# Naidu flags falling fertility

## Says population must be managed, not controlled

PNS VIJAYAWADA

Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu on Friday called for a national shift from population control to population management, declaring that human capital is India's strongest economic asset. He was addressing the inaugural Amaravati Summit on World Population Day at the State Secretariat.

Launching a new population survey campaign under the slogan "Population management starts with every family. Your opinion is our policy guide", Naidu emphasised the need for policies in tune with evolving demographic realities.

"Earlier, I supported family planning measures, including a law bar-

ring individuals with more than two children from contesting local body elections," Naidu said. "But times have changed, and such laws may now need reconsideration."

Quoting Gurajada Apparao's line "A nation is made of its people, not just its soil," he stressed the importance of protecting India's demo-graphic dividend. "With Andhra Pradesh's fertility rate at 1.7, below the replacement level of 2.1, we must act to sustain population equilibrium," he noted.

Naidu expressed concern over the global decline in fertility rates, citing figures from Japan (1.23), China (1.02), and Singapore (0.96), and pointed to international incentives to boost birth rates.

Deputy Chief Minister Pawan Kalyan on Thursday strongly advocated the importance of Hindi, describing it as essential to uniting India's diverse cultural fabric. Speaking at the Golden Jubilee celebrations of the Department of Official Language held at GMC Balayogi Stadium at Gachibowli in Hyderabad, he urged people to embrace Hindi without politicising

"While our mother tongue is like our mother, Hindi, as the official language, is like our elder mother ('Peddamma')," Kalyan remarked, drawing an emotional analogy. Recalling how missionaries once learnt tribal languages like Savara to spread their faith, he called upon Indians to approach Hindi with similar openness. Referring to Arunachal Pradesh, where over 50 languages are spoken but Hindi is the common link, he said Hindi serves as a unifying force.

## Experiments, exercise mark Axiom-4 crew's final days on ISS

PNS NEW DELHI

Astronaut Shubhanshu Shukla and other crew members of the Axiom-4 mission are making the most of their final days on the International Space Station, pushing forward a wide range of experiments that could shape the future of space exploration.

The SpaceX's Crew Dragon spacecraft, carrying the four-astronaut nauts are expected to board the crew, reached the orbital outpost on June 26 and is scheduled to undock from the International Space Station (ISS) no earlier than Monday, July 14, at 7:05 am ET (4:35 pm IST), according to an update on X by Axiom Space, which is spearheading the

Shukla and the other three astro-



spacecraft about two hours before the undocking, wear their space suits and carry out the necessary tests before they begin their journey to the

The ISS is orbiting the Earth at a speed of 28,000 km per hour, and the spacecraft will initiate the autonomous undocking process to movement and coordination.

Shukla worked on the microalgae experiment, deploying and stowing samples that could one day provide food, oxygen and biofuels for deep space missions, Axiom Space said in a statement.

"Exercise research and spacesuit maintenance topped the schedule for the Expedition 73 and Axiom Mission 4 (Ax-4) crews on Thursday," a NASA statement said.

## Should Narendra Modi step aside at 75?

RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat has stirred political debate with his remark that "anyone who turns 75 should step aside and make way for the younger generation." While he did not name anyone, the Congress party has claimed the comment was clearly aimed at Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who will turn 75 in September 2025.

Bhagwat made the statement at a recent book launch, and his words have quickly become the centre of a national discussion. The timing is significant, as the BJP has previously enforced the 75-year rule within its own ranks—leaders like L.K. Advani, Murli Manohar Joshi, and Jaswant Singh were sidelined once they reached that

Speculation over Modi's retirement isn't new. In March last year, Modi visited the RSS headquarters in Nagpur for the first time after becoming Prime Minister. That visit fuelled rumours that retirement discussions were on the table. However, leaders like Maharashtra CM Devendra Fadnavis and other senior BJP figures swiftly dismissed those reports.

# Banakacherla reveals TG's betrayal by Cong, BRS

Possession is nine-tenths of the law. In property law, if someone has physical possession of a property, they are presumed to be the owner of the property, making it easier for them to get support of the law to protect their possession. Politicians, especially from the BRS, the Congress, and the AIMIM, understand this principle very well. The numerous allegations of land grabbing against most of their leaders are proof that they are not only aware of this princi-ple but also brazenly take

advantage of it.

In case of rights over river waters, the same principle applies to water as much as it applies to land. Of course, in this case, it applies to rights over water among the riparian states. Any state that builds projects to utilise water from rivers flowing through multidoes not have a rightful claim over those waters to begin with. That is why states aggressively pursue irrigation projects, without agreements with the other riparian states or permissions from the tribunals or applicable central authorities.

The upper riparian states possess an inherent advantage when it comes to river waters, as water flows from the upper to the lower riparian state. Hence, upper riparian states can deprive the lower riparian states of their rightful share by moving first and building projects to channelise river waters for drinking, irrigation or industrial needs. Once a state builds projects and presents a fait accompli, it isn't easy for the other states to reclaim their rights over those waters.

Godavari waters by the erstwhile united Andhra Pradesh state's ruling class, which predominantly came from the present-day post-bifurcation Andhra Pradesh. This neglect and deprivation resulted in the demand for a fair share of Krishna and Godavari waters becoming a rallying cry for a successful separate Telangana statehood movement.

The leaders of BRS and Congress are well aware that the only way to ensure Telangana receives its rightful

share of Krishna and Godavari waters is to conceive and build projects on the two rivers. They know that, as the upper riparian state, if we construct projects, there's no way for Andhra Pradesh, the lower riparian state, to deprive us of our rightful share in the waters by building projects downstream.

Yet, the proposed Banakacherla project by Andhra Pradesh exposes the truth that Telangana remains as disadvantaged as it was in

united Andhra Pradesh when it comes to ensuring its rights over Krishna and Godavari waters. The rightful blame for this sorry state of affairs lies at the doors of the Congress and

The Congress, which ruled united Andhra Pradesh for decades, actively deprived

Telangana of its rightful share of Krishna and Godavari waters by its Chief Ministers focusing, designing and executing projects that benefit the

Andhra region. Pothireddypadu Head Regulator is a classic example. Initially approved for a capacity of 1,500 cusecs to provide drinking water to Chennai, the Congress government of YS Rajasekhara Reddy expanded its capacity to 40,000 cusecs without sanction. The BRS, which ruled

Telangana for its first nine and a half years, totally neglected projects on the Krishna river, leaving many projects started even before 2014, like the Palamuru-Ranga Reddy project, unattended and incomplete. Kaleswaram, the one mega project built by the BRS government on the Godavari, lies defunct today, thanks to the

BRS turning the project into an ATM for the party's first family. The defunct project not only failed to utilise Godavari waters, leaving them to flow into the Bay of Bengal, but also saddled the people of the state with a humongous debt of almost one lakh crores.

The current Congress government, which came into power with a promise of quickly completing various irrigation projects, turned out to be equally inept. The SLBC (Srisailam Left Bank Canal) tunnel accident and the Sunkishala retaining wall collapse are the only notable highlights of its rule regarding water projects. Forget creating new capacities, the government even stopped talking about irrigation pro-

Compared to Andhra Pradesh, Telangana is richer. It had higher revenues and bigger budgets all through. It is the upper riparian state. However, the inept and corrupt BRS and Congress governments, incapable of leveraging our advantages and securing our water rights, cunningly try to throw the blame on the central government to divert people's attention.

The latest example is the Banakacherla project proposal by Andhra Pradesh. Despite the BJP central government's repeated assurances to protect Telangana's interests and the Union Ministry of Environment returning the proposal citing the need to resolve inter-state issues before seeking environmental clearance, BRS and Congress continue with their deception. They will soon face the ire of Telangana.

## Fertiliser supply streamlined for Kharif crops: Agri Director

In a move to ensure uninterrupted and timely fertiliser supply during the ongoing Kharif season, Agriculture Director Dr S Dilli Rao chaired a key coordination meeting on Friday at the Department of Agriculture Conference Hall in Mangalagiri. The meeting brought together fertiliser manufacturers, statelevel wholesale dealers, and retailers to discuss supply chain efficiency, logistics, and shared responsibilities.

Āddressing the gathering, Dr Dilli Rao noted that major irrigation projects across the state are now brimming due to heavy rainfall in upper catchment areas, and canal water has been released. As a result, agricultural activities such as paddy transplantation, weeding, inter-cultivation, and fertiliser application

are in full swing.

He stated that Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu has given firm instructions to ensure no farmer faces difficulty in accessing fertilisers. Emphasising that manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers are essential links in the supply chain, Dr Dilli Rao called for coordinated efforts to ensure uninterrupted distribution.

A joint statement issued by all stakeholders affirmed their commitment to ensuring seamless fertiliser supply across the state. In response to departmental directives, fertiliser companies announced the provision of free lorry transportation from railway rake points directly to retail dealers, helping to reduce transport costs and avoid delays.

Dr Dilli Rao further revealed that the State Government has proposed three new railway rake points—at Hindupur, Anakapalli, and Madanapalli to minimise logistical expenses. Of these, the Central

Government has already approved the Anakapalli rake point, while the others are in the final stages of clearance.

He added that the Chief Minister is personally overseeing progress and is in active discussion with the Centre to expedite approvals and secure free transport support from manufactur-

Expressing gratitude on behalf of the farming community, Dr Dilli Rao thanked the Chief Minister for his efforts in securing the Anakapalli facility and for his continued commitment to farmers' welfare.

# Major push to end ganja cultivation

Minister for Tribal Affairs, Women and Child Welfare and district in-charge Gummadi Sandhyarani on Friday said that infrastructure projects worth Rs 1,000 crore

projects worth Rs 1,000 crore are underway in Alluri Sitarama Raju (ASR) district, including road works and public facilities.

Speaking at a public meeting held at the local junior college grounds to promote awareness on the 2005 antiganja policy and encourage alternative. alternative farming, Sandhyarani said the State government was distributing 2 crore horticultural saplings to tribal farmers to replace ganja with crops like mango, sapota, guava, lemon, and custard apple. She stressed the government's commitment to ending ganja cultivation and empowering tribal communities.

Referring to welfare measures, she said that the government had identified one lakh 'gold families' - economically backward households—and appealed to citizens and institutions to support them. She said 90% of ganja cultivation

al-grown coffee was receiving international attention, with plans to expand plantations to one lakh acres. Minister Home

Vangalapudi Anitha, who also addressed the gathering, described ASR as the "Andhra Ooty" and said that tribals had been exploited by middlemen in the ganja trade. She warned that cultivating even two marijuana plants was a non-bail-able offence. Assets worth Rs 3.73 crore had been seized, she said, and 700 of 900 prisoners in Visakhapatnam Central Jail for ganja cases were tribal youth. She noted that 13,000 acres had been covered under orchard development last year, with 35,000 acres targeted this year, including the distribution of turmeric seeds under MGNREGS.

Collector A.N. Dinesh Kumar said saplings worth Rs 54 crore were being given to tribal farmers under MGN-REGS. Coffee plantations would be expanded as per government plans. SP Amit Bardar said drone surveillance had helped clear 93 acres of ganja fields.

## AP Chambers urges ban on raw human hair exports

The Andhra Pradesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry Federation (AP Chambers) has urged Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu to intervene and impose a ban on the export of raw human hair, particularly Non-Remy (comb waste/Goli/Chutti) hair classified under HS Code 05010010, in order to safeguard the domestic hair processing industry.

In a detailed representation, AP Chambers pointed out that although demand for Non-Remy hair has surged over the past two decades, China — once a major legal importer — has increasingly resorted to smuggling through countries like Myanmar, Bangladesh and Nepal to evade import duties. Despite a ban imposed by the Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT) in March 2022, exports resumed shortly afterwards, allegedly involving even previously blacklisted traders.

Currently, Non-Remy hair accounts for about 85% of India's human hair exports, while Remy hair, typically sourced from temples and sold through auctions or direct sales, makes up just 15%.

The Chamber warned that the unchecked export of raw hair is adversely affecting domestic processors, especially in Andhra Pradesh's Eluru and Madepalli regions. The Indian human hair extensions and wig industry, valued at Rs 8,000 crore, has the potential to reach Rs 30,000 crore in the next decade and presently employs over 10 lakh women in rural areas. AP

Chambers' key demands include a strict ban on raw hair exports, limiting temple hair auctions to licensed Indian manufacturers, and encouraging value-added The federation also proposed

the establishment of a dedicated R&D chair at IIT Chennai and incentives for exports to Africa, one of the largest markets for human hair products.

## AISF demands revocation of GO 77, release of fee arrears

PNS VISAKHAPATNAM

Members of the All India Students Federation (AISF) staged a protest at the Visakhapatnam Collectorate on Friday, demanding the withdrawal of Government Order (GO) 77 and the release of pending fee reimbursement and scholarship arrears. The protest was organised following a call by the AISF Rashtra Samithi and ended with a petition being submitted to Administrative Officer Eshwar

AISF District Secretary U. Nagaraju said Education Minister Nara Lokesh had promised during the Yuvagalam Padayatra that GO 77 would be scrapped within 100 days of assuming office. However, he alleged that the government had not kept its word. He added that the order is still affecting students from low-income families studying in private postgraduate colleges, with many being forced to discontinue their studies due to a lack of financial sup-



Nagaraju demanded the immediate release of Rs 6,400 crore in pending dues, pointing out that students who completed their courses have not received their certificates. He recalled announcements made during the budget session, where the government had said Rs 3,900 crore would be released first, followed by Rs 2,600 crore, but claimed that no funds had been provided yet.

He also urged the government to continue offline

admissions for degree courses and criticised the focus on political and public events like Mahanadu and PTM meetings, saying they do little to help students. Nagaraju warned of intensified protests if the government fails to respond to their demands.

AISF District President P. Shekhar, Assistant Secretary Hemanand, teachers J Abhishek and Grace Prakash, and student leaders Ganesh, Surya, and Abhi also took part in the protest.

#### **Move to privatise** govt medical colleges opposed

keep tractors ready for trans-portation and to issue alerts to those living in the second warning zone. Special attention should be given to pregnant women, the elderly, and individuals with serious health conditions, who must be shifted to the nearest Community Health Centres (CHCs), she

The Collector further instructed the Marketing

Department to ensure the supply of vegetables as needed. She ordered that tarpaulins, boats, life jackets, expert swimmers, and rope teams with trained personnel be deployed in Kukkunur and Velerupadu mandals for effective flood relief and rehabilitation operations. "There should be no scope for negligence in handling the rehabilitation efforts," she stressed.

The District Panchayat Officer (DPO) was directed to maintain proper sanitation and cleanliness in the relief centres, while officials were asked to set up medical camps in these locations.

She also stated that flood relief efforts must be closely monitored by the Jangareddygudem RDO, ITDA Project Officer, and special officers of Kukkunur and Velerupadu mandals. Field staff are to remain on high alert and respond promptly to evolving situa-

Lastly, the Collector ordered preventive measures to stop people from crossing culverts, causeways, and roads inundated by floodwaters.

"They (international media)

wrote these things and put out things. The images only showed 13 air bases in Pakistan before and after May 10, whether it was in Sargodha, Rahim Yar Khan, Chaklala. I am only telling you what the foreign media put out on the basis of images. We are capable of doing that (damage

Stressing that positive things should be taught, he said that the contributions of those who served the country and the state should be equally mentioned but those Congress leaders who imposed the Emergency and killed democracy have been glorified in these textbooks.

The books only glorified Congress leaders, specifically the Gandhi family. Key figures

Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, Dr Ambedkar and even Congress leader Syama Prasad Mookerjee, who later founded the Bharatiya Janata Sangh, were ignored. The textbooks failed to highlight their contributions while extensively promoting the Gandhi family," he said on Thursday.



In a prelude to the 2025 Assembly elections in Bihar, the revision of electoral rolls by the Election Commission (EC) has triggered a major controversy, with the Opposition alleging that the process being followed is opaque and exclusionary. The Congress and RJD alleged that the process risked disenfranchising a significant number of voters, particularly those from marginalised and rural communities, due to a lack of clarity around acceptable documentation and limited avenues

It all began with the Election Commission's decision to revise the voter lists and ask voters to furnish identity proofs if they were not in the 2003 voter lists. What added to woes of the people was that the generally accepted Government ids like Aadhar, ration card etc. were not acceptable

This meant mass deletions of voters, as most people in villages and marginalised communities did not have those documents. Now, with the Supreme Court weighing in and offering clear guidance on permissible documents for voter verification, the issue appears to be heading toward resolution, though the final verdict is yet to come. Seeking judicial intervention, petitions were filed in the Supreme Court challenging the EC's methodology.

The core contention was that the exclusion of key identity documents - such as Aadhaar cards, ration cards, and even existing voter IDs from the verification process was arbitrary and in violation of citizens' democratic rights. The unilateral manner in which the EC was operating raised serious concerns of disenfranchise a huge chunk of population. However, in a recent hearing, the Supreme Court opined that the Election Commission include Aadhaar, voter ID cards, and ration cards as part of the enumeration and verification process. While the Court stopped short of issuing a formal directive, its suggestion carries weight and is expected to influence the EC's final approach.

The next hearing on the matter is scheduled for July 28, by which time the EC has to file its response. While the larger constitutional questions remain pending, the SC's interim suggestion already marks a significant course correction. It ensures that the electoral process in Bihar remains participatory, inclusive, and constitutionally sound.

The ball is now in the EC's court. It is expected that the poll panel will align its voter verification process with the Supreme Court's guidance. This is especially crucial in a state known for its caste complexities, migrant population, and economic vulnerabilities. While the controversy has not yet fully subsided, the SC's intervention has underscored the critical importance of transparent and inclusive electoral processes in safeguarding the democratic rights of marginalised people.

## Surging crime in Bangladesh

Human rights reports and police data reveal a grim picture of a nation where criminal gangs flourish with impunity, law enforcement remains demoralised and overstretched, and the general public is left vulnerable and afraid

he precipitous decline in the law-andorder situation in Bangladesh under the interim Government headed by Chief Adviser Muhammad Yunus is causing widespread concern in the country. An editorial, published in Dhaka Tribune on February 23, 2025, under the heading, "When will we get back law and order?" stated, "Bangladesh has been suffering due to a severe void in law and order since the fall of the previous Government in August last year. With a noticeable uptick in the number of criminal activity, of varying size and scope, the country has been in the grips of a veritable crime wave, and the recent robbery of a moving bus along the Dhaka-Rajshahi route is only further proof that our law enforcement has been nothing if not inadequate for the past few months in carrying out their duties.

Expressions of alarm continued as the situation worsened. An editorial carried in *The* Daily Star on July 4, 2025, under the heading "We must send an undiluted message against mob violence," stated, "Even the interim Government, while repeatedly assuring us that no mob activities would be tolerated, has frequently fallen short of backing those assurances with swift and firm action."

The alarm is understandable given the seriousness of the situation. There has been a massive upsurge in crimes of every nature — murder, mob violence, lynchings, drug trafficking, mugging, armed robbery, rape, molestation and abuse of women, thefts, assaults, forcible occupation of property and business establishments. The situation started deteriorating almost immediately after the forcible ouster of Sheikh Hasina's Government on August 5, 2024. According to a report by Nuruzzaman Labu appearing in Dhaka Tribune of December 22, 2024, under the heading, "Mugging, murder rates climb nationwide despite increased efforts," there were 583, 399 and 337 murders respectively in the whole of Bangladesh in September, October and November, 2024. The corresponding figures for the same months in 2023 were 278, 258 and 227. On February 27, 2025, Prothom Alo English carried a report by Partha Shankar Saha under the heading "Mob beatings claim 121 lives in 6 months, what does the law say." It attributed to the human rights organisation Manabadhikar Sanskriti Songstha (henceforth Shongstha) the figure of 121 persons being killed in mob violence between August 2024 and January 2025. According to another human rights organisation, Ain o Salish Kendra, 146 people were killed in such incidents in 2024 against 51 in 2023. A report by a staff correspondent, as updated on March 31, 2025, and appearing under the heading "Number of rapes in March over double that



in February," in Prothom Alo English, attributed to the Shongstha the statement that there were 132 rapes in Bangladesh in March 2025,

against 57 in February. The number of gang rapes in these two months were 17 and 25 respectively.

According to the same organisation, 52 cases of political violence in March affected 459 persons, of whom 12 were killed and 447 injured. An editorial titled 'Tackling the rising

tide of crime" in Dhaka Tribune of January 11, 2025, stated that 1,361 murders were reported nationwide in Bangladesh from August 1 to November 30, 2024, against 1,158 from April 1 to July 31 of the same year. Criminal gangs have mushroomed. A report by Mehedi Khan, appearing under the heading "Over 50 criminal gangs active under various names in 4 thanas of Dhaka" on June 9, 2025, states, "Criminal gangs have sprouted up in four thanas of the capital's western zones — Adabor, Mohammadpur, Dhanmondi, and Hazaribagh. The criminal groups are active in these densely populated areas, involved in various offences including drug trafficking, mugging, robbery and extortion. These gangs openly brandish weapons and engage in various criminal activities. They have also become embroiled in deadly clashes over territorial control and dominance in the area." It is not that efforts have not been made to control the situation. As early as September 17, 2024, Bangladesh's interim Government issued an order giving commissioned officers of Bangladesh's Army the magisterial powers vested in executive magistrates and put them under district magistrates or deputy commissioners. Among other things, this gave them the power to make arrests and disperse unlawful rallies. The order, which was to come into effect immediately, was for a period of 60 days. The order was renewed for the fourth time on May 8, 2025, and for the same duration, with effect from May 14, 2025.

A much-vaunted effort was the launching of what was termed as "Operation Devil Hunt." According to a report by Ali Asif Shawon published in Dhaka Tribune on February 9, 2025, under the heading "What is Operation Devil Hunt," Bangladesh's Home Affairs Adviser, Lt-Gen (Retd) Jahangir Alam Chowdhury told reporters that the operation would focus on detaining individuals who threatened the nation's stability and would continue until all the devils were brought to justice. It would incorporate not only the police but also personnel from the Bangladesh Army, Navy, Air Force, Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB), Ansar, and the Coast Guard, he added. The result was a damp squib despite the arrest of 11,882 persons until March 1, 2025.

A core committee, meeting at the Home Adviser's residence on March 2, 2025, decided that the operations by joint forces to control crime would continue but without the nomenclature of Operation Devil Hunt. Why did it fail? In an article under the heading "Gutsy women in Uttara and the Government's Operation Devil Hunt" in Prothom Alo English, the paper's Joint Editor and a poet, Sohrab Hasan, wrote, "From media reports it is apparent that 90 per cent of those being detained under Operation Devil Hunt are leaders and activists of the toppled Awami League. That means they have been caught for past crimes. It is certainly a

good initiative to bring to book those who misused state power in the past. But will those who are presently carrying out criminal activities be able to slip free?" The basic cause of the failure was the weakness of Bangladesh's police and its lack of confidence to act firmly. Its personnel had mostly gone into hiding in the face of fierce mob attacks following Sheikh Hasina's fall. There was no policeman in the streets from the evening of August 5 to August 8, 2024, when Yunus' interim Government assumed office. They slowly and fearfully trickled back to work thereafter, but some did not, and manpower remained short. There was lack of mobility. Five hundred police vehicles were burnt during mob attacks in Dhaka alone and there were no replacements. Massive purges of police personnel at all levels, accused of perpetrating atrocities during the uprising in July 2024 against Sheikh Hasina, played havoc with the

This was made worse by the fact that those from outside Dhaka, who filled the places of the ousted personnel, knew very little about Dhaka and the demands of policing the complex city. Nor did they have any network of informants. And this at a time when much of the force's time was — and is — spent in tracking down and jailing Awami League leaders and activists in hiding. Criminals are flourishing and are filled with a feeling of impunity. Hundreds of them, who were incarcerated by Sheikh Hasina, were released on bail in the couple of days following her ouster. Many who had fled abroad have returned. Turf wars between their gangs followed and continue. And all of them prey on the common people.

## Kolhapuri vs Prada: The GI Controversy



n June 25, during its Spring/Summer 2026 menswear show in Milan, Italian luxury fashion house Prada debuted shoes inspired by India's GI-tagged Kolhapuri chappals, which elicited outrage over cultural appropriation. The brand was accused of appropriating traditional Indian craftsmanship without due credit or acknowledgement of its cultural and geographic origins. A major ethical and legal controversy has arisen between the globally renowned luxury fashion house Prada and the traditional, handmade leather footwear known as Kolhapuri chappals, which have deep cultural roots in India.

Traditional Kolhapuri chappal manufacturers are preparing to file a lawsuit against Prada, asserting that the company's latest shoe series has borrowed the unique design elements of Kolhapuri chappals without authorisation or credit. This scandal has raised serious concerns about intellectual property rights, cultural appropriation, and, above all, the violation of protection ensured by India's Geographical Indication (GI) system. Famous for its craft artistry, which consists of fine hand-stitching and vegetabledyed leather, Kolhapuri chappals are indigenous to three districts in Karnataka and Maharashtra:

Kolhapur, Sangli, and Belgaum. The Geographical Indications of Goods (Registration and Protection) Act of 1999, a legisla-

tive mechanism that is used to protect goods with specific charpotential avenues for seeking legal remedies across borders. acteristics or reputations due to origin, granted this unique tection from unauthorised commercial use as well as legally validating the regional and cultural uniqueness of such goods. Prada's launch of a new line of open-toe leather sandals that look like traditional Kolhapuri chappals in terms of soles, toe knots, and leather construction ignited the controversy.

Indian craftsmen and cooperatives argue that Prada could have infringed the GI protection for Kolhapuri chappals by not recognising the traditional origin of this style. They view

> when the artistic work of poor craftspeople is utilised for global gain without equitable benefit-sharing, and not merely as an aesthetic imitation. Legally, this suit is soundly based in India's GI Act, specifically Section 21, which bars unauthorised persons from using a registered GI in any manner that may cause customers to be misled or that will constitute unfair competition. In addition, Section 22 enumerates other forms of GI infringement, including blatant abuse, false representations of origin, and actions that discredit or debase the GI's already acquired reputation. In addition, GI protection is expected to be enforceable worldwide under Articles 22 to 24 due to the fact that both India and Italy are signatories to the

Agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights(TRIPS) under the WTO, thus giving affected artisans

By GI tagging, India has for long encouraged the conserve cultural forms and tradition practices. There is a pressing requirement for robust international mechanisms able to effectively counter GI protections in cross-border cases. The issue raises the broader ethical debate of cultural appropriation versus appreciation, as well as its legality. While fashion often takes inspiration from across the globe, there is a deep imbalance in cross-cultural exchange seen in

not acknowledging, appreciating, and compensating traditional cultures for their effort. Global brands perpetuate systems of exploitation and erasure when they commodify local work without contributing to the societies of origin.

Hence, ethical grounds necessitate that businesses like Prada

be accountable, not only through legal compliance but also through promoting transparency, equitable trade, and true collaboration with communities of artisans. Finally, the legal action the Kolhapuri chappal manufacturers are contemplating is something greater than a conflict regarding ownership of the design; it is a declaration in favour of the preservation of traditional knowledge systems, the exercise of intellectual sovereignty, and the protection of cultural heritage. India can well set a precedent for safeguarding its cultural heritage due to the strict enforcement of the GI law and support from global legal systems such as TRIPS. It is important that history not only be preserved but also shared equitably and with morals as globalisation and tradition meet increasingly.

#### **Namibian Honour for PM Modi**

## From AI to apocalypse: Why the real crisis isn't in space, but on Earth

As inequalities deepen and ecosystems unravel, the call to build a sustainable, resilient future grows more urgent. India, among other nations, is waking up to this reality — but time is fast running out. The decisive decade is here and now

n an age marked by spectacular developments in Artificial Intelligence, space technologies, and quantum computing, humanity stands at a paradox. While we have gained tremendous success in exploring outer space with the resounding success of AXIOM4, our planet burns, floods, and suffocates under the weight of disasters, many of which are a result of our own making. The challenge of our time is not just to advance but to endure — to ensure our civilisation remains livable, equitable, and sustainable.

This is not an environmental concern alone. It is a civilisational crisis. And we have no other option but to act now. The recent incidents of floods, cloud bursts, receding glaciers, pollution levels, forest fires, and availability of toxic materials in water and food items, besides microplastics, continue to remain a challenge for India and other countries. There is always a dilemma between growth, economic development and protection of the environment for policymakers and Government agencies. As long as we continue to determine the societal development based on the parameters of GDP, per capita consumption, etc, the issue of climate resilience and sustainability will continue to be ignored and not accorded the due priority.

#### The Global Wake-Up Call

In his foreword to this year's Global Assessment Report (GAR), UN Secretary-General António Guterres put his opening remarks as "Disasters are a defining feature of the 21st century." He further

observes that "Storms, fires, floods, heatwaves, and droughts have become fiercer and more frequent, exacting an ever-greater toll on communities and economies — from eroding sustainable development gains, to rendering entire regions uninsurable, and knocking chunks out of countries' GDP."

The GAR report 2025 estimates a staggering \$2.3 trillion in annual disaster-related losses when cascading ecosystem impacts are considered. The signal is loud and clear: climate resilience and sustainability are not peripheral — they must be central to the global agenda of development and growth.

## Disasters: Natural, Yes. But Mostly Human-Made

Disasters are no longer isolated incidents — they are a continuum. Take the wildfires in the U.S., which ravaged over 1,000 acres, or the record-breaking heatwave in Europe (June 2025), claiming 2,300 lives, of which 1,500 were directly linked to fossil-fuel-induced warming.

In Texas, four months' worth of rain fell in four hours just last week, from 4th to 7th July, flooding entire cities and killing over a hundred people, many of them

illdren.
In the Global South, the picture is even bleaker.



India, Bangladesh, and Nigeria faced devastating floods in 2024, displacing over 19 million people. Across East and Southern Africa, drought threatens the survival of more than 90 million people, pushing many toward starvation. Water scarcity, projected to grow by 40 per cent by 2030, is already disrupting agriculture, energy, and urban life.

While these may seem like "natural" disasters, they are fueled by human choices: deforestation, unplanned urbanisation, pollution, and the relentless pursuit of extractive growth and greed.

## The Invisible Crisis: Pollution, Hunger and Health

Climatic variations are natural phenomena which we often refer to as nature's fury, but in reality, more than natural incidents, human actions have been pushing ecosystems and human civilisation to the brink of disaster.

Despite reasonable health facilities at least in the Metro Cities, the following pointers to insidious silent killers:

• Air pollution leads to 6.7 to 8.1 million

- deaths annually more than malaria,
  HIV, and war combined.
- Road accidents claim 1.18 million lives each year.

- Resilient Communities: Strengthen both urban and rural systems with green infrastructure and equitable resources.
- Climate Justice: Ensure adaptation funds and resources reach the vulnerable and are not monopolised by the rich.
- Education & Mindset Shift: Integrate climate consciousness, empathy, and intergenerational

thinking into school and college curricula.

## Global Cooperation: A Shared Imperative

India's G20 leadership and initiative for launching the Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure (CDRI) is commendable. So are initiatives by the UNEP's Global Adaptation Network, the Global Environment Facility (GEF), and the EU's GCCA+ program for Small Island Developing States.

The proposed World Summit on Disaster Management (WSDM) 2025, from 28 - 30 November at Dehradun, the gateway to the majestic Himalayas, also serves as a dynamic platform to connect research, policy, and real-world applications. Bringing together researchers, scientists, policymakers, practitioners, and industry leaders. Organised by Uttarakhand State Council for Science & Technology (UCOST), Govt of Uttarakhand, with an overarching theme of 'Strengthening International Cooperation for Building Resilient Communities', this summit aims to address global challenges while fostering experiential learning, multi-stakeholder engagement, and the creation of innovative, scalable solutions for a resilient future.

#### **Conclusion: The Decisive Decade**

While cloudbursts, wildfires, and cyclones make headlines, the real disaster may be our inaction. Our ecosystems are overstretched. Our cities are overheating. Our people are losing faith. The coming decade is not just another phase — it is the decisive window. A turning point, or a tipping point.

We need to stop treating sustainability as a slogan and start living it as a survival strategy. It is desirable to move beyond rhetoric and towards regeneration. Let us remember that the planet does not need saving — we do. Humanity must choose: collapse or do a course correction.

The window is narrow, but the hope is wide-if we could act now.

Both national and international organisations have appreciated the need to act fast to address these concerns, but systemic follow-up and implementation need commitment and conviction beyond the narrow and short-term Goals. Mainstreaming climate resilience with every Government program/scheme can be a step for building a sustainable intervention framework.

Local Community involvement through identified initiatives, such as — collection of pine leaves in the forest by SHG women and their conversion to biomass fuel, can prevent forest fires and also generate employment opportunities for the local people.

There is a need to identify such micro-level initiatives, both at the village level and in urban colonies, to promote climate resilience and sustainability as an "Andolan" through mass and regular participation of all stakeholders.

## The Promise and Challenge of Vertical Farming in India

ultivating and growing crops or plants in vertically stacked layers and vertically inclined surfaces is known as vertical farming. The world is on the verge of a population explosion, and feeding everyone is the most pressing concern. Per capita land area has decreased due to population growth. In the past, agricultural scientists used their creative thinking to create hybrid or improved high-yielding varieties, better methods, better tools and implements, integrated practices in water, nutrient, insect, and pest management, greenhouse technology, and even genetically modified crops in an effort to feed the world's growing population.

These once — revolutionary initiatives now seem insufficient. The goal of vertical farming has entirely altered in the modern day, and it is now limited to using every available square inch of land and space — rural or urban — to produce as much food as possible for the world's hungry. All around the world, it has now become a new farming technology. Vertical farming is taking over in India as well. With significant net returns, vertical farming is attracting a lot of entrepreneurs. Buildings, warehouses, roofs, and balconies are all suitable locations for vertical farming.

#### Advantages of vertical farming

1. The primary benefit of vertical farming is its ability to produce incredibly high yields per unit of available land or area.

2. Producing food year-round without being vulnerable to natural disasters such as floods, severe rains, irregular rainfall, hail, snowfall, drought, dry spells, very high temperatures, cold waves, pest and disease outbreaks, etc.

3. It lowers transportation costs for loads of food grains from rural to urban regions and lessens the likelihood of spoiling. The amount of fossil fuels used to transport agricultural products from rural areas to urban areas has also decreased.

4. The consumption of water in vertical farming is 70-95 per cent lower than in conventional farming

5. Because vertical farming requires 90 per cent less soil or none at all, insect and disease infestations are avoided.

6. Since no pesticides are used, food that is pesticide-free or organic is produced.

7. Customers receive fresh products with all of their natural nutritional characteristics since the food supply chain is shortened.

1. The main issue is the initial, exorbitant expense of setting up the vertical farming system. It will



cover the cost of building the buildings as well as their automation, such as weather control, programmable LED lighting, automated racking and stacking, remote control and software, computerised and monitoring systems, etc.

2. High energy costs since artificial lighting is used only for plant growth.

3. If not managed, the extra nutrients employed in vertical farming might disrupt and damage the primary metropolitan water

supply.
4. Even a tiny amount of heat from LED lighting systems can make it difficult to control temperatures, particularly during the summer, and can overload air conditioning systems, which will result in higher energy costs.

5. With vertical farming, a lot of trash, plant waste, etc., will be produced surrounding the structures, which must be disposed of appropriately.

6. At first, a skilled workforce will be lacking and will require training.

#### Feasibility of vertical farming

India is among the top producers of fruits, vegetables, and a wide range of other agricultural products. Vertical farming has been adopted in India. Experts at ICAR are developing the idea of "vertical farming" under soilless settings, which would allow food crops to be grown without the need for soil or pesticides, even on multi-story buildings in cities like Chennai, Mumbai, Kolkata, and New Delhi. Researchers at Nadia's Bidhan Chandra Krishi Viswavidyalaya have already made some progress on hydroponically vertical farming on a modest scale. Vertical farming has been used on a small scale in Punjab and Nadia,

West Bengal. In Nadia, Bidhan Chandra Krishi Vishwavidhalaya has had some success cultivating tomatoes and brinjal. Punjab has also been successful in using vertical gardening to produce potato tubers. An Indian design-in-tech firm called Idea Farms produces vertical farms, which are popular because their food is organic, of excellent quality, and their supply is reliable.

Greenopia, a firm located in Bangalore, sells packages that include the appropriate seeds, enhanced soil, and smart self-watering containers. The sensor-embedded pots alert you when you need to add more water from outside sources and replace soil moisture as needed. U-Farm Technologies, a start-up company located in Mumbai, is customising modular farms for supermarkets or individual residential complexes, utilising the hydroponic growing technology. India is seeing an increasing number of vertical farming start-ups.

Critical issues in Indian farming, such as an excess or shortage of agricultural products, excessive use of fertilisers and pesticides, degraded soils, and even unemployment, may undoubtedly be resolved by vertical farming.

However, there are obstacles, such as the Indian farming community's reluctance to embrace vertical farming. Indian farmers are dealing with a number of issues, such as water shortage, lack of electrical supply throughout the day, guaranteeing minimum support prices, and little control over market surplus.

A significant obstacle to the adoption of vertical farming in India is the initial, exorbitant cost of infrastructure for a large-scale farm. Other issues facing vertical farming in India include public awareness, the agricultural community's inclusivity, technical know-how, the expense of maintaining and administering the systems, and the industry's economic sustainability.

# The rising role of Anganwadi workers amidst challenges

he once sat in a shaded corner of the village, clothed in a sari, hunched over 11 paper registers, recording births, weighing babies, and distributing dry rations. Few noticed her. Fewer still imagined she was building the foundations of the Indian state. Today, she carries a smartphone. She scans QR codes, verifies biometrics, delivers nutrition kits, and teaches the alphabet.

The Anganwadi worker, quietly and without fanfare, has become the face of India's most local and human form of governance. What changed? Nearly everything.

In 2014, Índia's Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) were still largely analogue. Feedback loops were slow. Growth monitoring data was patchy. Migration of pregnant and lactating women broke service continuity. And the frontline worker operated with little institutional support. The decade that followed brought a quiet technological and administrative revolution, anchored by the rollout of the POSHAN Tracker in 2021.

Today, the numbers tell a radically different story. Over 13.96 lakh Anganwadi Centres are digitally mapped, tracking more than 10 crore beneficiaries in near real-time. Ninety-nine per cent of these are Aadhaar-authenticated, making nutrition governance more targeted, accountable, and responsive than ever before. More than 12 lakh smartphones and nearly 13.85 lakh growth monitoring devices are in the hands of frontline staff, transforming paper-bound posts into smart ser-

A helpline (14408), launched in 2022, has registered a massive number of calls, largely from Anganwadi workers seeking tech support. That such a system now exists is itself a marker of transformation. Field workers, once isolated, are now part of a responsive and digitally networked public system.

But this is not just a story of arms and

vice points.

But this is not just a story of apps and devices. It is one of the structural reimaginations. The Government's push to upgrade two lakh centres into Smart Anganwadi Centres equipped with LED screens, RO water filters, digital learning aids, and BaLA (Building as Learning Aid) murals signals a shift in what a service delivery point means. By March 2025, 1,70,337 such upgrades had already been sanctioned. If a new kind of state is emerging, it is being built at the doorstep.

The role of the Anganwadi worker has evolved in tandem. Under the "Poshan Bhi, Padhai Bhi" initiative launched in 2023, she is now a foundational educator, delivering early learning as envisioned by the National Education Policy. With flashcards and puzzles, blackboards and stories, she is shaping India's youngest minds, aged 3 to 6, in the most underserved corners of the country.

These are not token changes. They are backed by scale and intent. Over 4.2 lakh Anganwadi work-

ers have been trained in early childhood education methods. Through community drives, they led more than 30 crore activities in a single year. This signals a shift that places women, nutrition, education, and digital inclusion at the centre of statebuilding. And yet, even as expectations rise, so do the gaps. Community demand for quality services has grown. Home visits have increased, especially after the introduction of the Navchetna learning framework for children aged 0 to 3 years.

But basic physical infrastructure continues to be neglected. Many workers still conduct classes in rented buildings, often dilapidated and poorly maintained due to low rental allowances. Some operate under tin roofs. Others are under trees. Everything seems to revolve around the Anganwadi Centre and its beneficiaries, but the woman at the helm remains invisible to the system.

The Centre has become a hub of public delivery, but the woman who runs it is still waiting for recognition. There is pressure to deliver, to stay digitally literate, to ensure transparency, but no clarity on her status as a Government employee. Her workspace is expanding. Her accountability is growing. But the institutional gaze still looks past her.

What is emerging is a new frontline where the Anganwadi worker is not an informal adjunct but a full-fledged node in India's

governance architecture. Policy is slowly catching up. The Ministry has standardised the retirement date to 30 April, raised the minimum educational qualification to Class 12, and introduced a promotion pathway from helper to worker and worker to supervisor. And yet, the paradox remains. Their work is public, but their status is not. Despite handling duties that mirror those of regular Government employees, they are still denied pensions, uniform pay, or formal civil service protections. The care economy,

which is vital to India's human development story, continues to rest on informal shoulders. But the direction of reform is unmistakable. The Anganwadi worker is no longer a passive implementer. She is a decision node. She holds the pulse of the village, tracking health, schooling, nutrition, and migration. Her daily actions now generate national data. Her insights shape programme design. Her presence is not just valuable.

It is indispensable. India's state-building is no longer just a top-down project. It is being constructed from the grassroots, digitally empowered, locally driven, and deeply human. At the heart of this quiet revolution is a woman who carries the weight of the state in one hand and the future of her village in the other.

dani Green Energy Ltd on Friday said its operational renewable energy generation capacity rose 45 per cent to A 15,816 MW during June quarter as compared to the yearago period. It had an operational RE capacity of 10,934 MW in April-June 2024, a regulatory filing said. The 15,816 MW RE capacity includes 11,156 MW solar, 1,986 MW wind and 2,674 MW hybrid renewables. The sale of renewable energy rose 42 per cent to 10,479 million units (MUs) in the quarter from 7,356 MUs in the same period a year ago. The company has already met the 31 per cent or 6,138 MUs of its total committed generation of 19,667 MW (annual commitment as per power purchase agreements) in June quarter only. It operationalised 3,763 MW of solar, 585 MW wind and 534 MW hybrid renewable capacity and added greenfield RE capacity of 1.6 GW in the quarter. The company is aiming 50 GW renewable portfolio by 2030.



#### **Wockhardt to exit US generic** biz; focus on antibiotics

rug firm Wockhardt on Friday said it will exit loss-making US generic business while enhancing focus on new drug liscovery in the field of antibiotics and biological drugs for diabetes. The company is undertaking a significant strategic realignment of its US business in line with its long-term vision to build a differentiated, innovation-driven pharmaceutical enterprise, the Mumbai-based drug firm said in a statement. As part of this transition, the company has decided to exit the US generic pharmaceutical segment, paving the way for a deeper focus and investment in its advanced product portfolio, it added. The drug firm said it will focus on new antibiotic drug discovery, where Wockhardt has established a leadership position globally, with a strong pipeline of differentiated assets. Besides, it would also look at its biological portfolio in Insulin, leveraging advanced technologies to address critical unmet needs in diabetes care. The company said its US generic business has been incurring losses over the past several years In FY2025 alone, the generic business incurred a loss of nearly



### **DGGI** uncovers 6 shell cos issuing fraudulent invoices

ST Intelligence wing DGGI has conducted searches on at least six premises in the city and uncovered fraudulent invoices worth Rs 266 crore and passing of fake ITC of Rs 48 crore from shell companies, the finance ministry said on Friday. Investigation in a case initiated in Bengaluru by the officers of Directorate General of GST Intelligence, Bengaluru Zonal Unit, said four companies, with no business activity, have shown receipt of hundreds of crores worth of goods and services. "The officers of Directorate General of GST Intelligence, Bengaluru Zonal Unit carried out searches in over six premises in Delhi, and uncovered fraudulent invoices worth over Rs 266 crore, involving availment and passing on of fraudulent Input Tax Credit (ITC) of Rs 48 crore from the shell companies," the statement said. The investigation indicated that initially, the key mastermind was one of the CA/statutory auditor, who managed the transactions of these companies.

# **Beware of dealing with** unregistered OBPPs

Leading stock exchanges BSE and NSE on Friday cautioned investors against dealing with unregistered Online Bond Platform Providers (OBPPs), amid the rising popularity of such platforms that offer easier access to various fixedincome instruments.

In a joint statement, the exchanges asked investors to consider various key factors before investing through any online bond platform. These include checking the bond's credit rating, the issuer's repayment track record, the instrument's liquidity, settlement timelines, and tax implica-

Moreover, investors must ensure the platform is registered with Sebi as an Online Bond Platform Provider.

The exchanges also advised investors to thoroughly read platform disclaimers, understand the terms and conditions, and ensure that transactions are conducted through regulated and secure systems.

Given the growing use of these platforms, the exchanges stressed the importance of



understanding the underlying features, risks, and associated costs to make informed investment decisions.

The bourses noted that the risk and return on corporate bond investments vary based on the instrument's credit rating. A rating-wise risk scale, similar to the mutual funds risk-o-meter, could be considered to help investors assess risk more effectively.

Further, the exchanges explained key concepts affecting bond yields. One such concept is Yield to Maturity (YTM), which indicates the total annualised return an investor can expect if the bond is held until maturity. YTM factors in the bond's market price, periodic coupon payments, and the remaining time to maturity.

However, YTM is not a guaranteed return -- it can fluctuate based on market interest rate movements, liquidity conditions, time to maturity, and the creditworthiness of the issuer. If a bond is sold before maturity, the actual return may differ from the indicated YTM.

Typically, when a bond trades below its face value, its YTM is higher than the coupon rate, and vice versa.
The coupon rate refers to the

fixed annual interest paid by the issuer, calculated as a percentage of the bond's face value. This provides investors with regular income --usually semi-annual or annual. However, these payments are not without risk and depend on the issuer's financial health. Any delays or defaults in payment can negatively impact returns Another essential aspect is

the inverse relationship between bond prices and yields. When market interest rates rise, bond prices fall, resulting in higher yields. On the other hand, when interest rates fall, bond prices rise, lowering the yield. Understanding this dynamic is key to assessing interest rate risk and anticipating price movements in the secondary

Lastly, the exchanges highlighted that brokerage reversal or zero brokerage can impact YTM by lowering the invest-ment's overall cost, thereby slightly improving the effective return. Investors should always evaluate final returns after factoring in all costs, fees, and applicable taxes.

While maintaining a stable outlook for the industry, ICRA said that supply chain disruptions, including Pratt & Whitney engine issues, continue to impact capacity and costs.

"For June 2025, domestic air passenger traffic was estimated at 138.7 lakh, 5.1 per cent higher than 132.1 lakh in June 2024. However, it witnessed a marginal decline of 1.3 per cent on a sequential basis. The airlines' capacity deployment in June 2025 was 4.9 per cent higher than June 2024; however, it was 2.3 per cent lower compared to May 2025," it

In the first quarter of 2025-26, domestic air passenger traffic stood at over 4.22 crore.

According to the report, the industry witnessed steady pricing power in FY2025, with sta-



ble yields and domestic air passenger traffic growth tapered to 7.6 per cent.

"... emerging geopolitical and operational headwinds -- in the form of rising crude oil prices (because of the Israel-Iran conflict), closure of the airspace over Iran and Pakistan (for Indian carriers), probable rise in insurance premia (after the recent aeroplane crash) and possible hesitation to travel -warrant close monitoring for potential downside risks.





## 'Listeners don't just want sound — they want emotion,'

# says India's first Urdu R&B artist Farhan Khan

arhan Khan is not your convenarnan Knan is not your conventional rapper. Rooted in the poetic legacy of Agra and sharpened by the hustle of Mumbai, he has emerged as India's first Urdu Rhythm and India's first Urdu Blues (R&B) artist — a title he wears not with ego, but with sincerity and purpose. From the viral success of his debut album *Khansaab* to his award-winning single Jannat, Farhan has carved a lyrical path that blends heartbreak, heritage and hip-hop into something deeply personal, profoundly artistic and culturally resonant.

Now, with *Alif Laila* — a groundbreaking 12-track Urdu concept album — Farhan presents a cinematic and emotional saga that's never been attempted before in Indian music. In this candid and reflective conversation, he opens up about music, memory and the man behind the mic. After the release of *Khansaab*, which drew admiration from heavy-weights like *Badshah*, *Raftaar* and *Divine*, Farhan took his storytelling ambitions to another level. "People call me India's first Urdu R&B artist," he says with humility. "It's a title I don't take lightly. I feel grateful that people resonate with my journey—but I always focus on the next piece, created with the same honesty and precision I carry in my heart." Farhan believes it is the sincerity in his work that

sets it apart. "The honesty in my work is what people connect with," he says. "Even in a space led by giants, when your art is real, people can feel it." That authenticity was central to *Jannat*, the song that earned him the Best Lyricist award at the 2024 CMA Awards. But for him, the true success lay in staying true to his vision. "I wrote *Jannat* in 2020 but waited four years to release it exactly the way I envisioned. That's the kind of victory I value most," he shares. "Success was choosing to believe in my sound, my pace and my vision — even when it was-

With Alif Laila, Farhan has built not just an album but a universe. Narrated through the fictional character of Alif Abbas Qadri, the project delves into themes of love, loss, memory and legacy. Hailed as India's first major Urdu concept album, it follows an unconventional narrative structure — Side B, which captures the heartbreak, was released first, followed by Side A, which celebrates love. "It's often said that those who stand by you in your pain deserve to share your joy," Farhan explains. "By showing Alif's heartbreak first, listeners can deeply



began early — not only through music but also through cinema. "Since childhood, I've been through cinema. "Since childhood, I've been obsessed with cinema," he says. "Writing songs, filming, acting, storytelling — I'm living all my passions through this album. It's a story shaped from the pieces of my own journey."

Though poetic, Alif Laila also shows Farhan's sharp understanding of the business of music. "I've worked in my father's shop since I was a kid. That experience taught me what sells and how to sell it," he says. "Listners don't just want sound — they

Having grown up in both Agra and Mumbai, Farhan believes the contrast between the two cities has shaped him profoundly. "I carry the simplicity of Agra in my roots and the fire of Mumbai in my spirit," he says. "That duality gives my music both heart and hustle."

'That's a tough question. I still haven't understood how do I switch off because I never switch off and sometimes it's very funny and it's very weird," he said when asked how he unwinds. 

# Oh Bhama Ayyo Rama: Ayyo, even rama can't save this film!

ctor Suhas, who began his career in supporting roles before transitioning to lead roles, has been known for picking diverse scripts. With Oh Bhama Ayyo Rama, he teams up with debutant director Ram Godhala. The film also marks the Telugu debut of Malayalam actress Malavika Manoj as the female lead. Music is composed by Radhan. Here's a look at the story and how it unfolds.

Ram (Suhas) saves a girl named Satyabhama (Malavika Manoj) after she meets with an accident. Impressed by him, she starts liking him and eventually falls in love. Satyabhama aspires to become a film director and keeps narrating her stories to Ram and his friends.

Ram, on the other hand, lost his mother (Anita Hassanandani) during his childhood. His father (Ravindra Vijay) is a film director. Though Ram was initially fond of films, a troubled childhood made him lose interest. Now staying with his uncle (Ali) and two friends, Ram seems disinterested in life.

Why has Ram distanced himself from cinema? What trauma is he carrying? Who exactly is Satyabhama and how does she influence Ram's transformation? These are the questions the film attempts to answer.

#### **ANALYSIS**

When a debut director gets a chance to helm a film, the least expectation is a coherent and engaging story. Having worked as an assistant with various directors, Ram Godhala makes his directorial debut with Oh Bhama Ayyo Rama and unfortunately, it falls flat



on almost every count.

It's not about whether the lead actor is a big star or the film has a large budget. What matters is a compelling story. Even a small film with a thoughtful narrative can strike a chord. Sadly, Ram Godhala fails to deliver even the basics. From the very beginning, the film tests the audience's patience. Especially grating are the sequences where the female lead narrates her imaginary stories—three long and frustrating scenes that derail

frustrating scenes that derail the viewing experience. There is no gripping story-line, the screenplay is weak and the dialogues are uninspired. The plot feels painfully outdat-ed and the narration is excruciatingly slow.

The first half is dull, where the hero saves the girl and she obsessively follows him thereafter. It's baffling how the director even wrote such scenes, let alone filmed them. With crores invested, one would expect the makers to at least assess the potential of the story and the director's vision.

Despite claiming ten years of experience, the director seems to have learned nothing. Crafting love stories, emotional arcs and family drama is not new, but execution is everything — and in this case, everything misfires. Even the so-called interval bang lacks sense. You'd hope the second half redeems the film, but

it only gets worse.

This film serves as a wakeup call for aspiring produc-ers who dream of fame without understanding the nuances of filmmaking. When the entire project relies solely on the director's shoulders — without any oversight or constructive input — the outcome is exactly like this: a costly misfire with nothing to show for it but regret.

Malavika Manoj, despite being a newcomer to Telugu cinema, is the only positive takeaway. She looks fresh, is pleasant onscreen and tries her best — but unfortunately, she's trapped in a lackluster script that gives her little to work with.

Sathvik Anand and Moin Mohammad play Suhas' friends but their comedy track is more irritating than funny. Anita Hassanandani appears only in the second half and in a limited role, while Ravindra Vijay's role as Suhas' father is a wasted opportunity.

Babloo (Pridhvi) appears in only a couple of scenes and Ali, usually known for his comic timing, plays a serious role that doesn't leave any impression. Directors Harish Shankar and Maruthi make cameos — perhaps out of goodwill — but it's hard to understand why they agreed to appear in this film.



K Sagar, known for his iconic role as RK Naidu in the TV serial *Mogali Rekulu*, has made several attempts to establish himself on the big screen with films like *Siddhartha*, *Man of the Match* and Shaadi Mubarak, though none of them brought him notable success. He's back with The 100, released this Friday. Directed by Raghav Omkar Sashidhar, the film features Misha Narang as the female lead, with music composed by Harshavardhan Rameshwar.

Vikranth (RK Sagar) is a sincere and hard-working police officer. During duty at a func-tion, he notices a young dancer, Aarthi (Misha Narang) and devel-

ops feelings for her. Meanwhile, a mysterious gang of masked dacoits has been robbing rich house-holds, stealing only gold while leaving behind money and other valuables.

During his investigation, Vikranth observes a pattern—the robberies all occur on Amavasya (new moon) nights. He discovers that Aarthi's house was also targeted, but to his surprise, her family never filed a police complaint. Upon digging deeper, Vikranth learns that Aarthi was raped during

the robbery.

Determined to solve the case, he captures the dacoit gang, only to be shocked when they claim they never harmed any women and only stole gold. So, who raped Aarthi and what was the motive? Four young men surrender to the police claiming they committed the crime—but are they really the culprits? Why did

Vishnu Priya commit sui-cide? What's the connection between all these incidents? The crux of the film lies in uncovering the truth behind these events.

Director Raghav Omkar Sashidhar comes up with an interesting story, which starts strongly with Vishnu Priya's suicide and the gold heists. These elements spark curiosity and provide a solid setup. However, the film gradually slips into mediocrity due to the director's lack of experience. Instead of turning into a gripping thriller with twists and turns, *The 100* becomes a regular, formulation outling. ic outing.

As is often the case in Telugu cinema, the

serious narrative. *The 100* belongs to the investigative thriller genre, much like the *HIT* series, which demands a tighter screenplay and less cinematic liberty. Vikranth hiring an ethical hacker who can access any mobile phone or camera within seconds is highly unrealistic and purely cinematic. Most of the investigation takes place in the police station with Vikranth monitoring surveillance footage. While not inherently wrong, it lacks the excitement of on-field investigation, evidence gathering and high-stakes confrontations that make thrillers engaging.

Scenes featuring NHRC officers grilling Vikranth feel excessive and unrealistic. The SI Giridhar character also becomes irritating due to his over-the-top portrayal. The film

introduces action scenes and glorifies the protagonist in a way that feels disconnected from the tone of the core story. With a bit more attention to detail and tighter execution, this could have been a taut thriller-but as it stands, it falls short.

#### **PERFORMANCES**

RK Sagar fits well into the role of a cop. His body lan-guage and dialogue delivery reflect his effort. While play-ing a police officer isn't new for him, he brings a more serious tone to the role this

Misha Narang looks beau-tiful and delivers a neat performance. She gets a sub-stantial role and makes good use of the opportunity. Dhanya Balakrishnan plays a key part and fits her role perfectly. Vishnu Priya's character is crucial to the storyline and she does justice to her part.

Kalyani Natarajan, as Sagar's mother, performs gracefully. Tarak Ponnappa appears in a negative role and has a strong

screen presence. VV Giridhar, as the SI, occasionally goes overboard with loud dialogues that feel forced.

#### **TECHNICAL ASPECTS**

Shyam K Naidu's cinematography is good and supports the film's tone. Harshavardhan Rameshwar's music is average and doesn't leave a strong impact. The dialogues are passable but not particularly memorable.

*The 100* had the potential to be a gripping investigative thriller, thanks to its interesting premise. However, due to weak execution, forced songs and unnecessary cinematic liberties, it ends up as a formulaic film.
