunak — the party's fifth leader since 2016 — can rector its popularity to the level restore its popularity to the level that saw the party win an 80-seat majority in the 650-seat House of Commons in 2019. The prime minister then, Boris Johnson, resigned in mid-2022 amid scandals over his ethics and judg-

In recent weeks, Sunak has sought to take the initiative with a clutch of measures depicted as easing the economic burden on taxpayers. He has delayed a ban on selling new gas and diesel cars and watered down other green measures that he said imposed "unacceptable costs" on ordinary

'At least 13 killed in Spain nightclub fire

Madrid (AP): A fire broke out in a nightclub in the southeast-ern Spanish city of Murcia on Sunday, killing 13 people and injuring several others, authorities said. The fire started around 6 a.m. in the popular Teatre nightclub and quickly tore through the venue, according to Spain's state news agency EFE. It was not immediately clear what caused the fire. A video shared by Murcia's fire service showed firefighters trying to control flames inside the nightclub. Police and emergency services worked to secure the interior of the club to avoid a possible collapse and were trying to locate and identify the bodies. Officials said the death toll could increase. The city council declared three days of mourning with flags flown at half-staff on public buildings throughout the region of

Fire at Egypt police HQ injures 38

out early Monday at a police facility in northeastern Egypt, injuring at least 38 people before firefighters were able to extinguish the blaze several hours later, authorities said. The cause of the fire, which ripped through the multistory police headquarters in the Suez Canal province of Ismailia, was not immediately

"What we have here is an attempt to hurt me in an election," he charged, adding: "I don't think the people of this country are going to stand for it." He looked away from

The suit accuses Trump and his company of deceiving banks, insurers and others by habitually lying about his wealth in financial statements.

Smoky haze on Indonesia's island prompting calls for work from home

More than 300 forest and peatland fires on Indonesia's Sumatra island caused hazy skies across the region on Monday, prompting government officials to ask people to work from home. The military, police and local government were working together to extinguish the fires, which were burning in 316 places across South Sumatra province, but their work was complicated by the extreme dry weather, said Iriansyah, the head of the South Sumatra Disaster Management Agency.

The smoky haze drifted from the fires toward Palembang, the capital of South Palembang province, causing unhealthy air conditions for the area's 1.7 million people. "There is a high potential for people to suffer from respiratory tract infections, coughing, shortness of breath and eye irritation," said

name. The government in South Sumatra last week called on schools to delay their opening time, as the haze tends to decrease during the day. But on Monday, the schools asked students to attend classes online, as the air quality had worsened and was categorised as "dangerous". "We are worried as the haze is getting worse in Palembang...Many children are sick and we can only pray that this disaster will pass quickly," Umi Kalsum, a private sector worker and mother, told The Associated Press on Monday.

Forest and peat fires are an annual problem in Indonesia that strains relations with neighboring countries. Smoke from the fires has blanketed parts of Indonesia, Singapore, Malaysia and southern Thailand. Some parts of Malaysia said they experienced smoke from the Indonesian

AP ■ PALEMBANG (INDONESIA) Iriansyah, who like many fires since last week. Malaysia's chief Wan Abdul Latiff Wan Jaffar last week said the return of smog in some parts of the country was due to hundreds of forest fires in Indonesia. "Overall, air quality in the country has deteriorated," he said in a statement. "Forest fires that occur in the southern part of Sumatra and the central and southern parts of Kalimantan, Indonesia have caused haze to cross borders." 'India will help maintaining sites connected to Gandhi in S Africa'

🕇 ndia will assist in maintain-Ling all sites connected to Mahatma Gandhi in South Africa, the Indian envoy here said on Monday as the world marked the 154th birth anniversary of the global peace

On the occasion of Gandhi Jayanti, High Commissioner Prabhat Kumar paid floral homage to the bust of Gandhi at the Constitutional Court premises here, which was once a prison where the Mahatma and his followers served sentences during their resistance to discriminatory laws.

Gandhi served four terms of imprisonment between 1908 and 1913 here, including his very first sentence in South

The bust was unveiled in 2012 by then-President Pratibha Patil when she paid a visit to South Africa. "In all my postings abroad, I have always garlanded the statue of Mahatma Gandhi and now in South Africa, where I am doing so for the first time, it is very special, because Gandhiji was here for 21 years," Kumar said.

After the garlanding, Kumar visited permanent exhibitions at the venue dedicated to the lives of both Gandhi and Nelson Mandela, who served 27 years as a political prisoner of the apartheid government before becoming South Africa's first democratically-elected president in May 1994.

The diplomat said he is also looking forward to attending the installation of a seven-foot statue of Gandhi at Tolstoy Farm, the once-thriving commune established by Gandhi about 30 km south of Johannesburg during his tenure as a lawyer in the city.

After falling into complete disrepair due to vandalism, only the foundation of Gandhi's original zinc and wood home was left, surrounded by tall grass, until interventions by Gandhian activist Mohan Hira and the Mahatma Gandhi

'Open hearing of Imran bail plea may affect ties with other countries'

Pakistan's top investigation agency Monday informed a court here that an open hearing of former premier Imran Khan's bail plea in a case related to the alleged disclosure of state secrets could pose a "risk of deteriorating relations" with other countries

The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) on Saturday filed a charge sheet in the Special Court established under the Official Secrets Act, declaring Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf chairman Khan and Vice Chairman Shah Mahmood Qureshi "principal accused" in the cipher case. Both Khan and Qureshi are currently detained in jail on judicial remand.

The FIA on Monday informed the Islamabad High Court (IHC) that an open hearing of Khan's bail plea in the cipher case could pose a "risk of deteriorating relations with other countries," Dawn newspaper reported.

The post-arrest bail pleas of Khan and Qureshi were rejected by the special court earlier, following which the former premier approached the IHC seeking the same.

Khan, 70, was arrested in August after the case was filed against him for allegedly violating the Official Secrets Act by disclosing a secret diplomatic cable (cipher) sent by the country's embassy in Washington last year in March.

mer foreign minister, was arrested under the Official Secrets Act for violating the secrecy of the official cable sent by the Pakistani embassy in the US to the foreign office when he was the foreign minister.

On September 26, the judicial remand of Khan and Qureshi was extended till October 10 and as per the IHC's orders, the PTI chairman was shifted to Rawalpindi's Adiala Jail from the Attock dis-

Last week, the FIA filed a petition in the IHC seeking incamera proceedings of Khan's bail plea in the case.
On Monday, IHC Chief

Justice Aamer Farooq took up the FIA's plea.

"We also have to present statements regarding other countries before the court. By bringing such statements before an open court, there is a risk of deteriorating relations with other countries," prosecutor Shah Khawar said during

Additional Attorney General (AAG) Munawar Iqbal Dogal also presented the code of conduct for diplomatic state documents before the IHC.

Khan's lawyer Salman Safdar pointed out that the FIA's request, which was meant to prevent matters from being made public, contradicted its stance that the PTI chief had already "made the cipher pub-



Subsequently, the IHC reserved its verdict on the FIA's plea seeking in-camera proceedings of Khan's bail plea.

Separately, a two-member bench of the IHC on Monday accepted a set of petitions filed by Khan's party against trial courts' decisions to dismiss his bail in nine cases.

Last month, local courts of Islamabad had rejected nine petitions of the PTÍ chief seeking bail in first information reports (FIRs) registered against him over violent

Meanwhile, a special court on Monday summoned Khan and Qureshi on October 4 in the cipher case.

Special court judge Abul Hasnat Zulgarnain issued notices to respondents saying that statements of witnesses are sufficient to summon the accused in the court, Geo News reported. The judge directed the superintendent of Adiala

jail to present the PTI leaders before the court on October 4.

Khan and Qureshi have been placed in column 3 in the charge sheet which describes the names and addresses of the accused sent for trial.

The FIA invoked in the charge sheet sections 5 and 9 of the Official Secrets Act which may lead to a death sentence, or two to 14 years' imprisonment if proven.

The cricketer-turnedpolitician is charged with the violation of the Official Secrets Act in connection with the leakage of a confidential diplomatic cable from Pakistan's embassy in Washington.

In March last year, ahead of the vote of no-confidence that resulted in his ouster, Khan pulled out a piece of paper allegedly the cipher - from his pocket and waved it at a public rally in Islamabad, claiming it was the evidence of an "international conspiracy" being hatched to topple his government. However, during the interrogation with the joint investigation team (JIT) in the jail on August 26, Khan denied that the paper he waved at a public gathering last year was the cipher. He also admitted to losing the cipher, saying he couldn't recall where he kept it.

His principal secretary Azam Khan stated before a magistrate and the FIA that the Khan used it for his 'political gains' and to avert a vote of noconfidence against him.

among six killed in Zim plane crash

Johannesburg (PTI): An Indian billionaire and his son were among the six individuals killed when their private plane crashed near a diamond mine in southwestern Zimbabwe after experiencing a technical fault, according to media reports.

Harpal Randhawa, the owner of RioZim, a diversified mining company producing gold and coal as well as refining nickel and copper, along with his son and four others was killed when the plane crashed in the Zvamahande area of Mashava, iHarare, a news and media website in Zimbabwe, reported.

The Cessna 206 aircraft, owned by RioZim, was en route from Harare to the Murowa diamond mine when the tragic incident occurred on Friday. The single-engined aircraft crashed near the Murowa Diamonds mine, which is partly owned by RioZim. mThe plane experienced a technical fault, possibly resulting in a mid-air explosion, before plummeting into Peter Farm in the Zvamahande region.

All passengers and crew onboard lost their lives in this accident, the report said. The Herald, a state-owned

daily newspaper, quoted police as saying four of the victims were foreigners and the other two Zimbabweans. "The Zimbabwe Republic

Police reports a plane crash which occurred on September 29 between 7.30 am and 8 am, where six people are confirmed dead," police said. "The Murowa Diamond

Company (RioZim)-owned white and red Zcam aircraft had left Harare for the mine at 6 am and crashed about 6km from Mashava."

RioZim confirmed the crash and said it was working with relevant authorities to gather more information.

Names of the deceased are yet to be released by police but journalist and filmmaker Hopewell Chinono, who was a friend of Randhawa, confirmed his death. "I am deeply saddened by the passing of Harpal Randhawa, the owner of RioZim who died today in a plane crash in Zvishavane. Five other people including his son, who was also a pilot but a passenger on this flight, also died in the crash," wrote Chinono on X.

Indian mining tycoon, son Turkiye strikes suspected Kurdish militant targets in northern Iraq

The Turkish defence min-istry says its warplanes have carried out raids on suspected Kurdish rebel targets in northern Iraq on Sunday following a suicide attack on a government building in the Turkish capital.

A ministry statement said some 20 targets of the Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK) were "destroyed" in the aerial operation, including caves, shelters, and depots. Earlier, a suicide bomber

detonated an explosive device near an entrance of the Ministry of Interior Affairs, injuring two police officers. A second assailant was killed in a shootout with police on Sunday, the interior minister said. A news agency close to the PKK said the group has claimed responsibility for the

The attack happened hours before Turkiye's Parliament was set to reopen after its threemonth summer recess with an address by President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. Two police officers were

slightly wounded in the bombing near an entrance to the Ministry of Interior Affairs, Minister Ali Yerlikava said on X. Assailants who arrived at the scene inside a light commercial vehicle carried out the attack.

Pak court gives police one week to recover Imran's key ally Sheikh Rashid Islamabad (PTI): A Pakistani

court on Monday ordered the police to recover within a week Awami Muslim League chief and former interior minister Sheikh Rashid, a key ally of former premier Imran Khan, after his lawyer claimed that the politician had been arrested. Rashid, 72, was detained

by "plain clothes men" from his résidence in Bahria Town of Rawalpindi on September 17 and shifted to an undisclosed location, his lawyer Sardar Abdul Raziq Khan had said. Rashid's nephew Sheikh

Shakir and houseworker Sheikh Imran had also been arrested and taken to an "undisclosed location", according to the lawyer.

Later, police submitted City Police Officer (CPO) Khalid Hamdani's report to the court,

which stated that Rashid was neither in their custody nor was he arrested by the Rawalpindi police. Last week, Rashid's lawyer told the court that his client was arrested by the Rawalpindi police. However, police denied having the politician in their custody.

The court then directed the police to locate Rashid's whereabouts and asked the law enforcement agency to make an all-out effort for his recovery.

On Monday, Justice Sadaqat Ali Khan of the Lahore High Court's (LHC) Rawalpindi bench resumed the proceedings over the plea against the former interior minister's arrest. The court ordered the police to recover the AML chief within a week and present him before the court, Dawn newspaper reported.

European diplomats meet in Kyiv to support Ukraine

Some of Europe's top diplomats gathered Monday in Kyiv in a display of support for Úkraine's fight against Russia's invasion as signs emerge of political strain in Europe and the United States over the 19month-old war.

European Union foreign ministers converged on the Ukrainian capital for an unannounced informal meeting that officials said would review the bloc's support for Ukraine and discuss Ükrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy's proposed peace formula. EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell said the foreign ministers' first joint meeting outside EU borders signalled that the 27nation bloc's support is "unwavering," and underscored the EU's commitment to Ukraine.

The United States, the EU and the United Kingdom have

provided massive military and financial support to Ukraine, enabling it to stand up to the Kremlin's attack. The assistance is crucial for Ukraine's weakened economy and has so far been open-ended.

But uncertainty has set in over how long Kyiv's allies will keep sending it aid worth billions of dollars (euros).

US President Joe Biden on Sunday reassured allies of continued US financial support for the war effort, after Congress averted a government shutdown by adopting a shortterm funding package that dropped assistance for Ukraine

in its battle against Russia.

Many US lawmakers acknowledge that winning approval for Ukraine assistance in Congress is growing more difficult as the war grinds on. Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba told reporters that Ukraine held discussions

Work starts on turning Adolf Hitler's birthplace in Austria into police station

Braunau am Inn (Austria): Work started Monday on turning the house in Austria where Adolf Hitler was born in 1889 into a police station, a project meant to make it unattractive as a site of pilgrimage for people who glorify the Nazi dictator. The decision on the future of the building in Braunau am Inn, a town on Austria's border with Germany, was made in late 2019. Plans call for a police station, the district police headquarters and a security academy branch where police officers will get human rights training. On Monday, workers put up fencing and started taking measurements for the construction work. The police

are expected to occupy the premises in early 2026.

A years-long back-andforth over the ownership of the house preceded the overhaul project. The question was resolved in 2017 when Austria's highest court ruled that the government was within its rights to expropriate the building after its owner refused to sell it. A suggestion it might be demolished was dropped.

The building had been rented by Austria's Interior Ministry since 1972 to prevent its misuse, and was sublet to various charitable organisations. It stood empty after a care centre for adults with disabilities moved out in 2011. AP

Kumar pointed out that as the global trade has weakened, India's exports performance has also weakened given the weak demand in Europe, the US and other developed economies.

"We have to change this. We must do whatever we can to ensure that our exports have a greater share of world marets," he said.

On some US-based economists' claim that India is overstating economic growth, Kumar said that the Ministry of Statistics and Programme

take a firm position and give enough reasons as to why they are using the wholesale price index (WPI) deflator and not the Consumer Price Index (CPI) as GDP deflator.

"And that needs to be firm-ly established once and for all," Kumar emphasised.

Meanwhile, India's real GDP growth was 7.8 per cent on a year-on-year basis in Q1 FY24 as per the Income or Production Approach.

Recently, former chief economic advisor Arvind Subramanian, in an article, argued that India's GDP is not measured from the expenditure side and measured only from the income GDP growth. Last month, chief econom-

ic advisor V Anantha Nageswaran rejected criticism of "statistical discrepancy" in the first quarter GDP data, saying when the same statistical authority reported the severest contraction in the first quarter of 2020, the navsavers had called it credible as it suited their narrative.

The article by Nageshwaran was written in light of debates over India's economic performance and economist Ashoka Mody, a Princeton University professor, raising concerns regarding the country's GDP growth rate for the first quarter of the financial year 2023-24.

Lava eyes 10% smartphone market share in 2 years with investment of ₹600 crore in R&D, marketing

Home-grown mobile devices maker Lava International expects to capture 10 per cent market share in under Rs 30,000-priced smartphone seg ment on account of up to Rs 600 crore investment in product development and marketing in the next two years, a senior company official said.

Lava International President Sunil Raina told PTI that at a time when several Indian mobile phone companies succumbed to the pressure of aggressive pricing of foreign players around 2016-17 coupled with challenges posed by demonetisation and GST imple mentation, Lava focussed on its core strength and re-worked on the growth strategy.

The company relaunched its smartphone business with a small pause with focus on customer experience around devices and providing repair ser vice at home, Raina said.

He said that the company has realised that technology has to be competitive for growth

along with visibility.
"With branding and product development, we will invest Rs 500-600 crore in the next two years with a large part of it will go in product development, Raina said.

He said that the company has decided not to load smartphones with bloatware — which are pre-loaded apps on mobile phones.
"We have decided we will

not put out any bloatware in the phone. We have taken some hit on what could have been earned from bloatware only because we don't want to compromise on consumer experience. I also believe that bloatware is going to be short-lived because consumers don't like it and what consumers don't like doesn't last

long," Raina said. He said that consumers are very unhappy about bloatware because they get irritated with unwanted advertisements, unwanted notifications and bloatware makes devices slow and very vulnerable to security

Raina said most of the brands are not providing software updates on the devices that

patch security loopholes and

mprove performances of the

"In the last 2-3 years, we have not missed any single

update," he said. Raina said that the company has over 800 service centres but still decided to come up with 'service at home" where the company sends engineers to the home of consumers for

"In Agni 2, we have gone a step ahead and started giving replacement at home if their is any hardware fault," he said.

While the India smartphone market has recorded continuous decline in shipment since April 2022, Raina said that with new strategy Lava's smartphone busi-

ness grew over 200 per cent last year and this year it is growing at the rate of 300 per cent.

"We expect to grow by 100 per cent on average in the next 2-3 years. Our plan is to get 10 per cent market share in sub-Rs 30,000 price range smartphones. Right now we have around 2 per cent share," he said.

Lava president said that the company will leverage its retail channel strength as well as boost online growth to meet the tar-

The company at present sells products through 1.2 lakh retail stores which largely include feature phones only.

Lava claims to have 25 per cent share in the feature phone

"We will fully leverage our offline strength. As of now we sell our product through 1.2 lakh retailers. Smartphones are not present in the entire 100 per cent of that universe. We will look at taking smartphones to most of the outlets and strong presence across all geographies in the country," Raina said.

Lava also plans to strength en online business to meet its target. "Online earlier used to account for 10 per cent of our total sales. Now online contributes 25 per cent of our total which we will grow further,'

The peak power demand met — the highest supply in a day — rose to 239.97 GW in September. The peak power supply stood at 199.50 GW in September 2022 and 180.73 GW in September 2021.

The power ministry had estimated the country's electricity demand to touch 229 GW during summer. The demand did not reach the projected level in April-July due to unseasonal

The peak supply, however, touched a new high of 224.1 GW in June and before dropping to 209.03 GW in July. Peak demand touched 238.19 GW in August.

Spokesperson of the Tata Power Delhi Distribution Ltd, which supplies electricity to 70 lakh people in Delhi, told PTI that the demand has remained higher mainly due to unusual-The trade deficit (difference between ly higher temperature levels this

The spokesperson said in the coming months, demand is expected to remain on the higher side due to festivities.

In September, the Tata Power Delhi Distribution's power consumption was esti-mated at 1,110 MUs (million units), compared to 1,035 MUs in a year ago.



Things looked gloomy for Aarathy Kasturi Raj after a nasty fall in May that required 26 stitches to treat more than 20 cuts, including few deep ones on her forehead.

But, with her physician mother by her side, the Indian roller skater recovered in time to win a historic bronze medal at the Asian Games. Her goal achieved, Aarathy, who has completed her MBBS, will rejoin her mother in running the hospital they own

Aarathy suffered the injury during training exactly four months before the start of the continental showpiece.

The 29-year-old said it was scary but she took the injury in her stride and recovered quickly after rehabilitation with her physician mother taking care of

"I had a scary incident on May 26 this year and I had 26 stitches. There were deep cuts on my forehead," Aarathy told PTI after playing a part in the bronze medal win in the women's 3000m team relay. "I started training on the bike, did rehab." Daughter of a businessman father C Kasturi Raj and gynae-cologist mother Mala Raj in Chennai, Aarathy took to skating at the age of seven and after frequent falls, numerous bruises and bleeding, she is now an Asian Games medallist.

"It's a dream come true moment, I took to this sport at the age of seven and since then,

it has been my passion.
"My parents wanted me to play some sport and my mom

was the one who was behind this," said Aarathy.

Having competed in several national and international events, Aarthy has won more than 100 medals. She was also ranked world number five.

Rachin Ravindra found the night of July 14, 2019, one of the longest and hardest to endure as he watched New Zealand's heartbreaking defeat to England in the ODI World Cup final sitting in a Bengaluru pub.

Ravindra, then all of 19 was on an annual trip to India with his father's cricket club and the roller-coaster experience of watching the final is still etched

in his memory.

New Zealand losing that final to England on the boundary count-back rule divides opinion to this day. Rachin, whose first name is inspired by the first names of Sachin Tendulkar and Rahul Dravid, remembers that night as it was

As a budding cricketer dreaming to represent New Zealand one day, the Indian-origin circketer was shattered with the outcome of the game and the desire to represent New Zealand

implementation of VAR." Liverpool said it was "therefore unsatisfactory that sufficient time was not afforded to allow the correct decision to be made and that there was no subsequent interven-

"That such failings have already been categorized as significant human error' is also unacceptable," the club's statement added. "Any and all outcomes should be established only by the review and with full transparency.
