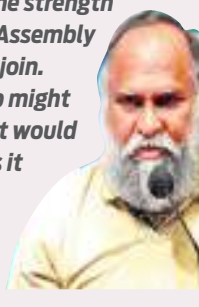

Chief Minister Revanth Reddy said that the election campaign has ended and that he will focus on governance from now on.

The CM said he would raise money by setting up a 'Farmers Welfare Corporation' and implement the loan waiver scheme. He made it clear that he would waive farm loans in one go.

He said the government will convene a State Level Bankers' Committee (SLBC) meeting and will give a guarantee for farmers' loans. The CM said the government will take loans under the Fiscal Responsibility and Budget Management (FRBM) Act to fund the loan waiver scheme.

The CM said he doesn't care about criticism by the opposition and that the opposition had criticised the Congress government for not giving Rythu Bandhu funds in full. However, the opposition is now taking credit for the government

'Making Hyd Union Territory is closed chapter'

Commenting "If Metro Rail is sold by L&T, what will we do?" Chief Minister Revanth Reddy said that making Hyderabad a Union Territory is a closed chapter.

"If someone wants Hyderabad made a Union Territory there is no one who lacks intelligence like him. We will develop Warangal like Hyderabad and will build an airport there," the CM said.

Delhi court extends Kavitha's judicial custody till May 20

A Delhi court on Tuesday extended the judicial custody of BRS leader K Kavitha, who has been arrested in a money laundering case related to alleged excise policy scam also involving Delhi chief minister Arvind Kejriwal, till May 20.

Special Judge for ED and CBI cases, Kaveri Baweja, passed the order after Kavitha was produced before the court on expiry of her judicial custody granted in the case earlier. The judge, meanwhile, also reserved for May 20 the order on whether to take cognisance of a fresh charge sheet filed by the Enforcement Directorate (ED) in the case.

During the hearing on Tuesday, the central probe agency told the judge that there was sufficient evidence in the prosecution complaint, ED's equivalent to a charge sheet, against Kavitha to put her on trial.



Lawyers cannot be sued for 'deficiency in service': SC

In a significant verdict, the Supreme Court on Tuesday held the lawyers do not come within the purview of Consumer Protection Act and cannot be sued for "deficiency in service" before the consumer courts.

The top court said a considerable amount of direct control is exercised by the client over the manner in which an advocate renders his services during the course of his employment. The services hired or availed of an advocate would be that of a contract "of personal service" and would, therefore, stand excluded from the definition of "service", it said. A bench of justices Bela M Trivedi and Pankaj Mithal said the legal profession is sui generis (unique) and the nature of work is specialised and cannot be compared with other professions.



"A service hired or availed of an advocate is a service under 'a contract of personal service', and therefore would fall within the exclusionary part of the definition of 'Service' contained in Section 2 (42) of the Consumer Protection Act, 2019. A complaint alleging 'deficiency in service' against Advocates practising legal profession would not be maintainable under the Consumer Protection Act, 2019," the bench said.

The judgment came on a plea filed by the bar bodies and other individuals challenging a 2007 verdict of the National Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission (NCDRC), which has ruled that advocates and their services come under the purview of the Consumer Protection Act, 1986.

The top court said the object of the Consumer Protection Act was to provide to the consumers timely and effective administration and settlement of their disputes.

"If the services provided by all the professionals are also brought within the purview of the Act, there would be flood-gate of litigations in

the commissions/forums established under the Act, particularly because the remedy provided under the Act is inexpensive and summary in nature," the bench said.

Observing that the legal profession cannot be equated with any other traditional professions, the bench said it is not commercial in nature but is essentially a service-oriented and noble profession.

"It cannot be gainsaid that the role of Advocates is indispensable in the Justice Delivery System. An evolution of jurisprudence to keep our Constitution vibrant is possible only with the positive contribution of the Advocates. The Advocates are expected to be fearless and independent for protecting the rights of citizens, for upholding the Rule of law and also for protecting the Independence of Judiciary."

Fate of BJP, Cong depends on BRS' performance in LS poll

In the Lok Sabha election battle between the Congress and the BJP in Telangana which party is going to win double-digit seats? Both the Congress and the BJP are assessing their winning chances based on polling trends.

In Telangana, there are 17 Lok Sabha constituencies and in the 2019 Lok Sabha elections the Congress won three seats and the BJP four seats. This time, both parties are confident of winning double-digit seats.

Out of the 17 seats, in Hyderabad, both the Congress and the BJP have no chance of winning as the AIMIM is likely to retain this seat.

Political analysts say that the Congress has a better chance than the BJP to win double-

digit seats.

BJP sources say that they are going to win Malkajgiri, Secunderabad and Chevella. In Karimnagar, Nizamabad and Zaheerabad the BJP thinks that they have a better chance.

Congress sources say that they will win Khammam, Nalgonda, Bhongir, Nagarkurnool, Warangal and Mahabubabad. In Peddapalli, Adilabad and Mahabubnagar there is a neck-and-neck race between the Congress and the BJP.

Most political observers say the Congress is going to win more seats than the BJP. While Congress leaders are saying that they are going to win 12 seats, BJP leaders are saying that they will win eight seats.

The Congress and the BJP are going to improve their tally in the current Lok Sabha elections compared to the 2019

elections. The BRS is going to lose heavily in this Lok Sabha election.

During the 2019 LS elections, the BRS won nine seats, but this time it may win Medak if it gets a good majority in Siddipet and Gajwel Assembly constituencies represented by T. Harish Rao and K. Chandrasekhar Rao respectively.

The results in other Lok Sabha constituencies, that is, whether the Congress or the BJP will win, depend on the BRS's performance. The BRS is going to decide the fate of the Congress and BJP candidates.

A senior Congress leader said if they win eight or nine seats it would be a good show. In the Assembly elections, the Congress won more than 50 per cent of the seats. In the Lok Sabha elections if the Congress wins eight or nine seats it is

Crisis likely in August if CM fails to waive farm loans: Laxman

ALLEGES THAT BRS LEADERS MAY JOIN CONGRESS TO PROTECT THEIR ILLEGAL ASSETS

The BJP's Rajya Sabha MP, Dr G. Laxman, said that people are now discussing a possible August crisis if Chief Minister Revanth Reddy fails to waive farm loans by August 15.

He also commented that it is certain that the BRS would merge with the Congress and that BRS leaders would join the Congress to protect their illegally earned wealth. Addressing the media on Tuesday at the State BJP office, Laxman said that the BRS cannot survive as people are angry with the family rule of the BRS.

He said the BJP would emerge as the new political force in Telangana and that the BJP would become as strong as the Congress and the BRS.



Laxman said that the Revanth government has also been following the footsteps of the KCR government and had contracted debts of Rs 16,000 crore in just five months. Power cuts have started and there is no clarity in the Congress government regarding irrigation, he said.

fully contested the last Lok Sabha election against Sonia Gandhi.

Rahul Gandhi was earlier an MP from Amethi but had lost to Smriti Irani in 2019 Lok Sabha polls.

Expect star campaigners to lead by example: EC

The Election Commission on Tuesday said it expects star campaigners, particularly of the national parties, to lead by example in the remaining three phases of the Lok Sabha polls and not vitiate the delicate fabric of society.

The commission also said that it is "primarily" the responsibility of the leaders to "correct the course" of their statements or utterances in the remaining phases of the ongoing election.

The statement comes against the backdrop of the poll authority issuing show-cause notices to BJP president J P Nadda and Congress chief Mallikarjun Kharge on complaints of model code violations by Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Congress



leader Rahul Gandhi. "At the outset, Commission expects top leaders of political parties, especially of the major national parties, most of whom are star campaigners, to set good examples

of campaign discourse expected of them in the current elections," the EC statement said. It is primarily the leaders' responsibility to correct the course of their statements "to avoid any permanent dent on the delicately balanced social fabric of the coun-

try", the EC said.

Coming out with its second report on the enforcement of the Model Code of Conduct since the March 16 announcement of the Lok Sabha election, the poll panel said it has disposed of over 90 per cent of complaints and no major complaint from parties was pending, except some by the Congress and the BJP.

"With about two months completed since the Model Code of Conduct (MCC) came into effect, campaign by various political parties and candidates at constituency level has largely remained violence free, less noisy, less cluttered and intrusive, free of inducement," the commission added. It said nearly 425 major complaints excluding canvassing-related or clarificatory complaints.

'Cong plotting to send Ram Lalla to tent again'

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Tuesday attacked the Congress, accusing it of indulging in "shameful" politics and plotting to send "Ram Lala to tent" again.

Alleging that the JMM, Congress and INDIA bloc have become the biggest model of corruption, appeasement and dynastic politics, Modi said he has resolved to free India from these vices.

Addressing a public meeting at Jharkhand's Giridih, the prime minister said, "Shameful statements are being issued by Congress leaders over Ram temple. Their leaders are plotting to send Ram Lala to the tent once again, and talk against the Supreme Court judgement."

The old idol of Ram Lala was kept in a tent-like structure after the Babri Masjid was demolished.

They want to lock the premises again, he claimed and urged people to oust such "corrupt" forces.

Modi said, "Congress forced the nation to Naxalism, whereas BJP contained Naxal violence in the country." He also promised that during his third term as the prime minister, he would wipe out "Naxalism and terrorism" from the face of the country. Modi alleged that the JMM-led ruling alliance in Jharkhand has been patronising infiltrators in the state. He said his topmost priority would be giving priority to deprived people.

PM Modi files nomination papers in Varanasi

Sporting a white kurta-pajama and a blue sadri, Modi reached the district collectorate after a busy morning, which included an aarti on the banks of the Ganga at the Dashashwamedh ghat and prayers at the city's Kaal Bhairav temple.

Immediately after filing his papers, the prime minister headed for the Rudraksha Convention Centre to address local party leaders and workers.

The prime minister also said that the abrogation of Article 370 in Jammu & Kashmir is one of the biggest steps in the interest.

The ED on Friday filed the nearly 200-page prosecution complaint along with annexures under the provisions of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

Kavitha, an MLC of the Bharat Rashtreeya Samithi (BRS) party, three employees of a company that handled AAP's assembly election campaign in Goa (Chariot Productions Media Pvt Ltd) -- Damodar Sharma, Prince Kumar and Chanpreet Singh -- and a former employee of India Ahead news channel Arvind Singh have been named as accused in the latest charge sheet, sources said.

The federal agency had arrested 46-year-old Kavitha, the daughter of former Telangana chief minister K Chandrashekar Rao, from her Banjara Hills residence in Hyderabad on March 15.

Chanpreet was arrested on April 15 and it was alleged by the agency that he "managed" cash funds for AAP's Goa poll

campaign in 2022.

The three Chariot Productions employees too were allegedly involved in the movement and handling of "bribe" funds paid by the 'South Group' through 'Angadiyas' and hawala route for the party's Goa campaign, according to the agency.

Arvind Singh, the commercial head and production controller of India Ahead, was arrested by the CBI in this case in May last year for alleged transfer of funds considered "kickbacks" of this "scam". This is the seventh charge sheet filed by the ED in this case in which it has arrested 18 people so far, including Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal, who was given interim bail by the Supreme Court on Friday. The ED has alleged that Kavitha was a key member of the 'South Group' that has been accused of paying the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) alleged kickbacks of Rs 100 crore in return for a big share of liquor licences in the national capital.

loans, and distribution of superfine rice, books, notebooks, uniforms etc as the academic year will start soon.

He said the government will concentrate on crop investment (Rythu Bharosa scheme) and Minimum Support Price (MSP) issues. He said the government would supply more essentials at low prices and provide superfine rice to the public through ration shops.

The CM said the government will purchase nine items from farmers and distribute them to the public through ration shops. The government will examine what goods can be supplied like this.

Citizens lost over Rs 127 cr in April

In the latest episode a woman dentist cheated of Rs 1.45 lakh

A Hyderabad woman dentist has fallen prey to an alleged cybercriminal and lost Rs 1.45 Lakh.

She said that she followed a page on Instagram and from there she contacted Rebecca on whatsapp. During their conversation Rebecca said that she was working as a recruiting manager in the Amazon partner platform and they were looking to recruit for a part-time job.

Rebecca instructed the dentist to register on their app and provided link with an invitation code. Subsequently, she was directed to contact another person on Telegram with a user ID. The ID contacted Bablu Kumar and he instructed the victim to complete certain tasks by paying amounts for specific orders



and sharing screenshots upon completion. Initially, the victim completed tasks and received commission payments.

However, the demands for additional payments escalated with promises of larger profits. After making payments

totaling Rs 1,46,195, the victim realised that it was a fraud.

The alleged cybercriminals only returned Rs 480 to her, claiming virtual profits that were never realised.

After realising that she has

been deceived by fraudsters, she filed a police complaint. The police registered a case under the sections of 420 IPC, 66-D IT Act.

In the month of April the people of Telangana lost more than Rs 127 crore to cybercriminals. People were cheated of Rs 44 crore in the Cyberabad commissionerate, Rs 38 crore in Hyderabad commissionerate and Rs 18 crore in Rachakonda commissionerate.

Though the cyber police are creating awareness to the netizens, still most people are falling into this trap and losing money and lives. Cyber crime police advising that people losing money by cyber crimes can report in www.cybercrime.gov.in or the call 1930. They can also report to TSCSB toll free number 8712672222.

Bone stuck near elderly patient's heart removed

Doctors at the Kamineni Hospital successfully removed a mutton bone stuck in the esophagus of a senior citizen.

The bone had been causing severe complications for over a month, including esophageal ulcers. This complex procedure was performed endoscopically by Dr Radhika Nittala, avoiding the need for major surgery.

Sriramulu, a native of Yadadri Bhuvanagiri district, faced difficulty in taking food properly. While attending a marriage, he consumed mutton, inadvertently swallowing a 3.5-centimeter long bone. Initially experiencing chest pain a few days later, Sriramulu sought medical advice from local doctors, who misdiagnosed the issue

as gastric trouble.

Persistent pain led him to seek further consultation at Kamineni Hospital in Narketpally, where an endoscopy revealed the bone stuck in his esophagus. The case was then referred to LB Nagar Kamineni Hospital for specialized care. Dr. Radhika Nittala, Consultant Medical Gastroenterologist, and her team undertook the challenge of removing the impacted bone using an endoscopic procedure.

Dr Radhika Nittala detailed the intricacies of the case: "Sriramulu's condition was severe due to the prolonged presence of the impacted bone, which had pierced the esophageal wall very close to the heart, causing ulcers. The bone's proximity to the pericardium required meticulous handling

during the endoscopic procedure to avoid further complications i.e. perforation."

Following the procedure, Dr. Nittala stressed the importance of timely medical intervention in such cases. "Had the bone not been removed in time, the ulcer would have completely pierced the esophagus causing perforation and necessitating major surgery. We managed to avert these risks through careful endoscopic maneuvering while its removal," she explained.

Post-procedure, Sriramulu was advised to follow a strict dietary regimen to facilitate recovery. "We recommended a liquid diet initially, including coconut water, to allow the ulcers to heal. He is now relieved from pain and has progressed to eating soft diet," Dr. Nittala added.

'Modi's political journey based solely on anti-Muslim politics'

Telangana likely to experience rains over next five days

The Indian Meteorological Department-Hyderabad (IMD-H) on Tuesday issued a yellow alert and predicted rainfall for the next five days.

For Wednesday, the department forecasted rainfall in all districts; however, there is no yellow alert for Medak district.

On May 16, all districts except Malkajgiri, Hyderabad, Rangareddy, Bhuvanagiri, Narayanpet, Jogulamba Gadwal, and Wanaparthy are likely to receive rainfall.

All districts of Telangana except Narayanpet, Mahabubnagar, Jogulamba Gadwal, Nagarkurnool, Nalgonda, and Suryapet, Khammam, and Kothagudem will receive rainfall.

In Hyderabad, the maximum temperature has dropped to as low as 32.5 degrees Celsius, recorded in Khammam district.

Mulugu, Kothagudem, Bhuvanagiri, Malkajgiri, Vikarabad, Rangareddy, Narayanpet, Mahabubnagar, Jogulamba Gadwal, Wanaparthy, Nagarkurnool, Nalgonda, Suryapet, Khammam, and Kothagudem will receive rainfall.

As per a report by the Telangana State Development Planning Society (TSDPS), the maximum temperature in the state has dropped to as low as 32.5 degrees Celsius, recorded in Khammam district.

In Hyderabad, the maximum temperature has dropped to as low as 35.2 degrees Celsius, recorded in Bandlaguda.

The rainfall forecasted by IMD Hyderabad is likely to further lower the temperature in the state.

Broiler egg prices go up in TG as summer hits production

The broiler egg has become costlier in Telangana with the retail sellers selling each egg at a price between Rs 6.50 and 7.

Besides the chicken prices, which costs Rs 270-300 a kg, the price of broiler egg has gone up by 90 paise.

The price of each broiler egg has now reached Rs 5.35 up from Rs. 4.45 paise on April 13. The retailers adding their profit sell each egg between Rs 6.50 and Rs 7. The increase in prices is burning a hole in the pockets of families depending on eggs for nutritional support.

The traders attribute the

increase in egg prices to the demand-supply mismatch. With the mercury going up, the broiler hen unable to bear with the rise in temperature dying in large numbers, affecting the egg production.

Because of the shortage of the eggs, the price has gone up.

The poultry traders feel that the customers should wait for at least two months for the prices to come down. The broiler egg production would improve as the temperature cools in monsoon season ruling out death of broiler birds in large numbers. The supply of eggs to market will increase, bringing the prices under control, they said.



Heart attack claims five lives in Telangana on polling day

On the day of polling for Lok Sabha elections held on Monday, at least five persons, in separate incidents, died in Telangana. The deceased includes two officers on election duty.

Besides the duo, three persons who went to polling booths to exercise their right to vote died of a heart attack. According to details, Poluri Srikrishna, 50, works as senior assistant in ZP High School in BhadradiKothagudem. As part of election duty, he was posted in the polling booth set up at Nehru Nagar school in Perayagudem panchayat of

Aswaraopetamandal of Khammam district. He suffered chest pain around 9.45 am. He was immediately rushed to the nearby government hospital where doctors declared him dead on arrival.

In another incident, Mohammad Sadiq, 35, of Dharpalli in Nizamabad district went to the CMC at Ditchpally to lie of his mother Mohamuda Ali, VRA, who has been indisposed to discharge election duty. In the process, he suffered heart attack. He was immediately rushed to a private hospital where he died on Monday night undergoing treatment there.

Commenting on the death, Tahsildar said that Sadik was not allotted election duty, but he came to the CMC and suffered heart attack and died calling the incident as painful.

A voter, identified as Kali Nageswara Rao, 58, of Vedantapuram village of Aswaraopetamandal went to the polling booth in the village to exercise his right to vote but suffered heart-attack and died.

In another incident, Ippakayala Sarojini, 75, of Cheryala of Siddipet district, collapsed after exercising her right to vote at Peddammagadashool polling booth. She was rushed to the

local hospital, where doctors declared her dead due to heart attack.

In Narsimhulupetamandal of Mahabubabad district, DontuVeeramma, 55, of Kommulavancha village exercised her right to vote at a local booth and reached home when she collapsed and died of heart attack. In a bizarre incident, a teacher Vipul Reddy who went to Andarband polling booth in Tamsi Mandal of Adilabad district on Monday to discharge election duty. But, he was bit by a snake. He was rushed to the RIMS hospital, where he is undergoing treatment. Doctors declared him to be out of danger.

MBT spokesperson injured in road accident

Task cut out for the next govt in AP: Balancing welfare & progress

Regardless of which party or combine wins in the just-concluded Assembly (and Lok Sabha) elections in Andhra Pradesh, the task is cut out for the next government: balancing costly welfare measures with non-negotiable development of the state. Otherwise, from the standpoint of this crucial balance, it will take some time for people to feel the victory.

As things stand, every citizen in AP has to bear his or her share of the state's financial burden to the tune of Rs.2 lakhs, as per estimates. Further borrowings for funding welfare schemes, whether new or expanded ones, without there being any parallel asset creation, will only complicate

Pin Point matters. The promises concerning welfare measures made by various parties to woo marginalized sections for retaining or attaining power do not portend a robust fiscal system in the years ahead.

Most of the beneficiaries of welfare schemes have no idea of the larger implications of the substantial (borrowed) money credited to their accounts, impairing the state's fiscal health. As Andhra Pradesh has already gotten neck-deep into a debt trap due to indiscriminate borrowings, there is dire need for taking a serious look at the debt position on a point-to-point basis. Given the scale of borrowings by AP, it is just impossible to clear them over five years for any government.

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So, fiscal prudence should be almost a custom for the government to borrow for meeting even its day-to-day needs, with government employees receiving their monthly salaries once in about 40 days. Fifteen chief ministers have ruled the combined Andhra Pradesh state since 1952. Unlike in the past, in residual

AP, government employees are getting their salary normally on the 10th of every month. No wonder, one political party included an assurance in its election manifesto that, should it come to power, salaries

would be paid before the 5th of every month.

Nowadays governments have almost forgotten their duty to create public assets in the state that would benefit succeeding generations. They think it is enough if they distribute funds to the beneficiaries of welfare schemes. The present government headed by YSR Congress Party has poured Rs.2.80 lakh crore into welfare schemes, with the money being credited directly to the bank accounts of beneficiaries. In other words, not a rupee from this huge amount would come back to the exchequer in any form. At a time when the state is reeling under drought conditions without proper irrigation facilities for the farm sector, the construction of the Polavaram multi-

purpose project has taken a back seat reportedly for want of funds. This project alone is capable of catering to the needs of the entire state, including irrigation and drinking water supply.

Being a lower riparian state of River Godavari, Andhra Pradesh can utilise nearly 1,000 tmc of water and earn hundreds of crores of rupees in the form of agricultural cess from the farm sector through an organized irrigation system. Just 20% of the huge amount of Rs.2.80 lakh crore spent on welfare schemes is needed for completion of the Polavaram project. Had successive governments been mindful of the need to complete the project on priority, it would have served as a big asset for the state, assuring better life for

future generations.

No doubt, welfare measures are essential for marginalized sections. At the same time, the state government should not be blind to the long-term needs of the state. Community development is incomplete without creation of public assets that meet common needs. Roads, community buildings, water tanks etc., cannot be dispensed with for accommodating populist schemes.

The state may take another 30 years to clear the existing debt burden if future governments work sincerely! In this backdrop, there is dire need to balance welfare measures with a proper development agenda. The next government in Andhra Pradesh would do well to keep this in mind.

No family planning surgeries in govt hospital for one and half years

Tubectomy was halted after the death four women following double puncture laaroscopic procedure

Family planning operations have been suspended for over one and half year following an incident in Ibrahimpatnam where four women died after double puncture laparoscopic (DPL) operations. Despite change in government, no steps have so far been taken to resume these operations, leaving many women waiting for essential medical procedures.

The previous government halted the operation of DPL camps after the incident in Ibrahimpatnam after four women died during DPL family planning operations on August 25, 2022. Serious action was taken by the Telangana government, including registering a criminal case against Dr Joyal Sunilkumar, who per-



formed the operations, and transferring the then District Medical Officer Dr Swarajyalakshmi. However, since then, no action has been taken to restart DPL operations.

Dr Venkateshwar Rao, District Medical Officer, assured that as soon as guidelines are received from the government, the DPL camps will be organised in the district to resume family planning operations. Currently, only tubectomy and vasectomy operations are being conducted in government hospitals.

The suspension of DPL camps has caused delays in family planning surgeries, affecting women in the district. Women are waiting for the government to organise camps and resume operations.

Due to the government's inaction, women are turning to private hospitals for family planning operations. However, this shift towards private healthcare comes with increased costs for the procedures.

Moreover, men are avoiding vasectomy operations due to misconceptions and stigma surrounding the procedure, causing delays in family planning decisions. Medical experts emphasize the need for awareness among men and women about available family planning options.

'BRS will continue its fight till Congress govt fulfil promises'

According to Meena, polling extended until 2 am at a few polling stations across the State, underlining the fervour with which voters engaged in the democratic process. He revealed that the provisional figures show a turnout of

approximately 81%, surpassing the previous 2019 record. By midnight, the polling percentage stood at 79.4%, with an additional 1.2% contributed through postal ballots, culminating in the impressive 81%.

Comparatively, the 2019 elections saw a turnout of 79.20%, with 0.60% through postal ballots, totalling 79.80%. Meena assured that comprehensive details will be available by late evening, reaffirming the current estimate of around 81%. To accommodate the

extended polling hours, new Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs) were deployed in centres where voting persisted past midnight, with mock polling conducted in approximately 20 centres.

Instances of polling till midnight were observed in various locations, including Chintala Colony in Tiruvuru (SC) Assembly segment, Gotivada Agraharam in Madugula Mandal of Anakapalli district, and Bheemunipatnam in Padmanbham Mandal of Visakhapatnam district.

GANHRI postpones reaccreditation of National Human Rights Institutions again

The Global Alliance of National Human Rights Institutions (GANHRI) has deferred the reaccreditation of NHRC, India for the second year in a row. Geneva-based GANHRI, through its Sub-Committee on Accreditation (SCA), is responsible for reviewing and accrediting NHRIs (National Human Rights Institutions) in compliance with the Paris Principles. It is a "rigorous, peer-based process, undertaken by representatives of NHRIs from each of the four regions: Africa, Americas, Asia Pacific and Europe", according to the website of GANHRI. GANHRI has deferred the reaccreditation of NHRC (National Human Rights Commission) during its review meeting recently, sources said. Last year, the review of the NHRC, India, which was due in March 2023 for its reaccreditation, had been deferred for a year, they said. The deferral means no final decision has been taken as yet, a source said.



Hit-and-run case turns out to be murder in Goa, two held

Police on Tuesday arrested two persons hailing from Uttar Pradesh for allegedly murdering a man in the guise of a hit-and-run accident in North Goa district, an official said. Superintendent of Police (North) Akshat Kaushal told reporters here that the accused, Rohit Singh and Abhishek Singh, allegedly killed one Devidas Konadkar at Pernem in the district on Monday night over a petty dispute and tried to pass it off as a hit-and-run case. Kaushal said the duo chased the victim who was on a two-wheeler, hit him from behind and ran their pick-up van over him before fleeing the spot. The two men ran into a nearby forest, but local residents who saw the incident caught them and handed them over to the police who placed them under arrest, he said. During investigation it turned out to be a case of murder, the police said. The SP said the murder was a fallout of a petty quarrel between the victim and the accused near the Mopa International Airport.



1995 verdict bringing doctors under CPA requires reconsideration: SC

The Supreme Court on Tuesday said its 1995 judgement which brought the medical profession within the ambit of Consumer Protection Act needs to be reconsidered.

A bench of Justices Bela M Trivedi and Pankaj Mithal said the decision of the three-judge bench deserves to be revisited and considered by a larger bench.

"In our humble opinion, the said decision deserves to be revisited having regard to the history, object, purpose and the scheme of the Consumer Protection Act and in view of the opinion expressed by us hereinabove to the effect that neither the 'Profession' could be treated as 'business' or 'trade' nor the services provided by the 'Professionals' could be treated at par with the services provided by the Businessmen or the Traders, so as to bring them within the purview of the CP Act," the bench said.

The bench referred the



matter to the Chief Justice of India for his consideration.

In 1995, the Supreme Court delivered a decision in Indian Medical Association Vs VP Shantha case which brought the medical profession within the ambit of a service as defined in Section 2(1)(o) of the Consumer Protection Act, 1986.

Section 2(1)(o) of the Act defines the word "service" to mean a "service of any description, which is made

available to potential users and includes, but not limited to, the provision of facilities in connection with banking, financing, insurance, transport, processing, supply of electrical or other energy, boarding or lodging or both, housing construction, entertainment, amusement or the purveying of news or other information, but does not include the rendering of any service free of charge or under a contract of personal ser-

vice".

The apex court's observation came while pronouncing a judgement which held that the lawyers do not come within the purview of Consumer Protection Act and cannot be sued for "deficiency in service" before the consumer courts.

The bench clarified that this does mean that the professionals could not be sued or held liable for their alleged misconduct or tortious or criminal acts.

"In the process of overall depletion and erosion of ethical values and degradation of the professional ethics, the instances of professional misconduct are also on the rise. Undoubtedly, no professional either legal, medical or any other professional enjoys any immunity from being sued or from being held liable for his professional or otherwise misconduct or other misdeeds causing legal, monetary or other injuries to his clients or the persons hiring or availing his services.

Four newborn tiger cubs die under weight of mother tigress

Four newborn tiger cubs were killed due to 'suffocation' under the weight of mother tigress in Ranchi's Bhagwan Birsa Biological Park, a zoo official said on Tuesday.

The tigress Gauri gave birth to four cubs on May 10 but it turned over the newborn cubs and under the weight of the mother all four cubs died, the zoo veterinarian OP Sahu said.

"The mother did not have child-caring experience. Gauri could not understand that she turned over her newborn cubs. The cubs died of suffocation under the weight of the mother on May 11," he said.

Dr MK Gupta of Ranchi Veterinary College, who carried out the postmortem on Monday, said, "It was evident that all four cubs died due to suffocation under mother's weight. We found pressure marks on skin of the cubs."

'No unauthorised operation by Indian military pilots in Maldives'

India on Tuesday dismissed the claim made by Maldivian Defence Minister Ghassan Maumoon, alleging that Indian military helicopter pilots stationed in the Maldives carried out an unauthorised operation in 2019.

In a statement, the High Commission of India in the Maldives asserted that Indian aviation platforms in the Maldives have always operated according to the "agreed procedures and with due authorisation."

The clarification came days after India completed the withdrawal of 76 military personnel from the Maldives following a demand by President Mohamed Muizzu. Relations between India and Maldives deteriorated since Muizzu, a pro-China leader, came to power in November last year.

Muizzu had set May 10 as the deadline for the withdrawal of the Indian military troops from his country.

Addressing a press confer-



ence here on Saturday, Defence Minister Ghassan said he knew of one of the aviation platforms undertaking an unauthorised sortie.

He narrated an incident where one of the two helicopters operated by Indian military personnel in the Maldives landed in Thimarafushi, allegedly without permission - a case, which he said, was reviewed by the Parliament's Committee on National Security Services (241 Committee), when he was a lawmaker.

However, the Indian mis-

sion dismissed the allegation. "Indian aviation platforms in the Maldives have always operated as per agreed procedures and with due authorisation from the Maldives National Defence Force (MNDFF)," the High Commission of India said.

Referring to the remarks by the Maldivian Defence Minister, the High Commission said the particular incident which saw an emergency landing at Thimarafushi on October 9, 2019, was "necessitated due to an unforeseen exigency."

No internal rift, ruling Cong is united in K'taka, asserts CM

Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah denied any internal rift within the ruling Congress and asserted that the party was united.

"Where is the rift within us? Is there a fight among us? They (BJP) saying it is different, they say it for politics...where is the internal rift?" Siddaramaiah asked reporters, responding to a question on state BJP leaders' statements that the Congress government will fall because of its internal rifts.

He said, "There is no internal rift among us. If there was internal rift, could we have done (faced) Parliament elections unitedly? There is no rift, neither inside, nor outside."

Reacting to Maharashtra Chief Minister Eknath Shinde's reported statements regarding efforts to replicate the 'Maharashtra model' to topple the Congress government in Karnataka, the CM said, "They (BJP leaders) have been making such claims for a year now."

"He (Shinde) is Maharashtra Chief Minister, instead of speaking about our government, let him save his government first," he added.

BJP President B Y Vijayendra on Monday said his party will not make any attempt to pull down this government, but he cannot now itself predict the kind of unrest that will get created within the ruling Congress, after the Lok Sabha poll results are declared.

"As the party's state President I'm saying -- BJP is successfully functioning as a responsible opposition and we will continue to do so," he said, adding that "there is no question of any operation, but we will not be responsible for the impact that the poll results will have on the ruling party."

BJP and JD(S) leaders in the state have several times predicted the collapse of the government, hinting at a possible power tussle within the Congress, amid persistent rumours about leadership change in the ruling party in the state after Lok Sabha polls or mid-way of the current Assembly's tenure.

BJP losing ground everywhere, says Kejriwal

BJP is losing ground across the country and will not win more than 230 seats all told, Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal claimed on Tuesday, as he called on the people of Haryana to start the "revolution" to unseat the saffron party-led alliance from the Centre.

Kejriwal made the remarks in a roadshow for party candidate Sushil Gupta in Kurukshetra's Pehowa, where he attacked the BJP-led Centre for his jailing, claiming it is scared of him.

This was Kejriwal's first visit to Haryana after being released on bail.

Gupta, the AAP's Kurukshetra Lok Sabha candidate, accompanied Kejriwal during the roadshow.

The Aam Aadmi Party national convener was granted interim bail till June 1 by the Supreme Court on May 10 in a money laundering case linked to the alleged Delhi excise policy scam.

Addressing a gathering during his roadshow, Kejriwal said, "On March 16, elections were announced. On March 21, they sent me to jail. This means they wanted Kejriwal to not campaign. They are scared of Kejriwal."

If Modi becomes PM again, polls won't be held: Kharge

Terming Prime Minister Narendra Modi as 'jhoonthon ka sardar', Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge on Tuesday said that if he becomes the PM again, elections will not be held in the country.

Addressing a rally here in support of Congress candidate Virendra Chaudhary, Kharge claimed that Modi had not fulfilled many of his promises.

Speaking in the presence of several INDIA bloc leaders, including Samajwadi Party (SP) national general secretary

Shivpal Yadav, the Congress president said, "The prime minister lies. Modi is a liar and I am saying it again and again that Modi is the chief of liars ('jhoonthon ka sardar')."

"If this man (Modi) comes again (as PM), there will be no elections. There will be no candidates of Dalits, tribals, backward classes or women."

Terming the elections an ideological battle, Kharge said, "We are not fighting against any individual person be it Modi or Yogi. This is not a personal fight."

"They ask what we have done in 70 years. If we did not



do anything, you could not become the PM of a democracy. You became PM as we (Congress) made the Constitution and saved democracy.

"You are trying to finish that democracy, break the Constitution. This will not happen. Dalits, tribals, back-

ward classes, farmers and intellectuals of the country will not let you break the constitution," he said.

Targeting Union Minister of Finance for state, Pankaj Chaudhary, who is also the MP from Maharajganj, Kharge said, "The person who you elected as your representative has not done any work."

"The district shares a border with Nepal and is politically important, still the district headquarter has not been connected to a railway line. In Modi's regime, a number of sugar mills vanished from here. Why is the chief minister sit-

ting silent?"

"They talk of double engines, one of which has failed and another has derailed," he said.

These double engines could do nothing as compared to the work done by former Congress prime ministers Jawaharlal Nehru and Indira Gandhi, he said.

"Their (BJP) work is only to abuse Congress which built dams, bridges and completed big projects," he said.

The Congress president hit out at the BJP government over the bullet train project. "Rs 1 lakh crore loan was taken from Japan.

Mamata can't stop CAA implementation: Amit Shah

In a bid to address concerns of the Matuas over citizenship, Union Home Minister Amit Shah assured the community that its members would get citizenship under the CAA and accused West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee of spreading falsehood about it.

Addressing a rally in Bongaon, a stronghold of the Matua community, in North 24 Parganas district, Shah asserted that Banerjee can "never stop the implementation of the CAA in the state as it is a law by the central gov-



ernment".

"No power in the world can stop my refugee brothers from becoming citizens of India. This is the promise of Modi Ji. Mamata Banerjee must

remember that citizenship falls under the exclusive authority of the central government, not the state governments," he said.

Shah accused Banerjee of "lying" and spreading "falsehood" about the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA).

"Mamata Banerjee is lying that anyone who applies for citizenship under the CAA will face problems. I have come to assure the people of the Matua community that no one will face any trouble. You will get citizenship and will be able to live with respect in the country," he said.



Only guarantee is Modi not returning to power: Mamata

Asserting that the INDIA bloc would form the next government at the Centre by winning over 300 Lok Sabha seats, TMC supremo Mamata Banerjee on Tuesday asserted that the "only guarantee is that Narendra Modi will not get a third term as the prime minister".

Addressing an election rally at Kalyani in Nadia district, the West Bengal chief minister accused the BJP of spreading falsehood on the Sandesh khali issue and tarnishing the image of women of the state.

"The only guarantee in the Lok Sabha polls is that Modi is not returning to power. The INDIA bloc would secure between 295 and 315 seats while the BJP would be restricted to a maximum of 200," she asserted.

Attacking Modi on the Sandeshkhali issue, Banerjee said, "The BJP and the PM are spreading falsehood on the

issue. The 'guarantee babu' (swipe at Modi's guarantee) is maligning West Bengal. Now, when the truth is emerging (referring to purported videos), they are asking TV channels not to show those. They are trying to hide the truth. The BJP hatched a conspiracy to tarnish the image of women of the state."

Modi, in election rallies on Sunday, had alleged that the TMC was "attempting to conceal its past misdeeds" in Sandeshkhali, where ruling party leaders have been accused of sexual assault and land-grabbing. Multiple purported videos recently surfaced on social media that claimed that a local BJP party leader made several women of Sandeshkhali sign blank papers, which were later filled up as complaints of sexual assault against TMC leaders, and that women were paid money to participate in the protests.

Novel molecules identified to combat cancer relapse: Study

Researchers have identified three molecules that offer a promising solution that can prevent cancer relapse during treatment, according to a new study.

In cancer treatment, DNA-damaging agents are commonly used to target cancer cells thereby killing them and causing cancer remission.

However, over time, the effectiveness of these agents can diminish as cancer cells develop mechanisms to repair the damaged DNA, leading to a process commonly called chemoresistance to drugs, leading to cancer recurrence and

metastasis.

This poses a challenge to cancer therapy. The new study by researchers in two Department of Biotechnology, Government of India institutes, namely the National Institute of Biomedical Genomics (NIBMG) and the National Institute of Immunology (NII), have tackled this issue by investigating the repair mechanisms specific to cancer cells.

The study highlighted the roles of two proteins, RAD54 and BLM, in this process. RAD54 can loosen the genome aiding in gene activation, while BLM assists RAD54 in this function.



Dr. Sagar Sengupta, Director of the National Institute of Biomedical Genomics (NIBMG), explained how their research addresses why cancer cells become resistant to

chemotherapy at the genomic level.

"We focused on two proteins, RAD54 and BLM, which are involved in the process of the development of chemoresis-

tance. RAD54 helps activate genes by remodelling chromatin, and BLM assists RAD54 in this role. The RAD54-BLM complex was found to activate a group of genes (called efflux pump genes) responsible for removing anti-cancer drugs from cancer cells, a key factor in developing chemoresistance. The team also screened a large library of approved small molecules and discovered three drugs that disrupt RAD54-BLM interaction, reducing DNA repair in cancer cells and thereby making the cancer cells more sensitive to chemotherapy," he said.

The study focused on colon cancer as a model system and

involved physically screening a large library of approved drugs or small molecules to identify these promising compounds. Tests on animal models, particularly mice, treated with these molecules alongside standard chemotherapy drugs for colon cancer, showed minimal to no tumor progression.

Hence these drugs have the potential to be taken forward as adjunct therapy for colon cancer when given in addition to the known chemotherapeutic drugs to patients.

Additionally, researchers would also like to determine whether the drugs can be utilized to treat chemoresistance in other types of cancers.

Bitter ballot battle

Poll rivals are rarely known for praising one another, but the current discourse has hit rock bottom

If the choice were for selecting the more entertaining option between the ongoing IPL or Lok Sabha elections, the latter — with its innovative taunts, snide remarks, branding family members with dirty accusations, obnoxious campaigning and mudslinging — would win hands down. With this election turning out to be more brutal and bloody than normal, social media is agog with videos of politicians that would put streetside rowdies to shame. A case in point: BJP's Mandi candidate, Kangana Ranaut, took a barrage of abuses, some too explicit to be printed. Disturbingly, even star campaigners are merrily throwing decency to the winds. The recent exchange between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and leaders of the Opposition, particularly the Congress, encapsulates the bitter nature of debate. Modi accused the Opposition leaders of being "cowards, scared of Pakistan", and the Congress shamed him by calling a corporate stooge, besides warning ominously that if he won this time too, India will see no more elections. This



exchange not only underscores the intense political polarisation, but also highlights the alarming decline in campaign standards. Modi's accusation resonates with the BJP's narrative to project itself as the sole guardian of national security. Such remarks, while appealing to a certain segment of the electorate, contribute to toxic polarisation of the polity. By insinuating that the Opposition is soft on Pakistan, Modi attempts to discredit his rivals and consolidate support by tapping into jingoistic sentiments. On the other hand, the Congress response reflects the prevalent perception of the BJP Government's policies favouring big business owners. The Opposition's strategy of portraying Modi as a representative of corporate interests seeks to appeal to the concerns of the common man. However, such charges, without substantial evidence, contribute to the erosion of trust in democratic institutions and further polarise the electorate. Besides, the Opposition has time and again accused him of being autocratic without any basis. What is particularly disconcerting is the way these accusations are delivered: Personal attack, character assassination and inflammatory rhetoric have become commonplace. Instead of engaging in substantive debates on policy issues and governance, the parties resort to sensationalism and vitriol. The falling standards of campaigning are symptomatic of deeper structural issues plaguing the democratic process. The influence of money power, the proliferation of fake news and misinformation, and the erosion of institutional checks and balances have created an environment conducive to negative campaigning and polarisation. Moreover, the advent of social media has amplified the reach and impact of divisive rhetoric. Unfortunately, the Election Commission has been rather ineffective in controlling these foul-mouthed leaders. That said, it is the responsibility of all of us to ensure that the leaders do not cross the 'Laxman Rekha'. We all can ensure that by pressing the blue button on voting day.

Like many other countries, political parties in India often claim victory during elections even before official results are announced. It is part of their politics. The ongoing polls are not just another political event; they are of paramount importance, as well as the fate of several political party leaders. They have profound and far-reaching implications.

In the current scenario, the ruling BJP has declared victory that the results will meet its expectations. However, the actual outcome remains uncertain, adding a layer of suspense to the political landscape. Four of the seven-phase polling have already occurred and the remaining three will occur on May 20, 25 and June 1. The outcome of these could significantly impact the election results, which will be revealed on June 4.

According to recent opinion polls, Prime Minister Narendra Modi is predicted to secure an unprecedented third-term win in these elections. There is a debate about whether the BJP tally will increase or decrease its tally. BJP leaders, including Narendra Modi, claim the NDA, led by the BJP, will win over 400 seats in the 543-member Lok Sabha. Home Minister Amit Shah says NDA will secure 200 of the 283 seats in the first three phases. The Congress party won over 400 seats only once in 1984. Political players need a game-changing strategy as there is no apparent wave of support. To gain an advantage, the BJP has implemented five key strategies: Celebrity Candidates Fighting Polls, strengthening the Hindu base, appealing to minority groups, exploiting redrawn boundaries to maintain the Hindu vote in areas controlled by the opposition and projecting Modi magic. The Congress and its allies are making a strategic move, attempting to consolidate the Hindu subaltern.

The ongoing election witnessed a decline in voter turnout and it is still being determined whether it will recover or continue to decline. The Election Commission of India (ECI) expressed disappointment with the turnout in some metropolitan



cities, highlighting the rigid voter apathy in high-tech cities. This underscores the significance of each voter in shaping the election results.

CP Joshi, former Chief Minister of Rajasthan, lost an election by one vote. His wife and daughter missed voting while praying for his victory. This shows how even one vote can significantly impact election results. This anecdote emphasises the potential impact of even one vote on the election results. High temperatures in some parts of India may reduce election turnout. However, low turnout can sometimes harm the ruling party, as local issues can sway the outcome.

BJP aims to improve in six Indian States: West Bengal, Odisha, Telangana, Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu and Kerala. However, it could face challenges from regional parties, which have the potential to sway State elections and impact overall results. During a recent rally, Congress leader Rahul Gandhi spoke about the uncertainties in predicting election results. Congress President Mallikharjun Kharge posted a message in Hindi on

X, saying the Prime Minister attacked his friends, indicating that Modi's chair is shaking. SP leader Akhilesh Yadav tweeted that the BJP's condition will worsen after the first two voting phases. The Congress party's strategy primarily concerns social welfare and economic empowerment. This all-encompassing approach aims to address the primary concerns of the voters and has the potential to connect with a vast section of the electorate. It could significantly impact the election results if it garners the voters' support. The Congress Party's challenge is to keep its members united. Since Modi's rise, many politicians, including State leaders, have defected to the BJP. The BJP has given tickets to some of them. How voters treat these turncoats remains to be seen. Internal disputes within Congress are currently a significant concern. Allegations of connections with rival parties raise questions about loyalty. They could affect the party's unity, which could, in turn, impact their performance in the upcoming elections. Therefore, it is crucial to close-

ly monitor any developments within the party to gain a more accurate understanding of their prospects in the polls. Political leaders' connections with rival parties have raised concerns about their loyalty. Between 2016 and 2020, 170 Congress MLAs and 7 Rajya Sabha members switched parties, causing an impact on Indian politics. It has created confusion and doubts about their loyalty. The allegations could influence voters' perception of these leaders and their parties. India's Satta Bazaar predicts the BJP will win between 330 and 335 seats at Rs. 1, 350 seats at Rs. 3 and 400 seats at Rs. 12-15. The odds for the NDA to win 400 seats are Rs. 4-5. The predictions reflect the market perception of election outcomes that could impact politics. India's stock benchmarks fell by 1.5% on Tuesday as investors cut their bets, expressing concern that the BJP may not get as many seats as projected. The voters will decide the winner of the election on June 4.

Fostering innovation from schools to startups

Early education is essential for shaping future innovators and entrepreneurs so that they can drive the nation towards a bright future

The boundary between science and engineering is so narrow that it is hard to differentiate them. They are two sides of the same coin and they go hand-in-hand. Whereas science explores the fundamental principles governing the universe, engineering focuses on applying scientific knowledge to design and develop solutions that meet specific requirements. So, engineers gather more respect in front of the public, as their output is tangible. Every year, the Govt. of India celebrates National Technology Day on 11th May to commemorate the contributions of Indian scientists, engineers and innovators who act as catalysts for the country's development. This year's National Technology Day was celebrated on the theme "From School to Startups: Igniting Young Minds to Innovate", giving thrust to nurture innovation from the school period onwards. One would doubt the need to promote a startup culture in schools. As the common adage goes, the seeds of character and attitude are sown during one's school life.



When we look at the life histories of great entrepreneurs and scientists, we can see that the spark for doing something special was initiated during their school years. Elon Musk, the founder of companies like SpaceX, Tesla and Neuralink, reportedly sold a video game he created at the age of 12 and later started a web software company while attending the University of Pennsylvania. Mark Zuckerberg, the co-founder of Facebook, started coding in middle school, where he developed a messaging programme called "Zucknet" for his father's dental office. Schoolchildren possess the ability to think freely and come up with crazy ideas. The limitations of reality do not shackle their minds. They are unfettered by the comments made by others

and don't have any preconceived notions about an idea. School students also have an inherent curiosity. The insatiable curiosity drives them to seek new knowledge and experience, fueling their creativity and innovation. The quality of innovation observed in the exhibits at various school science fairs, children's science congresses and IISF's students' science village provides ample proof of this. Some of the innovations displayed by the students in these exhibitions are at par or better than what our adult scientists have achieved in their lifetime. The Department of Science and Technology has instituted INSPIRE - MANAK (Million Minds Augmenting National Aspiration and Knowledge) Awards to support student innovators. MANAK, implemented through the National Innovation Foundation - India (NIF), seeks to inspire students in grades 6 to 10 to pursue their studies. The initiative aims to focus on one million unique ideas/innovations based on scientific principles and have practical applications in soci-

ety. Its goal is to promote a culture of creativity and encourage inventive thinking among schoolchildren. Another premier scientific organisation, the CSIR, has instituted the CIASC (CSIR Innovation Award for Schoolchildren) to harness schoolchildren's creative and innovative spirit. Though initiatives like Atal Tinkering Laboratories (ATLs) by the Government of India foster curiosity, creativity and imagination in young minds, most of our schools still put more stress on the traditional mode of rote learning. Rote memorisation and standardised testing prioritise conformity over creativity, relegating innovation to the sidelines. Furthermore, the fear of failure and the pressure to excel academically discourage risk-taking and experimentation. As a result, many children are discouraged from pursuing their innovative impulses, losing their untapped potential.

A recent newspaper article caught everyone's attention, featuring an elderly woman who initiated a 'Sleep Service Center' for those struggling to find restful sleep. This compassionate woman would just engage in conversation with the person and sing a lullaby offering comfort akin to a mother lulling her child to sleep. The result? Clients emerged refreshed and rejuvenated after just half an hour of her soothing sessions. Isn't it astonishing that we now seek sleep therapists for what should come naturally? What does this say about our society? If animals and birds can sleep peacefully, why can't humans enjoy this innate gift of carefree slumber?

Sleep is the best form of relaxation, akin to meditation, that's why those who sleep well always keep well & feel well. It's a fact that if we get sound sleep during the night, we get up fresh being more active & feeling more energetic. However, in today's world getting sound sleep has become a rare occasion because today millions of people suffer from sleep disorders like sleep apnea, insomnia, restless leg syndrome, narcolepsy etc. In addition, the number of those who get a very broken, fitful sleep would be many times more. Sadly, many of these individuals resort to sleeping pills and drugs which ultimately make the problem worse. Knowing that tranquilisers are usually prescribed for insomnia and such other disorders as are due to anxiety and mental depression etc., one would say: 'Where are we heading?'



Medical science has acknowledged several causes that lead to sleep disorders. The biggest hindrance of all that contributes to sleeplessness is bad mental health. We must understand that not being able to have restful sleep is not only in itself an unhealthy condition but also causes or aggravates many other diseases. For example, it is now recognised that sleep disturbance is one of the factors that lead to coronary heart disease. But most of us would agree subconsciously that tranquilisers are not the answer to the question of sleep disturbance.

They now know well that these drugs represent a purely symptomatic approach, ignoring the underlying problems that cause these conditions. A British medical journal recently published a report about experiments that have shown that sympathy can work well in cases of sleep disorders. It further said that in one trial, the doctors, instead of giving tranquilisers as they would have normally given, spent some time with the patients and talked with them in an open atmosphere. They just had a brief chat with them, with sympathy and also gave them a few words of advice and explained to them why they had those conditions. The results of these informal chats were astounding and the follow-up assessment showed that with this replacement of allopathy by sympathy, depression in those patients dropped from a level of 80 per cent to 40 per cent. The other fact being realised is that mental depression, anxiety, etc. are mainly due to certain lifestyles, behavioural patterns and personality traits. It was also felt that the pattern of behaviour, designated as type 'A' which is characterised by competitiveness, impatience, etc., predisposes a person to coronary diseases, hypertension, etc. As a result of these new findings, doctors all over the world are now increasingly advising such patients to practise meditation and to have proper dietary patterns. It's a medically proven fact that mental ill health adversely affects one's eating habits, which in turn, drastically influences our sleep and health. Under such a medical condition, proper meditation techniques can be of great help if practised regularly. In the hustle and bustle of living a modern life, we tend to forget that it is the quality of life that matters the most & not the quantity. Hence if we jeopardise our sleep for silly reasons, we are knowingly undermining our health.

Stopping thieving through DBT

A lot of pilfering from fertiliser subsidies is happening due to policy flaws. This can be curbed if only the subsidy is given under Direct Benefit Transfer

On January 22, 2019, addressing NRIs and Indian-origin people at the inauguration of the 15th Pravasi Bharatiya Divas convention in Varanasi (Uttar Pradesh), Prime Minister Narendra Modi recalled what Rajiv Gandhi had Stated "Of the funds the Central Government sends, only 15 per cent of that reaches the people. If one rupee is sent from Delhi, only 15 paise reaches the villages, 85 paise disappear. Even as the country's middle class kept giving tax honestly, this "loot" of 85 per cent also continued". Modi added "I also want to tell you today's truth as well. We used technology to end this loot of 85 per cent completely." Elaborating on this theme, he explained: "In the last four-and-a-half years, about Rs 580,000 crore, our Government, through various schemes viz. for a home, for education, for scholarship, for gas cylinder and to other such ends etc directly gives to the people, transferring it in their bank accounts. Now, just consider that if the country was being run through the old system, then even today from this Rs 580,000 crore, about Rs 450,000 crore would have disappeared or leaked. If we would not have brought a change in the system then this amount would have been looted like the former Prime Minister had accepted..." Modi said.

That was before the 2019 General Elections. Today, when the 2024 General Elections are underway, the same discourse reverberates in the air even as the PM cites a figure that is nearly seven times. The amount spent on welfare schemes during the last ten years under the Modi - regime has gone up to a gargantuan of around Rs 4000,000 crore. Had the old system (read: before 2014) continued, the amount disappearing from the distribution pipe would have been Rs 3400,000 crore (4000,000x0.85).

What do the facts say?
The Union Government executes a plethora of welfare programs aimed at providing basic and necessary amenities and upliftment of the most disadvantaged members of society. It does so mainly through "Central Schemes" (CS) which are fully funded and implemented by it. A total of 740 CS schemes are currently under implementation. During FY2022-23, the CS

spending was Rs 1208,000 crore. In addition, there are "Centrally Sponsored Schemes" (CSS) designed to supplement the efforts of the States in achieving various socioeconomic goals and implementing national priorities. These are funded by the central Government and the States in varying proportions viz. 90:10, 60:40, 50:50 and so on depending on the scheme. These schemes are implemented by the States. During FY2022-23, the spending on a total of 50 CSSs was Rs 412,000 crore. Put together, the total expenditure of the Central Government on CS and CSS schemes during the year was Rs 1620,000 crore.

Now, if we were to apply the 85 per cent magic formula dished out by the then Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi, the amount pilfered while on the way to the beneficiaries would have been Rs 1377,000 crore. Only Rs 243,000 crore would have reached. Under the Modi - model, the entire Rs 1620,000 crore has been reached; courtesy of, the use of technology to transfer the money to their bank accounts.

How does it work?
Under its flagship Digital India program, the Modi - Government has been implementing what is popularly known as DBT (Direct Benefit Transfer) for transferring the cash benefits and subsidies 'directly' to the Aadhaar-linked bank accounts of individual eligible beneficiaries. Launched by the erstwhile UPA - Government on January 1, 2013, its use has picked up pace under Modi since January 2015. As of date, DBT is used in 314 CS schemes.

The JAM trinity (Jan Dhan, Aadhar, Mobile) is a DBT enabler the 'mover and shaker' behind its successful implementation. Today, there are around 520 million Jan Dhan Accounts, more than 1.39 billion Aadhaar cards and 1.15 billion mobile connections. With this, the money can be 'instantaneously'

transferred at the click of a mouse to tens of millions of beneficiaries spread all over the country. The DBT is free from the delays corruption and associated pilferage that was germane to the earlier arrangements under which there was human intervention, a host of intermediaries/mediators and the money was flowing through multiple layers in administrative offices.

To improve transparency, the Government has put in place the Central Plan Scheme Monitoring System (CPSMS) which ensures that all transfers to bank accounts are made strictly as per the list of eligible beneficiaries. The persons included in the list are authenticated with the use of an Aadhaar card that contains their biometric details thus removing any scope for fictitious claimants. The provision for such checks and balances has helped hugely in preventing bogus claims. As per the latest update on the DBT portal, the total savings by way of plugging leakages in the schemes due to the implementation of DBT during FY2022-23 was Rs 63,000 crore.

However, if we look at the food subsidy (the excess of the cost of procurement, handling and distribution of food over the price paid by the beneficiary/consumer), during FY2022-23, the Government was able to save over Rs 50,000 crore which works out to around 18 per cent in the total food subsidy bill of Rs 272,000 crore. This was made possible because of the "deletion of over 50 million duplicate and fake/non-existent Ration Cards".

Likewise, under the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi or PM-KISAN (, the Union Government provides income support of Rs 6,000 a year to farmers with a valid enrolment, paid in three equal cash transfers of Rs 2,000 every four months; the money is credited to their account via the DBT mode),

it was able to save over Rs 10,000 crore during FY2022-23. This is about 17 per cent of the total payment of Rs. 58,000 crores during the year. The savings were due to the deletion of over 21 million ineligible beneficiaries.

According to the DBT portal, the Government has been able to generate a cumulative saving of Rs 348,000 crore by plugging leakages since the inception of the DBT. Of this, more than half or Rs 185,000 crore are savings in the distribution of food subsidies alone.

Notwithstanding the above, there remains a huge untapped potential for garnering more savings. This is because in the initial years, neither States used Aadhaar for validation nor the Centre made it compulsory even as the latter's efforts in this regard were hamstrung due to protracted litigation in the top court. In such circumstances, a large number of 'ineligible' persons making their way to the beneficiary list was inevitable. While the Government has got rid of them in some schemes like PM-KISAN, it has a long way to go.

Meanwhile, Modi also needs to focus on areas where technology intervention alone won't help. For instance, in fertilisers, the Government asks manufacturers to sell fertiliser at a low price to farmers. The excess of the cost of supply over it is claimed by the latter from the former as a subsidy. Since the subsidy is embodied in the MRP (albeit low), the subsidised fertiliser product must reach the farmer and be used only for growing the crop. If it doesn't reach, then the benefit of subsidy is enjoyed by the person who grabs it. A lot of pilferage from fertiliser subsidies is happening due to this flaw in policy. This can be curbed if only the subsidy is given 'directly' to the farmers under DBT.

In this way, the branding of film festivals becomes a crucial factor in shaping the trajectory of filmmakers' careers and the cultural nuances of movies as a whole.

PVR INOX posts net loss of Rs 129.7 cr in Q4

Cinema exhibitor PVR INOX Ltd on Tuesday reported a consolidated loss after tax of Rs 129.7 crore in the March quarter. The company, which had posted a consolidated loss after tax of Rs 334 crore in the same quarter a year ago, said it will consider reducing overhead costs, having a leaner organisational structure and monetisation of real estate assets, among other steps as part of four key strategic priorities that have been identified for its growth strategy from a medium- to long-term perspective. Consolidated revenue from operations in the March quarter stood at Rs 1,256.4 crore. It was at Rs 1,143.2 crore in the year-ago period, PVR-INOX said in a regulatory filing. Total expenses for PVR-INOX in the quarter was Rs 1,480.7 crore. The total expenses for PVR last year was Rs 1,364.1 crore a year ago. For the fiscal year ended March 31, 2024, the consolidated loss after tax was at Rs 32.7 crore. It was Rs 336.4 crore in the year ended March 31, 2023.



Innov8 opens 271-seater co-working centre in Delhi

Co-working firm Innov8 on Tuesday said it has opened a new centre, comprising 9,500 square feet of office space and 217 desks, at Aerocity in the national capital. In a statement, Innov8 said it has invested Rs 4 crore towards the development of this co-working centre. "Aerocity's central location and thriving business community made it a perfect fit for us as we expand across Central Business Districts and transit hubs in the city," Ritesh Malik, Founder of Innov8, said. Founded in 2015, Innov8 is currently spread across nine cities - Delhi, Gurugram, Mumbai, Pune, Chennai, Bengaluru, Ahmedabad, Hyderabad and Indore, with 30-plus centres. According to real estate consultant Colliers India, the leasing of office space by flexible space operators declined 14 per cent in January-March to 1.8 million square feet from 2.1 million square feet in the year-ago period across Bengaluru, Chennai, Delhi-NCR, Hyderabad, Mumbai and Pune.



Gold declines Rs 200; silver surges Rs 800

Extending the losses for the second day in a row, gold price declined Rs 200 to Rs 72,950 per 10 grams in the national capital on Tuesday amid a fall in precious metal rates globally, according to HDFC Securities. In the previous session, the yellow metal had closed at Rs 73,150 per 10 grams. However, silver surged Rs 800 to reach Rs 86,000 mark. It had ended at Rs 85,200 per kg in the previous trade. "Spot gold prices (24 carats) in the Delhi markets are trading at Rs 72,950 per 10 grams, down by Rs 200 against the previous close," Saumil Gandhi, Senior Analyst of Commodities at HDFC Securities, said. In the overseas markets, spot gold at Comex was trading at US\$ 2,339 per ounce, down by US\$ 8 from the previous close. Gold price fell further on Tuesday as traders weighed a probable downturn in the US economy against continued inflationary pressures that might hamper the US Federal Reserve's plans to reduce interest rates this year, Gandhi added.



Rupee settles on flat note at 83.51 against US dollar

The rupee settled on a flat note at 83.51 (provisional) against the US dollar on Tuesday, as the support from positive domestic markets and favourable inflation data was negated by strong US Dollar and foreign fund outflows. Forex traders said the rupee remains under pressure due to ongoing elections as well as foreign fund outflows and the same shall subside once the results are out. At the interbank foreign exchange market, the local unit traded in a narrow range. It opened at 83.51, and touched an intraday low of 83.52 during the day. The domestic unit finally settled for the day at 83.51 (provisional), unchanged from its previous close.

Israel-India to deepen ties for greater prosperity: Israel FM

Israel and India will continue to deepen their bilateral ties and lead to greater prosperity, Foreign Minister Israel Katz said on Tuesday. Katz was responding to India's External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar's message on the occasion of Israel's 76th Independence Day. "Thank you for the warm wishes, FM @DrSJaishankar. In celebration of our Independence Day, Israel and India will continue to deepen our ties and lead to greater prosperity," Katz said in a post on X. Earlier in the morning, Jaishankar posted on X a 2:03-minute video showcasing the India-Israel relationship through photos of various bilateral meetings between

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, himself, and other Indian ministers with Israel Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and other ministers. "Congratulate FM @Israel_katz and the people of

Israel on the occasion of the 76th anniversary of Israel's Independence. Mazel Tov!" Jaishankar posted along with the video and repeated the same message in another post in Hebrew. Meanwhile, President Droupadi Murmu wished her Israeli counterpart Isaac Herzog as she said on X, "I join the people of India in conveying our best wishes to President @Isaac_Herzog, and the people of Israel on the 76th anniversary of Israel's independence." Lok Sabha speaker Om Birla too took to X to post his greetings to his counterpart Amir Ohana, the Speaker of The Knesset: "On the occasion of Israel's 76th anniversary of independence, I congratulate Speaker of the Knesset @AmirOhana and the people of Israel."

Chabahar Port to help India expand trade routes: GTRI

The development of Chabahar Port will help India enhance its logistical capabilities and expand its trade routes to Central Asia and for that there is a need to ensure necessary infrastructure, and processes to effectively manage the cargo flow at the port, economic think tank GTRI said on Tuesday. The Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI) suggested that the government stick to the fact that the Chabahar Port is not under international sanctions despite being Iran's only ocean port as despite the strategic advantages, the project's success is intricately tied to the complex geopolitical environment it operates within. India on Monday signed a 10-year contract to operate the strategic Iranian port of Chabahar. The long-term agreement was signed by



Indian Ports Global Ltd (IPGL) and the Port & Maritime Organisation of Iran. IPGL will invest about US\$ 120 million while another US\$ 250 million will be raised as debt. The Chabahar port on the Gulf of Oman, which New Delhi had proposed to develop back in 2003, will provide Indian goods a gateway to reach landlocked Afghanistan and Central Asia using a road and rail project called International North-South Transport Corridor, bypassing Pakistan. US sanctions on Iran over its suspected nuclear programme had slowed the development of the port. "India should ensure that Chabahar has the necessary infrastructure, processes, and staffing to effectively manage the cargo flow. Yet the overarching stability required for such grand-scale projects remains a significant challenge due to external political pressures and regional instabilities," GTRI Co-Founder Ajay Srivastava said.

Stock markets rise for 3rd day on buying in auto, metal shares

Benchmark Sensex climbed 328 points while Nifty closed above the 22,200 level on Tuesday as stock markets continued the winning march for the third straight day on the back of gains in index major Reliance Industries and positive inflation data. Rising for the third day, BSE Sensex rose by 328.48 points, or 0.45 per cent, to settle at 73,104.61. The 30-share index rallied 510.13 points, or 0.70 per cent, to touch a high of 73,286.26 in day trade. As many as 20 Sensex stocks ended with gains while 10 declined. The broader Nifty of NSE rose by 113.80 points, or 0.51 per cent, to settle at 22,217.85 with 36 of its constituents ending in the green and 14 in the red. Gains were led by metal and auto shares while FMCG and pharma shares declined due to

profit taking, analysts said. From the Sensex basket, Mahindra & Mahindra, Larsen & Toubro, JSW Steel, NTPC,

IndusInd Bank, Sun Pharma, UltraTech Cement, State Bank of India, Reliance Industries, and Maruti were the major gainers. Nestle, Tata Consultancy Services, Axis Bank, ICICI Bank, Bajaj Finance, ITC, and Asian Paints were among the laggards.

ADANI GROUP STOCKS RALLY
Adani group stocks were in the limelight on Tuesday, with Adani Enterprises, Adani Total Gas and Adani Power, surging more than 5 per cent each. Shares of Adani Enterprises, billionaire Gautam Adani-led group's flagship firm, rallied 5.43 per cent on the BSE. The

stock of Adani Total Gas zoomed 5.50 per cent, Adani Power surged 5.49 per cent, Adani Green Energy jumped 4.34 per cent and ACC soared 4.17 per cent. Shares of Ambuja Cements went up by 3.90 per cent, Adani Energy Solutions advanced by 3.07 per cent, Adani Wilmar (2.20 per cent), Adani Ports (1.89 per cent) and NDTV (1.87 per cent).

'Ratings on eComm sites to be positively biased'

Nearly 56 per cent of online shoppers surveyed by community social media platform LocalCircles said they found ratings on the e-commerce sites and apps to be positively biased over the last 12 months, according to survey findings. Only nine per cent of e-commerce or online users said platforms have enabled an interface to easily spot sponsored or influencer reviews and ratings, while just 16 per cent of consumers felt their negative reviews were always published in the last year. The survey assumes significance given that the government is considering making it mandatory for e-commerce companies to comply with quality norms for consumer reviews after a voluntary push failed to effectively curb fake reviews. "...56 per cent of online

shoppers surveyed by LocalCircles...say they have found ratings on the e-commerce sites/ apps to be positively biased in the last 12 months," according to a release by LocalCircles. LocalCircles said it conducted a comprehensive national survey to find out how effective voluntary standards for online reviews and ratings have been, given persistent complaints. "The survey received over 54,000 responses from users of e-commerce sites and apps located in over 344 districts of the country," it disclosed. Despite the standards that prohibit deletion of negative ratings and reviews, the percentage of e-commerce users who found that their negative ratings and reviews were not always published has risen from 45 per cent to 52 per cent in the last 12 months, the survey revealed. "Despite the controversy, 46 per cent of e-commerce users surveyed say they always referred to rating and reviews when buying while 44 per cent referred to them occasionally," it said. Further, it said, only nine per cent of e-commerce users surveyed say that all e-commerce sites/ apps have enabled an interface so they can easily identify sponsored, incentivised or influencer reviews while 46 per cent say no e-commerce sites/apps have enabled such an interface.



CBI probing MMTC coal import 'scam'

The CBI is investigating alleged corruption in MMTC's coal import from an Australian company at inflated prices, which the PSU's former CMD kept under wraps for more than 11 years, officials said on Tuesday. The probe started only after the MMTC suffered a jolt in the Supreme Court, which had ordered an arbitration case in favour of the Australian company. The MMTC had to deposit Rs 1,088 crore in the Delhi High Court. The MMTC ordered an internal vigilance enquiry into the allegations that certain officials of the PSU earned

pecuniary benefits by allowing the Brisbane-based company to charge US\$ 300 per metric tonne (valued at about Rs 615 crore) when the global commodity prices had nosedived as a cascading effect of Lehman Brothers' collapse in 2008. The glaring irregularities flagged in the vigilance report were enough for the MMTC top brass to recommend a CBI investigation. On a reference from the Commerce Ministry, the CBI registered a preliminary enquiry last year in which the role of two former senior officials was under scrutiny. The agency did not give any comments on the developments.



Moody's pegs India's FY25 GDP growth at 6.6%

Moody's Ratings on Tuesday said the Indian economy is projected to expand 6.6 per cent in the current fiscal year and said strong credit demand fuelled by robust economic growth will support the NBFC sector's profitability. "We expect India's economy to expand 6.6 per cent in the year ended March 2025 (FY25) and 6.2 per cent the following year, and this will lead to robust loan growth at NBFCs, mitigating the impact of rising funding costs on their profitability," Moody's Ratings said. The Indian economy is estimated to have expanded 8 per cent in the 2023-24 fiscal year. In a commentary on the non-banking finance companies, Moody's said robust economic conditions will help them preserve their asset quality even as rise in interest rates increase the debt burdens of their customers. "Funding costs for non-bank finance companies (NBFCs) in India are rising, but strong credit demand

fuelled by country's robust economic growth will support the sector's profitability. "Also, robust economic conditions will help them preserve their asset quality even as rises in interest rates increase the debt burdens of their customers," Moody's said. Aggregate year-on-year loan growth at NBFCs accelerated to 20.8 per cent in September 2023 from 10.8 per cent a year earlier, driven by demand for retail loans, including financing for housing and automobiles. Moody's Ratings expects loans at NBFCs to grow about 15 per cent in the next 12-18 months, driven by various types of lending, including infrastructure financing by large government-owned NBFCs and loans to small and medium-sized enterprises. "Growth in unsecured retail loans will slow after the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) raised the risk weight of such credit assets for both banks and NBFCs by 25 percentage points in December 2023," Moody's Ratings said.

Bajaj Electricals Q4 net down 43.4 pc to Rs 29 cr

Bajaj Electricals Ltd on Tuesday reported a 43.47 per cent decline in consolidated net profit to Rs 29.31 crore in the March quarter with revenue impacted by weakness in appliances and general trade. The company had posted a consolidated net profit of Rs 51.85 crore in the year-ago period, Bajaj Electricals said in

a regulatory filing. Consolidated total revenue from operations in the quarter under review was Rs 1,188.08 crore as compared to Rs 1,291.97 crore in the same period a year ago, it added. Total expenses in the fourth quarter were lower at Rs 1,186.09 crore as compared to Rs 1,231.69 crore in the corresponding period a year ago. In the fourth quarter revenue

dropped on account of weakness in appliances and general trade. Growth in fans and 'Morphy Richards' brand was offset by drop in appliances, the company said. The lighting solutions segment also witnessed a drop in revenue on account of LED price erosion in consumer lighting and higher base effect in professional lighting, it added. For the fiscal ended March



31, 2024, consolidated net profit was lower at Rs 131.08 crore as compared to Rs 216.19 crore in the previous year.

In FY24, the total revenue from operations was Rs 4,641.27 crore as against Rs 4,889.24 crore in FY23. Bajaj Electricals said its board of directors has recommended a dividend at the rate Rs 3 per share of face value of Rs 2 each for the financial year ended March 31, 2024 subject to shareholder's approval at the forthcoming annual general meeting.

Food inflation likely to remain a cause for concern due to heatwave: ICRA

The wholesale food inflation, which is at a four-month high, will continue to be a cause for concern in May and June as the heatwave is likely to jack up prices of perishable commodities, ICRA Chief Economist Aditi Nayar said on Tuesday. Although the impact of the high base of last year will play out in July and August, the effect of the monsoon will determine the price conditions in the subsequent months. As per data released on Tuesday, the wholesale



price index (WPI)-based food inflation was at a four-month high of 7.74 per cent in April. Retail food inflation also remained stubbornly high at 8.70 per cent in April 2024, as

against 3.84 per cent in April 2023. Nayar said weather is an important factor in determining the food inflation trajectory. Monsoon was not very favorable last year and this year there are heatwaves in parts of the country, she said. "With the onset of summer, prices of perishable items are charting upwards. For the next two months, we expect the food inflation to climb further and then as the base effect turns very supportive, we will end up with temporarily plunging readings in July-August this year," Nayar said.

Jindal Stainless supplies 'high-strength' steel to Vande Metro trains

Leading stainless steel manufacturer Jindal Stainless has supplied high strength stainless steel for the Vande Metro train expected to operate from July, the company said on Tuesday. The Railways had recently rolled out the Vande Metro train from the Integral Coach Factory in Chennai. The "201LN" stainless steel supplied by Jindal Stainless, makes coaches lighter and energy efficient, Jindal Stainless claimed in a statement, here, today. Vande Metro Trains are shorter distance versions of the



'Vande Bharat' express trains. Vande Metro Trains aim to serve passengers traveling distances of up to 250 kms. Vande Metro Trains are expected to connect more than 120 cities and likely to be launched in July. Some of the preliminary routes planned are Bhubaneswar-Balasoer, Agra-Mathura, Chennai-Tirupati, Delhi-Rewari, and Lucknow-Kanpur, the company statement said.

'PIND KI PUNJABI pushed me out of my comfort zone'

Actress Delbar Arya is reaching new heights with her spectacular performances in the 'Pollywood' industry. Do you not believe us? Oh, come on! The actress recently surpassed all records by finishing her forthcoming Punjabi film, *Damdaa*, in just 23 days. This is, of course, wonderful news for all Delbar fans who have been waiting to see her in film for a long time. A tiny birdie from the industry has informed us of this.

Not only that, but after achieving enormous recognition for her role with Guru Randhawa in *Downtown*, the amazing actress is going to star in Punjabi ace artist Singga's new forthcoming single, *Shadow 2*, too. How could we pass up an exclusive interview with the actress, who is buzzing like a bee around town?

As previously stated, the character has presented a positive challenge. Also, it was her first time playing a country girl. However, for those living with lupus, its effects are profound, spanning physical, emotional, and social dimensions. Understanding the significance of lupus and exploring potential treatments like stem cell therapy is crucial in offering hope and improving outcomes for those affected.

Despite its prevalence and impact, lupus remains relatively misunderstood, both by the general public and within the medical community. This lack of understanding contributes to delayed diagnosis, inadequate treatment, and stigma surrounding the disease. Moreover, there is currently no cure for lupus, and treatment mainly focuses on managing symptoms and preventing flare-ups, often through immunosuppressive medications. For the past few years, Guwahati has been Royals' second home base and it was a strategic move by the franchise having invested a good six years in tapping Parag's potential. Panned for being inconsistent on social media platforms, Parag's homecoming this year

is special as his performance of 483 runs at a strike-rate of 153 despite not being an opener is simply outstanding. A stable core and improvisation as per match situations have already made Parag an India contender for the next T20 series where he is expected to make his international debut. As and when it happens, Parag will become the first cricketer hailing from the north-eastern part of the country to wear the senior team's iconic blue jersey. Parag's emergence as the cricketing face from the region makes this and the RR's next match against KKR more significant. The support for the 22-year-old will be organic and that will also help Sanju Samson and his men against Punjab Kings, which unearthed two T20 gems in Shashank Singh and Ashutosh Sharma but once again failed to fire as a



better part of the season made matters worse as his stand-in Sam Curran didn't exactly look the part. Skipper Shikhar Dhawan's absence due to injury for the

leader in what is expected to be his best season as a batter. He already is his team's top-scorer with 486 runs. The dynamic opening duo of Yashasvi Jaiswal (344 runs) and Jos Buttler (359 runs) have had an average season by their standards but Parag and Samson have ensured that batting remained solid and consistent with he low-scoring game against CSK being an aberration. RR's strongest aspect is their bowling unit that has never been taken to the task as such during the whole season. Sandeep Sharma (Economy Rate 8.07) at the death and Trent Boult (ER 8.38) at the start have executed plans to the 'T'. Ravichandran Ashwin has only become sharper as the tournament has progressed and Yuzvendra Chahal can always produce that magic ball against the run of play.



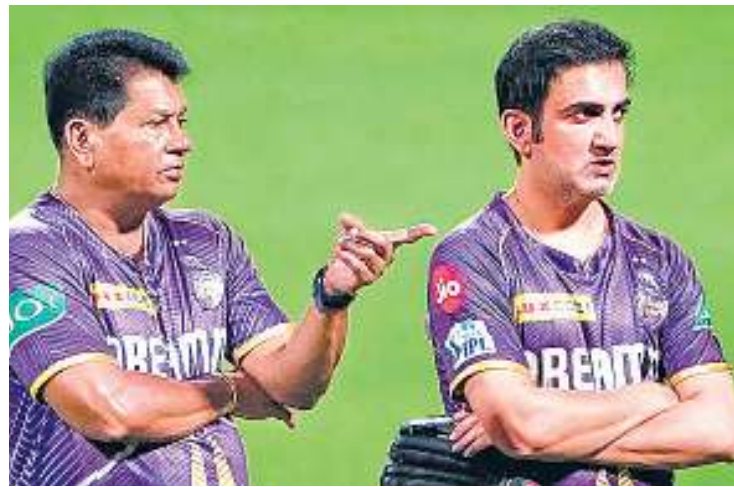
Shastri, Ashwin back Impact Player rule

 The "Impact Player" rule might have come in for sharp criticism in the ongoing IPL, but former India coach Ravi Shastri and senior spinner Ravichandran Ashwin have backed it, stating that it leads to more close finishes. The rule, implemented in the competition last season, has been a topic of debate this edition, with some experts and current players saying that it will make all-rounders redundant. "When any new rule comes in, there will be people who will try to justify why that's not right," Shastri said. "But with time, when you see the scores — 200 and 190 — and then, individuals grabbing that opportunity and making the most of it, people will start re-looking at how they think about it." Shastri vouched for the rule, saying that the game has to evolve with time. "The Impact Player (rule) is good. You have to evolve with the times. It happens in other sports as well. It's got tighter finishes," he said on Ashwin's YouTube channel. "I think it's a good rule. You saw the number of tight finishes we had in last year's IPL. So, it has made a big difference." BCCI Secretary Jay Shah had recently said that the rule is not permanent. "Impact Player is like a test case. We have implemented it slowly. The biggest advantage of it is that two Indian players are getting a chance (in each game), which is the most important," he told the media in Mumbai last week. "We will consult with the players, franchises, broadcasters (and take a call). This is not permanent, (but) I am not saying that it will go. (We'll see) if it's making the game more competitive or not. Even then, if a player feels that this is not right, then we will talk to them. But no one has told us anything yet. So, it will be decided after the World Cup." India skipper Rohit Sharma and Delhi Capitals' Axar Patel and Mukesh Kumar, also expressed their displeasure with the rule. "I genuinely feel it is going to hold back the development of all-rounders because eventually cricket is played by 11 players, not 12," Rohit had said a couple of weeks back. "So, I am not a big fan of the Impact Player rule because you are taking so much from the game just to make it a little more entertaining for the people around you."

 Former India cricketer Ambati Rayudu has no doubts that IPL teams that empower their players to take "ownership" are the ones likely to be more successful compared to those who leave decision-making in the hands of coaches. In a discussion on what goes into keeping the team environment healthy, the former India and Chennai Super Kings player cited Kolkata Knight Riders mentor Gautam Gambhir's example. He loves the manner in which Gambhir gives his players the freedom to perform and according to him, it has been the key to the two-time IPL champions' run of success so far this season. "If the coaches take a back-seat and work behind the scenes, and let the players take the ownership, and let the players have the freedom in order to perform on the ground, those are the sort of teams that excel, and that is what KKR has been doing," Rayudu, a veteran of 55 ODIs and six T20Is told Star Sports on Tuesday. KKR, the IPL winners in 2012 and

2014 under Gambhir's captaincy, became the first team to enter the playoffs this season and are currently on 19 points after nine wins. Gambhir returned as KKR mentor this season and his presence is being attributed to the team's resurgence after nearly a decade. "Gautam Gambhir is just facilitating them and guiding them in the right direction... If you keep it simple, it is easy," added Rayudu, who has been part of six IPL-winning teams. Former India spinner Harbhajan Singh applauded ex-KKR coach Brendon McCullum for bringing positivity into the dressing room irrespective of whether the team won or lost. "When I was part of KKR, Brendon was there. Brilliant coach. One of the top guys I have ever worked with. He was so positive in that dressing room.



Whether you win or lose, he remained the same. "We lost about 6-7 games at the start of that season, and we ended up

qualifying for the final. I have not seen even a single change in Brendon McCullum when we were not winning and when we were winning," said Harbhajan about the former New Zealand cricketer, who left KKR in 2022 to become England Test coach. He added that it was the duty of mentors and coaches to keep the players in a positive frame of mind. "He (McCullum) was just very humble, straightforward, and for him, everybody was equal. So that is what is very important to make sure the team is important. It is about those players going there and doing what they have to do to make sure they lift the cup. "It is our duty as mentors or coaches to give them the best we can and keep them in good shape. Not just physically but also mentally because that plays a very big role."

 With eyes firmly set on the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics, young squash players Anahat Singh, Abhay Singh and Velavan Senthilkumar were on Tuesday included in the TOPS Development Group. Squash, which was inducted in the 2028 Olympics programme in October, is popular in India, with exponents doing well in the Asian and Commonwealth Games. For years, Saurav Ghosal, Dipika Pallikal and Joshna Chinappa have kept the flame burning and are now passing the baton to the next generation of players like Anahat, Abhay and Velavan. "The inclusion of squash in the TOPS programme marks a pivotal moment for the sport in India. Beyond immediate benefits like increased participation and enhanced training opportunities, this recognition signifies a broader endorsement of squash as a significant sporting discipline within the country," Squash Racquets Federation of India (SRFI) secretary general Cyrus Poncha said in a SAI release. "Including squash in TOPS opens doors to international exposure and collaboration, fostering exchange programs and partnerships with leading squash nations. This is bound to enhance the overall standard of squash in India." Anahat, 16, is already a

national champion, with over 46 titles in the national circuit so far. On the international front, she has started making waves as the current Asian U-17 champion and winner of two PSA World Tour titles. She also has two Asian Games medals. "I am really honoured SAI and SRFI considered me to be added to TOPS and I believe it will be a big support for me in improving my game and getting ready for international competition. I am sure when other Indian squash players hear about this, they will be encouraged to pick up squash professionally as they will know the government is supporting them if they perform well and represent India," she said. Among men, Abhay and Velavan were inducted in TOPS. At 25, Abhay is the current National Games gold medallist and national championship silver medallist. He has won nine PSA World Tour titles and was part of the Indian men's team that won the Asian Games gold in Hangzhou in 2023. "I've been working hard to climb up the PSA rankings and have been funding all my expenses to travel abroad and train under some of the best coaches. I'm happy that TOPS will now take care of me, and I really hope we keep producing results on the world tour especially the 2026 Asian Games and the again the Olympics," Abhay said.

India will put to test its best strategies and combinations during the European leg of the FIH Pro League as it would be the last opportunity to shortlist the final squad for the Paris Olympics, said men's hockey team captain Harmanpreet Singh on Tuesday. The team left for Antwerp, Belgium on Tuesday for the challenging league, where the winner of this season will be determined. India, currently third in the points table, behind the Netherlands and Australia, will play Belgium and Argentina in Antwerp between May 22 and 26. It will be followed by matches against Germany and Great Britain from June 1-9 in London. "We are trying out the best combinations before the final squad is selected for the Olympics. Hence, the Pro League outing is crucial in our preparations for Paris as well as for players to make it to the 16-member squad for Paris," said drag-flicker Harmanpreet in a Hockey India

release before the team left for Europe. Last month, India, the Tokyo Olympics bronze medallists, lost all their five matches in Australia, raising doubts about their preparations for the Paris Games. Harmanpreet said the team will focus on eliminating any chinks in its armour ahead of Paris. "The team is quite excited to get back on the road again for yet another challenging outing where we will take on world's best teams in the Pro League. We will be travelling on the back of a very intense training camp over the past few weeks where we focused on our conditioning and played intra-squad matches regularly. "The team is shaping well and the Pro League is an important event for us to



iron out the flaws in our execution ahead of the Olympics," said Harmanpreet. The skipper said the Pro League will

not just help him assess his team's preparations but also provide cues into the rivals' strategies. "We have Belgium and Argentina in our pool at the Olympics along with Australia, Ireland and New Zealand. We play Belgium and Argentina both in Antwerp. Harmanpreet hoped that after finishing third in the last few seasons of the Pro League, his team would stake claim to the title this time around. "In the past few seasons of the Pro League, we have finished at third position. It will be great to finish on top this time and we are quite optimistic about it," Harmanpreet said. India will play Argentina on May 22 in Antwerp.

Paddler Manika Batra reaches career high ranking of world number 24

As women's table tennis player Manika Batra rose to a career-best singles ranking of 24 following her success in the Saudi Smash, becoming the first Indian woman paddler to break into the top-25 in world rankings. The 28-year-old Khel Ratna awardee, who was in 39th spot before the tournament, jumped 15 spots following her run in Jeddah, where she reached the quarterfinals. Manika, the 2018 Commonwealth Games gold medallist in individual and team categories, had shocked multiple-time world champion and Olympic gold medallist China's Wang Manyu (seeded second) on her way to the last-eight in the Saudi Smash. It was also the first time an Indian women player advanced that far in the tournament. Manika's rise through the draw finally earned her 350 points. In an Instagram post, Manika,



who had made history by becoming the first Indian paddler to reach the women's singles quarterfinals at the Hangzhou last year, wrote that the ranking boost had come at the right time as she aims to secure a Paris Olympics berth. "An extreme confidence boost on the road to Paris 2024. Breaking into the Top-25 and achieving the best rank ever achieved by an Indian in women's singles of the ITTF Ranking," wrote Manika. Manika also thanked her coach Aman Balgu and sparring partner Kirill Barabanov of Belarus for her success. "Thank you, everyone, for your blessings and support. Especially my coach @amanbalgu, my sparring partner @kirill_barabanov and my family for the constant support. Onward and upward towards Paris 2024," she added.

Manu, Vijayveer win final 25m pistol Olympic Selection Trials

Olympian Manu Bhaker and Paris quota winner Vijayveer Sidhu won the fourth and final Olympic Selection Trial (OST) in 25m pistol events here on Tuesday. At the M P State Shooting Academy, Manu, coached by the legendary pistol shooter Jaspal Rana, shot a world record-equalling 42 in the women's 25m Pistol OST T4 final, while Vijayveer shot 34 in the decider of the men's 25m rapid-fire pistol OST T4 to emerge triumphant. Manu displayed complete dominance in the trials, winning two and coming second in the other two. She was also the only shooter among the selected five to not score below 580 in the qualification round even once. Abhidnya Patil (35) was second, while Simranpreet Kaur Brar (30) took home the final podium point. Esha Singh and Rhythm Sangwan were



fourth and fifth respectively. In men's rapid fire, Vijayveer took the lead after the second five-shot series and held on to it till the eighth and final series to register his first outright victory in the trials. Anish Bhanwala was second with 30 while Adarsh Singh was third with 25. Ankur Goel (20) and Bhavesh Shekawat (18) took the minor places. Anish, however, was the most successful of the five in the event, having won two trials and coming second in the other two. Bhavesh had won the second trial. Vijayveer, on the other hand, had come second twice in the three earlier trials. Wednesday will see the qualification rounds in men's and women's 50m Rifle 3 Positions event with local hopes Aishwarya Tomar and Ashi Chouksey set to participate.
