DATA PROTECTION LAW UNVEILED

The Government of India has unveiled the Digital Personal Data Protection Rules 2025, to be implemented in phases over 12-18 months. The rules aim to empower citizens with greater control over their personal data, protect privacy. and prevent misuse, including spam calls and unauthorised access to digital content. Immediate implementation covers certain provisions. while others-such as registration of consent managers, notices from data fiduciaries, and detailed processing norms-will roll out gradually. A Data Protection Board will oversee compliance and levy penalties for breaches, with fines up to Rs 250 per breach and graded penalties to safeguard small businesses. The rules align with the 2017 Supreme Court judgment recognising privacy as a fundamental right, while also requiring citizens to provide accurate, verifiable information and avoid frivolous complaints. Certain exemptions apply, including legal enforcement, overseas data consent, financial default investigations, and selected Government-backed schemes. The framework represents a

key step in strengthening

digital privacy in India.



NEW US BILL AIMS TO END H1-B

Congresswoman Marjorie **Taylor Greene announced** plans to introduce a bill aiming to eliminate the H-1B visa program entirely, including its pathway to US citizenship, requiring holders to return to their home countries upon visa expiration. Greene described the program as "riddled with fraud and abuse" and blamed it for displacing American workers over decades. Her proposed legislation would allow a limited exemption for medical professionals, capping visas at 10,000 per year, which would be phased out over ten years to build a domestic pipeline of doctors and nurses. Greene emphasised restoring the visa's "temporary" intent, stating foreign workers should eventually return home.

BUMRAH STARS AS SA FALTERS

Jasprit Bumrah's brilliant bowling turned India's bold four-spinner gamble into a stunning display as South Africa were bowled out for 159 on Day 1 of the first Test in Kolkata. Despite a promising 57-run opening stand, South Africa collapsed to 102 for ten in 45 overs, with Bumrah taking 5/27 and Mohammed Siraj adding crucial strikes. Kuldeep Yadav (2/29) and Axar Patel (1/21) contributed key wickets, exploiting the pitch's variable bounce and spin. India ended the day at 37/1, with KL Rahul (13) and Washington Sundar (6)** cautiously reducing the deficit in front of a 36,000-strong crowd.

The decisive majority of BJP-JD (U) alliance in the Bihar polls signals a shifting political equation from the traditional Muslim-Yadav (MY) base to Mahila-Youth support.

The result was the culmination of a carefully managed campaign that blended communication, seat distribution and building a voter coalition broader than anything the State has seen in decades.

High enthusiasm among women and first-time voters, combined with a re-energised JD(U), powered the NDA's appeal

around the double-engine leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chief Minister Nitish Kumar.

The JD(U)'s negotiated seat parity with the BJP signalled an equal partnership and boosted confidence among undecided voters. Nitish's long record on infrastructure, welfare expansion and governance beyond caste lines played a crucial role in consolidating swing communities that had drifted in previous cycles.

In contrast to earlier elections marked by friction and lastminute realignments, the NDA went into this contest with one of its cleanest seat-sharing

arrangements

The BIP and JD(U) agreed to contest an equal 101 seats each — an uncommon balance in Bihar's coalition politics - while allies such as LJP (Ram Vilas), HAM(S) and RLM received seats that matched their regional influence.

This alignment ensured every partner operated within its strongest zones, minimising internal competition and maximising ground-level coordination.

Poll strategist Prashant Kishor's Jan Suraaj Party (JSP) failed to open an account in the Bihar Assembly polls, even though it contested all the seats in its debut electoral fray. A majority of the JSP candidates in 238 constituencies also forfeited their security deposit.

Positioned as a revolutionary third alternative to the ruling NDA and the Opposition INDIA bloc, the party, floated by the former political strategist, failed to galvanise votes in its favour, despite a highpitched campaign and raising pressing issues such as unemployment, migration and dearth of industries.

In many seats, the party's vote count was less than the NOTA (None of the Above) category. Kishor had earlier asserted his party would either be on the top or at the bottom in the seat tally, but that there is no middle ground in the Bihar polls.

The 47-year-old had launched the party, with much fanfare, about a vear ago, after a "pada yatra" that saw him marching across the length and breadth of Bihar over several months.

Speaking at a Tribal Pride Day event in Moratlai village of Pansemal assembly constituency in Barwani district, he said the celebration was a tribute to the sacrifices and valour of tribal icons who shaped India's freedom strug-

gle. The Chief Minister unveiled a grand statue of Birsa Munda and inaugurated development works worth over Rs 133 crore. These include six completed projects and Bhoomi Poojan for five others. He inaugurated the Rs 46-crore Rajpur-Dawana road and performed Bhoomi Poojan for new government college build-ings in Sendhwa and Balwadi. Responding to local demands, he also announced the expansion of lift irrigation schemes in Pansemal and Barla to cover all 51 surrounding villages. Yadav thanked the tribal com-

Yadav thanked the tribal community for preserving their land, culture and identity. Recalling leaders such as Raja Bhabhut Singh, Rani Avantibai, Bhima, Khajya and Birju Nayak, he said the region's history is rooted in resistance against British rule. He extended greetings for National Tribal Pride Day on November 15, which also November 15, which also marks Birsa Munda's 150th birth anniversary. The Chief Minister credited

Municipal Commissioner reviews biobriquette plant model for cleaner city

Bhopal Municipal Commissioner Sanskriti Jain on Friday reviewed the proposed bio-briquette plant model and said it would mark an important step towards cleaner air and better sanitation in the

Jain examined the model at the Mata Mandir municipal office and received a detailed briefing through a PowerPoint presentation on the plant's working. Officials said the civic body is moving to set up the facility on a PPP model to scientifically process horticultural waste.

The plant is being developed on a Public-Private Partnership framework to ensure efficient execution, better technical management and reduced financial burden on the municipal corporation. Officials said this

model will allow the civic body to streamline the disposal of horticultural waste while sharing operational responsibilities with

the private partner. Bio-briquette technology compresses dry organic waste under high pressure to form dense, uniform blocks that burn more efficiently than raw biomass. The briquettes serve as a cleaner fuel alternative, reducing smoke and particulate emissions.

She said the plant, with a capacity of 10 tonnes per day, would help Bhopal manage green waste more efficiently while strengthening environmental protection measures. The project is also expected to generate revenue for the municipal corporation. Preparatory work is under way to establish the plant, which will convert horticultural waste into bio-briquettes for reuse as an eco-friendly fuel alternative.

EOW raids Aastha Foundation in Rs 200-crore embezzlement

¬he Economic Offences Wing (EOW) on Friday conducted extensive searches at the main office of Shri Aastha Foundation for Education Society located on the Sevakunj Hospital and Research Centre campus in Village Kanadiya, Indore. The action was triggered by allega-tions of systematic financial embezzlement exceeding Rs 200 crore, allegedly committed by officials linked to the Chaukse family, which runs multiple educational institutions.

The investigation stems from a complaint filed in August 2025 by Anil Sanghvi. Independent forensic audits carried out by ABMS & Associates and Rajvanshi & Co. uncovered dummy transactions, fake payments, diversion of income, large-scale cash withdrawals and suspected tampering of financial records. These findings led to the registration of an FIR (Case No. 131/2025) on September 12.

According to the probe, hostel and bus fees worth Rs 8.22 crore were diverted to Kalchuri Contractors Limited; bank loans amounting to Rs 34.05 crore, meant for institutional development, were allegedly misused to clear the debts of HK Kalchuri Education Trust; and Rs 30.16 crore was transferred without authorisation to Dr Ramesh Badlani. Payments totalling Rs 42.21 crore were allegedly made to Lucky and Swift Construction without doc-umentation, while Rs 2.25 crore was shown as paid to the nonexistent Vardhman LNCTE. Investigators also found evidence of Rs 49.74 lakh siphoned from government scholarships, Rs 3.18 crore paid to Ahilya Group for land that was never

Pharmaceuticals for fictitious supply orders. Nearly 600 employees were reportedly paid in cash to evade PF and ESI dues. The audit also flagged that Rs 35 crore in cash was withdrawn from LNCT University in May 2025, with more than Rs 20 crore allegedly misappropriated through bogus entries.

Despite repeated notices, the society failed to submit crucial financial records, prompting a court-issued warrant on November 13. EOW teams are seizing original ledgers, bank statements, digital data, CCTV footage, scholarship records, construction bills and compliance files to preserve evidence. In a separate case, EOW Gwalior has filed an FIR against seven individuals for defrauding Vijaya Bank of Rs 7.48 lakh

¬he 78th Aalmi Tablighi Ijtema, one of the world's largest annual Islamic congregations, commenced on Friday morning in Eintkhedi after Fajr prayers.

The four-day gathering, scheduled from November 14 to 17, is expected to draw nearly 12 lakh participants, making it one of the most significant religious events hosted in the region. Devotees from 19 countries—including Indonesia, Kenya, Malaysia, Saudi Arabia, Iran and Morocco—have already arrived, with thousands more continuing to reach the site throughout the day.

Organisers said this year's a special prayer led by a religious larger and more structured than previous editions. The main congregation area spans nearly 120 acres, while parking facilities occupy an additional 350 acres. Overall, the event now covers roughly 600 acres, with the management focusing on crowd flow, sanitation, emergency access and logistical control to ensure

Security measures have been intensified following the recent blast in Delhi. Multi-layered security checks have been established from Bhopal Railway Station to the Ijtema grounds. Inspector General Abhay Singh said that given the international scale of the gathering, all lawenforcement agencies—including district police, intelligence units, GRP, RPF, and specialised emergency teams—are coordinating closely to maintain order, regulate traffic and respond rapidly to any emerging situation.

On Friday, a mass marriage ceremony was organised, featuring grooms and their families were present for the event, during which more than 400 marriages were solemnised with complete simplicity. PWD engineer's son fakes his own abduction to seek Rs 50L ransom

Mandsaur: Mandsaur police Harshul's close friend Ganpat have exposed a fake kidnapping plot orchestrated by Harshul Jain, the 22-year-old son of a PWD engineer, who attempted to extort Rs 50 lakh from his own family to escape mounting debt. The case, initially appearing to be a serious abduction, was solved in less than 24 hours through coordinated technical and field investigation.

According to Shamgarh police, Harshul left his government quarters near the Circuit House on Thursday morning, claiming he was travelling to Kota. At around 4 pm, his family received a call from his mobile number. The caller, posing as a kidnapper, demanded Rs 50 lakh for his release. Alarmed, the family lodged a complaint, prompting an immediate search operation across Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan.

SP'Vinod Kumar Meena formed a special team to track Harshul's movements. Technical surveillance, including phone location tracking and call detail analysis, quickly revealed inconsistencies. The movements recorded from Harshul's handset did not align with his claims, raising suspicion about the authenticity of the abduction.

Dr Manoj Mittal stresses holistic diabetes care for older adults

Manoj Mittal underscored the need for holistic, patientcentred diabetes care for India's growing older population during a World Diabetes Day lecture at People's Medical College on Friday. The session drew faculty members, students and healthcare professionals, all keen to understand the challenges of managing diabetes in ageing individuals. Dr Mittal said diabetes in older adults is often more complicated than in younger people because it overlaps with age-related physiological changes and multiple chronic illnesses. This complexity, he noted, requires clinicians to move away from rigid, uniform glycaemic targets and instead adopt personalised goals that consider a patient's overall health, functional status and preferences. Prevention, routine health screenings and encouraging healthy diet and lifestyle choices, he added, remain central to improving outcomes.

He discussed the careful use of both insulin and noninsulin therapies, highlight-

ing the importance of preventing hypoglycaemia and reducing polypharmacy, which can heighten risks for older patients. Care, he said, must always remain safe, practical and centred on

the individual. Much of his talk revolved around the 5Ms of geriatric care - What Matters Most, Mind, Mobility, Medications and Multicomplexity. Dr Mittal urged healthcare workers to respect patient values, address cognitive and emotional concerns, reduce fall risks, simplify medication regimens and approach interconnected medical and social factors as a whole

rather than in isolation. He also explained how diabetes management must shift across different care settings, from long-term planning in outpatient clinics to ensuring safe transitions in hospitals, supporting independence in nursing facilities and delivering comfort-focused relief in palliative and hospice environments.

The lecture concluded with a lively question-andanswer session on applying these principles in everyday practice.

Governing Council approves key academic expansions

The 13th meeting of the Governing Council of Sanchi Buddhist-Indian Knowledge Studies University on Friday approved several major academic, cultural and infrastructural decisions aimed at strengthening the university's role as a centre for Buddhist studies and Indian knowledge traditions. The meeting, chaired by Vice-Chancellor Prof. Vaidyanath Labh, was held in Bhopal.

A key decision was to house a

Sanchi University comprehensive collection of

books, publications, journals and archival material related to the Sanchi Stupa and associated Buddhist literature in the university library. The council also resolved that the university would publish translations of important Buddhist texts and rare literature in multiple languages to expand access to scholarly resources. The council approved a proposal to establish a Vipassana and

Meditation Centre on campus, where structured Vipassana camps will be organised. Another major decision was the approval to hold the university's first convocation, which will be announced soon. The Governing Council also decided to submit a proposal to the Madhya Pradesh government to acquire an additional 20 acres of land adjoining the campus. The land will be used to develop an international meditation centre, strengthening the university's global outreach in Buddhist studies.

Severe cold wave hits Madhya Pradesh

n unusually sharp drop in temperatures has tightened winter's grip on Madhya Pradesh, with several cities plunging below 10 degree Celsius—setting new records for November. Shahdol's Kalyanpur emerged as the coldest location at 7.2°C, while Bhopal recorded 9.6°C after hovering near the 8-degree mark for nearly a

Indore remained frigid at 8.2°C, with Jabalpur at 9.4°C, Gwalior 10.5°C and Ujjain 11.8°C. Nowgong and Rajgarh in Chhatarpur reported 8.2°C, Umaria 8.6°C, Rewa 8.8°C, and both Chhindwara and Malajkhand logged 9.5°C. Mandla followed closely at 9.6°C.

In Dindori, Collector Anju Pawan Bhadoria ordered schools to start from 8:30 a.m. due to the cold wave. Both Bhopal and Indore continued to stay colder than several northern hill stations—with northern hill stations—with Indore dropping to 7.6°C and Bhopal 8.2°C, compared to Dehradun's 10°C and Shimla's 8.2°C. Rajgarh recorded 7.4°C, Jabalpur 9.9°C, Gwalior 11.4°C, Ujjain 10.7°C. Umaria, and 10.7°C, Umaria and Nowgong 8.4°C, Rewa 8.9°C and Shivpuri 9°C. Pachmarhi reported a comparatively warm 13.4°C.

Dry weather persisted across the state over the last 24 hours even as the cold wave strengthened. Bhopal,

Rajgarh, Shajapur, Rewa, Shahdol, Jabalpur, Nowgong and Shivpuri experienced cold wave conditions, while Indore faced a severe cold wave.

Day temperatures saw little change, remaining 1.7°C to 2.8°C below normal in several divisions. Night temperatures dropped sharply—5.4°C to 5.9°C below normal in Bhopal and Indore, 3.3°C to 4.5°C below normal in Ujjain, Gwalior, Rewa, Jabalpur and Sagar, and 2.4°C below normal in Shahdol. Other divisions recorded near-normal minimum temperatures.

Tension erupts as eviction drive leads to self-immolation attempt

ension erupted during an encroachment removal drive in Indore on Friday when a resident attempted selfimmolation and several others threatened drastic measures to stop the demolition. The incident took place on land belonging to the Annapurna Trust, where the civic team had arrived with police support to remove four allegedly illegal structures.

As the demolition began, a youth climbed onto a tin shed and threatened to touch live electrical wires if officials proceeded. Another man poured kerosene on himself in protest.

The municipal team and police acted quickly, preventing any serious harm and detaining several agi-

Residents claimed they had been living on the land for years and accused authorities of acting without offering relocation support. Civic officials, however, said the land legally belongs to the Trust and that the removal action followed due procedure. The demolition continued after officers managed to calm the protesters and secure the

The incident has renewed debate over eviction practices in the city, highlighting recurring flashpoints over land rights, advance notice and rehabilitation for long-settled occupants. Authorities said additional monitoring will be carried out to ensure the situation remains under control.

Retd HC dies 4 days after being stabbed

70-year-old retired SAF head constable, Naseer Hussain, who was stabbed in the stomach by his son-in-law earlier this week, died during treatment late Thursday evening. Hussain, a resident of Bajaria, had been admitted to hospital in critical condition and remained under observation for four days before succumbing to his injuries, police said.

The accused, Parvez Khan, had been married to Hussain's daughter for about four years. According to police, Khan frequently harassed and assaulted his wife, prompting her to leave his home and return to her parents.

On the night of November 10, Khan went to the family's residence demanding that his wife accompany him back. When Hussain intervened and warned him against further violence, Khan allegedly stabbed him in the abdomen in a fit of rage.

Family members rushed Hussain to hospital, where his condition remained serious until his death on Thursday. Hospital authorities informed the police, who sent the body for post-mortem. The body was handed over to the family on Friday after the autopsy.

Police had initially registered a case of attempted murder and arrested Khan, who was later sent to jail. Following Hussain's death, the case has now been converted to murder under the relevant sections of law.

TI Shilpa Kaurav confirmed that Hussain, who had been under treatment for the stab injury inflicted by Parvez Khan, died late Thursday, prompting the upgrade of charges.

n November 15, the entire nation celebrates Tribal Pride Day. Madhya Pradesh, home to the country's largest tribal population, marks this day with even greater enthusiasm. This is not merely a day of celebration, but an occasion to remember the indomitable courage, sacrifice and struggle of the countless tribal heroes who did not receive the recognition they truly deserved in the history of India's freedom movement.

Birsa Munda was a people's hero who launched the struggle against British tyranny long Singh, before Bhagat Chandrashekhar Azad, and Mahatma Gandhi. At a time when the organized national freedom movement had not even begun, he united tribal communities in the remote forests and hills of Jharkhand, regions with almost non-existent communication, and boldly challenged British rule. The tribal society honours him

with the title "Dharti Aaba", meaning Father of the Earth. He took the message of self-rule to jungles, valleys, and villages with the slogan, "Abua raj ete jana, Maharani raj tundu jana" (Let our rule prevail, let the Queen's rule end).

In year 1900, alarmed by the rapid spread of his movement, the district magistrate called in police and military forces, who opened fire on a gathering at Dombivadi Hill, killing nearly 400 people. This incident was similar to Jallianwala Bagh massacre that occurred 19 years later, yet it never received the place it deserved in historical narra-

After his arrest, the British decided to parade him in chains to court to demonstrate the consequences of rebellion. But the plan backfired—thousands of people gathered along the road just to see him. He was kept in solitary confinement for three months and is believed to have been administered slow poison. Ultimately, he was martyred at the age of just 25.

Tribal Pride Day

Once the British consolidated their power in India, they began exploiting natural resources, especially forests, which brought them into direct conflict with tribal communities.

Nearly 25 years before the Revolt of year 1857, martyr Budhu Bhagat sounded the bugle of rebellion in Chotanagpur against British policies of seizing water, land, and forests. This uprising is known as the Lakra Rebellion. His movement was so intense that the East India Company announced a reward of ?1000 for his capture, a significant sum at

the time. Sidu and Kanhu Murmu led the Santhal Rebellion (Hul Movement) in year 1855-56. In June 1855, 50,000 Santhals from 400 villages gathered in Bhognadih, marking the beginning of the movement. Their slogan was—"Do or die... British, leave our land." The Santhals faced British guns with bows and arrows. Karl Marx in his "Notes

on Indian history" described the Santhal rebellion as India's first organised people's revolution. In Madhya Pradesh's Nimar region, the very name evokes memories of Tantya Mama or Bhil. Known as the Lion of Nimar, he stood nearly seven feet tall and possessed a charismatic warrior's aura. He redistributed wealth and grain seized from the British to the poor, earning him the title 'India's Robin Hood'. His name struck fear in British cantonments,

where extra security was maintained with the warning, "Tantya might arrive." Eventually, he was captured through deceit, hanged in Jabalpur, and his body was displayed at Patalpani to intimidate the public. His capture was reported even in the international press, including the New York Times in November 1889—revealing the extent of trouble he caused the

British in a small region of Nimar-Malwa. Similarly, Raja Shankar Shah and Kunwar Raghunath Shah were

the first royals in India to be tied

to cannons and blown apart by the British during the suppression of the year 1857 revolt. The judicial commission offered them several options, including religious conversion, to save their lives, but they refused. They were executed in Jabalpur by the brutal method known as

"blowing from a gun." In Madhya Pradesh too, the BJP government has revived the tradition of honouring tribal icons. Chhindwara University has been renamed after Shankar Shah; Habibganj Railway Station in Bhopal has been renamed after Rani Kamlapati; Pachmarhi Wildlife Sanctuary and Patalpani Railway Station have been announced to be renamed after Raja Bhabhut Singh and Tantya Bhil. The state government has even held cabinet meetings in Singrampur (Damoh) and Pachmarhi (Narmadapuram) to honour tribal heroes.

Rail Ministry prioritises staff training amid safety concerns

The Railway Ministry has advised its zones to focus on staff training and fill faculty vacancies, as it took note of recent reports of parliamentary committees on safety issues that flagged gaps in periodic induction, refresher and promotional training of personnel.

The ministry, while referring to the reports, said the lack of advanced training of railway employees and a large number of vacancies in training institutes are potentially jeopardising the safety of train movement.

Acting on the recommendations of the parliamentary committees, the ministry wrote to all railway zones, saying that developing an efficient, safety-oriented workforce aligned with future technological requirements is of utmost impor-

"It is therefore advised that a robust mechanism be established to effectively monitor training at the induction, refresher, and promotional stages, ensuring that no staff at the field or supervisory level misses the mandatory training at any stage and that all related training data are comprehensively recorded," the letter said. "Further, necessary steps may be taken to ensure that all sanctioned faculty positions across various training institutes are duly filled," it added.

The ministry said the Public Accounts Committee on "Derailment in Indian Railways" and the Standing Committee on Railways in their reports have observed gaps in periodic induction, refresher and promotional

Nabi's house demolished after Delhi blast MOHIT KANDHARI

A multi-storey house, belonging to Dr Umar Un Nabi, who allegedly triggered the car blast near the Red Fort Metro station on November 10, was demolished using explosives during the intervening night of November 13-14 in south Kashmir's Pulwama district.

A total of 13 people were killed and 20 others were injured in the terror attack orchestrated by the members of a 'White Collar' terror module.

Investigation into the blast has so far revealed that Umar, a doctor at Al-Falah University in Faridabad, was driving the Hyundai i20 car that exploded near a traffic signal on the Netaji Subhash Marg near Red Fort.

His presence in the car was later confirmed by matching DNA samples found at the blast site and collected from his mother.

To avoid collateral damage in the built-up area, the neighbours and the family members of the terror suspect were directed to shift to safer locations before the house was demolished. The local police authorities have not issued any statement on the demolitions till late evening. The demolition of his

house in Kashmir is aimed at sending a stern message to those backing terrorist activities on Indian soil. Earlier, homes of local

terrorists of Pakistan-based Lashkar-e-Taiba—Adil Hussain Thoker of Bijbehara and Aasif Sheikh of Tral and others were razed to the ground after the Pahalgam terror attack. Their names figured in

the list of local terrorists who were part of the bigger terror module behind the Pahalgam massacre. The car blast near Red

Fort was triggered within hours after a recovery of



about 2,900 kg of bomb-making material and sophisticated weapons such as Faridabad. This recovery

was made from Muzammil and Shaheen Saeed, doctors and associates of Umar. assault rifles from Both doctors are now in custody and are being ques-

Ghazwat Ul-Hind plotted to carry out a much bigger attack, and the Delhi blast was the result of Umar panicking after his associates were arrested.

Reacting to the demolition of Dr Umar Nabi's home, former Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister and PDP chief Mehbooba Mufti said the "harshest recourse' should be taken against those involved in the Delhi

blast, "but as per the law". Srinagar MP Aga Ruhullah Mehdi said that demolishing a home doesn't deliver "punishment", but that it only inflicts collective suffering. "Making an entire family homeless during the harsh winter of Kashmir without evidence/court order, or any law linking them to the incident is an act of cruelty. It doesn't bring justice to the innocent lives that we lost in the terror attack, and it doesn't achieve the ends of justice," he said.

Nitish Kumar posters dominate Patna

As the NDA appeared to

register a landslide victory in Bihar on Friday, Patna's skyline saw a visual grammar of its own-bold, swaggering and unmistakably centered on one man: Nitish Kumar. As the NDA's advantage

solidified through the morning, freshly minted posters began appearing across the city, leaving no ambiguity about who, in the JD(U)'s telling, remained Bihar's central axis of power.

Outside the chief minister's residence, a massive poster of Nitish Kumar standing beside a crouching tiger, with the tagline 'tiger abhi zinda hai' (the tiger is still alive), became the first further, stating simply, *Bihar* showstopper of the *ka matlab Nitish Kumar* morning. The imagery was not subtle. It was defiant, triumphant, and unmistakably aimed at setting the tone before the numbers settled. Through the day, more posters sprouted across arterial stretches, roundabouts, party offices neighbourhood corners, as though Patna itself had been cast in a

ID(U) production. One declared: 'Humaare Bihar mein ek star, har baar Nitish Kumar' (in our Bihar, there is only one star; every time, it is Nitish Kumar). The design was more striking, a towering image of Nitish, with a smaller photograph of Prime Minister Narendra Modi in the backdrop.

Another went even the JD(U), the posters

(Bihar means Nitish Kumar), a sweeping assertion that sought to blur the line between individual and the

state's identity.
Political observers said the visual grammar made the JD(U)'s message crystal clear: In Bihar's political theatre, Nitish Kumar is not just the protagonist, he is the plot. "The line 'Hamaare Bihar mein ek star' is not just praise. It is a reminder that whatever the arithmetic at the Centre, Bihar's leadership mantle is that of Nitish ji," a JD(U) worker told a TV channel, pointing to the posters. The timing was even more telling.

Even though the BJP was leading in more seats than counter to weeks of speculation, fanned by the Mahagathbandhan and pockets of the political commentariat that the BJP might project a new CM face after the polls.

doubled as a calibrated

Both parties had publicly dismissed the buzz, but the visuals on Friday morning appeared crafted to silence it once and for all.

For the JD(U) cadre, the posters worked as reassurance and assertion in equal measure: reassurance that Nitish was firmly in command, and assertion that within the NDA, hierarchy had its own logic, and Nitish Kumar remained its senior-most partner in Bihar. The visuals appeared almost in lockstep with

MY win for Bihar

The NDA's landslide rested on a re-engineered caste coalition that stretched well beyond its traditional anchors. The BJP secured a consolidated uppercaste vote, while JD(U) retained its Kurmi base and made substantial inroads among Extremely Backward Classes (EBCs).

At the same time, LJP (Ram Vilas) and HAM(S) succeeded in strengthening their standing among Dalit

and Mahadalit communities. This broad coalition outpaced the Mahagathbandhan's dependence on the Muslim-Yaday axis. A new voting bloc emerged in the form of the "MY" (Mahila-Youth) factor - a demographic that the NDA dominated. Strategic welfare initiatives and targeted outreach enabled the alliance to knit together groups that were once electorally scattered. Women voters ultimately shaped the outcome. In several districts, female turnout surpassed male turnout by 10 to 20 percentage points. The extensive network of Jeevika Didis ensured smooth mobilisation, particularly in rural areas where women often face barriers to reaching polling stations. Nitish Kumar's long-term focus on female empowerment - through welfare schemes, educational incentives and social support networks - paid off at the ballot box. The addition of more than 1.4 million first-time voters, many of them young women, created an advantage that the Opposition struggled to counter.

Verdict redraws Bihar's power equations

The BJP's winning streak extended across the state: Shreyasi Singh dominated Jamui with a margin of 54,498; Nitin Nabin protected urban BJP turf in Bankipur by 51,936 votes; and Nitish Mishra triumphed in Jhanjharpur with 54,849 votes. The successes of Jibesh Kumar in Jale, Prem Kumar in Gava Town, and Renu Devi in Bettiah underscored the party's rural-urban equilibrium

and its well-distributed leadership. The JD(U) matched the BJP stride for stride, powered by veteran anchors who ensured stability in the party's core belts. Leading the pack was Kaladhar Prasad Mandal, who delivered the single largest winning margin of these elections:

73.572 votes in Rupauli. In Gopalpur, seasoned JD(U) leader Shailesh Kumar (Bulo Mandal) captured 1,08,630 votes and won with a margin of 58,135, reinforcing the party's dominance in Extremely Backward Class pockets. Senior minister Vijay Kumar Choudhary, handling key portfolios including Water Resources and Parliamentary Affairs in the Bihar government, secured Sarairanjan with a margin of 20,798 votes. Minister Shravon Kumar protected Nalanda with 33,008 votes, a seat central to JD(U)'s political identity. Other major ID(U) gains included Kaushal Kishore in Rajgir (margin 55,428), Sheela Kumari in Phulparas, Leshi Singh in Dhamdaha, Maheshwar Hazari in Kalyanpur, and Aniruddha Prasad Yadav in Nirmali. The much-watched battle of Mokama went to Anant Singh, who defeated RJD's Veena Devi by 28,206 votes, delivering yet another blow to the RID's senior ranks.

For the RID, the election was a mixed ledger tilted sharply toward disappointment. While Tejashwi Yadav held Raghopur with a margin of 14,532 votes, the reduced gap from his 2020 margin signalled weakened momentum. The losses of leaders like Awadh Bihari Chaudhary and Veena Devi further deepened the party's concerns. A few bright spots offered some consolation. First-time candidate Osama Shahab claimed Raghunathpur with 9,248 votes, and former minister Alok Kumar Mehta held on to Ujiarpur by

Taken together, Bihar's 2025 verdict is more than a numerical win. It is a recalibration of political strength, fortifying the NDA's pillars, expanding its base with new entrants, and leaving the RJD facing a critical test of strategy and leadership renewal.

Bypolls deliver setbacks to ruling parties

In Nagrota, BJP's Devyani Rana defeated Jammu and Kashmir National Panthers Party (JKNPP) candidate Harsh Dev Singh by 24647 votes. NC candidate Shamim Begum, who got 10872 votes, lost her deposit. Rana is the daughter of former MLA

Devender Singh Rana, whose death necessitated the bypoll. Opposition PDP's Aga Syed Muntazir won the Budgam bypoll in Jammu and Kashmir, defeating ruling NC candidate Aga Syed Mehmood by a margin of 4,478 votes. The bypoll in Budgam was necessitated after Chief Minister Omar Abdullah vacated the seat and chose his family bastion of Ganderbal after winning from both constituencies in the assembly elections last year. This is the first time that the NC has lost in its bastion of Budgam, in central Kashmir, since the first elections for the legislative assembly were held in 1957.

Congress' wins came in Anta assembly constituency in Rajasthan and Jubilee Hills in Telangana. In Anta, Pramod Jain Bhaya defeating his nearest rival and BJP nominee Morpal Suman by a margin of 15,612 votes. The bypoll was necessitated after BJP MLA Kanwar Lal Meena was disqualified following his conviction in a criminal case.

The ruling AAP retained the Tarn Taran assembly seat in Punjab with its candidate Harmeet Singh Sandhu defeating his nearest rival and SAD nominee Sukhwinder Kaur Randhawa by a margin of 12,091 votes. The Tarn Taran seat fell vacant after the death of AAP MLA Kashmir Singh Sohal in June.

IMM candidate Somesh Chandra Soren beat his nearest rival Babulal Soren of the BIP in the byelection to the Ghatshila assembly seat in Jharkhand by over 38,500 votes. Somesh is the son of JMM MLA Ramdas Soren, whose death on August 15 necessitated the bypoll. The Dampa seat fell vacant following the death of incumbent Mizo National Front (MNF) legislator Lalrintluanga Sailo on July 21.

Phoenix soars in Patna

Women's empowerment, roads, electricity, education, and safety triumphed over rhetoric.

The NDA's women-centric policies emerged as the decisive factor, mirroring the success of similar models in Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra. The Mukhyamantri Mahila Rojgar Yojana, offering start-up grants and mentorship for aspiring women entrepreneurs, created a direct emotional and economic link with a key

Just as the Ladli Behna initiative in Madhya Pradesh and Majhi Ladki Bahin programme in Maharashtra cemented a loyal female vote, Bihar's version created a quiet but powerful groundswell. Even recipients awaiting their first instalment voiced confidence that "as long as Nitish is there, the money will come." A recordhigh turnout among women — outnumbering men by almost 10 percentage points — appears

to have decisively favoured the BJP-led coalition. Beyond women-focused outreach, the Nitish government targeted grassroots benefits: free electricity for the first 125 units, tablets and smartphones for Vikas Mitras and Shiksha Sevaks, and enhanced pensions for the elderly and disabled. Construction workers received new clothing allowances, while ASHA, Anganwadi, and Jeevika workers saw their honorariums rise. Together with the promise of one crore jobs over five years, these measures crafted an image of inclusive governance and welfare continuityhelping replicate the success of women-driven victories seen in other BIP bastions.

Kumar's own revival mid-campaign also played a critical role: his high-energy rallies and emphatic speeches countered speculation over his health and suitability for another term. His declaration that he had "never sought personal gain in life," captured in a widely shared video, seemed to strike a chord across Bihar's caste divides. Nitish Kumar's staying power lies in a rare political equation. Through careful social engineering —bringing together Extremely Backward Classes, Mahadalits, and non-Yadav OBCs — he has maintained a durable coalition of trust.

RJD wins votes, loses Bihar polls

The BJP stands at 20.40 per cent, while the JD(U) has 18.83 per cent.

The RJD entered the 2025 race relying on its traditional Muslim-Yaday (MY) base, which forms roughly 30 per cent of Bihar's electorate. Tejashwi struggled to win over Extremely Backward Classes (EBCs), Dalits, and aspirational youth, who over the past decade have steadily shifted toward the JD(U)-BJP combine. The MY formula, crafted by Lalu Prasad Yadav in 1990 after the Bhagalpur riots, once

powered the party's uninterrupted rule until 2005. But in 2025, Tejashwi failed to expand beyond

The much-publicised 2023 caste survey, pitched by the RJD as a milestone for backward caste empowerment, failed to generate broader traction, with critics dismissing it as a political tool rather than a transformative step.

Tejashwi's failure to treat allies — the Congress Left parties, and smaller partners — as equals led to major strategic errors and weakened coalition cohesion. Seat-sharing tensions and his RIDcentric approach caused internal friction and poor vote transfers. He branded the alliance manifesto as Tejashwi's Pledge and sidelined allies in campaign material, where Rahul Gandhi's photos appeared notably smaller.

His campaign leaned heavily on big populist romises – government jobs for every household, expanded pensions, and a review of the liquor ban — but lacked credible implementation plans. The absence of a clear blueprint for funding and executing the job for every household pledge fueled voter distrust.

Tejashwi's attempt to balance Lalu Prasad Yadav's complex legacy produced a muddled strategy. While he embraced Lalu's social justice plank, he simultaneously distanced himself from the jungle raj image by reducing Lalu's presence on posters — a contradiction the NDA capitalised on. Despite efforts to recast the RID as a governance- and welfare-focused party, the shadow of the 1990-2005 period - widely labelled jungle raj -remained a major deterrent. The NDA, especially the JD(U), reinforced this contrast by noting that elections today see minimal violence compared to earlier decades, citing that in the 1985, 1990, and 1995 polls, dozens were killed and repolling was ordered in hundreds of booths. Nitish Kumar's rep utation for stability and improved law and order further overshadowed Tejashwi's promises.

This election marks the RJD's second-worst performance in Bihar. In the 2005 Assembly polls when Nitish Kumar swept to power with a thumping NDA victory — the RJD won 55 seats. At the time, Rabri Devi was Chief Minister and the party was battling deep anti-incumbency. Nitish Kumar, in alliance with the BJP, ended the RJD's long rule. The party's worst performance came in 2010, when it secured just 22 seats.

partnership with the Congress, had exhibited a stupendous performance by claiming victory on 37 of the 80 Lok Sabha seats, which was instrumental in spoiling the BIP's arithmetic in the 2024 General Elections.

Posturing for a bold move, Yadav said that the "game" carried out through SIR in Bihar has now been exposed, and that such "election conspiracies" will not be possible in West Bengal, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh or anywhere else. "Like CCTV, our 'PPTV,' or 'PDA (Backwards, Dalit, Minority) Prahari (watchdog)' will remain vigilant and thwart the BJP's plans," he said.

The months-long SIR in Bihar concluded with the Election Commission (EC) publishing the final voters' list

on September 30. The exercise drew sharp protests from the opposition, which accused the poll panel of working at the behest of the ruling BJP, a charge it flatly rejected. Yadav further said the BJP is "not a party, but a fraud".

As the Congress and the

Mahagathbandhan suffered a humiliating defeat in the Bihar elections, calls for introspection and course correction started emerging from the opposition bloc, with some criticising the concentration of power in a few hands.

Mumtaz Patel alleged that the party's failures are a result of giving power in the hands of leaders who are totally disconnected from the ground reality. In a social media post, she said it is time to look within and accept the reality. She asked how long the loyal party workers have to wait to witness success.

Another partner of the INDIA bloc, Shiv Sena (UBT) leader Priyanka Chaturvedi, who was formerly with the Congress, urged opposition leaders to speak to the women of the country. "Dear Opposition Leaders. Unsolicited advise. Speak to the women of the country. An alternative cannot be without them. Thank you," she said in a social media post.

Congress leader and Lok Congress stalwart late Sabha MP Shashi Tharoor the results, do some serious introspection, and look into the organisational mistakes that led to such a verdict.

J&K bypolls: National Conference suffers twin defeats in Budgam, Nagrota

bypolls on Friday.

In a stunning reversal of fortunes just one year after the National Conference (NC) dominated the Jammu and Kashmir Assembly elections, the ruling party on Friday lost its longstanding stronghold of Budgam to the People's Democratic Party (PDP) and Nagrota to the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in the

In Budgam (central Kashmir), PDP candidate Aga Syed Muntazir Mehdi clinched victory with 21,534 votes, defeating NC's Aga Syed Mehmood (17,382 votes) by a margin of 4,152 votes. An independent candidate, Jibran Dar, disrupted IKNC calculations by siphoning off 7,152 votes, enough to dent Mehmood's tally and hand PDP the edge in a three-way split.

The trends from Bihar's vote count have thrown the spotlight on the NDA's calibrated, data-led campaign architecture—and at the centre of this strategy is Madhya Pradesh Chief Minister Mohan Yadav.

His targeted outreach across Bihar's competitive constituencies is emerging as one of the most consequential factors in the alliance's strong early performance. NDA-backed candidates are leading in 21 of the 25 seats where Yadav campaigned, a statistic that party strategists view as evidence of his growing electoral traction beyond Madhya Pradesh.

Yadav's campaign in Bihar was designed as a tactical intervention rather than a symbolic visit. The brief was clear: energise voter groups that had remained politically dormant, create visible momentum in constituencies with narrow margins, and tighten booth-level mobilisation using his reputation for organisational discipline. His rallies were built around sharp, governancefocused messaging—centred on economic stability, welfare delivery and alignment with national priorities-which resonated strongly with voters looking for predictable, executiondriven politics. According to party insid-

ers, what strengthened Yadav's impact was his communication style. While Bihar politics often leans towards emotive rhetoric, Yadav brought a data-backed, administrative approach, emphasising measurable outcomes and performance indicators. This contrast, strategists say, allowed the NDA to broaden its appeal among undecided voters



who were fatigued by political theatrics and wanted a more grounded narrative.

The NDA's Bihar playbook this cycle reflects a corporate-style deployment model that prioritises operational efficiency. High-performing leaders are assigned to lowtraction geographies to unlock incremental vote share, energise cadres, and stabilise campaign messaging. Yadav's assignment suggests the alliance's confidence in his growing brand equity—an asset the party is now deploying strategically across state borders. If the current leads consol-

idate into actual wins, it would offer empirical validation for the NDA's cross-state leadership mobility strategy. It would also strengthen the case for expanding the roles of regional chief ministers in national campaigns—particularly those with a reputation for administrative preci-

sion and on-ground delivery. For the opposition, Yadav's successful intervention exposes a strategic weakness: the absence of a comparable leadership pipeline capable of driving momentum in unfamiliar terrain. Bihar's early trends indicate that voters responded to consistency and credibility-two areas where the NDA's messaging, aided by Yadav's presence, held a clear advantage. The broader political take-

away is straightforward. Bihar's electorate rewarded a campaign anchored in discipline, governance outcomes and structural clarity. As the NDA prepares for upcoming electoral cycles, the momentum generated in Bihar will likely reinforce the alliance's reliance on cross-state campaigners like Mohan Yadav. For the opposition, the runway for course correction is getting shorter.

Kerala HC refuses to entertain State's plea to defer SIR



The Kerala High Court (HC) on Friday refused to admit the plea filed by the State Government seeking deferment of the special intensive revision (SIR) of electoral rolls being undertaken by the Election Commission of India (ECI) Justice VG Arun said that judicial discipline requires the High Court to not entertain the plea since petitions concerning SIR in other States are already pending before the Supreme Court. The Judge said that the State may approach the Supreme Court, as matter is pending there

"Judicial discipline and comity requires this court to not entertain this petition. Therefore this writ petition is closed leaving it open for the petitioner to move the Supreme Court or approach this court depending on the outcome of the petitions pending before the Supreme Court," the Court said. The Kerala Government filed the plea in light of the upcoming panchayat elections in

According to the plea, the elections would require about 1,76,000 Government personnel apart from 68,000 security personnel. The conduct of SIR would require the services of an additional 25,668 personnel. The same officials would have to be deployed for duties in connection with SIR and panchayat elections and this would strain the human resources of the State, it

ED moves Kerala HC seeking case files in Sabarimala gold case

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Friday approached the Kerala High Court seeking documents related to two cases probed by the Special Investigation Team (SIT) in the Sabarimala gold theft incident, for initiating a probe under the Prevention of Money

Laundering Act (PMLA).

In its petition, the ED said it had received information indicating that the accused's modus operandi in the two cases probed by the SIT showed that valuable temple property was illicitly diverted and its proceeds converted for personal gain, thereby giving rise to proceeds of crime as defined under the PMLA.

The agency said that as the sole authority to investigate money laundering activities, it was duty-bound to initiate an inquiry under the PMLA to trace, identify, and attach the proceeds of crime arising from the alleged offences.

The ED stated that it had approached the Judicial First Class Magistrate Court in Ranni, Pathanamthitta. last month seeking certified copies of the FIRs and First Information Statements (FISs) in the two cases.

However, the Magistrate dismissed the request on October 17, citing the sensitive nature of the case and noting that the investigation was being monitored by the Kerala

High Court. The ED argued in its petition that the Magistrate had incorrectly held that an investigation by another agency was prohibited by the High Court. It said the High Court had earlier directed that the FIRs registered by the Crime Branch be handed over to the SIT.

"There is no prohibition whatsoever on another investigation agency probing offences under a special legislation.

The wrong interpretation of the order of the Division Bench is farfetched and liable to be interfered with," the agency said.

The High Court will hear the ED's petition on Monday. Meanwhile, former Travancore Devaswom Board secretary S Jayashree on Friday moved the High Court seeking anticipatory bail in the case related to the loss of gold from the Dwarapalaka (guardian deity) idols.

She approached the HC after her anticipatory bail plea was dismissed by the Pathanamthitta District Principal Sessions Court.

In her petition, she expressed apprehension about her possible arrest, cited health issues, and denied any involvement in the case.

The High Court will consider her petition on Tuesday.





CJI to deal with claim of bias at Chennai NCLAT

The sensational claim that a senior High Court judge approached a judicial member of NCLAT, Chennai for an order favouring a scanner of the Supreme Court on Friday which said that the matter will be dealt with by the Chief Justice of India on the administrative side. Advocate Prashant Bhushan claimed before the top court that according to his information, "the message came

"The larger issue raised in the matter is of vital importance and will be dealt with by the Chief Justice of India on the administrative side," the bench told Bhushan, appear-



ing for a private firm AS Metcorp Private Ltd, in whose matter the judicial member of the NCLAT, Chennai recused himself.

It requested the NCLAT Chairperson Justice Ashok Bhushan to hear the matter in a bench headed by him and adjudicate the dispute at the earliest.

The top court also directed the interim resolution professional (IRP) appointed by the National Company Law Tribunal at Hyderabad to proceed in the insolvency dispute. According to the bench, the said judicial

member has recorded the incident in his order before recusing himself from hearing the matter, is enough for looking at the issue on the administrative "Consequently, we direct that the company appeal pending before NCLAT, Chennai be transferred alongwith all records to the Principal bench, NCLAT at New Delhi in the peculiar facts of the case. We request the President, NCLAT to list the company appeal before his bench and decide the same after notice to the contesting party at the earliest," the top court

ordered. The Bench said that there can be no qualm that all other issues are of vital public importance and the competent authority must have examined the available material and taken necessary steps as may be required.

"In any case, all these issues can be effectively dealt with by the Chief Justice of India on the administrative side. We thus deem it appropriate to keep this writ petition as a representation bringing on record information for consideration by CJI. Let the law take its own course," the top court said.

On August 13, 2025, during the hearing in the NCLAT, Justice Sharad Kumar Sharma created a sensation by stating in an open court that he had received messages from a judiciary pressing him to rule in favour of a particular party. He also showed the messages on his phone to one of the counsels present and immediately recused himself.

According to the petitioner private firm, the approach was allegedly made to favour the other party. Justice Sharma recorded in the order, which was uploaded later the same day, that he was approached by "one of the most revered members of the higher judiciary" but did not mention on whose behalf the approach was made.

The writ petition before the top court sought registration of an FIR for offences under the PCA disclosed by the incident, including provisions of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS). It said the Supreme Court's earlier ruling had held that a criminal investigation into alleged judicial corruption cannot be substituted by any internal "inhouse" fact-finding. The private firm has also sought a court-monitored probe by an independent agency after preserving the electronic evidence, including video and audio of the August 13, proceedings, which the NCLAT registrar has refused to share, citing a lack of enabling rules.

Jharkhand HC pronounced 32 judgements in 61 pending cases: SC told

The Supreme Court was on Friday informed that the Jharkhand High Court has delivered 32 judgements were reserved for over six months.

The Jharkhand High Court had come under the top court's scanner for not pronouncing verdicts for years, particularly in criminal matters including death and life

A bench of justices Surya Kant and Joymalya Bagchi was told by senior advocate Ajit Sinha, appearing for the High Court, that the remaining iudgements will be pronounced within a month's time and judges have been working on them.


"They have delivered 32 judgments till now and the remaining will be done in a month's time. The oral message of the court was placed before the judges of the High Court and they are working on home guards. On May 16, the top

Sinha said. The bench told the counsel that the court will be taking a holistic view in the matter and posted it for hearing in January and tagged it with pending matters.

On August 8, the top court suggested the Jharkhand High Court judges to take leave for penning verdicts after observing there were dozens of cases in which judgments weren't pronounced.

It had asked the judges to take their sanctioned leaves and complete the pending work. Sinha had earlier informed the court that till January 31, there were 61 cases in which judgements were not pronounced after reserving the verdicts for over six months.

The top court had passed the order in a batch of pleas in which students of faraway tribal areas of Jharkhand complained of judgements not being pronounced since 2023 in cases on appointments of

court asked the High Court to file a status report of pending cases in which judgements were reserved on or before January 31 in both criminal and civil cases.

Students complained their case was last heard on April 6, 2023 but no verdict was pronounced.

SC lambasts Punjab Govt over lack of infrastructure for judiciary

The Supreme Court (SC) on Friday lambasted the AAP led Government in Punjab for not creating requisite infrastructure for the judiciary and rather building houses for itself besides misusing central grants. A bench of justices Surya Kant and Joymalya Bagchi pulled up the State Government for failing to create even basic infrastructure despite repeated directions from the Punjab and Haryana High Court and pointed out that funds provided by the Centre meant for judiciary may have been utilised somewhere else by the State officials.

"If we order an inquiry, we will find out that they have already consumed the central grant for other purposes. They are building houses for themselves but cannot construct courts and create judicial infrastructure," Justice Kant observed.

The top court was hearing a plea of the Punjab Government challenging the orders of the Punjab and Haryana High Court for creating appropriate judicial infrastructure and transit accommodation for judicial officers in the newly-created Malerkotla district of the state. Punjab advocate general Maninderjit Singh Bedi submitted that the State has created posts and facilities for Malerkotla judges and required infrastructure is being created.

Senior advocate Abhishek Singhvi, who also appeared for the Punjab Government, submitted that the High Court's criticism of the State

Government was unjustified and unwarranted. He added that the issue before the High Court was

The High Court while hearing a PIL had recorded that Malerkotla was declared a revenue district in June 2021 and a separate sessions division was approved in August 2023, but the State had not created permanent courtrooms or residences for the district and sessions judge and other judges.

On August 22, it directed the state to issue fresh administrative and financial approval for two additional courtrooms in the existing complex and asked the High Court's building committee to examine whether the deputy commissioner's guest house and other buildings occupied by executive officers could be used for judges.

The High Court in September took a strong view and flagged repeated delays despite the building committee's resolution and directed that the guest house presently occupied by the deputy commissioner and another house occupied by the Senior Superintendent of Police be vacated and allotted to the district and sessions judge as residence and, if possible, as a courtroom space.

Aggrieved by the order, the Punjab Government challenged the order before the Supreme Court.

The corporation had issued a demand notice on March 27, 1996, claiming ₹51,18,450 from the association on account of advertisement tax for the inaugural ceremony and a semifinal match of the 1996 World Cup held at the Eden Gardens.

The inaugural ceremony of the World Cup was organised by the association on February 11, 1996, while the semifinal match was held on March 13, 1996.

A plea filed by the Kolkata Municipal Corporation challenging an order of June this year by a division bench of the Calcutta High Court came up for hearing on Friday before a bench of Justices Vikram Nath and Sandeep Mehta.

The High Court's division bench had dismissed an appeal filed by the corporation against an April 2015 order of its single judge. The division bench had said Eden Gardens stadium cannot be held to be a "public place". The single judge had allowed a plea filed by the Cricket Association of Bengal challenging the demand notice.

The top court dismissed the corporation's plea against the High Court's order.

In its order, the High Court's division bench had noted that the Cricket Association of Bengal enjoys a lease of the Eden Gardens in Kolkata and the owner of the property is

India. It had said that certain advertisements were put up both inside and outside the stadium during the 1996 Cricket World Cup. The corporation had issued a demand notice on account of advertisement tax for the two days of the World Cup by invoking provision of the Kolkata Municipal Corporation Act, 1980, which deals with tax on advertisements.

The association had challenged the demand notice before the High Court contending that the concerned advertisements were displayed within the Eden Gardens stadium which was not a public place and the same were not visible to the public from

a public street or a public place. A single judge of the High Court had guashed the demand notice after which the

corporation had moved the division bench. Before the High Court's division bench, the counsel appearing for the municipal corporation had argued that when advertisements were deployed either inside or outside the Eden Gardens stadium, such advertise-

ments were visible from a public place.

"In our opinion, as soon as conditions are imposed on members of the public for having access to a place, that place ceases to be a public place. A public place must be accessible to an indeterminate number of people without any hindrance or condition," the division bench had said.

It had said that the public does not have absolute or unrestricted right of access to Eden Gardens and just because the stadium can accommodate a huge number of people, that would not per se make it a public place.

The division bench of the High Court had refused to interfere with the single judge's order and dismissed the appeal filed by the Ministry of Defence, Government of the corporation.

Exit polls were right: NDA wins fair and square

NDA's thumping victory shows that elections in Bihar are won not with rhetoric alone, but with organisation and careful social-coalition management

The exit polls were right all along. Bihar has chosen to give another five years to the NDA with thumping majority. What may be debated is not the victory itself, but the margin of it. The National Democratic Alliance's emphatic win in the Bihar elections marks one of the most decisive mandates the state has witnessed in recent years. What makes this outcome remarkable is not merely the scale of the majority, but the clarity with which voters opted for continuity over change, organisation over loose alliances, and national issues over the local ones.

The opposition's inability to convert anti-incumbency into electoral advantage saw the smooth sailing for the NDA. Although dissatisfaction existed, it did not consolidate into a demand for change. Voters preferred stability and alignment of state politics with the central government . Moreover, Nitish Kumar, despite long years in power and multiple political shifts, remains a towering figure in the state's political landscape.


The NDA's campaign strategically positioned him as the anchor of stability and good governance, a tag he has earned over the years. While anti-incumbency was expected to weigh in favour of Mahagathbandhan, the NDA managed to turn the narrative towards experience, predictability and steady administration. This perception proved crucial tipping the balance in favour of the NDA. What truly powered the NDA, however, was its broadened social coalition. Beyond its traditional upper-caste and OBC support, the alliance made significant inroads among Economically backward castes (EBCs), Dalit communities and, critically, women voters. Women emerged as a silent yet decisive constituency whose turnout strongly favoured the NDA.

Equally important was the alliance's disciplined and highly coordinated election machinery. It ran a focused, message driven campaign that highlighted development, welfare continuity and social stability. Booth-level workers, constituency-level organisers and well-networked local leaders ensured that the NDA's messaging travelled uniformly and effectively across the state.

In contrast, the Mahagathbandhan struggled to match this coherence. Despite generating enthusiasm in several pockets and fielding energetic leaders such as Tejashwi Yadav, the opposition failed to convert sentiment into structured mobilisation. Internal contradictions, an uneven ground presence and reliance on a narrow caste base weakened its effort. The dependence on the traditional Muslim-Yadav combination further limited its reach. Attempts to expand into EBCs and non-Yadav OBC groups did not significantly alter the electoral arithmetic. The underperformance of key partners – particularly the Congress – dragged down the coalition's overall tally. The entry of new players such as the Jan Suraaj Party further fragmented the anti-NDA vote, weakening the Mahagathbandhan in several constituencies without yielding compensatory gains.

Nepal: Will the elections be held on time?

The country is caught between competing demands for electoral reform, a restive youth movement seeking deep structural change, and a judiciary questioning the very legitimacy of the current government

The question on everyone's lips is whether the elections in Nepal, slated for 5 March 2026, can be held on time — or even at all. The alternatives being discussed include the reinstatement of the dissolved Parliament with a new election date and the reappointment of former five-time Prime Minister SB Deuba; or an extension of the existing election date, something Prime Minister Sushila Karki herself has mentioned. So far, sixteen petitions have been filed in the Supreme Court seeking the restoration of the House. Former Prime Minister KP Oli, ousted three times, has called the present government unconstitutional and demanded Parliament's revival. On 29 October, a constitutional bench of the Supreme Court asked President R. C. Paudyel to provide justification for the dissolution of the House and directed petitioners seeking its revival to appear before the Court on November 20.

The establishment has not yet responded to the Court. Prime Minister Karki has attributed the formation of her government to the GenZ Andolan. for which its members seek national recognition as MOV 082. The real question now is whether the reforms demanded by GenZ — a directly elected Prime Minister, a stable government, voting rights for overseas Nepalis, and a reduction in the voting age from 18 to 16 — can be implemented before March 5. Some reforms could be enacted through a Presidential Commission empowered to amend the Constitution, should the government agree. On October 19, Miraj Dhungana, who had earlier released a video outlining GenZ's demands, announced the formation of a new political party.

However, some maintain that GenZ itself will not contest the elections. Several of their initial eight-point demands were found to be unimplementable — such as the core issue of eradicating corruption, which is best addressed by an elected government rather than an activist move-

GenZ itself remains deeply fractured. Nineteen different groups, many infiltrated by vested interests, have rendered the reform movement lacking in cohesion and clarity. In neighbouring Bangladesh, students recently hammered out the "July Charter", which includes electoral reforms that must be implemented before the February 2026 elections. Although the Charter was initially opposed as unconstitutional by the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), it was supported by its ally, Jamaat-e-Islami. Nepal's own Andolan-led reforms of 1990 could not be fully implemented because of the "mischievous clauses" inserted by the Palace into the 1990 Constitution — clauses that eventually triggered the Maoist uprising of 1996 and paved the way for the Federal Democratic Republic of Nepal in 2008, replacing the Constitutional Monarchy. The single-party Maoist



rule that followed saw Prachanda attempt to bring the Nepal Army under party control.

The 2015 Constitution sought to prevent a repeat of the 2008 scenario by introducing a mixed electoral system, but it was later manipulated by three Prime Ministers — Oli, Prachanda, and Deuba — who shared power among themselves. Nepal, which has already had seven constitutions in seven decades, now faces the urgent need for constitutional amendments that can address this entrenched instability.

Prime Minister Karki has met various political parties, engaged with GenZ representatives, and selectively addressed some of their demands. The state violence that resulted in 76 deaths and incidents of arson is under investigation. Of the 1,300 weapons lost by the police, only a few have been recovered. Many of those who fled the jails have been recaptured, though some are believed to have escaped into India. Recent arrests in Ghorai, Dang, include arsonists who torched the district court, government offices, and public facilities — evidence gathered through CCTV footage. Meanwhile, whispers are circulating that Karki is leaning towards the United States and the European Union, raising eyebrows

within the establishment. Nineteen new political parties have registered, adding to the existing 122. Rising political figures such as Balen

The Dioneer royalists, divisions are emerging between Raigndra Lingden and between Raigndra Lingden and Shah, Mayor of Kathmandu, and Harka Sampang, Mayor of Dharan, SINCE 1865 Dhawal Shamsher Rana, while are keeping their cards close to their

chests. Rabi Lamichhane, the charismatic leader of the ostensibly non-ideological Rastriva Swatantra Party, is currently in jail, and his popularity has declined.

The Nepali Congress (NC) is also in turmoil. Party President and five-time Prime Minister Sher Bahadur Deuba is recovering in a Singapore hospital following an assault by GenZ activists. Acting President Purna Bahadur Khadka is overseeing Central Committee deliberations on whether to hold the national convention before or after the elections — and whether to contest the March polls at all. General Secretary Gagan Thapa favours holding the convention now, while a majority led by senior leader Shekhar Koirala wants it postponed until after the elections.

The CPN (UML), meanwhile, is in a dilemma. Its leader Oli has been tarnished by the events that led to the GenZ uprising and his eventual ouster. A majority of the party's Central Committee wants him to resign, but he has dug in his heels. This has opened a window for former President Bidya Devi Bhandari to attempt a political comeback. It is clear that the UML will not fight the next elections under Oli's leader-

Maoist leader and thrice-elected Prime Minister Prachanda, known for his political agility and instinct for survival, has orchestrated the merger of ten leftist parties into what China has long sought - the revival of the erstwhile Nepal Communist Party, with Prachanda as its coordinator. The word "Maoist" has been conspicuously dropped. Meanwhile, the CPN (Unified Socialist) has split, with former Prime Ministers Madhav Nepal and Jhalanath Khanal parting ways — Nepal joining Prachanda's bloc. Other new entrants include Minister Kulman Ghising's Ujjailo Nepal Party and the Dynamic Democratic Party, founded by Buddha Air owner Birendra Basnet. Smaller parties are also

undergoing rebranding. The Madhes parties, already splintered into at least six factions, have fractured further. Among between Rajendra Lingden and firebrand royalist Durga Prasain

has announced a Hindu Rashtra movement and a protest for the restoration of the monar-

chy on 1 December. Ultimately, the verdict on whether the elections will be held — with or without reforms will rest with President Paudyel, Prime Minister Karki, Chief Justice Prakash Man Singh Raut, and, inevitably. GenZ and the political parties. Elections may yet be delayed, for precisely the same reasons that could hold up Bangladesh's own 2026 polls. Elections in Nepal were originally due at the end of 2027, with the expiry of the dis solved House. Prime Minister Karki remains confident that she will hold them earlier — but whether she will be allowed to do so remains

US shutdown leaves economy strained

Before the ice melts, the ego must: The real crisis behind COP30

The 30th UN Climate Conference has opened in Belém. The world meets in a burning forest to discuss how to stop the fire. For decades, we have spoken of cooperation but practised postponement. Finance is sidelined, attendance is thin, and the absence of the United States, the world's second-largest emitter, is dismissed as "less disruptive than expected". Yet the Earth does not hear declarations; it registers only emissions.

The Thresholds We Have Crossed

We are well past uncertainty. The world has already crossed the 1.5 °C threshold above preindustrial levels. Each of the past eleven years has been the hottest on record. The planet's fever mirrors our own: restless, rising, unwill-

The Global Tipping Points Report 2025 confirms the first irreversible Earth-system collapse: warm-water coral reefs, more than 80 per cent bleached since 2023, are dying, threatening nearly a billion people who depend on them. The Amazon is nearing dieback below a two-degree rise; 17 per cent has already turned to savanna, releasing more carbon than India emits in a year. The Greenland and West Antarctic ice sheets are destabilising, together capable of raising sea levels by up to five metres.

The Arctic is warming 3.5 times faster than the global average, releasing methane and fuelling record wildfires. The United States has already endured fourteen billion-dollar climate disasters this year, with losses exceeding \$100 billion. Global emissions, instead of falling 44 per cent by 2030 as pledged, have risen by 3 per cent. Even if every COP30 promise is kept, we remain on track for 2.3-2.5 °C of warming. The fever will not subside because the disease lies not in the atmosphere but in ambition.

Policy and Technology Alone Will Not

Governments cannot impose what voters refuse. The same person who demands climate action as a citizen demands consumption as a buyer. No political system survives long by asking its people to live with less, so nations sign accords and return home to preserve comfort. The richest five per cent of

Self-knowledge is solid action. Inner clarity can take social form. Cooperatives in Europe run solar grids owned by residents rather than corporations. Bhutan's "Gross National Happiness" demonstrates that even states can measure success using internal parameters rather than external growth.

One begins voting for policies that curb planned obsolescence, limit luxury emissions, and reward circular design. One demands that governments tax waste, not work, and that corporations disclose ecological facts rather than glossy pledges. One supports a green cess and a carbon border tax. And all this arises not from morality or ethics but from the same inner place that, if left unexamined, leads to

Can personal transformation reshape political reality? It must, because politics ultimately reflects the consciousness of the populace. When enough individuals see through manufactured desire, industries lose their grip. When consumption is recognised as compensatory behaviour, markets adapt or collapse.

Multiply inner awakening a millionfold, and industries will shift, because demand creates supply. Policy without inner change breeds resentment; introspection without public action is hypocrisy. The atmosphere will not cool while the mind burns. Humanity has always had insight, but wisdom was rarely lived by the masses. Religion became ritual rather than realisation; belief rather than understanding. The Gita calls Kama (desire) the destroyer of knowledge; the Buddha named Trishna (craving) the root of suffering; Lao Tzu counselled knowing when enough is enough. Yet economies were

What went wrong? Wisdom was kept separate from commerce, confined to temples while society walked blindfolded. The crisis is not that wisdom was absent, but that it never left the books to challenge the factory floor. Forests fell while prayers rose; rivers died as shrines multiplied.

The philosopher's task does not end with meditation or publication. He must enter society and ensure that the light he has seen becomes the living light of the common man. He must be both rebel and builder: challenging the system while shaping new institutions. If he retreats, his self-absorption becomes planet's ruin.





New US Bill Targets Outsourcing, Threatens India's IT Engine

The HIRE Act bill introduced in the U.S. Senate on 5 September 2025 seeks to penalise outsourcing through a 25 per cent excise tax and denial of tax deductibility for payments to foreign service providers.

For India's \$280-billion IT, BPO and GCC ecosvstem—dependent on the U.S. for over 60 per cent of revenues—this would sharply erode the cost advantage that underpins offshore delivery. Though still at an early legislative stage, the bill signals rising U.S. hostility to offshoring, and India's tech sector must monitor it closely.

The new 'Halting International Relocation of Employment (HIRE) Act' bill, introduced in the U.S. Senate on 5 September 2025—if it becomes law—would pose a serious threat to India's IT

With the United States accounting for more than 60 per cent of the industry's revenues, the introduction of this bill has triggered unease across India's \$280-billion technology services ecosystem.

For a sector built on offshore delivery and cost arbitrage, the proposed law strikes at the heart of its operating model.

It is essential to distinguish this legislation from the similarly named Hiring Incentives to Restore Employment (HIRE) Act of 2010, which was a post-financial-crisis stimulus package offering payroll tax holidays and retention credits to U.S. employers. The 2025 HIRE Act is entirely different—a new, standalone bill crafted to deter outsourcing by U.S. companies and shift work back onshore.

Key Proposals

Introduced in the U.S. Senate on September 5, 2025 by Senator Bernie Moreno (R-Ohio), the bill proposes a suite of aggressive anti-outsourcing provisions. The most far-reaching among them is a 25 per cent excise tax on payments that U.S. firms make to any "foreign person" for labour or services that ultimately benefit U.S. consumers, even if the services are performed entirely abroad.

In parallel, the bill seeks to deny tax deductibility for such payments, dramatically increasing the net cost of sourcing work from countries

It also introduces enhanced reporting requirements, forcing firms to disclose all "outsourc-



ing payments" and exposing them to significant penalties for non-compliance.

If enacted, these measures would apply to all relevant payments made on or after 31 December 2025, effectively beginning January

For India, the implications are stark. •A 25 per cent tax surcharge combined with loss

of deductibility could make offshore delivery meaningfully more expensive for U.S. companies, prompting some to renegotiate contracts, rebalance delivery toward onshore or near-shore hubs, or slow down the pace of new

The Plioneer SINCE 1865 outsourcing. High-volume functions such as application maintenance, customer support, and back-office processing are particularly vul-

nerable. Even GCCs—captive centres that serve U.S. parent companies—may not be sheltered, as the proposed tax applies to any payment benefiting U.S. consumers, including internal cost allocations.

· Indian firms could face pressure to expand onsite U.S. staffing, accept margin compression, or accelerate a pivot toward higher-value digital, AI, cybersecurity, and consulting services.

Meanwhile, uncertainty could chill new GCC investments at a time when India has become a global hub for such centers. That said, the bill is at a early stage. It has only

been introduced—without committee referral, hearings, or co-sponsors—and its passage is far from assured. U.S. technology and services companies are likely to lobby aggressively against measures that raise their operating costs.

Still, the political signal is unmistakable: Washington is re-examining the economics of offshoring. India's IT sector would be wise to monitor the bill's progress closely—and prepare for a world where U.S. outsourcing policy could turn structurally less favorable.

Ordinance on referendum unconstitutional: Jurists

Bangladesh overnight issued an ordinance in line with interim Government chief Professor Muhammad Yunus proposed referendum on a political charter, drawing immediate rebuttal from jurists who called

it "unconstitutional". President Muhammad Shahabuddin on late Thursday signed into ordinance the "July Charter Implementation Order" while the document was drafted by Yunus-headed National Consensus Commission after protracted consultations with several political parties excluding deposed prime minister Sheikh Hasina's now disbanded Awami League.

In a nationwide televised address Chief Adviser Yunus on Thursday said plebiscite would be staged simultaneously with the planned national election in February next year to elicit peoples mandate for the charter.

"Most of the decisions taken in the July Charter, including those in the gazette, are contrary to the current Constitution. Since the Constitution is still in force, the President cannot legally sign this gazette," leading constitutional expert and former law professor Shahdeen Malik said in a newspaper interview. Bangladesh Constitution kept no provision for referendum or plebiscite while its Article 93 of says no ordinance could be promulgated for altering or repealing any

provision

Constitution".

The charter contained over 80 proposals including issues requiring amendments to the Constitution but Yunus said the proposals were synopsized in four issues while the voters would just need to say "yes" or "no" in a question covering the four issues. Malik told Bangladesh's the Business Standard newspaper that the referendum "would have been acceptable if the Constitution had been annulled or suspended under martial law (but) since neither has happened, everything should proceed according to the existing Constitution". He feared the voters would be unable to make an informed decision on the referendum issues and will "leave their ballots blank" on the referendum

'Yes' or 'No' on", he said. The ordinance stipulated the next parliament must complete constitutional reform, as outlined in the charter and by the referendum's result, within 180 working days from the date of its first sitting.

Bodies of 15 Palestinians returned by Israel: Gaza health officials

Khan Younis

Israel returned the bodies of 15 Palestinians to Gaza on Friday, officials at Nasser hospital in Khan Younis said, in the latest step to fulfilling the terms of the **US-brokered** ceasefire agreement.

The bodies were returned after militants late Thursday handed over the body of one of the last four remaining Israeli hostages taken during the October 7, 2023, attack that launched the war in Gaza. Israel identified the returned body as that of Meny Godard, who was abducted from Kibbutz Be'eri in southern Israel.

His wife, Ayelet, was killed during the attack. The armed wings of Hamas and the Palestinian Islamic Jihad said Godard's body was recovered in southern Gaza.

The remains of 25 hostages have been returned to Israel since the ceasefire between Israel and Hamas began on October 10.

There are still three more in Gaza that need to be recovered and handed over. Hamas returned 20 living hostages to Israel on October 13. For each hostage returned, Israel has released remains of 15 Palestinians, an exchange central to the ceasefire's first phase. Overall, the number of bodies of Palestinians received so far is 330, of





Speed and simplicity in getting the loans is more important than the interest rates as the deciding factors for the consumers. According to a survey by Paisabazaar, India's largest marketplace for consumer credit, which was conducted among more than 10,200 respondents across the country, 42 per cent of the borrowers chose the lenders primarily for quick disbursals and easy processes, while 25 per cent prioritised lower interest rates. The findings underline a clear shift in borrowers' behaviour convenience and digital accessibility in shaping loan decisions compared to costs and interest

A majority 80 per cent of the respondents said that they preferred guided digital platforms for comparing and applying for loans, with 53 per cent citing faster approvals and seamless processing as their top expectations from lenders. "The growing confidence among the consumers across segments to take personal loans not just for essential needs but for aspirations, lifestyle, and festive spends, reflects a maturing credit ecosystem," said Santosh Agarwal, CEO, Paisabazaar. "Conversations with the consumers clearly indicate a preference for seamless digital processes that make access to credit convenient, transparent, and easy," he

The survey pointed to the rising first-time adoption of festive personal loans. About 41 per cent of the respondents said that they took the loans for the first time this year, and 46 per cent indicated that they were likely to borrow again during the future festive seasons, suggesting growing comfort with short-term credit. When asked about the reasons for borrowings, home renovation and furnishings topped the list at 18 per cent, followed by shopping, gifting, appliances, and electronics (15 per cent). Other popular categories included precious metals, debt consolidation (10 per cent), and fashion and lifestyle purchases (10 per cent).

Nearly 60 per cent of the borrowers opted for loans below ₹5 lakh, while 42 per cent preferred tenures under five years, which signals prudence, and an attempt to keep liabilities in check. According to the recent Reserve Bank of India (RBI) figures, while financial assets added between 2019 and 2025 grew by about 48 per cent, annual liabilities during the same period more than doubled, rising just over 100 per cent. In GDP terms, assets added accounted for 12 per cent of GDP. Financial liabilities, which were just below four per cent of GDP in 2019-20, climbed to 4.7 per cent in 2024-25.

The only relief lies in the fact that the liabilities fell sharply from 6.2 per cent in 2023-24, marking a 1.5 per cent dip in just one year. Which is a rare and noteworthy correction that merits deeper analysis. One possible explanation, economists suggest, lies in the "confidence factor." As households see their wealth, particularly paper wealth from booming stock markets rise, they tend to borrow more freely, confident in their ability to repay. More importantly, as the asset values rise, they do repay, and reduce liabilities.

However, when markets correct, this confidence quickly erodes, leaving families more leveraged than they realise. The recent moderation in stock prices could therefore serve as a timely reminder about the risks of overreliance on market-linked wealth for debt decisions. It also implies that the moment the asset values turned southwards, households reduced liabilities instantly. and tried to be in sync with the current scenario. The only reason why the liabilities came down is because of the consumers' mindset.

India's credit ecosystem has undergone a remarkable transformation over the last few years. Rising digital adoption, instant approvals, and improved credit awareness have made personal loans more accessible than before. The Paisabazaar report reinforces this shift, portraying borrowers as more tech-savvy and confident yet still largely prudent in terms of loan size and tenure. Experts note that the focus on digital-first borrowing is likely to deepen as fintech platforms expand partnerships with banks and NBFCs. They bring speed, transparency, and competition into the credit landscape.

One can look at various factors to explain this phenomenon. There is a shift from paying EMIs to buy a house or a plot to one where families borrow to fund consumption over traditional assets. A move away from the traditional model to instantaneous consumers can create a new culture. When borrowers feel more comfortable to loan money, without any hassles, but with ease, this indicates a credit culture. There is no angst about borrowings, interest rates, or payments. The only worries are whether the loans will be available without any problems. This is both a positive, and a

In a country like India, the ease of borrowing can be a classic trap. Just because the money is available, we borrow, and then use the money for things we do not need, or anticipate. As we bank on higher incomes in the future, or our abilities to pay the loans, and interest, we do not realise that things can go wrong. This is why the assets-liabilities mismatch within the Indian households is a matter of concern, not just for the policy-maker, but the society. If loans stare in our face, we need to turn it away. It is not easy. It is more convenient to accept the money that comes in, and worry later about the cash that will go out as principal and interest.



The grand tariff-trade ballroom

have sudden changes of heart since he firmed a plan to replace the East Wing of the White House with a \$300 million ballroom. It picked up pace during his recent three-nation Asia tour last month, and has concretised since his return. In recent times, Trump has altered, or indicated changes to, the specifics related to several nations. His administration has engaged in negotiations to change the final

Notable examples of the tariff transformations include the temporary, proposed, and specific rates, either through negotiations or unilateral decisions, with China, India, Japan, Brazil, among others. The around-Asia-in-five-days connected Malaysia, Japan, and South Korea to boost regional agenda, and ink major deals. After sealing deals in Malaysia, he managed more in Japan, which resulted in a landmark framework on nuclear energy, and critical minerals. In July, America and Japan set tariffs at 15 per cent, a reduction from a threatened 25 per cent. It was the same month that the White House announced the construction of a new

After Japan and South Korea, Trump beamed for the cameras with China's Premier Xi Jinping. After the temporary truce between them, the media headlines screamed that the trade war was coming to an end, albeit not too silently. Since the widely-splashed meeting, the world's largest economies reached key agreements that signaled a reset in economic cooperation. Xi emphasised that China and the US need to aim to be "partners and friends," despite the differences. He called for the two nations to shoulder global

week's meeting between senior officials from Beijing and Washington "would further enhance the favorable atmosphere, demonstrating that a stable and sound bilateral relationship serves the interests of both sides, and that the US business community highly values such certainty as it plans to expand further in the Chinese market." A US representative felt that the US business community was "inspired by the historic meeting between the leaders of China and the US in Busan, South Korea," and another observed how the six

months preceding the meeting was a "period of uncertainty," which has possibly ended.

Since the last week, the two **SINCE 1865** nations successively announced a one-year suspension of port fees on each other's vessels, and a parallel halt to related investigations in the shipping and shipbuilding sectors. This marked the latest step to implement the consensus reached at the bilateral talks during Trump's Asia tour. China agreed to end the retaliatory measures against the US semiconductor firms, and others, which could ease the pressures. The agreements were described as a "great success" by Trump, and were viewed by the more humorous voices as possible rehearsals for the grand dance among the global leaders at the new ballroom.

Trump identified India as the next success after months of uncertainty, and ongoing trade talks. Though the thaw was apparent with the US president waxing eloquent about the India Prime Minister Narendra Modi, it went up a few notches at the swearing-in of the new US Ambassador to India. His

statement temporarily lifts the doubts that the Trump-Xi waltzing in the new ballroom would sideline India. Mark "temporarily" since Trump's framing of the US-China summit as a "G-2" encounter signals a bipolar global power structure that dominated Washington Beijing.

If the new ballroom intends to host only the elite, it could reduce New Delhi's leverage in multilateral forums, and negotiations. India could lose its edge an alternative manufacturing hub unless it accelerates domestic reforms, and supply While integration. waiting for a formal of the opening

Trump's choice of a staunch loyalist, Sergio Gor, to become the ambassador in New Delhi shows his diplomatic priorities. He does not want anyone to interfere with his wishes.

"The tariffs on India are really high because of the Russian oil... but they have now substantially reduced Russian oil... so we will be bringing the tariffs down," said the US President. However, according to latest trade reports, India's crude oil imports from Russia remained almost the same in October, compared to September. Trump believed that

they will substantially go down in December. Apart from this oil slick, there is the visa amnesia. The views on H-1B visa regime changes as fast as the Internet speeds.

Trump first imposed high visa fees, even as he talked about a change in the regime from lottery-based system to a meritsalary-based one. Then he claimed that Americans need certain skills and talents available with the foreigners. Recently, he maintained, "You also have to bring in talent." Earlier, he urged a South Korean firm to bring in specialists to train the Americans. It seems like the US president seeks the help of the East to get a few "teachers." It is a kind of reverse skill flow, from Delhi to Washington.

Someone needs to seriously ask Trump if he intends to use the "ornately designed and carefully crafted" ballroom for a dance with limited partners, or fill up the entire 90,000 sq ft (which has a "seated capacity" of 650 people, and maybe slightly less for dance space). Sadly, the space may not allow all the partners, accompanied as they are with paraphernalia of delegates. After all, imagine the following leaders in the same room. Russia's Vladimir Putin, China's Xi, and India's Modi may exchange handshakes with each other, and Trump. So will many others from Asia and Europe.

What may not gel with many may be the entry of Syria's President Ahmad al-Sharaa, whose bonhomie with Trump marks another dramatic reconciliation with a former wanted al-Qaeda insurgent. This meeting followed coordinated actions such as the removal of Syria from the sanction list, which cleared the legal and diplomatic obstacles. Politics can indeed make strange bedfellows, but al-Sharaa's inclusion may create a mess. Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan, the Gulf states, and Israel will need to reassess Syria-related policies. They will figure out how to balance prospects for reconstruction, and the return of the refugee against security concerns and

Trump has scripted new texts, and language in his private book on diplomacy, business, economics, and politics. In his view, past relationships do not matter much. Past friends can be enemies (Putin and Modi), past enemies can become partfriends (Xi), and past enemies can become strong friends (al-Sharaa). This is an apt time to accommodate more, rather than less, in the ballroom.



For ardent fans of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, it has been a few weeks of celebrations, joy, and congratulations. First, there was the news from the agriculture ministry that farm and horticulture output were set to break existing records in the current year. Then came the news from the big rating agencies, and other institutions that the GDP growth rate will exceed the earlier estimates. The icing on the cake was

first time in history. This augurs well for the aspirational middle class. How can one forget that inflation, which is based on the consumer price index, fell to an incredible low of 0.25 per cent. This is the lowest in the 11 years that Modi has been the prime minister. One cannot remember the last time the figure was

so low. No wonder the fans of Modi are beating the drums, and dancing in the aisles. But I wish to add a note of caution, and precaution for them.

For one, the 0.25 per cent number is possibly a one-off one. Do not be surprised, or shocked, if it goes up to 3-4-5 per cent in a few months. The low number, while welcome, is not a sign that the country has completely and unflaggingly contained inflation. For instance, vegetable inflation, or let us say, the prices of vegetables, have crashed by more than 25 per cent in October, and by more than 20 per cent earlier in September. No wonder there is negative food inflation. When it comes to cereals like rice, a large majority get free rice, and do not need to suffer the implications of inflation.

GST 2.0 is a one-off, and the rates and slabs will remain the same for a few years. So do not expect the GST effect to continue as it will wear off in a few months. The central bank, which sets the core interest rate, does not have much control over inflation because it is caused due to a sustained rise in food prices. Thus, the events and decisions that pushed prices down, and which were aided by good monsoons, good Kharif production, and other factors, may change.

Now, let us focus on the really jarring missing.

data, which is included in the official press release on retail inflation in October. While the national average is 0.25 per cent, the figure for Punjab is more than seven times higher at 1.81 per cent. Karnataka is worse at 2.3 per cent, and the number for Jammu and Kashmir is close to three per cent. As you ponder, the kicker, shocker, or a punch lies in Kerala, where the price rise is 8.95 per cent to be precise. One wonders how the inflation can be so different in different states located in different regions.

The massive difference between Kerala measures it. and India can be caused only by two factors. One, the rate of the rise in regular consumption items in Kerala

was incredibly high. Two, the consumption basket in Kerala is drastically different from Punjab, Karnataka, and Jammu and Kashmir, as also the other states. Remember, in Bihar, Odisha, and a few states, the retail inflation is extremely low, and borders on the negative. Clearly, both the factors seem absurd, and cannot be explained logically. There is something

The solution may be simple. Several committees, which created representative Consumer Index. repeatedly asserted that the diversity of India means that a single inflation rate is a difficult proposition. We are being forced to live with it, just as Indians are forced to live with a single time zone. We know that when the sun sets in Guwahati, Assam, and it is pitch dark, there is bright sunlight in Mumbai. Something similar seems to be happening with retail inflation, and the way India

Hopefully, this will change, and mercifully, the Government has announced that in February, 2026 it will launch a new consumer price index, which will

be more representative, and give adequate weights to the items of regular consumption. This may sort out, and eliminate obsolete items in the current basket of goods used to measure consumption. I may point out that C Voter has launched a serious academic exercise to launch an aspirational Consumer Price Index in 2026. In Bihar, it recently

conducted preliminary surveys.

Bihar is an excellent starting point for a pilot because its per capita expenditure is the lowest in the country, and this will help C Voter to gradually arrive at a truly representative index. It is the lower classes, and the poor, whose spend needs to be accounted for, and not the middle class and rich. The latter two segments may crib about inflation, but are not really bothered about it. What matters is the rate of inflation for those who buy scooters, motorcycles, and bicycles.

In fact, most experts feel that the Consumer Price Index is biased towards the big cities, and undermines the situation in the smaller towns, and villages. Similarly, there is an inherent inability to account for the introduction, and purchases of new kinds of goods, improvements in quality, and substitution effects. New goods bias overestimates inflation. Quality upgrades may do the same, as a product may be expensive, but more productive. The fixed basket approach may lead to wrong calculations. The same reasons may achieve the opposite results in some cases.

One should never forget the base effect syndrome. Since food inflation was high a few months ago, the huge negative rates in September and October were driven by the higher earlier bases. This is why when one looks at sector-wise changes in prices, housing inflation was almost three per cent in October, healthcare was nearer to four per cent, and fuel and light was two per cent. These figures are way higher than the national average. This implies that even as consumers suffer with higher prices in these areas, their gain was in terms of food purchases, which were driven down by the Kharif crop.

As ardent consumers of data and information, we need to be aware of these issues. An average is an average, and not indicative of the nuanced changes across sectors, and states. One needs to go beyond the average to understand how price rise affects different segments of the society, and how changing consumption patterns have a differing impact on different sections. The one-size-fits-all does not work.

Asia's Potential Bipolarity: A vision of harmonious power between India and China

In the evolving geopolitics of the 21st century, the idea that Asia might become a new global power centre is increasingly compelling. Within this vision, two giants — India and China — naturally stand out. But rather than framing their roles in adversarial terms, what if India and China developed a cooperative relationship, each strong and independent, yet mutually respectful and supportive? What if that sort of partnership became the axis of Asia's rise — not a bipolar rivalry, but a constructive bipolarity? We explore that possibility: how it might come about, what it would look like, what the core factors of success and failure are and how this might translate into Asia becoming the world's strategic fulcrum.

Imagine India and China as the twin pillars of Asia's future. Each commands massive demographic, economic and strategic weight. Together, they would represent an Asian axis of power: China bringing scale, infrastructure, and manufacturing prowess; India bringing innovation, a relatively youthful population and soft-power resonance rooted in its democratic system. The key nuance is not merging into one hegemon, nor one country subsuming the other, but a bipolar axis of two complementary major powers, cooperating rather than contending. Their geopolitical outlook would shift from zero-sum competition to a shared recognition that a rising Asia benefits both and that in a global order marked by uncertainty, unity yields dividends. Asia thus ceases to be a theatre of greatpower competition dominated by external actors, and instead becomes a platform for endogenous growth, innovation and influence, with India and China at its heart. If realised, Asia might shift from being perceived as a region to be contested, to being a region that leads.

The sheer power of this combined entity forms the foundational strength of this vision. Together, India and China already account for a huge fraction of global economic activity; on a Purchasing Power Parity (PPP) basis, their combined output is already immense. This scale creates an unshakeable base for Asia-wide demand and investment. Critically, their economic profiles are complementary: China's strength lies in largescale manufacturing and sophisticated supply chains, while India's is rooted in its consumption-driven growth, its vast digital economy, and recent clashes mean that territorial disputes



its leadership in services exports. If China's capital and industrial expertise were leveraged with India's consumer base and human capital, the resulting synergy could create an unparalleled economic engine for Asia. Furthermore, with the two Asian powers aligned, their influence on global Governance would be amplified. Both nations are key voices for the Global South and their coordinated action-whether on climate change negotiations or demands for multilateral institutional reform-would solidify Asia's voice, moving the world toward a truly multipolar structure. Moreover, successful cooperation itself would be a strategic win, reducing the immense cost and risk associated with a classic zero-sum rivalry, freeing up resources for domestic development.

However, the path to this harmonious bipolarity is riddled with formidable obstacles-the very realities that currently shape the relationship. The single most critical deterrent is the deep-seated mistrust stemming from their long, unresolved border. Historical conflicts and remain an active and potentially fatal flashpoint. This fragility is compounded by a structural economic issue: the massive and widening trade imbalance. India's fears of being structurally dependent on China for critical imports, coupled with the low level of mutual investment, breeds strategic anxiety and undermines confidence in long-term economic alignment. Beyond economics, the divergent political systems and strategic cultures pose inherent challenges to trust and transparency.

China's party-led system and its vision for a regionally centralised power structure conflict with India's democratic and federal system, which seeks a multipolar Asia where its autonomy is paramount. Past initiatives like the Bangladesh-China-India-Myanmar (BCIM) Economic Corridor have ultimately stalled, demonstrating the difficulty of sustaining high-level cooperation mechanisms when core strategic friction persists. Furthermore, both countries face immense domestic pressures-China managing its ageing population and debt, India tackling infrastructure and inequality-which can easily force them to turn inward and sideline the cooperative agenda.

Yet, if these weaknesses can be managed, the opportunities unlocked are transformational for Asia. A cooperative axis could, for the first time, deliver pan-Asian connectivity. Infrastructure corridors, moving beyond old, stalled proposals, could be built with shared finance and technology, knitting South, Southeast and Central Asia more tightly and making regional supply chains more resilient. This would be a crucial step in accelerating the shift of the world's economic centre toward Asia. Moreover, in the critical area of technology and green transition, the potential synergy is enormous.

By combining China's overwhelming manufacturing capacity in solar and EV components with India's market scale and innovation ecosystems, the two giants could lead the green tech revolution and set new global standards for sustainable development. This coordinated leadership, backed by jointly reformed regional institutions, could truly empower the Global South,

their own terms, rather than being subject to the strategic manipulations of external powers.

The successful realisation of this vision, nowever, is constantly shadowed by significant threats. A resurgence of border escalation remains the most dangerous risk, capable of instantly collapsing any framework of cooperation and plunging the region into crisis. This threat is amplified by the external great-power dynamic. The involvement of the US, Japan, and others in the Indo-Pacific, through mechanisms like the Quad, introduces persistent centrifugal forces.

These alliances inherently pull India in one direction and China in another, risking the fragmentation of the cooperative axis into competing blocs. Even without conflict, the underlying competition for regional primacy-who influences neighbours, who leads global fora-may reassert itself, eroding the necessary trust. If the India-China axis is viewed by smaller nations not as a partnership for prosperity but as a new form of dominance, they may resist, creating fragmentation and undermining the entire Asia-wide project.

The future, therefore, hinges on a single, audacious pivot. Imagine a scenario in the early 2030s. India has sustained high growth and expanded its manufacturing base; China has upgraded its economy and consolidated its infrastructure networks. The two nations establish a "Shared Asian Prosperity Framework"-a commitment to structurally reduce India's trade deficit, jointly invest in advanced manufacturing in India and co-finance regional green technology corridors. They commit to a high-level strategic mechanism to manage the border, freeing up resources and attention.

This strategic choice-to opt for managed cooperation over antagonism-allows for the creation of an Asian architecture where both are strong, respected, and autonomous, yet interdependent. If India and China manage to align interests, build trust, invest together and lead regionally, Asia's rise could be orderly, inclusive and dominant.

The ultimate challenge for policymakers, business leaders and strategists is to foster the frameworks and mind-sets that turn rivalry into partnership. Because if the two most populous nations on earth, neighbours with massive stakes in each other's stability, opt for cooperation, the strategic centre of gravity could very well shift to Asia.

WPI inflation falls to 27-month low in October on GST cut, favourable base

Wholesale price inflation fell to a 27-month low of (-) 1.21 per cent in October, led by a sharp deflation in food items like pulses and vegetables and lower prices of fuel and manufactured items, Government data showed on Friday.

Wholesale Price Index (WPI)-based inflation was 0.13 per cent in September and 2.75 per cent in October last year

"The negative rate of inflation in October 2025, is primarily due to decrease in prices of food articles, crude petroleum and natural gas, electricity, mineral oils and manufacture of basic metals etc," the industry ministry said in a statement.

In the case of manufactured products, inflation eased to 1.54 per cent, from 2.33 per cent in September. Fuel and power witnessed a negative inflation or deflation of 2.55 per cent, against 2.58 per cent in September, thus recording a decline for

Chancellor Friedrich Merz said he and other coalition leaders agreed Thursday evening to introduce an electricity price of about 5 euro cents per kilowatt hour starting January 1, through 2028, to "support companies that use a lot of electricity and face

international competition." Talks on the plan with the European Union's executive commission are near-complete and "we assume we will get permission for this," Merz said. The German economy,

Europe's biggest, has shrunk

for the past two years and has not seen significant growth for much longer. The conservative Merz's coalition Government with the centre-left Social Democrats has made revitalising it a priority since taking office in early May.

Still, results haven't shown through vet, with gross domestic product stagnating in the third quarter. This week, the Government's panel of independent economic advisers forecast it will grow by an unimpressive 0.9 per cent next year after edging up 0.2 per cent this year. The country's economy, which is heavy on manufacturing and exports, has been held back by multiple factors including high energy prices, competition from Chinese producers of autos and industrial machinery, a lack of skilled workers

Anil Ambani offers virtual appearance before ED

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) has issued fresh summons to Reliance Group chairman Anil Ambani to appear before it on November 17 in a FEMA case after he skipped his scheduled date on Friday. Ambani offered "virtual means" and officials said the agency rejected his offer to depose through virtual.

In a statement, a spokesperson of the 66-year-old businessman said he has written to the federal probe agency assuring "full cooperation" in the probe.

The agency had asked Ambani to appear before it in person on Friday and get his statement recorded under the Foreign Exchange Management Act (FEMA). The investigation pertains to the Jaipur-Reengus highway project. In an earlier statement, the ED

had said that after recently attaching assets worth ₹7,500 crore belonging to Ambani and his



companies under the anti-money laundering law, a search carried out against Reliance Infrastructure Ltd found that an alleged ₹40 crore was "siphoned" from the highway project.

"Funds moved through Suratbased shell companies to Dubai. The trail has unearthed a wider international hawala network exceeding ₹600 crore," the agency had said.

The ED has recorded the state-

ment of various persons, including some alleged hawala dealers, following which they decided to summon Ambani, said officials.

"The matter (FEMA case) is 15 years old, dates to 2010. It concerns

issues associated with a road contractor," statement said issued by Ambani Group. In 2010, Reliance Infrastructure Ltd awarded an EPC (engineering, procurement and construction) contract to build the JR Toll Road (Jaipur-Reengus highway), it said.

'This was a purely domestic contract with no foreign exchange component involved whatsoever. The IR Toll Road has been fully completed and from 2021 onwards, has been with the National Highways Authority of India," the statement said, adding that Ambani is not a member of the Board of Reliance Infrastructure.

"He served the company for about 15 years, from April 2007 to March 2022, only as a non-executive director, and was never involved in day-to-day management of the company," it said.

The businessman has once been questioned by the ED in a money laundering case linked to an alleged ₹17.000 crore worth bank fraud against his group companies.

Singapore-based man held in Delhi bank fraud case: CBI

The CBI has arrested a Singapore-based man from a hotel near Delhi's Indira Gandhi International Airport in connection with a ₹32crore bank fraud, officials

VAIBHAV HITS SECOND FASTEST T20 TON BY INDIAN




Young sensation Vaibhav Suryavanshi struck the joint second fastest century by an Indian batter in T20 cricket, off 32 balls, for India A against United Arab Emirates in the Asia Cup Rising Stars competition here Friday. The 14-year-old opening batter smacked a total of 15 sixes and 11 fours to make 144 off 42 balls, while equalling the mark of India wicketkeeper batter Rishabh Pant who had a 32-ball century for Delhi against Himachal Pradesh in 2018.

His blitz powered India A to a huge total of 297/4 in 20 overs in which skipper Jitesh Sharma scored a 32-ball 83

The record for the fastest century by an Indian batter in T20s is jointly held by Indian opener and world No 1 T20I batter Abhishek Sharma and Gujarat's Urvil Patel, who both had scored 28-ball tons in the Syed Mushtaq Ali T20 Trophy in 2024-25.

Suryavanshi, who made his debut in the IPL last season, already holds the record for the second fastest century in the competition off 35 balls, when he scored 101 off 38 balls for Rajasthan Royals against Gujarat Titans.

FIDE World Cup: Harikrishna draws first game with Jose

Ronaldo awaits FIFA verdict on World Cup ban

Cristiano Ronaldo likely faces a three-week wait to discover the length of his FIFA ban ahead of the 2026 World Cup.

The Portugal superstar could be suspended for two or three games for the red Thursday for striking Ireland defender Dara O'Shea with an elbow during a 2-0 loss in Dublin.

FIFA has taken three weeks after rounds of 2026 World Cup qualifying games to publish a global list of disciplinary verdicts, including for red cards and incidents such as crowd disorder.

Now, however, FIFA is under less time pressure to process cases with no World Cup playoff games until March, but there is intense interest in the Ronaldo outcome. FIFA declined on Friday to

suggest a timetable for the case. A one-game ban is mandatory and will be served Sunday when group leader Portugal hosts lastplace Armenia. A win will send Ronaldo's team to the finals in the United States, Canada and Mexico.

FIFA disciplinary rules demand a ban of "at least two matches for serious foul play" or "at least three matches for violent conduct."

Those extra games beyond the mandatory sanction must be served in competition, at the World Cup — if Portugal qualifies Sunday as expected — and not in pre-tournament exhibitions.

Ronaldo spun round and swung his right elbow into O'Shea's back as they waited for the ball to be crossed around the hour mark at Aviva Stadium, with Ireland holding a surprise 2-0 lead. The referee at first showed a yellow card but minutes later upgraded it to red after a video review at the field-side monitor.

"I don't think it's an elbow, I think it's a full body," Portugal coach Roberto Martinez said in Dublin. "Obviously when he tries to get away from the defender, I think the action looks worse that what it actually is." "But from where the camera is it looks like an elbow," Martinez said. "We accept it. It could be a red card but for the right reasons.'

Bans in similar casesFIFA disciplinary judges must now decide if Ronaldo is guilty of serious foul play or violent conduct.

Bans of two and three games for serious foul play were imposed on players who were sent off last month in World Cup qualifiers. Qatar defender Tarek Salman got a two-game ban for a serious tackle on a



United Arab Emirates opponent. Salman had both feet off the ground and went over the ball, planting his boot into the shin of his opponent. A three-game ban was

imposed on Burundi forward Bonfils-Caleb Bimenyimana for injuring Kenya goalkeeper Brian Bwire. Bimenyimana raised his boot just above the turf and struck Bwire's face as they converged on a low cross to the near post.

Ronaldo deserved credit, Martinez suggested, for not being sent off previously in

an international career now in its 23rd season. 'He is just a captain that has never been sent off

before in 226 games,"

Martinez said, adding that Ronaldo was "being grabbed, being pulled, being pushed" throughout by Ireland defenders. "I think it was a bit harsh

because he cares about the team," the coach said.

The FIFA verdict could be announced after the Dec. 5 World Cup draw, when each team's schedule of three group-stage opponents will be known.

Ronaldo, who turns 41 in February, is aiming to play at a record sixth World Cup tournament. His great rival Lionel Messi also is due to play at his sixth World Cup.

Messi was sent off on his debut for Argentina in 2005 in a friendly against Hungary.

FRANCE QUALIFIES FOR 2026 **WORLD CUP**

Kylian Mbappé and France are going to the 2026 World Cup. And Cristiano Ronaldo might be banned from Portugal's first game there if his team finally wins its European qualifying group.

Two goals from star striker Mbappé helped two-time champion France to qualify with a 4-0 home win against Ukraine on Thursday. But Ronaldo was ejected for the first time in his international career and Portugal will have to wait until Sunday to secure a qualifying spot for the seventh straight time after it was stunned 2-0 by Ireland in Dublin.

Midfielder Michael Olise and substitute forward Hugo Ekitiké added the other goals in a dominant second half from France, the World Cup runner-up in 2022.

Mbappé sent the penalty straight down the middle to break the deadlock in the 55th minute before Olise turned inside the penalty area to curl home the second goal in the 76th at Parc des Princes in western Paris. Mbappé poked in France's third goal from close range in the 83rd following a goalmouth scramble.
