Top Maoist leader Nambala Kesava Rao, alias Basava Raju, was killed along with 27 other Maoists in a major anti-insurgency operation in Chhattisgarh's Bastar region on Wednesday. Kesava Rao, who had been serving as general secretary of the CPI (Maoist) since 2018, was one of the most wanted Maoist leaders, carrying a bounty of Rs 2.02 crore. Security officials confirmed that the operation was based on sustained intelligence

No 'Gulzar Houz fire accident' again, please

took place in the Gulzar Houz area of the Old City of Hyderabad which killed 17 people, including eight children of a family, has frightened city residents.

The accident was so severe that the victims died due to asphyxiation within an hour of the fire starting on the ground floor. Officials said that a short circuit was the reason for the accident. They said that some outdoor units of air conditioners exploded and that smoke engulfed the rooms where the family was sleeping.

There was no escape for the family as the only narrow staircase that led outside was on fire. As they could not go down or up, the victims inhaled the smoke and died.

Fire accidents are not new to Hyderabad, but the conditions which caused the fire at Gulzar Houz have sent a chill down the spines of citizens. Lakhs of families in Hyderabad live in similar conditions in which the

→he fire accident, which Gulzar Houz family has lived Most residential buildings in the Old City and some parts of the new city are located in densely populated areas, and on top of that, they are constructed in a semi-detached manner. There would be no space between houses, and they share

> These buildings were constructed decades ago and obviously did not adhere to any rules. Lakhs of people live in these houses as these areas are centrally located.

The fire accident in Gulzar Houz has raised many questions about the safety of the occupants of these houses. Narrow lanes, no space between houses, and no windows would render firefighters helpless.

Around 59 people have died in seven major accidents in the last 23 years in Hyderabad. Most of the times officials came to the conclusion that the accidents took place due to short circuit or the burning butt of

Experts have suggested many steps to prevent fires. They are of the view that the National Building Code should be revisited and new norms must be

prepared. They explained that the fire safety measures currently prescribed by fire services departments across India do not reflect the advancement in fire safety technologies now available in the market. Current guidelines predominantly recommend water-based sprinkler systems with wet risers or downcomers, which often lead

to practical challenges, inconvenience, and even damage in certain cases

They have suggested that systems like aerosol-based extinguishers, clean agents, inert gases, Dry Chemical Powder (DCP), foam-based systems, and liquid CO2 could be used in place of water during residential and industrial fire accidents.

They are of the view that the residential building safety norms should be made applicable to old houses.

Experts have pointed out that an unbearable load was laid

on the electrical wiring system in lakhs of houses in Hyderabad and surrounding areas. The installation of air conditioners without considering the capacity of wiring is leading to fire accidents.

The wiring in the old houses does not meet current standards. The owners do not bother to change the wiring and go on adding new gadgets.

Today, most houses have fans, coolers, grinders, fridges,

air conditioners, and lights which need a lot of power. The old wiring systems were designed to carry a load required to run just fans and

The upper middle class and the rich are using more than one air conditioner, which consumes a lot of power. This needs three three-phase connection and higher voltage. It leads to an unbearable load on the weak wiring system. The wiring system in old houses did not have trip switches in the event of a short circuit.

In some houses, even today, the fuses and meters are fitted on wooden boards, which would catch fire immediately if there is a short circuit.

Apart from the wiring, the terraced houses, row houses, semi-detached houses, and multi-family dwellings are a challenge to firefighters if something goes wrong. Some houses did not have wide staircases. In some houses, only one person can pass at a time.

The roads, lanes and bylanes of the old city and parts of the new city would not allow fire engines to reach the spot. The fire engines being used in the city are designed to Western road standards. We do not have small and medium-sized fire engines which can enter the narrow lanes of our towns.

The firefighters also face water scarcity problem. The water carried in the engine would not be enough when a major fire accident takes place, and they have to search for water sources. The water pipelines are operated for limited hours in a day, and no tapping point is provided, like in Western countries.

The old buildings of Hyderabad do not have enough ventilation. The front and back doors are the only ventilation points in most houses. Most houses do not have exhaust fans which can blow the smoke out when accidents take place. In order to ensure that the

Gulzar Houz incident does

not repeat the state and central governments should take some immediate steps. Ventilation should be made mandatory in all old buildings. By-lanes should be widened, and encroachments on roads should be removed.

The electricity department should be asked to inspect old houses and examine whether the wiring is compatible with current electrical needs. The owners should be advised to use fire-resistant wires, even though their cost would be Rs 3 to Rs 4 per meter more than conventional wires. All wooden panel boards should be removed, and new panel boards which adhere to the present-day standards should be fitted.

Smoke detectors should be fitted in every room so that residents can become alert as soon as the fire starts. Fire alarms should be linked to the nearest fire station so that fire engines can reach the accident spots immediately.

VMRDA to take up 22 roads to Bhogapuram Airport

State govt keen to expedite Visakhapatnam Metro Rail project: Minister

Minister for Municipal Administration and Urban Development (MAUD), P. Narayana, on Wednesday announced that the Visakhapatnam Metropolitan Development Authority (VMRDA) will take up the construction of 22 roads to link Visakhapatnam with the upcoming Bhogapuram International Airport. Of these, tenders have already been

The announcement was made during a review meeting at the VMRDA office, where the Minister interacted with MLAs and senior officials from the undivided Visakhapatnam district to take stock of infrastructure and urban development projects under VMRDA the Greater Visakhapatnam Municipal Corporation (GVMC).

Addressing media persons after the meeting, Narayana is keen to expedite the long-

awaited Visakhapatnam Metro Rail project. "It will be constructed as a double-decker system, with works scheduled to begin on October 1. While such projects usually take four years, the Chief Minister has instructed that it be completed in three," he noted. The Minister also revealed plans for a semi-ring road around Visakhapatnam to serve a population of up to one crore. He stated that VMRDA is currently engaging consultants to initiate the planning phase of the project. Touching upon the housing sector, Narayana recalled that the earlier TDP

aimed to build seven lakh TIDCO houses and had issued tenders for five lakh units. However, during the YSRCP's tenure (2019–2024), the target was reduced to 2.61 lakh houses, and the progress stalled. He said an estimated ?7,000 crore is now needed to complete the remaining units, and CM Chandrababu Naidu has directed that some houses be completed by Vijayadasami this year. He also announced that a new commissioner will soon be appointed to the GVMC to bolster administra-

Commission Chairman called for proactive measures at the village level to curb the spread of seasonal diseases. "Improvement in sanitation and drinking water facilities must go hand in hand with conducting medical camps wherever necessary," he said.

Dr. Shankara Rao further emphasised the crucial role of the Integrated Tribal Development Agency (ITDA) in monitoring health conditions through its field-level staff and ensuring swift action to contain outbreaks. He also appealed to district collectors and ITDA officials to prioritise the healthcare requirements of tribal populations, especially those residing in remote and underserved locations.

Firefighters responded promptly and managed to bring the situation under control. They broke windows to let the smoke escape and ensured all personnel were safely evacuated. However, officials noted that the building's fire safety equipment did not function, contributing to the spread of smoke.

The fire erupted on the second floor of the fivestorey building, causing thick smoke to spread rapidly. The incident led to concerns over the safety of crucial data, computers, and documents, especially as the building houses key departments like Treasury, Work Accounts, Pay and Accounts, State Audit, APCFSS, and MAPGLI.

Finance Minister Payyavula Keshav visited the site and reviewed the damage. He clarified that no important physical files were destroyed in the fire. Director Padmaja also confirmed that all important digital data remains safe despite concerns over damaged computers.

District Fire Officer Srinivas Reddy stated that the fire safety systems in the building were nonfunctional, resulting in the heavy smoke. Employees expressed worry over the potential damage to computers and stressed the importance of the records maintained at the facility, which include payrolls and departmental transactions from across the State.

PNS VISAKHAPATNAM APCC chief seeks reinstatement of 2,000 contract workers,

Andhra Pradesh Congress Committee (APCC) president Y.S. Sharmila, on Wednesday, began an indefinite hunger strike at the Visakhapatnam Steel Plant (VSP) protest site, extending solidarity to the recently terminated contract workers. According to the Congress party, the VSP management has removed nearly 2,000 contract workers over the past few weeks. Addressing party workers and protestors at the venue, Sharmila demanded the immediate reinstatement of the terminated workers and warned that the agitation would be intensified if

the demands are not fulfilled. "In support of workers at the VSP protest site, APCC chief Y.S. Sharmila Reddy has begun an indefinite hunger strike," said a senior Congress leader from North Andhra. A large number of Congress leaders and cadres participated in the protest in the port city. Sharmila lashed out at the VSP management, accusing it of adopting an "authoritarian attitude" and clearance of salary arrears and opposes VSP privatisation

There is not even the slightest concern to resolve workers' issues. The

management is behaving arrogantly, as if there's no authority to ques-

tion them." She further alleged that the management was planning to terminate an additional 3,000 contract workers and described the move as "utterly cruel". The APCC president also condemned the reported suspension of employees who had voiced opposition to the terminations.

Highlighting the financial distress faced by regular employees, Sharmila claimed that salaries had not been paid for the past eight months. She outlined the Congress party's key demands, which include reinstatement of the 2,000 terminated contract workers, immediate clearance of salary arrears to regular employees, withdrawal of the Centre's January 2021 decision to privatise the VSP, and a formal merger of the plant with the Steel Authority of India Limited (SAIL).

Issuing a stern warning, Sharmila announced that if the demands were not met, the Congress would launch a Statewide indefinite hunger strike. 'Visakha Ukku Andhrula Hakku (Visakha Steel is the right of the people of Andhra). We are ready to sacrifice our lives for the protection of the steel plant and the welfare of its workers," she asserted.

In light of the increasing risk of fire accidents during the summer season, Andhra Pradesh State Disaster Response and Fire Services Department Director General (DG) Madireddy Pratap has called upon the public to take fire safety measures. He highlighted the vulnerability of older buildings and densely populated city areas.

During a media conference at the State Fire Department Headquarters in Vijayawada on Wednesday, the Director General highlighted recent tragic events, such as the Charminar fire in Hyderabad, as illustrative cases. He evaluated the potential risks that could arise in comparable urban throughout settings Vijayawada, Visakhapatnam, Tirupati, and other significant cities in Andhra

Pratap highlighted the vital role of community engagement in preventing fire-related incidents. He noted that when fires occur in older urban areas, the danger is heightened due to narrow streets, a mix of commercial and residential properties,

Furthermore, he recommended that residents of older structures upgrade their electrical systems to accommodate modern appliances, advocating for the use of Fire Retardant Low Smoke (FRLS) wiring.

installation of Micro Circuit Breakers (MCBs) in every room to avert electrical overloads and short circuits.

Additionally, he emphasised the necessity of proper earthing in all buildings to minimise shock and fire risks. Homes should be fitted with smoke detectors and exhaust fans to facilitate early fire detection and smoke removal. Each residential unit should feature a 'breathing balcony' to provide escape routes and air access

during emergencies.

He cited a recent fire at a shopping mall in Srikakulam, where firefighters struggled for six hours to reach the site due to heavy smoke and synthetic materials.

He assured that the department is enhancing its fire safety protocols and will issue No Objection Certificates (NOCs) only after a comprehensive assessment of fire safety measures in residential and commercial properties.

The press meet was also attended by Fire Department Director D Murali Mohan, Additional Director T Uday Kumar, Assistant District Fire Officer K Vinay, and other fire service personnel.



Odisha guidelines for staff to avail maternity leave

he Odisha government on Wednesday laid down clear guidelines for maternity leave of women employees. The guideline was made public after Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi approved it. It said that maternity leave of 180 days can be availed three months before the expected delivery date (EDD) and within six months after the birth of the baby. It can be taken continuously in one go or in multiple phases. However, childbirth must take place in a recognised medical facility, it said. The guideline also cleared the doubts in cases where a female government employee was not in service at the time of childbirth but joined later, as well as in cases of miscarriage, death of a newborn, or stillbirth. It said that if a female government employee was not in service at the time of childbirth and joined later, she can avail maternity leave until her child is six months old. In such cases, the maternity leave may be less than 180 days.



YouTuber in touch with Pak staffer since 2023: Police

ailed YouTuber Jyoti Malhotra had been in contact with a Pakistani officer since 2023, police revealed on Wednesday. Malhotra, behind bars on suspicion of espionage, had been in touch with Ehsan-ur-Rahim alias Danish, the Pakistani staffer at the Pakistani High Commission, since November 2023, a source said. Danish was expelled by India on May 13 for allegedly indulging in espionage. Police have sent Malhotra's three mobile phones and a laptop for forensic examination, the person said. The National Investigation Agency, Intelligence Bureau, and military intelligence officials have questioned Jyoti. So far, it's been revealed that she had visited Pakistan, China, Bangladesh and some other countries. The 33-year-old Hisar native ran a YouTube channel 'Travel with JO' and was arrested from the New Aggarsain Extension last week. She was booked under sections of the Official Secrets Act and the Bhartiya Nyay Sanhita, police said. Malhotra is among 12 people who have been arrested from Punjab, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh over the past two weeks on charges of espionage, with investigators suspecting the presence of a Pakistan-linked spy network operating in north India.

SC's journey is 'inseparable' from Indian Constitution: CJI

PNS NEW DELHI

Chief Justice of India B R Gavai on Wednesday said the Supreme Court has played a "pivotal role" in expanding the scope of fundamental rights, and its 75-year journey is "inseparable" from that of the Indian Constitution.

The apex court has remained responsive to society's evolving needs by adjudicating on complex issues related to information technology, arbitration and electoral processes, he said. Importantly, it opened its doors to the most marginalised through public interest litigations, the chief justice of India stressed. The CJI was speaking at a function organised by the Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) to release a book commemorating 75 years of the top court that came into existence on January 26, 1950 and inaugurated two days later.

Justice Gavai said this year marks a historic occasion as both the Constitution and the Supreme Court completes 75 years. "Over the seven-and-ahalf-decade, we have witnessed an unbreakable bond between



the Constitution and the Supreme Court."The CJI said while the Supreme Court was created by the Constitution and functions under its provisions, it has, in turn, served as the "foremost shield" of the Constitution.

"In that sense, the 75-year journey of the Supreme Court is inseparable from the journey of the Indian Constitution. They are two sides of the same coin, one giving life and the other ensuring that life endures with dignity, justice and liberty," he said. Justice Gavai said the Supreme Court was given a huge constitutional mandate. In pursuance of that, the apex court developed the doctrine of basic structure in its landmark verdict in the Kesavananda Bharati case to safeguard the foundational features of the Constitution, he said. "Over the years, it has played a pivotal role in expanding the scope of fundamental rights, particularly by giving a broad and progressive interpre-

tation to the phrase 'right to life' and Article 21 which has led to the recognition of various essential rights such as right to privacy, right to dignity, right to justice, right to food, right to shelter, right to potable water, right to pollution free environment and so on," he said. The CJI said he must also acknowledge that the Supreme Court has shown the courage and humility to admit its own errors in the constitutional interpretation.

Gaps in MGNREGA implementation: Congress

The Congress on Wednesday cited the findings of a new report on MGNREGA to highlight crucial gaps in its implementation and attack the government.

India lost 18,200 ha of primary forest in 2024: GFW

India lost 18,200 hectares of primary forest in 2024 compared to 17,700 hectares in 2023, according to new data from Global Forest Watch (GFW), a global collaboration

of over 100 organisations. The GFW said the country lost 3,48,000 hectares of humid primary forest between 2002 and 2024 -- about 5.4 per cent of the country's total humid primary forest. This is 15 per cent of India's total tree cover loss during the same period.

Between 2019 and 2024, India lost 1,03,000 hectares (1.6 per cent) of humid prima-

ry forest, which is 14 per cent of its total tree cover loss in those years.

The country lost 16,900 hectares of humid primary forest in 2022, 18,300 hectares in 2021, 17,000 hectares in 2020, and 14,500 hectares in 2019, the data showed.

The GFW defines primary forests as "mature natural humid tropical forests that have not been completely cleared and regrown in recent history". These forests are identified using Landsat satellite images and special algorithms

for each region. Since 2001, India has lost 2.31 million hectares of tree

Heat crisis deepens as summer peaks early

The unprecedented heat has gripped the capital and the worst part — the monsoon is still weeks away

elhi is in a heat emergency. The threat is not just what the thermometer shows — it's in the air we breathe, the infrastructure we rely on, and the fragile lives caught in between. Delhi finds itself teetering on the edge of a climate emergency. With daytime temperatures already breaching unbearable levels and heat indices - the "feels like" temperature - soaring towards a blistering 50°C, the capital is caught in an escalating crisis. A new report by the Council on Energy, Environment and Water (CEEW), titled "How Extreme Heat is Impacting India," paints a stark picture of what's driving this relentless heat. Delhi now ranks among the top 10 most heat-vulnerable regions in the country. The report highlights a dramatic increase in very warm nights — indicating that nights are no longer bringing respite from daytime heat. This disturbing trend, combined with the city's dense infrastructure, is fueling what's known as the urban heat island effect, where tightly packed buildings and roads absorb and trap heat, pushing local temperatures higher than in surrounding rural areas.

To make matters worse, relative humidity in Delhi has climbed nearly 9 per cent in the past ten years. When humidity rises, the body's natural cooling mechanism - sweat evaporation - slows down, making it harder to cope and significantly increasing the "feels like" temperature. Compounding the crisis is the shrinking diurnal temperature range: the difference between day and night temperatures is narrowing, which means the city simply doesn't cool down enough after sunset.

More buildings, more energy use, more vehicles — all these lead to the heat load. While no one is entirely safe, the burden falls heaviest on the most vulnerable. Children, the elderly, and those who work outdoors are at serious risk. Residents of informal settlements, where homes lack insulation, proper ventilation, or consistent electricity, are also disproportionately affected. Low-income families struggle to afford cooling appliances, while people with heart or respiratory issues face compounding health risks. Despite relatively good access to healthcare and electricity in Delhi, the scale of exposure and intensity of the hazard overwhelms these buffers, especially during prolonged heatwaves.

In these conditions, adaptation is the key for survival. People are urged to stay indoors during peak heat hours. Hydration is crucial water intake should be frequent, even without thirst, while alcohol, caffeine, and sugary drinks should be avoided. Wearing loose, lightcolored cotton clothing helps, as does using fans, wet towels, or mist sprays to cool down. And at the first sign of heat-related illness dizziness, excessive sweating, confusion, or nausea — immediate medical attention can save lives. Meteorologists indicate that some relief may arrive with the pre-monsoon showers expected in late June. The Delhi Government's newly launched Heat Action Plan is a timely and vital step, aiming to reduce both short-term harm and long-term risk. However, implementation and execution are vital. What's clear is that this extreme weather is the new normal, and it demands urgent, systemic change.

Balochistan: The search for nationhood


Citing decades of oppression and neglect, Baloch leaders are demanding international recognition for a longsuppressed cause — now thrust into global focus amid rising insurgency and regional turmoil

n May 12, 2025, Baloch nationalist leader Mir Yar Baloch made a historic and audacious move: he declared the Republic of Balochistan as an independent nation. In his impassioned address, he called upon the United Nations and the global community to recognise the new state, free from Pakistani domination. What was once seen as a peripheral movement has now emerged as a central fault line in South Asia's geopolitical landscape. The roots of the Baloch nationalist movement run deep. Balochistan — a region straddling Pakistan, Iran, and Afghanistan-has a long history of tribal autonomy and cultural uniqueness. Historically ruled by tribal confederacies and princely states such as the Khanate of Kalat, Balochistan fiercely resisted centralised control. During British colonial rule, the region served as a buffer zone against Russian expansion, with Britain exercising indirect rule while allowing internal autonomy. When British India was partitioned in August 1947, Pakistan was born on the 14th, followed by India a day later. But just before these momentous events, on August 12, 1947, the Khan of Kalat declared Balochistan an independent state. Pakistan's founder, Muhammad Ali Jinnah, initially acknowledged Balochistan's separate identity.

However, pressures from global powers and regional considerations led to a shift. On March 27, 1948, Pakistan forcibly annexed Balochistan — a move widely viewed by the Baloch as illegitimate. This annexation marked the beginning of a long and bitter struggle for autonomy and justice. The decades that followed were marked by uprisings and brutal crackdowns. Major rebellions erupted in 1958-59 and again in 1963-69, led by Nawab Nauroz Khan and Sher Muhammad Marri. In 1973, Prime Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto dismissed the provincial Government, sparking another wave of insurgency. Inspired by the secession of East Pakistan in 1971, Baloch rebels fought for nearly four years before being crushed by superior military force and lack of internal cohesion.

A pivotal moment came in 2006 with the assassination of Nawab Akbar Bugti, a prominent Baloch leader. His death galvanised insurgent groups like the Balochistan Liberation Army (BLA) and the Balochistan Liberation Front (BLF), who began targeting Pakistani military installations, infrastructure, and Chinese investments-particularly those associated with the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC).

Balochistan's grievances are not merely historical. The region, which comprises 44 per cent of Pakistan's landmass and houses around 15 million people, remains one of the most impoverished and underdeveloped



areas in the country. Despite its rich reserves of natural gas and minerals, its people face chronic unemployment, illiteracy, and political marginalisation. Baloch representation in Pakistan's power structures — military. bureaucracy, and politics remains negligible. For many Baloch, Pakistan is not a nation but an occupying force.

The Tectonic Shift

Tensions escalated sharply after the May 7, 2025 launch of Operation Sindoor by the Indian armed forces. The operation was a direct response to the Pahalgam massacre, where terrorists-allegedly backed by Pakistan's military-attacked Indian



calls for decisive action Operation Sindoor was swift and strategic. As Pakistan reeled from the fallout and turned its focus eastward, the Baloch insurgency

surged. On May 11, the

BLA launched a coordinated attack across 52 locations, hitting 71 strategic targets in one of the most extensive operations in the movement's history. The very next day, the declaration of independence followed. What had long been simmering beneath the surface exploded into full view.

A Region on the Brink

The emergence of a declared Republic of

Balochistan has re-ignited debates around suppressed ethnic identities within Pakistan. On social media and in diaspora forums, Baloch voices are gaining traction, framing their struggle as a legitimate fight for self-determination.

Regional stability

Pakistan now finds itself fighting an internal battle on multiple fronts. Already diplomatically isolated and militarily stretched, Islamabad risks further alienating global opinion if it responds with forceful suppression. The haunting memory of Bangladesh's liberation in 1971 looms large. Should the movement gain momentum, the specter of Pakistan's fragmentation becomes a real and pressing concern.

China, deeply invested in CPEC, finds itself in a precarious position. Gwadar Port-a linchpin of Chinese strategic ambitions-is ocated in Balochistan. A hostile or unregulated Balochistan could disrupt trade routes and force Beijing into direct involvement. Already wary of unrest in its Xinjiang region, China may feel compelled to support Pakistan militarily or deploy private security contractors, effectively internationalising the conflict.

Iran, too, is watching closely. The province of Sistan-Balochistan, home to a significant Baloch population, shares ethnic and cultural ties with Pakistani Balochistan. A successful separatist movement could inspire similar demands within Iran, pushing Tehran into a closer security alignment with Islamabad.

Afghanistan, governed by the Taliban, remains an unpredictable wildcard. Depending on how events unfold, Kabul could either offer safe haven to Baloch militants or leverage the unrest to strengthen its influence along the volatile Durand Line. India stands

at a critical juncture. Since Prime Minister Narendra Modi's 2016 Red Fort speech expressing solidarity with the Baloch, India has maintained a position of moral support. Balochistan's declaration presents an opportunity to diplomatically highlight Pakistan's internal contradictions. However, overt support may invite international criticism or military escalation. India is more likely to pursue a strategy of diplomatic engagement, and outreach to the global Baloch diaspora.

Will the world recognise the Republic of Baluchistan? As of now, no state has done so officially. However, support from exiled leaders, sympathetic legislatures, and human rights organisations could slowly tilt the narrative. Symbolic recognitions could embolden the movement and complicate Pakistan's internal dynamics. Islamabad is expected to respond with a mix of force and political maneuvering. Constitutional changes, emergency laws, or military crackdowns may be deployed to suppress the rebellion. Yet, history suggests such measures may deepen the wounds rather than heal them. In truth, whether or not Balochistan gains full statehood, its declaration has laid bare a longneglected crisis.

This is more than a separatist bid-it is a demand for dignity, justice, and self-determination. The Republic of Balochistan may still be a contested dream, but its voice can no longer be silenced. South Asia now stands at a crossroads. Ignore this declaration, and the region risks repeating history. Confront it with wisdom, and perhaps a new, inclusive order can emerge from the shadows of discontent.

Tith its rich biodiversity, deep-rooted farming traditions, and a population that still lives close to the land, rural India holds the key to reversing India's biodiversity crisis and achieving true sustainable development. As the world observes International Day for Biological Diversity (IDB), the spotlight turns toward the communities that have long lived in harmony with nature and the urgent need to empower them as agents of ecological change.

As we near the 2030 deadline for the Sustainable Development Goals and the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (KMGBF), it becomes increasingly clear that rural India is not only central to India's biodiversity agenda — it could well be the catalyst that tips the scales.

Biodiversity is far more than an environmental concern; it is the foundation of life. It supports our food systems, sustains livelihoods, regulates the climate, purifies water, and provides protection against natural disasters. The rapid loss of species and ecosystems, both globally and in India, is not just a tragedy for nature — it is a threat to human survival and wellbeing. The KMGBF calls for a global transformation:

These time-tested approaches offer valuable solutions to today's challenges — if only we can help our farmers remember them and adopt them.

By building on these traditions and expanding nature-friendly practices like agroecology, organic farming, and natural farming, India can move toward a truly sustainable agri-food system-one that supports biodiversity instead port rural communities. Farmers must be recognised not only as food producers but as stewards of biodiversity. Their knowledge must be respected, their leadership encouraged, and their work made economically viable.

This moment also calls for greater synergy between policv and practice. India's National Biodiversity Strategies and Action Plans have an opportunity to meaningfully integrate the ambitious targets of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (KMGBF) while aligning with national and state-level development priorities. Government support will continue to play a crucial role-through enabling policies, incentives, training, and infrastructure. Just as vital, however, is the active engagement of civil society, CSR bodies, local institutions, and farmers themselves, who bring invaluable on-ground experience and insight. By working together across sectors, we can co-create solutions that are both locally rooted and globally relevant.

As the 2030 deadline looms, the need for action is urgent. But there is still time to rewrite the story. The International Day for Biological Diversity reminds us to recognise that India's future lies not in distant boardrooms or global summits-but in its villages, fields, and forests. Here, harmony with nature is a way of life-waiting to be recognised, revitalised, and scaled for a better tomorrow.

Dr Jayant Vishnu Narlikar is no more

Senior astrophysicist Dr Jayant Vishnu Narlikar passed away at his residence in Pune on May 20th, 2025. Dr Narlikar was not only a scientist but also a science writer and a pioneer of science fiction. He authored several books and articles in Marathi and English on scientific topics. THE INDO-BANGLADESH RELATIONS ARE WILTING AWAY



he once-warm relationship between India and Bangladesh now shivers under the shadow of trade tensions. India's semifinal victory in the fight against terrorism

The message of Operation Sindoor was clear: the path to a secure, developed, and globally respected India — Viksit Bharat — demands continued resolve, multidimensional preparedness, and an unflinching stand against terrorism in all its forms



n a bold reaffirmation of India's commitment to counter cross-border terrorism, Prime Minister Narendra Modi established a 'new normal' through Operation Sindoor as a strong response to Pakistan-sponsored terrorism. This operation, which featured deep and precise strikes on terror camps located not only in Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) but also well within Pakistan's heartland, was unprecedented. It showcased India's strong willpower, operational maturity, and ability to deliver high-precision strikes with minimal collateral damage. India's air defence capabilities were proven effective in neutralising advanced and coordinated drone threats. The successful hits on strategic air bases of Pakistan underscored India's operational readiness and

deterrent strength.
Yet, as PM Modi remarked, "We will keep taking decisive steps," which subtly foreshadowed that a full-scale final confrontation is inevitable. Although the exact timeline remains uncertain, decisive engagement appears to be a necessary milestone toward realising the vision of Viksit Bharat — a developed, secure, and globally respected India. Therefore, India needs a multidimensional and proactive strategy to prepare for the final stage of this prolonged conflict.

Diplomatic Front

Despite the operational success, the global diplomatic response did not meet our expectations. China, predictably, stood by its long-time ally Pakistan. The United States, while posturing as the champion of global peace, took a balanced, almost ambivalent stance, attempting to preserve its strategic interests on both sides. The European Union, meanwhile, continued to misinterpret the conflict through a limited prism of the Kashmir issue, failing to grasp the larger menace posed by Pakistan, which is the epicentre of terrorism the

The short-duration conflict has made it amply clear that India was not just fighting Pakistan; rather, it appears to be a broader coalition of actors who perceive India's growing assertiveness as a threat to their geopolitical agendas. This apprehension reached new heights after Operation Sindoor, where India's swift, coordinated and targeted strike incapacitated multiple Pakistani military installations, including airbases, radars, drone depots, and air

Western powers must reassess their assumptions. While China continues to back Pakistan both economically and militarily, India remains the most stable and democratic partner capable of upholding a rules-based global order in the Indo-Pacific region. The United States, in particular, must recognise that strengthening India is strategically aligned with its interest in counterbalancing Chinese expansionism. However, the American response so far indicates a hesitancy to decisively back India — opting instead

to maintain a superficial equilibrium between India and Pakistan. This approach is neither sustainable nor strategic. More importantly, India has to make efforts to shift the prevailing global narrative. The world must be reminded that the Indo-Pak conflict is not simply a territorial dispute over Kashmir it is fundamentally a battle against state-sponsored terrorism. Pakistan remains a breeding ground for radical Islamic ideologies that have manifested in

global tragedies such as the 9/11 attacks, London bombings, Madrid train attacks, and the Charlie Hebdo massacre. These events are enough evidence that the terror ecosystem nurtured by Pakistan's military intelligence, especially the ISI, has global ramifications.

India must proactively convey to the West that Kashmir has been an integral part of the Indian civilisation for thousands of years. Unlike Pakistan, which was founded on a

rigid two-nation theory, India is a vibrant, pluralistic, and multi-polar democracy that cannot be confined within communal or sectarian boundaries.

External Security/Military Front

The Border Security Force (BSF) currently fulfils its peacetime mandate well, leveraging its familiarity with the terrain and local intelligence.

However, it must now evolve into a battle-ready force capable of handling wartime contingencies. This includes enhanced access to artillery support, drone and counter-drone technology, as well as electronic warfare capabilities. Training modules should be updated, and regular joint exercises with the Indian Army must become a routine to ensure coordination during high-stress scenarios.

Internal Security Front

Internal security presents equally pressing challenges. One of the most serious is illegal immigration, particularly from Bangladesh. In 2016, then Minister of State for Home Affairs Kiren Rijiju stated that "as per available inputs, there are around 20 million illegal Bangladeshi migrants staying in India." This mass influx not only strains local resources but has also begun altering demographic compositions in sensitive border states - posing both security and social threat. Implementing the National Register of Citizens (NRC) is imperative. However, it must be done transparently and fairly, shielded from political agendas and vote-bank compulsions. Handling illegal immigration with an iron hand is the need of the hour so that demographic changes can be stopped.

To maintain national harmony, India has to take strong steps against anti-national elements who are out to exploit societal divisions. India is under constant assault from psychological and information warfare, much of it orchestrated by hostile actors across the border. These campaigns are designed to sow discord, spread fake narratives, and erode the nation's trust in its institutions. Social media has emerged as the frontline for such attacks and combating them requires a blend of technological vigilance and legal framework. We must consistently reinforce values of unity, national pride and patriotism. Fake news, hate speech and misinformation must be countered strongly.

As one of the world's 17 mega-diverse countries, India is home to over 45,000 plant species and 91,000 animal species, many of which are endemic. This rich biodiversity underpins our ecological stability, cultural identity, and economic prosperity. Drawing from my experience as PCCF & Chief Wildlife Warden of Haryana and former IUCN Country Representative, I am proud to share how India aligns with the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (GBF) to lead global conservation efforts.

Adopted at COP15 under the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), the GBF sets four global goals and 23 targets to be met by 2030. India played a pivotal role in shaping this framework and is now integrating it into our National Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan (NBSAP). Our priorities — sustainable agriculture, water security, climate resilience, and disaster risk reduction — are seamlessly woven into this plan, with a strong focus on the 30x30 target (protecting 30% of terrestrial and marine areas), equitable genetic resource access, and enhanced biodiversity financing.

A Unified Conservation **Strategy**

India's strength lies in its "whole-of-Government and whole-of-society" approach. We are converging sectoral schemes like MGNREGA, the National Mission for Clean Ganga, Jal Shakti Abhiyan, the National Bamboo Mission, and PM Kusum with biodiversity goals. In Haryana, the Aravalli Green Wall Project is a testament to this synergy. By uniting the Forest Department, Rural Development, Panchayati Raj Institutions, and corpo-

rate social responsibility (CSR) support, we are restoring degraded Aravalli landscapes with native flora, enhancing water recharge, and boosting carbon sequestration.

Preserving Agro-Biodiversity and Empowering Communities

Our agricultural legacy, with over 160 cultivated species and thousands of climate-resilient landraces, is a treasure we are determined to protect. Through the National Mission on Sustainable Agriculture, Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana, and Plant Genetic Resources Conservation, we are safeguarding indigenous varieties and traditional farming systems. State Biodiversity Boards and over 2.7 lakh Biodiversity Management Committees (BMCs)

How terror stilled the dreams of Kashmiri women

ahalgam, often called "the valley of shepherds," Prests gently in the cradle of the Himalayas. With its snow-fed Lidder River, dense pine forests, and sprawling meadows, it's easy to see why this corner of Kashmir is called "paradise on Earth." Each spring, travelers from across the world arrive to ride ponies into the hills, sip hot kahwa by the riverside, and breathe in the crisp mountain air. It is a place where time slows down and serenity fills every breath.

This year, the arrival of spring brought more than blooming flowers — it brought hope. After years of pandemic lockdowns and political tensions, Kashmir's tourist season was finally stirring back to life. Markets began buzzing again, homestays reopened their doors, and visitors started returning.

For many local women, this revival wasn't just economic - it was deeply personal. Tourism had become a path to independence. Women were stepping out of their homes and into new roles: hosting travelers in homestays, selling traditional crafts, running food stalls, leading nature walks, and offering embroidery workshops to curious tourists. Slowly, silently, they were stitching together lives of dignity.

Then came April 22, 2025. On that day, in broad daylight, five armed militants attacked a group of people in Pahalgam, opening fire with chilling precision. It was sudden, merciless. Twenty-six people lost their lives, and more than twenty others were injured. It was the deadliest terror attack Índia had witnessed in recent years, and its impact reverberated far beyond the blood-stained valley.

National headlines captured the horror of the moment — but what happened in the days that followed, especially to the women of Kashmir, was barely mentioned. Tourists began cancelling in droves. According to a recent

LocalCircles survey, more than 62 families across India abandoned their travel plans to Kashmir. Travel agencies were flooded with calls for refunds. Hotels and guesthouses stood empty. The laughter, the click of cameras, the joyful hum of a region trying to heal — all of it vanished overnight. And once again, silence returned to the valley. But this silence was not just the absence of visitors. For countless women, it meant the loss of their only source of income. It meant doors closing - on opportunity, on movement, on possibility. Rubeena, who runs a modest kahwa stall near Aru Valley, spoke through tears: "We had just started recovering from COVID-19. April was supposed to be our busiest time. And now, we are back to nothing."

"We had tourists who returned every year, who remembered our names. Now, they're afraid to come.

And just like that, we are invisible again. Studies in recent years have shown that tourism in Kashmir offered women more than jobs — it gave



them confidence, skills, and a space in the public sphere. In a place long scarred by conflict, these acts selling tea, guiding a walk, teaching

embroidery — were radical steps forward. Every kahwa poured, every shawl stitched, was a quiet act of resilience.

Now, with fear in the air again, families are reluctant to let women step outside. Daughters are told to stay home. Homestays once proudly run by women stand deserted. Kahwa stalls are shuttered. Craft workshops lie still. The energy that was just beginning to return has gone cold again.

And this is where the true damage of terror lies — not just in lives lost, but in dreams interrupted. In the retreat of women from the spaces they had only just begun to inhabit. In the silence that

replaces the sound of ambition. Kashmir's instability doesn't just make headlines; it crushes livelihoods. And while the world debates security and geopolitics, it is the women — without safety nets or alternative employment — who bear the brunt of the fallout. Every cycle of violence sets them back years. When we speak of Kashmir, let us not reduce it to borders and political disputes.

Let us also see the human cost — especially for those whose stories rarely reach the surface. It's not just about danger. It's about lost dignity, interrupted growth, and deferred dreams. Pahalgam has always symbolised peace. But if we allow violence to keep defining this region, we are not just losing a tourist destination — we are losing the women who dared In Anantnag, artisan Shabnam echoed the pain: to hope. We are letting fear win over freedom, silence over voice, and darkness over the promise of spring. And that, truly, would be the greatest loss of all.

Domestic air passenger traffic grows to 143.16 lakh

ndian airlines flew 143.6 lakh passengers on domestic routes in April, 8.45 per cent more as compared to the year-ago period, amid rising air traffic demand. In terms of domestic market share, IndiGo topped the list with 64.1 per cent of the pie, followed by Air India Group (27.2 per cent), Akasa Air (5 per cent) and SpiceJet (2.6 per cent), according to the latest data from the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA). "Passengers carried by domestic airlines during January-April 2025 were 575.13 lakh as against 523.46 lakh during the corresponding period of the previous year thereby registering an annual growth of 9.87 per cent and monthly growth of 8.45 per cent," DGCA said in its monthly report. Domestic air passenger traffic was at 143.16 lakh in April compared to 132 lakh in the same period a year ago. In terms of On Time Performance (OTP) of scheduled domestic airlines -- computed for the four metro airports at Bengaluru, Delhi, Hyderabad, and Mumbai -- IndiGo's OTP stood at 80.8 per cent while that of Akasa Air and Air India Group was 77.5 per cent and 72.4 per cent, respectively.



Rupee falls 1 paisa to close at 85.59 against US dollar

he rupee consolidated in a narrow range and settled for the day down by 1 paisa at 85.59 (provisional) against the US dollar on Wednesday, on dollar demand from importers and foreign banks as well as surge in crude oil prices. Forex traders said market sentiment soured under pressure from rising US Treasury yields and persistent foreign fund outflows. However, positive domestic markets and a weak US dollar index cushioned the downside. At the interbank foreign exchange, the domestic unit opened at 85.65 and moved between an intra-day high of 85.53 and a low of 85.70 against the greenback. The unit ended the session lower at 85.59 (provisional), registering a fall of 1 paisa over its previous closing level. On Tuesday, the rupee depreciated 16 paise to close at 85.58 against the US dollar. "We expect the rupee to trade with a negative bias on importer demand for dollar and geopolitical tensions in the

etirement fund body EPFO added 14.58 lakh net members during March 2025, registering an on-year increase of 1.15 per cent, according to the latest payroll data released on Wednesday. The Employees' Provident Fund Organization (EPFO) enrolled around 7.54 lakh new subscribers in March 2025, representing a 2.03 per cent increase over February 2025 and 0.98 per cent year-on-year growth compared to March 2024, a labour ministry statement said. EPFO has released provisional payroll data for March 2025, revealing a net addition of 14.58 lakh members. The year-on-year analysis reveals an increase of 1.15 per cent in net payroll additions compared to March 2024, the statement said. This growth in new subscribers can be attributed to growing employment opportunities, increased awareness of employee benefits, and EPFO's successful outreach programs, it stated. As per the report, 4.45 lakh new subscribers were added in the 18-25 age group, constituting a significant 58.94 per cent of the total new subscribers added in

India, EU looking for early harvest trade agreement

Negotiations for a proposed trade pact between India and the 27-nation European Union are progressing at a faster pace and both the sides are looking at concluding the talks for an early harvest trade agreement by July this year, a government official said on Wednesday.

The early harvest or an interim trade agreement would include issues such as intellectual property rights (IPRs), government procurement, tariff, and non-tariff barriers, the official said.

An Indian official team from the commerce ministry is visiting Brussels this week for the next round of negotiations on the trade agreement with the European Union (EU). This visit comes in the backdrop of recently-concluded eleventh round of talks between chief negotiators of both the sides on May 16 here in the national capital.

"We are looking for an early harvest. We are trying to do it as early as possible...targeting by July for early harvest," the official added.

The two sides have agreed to conclude the agreement in two phases on account of the uncertain global trade environment, particularly due to the US tariff actions under President Donald Trump.

India has followed the practice of negotiating trade pacts in two phases with Australia.

The early harvest pact



would lead to a full fledged free trade agreement.

Besides demanding significant duty cuts in automobiles and medical devices, the EU wants tax reduction in products like wines, spirits, meat, poultry and a strong intellectual property regime.

Indian goods exports to the EU, such as ready-made garments, pharmaceuticals, steel, petroleum products, and electrical machinery, can become more competitive if the pact gets concluded successfully. **INTERIM TRADE DEAL WITH US**

India seeks full exemption from 26 pc additional tariff

India and the US may announce an interim trade agreement before July 8, with New Delhi seeking full exemption from the additional 26 per cent tariff on domestic goods, an official said.

The US on April 2 imposed an additional 26 per cent reciprocal tariff on Indian goods, but suspended it for 90 days till July 9. However, the 10 per cent baseline tariff imposed by America remains in place.

The government official said India's endeavour to protect its sensitive sectors may entail some quota or minimum import price (MIP). Such sectors include agri goods and dairy

Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal was there in Washington earlier this week to give an impetus to the trade talks. He held meetings with US Trade Representative (USTR) Jamieson Greer and US Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick

"Talks are moving positively. Before July 8, we are looking at concluding an interim deal before the first tranche. It will include goods, non-tariff barriers, some areas of services also

like digital. We are trying that the 26 per cent additional duty and the 10 per cent baseline tariff should not be there for India," the official said, adding that India is seeking concessions for its labour-intensive sectors such as textiles and leather.

At present, the Trump administration requires approval from the US Congress to bring tariffs below the MFN (most favoured nation) rates. But the administration has

But the administration has the authority to remove the reciprocal tariffs imposed on a number of countries, including India.

India may look at certain commitments from the US on the duty concessions for its

labour-intensive sector in the first tranche of the proposed bilateral trade agreement (BTA).

Both countries have fixed a deadline to conclude the first phase of the pact by fall (September-October) of this year to more than double bilateral trade to USD 500 billion by 2030.

The minister-level meetings were followed by the deliberations between chief negotiators of the two countries, which will continue until May 22.

Officials from New Delhi and Washington are looking to take advantage of the 90-day tariff pause window to advance the talks. The US has suspended the additional 26 per cent tariffs on

Tea tasting certification course on cards to skill youth

The Tea Board of India, under the commerce ministry, will explore the possibility of launching certification courses in tea tasting with an aim to skill the youth, and promote tourism in the sector, a top government official said on Wednesday.

"The Tea Board is trying to take steps to establish a centre for tea tasting certification courses in the country," Barthwal told reporters here.

Such courses, according to experts, will provide structured training in tea tasting segment as it is a specialised

skill essential to the industry. It would also help standardise tasting practices and provide young professionals with a recognised qualification.

"This will also contribute to promoting tea tourism," he said. The export of tea grew to USD 920 million in FY25 from USD 830 million in FY24.

Major producing states include Assam, West Bengal, Tamil Nadu, and Kerala, with 81 per cent of the production consumed domestically. International Tea Day,

International Tea Day, observed on May 21, high-lights the cultural and economic significance of tea worldwide and recognises the contribution of workers in the sector. Main varieties of tea in India include Darjeeling, Assam, Nilgiri, and Kangra.

"A weak dollar supported gold prices. Investors are also evaluating sovereign risk after Moody's downgraded the US credit rating due to fiscal deficit concerns," Abans Financial Services' Chief Executive Officer Chintan Mehta said.

The downgrade has heightened uncertainty around the

long-term stability of US finances, prompting investors to seek safe-haven assets like gold, Mehta said.

In addition, silver prices climbed Rs 1,660 to Rs 99,160 per kg (inclusive of all taxes) on Wednesday. The white metal had finished at Rs 97,500 per kg in the previous market close.

On the global front, spot gold rose USD 21.79 or 0.66 per cent to USD 3,311.76 per ounce. "Gold edged higher on

Wednesday reclaiming the USD 3,300 level amid rising geopolitical tensions and US fiscal concerns," Saumil Gandhi, Senior Research Analyst of Commodities at HDFC Securities, said.

Meanwhile, investor jitters stemming from ongoing uncertainty regarding tariff policies and an upcoming crucial vote on President Donald Trump's major tax reforms are leading to caution, with the US dollar weakening and gold rising, Gandhi added.

India's oil demand expected to grow 4 pc annually

India's domestic demand for oil is expected to increase at a CAGR (compound annual growth rate) of 4 per cent over the next decade, S&P Global Commodity Insights, a division of S&P Global, said on Wednesday.

In 2025 so far, oil consumption in India stands at 4.8 million barrel per day (MBPD), up 4.3 per cent from the previous calender year. The country's crude oil demand is 5.4 MBPD this year.

year.

The global oil prices have lost some shine in 2025 year-to-date on the back of a challenging demand environment exacerbated by supply growth from OPEC+ as well as beyond, Pulkit Agarwal, Head of India Content (Cross

Commodities), said.
"For India, oil demand continues to grow, helped by favourable demographics and economic growth.

India is quickly assuming a prominent place in the global oil demand growth order, while the base is still small to have an oversized implication on the global markets," he said.

Govt headhunter finds none suitable for NTPC top job

PNS NEW DELHI

The government headhunter on Wednesday found none of the dozen candidates suitable for the role of chairman and managing director of India's biggest power producer NTPC, as its string of struggle in finding the right candidates for top job at PSUs continued.

The Public Enterprise Selection Board (PESB) interviewed a dozen candidates—half of them directors on board of NTPC and other state-owned firms—but found none suitable to be appointed chairman and managing director when the incumbent Gurdeep Singh superannuates on July 31.



"The board did not recommend any candidate for the post and advised the Administrative Minis try/Department to choose an appropriate course of further action for selection including the search-cum-selection committee (SCSC) or as deemed appropriate with the approval of the competent authority,"

PESB said in a notice posted on its website.

NTPC is the latest bluechip public sector firm where the government headhunter struggled to find the right candidate. Since 2021, PESB has failed to find a suitable candidate for at least four other PSUs -- Oil and Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC), Indian Oil

Corporation (IOC), Hindustan Petroleum Corporation (HPCL), and Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd (BPCL).

Search-cum-selection committee route was taken wherever PESB failed to find suitable candidates.

Incidentally, Singh, too, was chosen to head NTPC by a search-cum-selection committee in 2016.

PESB is a statutory body under the Department of Personnel and Training (DoPT), responsible for selecting candidates for top management posts like chairman and managing directors and directors in Central Public Sector Enterprises.

Asks the bank to report to investigative agencies

IndusInd Bank board suspects involvement of certain employees in the derivatives, microfinance and balance sheet "fraud" and directed the bank to report the matter to investigative agencies and regulatory authorities.

The bank board met on Wednesday to approve the financial results for the March quarter and for 2024-25 fiscal.

In a regulatory filing, IndusInd Bank said based on review of internal audit reports as well as external professional firm, its board "suspects the occurrence of fraud against the Bank" and

of fraud against the Bank" and the involvement therein of certain employees having a significant role in the accounting and financial reporting of the Bank.

"Accordingly, the Board has directed necessary steps be taken under applicable law (including reporting to regulatory authorities and investigative agencies) and to also fix accountability of all persons responsible for these

lapses," it said.

The Bank has appropriately accounted for and reflected the impact of all discrepancies identified in these reports while finalising the financial results for the quarter/twelve months

ended March 31, 2025, IndusInd added.

In March, the private sector

In March, the private sector bank had reported accounting lapses in the derivative portfolio which were estimated to have an adverse impact of approximately 2.35 per cent of the bank's net worth as of December 2024.



Following this, the bank appointed external agency PwC to assess the impact on the bank's balance sheet, lapses at various levels and suggest remedial action.

The agency in its report has quantified the negative impact of the above as of June 30, 2024, at Rs 1,979 crore. On April 29, CEO Sumant Kathpalia and Deputy CEO Arun Khurana resigned from the bank, following which IndusInd Board appointed a Committee of Executives to oversee the operations of the bank, till a new MD & CEO assumes charge or a period of three months.

Sebi cautions investors on stock market scams

Markets regulator Sebi on Wednesday cautioned investors against unsolicited messages from unverified people and asked them to refrain from joining WhatsApp groups or commu-

nities.

This warning comes amid a rise in cases where entities are using social media platforms to entice and deceive gullible investors in the securities

Sebi has observed that such entities use various strategies to gain investors' trust and confidence. Generally, these entities send unsolicited invitations in the form of links to join WhatsApp groups -- often under names like "VIP Group" or "Free Trading Courses"-- targeting prospective clients.

To appear credible, these

tive clients.

To appear credible, these entities often create fake profiles that depict them as experts in the securities market. In many instances, they impersonate Sebi-registered intermediaries, well-known public figures, celebrities, or CEOs/MDs of established

s organisations.
d They exploit investors by



showcasing fake testimonials of large profits, supposedly earned by other group members who are actually playing

a supporting role in the scam. This misleading portrayal tricks investors into transferring funds to the bank lured by false promises of similarly high returns.

Accordingly, Sebi, in a statement advised investors "to not

ment, advised investors "to not trust such unsolicited messages from unverified people and refrain from joining such Whatsapp groups/ communities. Investors are advised to deal with only Sebi-registered intermediaries and through authentic trading apps".

To safeguard their interests, investors are encouraged to verify the registration status of any entity with Sebi at https://www.sebi.gov.in/intermediaries.html before making

Moreover, transactions should be conducted only through authentic trading

apps of Sebi-registered intermediaries.

Investors are also urged to communicate only with gen-

communicate only with genuine social media handles of Sebi-registered entities. The regulator has issued this caution in the wake of

rampant frauds and scams perpetrated by unscrupulous actors and aims to help investors with the necessary awareness to protect themselves while engaging in the securities market.

BREAKING THE CYCLE

TSCS'S PREVENTIVE MODEL OFFERS HOPE AGAINST THALASSEMIA

n Telangana, particularly Hyderabad, thalassemia remains a pressing genetic health con-cern. "Every vear, an estimated 250

to 500 children are born with thalassemia in the state," says Dr. Chandrakant Agarwal, President of the Thalassemia & Sickle Cell Society (TSCS). Despite awareness campaigns led by public and private entities.

challenges remain in terms of cultural acceptance, early screening, and long-term care. "Stigma, low awareness, and cultural hesitations still lead to reluctance in acknowledging carrier status or under-

going timely testing," he adds.

TSCS has emerged as a beacon of hope for families grappling with tha-lassemia and sickle cell anemia. Based in Hyderabad, the organization offers a comprehensive suite of free services for affected children. "We provide reg-ular consultations with specialists, safe and timely blood transfusions, and medications supported by the Arogyasri scheme," explains Dr. Agarwal.

The society also facilitates a battery

of essential tests—biochemical, hematological, serological—and advanced diagnostics such as ECG, ECHO, X-ray, Ultrasound, and MRI, the latter of which has already been conducted for over 1,000 children. Moreover, genetic counselling and psychological sup-port for families play a central role in TSCS's mission.

Perhaps most notably, TSCS aids bone marrow transplantation (BMT) the only curative treatment for thalassemia—in collaboration with partner hospitals and with funding from corporate sponsors. "So far, we have supported 167 children through BMT," shares Dr. Agarwal. The organization also ensures the provision of free meals to patients and accompanying family members during treatment visits.

Additionally, TSCS is initiating prenatal diagnostic (PND) services at its centre to help prevent the birth of children affected by the disorder.

"Prevention is the most effective approach," says Dr. Agarwal, emphasiz-ing that the eradication of thalassemia in Telangana and Andhra Pradesh is possible through extensive screening and genetic counselling. TSCS strongly advocates for mandatory HbA2 testing—a simple blood test that identifies thalassemia carrier status—for all pregnant women during their first trimester.

"An HbA2 level above 3.5% indicates a thalassemia minor or carrier state," explains Dr. Agarwal. "If both parents are carriers, there is a 25% chance that their child will be born with thalassemia major, which is life-threatening." He stresses that this form of thalassemia is 100% preventable if such atrisk couples are identified early and offered prenatal diagnostic options.

TSCS has actively initiated antenatal screening programs in Modern Government Maternity Hospital at Petlaburi, and across PHCs in Medchal-Malkajgiri and Mahbubnagar districts, with upcoming expansions planned in Khammam and Asifabad. These initiatives not only aim to increase awareness but also embed screening into routine maternal care.

One of TSCS's most commendable milestones is Mahbubnagar becoming Telangana's first Thalassemia-Free District. This was achieved through a systematic and community-driven approach in collaboration with the district administration.

Dr. Agarwal outlines the steps: "We obtained permission to conduct antenatal screening in all PHCs of the district. We then trained ASHA workers, Anganwadi staff, and PHC doctors to implement the screening at the community level." Every pregnant woman visiting a PHC was tested early, and if found to be a carrier, her spouse was tested as well. In cases where both partners were carriers, they were thoroughly counselled about the risks and offered prenatal diagnostic options.

"Public education was also critical," he adds. "We invested heavily in spreading awareness about the condition and the importance of prevention.

While BMT is currently the only cure for thalassemia major, Dr. Agarwal is





clear that it's not a silver bullet due to cost and donor limitations. "The procedure involves replacing the defective blood-forming stem cells in the patient with healthy cells from a fully HLA-matched donor. This enables the patient to produce normal hemoglobin and eliminates the need for lifelong transfusions."

For those undergoing transfusions every 2–3 weeks, blood availability is critical. Dr. Agarwal points out that despite improved awareness, Hyderabad still faces seasonal shortages, especially during festivals and holidays. "This is where TSCS steps in," he says. "We conduct over 225–250 blood donation camps annually across Telangana and Andhra Pradesh."

These camps are hosted in collaboration with educational institutions, temples, mosques, corporates, and NGOs to maintain a stable blood supply for the thousands of patients under ΓŚCS care.

While thalassemia remains a global health challenge, countries such as Cyprus, Greece, and Italy have made tremendous progress by implementing nationwide screening, premarital testing, and prenatal diagnosis. Dr. Agarwal believes India can replicate this success by embracing similar strategies.

"We must move towards universal rier screening, especially in high-risl communities, mandatory HbA2 testing for pregnant women, and widespread public awareness campaigns," he urges. The integration of genetic counselling and accessible prenatal diagnosis is also essential. TSCS's consistent and impactful work has not gone unnoticed. The Thalassemia International Federation (TIF) recently selected Kamala Hospital and Research Centre/TSCS as its India Collaborating Partner. This partnership underscores the organization's role in aligning with global standards for thalassemia care.

"This recognition will help us scale our impact further," says Dr. Agarwal. "The collaboration will open doors for international training programs, cutting adapt recognition and vider discompanies." ting-edge research, and wider dissemination of global best practices in

We need to show some humility, says England coach McCullum

Ingland head coach Brendon McCullum feels his players have lacked humility in their recent public utterances and he would like to see them win back respect from fans ahead of the tough home series against India and the Ashes later this year.

McCullum, while speaking to the media ahead of a lone Test against Zimbabwe starting Thursday in Nottingham, said the players need to be more attuned to public mood. "It's not just about what you do on the cricket field. It's how you carry yourself. It's how you interact with the public. It's the messaging that you give," McCullum told the British media. "The ability these guys have to be able to play on the biggest stage, under the brightest lights and the pressure that takes is one thing, but also the ability to be humble and show some humility and not feel out of touch with the general population is something I'd like to see us improve on."

England's players have drawn criticism for their seemingly nonchalant attitude towards on-field setbacks, the most recent being a winless Champions Trophy campaign in Pakistan. They were also lambasted by former batting star Kevin Pietersen for playing golf while skipping training during a poor limited-overs tour of India before the Champions Trophy. England are playing a one-off Test against Zimbabwe at Trent Bridge before next month's marquee series at home against India and the away Ashes rubber in Australia.

McCullum's remarks come after comments made by some players dismissing criticism came under scrutiny, forcing England's director of cricket Rob Key to say that they need to 'stop talking rubbish'.

Even last month, fast bowler Mark Wood admitted that they can be 'a bit dumb'. "We've just got to be a bit smarter with some of our comments. What we say in that dressing room is often very different to what you expect to come out in a public forum," McCullum said.

"We've got we just got to be aware of that, smart enough to be able to make sure that we articulate things when we get the opportunity so that we don't

we don't lose touch with the English people." McCullum said he and his team want the fans to be proud of the team. "We want them along for the ride, particularly in the next few series, which could be quite amazing. We want people to look back and say, 'Crikey, that team in the mid-2020s was a hell of a team that we loved following, and we felt as if we were a part of that journey they went on." Since taking charge of the team in 2022, McCullum changed England's style of play, popularly called the 'Bazball' approach, which emphasises on taking positive decisions in attack and defence both with bat and ball.

The move paid dividends initially as from one win

in 17 Tests prior to McCullum's era, England emerged victorious in 10 of their next 11 matches. England are currently second in world rankings, but of late, they have been guilty of producing some sloppy performances. To add to it, England lost all their matches in Champions Trophy in February this year.

"If we look at it at the start, peo-

"If we look at it at the start, people were excited by the way we played," said McCullum. "They were enthralled by the free-wheeling type of cricket and they felt...With a bit of idle time, we get the opportunity to retrospectively look at things and see where things have been over the last few years...What we've achieved, opportunities we've let slip...," the former New Zealand captain



Gujarat Titans eye top as LSG look to salvage pride

Pormer champions Gujarat Titans will aim to extend their winning streak to solidify a toptwo finish when they face a struggling Lucknow Super Giants in their Indian Premier League clash here on Thursday.

With 18 points from 12 matches, table-toppers Titans have already booked their place in the playoffs. However, with Royal Challengers Bengaluru and Punjab Kings close behind on 17 points, the race for a top-two spot is still very much alive.

For Gujarat, everything seems to have fallen into place. Their top-order trio of Orange Cap holder B Sai Sudharsan (617 runs), skipper Shubman Gill (601), and Jos Buttler (500), has been in prolific form, laying the foundation for most of the team's victories. Together, they have racked up 16 half-centuries and a century, dominating the tournament's batting attacks with clinical consistency. Such top-order dominance, however, has left the middle order largely untested. Gujarat's bowling unit has been equally formidable. Their Indian pace battery has led the charge, with Prasidh Krishna being the leading wicket-taker this season after snaring 21 wickets. Mohammed Siraj and lanky left-arm spinner R Sai Kishore have chipped in with 15 wickets each

Adding further firepower to the attack is the return of South African pace ace Kagiso Rabada, who missed most of the season following a suspension for recreational drug use. On the other hand, Lucknow Super Giants saw their playoff hopes dashed after a comprehensive defeat to Sunrisers Hyderabad on Monday. The Rishabh Pant-led side, now on a four-match losing streak, has endured a campaign riddled with inconsistency and injuries.

LSG have leaned heavily on their overseas recruits — Mitchell Marsh, Aiden Markram, and Nicholas Pooran — for runs. The lack of noteworthy contributions from Pant, who has endured a woeful season, and the middle order has compounded their problems.

Injuries to key bowlers further derailed their campaign. Left-arm pacer Mohsin Khan missed the entire season, while express quick Mayank Yadav, who was retained with high hopes, spent most of it on the sidelines. Avesh Khan and Akash Deep also struggled with fitness, leaving LSG's bowling attack depleted. Pant acknowledged the devastating impact these absences have had on the team. "Definitely, it could have been one of our best seasons but coming into the tournament we had a lot of gaps, injuries and as a team we decided to not talk about that, but it became difficult to fill those gaps for us," he said after their previous game.

It is not a sight cricket fans are used to considering CSK's tremendous success in the past. 'No, we don't obviously like being down here, but it's not a motivation. We wanted just a good performance. We're trying to string some performances together. The aim was two good performances (in last two matches).

"Now it'll be one good one to finish. It's probably fitting that we're at the bottom. We've played that type of cricket, so you can't hide away from it," Fleming said after the match. The New Zealander said they know the road ahead and failure of toporder batters has played huge role in the ordinary run. "Our order is not right at

this stage, and that is something that we are always looking to rejig. We've got some strong ideas for next year, so all those facets are covered. But that hasn't been possible this year because of the lack of runs at the top. A lot of the batting positions are determined by how well a start we have, and then guys can fall into line. We haven't had that. So we've been just patching innings up, really, rather than constructing good innings," he explained the reason behind the wretched run.

Pacer Anshul Kamboj has managed to impress this season with his pace and Fleming feels he will be a good asset for India after his selection in A side for the England tour. "His speeds have been around 138, 139 (kph). He is deceptive harder. His big strength is his length and he just gets the ball to wobble. You saw that today on a reasonably flat wicket and he'll do well on that tour (of England) if he gets conditions that seam a bit and a little bit of swing. He'll be an absolute handful. He has got some real potential with both white and red ball. We're happy with his development and the opportunity he has taken this year."

"It's going to be a tough tour. It's not going to be an easy tour because the seniors have retired a lot. So, the young team is leaving. There could be a new captain. So, all these things will add a little bit of pressure," said Rathour, who spoke after Rajasthan Royals' win over Chennai Super Kings on Tuesday.

"But also it's an opportunity to showcase your talent and your ability."

Rathour, who shared a good rapport with all top Indian batters during his stint, said the fans must respect the decision

taken by the senior players.

"All three of them were phenomenal



cricketers who retired. So, I would have loved for them to carry on. But it's, again, a very, very personal decision. I'm close to all three of them.

"So, you know, I would have, as I said, I would have loved to see them play more. But, again, it's a very, very personal decision, I think. And if they've taken this decision, we should respect that," he said.

Rathour, who is the batting coach of RR, was expectedly effusive in his praise for their find of the season, the 14-year-old Vaibhav Suryavanshi, who played a key role in the team signing off with a win against CSK. Instead of an extravagant approach, he took some time and waited before unleashing his shots on Tuesday.

unleashing his shots on Tuesday.
"We've been working with him for quite

some time now, maybe three to four months now. We've seen all these aspects, but it's great to see when he's doing that in a game, in pressure situations, in a big game like even today. You're right, the ball was doing a bit when he went in, hardly got any balls, didn't get on strike too much in the power play," Rathour said.

"The kind of maturity he showed, the kind of temperament he showed, really good for him. And these kind of experiences will definitely make him a better player in coming time."

Rathour rued that despite having a strong batting unit at their disposal, they lost winnable games and also blamed poor fielding for their misery.

They managed to avoid last-place finish and believe that the worst is over.

"I don't think we fielded very well throughout the tournament. Bowling did let us down a few times where you let them score too many runs, 10, 15 extra runs mostly every game.

"And then again, with batting also, batting was our strength. We had retained five batters in the squad, and that is, I believe, our strength. And, you know, we got terrific starts at times," he said.

"We got ourselves into the positions where we should have finished the games, but unfortunately couldn't do that. It hurts," he added.

England prepares for first test against Zimbabwe in 22 years

or England, it's little more than a warm-up match ahead of much sterner examinations to come.

For Zimbabwe, it means everything. Trent Bridge in Nottingham will host a four-day test match — something of a rarity for the usual five-day format but perhaps a sign of the future — from Thursday when England and Zimbabwe meet for the first time at international level in 18 years since a Twenty20 World Cup match in

You need to go back four more years — to Chester-le-Street in 2003 when Jimmy Anderson, a 20-year-old with highlights in his hair, was playing in his first series —

for the last test match between the teams. Zimbabwe's return to English soil continues the African nation's gradual reintegration to test cricket after two decades of political interference, poor governance and sanctions that resulted in the team being exiled from test cricket for around six years. The Zimbabweans didn't play a test from 2005-11. From 2022-24, they played just four tests. But between December last year and August this year, they'll have played in 10 tests, with two-match series against South Africa and New Zealand to come this summer.

Zimbabwe still isn't part of the World Test Championship but, in the bigger picture, progress is being made. Zimbabwe Cricket will receive a touring fee from the England and Wales Cricket Board for being the first test opponent of the summer, ECB chief executive Richard Gould confirmed last year while speaking about the 'huge responsibility' to maintain the strength of bilateral cricket.

Zimbabwe isn't expected to offer much resistance to England, having slumped to a 138-run defeat to a Professional County Club Select XI in Leicester last week. Before that, however, it did earn a first test



victory since 2021 — beating in Bangladesh on the way to sharing the series 1-1.

Debut for Cook

While Zimbabwe's view is very much about the present, England's sights will be on the future. Ahead this summer is a five-test series against India and then an Ashes tour Down Under. For England, it doesn't get much bigger than that, so the match against Zimbabwe will be important preparation, especially for a bowling department at the start of a new era following the test retirements of Stuart Broad (in 2023) and Anderson (last year).

For the Zimbabwe test, England will

give a debut to Sam Cook, fellow pacer Josh Tongue is returning to the team after a two-year absence, and Gus Atkinson is about to start his second summer of test cricket. There are as many question marks about the only specialist spinner in the team, Shoaib Bashir, and the fitness of allrounder Ben Stokes, returning after a hamstring tear to regain the captaincy.

Then there's the batting lineup where opener Zak Crawley and No. 3 Ollie Pope have been retained despite continued speculation about their worthiness in the team. There's the welcome sight of a return for wicketkeeper Jamie Smith after missing the tour of New Zealand in November and December while on paternity leave.

coach Brendon McCullum said 'there's a lot of meat on the bone for us' in the next stage of the so-called 'Bazball' era.

'When we took on a project like this it

When we took on a project like this, it was not about necessarily settling on good," McCullum said. 'I think now's the time, working from a strong base, to be able to shoot for the stars and say, Where can we take this team? What can we achieve?"

The scheduling of a four-day test might be a blow to test purists but England home matches have rarely reached Day 5 under the leadership of McCullum and Stokes since 2022.



he ongoing divorce battle between Tamil actor Ravi Mohan and his estranged wife, Aarti Ravi, has taken center stage on social media once again, with both parties exchanging statements that have fueled public speculation over the past six months. The 'light of your life' brought only darkness to ours. That's the truth," she wrote, referencing Ravi's public remarks about Keneeshaa.
