The Andhra Pradesh government presented its budget for 2024-25 on Monday, November 11, 2024, totalling Rs 2.94 lakh crore. Finance Minister Payyavula Keshav introduced the Budget in the State Legislative Assembly, highlighting key allocations to enhance education, healthcare, rural development, and social welfare.

In his speech, Minister Keshav acknowledged the financial challenges the State is grappling with and accused the previous YSR Congress Party (YSRCP) government of mismanaging finances. He criticised the former administration for violating the Fiscal Responsibility and Budget Management (FRBM) guidelines, resulting in excessive debt. According to Keshav, this has severely strained the state's fiscal health. Anitha hails Rs 8,495 cr for Home Ministry

Home Minister V. Anitha has welcomed the allocation of Rs 8,495 crore for the Home Department in the 2024-25 budget, asserting that the Budget reflects a strong commitment to development and welfare.

Speaking in response to the budgetary allocations on Monday, the Home Minister said that the substantial allocation of Rs 8,495 crore would restore the past glory of the State Home Ministry and the Police Department. She expressed confidence that this allocation

would greatly benefit law enforcement and security personnel in the state. "For the first time, the Police Department has received a record allocation of Rs 8,495 crore in the 2024-25 budget. Under the previous YSRCP government, the Home Ministry was allocated insufficient funds, leaving the police force under-equippe etruggling with inadequate facilities," Anitha lamented. "Now, with this significant budget allocation, the much-needed amenities will be provided to our police personnel."

Missing files raise questions over Rushikonda Resort demolition

PNS VISAKHAPATNAM

A concerning pattern of missing files linked to the controversial demolition of the consequent construction of a new palace has prompted serious questions regarding transparency and accountability within the Andhra Pradesh Tourism Development Corporation (APTDC). Key documents, including construction permits for the new palace and records pertaining to the resort's demolition, have reportedly vanished, raising alarms among officials and local stakeholders alike.

once-thriving Rushikonda resort, a premier tourist destination featuring 80 elegant rooms, a function hall, a well-regarded bar, and an upscale restaurant, has been demolished in record time to make way for a new royal estate. However, this rapid transition has led to the



alarming disappearance of critical records from the resort's closure, including essential permits and inventories of valuable equipment worth around Rs. 50 crores items such as air conditioning units and commercial refrigerators.

An APTDC official, who spoke on the condition of anonymity, voiced serious concerns: "We are deeply troubled by the lack of accountability and transparency regarding the disappearance of these assets. Our officials are puzzled about the whereabouts of this equipment or the protocols followed during the demolition."

Compounding the issue, vital records delineating the handling of equipment from the resort's closure were reportedly placed in a separate file by the Andhra Pradesh Development Corporation (APDDC). This file has also vanished, coinciding suspiciously with a recent government shift. Standard procedure for decommissioning such facilities necessitates

either redistributing assets to other resorts or transparently auctioning them on the open market. "We seem to have bypassed the standard protowhat has transpired with the assets in this case," lamented a senior tourism official.

As the bulldozers cleared the resort's premises for the palace's construction, it emerged that Division Managers across the state were instructed to gather necessary furniture for their divisions, while APTDC officials may have liquidated remaining resources. However, the corporation currently lacks documentation on what items were taken or sold, leaving a significant accountability gap. Without accurate records, accountability becomes impossible," stated a source familiar with the ongoing investigation. 'This raises serious concerns about the officials responsible for managing these files."

Atchannaidu emphasised that these initiatives aim to support the 62% of Andhra Pradesh's population that depends on agriculture. He also focused on the importance of rural development and boosting agricultural growth through substantial investment and modernised infrastructure. "Around 62% of the state's population depends on agriculture, so my government will continue the Polam Pilustondi programme to create awareness among farmers during both the Kharif and Rabi seasons," he said. Key agricultural initiatives

The Minister further discussed the government's plans to introduce a new Tenant Protection Act in the Assembly, noting that the existing laws had failed to provide adequate safeguards for tenant farmers. "We have noticed that the current legal framework does not adequately protect tenant farmers, so we are introducing new legislation to ensure their security," Atchannaidu said.

Criticising the previous YSR Congress Party (YSRČP) government for neglecting the agricultural sector, Atchannaidu

promised to revive several farmer welfare schemes that had been suspended during the previous regime. "We are already conducting large-scale soil testing across the state to help farmers optimise the use of pesticides and fertilisers," he added.

Remote sensing agencies will be employed to provide farmers with accurate soil testing reports. The government has allocated ?38.88 crore exclusively for soil testing and will spend ?240 crore on seed distribution and ?40 crore on subsidising fertilisers. Natural farming and

support for farmers Minister Atchannaidu emphasised the government's focus on encouraging natural farming practices to reduce the use of chemical fertilisers and pesticides. "The reduction in chemical inputs will help farmers significantly cut their costs," he explained. The government has committed Rs 422 crore for promoting natural farming, which aims to produce healthier crops while minimising environmental impact.

Domestic violence: Young woman ends life

Twenty-five-year-old Kadgala Delhishwari ended her life following relentless abuse from her husband, Kadgala Rajasekhar, and his mother, Uma Maheshwari. The case is currently under investigation by the Fourth Town Police.

Delhishwari, originally from China Mangalapuram near Palakonda, married Rajasekhar, also known as Akhilj, in February 2022. Despite her family providing a substantial dowry—including Rs 18 lakh, 10 tolas of gold, and an additional Rs 5 lakh— Rajasekhar continually pressed for more financial support to fund his business ventures. Her father, Kimidi Suribabu, recalled that his son-in-law demanded an additional Rs 6 lakh, which added immense

strain to their relationship. Delhishwari's father painted a painful picture of her suffering, describing how she would often call, crying, and express that she could no longer endure the abuse. Her husband's demands and the emo-



tional abuse from him and his mother weighed heavily on her. Despite efforts from her parents to intervene, they were repeatedly rebuffed, and in one instance, even assaulted during a visit to check on her wellbeing.
Delhishwari ingested a toxic

substance, Vasmol-33, last Sunday in an act of despair. Her husband delayed informing her family about her critical condition, which only became known when neighbours alerted her mother. Rushing to her aid, her family brought her to a corporate hospital, but financial issues and delays in securing treatment led to a transfer between hospitals.





Delhi sees record high chikungunya, malaria cases

elhi registered a record high number of Chikungunya and Malaria cases in the past five years, while dengue cases declined, according to official data. As of November 9 this year, 728 malaria cases and 172 chikungunya cases were reported in the city. In 2020, there were 228 malaria cases, in 2021, 167 cases, in 2022, 263 cases, and in 2023, 426 cases. The tally includes 19 cases reported in the week leading up to November 9, according to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi's weekly report on mosquito-borne diseases. The number of chikungunya cases in 2020 stood at 111, in 2021, there were 89 cases, in 2022, 48 cases, and in 2023, 65 cases. This year, as of November 9, the number of chikungunya cases was 172. Meanwhile 4,533 dengue cases were reported in Delhi in 2024, including 472 cases in November. In comparison, there were 9,266 dengue cases reported in 2023. The number of dengue cases has sharply declined since last month, when it doubled to 2,431 cases from 1,052 cases in September.



SC rejects bail plea of ex-MP Prajwal Revanna

he Supreme Court on Monday denied bail to former JD(S) MP Prajwal Revanna, accused of rape and sexual assault. Rejecting the plea, a bench of Justices Bela M Trivedi and Satish Chandra Sharma observed Revanna was a "very influential person". Senior advocate Mukul Rohatgi. representing the politician, argued that the chargesheet had been filed in the case without the charge of Section 376 (rape) of the IPC. The bench, however, observed it could not interfere with the Karnataka High Court's October 21 decision denying him bail. Subsequently, Rohatgi sought the liberty to approach the court after six months. The bench said it could not say anything about it and dismissed the plea. In August, a special investigation team (SIT) in Karnataka which is probing four cases of sexual assault and harassment against Revanna submitted a 2,144-page chargesheet



Blast triggers fire at IOCL refinery in Vadodara

fire broke out at the Indian Oil Corporation (IOCL) refinery in Vadodara on Monday following a blast in its Astorage tank, a police officer said. No casualties are reported and the final head count is being conducted, said Vadodara Police Commissioner Narasimha Komar, adding that things are under control. The blast at the IOCL refinery in the Koyali area on the outskirts of Vadodara occurred at 4 PM, triggering the blaze. Visuals showed thick plumes emerging from the refinery which can be seen from kilometres away. Several workers were evacuated and can be seen exiting the IOCL campus. "A benzene storage tank caught fire after a blast at the refinery. They (IOCL) have isolated the affected storage unit. Fire tenders are deployed to control the situation," Komar said. The police officer said no casualty has been reported even as the final head count is being done to find if anybody is missing, which prima facie seems unlikely. Komar said fluid circulation in the IOCL complex was stopped as per the standard operating

Modi calls for unity among SC, ST, OBC communities

The Congress is trying to break the collective strength of SC, ST and OBC by creating divisions among them to weaken their voice and eventually end the reservation for them, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Monday as he called for unity among these communi-

Modi also highlighted the "failures" of the JMM-Congress-RJD combine's five year rule and said the state has to be freed from "corruption, mafiaism and misrule" to put it

on the path of progress.

The kind of blessings that the BJP is receiving at booth levels, it's clear that the "corrupt" JMM-led government is set to be ousted, Modi asserted."The countdown has begun," he said.

Modi said "everyone from the royal family" of the Congress -- from Jawaharlal Nehru to Rajiv Gandhi -- were "staunch opponents" of the provision of reservation and the party crushed all the voices rising in its favour till it was at the helm from "panchayat to Parliament" as the Dalit, OBC and Adivasi societies were scat-

Modi said that the Congress wants Dalits, tribals and other backward classes to break into "hundreds of smaller castes". instead of collectively being the SC, ST and OBC, so that they get scattered, lose their identity and fight with each other

But, gradually they started understanding what BR Ambedkar had said and came together posing a challenge to the Congress in many of the states, he said

"The OBC society could not come together till 1990. But when they came together, the Congress suffered severe loss-

"Since then, the Congress has not been able to form its gov-

ernment with a full majority. It has its government in just three states in the country today," he

Says Cong trying to create divisions

Modi said that the Congress has decided to break "the col-lective strength" of the Scheduled Castes (SC), Scheduled Tribes (ST) and the Other backward Classes (OBC) as its "royal family is angry".

'It has become their (Congress') agenda over the past few years. It's because the

states, which have the highest number of Dalits, OBC, Adivasis, are under the BJP-NDA rule today and there is no possibility of the Congress coming to power in these states," he said

Modi said that the Congress wants Dalits, tribals and other backward classes to break into "hundreds of smaller castes", instead of collectively being the SC, ST and OBC, so that they get scattered, lose their identity and fight with each other.

"When these societies break into smaller castes, their voice as SC, ST and OBC will become weak. The day this happens, the Congress' conspiracy will succeed. It will take away reservation as well," he said.

"That's why I keep saying 'ek rahenge, toh safe rahenge (if you remain united, you would be safe). All the OBC, SC and ST societies should remain united," Modi said.

"People have shared on social media an old advertisement given by the Congress during elections... Perhaps Rajiv Gandhi was the leader of the party then.

"The SC, ST and OBC have been painted so ugly in this advertisement. In their advertisement, they have clearly said that reservation has to be taken away from the SC, ST and the OBC," he added.

11 militants killed in gunfight with security forces in Manipur

Eleven suspected militants were killed in a gunfight with security forces in Manipur's Jiribam district on Monday, officials

Two CRPF personnel also sustained injuries during the heavy exchange of fire that happened at Jakurador Karong in the Borobekra sub-division. The condition of one of them was stated to be critical.

Militants in camouflage uniforms, armed with sophisticated weapons, fired indiscriminately at the Borobekra police station, and the CRPF camp located alongside it around 2.30 pm, officials said.

A few of the militants broke out and went to the Jakurador Karong market, around 100 metres away, and torched several shops, besides attacking some houses, they said.
As the security forces retali-

ated, a heavy exchange of fire began and 11 suspected mili-tants were killed, they added.

The gunfight lasted a little over an hour, officials said.

A relief camp was also located within the premises of the police station, and five people living there went missing, they

It was not clear whether these civilians were kidnapped by the retreating militants or went into hiding after the attack began, they said, adding that a

search was underway for them. The bodies of those killed were brought to the Borobekra police station, officials said.

Following the incident, prohibitory orders under Section 163 of the BNSS were imposed in the area, according to a notification.

"There is apprehension of widespread disturbance to peace and public tranquility or a riot or any affray in the area and grave danger to human lives and properties because of unlawful activities of some anti social elements," said the notification, prohibiting assembly of

five or more persons.

Sabha Parliamentary Party leader Derek O'Brien, the EC said it was "surprising" that accusations of delay were being made despite the Commission's "prompt action."

TMC leaders, however, actions favoured the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), diminishing the election's impartiality.

The ruling party accused central force personnel of entering private residences without the required presence of state police, reportedly intimidating voters and attempting to influence them in favour of the

NIA conducts pan-India searches

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Monday conducted extensive searches at multiple locations across the country in connection with the activities promoted by some Bangladeshi nationals as part of terror group Al-Qaida's conspiracy to destabilise India, according to an official statement.

The crackdown at nine locations, linked with individuals suspected of supporting and funding the activities of the proscribed terrorist organisation Al-Qaida,



started early in the morning in Jammu and Kashmir, Karnataka, West Bengal, Bihar, Tripura and Assam, it said.

The searches led to the recovery of incriminating documents showing detailed banking transactions, digital devices including mobile phones, and other evidence related to terror funding activities, the statement issued by the NIA said.

As per NIA investigations, the suspects whose premises were raided are sympathisers of a Bangladesh-based Al-Qaida net-

The searches were part of NIA's ongoing investigations into a 2023 case pertaining to a conspiracy orchestrated by Bangladesh-based Al-Qaida operatives in collaboration with

the arrested individuals, it said. The conspiracy was aimed at propagating Al-Qaida's terrorist activities and radicalising gullible youths in India, the probe agency

In November last year, NIA had filed a charge sheet against five accused, including four Bangladeshi nationals -- Mohd Sojibmiyan, Munna Khalid Ansari alias Munna Khan, Azarul Islam alias Jahangir or Aakash Khan, Abdul Latif alias Mominul Ansari, it added.

The fifth accused, Farid, is an

India bears the brunt

This year's high death toll and losses due to climate change underscore the urgent need for policy action

ith over 3,200 fatalities, extensive crop damage across 3.2 million hectares, and 2.3 lakh buildings destroyed in the first nine months of 2024 alone, the country's vulnerability to extreme weather events is undeniable. These findings of the 'India Climate Report 2024' from the Centre for Science and Environment (CSE) give a shocking picture of the impact of climate change on the country. The report underscores that 93 per cent of the days between January and September were marked by extreme weather, a clear indication that climate-related disasters are becoming not only more frequent but also more severe. The report's findings reveal a staggering increase in extreme weather events. In 2024, India faced climate extremes on 255 out of 274 days, a record when compared to previous years. Notably, over 35 of the 36 states and union territories experienced such events, with states like Karnataka, Kerala and Uttar Pradesh witnessing over 40 additional days of climate extremes compared to 2023.



The grim statistics point to a significant toll on human life and livelihoods. Kerala, Madhya Pradesh and Assam were the hardest-hit states in terms of fatalities, while Andhra Pradesh saw the greatest destruction of homes, and Maharashtra experienced the largest crop damage. Among the notable phenomena in 2024 were prolonged heatwaves and an unprecedented number of warm nights. Besides, the monsoon season was particularly disastrous, with heavy rains, floods and landslides occurring every single day from June through September. Assam, for example, faced extreme weather on 111 days out of 122, highlighting the relentless impact of intense rainfall and flooding. The 2024

India Climate Report also points to a significant data gap. While the India Meteorological Department (IMD) has made strides in tracking events like warm nights, it lacks absolute temperature benchmarks, which many other countries use to enhance climate data accuracy. The lack of comprehensive, real-time data on climate-related damages impedes effective planning and resource allocation, especially in vulnerable regions. Several factors have contributed to India's vulnerability which must be addressed. The lopsided development, scant regard to the climate impact and allowing reckless construction in hills must stop. This pattern of 'bad development' worsens the impact of natural disasters, transforming regions with poor infrastructure or unplanned urban sprawl into highrisk areas. As the world approaches the dangerous threshold of 1.5°C of warming above pre-industrial levels, India's situation signals the urgent need for effective climate policies, mitigation strategies and public awareness. The 'India Climate Report 2024' serves as a somber reminder of the escalating costs of climate inaction. A collective and urgent response is needed, one that includes better data collection, sustainable urban planning and policies aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Only then can India hope to protect its people and environment.

onald Trump has made history by winning the 2024 US Presidential election, securing 292 Electoral College votes and defeating Kamala Harris, the media's favoured candidate. His resounding victory marks a significant comeback and has eignited debates globally about what his second term might bring. This election wasn't without its drama, as Trump survived an assassination attempt on September 15, 2024, amid allegations of interference from powerful interest groups attempting to prevent his reelection. The victory was further shaped by the suport of influential figures, including Indian American Vivek Ramaswamy, a former Republican hopeful who backed Trump. "Trump's comeback is comeback, Ramaswamy remarked, applauding Trump's strong persona as a badass Commander-in-Chief" that many believe the US needs. substantial part of Trump's campaign success was due to substantial financial support from allies like Elon Musk, who reportedly contributed \$119 million to the campaign. FIRST COLUMN BREAKING THE CYCLE OF BURNOUT

Addressing mental health with managerial support is essential for a healthy workplace



umerous studies found that high job demands, low control, low social support and job insecurity are significant risk factors for depression in the workplace while, factors such as excessive workload, lack of control, poor work-life balance and unsupportive work environments trigger burnout. Research in all these areas has grown substantially in recent years, revealing valuable insights into how these mental health challenges affect individual employees and organisations. In today's fast-paced and highpressure work environment, burnout and depression have become prevalent challenges affecting employees across industries. While burnout is often a result of chronic workplace stress characterised by exhaustion, cynicism and a feeling of reduced accomplishment, depression on the other side, is a mental health disorder marked by persistent sadness, lack of motivation and feelings of hopelessness that may affect all areas of a person's life.

Both can severely impact employee wellbeing, workplace productivity and organisational success. Burnout and depression in the workplace are typically rooted in multiple factors often exacerbated by modern work conditions and expectations such as excessive workload and unrealistic expectations, lack of control and autonomy, poor work-life balance, toxic work environment and insufficient recognition and reward. There is no denying that when employ-



ees lack the time and resources to recover and recharge or have no input into their work, their sense of helplessness can contribute to both, they become more susceptible to burnout and over time, even depression. Moreover, a hostile or untrusting work environment can erode employee morale and mental health contributing to burnout and, in some cases, even depression. The impact of burnout and depression extends beyond individual suffering and affects the workplace as a whole.

As stated earlier, to maintain productivity, employees experience burnout and depression which may consequently lead to decline in productivity thereby impacting the profitability and overall performance. It is quite often stated that absenteeism and presenteeism both have significant implications for workplace productivity and team morale. Now when the levels of burnout and depression within an organisation are high, it will create a culture of dissatisfaction, resulting in a lack of engagement and trust among employees and as a result can harm collaboration, innovation and the company's reputation, thereby making it difficult to attract and retain top talent. It will end up driving employees to leave their jobs in search of a healthier work environment. Addressing burnout and depression in the workplace requires both—structural changes within the organisation as well as individual efforts. By creating a culture where employers foster an environment that values open communication and employees express concerns without the fear of stigma or reprisal; training managers to identify symptoms of burnout and depression and to respond effectively; providing small gestures of appreciation through praise, bonuses, or other rewards can significantly improve job satisfaction, and help in reducing stress and the likelihood of burnout. Organisations can create a healthier, more productive and more sustainable work environment where employees and the company can thrive.

The new US President's economic policy is expected to focus on higher tariffs on all imports – 10 per cent across the board, and as high as 60 per cent on those from China, restrictions on immigration as well a reduction of corporate tax rate to 15 per cent for all companies manufacturing in the US. All this could eventually fuel higher inflation in the US and subsequent action by the Federal Reserve. For India, it could impact key export sectors such as pharmaceuticals, textiles and IT ser-

This may affect sectors where India has maintained high tariffs to protect domestic industries, such as agriculture and manufacturing. This is a highly sensitive issue for the Indian policymakers. The NDA government has taken conscience steps to ensure protection for the domestic industry, agriculture and other sectors. The IT companies, like TCS, Infosys and Wipro, rely heavily on the US for both revenue and talent deployment. "It could make Indian exports less competitive in the US market, impacting revenue," says a report by the economic think tank Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI). It may hit China the most being the largest US trade partner. Many Indians believe that Indian exporters could benefit from the vacuum created as they also expect to fill the Bangladesh garment export fall by 6.2 per cent.

The expectations may not be a reality, as the US itself strives to be a manufacturing hub, which is termed "America First". Besides, if a new tariff regime begins it may require intense effort and

barriers are high, apart from the government's diplomacy, some large companies are already in touch with the Trump coterie to mollify the issues as they are keen on setting up new ventures in the US or with US companies. His previous immigration policies affected Indian professionals,

> visas. Stricter immigration controls may hinder the mobility of Indian IT workers and engineers to the US, posing potential challenges for the Indian tech industry. Women waste pickers in India: Transforming waste management amidst challenges

Recognising the intersection of caste, gender and class in the waste sector is essential to building a cleaner, more equitable world for all

n India, women waste pickers play a vital role in waste management, particularly in urban and semiurban areas. They are part of a larger, often invisible workforce within the informal waste sector, which comprises around 1.5 million workers. These women, mostly from marginalised backgrounds, undertake roles in waste collection, sorting, and sometimes even in supervisory capacities. Despite contributing significantly to recycling operations, they earn approximately 33 per cent less than their male counterparts, underscoring deep-rooted gender inequalities in this

The rise of initiatives like the Swachh Bharat Mission



(SBM) has shifted the land scape of waste management in India. Many Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) now employ more women in front-end roles, such as door-to-door waste collection and material sorting at Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs). This inclusion has led to Swachh improved Survekshan rankings for

enhanced cleanliness and an 80 per cent female workwaste management efficiencv. Despite this progress, women waste pickers continue to face multifaceted challenges, including genderbased violence, caste dis-crimination and limited economic mobility.

Case Studies: Studies from cities like Ambikapur, Bengaluru, and Tinsukia highlight the significant positive changes brought about by involving women in waste management.

Ambikapur, Chhattisgarh: With a population of around 146,000, Ambikapur became the cleanest town in its population category, mainly due to a large female workforce in waste management. Out of 550 jobs created, 457 were 108 jobs created for waste these ULBs, reflecting filled by women, resulting in collection and supervision,

force that greatly contributed to cleanliness and operational efficiency.

Bengaluru, Karnataka: In collaboration with the NGO Hasiru Dala, Bengaluru created over 1,200 jobs in the waste sector, with 92 per cent occupied by women. These women played various roles, from collecting fees to supervising sorting operations, positively impacting the city's cleanliness and Swachh Survekshan rankings.

Tinsukia, Assam: Once one of the dirtiest towns in Assam, Tinsukia witnessed a remarkable transformation due to the involvement of women waste workers employed by an NGO. Of



46 were allocated to women, enabling the town to achieve the status of the fastest-moving clean city in its category. Challenges Faced by Women Waste Pickers:

Despite their essential contributions, women in the waste sector face a range of difficulties. Hazardous working conditions expose them to toxins and diseases and their work often goes

Adivasis who endure societal stigma, which reinforces their marginalisation and limits their social mobility. They lack access to formal recognition, fair wages and safety measures, making them some of the most vul-nerable in India's workforce. The absence of specific policies addressing women waste pickers aggravates these issues. The informal nature of their work, coupled with limited research on gender dynamics in waste management, restricts policy interventions, leaving women out of leadership roles and decision-making processes.

Intersection of Caste and Gender in Waste Work Caste adds another layer to unrecognised. Many women the marginalisation of waste pickers are Dalits or women in waste manage-

ment. Often seen as "dirty work," waste picking and sorting are stigmatised, especially for women from marginalised castes. This reinforces social hierarchies that exclude them from fair participation and economic upliftment. Scholars like Nancy Fraser and Martha Chen emphasise that caste and gender intersectionality compounds discrimination, limiting women's bargaining power and political representation in waste management. Addressing such complex intersections requires policies that recognise these overlapping identities and create inclusive opportunities for women waste pickers. To address these challenges and create a more equitable

"We will be launching milk...fresh products in Europe by the end of this month," he said at the annual convocation of Indian Institute of Foreign Trade (IIFT) here. The company will launch the products in Spain first and then look at expanding to other countries in Europe. He also said that non-tariff barriers are being faced by the Indian dairy industry in other countries and removal of those will help in increasing exports.

"Try to create a market opportunity for us," Mehta said adding that milk is a source of livelihood for more than 10 crore families in the country and most of the producers are small and marginal farmers. India allows the import of dairy goods at a 30

"Gold prices are trading lower, with Comex down, slipping from Friday's close of USD 2,685 as the strengthening dollar index exerts pressure on the yellow metal. "The rise in US bond prices following Trump's election victory is contributing to the corrective trend in bullion," Jateen Trivedi, VP Research Analyst - Commodity and Currency at LKP Securities, said.

External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Monday called for "urgent" measures to address the issue of widening trade deficit between India and

While India's exports to Russia stood at only USD 2.24 billion in April-

August this fiscal, imports soared to USD 27.35 billion during the period. The trade deficit is aggregated at USD 25.11 billion.

The high trade deficit is mainly due to crude imports.

Russia emerged as India's biggest supplier of crude oil, which is converted into fuels like petrol and diesel in refineries. Russian oil was available at a discount after some European nations shunned purchases from Moscow over its invasion

of Ukraine in February 2022. Addressing the India-Russia Business Forum here, Jaishankar also pitched for the removal of non-tariff barriers and regulatory impediments to help improve the trade bal-

"The balance of trade needs urgent redressal since it is so one-sided. It is imperative that non-tariff barriers and regulatory impediments are speedily addressed for this to happen, he said.

The bilateral trade currently stands at USD 66 billion, and the goal of

reaching USD 100 billion is "more than realistic", he added.

Further, he advocated for mutual settlement of trade in the national currencies, especially in the "current

"Special Rupee Vostro Accounts are right now an effective mechanism. However, even in the short run, a better trade balance with national currency settlements is the answer," he added.

Jaishankar said the meeting between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Vladimir Putin at the Annual Summit in Moscow and last month in Kazan provided a "strategic direction".

SC dismisses Sebi's appeal against SAT order

No question of law involved in this appeal warranting our interference.

Dismissed. You can't chase a person like this for years," the bench said.

Sebi had moved the top court against the December 4, 2023, order of the Securities Appellate Tribunal (SAT).

The SAT ruling came after all the entities appealed before the tribunal against the order passed by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Sebi) in January 2021. In January 2021, Sebi




"Every band member has different musical tastes that have been influenced by the different genres we were exposed to as children. We were not constrained by the conventional divisions of various musical schools because we were self-taught musicians. We were able to create the distinctive sound that characterises the *Indian Ocean* thanks to this flexibility," an excited Rahul Ram shared.

Many people consider the *Indian Ocean* to be the forerunner of the Fusion Rock movement in India. The band's first album, *Indian Ocean*, featured Rahul Ram as the sole founder member when Susmit Sen left in 2013! On numerous albums, Sanjeev Sharma has worked with them as a lyricist. "Younger fans are encouraged to listen to our music live. They occasionally think we're 'old guys' doing music from a previous period. But after listening to our music, people frequently have a strong connection to it and explore both our earlier and more recent pieces, such as those in *Masaan*. The fact that the music we make appeals to listeners of all ages is immensely satisfying! We just pursue our distinct artistic trajectories without intentionally attempting to appeal to any specific demographic," reveals the famous bass guitarist, social activist and music composer.

He joined the musical group Indian Ocean in 1991 and plays bass guitar for them. Along with Varun Grover and Sanjay Rajoura, he is also one of the three members of 'Aisi Taisi Democracy'! He explains, "Tu Hai took a long time to develop. It was ready by late 2019 but wasn't released until 2023. Despite the delay caused by the pandemic, the album's production got underway soon after Tandanu in 2014. We recorded in studios in Bombay and Delhi, working with musicians like Vikuji and George Brooks. The final song to be finalised was Tu Hai, the title track. Songs like Jadoo Maya and Iss Tan Dhan Ki, where we adapted Kabir's lyrics to condemn thoughtless consumerism, are two examples of how the album reflects the effects of global climate change. Rebirth, which was coined before the epidemic, acquired new significance when it happened and now represents optimism for environmental restoration."

With Rahul and Himanshu Joshi contributing to the title track, Tu Hai represents the first time Indian Ocean wrote its own lyrics. Even if their music has changed, they are still rooted in their heritage. Because of their consistent musical identity, listeners identify with the same band in both Tu Hai and Kandisa.

"The band flourishes when they perform live. Our



passion is fuelled by the thrilling atmosphere created by the energy exchange with the audience. We think that live music can engage audiences more deeply," he quickly adds. The musical style of the band can be best classified as jazz fusion. It is an experimental genre, fusing raga (traditional Indian tunes) with rock music, guitars and drums, sometimes using Indian folk songs. It has also been described by some music critics as "Indo-rock fusion with jazz-spiced rhythms that integrates shlokas, sufism, environmentalism, mythology and revolution.

Our lyrics are written by several great people. A renowned philosopher, Sanjeev Sharma composed songs such as Bhor, Kaun and Kya Maloom. Sant Kabir Das' poetry has been included; Varun Grover contributed to Masaan and Piyush Mishra contributed to the Black Friday soundtrack. Ballads that delve into spiritual issues and go beyond typical love ballads appeal to us!" he adds. Rahul, the son of renowned botanist Professor H.Y. Mohan Ram, was born into a Kannadiga household. He is the nephew of the late a Prasad, who was most ing as Indira Gandhi's media adviser. "Tandanu was our first deliberate attempt at working together. It seemed like a logical step, particularly after Sushmit left. Fortunately, all of the musicians we approached agreed to work together. There are many amazing musicians in India, and we have a long list of potential future partnerships." Rahul's unexpected educational credentials, obtained at some of the best universities in India and the USA, are noteworthy given that he eventually joined a rock band as a guitarist. It was his doctoral studies in environmental toxicology that inspired him to join the Narmada Bachao Andolan (1990–95) as an activist. Immediately after receiving his degree from Cornell, he spent five years of his life working for that activist group!

"With an increase in new venues, musicians and platforms, India's indie music scene is flourishing. Even if anybody can share music in the digital era, creating a huge amount of content, genuine talent and a little bit of luck will always win out. We expect that India's first international independent star will emerge within the next ten years." Oh, that is a bold assertion and we hope it comes true. The band has been defying record labels' expectations since 2010. They gave out their most recent album, 16/330 Khajoor Road, online. Frustration over contract negotiations with record corporations and copyright disputes was the primary driver behind this move! To make money instead of playing for record labels, they have resorted to concerts and sponsorships. They were sponsored for a short time by Johnnie Walker! "We are here because of our fans. Any musician who says they make music just for themselves isn't telling the whole truth. Having seen the transition from email lists in the 1990s to the current social media environment, we cherish the relationships we have with our followers. We prioritise quality over quantity, even though social media demands regular engagement. Instead of posting just to be current, we would rather provide stuff that has a purpose. Our 'Artist Verse' foray into the metaverse is an intriguing investigation into fresh approaches to fan interaction. We see it as reciprocal, providing a more in-depth look at our lives and music," he discusses the same context.

He asserts that social issues like caste discrimination, gender inequality and climate change are urgent issues that require attention. This band is an example of how music can provide comfort and a sense of community, assisting people in overcoming these difficulties and depressive and alienating feelings. "As musicians, we've developed our technique and grown up. Even though we value all of our work, some songs—like *Tandanu*'s *Longing*—are harder to perform live. Songs like *Kandisa* and *Bandeh* have become quite popular, but others like Bhor and Kya Maloom are more popular with a certain demographic. Every record has a special meaning that adds to our development and awareness. The road to success in music is not predetermined. Authenticity, commitment and hard work are essential. Don't compromise your artistic vision or follow trends. Never lose faith in yourself, but be ready for obstacles and disappointments. Remain loyal to your principles, have faith in your gut and keep in mind that success takes time." And that's

Leading Indian rifle shooters Aishwary Pratap Singh Tomar and Sift Kaur Samra failed to make an impact even as little-known Smit Rameshbhai Moradiya clinched the men's 10m air rifle silver after an extremely close fight for gold in the World University Shooting Championship here on

On a day when Rameshbhai was the only Indian to win a medal, his more illustrious counterpart, Olympian Tomar finished fifth in the event, while Samra, a member of the Paris Games contingent, ended at fourth in the women's 50m rifle threepositions event.

Rameshbhai, who hails from Gujarat, missed the gold medal to Czech Republic's Jiri Privratsky by just 0.1 point, scoring 252.1 in the final. It was a grand double for Privratsky, who shot 252.2 to claim the top-podium finish and add to the men's 50m rifle three-positions gold he won on Sunday. The 23-year-old Privratsky had recently clinched a silver (50m rifle 3-positions) and bronze (10m air



rifle) in the year-ending ISSF World Cup Final held at the Karni Singh Range here last month.
Tomar shot 187.7 for a fifth-place finish, while

another Indian, Umamahesh Maddineni (208.8), finished fourth.

Earlier, in the qualification round, Rameshbhai shot 630.0 to enter the eight-shooter final in second place. Umamahesh and Tomar shot 629.8 and 628.3 to enter the final in third and fifth place respectively.

Samra, one of the best 50m rifle exponents in the country, was a big disappointment, finishing fourth with 439.6. France's Agathe Girard (462.3) won the gold medal, while Poland's Julia Piotrowska (462.0) and Anna Janssen (450.2) clinched the silver and bronze respectively.

Samra had earlier secured a place in the eightshooter final at seventh in the qualification round with a score of 587.

India have so far won nine medals, including a gold struck by the 10m air pistol mixed team of Palak Gulia and Amit Sharma on Sunday. As many as 220 shooters from across 23 countries

are competing in the championship. The event is being hosted by Manav Rachna International Institute of Research and Studies.

Last three years were tough, changed everything about my bowling: Chakaravarthy

Mystery spinner Varun Chakaravarthy has described the three-year gap from international cricket as "tough," saying he had to completely overhaul his bowling after finding that his orthodox side-spin wasn't working at higher levels.

The 33-year-old recorded his career-best figures of 5 for 17 in Sunday's second T20I against South Africa, though his efforts could not prevent India from losing by three wickets.

"I had to go to the drawing board and check out all my videos. I figured out that I was bowling side spin and it was not working out in the higher levels," he told Jio

Cinema. "I had to change everything about my bowling. It took me two years and I started bowling in the local leagues and IPL also. It worked there and I have started bowling it in the international stage and it's

working out for me." While side spin creates enough revolutions to make the ball drift sideways, over-spin generates a

sharp bounce and turn. Talking about what worked for him as he added a fifer on Sunday to the three wickets he scalped in the first T20I in Durban, Chakaravarthy said: "It is a combination of both my consistency and overspin.

'The overspin I bowl has more bite from the pitch and hopefully I can keep doing that and hopefully I can keep contributing for the country."

Chakaravarthy was axed from the Indian team after going wicketless during the 2021 World Cup but he earned his place back after his exploits in the last two editions of the IPL. He snapped 20 wickets in IPL 2023 before finishing as the second highest wicket-taker this

"Definitely, the last three years were a little tough," Chakaravarthy told media after the match.

"The only thing I could do was play lots of cricket. And I started playing a lot of the domestic league (TŃPĽ) in India. And that definitely helped me understand my game better. And that's what helped me."



Chakaravarthy was part of the We did our best and we could have Kolkata Knight Riders' IPL- pulled it off. winning team this year under Gambhir, who recently took over as the coach of the Indian team and he credited the role clarity provided by the coach for helping him to regain his lost

form. "Yes, we played the Bangladesh tour and he was coaching the team. And definitely we spoke a lot and he gave me a lot of role clarity. "He told me, even if you go for 30-40 runs, it doesn't matter. All you have to look is to pick wickets. So that's your role in the team. The clarity which they gave definitely

helped me." Chakaravarthy's match-changing spell reduced South Africa to 66 for 6 while chasing a modest target of 125, but a gritty partnership between Tristan Stubbs (47) and Gerald Coetzee (19) saw the hosts home in 19 overs, ending India's 11-match winning streak.

"During the innings break, Surya (skipper Suryakumar Yadav) came and told us that let's not think about the result and let's just go all out. And that's what we tried to do. pulled it off.

"Obviously, the mindset has to be aggressive when the score is low. You have to pick wickets and that's when we can win the match. That has to be my approach in the next two games also because it's going to be a do-or-die match for us," he

said. spinner added that The performing against a formidable team like South Africa would serve as a confidence booster heading into the remaining matches.

"Definitely, when we came to South Africa, we knew that it's going to be a challenging tour because the Proteas, they are one of the best teams right now and they have a powerful batting

lineup. "Doing well against them definitely gives me motivation to do more better and definitely I can. Hopefully I can do well in the

upcoming games."
India will face South Africa in the third and final T20Is on Wednesday and Friday at Centurion and Johannesburg, respectively.


