

Sunita Williams touches down on Mother Earth

Stuck in space no more, NASA astronauts Butch Wilmore and Sunita Williams returned to Earth on Tuesday, hitching a different ride home to close out a saga that began with a bungled test flight more than nine months ago.

Their SpaceX capsule parachuted into the Gulf of Mexico in the early evening, just hours after departing the International Space Station. Splashdown occurred off the coast of Tallahassee in the Florida Panhandle, bringing their unplanned odyssey to an end.

Within an hour, the astronauts were out of their capsule, waving and smiling at the cameras while being hustled away in reclining stretchers for routine medical checks.

It all started with a flawed Boeing test

flight last spring.

The two expected to be gone just a week or so after launching on Boeing's new Starliner crew capsule on June 5. So many problems cropped up on the way to the space station that NASA eventually sent Starliner back empty and transferred the test pilots to SpaceX, pushing their homecoming into February. Then SpaceX capsule issues added another month's delay.

Sunday's arrival of their relief crew meant Wilmore and Williams could finally leave. NASA cut them loose a little early, given the iffy weather forecast later this week. They checked out with NASA's Nick Hague and Russia's Alexander Gorbunov, who arrived in their own SpaceX capsule last fall with two empty seats reserved for the Starliner duo.

Wilmore and Williams ended up spending 286 days in space - 278 days longer than anticipated when they launched. They

circled Earth 4,576 times and traveled 121 million miles (195 million kilometers) by the time of splashdown.

"On behalf of SpaceX, welcome home," radioed SpaceX Mission Control in California. "What a ride," replied Hague, the capsule's commander. "I see a capsule full of grins ear to ear."

Dolphins circled the capsule as divers readied it for hoisting onto the recovery ship. Once safely on board, the side hatch was opened and the astronauts were helped out, one by one. Williams was next-to-last out, followed by Wilmore who gave two gloved thumbs-up.

Wilmore and Williams' plight captured the world's attention, giving new meaning to the phrase "stuck at work" and turning "Butch and Sunita" into household names. While other astronauts had logged longer spaceflights over the decades, none had to deal with so much uncertain-

ty or see the length of their mission expand by so much.

Wilmore and Williams quickly transitioned from guests to full-fledged station crew members, conducting experiments, fixing equipment and even spacewalking together. With 62 hours over nine spacewalks, Williams set a record: the most time spent spacewalking over a career among female astronauts.

Both had lived on the orbiting lab before and knew the ropes, and brushed up on their station training before rocketing away. Williams became the station's commander three months into their stay and held the post until earlier this month.

Their mission took an unexpected twist in late January when President Donald Trump asked SpaceX founder Elon Musk to accelerate the astronauts' return and blamed the delay on the Biden administration.

Gujarat village goes over the moon

Residents of NASA astronaut Sunita Williams' ancestral village Jhulasan in Gujarat's Mehsana district on Wednesday celebrated her safe return by bursting firecrackers, distributing sweets, dancing and offering prayers to the local deity.

Chief Minister Bhupendra Patel also extended congratulations through X to "our very own Sunita Williams" and said people in India take immense pride in her connection to "our" land, celebrating her as a "shining example of our shared heritage and aspirations".

As soon as a SpaceX capsule carrying Williams and astronaut Butch Wilmore splashed down near the Florida coast in the US after their nine-month stay at the International Space Station (ISS), the villagers erupted in joy, bursting firecrackers, dancing and chanting "Har Har Mahadev".

The villagers had organised a 'yagna'

praying for Williams' safe return. They said their happiness knew no end and hoped to see Williams visit her ancestral village soon and inspire school students who are already filled with curiosity and follow in her footsteps.

Students of the local government school gathered to celebrate the occasion by performing garba, a traditional Gujarati folk dance, and took out a procession with Williams' photo to the nearby temple of goddess Dola Mata.

As the procession made its way from the school premises to the temple of goddess Dola Mata, the students danced and sang and distributed sweets on their way.

School teachers and locals said the goddess heard their prayers and brought Williams home safely. The procession, and the prayer that followed at the temple, was a way to thank her for her blessings, they said.

Principal of the primary school, Vishal Panchal, said that the entire village is ecsta-

tic and filled with pride upon Williams' return.

"The daughter of our village is the pride of the world. She stayed in space for such a long time and came back safe. We performed garba, burst firecrackers and distributed sweets. Our happiness knows no end," he said.

When Sunita Williams left for ISS on June 5 last year and her mission was delayed, the villagers came together to light up an 'Akhand Jyot' here on June 27 and took out a procession carrying the eternal flame to the temple of Dola Mata, praying for her safety, said a local resident.

"We are very proud and happy that she is back on earth. We are from the same family. Sunita is a great inspiration for the children, who all want to become like her," he said.

Villagers chanted prayers by placing Williams' photo near the temple goddess and distributed sweets as 'prasad', the offering to the goddess.

Minority leader arrested for Nagpur riots trigger

The Nagpur police on Wednesday arrested Minority Democratic Party Leader Fahim Shamim Khan for his alleged role in the communal riots that erupted in Nagpur on Monday night, even as the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) condemned the violence in the orange city and said that Aurangzeb was no longer relevant in the current context.

On a day when he reiterated that the Nagpur violence was a "pre-planned" incident triggered to disturb social harmony, Maharashtra chief minister Devendra Fadnis said that those who attacked the police during

Monday's disturbances in the orange city would be "dug out from their graves".

Replying to a debate in the Maharashtra Assembly on the budgetary demands of the Home portfolio which he holds, Fadnis categorically stated that the police had verified and found that any cloth on which Quranic verses were written was burnt during the protest against Aurangzeb in Nagpur on Monday.

Maintaining that the attacks on police were "unpardonable", Fadnis said: "Such people will be given the strictest punishment. Those who have attacked the police in Nagpur will be dug out from their graves," he asserted.

The Pioneer vindicated in Delhi CCTV scam

The Delhi government's Anti-Corruption Branch (ACB) has registered a case against former PWD minister and senior Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) leader Satyendar Jain over alleged corruption in a ₹571-Crore CCTV project. The case revolves around claims that Jain waived damages worth ₹16 Crore imposed on Bharat Electronics Limited (BEL) for delays in installing CCTV cameras across Delhi. In exchange, he allegedly accepted a bribe of ₹7 Crore through contractors who benefited from additional orders. The Pioneer was the first newspaper to report the CCTV project scam.

Joint Commissioner of Police (ACB) Madhur Verma said the FIR was registered on Tuesday after obtaining prior sanction under Section 17A of the Prevention of Corruption Act. An FIR was filed under Sections 7 and 13(1)(a) of the Prevention of Corruption Act and Section 120B (criminal conspiracy) of the Indian Penal Code (IPC) after obtaining approval under Section 17A of the Prevention of Corruption Act from the competent authority.

In August 2019, the Delhi government under the AAP proposed a penalty of Rs 16 Crore on Bharat Electronics Limited (BEL) for its "slow pace" in installing 1.4 Lakh CCTVs in the capital. The Rs 571-Crore project, which included an annual maintenance clause for five years, specified the installation of 2,000 CCTVs in each of the 70 Assembly constituencies.

SIX SC JUDGES TO VISIT MANIPUR

Six Supreme Court judges, headed by Justice BR Gavai, will visit various relief camps in Manipur on March 22 to oversee and strengthen legal and humanitarian support to the violence-affected communities. This step was taken by National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) on Tuesday evening, whose Executive Chairman is Justice Gavai.

During the visit there will be distribution of essential relief materials to Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs). Further, a team of 25 specialised doctors from Chennai will conduct Medical Camps across all relief camps.

On August 1, 2023, the Supreme Court had said that there was an "absolute breakdown of constitutional machinery" in the state. Over 200 people were killed, several hundred injured and thousands displaced since ethnic violence broke out in the state on May 3, 2023, when a "tribal solidarity march" was organised in the hill districts to protest against the majority Meitei community's demand for scheduled tribe status.

NIA raids multiple locations in Jammu

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) Wednesday cracked down on the ecosystem sustaining terrorist activities across the Jammu region by raiding a dozen locations including residences of some of the active over-ground workers (OGWs).

These raids started early in the morning and continued during the day at several locations in Jammu city. Paramilitary forces stood guard outside the residences of suspected OGWs while NIA teams conducted raids and seized relevant records.

According to a spokesman of the National Investigation Agency, the raids were conducted in connection with a case RC-04/2024/NIA/JMU registered last year based on information about the infiltration of active

terrorists.

NIA teams conducted extensive searches at the homes of over-ground workers (OGWs) linked with the newly-formed offshoots and affiliates of banned terrorist organisations such as the Lashkar-e-Taiba and Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM).

A total of 12 locations in the Jammu district of the union territory of J&K were searched as part of the operation, and several incriminatory materials linking the terrorists with OGWs were seized. NIA teams are examining the material to unravel the terror conspiracy.

The FIR registered on November 2, 2024, was booked under sections 61 (2), 147, 148, 149 of BNS 2023, Sections 7, 25, 27 of Arms Act, Sections 3 & 4 of the Explosive Substances Act, 1908 and sections 20 and 23 of UA(P) Act 1967.

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CM announces Rs 1 Crore for Karila Dham development

AIIMS Bhopal performs first govt-sector TAVI in Madhya Pradesh

The All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) Bhopal has achieved a remarkable milestone by successfully performing the first-ever government-sector Transcatheter Aortic Valve Implantation (TAVI) in Madhya Pradesh. This historic procedure was jointly performed by Dr. Bhushan Shah, Assistant Professor and In-charge of the Structural Heart Program at the Department of Cardiology and Dr. Yogesh Niwariya, Head of the Department of Cardiothoracic and Vascular Surgery. This achievement marks a significant advancement in providing advanced cardiac care to the economically disadvantaged and underserved

sections of society. TAVI is a minimally invasive heart valve replacement technique, serving as an alternative to open-heart surgery for high-risk patients. It involves inserting a heart valve on a delivery system through the leg artery, which reaches the heart and deploys the new valve without the need for incisions, general anesthesia, or ventilators. As a result, patients can be discharged much earlier than with traditional heart surgery. The patient, a 70-year-old gentleman, had been experiencing severe breathlessness for 6 to 8 months due to a severely narrowed aortic valve that restricted blood flow. He was deemed a high-risk candidate for traditional open-heart surgery because of his frailty and chronic

obstructive lung disease (COPD). After a comprehensive evaluation, the specialized heart team opted for the TAVI procedure as the most suitable treatment. The procedure was performed by a multidisciplinary team consisting of cardiologists Dr. Bhushan Shah, Dr. Sudesh Prajapati, and Dr. Ashish Jain; cardiothoracic and vascular surgeons Dr. Yogesh Niwariya and Dr. Vikram Watti; and anesthesiologists Dr. Vaishali Waindeskar, Dr. Harish Kumar, and Dr. SRAN Bhushanam Padala. The successful completion of the TAVI procedure was further supported by the dedicated efforts of Cath lab technicians and nursing staff. The patient is now in stable condition and is planned for an early discharge. Speaking on this landmark

achievement AIIMS Bhopal ED Prof (Dr.) Ajai Singh said, "Performing the first government-sector TAVI in Madhya Pradesh is a testament to our commitment to providing cutting-edge medical care to those who need it the most. Our focus remains on integrating advanced technologies to offer affordable and accessible healthcare to all. I congratulate our dedicated team for their outstanding contribution to this remarkable achievement." This successful TAVI procedure establishes AIIMS Bhopal as a frontrunner in interventional cardiology, further reinforcing its commitment to offering world-class cardiac care. It also serves as a beacon of hope for patients who might otherwise lack access to life-saving medical interventions.

45-year-old man dies during 'Ger' procession in Indore

A 45-year-old man was crushed to death after he fell off a tractor-tanker and came under its wheels during the traditional 'Ger' procession taken out in Madhya Pradesh's Indore city on the occasion of Rangpanchami festival on Wednesday, officials said. The incident prompted Chief Minister Mohan Yadav to cancel his participation in the festivity, they said. Ger procession is taken out in the Rajbada area of the city on the occasion of Rangpanchami. Talking to reporters, Indore Collector Ashish Singh said the man, who is yet to be identified, was sitting on a tractor-tanker during the procession when he fell off the

vehicle and came under its rear wheels. Efforts were on to identify the deceased. As no identity card was found on him, officials have not been able to establish his identity so far, he said. Nearly 5-7 lakh people gathered in the Rajbada area to take part in the Rangpanchami festival which otherwise went off well, he said. Talking to reporters, CM Yadav expressed grief over the incident. He said that in view of the tragic incident, he would not

Man booked for forcing wife to convert, threatening to kill her

Shahjahanabad police have registered a case against a man and his sister for allegedly forcing a woman to convert to their religion and threatening her life. The accused, identified as Majid Ali and his sister Tabassum, are currently absconding following the victim's complaint. According to police reports, the harassment began approximately two years ago when Majid started pressuring his wife to accept his religion. The victim also alleged that her sister-in-law, Tabassum, supported and participated in the coercion. When she refused to comply, the accused threw her out of the house. Since then, she has been residing at her maternal home, where the accused allegedly continues to threaten and intimidate her. The victim revealed that Majid frequently visited her maternal

home to persuade her to return and live with him. However, when she resisted his demands, he escalated his threats, warning that he would kill her if she did not agree. The victim also claimed that Majid had made multiple attempts to forcibly take away their young daughter. In a recent incident on March 16, Majid allegedly arrived at her home to intimidate her once again. Fearing for her safety, the victim immediately contacted the police through Dial-100. However, by the time officers arrived, Majid had already fled the scene. Shahjahanabad police have since registered a case under relevant sections of the Indian Penal Code (IPC) related to harassment, criminal intimidation, and religious coercion. The victim's ordeal has been ongoing since July 2024. According to her statement, Majid and Tabassum continuously harassed her to convert to

their religion. The matter is already pending in court, with the next hearing scheduled for March 24, 2025. Despite the ongoing legal proceedings, the accused has allegedly continued to pressure the victim to withdraw her complaint and "compromise" the matter. The woman informed the police that both she and her family, including her mother and daughter, have faced persistent death threats for refusing to settle the case. The accused has allegedly warned her that if she does not surrender custody of their child, he will take the child by force. In a particularly alarming incident in December 2024, Majid reportedly attempted to abduct their daughter. According to the victim's complaint, Majid tried to run away with the child, but when she raised an alarm, he abandoned the child and fled. A formal complaint was lodged against him at the time, but no substantial action was taken.

The victim's frustration with law enforcement is also reflected in her First Information Report (FIR). She stated that in February 2025, she had filed a complaint through the Chief Minister's Helpline, urging action against Majid. Despite her repeated pleas, she claimed that no action was taken against the accused, which emboldened him to continue his intimidation tactics. In her FIR, the victim described a recent incident where Majid forcefully entered her home and threatened to kill her if she did not hand over their daughter. She alleged that Majid is demanding custody of the child without any legal procedure, despite her willingness to abide by the court's decision. "My husband keeps pressuring me to give him our child without waiting for the court's verdict," she told the police. "But I have always maintained that I will follow whatever the court decides. Still, he continues to harass and threaten me."

Alleging protection of key accused, Adil's family protests at police station

Family members of Adil, who was allegedly killed by enuchs in the Budhwara area on March 16, gathered and protested at Talaiya police station late Tuesday night. Their agitation intensified after a new video surfaced, clearly showing the victim losing consciousness after being stabbed in the chest. In the viral video, an enuch is seen holding Adil while a youth named Raunak, who is accused of the murder, stands nearby. The footage also shows another enuch punching Adil in the chest as he lies in a pool of blood. Several other enuchs and bystanders are visible at the scene, watching the incident unfold. The entire episode reportedly occurred on Sunday morning. Following the emergence of the video, Adil's family accused the police of shielding the main culprits. They alleged that Raunak, who allegedly stabbed Adil in the chest, has not been arrested, nor has the enuch who struck him after he became unconscious. Adil's elder brother, Shahab, expressed dissatisfaction with the police investigation. He claimed that the FIR only names

two enuchs, Mehak and Nawab, while other key suspects remain uncharged. Shahab further alleged that the police ignored their repeated statements that Raunak alias Ronnie, a resident of Mata Mandir, was responsible for stabbing his brother. According to Shahab, Talaiya police station in-charge (TI) C.B. Rathore asked him to gather evidence himself. Acting on this, Shahab reportedly obtained video footage from the vicinity, which confirmed the involvement of other individuals in the murder. Despite presenting this evidence to the authorities, the family claims the police delayed taking action. The protest prompted Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP) Riyaz Iqbal to visit the police station late Tuesday night. He assured the family that all remaining accused would soon be identified and arrested. He also confirmed that Raunak would be made the primary accused in the case. By Wednesday, the police had detained Pinky Kinnar and another enuch in connection with the murder. Investigations are ongoing, and authorities have assured swift action against all those involved.

Gold ornaments stolen from Ashoka Garden shop

A gang of four veiled women stole silver bangles worth Rs 1.13 lakh from a jewellery shop in the Ashoka Garden area on Monday evening. The entire incident was captured by the shop's CCTV camera. According to the police, Shashikant Soni, a resident of Samrat Colony, owns the Riddhi-Siddhi Jewellery shop located just below his house. On Monday afternoon around 3 p.m., Shashikant left his elderly father at the shop while he went out to eat. When he returned at 4 p.m., he noticed repair material lying on the counter. Suspicious, he checked the jewellery and discovered that a box of silver bangles, which had been on the counter, was missing. The theft was uncovered after scanning the CCTV footage. Four women wearing burkas were seen in the video. Three of them engaged Shashikant's elderly father in conversation, while the fourth woman stealthily took the box of bangles. After receiving information about the theft, the police arrived at the scene, registered a case against the unknown women, and began their search for the accused women.

Yadav prayed to the Almighty to grant peace to the departed souls and strength to their bereaved families to endure this irreparable loss. He also urged the public to exercise caution while travelling or using water bodies for any purpose.

Abrupt weather changes threaten ready wheat crops

The moderate weather conditions prevailing across Madhya Pradesh are expected to change abruptly, posing a serious concern for farmers who are in the final stages of harvesting their fully ripened wheat crop. The unpredictable weather may cause significant damage to crops, as thunderstorms, strong winds, rainfall, and lightning are expected to affect several parts of the state over the next three days. According to the Meteorological Department, the changing weather patterns are a result of multiple active systems, including a Western Disturbance over Afghanistan and an upper air cyclonic circulation over Southwest Rajasthan. Additionally, a trough stretching from central

Odisha to southern Vidarbha across south Chhattisgarh is contributing to the unstable weather. These systems are expected to cause storms with wind speeds ranging from 40 to 50 km per hour, accompanied by rain and thunderstorms in various districts. In the next 24 hours, light rain and thunderstorms with lightning are likely in districts including Narmadapuram, Betul, Harda, Guna, Ashoknagar, Singrauli, Sidhi, Mauganj, Shahdol, Umaria, Dindori, Katni, Mandla, and Maihar. Additionally, light rain is expected in 13 districts, including Jabalpur and Mandla. An alert for severe weather, including strong storms and heavy rain, has been issued for Gwalior, Jabalpur, Rewa, Shahdol, Chambal, and Sagar divisions on March 20 and 21. The wind speed is anticipated

to increase significantly, ranging from 30 to 50 km per hour, far above the usual 10 to 12 km per hour. This sharp rise in wind velocity could lead to structural damage and worsen the impact on crops already at risk from heavy rainfall and thunderstorms. On March 20, a thunderstorm accompanied by strong winds and rain is expected to affect multiple districts. These include Bhopal, Gwalior, Jabalpur, Sheopur, Morena, Bhind, Datia, Shivpuri, Ashoknagar, Vidisha, Sehore, Raisen, Sagar, Niwari, Tikamgarh, Chhatarpur, Damoh, Narsinghpur, Chhindwara, Pandhurna, Balaghat, Seoni, Mandla, Dindori, Anuppur, Umaria, Shahdol, Katni, Maihar, Panna, Satna, Rewa, Mauganj, Sidhi, and Singrauli. The adverse weather conditions

are likely to persist through March 21, bringing continued rainfall and thunderstorms to several regions. Affected areas on this day are expected to include Jabalpur, Shivpuri, Ashoknagar, Vidisha, Sehore, Raisen, Sagar, Damoh, Satna, Rewa, Maihar, Katni, Umaria, Shahdol, Anuppur, Dindori, Mandla, Seoni, and Balaghat. In Bhopal, there was light drizzle on Wednesday evening as the effects of the approaching weather systems began to be felt. The city recorded a daytime temperature of 35.8 degrees Celsius, while the nighttime temperature dropped to 17.8 degrees Celsius. The Meteorological Department has warned that thunderstorms and heavy rains may continue in and around Bhopal in the coming hours. Despite the widespread weather warnings, certain regions

are expected to remain unaffected by these conditions. According to the Meteorological Department's latest forecast, the Indore, Ujjain, and Narmadapuram divisions are unlikely to experience rain, storms, or thunderstorms during the three-day period from March 19 to 21. The current weather instability is attributed to several interacting atmospheric systems. A Western Disturbance positioned over Afghanistan, coupled with an upper air cyclonic circulation over Southwest Rajasthan, is driving the sudden shift in conditions. Additionally, a trough extending from central Odisha to southern Vidarbha is intensifying the moisture influx, leading to the development of thunderstorms and heavy winds across Madhya Pradesh.

Van Vihar eco-sensitive zone, experts call for larger buffer

To safeguard wildlife, the government has declared a 100-metre radius around Van Vihar National Park in Bhopal as an eco-sensitive zone, limiting human activity near the park. A joint committee of the Revenue and Forest Departments recently completed the demarcation process, covering three villages—Premapura, Aamkheda, and Dharampura. Officials confirmed that no objections were raised by residents. Due to waterlogging in Dharampura, symbolic demarcation was carried out there, while the process

was fully completed in other areas. Authorities stated that this move aligns with the government's broader conservation strategy. While the eco-sensitive zone restricts certain activities, officials clarified that all shops, hotels, and commercial establishments near the Boat Club remain unaffected, as they fall outside the designated boundary. Boards marking the eco-sensitive zone have also been installed. Professor Krishna K Dhote of MANIT, who researches urban renewal and sustainable development, emphasised that rapid urbanisation makes such zones critical. "As human populations

grow, so do other species within the ecosystem. Conservation efforts like this help maintain ecological balance," he said. He pointed out that similar eco-sensitive zones have already been established in Gir, Gujarat, and Satpura, Madhya Pradesh, with the process underway in Kuno. "A 100-metre zone is the standard, but it can be expanded based on local needs. This is a crucial step in protecting biodiversity and the food chain," he explained. Professor Surbhi Mehrotra, a National Wetland Committee (NWC) member, welcomed the step but suggested extending the eco-sensitive zone beyond 100 metres.

BMC swiftly cleans procession route

Bhopal: Bhopal Municipal Corporation (BMC) swiftly cleaned the Rang Panchami procession route within 30 minutes of its conclusion on Wednesday, ensuring the city remained clean after the celebrations. Sanitation teams were deployed across the old city's major locations, including Loha Bazar, Jumerati, Sindhi Market, Bhawani Chowk, Lakherapura, Chintaman Chowk, Itwara, Mangalwara, Chowk Bazar and Hanumanganj. These areas were covered in colours, flower petals and other waste following the grand procession. Sanitation workers from zones 2, 4 and 5 carried out the oper-

ation with 30 workers and five vehicles under the supervision of assistant health officers. Waste collected from the streets was transported to disposal sites immediately. The cleaning plan was executed systematically, with workers following the procession and cleaning behind it. By the time the celebrations ended, the route had been fully cleared. The BMC has consistently maintained its commitment to cleanliness during festivals and public events. The municipal effort reflects the civic body's firm resolve to enhance efficiency in waste management, ensuring minimal disruption to residents and businesses in the city.

Objection deadline ends for new Collector guideline tariff

More than 100 claims and objections have been received regarding Bhopal's proposed Collector Guideline rates, with submissions continuing until the deadline on Wednesday evening. A meeting of the evaluation committee on March 13 proposed an 18% average increase in guideline rates across 1,283 locations in Bhopal. The new rates and objections will now be sent to the state government for ratification. The new property guideline rates are scheduled to come into effect from April 1. Public representatives, including MP Alok Sharma, have expressed concerns

over the rate increase. Sharma has indicated plans for discussions with fellow representatives. The local chapter of the Confederation of Real Estate Developers' Associations of India (CREDAI) has filed over 80 objections, and many common citizens have also submitted their claims. Uncertainty remains over extending the deadline for claims and objections. While there is no official word, sources suggest that the deadline may be extended to March 23, allowing the administration time to build a consensus on the issue. Several ministers and MLAs have also voiced support for those opposing the new rates, saying the increase in circle rates at this juncture would adversely impact the city's economy.

Opposition groups demand an immediate halt to the rate hike, a rollback to 2019-20 levels, and the removal of provisions affecting agricultural land. They also seek a three-year moratorium on further increases and the constitution of an independent expert committee for a more transparent and equitable evaluation in the future. Guideline rates, also known as circle rates, are land value benchmarks used by the government to tax real estate transactions. While some argue that increasing these rates helps curtail the involvement of unaccounted money in the sector, others oppose the move, citing rising costs that ultimately affect real estate businesses and prospective homebuyers.

Man commits suicide by hanging

Unable to bear financial trouble a 27-year-old man committed suicide by hanging with the ceiling at Adivasi Mohalla behind Manas Bhawan. The family found his body hanging in the bathroom. He was taken down and rushed to the hospital where doctors declared him dead after examination. Police have registered a case and started an investigation. According to the uncle he last spoke on Tuesday evening with him before committing suicide. He had asked to go for fishing at Lower Lake but he suggested that we go some other time, not today. Bishan used to do decorative work for Plaster of Paris of ceiling. His brother Aman told that at around 12:30 in the

night, Bishan's body was found hanging in the bathroom by his cousin. No suicide note was found from him. Even before committing suicide, he did not mention any problem. He often used to talk about financial problems as he was not getting work for a long time and remained worried about this. Bishan was the youngest of five brothers and has a sister among siblings. The family was trying for Bishan's marriage but he was not ready to get married due to financial constraints as he always used to say that he would get married only after his life becomes stable and he gets good means of earning.

Rang Panchami 'Ger' drenches city in a riot of colours

The state capital erupted into a spectacle of colours on Wednesday as the grand Rang Panchami procession made its way through the city. Thousands of revellers danced to drumbeats, flung gulal into the air, and celebrated with unmatched enthusiasm, turning the streets into a mesmerising canvas of festivity. The procession began from Chowk and passed through Ghoda Nakkas, Jumerati, and Kundan Namkeen before culminating at the Curfew Wali Mata Temple at Peer Gate. Along the way, massive crowds gathered to witness beautifully crafted tableaux featuring Lord Shiva, Goddess Parvati, Radha-Krishna, and the iconic Holi celebrations of Braj. Traditional drums, DJs, and musical bands filled the air with infectious energy. Decorated

Need to deliberate on freebies, says Dhankhar

Vice President and Rajya Sabha Chairman Jagdeep Dhankhar on Wednesday opined that there should be a structured discussion on freebies and subsidies in the House as there is an urgent need for a national policy to help put all government investments to the larger good. Responding to the demand made by Samajwadi Party's Ram Gopal Yadav for increasing the funds, which Members of Parliament have at their disposal for developmental projects and schemes in their respective constituencies to ₹20 Crore a year from the current ₹5 Crore during the zero hour, Dhankhar said he would be open to a structured discussion on the issue if the government and the opposition agree.

Electoral freebies, such as free electricity and water, subsidised cooking gas, and cash handouts to certain groups like farmers and women, have often been criticised as something that may lead to unsustainable financial burdens on the government, distort public resources, and undermine long-term development goals.

"On placatory mechanisms, on appeasement, which is often known as freebies, this House needs to deliberate. I will be open to a structured discussion after consulting the Leader of

the House and the Leader of the Opposition," he said.

The country can grow only if money is available for capital expenditure, he said. Capital expenditure or capex is expenditure for creating assets such as infrastructure that yield long-term returns for the economy.

In contrast, freebies are revenue expenditures that do not contribute to the creation or acquisition of fixed assets. "Electoral process is such that these have become electoral allurements and thereafter the governments that came in the saddle, found themselves very uncomfortable, so uncomfortable that they wanted to revisit their thoughts," he said. "There is an urgent need for a national policy so that all investments of the government in any form are used in a structured manner for the larger good."

If the leaders of both sides agree, there can be a discussion, he said adding this is a very serious issue.

The comments assume significance as many states faced challenges in funding electoral freebies, particularly due to the financial strain they place on state budgets. States like Punjab have faced financial constraints in meeting poll promises. Dhankhar then touched upon the issue of subsidies.

"Subsidies, if required in areas like the farm sector, should be direct. That is the practice in developed countries. I

checked with the US mechanism.

The US has 1/5th of farm households as our country but the average income of a US farm household is more than the general income of a US household, and that is because the subsidy to the farmer is direct, transparent, without intermediary," he said.

This issue can also be discussed subject to the two sides agreeing, he said.

Members of Parliament Local Area Development Scheme (MPLAD), he said and went on to site how the cost of construction has risen in the last two decades, making the MPLAD funds inadequate to nurture constituencies.

He demanded that MPLAD fund amount be raised to ₹20 Crore, it be exempt from GST and a technical cell be created for estimates and quality inspection of work done. "If this is not possible, then MPLADs should be abolished," he said.

Dhankhar remarked that the constitution does not provide for a uniform mechanism for pay and perks of MPs and MLAs.

Some assemblies give members perks and salaries that are much more than what Members of Parliament (MPs) get. "Even the pension variation for a former member of the assembly is on a scale of 1 to 10. If in one state, one is getting one rupee, in the other state the pension will be 10 times," he said.

He said in the Constituent Assembly debates, one of the distinguished members, Sidhwa, reflecting on the power of Parliament to remove the judges, said, "It is very good to arrogate power without examining other elements.

But trust me, he reflected, the number of judges will grow, we will not be able to fructify even one."

Railway tracks kept vacant for maintenance, says Vaishnaw

Railway tracks throughout the country are kept vacant for a few hours every day for maintenance keeping in mind the safety of train travel, Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said in the Lok Sabha on Wednesday.

Vaishnaw said maintenance of railways is different from other infrastructure like highways. He said since the tracks and wheels are made of steel and the trains are travelling at a speed of 70 to 100 km per hour, the tracks often get damaged, resulting in creation of micro fractures

"If we don't repair the micro fractures regularly, there is a possibility of increased rail fractures which may lead to train accidents. That is why globally, out of 24 hours in a day, a few hours are kept for maintaining the tracks," he said.

The minister said taking into accounts all these aspects, a "tough decision" had been taken in 2018 that in every section, the railway tracks would be kept vacant for at least three hours for maintenance. "This was the reason why some train stoppages were done away and some trains are being regulated.

This has nothing to do with the Covid pandemic," he said replying to a question that some stoppages were done away due to the pandemic. Vaishnaw said the decision was taken after IIT Bombay carried out a detailed study and the time table was made in a way that three hours are kept for maintenance. "Its result has also come. It was a good result. Once there were 2,500 rail fractures which has come down to less than 250 now due to proper maintenance of the tracks," he said without specifying the time period.

The minister also informed the house the fares of various trains and their classes are based on the facilities provided in them and various types of train services are offered for different types of passenger segments. He said this in a written reply to questions in Lok Sabha regarding the high fares of Vande Bharat trains.

Rakibul Hussain, a Congress member from Dhubri in Assam, wanted to know whether the government has considered reducing the fares of the Vande Bharat Express to make this premium train service more affordable for a larger section of the population, particularly for the lower-income groups. Responding to the question, Vaishnaw said the Indian Railways fixes the fares with due consideration of the cost of service, the value of service, expenses the passengers can bear, competition from other competing modes, socio-economic considerations and the likes.

According to the railway minister, Amrit Bharat trains have modern state-of-the-art technology, equipped with advanced features like semi-permanent couplers for jerk-free travel, horizontal sliding windows and mobile holders.

Delimitation will penalise states that managed population and reward that haven't: DMK MP

DMK's Rajya Sabha member P Wilson on Wednesday said implementing delimitation of parliamentary constituencies at this point would unfairly penalise states which have successfully managed populations and reward those that have not.

Raising the issue during the Zero Hour in the Rajya Sabha, Wilson also made a demand for a holistic approach towards delimitation of constituencies for Lok Sabha and state assemblies.

He said delimitation was conducted after each census in 1952, 1962, and 1972 to ensure fair representation of all states.

Wilson said while some states embraced family planning policies, others ignored the issue allowing their populations to grow unchecked, and therefore to address this inequality, the 42nd constitutional amendment froze delimitation based on 1971 census data for 25 years, thereby safeguarding states that manage their population from losing political influence.

The freeze on population growth was extended through the 84th constitutional amendment following the recommendation of the national population policy in 2000, which expected stabilisation of population growth across all states by 2026, he said. "Data shows that the states like Tamil Nadu have a total fertility rate of 1.7 and Kerala TFR of 1.8 indicating that these states have successfully stabilise

their population. In contrast, Uttar Pradesh has a TFR of 2.4, Bihar has a TFR 3.0 which means that these states continue to experience exponential population growth," the DMK MP said. This suggests that the original reasoning for lifting the freeze in 2026 is no longer valid, he said.

"Implementing delimitation at this point would unfairly penalise states that have successfully managed by the populations while rewarding those that have not," he said, and added the consequence could be disasters for states like Tamil Nadu and others that have effectively controlled their population.

The DMK MP further said if Parliament strength is increased based on

2026 census, states like Rajasthan, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, and Uttar Pradesh are likely to gain more than 150 additional seats collectively. In contrast, southern states Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, and Telangana will gain only 35 seats collectively, Wilson said.

According to him, states that have effectively implemented the National Family Planning Policy will face penalties, which will result in a loss of political representation and bargaining power.

He further said that if the Constitution is not amended before 2026 to extend the freezing, the delimitation will kick in and automatically be done from 2026 onwards. He urged the prime minister to address the issue.

Put nation first, remain united: Rajnath

government takes decisions that are good for India. "The way Shashi Tharoor has accepted it, if other Congress leaders would also acknowledge it, then it will be good," he said.

Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) MP and national spokesperson Sudhanshu Trivedi said the government's diplomatic skills are clear to everyone who understands foreign affairs and noted that Modi had met the presidents of the two warring countries and drawn similar warmth from both of them. India has marked an epochal change in its diplomacy under Modi as it has gone from non-aligned to "all-aligned" in its approach, he said. "India is emerging as a friend of the world and this is what has been expressed by the

senior Congress leader," Trivedi said.

Tharoor said on Tuesday that the policy adopted by India following the outbreak of the conflict meant that the country has actually a prime minister who can hug both the presidents of Ukraine and Russia two weeks apart and be accepted in both places.

The former minister of state for external affairs said, "I am still wiping the egg off my face because I am one person in the parliamentary debate who actually criticised the Indian position at the time back in February 2022."

Tharoor justified his changed stand on Wednesday and said he voiced his opinion as an Indian and does not see politics in that.

Cabinet approves six-lane highway project

The Union Cabinet on Wednesday approved the construction of a 6-lane access-controlled greenfield high-speed National Highway to connect JNPA Port (Pagote) with Chowk (29.219 km) in Maharashtra at an investment of ₹4,500 Crore. The Cabinet meeting chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi also approved enhancement of outlays to ₹6,190 Crore for two schemes aimed at increasing milk production. Information and Broadcasting Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw informed that the Union Cabinet has approved the revised Rashtriya Gokul Mission (RGM) and National Program for Dairy Development (NPDD). Both the schemes, which seek to enhance milk production and raise farmers' income, will now have a total outlay of ₹6,190 Crore.

According to an official statement, the National Highway project will be developed on build, operate and transfer (BOT) mode at a total cost of ₹4,500.62 Crore. "The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs, has approved the construction of 6-lane access controlled Greenfield High-Speed National Highway

starting from JNPA Port (Pagote) to Chowk (29.219 km) in Maharashtra," it said.

The development of road connecting infrastructure to major and minor ports in India is one of the main focus areas of integrated infrastructure planning under PM GatiShakti National Master Plan principles, it added. "With the increasing container volume at JNPA port and the development of the Navi Mumbai International Airport, a need was identified for augmenting National highway connectivity in the region," the statement said. Currently, it takes 2-3 hours for vehicles to move from JNPA Port to the arterial Golden Quadrilateral (GQ) section of NH-48 and Mumbai-Pune Expressway due to heavy congestion in urban areas like Palaspe Phata, D-Point, Kalamboli junction, and Panvel.

After the operationalisation of Navi Mumbai Airport in 2025, the need for direct connectivity is expected to increase further. Accordingly, the statement said, this project is designed to address these connectivity requirements and to improve the logistic efficiency of connecting JNPA port and Navi Mumbai International Airport. The project align-

ment starts at JNPA port (NH 348) (Pagote village) and ends at Mumbai-Pune Highway (NH-48) while also linking Mumbai-Pune Expressway and Mumbai-Goa National Highway (NH-66). Two tunnels passing through Sahayadri are provided for ease of movement for commercial vehicles instead of a ghat section in hilly terrain, ensuring high speed and ease of movement for large container trucks.

The new 6-lane green field project corridor will lead to better port connectivity helping in safe and efficient freight movement. The project will open new avenues of growth, development and prosperity in developing regions in and around Mumbai and Pune. The Union Cabinet on Wednesday approved setting up of a urea plant in Assam with an estimated cost of ₹10,601.4 Crore as part of its effort to reduce import of this key crop nutrient and make India self-sufficient.

Cabinet also approved the proposal for setting up of a new brownfield Ammonia-Urea Complex of 12.7 Lakh tonnes annual capacity of urea production within the existing premises of Brahmaputra Valley Fertilizer Corporation Ltd (BVFCL), Namrup Assam.

Government to announce new toll policy, says Nitin Gadkari

Union Road Transport and Highways Minister Nitin Gadkari on Wednesday said the government will soon announce a new policy for toll charges on national highways, offering a reasonable concession to the consumers.

Replying to queries in Rajya Sabha, the minister asserted that the government is spending a lot on building road infrastructure and therefore toll charges are necessary. "It is the policy of the department that when you want good road, you have to pay for it," Gadkari said.

In Assam, he said the government plans to make expenditure of ₹3 Lakh crore.

"We are making a lot of big roads, four lanes, six lanes. I am making a lot of bridges from the Brahmaputra. We are raising funds from the market. So without a toll, we cannot do it. But still, we are very considerable. We are only charg-

ing toll on four lanes, not on the two-lane paved shoulder." According to the rules of 2008, toll plaza on the same section of the national highway and in the same direction cannot be established within 60 kilometers.

"So actually, there are some exceptions. After completing this session, we are going to declare a new policy for the toll, where the problem will be resolved and we will give reasonable concession to the consumer, and there will be no debate on particularly about the toll," he said, adding that the problems would be resolved.

All user fee plazas on National Highways are established as per the provision of National Highways Fee (Determination of Rates and Collection) Rules, 2008 and the respective Concession Agreement.

Total toll collection in India touched ₹64,809.86 Crore in 2023-24, a 35 per cent rise over the previous year. The collection was ₹27,503 Crore in 2019-20.

Six Supreme Court judges to visit Manipur relief camps

In an unprecedented development, six Supreme Court Judges, headed by Justice BR Gavai will visit various relief camps in Manipur on March 22, to oversee and strengthen legal and humanitarian support to the violence-affected communities. Other Judges in the delegation headed by Justice Gavai are Justices Surya Kant, Vikram Nath, MM Sundresh, KV Viswanathan and N Kotishwar Singh. The Congress welcomed the decision of six judges of the Supreme Court to visit Manipur and slammed Prime Minister Narendra Modi for not visiting the troubled State.

This step was taken by National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) on Tuesday evening, whose Executive Chairman, is Justice Gavai. "Nearly two years after the devastating sectarian violence of May 3, 2023, which led to the loss of hundreds of lives and displaced over 50,000 people, many continue to seek refuge in relief camps across Manipur. This visit by the Supreme Court Judges highlights the

ongoing need for legal and humanitarian assistance to these affected communities," said NALSA in a statement, adding that this will ensure that those people who need help and affected by sectarian violence in Manipur get Justice.

During the visit, Justice Gavai will virtually inaugurate Legal Services Camps and Medical Camps across all Districts of Manipur, as well as new Legal Aid Clinics in Imphal East, Imphal West and Ukhrul districts. There will be distribution of essential relief materials to Internally

Displaced Persons (IDPs). "The legal services camps will connect IDPs with government welfare programs, ensuring access to vital benefits such as healthcare, pensions, employment schemes, and identity document reconstruction. Each participating State Department will outline at least five key schemes tailored to address the needs of the displaced population. A team of 25 specialised doctors from Chennai will conduct Medical Camps across all relief camps," the release by NALSA said.

Congress general secretary in-charge communications Jairam Ramesh said his party welcomes the decision. Speaking to media, he recalled that in August 2023, the Supreme Court said that there was an absolute breakdown of constitutional machinery in the north-eastern state. Slamming the Government, Ramesh questioned Modi's "silence" on Manipur.

"He goes around the world, goes to Assam, elsewhere, but doesn't go to Manipur even as people of the state continue to wait and wait and wait for his visit,"

the Congress leader said.

On August 1, 2023, the Supreme Court said that there was an "absolute breakdown of constitutional machinery" in the state and despite such a harsh statement from the topmost court, the Modi Government took almost 18-19 months to impose President's rule, Ramesh said. Why it took 18 months to impose President's Rule, he asked.

"Why was there no full-time Governor in Manipur for six months? Why did they remove a tribal lady, a distinguished

political personality and give additional charge to the governor of Assam?" the Congress leader posted in X.

He noted that the Modi government eventually brought a retired civil servant as a full-time governor. Why was the retired civil servant in question chosen and why did his appointment take so long? he asked.

"Most importantly, why is the Prime Minister still silent on Manipur? Our frequent flyer jets all over the world. He goes to Assam and he visits other parts of the northeast. But why does he refuse to go to Manipur?" Ramesh said.

"The pain of Manipur is the pain of India and I'm glad that the judges of the Supreme Court are going there. Perhaps this visit will provide answers to some of these questions," he said. Over 200 people were killed, several hundred injured and thousands displaced since ethnic violence broke out in the state on May 3, 2023, when a "tribal solidarity march" was organised in the hill districts to protest against the majority Meitei community's demand for scheduled tribe status.

Congress slams Goa CM over forest land conversion

Congress has launched a scathing attack on the Goa Chief Minister Pramod Sawant, accusing him of facilitating backdoor access for real estate interests at the cost of the environment.

A recent Supreme Court order halting the conversion of private forest land in Goa triggered the political storm as the controversy revolves around a 2021 move by the Goa government to form a Review Committee (RC-II) to re-evaluate forest lands earlier identified by the Thomas and Araujo Committee.

Tribunal directed the Goa government to physically verify the lands removed from forest list by RC-II, and prohibited any development permissions until verification was complete

The RC-II reversed the classification of 27 survey numbers, thereby opening up over 1.2 Crore square metres of land-privately protected as private forest-for potential development.

The issue has drawn strong criticism from Congress chief spokesman Jairam Ramesh, who posted on social media platforms about the Supreme Court that very recently halted the conversion of Goa's private forest land at least for the time being.

"Much earlier, the National Green Tribunal too had prohibited development of denotified forest land until physical verification of all plots was complete. This

was never done," said Jairam, who served as Environment Minister in the Manmohan Singh led Congress government.

"The Supreme Court's order is a temporary respite. Bigger battles lie ahead given the single-minded focus of the Goa CM to free up forest lands for real estate purposes," the Congress mentioned.

The matter was earlier flagged by the National Green Tribunal (NGT) in a September 2023 order.

The tribunal directed the Goa government to physically verify the lands removed from the forest list by RC-II and specifically prohibited any development permissions until that verification was complete.

One plot in particular-survey number 257/1 in Sancoale, now earmarked for a major commercial project-has become a focal point of criticism.

With the Supreme Court's temporary halt now in place, the Congress has demanded a complete audit of the RC-II process, a freeze on all development on disputed plots, and accountability from the Chief Minister, who held the forest portfolio at the time the RC-II was formed.

This is not the first time Sawant has got into trouble related to land issues. Congress as opposition in the assembly had intensified its criticism of Sawant and his cabinet colleague Atanasio Monserrate, accusing them of a massive ₹500 Crore scam involving Zuari Agro Chemicals Ltd's (ZACL) land.

The discrepancy in the land's valuation from 25 paise per square metre in 1971 to ₹1,19,000 per square metre currently-fuelled suspicions of a massive scam.

UP minister's 'beaten cops' remark sparks outrage

A minister in the Uttar Pradesh Cabinet has stirred controversy with a shocking statement, claiming he had assaulted seven police inspectors before reaching his current position.

"I did not reach here easily. I had to break the hands and legs of seven police inspectors and throw them into a ditch before I got here," the minister said while addressing a public gathering.

A video of his statement has since gone viral on social media, though its authenticity remains unverified. Efforts to seek clarification from the minister have been unsuccessful.

The remarks were made by Dr Sanjay Nishad, a Cabinet Minister in the Yogi Adityanath-led government, while addressing a gathering in Lambhua, Sultanpur, during the Constitutional

Rights Rath Yatra. During the event, a woman named Raghni Pradhan from Samokhpur village, accompanied by three to four others, approached the minister with a plea.

She informed him that her husband had been arrested in an assault case and was due to appear for an LLB examination on Thursday. She requested his intervention to secure his release. In response, Nishad made the controversial statement about his rise to power.

"I know everything who is falsely implicating me. I will deal with them. I was born to fight for women and the poor. I have struggled to reach here. Seven police inspectors had their hands and legs broken and were thrown into a pit. Only then did I reach this position," Nishad declared.

He further advised people to report injustices directly to him instead of wait-

ing. "Many times, I only get to know about incidents after someone has been jailed. That is your mistake. Everyone has my mobile number and if not, you can find it on the internet. Just write to me about the injustice and I will act. I do not call any officer's PA, I directly call the District Magistrate or Superintendent of Police. If I do not get a reply in five minutes, I complain to the Chief Minister."

Nishad also emphasised that his community now has a voice. "Earlier, no one spoke up for the Nishads, but now you have the strength to do so. Speaking up is your right. This country runs by the Constitution. Your ancestors fought for its freedom," he added.

The minister's remarks have drawn sharp reactions, with critics questioning the appropriateness of such statements from a public representative. The matter is expected to trigger further political

debates in the state.

During the same speech, the minister also commented on the Aurangzeb dispute, arguing that history should highlight the Mughal ruler's cruelty. "What kind of tradition is it to celebrate cruelty and organize fairs around it? People learn ideals from fairs. In today's times, no one names their son Aurangzeb," he said, adding that the current government honours those who contribute to Indian civilisation. He further linked the recent Nagpur violence to those who consider Aurangzeb as their role model, stating, "The people who idolise Aurangzeb are responsible for this violence, and the public will answer them."

The minister also took a swipe at political rivals, questioning whether they considered Aurangzeb or Lord Krishna as their ideal. Opposition parties are expected to react strongly to his remarks.

Rakesh Rathore granted bail in rape case

MP Rakesh Rathore, and Congress leader who was lodged in the district jail on rape charges, was released on Wednesday morning after spending 48 days in custody. His bail plea was approved on Tuesday, following which the release order reached the jail. Rathore had been in judicial custody since January 30.

The Allahabad High Court had granted him bail on March 11, but the police subsequently invoked Section 69, delaying his release. A fresh bail plea was then filed in the Chief Judicial Magistrate (CJM) Court on March 12, and after

arguments on Tuesday, the CJM approved the bail. Jail Superintendent Suresh Kumar Singh confirmed that the release order was received at 6 pm on Tuesday, but as per jail manual regulations, he was released the following morning.

A rape case against MP Rakesh Rathore was registered at the City Kotwali police station on January 17. After the case was filed, Rathore evaded arrest, prompting the deployment of local police and the crime branch to track him down. His family members and close aides were also placed under surveillance, and his representative Wasi Ullah along with another associate was detained for questioning.

Wife, lover murder husband, hide body in cement drum

In a shocking tale of love turned to betrayal, a woman named Muskan and her lover, Sahil, have been arrested for the brutal murder of Muskan's husband Saurabh.

The chilling crime unfolded in the Brahmपुरi area of Meerut, where authorities discovered Saurabh's remains concealed in a plastic drum filled with cement, revealing a sinister plot fueled by infidelity and desperation.

The couple's actions were driven by a toxic mix of addiction and betrayal. On the night of the murder, Muskan and Sahil, under the influence of drugs, conspired to eliminate Saurabh after he returned from London and confronted Muskan about her affair. As tensions escalated, Muskan restrained her husband while Sahil inflicted fatal wounds, ignoring Saurabh's desperate cries for mercy.

Following the murder, they dismembered Saurabh's body and encased the pieces in a drum filled with cement, sealing their gruesome act in silence. They even feigned normalcy, sleeping in the house while their five-year-old daughter, Pihu, remained blissfully unaware of the horror that had transpired.

In an attempt to mislead family members and neighbors, Muskan traveled to Shimla and Manali with Sahil for 12 days. During this period, she continued posting pictures and videos on Instagram, creating an illusion that she and Saurabh were vacationing together. She also used Saurabh's phone to respond to messages, ensuring no one suspected foul play.

The crime was uncovered when Saurabh's younger brother, Rahul, visited his house on March 18. To his surprise, he found Muskan accompanied by a young man (later identified as Sahil).

When he inquired about his brother's

whereabouts, Muskan failed to provide a convincing answer. Rahul also noticed a foul smell emanating from inside the house.

Suspecting something amiss, he raised an alarm, drawing the attention of neighbors, who promptly informed the police. Upon searching the premises, officers discovered the cement-filled drum and took both Muskan and Sahil into custody.

The shocking discovery of Saurabh's remains came after police pieced together the couple's confession. Despite the gruesome nature of the crime, Muskan and Sahil attempted to maintain a facade of innocence, even purchasing materials for their sinister plan under the guise of household chores.

The love and betrayal

Investigations revealed that Muskan and Saurabh had married despite family opposition. Saurabh, who was mostly

stationed abroad, had been living with Muskan and their eight-year-old daughter, Pihu, in Indranagar for the past three years.

Trouble began in 2019 when Muskan met Sahil outside Pihu's play school. While Saurabh was away at sea, Muskan and Sahil developed a romantic relationship, which eventually turned into a full-fledged affair.

According to Muskan's statement to the police, Sahil pressured her to divorce Saurabh and start a new life with him. When she hesitated, he allegedly convinced her that getting rid of Saurabh was the only way forward.

Sahil and Muskan had meticulously planned the murder, selecting March 4 as the execution date. After the crime, they even attempted to hire laborers to dispose of the cemented drum but failed when the workers found the task suspicious and refused.

Suvendu Adhikari demands President's rule in WB

Even as the Hindu-Muslim rhetoric threatened to take a demonic proportion ahead of the coming festival season, Bengal Opposition leader Suvendu Adhikari on Wednesday demanded imposition of President's rule in the State.

Earlier, the BJP was scheduled to organise a long march at Baruipur a district town skirting the southern suburbs

of Kolkata. "We had a police permission to hold the rally but the district SP played a TMC's stooge and allowed the TMC men to assemble on two sides of the road and raise filthy slogans and attack our men, they rained lathi blows on my vehicle and had I been walking I would get a broken

head, the police did it intentionally to harass the BJP, but we will not spare them and will return on March 27 and gherao the SP office," he said. Incidentally Union Home Minister is scheduled to visit Kolkata on March 27.

All the State BJP MLAs led by Adhikari had gone to Baruipur to take part in a rally reportedly to express solidarity with the local Sanatani population who they complained were living in a climate of threat.

"The religious places are being desecrated and when we try to raise this in the Assembly we are not allowed to speak. Our MLAs are suspended by Speaker Biman Banerjee who is also an MLA from this area. This cannot go on for too long and so we had come here to protest against what has been happening here but the TMC goons with the help of the police attacked us," party leader and MLA Agni Mitra Paul said. The communal atmosphere of the State had been hotting up for the past fortnight with Adhikari saying that when his party would come to power in Bengal after next year's Assembly elections it would throw out all the Muslim MLAs from the Assembly.

that the deadlock over a law guaranteeing MSP will end and the talks will move forward."

Earlier, veteran farmer leader Jagjit Singh Dallewal reached the meeting venue in an ambulance.

Dallewal, who has been on an indefinite fast since November 26 last year and is on medical aid, said they were expecting a response from the Centre on the data presented by the farmers to support their demands.

The last meeting between the farmers and the central delegation was held here on February 22, which was attended by Chouhan, Joshi, and Goyal.

In that meeting, the central team sought data from the farmers backing their demand for legal guarantee for minimum support price to discuss them with experts.

The farmers have been claiming that a legal guarantee for MSP (for crops) can be given with an estimated outlay of ₹25,000-30,000 Crore per annum.

A meeting between a central team led by Joshi and farmers' representatives was held here on February 14 as well.

Before that, four rounds of talks took place between central ministers and protesting farmers in February 2024, but they remained inconclusive.

The protesting farmers have been camping at Shambhu and Khanauri border points between Punjab and Haryana since February 13 last year, after security forces did not allow them to march to Delhi to press their demands.

Besides legal guarantee for minimum support price, the farmers are demanding debt waiver, pension for farmers and farm labourers, no hike in electricity tariffs, withdrawal of police cases against farmers, justice for the victims of the 2021 Lakhimpur Kheri violence in Uttar Pradesh, reinstatement of the Land Acquisition Act, 2013, and compensation to the families of farmers who died during a previous agitation in 2020-21. A meeting between a central team led by Joshi and farmers' representatives was held here on February 14 as well.

The quicksand of communalism

Clashes have erupted over Aurangzeb's tomb, exposing the deep historical roots that gnaw away at the socio-cultural fabric of our nation

In India, the spectre of communalism rears its ugly head every once in a while, often serving as a convenient political tool for those ascending the stairway to power. Grievances left behind as relics of history in a country as religiously diverse as India are manipulated for political gains to fuel unrest and keep the communal cauldron burning. Maharashtra has often been the epicentre of such clashes, the recent one adding yet another bleak chapter to a deeply riven society. The past few days have witnessed a surge of violence as Hindu nationalist groups demanded the removal of Mughal emperor Aurangzeb's tomb, reigniting age-old conflicts. The ensuing agitation led to arson, stone-pelting, and clashes in Nagpur, forcing authorities to impose a curfew. However, to limit introspection on an issue so raw to the bone to Maharashtra alone would indeed be a fatal mistake, both for our political classes and the masses. The latest incident displays how historical narratives can be weaponised to serve regional political aspirations, and expose an already vulnerable society to centuries of wrongs committed in the name of religion.

Aurangzeb, the sixth Mughal emperor, remains a divisive figure in Indian history. His reign was marked not only by brutal territorial expansions but also by policies that amounted to a brazenly oppressive attitude toward his Hindu subjects. He imposed a crushing jizya tax on non-Muslims, dictated temple demolitions through royal firmans, and mercilessly butchered Maratha ruler Chhatrapati Sambhaji Maharaj, silencing every voice raised against him and decapitating every hand that rebelled against his atrocities. Aurangzeb invoked the Mughal Empire's ulema to sentence Sambhaji to death for his apparent acts of atrocities on Muslims. In essence, the foreign invader, much like his British successors, wanted to leave behind a legacy that disinherited India's indigenous inhabitants. Admittedly, he employed Hindus in high administrative positions, patronised some temples, and engaged in diplomatic relations beyond religious boundaries. However, it is his relentless religious persecution of Hindus that fuels what is unfolding in Maharashtra today.

Here, it would be prudent to bear in mind that howsoever burdened by historical injustice one may be, violence by any community must be condemned and controlled. The recent violence in Maharashtra is to be seen as much in the present context as in the past. Hindu right-wing groups have long called for the removal of Aurangzeb's tomb, arguing it stands as a symbol of historical oppression. A contemporary Indian film, Chhaava, portraying the brutal torture of Sambhaji by Aurangzeb, is now being cited by some analysts as the reason behind the reignited anger against the Mughal emperor. However, this is too facetious a premise to debate upon a historical wound still dangerously raw. The truth is that the current controversy intensified after statements by politicians, particularly Samajwadi Party MLA Abu Azmi's remarks, on Aurangzeb's rule, which were seen as attempts to whitewash a bloodied history, an argument his party members were quick to distance themselves from. The question of the hour is how to put this monster to rest. Indeed, educating people about the nuances of history can prevent the glorification or demonisation of historical figures. But that is easier said than done. The problem is that nobody wants to read history, let alone understand it, yet everyone remains opinionated. Aurangzeb was neither evil nor benevolent — his autocratic reign and religious chauvinism must be studied in the context of his times, the fact that he was last in the line of a foreign dynasty that had ruled India for centuries with an iron hand. For one, political leaders and groups would do well to desist from exploiting historical grievances for limited gains. Strict action should be taken against those inciting communal hatred.

India actually has a Prime Minister who can hug both the president of Ukraine and the president in Moscow two weeks apart and be accepted in both places. Therefore, India is in a position where it can make a difference to a lasting peace if it was so required, in ways that very few countries would be able to. India also benefits due to a number of factors including its distance from Europe. If it were necessary... there would be some willingness on the Indian side to consider sending peacekeepers.

Weathering the storm of US trade winds

The global economy is at a crossroads as the US introduces a disruptive reciprocal tariff model, challenging the foundation of global trade. This shift threatens developing nations, including India, by undermining WTO principles

The world is facing an uncertain and challenging time. The reciprocal tariff model introduced by the new Trump administration's economic policies has disrupted the seamless flow of global trade and commerce. This poses a significant economic challenge for developing nations, as it undermines the World Trade Organization (WTO) model, which upholds the principle of higher tariffs imposed by developing nations on imports from developed nations to protect their domestic industries.

The immediate consequences include the crippling of these industries, creating an unequal playing field. Rising unemployment and a slowdown in export-driven growth appear inevitable. India is not immune to this trade war, where global cooperation is being overshadowed by forced trade negotiations favoring the stronger party. A new world order is taking shape, and India must navigate this landscape not cautiously, but courageously.

Between April 2024 and November 2024, India, the second-largest trading partner of the US, exported goods worth USD 52.89 Billion while importing USD 29.63 Billion, resulting in a trade surplus of USD 23.26 Billion in India's favor. This trade imbalance is at the heart of the issue. India's key exports include diamonds, medical appliances and accessories, jewelry, agricultural products, refined petroleum, rice, textiles and apparel, automotive components, chemicals and petrochemicals, and machinery. Meanwhile, India's imports from the US primarily consist of mineral fuels and oils, pearls, precious and semi-precious stones, nuclear reactors, boilers, machinery, electrical equipment, crude petroleum, petroleum products, electronic components, and gold.

A closer look at these product categories reveals that India has room to further expand its market share in these sectors by enhancing cost efficiencies and quality standards. In contrast, the US has limited options for increasing its exports to India, apart from pushing crude oil and defense products—both heavily supported by the US government. This is due to the cost and consumption limitations of US goods in the Indian market. Consequently, the US, in its bid to reduce the trade deficit, will likely attempt to penetrate new segments currently dominated by Indian domestic industries, such as automobiles.

This is not just a trade negotiation, it is a full-fledged trade war aimed at capturing market share with little regard for global cooperation or diplomatic considerations. The reciprocal tariff strategy is a veiled attempt to lower tariffs and open new markets for the US.



The true agenda is now apparent.

The concept of reciprocal tariffs, introduced under the Trump administration's "Fair and Reciprocal Plan," seeks to impose high import duties on trade partners in an effort to reduce trade deficits. The administration argues that exporting countries impose high tariffs on US products. However, this is not a product-to-product reciprocity but a nation-to-nation policy. The term "reciprocal" itself is misleading, as there is no defined framework governing its application. Instead, it grants the US government the flexibility to impose tariffs arbitrarily, leaving exporting countries guessing about their potential impact and forcing them to react after the tariffs are already in place. In a world marked by unequal wealth distribution, economic development, and technological progress, these tariffs are more punitive than reciprocal, disproportionately harming developing nations.

In international trade, the true meaning of reciprocal tariffs, as governed by the WTO, differs significantly from what the US administration is advocating. Under Article 22.4 of the WTO's Dispute Settlement Understanding, reciprocity serves as the basis for tariff retaliation when a country fails to comply with a WTO ruling. Additionally, Article XXVIII of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) establishes legal guidelines for recalibrating trade agreements and calculating compensation. What the US is currently pro-

moting deviates from these principles.

As global trade policies continue to be shaped by dominant economies, the US's reciprocal tariff strategy is expected to cause significant disruptions until countermeasures emerge to stabilise the situation. However, the key question remains: Will this retaliatory tariff policy achieve its intended goal for the US? The likelihood is low. A closer analysis reveals that the US trade-to-GDP ratio stands at just 26.9 per cent, compared to 38.4 per cent for China, 46.8 per cent for Japan, and 50 per cent for India. Moreover, US import intensity is nearly three times

higher than its export intensity. The real issue behind the US trade deficit is not high foreign tariffs but the poor performance of US merchandise trade, which accounts for only 8.3 per cent of global exports. In contrast, the US enjoys a USD 200 Billion trade surplus in the services sector, making it the global leader in both imports and exports of services. The primary constraints on US merchandise exports stem from supply-side limitations and a failure to achieve economies of scale, not unfair tariff structures. Given the strong global demand for US service exports, why should

the US merchandise trade struggle to compete?

With a population of 1.4 Billion, India must support its citizens through various welfare programs funded by budgetary allocations. These expenditures rely heavily on trade and commerce, with export-driven industries playing a crucial role. India's ability to produce low-cost goods sustains its economy and provides employment to millions. Protecting these industries is imperative.

Allowing an influx of US products into new market segments could disrupt domestic industries in the short term and erode supply chains in the long run if US manufacturers fail to achieve economies of scale in affordable segments. While India can afford to reduce its diamond exports to the US, it cannot risk destabilising its domestic industries.

It is time for India to adhere strictly to WTO guidelines and advocate for a globally accepted trade policy to counter coercive trade deficit measures. A production-linked incentive (PLI) scheme to boost domestic industries, along with stronger ties with alternative trading partners, can help mitigate the impact of reciprocal tariffs. India must remain vigilant; this phase is temporary, but its long-term economic stability depends on strategic resilience.

I was recently invited to participate in a panel discussion during which the young moderator posed a query — what did I think of a New India? This was an interesting subject that made me reflect.

Like most around me, I too had been engrossed in leading a routine life till about a decade back. I would also often crib about a stagnant life. It was as I turned 60 that I started indulging in self-reflections about the way my life had evolved each decade since birth.

The first decade saw our family living a more frugal life. We acquired a radio set six years after my birth and a refrigerator two years later. Even though the voltage fluctuated and light was often dim at night, we had electricity at home. Our homes had fans.

The second decade witnessed a carefree me, not much stressed about what I would do after school or college. The government had invested in the creation of innumerable public sector undertakings. There were enough jobs. We also graduated to having desert coolers at home.

The mid-third decade saw me buckling down to the onerous professional responsibilities and simultaneously getting used to married life and raising a family. Though, to be fair, it was my wife who was at home to bring up

our two daughters. I spent more time in the railway control rooms to ensure smooth running of trains. My young age and diligence made me dream about one of the topmost positions in the railways sometime towards the end of my career. My promotions ensured that I had an air-conditioned cabin in office and I was able to travel in the upper first class air-conditioned coach for office tours. But we were still happy with fans and desert coolers at home.

The beginning of the fourth decade saw me travelling for a 12-week official training to Japan. This was my first overseas trip. The money that I saved from the allowance ensured that I was able to take my family for a holiday to Goa by flights. We stayed in resorts, inexpensive, but better than the official guest houses that I had been exposed to so far. I went for my next overseas official trip to Europe. I also opted to move to Delhi in a railway public sector undertaking. It was towards the end of this decade that I came into my own professionally. I travelled extensively within India and outside for work.

I could save enough to buy one second-hand air conditioner. We slept in the single room, but it felt heavenly in the sweltering summers of north India. A home loan from the department on easier terms also ensured that we could afford to buy a decent sized house in an upcoming small-town locality.

The beginning of the 21st century was also the start of my fifth decade. The government had hiked salaries though successive pay commissions. We no longer lived hand to mouth. We could spend lavishly by our middle-class standards and still be left with a saving. We could afford decent education for our daughters. We could encourage them to fly and pursue their dreams. I could afford to buy air-conditioners for all the rooms in our house. I could take my family on annual vacation by flights and stay in hotels or resorts. Professionally too, government's continued investments in infrastructure saw me busier than ever as we won contracts after contracts.

The end of this decade saw me quitting the government to join the private sector. This too was a new experience. The salary I took home far exceeded the wildest imagination and gave me financial security. I happily shifted to my own apartment in a condominium complex. I could afford more gadgets at home. I had the financial safety net to quit working and indulge in creative passions through writing. Life has changed, and continues to get better, for many people, be it the middle-class or the daily service providers. We do not realise it from one day to the next. If we look back each decade, or in slices of five years, or even from year to year, it has been a new India. It is more than a slogan. It is a continuous process. And, this is how it will be — for us and the next generations.

BAIL, NOT JAIL: SUPREME COURT MOOTS FOR REASONABLE JUSTICE

Supreme Court (SC) had again exposed its anguish on denial of bail in 'not very serious cases' despite the completion of probe and further said a democratic country must not function like a police state where law enforcement agencies exercised arbitrary powers to detain individuals without genuine necessity and such type of actions of the police should be brought to the notice of public so that they may be discouraged to follow such undemocratic attitude which downgrade the democratic values of the country.

The SC further said "do not burden top court 'bail matters in cases triable by magistrates are being brought before us because people are not getting bail when they should and moreover 'It is shocking that the Supreme Court is adjudicating bail pleas in cases that should be disposed of at the trial court level and the system is being burdened unnecessarily 'the Supreme Court also noted that two decades ago, bail pleas in smaller cases

rarely reached high courts, let alone the SC.

And it is unfortunate that bail matters in cases triable by magistrates are being brought before the Supreme Court and we are sorry to say that litigants are approaching the highest court whereas such cases should have been easily disposed of at the lower level and also said that granting bail to a cheating case accused who remained in custody for more than two years and it shows that natural justice is being denied to an accused.

Here in this case both the trial court and the Gujarat High Court had rejected his bail plea, despite the fact that the chargesheet had already been filed after completion of the probe.

The top court has been repeatedly asking trial courts and high courts to be liberal in granting bail, particularly in not so serious cases.

Mid-level officers: The backbone of India's defence

India's evolving security landscape demands proactive empowerment of mid-level tactical communication and engineering officers. These officers are the operational backbone and technological brain of India's modern military, translating national defence strategies into battlefield readiness

India's defence capability and strategic dominance in modern warfare are not solely dependent on high-ranking commanders or frontline soldiers. A critical yet often underappreciated element lies in the mid-level officers, tactical communication specialists, and engineering officers who serve as the vital link between strategic planning and operational execution. Their expertise ensures that India's military maintains technological superiority, robust battlefield communication, and seamless multi-domain operations. This analysis delves into their indispensable contributions across the Army, Navy, and Air Force, emphasising their roles in engineering innovation, cyber and electronic warfare (EW), and actionable policy measures needed to strengthen and empower them.

Mid-level officers—including majors, colonels, wing commanders, group captains, commanders, and technical or engineering specialists—are the core leadership managing battlefield dynamics. They oversee unit command, tactical communications, and the integration of cutting-edge technologies into operations. Despite being pivotal in India's AI-driven, network-centric warfare structure, their contributions are often overshadowed by senior leadership. Recognising and institutionalising their roles is vital to ensuring success in modern combat.

Indian Army

The Corps of Signals, led by mid-level officers, enables real-time, encrypted communication, battlefield networking, and electronic warfare capabilities. Their responsibilities include securing tactical communication during high-intensity and joint operations, integrating EW and cybersecurity measures, and managing communication networks within Integrated Battle Groups (IBGs). The organisational structure comprises signal companies led by majors and signal regiments commanded by Colonels, with specialised trades such as Operator Radio and Line (ORL) and Technician Electronics and Systems (TES).

Engineering officers play a crucial role in combat engineering, rapid construction of strategic infrastructure, and executing counter-mobility tactics. They deploy AI-based Battlefield Surveillance Systems (BSS) and robotics to enhance warfare efficiency. A notable example is the India-China standoff (2020-21), where Signals Officers maintained encrypted communications in high-altitude conflict zones while engineering officers constructed operational infrastructure like bridges and logistics hubs under extreme conditions.

Indian Air Force

The communication engineers of the Indian Air Force (IAF) are integral to maintaining a state-of-the-art, in-house communication network. These skilled



professionals ensure seamless, secure, and resilient connectivity by leveraging advanced technologies such as Software-Defined Networking (SDN) and 5G. Their expertise supports real-time situational awareness, mission-critical data exchange, and robust cybersecurity, enabling uninterrupted operations in high-intensity scenarios. By continuously adapting to evolving technologies and threats, IAF communication engineers strengthen air defence operations, enhance operational readiness, and uphold national security while setting new standards in military-grade communication technology.

Mid-level IAF communication officers ensure uninterrupted and secure communication for air defence and combat operations. They manage Air Defence Control Units (including S-400, Akash, and SPYDER systems), UAV and satellite networks, and cyber defences for air assets.

IAF engineers specialising in Aeronautical, Electronics, and Mechanical fields oversee aircraft readiness, system maintenance, and the integration of missile systems, radars, and EW platforms. Their expertise has been crucial in indigenous system development, such as the LCA Tejas and AMCA. During the Balakot Airstrike (2019), Communication Officers ensured real-time,

encrypted communication for operational secrecy, while engineers guaranteed the operational

readiness of Mirage-2000 aircraft, including EW systems and radar evasion measures.

IAF vs Chinese PLAAF mid-level officers

A comparison between India's IAF and China's PLAAF reveals key operational differences. Indian mid-level officers, including Squadron Leaders and Wing Commanders, are empowered for independent decision-making and multi-platform management. In contrast, Chinese officers operate under a centralised command model, limiting battlefield initiative. Reports from RAND Corporation and the Pentagon (2020-22) highlight that PLAAF officers face systemic challenges in joint operations and adaptive warfare. In contrast, Indian officers, seasoned through real combat experiences, lead the integration of advanced indigenous and Western technologies, whereas PLAAF officers primarily operate evolving domestic platforms with less proven combat capability.

Indian Navy

Naval communication officers manage secure ship-to-ship and ship-to-shore communication, Blue Water Communication Systems (BWCS) for long-range coordination, and encrypted submarine and stealth platform communications.

Naval engineers oversee the maintenance and readiness of warships, submarines, and aircraft

carriers. They also integrate sophisticated weapons such as BrahMos missiles and torpedoes while managing stealth and radar-evading systems. A case in point is the anti-piracy operations in the Gulf of Aden, where communication officers coordinated multi-national, encrypted communication while engineers maintained operational readiness of naval platforms throughout extended deployments.

Mid-level officers play a pivotal role in coordinating tri-service communication and operational integration, ensuring seamless joint missions across land, air, and sea. Mid-level officers are at the frontline of cyber and EW defence.

Communication officers ensure robust cybersecurity frameworks, while engineers lead the design and operation of AI-based EW platforms and cyber-resilient technologies. These officers spearhead the induction and field application of indigenous defence systems like BrahMos, Akash, and AI-driven surveillance. They work closely with DRDO, BEL, and private defence innovators to enhance technological self-reliance.

Empowering India's defence backbone

To strengthen mid-level officers, the government should implement AI, Cyber, EW, and space warfare training, conduct integrated tactical communication-engineering exercises, and facilitate global exposure through collaborations with allies like the US, France, and Israel.

National awards should be introduced to recognise excellence in tactical communications and engineering. Defence technology fellowships should be launched for innovation leaders in these domains. Mid-level officers should have representation in defence technology boards and policy-making bodies to ensure that operational insights shape defence strategies. Promotions should be fast-tracked for excellence in emerging tech domains like EW, AI, and Cyber.

Additionally, foreign exchange programs and specialised leadership incentives should be introduced. Collaboration with DRDO, clean startups, and established industries should be strengthened. Mid-level officers should play an active role in innovation ecosystems like iDEX to foster indigenous technological advancements.

Conclusion

India's evolving security landscape demands proactive empowerment of mid-level Tactical Communication and Engineering Officers. These officers are the operational backbone and technological brain of India's modern military, translating national defence strategies into battlefield readiness.

These efforts aim to reduce dependency on natural forests, address ecological degradation, and create employment opportunities in rural areas. By integrating agroforestry with tree-based enterprises, India can ensure that environmental restoration goes hand in hand with sustainable livelihoods.

Global pressure on Indian industries

Indian industries are increasingly feeling the heat of stringent global carbon footprint regulations. The European Union's Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM), set to take effect in 2026, will impose tariffs on carbon-intensive imports such as steel, cement, and chemicals. In 2023, trade between India and the EU reached ₹124 Billion, making the potential impact of these tariffs on Indian exports substantial.

Economic and social advantages

Beyond their environmental benefits, tree plantations significantly contribute to

economic and social development. Agroforestry, in particular, creates opportunities for farmers and marginalised communities by offering income from multipurpose tree species that yield both ecological and economic returns. Establishing credible policies and governance mechanisms is critical for India to attract international investments and solidify its position in these markets.

Strategic partnerships and innovative project designs offer a way to tackle the dual challenges of environmental degradation and industrial sustainability.

Collaborations between industries, government agencies, and local communities can lead to scalable plantation models that integrate agroforestry, address climate change, and enhance rural livelihoods.

However, in official tournaments, he was vanquished by opponents much inferior, which sullied his estimable reputation following every bout. There appeared to be a psychological problem.

To circumvent this unenviable state, he approached a Zen Master. The Master directed his new tutee to meditate in a Buddhist temple that night, which was located on the seashore and guided him to focus only on his breath and swallow even the greatest of waves that would arise from the depths of the sea. As night fell, there were high tides in the sea and the waves assumed gargantuan proportions and subsumed everything in its trajectory. Even the reclining Buddha was not spared and was inundated by the spectre that followed the path of the tidal waves. The waves had run amok, obliterating every object in the way.

But Great Waves, following the instructions of the Master, focused his attention on his breath and meditated passionately and with total concentration.

The next morning the Zen Master was a witness to both the destruction as well as the poise maintained by his stolid student. He merely said, "Upon conquering your wavering mind, be confident of sustained success in all the wrestling engagements and bouts."

To be confident, individuals, entrepreneurs, corporates, spiritual seekers, political leaders and parties, sportspersons and teams all need to metamorphose their thinking patterns from, "It is not possible," to a mental state of confidence that "It is very much within the realm of possibility."

Lanka court rejects Rajapaksa plea for restoring personal protection

Colombo (PTI): The Supreme Court on Wednesday dismissed without a hearing the former president Mahinda Rajapaksa's plea for restoring his security contingent.

Rajapaksa, in January, had filed the fundamental rights petition seeking court intervention after the government slashed his security from over 350 personnel to just 60 in December last year. In his petition, Rajapaksa claimed his life was under threat as a result of his action to end the three-decade-long armed campaign by the LTTE (Liberation Tigers of

Tamil Eelam) for a separate Tamil homeland.

He had cited Prime Minister Harini Amarasuriya, the Cabinet and the defence establishment as respondents. The legal step by the 80-year-old came in the midst of action by the government to remove him from his official residence. Rajapaksa served as the President of Sri Lanka from 2005 to 2015.

Israel's surprise attack plunges Palestinians back into 'hell'

The Israeli bombs began falling before dawn, lighting the sky with orange flares and shattering the stillness. The surprise wave of airstrikes plunged Palestinians back into a nightmare they had hoped might be behind them. The bombs crashed across Gaza early on Tuesday, setting fire to a sprawling tent camp in the southern city of Khan Younis and flattening a Hamas-run prison. They hit the Al-Tabaen shelter in Gaza City, where Majid Nasser was sleeping with his family. "I went out to see where the bombing was. Suddenly the second strike happened in the room next to us," he said. "I heard screaming, my mother and sister screaming, calling for help. I came and entered the room and found the children under the rubble." Everyone was injured, but alive.

Palestinians tried to claw bodies from the wreckage with their bare hands. Parents arrived at hospitals, barefoot, carrying children who were limp and covered in ash. Streets and hospitals filled with bodies. By midday, over 400 people had been killed. It was one of the deadliest days of the 17-month war, following two months of ceasefire.

During the truce that began on January 19, hundreds of thousands of people in Gaza had returned to their homes, many of them destroyed. A surge of aid brought food and medicines — until Israel cut off aid two weeks ago to pressure the Hamas militant group into accepting a new proposal instead of continuing with the truce. The Muslim holy month of Ramadan had even provided moments of joy as families held communal sunset meals ending each day's fast without the fear of bombardment. Instead, the war that has killed tens of thousands of Palestinians and caused widespread destruction was back with full force. "What is happening to us is hell. Hell in every sense of the word," said Zeyad Abed, as he stood among the blackened remains of tents in Khan Younis. Fedaa Heriz, a displaced woman in Gaza City, said victims were killed in their sleep just before the pre-dawn meal ahead of the daily Ramadan fast. "They set the alarm to wake up for suhoor, and they wake up to death? They don't wake up?" she screamed. Fedaa Hamdan lost her husband and their two children in the strikes in Khan Younis. "My children died while they were hungry," she said, as funeral prayers were held over their bodies.

Hospitals felt like Armageddon: Scenes at hospitals recalled the early days of the war, when Israel launched a massive bombardment of

Gaza in response to the Hamas attack on Oct. 7, 2023. Survivors on Tuesday held rushed funeral rites over dozens of body bags lining the yard of Shifa Hospital in Gaza City. Mothers sobbed over the bloodied bodies of children, as warplanes hummed overhead. Doctors struggled to treat the flow of wounded.

"A level of horror and evil that is really hard to articulate. It felt like Armageddon," said Dr. Tanya-Haj Hassan, a volunteer with the Medical Aid for Palestinians aid group. She described the Nasser Hospital emergency room in Khan Younis as chaos, with patients, including children, spread across the floor. Some were still wrapped in the blankets they had slept in.

Dr Ismail Awad with the Doctors Without Borders aid group said the clinic received about 26 wounded people, including a woman seven months pregnant with shrapnel in her neck. She later died. "It was overwhelming, the number of patients," Awad said.

At the Al-Attar clinic in Muwasi in southern Gaza, medical staff said they were forced to operate without light bulbs and emergency ventilation devices.

Israel not only blocked all supplies from entering Gaza two weeks ago but also cut off electricity to the territory's main desalination plant last week. That has again created scarcities in medicine, food, fuel and fresh water for Gaza's over 2 million people.

Palestinians flee once more: New Israeli evacuation orders covering Gaza's eastern flank next to Israel and stretching into a key corridor dividing Gaza's north and south sent Palestinians fleeing again.

Israel's Arabic-language military spokesperson, Avichay Adraee, published a map on X telling Palestinians in those areas, including highly populated neighborhoods, to leave immediately and head for shelters. "Continuing to remain in the designated areas puts your life and the lives of your family members at risk," he said.

The evacuation zone appeared to include parts of Gaza's main north-south road, raising questions about how people might travel. Palestinians nevertheless gathered their belongings and set out, hardly knowing where to go.

UNICEF spokesperson Rosalia Bollen recalled that the days before the bombardment felt uneasy. She could sense fear. Children would ask if she believed the war would start again.

"This nightmare scenario has been on everyone's mind," she said. "It's just heartbreaking that it is materializing right now and that it is shattering the last piece of hope that people had."

Putin's vow not to hit Ukraine's energy infra 'at odds with reality': Zelenskyy

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said on Wednesday that a vow by Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin not to attack energy infrastructure was "very much at odds with reality" following an overnight barrage of drone strikes across the country.

Zelenskyy said that he would speak with US President Donald Trump later in the day and expected to hear more about the American leader's phone call with Putin about a ceasefire and to discuss the next steps to be taken. "Even last night, after Putin's conversation with ... Trump, when Putin said that he was allegedly giving orders to stop strikes on Ukrainian energy, there were 150 drones launched overnight, including on energy facilities," Zelenskyy said at a news conference in Helsinki with Finnish President Alexander Stubb.

Russia said it had halted its targeting of Ukraine's energy facilities and accused Kyiv of attacking equipment near one of its pipelines. "Unfortunately, we see that for now there is no reciprocity on the part of the Kyiv regime," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said.

Russian strikes, which hit civilian areas and damaged a hospital, followed Putin's refusal to back a full 30-day ceasefire during discussions with Trump. The White House described the call between Trump and Putin as the first step in a "movement to peace" that Washington hopes will include a maritime ceasefire in the Black Sea and eventually a full and lasting end to the fighting. But there was no indication that Putin backed away from his conditions for a prospective peace deal, which are fiercely opposed by Kyiv.

Stubb called the discussions between Putin and Trump a step in the right direction, but Finland's president said that Russia needs to end its aggression.

"There are only two ways to respond to the proposal of the president of the United States: it's a yes or a no — no buts, no conditions," Stubb said. "Ukraine accepted a ceasefire without any forms of conditions. If Russia refuses to agree, we need to increase our efforts to strengthen Ukraine and ratchet up pressure on Russia to convince them to come to the negotiating table."

Shortly after the lengthy phone call between Trump and Putin on Tuesday, air raid sirens sounded in Kyiv, followed by explosions as residents took shelter. Despite efforts to repel the attack, several strikes hit civilian infrastructure, including a direct drone strike on a hospital in Sumy and attacks on cities in Donetsk region. Russian drones were also reported over Kyiv, Zhytomyr, Sumy, Chernihiv, Poltava, Kharkiv, Kirovohrad, Dnipropetrovsk, and Cherkasy regions.

The Russian Defence Ministry said that the military complied with Putin's order to halt energy infrastructure strikes and downed seven drones its forces fired before the order at power facilities related to the military-industrial complex in Ukraine's southern Mykolaiv region.

Moscow accused Ukraine of targeting its energy facility in the Krasnodar region bordering the Crimean Peninsula, which Russia annexed in 2014, several hours after the Putin and Trump talks. The ministry said that three drones targeted oil transfer equipment that feeds the Caspian Pipeline Consortium, causing a fire and leading one oil tank to lose pressure.

"It is absolutely clear that we are talking about yet another provocation deliberately concocted by the Kyiv regime, aimed at derailing the peace initiatives of the US president," the ministry said.

Police arrest Istanbul mayor over alleged graft, terror links

Turkish police on Wednesday arrested Istanbul's mayor — a popular opposition leader and key rival of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan — and several other prominent figures as part of investigations into alleged corruption and terror links.

It was a dramatic escalation in an ongoing crackdown on the opposition and dissenting voices in Turkey. The state-run Anadolu Agency said prosecutors issued detention warrants for the mayor, Ekrem Imamoglu, and some 100 other people. Among those detained was Imamoglu's close aide, Murat Ongun. Authorities also closed several roads around Istanbul and banned demonstrations in the city for four days in an apparent effort to prevent protests following the arrest. Private NTV television said two Istanbul district mayors were among those detained.

Critics say the crackdown follows significant losses by Erdogan's ruling party in local elections last year amid growing calls for early national elections. Government officials insist that the courts operate independently and reject claims that legal actions against opposition figures are politically motivated.

"We are facing great tyranny, but I want you to know that I will not be discouraged," Imamoglu said earlier in the day in a video post on social media. Germany criticised the arrests, with Foreign Ministry spokesperson Sebastian Fischer describing them as "a serious setback for democracy."

The backdrop: Erdogan, a populist with increasingly authoritarian tendencies, has led Turkey as prime minister or president for more than 20 years and is now the longest-serving leader in the Turkish republic's history. His current term runs until 2028 but he has indicated he'd like to serve longer — something he could achieve with the help of a friendly parliament. Imamoglu was arrested as police searched his home, but it wasn't immediately clear if anything was confiscated. His wife, Dilek Imamoglu, told the private Now television that police arrived at their residence before dawn and that the mayor was taken around 7:30 am. The Istanbul Stock Exchange's main index dropped by 7 per cent over the news of his arrest, automatically triggering a temporary halt in trading to prevent panic selling and stabilise the market. Trading later resumed but was again halted in the afternoon. The Turkish Lira lost some 7 per cent of its value against the dollar. Anadolu, the news agency, said that Ekrem Imamoglu and several others are suspected of extortion, money laundering and irregularities concerning tenders and procurements, among other crimes.

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Italian coast guard recovers 6 bodies after migrant shipwreck in Mediterranean

Milan (PTI): The Italian Coast Guard recovered six bodies and was searching for up to 40 migrants missing after a rubber dinghy that departed from Tunisia sank in the central Mediterranean, the UN refugee agency said on Wednesday. Another 10 people, including four women, were rescued Tuesday and brought to Italy's southernmost island of Lampedusa. The Red Cross said they were in good condition and were receiving psychological care. Aircraft from the European border agency Frontex, the Italian coast guard and others were assisting in the search due to difficult sea conditions, the coast guard said. Survivors said some 56 people were in the dinghy when it departed from the Tunisian port of Sfax on Monday, UNHCR said. The boat started to deflate a few hours later. The people on board were from Cameroon, Ivory Coast, Guinea and Mali, the UNHCR said. The UN Missing Migrant Project puts the number of the dead and missing in the perilous central Mediterranean at over 24,506 from 2014 to 2024, many of them lost at sea. The project says the number may be greater as many deaths go unrecorded. So far this year, 8,963 migrants have arrived in Italy, according to Interior Ministry figures updated Wednesday, a 4 per cent increase over the same period last year. Italian Premier Giorgia Meloni's centre-right government has pushed for economic agreements with northern African countries aimed at preventing departures. Speaking to lawmakers this week, Meloni credited the deals with a nearly 60 per cent drop in migrant arrivals in Italy last year to 66,317 from 157,651 in 2023. She said 1,695 people were dead or missing at sea in 2024, compared with 2,526 a year earlier. "What do those numbers mean? They tell us that reducing the departures, and curbing the traffickers' business, is the only way to reduce the number of migrants who lose their lives trying to reach Italy and Europe," she said.

JFK assassination files released, sending history buffs hunting for new clues

Dallas (PTI): More than 63,000 pages of records related to the 1963 assassination of President John F. Kennedy were released following an order by President Donald Trump, many without the redactions that had confounded historians for years and helped fuel conspiracy theories. The US National Archives and Records Administration posted to its website on Tuesday roughly 2,200 files containing the documents. The vast majority of the National Archives' collection of over 6 million pages of records, photographs, motion pictures, sound recordings and artifacts related to the assassination have previously been released. Larry J. Sabato, director of the University of Virginia Centre for Politics and author of "The Kennedy Half-Century," said it will take time to fully review the records.

India is focusing on core trade issues such as import duty and non-tariff barriers in the proposed Free Trade Agreements (FTAs) for faster outcomes from these negotiations, Commerce Secretary Sunil Barthwal said on Wednesday.

He said this approach is important as sometimes it takes "so much time" to conclude negotiations for these agreements and because of that businesses lose interest.

"The experience has been that when we look at these free trade agreements, sometimes they are so much time taking that people lose interest, the businesses lose interest."

"So we are also reviewing some of these issues in the department (of commerce) as well, as we are talking to our partners who are doing FTAs with us that why can't we first look at the core trade issues, and even if it is early tranche, or even if it is first phase of that comprehensive agreement, but let there be some kind of outcome which should come out of these negotiations. So we are taking that approach, that let us first focus on the core trade issues," Barthwal said at CII's India-LAC (Latin

America and Caribbean) Business Conclave here.

The secretary said that the core trade issues are tariffs, non-tariff barriers, SPS (sanitary and phyto-sanitary) barriers, and regulatory factors.

He added that there is a need for India and the LAC region to follow this approach.

"Look at the core trade issues with you, and start working in that direction. I think that is going to be a great way forward by which we will be able to achieve many things, and the businesses will be able to see that the outcomes are very, very fast," Barthwal said. He added that the multi-sectoral approach, which India is talking to the US with under the proposed bilateral trade agreement is also important.

In this approach, "we look at the sectors of mutual advantage, of mutual benefit", he said.

India is negotiating trade agreements with MERCOSUR (Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay, and Uruguay), Chile and Peru.

"We are also thinking of how to look at this (LAC) region in terms of looking the impediments, whether it is non-tariff barriers, whether it is tariff barriers or the regulations, to see that trade grows between these two regions," he said,

adding there is a target to double two-way commerce from USD 50 Billion to USD 100 Billion in the coming years.

The secretary said that huge potential is there to boost trade between the two regions.

LAC region imports are at USD 1.8 Trillion and exports of goods and services are around USD 1.8 Billion.

He also said that countries will have to cut down protectionism to increase trade because that is the need of the nations.

"You cannot grow your GDPs, unless and until the trade also grows...we are embarking upon our trade promotion mission, which would be a kind of umbrella, a kind of scheme, where we look at how to take our trade further. "So trade is going to be an engine of growth, not only for that region, but also for India and that is the path which we will be taking forward," Barthwal said.

He added that sectors where cooperation can be increased included automobile, medical devices and pharmaceuticals. "So can we look at the automobile sector, in a manner in which there are gains to both the regions. Similarly, the pharmaceutical sector, again, India has developed that ability of focusing on generic drugs, which can provide affordable medicines," he said.

Government recommends 12 per cent safeguard duty on certain steel imports

The commerce ministry's investigation arm DGTR has recommended imposition of a 12 per cent provisional safeguard duty for 200 days on certain steel products with an aim to protect domestic players from surge in imports.

Last year in December, the Directorate General of Trade Remedies (DGTR) started the investigation into the sudden surge in imports of 'Non-Alloy and Alloy Steel Flat Products', used in various industries, including fabrication, pipe making, construction, capital goods, auto, tractors, bicycles and electrical panels.

The investigations were conducted following a complaint from the Indian Steel Association on behalf of its members including ArcelorMittal Nippon Steel India, AMNS Khopoli, JSW Steel, JSW Steel Coated Products, Bhushan Power and Steel, Jindal Steel and Power and Steel Authority of India Limited.

The directorate in its probe has preliminarily found that there is a recent, sudden, sharp and significant increase in the imports of these products into India, causing and threatening to cause serious injury to the domestic industry/producers. The directorate has said in a notification dated March 18 that there exist critical circumstances, where any delay in application of provisional safeguard measures would cause damage which would be difficult to repair.

There is a necessity for immediate application of provisional safeguard measures.

"The authority recommends imposition of provisional Safeguard Duty at the rate of 12 per cent ad valorem for 200 days pending final determination on imports of the product under consideration," the DGTR has said in a notification.

The finance ministry will take the final decision to impose the duty.

According to the industry, the existence of significant excess capacity far exceeding domestic consumption in China, Japan and South Korea have arisen due to slowing demand in those countries.

Import of these products increased from 2.293 Million tonnes during 2021-22 to 6.612 Million tonnes during the period of investigation (October 2023 to September 2024, and the three preceding fiscal years - 2021-24).

The imports have increased from countries including China, Japan, Korea, and Vietnam.

The notification added that the objective of the duty is to protect the Indian

domestic industry against the surge of imports.

While some big domestic steel makers are advocating for imposition of the duty, the user industry is strongly against it as the duty would push raw material prices, impacting their competitiveness.

Domestic steel players have raised concerns over increasing imports of steel from nations like China.

However, MSME exporters from the engineering sector have stated that any move to impose additional duties on steel imports would make domestic products uncompetitive and impact the country's outbound shipments from the sector.

Hand Tool Association Chairman S C Ralhan said that the imposition of the duty would hurt exports from India.

"It will be very damaging for MSME exporters and manufacturers as the duty will increase prices of steel which is a key raw material for our industry. It will make exporters uncompetitive in global markets," Ralhan said.

Safeguard measures in the form of duty or quantitative restrictions are trade remedies available to the World Trade Organisation member-countries.

They are imposed to provide a level-playing field to domestic players in case of sudden and significant increase in imports of a product.

Telangana presents ₹3.05 Lakh Crore Budget for 2025-26

The Congress government in Telangana on Wednesday presented a budget of nearly ₹3.05 Lakh Crore for 2025-26, with over ₹56,000 Crore for the implementation of the party's 'six poll guarantees', while expecting to raise ₹64,000 Crore through open market loans.

The budget estimates revenue expenditure of ₹2.27 Lakh Crore and capital expenditure of ₹36,504 Crore, said Deputy Chief Minister Mallu Bhatti Vikramarka, who tabled the financial document in the state Assembly. "For the fiscal year 2025-26, I am proposing a total expenditure of ₹3,04,965 Crore, with revenue expenditure of ₹2,26,982 Crore and capital expenditure of ₹36,504 Crore," he said, describing it as a "perfect balance between welfare and development".

The 'six poll guarantees' of the Congress government include ₹2,500 per month, gas cylinder for ₹500 and free travel in state-run RTC buses under 'Mahalakshmi' scheme meant for women, ₹15,000 per acre for farmers and tenant farmers under 'Rythu Bharosa'.

As many as 200 units of free electricity for all households under 'Gruha Jyothi', house site and rupees five lakh for people not owning a house under the 'Indiramma Indlu', rupees five lakh for students under 'Yuva Vikasam' and social security pension of ₹4,000 monthly as per 'Cheyutha' scheme are the rest.

The state government has proposed an allocation of ₹24,439 Crore for the Agriculture Department, including towards the Rythu Bharosa Scheme, under which each farmer receives ₹12,000 per acre annually as investment support and

an additional incentive of ₹500 per quintal for fine variety paddy procured from farmers. ₹31,605 Crore has been earmarked for the Panchayati Raj and Rural Development Department, while the Education Department has been allotted ₹23,108 Crore. Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes Welfare will get ₹40,232 Crore and ₹17,169 Crore respectively.

"Inspired by secular values, the Congress government has designed this budget for equitable distribution of resources to all classes of society and to establish a system free from inequalities," Vikramarka said. He further said the government's strategic roadmap for the next decade envisions a five-fold expansion of the current USD 200 Billion state economy into a Trillion-dol-

lar economy. ₹23,373 Crore was proposed for the Irrigation Department, while the Home Department has been allotted ₹10,188 Crore. The Health, Medical and Family Welfare Dept gets ₹12,393 Crore and the Energy Department would receive ₹21,221 Crore.

The state's outstanding liabilities stood at over ₹4,51 Lakh Crore (FRBM loans) during 2024-25 (revised estimates) and it is expected to go over ₹5 Lakh Crore next fiscal.

In 2024-25, total outstanding liabilities (FRBM Loans) of the state were budgeted at 27.38 per cent of GSDP. The revised estimates indicate that the outstanding liabilities will be contained at 27.98 per cent of GSDP.

To address the issue of off-budget borrowings, the state is actively negotiating with financial institutions to lower borrowing costs and extend the repayment periods associated with these borrowings, the Budget document said, adding that the guarantees will be extended to only those Public Sector Undertakings which have sufficient cash flows of their own to service the debt.

"Most of the borrowings of the government are being utilised for capital expenditure. This will result in income generating assets and more income to people," it said. Expecting that the growth momentum will pick up further, own tax revenue in 2025-26 is budgeted at ₹1,45,420 Crore as compared with the revised estimates of ₹1,38,181 Crore in 2024-25. Telangana's per capita income stood at ₹3,79,751 with growth rate of 9.6 per cent, while the GSDP at current prices registered 10.1 per cent growth to ₹16,12,579 Crore in 2024-25.

Rupee rises 12 paise to settle at 86.44

Rising for the fourth straight session, the rupee appreciated 12 paise to close at 86.44 (provisional) against the US dollar on Wednesday, supported by a positive trend in domestic equity markets and lower global crude oil prices.

However, a strengthening American currency against major currencies overseas ahead of the US Federal Reserve's interest rate decision capped the sharp gain in the local unit, forex traders said.

At the interbank foreign exchange, the rupee opened at 86.60 and touched the intraday low of 86.68 against the greenback.

The US dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was trading 0.36 per cent higher at 103.26

The unit also hit the day's peak of 86.43 before ending the session at 86.44 (provisional), up 12 paise against its previous close.

The domestic currency settled 25 paise higher at 86.56 against the US dollar on Tuesday.

Anuj Choudhary, Research Analyst at Mirae Asset Sharekhan, said the rupee was supported by strong domestic equities, overnight decline in crude oil prices and FII inflows.

Choudhary further said the rupee is expected to trade with a positive bias on positive domestic markets and fresh FII inflows.

"Extended fall in crude oil prices and weakness in the greenback may also support the rupee. Investors may remain cautious ahead of the FOMC meeting. Fed is likely to leave the interest rates unchanged. USD-INR spot price is expected to trade in a range of ₹86.20 to ₹86.80," he added.

Meanwhile, the US dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was trading 0.36 per cent higher at 103.26.

Brent crude, the global oil benchmark, was trading 0.77 per cent lower at USD 70.02 per barrel in futures trade. In the domestic equity market, the BSE Sensex rose 147.79 points, or 0.20 per cent, to settle at 75,449.05, while the Nifty advanced 73.30 points, or 0.32 per cent, to close at 22,907.60 points.

Foreign institutional investors (FIIs) turned net buyers and purchased equities worth ₹694.57 Crore on a net basis on Tuesday, according to exchange data.

Let us secure farmers' future through reform and unity

It's time to end the agitation. Let's Focus on Real Solutions for Indian Farmers. Indian agriculture stands at a defining moment. The image of a farmer sowing seeds in the fertile fields of Punjab or harvesting crops in the sun-drenched plains of Maharashtra reflects the soul of the nation. Over the past decade, India's farmers have seen unprecedented support and transformation under the visionary leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi. From the sunburnt fields of Rajasthan to the fertile plains of Uttar Pradesh, farmers today stand more empowered, more secure, and more hopeful than ever before. Prime Minister Modi's unwavering commitment to transforming Indian agriculture has not only revitalised rural livelihoods but also restored the dignity and strength of India's farmers. The rollout of direct financial assistance, improved irrigation, access to credit, and strategic market reforms have given farmers a new lease on life. Yet, at a time when Indian agriculture is poised for a golden era, the misguided agitation led by the Samyukt Kisan Morcha (SKM) threatens to derail this hard-earned progress.

As a Founder Member of Rashtriya Kisan Mahasangha (RKM), I have witnessed firsthand how Indian farmers, fragmented by geography and economic disparity, came together under a single

banner. The formation of the Samyukt Kisan Morcha (SKM) was a historic moment for India's agrarian community—a united front aimed at protecting farmers' interests and ensuring that their voices were heard at the highest levels of government. The SKM gave farmers a platform, a collective strength that made the government sit up and listen. However, the current agitation stands in stark contrast to that spirit of unity and purpose. It has been hijacked by political forces that seek to exploit farmers' grievances for electoral gain, diverting attention from the real issues facing Indian agriculture.

Under Prime Minister Modi's leadership, Indian agriculture has witnessed a historic transformation. The PM-KISAN (Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi) scheme has been a game changer. Over ₹2.8 Lakh Crore has been directly transferred to more than 11 crore farmers' bank accounts, providing them with financial security and flexibility to invest in inputs and equipment. For decades, farmers struggled with soil degradation and poor productivity. The Soil Health Card Scheme addressed this challenge by distributing more than 23 crore Soil Health Cards, enabling farmers to make informed decisions about fertilizers and improving soil fertility. The Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (PMFBY) has been another milestone. As India's largest crop insurance scheme, it has provided over ₹1.4 Lakh Crore in claims, shielding farmers from crop loss due to weather extremes and natural calamities.

Recognizing the critical role of water in agriculture, the government launched the Per Drop More Crop initiative under the larger umbrella of the Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana. Over 72 lakh hectares have been brought under micro-irrigation, ensuring better water efficiency and higher yields. The expansion of the Kisan Credit Card (KCC) scheme has given farmers unprecedented access to affordable credit. Over 3 crore new Kisan Credit Cards have been issued since 2020,

allowing farmers to access institutional credit at low-interest rates, reducing dependence on informal moneylenders. To strengthen market access, the government has integrated over 1,260 mandis through the National Agriculture Market (e-NAM) platform. This has empowered farmers with better price discovery and reduced dependency on middlemen, ensuring fair prices for their produce.

India's global leadership in millet production is another testimony to Prime Minister Modi's agricultural vision. India has emerged as the world's largest producer of millets, and the United Nations' declaration of 2023 as the International Year of Millets was a direct result of India's

diplomatic and agricultural leadership. The government's push for crop diversification, sustainable farming, and export-driven growth has positioned Indian agriculture as a powerhouse in global markets.

Despite this remarkable progress, the SKM's agitation threatens to reverse these gains. The demand for a legal guarantee for Minimum Support Price (MSP) is economically unsustainable and strategically flawed. While MSP provides a safety net for farmers, making it legally binding for all crops would force the government to procure excess produce it cannot store or distribute. This would create market distortions, drive up fiscal deficits, and ultimately harm the very farmers it seeks to protect. India's agricultural sector thrives when farmers are competitive in the global market—not when they are dependent on artificial price supports.

The same holds true for the demand to scrap the Electricity Amendment Bill. The

bill aims to improve the efficiency and distribution of electricity, especially in rural areas. Privatization, when regulated properly, will ensure more reliable power supply, reducing input costs and increasing production efficiency. Rejecting reforms without exploring their benefits only ensures that rural India remains stuck in outdated systems.

One of the most distressing demands is the call for compensation for the families of those who died during the previous farmers' protests. While the loss of life is tragic and deserves compassion, tying it to political leverage is morally wrong. Farmers' lives are not bargaining chips. Seeking compensation without addressing the underlying issues—better market access, improved irrigation, and insurance against crop loss—only shifts focus away from real solutions. Farmers need dignity, not charity.

The Government of India has shown unprecedented willingness to engage with farmers and address their concerns. The repeal of the three farm laws in 2021 was a testament to the government's commitment to listening to farmers' voices. A committee on MSP was formed, and multiple rounds of talks have been held. Yet the SKM's rigid stance, driven more by political ideology than by farmers' welfare, has stalled meaningful progress.

In a significant step toward resolving this crisis, the government has agreed to hold a detailed discussion with all stakeholders before the next date of talk on May 4th—the day with farmers' representatives. This creates a genuine opportunity for farmers' leaders to present their case in a structured and solution-oriented environment. The government will and possible stakeholders. The engagement will aim for viksit Bharat by 2047 and net zero emitter Indian economy and all representatives from agricultural cooperatives, financial institutions, Private sector, and farmer producer organizations (FPOs) to join the dialogue and create a comprehensive solution framework. This is a golden opportunity

for SKM to shift from confrontation to collaboration. If the government is showing willingness to listen, why continue the agitation? Why let political narratives hijack an opportunity for meaningful reform?

What India's farmers need is support—not hollow slogans, not political posturing, not temporary fixes. They need to know that when their crops fail, there's a safety net. They need to know that they can access affordable credit without falling into the clutches of moneylenders. They need to know that their produce will find a fair price in the market, not through artificial price supports but through competitive value chains and export opportunities.

This is not the time for confrontation, it is the time for cooperation. The SKM has a moral responsibility to step back from the brink and steer the movement toward meaningful reform. Farmers have already sacrificed enough. Let's not ask them to sacrifice more in the name of misguided political narratives.

To the leaders of SKM—your movement was born from a genuine cause. It gave a voice to the voiceless, brought farmers' issues to the national stage, and forced the government to listen. But now you stand at a crossroads. You can either continue down the path of confrontation, risking the very livelihoods you claim to protect—or you can choose the path of dialogue and reform.

India's farmers have achieved remarkable progress under PM Modi's leadership. It is time to stop the agitation—not as a sign of defeat, but as a gesture of strength and wisdom.

Let dialogue replace protest. Let solutions replace slogans. Let farmers finally breathe the air of hope and dignity. If the SKM genuinely cares about farmers' future, it should call off the agitation immediately and walk into the May 4th meeting with a constructive mindset. NCA rechristened to COE

The National Cricket Academy has been rechristened (NCA) to Centre of Excellence (COE) as it found a new home in Bengaluru but it appears to be a case of "old wine in a new bottle", with still no clarity on injury management timelines for specific players.

Whether it is India's Number 1 pacer Jasprit Bumrah or country's fastest bowler Mayank Yadav, the COE has maintained an iron curtain regarding the timeline and process of injury management.

There used to be a running joke about the COE for injured players few years back: "You can check-in anytime of the year but you can't leave".

From injury management (by the physios) in COE's Sports Science and Medical team to rehabilitation and injury prevention (by Strength and Conditioning coach) to return to play (handled by bowling coaches cum biomechanics experts), a player goes through a complicated three-way process.

For any and every injury and subsequent 'Return To Play', there are timelines, which obviously vary from player to player. But not being able to even provide a rough estimation of a player's return hasn't actually amused anyone related to Indian cricket.

"Over the past year, in most injury and rehabilitation cases, the medical team has simply stated 'clinically fit', which offers no real clarity on a player's Return to Play. Don't want to name but many players resume skill training under bowling coach only to still experience discomfort."

"The medical team is always non-committal on Return to Play," a BCCI source privy to developments in COE told PTI on conditions of anonymity.



"It is a strange situation where there remains a question mark with regards to proper co-ordination between the various verticals which needs work in tandem to get an elite athlete back on track."

In case of Mayank, he had a six-month lay-off between April and October when he first suffered a side strain. He made his international debut against Bangladesh in October. He last played on October 12 and has been out with lower back stress fracture for last five months.

While he is expected to miss the first few games for LSG, Shardul Thakur training with the team suggests that Mayank's injury might be more serious than what people are envisaging.

For Bumrah, the last official statement that came was from chairman of selectors Ajit Agarkar, who had informed that he had required five weeks of off-loading (complete rest from any rigorous exercise) before he can start training. That was back in early February and with IPL starting in next few days, Bumrah still isn't fit.

"There is a reason why England and Wales Cricket Board has renowned sports and exercise medicine expert Dr Nick Pierce as their Chief Medical Officer (CMO). There is too much at stake for a physio to stick his neck out and give a

proper overview of a player's medical condition. Hopefully, BCCI would have a sports medicine expert as head and not just a physio," a former national selector, who has seen how NCA functions said.

There is also a perennial problem when it comes to co-ordination between the national team's travelling support staff and the team working at BCCI's COE base in Bengaluru.

If multiple sources are to be believed, the "co-ordination is nothing to write home about."

The IPL franchises spend millions on their key fast bowlers and they have every right to have a proper feedback from the COE not just the player updating them, a senior franchise official said.

Another interesting aspect that came out while talking to a number of people who have witnessed or worked in the COE is lack of "historical database" which also goes a long way in quick diagnosis and prognosis in terms of injuries.

"The BCCI now has an Athlete Management System (AMS) where the state team S&C trainers and physios update the injury management database. But what we need is a system of collecting body structure related data of all registered U-16 players.

Rory McIlroy wins The Players Championship

Rory McIlroy winning The Players Championship gave him so much of what he doesn't need.

The \$4.5 Million prize is the largest for any tournament in the world. It pushed McIlroy's career earnings on the PGA Tour alone to just over \$99.7 Million, second only to Tiger Woods.

The perks include a five-year exemption on the PGA Tour (his 28 wins make him a life member) and three-year exemptions to the majors (he's been eligible for all of them since 2009).

It also raised expectations for McIlroy going into the Masters. He probably doesn't need those, either. Even at the TPC Sawgrass for the premier championship of the PGA Tour, the week for McIlroy started and ended with talk about the Masters. It was last Tuesday when a University of Texas golfer watched McIlroy hook his tee shot into the water on the 18th during a practice round and told him it was just like the shot McIlroy hit on the 10th hole at Augusta National the one that started his shocking collapse in the 2011 Masters. That remains as close as McIlroy has come to winning a green jacket. McIlroy took his phone and handed it to security, the Longhorn lad was removed and McIlroy didn't want to talk about the incident a few days later.

Far more pleasant was the end of the week. Disappointed after losing a three-shot lead with five holes to play in regulation Sunday, more nervous than he would have expected at the start of a three-hole playoff Monday, McIlroy made quick work of JJ Spaun with three great swings. The last one was a three-quarter 9-iron in the wind that left everyone hopeful until it plopped down in the middle of an island at Number 17.

Winning The Players is a big deal, and McIlroy now has won it twice.

"I don't want to put any sort of label on it, but it is one of the biggest championships in the world," McIlroy said.

This also is the first time in his career he has two victories leading to the Masters, having won at Pebble Beach last month. Go back to last November, when McIlroy won the DP World Tour Championship in Dubai, and that makes three wins in his last six starts.

The first question from Sky Sports: "Have you ever been in a better head-space going into the majors after those two big wins?" The majors start with the Masters. For McIlroy, it's always the Masters. This starts the 11th year since he last won a major, his 11th time going to Augusta National knowing it's the one major keeping him from the career Grand Slam. "I've had good starts to years before," McIlroy said, and this much is true. Go back to 2019 when he started the year with seven straight top

10s, including a victory in The Players Championship. He tied for 21st at the Masters. "Look, I'm in good form," he said. "I'm playing well. I feel like all aspects of my game are under control. I just have to keep working hard, keep my head down. It's another opportunity to just refine little bits that need refining."

But this is setting up nicely for him. Scottie Scheffler had to wait a month to get going because surgery to his right palm that was punctured by a wine glass he was using to make ravioli. Scheffler still hasn't had all the pieces fall together since returning at Pebble Beach, though he does not appear to be far off.

Xander Schauffele, winner of two majors last year, just returned from two months away because of a rib injury. His only celebration has been making the cut on the number the last two weeks to extend his streak to 59 in a row.

McIlroy plans one more start the Houston Open before the Masters, the ultimate measure. He feels more equipped than ever to bag another major, and he certainly has been hardened by more failures than he would like to remember. St. Andrews in 2022 and the U.S. Open the last two years were his for the taking and someone else took home the trophy. Pinehurst No. 2 was particularly brutal last year when he missed a pair of short putts on crispy greens down the stretch.

Shubman Gill believes that a successful captain needs to keep his batting separate from leadership as mixing the two is never in the best interest of the team.

Gill took over the mantle of Gujarat Titans from Hardik Pandya last season and his start was an inauspicious one with the team finishing a lowly eighth after playing back-to-back finals in 2022 and 2023.

"The more you keep the captaincy and batting separate, the better it is. In my experience, if I am going to bat, the best thing for me is, that I concentrate on batting. The decision I take as a batter, that is the best decision for me," Gill said at the pre-season media conference here on Wednesday.

"When we are fielding, at that time, or off the field, I get more involved in captaincy. The more I bat, as a batsman, the better it is for me," said Gill, who had scored a massive 890 runs during the 2023 season.

However in his first season as skipper, the tally had come down by more than half to 426 runs and even the strike-rate dropped by 10 percent from 157.70 to 147.40.

The first season as skipper might not have gone as per plans but there were things that he learnt along the way.

"I think, the most interesting, and challenging thing, as a captain, is that, every day, you learn something new, about a player, or about yourself. If I want to be a good captain, these are the things I need to work on."

Gill thanked Director of Cricket Vikram Solanki and head coach Ashish Nehra for helping him in strategic matters as he himself is evolving as a young leader.

"The experience that I get here, from Ashu bhai (Nehra) and Vikram, is immensely treasurable for me."

Gill believes that whenever GT have played well at home, they have tended to perform well in away games too.

"If you look at our record, the better we performed, at home, the better we performed away as well. So, performing away, is just as important, and just as important, as performing at home."

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MI to approach IPL 2025 with togetherness: Hardik

Mumbai Indians (MI) captain Hardik Pandya on Wednesday said now that the contentious Impact Player rule has been extended by three years, a cricketer has to be a pure all-rounder to find place in the starting eleven.

The rule allows a team to replace a player from their playing XI at a later stage of the match. The teams bring in a batting or bowling specialist as the situation demands.

The BCCI extended the rule to at least the 2027 edition despite reservations from leading Indian players, including Rohit Sharma who said the Impact Player strategy was holding back the development of Indian all-rounders with teams replacing them with an extra batter or bowler during the game.

"In the current scenario, it becomes difficult if you are not completely a 50-50 all-rounder to find your place. Going forward this can change or will change, we will have to see. But yes, definitely if you want to encourage more all-rounders they will need a fix spot for them to develop over the years," said Pandya during the season-opening media interaction.

Pandya will miss MI's opening game on Sunday due to one match suspension for over-rate related offences last year. Surya Kumar Yadav will lead the side.

Sitting next to him, head coach Mahela Jaywardene also had his say on

the matter.

"It has given a different set of challenges. So we have to adapt and get better. My only concern at that time was that sometimes you have a pure all-rounder and they have a specific role to play but the other all-rounders are taken out of the game because you can get a genuine bowler or batter, that is something we have to see in the long term," reckoned the Sri Lankan great.

Pandya upbeat about Mumbai Indians' revival after memorable 12 months

Pandya's return to Mumbai Indians last season was not the smoothest as the storied franchise finished last among 10 teams. He was also booed by the home fans. Considering their five IPL titles, Mumbai Indians have had a dry run since 2021. The premier all-rounder said he will carry the confidence of winning two ICC titles with India over the past year.

"Playing for India has always been prideful. It has also been my number one priority, winning two trophies is very close to our hearts and that joy will carry forward to the IPL.

"Last four seasons have been dry for Mumbai Indians. This season we will approach the season with joy and togetherness," said Pandya who linked up with his IPL team hours after winning the Champions Trophy in Dubai.

Pandya believes that he is constantly evolving as a cricketer notwithstanding his "unshakeable" confidence.

Considering the rollercoaster last 12

months, his focus will be to help youngsters excel.

"My life has been about ups and downs. I have enjoyed the learning. It has taught me about sport as well as life over the years. It is a fresh year. Lot of things have changed. Every year there is .0 added. Hardik 3.0, if you want to call that, there will be passion, grit and challenges which I love.

"For me the crucial part is to make sure, if the challenges are thrown at boys how I can help them and add value."

On his own batting position, he added: "I like to play situations and entry points, specific batting number, it has gone from my cricketing journey."

Mumbai's core group remains intact despite the low returns over the past four seasons. Besides Pandya, the team has India captains in Rohit Sharma and Suryakumar Yadav. Jasprit Bumrah has also captained India.

Mahela stressed on the importance of maintaining the core group.

"We have relied on our core group for all the titles we have won. Winning IPL is not easy. With the core group, we have added more experience (with Bounl and Deepak Chahar coming in).

"Trent has been a big part in our success. Also, we have not won our first game since 2012, so there is a big challenge ahead of us. "I had a good chat with Rohit on the season. With Bumrah and Hardik not starting, we will decide the combination when we get to Chennai."

Players' association files antitrust suit against tennis organisers

Calling the groups in charge of professional tennis "a cartel," the co-founded by Novak Djokovic filed an antitrust lawsuit against the women's and men's tours, the International Tennis Federation and the sport's integrity agency in federal court in New York.

The suit by the Professional Tennis Players' Association says the organizations that run the sport hold "complete control over the players' pay and working conditions" and their setup constitutes "textbook violations of state and federal law" that "immunise professional tennis from ordinary market forces and deny professional tennis players and other industry participants their right to fair competition."

The lawsuit seeks a jury trial and wants players to gain access to more earnings, arguing that the governing bodies that oversee the four Grand Slam tournaments Wimbledon, the U.S. Open, the French

Open and the Australian Open — and other professional events "cap the prize money tournaments award and limit players' ability to earn money off the court." On top of the case in U.S. District Court, the PTPA made filings with the European Commission in Brussels and the Competition Markets Authority in London. "There is a complete and utter lack of competition that exists in professional tennis, and we believe by filing these actions, we will ultimately inject the kind of competition that will be fair to the players, to the fans and actually to the people (who) operate the system," said Jim Quinn, a lawyer working with the PTPA. "It's going to require a restructuring," Quinn said.

The WTA Tour and ATP Tour issued separate statements Tuesday saying they would "vigorously" defend themselves.

The WTA said it has "committed to a



\$400 million increase in player compensation" in recent years and labeled the PTPA action a "baseless legal case" that is "regrettable and misguided." The ATP touted a "major increase in player compensation" that created a jump of "\$70 million in the past five years," and called the PTPA's case "entirely without merit."

"The PTPA has consistently chosen division and distraction through misinformation over progress," the ATP's statement said. "Five years on from its inception in 2020, the PTPA has struggled to establish a meaningful role in tennis, making its decision to pursue legal action at this juncture unsurprising."

The International Tennis Integrity Agency — which investigates and adjudicates doping and corruption — said it noted the PTPA's action but did not offer any direct reaction to the case itself.

A spokesman said the ITF "will take the appropriate time to consider our response." The PTPA was founded by 24-time Grand Slam champion Djokovic and Vasek Pospisil in August 2020, aiming to offer representation for players who are independent contractors in a largely individual sport. One of the goals made clear along the way was to become a sort of full-fledged union that negotiates collective bargaining agreements like those that exist in team sports.

"Beyond just the economics, we see ... Player welfare is completely disregarded in everything, from the tour schedule to anti-competitive practices, to abusing our rights around name, image, likeness," Pospisil said. He is one of the players listed as a plaintiff; Djokovic is not. Players whose names are attached to the U.S. Lawsuit include 2022 Wimbledon runner-up Nick Kyrgios, Sorana Cirstea, Varvara Gracheva, Reilly Opelka, Tenny Sandgren and Nicole Melichar-Martinez.
