Retail inflation eased to a nearly six-vear low of 3.16 per cent in April mainly due to subdued prices of vegetables, fruits, pulses, and other protein-rich items, creating enough room for the Reserve Bank to go for another round of rate or in the June monetary policy review.The Consumer Price Index (CPI) based inflation was 3.34 per cent in March and 4.83 per cent in April 2024. Lauds military's valour, sends message of 'Lakshman Rekha' to Pak from border IAF base

With an S-400 missile defence system in the backdrop, Prime Minister Narendra Modi sent a firm message Tuesday from Adampur Air Base to Pakistan: Not only have you failed to harm any of India's military installations but you will be annihilated if terrorism continues from your soil.

In his first speech to the armed forces since Operation Sindoor, Modi lauded the military for humbling Pakistan in the four-day engagement that resulted in the destruction of nine terror sites, killing of over 100 terrorists and damage to its eight military installations.

Naidu unveils grand plan for port-based economy in State

Centre to invest Rs 3,500 crore, and the State will contribute land as equity

PNS VIJAYAWADA

Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu has announced an ambitious strategy to build a port-based economy in Andhra Pradesh by capitalising on the state's 1,000-km-long coastline. The plan envisions the establishment of a port or fishing harbour every 50 km to drive economic development, generate employment, and enhance infrastructure.

During a high-level review meet-ing at the State Secretariat with officials from the Union Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways, including Union Secretary TK Ramachandran, Naidu underscored the need to fast-track port and maritime infrastructure.

A major highlight of the discussions was the proposal to develop a Shipbuilding and Repair Cluster at Dugarajapatnam in Nellore district, as part of the Central

Government's bifurcation-era assurances. The project, backed by a preliminary feasibility report, will be developed across 2,000 acres with joint support from the Centre and

The greenfield port project will include four dry docks, outfitting jetties, and a ship-lift facility. Of the total area, 1,000 acres will be reserved for core shipbuilding operations, while the remaining will host ancillary industries.

The Centre will invest Rs 3,500 crore, and the State will contribute

A Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) will be established to attract global leaders in shipbuilding. Officials informed the Chief Minister that the initiative is expected to draw investments totalling Rs 26,000 crore, provide direct employment to 5,000 individuals, and indirectly benefit around 30,000 more.

200 kg of ganja seized, four held

Mumbai-bound local train overshoots platform

Officials seize painting by **Pak artist at IGI Airport**

Upon thorough examination, it was noticed that it was made by a Pakistani artist and routed to India via London," said a senior customs official. The art work is declared worth Rs 5.5 lakh, the official said, adding that the customs department has decided to confiscate it. The move comes after India on May 2, 2025 banned "direct or indirect import or transit of all goods originating in or exported from Pakistan..." through a notification issued by the Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT) in the wake of last month's Pahalgam terror attack.

BJP secures landslide victory in Assam panchayat polls

Husband's illicit affair not cruelty, abetment of suicide: HC

PNS NEW DELHI

The Delhi HC on Tuesday said a man's extramarital affair does not amount to cruelty or abetment of suicide unless shown it harassed or tormented the wife.

Justice Sanjeev Narula said an extramarital relationship was not a ground to implicate the husband for dowry death in the absence of a nexus between the alleged rela-tionship and dowry demand. The court, as a result, granted bail to a man, who was arrested in a case under Sections 498A (cruelty)/304-B (dowry death) aside from Section 306 (abetment of suicide) of IPC, following the unnatural death of his wife in her matrimonial home on March 18, 2024, within nearly five years of marriage.

Won't take up any official post after retirement: CJI

Chief Justice of India Sanjiv Khanna on Tuesday said though he wasn't going to accept any postretirement official assignments, he

would continue his innings in law. Justice Khanna, who was elevated to the top court in January 18, 2019, was appointed as the CJI on November 11, 2024 and would be demitting office on Tuesday.

After the conclusion of the ceremonial bench proceedings, the CJI met journalists in the apex court premises and said, "I will not accept any post-retirement post ... perhaps will do something with law." Many former apex court judges begin their innings in arbitration post judgeship. "I will have a third innings and will do something related to law," the CJI



said. Responding to a query related to the cash discovery controversy involving high court judge Justice Yashwant Vermam, he said, "Judicial thinking has to be decisive and adjudicatory."
He added, "We see plus and

minus points and decide the issue, then rationally we weigh various factors that help us to make a right decision."

Prompts Apex Court to call for performance audit

There is limit to India's patience

PM Modi addresses the nation, says war paused but fight against terrorism continues

a forceful national address, Prime Minister Narendra Modi broke his silence following a tense military confrontation with Pakistan, declaring that India has 'only paused' its operations and vowing firm retaliation in response to any future acts of terror.

Prime Minister Modi addressed the nation for the first time after Operation Sindoor. The remarks came just days after both nations stepped back from the brink of a potential fifth war, following a fierce exchange of missile strikes and artillery fire across the Line of Control and international border. "This is not an era of war, but this is not an era of terrorism, either," Modi said during his televised address from New Delhi. He emphasised that India will not distinguish between "Governments that support terrorism and terrorist groups," asserting that the country's response to any provocation will come "on its

India launched Operation Sindoor — a bold and coordinated tri-service military operation aimed at dismantling terrorist infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Jammu and Kashmir (PoJK). The offensive was a direct response to the Pahalgam terror attack of April 22nd, 2025, in which 26 civilians were killed

The attack is attributed to The Resistance Front (TRF), a proxy of Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT). The conflict, which flared up on May 6, following Indian missile strikes targeting $\ \$ terrorist infrastructures in Pakistan - administered Kashmir, resulted in the deaths of at least 60 civilians across both sides according to partial tallies. Indian army hit nine terrorist dens in POK and Pakistan. The attacks were India's response to an April 22 assault in Pahalgam, Jammu and Kashmir, in which 26 tourists were killed - a strike which has its roots in Islamabad-supported militants, a charge Pakistan denies. However all indications point the finger at Pakistan's involvement.

While a ceasefire was brokered with assistance from the United States, with President Donald Trump claiming his administration helped avert "a nuclear conflict," Modi's speech signalled no softening of India's stance instead, it was a clear message of vigilance and readiness. Modi strongly criticised Pakistan for what he described as choosing to "attack" rather than combat terrorism. He warned that every step of Pakistan would be monitored, emphasising that India would no longer tolerate what he referred to as

In his address, the Prime Minister also drew attention to India's suspension of the Indus Waters Treaty — a long-standing water-sharing agreement brokered by the World Bank. "Terror and trade cannot go together, water and blood cannot flow together," Modi declared, hinting that strategic leverage over water may be part of India's new approach.

Despite the ceasefire, military leaders in both countries remain on alert. Talks between top Indian and Pakistani military commanders were postponed but expected to resume shortly, with analysts noting their primary objective will be to establish technical safeguards and avoid future escalations.

India's Lieutenant General Rajiv Ghai, DGMO of the Indian Army, has stressed that "any threat to sovereignty and safety will be met with decisive force." Meanwhile, airports previously shut down during the height of hostilities have reopened, and reports from Kashmir suggest a tense calm has returned - at least temporarily.

While the guns may have temporarily fallen silent, the geopolitical climate remains volatile. Both sides remain on high alert and one wrong move on either side could break the fragile ceasefire. In fact one spark could quickly lead to a nuclear catastrophe as both the countries have sizable nuclear arsenals. In this situaiton need for measured dialogue and clear communication is a must and should be the top priority.

As the international community watches closely, Modi's address has made one thing clear: India's patience has limits, and while war has been averted for now - the path to lasting peace remains fraught. It is a matter of immense relief that a full-scale war has been averted between two nuclear-armed neighbours. However, India cannot afford to mistake this ceasefire for resolution. The real challenge now lies not in military might, but in strategy and diplomacy. New Delhi must focus its energy on exposing Pakistan's long-standing support for non-state actors and its role in exporting terror across the border.

Military deterrence alone is not enough. India's best bet is to build and sustain international pressure - mobilising global opinion, engaging allies, and leveraging diplomatic channels — to isolate Pakistan on the world stage until it is forced to dismantle the networks that breed violence. Only through relentless diplomatic engagement and a unified global stance against terrorism can peace in the region become more than just a pause between battles.

Modi pauses war, raises stakes

Striking a rare balance between statesmanship and strategic bluntness, Modi laid out a new doctrine for countering cross-border terrorism, signalling a fundamental shift in India's military posture and approach to deterrence

on Tuesday, Prime Minister Narendra Modi declared a 'pause' in the war. The speech was short by his standards long by standards of traditional war speeches, flashes of which were seen last week in Churchill's V symbol in London.

Modi was statesmanlike, stern and refreshingly non-political. It carried powerful messages and signals for Pakistan and the international community, especially the Trump administration.

His address follows the shortest 4-day non-contact, stand-off war in which only drones, UAVs and missiles crossed the LoC/IB. No Indian Prime Minister had ever carried out dozens of meetings in full public glare with his Defence Minister, NSA, CDS, Service Chiefs and Cabinet members before the war. Op Sindoor, an innocuous codename, was a sheep in wolf's clothing. Similarly, for a brief 72-hour operation and an undeclared war, there was one briefing too many because very little news or value was revealed.

For a fair and balanced picture of hits and misses, and a rough scorecard, it was essential to watch and read, at the very least, BBC, CNN and Al Jazeera, which have their own biases. Popular Indian TV channels were going insane thanks to overzealous and patriotic veterans egged on by competing anchors not competent to cover combat. Having congratulated all uniformed personnel, spy agencies, scientists and the people of India, Modi laid out the parameters of future response to cross-border terrorism emanating from or sponsored by Pakistan.

Leaders never mention the involvement of their clandestine agencies in combat. Modi indicated, first, the paradigm shift in the use of force to counter CBT: from surgical strikes in PoK in 2016 that Pakistan said did not happen; to air strikes in Balakot, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa in Pakistan in 2019 that Islamabad said 'missed the targets'; to Op Sindoor, with demonstrably visible proof of the elimination of terrorist hubs, terrorist leaders and infrastructure in PoK and Pakistan. Second, the total surprise was achieved by delivering Op Sindoor. Third, simply the sophistication in planning, execution and scale of punishment. Fourth, India challenged Pakistan's escape clause of plausible deniability by dispensing with any investigation and exchange of dossiers. Incidentally, the four terrorists — two linked to Lashkar-e-Taiba — got away. This is the first time perpetrators of a heinous terrorist attack have escaped.

Eighth, India has established dominance on the escalation ladder by shifting the burden of escalation to Pakistan. During Balakot, after the initial strikes, the IAF declared that the operation was concluded. ramp it had to escalate to de-escalate — or forfeit the opportunity for any retribution for India's devastating assaults. Ninth, Modi has raised the stakes in the rules of engagement. By declaring a terrorist attack an act of war, a red line has been drawn — which will not be easy to maintain and keep sacrosanct. What will define a terrorist attack?

It will also challenge the right to selfdefence authorised by UNSC Article 51, circumscribed with 2(4) on the prohibition on the use of force and attribution. Simply put, a rethink is required or it will cause grave turbulence and instability in the region. Tenth, Modi made no mention of the US or Trump — his administration orchestrating the stoppage of all firing in the air, on land and at sea. Details of US intervention have been revealed by US Secretary of State and NSA, Marco Rubio, Vice President JD Vance and Trump himself. Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif thanked Trump for his effort to maintain peace. In all previous India-Pakistan crises — and there were more than a dozen since 1984 — the US has played a key role in defusing them.
A clarification by the Government on the

extent of US involvement is necessary to establish the bona fide of India's strategic autonomy. Eleventh, India's insistence on bilateralism is clouded by the Pakistan National Security Committee decision of April 25th, in response to India's CCS ruling on non-kinetic levies on Islamabad.

Amongst other retaliatory actions stipulated, Pakistan has said it "shall exercise the right to hold all bilateral agreements, including Simla Agreement, in abeyance till India stops fomenting terrorism in Pakistan." Twelfth, Modi's reference to Made in India (with foreign collaboration) and high-cost imports of offensive and defensive tools of war in new-age warfare has to be taken with a pinch of salt. The biggest void in India's high-tech capacity is the inability to design and produce a jet engine. Thirteenth, India has been able to test in a combat environment its state-of-the-art equipment — with China watching with a hawk eye.

Similarly, India has been able to observe the performance of Chinese equipment supplied to Pakistan. Modi said Pakistan has assured it will cease terrorist activity and aggression against India. No victory celebrations appear to be planned in Pakistan. Shehbaz Sharif has declared Op Buniyan ul Marsoon successful. The BJP will extract the political dividend from Op Sindoor in the 11th day Tiranga Yatra that started yesterday. Modi's famous last words were: "no terror and talks, no terror and trade, no blood and river waters flow — together." And talks only on terrorism and PoK. This formulation will not end CBT.

The root of all conflict: Why traditional systems fail

n the night of May 7, I received a frantic message from a friend: "War has started." War? Could a war begin so suddenly? As an Indian who wept over the brutal Pahalgam terror attack, I had, in a moment of helpless fury, hoped for a strong retaliation — something that would put the attackers in place.

But a full-scale war? That seemed unlikely. Who, after all, has the economic muscle or the moral recklessness to push a brittle region into the jaws of crisis? Still, the message came from someone I trusted. I turned to Google, half-expecting it to be social media alarmism. But it was true, though not in the truest sense. India had carried out precision airstrikes on strategic terror hubs in Pakistan, a now-familiar signature response to provocation.

But in the theatre of such events, where state action is celebrated and hashtags fly like flags, one question haunts the quiet corners of conscience; who bears the true cost? Not the decision-makers in glass towers or pundits on television screens, but the innocent caught between sovereign pride and political vengeance. It is the schoolchild woken by air raid sirens, the farmer whose field becomes a frontier, and the mother who doesn't know if her son will return from patrol. The headlines may declare strategy and success, but

the undercurrent is always human sorrow wrapped in fren- in jingoistic zeal. And amid it all, the viewer is left anxious lose their lives for something they had no hand in — the Kashmir conundrum? Why must Gazans pay with hunger, rubble, and shattered dreams for conflicts history handed them without consent, carved by colonial compulsions and fed by political pride?

Why must a Ukrainian grandmother shelter in her basement for weeks, a Sudanese child flee bullets across borders he cannot name, Afghan girls watch their futures vanish beneath veils of geopolitics? The places may change, but the pattern remains. It is always the common man, the innocent woman, the nameless child who must bleed for the failures of leaders and the arrogance of ideologies.


And then comes the other war — waged through words, edits, and viral videos. The media, especially in moments of conflict, becomes both sword and shield, shaping not just what we know, but how we feel. In the days after the airstrikes, a deluge of misinformation, doctored visuals, and unverified claims flooded our feeds. It didn't matter which side was speaking.

Both seemed more invested in winning public sentiment than in protecting public reason. That's when I stopped following the details. I wanted to know: will this escalate or resolve? The noise made me sick. We, the people — tired, anxious, hoping for peace — become unwilling pawns in a psychological battlefield. Television anchors shout down nuances. Social media algorithms amplify rage. Patriotism gets conflated with aggression. Rational discourse drowns hyperbole. This phenomenon isn't new or unique. We saw it in the Russia-Ukraine war and during every Indo-Pak flare-up. When propaganda replaces people, when information becomes ammunition, truth becomes collateral damage. And in the long run, it isn't just bombs that destroy lives, but belief systems built on distortion, where empathy dies a quiet, unnoticed death.

The tragedy of war isn't only in its explosions. It is in how we begin to dehumanise the "other". In how young minds grow up mistrusting neighbours. In how generations are raised on suspicion and hate. It is in how quickly we forget that across borders and beneath uniforms, the heartbeat is the same. As citizens, perhaps the most responsible thing we can do is to think; to question and to resist being swept away by collective fury. We must ask: Who profits from war? Who truly suffers? And what are we consuming in the name of news? Let us not mistake noise for knowledge, or passion for principle. Let us not let our conscience be hijacked by emotionally charged half-truths. Let us remember that the strength of a nation lies not in its loudest voices, but in its wisest. Above all, let us refuse to cheer when we don't fully understand what we're clapping for.

Because in every war, declared or undeclared, there are always casualties beyond the battlefield. And innocence, more often than not, is the first to fall.

Covid claimed more lives than reported

The report titled 'Vital Statistics of India based on the Civil Registration System 2021', which is a compilation of registered births and deaths published by the Registrar General of India, now supports the argument that the number of deaths attributable to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic that was previously declared was grossly understated.While India reported 450 lakh COVID cases and 5.33 lakh fatalities, a 2022 World Health Organisation report put the number of "excess" deaths in India for 2020 and 2021 to be around 47 lakhs.

However, a senior Health Ministry official said, "Based on a 6.42 per cent annual increase in deaths from 2016 to 2019, the expected deaths were about 81.3 lakh in 2020 and 86.5 lakh in 2021. Observed deaths were 81.15 lakh in 2020 and 1.02 crore in 2021, resulting in excess deaths of about 15.5 lakh over two years."

After adjusting for the annual increase at 6.42 per cent, the number of 'excess' deaths was 1.78 lakh - 16 timeshigher than the earlier reported figure of 11,000. The total deaths in 2021 were 13.78 per cent of the 12.92 lakh COVID-19 cases reported. It is clear the disparities between the declared and registered deaths resulted from deliberate understatements of fatalities during the pandemic and the high fatality rate in some states was due to inadequate health care system there.

The decline of Indian media

I have been observing, even before the lockdown era, that the quality of Indian media — especially on television, has been steadily declining.

These TRP-hungry outlets will show anything and defame anyone just for a few views.

India now ranks 151st out of 180 countries in the World Press Freedom Index, largely because our media often chooses to distract the public with fake or sensationalist 'masala news" instead of providing real, factual information. In times like these, people would be better off avoiding mainstream media altogether and relying solely on information released by official Government sources.

The decline of Indian television media has been evident even before the lockdown era, but the post-pandemic surge in sensationalism has only worsened public trust. Driven by TRP ratings, many channels now prioritise scandal over substance, distorting facts for viewership. The result? India plummets to 151st in the World Press Freedom Index, an alarming testament to a press more focused on

spectacle than service. From manufactured outrage to viral misinformation, the media frenzy creates a smokescreen, distracting the public from real issues. In such a climate, citizens may be better off trusting official Government channels over the noise of mainstream media.

Operation Sindoor and the silence of modern war

In an era where military might is often measured in decibels and declarations, India's Operation Sindoor rewrote the script.

As the red dust settles on a historic week, a new doctrine of deterrence has emerged — one that speaks not through escalation, but through execution



outh Asia may have just danced on the edge of something darker. But if there's one lesson the world should take from the past week, it's this: modern warfare doesn't need noise. It needs intent and the capacity to follow through.

For decades, South Asia has been a study in controlled volatility. But the 72 hours beginning in the early hours of May 7, 2025, revealed just how perilously thin the line is between control and chaos.

India's decision to launch Operation Sindoor — a precise, joint-services strike deep inside Pakistan — offered a sobering glimpse of 21st-century coercive diplomacy at its most refined.

One might have expected tanks rolling, fiery rhetoric, or the familiar fog that typically shrouds subcontinental crises. Instead, what unfolded was a mission of surgical precision: unmistakably forceful, strategically brief, and executed with a discipline that left no room for improvisation or escalation.

The spark was the massacre in Pahalgam on April 22, where 26 unarmed tourists were killed in cold blood. In the past, such tragedies triggered a well-worn cycle: national outrage, diplomatic démarches, international hand-wringing and eventual inertia. This time, the script was quietly rewritten.

Within hours, India's National Security Council entered what insiders call "audit mode" — a focused, silent review tracing the attack's logistics, mapping militant camps, and assessing the costs and consequences of action.

The usual leaks to the media were absent. Parliament stayed quiet. There was no posturing, only planning. Seventeen days later, the result emerged: Operation Sindoor, named after the vermilion streak worn by Hindu women to symbolise enduring commitment.

At 03:40 hours on May 7, Rafale fighters carrying SCALP cruise missiles soared over the Thar Desert, hugging terrain contours to evade radar. Their targets: Bahawalpur and Muridke — sites long known to intelligence agencies but never previously struck. Minutes later, Heron-TP drones, already circling above, relayed real-time footage to South Block.

As militants scrambled in the wake of the blasts, loitering munitions dove after them. Off the Makran coast, an Indian Navy task group briefly lit up its active radar systems — just long enough to send a message to the Pakistan Navy without triggering open conflict. Army units simultaneously feinted along the Rajasthan border, forcing Pakistan to divert armoured assets while the real

blows landed hundreds of kilometres away.

The entire operation lasted under 30 minutes.
By sunrise, the shooting had stopped, the mes-

sage had been delivered, and the jets were home. Nine terrorist compounds were destroyed, and over 90 militants were killed, according to independent assessments. But the operation's sig-





nificance wasn't in its body count — it lay in what it chose not to destroy. Pakistani military installations were spared. Rail and radar infrastructure remained untouched. The message was clear: India could escalate but chose not to. It was a strike on the ecosystem of terrorism, not on the Pakistani state — a display of both strength and restraint.

By May 10, Islamabad was on the defensive. At 3:35 pm a call from Pakistan's Director General of Military Operations (DGMO) to New Delhi requested a ceasefire. India agreed — on its terms. The strategic objectives had been met.

Then came a startling signal. A US Department of Energy Gulfstream, tail number N111SZ, landed in Islamabad — an aircraft that only flies

in the event of suspected radiological threats. Either a strike had landed too close to a nuclear storage site at Noor Khan Airbase, or the mere proximity of the attack had alarmed Washington. Both scenarios reflect how dangerously close even a "limited" counter-terror operation can come to nuclear tripwires.

Domestically, India saw an unusual political consensus. Even the Congress Party swiftly endorsed the armed forces. Television anchors — usually quick to polarise — focused instead on operational details and strategic implications. Markets, too, responded with calm confidence: the Sensex dipped and then rallied, rewarding defence stocks.

Meanwhile, Karachi's exchange fell by 5 per cent in a single day. In modern warfare, capital flight, like artillery, follows confidence — and confidence firmly backed New Delhi.

Diplomatically, India moved swiftly. Within 48 hours, Indian envoys shared intercepts and high-resolution imagery with Washington, London, Riyadh, Moscow, and Paris, establishing

a clear link between the Bahawalpur camps and the Pahalgam attackers.

The global reaction or lack there of — was telling. No resolutions at the UN, and no condemnations from the European Union. Even Beijing limited itself to standard statements on sovereignty, perhaps wary of drawing attention to its practices in Xinjiang.

Yet none of this ensures long-term stability. Pakistan still maintains tactical nuclear weapons under its full-spectrum doctrine. A misread blip on a radar screen, or a rogue field commander, could undo everything. In both nations, political dynamics could reintroduce volatility: having demonstrated precision, a future Indian Government may feel compelled to show magnitude. Pakistan, for its part, must weigh whether hosting proxy militants remains a strategic asset or a glowing target.

External powers should take note. Applause is not enough. Real steps are needed: converting the 2003 DGMO hotline into a secure video link, and nudging Pakistan's legislature to criminalise, not just ban, UN-listed terrorists.

For India, Operation Sindoor now joins the canon of decisive military acts — alongside Pokhran II and Balakot — not because of the destruction wrought, but because it shattered old assumptions. First, Pak-based terror groups are no longer protected by geography. A cruise missile can skim the desert and strike with impunity. Second, global diplomatic instinct may be shifting — from privileging fragile stability to acknowledging the legitimacy of precise, rules-based retaliation.

And then, there's the operation's name. In Indian culture, sindoor is not decorative. It is declarative — a daily reaffirmation of commitment. New Delhi's invocation of that symbol was not mere flourish. It was a vow: that counter-terrorism is not a spasm, but a doctrine.

Some mot a spassif, but a doctrine.

Some may call that symbolism excessive. Yet nations run on symbols as much as they do on

Pakistan too has its emotive vocabulary. But unless it separates its nationalism from its reliance on non-state militancy, it will continue to operate at a disadvantage — forever uncertain which of its sanctuaries might next become a crater.

Operation Sindoor has not ended but the red dust has settled — for now. But the operation redrew boundaries, both real and conceptual. The week of May 7 was not an anomaly. It was a signal. In this age, where resolve travels by drone, missile, and market ticker, the quietest wars may leave the loudest echoes. And the margin for error has never been thinner.

BJP's biggest challenge in Bihar: Balancing alliances and strategy

With cracks appearing within the National Democratic Alliance (NDA), rising seat demands from allies, and a resurgent Mahagathbandhan banking on traditional vote banks, the BJP's path to power hinges on its ability to navigate these turbulent waters

he Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) faces one of its toughest electoral battles in Bihar. Its primary challenge is to win the upcoming elections by maintaining unity within the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) and increasing its vote share. The pressing question is: Can the NDA stay united? Will the smaller allies support the BJP once again in its bid for power?

This uncertainty looms over NDA leaders, compounded by political speculation around Nitish Kumar's repetitive public statements. Yet, this moment presents a golden opportunity for the BJP to reclaim power.

BJP's chief strategist, Amit Shah, is acutely aware of the situation. Like Abhimanyu in the Mahabharata, he finds himself surrounded, fighting almost alone in the Bihar campaign. His allies in the state come from a socialist background, which may not provide the desired leverage in caste-based calculations.

Moreover, the BJP risks losing a significant portion of the Muslim vote bank following the controversial Waqf Amendment Bill. Historically, Muslim voters have backed the party most likely to defeat the BJP. The poor performance of JDU in the 2014 Lok Sabha and 2020 Assembly elections is evidence of this trend.

This time, the BJP aims to benefit by keeping all NDA factions united while consolidating their individual vote banks under its own umbrella. In essence, BJP must win the election on its own terms — while still working alongside JDU. Achieving this will require testing new political and caste equations daily and forging consensus — an undeniably difficult task.

On the other side stands the Mahagathbandhan (Grand Alliance), comprising RJD, Congress, and the Left parties. Here, the Yadav-Muslim (MY) equation remains intact — an undeniable strength, possibly strengthened further by the Waqf Amendment Bill.

Although backwardness in Bihar is routinely criticised, the state has long been a testing ground for political experiments. Currently, the BJP faces several challenges: its allies are demanding more assembly seats, and the party itself is striving to boost its vote percentage.

There are few dedicated and well-regarded grassroots workers within the BJP. Many active members have defected from other parties and are not fully accounted by the core and re-

ties and are not fully accepted by the core cadre.

Several former Union Ministers have lost ground and credibility, making them unreliable assets. Some sitting MPs may be fielded in the assembly elections, and similar suggestions have

been made for JDU candidates.

However, the escalating and often unreasonable





seat demands from allies are becoming a point of tension. To tackle this, BJP has introduced the caste census as a strategic move.

It claims this step is a leap toward social justice, aimed at attracting OBC and EBC voters—key electoral blocs in Bihar, where caste equations largely decide outcomes. According to sources within the RSS, BJP is in favour of reuniting the Lok Party (LJP) in its

original form, believing that a split will divide its vote share.

Chirag Paswan's announcement to contest the elections and the dissatisfaction within Pashupati Paras's faction have only intensified the family

feud. The Chief Minister face remains unresolved. If BJP openly endorses Nitish Kumar, it risks alienating its core workers and supporters, many of whom may become disillusioned or inactive. In such a scenario, disenchanted BJP voters could shift their support to Prashant Kishor's Jan Suraj. Interestingly, BJP could still benefit if anti-incumbency votes are diverted away from RID.

incumbency votes are diverted away from RJD.

Meanwhile, AIMIM leader Asaduddin Owaisi
has signalled his intent to contest, which
may again disrupt the MY equation, as witnessed
in previous elections. Historically, three
regions in Bihar have shaped the trajectory of
socialist politics.

This time, these regions are once again at the heart of the contest. Mithilanchal has emerged as a key battleground since the days of Mandal politics and Lalu Yadav's social engineering — now largely overseen by NDA Rajya Sabha MP

Sanjay Jha. These areas, where the MY equation has thrived, are once again central to BJP's strategy. Amit Shah and Prime Minister Modi have already made multiple visits to the region, and a state-wide "Bihar Marathon Tour" by the Prime Minister is being planned. This will feature the politics of "Makhana" and airport announcements

— strategic "revdis" aimed at wooing voters.

Despite opposition, BJP and JDU have entrusted Sanjay Jha with the coordination efforts. Two Bhumihar leaders from Munger-Begusarai were recently inducted into the cabinet, despite limited political returns. They may also be positioned as caste-specific candidates in the assembly elections. The focus will later shift to Nitish Kumar's strongholds — Nalanda and Rajgir — where BJP is already making inroads.

The role of Nitish's son, Nishant Kumar, is also under consideration, as are other leaders close to Nitish. Some MPs and Nitish's trusted allies might be fielded for the assembly polls. Discussions are also ongoing about new names. Several Rajput leaders have shown influence in the name of Veer Kunwar Singh.

Among them, Anand Mohan stands out. The Thakur leader reportedly has sway in multiple Lok Sabha constituencies, especially in Shivhar and Vaishali. JDU is reportedly wary of his growing proximity to BJP. Anand Mohan is also active in his home region, Kosi.

However, the real battlefield for BJP remains Seemanchal. Amit Shah is expected to return there, with Prime Minister Modi likely to follow — using the Purnia Airport and Greenfield Expressway as political touchpoints. Analysts suggest Seemanchal is also where Prashant Kishor's Jan Suraj is gaining ground, especially with its aggressive stance against Lalu Yadav.

The MY formula dominates here, with added support from Dalit and backward communities. RJD maintains strongholds across the region, except in Purnia. In the last election, Owaisi tried to pentrate the Muslim vote bank.

Since then, Seemanchal's economic conditions have evolved, but the region's political leadership remains rooted in the past.

Recognising this, BJP is preparing to sideline old leadership figures across Bihar and introduce fresh faces — possibly Amit Shah's most important move. This strategy could help transform Bihar into a BJP stronghold. As the countdown begins, several more visits from the Prime Minister are expected. These may bring clarity to the ongoing speculations and political equations.

The total shipment of gold jewellery witnessed a dip of 5.41 per cent at USD 684.51 million during the month under review, as compared to USD 723.63 million for the same period of the previous year. Gross export of 'Polished Lab Grown Diamonds' in April was almost flat with a growth of just 0.41 per cent at USD 110.74 million, over USD 110.29 million in the same month of FY25. Silver jewellery exports in April too declined by 12.03 per cent at USD 38.3



IFFCO starts production of nano-liquid DAP

ooperative IFFCO, one of the major fertiliser firms in the country, has commenced commercial production of nano liquid DAP (di-ammonium phosphate) at two new plants in Uttar Pradesh, each having a capacity of 2 lakh bottles per day. India only reserved right to impose retaliatory duty on US goods

May resolve issue via BTA talks

India has "only" reserved its right under WTO norms to impose retaliatory duties on certain American products over the US' steel and aluminum tariffs and it may choose to resolve the issue through the ongoing bilateral trade agreement (BTA) negotiations between the two countries, an official said on Tuesday.
The official said earlier also

a similar notification has been issued to the World Trade Organization (WTO) by India against the European Union over EU's steel safeguard measure of 2019 and 2021, but it has not been implemented to

"Accordingly, India's current notification to WTO Council for Trade in Goods against US' steel and aluminium tariffs only reserves India's right under the Agreement on Safeguards to retaliate at any future date. However, it is for India to decide whether to effectuate these proposed retaliation after 30 days of the notification or later or resolve it as part of ongoing BTA negotiations," the official said.

Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal will lead a team of senior Indian officials to Washington starting May 17 for discussions with their US counterparts on



the proposed BTA. The chief negotiators of both countries will hold meetings from May

The two countries are negotiating the pact to boost twoway commerce to USD 500 billion by 2030 from the present USD 191 billion.

According to trade experts, India's move to reserve its retaliation rights could serve as a bargaining chip in the proposed trade deal.

This is not India's first brush with safeguard retalia-

In June 2019, India imposed higher tariffs on 28 US products after the US removed India from its Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) and continued its 25 per cent and 10 per cent tariffs on certain steel and aluminium products. That action, which covered about USD 240 million in trade value, marked

India's first use of WTOsanctioned retaliation.

However, the duties were withdrawn in September 2023, following the decision of both countries to resolve seven WTO disputes.

That time also, the US had initially imposed additional duties on certain steel (25 per cent) and aluminium (10 per cent) products in March 2018. On May 18, 2018, India notified WTO Council for Trade in Goods of India's proposed suspension of concessions.

This notification reserved India's right to effectuate the proposed suspension, however, it was implemented by India after a year, in June 2019.

Goyal to lead team to Washington for trade talks

Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal will lead a team of senior Indian officials to Washington starting May 17 for discussions with their US counterparts on the proposed bilateral trade agreement (BTA), an official said on Tuesday. During the visit, Goyal will hold meetings with US Trade Representative (USTR) Jamieson Greer and US Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick on the agreement. The four-day talks (May 17-20) come against the backdrop of both countries exploring the possibility of an interim trade arrangement in goods to secure "early mutual wins" ahead of finalising the first phase of the trade agreement by fall (September-October) this year. The official said the chief negotiators of both countries will hold meetings from May 19-22. Goyal will reach Washington on May 16. The main issues that will figure in the negotiations include market access, rules of origin, and non-tariff barriers. India's proposal to impose retaliatory duty on certain US products over American tariffs on steel and aluminium would also figure in the BTA deliberations.

Sparks more rate cut hopes

Retail inflation eased to a nearly six-year low of 3.16 per cent in April mainly due to subdued prices of vegetables, fruits, pulses, and other protein-rich items, creating enough room for the Reserve Bank to go for another round of rate cut in the June

monetary policy review.

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) based inflation was 3.34 per cent in March and 4.83 per cent in April 2024. It was 3.15 per cent in July 2019.

NSO data showed a sharp decline of 91 basis points in food inflation in April 2025 in comparison to March 2025. The food inflation in April 2025 is the lowest since October 2021. Food inflation in

April was 1.78 per cent, lower than 2.69 per cent in the preceding month and 8.7 per cent in the year-ago month, showed data released by the National Statistics Office (NSO) on Tuesday.

The Reserve Bank, which has been mandated to ensure inflation remains at 4 per cent with a margin of 2 per cent on either side, has slashed the key interest rate by 50 basis points in two tranches (February and April) as the price situation improved.





'I'VE SET THE BAR HIGHER FOR MY NEXT PROJECT,' SAYS THE ROYALS DIRECTOR PRIYANKA GHOSE

ower. Privilege. Betrayal. And a legacy dripping in secrets. With The Royals now streaming on Netflix, director Priyanka Ghose delivers a dazzling drama that's equal parts visually sumptuous and emotionally raw. Following her Emmy-nominated work on

The Night Manager and Broken But Beautiful season 3, Ghose brings her signature flair to this palace of intrigue, in a story where modern ambition collides with ancient bloodlines.

What initially drew her to this series was its unique setting—a blend of modern India and royal legacy. "The very first time I heard the concept and the setup, I was excited. It was a story set against the backdrop of today's Indian royalty—how they are, the lives they lead-and marrying that with the modern urban entrepreneur world. That was the biggest thrill for me.

She was deeply intrigued by the story's central theme of shifting power and privilege. "It's a long-standing theme of our show. You see how modern India is being shaped by the entrepreneurs of today and at the same time, there's this legacy of royal families who are trying to find relevance in today's world—be it in fashion, travel, or as influencers. That interplay is what really drew me in," she adds.

The ensemble cast features celebrated veterans like Zeenat Aman and Sakshi Talwar, alongside younger talents such as Ishaan Khatter and Bhumi Pednekar. One might expect such a generational mix to be a challenge, but Priyanka found it refreshing. "This is actually such a fun question. There's a mix people assume won't gel-older actors and a younger bunch—but I had just come off another project with a similar dynamic and honestly, it's beautiful.

For her, the set became a collaborative, age-blind creative space. "We all kind of live together, trying to create something. While doing that, age, sex, gender, caste-it all ceases to matter. Everyone's just an artist bringing something new to the table," she says. She fondly recalls how Zeenat Aman was "possibly the youngest person at heart" and how Sakshi Talwar, often perceived as serious, constantly cracked jokes. "You've got siblings, Zeenat ji, Sakshi

ma'am—everyone's playing pranks. Even I get called a prankster! That fun is how we powered through intense, long-hour schedules. It's the only way to create something filled with life and energy."

Priyanka's directorial approach is rooted in freedom and deep collaboration. "I don't think I should be giving out the tricks of my trade," she chuckles, before elaborating. "My process is very collaborative. I spend a lot of time—sometimes months, sometimes daysbefore shoot with my actors, working one-on-one. We dissect the script, understand the tone, chart scene graphs, explore power dynamics and just

and hints at exciting Launching a series of this scale required a careful, strategic start. "There are so many characters and elements in a long series. So, I always start with what I call a soft start," she explains. She ensured the first few days of shoot were light, allowing everyone—from the cast to crew—to settle in and sync. "You need to function like a well-oiled machine for something this intense. These early days

are like setting the tone for a marathon.' She recalls shooting some of the grandest and most challenging sequences—ones that shaped the visual appeal of the show. There's Bhumi's beach horse race against Ishaan, a rooftop party featured in the trailer, Ishaan's polo match in Episode 3, a massive rooftop dance number in Episode 5 and his majestic coronation in Episode 6.

While these scenes were cinematic highlights, it was the intimate, emotionally charged performances that stayed with her the most. "Beyond these large-scale moments, I have my four personal favourite scenes—ones that leaped off the page because of the actors' energy. One of them is in the trailer: a dinner table scene between Ishaan and Bhumi in Episode 6. It turned out magical. We found the rhythm and emotional highs and lows on set-something we hadn't rehearsed. That magic is priceless."

Ask her to name the most unforgettable memory from the shoot, and she instantly lights up. "The two days we spent shooting the

At the core of The Royals is its multigenerational ensemble, each character caught in their own emotional arc. For Priyanka, balancing these layered characters was both a challenge and a creative joy.

"This series has given me the opportunity to really deep-dive into very complex human emotions. There are so many interpersonal dynamics within the family and with the outsiders who come into their world — that's what gives birth to the Acknowledging

writing team, she continues, "The balance character's each significance to the overall story was beautifully

crafted at the writing level itself. Huge credit to my writers and of course the creators, who gave birth to a world and characters that were inherently driving the narrative forward."

As a director, her job was to ensure that each character's tone felt authentic and unfolded gradually. "Every character has their own journey, and their starting point and ending marks are very unique. That's not just a challenge but the most fun exercise in this show," she shares.

One of the biggest challenges, the Broken But Beautiful season 3 filmmaker says, was making the emotional core of these seemingly unrelatable lives resonate with viewers.

"Often, it's hard to connect with characters from a world that's not part of our lived reality. When you're doing something in a completely fictitious universe — like fantasy or sci-fi — it becomes easy for the audience to disconnect. And with *The* Royals, we knew we were presenting a world that's largely unfamiliar to the everyday viewer."

Despite its lavish setting, The Royals is an emotionally intense drama. Collaborating closely with her DOP Neha and production designer — who also happens to be her sister. Priyanka was determined to reflect the duality of beauty and inner turmoil

She emphasised a color story that reflected character arcs and emotional beats. "I wanted tone-on-tone palettes in specific scenes and pops of color in others. Zeenat Aman's character, for instance, pops - and so does Ginny, her spiritual extension," she shares.

There are some collaborations that go beyond the script-beyond the screen, even. For Priyanka, her work with Sidharth Shukla on Broken But Beautiful was one such deeply personal journey. Theirs wasn't just a director-actor equation; it was a meeting of minds, a creative synergy that blossomed into a profound friendship.

So when she's asked about Sidharth, her voice lowers, and the emotion is unmistakable. "It's a very delicate, sensitive question for me," she says. "Sid was, in fact, one of my closest friends.'

Their bond, she shares, wasn't just born from shared screen time-it was forged in the trenches of creation. It was Broken But Beautiful that brought them together, both creatively and personally. "We became such good friends because of Broken. Our

creative collaboration is what brought us close. We started to appreciate each other not just as professionals, but as human beings," she reflects. Shukla, at the time, had just emerged from the public glare of Bigg Boss, carrying with him a certain reputation and perception. For Priyanka, the task was both delicate and transformative. "I needed him to step into Agastva's shoes—to become something he wasn't and yet draw from

parts of himself. That's how he tapped into

emotions with such honesty," she explains. Together, they delved deep into the nuances of the character, "We worked on every single scene—on where the anger stems from, how obsession creeps in, and how far Agastya would go before pulling back. There were intense conversations, rehearsals, and a lot of homework we did together. That process, that trust, is what made the portraval so lavered. I truly believe that's why the show became what it did.'

But her memories with Sidharth are not confined to the set. "I have too many," she says, her voice breaking slightly. "They go beyond our time working together. I'm still family to him—and to his family. I remain very, very close to them. His niece is actually my assistant now.

That bond, she admits, is sacred and hard to put into words. "We shared something special. And I don't think I can talk much about it, because losing him... it felt like I lost a part of me. It will always be a very, very delicate topic."

While the grief still lingers, Priyanka continues to pour herself into her work—and there's much on the horizon. "There are exciting projects coming up," she says. "But I can't reveal anything just yet-I have to wait for official announcements.

She does, however, confirm that she's already on set for her next project. "I'm in the middle of the shoot, and it's something I'm very, very excited about. It's a project that's pushed me to set the bar even higher, and I'm working with some of the finest in the industry. It has a huge ensemble and a story I truly believe in.

There's also more quietly taking shape behind the scenes. "There are other series and films I'm developing parallelly—some new ideas, and maybe some follow-ups to earlier projects. So yes, there's a lot happening. A lot to be grateful for."

Let's examine the specifics and discover how this might alter the rules for both educators and learners with Dr. Farhiz Panthaky, Head – KEF **KSHAMATA Capacity Building Project!**

In a nation as divided as India, what does educational fairness actually imply? According to me, educational equity is about providing each

child with the resources they need to succeed, regardless of where they are. Recognising the systemic and generational disadvantages that many children experience is the first step towards achieving equity in a nation as complicated as India. With Project KSHAMATA, we work to strengthen the abilities of educators, administrators and other leaders who influence kids' everyday education so that schools in isolated or underdeveloped areas can become hubs of opportunity rather than constraints. We develop agency and change beliefs in addition to training. Equity proceeds from concept to action in this manner.

How can you quantify something as intangible—but crucial—as leadership transformation in schools in a time where

testing and metrics are king? The foundation of the Kshamata initiative is "leadership practices." To "assess" where the leadership is for that "practice," we use a fivestage behaviour reform technique. There are five stages, starting with "He does not think the practice is important" and ending with "He does it in a defined and structured process for a period of time." Though gradual, progress is

being made. The culture it fosters is a clear indicator of leadership first steps we take to scaffold identity transformations. Teachers start transformation. Depending on the practice, we evaluate this culture using behavioural indicators, peer feedback, narrative shifts and the what leadership is all about. growing ability of school teams to work together to solve challenges. We may track our identity and skill development, from compliance to ownership, with the use of tools like progression rubrics, structured observations, and reflective notebooks. We can tell that change has started when a teacher begins to refer to "my school" rather than "the

A large portion of your work focuses on mentality change. Which deeply held belief-among educators or among yourself-have you had to challenge the most?

Many, to name only a handful: There is a pervasive belief that education is linear and standardised. Every "input" needs to be converted into "output/outcomes" and the phrase "in every quarter" is ingrained. Teachers hold the view that pupils from underprivileged or tribal origins are unable to "achieve" in the same manner as

other students. It is difficult to remove mediocre expectations masquerading as "realistic expectations." The goal is frequently "100% children pass: Exams"—that's all. I have to question the notion that resistance equates to failure or that change must be top-down. I've discovered that trust, not control, is the cornerstone of transformation and that longlasting change frequently starts with one courageous teacher (regardless of positional authority) reinventing their job.

> How do you provide leadership training for teachers and principals who have never been allowed to consider themselves leaders? We prioritise the "be" over

the "do" at the heart of our design. Are we "working" as head teachers or instructors, or are we just "being" them? Everyone in the room is suddenly grounded in the reason behind our actions as a result of this change. We then start by assisting them in realising that leadership is a way of being rather than a position. "Self leadership" is the topic of our first session. If a person is not leading themselves, acceptable mistakes. they cannot lead a team. Only with team leadership in place will school instruction change. We make sure that our programs environments that value introspection, discussion and minor victories. Building self-

leading from anywhere when they realise that impact, not hierarchy, is

What do you think about the existing forms of teacher training in

In India, a large portion of teacher preparation is compliance-driven and unrelated to the reality of the classroom. It views educators as content consumers rather than as knowledgeable, articulate experts. This is flipped by KSHAMATA. Relational trust, contextualisation and relevancy are our top priorities. Our workshops are experiential, emotionally impactful and co-created. Because transformation occurs in the weeks after a workshop, we also incorporate long-term mentorship and school-based follow-up.

'Spirit-based leadership' is a concept that is rarely used in academic

reform, but you mention it. What does that actually look like? Leading with presence, purpose, and inner clarity is the hallmark of spirit-based leadership. In our work, it manifests when a teacher decides to continue their education in spite of personal adversity or when a school principal makes room for a child who is mourning. In order to lead with courage and heart as well as intellect, we teach leaders to match their inner selves with their external endeavours. The attitude of optimism, decency and caring can be a potent force for change, even in the most troubled schools.

Which extreme concept do you think the system is in dire need of but isn't yet ready for?

Putting the welfare of teachers and principals at the forefront of educational reform would be a drastic but essential change. We talk about child-centered learning, yet we forget that successful learners cannot be nurtured by worn-out, under-resourced teachers. In addition to improving results, a comprehensive approach to adult emotional wellbeing and purpose-building could change the

What, in your opinion, are the silent elements that have the biggest effects on a child's capacity to learn but are frequently disregarded by policy?

The presence of trusted individuals, emotional safety and a sense of belonging are all subtle but significant factors that influence learning. Children's brains are more receptive to learning when they feel appreciated and seen. Unfortunately, textbooks and infrastructure frequently take precedence over these concerns. However, we don't assess how much a nice word, a courteous classroom, or a teacher who listens can influence life paths. Additionally, it appears that our educational system disregards "self leadership." Compliance is valued highly above exploration and room for error. Generally speaking, learning only occurs in environments where everyone is free to make

Do you think leadership can be taught empathy?

If yes, how would you include it into scale and sustainability programs? It is possible to develop empathy through discourse, foster psychologically secure narrative, modeling and reflective practice. By providing emotionally compelling experiences, promoting peer sharing and establishing listening rituals, we integrate empathy into KSHAMATA. Because empathy is a transmission rather than a topic, we also train facilitators leadership, peer leadership to be the change. And when done well, it scales via resonance rather and institutional leadership are the than reproduction.

Milan takes on Bologna in Italian Cup final

cup specialist will take on a serial runner-up when AC Milan plays Bologna in the Italian Cup final on Wednesday.

And both teams will be looking to get their hands on the trophy for the first time

Bologna hasn't won the Italian Cup since 1974, which was its last major trophy.

Milan has won plenty of trophies since then, but last lifted the Italian Cup 22 years ago — losing two finals in the intervening years. This time, however, the Rossoneri are led by a cup specialist in coach Sérgio Conceição.

Indeed, Conceição has already steered Milan to a trophy this season — winning the Italian Super Cup in January just a week after being appointed as coach. That was the 50-year-old's 12th trophy

as coach, with nine coming in cup competitions. Conceição also lifted seven cup trophies as a player, with Porto and Lazio. However, even if Milan ends the season

with two trophies in Conceição's five months in charge, it might not be enough to save the Portuguese coach's job.

Milan is eighth in Serie A with two



rounds remaining and only has a slim chance of qualifying for the Champions League — or any European competition.

Winning the Italian Cup would earn Milan a spot in the Europa League and go some way toward salvaging a season where the Rossoneri were never competitive in Serie A or Europe, having been

dumped out of the Champions League by Feyenoord in the knockout playoff round

"It's not the moment to talk about my future," Conceição said. "Now we're only thinking about this final, against a diffi-

"I have my character and my personality, I've changed things and you need time but at Milan you don't have time. ... At Milan, what counts is winning trophies and Wednesday we have a great chance."

In contrast to Conceição, Bologna coach Vincenzo Italiano has not fared well in finals. Italiano never won a cup in his playing days and, as Fiorentina coach, he lost back-to-back Europa Conference League finals — in 2023 and 2024 — and finished runner-up in the 2023 Italian Cup.

Second meeting in a week

The cup final in Rome will be the teams' second meeting in less than a week.

Two goals from Santiago Giménez, either side of a Christian Pulisic strike, saw Milan rally to beat Bologna 3-1 and seriously dent its opponent's chances of qualifying for the Champions League again.

Son, Kim, Lee tasting success in Europe despite South Korea's soccer struggles

South Korea's national soccer team may be stumbling toward 2026 World Cup qualification and its clubs may have struggled in the Asian Champions Leaves but three of its Champions League, but three of its biggest stars have been finding success

Kim Min-jae helped German giant Bayern Munich lift the Bundesliga title, the 28-year-old defender's second major prize in Europe after winning the Italian championship with Napoli two years earlier.

That game will marks the end of the European season and the start of transfer speculation. Lee has been linked with clubs elsewhere in Europe. So has Kim, whose season at Munich has been affected by injuries.

"I want to keep playing for Munich," Kim said last month. "There's no reason why I should leave this team. I like playing for Munich. I want to continue playing for this team next season. It's one thing that's important to me right now."

Gukesh in different position as world champ: Kasparov

ussian chess icon Garry Kasparov, whose record of being the youngest world champion was bettered by D Gukesh, feels that the Indian is in a "different situation" compared to him as Norwegian Magnus Carlsen is considered, "by all metrics", a better player than the Chennai teenager.

Gukesh was 17 when he defeated China's reigning world champion Ding Liren in a 14-game showdown to claim the coveted title last year. Kasparov was 22 when he clinched the world crown back in 1985, beating compatriot Anatoly

(Gukesh' world championship win). But I beat the strongest player in the world. Gukesh is in a different situation because Magnus is there.

"So yeah Gukesh is official world champion, there is no doubt about it, but there is somebody else who is widely considered, by all metrics, as a better player," Kasparov told the YouTube channel of Saint Louis Chess Club during the Superbet Chess Classic in Bucharest, Romania.

This is not the first time that a comparison has been made between Gukesh and Carlsen, who is the current world number one and pursuing the ambition of a freestyle chess tour, putting him at loggerbody FIDE.

The FIDE has made it clear that it would not allow the tour to have a world championship match as that would remain solely its domain.

Kasparov has been effusive in his praise of India's current crop of chess players, including Gukesh, and described them as "Vishy's children", an ode to his contemporary and five-time world champion . Viswanathan Anand.

"He (Gukesh) has plenty of room and plenty of time to improve. That's a challenge that I am sure he is dealing with," Kasparov said. The Russian great felt that the 32-year-old Liren, who battled psycho-

"It's a phenomenal accomplishment heads with the world governing logical issues in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic and even stopped playing for a while, was not at his best during the mega-event in Singapore.

Ding at his best against Magnus... that would be a match! But then COVID ruined him. Ding after COVID was just a different player, still very tenacious, just tons of resilience.

Novak Djokovic ends coaching partnership with Andy Murray

"I like Alonso a lot," Ancelotti said when asked about the former midfielder. "I don't have any advice for him because he already has all the tools needed to become

a great coach in the future." Ancelotti, wearing Madrid's apparel as usual, looked relaxed as he led the team's practice session at the club's training center. He then spoke to the media for the first


