

Dress code for nursing service cadre staffs changed

The State Health and Family Welfare Department has effected a change in the dress code for the employees of Odisha Nursing Service cadre.

As per a notification, the colour of the dress code for the Nursing Officer/Senior Nursing Officer will be light lavender. Those working in the ICU/OT/Labour Room will wear 'Scrub Suit' while females in general wards will be in saree/salwar and kameez (3/4th sleeve top) while males will wear shirt and



a deep navy blue colour formal trousers.

The colour of the dress code for Assistant Nursing Superintendent (ANS) will be Cyan Blue. Like Nursing officers, ANS working in the ICU/OT/Labour room will wear

'Scrub Suit' while the dress code for female Assistant Nursing Superintendents will be saree/salwar and kameez while males are going to wear a shirt accompanied by a deep navy blue colour formal trousers.

The colour of the outfit of Deputy Nursing Superintendents (DNS)/Nursing Superintendents (NS) will be white. They are also required to wear a 'Scrub Suit' for ICU/OT/Labour Room. Females in the general wards will be seen in sarees while males will be wearing shirts along with deep navy blue colour formal trousers. Interestingly, the collar

neck portion of the white apron will be bordered in deep purple Sambalpuri for all. These apart, there will be white half sleeve aprons for all Nursing Officers and Senior Nursing Officers in general wards.

A full-sleeve apron will be provided for all ANS/DNS/NS in general wards while all officers of the cadre irrespective of the rank will have their names and designations inscribed on their uniforms.

Lastly, Nursing Superintendents will have a dark brown colour badge with the hospital logo, name and designation.

2 groups of students clash in city college

Lab Attendant hurt after hit with bottle

Tension prevailed at the Maharishi College under the Saeed Nagar police station here on Monday after two groups of students clashed.

As per reports, a Laboratory Attendant sustained injuries while he was trying to pacify the situation. The victim was identified as Santosh Swain.

It is alleged that the college official sustained head injuries after he was attacked with a bottle.

Senior officials of the college said

that around three to four students entered through the main gate and suddenly attacked some other students.

"Our laboratory attendant Santosh Swain caught hold of one of the students and was trying to take him to my office. However, the student took out a bottle from his bag and hit him on his head," said the college Principal.

A Staff Council meeting was held and stringent action would be taken against the student.

"We will inform the parents of the students; and if needed, police would be informed about the incident," the Principal added.

'Unsatisfactory performance' Minati removed as OSCW Chairperson

The State Government on Monday ordered removal of Minati Behera as the Chairperson of the Odisha State Commission for Women (OSCW) citing her unsatisfactory performance. Earlier, she had been issued a show-cause notice and asked to submit her reply by November 1.

After a "thorough and careful examination" of her reply, it was observed that her reply was inadequate and does not justify the unsatisfactory performance of the commission, the Department of Women & Child Development said in a notification.



Behera had been accused of not vacating her post even after being dismissed by the government. Earlier too, the department had issued a show-cause notice to Behera on October 28 this year for 'unsatisfactory' performance during her tenure.

Behera had been appointed as the OSCW Chairperson on October 12, 2022.

In city Youth 'beaten to death' at rehab centre

A youth was allegedly beaten to death at a rehabilitation centre under the Airport police station in Bhubaneswar on Monday.

The deceased was identified as Sumanta Panda (36), a resident of Unit-6 in the capital city.

As per the allegations, family members had admitted Sumanta to the rehabilitation centre on Sunday evening. To their shock, they were informed that he had been admitted to the hospital the same night.

Mysteriously, officials of the re-

habilitation centre had admitted Sumanta to a hospital at around 4 am on Monday and asked the hospital authority to inform the family members about his death.

On being informed, the relatives of the deceased rushed to the hospital and found no officials of the rehabilitation centre at the spot.

Family members of the deceased have further alleged that there were multiple injury marks on Sumanta's body. Acting on the complaint, a police team reached the Capital Hospital and sent the body for post-mortem. Further investigation into the matter was ongoing.

Mango kernel deaths CUO survey suggests spl dev plan to tackle K'mal poverty

Team of professors visit Mandipanka

A five-member team of the Centeal University of Odisha (CUO), Koraput made a ground survey of the recent mango kernel death cases in Mandipanka village in Daringibadi block of Kandhamal district, on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Members, Prof Kapila

Khemundu, Prof Sourav Gupta, prof Prasant Behera, prof Jayant Nayak and prof Chandrasekhar from five departments such as Sociology, Journalism and Mass communication, Anthropology, Economics and Animal husbandry, have prepared a report containing observations and suggestions, which they will submit to the State and Centre for policy intervention.

Reliable sources said the team's keen observations include 11 points

such as the distance of PDS ration centre (9km) from Mandipanka village, acute poverty among the households who belong to BPL category and work as daily wage labours where as young men are forced to go to Kerala as seasonal migrant labourers, inadequate pure safe drinking water for the villagers, lack of awareness about public health sanitation and hygienic, lack of public transport system, poor mobile network, erratic electricity supply, lack of a dedicated

Anganwadi centre and skill development training facility etc.

In the suggestions part of the report, the team opined for opening of PDS ration centre within the village, regular health checkup camps, a mobile health unit for quick access, installation of mobile towers, regular power supply, safe drinking water supply, skill development training and above all implementation of a special development plan for Kandhamal district in line with the KBK Plan.

Interview of the week

Name an institution of repute of Odisha after Kharavela

Rajendra Prasad Samal is a noted Indo-Anglican poet who has been awarded at the international level. His unique poetry book 'Many moods of Mumbai' had arrested the attention of legendary Khuswant Singh, who wrote on Samal. Samal's poetry is preserved as treasure tokens in the library of University of Maryland. Currently, Samal is a visiting faculty to the Mumbai University and stays put at Mumbai.

In an interview to *The Pioneer*, Samal spoke to *Sugyan Choudhury*, paying a glowing tribute to Odia emperor Kharavela.

Why do you feel that the Utkal University of Culture be named after Kharavela?

Kharavela as an emperor had no equals among the kings of his times. While other emperors had been dangerously overambitious and disgustingly self-aggrandising, his noble deeds were used as gifts to his subjects and neighbouring states. He was the philosopher king that the great Lao Tzu had in mind and Plato dreamt of. Like Plato, he believed, 'Happiness or wellbeing of subjects is the highest aim of the ruler and virtues are needed to attain it.' Every Odia will feel delighted to know that such a rare human being was born in Bhubaneswar in 67 BC. But unfortunately being in Bhubaneswar, we do not feel proud that such a great emperor was born here. If University of Culture will be named after him, students will be curious to know about his greatness.

In nineteen sixties for Matriculation, we had 'Makers of Destiny', a book glorifying people taken from the pages of history written with the blood of the people they had butchered. It included chapters on 'Alexander the great Greek' who massacred thousands and spent his entire career of thirteen years in the battlefield. A chapter on 'Ashok the Beloved', who mercilessly killed one hundred thousand innocent Odias apart from equal numbers got perished after being taken as captives. It had 'Akabar the great Moghul' a man known for having 300 concubines

apart from many wives to have short sexual relationships with them and was ruthless against Hindu kings. But a chapter on Kharavela was missing because the malevolent evil attracted the attention of the historians more than that of the benevolent good. Although recorded facts say, 'The political and military performances of Kharavela have in fact no parallel in history and this great monarch fully justifies that he attained the status of Chakravarti meaning the emperor of emperors.' With our people being unpatriotic, our intellectuals being indifferent, our historians being tentative and not assertive, how do we expect our people to know about the greatness of Kharavela?

What are his achievements of which people of Odisha should feel proud?

Within only twelve years of his reign, Kharavela could achieve a series of brilliant victories extending his supremacy from the north-western part of India to the farthest extent in south. The military campaigns of Kharvela never aimed at building a political empire for Kalinga by annexing conquered territories. His cherished desire was to play the role of a Dharma Vijayee Monarch and enhance the honour of Kalinga by defeating rising powers of his times. The Satavahanas who were bidding for political power in the Deccan were humbled, and the Yavans (Indo-Greeks) in India were chased away from the soil of Bharatavarsa. Magadha got a setback too serious to rise again and the dissolution of the Tamil league that had been existing for over 1,300 years were his extraordinary achievements.

While walking on the bank of the river Daya, Kharavela's teacher Gyanalokananda reminded him about the painful cry of thousands of war widows and screaming of orphaned children during the Kalinga War, which kept stirring his heart and echoing in his mind and like Caesar he came, he saw and avenged Ashok's genocide by conquering Magadha, honourably brought back the prestigious Kalinga Jina along with all the treasures which had been plundered by

King Dhanananda and with that he tax-freed his beloved subjects.

Why the virtues of Kharavela have not been spread far and wide so far?

Valmik's Sri Rama was undoubtedly the greatest. But it was Tulsidas who took Rama to the heart of common man and popularised him to the extent that Lord Rama became the symbol of ultimate ideal in every household. Kharavela has not been adequately presented to the world despite having the virtues like that of Lord Rama. He had ensured health, wealth, bliss, renaissance and happiness in the life of his subjects and elevated his kingdom to the level of a Rama Rajya. Despite all this and despite having the bravery of Julius Caesar, he could not be known to the world simply because neither his achievements have been written about like Shakespeare did it for Julius Caesar nor his virtues have been highlighted through folktales, ballads, moving pictures and plays as are done to make the legends out of historical figures. 'Salabhanjika', a recent novel on the life of Kharavela by Dr Indramani Jena, illuminates Kharavela's glorious days.

What were his greatest virtues which other emperors did not possess?

With the kind of powerful military he had, he could have marched into any kingdom without resistance. But as a man of Tao he knew what was enough and he had realised that over-ambition hastens decay and downfall. Grown up among the Jain masters, he had entered the world with the wisdom of gods. He was a man among the animals because he had never succumbed to the animal instincts the way emperors like Ashok, Alexander and Akabar did. He was a philosopher among the poets because he had allowed conquered territories to be independent and friendly kingdoms. He was a mystic among the philosophers because he had not taken a single erring step in his life.

What more would you like to say in this regard?

The Odia identity should be preserved, protected and defended through the life history of Emperor Kharavela, who was lovingness personified. He inculcated a kind of oneness among his subjects. When he relinquished his throne his son was only seven years old. But his kingdom was safe because of such oneness. Any established institution of repute of Odisha, if named after him, will radiate vibrantly proudly proclaiming to the world about his ideals. Our leaders, planners, politicians, who deliver their rhetorics on Odia Ashmita, should install statues of this great Odia emperor at every nook and corner of the State to commemorate his hallowed memory.

6 die, many hurt in separate road accidents

A youth was killed after being hit by a container in Koraput district's Pottangi.

In the fifth incident, a youth

was killed after he was run over by an unidentified vehicle at Parjang in Dhenkanal district.

An auto-rickshaw driver was critically injured after his three-wheeler collided head on

with a truck near Ghasipura in Keonjhar district.

In the last incident, at least five persons were grievously injured after their vehicle was hit by a speeding truck at Basta in Baleswar.

Miscreants break into bank, decamp with lakhs

Miscreants broke into the Odisha Gramya Bank at Khaprapada Square under the Baliaipal police station in Baleswar district on Sunday night and looted cash worth lakhs.

The looters managed to break open the window of the bank using gas cutters and entered to commit the loot. It was not immediately known if the miscreants had also tampered with the CCTV camera installed in the bank.

The burglars fled with cash worth lakhs. The exact amount stolen would be ascertained after verification by bank officials.

The matter came to the fore after locals spotted the broken window and alerted the bank manager and local cops. On being informed, police rushed to the spot and launched a hunt to nab the miscreants.

A similar loot had happened in the same bank five years ago. Lack of police patrolling has led to a rise in crimes in the area, locals alleged.

Land donors hold protest before ArcelorMittal



Over job, rehab lapses

The land oustees, who previously donated their land for the establishment of ArcelorMittal Nippon Steel Company, protested outside the company's plant in Paradip, alleging unfair treatment regarding their employment terms. They alleged that the company exploited them in the name of employment and did not compensate them fairly.

The protesters highlighted that, despite losing their land for the company in 2006-07, they were only provided con-

tractual jobs by Essar Steel in 2008. Following the acquisition by ArcelorMittal Nippon Steel, the workers reported that their salaries have stagnated, with many still earning only Rs 12,000 per month—an amount, they said, was inadequate, given the rising cost of living. Despite repeated requests for fair compensation and permanent positions, the company simply ignored them, they alleged.

Protesters Satya Prakash Samal and Pooja Swain warned that if the company officials failed to meet them and address their concern, they would intensify their agitation, including blocking the factory gates with their families.

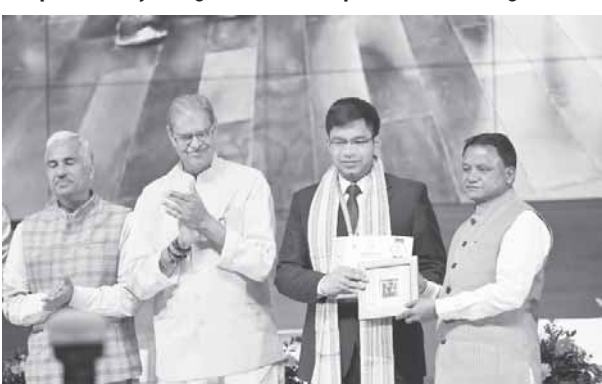

People determined to bring change: PM Modi to BJP workers

The Congress is trying to break the collective strength of SC, ST and OBC by creating divisions among them to weaken their voice and eventually end the reservation for them, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Monday as he called for unity among these communities. “That’s why I keep saying ‘ek rahenge, toh safe rahenge (if you remain united, you would be safe),’” he said while interacting with BJP workers in Jharkhand under the ‘mera booth sabse mazboot’ programme through the NaMo app. The state goes to assembly polls on November 13 and 20. Modi also highlighted the

“failures” of the JMM-Congress-RJD combine’s five-year rule and said the state has to be freed from “corruption, mafiaism and misrule” to put it on the path of progress. The kind of blessings that the BJP is receiving at booth levels, it’s clear that the “corrupt” JMM-led government is set to be ousted, Modi asserted. “The countdown has begun,” he said. Modi said “everyone from the royal family” of the Congress -- from Jawaharlal Nehru to Rajiv Gandhi -- were “staunch opponents” of the provision of reservation and the party crushed all the voices rising in its favour till it was at the helm from “panchayat to Parliament” as the Dalit, OBC and Adivasi societies were scattered then.

But, gradually they started understanding what B R Ambedkar had said and came together posing a challenge to the Congress in many of the states, he said. “The OBC society could not come together till 1990. But when they came together, the Congress suffered severe losses. “Since then, the Congress has not been able to form its government with a full majority. It has its government in just three states in the country today,” he added. Modi said the Congress has decided to break “the collective strength” of the Scheduled Castes (SC), Scheduled Tribes (ST) and the Other backward Classes (OBC) as its “royal family is angry”.



“It has become their (Congress’) agenda over the past few years. It’s because the states, which have the highest number of Dalits, OBC, Adivasis, are under the BJP-NDA rule today and there is no possibility of the Congress coming to power in these states,” he said. Modi said the Congress wants Dalits, tribals and other backward classes to break into “hundreds of smaller castes”, instead of collectively being the SC, ST and OBC, so that they get scattered, lose their identity and fight

with each other. “When these societies break into smaller castes, their voice as SC, ST and OBC will become weak. The day this happens, the Congress’ conspiracy will succeed. It will take away reservation as well,” he said. “That’s why I keep saying ‘ek rahenge, toh safe rahenge (if you remain united, you would be safe). All the OBC, SC and ST societies should remain united,” Modi said. “People have shared on social media an old advertisement given by the Congress during elections... Perhaps Rajiv Gandhi was the leader of the party then. “The SC, ST and OBC have been painted so ugly in this advertisement. In their adver-

tisement, they have clearly said that reservation has to be taken away from the SC, ST and the OBC,” he added. Modi launched an all-out attack on the Congress, JMM and RJD and accused them of making tall claims but failing to deliver on their promises. He said in these polls, the people of Jharkhand are determined to bring change. The biggest reason for this, the prime minister said, is that JMM, Congress and RJD have attacked Jharkhand’s “roti, beti and maati” (bread, daughters and land). “They made tall claims in the last five years, but today the people of Jharkhand can see that most of their promises are false,” Modi said. He said despite the lack of cooperation from the state

government, the Centre is trying its best to develop the state with its mantra of ‘sabka saath, sabka vikas’. Dynastic parties are not only corrupt but also the biggest hurdle for talented youth of the society, he said. Modi said that the JMM too has learned these tricks from the “royal family” of the Congress. It now only cares for power and money, the prime minister alleged. Earlier, the rich had gas cylinders in their homes and the poor could not even think of having a gas cylinder, he said adding the reason being that Congress had the nature of catering to the rich. The BJP delivered gas cylinders to the homes of people through the government’s ‘Ujjwala’ scheme, Modi noted.

SC stays warrant against Shivraj Singh Chouhan in defamation case

The Supreme Court on Monday stayed the execution of bailable warrant against Union Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan and two other BJP leaders in a defamation case filed by Congress Rajya Sabha MP Vivek Tankha. A bench of Justices Hrishikesh Roy and SVN Bhatti sought Tankha’s response on a plea of Chouhan and others challenging the October 25 order of the Madhya Pradesh High Court refusing to quash the defamation case. The bench said, “The execution of bailable warrants against the petitioners shall not be executed subject to their effective participation in the proceedings before the court in the case.” Senior advocate Mahesh Jethmalani, appearing for Chouhan and others, said the purported statements mentioned in the complaint by Tankha were made on the floor of the house



and were covered by Article 194 (2) of the Constitution. Article 194 (2) states, “No member of the Legislature of a State shall be liable to any proceedings in any court in respect of anything said or any vote given by him in the Legislature or any committee thereof, and no person shall be so liable in respect of the publication by or under the authority of a House of such a Legislature of any report, paper, votes or proceedings.” Jethmalani submitted it was unheard of that in a summons case, a bailable warrant was issued by the court, when the

parties could appear through their counsel. On October 25, the high court had refused to quash the defamation case lodged by Tankha against former Madhya Pradesh CM Chouhan, BJP state president V D Sharma and former minister Bhupendra Singh. Tankha, in his complaint in the trial court, said defamatory statements were made in the run-up to Panchayat elections in the state in 2021. On January 20, 2024, a special court in Jabalpur registered the defamation case against the three BJP leaders under IPC Section 500, summoning them in court.

Justice Sanjiv Khanna sworn in as 51st CJI

Justice Sanjiv Khanna was on Monday sworn in as the 51st Chief Justice of India. President Droupadi Murmu administered the oath of office to him at a brief swearing-in ceremony held at the Rashtrapati Bhavan. Justice Khanna took the oath in English in the name of God. Born on May 14, 1960, Justice Khanna will serve as the CJI for a little over six months and

demit office on May 13, 2025, on attaining the age of 65 years. He succeeds Justice D Y Chandrachud, who demitted office on Sunday. Hailing from an illustrious Delhi-based family, Justice Khanna is the son of former Delhi High Court judge Justice Dev Raj Khanna and the nephew of renowned former apex court judge HR Khanna. Vice President Jagdeep Dhankhar, Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, Union

Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal and former CJI J S Khehar were among those present on the occasion, besides Justice Chandrachud. Justice Khanna, who served as a Supreme Court judge since January 2019, has been part of several landmark judgments such as upholding the sanctity of EVMs, scrapping the electoral bonds scheme, upholding the abrogation of Article 370 and the granting of interim bail to former Delhi CM Arvind Kejriwal.

Indian Navy, Sri Lankan Navy review preparedness to jointly combat transnational maritime crime

India and Sri Lanka on Monday reviewed their preparedness to jointly combat transnational maritime crime and regional cooperation in the seventh annual High Level Meeting (HLM) between the Indian Coast Guard (ICG) and the Sri Lanka Coast Guard (SLCG) at Colombo, ICG said here. Giving details, officials said this meet marked a significant milestone in the collaborative efforts to combat transnational maritime crime and promote regional cooperation. This annual meeting follows the institutionalized mechanism as outlined in the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed between both the maritime agencies in May 2018. The four member ICG delegation is led by its Director General S Paramesh while the SLCG side is led by Rear



Admiral YR Serasinghe, Director General, Sri Lanka Coast Guard. The HLM underscores the commitment of both the Coast Guards to jointly address maritime challenges while focusing on a range of regional maritime contemporary issues, including drug trafficking, marine pollution, safety of mariners, adoption of best practices, capacity-building programs and other collaborative arrangements. The outcome of the meeting reiterates enhancing mutual cooperation in addressing these challenges, thereby strengthening the maritime safety and security framework in the region.

Gwalior murder: Foreign pistols, phones seized from two aides of Khalistani terrorist Arsh Dalla

Two firearms made in Australia and China as well as mobile phones with foreign IMEI rpt IMEI numbers have been seized from Canada-based Khalistani terrorist Arshdeep Singh Gill’s two aides who allegedly shot dead a man in Madhya Pradesh’s Gwalior last week, a police official said on Monday. The two accused, identified as Navjot Singh alias Neetu and Anmolpreet Singh alias Vishal, were arrested in Punjab on Sunday in connection with the murder of a Youtuber there, as per police. They had allegedly shot dead Jaswant Singh Gill on November 7 outside his house in Dabra area in Gwalior, the official said. Gill was sentenced to life imprisonment for killing his wife’s cousin Sukhvinder in 2016 and was out on parole since October 28. The official said Sukhvinder’s brother Satpal possibly transferred Rs



2.50 lakh from Canada to his cousin Jitu Singh alias Jita here to facilitate the November 7 killing. “The two firearms, an Australian Glock and Chinese-made pistol, are worth Rs 15 lakh each. One of these pistols and the high-end mobile phones with foreign IMEI (International Mobile Equipment Identity) were used in the November 7 murder here. Our probe has found Navjot and Anmolpreet, after the killing, fled from here late Thursday night to Chandigarh

in a taxi booked by Satpal,” the official said. After MP police got information about the duo through an identity card used at the hotel they had stayed in Gwalior, Punjab police was contacted, he said. “We sent our Punjab counterparts their photos. The duo was arrested on Sunday and Punjab police are questioning them at present. Later, we will bring them here on transit remand. They had come to the hotel on November 7 itself. Jita gave them local inputs,” he said. The official said Satpal transferred Rs 1

lakh to Jita when victim Gill came out on parole, and the remaining Rs 1.50 lakh was sent online after the November 7 murder. “After Navjot and Anmolpreet reached Chandigarh, Satpal made some online payments on their behalf. We were monitoring Satpal’s online transactions and shared all information with our Punjab counterparts. Satpal and his family migrated to Canada after Gill killed Sukhvinder. But Satpal continued to visit here once in a while,” the official said. The official said the two alleged shooters are from Dalla’s gang as per Punjab police, adding he would not comment on whether the Canada-based Khalistani terrorist has any role to play in the November 7 murder. Arsh Dalla, who has been accused of involvement in targeted killings, terror financing and extortion in Punjab, was in January last year designated a terrorist by the Indian government.

The Committee has approved Rs. 147.76 crore for Chhattisgarh, Rs. 201.10 crore for Odisha and Rs. 376.76 crore for West Bengal. The committee comprises Finance Minister, Agriculture Minister and Vice Chairman NITI Aayog as members. To fulfill Prime Minister Narendra Modi’s vision of disaster resilient India, Ministry of Home Affairs under the guidance of Home Minister Amit Shah has taken several initiatives to ensure effective man-



agement of disasters in the country. A number of steps have been taken to prevent any extensive loss to life and property during disasters by strengthening disaster risk reduction system in India. The Central Government has allocated a total of Rs. 5000 crore under National Disaster Response Fund (NDRF) to 15 States, Rs. 1,385.45 crore from State Disaster Mitigation Fund (SDMF) to 11 States and Rs. 124.93 crore from National Disaster Mitigation Fund (NDMF) to three States.

IFFI 2024: “Better Man” to open gala, Satyajit Ray award to filmmaker Noyce

Better Man, a semi-autobiographical film about British pop singer Robbie Williams, will open the 55th International Film Festival of India (IFFI), where Australian filmmaker Phillip Noyce will be presented the Satyajit Ray Lifetime Achievement Award. The annual film gala, which will run through November 20-November 28 in Goa, will present over 180 international films from 81 countries, including 15 world premieres, three international premieres, 40 Asian premieres and 106 Indian premieres. The curtain raiser press conference for IFFI 2024 was held on Monday at the National Media Centre here. The event was attended by L Murugan, Union Minister of State for Information and Broadcasting, Sanjay Jaju, Secretary Information and Broadcasting ministry, Shekhar Kapur, Festival Director and Prasoon Joshi, Chairman, CBFC. The IFFI is “not less than the

Cannes Film Festival”, said Murugan. “You can compare our IFFI with Cannes and some of the other festivals... We are giving the same festivals in IFFI. The response that we are getting from the international audience and delegates is great... There are roadshows about the festival in Mumbai and Chennai. Another roadshow will happen in Hyderabad. We are seeing how the industry is owning the festival, taking responsibility,” the minister told reporters. The festival will open with the Asia premiere of Michael Gracey’s “Better Man”, an Australian film that offers a captivating glimpse into the life of popstar Robbie Williams, portrayed as a chimpanzee by Jonno Davies in a groundbreaking motion-capture performance. Noyce, known for films such as the Angelina Jolie-starrer “Salt”, “Patriot Game” starring Harrison Ford, and “The Bone Collector” featuring Denzel Washington and Jolie, will receive the Satyajit Ray Lifetime Achievement Award at IFFI



2024. The upcoming gala will have 47 films directed by women and 66 works by young and debut filmmakers, reflecting “the festival’s commitment to amplifying underrepresented voices”. Jaju said the team behind IFFI is excited to be charting a new path. “This is the first time in the history of the film festival that we have started this tradition of handing over the festival to the industry. Now, Shekhar Kapur has taken over as the festival director. This is the festival of the industry being completely led and run by the industry. “We look at the festival as the biggest because we are the world’s biggest filmmaking nation. The content we make in

our country is made at one-millionth of the cost at which the content is made outside,” he added. The theme of this year’s festival is ‘Young Filmmakers - The Future is Now’, following which the Creative Minds of Tomorrow initiative has been enhanced to support 100 young talents from 75 in the previous editions. Kapur said that theatrical films are becoming less and less important. “But we need to nurture this idea of theatricals without saying that it’s the only important medium. Because storytelling can be anything. I can give you a 30-second video and tell you a story. If I can’t tell you a story in 30 seconds, 1 minute or 5 minutes, then nobody is going to remember you. We took a Western technology from ‘Raja Harishchandra’ and we made the biggest film industry in the world,” the filmmaker said. A new award of Best Debut Indian Director has been instituted to recognise the young filmmaking talent across India. The winner will be awarded a certificate and cash prize of Rs

5 lakh at the closing ceremony. India is a country of “restless dreams and storytellers”, added Joshi. “If we want our stories to be diverse, we need the courage to tell stories that come from our roots. Filmmaking has become more about courage than talent. It’s become a property of those who are courageous. Now, why should that be? Many stories face story infanticide because they don’t have resources. In such a case, IFFI is a national stage that platforms those who don’t have sufficient funds or facilities,” he said. Australia will be the Country of Focus for IFFI 2024, with a dedicated package of Australian films and a strong presence at the festival. The film festival will mark the centenary of four icons of Indian cinema Raj Kapoor, Tapan Sinha, Akkineni Nageswara Rao (ANR), and Mohammed Rafi at its upcoming 55th edition, honouring them with in-conversation series, exhibitions, and screenings of the restored versions of their timeless classics.

Assam bypolls: ECI transfers officers after violence escalates in Nagaon

The Election Commission of India (ECI) has ordered the transfer of two police officers in Assam's Nagaon district following incidents of violence in Samaguri Assembly constituency area of the district, where bypoll is scheduled this week, official sources said on Monday.

Partha Pratim Saikia, Additional Superintendent of Police (ASP) (Crime), Nagaon, and Rupiyoti Dutta Kaliabar sub-divisional police officer (SDPO) have been moved out of the district, the sources said. Jayanta Baruah and Shyamanta Sarma have been named the new ASP (Crime) and SDPO respectively with immediate effect, they added.

Meanwhile, the Bharatiya Janata Pary (BJP) has written to the ECI demanding bar on Rakibul Hussain, MP, Dhubri from campaigning in Samaguri. The ruling party

has also filed a police complaint against the Congress leader. Hussain had been representing Samaguri in the state Assembly for the past 23 years. He vacated the seat following his election to the Lok Sabha earlier this year. His son Tanzil is the Congress candidate in the by-election. The BJP has fielded Diplu Ranjan Sharma, the party's state general secretary and a former president of the party's state youth wing.

In the letter to the EC, sent through the Returning Officer, Nagaon, on Sunday, the BJP has maintained that Hussain's presence has incited violence in the area and wanted a bar on the MP from campaigning in the constituency. "The by-election in Samaguri has turned violent due to conspiracy of this one person, Rakibul Hussain. We want that Hussain should not be allowed to campaign here any further. The by-election will



not be fair and transparent if he is allowed to move around here," Bimal Bora, a minister in the state government, said after submitting the letter.

Jitu Goswami, a BJP MLA, filed the complaint, whose vehicle was purportedly fired upon, at Rupahihat police station on Sunday. The complaint against Hussain and other Congress workers alleges stone pelting, gun

violence, attempt to murder and inciting violence.

Goswami claimed that stones were pelted at him and BJP supporters during the campaign in Muriputhi Kheta area on Saturday evening from a Congress election office, with gunshots also fired at them later.

He further claimed that Hussain was present at the spot during the incident and

instigated a criminal and other Congress workers to attack the BJP leaders and workers. The MLA, who said two BJP workers were injured in the incident, named 15 persons, including Hussain, in the complaint.

Violence has rocked Samaguri constituency with both the ruling BJP and the opposition Congress alleging gun violence, besides workers of the two parties being engaged in verbal spats and scuffles.

Journalists covering the poll campaign have also been injured in the spats.

On Sunday, Tanzil's SUV was allegedly attacked by BJP supporters at Udmari village, with the Congress filing complaints with the EC and police over the matter, a local party leader had said.

The BJP is making an all-out effort to snatch the seat in the demographically sensitive Nagaon district, while Congress is in no mood to leave its stronghold.

Tribal strike shuts down Dibrugarh, Tinsukia

A 12-hour strike in Assam's Dibrugarh and Tinsukia districts called by Moran and Motok community organisations demanding ST status brought life to a standstill on Monday, with all business establishments, offices and other institutions remaining closed.

Thousands of agitators blocked the main roads in Dibrugarh and Tinsukia towns and stopped vehicular movement along the national highways despite the district administrations promulgating prohibitory orders under Section 163 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) in entire districts.

Protesters came out in large numbers to impose the 12-hour bandh from 5am called by All Moran Students' Union (AMSU) and All Assam Motok Yuva Chatra Sammilan (AAMYCS) defying district administrations' orders issued on Sunday night, prohibiting

any forceful bandh call, road blockage, picketing, burning of tires and carrying of inflammable items.

Tires were burnt on roads blockaded by the strike supporters in various places in the two Upper Assam districts, with police opening two rounds in the air to disperse strike supporters on Makum-Tinsukia bypass, an official said."So far, we have not detained anyone. People have hit the streets in thousands at various places. We are trying to clear the highways and local roads," he added.

All shops, business establishments, offices, banks and other institutions remained closed, while some witnessed thin attendance. Bandh supporters, however, exempted school buses, vehicles carrying students to attend examinations, and those of the emergency services from the purview of the shutdown.

Assam's Moran, Motok,

Chutia, Tai-Ahom, Koch-Rajbongshi and Tea-Tribes communities have been demanding ST status for many years, with several senior Bharatiya Janata Party leaders and state ministers regularly offering assurances of granting the reservations.

AMSU and AAMYCS have been protesting Union Tribal Affairs Minister Jual Oram's reported comment that the government has not taken any formal step to grant ST status to the six communities.

Although the 12-hour strike was called by the two organisations, several other groups of the remaining four communities seeking ST status also extended support to the agitation.

AMSU president Pulendra Moran said the movement will intensify in coming days. "We have been fooled by the BJP government many times. Now, we will not listen to any of their assurances. We need sincere actions only," he added.

Andhra FM presents Rs 2.94 lakh Crore budget for 2024-25

The government of Andhra Pradesh (AP) on Monday presented a budget of Rs 2.94 lakh crore for the year 2024-25 with Payyavula Keshav, the state finance minister. "The budget proposals, which I am presenting today, were made by keeping the state's financial position in consideration and to revive the (state) financially by creating wealth. This is aimed at restarting the financial wheels of the state," said Keshav, addressing the second session of the Assembly in the new National Democratic Alliance (NDA) government.

Presenting the budget in the Assembly, with four months left in the fiscal, he said the estimated revenue deficit is around Rs 34,743 crore (2.12 per cent of the Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP)) and the fiscal deficit is estimated at around Rs 68,743 crore (4.19 per cent of the GSDP) for the financial year.

The state government presented a budget of Rs 2.94 lakh crore for FY25 with a revenue expenditure estimated at Rs 2.36 lakh crore and capital expenditure at Rs 32,713 crore. The budget allotted Rs 16,739 crore for panchayat raj and rural development, a portfolio held by Pawan Kalyan, the deputy chief minister of the state. A total of Rs 29,909 crore for school education and Rs 18,421 crore for healthcare and family welfare were also allotted.

Observing that the ambition of the NDA government of Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), Janasena and Telegu Desam Party (TDP) is to eradicate poverty and extend welfare for the marginalised, the finance minister allocated Rs 18,497 crore as Scheduled Castes (SC) component.

Punjab bypolls: Manpreet Singh Badal returns to roots 12 years later

Manpreet Singh Badal has returned to Gidderbaha to seek a re-election as a Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) candidate twelve-year after losing his stronghold.

The former state finance minister has been visiting villages in the constituency and is invoking the name of five-time chief minister late Parkash Singh Badal.

The 62-year-old has as his rivals Aam Aadmi Party's nominee Hardeep Singh Dimpy Dhillon and Congress candidate Amrita Warring, who is the wife of Punjab Congress chief Amrinder Singh Raja Warring. The Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) (Amritsar) has fielded Sukhraj Singh.



The Gidderbaha seat fell vacant after Amrinder Singh, who was a Congress MLA, was elected to the Lok Sabha from the Ludhiana seat in the 2024 parliamentary elections. The seat in Muktsar district was once considered a stronghold of the Akalis, with Parkash Singh Badal representing it for five consecutive terms - 1969, 1972, 1977, 1980 and 1985. Manpreet began his political journey from Gidderbaha in

1995 on a SAD ticket and went on to win the seat in 1995, 1997, 2002 and 2007.

After parting ways with the SAD, Manpreet unsuccessfully contested from Gidderbaha in 2012 on a ticket of People's Party of Punjab, a party he floated, but lost to Amrinder Singh. He then shifted from Gidderbaha seat to Bathinda Urban Assembly segment, which he won in 2017 on a Congress ticket. He lost it again in 2022, and switched sides in 2023 by joining the BJP. Amrinder Singh won the Gidderbaha seat in 2012, 2017 and 2022.

"In the next two years, we want to develop Gidderbaha as a model Assembly segment to showcase to the rest of 116 Assembly constituencies that this is what the BJP model can

look like. I want to showcase to the people of Punjab that this is what Gidderbaha can achieve. This should be a model for the rest of Punjab to emulate," Manpreet said.

The politician seeks inclusion of the constituency under the AMRUT-2 scheme, plans to lay down water pipes for irrigation, and set up 20,000 solar-powered tubewells. "My first priority will be to get Gidderbaha declared as a smart city under the AMRUT-2 programme and the government of India has to select a certain number of cities in India so let Gidderbaha be one of them.

The bypolls to the four assembly seats - Gidderbaha, Dera Baba Nanak, Chabbewal and Barnala - will take place on November 20.

Congress expels 28 rebels in Maharashtra

Less than a week after the BJP expelled 40 party rebel candidates, the Congress, has shown the door to as many as party's 28 rebel candidates in poll-bound Maharashtra for a period of six years.

Acting on the directions of AICC general secretary in-charge of Maharashtra, State Congress president Nana Patole issued two separate orders, suspending 28 rebels in 22 constituencies across the state.

The seven candidates suspended in the first list were: Shyamkant Saner (Sindhkheda), Rajendra Thakur (Shrivardhan), Aba Bagul (Aba Bagul), Manish Anand (Shivajinagar), Sureshkumar Jethaliya and Kalyan Borade (both from Partur) and Chandrapal Choukse (Ramtek).

Of the 21 more rebel candidates suspended through the party's second order were six pairs Anandrao Gedam and Shilu Chimurkar (both from

Armori), Sonal Kove and Bharat Yorme (both from Gadchiroli), Abhilasha Gavture and Raju Jhode (both from Ballarpur), Vilas R. Patil and Asma J. Chikhalekar (from both Bhiwandi), Manoj Shinde and Suresh Patil-Khede (both from Kopri-Pachpakhi).

The other rebel candidates against whom disciplinary action was initiated were Premsagar Ganveer (Bhandara), Ajay Lanjewar (Arjun Morgaon), Hanskumar Pandey (Mirambhayander), Kamal Vyawahare (Kasbapeth), Mohanrao Dandekar (Palus-Kadegaon), Mangal V. Bhujbal (Ahmednagar City), Vijay Khadse (Umarchhed), Shabbir Khan (Yavatmal), Avinash Lad (Rajapur), Yagnavalkya Jichkar (Katol) and Rajendra Mulak (Ramtek).

The suspension of rebel candidates came a day after Ramesh Chennitala sent a warning the rebel candidates that his party would not tolerate their indiscipline, that

the party would not allow 'friendly contests' and that the party would do everything to protect the prospects of the Maha Vikas Aghadi candidates are in the candidates in the fray.

Earlier on November 5, the BJP had cracked the whip and expelled as many 40 rebel candidates in 36 constituencies across the state.

The expelled rebels included two rebels from Dhule -- Rural (Shrikant Karle and Sophan Patil), two from Jalgaon city (Mayur Kapse and Ashwin Sonawane), two from Nanded-North (Vaishali Milind Deshmukh and Milind Uttarmrao Deshmukh), Nanded south (Dilip Venkatrao Kadkrute, Sunil Sahebrao More and Sanjay Dhongare), Baglan-ST (Aakash Salunke and Jayashree Garund).

Notwithstanding the disciplinary action taken by both the ruling BJP and Congress, there are still more rebels against official candidates of various political parties in the poll fray.

BJP's Jharkhand poll cry: love jihad, infiltration, Rohingayas

Amit Shah, Union Minister for Home Affairs, on Monday announced that a committee would be formed if Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) forms government in Jharkhand to identify and drive out infiltrators from the state besides reclaiming land grabbed by them.

Shah also said a legislation will be brought to prevent transfer of land to infiltrators on their marrying tribal women. He went on to accuse the Jharkhand Mukti Morcha (JMM)-led dispensation of patronising Bangladeshi infiltrators. Elections to the 81-member Jharkhand Assembly will be held on November 13 and 20, while the counting of votes polled will take place on November 23.

"Tribal population is declining in Jharkhand. Infiltrators are grabbing land

by marrying our daughters. We will bring legislation to prevent transfer of land to infiltrators if they marry tribal women. We will also form a committee to identify infiltrators to drive them out and reclaim land grabbed by them," Shah said addressing a rally at Seraikela.

He claimed that Champai Soren was insulted when he raised the infiltration issue and was forced to resign from chief minister's post by Hemant Soren.

Accusing the JMM-Congress and the RJD of only working for personal growth and indulging in corruption, he said, "Corrupt leaders of JMM-led coalition to be sent behind bars if BJP forms government in Jharkhand."

Shah alleged that the JMM-led dispensation was behind Rs 1,000 crore MNREGA scam, Rs 300 crore land scam, Rs 1,000 crore mining scam and multi-crore liquor scam and devoured Rs 3.90 lakh



crore sent by the Centre.

He promised that once the BJP government is voted to power in the state it will ensure that if the Centre sends rupee one, 25 more paise is added to it by the state so that Rs 1.25 reaches to people.

In another poll rally in Jharkhand, Yogi Adityanath, chief minister of Uttar Pradesh, on Monday accused

the JMM-led coalition in Jharkhand of converting the state into a "dharmashala" for Rohingyas and Bangladeshi infiltrators.

"Jharkhand has been converted into a 'dharmashala' for Rohingyas and Bangladeshi infiltrators who have been given free rein to spread anarchy," he claimed, while addressing an election rally at Bhawnathpur.

MP bypoll: Nail biting finish expected in Budhni, Vijaypur

Since the start of the Selection season in Budhni and Vijaypur Assembly constituencies, both the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and the main opposition Congress have left no stone unturned in the two constituencies.

Spearheading the BJP's attack, Mohan Yadav, chief minister of Madhya Pradesh (MP) and Vishnu Dutt Sharma, BJP state unit chief, addressed more than a dozen public meetings and conducted roadshows in both areas.

Narendra Singh Tomar, MP Assembly Speaker, has been camping in Vijaypur for over a fortnight. Though not on the original list of star campaigners due to his position in the state Assembly, Tomar was pressed into service after the BJP

sensed rough weather in the tribal-dominated area.

Tomar's involvement stirred the Congress, and the party immediately moved the Election Commission of India (ECI), describing Tomar's campaigning as a violation of the model code of conduct. The election watchdog is yet to respond.

The absence of Jyotiraditya Scindia was conspicuous in Vijaypur. Party insiders say that all may not be well between him and Rammivas Rawat, the BJP candidate in Vijaypur. Ruling party sources say that Rawat had refused to quit the Congress with Scindia when the latter crossed over to the BJP in 2020.

On the other hand, except for former Kamal Nath, all senior Congress leaders-PCC chief Jitu Patwari, Leader of the Opposition in the State

Assembly Umang Singh, Rajya Sabha MP Digvijay Singh, former PCC chief Arun Yadav and several legislators and office bearers participated in campaign activities.

With the Vijaypur bypoll beginning to acquire caste overtones, the BJP campaign requisitioned the services of Gwalior MP Bharat Singh Kushwaha to woo the sizeable Kushwaha community in Vijaypur.

The parliamentarian held a public meeting for the community in the presence of state BJP president.

Political observers feel that there is a tough fight in both constituencies. Both parties have put in all their strength. After the campaigning ended on Monday, both parties began closed-door meetings with booth workers and voters.

The Karhal constituency in Uttar Pradesh's Mainpuri district has transformed into a political battleground with the upcoming by-election turning into a crucial test for both the Samajwadi Party (SP) and the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP).

Representing the SP is Tej Pratap Yadav, grandson of the late Mulayam Singh Yadav, who is fighting to retain the family's political stronghold. His main rival is Anujesh Yadav, a BJP candidate and brother-in-law to SP MP Dharmendra Yadav, who presents himself as a "rebel" from the influential Yadav family of Saifai.

The Karhal seat was previously held by SP chief Akhilesh Yadav, who vacated it after winning the Kannauj

seat in the 2024 Lok Sabha election. Akhilesh won Karhal in 2022, defeating BJP's Union Minister SP Singh Baghel. With the seat now vacant, the BJP has strategically fielded Anujesh Yadav to challenge Tej Pratap and make inroads into the SP's Yadav vote base.

"This election is about giving Karhal its share of development. Voters are ready for a double-engine government with Modi at the Centre and Yogi Adityanath in the state," Anujesh said, adding that other communities like the Shakyas, who are second in population only to the Yadavs, are keen to support the BJP for economic growth.

Historically, Karhal has been an SP fortress. Since 1993, the SP has won six of the seven elections held, with the BJP only managing one victory in

2002. In recent years, the SP has maintained its dominance, but the BJP's focus on a Yadav candidate has intensified the contest, raising questions about shifts in the constituency's political alignment.

Local journalist Neeraj Mehre commented, "The BJP hopes to replicate its 2002 success. However, the Yadavs' loyalty to the SP and their historical ties with the Mulayam family make this a formidable challenge."

Akhilesh Yadav and his wife and Mainpuri MP Dimple Yadav, has been at the forefront of Tej Pratap's campaign. Dimple, known for her close ties with voters in the region, has led door-to-door interactions, while senior family members like Shivpal Yadav and Dharmendra Yadav have actively supported her.

Notably, Tej Pratap previously represented Karhal from 2014 to 2019 after winning a by-election following Mulayam Singh Yadav's resignation. Married to Lalu Prasad Yadav's daughter Raj Lakshmi, Tej Pratap also carries the political legacy of the Yadav clan.

With Karhal's electorate of approximately 3.75 lakh voters, the Yadavs comprise the largest share at around 1.3 lakh, followed by Scheduled Castes (60,000), Shakyas (50,000), Thakurs (30,000), and other communities. The BJP's choice of a Yadav candidate is seen as an effort to fracture this vote base, while the Bahujan Samaj Party (BSP) has fielded a Shakya candidate, potentially dividing the vote further.

Additionally, the entry of Chandrashekhar Azad's candidate may siphon off

Dalit support, adding complexity to the SP's traditional advantage.

BJP district president Rahul Chaturvedi expressed confidence in Anujesh's local connections and the development track record under the Yogi-Modi administration. "Karhal has benefited from our crime-free governance, and the people want to see more development," he stated.

While the BJP seeks to penetrate this SP bastion, the SP leadership remains optimistic. An SP leader said that disillusionment among farmers and youth with the BJP government strengthens Tej Pratap's chances.

As Karhal approaches the polling date, the election has become a high-stakes contest of Yadav loyalty, political legacy, and changing caste dynamics.

India bears the brunt

This year’s high death toll and losses due to climate change underscore the urgent need for policy action

With over 3,200 fatalities, extensive crop damage across 3.2 million hectares, and 2.3 lakh buildings destroyed in the first nine months of 2024 alone, the country’s vulnerability to extreme weather events is undeniable. These findings of the ‘India Climate Report 2024’ from the Centre for Science and Environment (CSE) give a shocking picture of the impact of climate change on the country. The report underscores that 93 per cent of the days between January and September were marked by extreme weather, a clear indication that climate-related disasters are becoming not only more frequent but also more severe. The report’s findings reveal a staggering increase in extreme weather events. In 2024, India faced climate extremes on 255 out of 274 days, a record when compared to previous years. Notably, over 35 of the 36 states and union territories experienced such events, with states like Karnataka, Kerala and Uttar Pradesh witnessing over 40 additional days of climate extremes compared to 2023.



The grim statistics point to a significant toll on human life and livelihoods. Kerala, Madhya Pradesh and Assam were the hardest-hit states in terms of fatalities, while Andhra Pradesh saw the greatest destruction of homes, and Maharashtra experienced the largest crop damage. Among the notable phenomena in 2024 were prolonged heatwaves and an unprecedented number of warm nights. Besides, the monsoon season was particularly disastrous, with heavy rains, floods and landslides occurring every single day from June through September. Assam, for example, faced extreme weather on 111 days out of 122, highlighting the relentless impact of intense rainfall and flooding. The 2024

India Climate Report also points to a significant data gap. While the India Meteorological Department (IMD) has made strides in tracking events like warm nights, it lacks absolute temperature benchmarks, which many other countries use to enhance climate data accuracy. The lack of comprehensive, real-time data on climate-related damages impedes effective planning and resource allocation, especially in vulnerable regions. Several factors have contributed to India’s vulnerability which must be addressed. The lopsided development, scant regard to the climate impact and allowing reckless construction in hills must stop. This pattern of ‘bad development’ worsens the impact of natural disasters, transforming regions with poor infrastructure or unplanned urban sprawl into high-risk areas. As the world approaches the dangerous threshold of 1.5°C of warming above pre-industrial levels, India’s situation signals the urgent need for effective climate policies, mitigation strategies and public awareness. The ‘India Climate Report 2024’ serves as a somber reminder of the escalating costs of climate inaction. A collective and urgent response is needed, one that includes better data collection, sustainable urban planning and policies aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Only then can India hope to protect its people and environment.

I was impressed by the way David tackled the adversities in his life. He was sent to the boarding school by his stepfather and was saved from being bullied by James Steerforth. The two formed an unlikely friendship that ended with the death of James.

Steerforth was a rakish scoundrel, but David looked at all that was good in him. My dream at that tender age depended on my frame of mind. Sometimes I would want to be like David, overcoming all adversities, other times I would want to be a lovable scoundrel like James, ready to help friends. I guess I imbibed a bit of both. I had studied mostly



in Hindi medium all boys’ schools in my formative years. I was shy of speaking to girls the first time that I went to a co-ed school when I was only 12. I would look enviously at boys who could speak with girls in fluent English. I would want to be like them. In later years, I understood that it was important to communicate, language was secondary. Two heroes entered my life around this time. Sunil Gavaskar from the cricket world and Bjorn Borg of the lawn tennis fame. I looked enviously at their ability to display no emotions whether winning or losing. I was and continue

to be sentimental. My face is transparent and displays all my emotions. However, I have come to realise that being sentimental is also akin to being passionate about your goals and is not a weakness. My dreams were not so spectacular in my intervening professional years. They were the routine dreams about going up the career ladder to reach the top, whether in the government sector, where you are bound to move up at a steady pace to a point predetermined by your age and seniority; or to earn better money in the private sector.

Then I quit the system. Free of the invisible shackles, I went berserk with my dreams. I spent a lot of time in the kitchen during the COVID-19 days, baking bread and making wine. Surprisingly, even my wife stopped objecting to my presence in a space that she had always considered as her private domain. I started harbouring dreams of recognition as a renowned chef. I also started writing at

this late stage in life and another dream was born. I started thinking of winning a Booker prize or a Sahitya Akademi award. Once you have crossed 60, you want to be immortal. What could be better than to be remembered centuries after you are gone? My dream is for my books to occupy pride of place on someone’s bookshelf in the 23rd century; like the books of my favourite author, Charles Dickens, on my bookshelf, 200 years later. I now understand that no dream is irrational, outlandish, bizarre, or not worth pursuing. What is this life if we do not dream and strive for them? We may fail to attain many, but we will succeed in a few. That is what makes life extraordinary. Lee Kuan Yew’s words are apt, “If you are just realistic, you become pedestrian, you will fail. Trump’s win sets stage for ‘America First’ revival

Trump’s second term promises to reshape alliances and influence critical issues, including US-India relations, climate policy and the global energy market

Donald Trump has made history by winning the 2024 US Presidential election, securing 292 Electoral College votes and defeating Kamala Harris, the media’s favoured candidate. His resounding victory marks a significant comeback and has reignited debates globally about what his second term might bring. This election wasn’t without its drama, as Trump survived an assassination attempt on September 15, 2024, amid allegations of interference from powerful interest groups attempting to prevent his reelection. The victory was further shaped by the support of influential figures, including Indian American Vivek Ramaswamy, a former Republican hopeful who backed Trump. “Trump’s comeback is America’s comeback,” Ramaswamy remarked, applauding Trump’s strong persona as a “badass Commander-in-Chief” that many believe the US needs. A substantial part of Trump’s campaign success was due to substantial financial support from allies like Elon Musk, who reportedly contributed \$119 million to the campaign. Musk’s active presence on X (formerly Twitter) and outspoken defence of Trump against media criticism played a key role, particularly in swing states like Texas, Pennsylvania, Georgia, North Carolina and Florida. This unconventional alliance between Trump and Musk has sparked speculation and surprise, even influencing figures abroad, such as Bangladesh’s Chief Advisor Muhammad Yunus. Previously critical of Trump, Yunus has become a reluctant admirer following Trump’s success.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi is also likely pleased with Trump’s return. The two leaders share a warm rapport, marked by a mutual understanding rooted in their strong nationalist stances. Though Modi was unable to meet Trump during his September 2024 visit to the US due to protocol issues, Trump’s victory strengthens India-US ties and suggests a renewed focus on strategic cooperation between the two nations.



Trump’s “America First” policy will likely shape his approach to foreign relations in this term. Expect him to push allies, including NATO and the European Union, to shoulder more of their defence costs. He may scale back US involvement in international conflicts, aiming instead to negotiate peace agreements that align with American interests.

A notable example is his stance on Ukraine: Trump’s re-election could mean a reduction in US military and financial support for Ukraine, possibly pressuring the country toward a peace settlement with Russia—a development that could lead to a significant de-escalation of the conflict. In the Indo-Pacific region, Trump’s focus will likely remain on curbing China’s influence and India could play a pivotal role in these efforts. India’s strategic importance as a counterbalance to China in the region aligns well with Trump’s vision. The US-India partnership could expand in sectors like defence, technology and energy security. Trump’s push for “reshoring” American manufacturing from China may create new investment opportunities for India, especially in high-growth industries like pharmaceuticals, electronics, and renewable energy. Energy collaboration will also likely be a highlight of US-

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India relations. With India’s growing energy needs, Trump’s focus on US energy independence could lead to mutually beneficial trade in oil, natural gas, and renewable technologies, while US firms may look to invest in India’s energy infrastructure. However, Trump’s immigration policies, particularly concerning H-1B visas for skilled workers, may remain a point of contention. While Trump generally supports highly skilled professionals, further restrictions on visas could push India to enhance its own tech ecosystem, promoting more in-country growth and innovation. Trump’s stance on climate change negotiations may remain divisive. Given his scepticism toward multilateral climate agreements, he could once again withdraw the US from global climate accords. This could impact the efficacy of initiatives like the Paris Agreement, where developed countries have pledged \$100 billion to support developing nations. So far, only a fraction of this amount has materialised, raising concerns about the long-term viability of global climate targets. Trump’s reluctance to support these accords without substantial changes could weaken international resolve on climate issues. India will closely watch Trump’s policies on counterterrorism, particularly regard-

ing Pakistan, a country that has historically been linked to terrorism in the region. Trump’s past rhetoric and strong stance against terrorism suggest he may align with India’s concerns. A tougher US stance on Pakistan could address India’s longstanding issues with cross-border terrorism, potentially strengthening US-India ties in this area. Trump’s complex relationship with the US media, especially during the 2024 campaign, added another layer to the narrative. Musk was one of the few who openly supported Trump on X, condemning what they saw as a biased media landscape that often criticised Trump. This approach may have contributed to his strong showing in swing states, bolstered by Musk’s strategic influence on social media. As Trump prepares to re-enter the White House in January 2025, the world anticipates how his policies will unfold. His administration’s priorities are expected to bring significant shifts in US domestic and foreign policy, from trade and immigration to international alliances and climate action. Global leaders and citizens alike are waiting to see how Trump’s assertive approach to governance will redefine America’s role on the world stage. BREAKING THE CYCLE OF BURNOUT

Addressing mental health with managerial support is essential for a healthy workplace

Numerous studies found that high job demands, low control, low social support and job insecurity are significant risk factors for depression in the workplace while, factors such as excessive workload, lack of control, poor work-life balance and unsupportive work environments trigger burnout. Research in all these areas has grown substantially in recent years, revealing valuable insights into how these mental health challenges affect individual employees and organisations. In today's fast-paced and high-pressure work environment, burnout and depression have become prevalent challenges affecting employees across industries. While burnout is often a result of chronic workplace stress characterised by exhaustion, cynicism and a feeling of reduced accomplishment, depression on the other side, is a mental health disorder marked by persistent sadness, lack of motivation and feelings of hopelessness that may affect all areas of a person's life. Both can severely impact employee wellbeing, workplace productivity and organisational success. Burnout and depression in the workplace are typically rooted in multiple factors often exacerbated by modern work conditions and expectations such as excessive workload and unrealistic expectations, lack of control and autonomy, poor work-life balance, toxic work environment and insufficient recognition and reward. There is no denying that when employees lack the time and resources to recover and recharge or have no input into their work, their sense of helplessness can contribute to both, they become more susceptible to burnout and over time, even depression. Moreover, a hostile or untrusting work environment can erode employee morale and mental health contributing to burnout and, in some cases, even depression. The impact of burnout and depression extends beyond individual suffering and affects the workplace as a whole. As stated earlier, to maintain productivity, employees experience burnout and depression which may consequently lead to decline in productivity thereby impacting the profitability and overall performance. It is quite often stated that absenteeism and presenteeism both have significant implications for workplace productivity and team morale. Now when the levels of burnout and depression within an organisation are high, it will create a culture of dissatisfaction, resulting in a lack of engagement and trust among employees and as a result can harm collaboration, innovation and the company's reputation, thereby making it difficult to attract and retain top talent. It will end up driving employees to leave their jobs in search of a healthier work environment. Addressing burnout and depression in the workplace requires both—structural changes within the organisation as well as individual efforts. By creating a culture where employers foster an environment that values open communication and employees express concerns without the fear of stigma or reprisal; training managers to identify symptoms of burnout and depression and to respond effectively; providing small gestures of appreciation through praise, bonuses, or other rewards can significantly improve job satisfaction, and help in reducing stress and the likelihood of burnout. Trump's return and the US-India trade challenge

The evolving global trade landscape may offer India an opportunity to capture markets left by China, positioning it as a key partner in America's strategy to diversify supply chains




The world is galvanised, shaken, in a trance with Donald Trump's return to the US presidency. There are hope, aspirations, anxiety and speculations of a changing world. One knows the reality but the uncertainties around rock. Would it be a stable or turbulent India? Sizeable Indians are celebrating his victory against Kamla Harris, who possibly lost because she is a woman than any other reason. Not surprisingly, Indians obsessed with Trump, who exceeded the limits of decency, in the uses of words and even a 'B...' word are rejoicing. An Indian newspaper headline was eloquent or jocular as its banner blared "Kamala Harris", an intended pun may be to express the happiness that she was destined to lose. 'Harris' in Hindi and some other Indian languages means defeat. So, an unsobor person gets the support against a dignified woman, whose Indian origin did not enamour Indians either in the US or India. Would Trump, supposedly a friend of India, spread out the red carpet for India? Does India matter much for the US, strategically or economically? The US is India's export partner with total exports of \$77.5 billion in FY24 and total bilateral trade was about \$120 billion. Obviously, this balance of trade in favour of India spurs the US to counterbalance it. Trump has often criticised India's trade policies for creating barriers to American products, framing them as unfairly protectionist. During his previous term, Trump argued that India imposes some of the highest tariffs in the world, pointing to examples such as the 100 per cent tariff on Harley-Davidson motorcycles, though it was later reduced by Prime Minister Narendra Modi

terms. The new US President's economic policy is expected to focus on higher tariffs on all imports – 10 per cent across the board, and as high as 60 per cent on those from China, restrictions on immigration as well a reduction of corporate tax rate to 15 per cent for all companies manufacturing in the US. All this could eventually fuel higher inflation in the US and subsequent action by the Federal Reserve. For India, it could impact key export sectors such as pharmaceuticals, textiles and IT services. This may affect sectors where India has maintained high tariffs to protect domestic industries, such as agriculture and manufacturing. This is a highly sensitive issue for the Indian policymakers. The NDA government has taken conscience steps to ensure protection for the domestic industry, agriculture and other sectors. The IT companies, like TCS, Infosys and Wipro, rely heavily on the US for both revenue and talent deployment. "It could make Indian exports less competitive in the US market, impacting revenue," says a report by the economic think tank Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI). It may hit China the most being the largest US trade partner. Many Indians believe that Indian exporters could benefit from the vacuum created as they also expect to fill the Bangladesh garment export fall by 6.2 per cent. The expectations may not be a reality, as the US itself strives to be a manufacturing hub, which is termed "America First". Besides, if a new tariff regime begins it may require intense effort and allowing concessions for increasing Indian exports. While the barriers are high, apart from the government's diplomacy, some large companies are already in touch with the Trump coterie to mollify the issues as they are keen on setting up new ventures in the US or with US companies. His previous immigration policies affected Indian professionals, especially those reliant on H-1B visas. Stricter immigration controls may hinder the mobility of Indian IT workers and engineers to the US, posing potential challenges for the Indian tech industry. The IT companies are giving preference to indigenous US workers. It reduces opportunities for new entrants. India's leading status as a generic drug exporter to the US could be hit with new regulatory hurdles and tariffs, impacting companies like Sun Pharma and Dr Reddy's. Additionally, India's steel and aluminium industries may suffer if Trump reinstates tariffs on these metals, as he did during his previous term. His preference for fossil fuels and his resistance to international climate commitments could discourage joint US-India investments in renewable energy, a priority for India. It could impact Indian solar and renewable energy companies. Trump's support for India in defence and security matters is unpredictable. His prior attempts to mediate between India and Pakistan on issues like Kashmir created unease in New Delhi, which values its autonomy in regional matters. Possibly sensing this China entered into a border agreement with India after four years of logjam. An Indian concern is that the West Asia war zone extends to Iran now. India is simultaneously developing ties with the Taliban in Afghanistan. The recent rate cut by the US Fed Reserve and the latest presidential polls have disturbed Indian stock markets, which continue to fall. Along with this, rupee parity with the dollar touches new lows with a one-day fall of 21 paise to Rs 84.30 on November 6 and a further decline to Rs 84.38 on November 8. It may go down to Rs 85, the market says. There are also positive aspects in the US-India relationships, which Trump ensured earlier too. His personal equation with Prime Minister Narendra Modi had warmed up the ties. It is expected that high-profile events like Howdy Modi in Houston and Namaste Trump at Ahmedabad will be repeated to cement public engagements, and personal diplomacy and strengthen people-to-people ties. Indian exports and trade with the US might increase under Donald Trump for several reasons, despite his protectionist "America First" stance. India, with its growing manufacturing sector and cost advantages, emerged as a potential alternative to China for certain goods. If Trump continues to push for decoupling from China, India could benefit by positioning itself as a substitute supplier in many areas including semiconductors. Despite many issues, it is expected that US firms moving away from China could set up shops in India. Some like Ford set up 200,000 vehicle manufacturing units in Chennai for exports. McDonald's is also expanding. Ups and downs apart, India and the US are likely to have better ties for strategic reasons by engaging in intense negotiations also to end proposed sanctions against 19 Indian companies. *(The author is a senior journalist; views are personal)*

Women waste pickers in India: Transforming waste management amidst challenges

Recognising the intersection of caste, gender and class in the waste sector is essential to building a cleaner, more equitable world for all

In India, women waste pickers play a vital role in waste management, particularly in urban and semi-urban areas. They are part of a larger, often invisible workforce within the informal waste sector, which comprises around 1.5 million workers. These women, mostly from marginalised backgrounds, undertake roles in waste collection, sorting, and sometimes even in supervisory capacities. Despite contributing significantly to recycling operations, they earn approximately 33 per cent less than their male counterparts, underscoring deep-rooted gender inequalities in this sector. The rise of initiatives like the Swachh Bharat Mission

(SBM) has shifted the landscape of waste management in India. Many Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) now employ more women in front-end roles, such as door-to-door waste collection and material sorting at Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs). This inclusion has led to improved Swachh Survekshan rankings for these ULBs, reflecting

enhanced cleanliness and waste management efficiency. Despite this progress, women waste pickers continue to face multifaceted challenges, including gender-based violence, caste discrimination and limited economic mobility. **Case Studies:** Studies from cities like Ambikapur, Bengaluru, and Tinsukia highlight the significant positive changes brought about by involving women in waste management. **Ambikapur, Chhattisgarh:** With a population of around 146,000, Ambikapur became the cleanest town in its population category, mainly due to a large female workforce in waste management. Out of 550 jobs created, 457 were filled by women, resulting in

an 80 per cent female workforce that greatly contributed to cleanliness and operational efficiency. **Bengaluru, Karnataka:** In collaboration with the NGO Hasiru Dala, Bengaluru created over 1,200 jobs in the waste sector, with 92 per cent occupied by women. These women played various roles, from collecting fees to supervising sorting operations, positively impacting the city's cleanliness and Swachh Survekshan rankings. **Tinsukia, Assam:** Once one of the dirtiest towns in Assam, Tinsukia witnessed a remarkable transformation due to the involvement of women waste workers employed by an NGO. Of 108 jobs created for waste collection and supervision,

46 were allocated to women, enabling the town to achieve the status of the fastest-moving clean city in its category. **Challenges Faced by Women Waste Pickers:** Despite their essential contributions, women in the waste sector face a range of difficulties. Hazardous working conditions expose them to toxins and diseases and their work often goes unrecognised. Many women waste pickers are Dalits or

Adivasis who endure societal stigma, which reinforces their marginalisation and limits their social mobility. They lack access to formal recognition, fair wages and safety measures, making them some of the most vulnerable in India's workforce. The absence of specific policies addressing women waste pickers aggravates these issues. The informal nature of their work, coupled with limited research on gender dynamics in waste management, restricts policy interventions, leaving women out of leadership roles and decision-making processes. **Intersection of Caste and Gender in Waste Work** Caste adds another layer to the marginalisation of women in waste management. Often seen as "dirty work," waste picking and sorting are stigmatised, especially for women from marginalised castes. This reinforces social hierarchies that exclude them from fair participation and economic upliftment. Scholars like Nancy Fraser and Martha Chen emphasise that caste and gender intersectionality compounds discrimination, limiting women's bargaining power and political representation in waste management. Addressing such complex intersections requires policies that recognise these overlapping identities and create inclusive opportunities for women waste pickers. To address these challenges and create a more equitable waste management system,

policies should adopt a gender-sensitive approach, ensuring that women have access to leadership roles and opportunities for entrepreneurial development. By promoting women in management roles, their economic empowerment and social standing can be enhanced. The inclusion of women not only enhances cleanliness but also contributes to larger goals of social justice and economic empowerment. Trump, Putin discuss ending war in Ukraine, but Kremlin denies

US President-elect Donald Trump spoke to Russian President Vladimir Putin over the phone and discussed ending the war in Ukraine amongst many other important topics, according to a media report. However, Kremlin spokesperson Dmitry Peskov denied the media report of the phone call between Putin and Trump. After winning the recent presidential elections, Trump has spoken to over 70 world leaders. Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu were among the firsts. “The two men discussed the goal of peace on the European

continent and Trump expressed an interest in follow-up conversations to discuss ‘the resolution of Ukraine’s war soon,” one of the people said,” The Washington Post said in an exclusive report published on Sunday. One former US official who was familiar with the Putin call said that Trump likely does not want to enter office with a fresh crisis in Ukraine prompted by Russian escalation, “giving him the incentive to want to keep the war from worsening,” the daily said. Trump is scheduled to be sworn in as the 47th President of the United States on January 20, 2025. Ukraine has been

informed about the Trump-Putin call. “During the call, which Trump took from his resort in Florida, he advised the Russian president not to escalate the war in Ukraine and reminded him of Washington’s sizable military presence in Europe, said a person familiar with the call, who, like others interviewed for this story, spoke on the condition of anonymity to discuss a sensitive matter,” The Washington Post reported. However, Kremlin spokesman Peskov in Moscow said the Western media reports of the phone call between Putin and Trump are “untrue”, state-run TASS news agency reported.

“There was no conversation... This is completely untrue; it’s pure fiction,” Peskov said. Meanwhile, Steven Cheung, Trump’s communications director, told PTI he would not comment on the private calls between President-elect Trump and other world leaders. “President Trump won a historic election decisively and leaders from around the world know America will return to prominence on the world stage. That is why leaders have begun the process of developing stronger relationships with the 45th and 47th President because he represents global peace and stability,” Cheung said.

Russian glide bombs, drones, ballistic missile kill 6, injure 30 in Ukraine

Russian glide bombs, drones and a ballistic missile smashed into cities in southern and eastern Ukraine on Monday, officials said, killing at least six civilians and injuring about 30 others. Russia recently intensified strikes that have long tormented civilian areas, Ukraine President Volodymyr

Zelenskyy said, in an apparent effort to unnerve Ukrainians and wear down their willingness to keep up a war that is approaching its 1,000-day milestone. “Every day, every night, Russia commits the same terror,” Zelenskyy said in a post on the Telegram messaging app. “Except that an increasing number of civilian objects are becoming targets.” Both Russia and Ukraine are waiting to see how Washington will change its policy on the war after Donald Trump takes office in January. The US is the biggest provider of military help to Ukraine but Trump has chided the Biden administration for giving Kyiv tens of billions of dollars of aid.

The major cities struck Monday by Russia are close to the war’s around 1,000-km (600-mile) front line. Russian drones hammered the southern city of Mykolaiv, killing five people and injuring a 45-year-old woman, local

authorities said. Around two dozen people sought psychological help following the attack that damaged houses and stores, officials said. Mykolaiv, located about 60 km (37 miles) northwest of the front line in the Kherson region, frequently comes under Russian attack. An overnight attack on Zaporizhzhia, also in the south, with three powerful glide bombs killed one person and injured 21, including a 4-year-old boy, Ukraine’s National Police said. The strikes partially destroyed a two-story apartment building and damaged a dormitory. A five-story apartment building in Kryvyi Rih, Zelenskyy’s hometown in central Ukraine, was hit by a Russian ballistic

missile, injuring at least eight people. Emergency services were searching through the rubble, Oleksandr Vikul, head of Kryvyi Rih Military Administration said. The missile destroyed all five stories in one part of the building, he said. Meanwhile, Ukraine’s intelligence agency claimed in a statement it destroyed a Russian Mi-24 assault helicopter parked at the Klin-5 airfield in the Moscow region. The claim could not be independently verified. The Russian Defence Ministry said Monday that 17 Ukrainian drones were destroyed over the Russian regions of Kursk, Belgorod and Voronezh overnight and in the morning.

Netanyahu admits Israel’s role in pager, walkie-talkie attacks on Hezbollah

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for the first time admitted that Israel was behind the pager and walkie-talkie attacks on Hezbollah in September that left at least 39 people dead and more than 3,000 injured, local media reports have said. “The pager operation and the elimination of (Hezbollah leader Hassan) Nasrallah were carried out despite the opposition of senior officials in the defence establishment and those responsible for them in the political echelon,” The Times of Israel newspaper quoted Netanyahu as saying. Netanyahu’s remarks came during Sunday’s weekly Cabinet meeting, according to Hebrew

media reports. Israel had so far not taken responsibility publicly for the attacks, but it was widely speculated that it was behind the complex successfully orchestrated attacks that took the world by surprise. Thousands of pagers containing explosives exploded on their Hezbollah owners across Lebanon and parts of Syria on September 16. While the world was still absorbing the news of pager explosions, walkie-talkies met the same fate a day later on September 17, shocking the world at the level of Israeli intelligence’s preparation in its war against the Lebanese Shia militia. Netanyahu’s statement is being interpreted in the context of his firing of Defence Minister Yoav

Gallant and efforts to shore up personal popularity by taking credit for war successes. Gallant was fired from the defence minister’s position on November 5. Netanyahu and Gallant have clashed repeatedly over the course of their time in government together. Netanyahu also tried to get rid of him in March 2023 as well, a day after Gallant called for pausing the legislation process of the government’s contentious judicial overhaul plan arguing that it caused divisions that posed a threat to national security, but had to reinstate him due to massive public protests. He was the defence minister when Hamas committed its deadly terror assault in southern

Israel on October 7 last year and had so far carried out his duties in the subsequent war in the Gaza Strip, the fighting on the northern border, and the ground operation in southern Lebanon. In a press conference on Tuesday, Gallant said that he was fired because of differences on the issue of the need to draft ultra-orthodox men in the Israel Defence Forces, the imperative to bring back the hostages from Gaza, and the need for establishing a state commission of inquiry to look into the October 7 Hamas terror attack and the ensuing war. Netanyahu has resisted taking responsibility for the country’s security oversights, blaming Israel’s security forces for the failure to foresee Hamas’ October 7 massacre.

Israeli strike kills 3 in central Gaza

Palestinian medical officials say an Israeli strike hit a tent sheltering a displaced family in the central Gaza Strip, killing at least three people, including the parents of twins. The strike late Sunday in the urban Nuseirat refugee camp wounded the two children, aged 10, who were being treated for serious injuries at the Al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital in the nearby city of Deir al-Balah. The details of the casualties were listed in hospital records and an Associated Press reporter saw two of the bodies. The Israeli military says it only targets militants and accuses them of hiding among civilians. Palestinians reported heavy bombing late Sunday in the western areas of Nuseirat camp, which dates back to the 1948 war surrounding Israel’s creation. At least 24 people were wounded and taken to the Awda hospital in Nuseirat, said Mohamed Muhareb, head of



the hospital’s ambulance service. The Israel-Hamas war began after militants stormed into Israel on Oct 7, 2023, killing some 1,200 people — mostly civilians — and abducting 250 others. Israel’s military response

in Gaza has killed more than 43,000 people, Palestinian health officials say. They do not distinguish between civilians and combatants, but say more than half of those killed were women and children. Hezbollah began firing into

Israel on Oct 8, 2023, in solidarity with Hamas in the Gaza Strip. Since the conflict erupted, more than 3,100 people have been killed and nearly 13,900 wounded in Lebanon, the health ministry reported.

Japan’s parliament re-elects Ishiba as PM despite his coalition’s recent loss

Japan’s parliament reelected Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba on Monday after his governing coalition suffered the worst election loss in more than a decade, forcing the struggling leader to form his second Cabinet in just over a month since taking office. Ishiba’s ruling Liberal Democratic Party and its junior partner Komeito together lost their majority in the 465-seat Lower House, the more powerful of Japan’s two-house parliament, in the Oct 27 election due to continued voter outrage over financial misconduct by his party and its lukewarm response.

A special parliamentary session convened Monday to pick a new leader in a vote required within 30 days of a general election. Ishiba beat top opposition leader Yoshihiko Noda 221-160 in the first runoff in 30 years. Ishiba reappointed most of his previous Cabinet members, including Foreign Minister Takeshi Iwaya, Defence Minister Gen Nakatani and Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshimasa Hayashi, but had to replace three who lost seats or were affected by the election results. Ishiba is expected to hold a news conference to explain his new Cabinet and policies. Ishiba has refused to step down

and showed willingness to cooperate with additional coalition partners to boost stability and help him pursue his party’s policies. Ishiba will struggle in the coming months as he must gain consent from the opposition on policies including the budget and other legislation, experts say. He is eyeing a rising smaller, conservative opposition, the Democratic Party for the People, whose seats quadrupled to 28 under its popular leader Yuichiro Tamaki, whose proposal for raising the basic tax-free income allowance and increasing take-home wages garnered support

from low income and younger voters. Tamaki only wants to cooperate with Ishiba’s party on policy — not as part of a coalition — since he wants to use his leverage to increase his party’s standing ahead of the next election. However, Tamaki was recently stung by a magazine article exposing an extramarital affair, which he admitted to on Monday. Ishiba’s government is preparing for his trip later this month to Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation and Group of 20 summits, as well as a possible meeting with President-elect Donald Trump on his way home.

Trump names Tom Homan as ‘border czar’

AP ■ NEW YORK

President-elect Donald Trump says that Tom Homan, his former acting US Immigration and Customs Enforcement director, will serve as “border czar” in his incoming administration. “I am pleased to announce that the Former ICE Director, and stalwart on Border Control, Tom Homan, will be joining the Trump Administration, in charge of our Nation’s Borders,” he wrote late Sunday on his Truth Social site. Homan was widely expected to be offered a position related to the border and Trump’s pledge to launch the largest deportation operation in the country’s history. In addition to overseeing the southern and northern borders and “maritime, and aviation security,” Trump said Homan “will be in charge of all Deportation of Illegal Aliens back to their Country of Origin,” a central part of his agenda. He says he had “no doubt” Homan “will do a fantastic, and long awaited for, job.” Such a role does not require Senate confirmation. In an interview on Fox News Channel’s “Sunday Morning Futures,” Homan said the military would not be rounding up and arresting immigrants in the country illegally and that ICE would move to implement Trump’s plans in a “humane manner.” “It’s going to be a well-targeted, planned operation conducted by the men of ICE. The men and women of ICE do this daily. They’re good at it,” he said. “When we go out there, we’re going to know who we’re looking for. We most likely know where they’re going to be, and it’s going to be done in a humane manner.”

China working on nuclear propulsion for new aircraft carrier

China has built a land-based prototype nuclear reactor for a large surface warship, in the clearest sign yet Beijing is advancing toward producing its first nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, according to a new analysis of satellite imagery and Chinese government documents. China’s navy is already the world’s largest numerically, and it has been rapidly modernising. Adding nuclear-powered carriers to its fleet would be a major step in realising its ambitions for a true “blue-water” force capable of operating in seas far from China in a growing global challenge to the United States. “Nuclear-powered carriers would place China in the exclusive ranks of first-class naval powers, a group currently limited to the United States and France,” said Tong Zhao, a senior fellow at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace in Washington, DC. “For China’s leadership, such a development would symbolise national prestige, fueling domestic nationalism and elevating the country’s global image as a leading power.” Researchers at the Middlebury Institute of International Studies in California said they made the finding while investigating a mountain site outside the city of Leshan in the southwest Chinese province of Sichuan, where they suspected China was building a reactor to pro-

duce plutonium or tritium for weapons. Instead they concluded that China was building a prototype reactor for a large warship. The project at Leshan is dubbed the Longwei, or Dragon Might, Project and is also referred to as the Nuclear Power Development Project in documents provided to The Associated Press. Neither China’s Defence Ministry nor Foreign Affairs Ministry responded to requests for comment. There have long been rumours that China is planning to build a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, but the research by the Middlebury team is the first to confirm that China is working on a nuclear-powered propulsion system for a carrier-sized surface warship. “The reactor prototype at Leshan is the first solid evidence that China is, in fact, developing a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier,” said Jeffrey Lewis, a professor at Middlebury and one of the researchers on the project. “Operating a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier is an exclusive club, one that China looks set to join.” Drawing on satellite images and public documents including project tenders, personnel files, environmental impact studies — and even a citizen’s complaint about noisy construction and excessive dust — they concluded a prototype reactor for naval propulsion was being built in the mountains of Mucheng township, some 70 miles (112 kilometers) southwest of Sichuan’s provincial capital Chengdu.

RBI issues framework for reclassification of FPI to FDI

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) on Monday issued an operational framework for reclassification of investment made by a foreign portfolio investor to foreign direct investment (FDI) if the entity breaches the prescribed limit. Currently, an investment made by foreign portfolio investor along with its investor group (FPI) should be less than 10 per cent of the total paid-up equity capital on a fully diluted basis. Any FPI investing in breach of the prescribed limit has the option of divesting their holdings or reclassifying such holdings as FDI subject to the conditions specified by the RBI and Sebi within five trading days from the date of



settlement of the trades causing the breach. The RBI has issued an operational framework for reclassification of foreign portfolio investment by FPI

to FDI. As per the framework, the FPI concerned will have to take necessary approvals from the government and concurrence of the Indian

investee company concerned. However, the facility of reclassification shall not be permitted in any sector prohibited for FDI, the RBI said.

For reclassification, the entire investment held by such FPI should be reported within the timelines as specified under the Foreign Exchange Management (Mode of Payment and Reporting of Non-Debt Instruments) Regulations, 2019. Post completion of reporting, the FPI should approach its Custodian with a request for transferring the equity instruments of the Indian company from its demat account maintained for holding foreign portfolio investments to its demat account maintained for holding FDI, the RBI said. The directions have become operative with immediate effect, the central bank added.

IRF writes to PM expressing concern at growing road fatalities in India

The International Road Federation (IRF) has written a letter to Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressing concern at growing number of road accident fatalities in the country. IRF president emeritus K K Kapila in the letter suggested implementing strategies aimed at raising awareness, influencing policy, and advancing road safety measures. According to the latest government data, about 5 lakh road accidents occur in India annually. Of this, there are 1.5 lakh fatalities, while 3 lakh suffer injuries. Recently, Road Transport and Highways Minister Nitin Gadkari had



highlighted that this caused 3 per cent loss to the country's GDP. "Despite running of various campaigns involving road safety by the government, corporates and non-government bodies, India remains one of the most dangerous places for road users," Kapila said. He further said it is therefore, essential to galvanize public awareness, political will, and continuous engagement at

every level of society. As the leader of the nation and someone who embodies India's values and aspirations, IRF humbly requests the Prime Minister's support in promoting road safety initiatives, Kapila said. Some of the suggestions and actions made by IRF include incorporating road safety into PM's various addresses with a brief mention of road safety, the importance of obeying traffic rules, and reducing road fatalities, which could reach millions of people, especially youth. Other suggestions are spreading the road safety anthem prepared by IRF in 23 Indian languages and 10 foreign languages in schools, offices etc.

Sensex, Nifty close flat amid unabated foreign fund outflows, muted earnings

Benchmark stock indices Sensex and Nifty closed flat in highly volatile trade on Monday as continuous FII selling, disappointing quarterly earnings and weak trends from Asian markets dented investor sentiment. After gyrating between highs and lows, benchmark Sensex eked out gains of 9.83 points or 0.01 per cent to settle at 79,496.15. The barometer gyrated 1,100.8 points between the day's high of 80,102.14 and a low of 79,001.34. The NSE Nifty dipped marginally by 6.90 points or 0.03 per cent to 24,141.30. From the 30-share Sensex pack, Asian Paints tumbled over 8 per cent after the company on Saturday reported a 43.71 per cent decline in consolidated net profit to Rs 693.66 crore for

the September quarter, impacted by soft-demand conditions, material price inflation and a decline in decorative and coatings business in the domestic market. Tata Steel, Bajaj Finance, Mahindra & Mahindra, JSW Steel, NTPC, Adani Ports, Bajaj Finserv and Larsen & Toubro were also among the laggards. However, Power Grid, HCL Technologies, Infosys, Tech Mahindra, Tata Consultancy Services and ICICI Bank were among the gainers. Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth Rs 3,404.04 crore on Friday, according to exchange data. Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP (Research), Mehta Equities Ltd, said, Indian markets remain under pressure, largely due to relentless foreign investor selling.

"The actions of FIIs are dominating the current market momentum, which is backed by a weak set of earnings and expectations from Trump policy. The risk of further downgrades in Nifty earnings casts clouds over investor sentiment, while the IT sector continued to outperform due to the strong US dollar and in anticipation of a revamp in US IT spending," Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Financial Services said. India is also looking forward to the CPI data with a muted view as food prices are likely to be higher on MoM basis, essentially forging RBI to hold the interest rates in the short term, Nair added. In Asian markets, Seoul and Hong Kong settled lower while Tokyo and Shanghai ended higher. European markets were trading on a firm note. Wall Street ended in positive territory on Friday. Global oil benchmark Brent crude declined 0.83 per cent to USD 73.26 a barrel. On Friday, the BSE benchmark gauge declined by 55.47 points or 0.07 per cent to settle at 79,486.32. The Nifty dipped 51.15 points or 0.21 per cent to 24,148.20.

Star India to make web series on Reserve bank

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI), which was set up in 1935, completed 90 years in April this year. While Zee Entertainment Network and Discovery Communications India did not qualify beyond the technical evaluation round, Star India Pvt Ltd and Viacom 18 made it to the final round. According to the RBI, Star India has been awarded the tender for Rs 6.5 crore to make the web series. As per the RFP document, the RBI had desired the creation of a web series of



five episodes of approximately 25-30 minutes each, which can be aired on national TV channels and/or OTT platforms, commemorating 90 years journey of the RBI. The five-episode series will serve as a valuable resource for enhancing public understanding of the central bank's vital role in the economy, fostering greater engagement, and building trust and confidence in its operations and policies," said the RBI's Request for Proposal (RFP) issued in July. The series aims to highlight the central bank's vision and mission, showcase its significant achievements and initiatives, and provide insights into ongoing developments and collaborations. "Through compelling storytelling, expert interviews, and high-quality visuals, the web series seeks to enhance transparency and build trust in the central bank's operations and policies," the RBI has said while inviting the bids. The series aims to make complex financial concepts accessible and interesting to a broad audience, thereby, contributing to financial literacy.

Sugs Lloyd emerges as lowest bidder for two govt projects worth Rs 300 crore in Bihar

Equity mutual funds see record ₹ 41,887 crore inflow in October

Equity mutual funds witnessed a record inflow of Rs 41,887 crore in October, marking a surge of over 21 per cent on a month-on-month (MoM) basis, fuelled by robust investments in thematic funds. This also marks the 44th consecutive month of net inflow in the equity-oriented funds, highlighting the ever-increasing appeal of mutual funds among investors, data with the Association of Mutual Funds in India (AMFI) showed on Monday. "October's numbers are indeed phenomenal, especially given the backdrop of a steep market correction. While earlier this year,



equity inflows were buoyed by strong market performance, October marked a stark reversal. "The 5-6 per cent drop in both the Sensex and Nifty was one of the sharpest in recent years, similar to what we last saw in March 2020. Despite this, retail investors have shown remarkable resilience, with inflows

exceeding Rs 40,000 crore," Santosh Joseph, Co-founder and CEO of Germinate Investor Services, said. Overall, the mutual fund industry witnessed an inflow of Rs 2.4 lakh crore in the month under review, after an outflow of Rs 71,114 crore in September. The huge inflow was due to investments to the tune of Rs

1.57 lakh crore into debt schemes. The industry's net assets under management rose to Rs 67.25 lakh crore last month from Rs 67 lakh crore in September. As per the data, equity-oriented schemes witnessed an inflow of Rs 41,887 crore in October, as compared to Rs 34,419 crore in September. Before this, equity schemes saw an inflow of Rs 40,608 crore in June. Within the equity schemes, sectoral thematic attracted investors with the highest net inflows of Rs 12,279 crore during the month under review. However, flow in the segment was less compared to Rs 13,255 crore in September.

Coca-Cola India FY24 profit falls 42 per cent to ₹ 420.29 crore revenue rises 4 per cent to ₹ 4,713.38 crore

Beverages major Coca-Cola India's consolidated profit fell 41.82 per cent to Rs 420.29 crore in FY24 while its revenue rose 4.24 per cent to Rs 4,713.38 crore, according to the company's filing to RoC (Registrar of Companies). Its total income, which also includes other income, was up 4.19 per cent to Rs 4,801.84 crore during the fiscal ended March 2024, according to financial data accessed through business intelligence platform Tofler. In FY23, Coca-Cola India Pvt Ltd, an unlisted entity, had reported a net profit of Rs 722.44 crore and revenue from operations at Rs 4,521.31 crore. Its expenses on advertising and sales promotion were up 35.47 per cent to Rs 1,520.21 crore during the financial year under review. This was at Rs 1,122.11 crore a year ago.



Moreover, royalties paid to its US-based parent the Coca-Cola Company also went up 4.68 per cent to Rs 507.51 crore. The total tax expense of Coca-Cola India in FY24 was down 35.34 per cent to Rs 171.42 crore. This was at Rs 265.14 crore a year earlier. Coca-Cola India's total expenses in FY24 was up 16.27 per cent to Rs 4,210.11 crore.

The company, which operates with power brands in Indian markets, including Coca-Cola, Thums Up, Limca, Sprite, Maaza and Minute Maid, is owned by Atlanta-based US beverages major The Coca-Cola Company. India is the fifth largest market for Coca-Cola. Besides, Coca-Cola also has a bottling unit, Hindustan Coca-Cola Beverages (HCCB) Private Ltd, which operates 16 plants.

India beat Malaysia 4-0 in women's ACT hockey opener

Young striker Sangita Kumari scored a brace as defending champions India defeated Malaysia 4-0 to open their campaign at the women's Asian Champions Trophy hockey tournament on a confident note here on Monday. Sangita (8th, 55th minutes) struck twice, while Preeti Dubey (43rd) and Uditia (44th) were the other goal getters for the hosts. India will next play South Korea on Tuesday. In other matches of the day, Japan and Korea played out a 2-2 draw, while reigning Olympic silver medallist China thrashed Thailand 15-0. The Indians completely dominated the proceedings in the first quarter even though Malaysia had the first shy at the goal in the form of a penalty corner in the fifth minute which they wasted. Thereafter, it was India all the way as they mounted attack after attack to put pressure on the Malaysian defence. India secured two penalty corners in two minutes and Sangita scored with a variation from the second effort in the eighth minute. Preeti then came close to doubling



India's lead twice. First, her push from close range was saved by the Malaysian goalkeeper, and then a minute from the first quarter, she

struck the side post. Just seconds from the first quarter, India secured another penalty corner but wasted the opportunity.

India continued in the same vein and dominated the share of exchanges with persistent attacks on Malaysia but lacked the

finishing touch. The Indians earned four penalty corners in the second quarter but failed to capitalise on a single opportunity to go into the breather with a slim one goal lead despite dominating the match. A minute later, India extended their lead when Uditia found the net with a slap shot from another penalty corner. The Indian secured yet another penalty corner in the 50th minute but this time Uditia's slap shot was saved by the Malaysian goalkeeper. Five minutes from the final hooter, Sangita scored a brilliant field goal. She first collected an excellent through pass from the deep, ran past two defenders and slammed the ball into the net with a fierce reverse shot.



Barcelona hit by absence of injured Yamal, loses to Sociedad in Spanish league

Missing injured Lamine Yamal, Barcelona saw its seven-game winning run come to an end with a 1-0 loss at Real Sociedad in the Spanish league. Yamal, one of the team's key players this season under new coach Hansi Flick, was ruled out before the game because of a right ankle injury. He was replaced by Fermin López and the team's attack - by far the best in the league with 40 goals scored in 13 matches - struggled in the Basque Country, unable to get a single attempt on target against Sociedad. Sheraldo Becker scored a 33rd-minute winner to move Sociedad, which had lost two of its last three games in all competitions, to eighth place. Barcelona has a six-point lead over second-place Real Madrid, which routed Osasuna 4-0 at home on Saturday with a hat trick from Vinicius Júnior. Madrid has a game in hand after its visit to Valencia was postponed because of the deadly floods in the Valencia region. "We have to analyze what happened and keep working after the international break," Barcelona midfielder Pedri said. "We have been playing well and we are still in first place." Barcelona had won seven in a row in all competitions since a 4-2 loss at Osasuna in the league in September. Its only other loss this season had been at Monaco in the Champions League. All of its other 14 matches were victories. Barcelona striker Robert Lewandowski, the league's leading scorer with 14 goals, had a first-half goal disallowed for offside. **Yamal injury** Barcelona said Yamal sustained a "severe right ankle contusion" in last Wednesday's game against Red Star in the Champions League. "Over the past few days, he has

undergone treatment, but the discomfort has yet to subside. His recovery will determine his availability," the club said. Flick said the club tested Yamal on Sunday to see if he could play "but it was not possible." Atletico Madrid back in third place Julián Álvarez scored a second-half winner as Atletico Madrid moved back into third place with a 1-0 victory at Mallorca. That left Atletico one point behind Madrid. It moved two points ahead of Villarreal, which defeated visiting Alaves 3-0 on Saturday. Álvarez scored Atletico's winner in the 61st minute after Giuliano Simeone's assist. Simeone, the son of Atletico coach Diego Simeone, beat a defender to a long pass and set Álvarez for an easy strike from close range. Goalkeeper Jan Oblak had another solid performance for Atletico, which earned its seventh clean sheet in the league this season, the most by any club. Atletico was coming off a 2-1 midweek win at Paris Saint-Germain in the Champions League. **Betis draws late** Marc Bartra scored a stoppage-time equalizer as seventh-place Real Betis salvaged a 2-2 home draw against 11th-place Celta Vigo. Celta had moved ahead with Anastasios Douvikas' goal in the 82nd. The visitors earlier took the lead through Javi Rodríguez in the 13th before Vitor Roque equalized for Betis in the 40th. **Other results** Midtable Girona won 1-0 at 17th-place Getafe with a first-half goal by Yangel Herrera, while sixth-place Athletic Bilbao was held at second-to-last-place Valladolid, with the Basque Country club earning the equalizer with Gorka Guruzeta in stoppage time after the hosts had taken the lead with Raúl Moro in the 79th.



Sindhu, Lakshya hope to regain form at Kumamoto Masters Japan

round exit to Canada's Michelle Li in Finland, made it to the quarterfinals in Odense but lost to Paris bronze medallist Gregoria Mariska Tunjung of Indonesia in a tense deciding game. Lakshya, on the other hand, fell short against Chinese Taipei's Chou Tien Chen and China's Lu Guang Zu in Finland and Odense. Despite these setbacks, Sindhu has expressed confidence in her preparations, having worked closely with new coaches Anup Sridhar and Korean legend Lee Syun Il. "I'm in good shape, physically and mentally fit," said Sindhu, who will open her campaign against eighth-seeded Thai Busanan Ongbamrungphan. "We've been working on

different aspects, like speed and defence. I hope to perform well in Japan and China with their guidance." In the men's singles, Lakshya possesses the game to challenge the world's best, but his mental resilience has been questioned following his near-miss at the Tokyo Olympics, where he slipped from a medal position in a heartbreaking loss. The 23-year-old will open against Malaysia's Leong Jun Hao, with a potential showdown against eighth seed Anthony Ginting of Indonesia in the next round. The only other Indian pair in action will be the women's doubles team of Treasa Jolly and Gayatri Gopichand, who will face Taipei's Hsu Yin-Hui and Lin Jhih Yun in their opening match.

Waring had taken control of the first event of the new DP World Tour Play-Offs with a course-record 61 at Yas Links on Friday but saw his five-shot halfway lead reduced to one as he posted a 73 a day later. The 39-year-old, whose only previous DP World Tour title came at the Nordea Masters more than six years ago, made a fast start with two opening birdies and added two more at the seventh and 10th. He responded to being caught by Hatton with a moment of

magic as he converted from 40 feet at the 17th, before hitting a perfect drive at the last, running a three-wood through the back of the green and getting up and down to seal victory. McIlroy had the chance to make his lead in the Race to Dubai Rankings in Partnership with Rolex unassailable and was first to make an early charge as the four-time Major winner birdied four of his first six holes. He bogied the fifth and added five more gains to sign for a 64, but the Race continues into the season-ending DP World Tour Championship after closest challenger Thriston Lawrence recorded two eagles and four birdies in his round of 64 to get to 20 under and a tie for sixth alongside two-time Abu Dhabi HSBC Championship winner Tommy Fleetwood, and French pair Ugo Coussaud and Antoine Rozner.

Arsenal's winless run goes on after 1-1 draw with Chelsea and Man United beats Leicester 3-0

Arsenal's Premier League title challenge took another hit after a 1-1 draw with Chelsea. It's now four games without a win in the league for Mikel Arteta's team, which is nine points behind leader Liverpool. While a point saw Arsenal climb up to fourth in the standings, its winless run has seen a gap open up at the top. Chelsea is third, ahead of Arsenal on goal difference. Gabriel Martinelli had fired Arsenal in front in the 60th minute at Stamford Bridge, but Pedro Neto equalized 10 minutes later. "It's about transforming these performances into victories," Arteta said afterward. Arsenal was runner-up to Manchester City in each of the last two seasons and expected to be the closest rival to the defending champion again. Instead it is Liverpool, under new manager Arne Slot, that has powered ahead at the start of the campaign and taken advantage of the faltering form of both City and Arsenal. City is five points back in second after two-straight losses in

the league. "It is a long season - long way to go. We had a tough period in December last season and came back," Arsenal captain Martin Odegaard told Sky Sports, as reported by the BBC. Odegaard was making his first start since sustaining ankle ligament damage in September. "We know the quality and mentality we have and we just have to keep going." Behind the top two the league is bunching up. Just four points separate Chelsea and 13th-place Manchester United after 11 rounds of the season. **Injury concerns** Declan Rice went into the match with a broken toe and was taken off in the 71st, while Bukayo Saka was substituted 10 minutes later, placing doubts over whether they will be available for England's Nation League games against Greece and the Republic of Ireland. "I don't know whether to expect them to be fit, because if not they don't come off," Arteta said. **New era** Over to you Ruben Amorim. United's incoming head coach will



take over a team on the up after a 3-0 win against Leicester made it four games unbeaten in all competitions under interim boss Ruud van Nistelrooy. Amorim officially starts on Monday after serving out his notice period at Sporting Lisbon -

where his last game in charge Sunday was a 4-2 win at Braga in the Portuguese league - and comes into a club that looks to be in a much healthier position than it was when Erik ten Hag was fired at the end of last month. "We said Let's make the most of

these four games, get the maximum out of it, and I think we did an okay job," Van Nistelrooy said. "I really enjoyed it, it's been a short but amazing period." Van Nistelrooy, Ten Hag's former assistant and an iconic striker for the club in his playing days, has

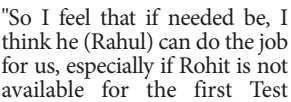
secured three wins and a draw during his four-game temporary reign. Now he is seeking clarity from United's hierarchy about his own future once Amorim takes over. "I expect to hear today or tomorrow from them," he said. On his 250th appearance for the club Bruno Fernandes scored with a brilliant curling shot from the edge of the area in the 17th minute at Old Trafford. His effort in the 38th then saw Victor Kristiansen accidentally divert the ball past Leicester goalkeeper Mads Hermansen to double United's lead before the break. Substitute Alejandro Garnacho scored an even more spectacular goal than Fernandes' in the 82nd when sweeping the ball into the top corner from outside the box. Fernandes said later that the Argentina international didn't fully celebrate the goal because he believes some fans have lost faith in him. **Newcastle fights back** Nottingham Forest's rise has been one of the stories of the season, but it missed the chance to close the

gap on Manchester City in second after falling 3-1 to Newcastle. City's 2-1 loss against Brighton on Saturday meant Forest could have moved to within a point of Pep Guardiola's team and it got off to an ideal start through Murillo's goal in the 21st at the City Ground. But second-half goals from Alexander Isak, Joelinton and Harvey Barnes completed eighth-place Newcastle's comeback. Defeat saw Forest drop from third to fifth on goal difference. **Ipswich wins** Ipswich won for the first time in the league this season with a 2-1 victory at Tottenham that saw it climb out of the relegation zone. It was promoted Ipswich's first Premier League win in 22 years. Ipswich was the only top-flight team without a win heading into Sunday and led 2-0 at halftime against a Spurs side that could have moved into the top four with victory. Sam Szmodics and Liam Delap put Ipswich in control at that break. Rodrigo Bentancur pulled one back for Tottenham, but couldn't prevent Ange Postecoglou's team falling to a fifth league loss this season.

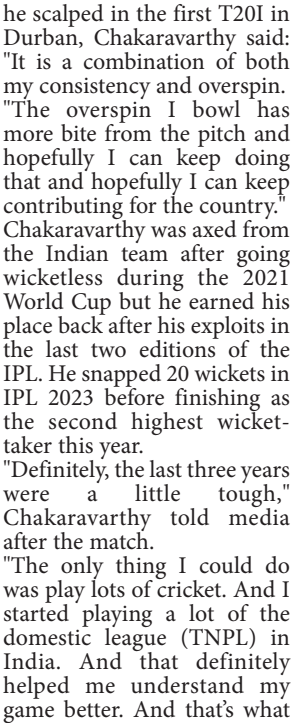

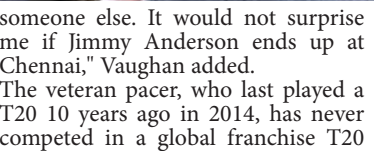
