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## BJP Casts Al Against Congress Caste Census

s India gears up for the Aupcoming general general general battleground witnesses a stark dichotomy between the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and the Congress party, each vying for the attention of the electorate through distinctly different approaches.

Under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the BJP is embarking on a revolutionary transformation in its communication strategy by incorporating Artificial Intelligence (AI) technology. This innovative approach seeks to transcend linguistic barriers and engage the diverse youth across India's linguistic ĺandscape.

advanced AI Utilising algorithms, the BJP plans to translate Modi's speeches into several regional languages, including Bangla, Kannada, Telugu, Odia, Tamil, Punjabi, Marathi,

Malayalam. By doing so, the party aims to democratise access to political discourse, emphasising inclusivity and outreach across linguistic boundaries.

Vijay Bahadur Pathak, BJP vice-president and lawmaker, voiced the party's rationale behind this technological leap, stating, "AI is a new advent, and the Prime Minister used this technology in Varanasi to convey his feelings to our



Tamil-speaking friends. If we have technology, why should we not use it? Politics is the game of giving messages. What is wrong if we use technology to spread our viewpoints?"

The successful demonstration of AI-powered translation during a recent event in Varanasi, where Modi's Hindi speech seamlessly translated into Tamil in real-time, underscores the party's forwardthinking approach to communication and engagement.

In stark contrast, the Congress party's strategy appears less defined, persisting in its advocacy for a caste census. Departing from BIP's emphasis advancements, technological Congress champions the idea of a comprehensive census based on caste divisions, with the aim of addressing social disparities and ensuring equitable representation

for marginalised communities. "If Congress comes to power we will allow caste census," Rahul Gandhi thundered during his Naya Yatra as it traversed through Uttar Pradesh.

Defending Congress strategy party's spokesman DP Singh says the BJP's election campaign and use of AI is nothing but a gimmick. "Instead of talking about core issues like employment, health issues and caste, the BJP is raising issues which have more of glitz and gizmo involved in it," he said and added, "Tell me, how many people in rural India know about AI.

These people are suffering and our leader Rahul Gandhi has raised their pain on different platforms." Nomita P Kumar of Giri Institute

of Development Studies in Lucknow commented on the Congress's approach, highlighting the party's failure to grasp the significance of technology among the youth. Kumar remarked, "This is the problem with the Congress. It has failed to read the ground

## **Fresh electoral** bonds data released

Ruling party at the Centre BJP received the maximum funds through electoral bonds worth ₹6,986.5 crore with maximum of ₹2,555 crore in 2019-20 since they were introduced in 2018,

followed by West Bengal's ruling party Trinamool Congress (₹1,397 crore), Congress (₹1,334 crore) and the Telangana Pachtra Somith (₹1,700) Rashtra Samithi (TRS), now known as Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) (₹1,322 crore).

The latest data released by Election Commission on Sunday shows BRS got ₹230.65 crore in bonds from 2018 to 2019. Odisha's ruling party BJD was the fourth largest recipient at  $\stackrel{\textstyle \star}{\sim} 944.5$ 

Days after releasing the details of electoral bonds donors, the EC released data received from political parties on electoral bonds, which it had given to the Supreme Court in sealed covers. The latest documents released by the Nirvachan Sadan only show raw data of the date of the bonds, denominations, number of bonds, issuing State Bank of India (SBI) branch, date of receipt, and

date of credit. It does not disclose the unique

numbers of the bonds. Top purchaser of electoral bonds Future Gaming and Hotel Services donated ₹509 crore to Tamil Nadu's ruling party DMK through the now-scrapped

payment mode. The donations given by Future Gaming, whose owner, "lottery king" Santiago Martin, has been under the Enforcement Directorate's (ED) scanner, accounted for more than 77 per cent of the total receipts from electoral bonds of ₹656.5 crore

disclosed by the DMK.

## **Kejriwal gets** fresh ED summon in DJB case

Furthermore, it revealed that social media interactions,

comments,

played

smartphone habits for the significant role in providing emotional validation for the students.

Many participants also admitted to using their smartphones as a means of escaping from the pressures reality, further exacerbating dependency on these devices. Checking the phone every few minutes, and using it for long hours for entertainment were the most common traits. For many, the phone was a constant companion to which they were strongly attached. 'Likes' or comments on social media gave them a false sense of security and emotional validation. For some, the smartphone served as a means of escape from reality.

## 97 crore voters registered for LS polls | Lok Sabha polls: Biggest peacetime

Over 97 crore voters are registered in the electoral rolls for the upcoming Lok Sabha polls and will cast their franchise using their photo ID card. But the unique cards in the Indian electoral system are not as old as the first elections.

What the Election Commission once thought was "not practicable to operate satisfactorily on a large scale", has become a mainstay in India's election system. The identity cards are now acceptable also as proof of identity and address. First mooted in 1957 to rule out the malpractice of bogus voters, the Electors Photo Identity Cards (EPICs) debuted over three decades later in 1994 when they were launched to prevent impersonation at polling stations. A pilot project of the photo identity card for the voters was undertaken in Calcutta (South West) parliamentary constituency for the by-election in May 1960 did not succeed.

Thereafter, the project was shelved for almost two decades. Photo identity cards were issued for the October 1979 assembly elections in Sikkim. The idea was subsequently implemented in other north-



eastern states like Assam, Meghalaya and Nagaland. This was a precursor to nationwide launch of Electors Photo Identity Cards in 1994.

According to Election Commission's report on 1962 Lok Sabha polls, soon after the general elections of 1957, it was suggested to the Election Commission that the issue of identity cards, with photographs attached, to all electors in congested urban areas would greatly facilitate identification at the time of poll and avoid impersonation.

"The Election Commission tried it as an experimental measure in the Calcutta South-West parliamentary constituency in which a by-election was then due. In spite of stren-uous efforts spread over a period of ten months, only 2.13 lakh electors out of a total of 3.42 lakh could be effectively photographed, and identity cards with photographs attached could thereafter be

issued only to 2.10 lakh. 'Thus, three out of eight electors could not be provided with identity cards. The main reason for this was that an appreciable section of women electors refused to be photographed either by men or women photographers. A section of the voters could not be found," the report noted.

Chief Election Commissioner K V K Sundaram recalled the exercise in his report on the 1962 General Elections that had to be aborted after finding out that it would "not be practicafactorily" on a large scale either in Kolkata or elsewhere in the country. "The expenditure on the project for the Calcutta area alone would be of the order of Rs 25 lakh which would be an appreciable addition to the national expenditure on the conduct of elections.

"After a careful consideration of the machinery available to the commission for the purpose and after consulting the government, the EC came to the conclusion that it would not be practicable to operate the system satisfactorily on a large scale either in Calcutta or elsewhere in the country," he said. According to the book "Leap of Faith" published by the Election Commission to document the journey of elections in India, the nationwide programme for EPIC was launched in 1994.

"This was followed by an intensive revision of electoral rolls in 1995. The challenge was to integrate the EPIC with electoral rolls. In 1997, the work of computerising the electoral roll was taken up. In addition to this high volume of data for 62 crore plus voters the commission had to meet the challenge of handling data in multiple languages," it read."The electoral roll was now to be treated as a database

text as before. The format of the electoral roll was thoroughly standarised. The EPIC and computersied electoral roll were integrated. This made it possible for a voter to migrate from one constituency to another while retaining the same EPIC," it added.

The Election Commission had in 2021 launched the e-EPIC (Electronic Electoral Photo Identity Card). E-EPIC is a non-editable secure portable document format (PDF) version of the EPIC and will have a secured QR code with image and demographics like serial number, part number, etc. E-EPIC can be downloaded on a mobile or a computer and can be digitally stored.

India is gearing up for the next general elections to elect its 18th Lok Sabha. Polling for the 543 Lok Sabha seats will be held in seven phases, starting with 102 in the first phase on April 19. The votes will be counted on June 4.

Nearly 97 crore registered voters across 543 constituencies will cast their ballot at 10.5 lakh polling stations. Around 1.5 crore polling and security personnel, about 55 lakh ÉVMs and four lakh vehicles will be deployed for the polls, according to the poll authority.

## movement of men, material in world

Holding of Lok Sabha elections is a mammoth exercise that entails the biggest peacetime movement of men and material in the world through waterways, air and land across India to ensure no voter is left behind. The exercise to hold the Lok Sabha was started as early as in June last year, the EC had initiated "first level checks" of EVMs and paper trail machines across the country in a phased manner. 'Mock polls" are part of the first level check (FLC) process to ensure parties are satisfied with the machines.

Notably, the 2024 Lok Sabha elections will be India's longestever election at 44 days in peak summer. The India Meteorological Department (IMD) predicted above normal temperature and heat waves in April and May. In 2019, a seven-phase Lok Sabha election was held over as many as 39 days. In 2014, the Lok Sabha elections were held in as many as nine phases and stretched to 36 days. According to the EC, in 1998, polling for Lok Sabha elections were held within 13 days. In 1999, the general elections stretched to 29 days. In

2004, the Lok Sabha elections were over within 21 days in four

The Election Commission, mandated to hold the gigantic democratic exercise starts preparing for the polls at least one-and-a-half years in advance by training officials, poll personnel and ramping up the sup-ply of required EVMs and indelible ink, besides other equipment.

The elections for the 18th Lok Sabha will begin on April 19 followed by subsequent phases on April 26, May 7, May 13, May 20, May 25 and June 1.Nearly 97 crore registered voters across 543 constituencies will cast their ballot at 10.5 lakh polling stations. Around 1.5 crore polling and security personnel, about 55 lakh EVMs and four lakh vehicles will be deployed for the polls, according to the poll authority.

The EC issues a calendar for such exercises and there are standing instructions that are to be followed by state chief electoral officers. During FLCs, electronic voting machines and paper trail machines are checked for mechanical flaws by engineers of BEL and ECIL, the two PSUs which manufacture the two equipment. Faulty machines are returned to

the manufacturers for repair or replacement. A mock poll is also held to check the two machines in the presence of representatives of political par-

While it puts the required equipment and infrastructure in place, the poll panel also starts interacting with its offi-cials at the state level to under-

stand their requirements.

State chief electoral officers are called for sessions where they share best practices and learn from each others' experience in election management, voter awareness and preventing malpractices which can disturb level playing field during polls. A key component of election management is the deployment of security personnel and their movement by trains, boats and helicopters.

To firm up the plan, the EC top brass holds meeting with senior officials of the Union home ministry and Railways. Comfortable stay and hygienic food for security and polling personnel also requires planning at the grass-roots level. While the EC is busy sending the required number of EVMs in states ahead of polls, the Mysore Paints and Varnish Ltd gets ready to complete its order of providing indelible ink.

## Memories of Amma come alive as election campaign peaks in TN

The picture given with this dispatch has lot of similarities with the 1950 Japanese film Rashomon written and directed by Akira Kurosawa. Rashomon is the name of a samurai who is murdered mysteriously in a forest and the story is retold by persons who were associated with the protagonist in one way or other. The uniqueness of the film is that Rashomon does not appear in the movie even for a fraction of a second and by the time the 88 minutes long film is concluded, viewers get an idea about his character. What we have carried with this

report is a shot from the album of the 2014 Lok Sabha election. People who are looking heavenward with reverence and folded hands are not ordinary mortals. They are all ministers, MPs, MLA and party leaders of the All India Anna Dravida Munnetra Kazhakam arrival of the then presiding deity of Tamil Nadu, Amma J Jayalalityhaa. Those familiar with Tamil Nadu politics can make out a three-time chief minister waiting for the helicopter with a customary

Namaskaaram , This scene is Thiruvannamalai and they



are all waiting for the arrival of Amma whose purple colored BELL 412 chopper is expected to touch the newly laid temporary helipad. One the helicopter comes to a halt, all the ministers, MLAs and MPs run towards the flying machine and prostrate before the door through which Amma comes out. They call the process Danda Namaskaaram, their upper body falling almost parallel to the ground, their eyes looking at their feet and the even harder.

Jayalalithaa makes just two campaign speeches every day and she introduces three or four candidates in each meeting. Since it is difficult to remember the names of the candidates, she asks the audience "wont you vote for the Two Leaves"? to which the

audience unanimously say a big Yes. "Who brought Kaveri water To Tamil Nad? Who gave you power for your domestic consumption? Who gave you rice at the rate of Rs per Kg? Is it this Lady or that Modi?" shouts Amma to which the answer is a chorus of

## Mamata terms CAA useless, purely discriminatory law

To protect horses and people, horses must be removed from Delhi's roads," said PETA India Veterinary Officer Dr Kundan Joshi.

The ICAR-NRCE has asked the Delhi Department of Animal Husbandry & Dairying to bring equine movement in and around the area of concern under strict regulation and surveillance. The department has also been asked to address the situation of glanders disease in the region in accordance with The Prevention and Control of Infectious and Contagious Diseases in Animals Act,

PETA highlighted that despite them pointing out as many as 40 positive cases of glanders in 2018, eight in 2019 and one in 2020, no action by the authorities were taken to prohibit this illegal plying of tonga by horses.

"The use of horses to pull tongas and for rides and weddings is harmful not only to the horses - who are often worked to death - but also to humans because they are a major traffic and health hazard. To protect horses and people, horses must be removed from Delhi's roads," said PETA India Veterinary Officer Dr Kundan Joshi.

Director of Veterinary Services Dr Mini Aravindam said, "Since 2010 tongas are illegal to be used in Delhi, but still the practice is continuing. Glanders is a bacterial disease

caused by Burkholderia mallei mainly affecting horses, and can be also seen in mules and donkeys. This disease is contagious and it can be an acute or chronic, usually fatal disease for horses."

Elaborating on the transmission of the disease from animals to humans, posing a threat to human life, she said, "This is a contagious disease and people handling infected animals like tonga riders and groomers will be infected as well as it is a zoonotic disease. Hence, it is fatal for humans too. It spreads through nasal discharge, or any other purulent discharge from the nodules formed on the skin of the horses."

PETA pointed out the flouting of rules and urged the Government to be vigilant of such illegal activities. Dr Mina underscored that the only solution to this problem is the Government taking the appropriate actions to prevent such things from happening. "Usually the Government has to take action, detection, isolation and culling of infected animals and eradicate this disease. This is the only measure, as there is no

There is no vaccine against glanders. Time to time blood tests can help in identification and prevention of disease, once identified Government protocol to eradicate the disease has to be followed," she added.

ED maintains that previous search operations on July 24, 2023, and November 17, 2023, resulted in the seizure of incriminating documents and evidence related to the case. The ED raided the premises of Kejriwal's personal assistant Bibhav Kumar, AAP Rajya Sabha MP N D Gupta, former DIP member Shalabh Kumar. DJB member Shalabh Kumar, chartered accountant Pankaj Mangal and some others as part of this investigation in February.

The ED arrested Arora and a contractor named Anil Kumar Aggarwal in this case on January 31.

In the case of excise policy, a city court on Saturday had granted bail to Kejriwal on two complaints filed by the agency against him for skipping six of the previous eight summons in this case. ## Atishi slams ED over fresh BJP accuses Delhi CM of repeatedly flouting law by skipping summons

The BJP on Sunday hit out 1 at the Aam Aadmi Party after the Enforcement Directorate summoned chief minister Arvind Keiriwal in a second money laundering case linked to alleged irregularities in the Delhi Jal Board (DJB) and ninth summons in the now-scrapped Delhi excise policy case.

Delhi BJP president Virendra Sachdeva accused Kejriwal of 'repeatedly flouting the law' by skipping the nine summons sent to AAP chief by Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Saturday and claimed that him taking a bail for evading ED summons 'confirms the validity of the sum-

He said, "Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal, after disrespecting the summons which he previously claimed were illegal, has now taken bail, confirming the validity of the summons." Taking potshots at Former Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia, who is in jail in the liquor scam policy, Sachdeva questioned the conduct and language of the AAP leaders and said that they resemble thugs and looters. "Arvind Kejriwal's former Deputy Chief Minister has been in jail for over a year in the liquor scam case, and another MP has also been in jail for a long time, but the



repeated assertion by the Aam Aadmi Party that there was no scam in the liquor policy is ludicrous in itself.'

He further took a jibe at Arvind Kejriwal and Atishi and said, "Firstly, what was the need to change the liquor policy in Delhi, and if the new liquor policy was good, why did it have to be withdrawn as soon as the investigation

Delhi BJP stated that the new policy was aimed to push Delhi's youth into addiction and to loot money from them. He further said that Kejriwal's second summon is in the Delhi Jal Board case, stating that it is another proof of loot-

He said, "The people of Delhi know how the Jal Board has been looted, and the BJP has always said that the Jal Board scam is bigger than the liquor

When Kejriwal came to power, he made big promises to end the tanker mafia, while

at that time the Jal Board was making a profit of Rs 1200 crore, but today it is incurring a loss of Rs 80,000 crore."

BJP leader Bansuri Swaraj who is also contesting the Lok Sabha elections from the New Delhi seat, claimed that Arvind Kejriwal is accountable for the Delhi excise policy case and he is repeatedly disrespecting the ED summons by not appearing before the probe agency for questioning. Swaraj, refuted Atishi's claims and pointed out it is Mr Kejriwal who has 'zero knowledge" of the law. "Chief minister Arvind Kejriwal is educated. His entire cabinet is full of educated people... The investigation is being done in the liquor policy case. Arvind Kejriwal becomes accountable and will have to explain why the Aam Aadmi Party is doing so much corruption... When you are sent a summon, it is your responsibility to respect it and respond,

but whenever you disrespect the summons, then you are committing a new crime... Arvind Kejriwal has disregarded the last eight summons..." Swaraj, said.

Bigg Boss OTT, was later produced in a special court in Surajpur which sent the 26year-old social media influencer to 14-day judicial custody, they said.

He was among six people named in an FIR lodged at Noida's Sector 49 police station on November 3 last year. The five other accused, identified as snake charmers, were arrested

in November but are currently out on bail, the officials said.

The case was lodged under provisions of the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972, Indian Penal Code sections 120B (party to criminal conspiracy), 284 (negligent conduct related to poison that endangers human safety) and 289 (negligent conduct with respect to animals), according to police. Charges under the provisions of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act have also been added in the case in which Yadav, a resident of Haryana's Gurugram, has been arrested, police said. Elvish Yadav was called for

questioning in the case. He was



arrested after adequate evidence, including those linked to the NDPS Act, was found in the case. Further investigation is underway," Deputy Commissioner of Police (Noida) Vidya Sagar Mishra

The Noida police said during investigation in the case, it had collected some samples which have been confirmed by forensic laboratory as "snake venom". "The accused has been arrested by a team of Sector 20 police station which was investigating the case," Additional DCP (Noida) Manish Mishra said. During probe, the case was transferred from Sector 49 police station to Sector 20 police station, he added. was produced in the Sunday special court of the Remand Magistrate who sent him to jail for 14 days, according to police. ## EC sets up flying squads, control rooms across seven LS constituencies

¬he office of the Delhi Chief L Electoral Officer has set up flying squads and control rooms across the city's seven Lok Sabha constituencies to check incidents of voter intim-

idation.

In a public notice issued on Sunday, the poll office in Delhi said district election functionaries or returning officers will enforce the Model Code of Conduct in letter and spirit. Polling for Delhi's seven Lok

Sabha seats will be held on May 25 in the sixth phase of the general elections, with 1.47 crore people eligible to exercise their franchise, according to the schedule announced by the Election Commission of India on Saturday.

According to the notice, flying squads have been formed to register cases against both the

"giver" and the "taker" of bribes and for taking action against those engaged in threat and intimidation of electors.

"All the citizens are hereby requested to refrain from any illegal activities as above and in case anybody offers any bribe or is having knowledge about the bribe or case of threat/intimidation of electors, then he/she should inform on the toll free number of the 24x7 complaint monitoring cell of the returning officers/district set up for receiving complaints," it said. The poll body has also urged people to inform of incidents related to Model Code of Conduct violation, including defacement of any public property/any property in public view, distribution of cash, liquor, gifts or offering/attempting to offer bribe by candidates/political parties to the returning officers of their

respective constituencies. If there is threatening/intimidation of electors and instances of other electoral malpractices, it should be reported to the dis-

trict election officer, it said. According to Section 171 B of the Indian Penal Code, any person giving or accepting gratification in cash or kind during the election process, with a view to inducing any person to exercise his/her electoral right, is liable to punished with imprisonment up to one year

or fine or both.

Section 171 C of the Indian Penal Code states that any person who threatens a candidate or elector or any other person with injury of any kind is liable to be punished with imprisonment up to one year or fine or both.

The Delhi poll body has also set up a 'single window system' in the offices of all seven return-

ing officers in the city for receiving applications and issuing permissions/decisions to political parties and candidates for public meetings/rallies/processions/loudspeakers and use of vehicles for election campaigning as well as use of

commercial/remote/uncontrolled airports/helipads etc during the election period. Political parties/candidates seeking permission has to apply online through the "Suvidha Candidate" mobile app or "ENCORE" on the Election Commission of India website at least 48 hours before an event. along with expenditure plan

Parties/candidates seeking permission can also apply to the Assistant Commissioner of Police (Permission) at the single window in the office of the returning officer concerned.

to 6 am," he said. During the Model Code of Conduct, no rest house, post office or government house will be used by political parties. Apart from this, no political person will be able to use words related to caste and religion in his speech. Political parties will not be able to use photographs of temples, mosques, gurudwaras and churches on their banners.

## RRTS struggles with low ridership

Despite its impressive features and seamless connectivity, the world class Delhi-Ghaziabad-Meerut Regional Rapid Transit System (RRTS) is currently experiencing a lower passenger turnout due to exorbitant fare and not fully operational corridor. Almost 10 days of daily 17 km

run between Ghaziabad RRTS Station to Duhai RRTS Station near Meerut, which was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on March 6, the section has handful of commuters and most of them for joyrides. "I came with my friend to just have a feel of the Namo Bharat Train. It is good just like Delhi Metro. I understand once fully operational then it will be of great use for commuting just like the Delhi Metro which has become lifeline of NCR," said Pinki Sinha, a resident of Kavi



The operations are efficient but the trains are underutilized, impacting its potential to alleviate traffic congestion and offer a comfortable commuting alternative. Individuals traveling from areas like Sahibabad, Guldhar, and Duhai face challenges accessing the RRTS due to limited digital literacy and technological know-how. Several residents are not digitally equipped or familiar with using apps for ticket booking as a result they are unable to take full advantage of the convenient booking options offered by the RRTS, leading to lower ridership from these regions

"The anticipation of low footfall at the initial stage of the Delhi-Meerut RRTS is grounded in several factors. Firstly, the unfamiliarity of the public with the RRTS system may lead to skepticism or hesitation in adopting it as a primary mode of transportation. Despite its modern features and conveniences, any new transit system requires time to gain public trust and awareness. The digital divide among potential passengers poses a sig-

a New Delhi based expert on Delhi NCR Transport and Traffic Management. Increased promotional efforts,

educational campaigns, and targeted marketing strategies are essential to inform the public about the RRTS's benefits, its convenient booking options, and the ease of travel it offers. By raising awareness and highlighting its advantages, the RRTS can attract more passengers, ultimately fulfilling its goal of revolutionising urban transit in the region.

"Addressing this digital divide by providing alternative booking methods such as traditional ticket counters, community outreach programs, and user-friendly guides can help ensure equitable access to the RRTS for all demographics, thereby encouraging broader adoption and utilization of this modern transit system," Y K Sharma, retired officer from Jaipur Metro.

Bibek Debroy, Chairman, Prime Minister's Economic Advisory Council, in his foreword for the book lauds Dr Beena while underlining that there has not been much work on voginis. Recalling her visit to the Nigambodh Ghat, Dr Beena

writes: "Just as I entered Nigambodh Ghat, my legs froze. I was unable to move. There were more than ten bodies awaiting their turn at the pyre at the crematorium. There was not a single woman in sight.

Summer was at its peak in Delhi, and the heat emanating from the burning pyres made me dizzy.

## Indian Navy coerces 35 pirates onboard ship to surrender

In a calibrated operation, the Indian Navy on Saturday "coerced" 35 pirates onboard a merchant ship around 1,400 nautical miles from the Indian coast to surrender and ensured the safe evacuation of 17 crew members without any injury, officials said.

The Navy deployed its P-8I maritime patrol aircraft, front-line ships INS Kolkata and INS Subhadra, and high-altitude long-endurance (HALE) unmanned aerial vehicle. The elite MARCOS commandos were air-dropped for the operation by C-17 aircraft.

Earlier, the Navy said it foiled attempts by a group of Somali pirates to hijack ships in the

Somalia as it intercepted their vessel. The armed pirates had sailed out onboard a cargo ship named Ruen that was hijacked around three months back, they said.

"INS Kolkata, in the last 40 hours, through concerted actions successfully cornered and coerced all 35 Pirates to surrender and ensured safe evacuation of 17 crew members in the evening today from the pirate vessel without any injury," Navy spokesperson Commander Vivek Madhwal

The vessel MV Ruen was hijacked by Somali pirates on December 14 last year and was reported to have sailed out as a pirate ship towards conducting acts of piracy on the



In an earlier statement, the Navy said the pirates opened fire on the Indian warship, which took appropriate actions

in self-defence under international law and to counter piracy, using minimal force to neutralise the pirates' threat to shipping and seafarers.

"The pirates onboard the vessel have been called upon to surrender and release the vessel and any civilians they may be holding against their will," it

On Friday, the Navy said an Indian warship and a longrange maritime patrol aircraft extended assistance to a Bangladeshi-flagged cargo vessel after it was hijacked. It said the safety of the crew held hostage by the armed pirates

Navy warship continued to maintain its presence in the close vicinity of the vessel till its arrival in the territorial waters of Somalia.

In the last few weeks, the Indian Navy assisted several merchant vessels in the Western Indian Ocean following attacks on them.

The Indian Navy, earlier this month, foiled a piracy attempt on an Iranian-flagged fishing vessel with a crew of 11 Iranian and eight Pakistani nationals along the East coast of Somalia. In January, Indian warship INS Sumitra rescued 19 Pakistani crew of a fishing vessel after pirates on the east coast of Somalia attacked their Iranianflagged fishing vessel. The Navy on January 5 thwarted an attempted hijacking of Liberian-flagged vessel MV Lila Norfolk in the North Arabian Sea and rescued all its crew members.

Liberian-flagged vessel MV Chem Pluto, with 21 Indian crew members, was the target of a drone attack off India's west

coast on December 23.

The Navy has already enhanced the deployment of its frontline ships and surveillance aircraft for maritime security operations given the maritime environment in the critical sea lanes, including the North and Central Arabian Sea.

There have been mounting global concerns over Houthi militants launching a series of attacks on cargo vessels in the Red Sea in the last few

### Indian Army to carry out 10 days mega wargame with Seychelles troops

immensely in developing mutual understanding and magnify jointness between the troops of both the armies. It will also foster collaborative partnership and help in sharing best practices between the two sides," the Army said in a readout.

It said the aim of the exercise is to enhance interoperability in sub-conventional operations in semi-urban environments under Chapter VII of the United Nations Charter on peacekeeping operations.

"The exercise will also build and promote bilateral military relations in addition to exchanging skills, experiences and good practices between both armies," it said. "Two foreign students were injured in the clash. One of them has been discharged from hospital after receiving medical attention," he said.

According to Ahmedabad Police Commissioner GS Malik, the incident occurred on Saturday night when some 20-25 people entered a hostel



premises of Gujarat University in Ahmedabad "and objected to the international students offering namaz there, asking them to do so in a mosque. They argued over the issue, assaulted them and hurled stones". Two students -- one from Sri Lanka and another from Tajikistan -- were hospitalised. the police said. An FIR was registered against 20-25 people and nine teams were formed to

conduct a probe into the inci-

dent, Malik said.

There are around 300 international students enrolled at the university including from Afghanistan, Tajikistan, Sri Lanka and countries in Africa, he said. Nearly 75 of the international students stay in the Ablock hostel of the university where the incident occurred. the official said All those involved in the incident will be arrested, the official said. adding the case will be monitored by the joint commissioner of police (crime).

### One crore households register for PM rooftop solar scheme within a month

¬he rooftop solar scheme PM-Surya Ghar: Muft Bijli Yojana' has garnered an overwhelming response, with over one crore households registering within just one month since its announcement by Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

States including Assam, Bihar, Gujarat, Maharashtra, Odisha, Tamil Nadu, and Uttar Pradesh have witnessed more than 5 lakh registrations each. The scheme aims to provide up to 300 units of free electricity every month to 1 crore households, with an investment of over Rs 75,000 crores. It also aims to reduce dependence on conventional power sources and promote renew-

able energy. Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday posted on social media X, "Outstanding news! In about a month since



households have already registered themselves for the PM-Surya Ghar: Muft Bijli Yojana. Registrations have been pouring in from all parts of the nation."

'Those who haven't registered should also do so at the earliest," he added. The scheme focuses on the household segment with up to 3 kW system, which covers most of the residential consumers in the country. According to an official from the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy

which is overseeing the scheme, the subsidy program offers a 60 per cent subsidy on systems up to 2 kW capacity and a 40 per cent subsidy on systems between 2-3 kW.

The subsidy is limited to systems up to 3 kW capacity, meaning no financial assistance will be given for capacities exceeding 3 kW. In case the cost of system

installation goes beyond sub-

sidy, households have the option to access collateralfree, low-interest loans until the subsidy is credited. If a consumer cannot cover the entire upfront cost required for installation, they can pay 10% upfront and secure a loan for the remaining 90% at a 7% interest rate. Once the central subsidy is disbursed upon system commissioning, it offsets the loan amount, with the remaining 30%

repaid over a 10-year period

through monthly install-

ments, said the official.

## Gangetic plains, Midnapore hold key to LS polls in Bengal

With the stage set for yet another political showdown between Mamata Banerjee's Trinamool Congress and the opposition BJP, two regions - Gangetic plains and Midnapore - seem to hold the kev to the state's action-packed electoral battle.

The Jalpaiguri region in North Bengal and the Matua belt in south Bengal are also important in the political landscape of the

The Lok Sabha polls in West Bengal, comprising 42 seats, will take place in seven phases, from April 19 to June 1. Counting is on June 4.

Out of the 42 seats, 10 are reserved for SC candidates and two for ST.

In the 2019 Lok Sabha polls, the TMC won 22 seats, the Congress (2) and the BJP (18). The Gangetic-plain region, which comprises five districts of North and South 24 Parganas, Kolkata, Howrah, and Hooghly, has 16 Lok Sabha seats out of which the BJP had won just three in the last Lok Sabha polls. The TMC, which is known for its political dominance of this region, sensing anti-incumbency and non-performance of its candidates, this time has brought in new aspirants in six seats -three, two, and one

respectively from North 24

Parganas, South 24 Parganas, and Hooghly.
The TMC had swept the two

districts of 24 Parganas in the 2021 assembly polls when the party had bagged 27 of the 33 seats in North 24 Parganas, and all but one seat in the minority-dominated South-24 Parganas.

It had also made a clean sweep by winning all the assembly seats in Kolkata, Howrah, and all but four in the Hooghly dis-

Although the TMC has announced its candidates for all Lok Sabha seats in the state, the BJP announced candidates for only twenty seats and the Left Front, which is still in talks with the Congress for an alliance, has announced candidates for sixteen seats.

The saffron party, which had made the citizenship law one of its poll planks during the last general election, was able to woo a section of the refugees, especially those from the Matua community, and the Bongaon Lok Sabha seat subsequently fell on its lap.

The BIP anticipates positive outcomes from the implementation of the CAA, while the TMC seeks to exploit the confusion surrounding it.

The TMC is concerned about the arrests of its senior ministers and alleged influential figures who managed organization



and election affairs in South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas, and Kolkata.

Jyoti Priya Mallick, responsible for North 24 Parganas, and Partha Chatterjee, overseeing party affairs in Kolkata and Hooghly, have been detained by central agencies due to their alleged involvement in scams. ## Dance of democracy

The announcement of dates for the Lok Sabha elections kicks off a massive electoral exercise

■ ndia, the world's largest democracy, is gearing up once again for its general elections, a monumental event that not only captures the attention of the nation but also echoes globally. On Saturday Chief Election Commissioner Rajiv Kumar disclosed the schedule for the forthcoming Lok Sabha elections. The electoral process will unfold in 7 phases, commencing on April 19 and concluding on June 1, with the results slated for announcement on June 4. Notably, simultaneous polls will not be conducted. The Election Commissioner emphasised its commitment to addressing the challenges posed by the "4Ms" — muscle power, financial influence, misinformation, and violations of the Model Code of Conduct — which pose obstacles to the conduct of free and fair elections. With the announcement of election dates, the nation is now abuzz with political fervour and anticipation, as preparations kick into high gear. However, amid the excitement, challenges loom, including completing the exercise peacefully, ensuring free and

pare elections and ensuring a level playing field for all participants, a task that even the esteemed Election Commission of India finds daunting.

To have an idea of the scale of Indian elections savour this: With over one million polling stations set up across the nation and a staggering 969 million registered voters, along with the participation of 2,660 registered political parties and independent candidates, India's upcoming general elections are poised to be an unprecedented democratic spectacle. Spanning across 82 days and divided into seven phases, this electoral exercise is anticipated to be the world's most expensive election to date. With political parties and candi-

dates vying for the attention of voters, the projected expenditure on campaigning and electioneering activities is estimated to surpass a staggering 1.2 trillion rupees, underscoring the immense scale and significance of India's democratic process. There would be a polling station at the altitude of 15,256 feet. This much-awaited declaration marks the initiation of a meticulous and extensive process that will culminate in the formation of the next government. From the deployment of security personnel to the procurement of electronic voting machines (EVMs) and the training of election officials the Election Commission is busy preparing for this gigantic democratic exercise. Despite the best efforts of the Election Commission, ensuring a level playing field for all participants remains a significant challenge. The democratic ethos of India hinges on the principle of fair and free elections, where every citizen has an equal opportunity to participate and express their will through the ballot box. However, in reality, achieving this ideal is fraught with obstacles. In this gigantic our participation remains a crucial factor. Voter apathy is unacceptable. We must vote no matter what. Should you harbour reservations about the candidates, you have the option to exercise the 'none of the above' (NOTA) provision. While your vote under NOTA might not be tallied, it still signifies your expression of opinion.

## Secessionism is not an option




### A Raja's remarks, rooted in a divisive political ideology, reflect a dangerous trend of separatism that undermines the unity of India

MK MP A Raja can perhaps be forgiven, for believing that India is only a subcontinent and not a country, only on grounds of stark ignorance. One doesn't know whether Raja has ever gone to a university, but even if he had, he has learnt nothing useful. More ironic would be the fact that even his political knowledge—assuming he has any worthwhile of it in the first place—appears to have let him down.

A background into Raja's anticentre and anti-Indian fulminations would be necessary. His party the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) came into existence based on sectarian hatred against the Brahmin community, Sanskrit and the Hindu religion itself. Later, this morphed into anti-Indian sentiment; the DMK committed to seceding from the Indian Union as part of its party manifesto, which it claimed as an inalienable political right, giving it up only in 1962. It, however, continues to remain virulently anti-Hindu and anti-Hindu. İts political ideology is based on pitting Tamil Nadu as a 'separate' civilization from the rest of India, particularly Hindu civilization. Raja, in an election year, is trying to fan the embers of that fossilised ideology.

But facts and reality make rubbish of Raja's utterances. Let us take the most visible facet of Hindu dharma—the temple. Some of the first Hindu temples, and certainly the most in number, are situated in Tamil Nadu. Be it Shaivism or Vaishnavism, the modes of worship are exactly what they are in all other parts of India, except maybe the use of Tamil in place of Sanskrit in many temples in the state. The cardinal point being made here is that Hinduism in all its fascinating shades is the same across the country and that is the spine that makes India a single civilization, and constitutionally, a single country.

Mohammad Áli Jinnah from 1940 to the end of his life in 1948, believed and propagated that Hindus and Muslims are so different that they cannot co-exist in hood crypto-Christians, who one country. So far, in postindependence India, they have managed to do so. On the other



The point to be iterated here is that even the closely-knit Islamic community is not able to hold a country together. In the early years of President Gamal Ábdel Nasser of Egypt, his country and Syria merged to become the United Arab Republic (UAR); the 'unity' lasted just three years (from 1958 to 1971), as both returned to their separate entities.

Those citizens of Tamil Nadu like A. Raja who talk of India as a subcontinent are not Hindus but are, in all likeli conceal their faith under the cloak of Hindu names. Their separatism is dangerous more

to Tamil Nadu and less so to India. The reason is that there are more Hindus in Tamil Nadu than any other community and therefore, are not going to separate from India on any temptation. As a consequence, if any fissiparous activity were to break the state, it would leave no chance of any secession from India. We wonder whether A. Raja has realised the folly of his 'subcontinental' thesis.

The Raja writ may run in Chennai and the districts around it. The Nagercoil area of the extreme southern part of the state is nearer its neighbour Kerala than being a devotee of the Raja thesis. The northern districts of Tamil Nadu are indifferent to the Raja theory. Raja should realise that it is one thing to talk about seceding, but quite another to survive in separation. For example, dealing with neighbouring countries is a different kettle of fish, whether it is regard to river water or imports and exports.

The prestige and clout a larg and powerful country like India can command is something a small country cannot even dream of. What then becomes necessary is seeking the refuge of a larger bloc, the way Estonia, Lithuania, and Latvia have joined NATO. Being so small, these three countries would have no say in the conduct of NATO, but on the other hand, would have to make quite some sacrifice in exchange for only military

protection.

Thought should be given to whether Tamil Nadu could have built up such a large automobile industry had it been a small, separate country. TN's automobile industry's success has happened because A. Raja's state is part of a large country. This also throws open a large, open home market. Competing with large automobile makers in the home market will make survival difficult; without the support of a home market, it is impossible. To sum up, secession and surviving as a separate entity is a far more complex proposition than life after talaq (divorce), which is of course, different and difficult enough.

## The power of centralised lab in modern healthcare



A centralised approach to laboratory diagnostics offers numerous advantages in terms of efficiency, quality and coordination of services

n the present age, medical and clinical examination is **▲** greatly supplemented with (or sometimes lamentably even replaced by) laboratory investigations. Nearly all physicians and surgeons routinely rely on a broad range of laboratory tests to diagnose or confirm various medical conditions. Diagnostics are a force multiplier to our clinical judgment and are essential decision-support tools. Laboratory diagnostics provide us with extremely valuable information that assists accurate diagnoses, helps in monitoring the progression of diseases, and aids treatment decisions.

Standardisation of laboratory procedures and maintenance of accurate reference ranges is crucial to ensure consistent and comparable results across different laboratories. Without standardisation, the issued laboratory results will at best, be slightly inaccurate but could lead the treating physician away from diagnosing the problem at hand. It is therefore incumbent on the physician to apriori check if the tests being perused have been done in a standardised laboratory. This is where the mendable work that was



a major advantage. Good centralised laboratories routinely implement standardized protocols and participate in external quality assessment programmes to validate the uniform standardisation and accuracy of their testing practices. These laboratories, by virtue of sheer numbers being catered to, are able to reduce the turnaround time or total diagnostic time, the time lag between sample collections to reporting of results. This is vital in accessing samples from remote locations where delays in reporting have amplifying effects on delays in diagnosis and optimum healthcare delivery. Though, the COVID pandemic challenged this hypothesis of the superiority of the centralised laboratories and the decentralised, stand-

alone laboratories did com-

widely appreciated also. At the end of the day, as practising clinicians, we desperately need accurate results that are uniformly comparable between different laboratories. This accuracy in the interpretation of test results helps in better treating the patients.

As nephrologists, we rely on the blood concentration of creatinine (serum creatinine) to estimate a patient's kidney function. It is mandated that laboratories doing this test must have its results traceable to IDMS (isotope-dilution mass spectrometry). Until about a decade ago, several laboratories in India were not maintaining this standard. Thankfully, things have improved. This is where the centralised laboratories score, by maintaining high standards of quality assurance and providing accurate and reliable results

Most of these laboratories National Board have Accreditation for Testing and Calibration Laboratories (NABL) certification. This certification reinforces uniformity and standardisation. However, at present, this accreditation and certification

is still voluntary at the present time. It is well known that different laboratory tests require specialised expertise and equipment. For example, pathology, microbiology, hematology, and molecular biology laboratories each need their own set of techniques and instruments to operate. Centralising testing also allows for a wider array of tests to be available simultaneously.

In addition, modern laboratory diagnostics often involve sophisticated equipment and infrastructure, such as automated analysers, mass spectrometers, genetic sequencers, and imaging systems. These instruments are costly to acquire, operate, and maintain, and in addition, need experts with specialised knowledge, training and skills to conduct the tests and interpret the results. Centralised aboratories are often able to pool resources to invest in state-of-the-art equipment, enabling more accurate testing and savings on instruments, reagents, and person-



However, it is also a highly coveted resource, often the subject of conflicts as various stakeholders, each with their unique vision of development, compete for its possession. India's terrain, once a vibrant mosaic of lush fields and flourishing ecosystems, is confronting a transformed paradigm. The ceaseless progression of urbanisation and industrialisation is swiftly altering the landscape, leaving a trail of unintended consequences in its wake. This shift is diverting fertile land away from its traditional agricultural use, posing serious challenges for food security and causing harm to ecosensitive areas, thereby disrupting wildlife habitats and biodiversity on both micro and macro levels. Development, despite its promise of progress, tends to exploit nature's bounty and displace indigenous communities, severing the sacred ties that have bound them to the land for generations. These competing and conflicting land uses along with evolving land rights issues are igniting conflicts between local communities and administrative entities.

vith indias rise as the world's most pop ulous country, accounting for nearly 18% of the global population, the per capita land availability is dwindling. This decline, especially in areas vital for human life, agriculture, ecosystems, and natural resources, carries significant implications. The task ahead is to unlock the potential of the land in a way that harmoniously accommodates the diverse needs and impacts associated with different land uses.

The agricultural landscape of India has also experienced significant transformations over the centuries, evolving from traditional farming to modern techniques. Initially, Indian farming was subsistence-based, relying on indigenous knowledge and techniques like mixed cropping, crop rotation, and organic manure use, which fostered a healthy relationship with the environment. Agroforestry, the harmonious integration of trees and shrubs within farmlands had further enriched this tapestry which contributed to the overall health and productivity of the land.

However, the British era marked a shift



Post-independence, the Green Revolution emerged as a beacon of hope, aiming to alleviate hunger and poverty by increasing food grain production. Climate change is also worsening the existing water scarcity, creating a vicious cycle that threatens the very foundation of agriculture in many regions.

Beyond these environmental chal-

farming, making it a less attractive livelihood for many. Farmers often face unfair market practices, including receiving low prices for their crops and delayed payments.

These multifaceted challenges culminate in a tragic reality - the distressing issue of farmer suicides. The key to sustainable land management lies in open discussions and collective decision-making among a diverse group of stakeholders. To realise this vision, it's essential to empower all stake-

edge to make informed decisions. In this context, building a comprehensive Land Information System becomes vital, especially for small landholders. Farmers often face challenges in decision-making due to the lack of comprehensive land records, particularly during land transactions. Establishing systems that provide crucial data, such as soil conditions, water availability, past crop yields and pricing trends can enhance their decision-making capabilities. Addressing land rights issues and empowering margin-alised communities are also crucial for societal robustness and equity. It's equally important that land acquisition strategies balance the need for public projects with the provision of adequate compensa-tion and rehabilitation support for displaced individuals.

Efficiency and effectiveness in land management can also be significantly improved by streamlining regulations, eliminating redundancies, and enhancing data accessibility and transparency. It's also important to cultivate environmental consciousness, promote climatesmart strategies, and encourage forward-thinking in land use planning. Protecting resource-rich areas, pai ticularly Eco-Sensitive Zones must be prioritised. Establishing clear boundaries and integrating these areas into land use planning will ensure their continued bounty and ecological significance. Enforcing sensible restrictions on the acquisition and conversion of arable lands is fundamental, given their significant role in food security and sustaining agricultural communi-

With these comprehensive strategies and mindful practices in place, we can begin to address the multifaceted challenges of land management. This sets the stage for India to navigate its complex land use challenges and secure a future where development and environmental preservation flourish in harmonv.

Consular services are crucial for global diplomatic efforts as they tirelessly safeguard the interests of citizens residing outside their country of origin

Tith the intricate tapestry of international relations, consular services stand out as the crucial thread that weaves together global diplomatic efforts while also working to safeguard their citizens' interests outside of their country of origin. From the Indian perspective, consular duties are of immense importance. At present, officials assigned to various Indian missions worldwide have been burdened with the responsibility to safeguard the highest interests of Indians abroad and secure their wellbeing by any means possible. Particularly, Indian consular services are internationally active in fostering business ties. These consular duties reflect domestic legal requirements under the Indian Constitution



and international responsibilities. The wide range of functions available to Indian citizens within countries where they are resident encompasses several areas, including keeping them safe, vital for their welfare, and helping them normally adjust to a new culture abroad. This demonstrates that consular services are multi-dimensional because they connect local laws with

the Indian consulates take care of Indian citizens. This entails providing advice, assistance, or help in instances like emergencies, sicknesses, and natural calamities. Consular services support Indians in distress abroad by providing financial aid to enable them to cope with unexpected situations. # Netanyahu rails against US criticism 'Israel won't stop until total victory is achieved'

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu railed on Sunday against growing criticism from the United States against his leadership amid the devasting war with Hamas, saying the pressure won't stop Israel from achieving "total

In recent days, top officials from the US, Israel's staunchest ally which has provided key military and diplomatic sup-port during the war, have pub-licly voiced their frustration with Netanyahu and his gov-

US President Joe Biden accused Netanyahu of hurting Israel because of the huge civilian death toll in Gaza

US Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, the highestranking Jewish official in the country and a strong Israel supporter, then called on Israel to hold a new election, saying Netanyahu had "lost his way."

for what he called Schumer's "good speech."

Biden then expressed support The US also has expressed concerns about a planned Gaza city of Rafah, where about 1.4 million displaced Palestinians are sheltering, and support for a new round of talks aimed at securing a cease-fire in exchange for the return The Israeli delegation to those

talks wasn't expected to leave for Qatar until after Sunday evening meetings of the Security Cabinet and War Cabinet, which will give them directions for the negotiations. Despite the talks, Netanyahu made it clear Sunday he had no plans of backing down from the fighting that has already killed more than 31,000 Palestinians, according to local health officials, in the more than five months since Hamas' October 7 attack on southern Israel killed 1,200 people and left another 250 hostage in Gaza, Israeli authorities say.

He said that calls for an election now — which polls show he would lose badly - would force Israel to stop fighting and would paralyze the country for six months. If we stop the war now, before all of its goals are achieved, this means that Israel will have lost the war, and this we will not allow. Therefore, we cannot, and will not, succumb to this pressure," he said. While the international criticism was mainly directed at Netanyahu and his leadership specifically, his state-ment Sunday painted it as a

"No international pressure will stop us from realizing all of the goals of the war: Eliminating Hamas, freeing all of our hostages and ensuring that Gaza never again constitutes a threat to Israel," he said.

He reiterated his determination to attack Hamas in Rafah and said that his government approved military plans for such an operation. We will operate in Rafah. Transport Secretary Mark Harper was directly asked during a television interview if he thinks Sunak will be the leader of the Conservative Party at the general election. "Yes he will, and he'll take us into that election and he'll set out very clearly that we're a

government with a plan," Harper told 'Sky News'. "The plan is working, we're driving down inflation, we're

reducing people's taxes. We're the only party that's got a plan to deal with the priorities of the country that will take us into that election and set out a choice," he said. On rumours that a group of Tory MPs are keen to replace

Sunak with his former leadership rival and now Leader of the House of Commons in his Cabinet, Penny Mordaunt, Harper added: "What I would say to all my colleagues is this; I spend my time as Transport Secretary focusing on doing what I think is the right thing for the country, making decisions that I think are sensible." "That is the approach that the Prime Minister takes as well. He focuses on making the right decisions even if in the short term they are not necessarily popular," Harper said.
According to 'The Daily Telegraph, a meeting is understood to have taken place this weekend between leading figures on the right wing of the Tory party and prominent supporters of Mordaunt from exit of Boris Johnson as prime

Some right-wing MPs met with Team Penny this week, where they expressed the view they were prepared to back her. They take the view that Penny is preferable to Rishi Sunak right now. Penny Mordaunt is now seen as the most likely person to stem the losses," the newspaper quoted a source as saying.

The discussions are reflective of despair among some Conservative MPs at the steady lead in favour of the Opposition Labour Party in pre-poll surveys and the prospect of heading towards a disastrous defeat.

With the Spring Budget earlier this month failing to turn the dial in the party's favour and a series of high-profile exits from the Tory ranks, there is growing discontent among the Conservative backbenchers.

However, some of Sunak's very vocal critics and Boris Johnson allies, such as former minister Jacob Rees-Mogg, have dismissed the idea of replacing the British Indian leader at this juncture in the electoral cycle as "madness".

"Interesting to hear lots of media reporting of centreright Conservative MPs pushing for a certain leadership candidate to replace Rishi. Having spoken with lots of my

colleagues, no one seems to have heard or been pushing for such a thing," said Andrea Jenkyns, a Tory MP critical of Sunak's leadership.

Labour, meanwhile, has jumped on the turmoil to demand an early general elec-

interest anymore. It is irresponsible. We need stability in this country. He [Sunak] could stabilise this by naming the date of a general election. ### Suspected attack by Houthi rebels target ship in

Gulf of Aden Dubai (AP) A suspected attack by Yemen's Houthi rebels targeted a ship early Sunday in the Gulf of Aden, potentially marking their latest assault on shipping through the crucial waterway leading to the Red Sea. The British military's United Kingdom Maritime Trade Operations centre offered few details in an announcement about the attack, saying only it happened off the coast of Aden, the port city in southern Yemen home to the country's exiled government. The Houthis have launched repeated drone and missile attacks in the same area, disrupting energy and cargo shipments through the Gulf of Aden. The rebels did not immediately claim responsibility for the attack, though it typically takes the Houthis several hours before acknowledg

ing their assaults. Separately, the US military's Central Command said it carried out a series of strikes tar-

geting the Houthis. It said it destroyed five drone boats and one drone before takeoff from Houthi-controlled territory in Yemen on Saturday. It was an unusually high number of drone boats to be

Separately, the US military shot down one Houthi drone over the Red Sea, while another was "presumed to have crashed". There were no reports of dam-

age or injuries from ships in the vicinity," Central Command said. The Houthis have attacked ships since November, saying they want to force Israel to end its offensive in the Gaza Strip against Hamas. The ships target ed by the Houthis, however, largely have had little or no connection to Israel, the US or other nations involved in the war. The rebels have also fired missiles toward Israel, though they have largely fallen short or been intercepted.

The assaults on shipping have raised the profile of the Houthis, who are members of Islam's minority Shiite Zaydi sect, which ruled Yemen for 1,000 years until 1962.

## announces USD 8 bn aid package for Egypt

The European Union on Sunday announced a 7.4 billion-euro (USD 8 billion) aid package for cash-strapped Egypt as concerns mount that economic pressure and conflicts in neighbouring countries could drive more migrants to European shores. The deal, which drew criticism from rights groups over Egypt's human rights record, is scheduled to be signed during a visit Sunday by European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen and leaders of Belgium, Italy, Austria, Cyprus and Greece, according to Egyptian officials.

Egyptian President Abdel Fattah el-Sissi met separately with von der Leyen and other European leaders before the signing ceremony on Sunday

The aid package includes both grants and loans over the next three years for the Arab world's most populous country, according to the EU's mission in Cairo. Most of the funds — 5 billion euros (USD 5.4 billion)— are macro-financial

assistance, according to a document from the EU mission in

The mission said that the two sides have promoted their cooperation to the level of a "strategic and comprehensive partnership," paving the way for expanding Egypt-EU cooperation in various economic and noneconomic areas.

El-Sissi's office said in a statement that the deal aims to achieve "a significant leap in cooperation and coordination between the two sides and to achieve common interests." The EU will provide assis-

tance to Egypt's government to fortify its borders, especially with Libya, a major transit point for migrants fleeing poverty and conflicts in Africa and the Middle East. The 27nation bloc will also support the government in hosting Sudanese who have fled near ly a year of fighting between rival generals in their country. Egypt received more than 460,000 Sudanese since April

Egypt faces migratory pressures from the region, with the added looming threat that the Israel-Hamas war will spill across its borders.

The deal would inject muchneeded funds into the Egyptian economy which has been hit hard by years of government austerity, the coronavirus pan-demic, the fallout from Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, and most recently, the Israel-Hamas war in Gaza.

Egypt reached a deal with the International Monetary Fund earlier this month to increase a bailout loan to \$8 billion, up from USD 3 billion, after marathon negotiations. The deal with the IMF was combined with economic reforms that included the flotation of the Egyptian pound and a sharp raising of the main interest rate. The EU deal follows the template of those recently signed with Tunisia and Mauritania that pledged funds in return for fortifying their borders. Both Tunisia and Mauritania were key points of departure for migrants crossing the Mediterranean and a

and Spain, respectively, and they too were criticized for alleged abuses against migrants. The package drew criticism from international rights groups over Egypt's human rights record. Amnesty International urged European leaders not to be complicit with human rights violations taking place in Egypt.

"EU leaders must ensure that the Egyptian authorities adopt clear benchmarks for human rights," said Eve Geddie, Amnesty International's head of the European institutions office. Geddie pointed to Egypt's restrictions on media and freedom of expression and a crackdown on civil society.Questioned about the morality of such deals earlier this week in Brussels, European Commission spokesperson Eric Mamer acknowledged that there were issues in all these countries, but defended the partnerships nonetheless. Some of those forces were involved in the July overthrow of Niger's democratically elected president, Mohammed Bazoum. In October, Washington officially designated the military takeover as a coup, which triggered US laws restricting the military support and aid that it can provide to Niger. But in

## Volcano in Iceland erupting for fourth time in three months

The Met Office had warned for weeks that magma — semimolten rock — was accumulating under the ground, making an eruption likely. Hundreds of people were evacuated from the Blue Lagoon thermal spa, one of Iceland's top tourist attractions, when the eruption began, national broadcaster RUV said. No flight disruptions were reported at nearby Keflavik, Iceland's main airport.

as saying that the latest eruption is the most powerful so far. The Met Office said some of the lava was flowing towards the defensive barriers around Grindavik. Iceland, which sits above a volcanic hot spot in the North Atlantic, sees regular eruptions and is highly experienced at dealing with them. The most disruptive in recent times was the 2010 eruption of the Eyjafjallajokull volcano, which spewed huge clouds of ash into the atmosphere and led to widespread airspace closures over Europe.

### Shooting in Washington leaves 2 dead, five injured Washington (AP): Two people

have been killed and five others injured in a shooting in the nation's capital early Sunday. Police were looking for a single gunman after the seven people were shot around 3 a.m. in the Shaw neighbourhood of Washington. The five people who were injured were all taken to local hospitals, said Jeffrey Carroll, the executive assistant chief of the Metropolitan Police Department. All of the victims are adults, he said. Police did not immediately provide details of the circumstances surrounding the shooting or the conditions of those injured. The District of Columbia is struggling with a sharp increase in violent crime, which went up 39% in 2023. The increase was largely fueled by a 35% rise in homicides and growth in carjackings, which nearly doubled.

## Biden campaign has amassed \$155 million for poll campaign

President Joe Biden's campaign has amassed USD 155 million in cash on hand for the 2024 election, far exceeding the in-hand total for his Republican opponent, Donald Trump.

The president raised USD 53 million alone last month, which was the strongest grassroots fundraising month since the campaign launched, according to campaign offi-

Among those efforts was a contest for supporters to attend a fundraiser on March 28 in New York with Biden, Barack Obama and Bill Clinton that raised USD 4 million last month.

The enthusiasm we're picking up as we go around the country is real," Biden said in a radio interview with WNOV 860 in Wisconsin last week. "We've raised a whole lot of money. We have 1.5 million donors, including 500,000 are brand new, they're small donors; 97 per

Trump's February figures have not been released. By the end of January, his two major committees had just USD 36.6 million in cash on hand, and those committees collectively spent more than they took in that month.

A major driver of those costs was millions of dollars in legal fees from Trump's myriad court cases. The figures are only a partial snapshot of the Trump operation's finances because other branches won't have to disclose their numbers until April.

Biden's cash on hand total is the highest amassed by any Democratic candidate in history during this point in the campaign, the campaign said. Emails to Biden supporters that focused on concerns over Trump helped drive up support last month. While Joe Biden and

## **Imran seeks high treason trial** of Pak poll mandate thieves

 $P_{\text{minister Imran Khan has}}^{\text{akistan's jailed former prime}}$ sought high treason proceedings against officials who allegedly stole his party's mandate in the February general elections and allowed the rival PML-N and the PPP to form a coalition government.

Khan's remarks came as he spoke to reporters on Saturday after the hearing of the Al-Qadir Trust corruption case in which his wife Bushra Bibi, aide Farah Gogi and property tycoon Malik Riaz are also implicated. The February 8 elections in Pakistan were marred by the allegations of vote rigging. Though more than 90 independent candidates backed by Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) won the maximum number of seats in the National Assembly, the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) led by former prime minister Nawaz Sharif and the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) led by former foreign minister Bilawal Bhutto struck a post-poll deal and formed a coalition government in the

PTI says the new government was formed by stealing its mandate. Khan on Saturday claimed that his party bagged over 30 million votes whereas the rest of the 17 political parties jointly secured the same number of votes, Dawn newspaper reported. He said his party took up the irregularities in polls with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and that non-government organisa-tions also pointed out flaws in the electoral process.

Khan, being the prime minister then, instead of depositing in the national treasury, allowed the businessman (Riaz) to use the amount to partly settle a fine of about Rs 450 billion imposed by the Supreme Court some years ago. Reportedly, the tycoon, in return, gifted about 57 acres of land to a trust set up by Khan and his wife, Bushra Bibi, to establish the Al-Qadir University in the Sohawa area of the Jhelum district of Punjab. Accountability judge Nasir Javed Rana also recorded the statement of another prosecution witness. During the hearing, Khan, Bushra Bibi, her daughter and son-in-law were also present in the courtroom. The case was adjourned till March 20.

## fishermen for poaching

Colombo (PTI): The Sri Lankan Navy has arrested 21 more Indian fishermen for allegedly poaching into the country's territorial water, the latest such incident this month. The fishermen were arrested on Saturday near the Jaffna islet of Delft and escorted to the Kankesanthurai port, the Navy said. Their two trawlers were also seized by the Navy.

The arrests come a day after the Sri Lanka Navy on Friday detained at least 15 Indian fishermen off the coast of Karainagar in the northern Jaffna Peninsula. At least 146 Indian fishermen have been arrested by Sri Lanka so far this year. The fishermen issue is a contentious one in the ties between India and Sri Lanka, with Lankan Navy personnel even firing at Indian fishermen in the Palk Strait and seizing their boats in several alleged incidents of illegally entering Sri Lankan territorial waters The Palk Strait, a narrow strip of water separating Tamil Nadu from Sri Lanka, is a rich fishing ground for fishermen from both countries.

There have been periodic instances of Indian fishermen being arrested by Sri Lankan authorities for allegedly cross-ing the International Maritime Boundary Line and fishing in Sri Lankan waters, In 2023, the island nation's Navy arrested 240 Indian fishermen along with 35 trawlers for allegedly poaching in Sri Lankan waters.

## SL Navy arrests 21 more Indian With no 'real choice', Putin to rule Russia for 6 more years

 $R_{\text{Putin is poised to extend}}^{\text{ussian President Vladimir}}$ nearly a quarter century of rule for six more years on Sunday after wrapping up an election that gave voters no real alternatives to an autocrat who has ruthlessly cracked down on dissent. The three-day election that began Friday has taken place in a tightly controlled environment where no public criticism of Putin or his war in Ukraine is allowed. Putin's fiercest political foe, Alexei Navalny, died in an Arctic prison last month, and other critics are either in jail or in

The 71-year-old Russian leader faces three token rivals from Kremlin-friendly parties who have refrained from any criticism of his 24-year rule or his full-scale invasion of Ukraine two years ago. Putin has boasted of Russian battlefield successes in the run-up to the vote, but a massive Ukrainian drone attack across Russia early Sunday sent a reminder of challenges faced by Moscow. The Russian Defense Ministry

reported downing 35 Ukrainian drones overnight, including four near the Russian capital. Moscow Mayor Sergei Sobyanin said there were no casualties or damage

Russia's wartime economy has proven resilient, expanding despite bruising Western sanc-

tions. The Russian defense industry has served as a key growth engine, working around the clock to churn out missiles, tanks and ammunition. Russia's scattered opposition has urged those unhappy with Putin or the war to express their protest by coming to the polls at noon on Sunday. The action was endorsed by Navalny not long

Navalny's associates described their strategy as a success, releasing pictures and videos of people crowding near polling stations in various cities across Russia. It wasn't immediately clear if the voters lining up at polling stations heeded the call from Navalny's allies or the queues reflected strong turnout that usually peaks around midday.

Voting is taking place at polling stations across the vast country's 11 time zones, in illegally annexed regions of Ukraine, and online. More than 60% of eligible voters had cast ballots as of early Sunday. Despite tight controls, multiple cases of vandalism at polling stations were reported. A woman was arrested in St Petersburg after she threw a firebomb at a polling station entrance, and several others were detained across the country for throwing green antiseptic or ink into ballot boxes. Dmitry Medvedev, a deputy head of the Russian Security Council chaired by Putin, called for toughening the punishment for those who vandalize polling stations, arguing they should face treason charges for attempting to derail the vote amid the fighting in Ukraine.

Ahead of the election, Putin cast his war in Ukraine, now in its third year, as a life-ordeath battle against the West seeking to break up Russia. Russian troops have recently made slow advances relying on their edge in firepower, while Ukraine has fought back by intensifying cross-border attacks and launching drone

strikes deep inside Russia. The Ukrainian shelling of the city of Belgorod near the border killed a 16-year-old girl on Sunday and injured her father, according to the local governor, who also reported two deaths from Ukrainian attacks the previous day

Putin described the attacks as an attempt by Ukraine to frighten residents and derail Russia's presidential election, saying they "won't be left unpunished."

## India economic boom feels like 2003-07: Morgan Stanley

rndia's current worldbeating economic growth rate on the back of an investment boom resembles that of 2003-07 when growth averaged more than 8 per according to economists at Stanley.

In a report 'The Viewpoint: India - Why this feels like 2003-07', Morgan Stanley said after a decade of investment to GDP steadily declining, capex has emerged as a key growth driver in India. "We think the capex cycle has more room to run, the current expansion closely resembles that of 2003-07.

The current cycle is driven by

consumption, public capex leading initially but private capex rapidly catching up, the urban consumer leading consumption followed by catch-up in rural demand, market share in global exports rising and macro

stability risks kept in check. "We think the defining characteristic of the current expansion is the rise in the investment-to-GDP ratio. Similarly, in the 2003-07 cycle investment to GDP rose from 27 per cent in F2003 (fiscal year ending March 2003) to 39 per cent in F2008, which was close to the peak. "Investment to GDP then hovered around those levels until it peaked in F2011. 2011 to 2021 then registered a



decade of decline - but the ratio has now inflected again to 34 per cent of GDP and we expect it to rise further to 36 per cent of GDP in F2027E," it said.

In 2003-07, the capex boom led to an acceleration in productivity, job creation and income growth. As more labour was absorbed into employment

strengthening economy, savings to GDP also rose from 28 per cent in F2003 to 39 per cent in F2008.

During 2003-07, GDP growth averaged 8.6 per cent and headline CPI inflation averaged 4.8 per cent. The current account balance stayed within the central bank's comfort zone, ranging

per cent of GDP on a 4Q trailing sum basis. Even when oil prices shot up to USD 145 per barrel in July 2008, the current account deficit only widened to 2.4 per cent of GDP the following quarter, the research report said.

### Regional airline FLY91 expects to have 350 staff in first year of operations

Regional airline FLY91, which will commence its commercial flights on March 18, will have around 350 staff at the end of the first year of operations and aims to break even within two years, according to a top executive.

The Goa-based airline currently has two ATR 72-600 planes in its fleet and four more aircraft will be added in the first year of operations.

The carrier's MD and CEO Manoj Chacko said there is no need to raise funds now, as it will also be getting Viability Gap Funding (VGF) under the regional air connectivity scheme UDAN. "We also have VGF for the sectors we have won. If we take all the sectors we have secured and if we operate the full schedule, then on an annualised basis, it will be around Rs 200 crore," he told PTI in a recent interview.

The airline expects to break even in 18-24 months, he said and added that the focus is to build a profitable, sustainable and scalable

flights between Goa's Manohar International Airport and Bengaluru and Hyderabad. It will also provide connectivity between Sindhudurg, in Maharashtra to Bengaluru and Hyderabad.

Subsequently, the airline will start flights to Agatti, Pune, Jalgaon and Nanded. The services to Agatti in Lakshadweep commence from April.

Currently, the carrier has a staff strength of around 200 and the count will rise to about 350 to 360 by the end of the first year of operations. "I have got 200 people (now) with 2 aircraft. 4 more aircraft are coming and another 100 people will be added. I have two stations open and another three stations, they will need 50 staff... So, it will be around 350-360 in the first year of operations," Chacko noted. He spoke to PTI onboard the airline's ceremonial flight from Goa to Agatti on March 12.





## Decoding Thyroid Nodule Puzzle

Solitary thyroid nodules (STNs) are discrete masses within the thyroid gland, located in front of the neck. While most are benign, some can be malignant, requiring thorough evaluation. A team from the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) Delhi, Surgical Department, led by DR SUNIL CHUMBER tells ARCHANA JYOTI that proper assessment to determine nature and risk is vital for a patient's well-being

WHAT IS STNs BY Dr. Sunil Chumber,

Dr. Piyush Ranjan, Dr. Suneha f you've ever felt a lump or swelling in the front of your Lneck that moves up and down with swallowing, it could be a solitary thyroid nodule (STN). But what exactly is it, and does it pose any health risks? Let's break it down.

Imagine your thyroid gland as a butterfly-shaped organ located in the front of your neck, just below your Adam's apple. Normally, it functions smoothly, regulating various bodily functions through hormone production. Sometimesa single abnormal lump or nodule can develop within an otherwise normal thyroid gland, this is known as a solitary thyroid nodule. This can happen due to a variety of reasons.
Solitary thyroid nodules can

affect individuals of all ages, including children, and in both genders but are more common in women. At any given time, about 4 to 8 out of every 100 people may have these nodules, which sometimes may not be visible to the naked eye, but are seen on ultrasound of the neck. The good news is, not all Solitary thyroid nodules require treatment. Although it is advisable to get them checked by a doctor since a small number of these nodules can harbor cancer.

hyroid nodules can be tricky L because they might not show any signs, especially if they're small. You might not even feel them or notice any symptoms. But sometimes, they can be found during a regular check-up or when you're getting another scan done for

something else. However, if a nodule grows bigger, you might notice it yourself when you look in the mirror or someone else might spot it. You might even be able to feel it with your hand. As they get bigger, they can cause

Difficulty: Breathing Especially when lying down.

Swallowing Difficulty: It might feel like something is stuck in your throat.

indeterminate, and malignant.

Benign nodules are not cancerous and are not likely to cause harm. Most thyroid nodules are benign.

Malignant nodules are cancerous. However, it is important to note that most thyroid nodules are benign, not cancerous.

Indeterminate: Sometimes, the results of tests (Fine needle aspiration biopsies-FNAC) are inconclusive, meaning they definitively say whether the nodule is cancerous or not.

The classification is based on features of cells seen under a microscope using Bethesda System and the American Thyroid Association guidelines. The risk assessment is done ultrasound using characteristics, and staging based on clinical and pathological factors. These clinical classification systems help surgeons determine the appropriate management and treatment plan for patients with thyroid nodules, including whether surgical intervention is necessary and the extent of surgery required.

When doctors need to figure out what's going on with your thyroid nodules, they use a few different tests to get the full picture. These tests help them understand if the nodules are harmless or if they could be cancerous. Here's what they do:

Neck Ultrasound: This is like taking a picture of your neck using sound waves. It helps the doctor see the thyroid gland and any nodules clearly without any pain. They can tell a lot about the nodules, like how big they are and what they look like inside.

Fine Needle Aspiration (FNA) Biopsy: This sounds scarier than it is. It's a procedure where they use a tiny needle to take out some cells from the nodule. Then, they look at these cells under a microscope to see if there's anything abnormal, like cancer cells.

Blood Tests: These tests help the doctor check how well your thyroid is working and if there are any signs of trouble. They look at different things in your blood:

Thyroid Function Test: This checks levels of thyroid hormones and a hormone called TSH that helps control your thyroid. If these levels are off, it could mean your thyroid is not working right. Thyroglobulin Levels: This

checks for a protein that the thyroid makes. High levels could mean there's a risk of thyroid cancer. Calcitonin Levels: Doctors check this hormone to see if

there's a rare type of thyroid

cancer called medullary


thyroid carcinoma. By doing these tests along with imaging studies like ultrasound and looking at cells under a microscope, doctors can get a good idea of what's going on with your thyroid nodules. This helps them decide the best way to take care of you and make sure you stay healthy.

When it comes to dealing with thyroid nodules, doctors consider your medical history, do a physical exam, and

often use ultrasound to get a better look. They might also do a biopsy, where they take a tiny sample of the nodule to check for cancer cells.

#### Here's what happens next based on the results:



biopsy shows cancer, you'll likely need surgery to remove all or part of your thyroid gland. Sometimes, they might also remove nearby lymph nodes. After surgery, you might need treatment more radioactive iodine to make sure all the cancer cells are gone. You'll also need to take thyroid hormone pills every day for the rest of your life to keep your body working

Uncertain Results: If the biopsy doesn't give a clear answer, you might still need surgery to remove the nodule. But there are some new tests that can help doctors decide if surgery is really necessary, especially if the risk of cancer is low.

Cysts and Tough Cases: Nodules that keep coming back or are really big might need surgery. And if a nodule looks suspicious on ultrasound but the biopsy doesn't show anything, it's still a good idea to talk to doctor vour removing it, especially if you have a family history of thyroid problems or were exposed to radiation as a child.

Remember, your doctor is there to help you figure out the best plan for your nodules. Don't hesitate to ask questions and make sure you understand your

## Manmade barriers blocking access to TB care

We must walk the talk on the promise to end TB and deliver on sustainable development 'where no one is left behind'. There is no excuse for inaction as clock is ticking fast

 $I^{
m t}$  is not natural disasters (like hurricanes or storms) which block access to TB care services most times, but manmade barriers that fuel injustices, inequities, greed, and risk factors that put people at risk of TB disease and death.

Since these are manmade barriers, it is we who have to unmake them if we are to walk the talk on the promise to end TB and deliver on sustainable development 'where no one is left behind'. There is no other choice because it is a human rights imperative to end TB and deliver on #HealthForAll and #SDGs. And there is no excuse for inaction as clock is ticking: Only 21 months left to end TB in India, and 81 months left to end TB globally

But if justice and equality can become centre-stage in our world - from the point-ofview of the least served, least represented and least visible communities - and if they are served first with respect and equity, then perhaps we can avert a social uprising to get a just access to health and development for everyone.

But then this is a big 'but'!
"We have allowed inequities to mar the TB response," said Dr Lucica Ditiu, Executive Director of Stop Partnership. Old TB guidelines of the past years will show how drug-resistant TB, or TB in children were on the blindspot in the Global South. But richer nations of the Global North were diagnosing and treating them back then. "We cannot



have double standards," rightly said Dr Lucica Ditiu, who was speaking at the 2024 World Social Forum (WSF 2024) in Nepal.

### **LISTEN TO THE ONES**

WE SERVE But are we finding TB, treating TB and preventing TB everywhere with the best of tools science has gifted us? Why is 140+ years old microscopy still being used in high TB burden nations to screen and diagnose TB? Why are older, longer, less effective, more toxic treatment regimens still being used? Why is TB prevention on the backseat? Preventing people with latent TB from progressing to active TB disease is possible with the best of available treatments. along with addressing TB risk factors, like malnutrition, tobacco, alcohol, HIV, diabetes, among others. governments not committed to deliver on addressing them

"We must secure the same equitable access to TB care services for everybody. We cannot do this equitably and justly unless we create the processes and systems to embrace everybody by listening to the ones we serve," said Dr Lucica Ditiu at WSF 2024.

#### WHY IS A MISSING

Is it not high time to set (A)ccountability if even one TB death is a death too many? Despite having highly accurate molecular tests to diagnose TB early, shorter effective and more treatments (1 month regimen for latent TB, 4 months for drug-sensitive TB, and 6 months for drug-resistant TB), and scientific evidencebacked know-how to prevent TB, who is responsible for at least 10.6 million people who suffered from TB disease globally in 2022, out of which 1.3 million died?

Science has gifted us tools to test, treat and prevent TB but added Mitra.

are we using them? "Science has never been at fault, but implementation has been lacking," said Professor (Dr) Rajendra Prasad, Dr BC Roy National Awardee.

Richer nations, like Australia for example, were able to deploy age-old tools in 1960s-1970s to screen everyone and find all TB, treat all TB and prevent all TB. The rate of TB in some of the richer nations is already at the much sought after elimination levels. Then why was it not replicated to fight TB in the rest of the world?

Sumit Mitra, President of Molbio Diagnostics wondered that when less than a quarter of the world's population lives in the Global North (richer nations) then why do those in the Global North have decision-making powers when it comes to global health - especially when health challenges are way more profound in the Global South?

What works really well in the Global North may not work well in the South. Health technologies conceived, designed, and manufactured in the Global North, and funded mostly by the Global North, are being rolled out in the Global South in a way those sitting in the North decide, said Mitra.

"I have every right to demand the best possible diagnosis and treatment. Just because someone is born in the Global North, her/ his/ their right to a healthy life is not in any way higher than mine,'

#### **THE DEADLY DIVIDE IN 2024**

WHO's highest level initiative Find. Treat. All (first launched in 2018) calls upon all countries to replace microscopy underperforms diagnosing TB) 100% with WHO recommended highly accurate molecular tests by 2027. But only 47% of those with TB disease got a molecular test diagnosis in 2022 as per the WHO Global TB Report 2023.

If we use a bad test that underperforms (like diagnosing microscopy) we will miss TB even among those who take that test. These people who are not accurately and timely diagnosed unnecessarily due to TB, as well as the infection keeps spreading from one person to another. Making upfront molecular test diagnosis to all those who take a TB test is essential entry gate to TB

care pathway. At least one-third of the estimated people with TB globally are not notified to TB programmes. Let us take the best of existing TB services equitably to the communities (and closer to the people) in high TB burden settings with dignity and respect. Linking all those diagnosed with effective and best of WHO recommended treatments is vital.

## Kane sets scoring records

## Man City, Coventry reach FA Cup semis

Manchester City is banking on Wembley Stadium being a key staging post in its pursuit of a second straight treble of major trophies. One of a possible three late-

season trips to English soccer's national stadium was booked when City reached the semifinals of the FA Cup on Saturday.

If that came as no real surprise, second-tier Coventry's progress to the last four certainly did.

Man City ousted Newcastle with a 2-0 victory secured by two deflected shots by Bernardo Silva in the first half. Pep Guardiola's team has now advanced to the FA Cup



semifinals for six straight seasons, an unprecedented achievement in the 153-year history of the competition. The day's drama came a few hours earlier at Molineux as Coventry scored two goals deep into stoppage time to beat Wolverhampton 3-2 and reach the semifinals for the first time since 1987 - the year the team won the cup.

United States striker Haji Wright completed remarkable comeback in the 10th minute of added-on time, three minutes after Ellis Simms - with his second goal of the game - equalized for Coventry. Sitting in eighth place in the Championship, Coventry was the lowest-ranked team to get to the quarterfinals. The club from central England has

endured a turbulent and financially rocky past couple of decades since relegation from the Premier League in 2001 but can look forward to another trip to Wembley, where it lost the Championship playoff final to Luton at the end of last season.

It also gives Mark Robins, Coventry's manager, another magical FA Cup moment. Robins likely saved Alex Ferguson from getting fired three years into his storied tenure as Manchester United manager by scoring the winner in an FA Cup third-round match against Nottingham Forest midway through the 1989-90 when season, Ferguson was under severe

Harry Kane has never scored so many league goals. The England captain claimed his 31st Bundesliga goal on Saturday to help Bayern Munich to a 5-2 win at last-place Darmstadt.

Kane headed in Joshua Kimmich's cross before the break to set the record for goals in a debut Bundesliga season. Uwe Seeler scored 30 goals for Hamburg in the inaugural Bundesliga in 1963-64. Kane also eclipsed his previous best mark of 30 league goals in a season achieved with Tottenham in the Premier League in 2018 and again last season. But Kane's afternoon ended in

## Vinícius scores twice in easy win at Osasuna

Days after being targeted by racist taunts before games not even involving his team, Vinícius Júnior scored twice to lead Spanish league leader Real Madrid to a dominant 4-2 win at Osasuna on Saturday.

Vinícius, who is Black, has endured racist insults during away games especially over the last two seasons. This week he was subjected to racist chants by groups of fans gathered outside the stadiums of Atletico Madrid and

Barcelona before Champions League games. Atletico played Inter Milan, and Barcelona played Napoli.

Vinícius asked on social media for the acts to not go unpunished, adding "It's a sad reality that happens even in games where I'm not present!"

Players wore T-shirts promoting a league Spanish anti-racism campaign before kickoff for the day's games. Local media reports said some fans at El Sadar Stadium chanted "Die Vinícius" after he celebrated his second goal by



holding a hand to his ear while facing the stands. The referee's report made no mention of any

incidents involving fans. Brazil forward Vinícius was unfazed on the field in Pamplona, scoring Madrid's fourth-minute opener and adding a fourth goal to complete the rout. Dani Carvajal and Brahim Díaz also scored for the visitors, which picked apart Osasuna's high defensive line.
"I congratulated Vini Jr. Because

he played an extraordinary game," Carlo Ancelotti said after the coach's 200th win with Madrid. "He is a very dangerous player and everyone knows it. Rival fans jeer him and opposing players give him kicks, although today everything was correct and by the rule book. Madrid moved 10 points ahead of Girona with nine games left after the Catalan side stumbled again with a 1-0 defeat at Getafe.

Vinícius has scored six goals in a four-game scoring streak across all competitions. He is playing his best just as Madrid is preparing to face Manchester City in the Champions League quarterfinals next month.

"The entire team played a great game, not just me, said Vinícius, who had opportunities to make it a hat trick. "I don't think as much about the goals I scored as I do about the chances I missed."

Vinícius will miss next round's home game against Athletic Bilbao as he serves a one-game suspension for picking up a fifth yellow card for protesting a decision by the referee.

Madrid was without Jude Bellingham, who leads the league with 16 goals, as he completed a two-game suspension.

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
